The type-metal bands at the head and foot of each page are different, and several variations occur in the spelling of words. The collation of both editions is the same.

In each of these folding sheets the matter is arranged in columns with connecting brackets after the manner of genealogical tables. Sig. $\mathrm{N}_{3}$ recto is wholly occupied with an engraving of an octagonal pyramid with inscriptions in Latin on four of its sides and the following couplet at the foot:

The lower half of Sig. $\mathrm{N}_{4}$ recto is occupied with an engraving of a hand holding a heavy chain, the links of which bear separate inscriptions. At the top are the words, "Catena Canfarum at Salutem pertinentium", and below the following couplet:
" Mans Hart's foe linkt to Sin wedded to Vice
It needs a Chayne to bring it unto Christ."

On Sig. $\mathrm{O}_{2}$ recto is an engraving representing the holy ascent from Faith founded on a rock, through Virtue, Science, Continence, etc., to a heavenly crown. Below are six lines of explanation. Many of the poems in the volume are arranged in fantastic shapes in the manner that was so much affected by the religious poets of the time.
The title or frontispiece to the second part represents a landscape with trees and the twin peaks of Parnassus, and the river Helicon issuing from a hollow cave. At the top is the inscription, "Famulenter prioribus", and on a scroll below the quotation from Virgil's Eclogues:
"-_tutus in Umbra
Silveftrem tenui Musam meditatis avena."

The work is generally said to have been privately printed for presentation, and most copies lack one or both of the folding plates, or the two unpaged supplementary leaves at the end.

Every page of the text is within double lines at the top and outer margins, and single lines at the foot and inner margins. The first part of the work, from Sig. Bi to $\mathrm{L}_{4}$, is divided into twenty-five chapters, forming an introduction explanatory of the plan and scope of the work. The body of the work is then divided into sections representing all the counties of England and Wales. Under each county is given a descrip-
tion of its Geography, Natural Commodities, Manufactures, Buildings, Proverbs, Lists of Lord Mayors, Gentry, and Sheriffs, and biographies of eminent men under such headings as Princes, Saints, Martyrs, Confessors, Prelates, Statesmen, Soldiers, etc. Notes are printed in the outer margin between the parallel lines. The arrangement of the work is so arbitrary that it is extremely difficult to use for consulting, especially as there is no general index. It is therefore necessary to know in what county any man was born before the account of his life can be found. Sometime during the next century a general index was printed and is often found inserted. It forms six leaves, printed in double columns, lettered from $A$ to $F$ (pp. i-12).

An edition edited by John Nichols was published in two volumes in I8II, and in i840 appeared an edition in three volumes edited by P. Austin Nuttall.

Copies of this volume are in existence which differ from the one described in having a title without any date. One of these copies is in the Huth Library, while another came from the celebrated Daniel collection to the United States, where it still remains. It is supposed that they were originally issued for presentation, or that for some unknown reason the title was cancelled when only a few copies had been printed, and a new one substituted. The authorship of most of the poems is indicated by the initial P or $R$ at the head of those written respectively by the Earl of Pembroke or Sir Benjamin Rudyerd. Besides these the volume contains poems by Sir Walter Raleigh, Sir Edward Dyer, Carew, William Strode, and others. Among them is the celebrated epitaph on the Countess of Pembroke, beginning

> " Underneath this sable Herse Lies the subject of all verse."

The first six lines of this epitaph are commonly attributed to Ben Jonson. The whole poem was first published in Osborne's "Traditional Memoirs on the Reign of King James", 1658 , and afterwards in the present volume. In ${ }^{1} 756$ Peter Whalley printed the first six lines in his edition of Ben Jonson's works, and since then they have been generally considered to belong to Jonson. Considerable evidence tending to prove that it was written by William Browne is given in the " Poems of William Browne of Tavistock", edited by Gordon Goodwin, 1894 (Vol. II, p. 350).

This first edition of the Earl of Pembroke's Poems was edited by John Donne the younger. In the dedication he states that the poems had been preserved by the Countess of Devonshire, who had employed him to edit them, while in his address "To The Reader" he states that he obtained them from Henry Lawes and Nicholas Laniere, who had set some of them to music.

A reprint of the volume, edited by Sir S. E. Brydges, was published in 1817.

To this issue a supplement of nineteen leaves was added (Sigs. A2-C4, pp. $1-38$ ), containing four additional elegies, among which is the one on Charles I described above (No. 508). It is possible that these supplementary leaves were originally intended to form a separate publication, as the poems begin on Sig. A2. Sig. A 1 , which would naturally form the title, is cancelled.

