

## Course of Instruction,

AS REVISED DECEMBER 11, 1894.

Four Courses of Instruction are provided for, as follows: Elementary Course.
Regular Normal Course.
Scientific Course.
Advanced Normal Course.

#### ELEMENTARY COURSE.

#### PREPARATORY STUDIES.

Language: - Orthography, Reading.

Natural Science:-Physiology and Hygiene.

Historical Science:—Geography, Political and Physical; History of the United States.

The Arts:—Penmanship, sufficient to be able to explain some approved system; writing to be submitted to the Board of Examiners.

Other studies, as Arithmetic, English Grammar, Algebra, etc., shall be added to the Preparatory year, said studies to be selected by each Normal School, but the "final" examination in these added branches shall be deferred till the end of the Junior year.

#### JUNIOR YEAR.

Pedagogies: -School Management; Methods of Teaching the Common Branches.

Language: - English Grammar; Latin, sufficient for the introduction of Cæsar.

Mathematics: - Arithmetic; Elementary Algebra.

Natural Science: -- Botany.

Historical Science: - Civil Government.

The Arts:—Drawing, a daily exercise for at least twenty-four weeks, work to be submitted to the Board of Examiners; Book-keeping, single entry, including a knowledge of common business papers, and a daily exercise for at least seven weeks; Vocal Music, elementary principles, and attendance upon daily exercises for at least twelve weeks.

Physical Culture.

#### SENIOR YEAR.

Pedagogics:—Psychology; Methods of Teaching the Common Branches; History of Education; Model School Work, at least twenty weeks of actual teaching daily during one period of not less than forty-five minutes; a Thesis on a professional subject.

Language:—Rhetoric and Composition; English Literature, at least twelve weeks' work, including the thorough study of four English classics; Latin, Cæsar, through the Helvetian War.

Mathematics: - Plane Geometry.

Natural Science: - Elementary Natural Philosophy.

Historical Science.—General History.

The Arts:—Elocutionary exercises in connection with the study of English Literature; Manual Training.

Physical Culture.

#### REGULAR NORMAL COURSE-THREE YEARS.

(This Course includes the studies of the Elementary Course, and the following branches: A full equivalent will be accepted for any of the text-books named in this Course.)

Pedagogics:—Advanced Psychology; Moral Science; Philosophy of Education; Methods of Teaching; Practice of Teaching; Pedagogical Works; Fræbel, Education of Man; Quick, Educational Reformers; Fitch, Lectures on Teaching; School Supervision, School Apparatus; Discussion of Manual Training, Physical Culture, etc.

Mathematics:—Solid Geometry; Plane and Analytical Trigonometry; Surveying.

Language:—Latin; Cæsar, 3 books; Vergil's Æneid, 3 books; Cicero, 3 Orations.

Natural Science:—Chemistry, including Chemistry of Soils; Zoology, including Entomology; and Geology.

Literature:—Higher Literature, English and American, including a study of at least four classics.

#### SCIENTIFIC COURSE—Four YEARS.

(This Course includes the studies of the Regular Normal Course and the following branches:)

Pedagogics:—Logic; Course of Professional Reading selected from Regular or Advanced Normal Course; a Thesis on a professional subject.

Language:—Latin; 3 Books of Vergil's Ænid, 3 Orations of Cicero, or a full equivalent; (an equivalent of Greek, German or French will be accepted for any of the following studies: Vergil, Cicero, Higher Algebra, Spherical Trigonometry, Surveying, Analytical Geometry, Calculus, Mathematical Natural Philosophy and Mathematical Astronomy, and an equivalent of Latin and advanced work in Natural Science for any of the foregoing mathematical studies.)

Mathematics:—Higher Algebra; Spherical Trigonometry and Surveying, with use of instruments; Analytical Geometry; Differential and Integral Calculus.

Natural Science.—Higher Natural Philosophy; Astronomy, Descriptive and Mathematical.

