Report of Executive Board read and, on motion, adopted as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Your Executive Board has been called upon to consider many matters during the past biennium. A detailed report of the work done is herewith submitted for your careful consideration and approval. The items dealing with the order to have the Southern Christian Convention incorporated, and the provisions for issuing \$500,000 in bonds by the Convention are quite lengthy, but it is very important that all this matter shall be included in the records of this Convention.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE S. C. C., INC.

The Executive Board of the Southern Christian Convention, Inc., met at Elon College, N. C., May 27, 1924, and approved the proceedings of the Special Committee, held in Suffolk, Va., on May 21, 1924, the minutes of the meeting of the incorporators of the S. C. C., Inc., the minutes of the Directors of the S. C. C., Inc., and the certificate of Incorporation of the S. C. C., Inc., as follows:

MINUTES OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

Suffolk, Va., May 21, 1924.

The Special Committee appointed by the Southern Christian Convention to take steps to make effective the following resolutions:

"That the Southern Christian Convention issue its bonds executed in behalf of the Convention by the President, countersigned by the Secretary, under seal of the corporation, to cover the indebtedness and financial requirements of Elon and Bethlehem Colleges, providing, over a term of twenty years, for the retirement of interest and principal of the same, thus replacing these schools on a safe financial basis. This would require \$500,000—\$400,000 for Elon and \$100,000 for Bethlehem,"

met in Suffolk, Va., today at 11 A. M., with all members present. Dr. W. W. Staley was also present, and Col. J. E. West for part of the time.

After discussion, the following form of bond was prepared, to be submitted to the Board of Trustees of Elon and Bethlehem Colleges and to the Executive Board of the Southern Christian Convention for approval, to-wit:

It was unanimously voted that the following be elected officers of the Southern Christian Convention, Inc., for the unexpired term of two years ending in April, 1926: President, L. E. Smith; Vice-President, N. G. Newman; Secretary, I. W. Johnson; Assistant Secretary, Mary Andrews; Treasurer, W. C. Wicker; Executive Board: L. E. Smith, I. W. Johnson, E. E. Holland.

It was unanimously voted that the above elected directors of the S. C. C.,

Inc., have the power to make and alter the by-laws of the corporation. Such directors to serve for an unexpired term of two years ending at the April, 1926, session of said Convention. The said Board of Directors and their successors shall be vested with full power to manage and control the business and affairs of the corporation, subject to the superior power of the members of the corporation in regular or special session or of the Executive Board during the recess of the Convention.

2. It was moved and carried that it is the sense of the board that the Board of Religious Education, under provision 5, page 35 of the printed minutes of

the last session of the Convention, shall send a contribution to the Board of Christian Education of the General Christian Convention equal to the amount received from the offerings to be raised in November, 1924.

3. It was moved and carried that the matter and cost of memorials (see page 24, minutes 1924 session S. C. C.) be fully determined upon by the committee, and contributions be asked for to pay the cost.

4. It was moved and carried that the President of the Convention be responsible for submitting to the various Conferences the matter of increased apportionments, pages 35 and 39.

5. It was moved and carried that the office of the Southern Christian Convention, Inc., shall be located in the Alamance Building, at Elon College.

6. It was moved and carried that the President shall defer the sale of any Convention bonds until authorized by the Executive Board.

7. It was moved and carried that the managing editor shall be elected as agent to sell books and periodicals for the Convention.

8. It was moved and carried that a copy of the Principles and Government of the Christian Church be presented to every ministerial student of the Christian Church in Elon College.

9. It was moved and carried that it is the sense of the board that some fitting memorial to Dr. W. S. Long should be located at Elon College, and the college trustees are requested to consider the matter.

10. It was moved and carried that the President be authorized to draw orders for payments to General Convention, for Federal Council and other co-operative work as required by Convention order.

11. It was moved and carried that the Board of Education limit loans to ministerial students to \$200.00 annually.

12. It was moved and carried that W. A. Harper, J. O. Atkinson and C. D. Johnston be appointed a special committee to handle the matter of making loans to ministerial students.

13. It was moved and carried that it is the sense of the board that the contract for printing *The Christian Sun* implies that the bonus of \$3,000.00 (see page 36) shall be paid from the Men and Millions Fund when there is not sufficient money in the Convention Fund to pay same.

