

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

ADMISSION.

- 1. Applicants for admission must furnish evidence of good moral character, and produce a certificate of honorable dismission from the institution of which they were last members.
- 2. Candidates for admission to the Sub-Freshman Class must sustain a creditable examination in the common English branches, McClintock and Crook's First Book in Latin, Latin Grammar, Cæsar, Sallust, McClintock and Crook's First Book in Greek, a Higher Arithmetic and an Elementary Algebra to Simple Equations. For admission to advanced standing, candidates must sustain an examination on all the studies previously pursued by the Class they propose to enter.
- 3. The following Text-Books are recommended for use by our students and by those who purpose to enter our Institution, viz: Robinson's Higher Arithmetic and Elementary Algebra; Harkness' or Andrews and Stoddard's Latin Grammar; Hadley's Greek Grammar.

EXAMINATIONS.

Intermediate Examinations are held during the progress of the session; and the Final Examinations, near the close of the session. A Committee of the Trustees attend the Final Examinations. Students are not allowed to absent themselves from any of their Examinations.

CERTIFICATES.

- 1. Certificates of Distinction are given for distinguished attainments in any Class within any of the Schools.
- 2. Certificates of Proficiency are conferred as evidences of satisfactory attainments in any of the Schools.
- 3. Certificates of Distinguished Proficiency are conferred as evidences of distinguished attainments in any of the Schools.
- 4 A Certificate, with title of *Distinguished Undergraduate*, is conferred upon any student who makes distinguished attainments in any three Schools within one session.

DEGREES.

I. Bachelor of Philosophy (B. P.) Required: Certificates of Proficiency in English; Moral Philosophy and Rhetoric; History and Literature; French and German, and the Junior Course of Mathematics. Elective: Chemistry or Physics; Astronomy, or Mineralogy and Geology, or Physiology.

LATIN or GREEK may take the place of either of the Modern Languages.

- II. BACHELOR OF SCIENCE (B. S.) Required: Certificates of Proficiency in Mathematics; Applied Mathematics and Astronomy; Physics, including Rational Mechanics; Chemistry; Ethics and Evidences of Christianity. Elective: Mineralogy and Geology, or Physiology; French and German, and English; or one of the Modern Languages, and any other literary School.
- III. BACHELOR OF ARTS (A. B.) Required: Certificates of Proficiency in Latin; Greek; Mathematics; Moral Philosophy, including Ethics and Evidences of Christianity. Elective: Moral Philosophy and Rhetoric, or History and Literature; English, or one Modern Language; Chemistry of Physics; and Astronomy, or Mineralogy and Geology, or Physiology.
- IV. MASTER OF ARTS (M. A.) To attain this Degree the student must have received Certificates of *Proficiency* in Latin; Greek; English; Moral Philosophy; History; Mathematics; Chemistry; Natural Philosophy; and in Modern Languages and English Literature, or Applied Mathematics; and Certificates of *Distinguished Proficiency* in at least seven entire Schools; and have passed a satisfactory Review Examination on all the subjects included.
- V. CIVIL ENGINEER (C. E.) The requirements for this degree are certificates of *Proficiency* in Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, including Astronomy; Chemistry; Mineralogy and Geology; Natural Philosophy, including Analytical Mechanics; French; English; and Plans and Reports upon assigned subjects.

For each of the above degrees, a suitable Essay or Oration must be furnished, which may be read on Commencement day, if required.

COLLEGE HONORS.

I. PRIZE MEDAL.

The College Faculty have instituted a prize for excellence in Elocution consisting of a gold medal. For this prize the members of the Sophomore Class compete; and the award is made by disinterested judges.

II. COMMENCEMENT ORATIONS.

- 1. The Valedictory Oration is awarded to that graduate who shall be judged to have attained the highest degree of general scholarship.
- 2. The College Prize Oration is awarded to that student who may have submitted the best Essay or Oration. No student to have more than one of the above orations.
- 3. In every list, of Distinctions or Proficients, the most distinguished students, to a number not exceeding *one-third* of the whole, may be announced in the order of relative standing.

BUILDINGS.

