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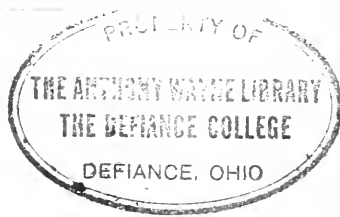

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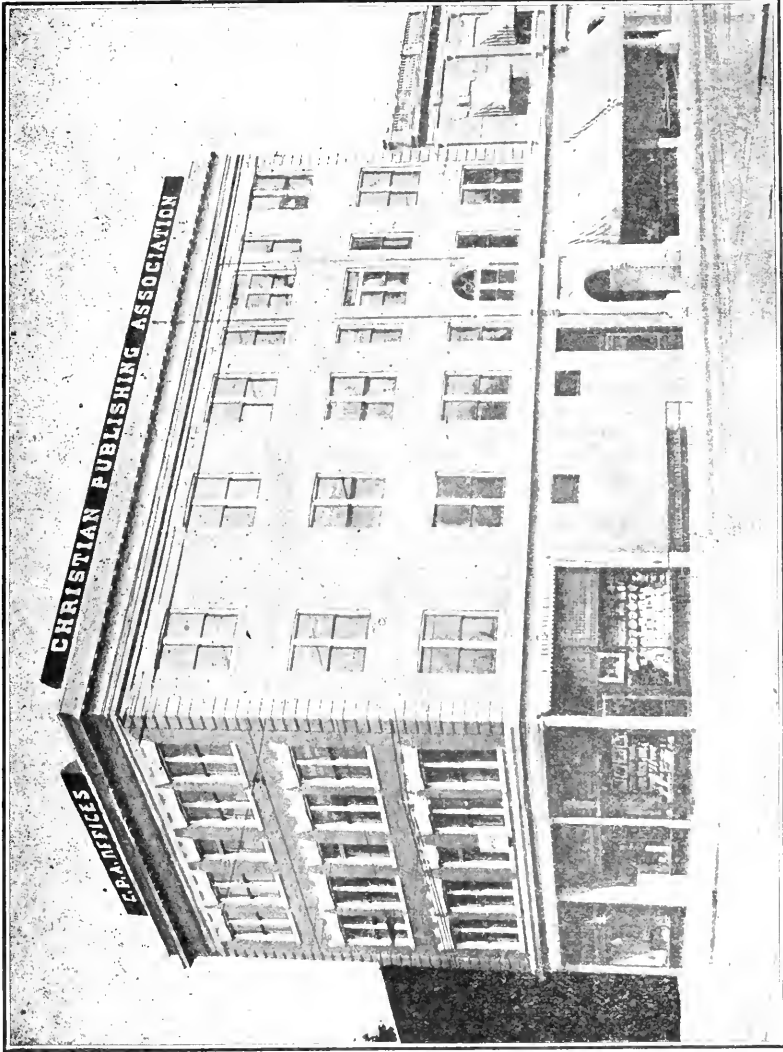
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A Few Words to You.



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OUR ENTERPRISES

The chief interest of any religious organization centers in its enterprises. The only reason for the existence of such organization is to perpetuate its enterprises. The American Christian Convention has several different enterprises, and when it ceases to perpetuate them its mission is at an end. The Convention is not an end in itself, but a means to an end. It is simply a medium through which the whole church speaks. Therefore, when the Convention speaks it is of the highest importance, because it is the entire church speaking. The officers who are at the head of the different church enterprises speak with delegated authority; they have no power to act only as the church gives them power. Every enterprise of the Convention is a church enterprise and can be maintained only as the church makes it possible.

WHAT IS THE OUTLOOK?

1. THE AMERICAN CHRISTIAN CONVENTION

Looking at it from my standpoint I think the outlook is very encouraging. The Convention, as some of us know, has undertaken some new work; that to which I refer is the field work of our secretary, Dr. Burnett. In connection with the Christian Publishing Association, his entire time is spent in the field in the interest of these two enterprises. I am sure that untold good will come to our cause through the work of the field secretary. It may not all come back to us this year in dollars and cents, but much good will come to the A. C. C. and C. P. A. by the education our people will receive with reference to our general church work. Many of our people do not understand the absolute necessity of being informed upon the various lines of our church work. I fully believe that when our people are informed, and thoroughly awakened, that none of our enterprises will lag for the want of hearty co-operations. We are encouraged to believe in a bright future for the American Christian Convention.

2. OUR EDUCATIONAL ENTERPRISES

We have no hesitancy whatever in saying that our educational enterprises never had a brighter future. One encouraging feature is the men at the head of our institutions of learning. Our colleges never had a higher grade of presidents, nor a more capable, thorough and painstaking faculty.

Elon College of the South is one of our substantial colleges, and is doing a thorough work; and, under the efficient leadership of Dr. Mollitt, is sending out men thoroughly equipped for life's work. It has a great future.

Union Christian College of Indiana, never had a brighter future and, under the management of Dr. Whitaker, it is daily gaining the confidence of our people. I doubt if the time has ever been when the people of Indiana looked with greater confidence and pride to U. C. college, than in the year 1907. They have a right to have that confidence, for Dr. Whitaker never fails.

Defiance College is enjoying a higher degree of prosperity than in any previous year, and it is destined to become one of our strongest institutions of learning. Since the negotiations with the Christian Biblical Institute have been closed up, and that institution has become part of Defiance college, the outlook is exceedingly bright. Through this combination our people of the West have an opportunity for which they have long been waiting—a place where the students for the ministry can receive academic and theological training without changing colleges. Then Defiance has two presidents of rare excellence, both in scholastic and executive ability, Dr. J. B. Weston and Dr. P. W. McReynolds. With such men at the head, Defiance has a great future.

Only good words can be said of Starkey Seminary. Starkey in the past few years has been enjoying a large degree of prosperity. Our lamented Brother Palmer championed the financial interests of Starkey, and

destined it to become a great power in educational circles. Then as its president we have a scholarly man of whom the entire denomination is justly proud. Dr. Martin Summerbell is one of the most scholarly and highly cultivated men of the church. To graduate from Starkey means a great deal in the life of any young man or woman.

