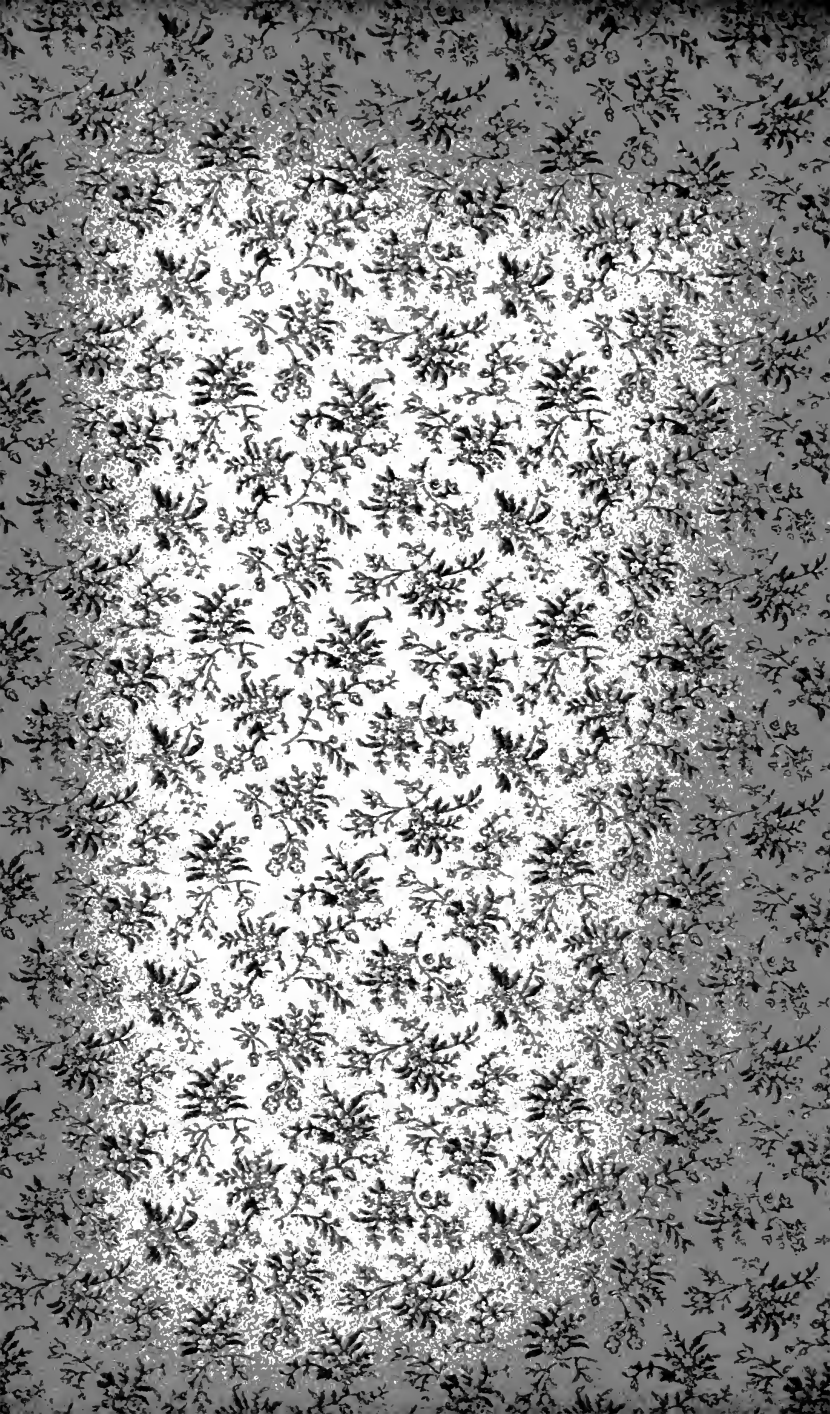