Historical Science.—English History; Grecian History; Roman History.

#### ADVANCED NORMAL COURSE-FIVE YEARS.

(This course includes the studies of the Scientific Course, and one year's additional work in Pedagogics, as follows: A full equivalent will be accepted for any of the text-books in the Course.)

Psychology: - James, Advanced Course.

Laurie's Institutes of Education; Rein's Outline of Pedagogy; Herbart's Science of Education; Spencer's Education; Rosmini's Method in Education; Davidson's Education of the Greek People.

Discussion of Methods and Objects of Leading Educators: Freebel, Pestalozzi, Dr. Arnold, Horace Mann and others.

Discussion of Educational Theories.

Education in the United States; Education in Pennsylvania (Wickersham); General Survey of History of Public Education in Germany, France and England.

Advanced work in Language, Mathematics, Natural Science, etc., may be taken at the option of the student.

## Rules for Final Examinations

AND ADMISSION TO THE JUNIOR AND SENIOR CLASSES
IN THE ELEMENTARY COURSE.

- 1. Admission to the Senior and Junior classes as well as graduation, shall be determined by the State Board of Examiners at the annual examination by the Board. This Board is appointed by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction from the following classes: The State Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent, who is President of the Board; the Principal of another Normal School; six county, city or borough superintendents of Pennsylvania; and the Principal of this Normal School. Each student must receive eight votes out of the nine in order to pass the examinations.\* Students must be examined and recommended by the Faculty before taking the State examinations.
- 2. In order to be admitted to the Junior class at any State Normal School, persons must be examined in the six prepara-

<sup>\*</sup>These examinations come early in June, the date being fixed each year by the State Superintendent. The examinations are in writing and last two or three days.

tory branches named and no others; and the examination in these branches shall be final. Those who for any reason were unable to complete the preparatory examination, may be admitted to both the preparatory and the Junior examinations at the end of the Junior year. But they must be classed as preparatory students till the final examination in the preparatory branches has been completed. No substitutions or conditions shall be allowed for any of the studies required for admission to the Junior class.

- 3. In order to be admitted to the Senior class, persons must be examined in all the Junior studies, except Methods and Latin, and the examination in these branches shall be final. No substitutions or conditions shall be allowed for any of the studies required for admission to the Senior class.
- 4. If the faculty of any State Normal School, or the State Board of Examiners, decide that a person is not prepared to pass an examination by the State Board, he shall not be admitted to the same examination at any other State Normal School during the same school year.
- 5. If a person who has completed the Preparatory or the Junior studies at any State Normal School, desires to enter another State Normal School, the Principal of the School at which the examination was held shall send the proper certificate to the Principal of the School which the person desires to attend. Except for the reason here stated, no certificate setting forth the fact of the passing of the Preparatory or the Junior studies shall be issued.
- 6. Candidates for graduation shall be examined in all the branches of the Senior year. They shall have the opportunity of being examined in any of the higher branches, including vocal and instrumental music and double entry book-keeping; and all studies completed by them shall be named in their certificate.
- 7. Persons who have been graduated in any Course may be examined at any State examination in any branches of a higher course, and the Secretary of the Board of Examiners shall certify, on the backs of their diplomas, to the passing of the branches completed at said examination.
- 8. A certificate setting forth the proficiency of all the applicants in all the studies in which they desire to be examined by the

State Board of Examiners shall be prepared and signed by the faculty and presented to the Board.

#### CERTIFICATES AND DIPLOMAS.

A student graduating in the Elementary Course will receive a certificate in which will be named the branches he has studied, and by which he will be constituted *Bachelor of the Elements;* these certificates entitle their holders to teach in the public schools of Pennsylvania for any two subsequent years without further examination. The diplomas of those graduating in the Scientific course will enumerate the distinctive branches of this course, and constitute their holders, *Bachelors of the Sciences*.