On this subject space forbids me saying much more, yet I cannot close without speaking briefly of Weaubleau College, presided over by that noble Christian man, Rev. Fred Cooper. Weaubleau is doing a grand thing for our people in that section and should receive enthusiastic endorsement. The same is true of Kansas Christian College, and LeGrand. These institutions of learning have at their heads two finely equipped young men who are doing noble work to prepare our young people for the future work of the church. Franklinton College for the colored people is deserving of support and sympathy. It is doing good work in helping to shape the future of that race of people.

3. OUR MISSION ENTERPRISE

In writing of this enterprise I shall not use the term "Home and Foreign," I shall use the term "Missions." It seems to me that we would do well to eliminate the words "Home and Foreign," and just use the word Missions. If we cling to either I would suggest, "Home Missions." It is no longer a foreign subject. When we think of the millions that are coming to our country from other countries, missionary work resolves itself into Home Missions, it is no longer foreign.

The mission enterprise is a child of the Convention, and the American Christian Convention is only a medium through which the entire church speaks. It is the highest authority. The mission work being a child of the American Christian Convention, we may ask. How are we taking care of our child? We are sorry to say that the mission enterprise is not enjoying as high a degree of prosperity as it is entitled to. We are neglecting our child and, therefore, handicapping the Mission Board in its work. The last circular letter sent out by the Board should arouse every member of the Christian Church to greater activity and greater sac-

riifice. The sacrifice began at the wrong place. It began by the Board cutting the salaries of the mission workers. It is a burning shame that the Board was compelled to do such a thing. Their salaries were too small in the first place. Who is to blame? We are to blame because we do not contribute more liberally to our mission work. The Board is not to be blamed. There is not a Mission Board in the land that can make money reach farther than ours. May God stimulate us to relieve the aching hearts and weary brains of the Mission Board by loosening the strings of our purses and pouring more means into the treasury. No department of our church work is doing greater good in the kingdom of Christ than this. This being true we should rally to its support. To neglect mission work is to die, and I must say, to die a shameful death. The churches that are alive to missions are doing the most permanent work for the cause of Christ. May God burn more deeply into our hearts the need of greater activity and greater loyalty to our mission work.

4. THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

I presume that this is the most lively child of all the children of the Convention. It never disappoints, but always gladdens, the hearts with its efficient work. From the Sunday-school the church is receiving its strongest re-inforcements for future work. The reason this child is more lively than the balance is because it is better nourished and more enthusiastically encouraged.

5. THE CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR DEPARTMENT

A close running-mate for the Sunday-school is the Y. P. S. C. E. The reason is this: Some of the young people that perpetuate the interests of the Sunday-school are transferred to the Endeavor society. The Y. P. S. C. E. is doing a great work in developing the latent talent of our young people. None of the departments of our church work are doing more. Through this society the young people are being utilized. We have nothing but the highest words of praise for the secretaries of these two departments. They are doing grandly. The same may be said of all the departments.

As the President of the American Chris-

tian Convention I bring these words, hoping they may do good. I trust as your officer I shall ever be found worthy of your confidence. I assure you that I shall work for

the highest degree of success in the departments of the American Christian Convention work.

WHY THESE OFFERINGS SHOULD BE TAKEN.

The Convention is growing all along the lines of its work, and has from year to year undertaken new work as the funds would allow, and these new and important enterprises can be carried forward only by having money with which to meet the expenses. Stamps, stationery, railroad fares, printing and many other legitimate and necessary expenses, must be met from the offering of the churches in December. The Convention has no other source of income, and is wholly dependent upon the December offering, and must measure its plans by the liberality of the people in this offering.

What is true of the Convention expenses, is true of the departments of Education and Missions. The enlargement or curtailing of the work in missions and educational matters, must be determined by the amount of money given by the churches. Small offerings mean subtraction, large offerings mean multiplication. It is for the churches to decide the process. New churches, new conferences, new educational undertakings, new hope and new life will spring into being with large and liberal offerings, and all of them will die with small and illiberal ones.

The Hopefulness of the Educational Prospect

The educational conditions and achievements of the past year mark, beyond doubt, the present as our best time denominational-

ly in general educational matters. Our golden age is not in the past, to be left farther behind as our history lengthens. It

is yet in the future, to be cherished and realized. What are some of the evidences of its promise? .

We have more centers of educational influence than at any previous time, and these centers maintain higher standards. Our schools are better organized, housed, manned, equipped, patronized and managed than generally at any previous time known to the writer. In all these respects improvement continues. This must be so if our institutions are to keep up to the standards of the day, and be worthy of the support which they need.

The removal of the Biblical Institute to Ohio leaves a line of eastern institutions extending from Toronto, Ontario, and Lakemont, N. Y., at the North, to Elon College and Franklinton, N. C., at the South. Each of these is a bright constellation in our educational firmament. Among them are our oldest and our newest—Starkey and McMaster. The southern schools are sharing the prosperity common to that section, and are gaining on every line. They are building solidly and faithfully. Each of these four schools has its own characteristics and field.

The experiment at McMaster is proving so satisfactory that from other quarters, where the building of new and worthy institutions is immediately impracticable, comes the inquiry whether the same principle of co-operation may not there also be employed. It may be that along this line lies the training of our young folks, and the spreading of our principles among those most likely and most fitted to be leaders.

Our numerical center is served by Union Christian College, Defiance, and Christian Biblical Institute. These have all shown fresh vigor and enthusiasm during the past year. One with its new executive and another from its new location faces the future confidently, and the third continues to grow in efficiency and favor. Each of them is getting improved buildings, increased funds, extended courses, new instructors and a deservedly larger patronage. By them some of our serious educational problems shall presently find solution.

