RANDOM HOUSE DICTIONARY DEFINES CHANGE AS "TO BECOME DIFFERENT." ON THE MARYVILLE COLLEGE CAMPUS, FACULTY, STAFF, AND STUDENTS HAVE SEEN LOTS OF DIFFERENCES AND CHANGE DURING THE PAST YEAR FROM A NEW RESIDENCE HALL AND THE SKELETON OF A CIVIC ARTS CENTER BEING FORMED TO CHANGES IN LEADERSHIP. DIFFERENCES ARE OCCURRING ON ALL LEVELS AND IN ALL FORMS. WHEN I CAME ACROSS THIS DEFINITION, I IMMEDIATELY THOUGHT ABOUT THE SHIRTS THAT WE ALL DAVNED AS INCOMING STUDENTS. SOMETIMES IT TAKES BEING REMOVED FROM AN ENVIRONMENT TO TRULY APPRECIATE IT AND UNDERSTAND WHAT NEEDS TO OCCUR; THEREFORE, I WOULD LIKE TO CHARGE THE MC COMMUNITY TO REMOVE THEMSELVES FROM THE EQUATION AND EXAMINE MC FROM A NEW PERSPECTIVE. I HOPE THAT AS YOU EXPERIENCE CHANGE WHETHER IT BE ON THE MC CAMPUS OR IN YOUR PERSONAL LIFE THAT YOU REMEMBER CHANGE NEEDS TIME BEFORE IT BECOMES COMFORTABLE. REMEMBER WE ARE ALL WAITING FOR CHANGE.. WILL YOU HELP START CHANGE OR WILL YOU HENDER THE GROWTH THAT CAN OCCUR?



TOWN HALL MEETINGS: RECONNECTING WITH THE STUDENTS

"BECAUSE THE DEAN OF THE COLLEGE & THE DEAN OF STUDENTS AT MC HAVE OVERSIGHT OF THE PROGRAMS WHICH PROBABLY IMPACT STUDENTS THE MOST, IT IS VERY IMPORTANT FOR STUDENTS TO HAVE ACCESS TO US AND FOR US TO HEAR THE CONCERNS & VIEWPOINTS OF STUDENTS IN OUR CONTINUING EFFORT TO MAKE MARYVILLE THE BEST POSSIBLE COLLEGE."

ON WHY IT IS IMPORTANT FOR COLLEGE ADMINISTRATORS TO BE TRANSPARENT WITH COMMUNICATION TO STUDENTS



FOR SEVERAL YEARS, MARYVILLE COLLEGE HELD SEVERAL ROUNDTABLE DINNERS EACH SEMESTER IN WHICH THE PRESIDENT AND CABINET MEMBERS SHARED A MEAL WITH VARIOUS STUDENTS. THIS WAS AN OPPORTUNITY FOR STUDENTS TO PROVIDE FEEDBACK ABOUT THE COLLEGE OTHER THAN INDIVIDUAL APPOINTMENTS. THIS HAS SERVED AS THE LONE CONTACT FOR STUDENTS WITH MC ADMINISTRATORS.

FALL 2008 BROUGHT ABOUT CHANGE WITH THE ARRIVAL OF DR. JEFFREY FAGER, THE NEW DEAN OF MARYVILLE COLLEGE. AS A NEW ADMINISTRATOR, DR. FAGER WANTED TO INSTITUTE TOWN HALL MEETINGS TO PROVIDE A NEW AVENUE FOR COMMUNICATION WITH STUDENTS. "AS AN ADMINISTRATOR," DR. FAGER STATES, "I FIND IT TOO EASY TO GET SO INVOLVED IN DAY-TO-DAY MATTERS THAT I CAN LOSE TOUCH WITH PEOPLE FOR WHOM THE COLLEGE EXISTS, THE STUDENTS."

SEEKING NOT TO LOSE TOUCH, DR. FAGER ASKED VANDY KEMP, DEAN OF STUDENTS, TO HELP CHART THESE NEW LINES OF COMMUNICATION. A CHAMPION OF FINDING NEW WAYS TO COMMUNICATE EFFECTIVELY WITH STUDENTS, KEMP WAS EAGER TO HELP JOIN IN THIS CRUSADE.

"IN THIS ELECTRONIC AGE, EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION IS A CHALLENGE FOR US," KEMP STATED. "STUDENTS OFTEN DO NOT READ E-MAIL OR ATTEND MEETINGS AND FORUMS, SO WE HAVE TO CONSTANTLY SEEK BETTER WAYS. I LIKED DR. FAGER'S IDEA VERY MUCH AND WAS HAPPY TO TRY IT."

WITH TWO HALL MEETINGS IN THE FALL AND TWO MORE SCHEDULED FOR SPRING, THE DEANS HAVE ALREADY SEEN THEIR NEW METHOD PAY DIVIDENDS. "MARYVILLE COLLEGE STUDENTS ARE, ON THE WHOLE, PERCEPTIVE AND MATURE.

THE ISSUES WE HAVE DISCUSSED HAVE NOT BEEN PETTY OR SELF-CENTERED," AFFIRMS DR. FAGER. "THE STUDENTS HAVE BEEN ABLE TO UNDERSTAND OTHER POINTS OF VIEW AND WHAT OPTIONS MAY NOT BE AVAILABLE TO THEM. THEY ARE ALSO CREATIVE IN HELPING US THINK OF WAYS TO IMPROVE SERVICES. THEY ARE VERY WILLING TO BE PARTNERS IN BUILDING BETTER COMMUNITY."

WHILE NOTHING SHOCKING HAS BEEN BROUGHT TO THE DEANS, THEY LEARNED OF PARTICULAR ISSUES THAT ADDRESS QUALITY OF LIFE ON CAMPUS. MANY OF THE PROBLEMS BROUGHT FORWARD HAVE SIMPLE SOLUTIONS AND SOLVING THOSE ANNOYANCES CAN REALLY IMPROVE CAMPUS LIFE.

SINCE THE FIRST TWO WERE HELD AT NIGHT, THE DEANS CONDUCTED THEIR THIRD DURING THE DAY TO GET THE COMMUTERS PERSPECTIVE ON THE COLLEGE. "WE HAVE HEARD SOME THINGS THAT WE ANTICIPATED, BUT WE ALSO HEARD ABOUT ISSUES WE DID NOT KNOW EXISTED. THIS IS AN IMPORTANT WAY TO CONNECT WITH STUDENTS, WHICH KEEPS ME MOTIVATED AND HELPS US BECOME MORE EFFECTIVE," ADDED DR. FAGER.

WHILE TURNOUT HAS BEEN GOOD AT THE TOWN HALL MEETINGS, THE DEANS WOULD LIKE TO SEE MORE INPUT AND PARTICIPATION. "WE WOULD BE HAPPY IF MORE STUDENTS WOULD COME TO OUR TOWN HALL MEETINGS, BUT STUDENTS ARE VERY WILLING TO BE OPEN AND HONEST WITH US," STATES DR. FAGER. "THOSE WHO COME HAVE EXPRESSED THEIR APPRECIATION OF OUR PRESENCE IN THE RESIDENCES, AND THEY ENCOURAGED US TO CONTINUE."

"WHEN WE DO MEET WITH STUDENTS," STATES DEAN KEMP, "I BELIEVE IT IS VERY IMPORTANT THAT WE LISTEN CAREFULLY AND RESPOND WHEN WE CAN. SO FAR, DEAN FAGER AND I HAVE SHARED WITH OTHER CABINET OFFICERS THE FEEDBACK AND COMMENTS WE HAVE RECEIVED FROM STUDENTS."

THIS NEW AVENUE HAS CREATED OPEN LINES OF COMMUNICATION BETWEEN STUDENTS & ADMINISTRATION OFFICIALS NOT SEEN AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE FOR MANY YEARS. IT IS OUR HOPE THAT THESE WILL CONTINUE AND FLOURISH, CREATING THE MOST TRANSPARENT COMMUNICATION OF ANY COLLEGE.

THIS AVENUE HAS BROUGHT ABOUT REAL CHANGE, CHANGE THAT CAN BE SEEN IN THE LIVES OF ALL MC STUDENTS.