Graduates who have continued their studies for two years, and have practiced their profession for two annual terms, in the Common Schools of the State, and who have presented to the Faculty and Board of Examiners a certificate of good moral character and skill in the art of Teaching from the Board or Boards of Directors in whose employ they have taught, countersigned by the proper County Superintendent, may receive diplomas, constituting them Masters in the several studies embraced in the Course in which they graduated, and conferring upon them corresponding professional degrees, as follows:

Master of the Elements. Master of the Sciences.

These diplomas are permanent certificates of the highest grade. They confer upon their holders the right to teach the branches named therein in the public schools of Pennsylvania, without further examination.

Applications for diplomas must be presented to the Board of Examiners at their regular session.

The Normal School law makes it the duty of the authorities of the Normal Schools to grant diplomas or State Certificates to actual leachers in Common Schools, without their having attended the Normal Schools as students. The following are the conditions upon which these diplomas will be granted:

1. Each applicant must be twenty-one years of age, and of good moral character, and he must have taught successfully during three successive annual terms in Common Schools in this state, the proof of age to be the declaration on honor of the applicant; and of moral character and a satisfactory discharge of the requisite terms of teaching, a certificate from the proper

Board or Boards of Directors, signed by the President and Secretary, and countersigned by the proper County Superintendent or Superintendents.

- 2. The examination to be in the Elementary or Scientific Course, as the applicant may select, according to the list of studies as printed in the circulars of the State Normal Schools, and approved by the Superintendent of Public Instruction, or in such other studies as may by the Board of Examiners be deemed equivalent.
- 3. Any person obtaining a certificate in the Elementary Course may, at the next or any succeeding annual examination, be examined for the higher course, and obtain the proper certificate.
- 4. Each applicant to prepare and present to the Board of Examiners an original thesis of not less than six folio pages of manuscript, on some professional subject, to be retained at the school where the examinations take place.
- 5. The examination and certificate to be without expense to the applicant, and the certificate to be full evidence of qualifications to teach the branches therein named, in any part of the state, without further examination.

# Location, Building, &c.

The West Chester State Normal School was founded in the year 1871, by the joint efforts of the Trustees and contributors of the West Chester Academy, and the citizens of West Chester and vicinity.

West Chester is a beautiful town of 10,000 inhabitants, the county seat of Chester county, and is pre-eminent for its health-fulness, morality and intelligence. It is about twenty-five miles west of Philadelphia, with which it is connected by two railroads, over which trains run at all hours of the day. Both of these are controlled by the Pennsylvania Railroad, and all trains for West Chester leave the new Broad Street Station. A short branch road connects West Chester with the main line of the Pennsylvania Railroad at Frazer, where close connections are

made with the trains on the main line, and by an Electric Road it is also connected with the Wilmington and Northern R. R. at Lenape.

#### THE BUILDINGS

Are situated in the southern part of the borough, half a mile from the Court House. The main building is new, built of greenstone and marble, 256 by 234 feet, four stories high, with basement. It is one of the finest and handsomest school buildings in the country. The buildings are surrounded by nineteen acres of beautiful grounds.

A new building, containing a chapel and a dining-room, has lately been completed; both are most completely and hand-somely fitted up. They are not excelled in any school in this country. Two new additions for sanitary purposes have also been erected, and each story, on both the girls' and boys' wings, is fitted up with bath-rooms (hot and cold water), water-closets, slop-hoppers, &c., of the best patterns. The drainage is perfect. These sanitary improvements alone cost \$10,000, and are believed to be the best and most healthful to be found anywhere. The whole building has lately been improved, the students' rooms have all been papered, refitted and refurnished, a fine library and reading-room provided for the free use of students, and many other improvements made to add to the efficiency of the school, and the comfort of the students.

