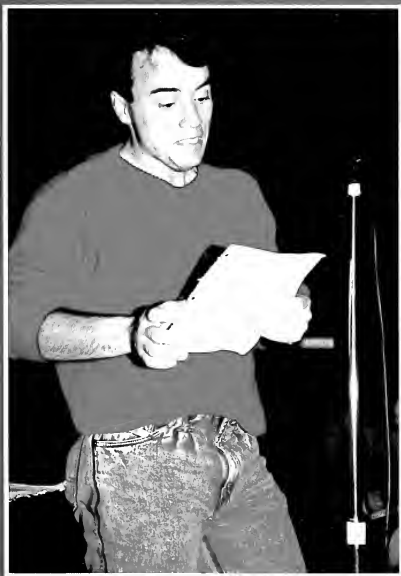

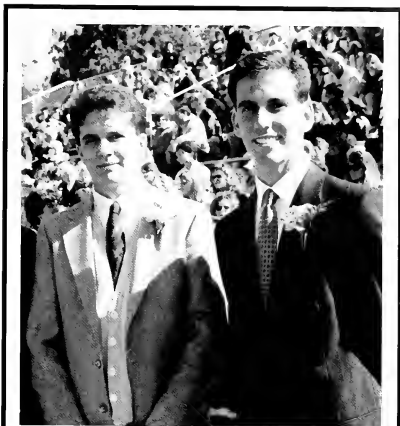

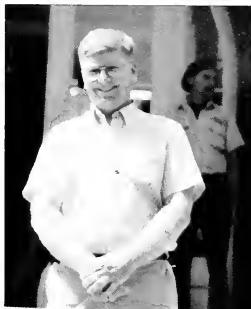

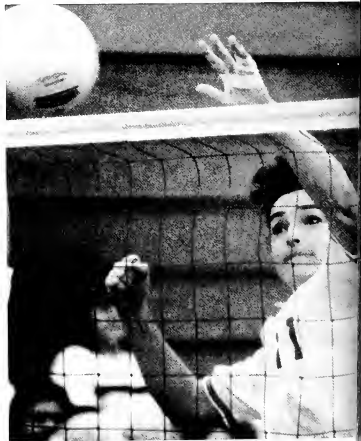

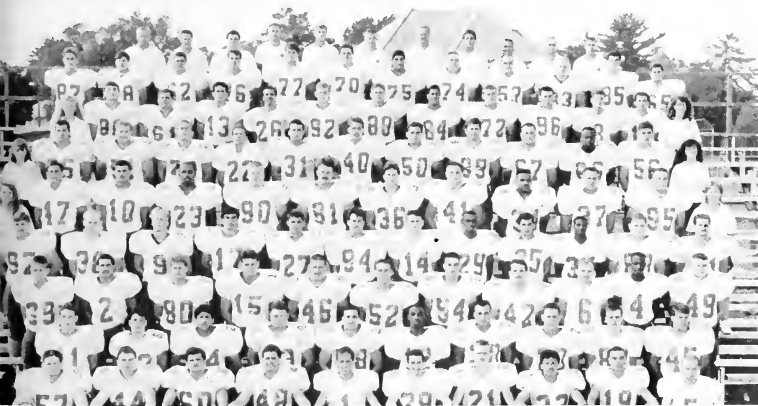

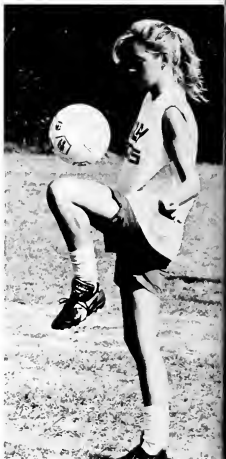
Lady Scots Soccer

Scots Soccer

The Scots fell just short of an NCAA Tournament bid for the third straight year. Posting a 15-4-1 record that included victories over the 1989 Division III runner-up Greensboro College and Division I program Vanderbilt, the Scots were under consideration all season long. In fact, they were bumped from the fourth and final playoff spot down to the fifth position in the South Region without losing another game!

Maryville was led by senior All-American candidate Brian Moore. He finished the season with 22 goals and 14 assists. This places him second in all-time scoring at Maryville and first on the career assist list. Seniors Enrique Rueda and Alfred Rietkirk also provided leadership for an offense that scored 63 goals. The defense, which allowed only 16 goals on the season, was led by senior fullback Scott Snyder.

