"CLAUDII PTOLEMÆI Pelusiensis Geographiæ libri octo; Græce; tabulis geographicis, sive partibus earum septuaginta octo illustrati." Catalogue of Mss. in the British Museum, New Series, 1840, vol. i. pt. ii. p. 45.

A very fine manuscript on vellum, written apparently in the latter part of the fourteenth, or beginning of the fifteenth century, in folio, containing 115 leaves: $1 f. 5 in. \times 1 f$. It formerly belonged to Charles Maurice, Prince de Talleyrand, ex-Bishop of Autun.

The maps are tinted with yellow and blue, the latter color being used to mark the rivers and the outlines of coasts or islands; they are of various sizes, some occupying one page, some two pages, and others a portion only of a page.

PTOLEMY.

Harleian Ms. 7182.

"Codex membranaceus, eximiæ pulchritudinis, et formæ amplioris in folio. Continet Ptolemæi Geographiam Latine redditam a Jacobo Angelo, et Alexandro V. Pontifici Max. dicatam. Scriptus ergo est Codex, A.D. 1409, quo anno unico Alex. ille Papatum tenuit. Ornatur mappis geographicis pictis, et literis initialibus coloratis." Catalogue of the Harleian Mss. 1808, vol. iii. p. 519.

It must be observed, that the dedication prefixed will prove only the date of the translation, but it does not follow that this copy was then written; on the contrary, it would appear to have been executed at a later period of the fifteenth century.

On the fly-leaf at the commencement is a coat of arms of some Italian family, probably of the Ruffoli of Florence, neatly tricked upon a large scale; viz.:—on a bend, between three stars of six points, an eagle's wing; all within a bordure engrailed, colors not expressed. On the sides are the initials E. E., and on a scroll at the foot, the motto "Non altra," and lower, the letter R. and the date 1506. On the same page is an elephant, drawn in pen and ink, with this description: — "Semblable beste nommée Eléphant fut par aucuns Genevois amenée en France au Roy Loys xj. avec ung tigre, l'an mil cccclxxix. et au dit an au retour mourut le dit Elephant en Avignon. En ce livre trouverez le lieu ouquel ilz habitent."

The twenty-seven maps in this volume are similar to those which were designed, about the year 1468, for Borso of Este, Duke of Modena, by Donnus [*i.e.* Domnus] Nicholaus*, a Benedictine monk of Reichenbach, who died in 1471, and are very neatly executed.

This volume closely resembles the Harl. Ms. 7182, and appears to have been written at the same period. The maps are of exactly the same dimensions, and their contents are the same; but in the former Ms. the sea is colored blue, in this it is yellow, and the execution is inferior.

Unfortunately, the Ms. wants the 5th map of Europe, (No. 6 of 7182,) and one half of the 11th map of Asia, (No. 26 of 7182). One leaf of the text is also wanting, containing the commencement of book iii.

In 1656, this Ms. belonged to the Convent of Frères Mineurs, at St. Omer.

Harleian Ms. 3686.

"Claud. Ptolemæi Geographia, 8 libris. A Jacobo Anglo traducta et Alex. V. Pont. Max. dedicata, cum tabulis geographicis. Codex chartaceus. xv." Harleian Catalogue, vol. iii. p. 52.

Written probably about 1450, in small folio: $11\frac{1}{2}$ in. $\times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in. It contains eighteen maps of various sizes, rudely drawn; of which thirteen belong to the first three books, and the other five together form a map of the world, as described by Ptolemy.

Cottonian Ms. Nero, D. I. fol. 184.

" SCHEMATA quædam cosmographica." Catalogue of the Mss. in the Cottonian Library, 1802, p. 237.

These are a few circles and schemes roughly drawn to illustrate the theory of the universe, the winds, etc. The first purports to be "Secundum magistrum Elyam de Derham."

The volume in which these are contained formerly belonged to the Abbey of St. Albans, and its contents relate chiefly to the history of that Abbey, at which place it was written, in the thirteenth century. The above occupy three pages of the Ms.

Cottonian Ms. Tiberius, B. v. fol. 59.

