

PREFACE.

Is March, 1889, the author began collecting material for a genealogy of the American Champions, and now presents to them the following histories of their several families. The efforts to obtain information in regard to those of the name have met with enthusiastic responses from all parts of the country, the members of each individual family having manifested great interest in the work. Truly, as one correspondent writes, "the chief characteristic of our family is to feel an interest in anyone in whose veins runs one drop of Champion blood."

The Champions as a race are of a vigorous character mentally and physically. Besides this quality of strength which they inherit, there is noticeable a decided family resemblance between individuals only distantly related. Pride of family is strong among them; and not only is the name prized by those to whom it belongs, but all around them they find others glad to honor it and entwine it with their own.

Our forefathers especially rejoiced in military titles, and in this respect the Champions were conspicuous, many of them having borne titles of more or less distinction. That these honors were wisely and deservedly bestowed upon them by their state and country, is proved by the part they took in the early colonial struggles and in the later wars of the Republic; and in all civil, educational, and religious movements, they have done their part in laying the foundation of American society.

While some have remained in their birthplace and cared for the old homestead, others, leaving the ease and quiet of their early home, have boldly faced the hardships incident to all new settlements; and as a tribute to their energy and enterprize, the name Champion has been given to towns in many different parts of the country.

The localities which have been the special homes of the Champions and with which their name is most closely identified are the towns of Saybrook, Lyme, East Haddam and Colester, in Connecticut; Hillsdale, North Chatham, Starkville and East Worcester, in New York; West Springfield, in Massachusetts; Ypsilanti, in Michigan; and several neighboring villages in the Wyoming Valley, Pennsylvania, and in Ashtabula County, Ohio.

Certain members of each family have taken the initiative by sending whatever records they could gather and the addresses of others who would be likely to assist in the collection of material for the Genealogy. The information derived from these sources has been supplemented by a personal search in town, church, and probate records, among monumental inscriptions in various burying-grounds, and by consulting many family, town, county, and state histories and directories already published.

INTRODUCTION.

In the ruder stages of society, when a man's position and acknowledged rights were dependent upon his own power to maintain them by force of arms, it was but natural that the trial by battle should form a prominent part of the social system then existing. Therefore from the earliest stages of feudalism trial by single combat was recognized as a legal mode of settling disputes. In many cases where the disputants were so unequally matched that a personal encounter could not fairly determine the merits of the cause, the law permitted either party to name a proxy or champion.*

It was in the eleventh century, when the system of knight-hood or chivalry had assumed the character of a positive institution, that the name 'champion' came to have its more dignified acceptation and signified a knight who entered the lists in behalf of any one incapable of self-defense. In every community where the law of chivalry prevailed there is no reason why there might not be some individual who would receive the appellation of The Champion. The title once being affixed, its use in connection with a christian name would follow, and from a mere sobriquet gradually pass into an acknowledged surname.

"Our 'Champions' and 'Campions' are but relies of the old 'William le Champion,' or 'Katerine le Champion,' a sobriquet which would easily affix itself to some sturdy rustic who had thrown his adversary in the wrestling ground." [Bardsley's "English Surnames," p. 304.]*

That the Champions of the several counties of England, where the name is found, sprung from a common origin would seem to be manifest from the similarity of their family coats of arms. These are described in Burke's "Heraldic Dictionary" as follows:

(Berkshire and Essex.) Argent three trefoils slipped sable. Crest—an arm embowed and erect, in armour proper, garnished or, holding in the gauntlet a chaplet of laurel vert.

(London.) The same.

(Essex.) Sable three trefoils slipped argent.

(Kent.) Argent three trefoils slipped sable. Crest—an arm in armour erect, couped below the elbow, holding in the gauntlet a chaplet of laurel.

(London.) Or, on a fesse gules an eagle displayed of the first, between three trefoils slipped pean, within a bordure engrailed azure charged with eight besants. Crest—an arm erect, vested argent cuff gules holding in the hand proper a chaplet vert.

(London—Sir Richard, Lord Mayor, 1565.) Or, on a fesse gules between three trefoils, slipped crmines, an eagle displayed of the field, within a bordure azure besantée. (Another, the bordure engrailed.)

——. The same arms, the bordure being engrailed gules besantée. Crest—an arm erect, couped at the elbow, vested gules charged with three bars or, holding in the hand proper a rose branch of the first,†

[•] On pages 158 and 159 of the same work he says; "To Champagne it is we are indebted for our 'Champneys' and 'Champnesses,' descendants as they are from such old incomers as 'Robert le Champeness,' or 'Roger le Champeneys,' while the more strictly local form appears in our 'Champagnes,' not to say some of our 'Champions' and 'Campions.'

^{&#}x27;Champagne,' of course, means simply plain-land, and is found locally in various parts of Western Europe. I have included 'Champon' with the others because, though sometimes a combative sobriquet, it is as often found to be the media-cal form of the local term, 'Champon' and 'Champon' being other modes of spelling the same to be met with at this period. Then we find such double entries as 'Katerline le Champion' and 'Rozer le Champion'. Our present Authorized Version uses the word twice, as in Deut, xi, 30.—''Are they not on the other side of Jordan, by the way where the sun gooth down, in the land of the Camanures, which dwell in the champaign over against Gligal, beside the plains of Morch?''. In the various translations of this passage almost all the above modes of spelling have been used.'' Champon has been a respected name on the Continent for several centuries.

 $[\]bullet$ The Rose campion is a garden plant (Lychius coronaria) with handsome crimson flowers.



(London.) Or, two wings conjoined and expanded, sable between three trefoils, slipped ermines, on a chief gules an eagle displayed argent.

It will be seen that the three trefoils characterize all of the above arms alike. The coats of arms of Champane and Champeyon likewise bear trefoils. Whether any one of these ensigns armorial belongs to the Champions of this country the author has found no means of determining; and if there is any motto belonging to the arms it is likewise unknown. Is the shield charged with the three fleurs-de-lis which is impressed on the seals attached to the "agreement" printed on page 22 the rightful coat of arms of the Connecticut Champions, or is it merely the imprint of some seal casually in the possession of one of the subscribing parties, witnesses or magistrate? Is it reasonable to suppose that through some mistake the engraver cut fleurs de-list upon the shield instead of trefoils?

Henry Champion, the ancestor of by far the greater part of those who bear the name in this country, according to a wide-spread and probably reliable tradition, left his home in the neighborhood of Norwich, Norfolk, England, early in the seventeenth century, and embarking at Yarmouth set sail for New England.§ Influenced by this tradition, the writer after corresponding with Mr. Thomas R. Tallack, a professional genealogist of Norwich, engaged him to make search of such records as he suggested in the following letter:

According to Burke, Ely is the only one of the names which has a fleur-de-lis in its coat of arms. It has six.

The arms of Campion of London are-az, fretty of eight pieces erm, on a canton or, a fleur-de-lis gu.

[•] The fleur-de-4/s has, from its first introduction into coat armor, been the charge in the royal arms of France, and is a very common bearing in English armory. Some authors have supposed it to be intended to represent the terminal decoration of a scepter; others the iron of the angon, or javelin, of the aneuent French. That they are now intended to represent lihes there is little doubt. It is said to be an emblem of the Trinity from its three branchings; and lilies, it is said, were the Prancial organization of the armorphism of a very varly period.

² The trefoil, or three-leaved grass, is a bearing which often occurs in contarmor, if This trachfore exists in every branch of the family. Several of the prominent settlers of Saybrook are known to have come from the vicinity of Norwich; and Norwich, Connecticut, to the site of which some of them removed, is believed to have received its name from this fact. Varmouth is a considerable sequent town and place of great antiquity, and is innected miles distant from Norwich, the capital of Norfolk, which was a flourishing town in the time of Edward the Confessor (ed.) 69.

Dear Śir:—Your letter of March 5th duly reached me. With regard to the Champion family. I have looked at several ancient indexes and I find there were persons of that name in East and West Norfolk and also in Suffolk at various periods during the past four or tive hundred years. What I would suggest is that searches be made in the following records, when no doubt much information respecting the family would be gamed and possibly the connecting link with the American family discovered.

Wills, administrations and marriage licenses in the Consistory Court of Norwich, which embraced the whole of Norfolk and Suffolk, dating from 1380.

Wills and administrations in the Archdeaconry of Norfolk, 1450-1800.
Wills and administrations in the Archdeaconry of Norwich, 1430-1800.
Wills and administrations in the Peculiar of the Dean and Chapter

of Norwich, about fifty parishes.

Wills and administrations in the Archdeaconry of Suffolk, 1416-1800. I mention Suffolk as I saw the name of Champion in Ipswich.

Norwich Corporation Free-book, comprising a list of every person who traded in the city from 1316 to 1820.

Great Yarmouth Corporation Free-book, 1600-1800.

Lists of persons who held property in Norwich, 1500-1800.

Lists of persons who held property in Yarmouth, 1500-1800.

Great Yarmouth parish register (the largest in Englands, 1538-1800.

The poll-books of voters at elections for Norfolk and Sutfolk, Norwich and Yarmouth, none earlier than 1710.

Indexes in London.

The will-lists and poll-books would give the town or village to which the testator or voter belonged, and so would guide one to a knowledge of which parish register would be likely to yield results. Here in Norwich we have forty parishes and as many registers, but if the name be found as belonging to this city, there are ancient rate-books which exist as far back as Queen Elizabeth's time from which I could ascertain the particular parish in which the occupier of a house dwelt. Anything found in the Freemen's list would be very useful if, as is usually the case, the person was admitted by patrimony, because the father's name is given.

One other matter occurs to me. The ancient scribes had unlimited license in orthography, and the name of Champion is one that might very likely be much varied. I would therefore suggest that any Campion, Kampion, Scampion or even Scampine (which I have seen in a parish register near Norwich) should be carefully noted.

Dear Sir:-1 am writing just to inform you that the Champion investigations are progressing, but I trust you will be able to give rather more time than you spoke of in your previous letter, as the documents to be looked at are far apart and the matter to be gathered voluminous. I have had several days searching in London with the result of finding there were several armour-bearing Champion families in various parts of England, pedigrees of which exist. I have taken notes of where all these were located. I have found a number of notes of Champions in this part of the country, but as they are in various villages and at various periods, as far as I can see at present, there is not much likelihood of connecting them. With regard to the very old man named Champion, who you write died at Yarmouth in the last century,* I find he was only resident a very short time there and I have not found where he lived previous, but he was born in Flanders and came to England with his father who was attached to the army or household of the Prince of Orange. I have found the name entered Champion alias Campion, which is rather perplexing, as the latter family were numerous in some places.