Even in this shape the sale of the book must have been extremely slow, so that as late as the year 1700 some copies remained unsold. In that year some anonymous bookseller, who was not troubled with any qualms of conscience, tried the effect of a new name, and issued the unsold copies with the following new title:

Concerning Sir Thomas Malory practically nothing is known. The work, which is mainly translated from French romances, was finished between March 4, 1469, and March 4, 1470. Of the first edition, printed by Caxton in 1485 , only one perfect copy is known. It was reprinted by Wynkyn de Worde in 1498 and $5^{29}$, by William Copland in 1 $_{557}$, and by Thomas East about ${ }^{1} 5^{8} 5$. The edition described above is the last of the early editions. It was not reprinted until 18 ı 6 , when two editions appeared, one edited by Haslewood in three volumes, and the second in "Walker's British Classics" ( 2 vols.). Both these editions were from that of 1634 . In $1^{8} 1_{7}$ Caxton's edition was reprinted, edited by Southey. In 1856 Thomas Wright re-edited the edition of 1634 for the "Library of Old Authors" (3 vols.). In 1868 Sir Edward Strachey issued Caxton's version "revised for modern use," and finally Dr. Oskar Sommer published an edition of Caxton's version with critical notes in i889-1891.

He was never marryed."

Cooke's statement was repeated by Captain Edward Thompson in his edition of Marvell's works, $177^{6}$; but as administration of Marvell's goods was granted to Mary Marvell on March 19, 1679, it is to be presumed that she was his widow, and that both Cooke and Thompson were mistaken.

Henry Lawes, who composed the music for this mask, published it in consequence of the many requests he received for copies; in the dedication he states that "Although not openly acknoledg'd by the Author, yet it is a legitimate off-fpring, fo lovely, and fo much defired, that the often copying of it hath tir'd my pen to give my feverall friends fatisfaction, and brought me to a necefsitie of producing it to the publick view ". The name "Comus", by which the poem is best known, does not appear in the title of this edition nor in the collected editions of the author's poems published in 1645 and 1673 . It was the author's first published work.

The occasion of this collection of verses was the drowning of Edward King during his passage from Chester in 1637 , when the ship was lost in the Irish seas and several of the passengers perished; the verses were written in love and remembrance by his sorrowing friends, as stated in the title; the last piece in the book, entitled "LYCIDAS" and signed with the initials J. M., is by John Milton, and this is its first appearance in type. It is reprinted in the collected volumes of poems.

This is claimed to be the first of Milton's works in prose. It was preceded only by his "Comus" and "Lycidas", published in 1637 and 1638 respectively.

This and the four following numbers are Milton's contributions to the dispute between Joseph Hall, bishop of Exeter, his son Robert, and Archbishop Ussher on the one side, and the five ministers whose united initials formed the name Smectymnuus, on the other side. The works are given in the order in which they appeared between May, 1641, and March or April, 1642.

Of the two editions published this year ( $16+5$ ) there is nothing to indicate which is the earlier. Both of them, as well as the edition of $16+4$, have the statement on the title-page, "Now the second time rerised, and much augmented ", evidently due to the fact that each was slavishly copied from the previous edition without any attempt at correction or change; the books are almost paginary reprints, one of the other, occupying the same number of pages and generally repeating the same errors, although they are noted in the errata.

According to Wharton, it was "The most close, conclusive, comprehensive and decisive vindication on the liberty of the press that has yet appeared". The two parts of the volume have separate pagination. The work contains all the poems written by Milton up to the date of its publication, with the exception of those "On the death of a fair infant dying of a cough" and "At a vacation exercise in the Colledge", both of which appear in the second edition of the poems, 1673 . With the exception of "Lycidas", "Comus ", and the epitaph on Shakespeare, all the pieces were printed here for the first time. It is the first published work of Milton's to bear the name in full. Although registered on October 6,1645 , the precise day of its publication was January 2 of the following year. Copies exist with the slight change in the imprint of "S. Pauls" Church-yard.

The publication of the "EIKONOKAÁETHE" in 1649 having called forth an answer in defence of the King by Salmasius, the work of Salmasius was in turn answered by Milton in the above described work, characterized by Wharton as "The best apology that ever was offered for bringing Kings to the block". Its popularity is attested by the fact that it was followed by at least seven distinct editions in 165 r , and at least two in $165^{2}$. On June 16,1660 , it was ordered by the restored House of Commons to be burned by the common hangman. It was translated into English in 1692 (see No. 590).

It was the writing of this work that finally cost Milton his eyesight, which had been failing for some years.

These lines are continued across the head, enclosing the head-line, " Paradife loft", and the word "Book" followed by its appropriate number. A single ruled line surrounds the inner and lower edges. Each Book has at its beginning a head-band formed of printer's ornaments.