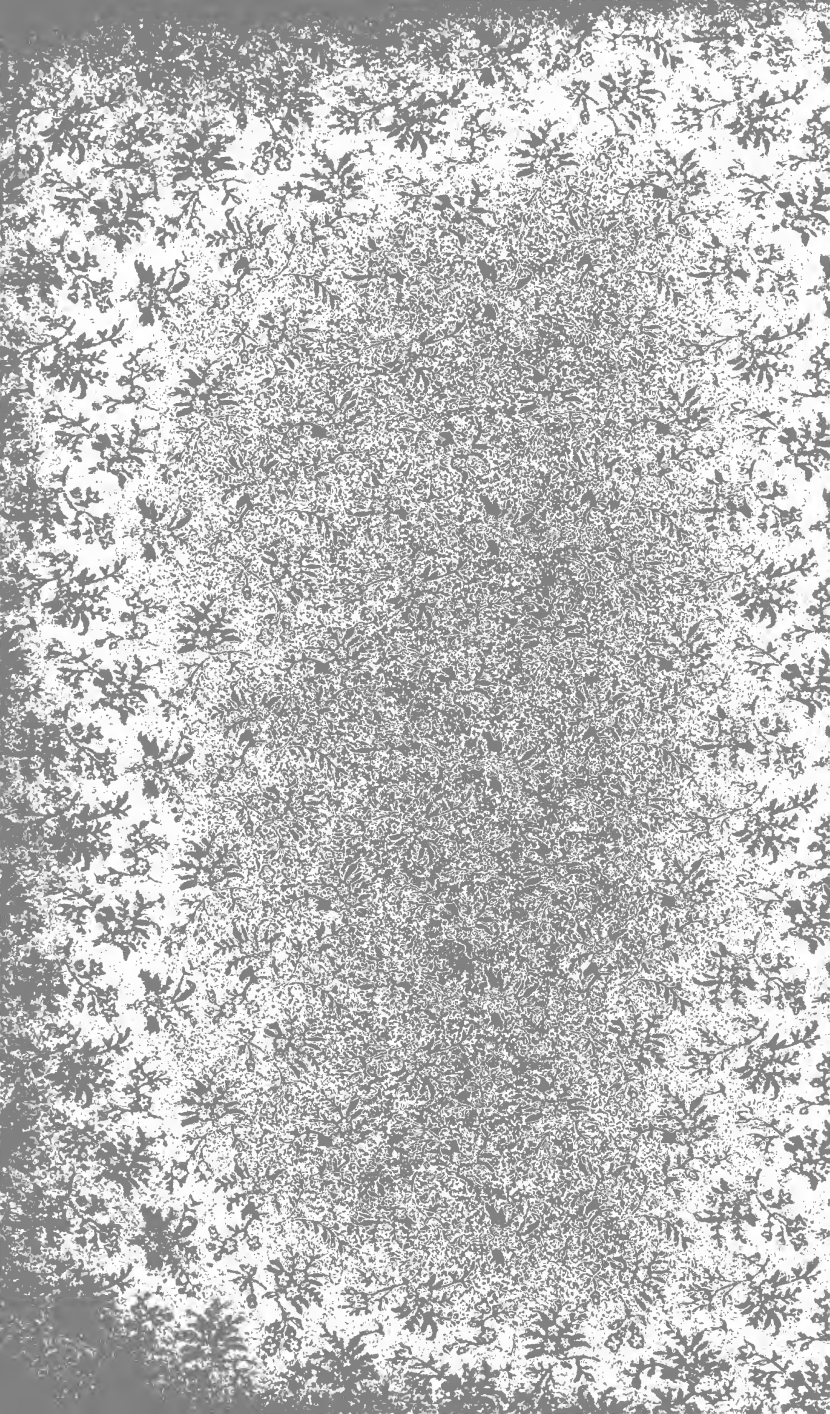