There are families of the name in Essex whom I am about to look up, as I think the persons who resided in Suffolk and Norfolk at various periods and places were offshoots from that county; but the name occurs in good families in Surrey, Sussex, Somerset, Leicester, Berkshire, Hampshire, Kent and London. I do not see that the name occurs at all in our city records. Quite recently a Mr. Champion resided in this neighborhood, but I hear he came from Essex and has returned thither.



Disappointing and unsatisfactory as these extracts are, the writer has thought it best not to delay the publication of the Genealogy in the hope of receiving more conclusive evidence as to the birthplace of the Connecticut Settler. Further researches, however, are being prosecuted in England, the result of which, if of interest to the Champions of this country, will be immediately made known.

No one regrets more deeply than the writer his inability to authenticate the family tradition and trace the parentage of the Emigrant in the mother country. The difficulty of restoring the lost link may be more easily un 'erstood, when it is remembered that many of the early emigrants were led to come from the mother land for greater freedom in their religious faith, and often sailed from some minor port where no list of the pasengers was made or desired. Whether this was the ease with our Puritan Emigrant has not been ascertained; it may have been, as his name does not appear on any preserved list.

The names Champion and Campion, often used interchangably, are to be met with repeatedly in the various parish registers of London.



SAYBROOK AND LYME.

The state of civil and religious affairs in England in the time of Charles I was well calculated to cause dissatisfaction among those who were thoroughly indoctrinated with Puritanism or kindred forms of dissent. Influenced by such feelings, Lord Say and Sele. Lord Brook and other gentlemen contemplated a removal to America. In accordance with this design, on March 19, 1631–2, they procured of Robert, Earl of Warwick, a patent of all that territory "which lies west from Narraganset river, a hundred and twenty miles on the Sea Coast, and from thence in latitude and breadth aforesaid, to the South Sea."

On July 7, 1635, articles of agreement were entered into between the Say and Sele Company and John Winthrop, Junior, by which the latter was to be fully compensated for his time and trouble, was to act as "governor of the River Connecticut in New England and of the harbor and places adjoining" for one year, and was to build a fort at the mouth of the river, with a garrison of fifty men, reserving one thousand acres of good ground near the fort for its maintenance.

Winthrop arrived in Boston the 8th of the following October, and on November 24th a party of twenty men, dispatched by him, arrived at the Connecticut and took possession. Winthrop followed a little later with Lion Gardiner who soon took command of the fort. The fortifications and some other buildings were immediately begun; the level tract of land, two miles north-west from the bar, now called Saybrook Point, being selected for the beginning of a settlement.



For some years the garrison endured the privations and dangers of a frontier post. The fort was constantly threatened with attack by the Dutch; its men were ambushed and slain by the Indians; and the growth of the settlement was retarded, since efficient protection could be afforded only to those within the fort and the few scattered buildings near it.

Col. George Fenwick, one of the patentees, had visited the place the year Winthrop took command. About mid-summer 1639 he returned with two vessels, and gave to the tract of land about the mouth of the river the name of Saybrook in honor of the two leading proprietors. The territory to which the name was applied was about ten miles in length, divided nidway by the Connecticut River, and extending six or eight miles back from Long Island Sound, and included the greater part of the townships of Saybrook and Lyme and their parishes. Fenwick organized the first civil government in the settlement, and from this time continued to superintend and govern the inhabitants until December 5, 1644, when he sold the jurisdiction to Connecticut.

At a session of the General Assembly held at Hartford March 10, 1663, deputies from Saybrook were in attendance who made known to the Court an intention on the part of the colonists to set up a plantation on the east side of the river, and prayed that the bounds might be enlarged. To this the Court consented, and forthwith extended the bounds on the east side four miles to the north. In 1664 the first settlement was begnn, and on May 12th of that year a commission was appointed to determine the boundary line between Savbrook and New London. The settlement was known as East Saybrook and was incorporated as a distinct town under the name of Lyme in 1667. The site chosen for the town was a fertile, pleasant plain bordering the Connecticut, and terminating on the Sound in broad salt marshes. Towards the east commences a succession of hills which range northerly and become more elevated as they extend into the interior. It has been said, that the town was named by Matthew Griswold, one of its founders, in memory of Lyme-Regis, on the south coast of England, which was thought to have been his birth-place."

^{*} It is now known that Matthew Griswold came from Kenilworth.




Mr. Griswold built a log hut on his farm in Lyme, in which a negro of his used to sleep before any white person had ventured to spend the night on that side of the river on account of the Indians. It was called Black's Hall, and from that took the name Black Hall, by which that part of the town is still known.


"Lyme," says Miss Martha J. Lamb, "was settled by an active, sensible, resolute and blue-blooded people who gave it a moral and intellectual character it has never outgrown. Its climate is one of perfect health, and its people live to a great age."

That the relative position of those localities in Old Lyme with which the Champions have been especially associated may be apparent, a map of the southern part of the town is here inserted












TABULAR VIEW OF HEADS OF FAMILIES FOR THE FIRST FIVE GENERATIONS.

HENRY CHAMPION AND HIS DESCENDANTS.



"Few families in the Connecticut Colony have been more presperous than that of Henry Champion of Saybrook. When I speak here of his family, I intend his numerous descendants."—Himman.



HENRY CHAMPION.

 Henry Chambion emigrated from Old England to the American Colonies and settled at Saybrook, Connecticut, where he is found as early as 1647.

About 1660 the first known records of the town of Saybrook were begun, wherein were described the lands of the different inhabitants. With the exception of George Fenwick, the number of acres allotted to each person seems to have been small.

The lands of Henry Champion are recorded as follows:

"One parsell lying on the East side of the Great River Con. whereon a house now standeth containing by estimation six ackers, the ends abutting against the highwaie North East and South West, the sides abutting against the land of Morgayn Bowers South East and the land of Joseph Jarrit North West." [Say. Rec. p. 10.]

Also: "one parsell in the planting fields on the East side of the great River Con. by estimation four ackers, the end abutts against Blacke Halle River N. East, and against the greate Marsh South West, the side abutts against the Land of Will. Bechous North West," [id.]

Prior to 1600, and previously to the foregoing record being entered, he had sold his lot "lying within the town plott" in Saybrook to Jonathan Rudd. This lot contained five roods, and "the one side abuts against the highway North and the other side abuts against the lands of Thomas Mirall and William Waller South, the one end abuts against the land of Thomas Rood East and the other end abuts against the highway West." The lot thus appears to have been the corner lot situated on the south side of the East and West road, and on the East side of the North and South road.



After having assisted in the development of Saybrook, Henry Champion removed with his family to the east side of the Connectient River and became one of the first and most active founders of Lyme, being propounded a freeman of that town on May 12th, 1670. The records of the town were begun in 1674, and on June 18th of that year the following entries were made:

"Henory Champean's Lott one the necke beyond the little stony brook, bounded east by the highwaie to a little tree by the marsh fronting north to the highwaie, west and south by the marsh, contayning aighteen ackers more or less; Henry Champean allowing John Laye Junior tow ackers one the other side of the River adjoyning to John Laye's medow."

"Henory Champean's meadow upon Stony Brook three ackers more or less, bounded East by his own land, West and North by the commons, South by the medow of Renald Marvines." [It appears that Henry Champion and Renald Marvin had a dispute about this land which was subsequently settled by an agreement dated Sept. 8, 1696.—Lyme Torra Rec. Book II, p. 130.]

"Henory Champeon Senior's medow upon Russ oylande containing three ackers, three quarders more or less bounded west upon the medow of Renald Mervines, Southwardly upon the slow, north by the Coave, eastwardly by the meadow of John Lave Senior."

"Henory Champean's medow one his home Lotte contayning tow ackers and three quarders more or less, bounded South one the Cricke and the land of Peter Pratte, North one his own uplande, Sow West upon the Cove."

"Henory Champean's home Lott that he bought of Beltishaser De Wolfe, contayning ten ackers of upland more or less, bounded east one the highwaie, northerly on John Laye Senior, and westerly upon the Cove, southerly upon the medow of his own and the mouth of the Cricke."

"Henory Champean's Calf Pasture Land containing twenty ackers more or less bounded north upon the highwaie, east upon the commons, Southwardly upon the land of Richard Smith, westerly on the Commons, with one dwelling house beulte upon it."



"Henory Champean hath laid out to him at Bigg Medow tow reckers and a half more or less, bounded South on the medow of Widow Waller at a pine tree, Easterly by a cricke, northerly by the River and a little oylande."

The foregoing records are dated June 18, 1674, and are recorded in the First Book of the Town Records of Lyme on pages 23 and 24, under attestation of "Mathew Griswould and Reguld Mervines," who were the town surveyors. The lands of the other inhabitants are similarly recorded about the same time.

From the following document it appears that Henry Champion was one of the first proprietors of the town of Lyme.

"Know all men by these presents that I John Lay Senior of Lyme being unacquinted with the bounds of the Lotte which was formerly Henory Champean, Desired M^r Mathew Griswold Sen of Lyme he being one of the men that Laid out the lott at the first, that he would be held to lay out four ackers to Thomas Lee of Lyme I having sold it to him. Henory Champean also, being the first proprietor of the land above s⁴ consents unto and allow of Thomas Lee's having the above s⁴ four ackers of land according as it is now laid out by M^r Mathew Griswould as above s⁴.

Henry Champion resided in the house he had built on the hill just east of the meeting house and near the old burying-ground. Like the majority of settlers in a new country he probably occupied himself chiefly with agriculture. He also owned some live stock, for "Henry Champeon Senior his eare mark for all sorts of cretures is a crop one the off care with a balf penny cutt out one the under side of the same eare." Recorded March 24, 1673-4. [L. T. R. Bk. I. p. 5.] The sume mark had been previously allowed him in Saybrook as appears by the following entry [Say, Rev. p. 39]: "The mark that Henry Champeon puts upon his eattle and hogs is the top of the eare took square off and a pece took out under the same eare after thi-manner."



On March 12, 1671, representatives of the town of New London entered a complaint against Henry Champion and a number of his fellow townsmen before the county court at Hartford. The subject of the ill-feeling between the towns was a strip of land lying between Bride Brook and Niantic River, including Black Point in Lyme. Both towns claimed the land by virtue of previous grants, and both had reserved a portion of meadow at Black Point for the use of the ministry. The Court fined New London £9 and Lyme £5, which were afterwards remitted.

Henry Champion's name occurs frequently in the early records, usually as the grantor or grantee of land. On Sept. 2, 1664, Tobiah Colls (sie) of Saybrook makes his will, which is witnessed by "Henry Champion, John τ Constocke, his marke, John Borden." [County Court Rev., Vol. 3, p, θ ; at Hartford.] The three witnesses and a number of their friends are beneficiaries under the will.