"Liber periegesis: i. e. de situ terræ Prisciani Grammatici, quem de priscorum dictis excerpsit ormistarum. Huic periegesi, quam ex Græcis Dionysii Afri Latine reddidit Priscianus, præmittitur Tabula Geographica trium partium mundi." Cottonian Catalogue, p. 36.

This map appears to have been executed at the end of the tenth century; it is on vellum, and for the time is highly finished. The writing is very minute; the sea is of a grey color, the mountains green, and the Persian Gulf, the Red Sea, the Nile and other waters in Africa, red. The world is represented as of a quadrangular form, encompassed by the ocean, but not, as in other maps of an early age, in the form of a belt. The outlines of the countries and of the islands are given with remarkable precision for the time. The east is at the top. It measures $8\frac{1}{2}$ in. \times 7 in.

This map is engraved in outline in Playfair's Atlas, pl. 1., and more fully in the Penny Magazine for July 22, 1837, (vol. vi. p. 280.) A fac-simile copy was made in the year

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1830, by Mr. Walker of the Admiralty, and presented to the Bibliothèque du Roi at Paris.

The Ms. would appear from some entries at fol. 88 to have belonged to Battle Abbey in the reign of Henry the Second.

Cottonian Ms. Tiberius, B. v. fol. 29.

"Tabula repræsentans globum terraqueum, in qua nihil non litteris majusculis descriptum est." Cottonian Catalogue, p. 36.

This table, which appears intended to shew the supposed motion of the ocean, and the position of the zones, is of the close of the tenth century, and belongs to the volume which contains the map attached to Priscian's Geography, mentioned before. It contains only a slight sketch of the Mediterranean, with two large buildings, intended probably to mark the sites of Rome and Jerusalem. The table is circular, measuring 10 inches in diameter, and is on vellum.

Add. Ms. 11,695.

A colored map of the world, according to the ideas of the Arabian geographers. The earth is represented of a quadrangular form, surrounded by the ocean; the east is at the top, and has a representation of Paradise with our first parents, the serpent tempting Eve. A part of the south (on the right of the map) is cut off by the Red Sea, which is straight, and is colored red. The south-western quarter represents Africa, the north-western quarter Europe; they are divided by the Mediterranean, which is straight, the islands being all quadrangular. The Ægæan Sea joins the Mediterranean at a right angle in the centre of the map. In the ocean, which borders the whole, are quadrangular islands; viz. on the east (at the top) "Crise et Asgire Insula;" on the north, "Tile insula," "Scocia insula," "Furtunarum insula," and "Scaria insula."

This map occurs in the second book of a Commentary on the Apocalypse, written by an anonymous author, apparently a native of Spain, about the year 787, and dedicated to Etherus, Bishop of Osma. This passage precedes the map:

"Et quo facilius hanc seminis grana (sic) per agrum hujus mundi, quem prophetæ laboraberunt et humetent, subjecte formulæ pictura demonstrat." The map measures 1 f. 6 in. \times 1 f. 3 in.

The Ms. is of folio size, on vellum, and was completed in the year 1109, in the monastery of Silos, in the diocese of Burgos, Old Castile. It is richly ornamented and illuminated in a singular Arabesque style, and has also numerous paintings.

A copy of the same work is in the Royal Library at Turin, (Cod. XCIII. d. V. 39,) which has a map nearly resembling the present map, but of ruder execution, and of a circular form. The Turin map is engraved on wood in Pasini, Codices Mss. Bibliothecæ Regii Taurinensis Athenæi digesti, etc. Taurini, 1749, vol. ii. p. 29; and a description of it, with the names of the places, is in Gough's British Topography, vol. i. pp. 66, 67.

Add. Ms. 10,049.

S. Hieronymi libri de Hebraicis Quæstionibus; de interpretationibus nominum Veteris ac Novi Testamenti; de nominibus locorum.

A folio volume, written on vellum in the twelfth century, which formerly belonged to the monastery of St. Martin at Tournay.

At the end are two maps, apparently of the same date with the Ms., occupying the two sides of the same leaf of vellum, and each 1 f. 2 in. \times 9 in.; they are uncolored.