WEBSTER'S DICTIONARY DEFINES CHANGE AS "TO MAKE SOMETHING RADICALLY DIFFERENT." FOR WOMEN, CHANGE HAS BEEN OCCURRING RAPIDLY IN THE LAST 100 YEARS WITH RESPECT TO EDUCATION, POLITICS, AND SOCIAL ISSUES. MARYVILLE COLLEGE IS NO DIFFERENT. THE CHILHOVEAN INTERVIEWED FOUR INFLUENTIAL WOMEN ON CAMPUS WHO IN THEIR RESPECTIVE AREAS HAVE BEEN AGENTS OF CHANGE FOR FACULTY, STAFF, AND STUDENTS.

AS A WOMAN, HOW HAS YOUR ROLE CHANGED IN YOUR RESPECTIVE WORK AREA (OR AS A STUDENT) AS SOCIETY'S PERCEPTION OF WOMEN HAS CHANGED?

IN MY YOUTH, FEMALE PROFESSORS AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE WERE ROUTINELY PAID LESS THAN THEIR MALE COUNTERPARTS. I THINK THIS SITUATION EXISTED UNTIL SOMETIME IN THE 70S. NOW SALARIES ARE BASED ON RANK; GENDER HAS NO BEARING.

AS A FEMALE STUDENT IN A FEMALE DOMINATED MAJOR I FEEL LIKE I HAVE BEEN EMPOWERED BY MARYVILLE COLLEGE TO REPRESENT MYSELF AS AN EDUCATED, MATURE WOMAN. I KNOW THERE ARE INEQUALITIES IN SOCIETY, MANY OF WHICH ARE BASED ON GENDER AND GENDER ROLES. AT MARYVILLE, HOWEVER, I HAVE BEEN BLESSED TO ONLY LEARN ABOUT SUCH INEQUALITIES IN THE CLASSROOM, NEVER FIRSTHAND THROUGH MY EXPERIENCES OR INTERACTIONS WITH THIS CAMPUS. I HAVE BEEN PRESENTED WITH STRONG WOMEN TO EMULATE BOTH IN, AND OUT, OF THE CLASSROOM AND I HAVE NEVER FELT I WAS BEING TREATED DIFFERENTLY BECAUSE OF MY SEX.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR WOMEN HAVE GREATLY IMPROVED IN THE REALM OF ATHLETICS AND ATHLETICS ADMINISTRATION. MY ROLE AS DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS HAS BEEN EMBRACED BY THE COLLEGE COMMUNITY. I DO NOT BELIEVE I WOULD HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED IN THIS POSITION 3-5 YEARS PAST.

IN ADMISSIONS, PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS ARE MORE RESPONSIVE TO ME WHEN I DISCUSS MARYVILLE COLLEGE. ALSO, WOMEN HAVE THE ABILITY TO MOVE TO HIGHER POSITIONS MORE NOW THAN EVER BEFORE.

IN YOUR OPINION AND TIME SPENT HERE, WHAT HAS BEEN THE BIGGEST CHANGE FOR WOMEN AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE?

I THINK THE COLLEGE HAS BEEN SOMEWHAT IN STEP WITH THE PULSE OF THE LARGER WORLD. WHEN COMPARED WITH LIKE INSTITUTIONS I BELIEVE WE ARE AT OR ABOVE THE CURVE. WHEN COMPARED WITH STATE INSTITUTIONS OR LARGER UNIVERSITIES, I THINK WE ARE STILL SOMEWHAT BEHIND. THE BIGGEST DIFFERENCE WOULD BE IN SALARIES AND OPPORTUNITIES.

IN MY TIME SPENT HERE AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE, I THINK THAT ONE OF THE BIGGEST CHANGES WAS THE HIRING OF TWO WOMEN FOR THE POSITIONS OF VICE PRESIDENT AND DEAN OF STUDENTS, AND VICE PRESIDENT FOR ADVANCEMENT AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS. I THINK IT IS A BIG DEAL TO HAVE TWO WOMEN SIT IN HIGH POSITIONS HERE AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE. AS A PERSONAL NOTE, AS A WOMAN OF COLOR, THE HIRING OF AN AFRICAN-AMERICAN WOMAN PROFESSOR WAS PROBABLY THE GREATEST CHANGE FOR GOOD. EVEN THOUGH I WASN'T ABLE TO EXPERIENCE HER CLASS AS A STUDENT, IT DOES SHOW THAT MARYVILLE COLLEGE IS WORKING TOWARDS DIVERSITY AMONGST THE FACULTY.

I HAVE ONLY BEEN HERE 20 YEARS, AND DURING THAT TIME SALARIES AND STATUS HAVE BOTH BEEN PRETTY EQUAL. MORE WOMEN SEEM TO BE EARNING PH.D.'S AND ARE APPLICANTS FOR OPENINGS WE HAVE. I DON'T SEE ANY MAJOR DIFFERENCES FOR STUDENTS DURING THIS TIME.

AS I HAVE ONLY BEEN A STUDENT AT MARYVILLE FOR THREE AND A HALF YEARS, IT IS HARD FOR ME TO IDENTIFY ANY CONCRETE CHANGES THAT I HAVE WITNESSED FOR WOMEN IN GENERAL ON CAMPUS. IN SUCH A LIMITED TIME, IT IS HARD TO SEE ANY DRAMATIC TRANSITIONS IN THE ROLES WOMEN PLAY IN THIS INSTITUTION. WHAT I CAN ATTEST TO, HOWEVER, IS HOW THE YOUNG WOMEN I ENTERED COLLEGE WITH IN 2005 HAVE CHANGED THROUGHOUT THESE PAST YEARS TO DEVELOP INTO CONFIDENT, MATURE, AND ARTICULATE ADULTS. SOMEWHERE DURING ALL OF OUR PAPER WRITING, FACT FINDING, AND DEBATE ARGUING, WE HAVE GROWN STRONGER IN OUR IDENTITY OF WHO WE ARE AS STUDENTS, WOMEN, AND CITIZENS OF THIS CAMPUS, COMMUNITY, AND WORLD. THROUGH ALL THE QUESTIONS WE HAVE GROWN INTO DIGNIFIED ADULTS WHO ARE NOW WILLING, AND ABLE, TO COMBINE OUR PASSIONS WITH THE NEEDS OF SOCIETY.

WHAT AREAS OF MC CAN YOU SEE WOMEN PLAYING A MORE PREDOMINANT ROLE TEN YEARS FROM NOW?

IN TEN YEARS, IT WOULD BE BEAUTIFUL TO SEE A WOMAN AS PRESIDENT OF THE COLLEGE.

I HOPE TEN YEARS FROM NOW THE WEIGHT ROOM IN COOPER IS MORE WOMAN FRIENDLY BECAUSE IT IS CURRENTLY VERY INTIMIDATING TO MOST FEMALES ON CAMPUS (AT LEAST THOSE WHO ARE NOT INVOLVED IN MC ATHLETICS). ON A MORE SERIOUS NOTE, HOWEVER, I WOULD LIKE TO SEE MORE WOMEN REPRESENTED ON OUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND IN THE HIGHEST OFFICES OF THIS INSTITUTION.

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR THE NEW GENERATION OF WOMEN ENROLLING AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE?

I WOULD TELL THEM TO PUSH BOUNDARIES. AS I AM PREPARING TO GRADUATE FROM COLLEGE I HAVE HEARD MANY OF MY FRIENDS VOICE THEIR CONCERNS OVER WHETHER OR NOT THEY CAN HAVE A SUCCESSFUL CAREER AND ALSO HAVE A FAMILY. IT IS NOT RIGHT, NOR IS IT NECESSARY, THAT THE BURDEN OF BALANCING FAMILY AND WORK LIFE SHOULD FALL SOLELY ON THE WOMAN. I WOULD TELL PEOPLE COMING INTO MARYVILLE THAT THEY SHOULD NOT LOSE SIGHT OF THE DREAMS THEY HAD WHEN COMING INTO COLLEGE. FIND YOUR PASSION AND FOLLOW IT.

THE ADVICE THAT I WOULD GIVE TO NEW GENERATION OF WOMEN ENROLLING AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE IS TO STAY TRUE TO THEMSELVES. PEOPLE WILL TRY TO TELL YOU HOW YOU ARE SUPPOSED TO THINK, TALK, AND DRESS. DON'T CHANGE TO FIT MC, HAVE MC FIT WHO YOU ARE. ON ONE MORE THING, GET INVOLVED. DON'T COMPLAIN IF YOU AREN'T INVOLVED IN ANYTHING!