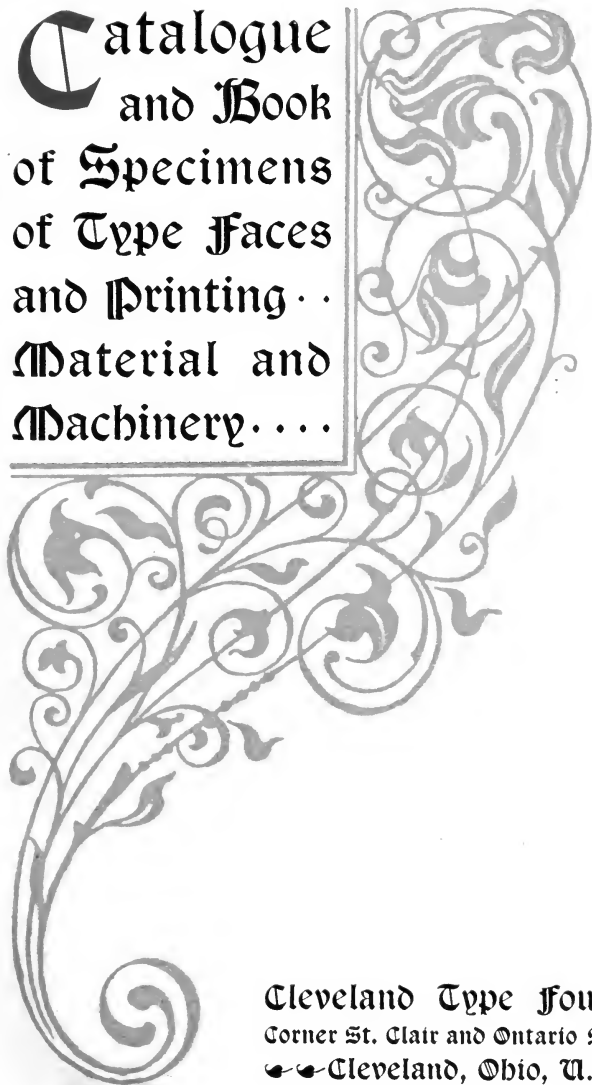

POINT SYSTEM.

*ALL TYPE SHOWN IN THIS BOOK IS CAST ON THE POINT SYSTEM OF
INTERCHANGEABLE TYPE BODIES, AND WILL WORK
TOGETHER AND JUSTIFY ACCURATELY.*

Below we print a table showing comparison between Point System and the Old Bodies. This is given for the benefit of those not yet familiar with the Point System—not to perpetuate the old names, which we believe any attempt to retain in use in connection with the new bodies will result only in confusion. We shall use them in such connection only when we deem it necessary for explanatory purposes. The new sizes will in all cases be designated by the number of points.

Type Specimens.

It is the part of wisdom to move before the usual day of changing habitations, if possible. Machinists, carpenters and painters are more busily engaged at that time than before or after. A new building should be thoroughly tested before moving in, to see whether it is of the requisite strength, and this is the first consideration before taking a lease. The pressroom is the most difficult to move. Study the existing lines of shafting in the new building, if they are to remain, and consider how the floor can be laid out to advantage. Draw a diagram the size of entire floor, an inch to four feet; mark upon this the windows, the lines of shafting and the parts which must be taken out for the elevator or the stairs; then carefully measure your presses, with an allowance for delivery board and a margin around the whole press. This being ascertained, cut a piece of cardboard which shall represent the press, on the same scale as the diagram. Each piece of cardboard should have marked on it a number and name, so that it may be identified. All the presses, with the paper cutters, standing presses, sink and other appurtenances, thus being represented, arrange the cards on the diagram in the most advantageous way, so that they may all come in. By this plan they can be transposed again and again. A pressroom must have space for some white paper and some which has been worked off, and there must be room enough around each machine for men to get by it easily. When the positions are ascertained the spots should be marked with ink, and a copy of the diagram taken to be given to the foreman of the moving gang. It is clearly inexpedient to have the moving of this machinery done by the pressmen. They are strong enough, and understand their machines, but their wages are too high, and they are not used to dead lifts. It is better to make arrangements with some master machinist who is familiar with such work, and who will both take down and set up the presses. The best bargain is for a lump sum. The floor must be examined and repaired, and if at all weak, a platform of a couple of inches in height should be made to be placed under each press. The press farthest from the door or elevator should be first put up, and then the next in order. Sometimes it is found that the press nearest the door in one place can be transposed to farthest part of the new pressroom. This expedites matters very much. If, in the new place, shafting is to be provided, it ought to be attended to early. So ought the main pipes for gas. The individual lights can be put on as soon as the machines are up. Great pains ought to be taken in seeing that the foundation of presses is really level. The composing room and all the other parts of an establishment should be laid out on paper the same way. The largest pieces in a composing room are the imposing stones, but which hardly ever weigh over three hundred pounds. These can be easily handled by men accustomed to lifting, but compositors should not attempt this work. It will generally take eight compositors to do what three strong laborers will easily accomplish. Compositors can, however, be employed to do all the light work, such as arranging the cabinets, cases, stands, galley racks, etc. The position of the cabinets and stands should be so