The Gymnasium.—A first class gymnasium, 104 by 64 feet, with an administration building attached, 29 by 36 feet, has recently been completed. It is of stone, two stories high, is fitted up with every modern improvement, including a full supply of the best apparatus, running track, bath-rooms, large swimming-pool, bowling-alleys, ball-cage, &c. With the single exception of the new Yale gymnasium, it is believed to be the best and most complete gymnasium connected with any school or college in the United States. A thoroughly trained physician and his wife are in charge of the gymnasium, and all exercise is taken under their supervision. All students are given a complete physical examination, and proper exercises prescribed for them. This gymnasium marks a great and important advance in Normal School work, and its advantages will be enjoyed by all students without extra cost.

RECITATION HALL.—Two years ago the Board of Trustees erected a new building, 185 by 80 feet, with two stories above

a high basement, which is used wholly for school purposes. It has been planned with great care, and is unusually well adapted to its purpose. It is heated and ventilated by the Smead-Wills system. The total cost of the building and heating-plant has been over \$60,000.

NEW GROUNDS.—The erection of so many buildings has so taken up the main campus that during the past year the trustees purchased an adjacent plot of five acres; a part of this has been leveled up at much expense and made into a fine playground and ball-field.

INFIRMARY.—A complete and well appointed school infirmary, at considerable distance from the other school buildings, has just been erected. This has been planned by skilful physicians and architects, and will not only promote the comfort and the recovery of any who may be ill, but will also prevent the spread of any contagion in the school. It is believed that this is the first school of its class to take this important step.

The school property has now cost upwards of \$400,000, and is the best and most complete possessed by any Normal School in this country.


STUDENTS' ROOMS.

The rooms are generally arranged for two students each. All are good sized, have high ceilings, are well ventilated, and are all thoroughly heated by direct steam radiation. The rooms are newly and comfortably furnished, have closets, single beds, wash stands, bowls and pitchers, and are furnished with woven wire mattresses. The ladies' rooms are all partly carpeted. The whole building is lighted with gas, every student's room being fitted with an Argand burner.

# Admission, Government, &c.

# CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION.

Pupils will be allowed to enter the regular course at any point for which they are actually fitted. They may enter at any time during the Session, and will be charged only from date of entrance.

A prompt attendance at the commencement of the Session is of the utmost importance, both to the progress of the pupil and proper organization of the School.

Students desiring to enter the Institution should make application to the Principal at as early a date as possible. All new students must submit satisfactory testimonials of good character from their last teachers.

#### OUTFIT.

Pupils boarding in the Institution will be furnished with single beds and bedding, and are expected to furnish two pairs of blankets, or an equivalent, towels, and table napkins; also an umbrella and a pair of rubber over-shoes. All students will need gymnasium shoes, which can be got in West Chester at small expense, and all young ladies will need loose blouse waists for use in the gymnasium, which should be of dark blue flannel. Many of the students provide carpet for their rooms, thus giving them a very neat and home-like appearance.

Keys, lamps, wash-bowls, pitchers and looking-glasses, are furnished by the School, but their cost must be deposited when they are obtained, which deposit will be refunded when they are returned uninjured.

#### GOVERNMENT.

Self-government is regarded as the only true government and nothing will be required except that which a true sense of honor and self-respect would naturally demand from the individual.

The right is reserved to remove any pupil whose influence is found to be vitiating, from the school.

#### MORAL AND RELIGIOUS CULTURE.

All students are required to attend the opening exercises of the School in the chapel each day, and all must attend religious services each Sabbath morning in the town, at the churches preferred by their parents or guardians.

#### LABORATORY.

The new Laboratory renders the facilities for Chemistry even more complete than ever; the department is under the charge of a practical chemist, who has devoted years to this important branch, and who is State Inspector of Foods of Penusylvania. A full course in qualitative analysis, blowpipe analysis of minerals, &c., is given each term. Students receive instruc-

tion without extra charge, but are required to pay for chemicals used, breakage, &c. The removal of the laboratory out of the main school building has removed all the danger often apprehended from such departments.