ALTERATIONS IN LIFE FROM A MAN'S POINT OF VIEW

OUTNUMBERED BY 10% ON CAMPUS, MEN AT MC FIND THEMSELVES IN UNFAMILIAR WATERS. FOR YEARS, MEN HELD THE HIGHEST POSTS ON CAMPUS, WERE THE OUTSPOKEN LEADERS ON CAMPUS, AND CONTROLLED MANY ASPECTS OF CAMPUS LIFE SOLELY BASED ON GENDER. WITH MANY CHANGES HAPPENING IN THE LAST 15-20 YEARS, THE COMMUNITY HAS FOSTERED AND SUPPORTED INCLUSION OF ALL PERSONS. THE CHILHOVEAN POLLED FOUR MEN WHO CAN OFFER THEIR PERSPECTIVES INTO THE OUTCOME OF THESE CHANGES.

AS A MAN, HOW HAS YOUR ROLE CHANGED IN YOUR RESPECTIVE WORK AREA (OR AS A STUDENT) AS SOCIETY'S PERCEPTION OF WOMEN HAS CHANGED?

HAVING HAD THREE OF FOUR FEMALE LEADERS OF STUDENT DEVELOPMENT AND NOW A FEMALE LEADER IN ATHLETICS, THEIR FOCUS ON THE WELL BEING OF EACH INDIVIDUAL STUDENT HAS TRICKLED DOWN TOWARD OUR/MY INDIVIDUAL FOCUS ON STUDENT SATISFACTION AND DEVELOPMENT.

AS A YOUNG ADULT ON THE BRINK OF TWENTY-THREE, MY WORK AT THE COLLEGE AS A RESIDENT ASSISTANT HAS NOT BEEN EFFECTED BY SOCIETY'S EVER-CHANGING PERSPECTIVE ON GENDER ROLES. HOWEVER, IN MY WORK AS AN UNDERGRADUATE STUDYING INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS, WE MEN ARE NO LONGER LOOKED TO FOR ALL THE ANSWERS, WOMEN ARE NOW RESPECTED AND IDEALLY THOUGHT OF AS EQUAL TO MEN IN THE CORPORATE WORLD.

MY PROFESSION (THE ACADEMIC STUDY OF LITERATURE) HAS LONG HAD MANY FEMALE PRACTITIONERS, SO I'M NOT SURE IT HAS CHANGED THAT MUCH OVER MY CAREER. I THINK THE ACADEMIC STUDY OF GENDER AND CULTURE HAS OVER TIME CHANGED MANY OTHER ASPECTS OF OUR SOCIETY. IN TERMS OF FACULTY AT MC, I THINK THE COLLEGE HAS HAD TO BE MUCH MORE SENSITIVE TO FAMILY DEMANDS AS TWO-PROFESSION HOUSEHOLDS AND THE NEEDS OF YOUNG CHILDREN HAVE COMPLICATED THE OLDER MODEL OF THE WORK-CENTERED COLLEGE PROFESSOR SUPPORTED BY A STAY-AT-HOME SPOUSE. BALANCING WORK DEMANDS AND FAMILY NEEDS DURING THIS TIME IS A PROBLEM FOR ALMOST EVERYONE, BUT ACADEMIA NEEDS TO RE-THINK THIS BALANCE AS MUCH AS ANYONE.

WITH THE EXCEPTION OF 6 MONTHS, I HAVE BEEN THE ONLY MALE IN THE CENTER FOR CAMPUS MINISTRY. FOR MOST OF MY PROFESSIONAL CAREER, MY PERCEPTION OF WOMEN HAS BEEN THE SAME: I'M SURROUNDED!

THIS SUBTLE GENDER TYPING LEADS TO IMBALANCES IN COLLEGE ENROLLMENT AS WELL AS A CONFIDENCE GAP ON THE PART OF SOME MALE STUDENTS. I SUPPOSE I WOULD ADVISE MORE YOUNG MEN TO EMBRACE THEIR INNER NERD: TO REALIZE THAT, IN THE MODERN WORLD, MOST MAKE IT WITH STRENGTH OF MIND RATHER THAN STRENGTH OF BODY. MANHOOD ISN'T ABOUT PHYSICAL DOMINANCE, BUT ABOUT BROAD COMPETENCE.

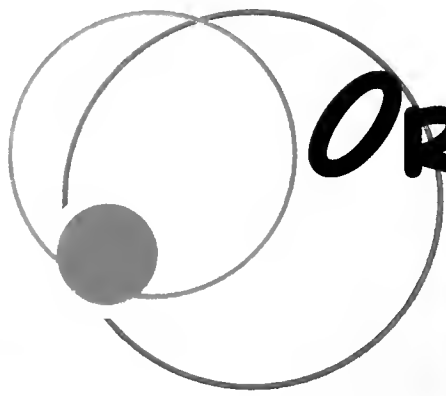

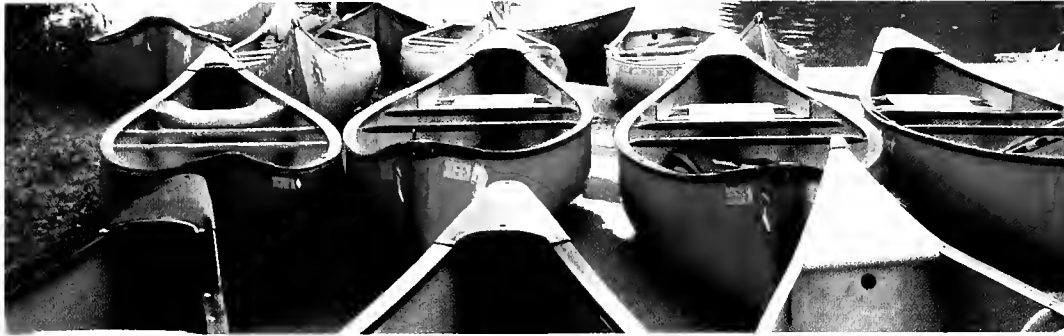

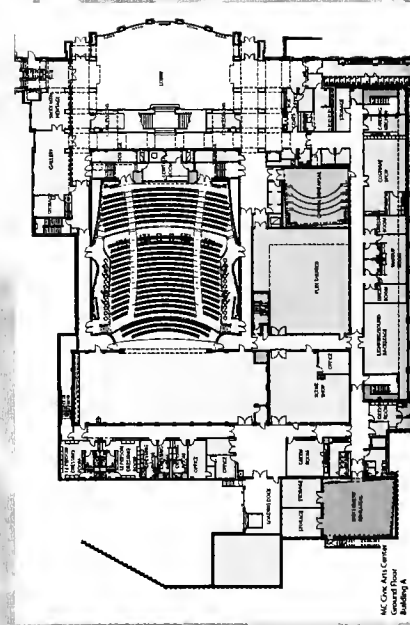

WHEN ASKED ABOUT THE INCONVENIENCES HE HAS BEEN FACED WITH, MUSIC MAJOR ERIC MATTHEWS'S ISSUES RELATED TO THE CIVIC ARTS CENTER (CAC). "HAVING TO REHEARSE OFF CAMPUS THE PAST TWO YEARS, IT WILL BE NICE TO HAVE AN ON-CAMPUS SITE TO REHEARSE." SCHEDULED TO BE COMPLETED IN EARLY 2010, STUDENTS SAW THE CAC UNFOLD AND RISE TO THE HEAVENS DURING THE 2008-09 ACADEMIC YEAR.

WHILE STUDENTS NOTICE SMALLER PROJECTS MORE, THE CAC PROJECT IS THE FOCUS OF THE COMMUNITY. THIS COMMUNITY FOCUS COULD BE A BLESSING FOR THE COLLEGE, ACCORDING TO DR. BILL SEYMOUR, VP FOR ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES. "IT SHOULD HELP GROW ENROLLMENT-NOT ONLY FOR THE FINE ARTS, BUT FOR THE WHOLE CAMPUS. IT WOULD BE A UNIQUE FACILITY THAT VERY FEW COLLEGES OF OUR SIZE WILL HAVE- PROVIDING PROGRAMS THAT WILL ENHANCE CAMPUS LIFE IN MANY WAYS."