Sir Edmund Andros took into his hands the government of the Colony of Connecticut in October 1687, and on August 27, 1688, by his direction was taken "An Accord of the lystable Estates in the towne of Lyme."

In amount his assessment stands twenty-sixth out of seventy, but his estate had been somewhat reduced by frequent presents to his children. Under the date Nov. 12, 1706, is "Henry Champion Senior's deed of gift to his grandson Henry Champion, eldest son of his son Henry Champion. Part of his home Lot situate on Meeting House Hill containing four acres of upland and swamp, with all the appurtenances, etc.," and "said Henry was not to put any tenant on this tract during



the lifetime of his grandfather or his wife Deborah" who signed the deed of consent "as per marriage agreement."

The first knowledge which we have of the marriage or family of Henry Champion is to be found on page 24 of the "Old Book" of Saybrook Records where is recorded:

From the original it is evident that no part of the foregoing record was made before the date of the last entry—the ink and handwriting being uniform throughout. It was not until about this time that the records were kept systematically in Saybrook. An attempt was then made by the town clerk to enter all previous records, depending either upon his own memory or information derived from members of the several families. These earliest vital statistics are scattered promisenously through the records of town and land transactions in the "Old Book" of Saybrook Records.

As to the name and family of the wife of Henry Champion no particulars have been gleaned from the early records; she was probably the daughter or sister of one of the early settlers of Saybrook. The exact dates of her birth and death are likewise unknown, so that she has come on, been the mother of children, and passed off the stage and we know nothing more of her. His second wife was a shrewd, scheming woman, for she induced this old man to make a very advantageous marriage settlement upon her, and finally involved him in a law suit with the widow of his eldest son, who resisted the resumption of the gifts her father-in-law had made her husband, and maintained in a very spirited manner the rights of herself and children.

Whereas it is intended if God willing that Henory Champion Senior in Lyme and Deborah Jones of the same town to join in near-

riage, therefore to prevent after trouble it is agreed and concluded that what estate the said Deborah Jones shall carry with her to Henry Champean's habitation that that estate shall remain her own and be at her own disposal her life time and at her death to return to her children [by a former marriage], and not to be accounted the said Henry Champion's estate at his death.

It is also agreed that the aforesaid Henry Champean doth by these presents promise and engage that after the day of this marriage that he will not dispose or alienate by deed of gift or sale, without the consent of the said Deborah Jones, during the said Champean's natural life, that is to say no part of his real estate. It is also to be understood that the abovesaid agreement shall nowise deprive or cutt off the above said Deborah of that part of the aforesaid Henry Champean's estate that is now allowed to the widow after her husband's decease. And for the true performance of the abovesaid we do hereunto set our hands and seals, the day and date being above written.

"Henory Champean Senior was married unto Deborah his now wife 21st March 1697, S."

"Henory Champean deceased the 17th day of February 1708/9, said to be aged ninety-eight years."#

AGREEMENT DETWEEN THE HEIRS OF HENRY CHAMPION DECEASED:

"We the heirs of Henry Champion deceased of the town of Lyme and Colony of Connecticut do untually agree to divide the estate of our honored father abovesaid into four equal shares; one to the children of Henry Champion deceased the son of Henry Champion abovesaid. One to the children of Thomas Champion deceased, and one to Sarah Bennet, and one to Mary Huntly, the daughters of the said Henry Champion. And whereas Henry Champion the grand child of Henry Champion is possessed of a house, and land lying southward of his house which was before possessed by his father Henry Champion and contirmed to him by his grandfather Henry Champion, we do all agree and consent that he shall enjoy the same to him and his heirs forever.

And we do hereby bind ourselves and our heirs to abide by and stand to this agreement in a bond of £40, that is to say that the party or parties not acquiescing in and being satisfied with the share or share according as is above expressed shall forfeit and pay £40 in silver money to the parties which do abide by and perform this agreement.





This meager sketch is all that has been recovered of one whose life however obscure has an interest for his posterity. He was not of base degree, but of independent if not gentle condition; and had left the green homes of old England and her pleasant firesides to war with fierce wild beasts and the still fiercer Pequots, exacting a hard and seauty subsistence from the soil which he had found covered with "a howling wilderness."

At a Probate Court held at New London, Aug. 8, 1706, administration is granted Mrs. Susanna Champion. "The names and ages of ye children of Henry Champion, deceased," being also stated. The widow to have one third of the real property during her life, and one half of the movable property forever; to the eldest son a double portion; to the others equal shares.

"The last will and testyment of Thomas Champoyn of Lyme being sick butt of perfect memore; and right in his mind declares his bodey to be buried—first I bequieth my souell to God that gave itt and hereby my bodily goeds that God hath given me I dispose of them as followeth; first all my lands to be evenly divided between my two sons Thomas and Henry when they come of age, my wife is to have her thirds of it during her widow hood, she appointed administratrix and my two loving nighboors John Lay and Francis Smith to be over seers to my said wife.

[•] Wolston Brockway was one of the earliest settlers in Lyme; his wife was the daughter of William Brazes of Boston and Lyme, and widow of John Harris, of Boston. On 16 May 1711 Wolston Brockway conveys certain personan property, in the event of his own and his wife's death, "to my daughter Hannah Wade," who was the wife of John Wade, of Lyme; the anter-imputal agreement of 17 Jan. 1703-6 being acknowledged of Feb. 1705-6 by John Wade and Hannah his wife. They apparently had no children, as his will made 25 June 1722, proved 24 Apr. 1728, names his wife Hamath, and gives "to my daughter Flizabeth Champion" (see No. 90 all his household goods and sheep. His inventory which mentions no land shews a personal colute of \$23-15.



Wolston Brockway, Sen', and Richard Harris made oath as to their signatures before William Ely, Justice, on May 2nd, Thomas Anderson on May 7th.

"An Inventory of Thomas Champions Estatt aprised as Cach" was taken by Thomas Anderson, John Lay and Francis Smith, and presented 29 May 1705. It mentions: "Dwelling house and 5 acres and small orchard: 15 acres and small orchard adjoining upon it on the North side of Duck River: 4 acres of plow land lying over Black Halle; 7 acres of meadow on the Island commonly called Great Island: 1 yoke of oxon; 4 yerould stears; 3 Cowes: 3 thre yeroulds: 1 yearlling: 1 tow yere ould: 1 horse; 32 sheep and lambs; 3 swine; 3 small swine; mirrors; fether bed and the bed stead curtains and all necessary covering and furniture: spining wheel; warming pan: 2 books; kitchen ware; farming utensils: gun and cutlass," etc., in all amounting to £332—17:—94."

"The names and ages of y" children of Thomas Champion" are also stated in the inventory. The widow appeared in New London 7 June 1705.

The murriage of Deborah Champion, daughter of ——— Champion and Samuel Mather, LJan. 1711-2, is recorded at Lynne, but no record of the birth of any daughter of the Champions who would correspond to her has been found. [See "Mother Pedigree," N. Eng. Hist. fon. Reg., vi. 31.] Since Samuel Mather was born 23 Jan. 1883, it would seem that Deborah could not have been adarghter of the Settler. It is also improbable that she was Deborah 65, vi. who would have been that little over lifteen years of are at the date of the marriage and fourteen years younger than her husband, and is recorded to have been married to Ebenezer Johnson in 1718. Henry Champion was appointed Ensign of the South Company of Lyme on Oct. 12, 1732, and was promoted Captain on May 9, 1734. He inherited the lands of his grandfather, the Settler, and resided in Lyme where he was prominently identified with town affairs.

"To Henry Champean, Junior, a parcel of land of upland and meadow, the upland containing 5½ acres, and the neadow 3½ acres, lying in Lyme in that part commonly called the planting field, bounded East by highway leading to Black Hall River, South by the land of John Robbins, deceased, west by the neadow of Isaac Waterus and a creek, North by a highway leading to the said Waterus' meadow, recorded 17 Nov. 1704."

He and his wife lie buried in the old burying-ground, where their grave stones are still standing.

northward runs in that direction eighty rods and then again castward, the other runs first south and then eastward. His farm buildings lay around his house on the hill which slopes

gently down to the north and east.

Gen. Epaphroditus Champion (334), his grandson, described him as "a man of more than medium height, square and compactly built, all his joints seemed to be double, and he was possessed of great strength. His face was handsome, his eves dark and his complexion florid. I have repeatedly seen him dive head-foremost from the mast head of a sloop into the river. He was a man of good courage, but he was once thoroughly frightened. He had been on a journey and was returning home late at night. The road led through a forest for many miles. He had not rode far in the woods when he heard a noise, as of wings flapping, in the road behind him. He looked around, and sure enough he saw there in the dim light two white wings flapping and following him along the road. He stopped his horse and the motion of the wings ceased, and they themselves disappeared. He then went on, but presently he heard the same sounds and saw the wings following him, he put his horse into a quick trot, then into a canter, and finally upon the full run, but go at what pace he would the mysterious wings still pursued at equal distance. In utter desperation he at length drew in his horse and then the wings came on more slowly. Thus through the whole of his long night-ride these white bodiless wings followed him with their ceaseless flap-flap-flap. At last, in great terror, he reached his own house, and in the light of a candle, the object of his dread was revealed—a dark-colored hound with long white ears that had lost its master and followed him."

Henry Champion's will is dated June 29th, 1764, and was probated at Colchester February 7th, 1780. In it he mentions his wife Mehitabel; his son Ebenezer to have the use of 70 acres of land in Millington, his sons Henry and Judah; his daughters Mary Mason and Mehitable Deming; and grand daughter Elizabeth Brainard; his son Israel to be executor.

In a small burying-ground about 200 rods north of the old town house are three plain tombstones with the following inscriptions:

Henry Champion was appointed Lieutenant of the South Company of Lyme on May 9, 1765, and was promoted Captain on the "Second Thursday in October 1771." He resided in that part of Lyme known as Flat Rock Hill. He and his wife lie buried in Lyme burying-ground.

Roswell Champion was elected a captain in the Thirty-third regiment in 1796, and again in 1794; and continued to be prominent in military circles all his life. He lived in Four Mile River (South Lyme) where he was a large land owner.

His death was a tragic one. He had been to New London and was returning home on horseback. As he crossed the bridge at the river, the toll-keeper tried to persuade him from continuing further that night, as there was a gale blowing and a high tide on the bar. Disregarding the warning Captain Champion rode on, until his horse blinded with the spray and confused by the storm missed his footing in the darkness and fell with its rider into the channel. Next morning the family were alarmed by finding the Captain's horse standing riderless at the gate. On perceiving that he was noticed the intelligent animal started off and led the anxious family and friends to the spot where his master, left by the outgoing tide, lay half buried in the sand—drowned almost in sight of the lights in his own windows.