The first map shews Greece, Asia Minor, Syria, Persia, India, and generally those portions of the world of which mention is made in Scripture.

The second contains the Holy Land and the parts immediately adjoining, on a larger scale than the former; Jerusalem near the centre.

Cottonian Ms. Nero, D. v. fol. 1.

"Mappa terræ habitabilis." Cottonian Catalogue, p. 238.

This Ms., written on vellum in the latter half of the thirteenth century, contains the Flores Historiarum of Matthew of Paris. Prefixed is the map above mentioned, which is of the same age, and very rude and confused in its construction. It represents only Europe and the Mediterranean Sea; Asia is not drawn, but has the names of places written in their respective positions. Near the top is this inscription : "Sumatim facta est disposicio mappa mundi magistri Rob. de Melkeleya, et mappa mundi de Waltham. Mappa mundi domini regis, quod (*sic*) est in camera sua apud Westmonasterium, figuratur in ordine Mathei de Parisio. Verissimum autem figuratur in eodem ordine, quod est quasi clamis [chlamys?] extensa: talis est scema nostre partis habitabilis secundum philosophos, scilicet quarta pars terre qui (*sic*) est triangularis fere. Corpus enim terre spericum est." The map occupies one page of the Ms., which measures $1 \text{ f. } 2 \text{ in.} \times 9 \text{ in.}$

In the Ms. of C. C. Coll. Camb. marked C. ix. is a copy of Matthew Paris which has a similar map with the same inscription. See Gough's *British Topography*, vol. i. p. 66.

Old Royal Libr. Ms. 14 c. VII. fol. 2.

A map of the stations for a pilgrimage from England to the Holy Land, consisting of rude drawings of the towns from London to Jerusalem, with the names in French.

The Ms. in which this is contained is a copy of the History of Matthew Paris, generally supposed to have been written with the author's own hand, about the middle of the thirteenth century.

It is an itinerary rather than a map, and is arranged in eleven columns, exclusive of the Holy Land, which is depicted on a more extended scale. In some parts a double route is given. The first two columns, containing the English portion, are engraved, of the same size with the original, in Gough's *British Topography*, pl. vii., and a description is given by him at p. 85 of vol. i.

The execution is nearly the same as that of the Itinerary between London and Naples in the Cottonian Ms. Nero, D. I.

Cottonian Ms. Nero, D. I. fol. 182. b.

"Tabula itineraria ab urbe Londinum ad Neapolin et extremitatem Apuliæ." Cottonian Catalogue, p. 237.

This is not a map but an itinerary, divided into daily journeys, with a rude representation of each place, and its name in French; it is arranged in six columns. Between Whitsand and Troyes a double route is given; one by way of Paris, the other by way of Rheims.

The volume in which it is contained has been before mentioned (p. 11.) as having been written in the Abbey of St. Albans, in the thirteenth century, and is, for the greater part, together with the itinerary, in the same hand as the Royal manuscript 14 C. VII.

Old Royal Libr. Ms. 14 c. 1x.

"Ranulphi Hygden Cestrien. Polycronicon, 7 libris; cum indice alphabetico, et duplici orbis terrarum descriptione geographica." Casley's Catalogue of the Mss. of the King's Library, 1734, p. 231.

This Ms. was written in the latter half of the fourteenth

century, on vellum. It has prefixed two maps of the habitable world, rudely drawn and colored. They are both of an oval form; the diameters of the larger being respectively 1 f. 6 in. and 1 f. $1\frac{1}{2}$ in.; those of the smaller 11 in. and $8\frac{1}{2}$ in.

The general construction of these two maps is similar; the larger containing more places than the smaller, and the descriptions being more ample. The principle is the same as that of Ms. Add. 11,695, before described. The east, with Paradise, is at the top, Jerusalem near the centre, and the Pillars of Hercules at the bottom. The islands in the circumambient ocean are rectangular.

These maps are described at some length by Gough in his *British Topography*, vol. i. p. 61, who has engraved in Pl. III. fig. 2, that part of the larger map which represents England.