THE INTERNATIONAL HOUSE (ABOVE) IS ONE OF MANY FACILITIES BEING RENOVATED IN THE CAMPUS IMPROVEMENT PROJECT (CIP). SCHEDULED TO OPEN IN MARCH '09, THE RENOVATION WILL ALLOW FOR MORE CLASSROOMS AS WELL AS INCREASED OFFICE SPACE.



THE 2009 SENIORS AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE WERE THE LAST CLASS TO ARRIVE BEFORE THE CIP ENGULFED THE CAMPUS. WITH THE MODERNIZATION OF ANDERSON HALL AND POSSIBLE REVITALIZATION OF PEARSONS HALL SCHEDULED TO BEGIN IN THE SUMMER OF 2010, MARYVILLE COLLEGE IS BARRELING THROUGH A DECADE OF EVER CHANGING PHYSICAL RESTRUCTURING. WHILE STRUCTURES MAY CHANGE AND MODERNIZE, THE CORE OF MARYVILLE COLLEGE WILL NEVER CHANGE: ITS PEOPLE.

MAKING MARYVILLE COLLEGE SUSTAINABLE

MOVE IN DAY ARRIVES. STUDENTS COLLECT THEIR KEYS AND SWIPE CARDS WITHOUT EXPECTING ANY OTHER GIFTS. AWAITING THEM IN THEIR ROOMS, HOWEVER, WAS A GREEN BAG OF GOODIES. THESE BAGS CONTAINED COMPACT FLUORESCENT BULBS, ECO-PENCILS, TIRE GAUGES FOR COMMUTERS, REUSABLE SHOPPING BAGS, ECO-FRIENDLY BOOKMARKS THAT COULD BE PLANTED AFTER USE AND GREEN PLACARDS REMINDING STUDENTS TO TURN OFF THEIR LIGHTS.

AFTER HAULING ALL THEIR BELONGINGS UP ONE, TWO, AND THREE FLIGHTS OF STAIRS AND UNLOADING COUNTLESS NUMBERS OF CARDBOARD BOXES, THE FRESHMEN DISCARDED ALL THE CARDBOARD BOXES, CONFIDENT THEY WERE UNNEEDED, USELESS, AND LONG GONE. LITTLE DID THEY KNOW THAT THEIR TRASH WOULD BECOME SOMEONE ELSE'S HOME. THE ELSE'S ACTION TEAM BUILT A FORT MADE OF BOXES TO RAISE AWARENESS TO THE NEW STUDENTS ABOUT THE COLLEGE'S RECYCLING EFFORTS, WHICH HAVE INCREASED SINCE THE PREVIOUS YEAR.

THERE ARE NEW, LARGER RECYCLING BINS LOCATED AROUND CAMPUS. WORK-STUDY POSITIONS ARE BEING IMPLEMENTED FOR STUDENT RECYCLING COORDINATORS. THE FIRST-EVER INHABITANTS OF THE NEW RESIDENCE HALL GIBSON HALL ARE ADJUSTING TO A GREENER WAY OF LIFE AS WELL. THE NEW WELLNESS RESIDENCE HALL COMES EQUIPPED WITH LOW-FLUSH TOILETS, LOW-FLOW SHOWER HEADS, COMPACT FLUORESCENT LIGHTS, AND DRY ERASE BOARDS. THE PAPER BANNERS THAT ADORN AND INFORM IN EVERY OTHER BUILDING ON CAMPUS ARE NOT ALLOWED IN GIBSON HALL SO AS TO CUT DOWN ON WASTE. THERE ARE NO MORE TRAYS IN THE DINING HALL TO CUT DOWN ON WATER USED AS WELL.

MOUNTAIN CHALLENGE HAS ALSO IMPLEMENTED A NEW PROJECT TO ALLOW STAFF MEMBERS & STUDENTS TO PARTICIPATE IN A CARBON-OFFSET PROGRAM. MONEY TRANSFERRED INTO THE FOOTPRINT PROJECT AGENCY ACCOUNT WILL FUND ON-CAMPUS ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECTS.

TRAILBLAZING ON THE SHOULDERS OF GIANTS



"AS ISAAC NEWTON SAID: 'IF I HAVE SEEN FURTHER IT IS BY STANDING ON THE SHOULDERS OF GIANTS.' EVEN THOUGH THIS IS THE FIRST TIME YOU'VE SET EYES ON US, YOU WERE ALWAYS WITH US."
BABATU WILLINGHAM '93, ON WHAT THE TRAILBLAZERS MEAN TO ALL AFRICAN-AMERICAN STUDENTS AT MC

FROM 1867 TO 1901, MARYVILLE COLLEGE HAD SIXTY AFRICAN-AMERICAN MALES ATTEND THE COLLEGE WITH NINE RECEIVING BACHELOR'S DEGREES. UNFORTUNATELY, THE 1901 LEGISLATURE SUCCEMBED TO PRESSURE FROM SEGREGATIONIST GROUPS, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR WHITES AND BLACKS TO ATTEND THE SAME SCHOOL. A PIONEER IN HIGHER EDUCATION IN TENNESSEE, MARYVILLE COLLEGE CHOSE TO SEAL ITS DOORS TO AFRICAN-AMERICANS, INSTEAD OF CLOSING ITS DOORS FOREVER. THE PIONEERING INSTITUTION WHICH ONCE ALLOWED ALL NATIONALITIES TO OBTAIN AN EDUCATION NOW HAD FIFTY-THREE YEARS TO DENY NON-WHITES AN EDUCATION AND SUPPORT THE NEGATIVE CULTIVATION OF SEGREGATION IN TENNESSEE.

SUBSEQUENT TO THE 1954 SUPREME COURT DECISION DISMANTLING LEGAL SEGREGATION, MARYVILLE COLLEGE HAD A DECISION: SHOULD THEY BE THE TREND SETTER OR FOLLOW SOMEONE ELSE'S LEAD. FOR THE CHURCH-BASED INSTITUTION IT WAS SIMPLE. AS PRESIDENT DR. GERALD GIBSON SAID AT THE REINTEGRATION CEREMONY DURING HOMECOMING 2008, "MARYVILLE COLLEGE'S RIGHT-MINDED LEADERS THEN DECIDED TO OPEN OUR DOORS AGAIN TO AFRICAN-AMERICANS AND ACCEPT ANY QUALIFIED STUDENT. A CHURCH COLLEGE OUGHT TO LEAD NOT FOLLOW."

MARYVILLE COLLEGE CHOSE NOT ONLY TO LEAD, BUT SPRINT OUT OF THE GATE. NOT ONLY WAS IT THE FIRST INSTITUTION IN THE STATE TO REINTEGRATE, MARYVILLE COLLEGE WAS NOW ALLOWING AFRICAN-AMERICAN WOMEN THE OPPORTUNITY TO SEEK DEGREES. TWO MALES, FREEMAN WYCHE AND LEO VALENTINE, ALONG WITH FOUR FEMALES, QUEEN CROSSING, LOUISE HILL, GILMORE, SHIRLEY CARR-CLOWNEY, AND NANCY SMITH WRIGHT, TRAIL BLAZED A PATH FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE, REINTEGRATING THE ALL-WHITE COLLEGE IN 1954.

HOWEVER, THE IRON GATES OF THE COLLEGE COULD NOT STOP THE PAINFUL TRUTHS THAT STILL EXISTED IN THE REGION. WHILE THE MAJORITY OF THE STUDENT BODY QUICKLY ERASED THE ISOLATIONIST PAST, THE SIX TRAILBLAZERS FACED HURDLES TO SUCCESS: A CROSS BURNING, AMENITIES MADE UNAVAILABLE, INADEQUATE QUARTERS, AS WELL AS PAINFUL REMARKS FROM PROFESSORS AND STAFF. IN ADDITION TO PROBLEMS LOCALLY, THEY FACED ISSUES AWAY FROM CAMPUS AS WELL. FREEMAN WYCHE, A MEMBER OF THE TRACK TEAM, WAS DENIED SERVICE AT HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS WITH THE TEAM. RECALLING HIS TEAMMATES ADDRESSING RACISM AND BIGOTRY WHEN IT WAS NOT POPULAR TO DO SO, WYCHE SAYS, "SOMETIMES I FELT I WAS DOING THEM A DISSERVICE, BECAUSE THEY COULDN'T DO WHAT THEY WANTED TO. THEY LET ME KNOW THEY WERE WITH ME, BECAUSE ONE DAY THE SHOE MIGHT BE ON THE OTHER FOOT." THE COLLEGE'S TRACK TEAM ALSO REFUSED TO COMPETE WITH OTHER SCHOOLS THAT WOULD BAR WYCHE FROM RUNNING.