Our educational frontier is still no farther

west than Iowa, Kansas, and Missouri—little past the middle of the continent. The great land of undeveloped opportunity lies beyond. Shall we endeavor to plant at least one center of educational influence in the real West before another year shall be recorded in history?

Are we ready for a general advance, and are we prepared to maintain what may be gained by a special effort all along the line? As in their various localities some of the schools increase their income from special offerings, there is a tendency on the part of the churches and individual contributors to do less for the general work. *That* ought to be done, and *this* not left undone. A school can secure more funds and students in its own section than elsewhere, but some must continue to depend largely upon the general support of the brethren. Let the observance of special "College" days increase, but let it not diminish our response to the Educational call issued by the American Christian Convention.

Large numbers of our own and other students have the advantages that come from these various schools, and from them must come our leaders of the next decade. A considerable number of young men are studying to show themselves approved unto God, as interpreters of the Word of his truth, and from these we are to have teachers, officers and administrators. We dare not do *less* than we are doing, and claim a *right to live* or a *mission to fulfill!* We should *double* what we contribute for education, and emphasize the power of the schools in evangelizing our land and God's world until from no congregation and from no individual shall come objection to adequate training of every youth, but from all shall come support as God has prospered each. Our destiny and influence are of our own choosing, and they will be great and noble in proportion as we make and employ the schools as a means.

Home Missions

The Home Mission work of the American Christian Convention should include the following lines of effort, in order to respond fully to the plans developed by the Convention and the mission department.

CITY CHURCH EXTENSION.

As much is being accomplished in this direction as the limited support of the Home Mission enterprise will justify, and with encouraging results. The most hopeful field is that known as "Greater Norfolk," where the thriving mission churches of South Norfolk, Lambert's Point, Rosemont, Portsmouth and Park Place, or Norfolk Third Church, are being aided. Next in promise is the movement at Dayton, Ohio, which includes in its plans a new building for the First Church, one mission church organized and a building under construction, a second mission in operation, and a third planned with some services already held.

The following city churches being helped by mission funds have been recently organized: Coshocton, Ohio; Palm Street, in Greensboro, N. C.; Lima, Ohio; Oblong, Illinois; Lynn, Mass. At the following places churches are still being aided which have been organized for a longer time, which, it is hoped, will soon reach self-support: Bangor, Me.; Columbus, O.; Indianapolis, Ind.; Danville, Ill.; Rockport, Mo.

SUSTENTATION.

Four churches at educational centers, one of them a mission church, are receiving aid to strengthen their power and influence, namely, Toronto, Ont.; Defiance, Ohio; Merom, Ind.; and Lincoln, Kansas.

Three points will receive aid to overcome temporary difficulties: Romeo, Mich.; Cottage Home, Ill.; and Bear Lake, Pa. The slight aid afforded Jamestown, Ohio, last year, has proved to be a good investment.

FRONTIER WORK.

The frontier work will be the same in 1908 as in 1907. Washington, Colorado,

North Dakota and Saskatchewan being the fields. It is hoped that a church will soon be organized in Olympia, but the additional worker needed for Western Washington could not be sent. The work at Rifle should be followed up, and a conference organized on the western slope of Colorado. Rev. Robert Harris, resigning at Denbigh, N. D., is succeeded by Prof. Neil D. Reid, and although needing a change of climate, remains to assist the Surrey field temporarily. Plans must be made to reinforce Bro. Holaday at Saskatoon in the near future. The Montana work is at a standstill because any advance calls for greater expenditure than the Board is able to make at present. There are opportunities in Wyoming, Idaho, Oklahoma and South Dakota, but we are not ready.

CONFERENCE FIELD WORK.

This was attempted by the Northern Kansas Conference last year, but the plans were not fully matured. There is a demand for this work in many sections, and where fairly tried it has proved very effective in encouraging non-active churches, settling pastors, etc. The Board should be ready to encourage work of this kind.

PASTORATES AND EVANGELIST.

The Home Mission Department was made a "Bureau of Information" by the Convention for pastorless churches, and ministers have availed themselves of the services of the department, but no practicable system has been developed by which any great amount of assistance can be given. An investigation by correspondence of conditions in 44 conferences reporting about 620 ministers, gives the following results: Employed 55 per cent. available for pastorates, unemployed, 12 per cent.; engaged in secular occupations and unavailable for that reason, 11 per cent.; engaged in general or denominational work, as evangelists, temperance workers, etc., 3 per cent.; superannuated, 19 per cent. If this department of work,

together with that of the permanent Committee on Evangelism, of which the Home Mission Secretary is made a member, can be developed, it may result in some improvement in the working condition of our churches.

OTHER RACES AND FAITHS.

Our Home Mission endeavors made a brave beginning in establishing at Franklinton, N. C., a school for the colored Christians. Turning this work over to the Educational Board may have been wise, but we should ere this, have some other form of

missionary sentiment, promoting the reading of missionary books, forming mission study classes, scattering literature of all kinds that will tend to stimulate mission activity or quicken the spiritual life. It has also worked hand in hand with the department of Foreign Missions and the Secretary's department of the American Christian Convention in extending all possible aid to the annual conferences, appearing on the program when invited, and promoting general denominational co-operation and fellowship. In the absence of any form of general super-

vision, such effort is indispensable to the proper co-ordination of our various organizations.

FINANCIAL.

The cost of the work, including inspection of the field, educational and office work has been about \$7,500. The receipts for the year have been about the same. And the actual balance in the treasury to the credit of the home mission fund less borrowed money is about the same as last year. But charged against the Home Mission account is a former loan from invested funds, which leaves an actual deficit.