Bibliographers have recognized eight distinct issues of this first edition of "Paradise Lost," varying from each other in several more or less important particulars. The more important of these variations consist in changes in the title-pages, which will be noted under their respective headings. The text of the poem is identical in all cases, with the exception of a few typographical errors which were corrected as the work passed through the press. The sheets of the various issues were evidently mixed and made up indiscriminately by the binder, and therefore copies of apparently the same issue will be found to differ from each other in that some will have more of the errors corrected than others.

With the issuance of copies under what is designated as the fourth title-page, as also in the subsequent issues, several pages of preliminary matter were added, which will be clescribed under the proper headings. This matter includes a list of errata, which is, however, more or less incorrect, according as the errors in each particular copy were corrected while the work was printing.

Notwithstanding a diligent search, the compilers of this catalogue have been unable to find any copies with the so-called fifth and sixth titles. The public and private libraries of this country and England have been searched in vain. On the other hand, slight variations of the titles already noted have been discovered; and while it is not impossible that the missing issues may be found, it is very probable that still other variations exist.

It would be interesting, if it were possible, to learn the causes that led to so many changes in the title-page of this first edition of one of the
most famous books in English literature. It has been supposed that the sale of the book was so slow that the publishers found it necessary to stimulate the demand by printing new titles and conveying the impression of new editions. This explanation, however, is hardly in accordance with the known facts. The agreement between Milton and Samuel Simmons, in April, 1667 , by which the latter purchased the copyright of the poem, provided that the author was to receive the sum of five pounds when the book was printed, and a second five pounds when the edition (to consist of from thirteen hundred to fifteen hundred copies) was sold. The book was published, probably, about August, 1667 , as in that month it was entered upon the books of the Stationers' Company. Milton's receipt for the second payment of five pounds, which is still in existence, is dated April 26, 1669, from which it would conclusively appear that the whole edition had been sold within less than twenty months, certainly not an over long period, at that time, for the disposal of so large an edition of an epic poem by an unpopular poet. This theory furnishes no explanation of the fact that although Simmons was the purchaser and owner of the copyright, his name does not appear on any of the title-pages earlier than that designated as the fourth, nor does it explain the changes made in the booksellers of the various issues. A more plausible theory would be, that the whole edition was printed at one time, but without title-page, which was set up and printed only as purchasers were found for a portion of the edition, and that the imprint was changed to agree with the names of such purchasers.

It is a curious fact that in the first four issues of the title, although printed in two separate years ( 1667 and 1668 ), the first, second, third, and fifth lines were certainly printed from the same type. Evidence of this will be found by careful measurement, and in the fact that small defects in certain letters will be found identical in all; for instance, the slight nick in the top of the long " $s$ " in "Paradife", the cut in the lower part of the " $B$ " in "Books", etc. These do not show in the reduced facsimiles given.

The address of "The Printer to the Reader" in this issue consists of three lines and reads as follows: "The Printer to the Reader. Courteous Reader, There was no Argument at firf intended to the Book, but for the fatisfaction of many that have defired it, is procured. S. Simmons." In a later issue with the same title-page, as well as in the subsequent issues, the address is in five lines as follows: "The Printer to the Reader. Courteous Reader, There was no Argument at firf intended to the Book, but for the fatisfaction of many that have defired it, I have procur'd it, and withall a reafon of that which fumbled many others, why the Poem Rimes not. S. Simmons."

This is the first folio edition and the first to be illustrated ; the illustrations, besides the portrait described above, consist of twelve full-page copper-plates, most of them engraved by M. Tonson seems to have considered this publication his crowning effort, for in his portrait, painted by Kneller, he holds the book conspicuously in his hand.

Copies are said to have been printed on large paper, but as 110 mention of such is made in the list of subscribers, it is probable that the copies so called are only unusually large ones, though some copies are evidently on a thicker and better paper. The work is frequently found bound up with "Paradise Regained" and "Samson Agonistes" issued the same year to match the preceding (see No. 6I5).

The thirty-one additional plates illustrating the life of Æsop are placed at the end of the volume. They are preceded by the plate representing Æsop surrounded by animals and birds, which formed the first plate to the first edition. Plate No. 17 is usually wanting, being generally removed as of too free a character. Nearly all of them are signed "Tho: Dudley fecit ".

The first edition or issue contains sixty-four poems, to which over thirty new ones are added in the second issue. Of these additional poems at least nine are taken from the first edition of the Earl of Rochester's poems (Antwerp, 1680). It must be noted, however, that that volume contains poems that were certainly not written by Rochester, and which were not included in the most authoritative editions of his works.

The authorship of the present volume is attributed to Joan Philips on uncertain authority, and who Joan Philips was appears to be equally uncertain. Mr. Edmund Gosse has suggested that she may have been the daughter of Katherine Philips. ("Seventeenth Century Studies," i 883, p. 227 .)