FIFTY-THREE YEARS LATER, THE SACRIFICE AND DEDICATION OF SIX STUDENTS WAS BEING RECOGNIZED. MARYVILLE COLLEGE'S CEREMONY AT HOMECOMING 2008 PROVIDED "A LONG OVERDUE RECOGNITION OF THEIR COURAGE AND ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE," SAID DR. GERALD GIBSON, THE COLLEGE'S PRESIDENT. WHILE THIS WAS A CELEBRATION OF THE PAST, NANCY SMITH WRIGHT CHALLENGED MARYVILLE TO LOOK BEYOND THE PAST AND HOPE FOR A BRIGHTER FUTURE. "WE CHOSE TO GO DOWN A PATH LESS TRAVELLED. HOWEVER, RATHER THAN DWELL ON THOSE DAYS SOME 50 YEARS AGO, CONTINUE OUR VISION AND BE WHAT A CHURCH COLLEGE SHOULD BE," WRIGHT SAID.

A PLAQUE DETAILING THE ACCOUNT OF INTEGRATION AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE HANGS IN THE LOBBY OF BARTLETT HALL. THIS PLAQUE IS A TRIBUTE TO THE TRAILBLAZERS' PASTS, BUT MORE IMPORTANTLY A REMINDER FOR THOSE AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE TO REMEMBER WHAT HAPPENED THOSE DAYS INSTEAD OF SWEEPING IT UNDER THE RUG AND FORGETTING.

GIBSON HALL: AN HONOR BESTOWED FOR PROGRESS

FOR MANY CAMPUS VISITORS AND REGULARS ALIKE, 2008 SERVED AS A YEAR OF UNKNOWNNS WHEN IT CAME TO THE NEW \$8 MILLION RESIDENCE HALL BEING BUILT ON CAMPUS. WITH 53,000 SQUARE FEET OF SUITE-STYLE ROOMS WHICH SHARE LIVING SPACE AND BATHROOMS, THE YET TO BE NAMED BUILDING PROVIDED SPECULATION FOR MANY PROPOSALS: NEW HALL FLOYD, NEW LLOYD. HOWEVER, ALL SPECULATION ENDED AT HOMECOMING WHEN THE GERALD W. AND RACHEL P. GIBSON RESIDENCE HALL WAS DEDICATED.

SINCE THE ARRIVAL OF THE GIBSONS, MARYVILLE COLLEGE HAS BEEN TRANSFORMED OVER THE LAST 15 YEARS. FROM HIS INAUGURATION IN 1993, DR. GIBSON HAS SPEARHEADED THE COMPLETION OF SIX NEW BUILDINGS AS WELL AS THE ACQUISITION OF FOUR EXISTING BUILDINGS. HE HAS PRESIDED OVER THE MAJOR RENOVATION OF 11 BUILDINGS INCLUDING THE EXPANSION AND RENOVATION OF BARTLETT HALL. MORE RECENTLY, THE EXTERIOR RENOVATION OF ANDERSON HALL AND THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE \$47-MILLION CIVIC ARTS CENTER, SET TO OPEN IN 2010, HAVE ALL COME UNDER THE GUIDANCE OF DR. GIBSON.

WITH THESE ENORMOUS VENTURES UNDERTAKEN BY DR. GIBSON, MARYVILLE COLLEGE'S 10TH PRESIDENT, THE COLLEGE'S CABINET SUGGESTED THAT NOW WAS THE TIME TO RECOGNIZE DR. GIBSON AND HIS WIFE, RACHEL. WHILE BOARD MEMBERS AGREED THE GIBSONS WERE WORTHY OF SUCH RECOGNITION, THEY WANTED TO AVOID MAKING THE WRONG IMPRESSION.

"TRADITIONALLY, BUILDINGS ARE NAMED FOR PRESIDENTS AFTER THEY COMPLETE THEIR TERMS IN OFFICE," STATED DR. DORSEY D. "DAN" ELLIS, JR., CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND AN MC ALUMNUS FROM THE CLASS OF 1960. "SEVERAL BOARD MEMBERS WERE CONCERNED THAT GERALD WOULD INTERPRET A RESOLUTION TO NAME THIS BUILDING IN HIS AND RACHEL'S HONOR AS A HINT THAT HE SHOULD RETIRE OR RESIGN, AND THAT WAS THE LAST THING THEY WANTED TO HAPPEN. I WAS DISPATCHED TO CONVEY THAT TO GERALD."

COMPLETED IN AUGUST, GIBSON HALL IS LOCATED WITHIN A FEW FEET OF LLOYD HALL AND MIRRORS THE OLDER RESIDENCE HALL IN LOOK AND DESIGN. GIBSON HALL FACES THE COLLEGE'S MAIN ENTRANCE ON U.S. HIGHWAY 321, WHILE THE BACK FACES THE REAR ENTRY OF LLOYD. GIBSON AND LLOYD HALLS ARE POSITIONED IN SUCH A WAY THAT A COURTYARD WAS CREATED, WHICH IS A POPULAR GATHERING PLACE FOR RESIDENTS.

"DR. GIBSON HAS ALWAYS BELIEVED IN THE IMPORTANCE OF RESIDENCE LIFE TO A TRULY EFFECTIVE, LIBERAL ARTS, TOTAL LEARNING EXPERIENCE," STATED VANDY KEMP, VICE-PRESIDENT AND DEAN OF STUDENTS. "AND SO FROM HIS EARLIEST DAYS AT MARYVILLE, DR. GIBSON HAS ADVOCATED FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF SAFE, COMFORTABLE, ATTRACTIVE RESIDENCE HALLS STAFFED BY HIGHLY QUALIFIED PROFESSIONALS. I BELIEVE THAT THIS FALL WE ARE VERY, VERY CLOSE TO FINALLY ACHIEVING THAT IDEAL THROUGHOUT OUR RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM, AND OPENING GIBSON HALL SYMBOLIZES THE ENORMOUS PROGRESS WE HAVE MADE," KEMP ADDED.

AT THE HOMECOMING CEREMONY, DR. GIBSON SPOKE OF HOW THIS WAS NEVER IMAGINED. "SINCE THAT FIRST VISIT TO CAMPUS ALMOST 16 YEARS AGO, I HAVE HAD THE PRIVILEGE OF HELPING TO DEDICATE A NUMBER OF BUILDINGS ON THIS CAMPUS, BUT EVEN THEN, IT NEVER OCCURRED TO ME THAT SOMEDAY THERE WOULD BE A GIBSON HALL," GIBSON SAID.

HE ADDED THAT THE FIFTH PRESIDENT, SAMUEL TYNDALE WILSON, WAS AN INSPIRATION TO HIM AND THAT HE HOPED HE COULD BE REMEMBERED AS FONDLY BY FUTURE PRESIDENTS. "DR. WILSON WAS JUST A COUPLE OF YEARS OLDER THAN I AM NOW WHEN HE RETIRED, BUT IT WAS ANOTHER 24 YEARS BEFORE THE BOARD PLACED HIS NAME ON A BUILDING, AND HE DIDN'T LIVE TO SEE IT."

PAUSING MOMENTARILY, DR. GIBSON ADDED A COMICAL QUIP, "SO THANK YOU, TOO, CHAIRMAN ELLIS, FOR PUTTING THIS ONE ON THE FAST TRACK."

HOWEVER DR. GIBSON ALSO RECOGNIZED THE BOARD'S AWARENESS TO NOT NAMING THE BUILDING SOLELY FOR HIM, BUT FOR HIS WIFE, RACHEL, AS WELL. "EVERYONE WHO HAS KNOWN US OVER THESE 15-PLUS YEARS KNOWS THAT RACHEL IS THE ONE WITH THE GREAT PERSONALITY, THE EXTROVERT WHO NEVER MEETS A STRANGER, THE ONE THAT YOU'D CHOOSE TO BE ON A DESERT ISLAND WITH," STATED DR. GIBSON, CAUSING A CHORUS OF LAUGHS FROM THE OVER 200 PEOPLE IN ATTENDANCE.