Captain Roswell and his wife lie buried in the South Lyme Station burying-ground. Their gravestones bear the following inscriptions:





Robert Miller Champion prepared for college at the Bacon Academy in Colchester. His teachers were wont to say that he learned readily, recited his lessons well, and took all the prizes that were offered. At Commencement in 1843 he passed his entrance examinations to Yale College and was admitted a member of the Class of 1847. He remained with the class during Freshman and Sophomore years, but in the summer of 1845 his friends persuaded him to leave college and enter the house of Cowperthwait and Company, a well-known publishing concern in the city of Philadelphia. As agent for this firm he was occupied for two years in canvassing central Pennsylvania and Missouri between the Missouri and Osage Rivers. Later he travelled through the principal cities in the United States until the outbreak of the Civil War, when he returned to the old homestead in South Lyme where he has since continued to reside.

Joshua Champion removed with his family from Connecticut to the State of New York soon after the close of the Revolution. He first settled in the lower part of Columbia County in what was then called Nobletown (now Austerlitz). Not liking it there, he came further up the country to the town of Nassau. Here he opened a tavern and continued in that business about two years, when he removed to North Chatham, where he and his wife subsequently died.

Their grave-stones are to be seen in the Champion lot in the North Chatham burying-ground surrounded by those of many of their descendants.

Rev. Job Champion resided for many years on his farm three-quarters of a mile northeast of North Chatham. He preached in that village from 1798 until 1816, when he removed to Clifton Park, Saratoga County, where he was actively engaged in the ministry until a short time before his death. He was a preacher of the gospel for nearly seventy years and was instrumental in building up many churches, but never would consent to receive any renumeration for his ministerial services. When he married a couple, whatever the groom gave him as a fee he would quietly hand over to the bride, telling her to be sure and buy a nice family bible.

In early life he lived in a community where the only church, except his own Baptist church, was the Dutch Reformed church. The pastor of the latter was a Hollander, educated and ordained in the Old Country, and very tenacious of his fees for every kind of service. This made the poor people especially look to Elder Champion for attention. He would often be called to attend a funeral when in the midst of his most pressing farm-work, and has been known to leave his partly loaded wagon in the hay-field, turn out one horse and saddle the other, and ride several miles to bury the dead, after which he would return home and draw in his hay by moonlight.

Elder Champion, although never drawing a salary, always had sufficient means to support his large family, and something besides to aid a good cause or assist an unfortunate fellow. In his old age he lived on a small farm of sixty acres in the western part of the town of Clifton Park, Saratoga County, N. Y. He had originally bought three hundred and twenty acres of land there and divided them among his sons, so as to keep his family together. From his house he could see a number of the



country seats of the wealthy summer visitors, as well as the dwellings of two or three of those shiftless families who always look to their neighbors for help when times are hard. In the winter of 1837, after one of these had been to the Elder several times with a bag for potatoes, flour and meat, the Elder said to him: "I think it is time for you to go somewhere else. There are others who are worth five times as much as I. Have you been to them?" "No." "Well, why not?" The fellow looked down, pulled at the leg of his breeches, and finally said: "I might get something, and I might not, but here I'm sure." "Give me your bag," said the Elder, and it was filled as usual. Dr. Seth Higgins, the wit of Clifton Park, used to say that he knew only one thing against Elder Champion; he never had an enemy-every one spoke well of him. He lies buried beside his four daughters and eldest son in the family lot in the cemetery of the First Baptist Church in Clifton Park.

Joel Champion served throughout the Revolution and was honorably discharged at its close. When still a young man he removed with his parents to the State of New York and settled in North Chatham. He and his brother owned two fertile and pleasantly-situated farms of one hundred and sixty acres each,



opposite each other, and about three-quarters of a mile northeast of the village. He was a Justice of the Peace and Deacon of the Baptist church for many years.

He lived having the respect of all who knew him. In the church, with which he was identified for over fifty years, he rendered himself an ornament to religion by his untiring zeal and kind and affectionate concern for the advancement of Christianity. In his death, the church has lost one of the chici promoters of its interests, society one of its kindliest members, and his relatives a wise counsellor and an affectionate father.



Rev. Job Hiram Champion, A.M., worked on his father's farm and studied in the evenings until he was sixteen years of age, when he began teaching school. He soon entered Union College from which he was graduated with the first grade in 1852, being a member of the Phi Beta Kappa Fraternity. Immediately after graduation he was invited to become the pastor of a church in Hyde Park on the Hudson. On May 4, 1853, he was admitted to the New York Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and was placed in charge of the church in Tyringham, Mass. From 1854 to 1855 he was pastor in Falls Village, Conn.; 1856-57, Charlotteville, N. Y.; 1858, Windham, N. Y.; 1859-60, Kiskatom, N. Y.; 1861, Andes and Boyina, N. Y. In 1862 he enlisted in the Union Army as First Lieutenant of the Eighth Independent New York Battery. He served in the army two years; taking part in two campaigns, during which he was distinguished for his courage at the front, having a horse shot under him at the battle of Fair Oaks. While in the army he did a great amount of chaplain-duty, and was finally asked unanimously by the 179th Regiment Pennsylvania Infantry to muster as their chaplain. Mr. Champion accepted and conscientiously performed the duties of that office. While on duty at Yorktown, Va., in the early part of 1863, he was editor and chief contributor to the Cavalier, a weekly Union newspaper, and conducted the paper in so masterly a manner that it became influential and profitable. At the same time he never omitted any military duty.



On his return from the army Mr. Champion again took up his pastoral duties, and from 1864 to 1865 acted as pastor at Garrison's, N. Y.; 1866-68, Bedford, N. Y.; 1869-70, Mahopae, N. Y.; 1871-72, North Hills-lale, N. Y., and North Egremont, Mass.; 1873-75, Highland Mills, N. Y.; 1876-78, New Windsor, N. Y., and Salisbury Mills, N. Y.; 1879-81, Glasco, N. Y.; 1882-84, Durham, N. Y.; 1885-87, Dormansville, N. Y. In 1888 he was appointed to the church in Bellvale, a village in the town of Warwick, N. Y., his present residence.

Mr. Champion is the only one of the seventeen young preachers who joined the New York Conference in 1853 who is actively engaged in his ministerial duties. He still preaches three times each Sunday, and does a large amount of pastoral and literary work. He is the author of a number of poems and delivers several lectures every year. He is, perhaps, in as great demand in military matters as anywhere, constantly receiving ealls for Decoration Day addresses, regimental reunions, dedications of memorial halls, etc. At the first public meeting of the New York Conference Veteran Association, April 2, 1889, of which he was Vice-Commander, Mr. Champion was called upon to make the first speech "Reminiscences of Army Life") for the association in connection with Generals Howard and Sherman.

In speaking of his grandfather's descendants, Mr. Champion says: "I never knew or heard of any descendant of Rev. Job Champion that drank ardent spirits, used profane language, or was not able and did not pay his debts promptly; and not many of them ever touched tobacco."







13. Ezra Champion (Joshua[†], Henry[‡], Henry[‡]), born 21 February 1730, in Lyme, Conn.; died 15 March 1776, in Lyme; married in Lyme, 24 October 1752, Mary Bump, who married, second, Asael Rowland, and died 11 March 1826. aged 93 years.

Ezra Champion resided at Four Mile River, now South Lyme, near the East Lyme line. He was master and owner of a coasting vessel. His inventory taken April 2d, offered April 9th, 1776, at New London, shows an estate of £644-3°-3d. "Land lying west of the road leading to Samuel Marvin's, called the 'Scovil Lot,' and land adjoining, 65 acres;" also house, barn and mill, 14 acres, and land bought of his brother Jasper Champion.

"9 May 1776, at a meeting of the General Assembly held in Hartford. Upon the memorial of Jasper Champin of Lyme, shewing that said memorialist sold and conveyed by deed to his brother Ezra Champin of Lyme, deceas'd, about eighty acres of land in said Lyme, for the sum of two hundred and twenty pounds; that part of the purchase money was paid; that said Ezra having involved his estate, &c., he on his death bed agreed with said memorialist to reconvey said land, but before a proper deed could be executed for that purpose the said Ezra died: said memorialist praying that some suitable person might be appointed and impowered to execute a deed of reconveyance of said land upon his, the said memorialist, paving back the money and remaining securities given for the purpose of the same, &c., according to the agreement aforesaid, as per memorial on file: Resolved by this assembly, that the said Mary Champin and the said Stephen Champin, the administrators on the estate of the said Ezra Champin, deceased, be and they are hereby appointed and impowered to make a deed of convevance to said memorialist of the land contained in said deed from said memorialist to said Ezra, deceased, as therein bounded and described, upon his, the said memorialist, paying back the money and remaining securities given for the purchase of the land; and that such deed so made and executed shall be good and effective to secure the



title to said land to the said memorialist, his heirs, &c., as though the same had been bona fide made by the said Ezra before his death."

Ezra Champion and his wife lie buried in the East Lyme burying-ground.

Stephen Champion was a miller by trade, and in company with his brother Reuben owned a mill at Four Mile River in Lyme. On October 20, 1779, she sailed from Philadelphia for France. Being dismasted in a storm on November 7th, she was obliged to put into Martinique, W. I., which she reached on December 18th. After retitting she again put to sea, but on June 22, 1781, was captured off the Capes of Virginia by a British seventy-four and with her crew taken into Charleston, S. C., then in the enemy's possession.

Dan Champion soon after his marriage removed from Connecticut to Chatham, N. Y. He lived in a log hut several years, and then built the house which was pulled down in 1830 by his son Joel to make room for the one now standing. 

John Champion at the age of twelve years entered the American Army as a teamster, he being too young to carry a musket as a soldier, and served in this capacity until the close of the Revolution. At the age of twenty-two he emigrated to "York State" and settled in what was at that time the town of Worcester and subsequently the town of Decatur, Otsego County. He bought a farm on what is known as Elliot Hill. but after paying for his land and clearing a large part of it he found out that he had been swindled and that he had purchased his land of a man who had held no title to it. In consequence of this he lost his farm, receiving nothing for his improvements. It was while living here for a period of nearly tenyears, that he suffered all the privations and hardships of a pioneer life. The country was one dense wilderness from Schoharie to Oswego, except a few settlements scattered at intervals along the Susquehanna and at Cherry Valley. There were no mills where the pioneers could get their grinding done; the nearest was at Sharon, and the next was at Central Bridge which was twenty miles distant. He made several journeys on foot to the latter place to mill, with half a bushel of corn on

his back. He would start before daylight, so as to be able to be back by the following night. Part of the way there was no road, but blazed trees indicated the path through the forest by which the hardy pioneer found his way, often followed by a pack of howling wolves.