Minutes of the meeting of the Executive Board and heads of departments of the Southern Christian Convention, held in Suffolk Christian Church, September 22, 1925:

Called to order by L. E. Smith, President. Prayer by W. W. Staley. Minutes of last meeting read. Dr. J. O. Atkinson reported that plans and specifications for the Lebanon Memorial had been prepared and accepted. He also reported that the committee on the O'Kelly Memorial has decided to recommend the placing of the memorial on Elon College campus, if possible.

Dr. W. A. Harper reported that provision has been made for a memorial to Dr. W. S. Long at Elon College.

It was moved and carried that the President submit to the next session of the Western N. C. Conference the matter of the increased apportionment.

It was moved and carried that it is the sense of this body that restrictions made against general appeals during the term of the Men and Millions campaign terminated May 1, 1925.

It was moved and carried that no appeals for funds by departments be made to the constituency of the Convention until authorized by the Convention or Executive Board.

It was moved and carried that it is the sense of this board that the action of the Convention relating to the issuance of \$500,000.00 in bonds included the authority of Elon College Board of Trustees to handle the bonds in all details in the sum of \$400,000.00, including the collection of interest on same; and that the Board of Trustees of Bethlehem College handle the \$100,000.00 allotted to Bethlehem in the same way.

It was moved and carried that the President appoint a commission of finance to study and submit to the next session of the Southern Convention such matters as pertain to the financial policy of the Convention.

It was suggested that the next session of the Convention deal largely with matters touching finance, principles and polity of the Christian Church, mission, evangelism, etc.

Report of Board of Trustees for Christian Orphanage read by W. K. Holt, chairman. After discussion by W. K. Holt, C. D. Johnston, superintendent, the report was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CHRISTIAN ORPHANAGE.

For twenty years the Christian Orphanage has been giving a home to the homeless, providing food for the nourishment of the body and raiment to keep the body warm and comfortable. It has tried to educate and train the mind of the child that it might have an equal chance in life with other children. It has also tried in an humble way to point the children to the higher life that they might take the straight and narrow road in life that leads ever onward and upward. The Orphanage had a small beginning more than twenty years ago, and its progress has not been as rapid as it might have been under more favorable circumstances; but those who had faith and those who had

love in their hearts for fatherless children and widows in distress have stood by it all these years, and it has grown in usefulness in service to the helpless, and has also been able to add to its material value from year to year.

We are glad that the Christian denomination has an orphanage for the care of fatherless children, that it may show the world that it is ready and willing to do its part in service to humanity. We feel that we have much to praise God for during this biennium. The health of our children has been extremely good. For practically two years we did not have a child sick enough to be confined to its room, and for two years we have not had a child placed in the infirmary. God has been mindful of us, and we are grateful.

SCHOOL.

We have succeeded in making arrangements with the school board of the town to take all our children in the public school for the entire term by paying a stipulated amount of money to help defray the teachers' salaries. This is a fine arrangement and far less expensive to the Orphanage than if we had to furnish school facilities for our children. Our children get the advantage of mingling with the children in the community and are not isolated as in years past.

FARM.

Our farm is improved from year to year, and when we have favorable seasons we are able to make much of the stuff we use in the Orphanage, thereby cutting down running expenses.

Last year was an extremely dry year, but our farm shows a profit, and if we had had a favorable season we would have made a bumper crop.

DAIRY.

Our dairy herd is growing better year by year. We are working to the end in view to a full herd of Holstein cows and hope in the next few years to accomplish this. Our herd is now producing something like thirty gallons of milk per day. A quart for each child is required by the State Board of Health.

PORK.

Two of our little boys raised 5,200 pounds of pork last season, and we feel very proud of this record.

The good women of our denomination have been extremely good to us and have made and sent us quilts, sheets, pillow cases, dresses for the little girls and suits for the little boys, for which we are very grateful indeed.

The demand upon us has grown from year to year, and last year the Board thought it wise to undertake to build another building to care for something like thirty children, and after prayerful consideration this was undertaken, the contract let, and the building is now under construction. It is well planned and modern in every way, and is a magnificent structure and an addition to our Orphanage plant which our Church may well be proud of. It will enable us to grade the children in three grades according to size and age and will make it much easier on the general management. We have been able to finance this proposition so far without going in debt, and we hope to be able to finance it through.