The Mission Board had good reason to expect an amount equal to the contributions of the year 1905-6, which was in round numbers about \$10,000. Considering that this is not too much to expect for this year, with proper effort, the Board has ventured, in the face of an insufficient balance to carry the work until the June collections, to attempt to maintain the work, and plan for enlargement, as fast as the churches indicate by their offerings that they are ready to support it. It should be easy to surpass the former record by at least a few hundreds. In confidence that what has been done can be done, the Board has gone forward, in the hope that the long-talked-of advance may soon be made.

effort in its place. Aiding the school for the Chinese in Boston for one year gave us contact with the alien races in our land. The beginning thus made should be vigorously followed up. Our people are studying the problem of the immigrant coming to our shores at the rate of a million a year. We must be ready to move forward very soon, or see some of our strongest churches abandon their fields. In the work of assimilating and evangelizing the millions of erstwhile strangers in our land, the Christians need not lack for opportunity and should be ready to do their share.

The Work Abroad

In its main features our Foreign Mission work last year was like that of the year preceding. Figures for both years will not differ very greatly. A brief outline may suffice to convey an adequate idea to readers of the ANNUAL.

A CHANGE.

By order of the Convention, at Huntington, Ind., Porto Rico was put back under the heading and administration of foreign missions. That makes several thousand dollars difference between the home and foreign accounts of last year, compared with 1906. The mission has not been at all affected by this change.

RECEIPTS.

The whole sum of money placed to the credit of the foreign fund up to October 1, was \$13,533.20. But we began the year with some money on hand; we borrowed some. Counting this out, to get at the actual receipts for Japan and Porto Rico, we find that there were \$11,616.93, including \$4,440.92 from the regular foreign offering of churches, \$245.75 from Sunday-schools, \$582.78 from Endeavor Societies, \$1,476.82 from the Woman's Foreign Board, \$1,932.00 from the Southern Convention, \$445.46 from the Rhode Island and Massachusetts Conference, \$350.00 from the Ontario Conference, and the balance from many other sources.

EXPENDITURES.

October 1, 1907, the foreign mission ex-

penditures for the year amounted to \$14,026.74, being nearly \$500 in excess of the available foreign funds. Most of this increase was required by the new arrangement for administration, putting Porto Rico on the foreign list, and building the Salinas church. The regular appropriations for Japan and Porto Rico were \$8,500 and \$4,300 respectively, sums less than the year before.

The total administrative expense charged to the foreign account was \$1,833.52, covering salary, rent, Board meeting, Council meetings, printing, office furnishings, supplies, travel and other items. It may be said here that the total amount of money cared for by the treasurer last year was nearly \$40,000.00., which leaves the administrative expense only a little more than nine per cent. As the funds increase, of course the per cent. of administration cost decreases. For example, the American Baptist Missionary Union had \$2,200,000 nearly, to look after the past year, and the per cent. for administration was between 5 and 6 per cent. Our Board could handle many more thousands without additional cost. But nine per cent. is certainly a very conservative percentage. Few kinds of business are administered on so narrow a margin.

THE FIELDS.

A few figures arranged in tabular form will introduce readers to our Japan and Porto Rican missions.

In Japan our principal stations are Ishinomaki, Sendai, Utsunomiya and Tokyo; in Porto Rico they are Ponce and Salinas. Good headway has been made at these places and at a number of others. To indicate somewhat the progress, it may be said that Tokyo church now has a strong and aggressive pastor; Oji church has returned to fellowship in our mission; Utsunomiya reports 17 baptisms, and two out-stations now have pastors, native Christians and enquirers; Sendai church received 32 members; Ichinoseki witnessed 5 baptisms and increased interest; Wakuya had 6 baptisms and Tsukidate 4; Ishinomaki received 12 members. In Porto Rico, in Ponce field there were 25 baptisms and 27 additions to the churches, mostly at Ponce and Arus. Both points have seen great interest awakened the past year. In the Salinas field 9 persons were baptized, and 11 added to the church, nearly all in Salinas. Mr. White's illness greatly hampered his end of the work. At Ponce and Salinas thriving Endeavor Societies have been started within the year.

THE WORKERS.

There are now nine missionaries connected with our Japan mission, as follows: Rev. and Mrs. A. D. Woodworth and Rev. and Mrs. C. P. Garman, Tokyo; Rev. and Mrs. E. C. Fry, Utsunomiya; Rev. and Mrs. E. K. McCord, Sendai (soon to start for America on furlough); Miss Alice True, Ishinomaki. (now in the United States on furlough).

The number of Japanese workers in the mission is 18, including pastors and Bible women.

There are five missionaries connected with the Porto Rican mission, as follows: Rev. and Mrs. D. P. Barrett and Miss Jennie Mishler, Ponce; Rev. and Mrs. T. E. White, Salinas. Mr. and Mrs. Barrett are in the States on furlough.

The number of Porto Rican assistants is four.

ENLARGEMENT.

As appropriations were reduced last year, it was expected that less would be done in the fields. Two noteworthy advance steps were taken however. A generous friend gave \$250 toward starting a Girl's school in Japan which actually opened last April, and is now

in session. Mrs. Mina Kitamura and Miss Alice True were in the field raising money for this school, and their efforts netted about \$900.00. Mrs. Susie V. Fry is principal of the school, which was located at Utsunomiya, and has two assistants. About half a dozen students, all told, are receiving instruction. The school is thoroughly Christian.

Last February the town council of Salinas, Porto Rico, generously donated a lot to our mission, provided it was built upon within nine months. A neat concrete and concrete block church building, with finishings of hard pine is just about ready for occupancy. It was contracted for at \$2,500, which sum our Sunday-schools were asked to raise. They have, however, failed to raise half the amount.

THE SECRETARY'S FIELD WORK.

During 1907 the Foreign Mission Secretary made two trips to Porto Rico in behalf of that mission; and has spent nearly half the remaining time, up to October 1, in church and conference visitation in the States. Good results have come from all this field work, and the end is not yet. Even more field work is contemplated by the Board for the coming year.

LITERATURE.

According to the present arrangement the two Secretaries are jointly editors of the *Christian Missionary*. That magazine paid its way, as usual, and has been a bulwark to the cause. A great deal of missionary literature has been distributed wherever the secretaries have gone, and much has been sent out from the Mission Rooms. A stock of missionary books has been kept on hand. This department is in charge of the Home Mission Secretary.