The volume formerly belonged to Johannes de Wardeboys, Abbot of Ramsey from the year 1509 till its surrender to Henry VIII.

Old Royal Libr. Ms. 14 c. XII.

"Ranulphi Hygden Cestr. Polycronicon, 7 libris; cum indice alphabetico, et charta geographica orbis terrarum." Casley's Catalogue, p. 232.

A Ms. written in the latter half of the fourteenth century, on vellum, which belonged formerly to the monastery of St. Thomas of Acon, London. On fol. 9. b. is a map of the habitable world, enclosed in a figure of the form called the "vesica piscis." The map is not filled up, but has the names only of places, written in their supposed positions. The construction is the same as those last described. 1 f. 2 in. $\times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in.

A similar map exists in a Ms. of Higden, marked E. vi., in C. C. Coll. Camb. See Gough's *British Topography*, vol. i. p. 60.

Add. Ms. 11,267.

A copy of the large Planisphere, or Mappa Mondo, compiled and drawn in the year 1459, by Frà Mauro, a monk of the order of Camaldoli, and preserved in the monastery of S. Michele di Murano, near Venice.

The Planisphere is a circle of 6 f. 4 in. in diameter; the corners of the table are filled up with four small circles, each $11\frac{1}{2}$ in. in diameter, representing,

1. The Ptolemaic system and the spheres.

2. The lunar influence over the tides.

3. The circles described on the terrestrial globe.

4. A miniature painting representing the expulsion of our first parents from Paradise; with the four rivers of that garden.

This copy is on vellum, colored to represent the original. The descriptions, which were in an old character, and full of abbreviations in the original, are here, however, in a modern hand, and at full length. It was executed in the year 1804, by Mr. William Frazer, for the sum of £200, contributed for that purpose by the East India Company, the Earl Spencer, Lord Hobart (then Secretary of State for the Foreign Department, and afterwards Earl of Buckinghamshire), the Bishop of Durham (Dr. Shute Barrington), Andrew Strahan, Esq., King's Printer, and Dr. William Vincent, Dean of Westminster; by whose directions it was deposited in the British Museum.

It has been several times engraved, and it is particularly described in the following works, and is besides mentioned in many works on geography.

note is inserted, written in a modern hand, of the variations between this volume and another, also drawn by Benincasa in 1469, belonging to the Fathers Della Salute, at Venice, and described by Tiraboschi.

This volume was purchased for the Museum at the sale of the Canonici and Saibante collections, in 1821.

It formerly belonged to the Cornaro family of Venice, and has a book plate on the first leaf with their arms, viz. :---Quarterly of Jerusalem, Lusignan of Cyprus, Armenia, and Luxembourg, impaling the ancient coat of Cornaro. It afterwards belonged to the library of St. Mark's at Venice, and is described at great length by Cardinal Placido Zurla. Di Marco Polo e degli altri viaggiatori Veneziani più illustri Dissertazioni. Venezia, 1818, tom. ii. pp. 353-358. It was brought to England by M. Vendramini, and was purchased for the British Museum at the sale of the Rev. C. Yonge's Library, 1 March, 1832.

36. General chart of the coasts of Europe, the Black Sea, the Mediterranean, and the western coast of Africa southward to Cape Negro.

37. Chart of the German Ocean and the Baltic.

38. A pictured map of the Holy Land, very beautifully executed, intitled "Descriptio totius Terre Sancte, quam posiderunt filii Israhel; vocatur etiam Terra Promisionis."

Old Royal Libr. Ms. 14 c. v.

A Portolano, containing seven charts on a plane scale: each 1 f. 5 in. \times 1 f. $\frac{1}{2}$ in., executed on vellum, at the commencement apparently of the sixteenth century. The names are in the Venetian dialect.

This volume belonged to John, Lord Lumley, who died in 1609.

date are the arms of Cardinal Giulio Feltri della Rovere, son of Francesco Maria, Duke of Urbino, and Eleonora Gonzaga. It contains the whole of Europe, with the Black Sea, the Mediterranean and the coast of Morocco. It measures 2 f. 10 in. \times 2 feet.