We can present to you today an Orphanage plant worth \$150,000.00 in real assets, with 110 children in its care and no indebtedness on it.

God has been good to us, and to Him is given all the praise.

We recommend that you order that the number of Trustees be eight instead of seven.

The above collections do not cover the items coming through the regular channels of Conference, Men and Millions and Convention, since these items go directly to the Treasurer of the Convention and are transmitted to the treasurer of the Mission Board by drafts from the President of the Convention.

SUNDAY SCHOOL MISSIONS.

One of the most gratifying features of our mission work is the increasing interest in missions in our Sunday Schools. With the exception of a very few, our active and progressive Sunday Schools have adopted the plan ratified by this Convention of giving one offering per month for missions. We feel that this creates interest in missions where it will do most good in the future, and so we urge this plan be continued and emphasized in all our schools. The schools should be deeply interested in missions and should be giving donations and fre-

quent missionary programs. Donations from our Sunday Schools last two years amounted to \$8,327.82. We have faith to believe that we shall in the future receive not only increasing funds from this source, but missionary recruits for the field. Missionary teaching must be given to the youth, and there is no better place for this than in the Sunday School.

OUR WOMAN'S MISSIONARY WORK.

The most rapidly growing element of our missionary work, as well as the most gratifying, has been that among our women. During the past two years they have turned in through the Treasurer of this Convention to our mission treasurer designated sums to the amount of \$15,729.15. The Woman's Conferences are very largely attended, especially in North Carolina and Eastern Virginia, and those of the other Conferences are on the increase in attendance and interest. We feel that the women, because of their mission study courses and their monthly missionary meetings, are making more actual progress in missionary vision and development than the men in the Churches. It would be well indeed if the men of the Church would study the missionary study books, that they might not be left behind in gaining intelligence about the present world movement through missionary endeavor. Our women are certainly to be commended for the splendid work they are doing.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Since our last report to this body, we have paid to the work in Japan and Porto Rico \$25,735.19. This includes specials to Japan of \$4,814.42, and to Porto Rico of \$3,211.65. Working under the auspices of the General Convention, there are in Japan ten missionaries, and in Porto Rico four. This does not include sixteen native pastors in Japan and four native pastors in Porto Rico. There was a falling off in receipts for the foreign work last year, and owing to the fact that five missionaries were sent out in 1923 we have been brought into indebtedness. There are other missionaries ready to go out, but cannot be sent for lack of funds.

The Executive Committee of the Convention asked the Conferences to ratify a call for an Emergency Mission Fund during the spring of the present year, the amount called for being \$25,000.00. Up to the present (April 15th), there had been received on this fund \$7,517.52. While the response has not been as liberal as was anticipated, there was universal approval of the undertaking, and practically all the Churches of the Convention have made an offering, much of which is yet to be sent in. "Mission Month" gave an opportunity for missionary instruction and propaganda not heretofore enjoyed by our Churches and people.

MEN AND MILLIONS.

The board has looked after collecting Men and Millions the past two years to the best of its ability and understanding. We have sent out frequent notices and endeavored to advise each subscriber amount of balance due, in addition to receiving and receipting all funds as they came in. These funds, as collected, have been turned over to Mr. C. D. Johnston, executive secretary, whose report elsewhere will show what has been done in this particular. We are of opinion that the Convention should fix a definite date for the clearing or collecting of these accounts. Conditions and circumstances have changed quite materially since the pledges were made, and it would seem to be the part of wisdom that these pledges be canceled or diverted to some specific cause, as the individual may direct, after December 31, 1925.

COMMENT.

The Mission Board has certain pledges which it is exceedingly anxious to discharge, and will do so as rapidly as funds are available. These obligations, in the form of promissory notes due as of April 1, 1926, are \$14,600.00.

In addition to these obligations, the following pledges by the board have already been made:

South Norfolk, Va.	\$ 8,000.00
Raleigh, N. C.	7,000.00

To be paid in 3 to 4 years.....	\$16,666.00

The board is under obligations to pay to our foreign missions account \$6,-500.00 out of the first funds becoming available. We feel that, owing to the imperative need in our foreign work, special emphasis should be given to this obligation, and the same should be paid at the earliest possible date.