After losing his farm Mr. Champion moved to what is known as McCarthy's Corners in Decatur, where he bought another tract of land of about 150 acres, and soon had cleared 40 acres by burning the timber. He erected a potashery, and as potash brought a large price at that time he did well at the business and succeeded in paying for his land a second time-about \$400. The market for potash was Albany; whither it had to be lauled over the hills in ox-teams on roads cut through the woods until the valley of the Cobbleskill Creek was reached, from which point better roads led to Albany. The journey usually occupied a week or ten days, and upon such occasions the settlers would combine, so that those who went with a load of potash might bring back a supply of groceries and other articles.

John Champion sold his claim at McCarthy's Corners about 1805 and moved to what is called "Calcutta Street" near East Worcester. The neighborhood was all a dense forest, but he cleared a spot large enough for his purpose and built a log hut. In 1808, his family then being quite large, and having offers of help from the settlers, he commenced to build a grist-mill, which he completed in a little over a year. It was the first grist-mill built in East Worcester. To get the required fall water was diverted from the creek half a mile from the millsite and a ditch was dug through the woods to a small swamp about half way to the mill. There a deep wheel pit was dug near the bank, and a hollow log conveyed the water to the overshot wheel. The mill-frame was three stories high and made of the heaviest timber, so that the machinery would not shake it to pieces. As elevators to carry grain or meal were unknown, the mill stones were raised above the bolts, so that the meal could run from the stones into them. All the wheels were of wood, with wooden cogs. The belts were made of untanned hides. In 1812 he pulled down the old log-but and built a



frame house near by in which he and his descendants lived for over sixty years.

It was while running the grist-mill that he conceived the idea of publishing his "Comments" on the Book of Revelation, beginning at the 4th chapter, and harmonizing it with the ancient prophecies. While tending mill his bible was near by on a table, and while the grist was grinding he was studying and writing, or if he became tired he would lie down on the mill-curb to rest or sleep. Thus he worked or studied many times during the day or night as he found the opportunity. He was a man of more than ordinary intellect, and, had he been possessed of a classical education, would have been an author of remarkable power. During this period he prepared his "Comparison of the prophesies with the revelations and an application of St. John's Visions to the great transactions in Europe and America," which he published at Cooperstown, N. Y., in 1823.

In 1820 he left the mill in care of his sons. Moses and John and went down to what was then called the "Corners," now East Worcester, and by arrangement with his son Aaron came into possession of the farm. With the help of his sons he built a carding-machine and clothing works, digging a canal a quarter of a mile long in the side of the hill, a part of the way through solid rock. It was a great undertaking for his limited means; but with him there was no such thing as failure in anything he undertook, and he accomplished his project and established a business which was carried on successfully for a number of years.

A Methodist society had been formed in East Worcester, mainly through the influence of Mrs. Champion. Her husband became a warm and enthusiastic member, and occupied the position of local preacher. He proclaimed especially against Sabbath-breaking, by which he provoked the ire of such as were wont to shoulder the rifle and pass their Sundays in hunting. Now it so happened that the time for the last installment on his farm was near at hand, and according to contract the final payment was to be made in potash which was to be delivered on a particular day. He had nearly all the petash ready on a certain Saturday night, except one lot, the boiling of which of necessity must go over to Monday. Sunday morn-



ing he went to his ashery and saw there would not be lye enough for the required work unless the leaches were filled with water; according he pulled out the plug from the conductor and let in sufficient water. He then took his family to meeting. The error of his ways was soon discovered, and on being threatened with expulsion by the ruling elders unless he confessed, he replied; "No sirs, no! I have no confessions to make to you, and I will not lie before my God to belong to any church, for I should do the same thing again did the circumstances require it," and ordered his name stricken from the roll of membership.

The building of the church edifice was mainly due to Aaron and James Champion. It was erected previous to 1839, and was a heavy tax on a few persons. The committee called on John Champion for aid; he promised it if they would grant him the privilege of preaching the first sermon in it after its completion. This was readily assented to. At the deducation, after the preliminary exercises had taken place and all were waiting for the sermon from the presiding elder, Uncle John left his seat and started for the pulpit. All eves were turned on the old grav-haired veteran, and those in the pulpit seemed to he sitate not knowing what was about to occur. On reaching the altar, he addressed the ministers and related in a clear voice the contract made, and declared that he was ready to talfil the last of the bargain on his part. The ministers stood aside; the old gentleman took his text, and for twenty minutes addressed the crowded house in a manner never before or since known. "It almost seemed as if St. John the Apostle was speaking in his own flesh and blood." Having finished his remarks, he thanked all concerned, walked back to his seat, and the exercises proceeded.

John Champion was truly a remarkable man. He and his sons were the founders of East Worcester, and the many buildings which they erected, including the mill and its power, now one of the most desirable water privileges in Central New York, remain as monuments to their enterprising spirit.

[•] Reuben Champion was a schoolmaster and justice in Worcester, N. Y., until 1889, when he caught the "Western fever" and camprated to Warrenton, Mo, soon after its settlement. He opened a school there, and was appointed Justice of the Peace of Elkhorn township at the February term, 1842, to fill a vacancy. He was elected to the same once on the first Monday in August following and held that position until his death. His was the second burnal which had occurred in the city burying-ground. A fellow townsmen says of him: "It is with pleasure that I state an honester man than my triend Rouben Champion, Esq., never imprinted footstep on the west side of the Mississippi River. 



John Marvin Champion, named after his maternal grandmother's family, studied surgery in his youth, and was drafted for the War of 1812; but on account of his young family he accepted a volunteer substitute and in a few days returned to



his home in Starkville, N. Y. He then learned the trade of a millwright, which he followed until 1848. He was an excellent workman, and many mills are still standing as monuments of his skill. From the time of his marriage until the summer of 1830 he resided in Starkville, with the exception of a few months in 1824 which he passed in Paine's Hollow, N. Y. In 1830 he removed to Litchfield, N. Y., where he resided until 1832, when he removed to Winfield, and in 1837 to Columbia. in the same state, where he resided eleven years. In 1848 he emigrated with his family to Ohio, and settled in the township of Amboy. In the spring of 1852 he set out with a party of pioneers for California. All the horses died on the way, except one which was given to him to ride. Dan Champion went with the New York State Militia when it was summoned in May, 1813, to defend Sackett's Harbor, and took part in the engagement in which the British, although victorious at first, were finally routed and driven to their boats. He was an enterprising and prosperous young man, and at his death, which occurred after a few days' illness, left property consisting of a dwelling house, store, sawmill and several acres of land. Various creditors, with his partner, took advantage of the unsettled state of his affairs; and the widow was surprised to find herself and young children left with nothing but a garden and orchard and the land on which the dwelling house stood. Her two elder sons, however, beginning with a small capital, built a cooper shop and began cabinetmaking, and soon did a flourishing business.



Aaron Champion was an enterprising man like his father. About the year 1818, he and his brother Reuben bought the farm then occupied by Andrew Little, and soon after Aaron opened the first tavern in East Worcester. His hotel sign was made by raising two poles connected by a cross-bar, to which was suspended a board, three feet by four, on which was painted an enormous anaconda, with the words "A Champion's Inn." This signboard was noted for hundreds of miles, and the hotel was called the "Snake Tavern" to distinguish it from others on the Susquehanna Valley turnpike. It was while the Champions owned the tavern, and mainly through the courage of John Champion, Senior, that a notorious band of horse-thieves, known as "Convackers," which had infested Schoharie, Delaware and Otsego Counties, was broken up and its leaders lodged in jail. Some who had escaped capture returned to revenge themselves on John Champion and wreck the tavern, but finding a number of his sons present, the thieves started for their horses. They were pursued and arrested, and being taken before Justice Reuben Champion received no favor at his hands. On one occasion a member of the band was brought before Judge Reuben, who to prevent his escaping locked the prisoner to one of his own legs, and even went to bed with him that night.

Aaron Champion was commissioned lieutenant in the Seventh Regiment Infantry, Capt. Bela Johnson, in 1823. His brothers were members of the same company, and all had been prepared to serve in the War of 1812, but were not drafted. Keeping a tavern not being a congenial business to Aaron, he went back to the mill in 1826. He built a shop just below the old mill and set up a turning lathe. Here he turned many articles and made machinery for the carding works. He erected a dwelling on the corner of the road lead-



ing to Aegerine Hill, in which he resided until he removed to Bloomville, where he passed the rest of his life.



John Champion in time came into possession of the old mill and removed it to East Worcester, where he rebuilt it and constructed a dam across the creek. In 1837 he erected a store on the northwest corner of the roads, and a year later built a large house just east of the present grist-mill, in which he, his brother Joshua, his two unmarried sisters and their father resided. He continued in the milling business until his health failed, when he bought a farm a mile below East Worcester Village, with the care of which he was occupied as long as he was able to work. He then removed to Calcutta, about one and a half miles above the village, where he resided at his death. Mr. Champion was a well-read man, kind in his family, and popular with his neighbors. In politics he was strongly republican.



James Arminius Champion when he came into possession of the old mill put in a clover-mill, but it soon took fire and burned to the ground. He then built the present woolen factory, and also erected a dwelling on the knoll opposite. His eldest son was drowned in the mill-race, and he himself was severely injured in the machinery of his factory. In 1861 he sold the factory to his brother Ezra, and removed with his family to Cedar Rapids, Iowa; but after remaining there two years he moved to Waubeek, Linn County, where he was engaged in farming until 1882. On February 22d of that year his wife fell and broke her knee. It was eighteen hours before a physician could reach her, and during that time she bore her suffering with remarkable fortitude. Mr. Champion rented out his farm, and her daughters returned home and devoted their whole time to nursing her; but the shock occasioned by the fall, combined with a previous delicate state of health, caused her death in four months. Throughout her long illness her manner was that of a resigned and Christian woman.

Dan Champion, losing his father when he was quite young, was at an early age thrown upon his own exertions for support. He worked at his trade of piano and organ making until 1884, when he was eaught in the machinery and permanently disabled. Over fifty years before he had begun his studies in physical science, and after his accident he determined to prepare his manuscript for publication. In 1884 appeared the first edition of "Problem and Science of Light and Heat, Electro-Magnetic Phenomena, Pneumatics, etc., by Dan Champion, Professor of Physical Science." The view of the subject therein contained differs radically from the generally accepted theories of scientists. The edition of one thousand copies appeared as a small pamphlet, simply as an experiment. It sold readily, however, and a second edition of three thousand copies was issued in 1886. The third edition, revised and enlarged, appeared in December, 1889, and is 12mo in size and contains 183 pages, the subject being treated in twelve "Lectures."