"Libri geographici fragmentum, cum mappa mundi." Catalogue of Mss. in the British Museum, New Series, vol. ii. p. 18.

This mappa mundi consists of the two hemispheres, drawn on vellum, probably about 1530, each 11 in. \times 8 in. It is inserted in a Latin geographical treatise, written in the form of a dialogue between a *Magister* and his *Discipulus*.

A Portolano, containing four charts on a plane scale, each 1 f. 4 in. \times 1 f., executed upon vellum, in the earlier part, apparently, of the sixteenth century; the names are in Spanish.

It was probably executed in the time of Francis I. of France, for his son the Dauphin, afterwards Henry II., as the crown over the arms of France is open, which was so borne till the year 1536, when it was arched over.

This chart is thus described by Malte-Brun, in his Histoire de la Géographie, ed. Huot. Paris, 1831, tom. i. p. 630.

"Elle est entièrement écrite en Français; les noms principaux sont très grands et très distincts, comme dans l'Amérique méridionale, *Terre du Brésil*, etc. Le midi est au haut de la carte, au lieu d'etre en bas, comme c'est l'ordinaire main-

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tenant. On y voit au sud de l'Asie une grande île dont la position correspond à notre Nouvelle-Hollande. Il y a un passage étroit entre Java et cette grande île; Timor est placée au nord-est. La grande île est appelée Java-la-Grande. Parmi les noms qui se trouvent écrits le long des côtes, on remarque celui de Côte des Herbaiges, ou des plantes, nom que l'on a cru correspondre à Botany Bay, mais qui est trop avancé vers le nord. Au midi de la côte des Herbaiges, il y a trois autres noms à des distances considérables : le premier, côte de Gracal, puis un promontoire, étendu et très saillant, appelé cap de Fromose. A une autre distance considérable au sud, se lit le mot goufre, qui indique un golfe ou plutôt une grande baie. La ligne qui termine la carte coupe cette grande île, et en laisse l'étendue incertaine. Les noms de Gracal et Fromose semblent etre Portugais, et on peut croire que la carte a éte traduite de cette langue. Ce soupçon se trouve confirmé par une collection de Cartes intitulées, Hydrographie, par John Rotz, datée de 1542, et qui se conservent également dans le Muséum Britannique."

This chart formerly belonged to Edward Harley, Earl of Oxford, after whose death it was taken away by one of his servants. It was subsequently purchased by Sir Joseph Banks, Bart., and presented by him to the British Museum in 1790.

A Portolano, containing five maps on a plane scale, executed in the year 1538, by a native of Ancona, whose name has been erased. On vellum, each map I f. 8 in. × 1 f. 2½ in.

This volume formerly belonged to the Canonici and Saibante Collections, sold by auction in London, in 1821.

"John Rotz, his book of Hydrography, so called; being an account of the compass, elevation of the pole, latitude, sea coasts, etc., finely painted; anno 1542." Casley's Catalogue of the Mss. in the King's Library, p. 306.

This book is dedicated by the author to king Henry VIII., and the diagrams and maps have illuminated borders, and are otherwise ornamented in gold and colors. It is mentioned by Malte-Brun, in his *Histoire de la Géographie*, (ed. Huot, tom. i. p. 631,) who, on one point, compares it with the Additional Ms. 5413, and adds :--

"Ce curieux et important manuscrit est écrit en Anglais, sur velin; mais la dédicace est Française. Peutêtre l'auteur était-il un des Flamands qui passèrent en Angleterre avec Anne de Clèves, en 1540. Outre un Calendrier et quelques instructions sur la navigation, il s'y trouve plusieurs cartes exécutées avec exactitude et élégance, en particulier un planisphère qui termine la collection. La Nouvelle-Hollande y est dessinée presque comme dans les cartes du XVII. siècle, avant le voyage d'Abel Tasman: elle porte le nom de Terre de Java.