The main College edifice contains a large Chapel, Library, Apparatus Rooms, Laboratory, Halls, Offices, &c. The Dormitory Buildings, comprising the North Hall and the South Hall, contain forty-four Dormitories, eighteen feet square, together with Recitation Rooms. The citizens or Marion have subscribed liberally for the repair of these buildings.

RECITATIONS.

The Bell will be rung at dawn, to rise and dress; and, at sunrise, for recitation and study, to which one hour will be devoted before breakfast. The hours for study, recitation and recreation during the remainder of the day will be regulated with reference to strict economy of time.

DISCIPLINE.

Monthly Reports, showing the standing of Students in their Classes, and the number of absences from prayers, recitations and rooms during study hours, together with other irregularities, will be sent to parents and guardians.

APPARATUS.

The Institution is in possession of an excellent Chemical and Philosophical Apparatus. More than three thousand dollars have been already expended on these Departments alone; and the College is now supplied with better and more expensive means of furnishing experimental instruction in the several branches of Natural Science than ever heretofore. Much of the Chemical Apparatus has been imported directly from Europe for the use of the College; and no pains or expense has been spared to supply the most abundant and valuable means of illustrating this important branch-Not only is the illustrative apparatus complete, but all ordinary appliances for original research and practical investigation are now in the hands of the Professor of Chemistry.

The Philosophical Apparatus is inferior in quality to none in the country. Considerable additions are making in order that this Department may vie with the other in the completeness of its equipments.

The Mathematical Department is supplied with a superior Theodolite Compass, and the usual appliances.

The Astronomical Apparatus consists of such instruments as are ordinarily employed by instructors in this branch. The Telescope is a refractor of six inches aperture, and eight feet five and a half inches in length. It is mounted equatorially with finely graduated right ascension and declination circles, and has a highly finished driving clock.

The Geological and mineralogical Cabinet is sufficiently ample for purposes of instruction. A handsome series of Maps, Charts and Engravings has been produced to illustrate the Lectures on Geology.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

There are in connection with the College, and in successful operation, two Literary Societies—the Philomathic and the Franklin. These Societies are provided with well-selected Libraries; and they must be regarded as valuable aids to the student in the formation of a literary taste, and in affording opportunities for exercise in debate, and for obtaining a knowledge of parliamentary rules.

COMMENCEMENT AND DEGREES.

- 1. The Annual Commencement is held on the THIRD WEDNESDAY IN JUNE.
- 2. No Student is admitted to a Degree or permitted to take any part in the Commencement Exercises, unless he has creditably sustained all his examinations, performed such other exercises as may have been assigned him, and settled all College dues, including a graduating fee of five dollars.

LOCATION.

The location of Howard College is all that could be desired. Marion is situated on the Selma, Marion and Memphis Railroad. This road has been completed some distance beyond Marion, and places this town in direct and daily communication with Selma and the great lines of travel running through the latter place. Howard College is thus quite accessible by railroad from all quarters of this State and from the adjoining States. In addition to Howard College, there are located here two large and prosperous Female Seminaries—The town also contains five Churches—the Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, Episcopal and Christian. With these surroundings, and with a population of three or four thousand inhabitants, it is evident that Marion affords the wholesome restraint of a moral and intelligent community, without presenting those extraordinary temptations to young men incident to great centres of trade.

EXPENSES.

Payable October 1st and February 15th-Strictly in advance.

FOR FIRST TERM OF 41 MONTHS.

Tuition, Board, Fuel, Furnished Room, Washing, and one Uniform Suit, - - - - - - \$150

FOR SECOND TERM OF FOUR MONTHS.

Tuition, Board, Fuel, Furnished Room and Washing, - - \$125 Expenses of Students who enter Preparatory Department, \$55 per session less.

To cover any damages, \$2.50 additional must be deposited at the beginning of each term, but this will be refunded if there are no damages.

Students admitted at any time, and assigned to proper classes.

UNIFORM.

"It is the experience of the best schools that uniformity of dress is essential to both discipline and economy." Therefore, all the students are required to wear on public occasions the grey uniform, which is furnished. About the College, they are allowed to wear the outer clothing which they bring from home.

ACCOMMODATIONS ENLARGED.

The Board of Trustees have just completed a large and handsome Dining Hall; and all the dormitories have been renovated, repaired, and supplied with new furniture and bedding.