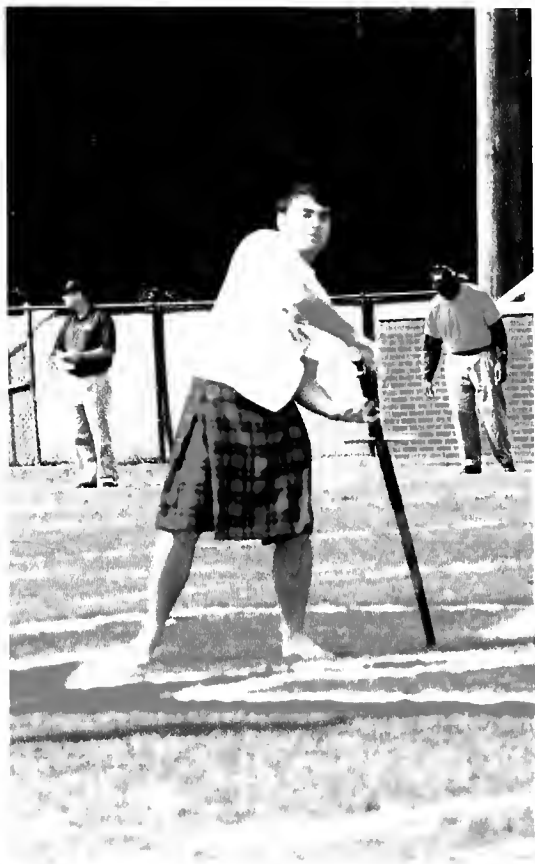

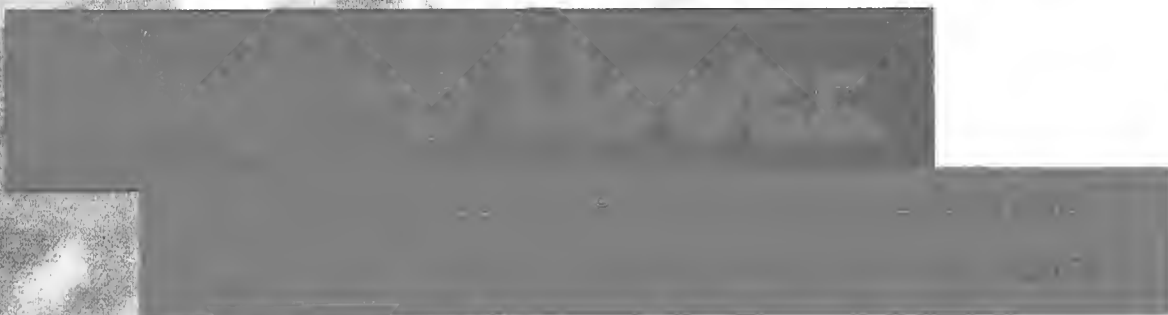

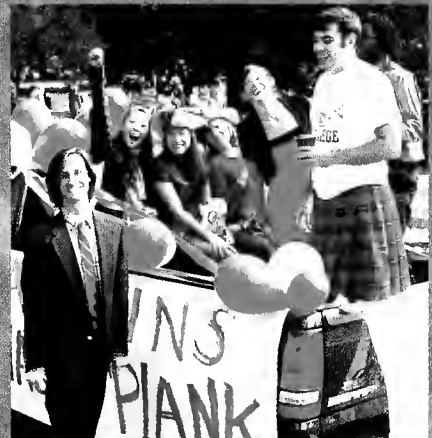

A PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE: CHANGE AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE

A NEW AMERICAN PRESIDENT HAD JUST BEEN ELECTED WHEN I ARRIVED ON THE MARYVILLE COLLEGE CAMPUS IN 1993. WILLIAM JEFFERSON CLINTON, HAD JUST MOVED INTO THE WHITE HOUSE AND WAS SETTLING IN THERE AS I SETTLED INTO LIFE AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE. THIS YEAR'S FRESHMEN, MEMBERS OF THE CLASS OF 2012, WERE JUST TODDLERS THEN. AS THEY WERE GROWING TOWARD COLLEGE AGE, MARYVILLE WAS ENTERING A PERIOD OF SIGNIFICANT CHANGE.

THE CAMPUS IN 1993 WAS FRANKLY RATHER SHABBY IN APPEARANCE. YEARS OF DEFERRED MAINTENANCE HAD LEFT THEIR MARK ON EVERY BUILDING, CREATING A CHALLENGE FOR ADMISSIONS WHEN PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS CAME TO CAMPUS. PAINT WAS PEELING, ROOFS WERE LEAKING, AND REPAIRS WERE LONG OVERDUE. THE SINGLE BRIGHT SPOT WAS CARNEGIE HALL, WHICH, AFTER SITTING VACANT AND DERELICT FOR A DECADE, IN THE FALL OF 1993 WAS GETTING A COMPLETE RENOVATION. CHANGE WAS SORELY NEEDED.

NOT ALL CHANGE IS PROGRESS, BUT PROGRESS REQUIRES CHANGE. CHANGE IS INEVITABLE, A FEATURE OF NATURE. BUT TO INSURE THAT CHANGE AT MARYVILLE COLLEGE RESULTED IN PROGRESS, THE CAMPUS ENGAGED IN ITS FIRST STRATEGIC PLAN, THE MC2000 PLAN, APPROVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS IN THE SPRING OF 1994. WHEN THAT PLAN WAS COMPLETED IN THE YEAR 2000, CHANGE WAS EVIDENT ALL ACROSS CAMPUS, AND THE PROGRESS WAS INDISPUTABLE. THERE WERE SIX NEW BUILDINGS, THE BUILDINGS HAD BEEN RESTORED, BARTLETT HALL HAD BEEN RENOVATED AND EXPANDED, AND DEFERRED MAINTENANCE WAS IN RETREAT. ENROLLMENT OF FULL-TIME STUDENTS HAD GROWN BY 56%. THE FINANCES OF THE COLLEGE HAD BEEN STRENGTHENED, AND THE ENDOWMENT INCREASED BY 92%. THERE WAS A NEW GENERAL EDUCATION CURRICULUM. THE LIBRARY WAS AUTOMATED, THERE WERE "SMART" CLASSROOMS, AND ALL CAMPUS BUILDINGS HAD INTERNET CONNECTIONS. MC2000 FUNDRAISING HAD BROUGHT IN \$35.5 MILLION IN GIFTS TO THE COLLEGE.

THE SUCCESS OF THE MC2000 PLAN PRODUCED AN EAGERNESS ON THE PART OF CAMPUS CITIZENS TO GET GOING WITH THE NEXT STRATEGIC PLAN. INVOLVING ALL CONSTITUENT GROUPS AND MORE PEOPLE THAN HAD EVER BEEN ENGAGED IN PLANNING FOR MARYVILLE'S FUTURE, CREATION OF THE WINDOW OF OPPORTUNITY PLAN GOT UNDERWAY, WITH BOARD APPROVAL IN EARLY 2002. WHEN IT WAS COMPLETED IN 2008, THE CAMPUS CLAIMED A NEW FAYERVEATHER HALL, A NEW LLOYD HALL AND GIBSON HALL. GAMBLE, DAVIS AND COPELAND HALLS HAD BEEN RENOVATED, OVERHEAD UTILITIES HAD BEEN PLACED UNDERGROUND, DRIVES AND PARKING LOTS REPAVED AND CURBED, AND THE CAMPUS EXTENSIVELY LANDSCAPED. THE ENDOWMENT HAD GROWN BY ANOTHER 70%. WINDOW OF OPPORTUNITY FUNDRAISING HAD BROUGHT IN \$42.2 MILLION IN GIFTS AND \$21.9 MILLION IN GOVERNMENT GRANTS.

BETWEEN THE COMPLETION OF THE MC2000 PLAN AND THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE WINDOW OF OPPORTUNITY PLAN, AMERICA ELECTED ANOTHER NEW PRESIDENT, GEORGE W. BUSH, AND NOW HAS ELECTED STILL ANOTHER, BARAK OBAMA. OBAMA'S CAMPAIGN CRY WAS "CHANGE!" AND CHANGE WE WILL BOTH THE COUNTRY AND THE COLLEGE. WITH GOD'S HELP, THE CHANGE THAT LIES AHEAD WILL BRING PROGRESS TO BOTH.