Ezra Abbot Champion at the age of seventeen obtained his minority, and the monotony of his younger years was varied by trips to Boston with loads of farm produce—those being the days before railroads. In 1849 he purchased the farm of 230 acres where he at present resides. He devotes his attention



to lumbering, agriculture, merino sheep and stock raising and dairying; and owns a herd of choice Jersey cows.

The construction of the Woodstock Railroad was begun in 1862, and ground was first broken on the farm of Mr. Champion. The opening ceremonies were also held on that spot, President Washburn, since Governor of Vermont, making the address. The railroad extends two hundred rods through the Champion farm, and is a great accommodation, as trains stop almost at Mr. Champion's door. The station is known as "Champion's Crossing," and is much used during the summer months. His son has a farm of 372 acres adjoining his, and both farms have sugar orchards of considerable size.

Simon Bolivar Champion, so named by his uncle Reuben who had just finished reading the life of the famous South American, was the first grandson born to the East Worcester Champions. He attended the district school until September 7, 1840, when he went to Cooperstown, N. Y., to learn the printer's trade. He served a six-year apprenticeship with the Hon, John H. Prentiss in the Freeman's Journal office, and then acted as foreman in the same office for nine months. In the fall of 1847 he went to Prattsville, Greene County, and became a partner with John L. Hackstaff in the publication of the Prattsville Advocate, a Democratic newspaper. Here Mr. Champion first introduced the local department under the caption of "Home Matters," an example soon imitated by nearly every country paper. He claims the pioneership of that progressive kind of journalism. For nearly two years he labored industriously with the pen: then his health began to give way. and his physician ordered him to seek higher land and cease close indoor work. Accordingly, in 1849, he went to Bloomville, Delaware County, a village of only two hundred inhabitants, where he and his father bought a dwelling house, gristmill and saw-mill. While attending to the mill be kept his pen busy as correspondent for several papers, especially the Albany Argus, which he had read all his life. He was also often called to assist the printers in Delhi, the county seat, which was only eight miles distant.



In the spring of 1851 he was called to Schoharie, by W. II. Gallup of the Republican, who desired a vacation and wanted a man to take charge of the paper. Young Champion introduced a local department and reported a noted arson case, which gave new life to the paper; and induced the proprietor on his return to buy new type for it. While dumping the cases of old type Champion suggested buying some of it to take home. Mr. Gallup told him to take what he wanted, and he made up a small font of only a dozen pounds. Soon after his return to Bloomville, a neighbor desired some labels printed. Champion thought of the old type, made cases, obtained a quire of printing paper, a piece of composition and a few ounces of ink, made a wooden stick and chase, covered a square block of wood for a press, and began work. One day a squirrel lunt took place, and the next a special election was held for a state senator, to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of Democratic senators on account of Canal troubles.

When making up an account of these happenings for several papers, the thought occurred to him, that he could print the little slips and save using the pen. He succeeded, and mailed the printed slips containing the election returns and an account of the hunt. Next day there was a call for the slips, as he had shown a copy to some friends, so he again started his press of planer and mallet, after adding the returns of two towns, he thought it would look better to have a newspaper caption, so he set up Bloomerille News and took proof. It did not suit, so he changed it to Bloomville Mirror. He gave the copies away. The miniature paper "took like wild fire," and his friends urged him to start a paper; but the printer said he had no capital to buy a press. In about a week he issued another slip containing only local items. Applications for it began to come in by mail; he filled the orders, but as yet no price had been fixed. After several numbers had been issued and about 1000 names entered, he fixed the price at twenty-tive cents a year. Here was a problem. If he commenced taking pay he would have to furnish the paper. He found an old "Ranage" press in the garret of the Prattsville Advocate, which Colonel Pratt gave him; bought a case of old brevier type, and fitted up a room in the mill for an office. Voluntary subscriptions



began to come in and he soon had money enough to buy a few fonts of new type. On July 1, 1851, the law came into effect by which papers were allowed a free circulation in the county where they were published. This did away with paying postage and opened the door of success to the little sheet. It was about the size of a sheet of common note paper, and contained home news and a list of its subscribers, which made it a special favorite with the boys.

After the circulation reached 1000, a Smith hand press was purchased, and as business increased so was the size and price. In 1856 the circulation reached 2000, and an office was erected and a power press put in operation—the first one in Delaware County. The little sheet was well filled with county news and pithy correspondence from all over the country. At the breaking out of the Civil War the Mirror had a voluntary list of 3000 subscribers. In 1870, owing to the daily mail service being reduced to three times a week and there being no railroad or telegraphic communication, and in view of the opening of a railroad from Rondout to Stamford, Mr. Champion sold his property in Bloomville, both of his parents being dead, and in September bought two acres of land in Stamford, creeted an office, and changed the name of his paper to the Stamford Mirror. The Mirror is issued weekly. It has twenty-eight columns, is printed with modern machinery, and has a circulation of 2000 copies.

Mr. Champion is probably the oldest editor in the Empire State. He learned short-hand of Sherman Croswell of the Argus, and has served as editor for over thirty-eight years consecutively on one paper. In 1858 he was unanimously elected a member of the State Assembly, but declined on account of his literary work. On January 31, 1861, he was chosen one of the delegates from the Second Assembly District of Delaware County to the "Peace Convention" at Albany. In 1868 he was Presidential Elector for Delaware and Otsego Congressional Districts. In 1870 he was Democratic candidate for County Treasurer, but although leading his ticket by 400 votes was defeated as was nearly every Democrat at that time. In that year he took the census of Davenport, Meredith and Kortright, He has also acted several times as delegate to various conven-



tions. In Bloomville, where he resided twenty-one years, he was postmaster, school trustee, etc. At Stamford, he has been deputy-postmaster for several years, trustee of the village school, and a member of the Board of Education of Stamford Seminary. He has been High-priest of the Royal Arch Masons and is the present secretary of that order.

John Champion Jaynes, after being engaged in milling in East Worcester, about the year 1851 moved to State Bridge, Oneida Connty, where he bought a farm on which he raised grain and stock. After the partnership was dissolved he went into farming and stock-raising, but two years later he returned to Kappa and engaged in business, conducting it with profit for two years. He then retired from business, and on February 16, 1876, removed to Normal, where he purchased the house in which he resided the rest of his life.

James Jaynes came to Illinois in 1852, and after spending one year just across the line in McLean County, in 1853 settled in Kappa where he was engaged in milling and farming over twenty-five years. Joseph Stewart Champion went with his parents to Schenevus, N. Y., and there enlisted in the 121st Regiment, New



York State Volunteers. He was severely wounded in the siege of Petersburgh, Va., and lay in the City Point (Va.) hospital for several weeks, when he was transferred to Washington, D. C. Soon after his return home he emigrated with his parents to Kappa, Ill.

The following is from the Freeport (Ill.) Bulletin of Sept. 10, 1881:

"Mr. Stewart Champion, residing in Virginia City, Montana Ter., was on August 27th, in the town of Butte, some miles from home, at a steam saw mill, when a fearful explosion took place, the boiler parting near the center; one section of which was thrown a distance of six and the other eight rods. The engineer was instantly killed, and Mr. Champion knocked down and rendered insensible. He received a severe contusion on the left side of his head, which produced a laceration of the tissues; his face was badly scalded, and his left hip bone fractured. Medical aid was immediately procured, but was of no avail. He lingered till Wednesday, August 31st, when death ended his suffering. He leaves a wife and two small children in Virginia City, and a large circle of friends in Kappa to mourn his untimely death. He left Kappa about thirteen years ago, and was the eldest son of Joshua K. Champion of that place. This account finishes the sad fate of a worthy young man."





14. Capt. Jasper Champion (Joshua, Henry, Henry), born 30 July 1737, in Lyme, Conn.; lost at sea in the winter of 1781; married in Lyme, 1 January 1761, Elizabeth Chadwick, of Lyme, who died 18 January 1826, in Waterford, Conn., aged 81 years.

Jasper Champion was a sea captain by occupation. He lived in the eastern part of the town of Lyme, not far from the present East Lyme line. The births of his children are recorded in Lyme. He and his wife lie buried on Durfee Hill, near New London, Conn. His estate included 85 acres of land.**

Sacred to the memory of Capt. Jesper Champion who was lost at sea in the Winter of 1781 aged 43 years. In memory of M^{rs.} Elizabeth relict of Capt. Jesper Champion who died Jany 18, 1826 aged 81.

"William Champion a minor upwards of 14 years chooses George Dorr of Lyme his guardian," at a Court of Probate held in New London October 8, 1791. He became a large farmer in Waterford near New London. He was a well-known man in his neighborhood, and quite a character in his way. At one time he asked a friend of his, a local poet and wit of New London, to write an epitaph which would be suitable for his tombstone. It is said that his request resulted in the composition of the following lines:

> "Beneath this monumental stone Lies half a ton of dust and bone; The world has lost much wit and fun. But * * * * has gained a Champion."

William Sands Champion after pursuing his studies at Plainfield (Conn.) Academy entered a store in Norwich, Conn., as a clerk. He soon removed to New York City, where he was engaged in mercantile pursuits until he became contractor for the supplies of revenue vessels and ship timber for the Navy Yards, in which business he continued up to the time of his death. His widow returned to Westerly in the spring of 1843, and resided there until she came to raide with her eldest son in Rome, N. Y.



John Cross Champion from the time of his father's death until May, 1845, lived with his grandfather Champion in Waterford. He then went to the home of his mother in Westerly, R. I., and attended school until November, 1849, when he entered Plainfield (Conn.) Academy. He ceased attending school in April, 1851, and on the first of the following October sailed from New York in the clipper-ship Comet, as a "boy before the mast." He remained on board this ship for four years, during which time he made a voyage to China, and continued in the merchant marine service until January, 1861.

On August 15, 1861, he received the responsible appointment of Acting-Master, with the rank of Lieutenant in the United States Navy, and the following month was ordered to the Squadron of the Gulf. He accordingly took passage in the frigate *Potomuc*, and on his arrival at Key West, Fla., was ordered to take passage on the steamer *Rhode Island* for the mouth of the Mississippi, where he reported to Commander McKeon on board the frigate *Vingara*. He was in time ordered to the gnuboat *Hantsgille*, Commander Cieero Price,

and joined this vessel off Mobile Bay where he did blockade duty until early in the spring of 1862, when the Huntsville was ordered home to New York for repairs. On his arrival he was ordered to the recruiting-vessel North Carolina, in the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and remained on board of her until the latter part of July, when he was transferred to the newly completed sloop-of-war Adiconduck. She was commanded by Capt. Guest Gausevoork, and sailed from New York on July 26th direct to Nassau. From there she sailed to Newbort News, and after coaling sailed on a roving commission to search for the Rebel steamer Mahama. "Unfortunately the Adirondack, the prettiest sloop-of-war the Government ever owned, ran upon a coral reef near one of the Abaco Islands. at half-past five in the morning, during a dark rain storm, and had to be abandoned." Her erew, consisting of two hundred and fifty officers and men, were compelled to camp out on one of the adjoining islands for about six weeks, when they were taken off by the steamer Canandaigna and carried to Port Royal.