The board is exceedingly anxious to begin constructive work in the home field at an early date, but at its last session decided not to incur further obligations or pledges until present obligations and demands had been met. Owing to the very great lack of income from Men and Millions, the board had been handicapped, and will be until resources shall come in adequate to meet the demands of pledges and obligations undertaken from estimated income of Men and Millions.

CHURCH MEMBERSHIP.

At the session of the Convention two years ago we reported the total membership of the Churches composing the Conferences of this Convention to be 28,635. We are gratified to report an increase in our membership during the biennium of 3,247, giving a total Church membership at present of 31,882, or an increase of about eleven and one-seventh per cent. While this increase is by no means what it should be, we take courage in that it is far more than that of the previous biennium.

WORK IN CARROLL COUNTY, VA.

In co-operation with our Woman's Board, this board is doing some much-needed and constructive work in Carroll County, Va. We have now two ample Church and school buildings combined whose cost of construction was something over \$7,000.00. In these buildings we maintain regular preaching and Sunday Schools on Sunday, and for six months in the year week-day schools also. Rev. M. T. Sorrell, pastor in charge, has had three competent and consecrated assistants the past winter. We have found the people of the remote mountain districts appreciative, worthy and willing to co-operate and anxious to improve their condition. We have two regularly organized Christian Churches, both of which are now members of our North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference.

NEGRO CHURCHES.

There are in the territory covered by our Convention several Conferences and a host of Churches of negro Christians. Your board feels that, with some effort on the part of the Convention, these Churches and people could be very materially aided to better organizations and more efficient service in the name of our Lord. Either by fraternal messengers or by visitation and assistance on the part of our pastors and others interested, we ourselves would be benefited, and in turn might be of service to these Churches and Conferences. We suggest that our secretary gather statistical information with reference to the negro Christians and publish same in *The Christian Sun*.

STEWARDSHIP.

Your Mission Board is overwhelmed with the appalling need and the woeful lack of definite teaching of the plain biblical gospel of stewardship among our Churches and people. We need to realize, as never before, that God is the Owner of all, and we are stewards in charge for a season. We need definite, continuous, constructive teaching in stewardship. To this end, we urge every Conference composing this Convention to give place on their annual programs

for discussion on stewardship, and that each Conference have either a secretary of stewardship or a committee on stewardship. We highly endorse the great work Dr. W. H. Denison is doing as Stewardship Secretary of our General Convention.

MISSIONARY INTEREST INCREASING.

Your board feels that, while expected resources from Men and Millions and other movements were not realized as desired, yet missionary information and interest are increasing, and if we are to do our work as a part of a great Church, must increase more and more. We should earnestly pray that the day may soon come when our missionary offerings shall be many times what they are now, and that there shall be in the foreign field and at home many missionaries giving their full time to planting and building Churches and congregations and carrying the gospel to those who have it not. To this end, we solicit the prayers and co-operation of Christians throughout the Convention and in all our Zion.

Address: "The Pastor's Part in the Program of Evangelism," by Dr. R. C. Helfenstein.

Dr. W. W. Staley made a report of his visit to the Afro-American Christian Convention in Baltimore, in June, 1924.

REPORT OF DR. W. W. STALEY.

On Friday, May 2, 1924, the Southern Christian Convention, in Norfolk, Va., elected Revs. W. W. Staley, L. E. Smith, and J. O. Atkinson fraternal delegates to the Afro-Christian Convention, which met in the People's Christian Church, 423 North Bond Street, Baltimore, Md., June 15-20, 1924.

Drs. Smith and Atkinson could not attend, so I went alone by Chesapeake steamer on the night of June 16th, and attended the Convention on the 17th (one day) Dr. S. A. Howell, of Newport News, Va., was president, and that meant order and dispatch of business. The session was well attended, the proceedings were well conducted, the singing was fine.