"En comparant cet ouvrage avec la mappemonde dont il a été parlé plus haut, on est porté à croire que les cartes de Rotz sont les originaux; car elles contiennent beaucoup de noms portugais qui, dans l'autre, sont traduits en Français. Dans toutes deux la côte occidentale de Bornéo est située comme elle doit l'être, avec les noms de Porto de Borne et Paxos de Borne. Au nord de Bornéo on voit Palaouan ou Palawan; à l'est sont les Moluques. Ces détails rendent inadmissible l'opinion de ceux, qui ont prétendu ne voir, dans la Nouvelle Hollande de ces cartes, qu'une repetition erronée de l'ile de Bornéo, nommée Grand Java chez Marco-Pol. Dans la mappemonde, Bornéo est à la vérité, représentée par un carré oblong beaucoup trop petit; mais cet erreur est commune à toutes les cartes du même siècle. M. Coquebert-Monbret a vu une collection de cartes qui a appartenu au nommé Jean Valard, de Dieppe, et qui est de l'an 1552; on y trouve à peu près les même choses que dans les deux cartes du Muséum Britannique."

The volume contains :--

1. The arms of King Henry VIII., emblazoned on a large scale. Underneath is written, "This boke of Idrography is made be me Johne Rotz, sarvant to the Kingis mooste excellent Majeste. Gode save his Majeste." fol. 1. b.

2. The author's dedication of his work to Henry VIII., in which he mentions his original intention to dedicate it to the King of France, who was then his Sovereign and Natural Lord; in *French*. fol. 2.

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3. "The Introduction of the thingis, the quhitche are conteint in this booke. For to know the thingis conteint in this booke, it is to be wnderstand, that in the first thair is one figure for to know the maner of the poinctes or routtis of all the wyndes of the Sey compas; and efter thair is one uther figur, that doys teche the maner for to tak the eslevation of the poll in every region, and this be the Norht Starr. Item more efter is declarit in one other leff the maner for to take the latitude in every region be the movens of the sonne, and of one tabil of his declination from the equinoctial. Than cummis nixt efter in the leffes following the landes and sey costes of the Worlde, in so furr as be marinares and other saillarres it is knowin; the quhitche descripsion of landis is set be ordorr, so that every leffe doys begynne thair quhair the precedent of it did leif, and so dois proceid quhil all the knowin partes of the sey costes be shawin in partiallitez. Quhair than thair doys cum in one leff the hoole description of the sey carte, made in rondnes efter the maner of cosmography, for in it al the costes ar ordaint wnder the meridiens and degrez of latitud, that be experiens ar fonde corresponding to thame. Item in the bordorres of the leffes of the booke ar set the tabilles, quhar the leigges ar merkit and writin with cyfres be thair nombres, efter the proportion of xvij legges and one halfe for every degre of latitud, as be al saillars it is acoustumit. Item longes the bordorres of the said leffes ar markit the degrez of latitud efter thair proportiouns and distances, be soche maner, that those that be benorth the equinoctial ar writtin in thair nombres with blak lectrez of cyfre, and those that be be the southe partes of the said equinoctial ar writtin with reid lectrez of cyfre. So that be this lytil introduction may be al thinges clerly wnderstond." fol. 2.

On the first page is a colored drawing of the Virgin and Child; underneath are the two following inscriptions :-- "E chesto llibro sta di Nicolo Canachi dell'isola di Sa. Gioane di Pattino, pillotto di mare."

A Portolano, consisting of nine large charts on vellum, drawn on a plane scale, by Diego Homem, in 1558; very highly finished and ornamented in gold and colors, with the arms of the respective sovereigns emblazoned on the various countries. The outlines of some of the coasts are laid down in gold: each map 2 f. 7 in. $\times 1$ f. 8 in. It was probably executed for Philip II. during the lifetime of Mary.

This map resembles in many respects that which is described by Moeller in his Catalogus librorum tam manuscriptorum quam impressorum in Bibliotheca Gothana, 4to. Gothæ, 1825, App. ii. p. 13, and engraved at p. 28.

The volume in which this map is contained belonged formerly, it is presumed, to Kæmpfer: it consists chiefly of Persian drawings of animals and sports, some of which are introduced on a smaller scale in his Amœnitates Exoticæ, 4u. Lemgov. 1712.