The Embossing Machines are built only for very heavy embossing and book-cover stamping ("smashing"), and have no inking apparatus whatever. The general appearance and style of operation is somewhat like the regular NEW UNIVERSAL PRESS.

These presses have a gear wheel on each side of frame, and each wheel is let into and is flush with the sides of the bed. These gear wheels have steel sections welded into their periphery, and in said sections are formed the teeth which withstand the strain of impression. 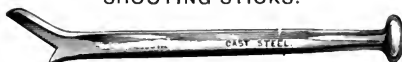

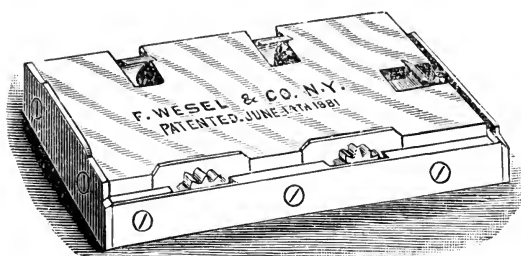

PAPER IN PRESS.

This Press is used for forming into tablets or blocks, bill-heads, letter-heads, note-heads, statements, orders, memorandums, blanks, etc.

The second illustration shows the machine when closed and packed with paper. When the paper is in position it is pressed by turning the crank handle at one end of the press, which operates a screw bearing against a movable iron clamp. The clamps are held in a hinged frame so that the paper, when

properly secured, can be thrown over as shown in the first illustration, bringing the lower and smooth edges uppermost, ready for glueing.

Every press is provided with clamping boards for each end, to protect the paper from indentations from the iron clamps. A thumb screw is used to raise or lower the clamping frame, whereby a central pressure can be obtained on any size paper, from 2X2 inches up to the full capacity of the press.

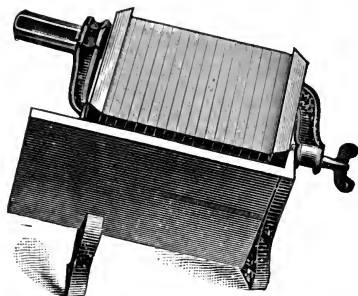

General Information.

OLD METAL.

Old Metal (delivered at the Foundry) is taken in exchange for new type of our cast at list price at the following prices: Old Type, 7 cts. \pounds lb.; Leads and Stereotype and Electrotypes, 4 cts. \pounds lb.

 To avoid mistakes, packages of Old Type or Metal should always be marked with the name of the shipper as well as our address.

HINTS TO PRINTERS.

When you are ordering type for newspaper or book work, state whether or not you want the fonts to contain Italics, Leaders, Fractions or Commercial Marks.

In ordering Sorts to match type you already have, state the Name and Number of the Face, as well as the Size of the body; or, if you cannot do this, send a capital "H" and a lower case "m" (as little used as possible) of the font the Sorts are to work with. Also state the number of pounds or ounces you want of each particular Sort.