#### APPARATUS.

The Institution is supplied with Philosophical and Chemical Apparatus of the most approved kind, large additions having been made recently. Students in General Chemistry will be charged at the rate of two dollars per term for materials used in experiments before the class.

# MODEL SCHOOL.

The Model School is a most important adjunct to the Normal School. If a Normal School fails to inculcate good methods of teaching, it fails to accomplish the great end for which it was established. The Model School should, therefore, be what the name implies, a school in which teacher students may witness the best methods of instruction, and learn to practice them.

Miss Eva J. Blanchard, so long associated with Miss Spear here, is Principal of this department. Miss Blanchard is well known as one of the foremost teachers in this line in the country, and the advantages which the Model School offers cannot be overestimated.

This school is connected with a view to produce the best results, both in the progress of the pupils, and the attainment of correct methods by the student-teachers. Before students are allowed to teach classes in this department, they are required to witness the plans adopted by the principal and her assistants. They are then required to teach under the constant supervision of the Principal of the Model School. Weekly meetings are held for the purpose of correcting errors in teaching and suggesting new methods.

The following course of study is pursued in this department: Primary Department.—Reading, Number, Form, Language, Elementary Geography and History, Writing, Spelling, Drawing, Vocal Music, Observations of Plants, Animals, Minerals and Metals.

Intermediate Department.—Reading, Arithmetic, Form, Lauguage, Grammar, Physiology, Geography, History, Writing, Spelling, Drawing, Vocal Music, Manual Training, Elementary Botany, Zoology, Mineralogy, and Physics.

# LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

A large library room has lately been fitted up in the best manner. It now contains libraries aggregating nearly 7,000 volumes. A modern card catalogue adds greatly to their value. The library is open at all hours out of school time, with a competent librarian constantly in charge.

Connected with the library is a reading-room supplied with about a hundred magazines and papers, also for the constant and free use of the school.

# LITERARY SOCIETIES.

There are connected with the school two flourishing Literary Societies—The Moore Literary Society, and the Aryan Society—composed of students and members of the Faculty.

The value of these societies as adjuncts of education is so great that students cannot afford to neglect the opportunities they furnish for literary and oratorical culture. In addition to the School Library, each society has an excellent and good-sized library, for the use of its members.

#### MUSEUM.

The museum contains a large and valuable collection of specimens, illustrating every department of Natural Science. It was begun in the year 1826, and has been annually enriched with contributions from every portion of the world. The justly celebrated "Herbariums" of the late Dr. William Darlington, and David Townsend, now in this Museum, are conceded to be two of the most accurate and extensive private collections ever formed in this country.

#### TEXT BOOKS.

Text Books are sold to students at wholesale prices; but all books used in the Elementary Course are furnished on rent to those preferring it.

#### MUSIC.

This department is unexcelled outside of the large cities. The teachers in charge are fine musicians, and have had long and successful experience in their profession. The following is the course arranged for the piano:

Course in Instrumental Music.

First Grade.

Emery's Foundation Studies, and the N. E. Conservatory Method, or Urbach's Instruction Book.

Very easy selections from modern composers.

Bertini, op. 29; Heller, ops. 46 and 45; Loeschorn, op. 66; Berens, op. 61; Bach, Little Preludes; Turner, Damper Pedal Studies, op. 15; Technics, Emery and Mason.

PIECES.

Selections from Heller, Reinberger, Schwarvenka, Mendelssohn, Haydn, Schumann, Schubert, Bach, and others.

Fourth Grade.

ETUDES.

Turner, Elements of Modern Octave Playing; selections from 50 Selected Studies, Cramer; Bach, Two Part Inventions; Clementi, Gradus ad Parnassum; Moscheles, op. 70; Selections from Chopin, ops. 10 and 25, and Bach's Preludes and Fugues.

PIECES

Selections from classical and modern composers.

Pupils completing this course in a satisfactory manner will be awarded a diploma. The time required to complete the course cannot be specified, depending, as it does, upon the talent, previous acquirements, and industry of the pupil.