"MATTHÆI PARIS Historia a conquestu Angliæ ad A.D. 1259, quo obiit, propria illius manu scripta; cum Calendario, Mappa Angliæ, picturis urbium inclitarum, regum Angliæ cum monasteriis ab eis fundatis, scutorum variorum, et propriâ ad pedes B. Virginis prostrati." Casley's Catalogue of the Mss. in the King's Library, 1734, p. 231.

This manuscript was presented by the author himself to some monastery, most probably to that of St. Alban's, but the name has been erased, at fol. 6. b. In 1488 it belonged to John Russell, Bishop of Lincoln and Lord Chancellor, by whom it was given to New College, Oxford, subject, however, to a claim on the part of the monastery of St. Alban's, if its prior possession of the Ms. could be proved. The volume came into the Royal Library as part of the collection of John, Lord Lumley, the son-in-law of the last Earl of Arundel of the Fitzalan family.

The map of England, Wales, and Scotland, contained in this volume at fol. 5. b., measures 14 in. $\times 9\frac{1}{2}$ in., and is engraved of the same size in Gough's *British Topography*, Plate ii. It is described by him at great length in the same work, vol. i. pp. 61-64, where he gives the whole of the names which occur in the map.

"The most antient map of Brittain, drawn by Matt. Paris, in the Ms. of his own writing in the Cotton Library, his history of England."

It is a pen and ink copy, on a reduced scale, of the preceding map in the Old Royal Library, 14 c. vii., and not in the Cottonian Library, as inscribed on the copy.

"Figurata Angliæ delineatio, cum parte Scotiæ." Catalogue of the Mss. in the Cottonian Library, 1802, p. 196.

This map is in another copy of Matthew Paris' work, which, like the last, is supposed to have been written with his own hand. It is called by Gough "the completest map of Great Britain for this period." It is intire, except on the western edge, and takes in the whole extent of the island. At three of the sides are the cardinal points expressed in capitals, AUSTER, ORIENS, OCCIDENS. It measures 13 in. \times 9 in., and is engraved, of the same size with the original, in Gough's British Topography, Plate iv., and is minutely described by him, vol. i. pp. 66-71 of the same work, where, as in the case of the last, he gives all the names which are found in the map

A third copy of Matthew Paris, also containing a map of England, and like the two copies here mentioned, attributed to his own hand, is in the collection of Mss. given by Archbishop Parker to Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. It is numbered C. v., and the map is engraved and described in Gough's work:

They have the degrees of longitude and latitude marked on the sides; and in the northern, and some other counties, the Saxon names and writing are retained."-" The observationes historicæ are, for Ireland, the archbishopricks, havens, and names of princes; for Scotland, a short account of the Scotch Isles, and "Scocia ex Higdeno"; the rivers are expressed in Derbyshire, Rutlandshire, Northumberland and Suffolk; and in other counties the proprietors of lands; in the northern counties, the dales; in Wales, the shires." added to this collection, there is left for that purpose blank leafs and slips to paste draughts or other leafs upon." Its contents are as follows :---

1. "An account of the beginning and the progress of the enlargements and improvements of each dock-yard, with some observations of the particular services to which each is the best adapted, and the particular advantages or disadvantages belonging to each, with an account of the number of officers, clerks, artificers and workmen now employed in each yard."

2. "Three plans upon one sheet, of each yard, shewing their states at three different periods, viz., 1689, 1698 and 1774, shewing at one view the alterations and improvements from time to time made. The plans of 1774 agree with the models of the yards prepared and herewith sent for his Majesty's use, shewing all the buildings, docks, slips, etc., in their due proportions, and each distinguished whether of brick, stone or timber."

3. "A plan of each harbour where the yards are, taken from the latest and best surveys thereof, shewing the number and disposition of the harbour moorings, and the sands, rocks, sholes and soundings, with directions and marks for sailing in and out of each harbour."

9. "Of the present state of the magazine of stores, particularly of oak timber in the yards, and the regulations for

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seasoning it, and for building more durable ships than heretofore, and of the present disposition, by means of a stock of timber, for speedily angmenting, when necessary, his Majesty's fleet to a greater number of ships of the line than it ever was."