Although he was disappointed about being overlooked by the NCAA selection committee, Coach Pepe Fernandez had nothing but praise for this year's team. "I was proud of the way our team responded to what was a very difficult schedule," he said. "They did all that you could ask of a team."

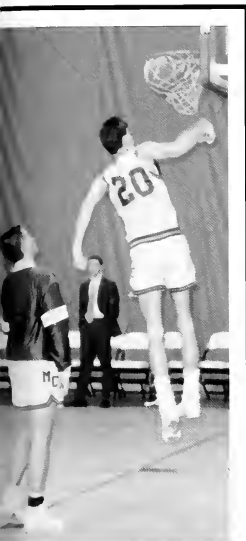
Lady Scots Basketball

Once again the Lady Scots basketball team started the season depending on young players, and once again those players lived up to expectations. Several freshmen grew up in a hurry while key returners provided leadership for another successful season.

For the third straight year, the Lady Scots recorded 23 victories and received an NCAA Tournament bid. For the second consecutive year they were ranked in the top ten in the country and made it to the round of "Sweet Sixteen." The Lady Scots defeated longtime nemesis Centre College at home in the first round of the tournament but lost to Washington University of St. Louis in the next round.

Coming off a successful season with no seniors on the roster should result in a bright future for the Lady Scots. Next year's team will be loaded with experienced players who have contributed on NCAA tournament-tested teams. They should help move MC up another step in their climb to the top.





Scots Basketball

The 1990-91 basketball season for the Fighting Scots turned out to be one for the record books. The team rolled to a school-record 22-5 season that culminated in a first-time trip to the NCAA tournament. As a team, the Scots were able to break in to the top 20 poll for the first time in school history. The team once again finished in the top five in the nation in three point field goals made per game (8.8).

The Scots opened up with six of their first seven games on the road. The team managed a 5-2 record on that trip with the two losses coming by a total of nine points. The team then hit a winning streak including championships in the Rhodes Classic and the MC Invitational. Maryville scored victories over Sewanee, Oglethorpe, and Knoxville College as well as over NAIA Eastern Division champion King College. The Scots lost their last regular season game at Lane College, but they had accomplished their main goal of reaching the NCAA tourney.

"We had a great time," said head coach Randy Lambert. "The competitiveness and the positive outlook of the players made the difference. We are already excited about next year."



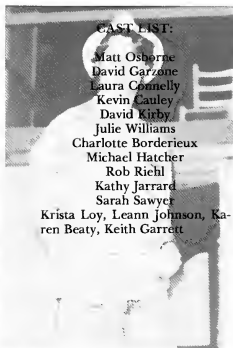

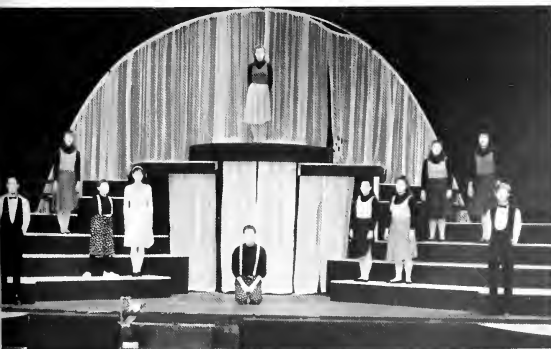

The play embraces universal themes of birth, growth, marriage, parenting, career, and death. It symbolizes that life is a continuous circle with no beginning or end.

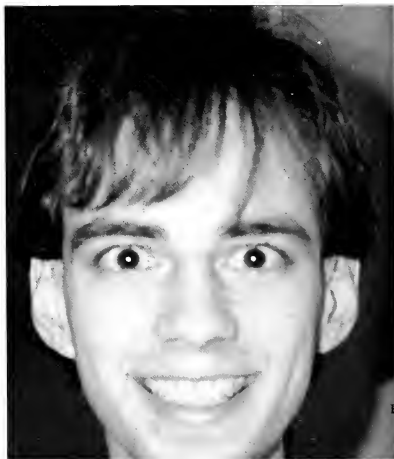
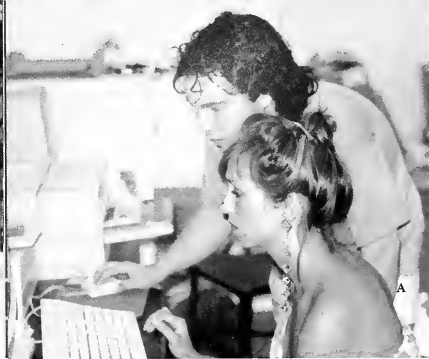