Job fonts, such as Titles, Antiques, Ornamented, etc., are put up without Spaces and Quads, and if you want them for any Size of body it will be necessary for you to order them separately.

When you want Leads, Advertising Rules or Dashes, send one of your Leads; or, if you order them cut to certain ems long, be careful to state what particular ems you mean—whether Nonpareil, Brevier, Long Primer, Pica, etc., otherwise they will be cut to pica ems.

Should you order Brass Rule to be mitered to any size, give either the "inside" or "outside" measurement, and if it is to be cut from Double Rule, state whether you wish the heavy line inside or outside.

When you order Type, Rules, Borders, Cuts, etc., from any other Foundry's Specimen Book, do not cut the sample out, but mention what book (giving date of same, if possible) you select from, and give the Name, and Number, if any, of each particular article required; also, when practicable, the page on which it may be found.

In ordering Printing Ink, state the quantity, and price per pound or ounce, of each kind you want.

When you want Chases, give the "inside" or "outside" measurement, or better still, send a diagram.

SCHEME FOR ORDERING SORTS.

The following table will be found useful in ordering sorts. It contains a rough estimate (taking Brevier as a standard), of the amount which the respective boxes of the regular full-sized lower case will contain. The first two columns give the letters and weights to box; the last two columns the letters and the number that will weigh a pound. Of course, printers in ordering can increase or decrease the quantities and weights to suit their wants, or the proportion to the body of the type they need.

STANDARD NEWSPAPER MEASURE.

The standard Newspaper Measure, as recognized and now in general use, is 13 Ems Pica. The standard of measurement of all sizes of Type, is the Em Quad, and not the letter m.

LEADS AND SLUGS.

Leads are designated as “—to-Pica,” the number being that fraction of a Pica which the Lead is, viz : a 6-to-Pica Lead is one-sixth of a Pica in thickness, or six 6-to-Pica's are equal to one Pica ; four 4-to-Pica's one Pica, and so with other sizes or thickness of Leads.

SLUGS.—Leads of Nonpareil thickness and greater are called slugs, viz : Nonpareil Slugs, Pica Slugs, etc.

AVERAGE WEIGHT OF MATTER.

A “piece” of solid matter 13 ems Pica wide and 6 inches long will weigh about $3\frac{3}{4}$ lbs., but in order to allow for the sorts usually remaining in case, $4\frac{3}{4}$ lbs. of type would be required to set that amount of solid matter. When the matter is to be leaded the weight of the type may be reduced about one-quarter, i. e.: a single column of six-column folio, solid, will weigh $10\frac{1}{2}$ lbs., requiring about 13 lbs. of type, while the same length column, leaded with six-to-pica leads, will contain but $7\frac{7}{8}$ lbs. solid matter, requiring about 10 lbs. of type to set the same.

A piece of solid matter 12 inches square will weigh about 40 lbs. One pound of type will, therefore, measure $3\frac{3}{8}$ square inches. A piece of leaded matter 12 inches square will contain but 30 lbs. of type.

LEADS REQUIRED FOR NEWSPAPER AND BOOK WORK.

To lead one pound of Pearl requires 6 ounces of 6-to-Pica Leads, Agate $5\frac{1}{2}$ ounces, Nonpareil 5 ounces, Minion $4\frac{1}{2}$ ounces, Brevier 4 ounces, Bourgeois $3\frac{1}{2}$ ounces, Long Primer 3 ounces, Small Pica $2\frac{3}{4}$ ounces, Pica $2\frac{1}{2}$ ounces, English $2\frac{1}{4}$ ounces.

HOW TO ESTIMATE FOR BODY TYPE.

To estimate the quantity of type (solid) necessary to fill a given space, multiply the number of square inches by $5\frac{3}{4}$ (estimated weight, in ounces, of one square inch of matter, including sorts in case), divide the product by 16 and the result will be the weight of type required. If leaded, a reduction in weight of type may be made as above.

ANOTHER RULE.