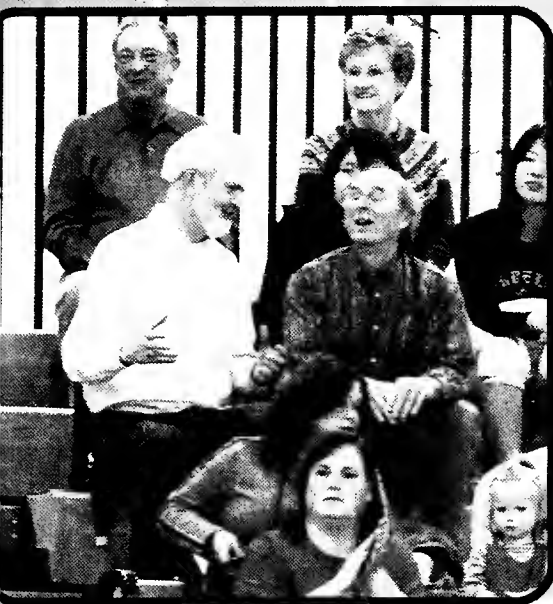

A COLLEGE TRANSFORMED: Q & A WITH MARYVILLE COLLEGE REGISTRAR MARTHA HESS, CLASS OF 1967

How has the Maryville College community changed since you were a student?

STUDENTS DID NOT HAVE CARS WHEN I WAS HERE; THEREFORE THE COMMUNITY WAS MORE SELF-CONTAINED. MOST STUDENTS AND MANY FACULTY/STAFF WERE HERE ON THE WEEKENDS AND ENGAGED IN SELF-PLANNED ACTIVITIES, COLLEGE EVENTS, AND OF COURSE ATHLETIC EVENTS. I CAN REMEMBER RIDING MY BIKE MOST EVENINGS WITH PROFESSORS FROM THE ENGLISH AND HISTORY DEPARTMENTS.

INTRAMURALS WERE BIG. MY SENIOR YEAR, THE SENIOR ENGLISH MAJORS (THE WOMEN) FORMED A BASKETBALL TEAM AND ENTERED THE INTRAMURAL TOURNAMENT. (BY THE WAY, WE WON. SOME OF THE F.C. MAJORS WERE A LITTLE UPSET.) MEALS IN THE DINING ROOM WERE SERVED FAMILY STYLE WITH A WAITRESS FOR EACH TABLE. GENERALLY YOU SAT AT SAME TABLE FOR THE ENTIRE YEAR AND OFTEN FORMED A VERY CLOSE BOND. AND OF COURSE THERE WAS CHURCH WHICH BROUGHT THE COMMUNITY TOGETHER DAILY. UNTIL MY SENIOR YEAR, CLASSES MET A 1/2 DAYS A WEEK (CHURCH ON SAT. MORNING T.O.).

What change has been the most difficult change since becoming Registrar?

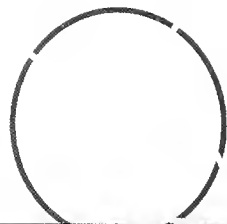
LESS AND LESS PERSONAL CONTACT WITH STUDENTS HAS BEEN THE GREATEST CHANGE. AT EVALUATION PRACTICE, I SEE SOME STUDENTS FOR THE FIRST TIME. I'VE BEEN IN CONTACT WITH THEM FOR FOUR YEARS VIA E-MAIL, CELL PHONES, ETC. BUT NOT ONE-ON-ONE PERSONAL CONTACT. THIRTY-FOUR YEARS AGO I KNEW EVERY SENIOR PERSONALLY.

What changes do you see on the horizon for Maryville College?

IF THE COLLEGE CONTINUES TO GROW THERE WILL BE CHANGES THAT WE CANNOT IMAGINE. AS WE BECOME MORE AND MORE DEPENDENT ON ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION AND ADMINISTRATION (AS WE SHOULD), THE VULNERABILITY OF THE COLLEGE WILL CHANGE. THIS CHANGE IS GOOD ON THE ONE HAND AND IS A SIGNIFICANT LOSS ON THE OTHER.

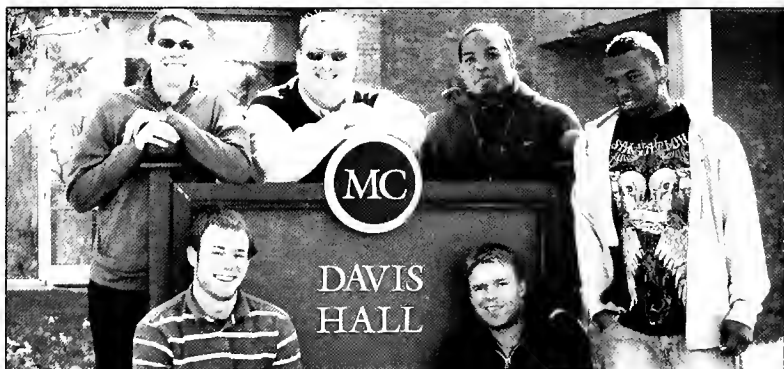
Q & A WITH MATT MART, CLASS OF 2000

The sense of community Maryville has always prided itself on will probably be the most welcoming aspect of the school. - Kat Harmon

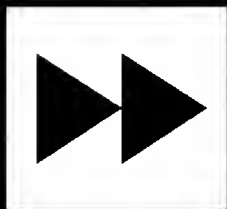

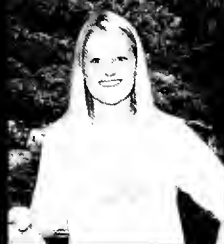

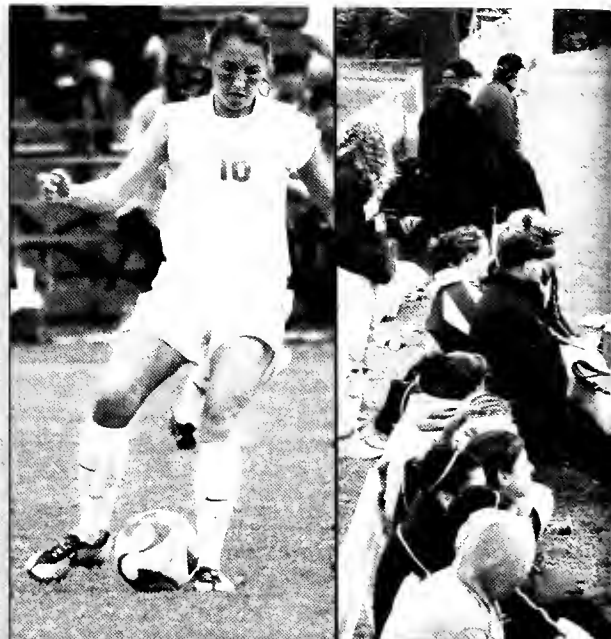

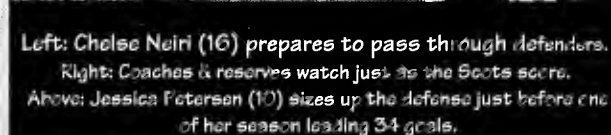

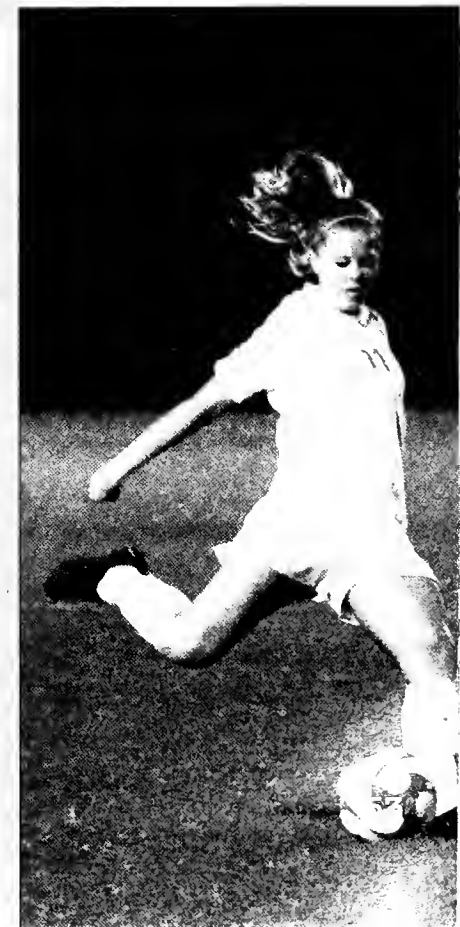

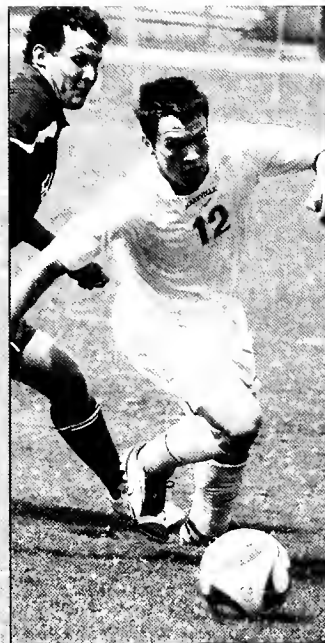

16-match winning streak & GSAC championship compels NCAA to leave Maryville College out