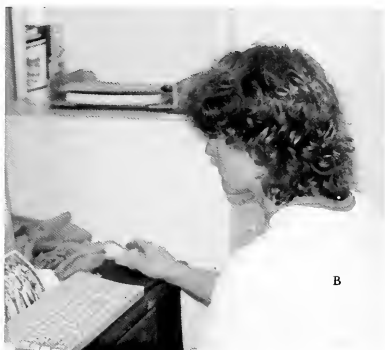

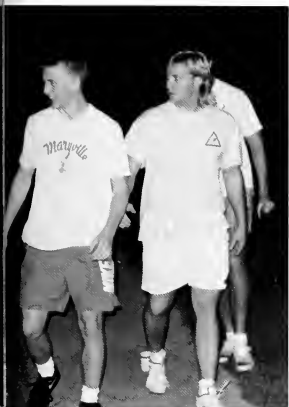

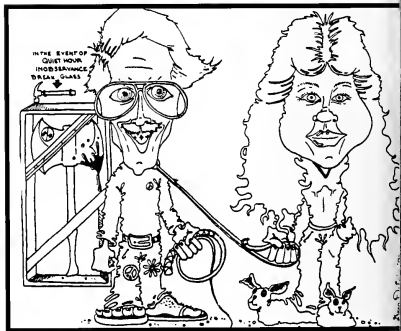

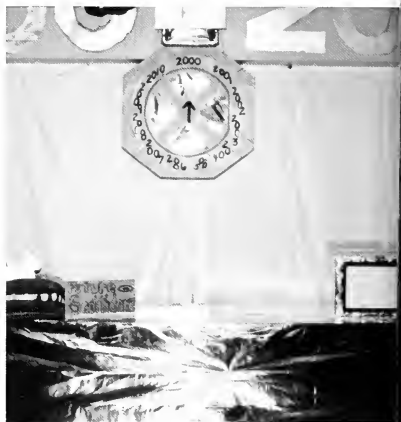

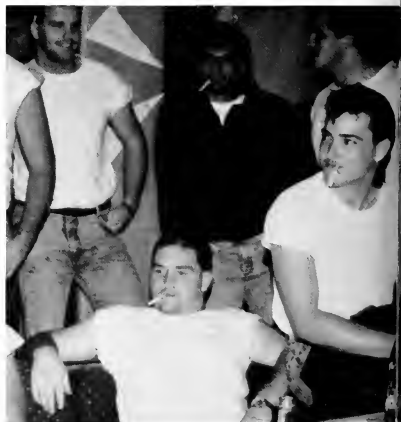

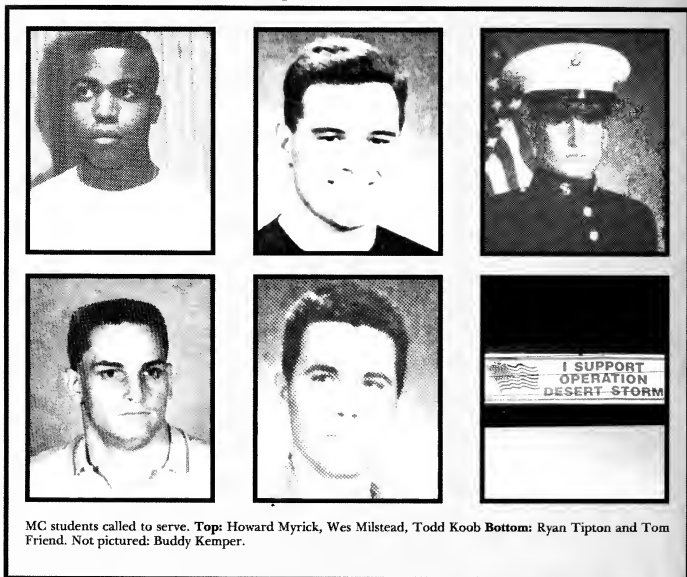