The pianos used for practice are all new and of first-class makes.

VOCAL Music.

This department is also in charge of a first-class teacher. The best modern methods of instruction are used both in class work and in individual instruction, and the success and popularity of the department have been very marked. Private pupils in vocal music pay the same rates as in instrumental music, and have the use of a piano to aid their practice. Class instruction in vocal music is given without extra cost.

#### First Grade.

Lessons in physiology of voice and organs of respiration. Exercises for combining different registers or tones. Exercises for developing chest; medium and head tones. Vocalizes by Panof ka. Easy ballads.

#### Second Grade.

Exercises for flexibility continued. Study of scales. Major and Chromatic. Vocalizes by Panof ka and Concone.

#### Third Grade.

Practice of Major, Minor, and Chromatic scales continued. Study of embellishments, trills, &c. Vocalizes by Panofka, Concone, and Marchesi. Selections from Operas and Oratorios.

# MUSIC RECITALS

Are held every four weeks in the chapel, for the purpose of giving the pupils ease and self-control in playing and singing before an audience. For these recitals a new Steinway Concert Grand Piano is used.

A course of reading in musical literature is recommended to cultivate the style, and enrich the pupil's knowledge of the great masters.

Terms:—Winter Sessions, two lessons per week, including two practice periods daily, \$34.00. For Spring Session, \$16.00. For a part of a term, \$1.25 per week.

For lessons on other instruments than the piano and cabinet organ, special arrangement must be made.

# APPLICATIONS FOR TEACHERS.

Frequent applications are made to the Principal for well trained teachers, and it will be our aim to supply the demand as far as possible. Every year demand is made for more teachers than can be supplied.

#### CALENDAR.

The school year is divided into two sessions. The Winter Session will begin Monday, September 2d, and continue twenty-

cight weeks. The Spring Session will begin Monday, March 30th, and continue fourteen weeks. There will be a vacation of one week at Christmas, and one of the same length between the sessions in March.

#### TERMS.

Tuition and board, including heat, light, and washing, for the Winter Session, \$140; one-half payable in advance, the remainder on the second of December; for a period less than the session, per week, \$5.25. For the Spring Session, \$65, payable in advance; for a period less than the session, per week, \$5.00.

For tuition alone, for Winter Session, \$45, one-half payable in advance, the remainder on the second of December; for a period less than a session, per week, \$1.65. For Spring Session, in advance, \$20; for period less than a session, per week, \$1.50. For tuition in Model School, Winter Session, \$20; Summer Session, \$10. For a time less than a session, per week, 80 cents.

The "State Aid" of fifty cents a week is deducted from the bills of those who comply with the conditions stated *below*, making the total cost to teachers \$184 per year.

*Teachers* whose schools do not end until after the beginning of the session, are charged by the week, at *term rates*, if they enter as soon as their school close, and finish the term.

There are no extra charges except for private lessons in music, and the costs of the chemicals to those studying chemistry.

#### DEDUCTIONS.

Students absent two consecutive weeks, or longer, on account of personal sickness, are entitled to full reduction for the time lost.

Those leaving for any other cause will be required to pay for the time spent at the school at the rate for a period less than a session as specified above.

All bills must be settled with the Principal, who acts in behalf of the Trustees. Bills for one term must be settled before a student will be permitted to enter upon the next term, unless by special arrangement.

# STATE APPROPRIATIONS TO STUDENTS AND GRADUATES.

By a recent Act of the Legislature, the following appropriations are made by the State to Normal Students and Graduates:

1. Each student over seventeen years of age, who shall sign a

paper declaring his intention to teach in the Common Schools of the State, shall receive the sum of FIFTY CENTS per week towards defraying the expenses of tuition and boarding.