To ascertain the quantity of Type (solid) required for Newspaper or Book work, find the number of square inches to be set, and divide the same by 4, which will give the approximate weight of matter ; to which 25 per cent. should be added for “sorts,” or dead letters remaining in the case. If the matter is to be leaded the weight may be reduced one-quarter.

MIXTURES OF COLORS.

Use Magnesia as a base in making tints.

Yellow and Carmine or Deep Red produce impure Scarlet.

Carmine and Blue produce Deep Lilac, Violet and Plum

Blue and Black produce Deep Blue or Blue-black.

Vermilion and Black produce rich Brown.

Yellow and Black make Bronze Green.

Yellow, Blue and Black make Deep Green.

Orange Mineral and White make beautiful Flesh Tints.

Yellow and Blue produce Green.

Carmine and White make Pinks of any depth.

Ultramarine, White and Carmine form the various tones of Lilac, etc.

To thin ink, use Reducing Varnish.

Use Copal Flock Varnish if quick dryer is wanted.

IMPOSITION AND SIZES OF BOOKS.

FOLIO.—The standard size of this paper is 25X38. The half sheet folded in two leaves, having four pages, makes a book called a folio.

QUARTO.—When the half sheet is folded in four leaves, making eight pages, it forms a quarto.

OCTAVO.—The half sheet folded again, eight leaves, sixteen pages, forms an octavo; or folded into sixteen leaves forms a 16mo.

DUODECIMO.—By folding the same into twelve leaves, making twenty-four pages, we have a duodecimo. Folded into eighteen leaves, we form an 18mo; into twenty-four leaves, and we have a 24mo, etc.

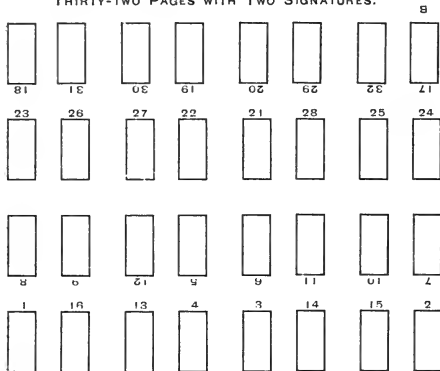
The words, Post, Crown, Demy, Royal, etc., used in connection, as Royal Octavo, designate the sizes of paper of which the book is made.

Modern facilities for the manufacture of paper enable publishers to have any desired size made to order, the same as this Catalogue.

Marks occasionally found at the bottom of a page are termed signatures (such as a, b c; or, 1, 2, 3; or 1*, 2*, 3*), and are used for the direction of the pressman and binder in printing, folding and gathering the sheets.

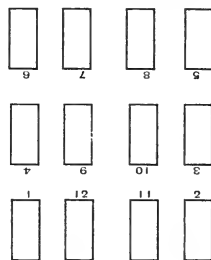
DIAGRAMS SHOWING HOW TO IMPOSE FORMS.

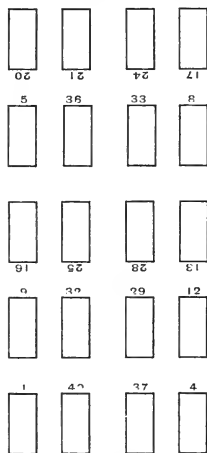

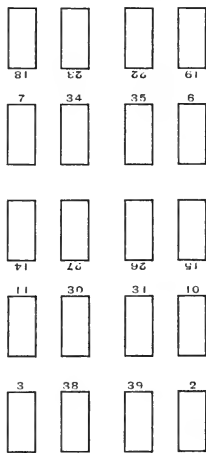

A compositor, receiving, for instance, a circular to set up to packet note size, would glance at this table, and noting that the width of the matter for that size piece of paper is twenty-six ems, sets his stick and gets his leads and slugs to that measure. He also notes how far down the galley the forty-five ems of length reaches, and is ready to go ahead. This takes much less time than hunting up a sheet of paper and folding it, with the chance of getting the margin wrong after all.