THE FUTURE.

What prospects open before our foreign work? Two statements will cover the whole subject. (1) Opportunities, some of them most flattering, confront the missions and missionaries. There is an actual demand and request from the native people for more preachers and teachers and services. (2) On the other hand, never has the foreign fund begun the year with so large a deficit (and the appropriations were cut last year

and will be this). If funds can be secured, the work will prove as successful as ever. Continued deficit will mean further reduction and injury to the work. But increased interest in many quarters gives us courage to believe that more funds will be provided,

and that correspondingly greater results will accrue. The general foreign fund is more needy than any other, at present. Let us surpass all former years' records in gifts and results.

Woman's Work for Missions

"The Lord giveth the word: the women that publish the tidings are a great host." Psalm 68:11. (American Revised.)

Some of the pronounced aims of woman's organized work for missions are: To enlist the interest of those who would not otherwise be interested, and banding them together with the purpose of learning Christ's will concerning them, and their relation to the advancement of His kingdom.

In systematic ways to gather funds, by membership dues, mite boxes, self-denial and thank-offerings, tithes of income, individual gifts, annuities and legacies.

The hundreds and thousands of women thus gathered into the auxiliary missionary societies of the church in America, and the millions of dollars they have gathered and disbursed for missions in the homeland, and in all the world, demonstrate the patient, persevering, enthusiastic efforts of consecrated Christian womanhood.

They have set in motion Young People's Societies, Children's Bands and Cradle Rolls. They foster Mission Study Classes and Circulating Libraries; they publish annual reports, and papers in periodicals, calendars, magazines and books; they scatter missionary literature broadcast—leaflets, tracts, booklets, picture cards, and society helps.

OUR OWN PEOPLE.

Have two National Woman's Boards, one for Home Missions and one for Foreign Missions. These boards were organized by the American Christian Convention, and are auxiliary to it, and are connective with the General Mission Board in missionary work.

Auxiliary to the Woman's Boards for Mis-

sions are the conference Woman's Missionary Boards. These are organized for both home and foreign mission work.

Auxiliary to these are the local, or church societies. These also are organized for both home and foreign missionary work.

While the organization always begins at the top, the real center for spreading missionary knowledge and increasing membership and funds is the local society.

Our women are urged to send their reports and money through

THE REGULAR CHANNELS.

That means that the money of the local society is sent to the conference Woman's Mission Board treasurer quarterly, and an accompanying statement as to how gathered and how divided. The corresponding secretary also makes a quarterly report to the corresponding secretary of the conference Woman's Board.

These officers in turn send the money and statistical reports to the relative officers of the National Woman's Boards quarterly. Sending the gifts in this order magnifies the local society and the church and the conference board and the national boards, and thus magnifies the work, and encourages and dignifies the enterprise, and wisely conserves the resources for the work for which we are responsible.

The departments of literature, young people and children's work and cradle roll are under the auspices of both boards, the same superintendents serve both boards, and these boards jointly employ organizers.

THE WOMAN'S BOARD FOR HOME MISSIONS

Has twenty-five permanent members, about 100 life members, also annual, quadrennial and associate members.

The object of this board is to raise funds for the promotion of the home mission work in connection with the General Mission Board of the Christian Church. To this end it shall seek to increase the missionary spirit among our people, and, by correspondence or otherwise, secure organization of Woman's Missionary Boards in the confer-

ences, and of Auxillary societies, Young People's Societies, Glad Gleaners and Cradle Roll Bands.

The Board in the several years of its existence has assumed responsibility for some special fields or missionaries, frontier work, college centers, for the freedmen, church extension and city missions.

All of these lines of work, and the work contemplated for foreign speaking people in the home land, are demanding financial aid far beyond the ability of the General Board to render. It is therefore deemed wise that this year the Woman's Board shall center its energies upon enlarging the general home mission funds.

The conference Woman's Boards and the local societies should enter heartily into the aims and plans of the board. Send all funds through the regular channels till they reach the treasurer, Mrs. Denison. She will remit to the General Board treasurer according to the constitution.

At the July meeting take the offering for the Literature and Mite Box Department.

Observe October as a month of renewed consecration, self-denial and prayer for the work.

In November a Roll Call and Mite Box opening meeting.

Work for 100 new life members this year, \$10 each.

Each society secure at least as many subscribers and renewals to the *Christian Missionary* as there are members in the society.

Disseminate missionary literature, organize Mission Study Classes, secure missionary libraries.

The Woman's Board for Foreign Missions

BY REV. ELLEN G. GUSTIN, President.

The Woman's Board for Foreign Missions has entered upon its twenty-second year. It was organized to help in the support of the Japan mission, and has been active in the work for which it was instituted. The following is the plan on which the Board is organized:

The Woman's Board for Foreign Missions is auxillary to the American Christian Convention. To facilitate work, combine the workers and collect the funds, a Woman's Board for missions was organized in the conferences, known as the —Conference Woman's Mission Board, auxillary to the

Woman's Board of the American Christian Convention; and to make the interest in the work more general and gather in the women of the churches, the local or church missionary society was organized auxiliary to the Conference Woman's Missionary Board. This is the order in which the woman's missionary work has existed to the present.

The Constitution provides for the organization of Young Peoples' and Juvenile Societies, and in connection with the Woman's Board for Home Missions, literature, mite box and cradle roll departments.

When the Board was organized there were 25 permanent members. The Constitution provides that any person may become a life member by the payment of \$25.00; and by this provision the membership has more than doubled.

The Board was incorporated in 1887 by the legislature of Massachusetts, whereby it is authorized to hold and control property.

The money is raised by membership fees and contributions. The Board has contributed, through the treasury of the General Board, toward the support of thirteen missionaries in Japan, established day schools, Sunday-schools, organized churches, built meeting houses, educated native pastors and Bible women, and built homes for the missionaries.