Lieutenant Champion was here transferred to the steamer Paurnee, in which vessel he remained, doing blockade duty at different points from Georgetown, S. C., to Jacksonville, Fla., taking part in the attack on Hilton Head, until he received his honorable discharge on November 27, 1865. He was in Georgetown when Charleston was evacuated, and lay in Warsaw Sound when General Sherman reached the coast after his march from Atlanta to the sea. "The General came on board Admiral Dahlgren's vessel, which lay near us, and was given a shotted salute by the fleet there assembled."

On December 7, 1865, Mr. Champion came to Savannah, Wayne Co., N. Y., and bought out his father-in-law's interest in a patent steam sawing machine that he controlled, and commenced to saw wood for the New York Central Railroad, which business he followed for nearly one year. He then sold out his interest, as the prospect was that coal-burning engines would be introduced as rapidly as possible. On December 1, 1866, he entered the fuel department of the New York Central Railroad as wood inspector, and went to reside in St. Johnsville, N. Y., where he remained until March 19, 1869. On that day



he removed to Rome, Oneida County, where he has since continued to reside, and became wood agent from Albany to Syracuse, and soon after wood and tie agent from Albany to Buffalo. In 1872 the same duties were extended from New York to Buffalo, and five years later were made to include the Harlem Division. In January, 1889, Mr. Champion assumed the important duties of lumber and tie agent over the whole of the company's lines, which in Angust of that year were increased by the addition of the West Shore, Wallkill Valley, and Syracuse, Ontario and New York Railroads.

Charles Perry Champion at the age of fifteen was sent to Plainfield (Conn.) Academy, and later attended a school in Kingston, R. I., but after remaining there one year ill health compelled him to go to Savannah. Ga., for a few months. Returning to his home in Westerly, R. I., he entered the store of his uncle E. W. Babeock, where he remained two years. In February, 1859, he came to New York and entered the house of Townsend, Clinch and Dike, East India importers. He remained with this firm until the death of each of the members, and on January 1, 1880, succeeded to the business and has since continued in it.

Mr. Champion was a member of Company II of the Seventh Regiment of New York, and went to the front when the regiment volunteered for the defence of the Union.

15. Dr. Reuben Chamfon (Stephen's, Henry's, Henry's), born 4 September 1727, in Lyme, Conn.; died 29 March 1777, at Fort Ticonderoga, N. Y.; married in Saybrook, Conn.; 6 February 1755, Lyma Dunk, daughter of Samuel and Sarah (Ingram) Dunk, *born 22 September 1730, in Saybrook. She was married, second, in West Springfiel!, Mass., 1 November 1783, as second wife to Capt. Moses Field, of Long Meadow, Mass., whose son Moses had married Lydia Champion (15.1). She died 1 May 1809, and lies buried in Long Meadow, Capt. Moses Field died 7 March 1815, in Long Meadow, aged 92 years.

Dr. Reuben Champion resided in Saybrook for many years, and there brought up his children. He sold his house in Saybrook and removed with his family to West Springfield, Mass., about the year 1772. At the commencement of the Revolutionary War, leaving his wife and children in that village "as a city of refuge," he himself hastened to join the forces then assembling under General Washington. Dr. Champion continued to act as a surgeon in the Continental Army until he was attacked by a fever, while on duty at Fort Ticonderoga, which soon caused his death.

* The name was soon after changed to Duncan.

"The mark that Rouben Champion puts on his Creatures is a Cross of the Near Ear and three Slits on the Under Side of the off Ear." Recorded 9 Nov. 1763.

On the "9th day in 1755" he sells land in Saybrook, his wife witnessing the deed. See also letter of condolence on the death of Dr. Reuben Champion, written by his father to the widow, on page 36.

On 2 Oct. 153, Reuben Champion buys for 561 "a quarter interest in a certain small shoop burthened about thirty tons or theire abouts now lying at Saybrook." signed by Gideon Buckinghams and Hezekiah Buckingham.

Daniel Denisor sells land in Saybrook to "Rubin Champin" for \$48-8-43, 23 Mar. 1762. Elijah Peck sells him land for \$50, 2 May 1770, and 10 July 1870. Jedidiah Peck sells him land for \$25, 7 July 1772.

Joseph Lathrop, D.D., of the old clarich in West Springfield, it was the custom to visit the families of the parish on set occasions to baptize the children of the household. This ceremony was often accompanied by a sermon, as was the case when Dr. Lathrop, in his pastoral function, visited the Champion homestead in Amostown neighborhood to christen the offspring of the godly Champions."



Dr. Reuben Champion, after a course of study at the academy in Westfield, Mass., entered the office of Doctor Summer of that town. He continued his studies in the Medical Department of Dartmouth College, and later attended a course of lectures in New York City. In 1809 he returned to his native



town and entered upon the active practice of his profession. He continued to reside in West Springfield the rest of his life with the exception of a few months during which he acted as a surgeon at Boston in the War of 1812.

Doctor Champion was prominent in political as well as medical circles. He was Town Clerk of West Springfield from 1813 to 1821 and from 1835 to 1842. He was elected to the State Senate in 1841–2, and was twice (1830–36) a member of the House of Representatives. That he enjoyed the thorough confidence of his fellow citizens is shown by the fact that he was in public office during the whole of his active and useful life. His death occurred but one week before his goldenwedding was to have been celebrated.



Aaron Champion was educated at the academy in Westfield, Mass. At the age of twenty-one he left home to take charge of a school in Orange, N. J., and later of one in Newark, N. J., teaching in the latter place four years. In the autumn of 1817 he came to Savannah, Ga., and obtained the position of clerk in a prominent business house in that city, which he



retained until the great fire of 1819. In January, 1820, he began business for himself on Jefferson Street, and later on Market Square, and led a successful mercantile career until enabled to retire.

Mr. Champion was a director in the Marine Bank for several years, and its president in 1861. He conducted the affairs of the bank so well during the war, that it was one of the few which paid its ante-bellum obligations in full. Mr. Champion was in no active business after the war, but took a deep interest in the welfare of the city; serving on the Board of Aldermen for several years, and acting as chairman of the Finance Committee. His methodical habits, scrupulous regard for his obligations, and promptitude in mercantile transactions, secured for him early in life an enviable reputation for commercial integrity, which was never dimmed by a single act of his long life.

John Newton Champion, so named for the celebrated divine, at an early age entered the service of his older brother Aaron in Savannah, Ga., where he devoted himself with great energy to business, and with a good degree of success. In 1834 he emigrated with his young wife and infant son to Ohio; going by a sailing vessel to New York City, thence journeying to the West by canal, lake, and stage, via Cleveland, to Columbus. The site of this now thriving city was then only a small clearing in the midst of a dense forest, although already designated as the capital of the state.

Mr. Champion at once took a prominent position among the business men of the infant city, and was a heavy stockholder in two large business blocks erected about 1838, an early date for such an undertaking. For many years he conducted successfully an extensive drygoods business, and became possessed of a large amount of real estate, which in later years became very valuable. He and his young wife were leaders in social circles, and as he was an old line Whig their large and elegant residence became an hospitable headquarters during the Harrison campaign. He died of heart disease in Columbus—one of the pioneer merchants of that western capital, and respected by all who knew him.

Mrs. Sarah A. Champion, soon after her arrival at Columbus, began to take an active part in all benevolent enterprises, and was a leading member of the charitable societies in her new home. In her religious belief she was an earnest Unitarian. During the War of the Rebellion much of her time was spent as a ward visitor in relieving the wants of soldiers' families. She also visited the battlefield of Pittsburg Landing just after the battle in company with the Sanitary Commission. She died at the home of her daughter in Columbus, surrounded by her children, lamented by a large circle of friends, and mourned by the poor and lowly whose benefactor she had been for so many years.

Colonel Moseley was born in the old Moseley homestead in Westfield, with which town his family had been prominently identified for over a century. He was commissioned colonel of artillery in the Massachusetts militia in 1831. In the years 1841 and 1842 he served as a representative in the Legislature, and in 1851 he was elected to the State Senate. He was deeply interested in all matters which concerned his native town, and was an earnest advocate of education; acting as chairman of the School Committee, and being also one of the trustees of Westfield Academy. He was a selectman and assessor, and held numerous other local offices. He was an active member of the New England Agricultural Society, and took great interest in the cultivation of his large and valuable farm, especially the growing of choice fruit and forest trees.

Colonel Moseley had many traits of the old English gentleman, and those who knew him at his own fireside could best appreciate his worth. His remains rest in the ancient burying-ground in his native town, where the dust of five generations has found a common abiding place.

Mrs. Silence (Champion) Moseley, if local tradition is to be relied on, was as lovely a bride as ever graced the old church in West Springfield. In 1831 she united with the First Church in Westfield, in which for more than half a century she was a most devoted disciple; her children being early taught the supreme importance of religious worship. As years passed by and the circle of relatives grew larger, the Moseley homestead under the grand old clins opened wider its doors with bounteous greeting for all. But in the midst of her cares and duties as wife and mother, Mrs. Moseley never neglected the cultiva-



tion of her plot of old-fashioned flowers, and no one could win her more thoroughly than by admiring her pets with her. She naturally loved the companionship of those who could converse with her on the customs and happenings of bygone days, but she was interested nevertheless in the affairs of the day, and her kindly heart delighted in the youth of her acquaintance. Her death occurred but one day before her eighty-sixth birthday was to have been celebrated.



Reuben Ely Champion was left fatherless at the age of thirteen, and on him with his widowed mother fell much of the care of the young family. He began his business career as clerk in a grocery store and later held the same position in a bookstore. He was in the service of the Columbus and Xenia Railroad Company for some time, and in June, 1855, embarked in the coal trade in Columbus, Ohio. He became interested in the Santa Rita Silver Mining Company, and on June 26, 1858, started with a party for the company's mines in Arizona. After a weari-ome journey by wagon across Texas, from Galveston and Matagorda Bay, they reached the Mission of Tumacaccara near Tubec, Arizona, in January, 1859. An attempt was made to work the rich mines of the company, but the fierce Apaches prevented communication with the neighboring Mexican State of Sonora, which was the only source of supplies. Discouraged by sickness, searcity of supplies, and constant watchfulness against Indian surprises, most of the party returned to "the States" by the overland stage, in May, 1859, after a continuous journey of seventeen days. He then continued in the coal business in Columbus until the breaking out of the Civil War in April, 1861.