COACH SCHRAM COULD NOT HAVE SCRIPTED IT ANY BETTER. WITH AN UNDEFEATED HOME RECORD, NO LOSSES IN THE GSAC, AND PERFECTION SINCE MID-SEPTEMBER, THE SCOTS COULD DO NO WRONG.

TAKING CENTER COURT FOR THE FIRST TIME IN SCHOOL HISTORY, THE SCOTS DOMINATED THE HOME SEASON WITH AN UNDEFEATED RECORD. MARYVILLE FINISHED THE SEASON WITH A PERFECT RECORD IN THE GREAT SOUTH AND A 19-4 MARK OUT OF THE LEAGUE.

MC (28-4) WAS RIDING A 16-MATCH WINNING STREAK AFTER SWEEPING THE GREAT SOUTH ATHLETIC CONFERENCE TOURNAMENT AND CLAIMING THEIR SEVENTH CONFERENCE TITLE. WHEN AGNES SCOTT DROPPED THEIR PROGRAM DURING MID-SEASON AND WESLEYAN DECIDED TO NOT FIELD A TEAM, THE GSAC AUTOMATIC QUALIFICATION FOR THE POST-SEASON WAS TAKEN AWAY. THE SCOTS WERE COMPETING AS AN INDEPENDENT FOR ONE OF ONLY FOUR BIDS ACROSS THE ENTIRE COUNTRY.

UNFORTUNATELY FOR THE SCOTS, THE NCAA LOOKED AT THE EARLY PORTION OF THE SCHEDULE. HAVING HAD ONLY FOUR LOSSES EARLY IN THE SEASON, THE SCOTS HAVE STEPPED IT UP AND BEEN ON A WINNING SPREE SINCE SEPTEMBER 20TH. HOWEVER, THE NCAA UNFORTUNATELY FELT THE SCOTS WERE NOT READY TO GO DANCING. THE AVAILABLE INDEPENDENT BIDS WENT TO CAL STATE EAST BAY (29-4), JUANTIA (29-4), NEBRASKA WESLEYAN (19-9), AND UNION, NEW YORK (35-5).

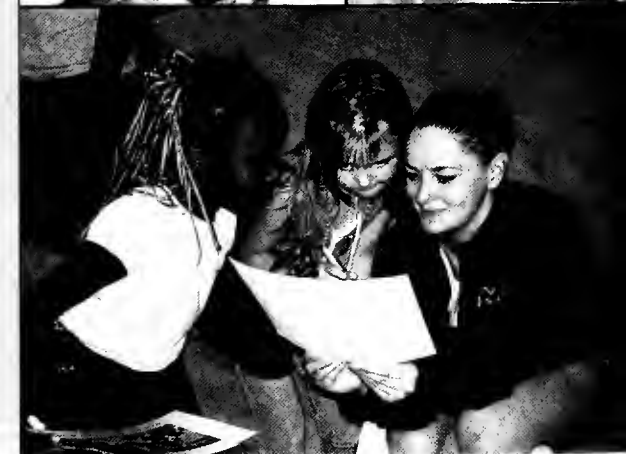
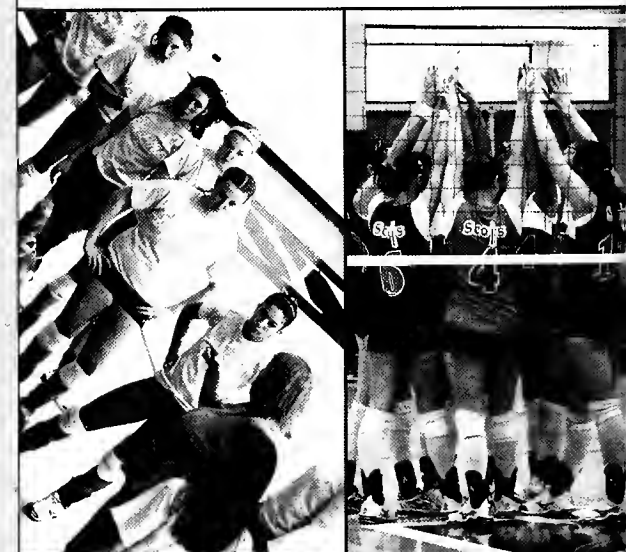

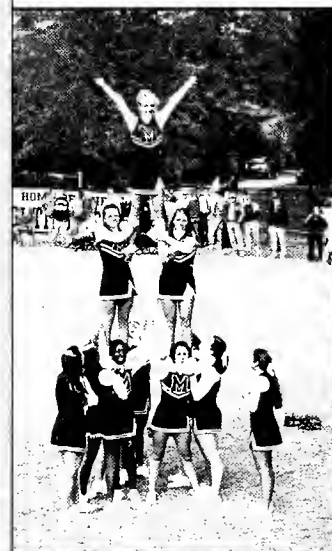

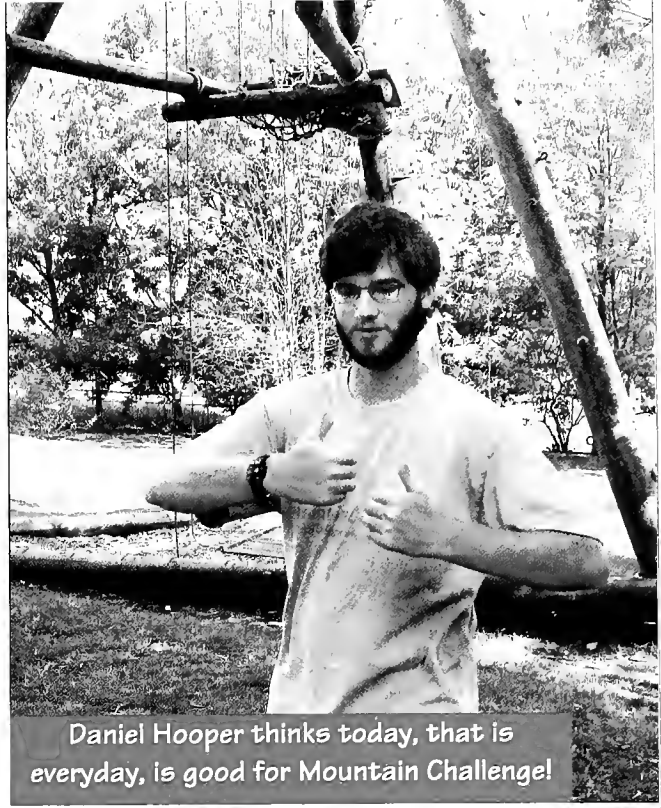

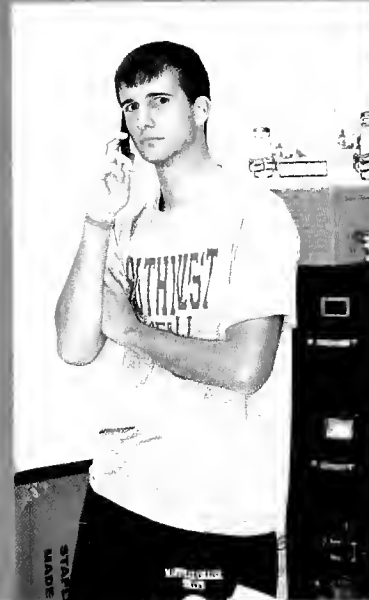