Recently the Mission Board has established the Utsunomiya Christian Girl's School, Utsunomiya, Japan, which the Woman's Board undertakes to support and equip.

The Woman's Board has contributed to the work in Japan, the past twenty-one years, \$28,483.52.

The work planned for the present year is: To make extraordinary effort to encourage all the interest already manifest in the mission fields of our denomination and the general work of the world's evangelization, and arouse, instruct and gather the women of our churches into societies and boards, and so increase the numbers and strengthen by deeply spiritual, earnest, devout trust in and service for the Master, a greatly enlarged power in all the departments of our work.

We have set the standard of \$3,000 to raise for the general work in the Japan field, and the additional sum sufficient to support the Girl's School; if this hope is realized it will be an amount much more than in any previous year. We can do it if we will and we will.

The Woman's Board for Foreign Missions is a permanent institution of the church. It is, we believe, receiving divine favor and growing in the respect and interest of the people.

Annual Message of the Sunday-School Secretary

of the

American Christian Convention

TO THE BROTHERHOOD:—We have little to report as to the work of the past year so far as statistics can show.

Many of our conferences are paying more attention to the Sunday-school work, giving this department larger space in conference programs, and holding Sunday-school institutes during the year. This is good.

The brethren of the Southern Convention are leading in the advance along Sunday-school lines, and their publication in the interest of the work of the young people is a valuable aid to the Sunday-school cause.

We are having frequent calls from various quarters for Sunday-school statistics, and these calls cannot be well met unless provision shall be made for taking complete denominational statistics every year such as are now taken each Quadrennium. For the sake of information and for a better denominational representation in the world's work, steps should be taken to make this possible at an early date.

FINANCIAL.

The amount received from the Sunday-school collection last May and June was

\$171.21. Less the expense account for printing and postage \$18.78, makes a total of \$152.43.

This amount will be disbursed by action of the General Board.

Many of our schools must have ignored the call. Such treatment in any case is a breach of fellowship, and should be so understood by all. The offerings taken were all that the cause requires of the individual school, but the deficit arises when so many of the schools ignore the call. Let us do better next year.

SUGGESTIVE.

Two very important matters pertaining to Sunday-school work are the matters of *organization* and *equipment*.

Too much of our Sunday-school work is done in a haphazard sort of way that tends to demoralize the workers, diminish their interest and defeat their aims.

Too much attention can hardly be paid to the matter of organization. First, Put the right man in the right place. Sometimes the right man is a woman. The interest in Sunday-school work must be developed until we are no longer under the necessity of taking whoever we can get, but may have whoever we need. We cannot always have ideal conditions at the beginning, these conditions must be created, and with the help to be obtained from the workers in the town, county, state, national and international associations, it is easily possible to develop this needed interest in a little time. With the new interest will come additions to the force, and increased efficiency on the part of the workers already engaged. The best talent should be devoted to the Word of God and the kingdom of God. This is fundamental to organization.

Then should follow the best possible division and arrangement of the school into departments and classes according to grade. We have seen children of six years in the class with others of twelve years, and boys of sixteen with men of sixty. Better have classes of two of similar age and attainments than to place the children where interest is impossible, and the teaching is not fitted to the child. Every school can be graded, no matter what the size or the circumstances, and

grading is necessary to proper organization.

At least four departments should be found in every school, viz: the primary, the intermediate, junior and senior. There may be one class or several in each department according to the size of the school.

Class organizations are found very effective, as they foster a class spirit, and also do a large amount of shepherding through the Lookout and Visiting committees appointed by the class.

Shall we not make the perfecting of our organization a part of the work of 1908?

LET US TRY.

The next item relates to the equipment of the school. Farmer's wives sometimes have cause for complaint because their husbands have all the modern improvements in farming implements and machinery, while they are left with all the drudgery of the kitchen and the dairy, besides the family sewing, to be done by hand. More than all others the Sunday-school has suffered from such neglect in the past. Its sessions held in bare and barn-like rooms, seated with stiff and awkward pews, without maps, Bibles, blackboards or charts, with classes crowded so closely as to make the teaching of one a hindrance and a temptation to others. Such, and sometimes worse, are the conditions under which many of our schools are left to work from year to year, lacking adequate equipment according to approved modern standards of excellence, such as should be adopted by those who do this important work in the kingdom of God.

It is to us a privilege to present to our people a cut (see page 37,) of the Sunday-school rooms of the First Christian church Troy, Ohio, and thus to indicate a few of the desirable improvements in Sunday-school architecture and equipment of modern times. We shall be glad to show our rooms to as many Sunday-school workers as may desire to see them, and especially to such as may desire to get suggestions for the improvement of their own equipment in any way. We have some things yet to be desired, but our people are receptive and responsive to high ideals, and further improvement will come in due time. Let us look for an advance all along the line.

Organized Effort

Better organization and more systematic effort are among the important needs of the Christian Church in almost every department from the local church to the American Christian Convention and the Christian Publishing Association. How many of our churches have a perfect church roll—alphabetically arranged—with the address of each member? How many pastors have such a roll at their command and study it until they are familiar with each member, where he lives and what his spiritual or even his moral condition is? How many of our churches are organized for effectual work in building up the church numerically and spiritually, or are even organized to secure the best financial results, to say nothing of numerical or spiritual growth?

Many of our churches, when called upon by the Christian Publishing Association for a list of the members, are unable to furnish it. The Publishing Association needs a carefully prepared and correct roll of the membership of each church. When a church is asked to furnish such a list, she ought to respond quickly and accurately, she should not send in a "slipshod" or a carelessly prepared list with half of the names wrong or the post-office lacking or incorrect. Such a list is of very little or no value to the Publishing Association. It needs a correct list and it wants this list for a purpose. The Christian Publishing Association has need of this list that *it may reach all the membership of the Christian Church directly from the Dayton office with the publications and literature of the Christian Church.*

This year is Centennial Year for the *Herald of Gospel Liberty*, and we hope to make it the banner year of its history. Any one, who thinks for one moment, can see the importance of having a correct list of the members of the church at the Publishing House. When Field Agent Burnett calls for such a list from the church clerk or pastor, do not neglect the call, for it is important.