Mr. Champion and his brother John had been for several years active members of the "State Fencibles," a well-known



military company of Columbus. This company volunteered for the first three months of service, becoming Company C. Second Regiment Ohio Volunteer Infantry. The company afterwards furnished seventy-five officers and enlisted men for the United States service, which was a better record in proportion to numbers than even the famous Seventh Regiment of New York. Mr. Champion was the first quartermaster appointed in Ohio, and entered into service in April, 1861, on the day that the President issued his proclamation. He assisted in the organization of the First and Second Regiments Ohio Volunteer Infantry, and served as quartermaster at Camps Jackson and Chase at Columbus. On June 15, 1861, he was appointed Captain and Quartermaster on the staff of Brigadier General C. W. Hill who took command of the large territory extending from Wheeling to Parkersburgh, in West Virginia. Captain Champion served with credit in this campaign, having charge of large amounts of stores at Grafton and Oakland, at a time when sagacious care and system were so much needed for the preservation of supplies for the Union troops. During this summer, and in this region, occurred the battle of Laurel Hill and those brilliant affairs that first brought General McClellan into public notice.

At the close of the war Mr. Champion became extensively engaged as a commission merchant at New Orleans, and was afterwards a cotton factor in that city and Mobile. In 1869 he returned to the North and settled down for a time in Columbus, his former home. In September, 1871, he removed to Cincinnati, Ohio, where he was Assistant Superintendent of the Little Miami Railroad for many years. He is at present the Secretary of the Ohio Mechanics Institute in Cincinnati. They have had no children.

On June 18, 1862, he was appointed by Governor Tod Adjutant of the 88th Regiment Ohio Volunteer Infantry, which command was stationed for a time at Camp Chase, Ohio, and afterward at Frankfort and Lexington, Ky. 





It is entirely superfluous for me to enlarge upon his merits or recite the catalogue of his virtues. His were a life and character which won their own commendation. You recall at once the moment you think of him, his sterling qualities—unobtrusive, kind, genial, prompt, reliable,—a man of integrity, and, what is more, a man of true charity."







19. Memitable Champion (Henry), Thomas, Henry), born 25 February 1720, in East Haddam, Conn.; died aged 97 years in Litchfield, Conn.; was married in Lyme, Conn., 18 December 1740, to David Demise, son of Rev. David and Mariah Deming (Brigham), born 24 August 1709, in Lyme; died 30 May 1781, in Lyme, and lies buried on Church Hill.

Mr. Deming was a small man, with blue eyes, sandy hair and light complexion, who took the world easily and allowed his wife to manage the household affairs. When a boy he attended the funeral of his grandfather, which was performed with much ceremony. He had a thumb-ring given to him at that time, which was retained in the family until lost by his granddaughter. Mary Marvin, while she was at boarding school in Litchfield, Conn. The ring was of gold, engraved with a death's-head and the motto: "Prepared be to die like me."

Mrs. Mehitable (Champion) Deming was a beautiful woman, and it is from her that the Demings inherit their black eyes and energy of character.

^{*}Rev. David Deming, son of David and Mary Deming, and grandson of John Deming (who was among the chief settlers of Wethersfield, repeatedly represented that town between 1649 and 1061, and is named in the Charter of Connecticut granted April 20, 1962) and Honour (Treat) Deming, was b. 20 July 1681, in Wethersfield, Coun., and was graduated from Harvard College in 1709. He m. 48 Nov. 1708, Maria Brigham or Bridgham as it was sometimes spelled), of Boston, who d. in Dec. 1760, aged 85. "Mr. Brigham bought a township within half a day's ride of Boston, and dying left one son, aged 18, and a daughter Mariah. The rights to this township were lost. Mrs. Deming, however, received by her father's will £1500 on arriving at the age of eighteen." Mr. Deming was the first minister of Medway, Mass., but on account of his wife's disliking to reside in the vicinity of Boston, probably through mortified pride, he resigned his pastorate and preached in Middletown. "He was a tall, handsome man; his wife was a few years his senior, and wasn't bigger than a pint cup, but as complete a lady as you ever set your eyes on. She had been brought up very delicately in Boston, and though she resided not more than forty rods from her school had a negro to draw her there and back in a land coach." COLONEL HENRY CHAMPION.

20. Col. Henry Champios (Henry), Thomas, Henry), born 19 January 1723, in East Haddam, Conn.; died 23 July 1797, in Westchester (Colchester). Conn.; married, 1st, in East Haddam, 25 December 1746, Deborah Brainard, daughter of Capt. Joshna and Mehitable (Dudley) Brainard, born 20 June 1724, in East Haddam; died 17 March 1789, in Westchester. He married, 2d, in Westchester, 24 November 1791, Mrs. Sarah (Brainard) Lewis, widow of Judah Lewis, and daughter of Stephen and Sasannah (Gates) Brainard, born 30 April 1744, in East Haddam; died 17 January 1818, in Westchester.

Henry Champion entered upon his military career at the age of eighteen, being appointed Ensign of the East Haddam South Company on October 8, 1741, of which he was made Lieutenant on May 10, 1750. On the 5th of March, 1758, a special meeting of the Assembly was called at New Haven to take action on William Pitt's letter to Connecticut. The suggestion was made in the letter that the New England Colonies, together with New York and New Jersey, should raise twenty thousand men to prosecute the war with France. Connecticut had already furnished more than her share of men and treasure during the previous years of the war, but this appeal was answered by a vote to raise five thousand men-one-quarter of the whole number asked for. Henry Champion at once volunteered for service, and was elected captain of a company which was recruiting in his neighborhood. The company left Colchester on June 8th, and marching by way of Hartford, Litchfield, Kinderhook, Greenbush, and Saratoga, joined the main army at Lake George on the 29th. The account of the journey and the campaign which succeeded it will be found in Captain Champion's diary printed in the Appendix. It was in the severe experiences of the French and Indian War that Captain Champion was being trained for the responsible position which he filled throughout the greater conflict which was soon to follow.



Captain Champion arrived home on November 15th, and on March 8, 1759, was elected Captain of the Fifth Company of the Second Regiment of His Majesty's forces, from which he was transferred to the command of the Twelfth or Westchester Company on the second Thursday of May, 1760. On May 14, 1772, he was appointed Major of the Twelfth Regiment Colonial Militia.

On the 26th day of April, 1775, the Assembly appointed "Oliver Wolcott, Henry Champion, Thomas Mumford, Jedediah Strong, Jeremiah Wadsworth, Thomas Howell, Samuel Squire, Amasa Keves and Hezekiah Bissell commissioners to supply all necessary stores and provisions for the troops now to be raised for the defence of the Colony." When General Washington took command of the army in July, 1775, he recommended that Henry Champion, Joseph Trumbull and Jeremiah Wadsworth be made commissaries; Congress accordingly appointed them with full powers to supply the army both as to the purchasing and issuing branches, unrestricted by any regulations of Congress. The troops, therefore, continued to be furnished with provisions until the evacuation of Boston by the British in March, 1776. During the previous October Henry Champion had been promoted from the rank of Lieut. Colonel of the Twelfth Regiment of State Troops to that of Colonel of the Twenty-fifth Regiment which was composed of companies from Colchester and East Haddam.

When the army began to assemble at New York in April, 1776, Colonel Champion was appointed Commissary of the troops, and the main army was supplied almost wholly by him from that time. He also provided for the troops ordered to Rhode Island.**

^{* &}quot;Wednesday, 3d July, 1776. Governor and Council met.

Resolved and ordered. That the committee of inspection for New London and Groton do forthwith remove the horned cattle, sheep and swine from Fisher's Island to the main, leaving necessary working owen, cows sheep and swine, for the use of the families there at their discretion; that they cause them to be appealed by indifferent judicious men, under eath, at their present just value in money; that the amount of such appraisent be paid out of the Colony Treasury to the owner or owners of such stock; and that said committee sell and dispose of said stock at a reasonable price in behalf of the Colony, rendering their account of such sales and how they shall execute this order, to his Honor the Governor, as son as may be; and also advising Colo. Champion, deputy commissary, when they remove such stock, that he may purchase such part of the same as may be fit and proper for the use of the army."



On January 15, 1778, the governor and conneil of safety of Connecticut, judging that the quantity of provisions laid up for use of the Continental Army in that State would fall far short of the required supplies, "and as Col. Henry Champion was considered a gentleman of great judgment, capacity and experience in said business, especially beyond any person in this State, and of most unexceptionable honor and integrity," the board applied to him to undertake the business. Col. Champion was therefore appointed sole Commissary General of of the Eastern Department of the Continental Army by Col. Peter Colt, being re-appointed by the State in April, 1780.

In the spring of 1780, in consequence of the distressed condition of the army, which had wintered at Morristown, General Washington appealed to Governor Trumbull for assistance. The special messenger dispatched to Governor Trumbull brought back the answer that a train would be at once sent forward to the army. Colonel Champion was placed in command of the train, which was largely supplied from his own resources. It reached the Hudson in an astonishingly short time, was ferried across at Newburgh, and delivered into Washington's hands. When the General received these stores, he remarked that "no other State than Connecticut could have furnished them."

In May, 1780, Colonel Champion resigned his commission in the army and returned to his home in Westchester. He had been prominent in politics before he enlisted in the army, and during the Revolution he continued to be regularly elected. He was Deputy from Colchester to the General Assembly in 1761 and from 1765 to 1779, and in 1781, 1783, 1790 to 1792. He was also a deacon of the church in Westchester from 1775 until his death. The services at his funeral were held in the church, Parson Robbins pronouncing the address. He lies buried in the family lot in the burying-ground about a quarter of a mile from Westchester Meeting House.

Col. Henry Champion died July 21, 1797, aged 73 years.

Henry Champion entered the service of the Continental Army at the "Lexington Alarm" and served as an ensign for twenty-two days. On April 26, 1775, he was appointed 2d Lieutenant of the Eighth Company, Second Regiment, and on May 1st was promoted 1st Lieutenant of the same. The regiment was raised at the first call for troops, and in May, 1775; marched to Boston under the command of Gen. Joseph Spencer, and did duty at Roxbury until December 10th, the expiration of its time of service. Lieutenant Champion was one of a detachment of officers and men who were engaged at the battle of Bunker Hill. On January 1, 1776, he was promoted Adjutant on the staff of Col. Samuel Wyllys of the Twenty-second
