## In Memoriam

While in his term of active service, Dr. Augustus Sisk died on February the first, 1955. Dr. Sisk had been a professor at the College since 1938, before which time he had taught in high schools and universities, including fifteen years of service at the University of Tennessee. He received his B.A. degree from Maryville in 1917, his M.A. degree from the University of Kentucky and his Ph.D. in 1932 from Cornell University. What greater tribute could be paid Dr. Sisk than that given him by his pastor: "The very look in his eye made me think, 'here is a man who believes what he says.'"

The opening of the 1954 football season found the Highlanders in possession of a well-rounded squad of veterans and newcomers. Sixteen returning lettermen promised to give the squad a good foundation around which it could build a solid attack. This optimistic outlook was justified, as the season ended with a 4-3-2 record, and provided some of the most interesting and exciting football seen in many s-asons.

The Scots opened the season by handing Hiwassee a 26-6 defeat. Most of the squad saw action and the performance was an indication of good football ahead.

The next Saturday night, though, brought disappointment as a powerful Jacksonville State squad defeated the Highlanders 14-0, proving to be the outstanding opponent of the year.

The game was one of hard-fought line play and was close all the way due to some fine running by Shepard and an interception by Strickland which became a Highlander score. But the East Tennessee State boys pulled it out to win 20-14.

The Homecoming game found the Scots facing Emory and Henry before the usual large Homecoming crowd. Both teams treated the spectators to a fine game and the score ended even at 14-14.

Newberry College, South Carolina, was the next stop for the Highlanders, where they dropped 27-0 to the Indians.

Returning home for a visit by Howard, the team reverted to form and punched out a 21-12 victory in a game which found both squads making many errors.

Carson-Newman, the arch-rival, provided competition for the Scots the next week, and competition it was. The score is indicative of the battle, ending in a 7-7 tie. The final game of the season preved a fitting climax to an exciting year of football. The Mountain Lions of Concord State invaded Maryville with a team of big linemen and rapid backs. The Scots, playing the breaks, held their own in a close contest and in the final minute. Shelton, switched to tailback due to injuries to Shepard and McCall, engineered a Scot touchdown. White added the point and Maryville won 14-13. Particularly outstanding for the Scots all season were Shelton. Shepard. White, Keny, Berrong, and Strickland; but credit must go to all the players and the coaches for a fine showing in the '54 football season.





Miller and Renfro