Each pastor and each clerk is interested

in the growth and success of the Christian Church; if he is not he should resign and get out of the way for some one who is interested in the church, and who is willing to give some time and energy toward enlarging her borders and making her a great power for good in the world. If your church has no church roll, it is very important that you get one; your church needs one, your pastor needs one, your Sunday-school superintendent needs one. Make one and send a copy to Rev. J. F. Burnett, Dayton, Ohio. If every church would do this, every department of our church work would soon feel the vitalizing influence of the pure stream of literature flowing out to the churches from our *Publishing House*; the whole church would be helped and Christ's kingdom would be built up. I appeal to our churches to organize, to get closer together, to be united in the bonds of Christian love and fellowship; for in union there is strength. Many churches have Ladies' Aid Societies, but all should have not only ladies' societies, but men's societies. God's business is too important to trust to the women alone, or to a band of stragglers.

We must have a well organized and trained regular army of the Lord, we must have valient men, who stand shoulder to shoulder and step, step to step, *to do the heavy fighting.* The women, God bless them, can do the red cross work—the nursing of the heart-sick and weary; but the *men must stand in the front rank of battle*; they must put on the whole armor of God and step into the battle line; they must have nails in their shoes so they will not slip back, the nails of faith and trust.

With the Christian Church thoroughly organized and better equipped with literature and knowledge, she will march forward to victories over sin and wrong doing. She will be a Gideon's band with banners flying, with lights flashing and with shouts of victory.

Oldest Church in the Christian Denomination

SWANSEA, MASSACHUSETTS

Rev. Carlyle Summerbell, Pastor. Fifty years ago, B. F. Summerbell, great uncle of the present pastor, was the pastor.

(The following statements are selected from a historical sketch by Rev. J. W. Osborn, Ph. D., who was pastor of this church from June 1864 to January 4, 1889, the time of his death.—Carlyle Summerbell).

Swansea was settled by men who believed in liberty of conscience. Probably it was the only town within the territorial jurisdic-

tion, had learned the lesson of tolerance. Not only did the town in its organic capacity concede freedom of religious opinions, but the church of which he was pastor, although composed of Baptists, admitted to communion all persons who (the original covenant declared), "by a judgment of charity, we conceive to be fellow members with us in our head, Christ Jesus, although differing from us in such controversial points as are not absolutely and essential to salvation."

The successors of Mr. Miles were Calvinistic Baptists, and the church covenant was changed to harmonize with their views.

Perhaps the erection by the town of the "new meeting-house," on the lower end of New Meadow Neck (in what is now Barrington, R. I.) in 1860, may have been one reason why the inhabitants of the "eastern-most part of the town upheld a religious meeting" at a more accessible place.

Although services were maintained from "about the year 1680," there was no formal church organization until 1693. In the original record book (very plainly written and still in ex-

cellent condition) the church is styled simply a "Church of Christ in Swansea." No doctrinal tests were made conditions of admission, but all Christians were recognized as possessing equal rights in the household of faith. Perhaps there was then no other church in all the earth which received as members all Christians irrespective of divergent opinions concerning the various points of speculative theology. In

tion of the Pilgrims which recognized the right of free thought. While all desired freedom for *themselves*, nearly all in that age would "use the sword of the civil magistrate to open the understanding of heretics, or cut them off from the state that they might not infect the church or injure the public peace."

John Miles, the first minister of the town, while exposed to persecution in his native

1725, nearly half a century after the "meeting" was established and a third of a century after the church was organized, it was decided to receive members only by the "laying on of hands." The church was then ecclesiastically independent. From the year 1803 to 1819 it was represented by "messengers" in the "Yearly Meeting of the Six Principal Baptists." After a connection of sixteen years with that body the church withdrew, declaring, "the Lord Jesus Christ the great head of the church to be their leader, and the Scriptures a rule to govern their faith and practice by, and receive their doctrines from." This action was taken February 20, 1820. The church thereby gained the freedom, says the record, "which it enjoyed under the pastoral care of Job and Russell Mason before it was considered a branch of the Yearly Meeting." From that time to the present all persons giving satisfactory evidence of Christian character, have been welcomed to the communion and also to membership in the church. A few years ago the church united with the Rhode Island and Massachusetts Christian Conference, but this relation does not restrict fellowship, as the Conference discards doctrinal tests in regard to subjects concerning which Christians differ in opinion.

As there was for thirteen years a congregation without a church, so there was a religious service without a clergyman. The record book says: "We upheld a religious meeting partly by some improving their gifts among us and partly by helps from other places. In 1693, Thomas Barnes was ordained pastor. It had been represented that he was a man of some note in Plymouth Colony. He was one of the original proprietors of the town, although a very young man when the first settlement occurred. According to the system of 'ranking' adopted soon after the charter of Swansea was obtained, Mr. Barnes belonged to the 'second class' of the landed aristocracy, as did also Samuel Luther who succeeded John Miles as pastor of the Baptist church. The Colonial Record affords incidental but positive proof that the 'Court' acknowledged the validity of his claim to be recognized as a clergyman, notwithstanding that he was a 'Separatist.'"

Among the former soldiers of Cromwell who came to this country at the time of the restoration of the Stuart family to the English throne was one Samson Mason. One of the sons, Isaac, was the first deacon of this church; another son, Joseph, succeeded Mr. Barnes as pastor; a third son of Samson Mason, Pelatiah, was the father of three ministers, Job, Russell and John, two of them serving as pastors of this church, as also did their cousin Benjamin, son of Samson Mason, Jr., these prophets not being without honor in their own country and among their own kin.