- 2. Each student, who, *upon graduating*, shall sign an agreement to teach in the Common Schools of the State *two full school years*, shall receive the sum of FIFTY DOLLARS.
- 3. Any student to secure the benefits, must attend the School at least *twelve consecutive weeks*, and must join a class in Methods of Instruction or School Management. These benefits will be deducted from the regular expenses of board and tuition.

# VISITORS AND VISITING.

Calls on pupils at other times than during the hours of recreation, seriously interfere with the object they have in view, and therefore, will not be allowed except in case of necessity. Persons desiring to visit the school are cordially invited to do so at any time.

Every absence from a school duty is a loss which cannot be wholly made up. Parents are carnestly requested not to take their children away from a single school duty, unless it is absolutely necessary. It will interfere with important school duties if a student leaves school earlier than Saturday morning or returns later than Sunday evening. Students are not permitted to visit home or away from the town without special permission from their parents or guardians.

## REGULATIONS.

- 1. Every student is requested on entering to give the Principal information in regard to the following particulars: Whether he designs fitting himself for a teacher; what length of time he designs remaining in the Institution, and whether he desires to pursue the regular course for graduation.
- 2. Students are considered members of the School until the Principal is duly notified of their withdrawal.
- 3. The hours regularly assigned to study are to be faithfully devoted to the preparation of the exercises required.
- 4. Students are allowed to walk for exercise in the vicinity of the school, but no one is permitted to visit the town or otherwise absent himself, without permission from the Principal. Absence from the premises after dusk is not permitted. New acquaintances outside of the school must not be cultivated.
- 5. Permission to be absent from a recitation must always be obtained from the teacher in charge of the class, *before* the absence occurs; and students desiring to be absent from town must obtain written permission from the Principal.
- 6. Boarding students who are not present at the beginning of the term, must send to the Principal a written explanation of their absence, or their rooms will be forfeited.
- 7. Every student must be present at the daily opening exercises of the school, and at all general exercises in the Chapel unless excused.
- 8. All objectionable books, papers and cards, found in the possession of students, will be taken and destroyed.
- 9. Disorderly conduct in the building is prohibited. Each student will be held accountable for any disturbance or damage in his room.
- 10. No nails must be driven in the walls or ceilings, or alterations be made in the windows, doors, or any appendage of the rooms, without permission from the *Steward*.
- 11. Students are not allowed to visit one another's rooms during the regular hours of study, without permission of those in charge of the halls. No change of rooms must take place without permission from the Principal.

- 12. Each student of instrumental music will have regular hours assigned for practice, during which time no spectator must be present to interrupt the exercises or divert the attention.
- 13. All students who are tardy, unnecessarily, at meals; must forfeit them, and no one must leave before the rest without good reason, and permission from the person sitting at the head of the table. Any student sick or indisposed, and requiring attention, must have himself reported at once to the Matron.
- 14. It is expected that the ladies and gentlemen of the Institution will treat one another with politeness, but they will not be allowed to be together or to carry on conversation or other communication except in the performance of school exercises, unless by special permission. Neither sex will be permitted to trespass upon that portion of the building assigned to the other.
- 15. No lady or gentleman attending this Institution will meet, walk, or ride with a person of the opposite sex, except in cases of necessity, and then only with the permission of the Principal.
- 16. Students will not visit the dining room at any other time than meal time, nor the domestic departments, boiler room, or music rooms, without permission.
- 17. The use of tobacco in any form is strictly prohibited in the building or on the grounds.
- 18. Students must not enter any saloon, bar-room, billiard or pool-room. They are absolutely forbidden to use as a beverage alcoholic liquors of any kind whatever during their connection with the school.
- 19. Students will be required to attend public worship each Sabbath morning at such places as their parents or guardians designate.
- 20. Students are required to take up enough studies to keep them, in the judgment of the Principal, sufficiently employed, but must not take up more than they can study with profit.
- 21. Students must furnish towels, napkins, and two pairs of blankets (or an equivalent), and have all articles of clothing distinctly marked. Each student is permitted to have twelve pieces washed each week without extra charge.