The oldest son of the first Samson Mason bore his name. He remained unmarried until about seventy-three years of age; when he was eighty the youngest of his four children was born. It will be noticed that the posterity of the sturdy soldier evinced by their longevity the possession of some of the characteristics which gave to the adherents of the Protector the appellation of "Oliver's Ironsides." For more than a century the successive pastors bore his name, and the one who died youngest attained the age of eighty years.

The first meeting of the voters of the parish of which there is a record, took place in 1719, the congregation concurring with the church in the election of Joseph Mason as pastor. He had long served in that capacity, and this action was taken to avoid legal difficulties. The town of Barrington had not long before been set off from Swansea that a Puritan minister might be supported therein by taxation, repeated efforts, beginning about the time of the ordination of Mr. Barnes, having failed to induce or compel the undivided township to conform to the custom which prevailed elsewhere without the colony. The inhabitants of the remaining portion of the town disliked both the exclusive spirit of Puritanism and the system of taxation for the support of religious institutions. When Mr. Mason was in due form pronounced the lawful pastor, he publicly declared himself satisfied with the voluntary contributions of the congregation for his subsistence, and expressly waived all claim to support by taxation, while recognizing the duty of all "to uphold and main-

tain ye ministry and worship of God in ye several churches or congregations where they respectively belong or assenble, and not in any other church or congregation."

At one time there was dissatisfaction on the part of several members because the majority "would not approbate women's speaking in public in the church by way of exhortation." The church censured those disaffected members, but subsequently the censure was by unanimous vote expressly revoked.

In the Puritan churches of New England there was (even within a time quite recent) a strong prejudice against kindling fires in a house of worship. But the builders of the

meeting-house of 1720 did not share that superstition. Two platforms of brick were constructed, each surrounded by a row of brick turned up edge-wise (with no outlet for smoke or gas) and in cold weather charcoal fires were kept burning upon them.

Possibly this is the oldest church in Massachusetts which never had a legal connection with a town. A brief outline of events connected with its history has been given, but the real history of a church (and especially of one including among its members so many generations with modes of thought, and life so divergent) can never be written. The effects of moral forces no man can chronicle, for no man can comprehend.



Sectarianism

We understand a Sect to be a church organized upon a basis too narrow for the admission of all Christians, *as Christians simply*. I understand a sectarian to be an exclusionist—to be void of the catholic spirit of Christianity; and that we regard *sect* as differing from *schism* only as posterior from prior.

mentor of infernal discords! thou art fattening upon the bleeding hearts and ruined souls of men! thou who hast mangled and torn asunder the mystic body of the Son of God! thou who hast mocked His expiring agonies, and set at nought his dying prayer! Archfiend of the universe! God hasten thy return to thy native hell.

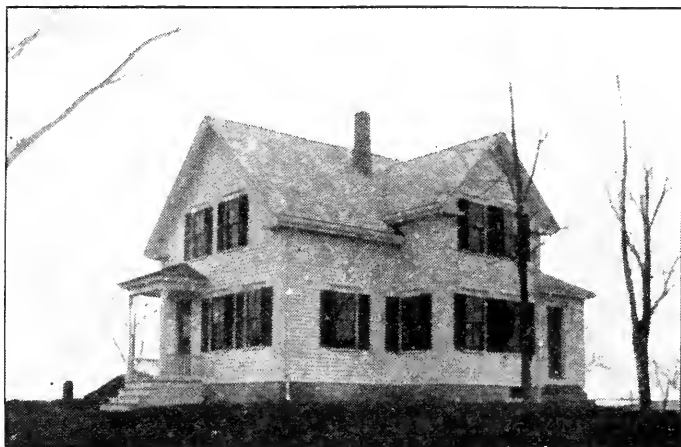

The Christian Camp-Meeting Association, Craigville, Mass.

(Reported by Vice-President Morrill.)

This Association is incorporated under the laws of Massachusetts and owns the public property, consisting of a tabernacle, Craigville Inn, a cottage, the streets and unsold lots in this village by the sea, and conducts annually religious meetings of a full week, commencing "Monday following the last Sunday in July." The location of the grounds is beautiful, on the south shore of Cape Cod, in the town of Barnstable, about three miles from the village of Hyannis, where is also the railroad station. The first series of meetings was held here in 1872, several years before the Association was incorporated, or owned any property here. There were fifty ministers of our denomination present during the meetings and about twenty of other denominations. Several were converted during the meetings, and Rev. J. C. Emery, then pastor of the Haverhill Church, baptized three persons. The presidents have been: Rev. William Miller, Rev. S. W. Butler, Rev. O. A. Roberts, Rev. I. H. Coe, Rev. Martyn Summerbell, D. The home mission work of this convention, as shown by the report of the president of the Christian Missionary Association at the last meeting of the Southern Convention, is in successful operation. The Association, in addition to aiding special points, maintains two general missionaries in its bounds. As regards foreign missions, there is a steady growth of interest. A special call was made upon the conference for missions at the late session of the Convention.

The officers of the Christian Missionary Association are: Rev. J. O. Atkinson, D. D., President, Elon College, N. C.; Rev. I. W. Johnson, secretary, Suffolk, Va. The Association meets Tuesday after the first Sunday in December, 1907.

The report of the Committee on Schools and Colleges, made at Burlington, N. C., shows Elon College to be highly successful and the endowment increased to \$30,000. That the churches composing the Convention pay a fixed sum annually of \$1,800 for Elon College. Thus the college is freed from embarrassment as to its future progress. In 1904, it was decided to build a new dormitory to cost about \$20,000, with modern equipments. This building is now completed at a cost of about \$40,000. It contains music rooms and art studio, in addition to accommodations for about one hundred young ladies. Prof. E. L. Moffitt, Elon College, N. C., is president of the college, and its financial affairs are entrusted to him.

The Orphanage, projected by the Convention, is now opened, and is under the management of Rev. J. L. Foster, superintendent, Elon College, N. C. He is also the authorized financial agent. *The Christian Sun* was purchased by the Southern Convention and Rev. J. O. Atkinson, D. D., elected editor.