I was introduced to the Convention, delivered greeting from the S. C. C., and then delivered an address, in which I contrasted the characteristics of the white and black races. I was received in a Christian spirit, tried to respond in the same way, and I am sure that such exchange of interests helps the cause of Jesus Christ and the Church. I enjoyed the day, and feel that the time and cost were not without good fruit.

Report of Committee on Memorials read by Judge J. F. West, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

The committee, appointed at the last session of this Convention, "whose business shall be to decide upon a suitable memorial to the memory of James O'Kelly and a suitable marker on the spot of Old Lebanon Church, in Surry County, Va."—beg leave to submit the following:

THE LEBANON MARKER.

We secured the necessary order from the Circuit Court of Surry County, Va., vesting the title to the Old Lebanon Christian Church lot, near Surry Courthouse, Va., containing one acre, in the trustees of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference.

A proceeding was then instituted in the same court in the name of the trustees, in which a decree was entered, authorizing them, after reserving a lot about 41x61 feet as the monument site, to sell the residue of the land in three parcels. The style of the chancery case in which this decree was secured is "*In re Trustees Lebanon Christian Church Lot.*"

One parcel was sold to the State of Virginia as a right of way for State highway No. 10. The land on the north side of the highway was sold to J. W. Enos. The land on the south side of the highway, except the reservation for the monument site, was sold to Ella White. The aggregate sales amounted to \$105.00. After deducting all expenses, the net balance of \$87.40 was deposited on interest-bearing certificate in the Bank of Waverly, Waverly, Va., payable to J. O. Atkinson, treasurer of your committee, to be used in aid of the purchase and erection of a suitable monument on the reservation.

The plot showing the division of the Church lot into parcels, including the reservation for the monument site on the south side of the highway, is duly recorded in the clerk's office of the Circuit Court of Surry County, along with the deed to Ella White.

Your committee agreed that the monument to mark the site of Lebanon Church should be constructed of the best granite, with two bronze tablets made of best United States standard bronze.

Your committee let the work to the lowest bidder and awarded the contract to erect a monument of the best Petersburg granite, as per plans and specifications submitted, including two bronze tablets made of United States standard bronze and four granite posts all complete, to Burns & Campbell, of Petersburg, Va., for \$770.00. The concrete around the monument and walkway to the highway to be built by them at cost to the contractors, not to exceed \$2.25 per yard, and they to furnish two additional posts to mark the ten-foot right of way across one end of the reservation, free of charge. Total cost estimated \$850.00. Plans and specifications are herewith submitted, to which we invite attention.

The following inscription is to appear on the tablet on the front of the monument: "This monument marks the site of Lebanon Church, where the founders of the Christian Church, who had declared for religious liberty and accepted the Bible as their only creed, on August 4, 1794, adopted the name 'Christian,' to the exclusion of all party or sectarian names. Erected by the Southern Christian Convention in 1926."

The following inscription is to appear on the tablet on the back of the monument:

"Principles of the Christian Church.

1. The Lord Jesus Christ is the only head of the Church.
2. Christian a sufficient name for the Church.
3. The Holy Bible a sufficient rule of faith and practice.
4. Christian character a sufficient test of fellowship and membership.
5. The right of private judgment and liberty of conscience a right and privilege of all."

O'KELLY MEMORIAL.

For the O'Kelly marker, your committee recommends that there be placed on the campus at Elon College, exact site to be designated by the board of trustees of the college, an Egyptian-style memorial, according to plans and specifications herewith submitted, the material to be of the best Winnisboro granite, total height to be eleven feet, total weight 16,000 pounds. We present herewith blue-prints and details, to which your committee invites attention and suggestions.

The cost of the Old Lebanon memorial will be \$850.00. That of the O'Kelly memorial \$1,275.00; a total of \$2,125.00. We have in bank subject to the order of the Convention \$105.75.

We recommend that steps be taken to secure the remainder of funds needed to erect these memorials, and that the work be pushed to completion as soon as funds are available; and that the Committee on Memorials be continued till the work is completed.

The President appointed the Committee on Loans to audit the report. Report of Committee on Religious Education was read by Dr. W. T. Walters and, on motion, adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

In a world where men do not know, you can command; in a world where men think, you can only direct. The child world of a generation ago was one of limited knowledge and restricted observation which made it easier to secure obedience in the home. With the passing of the decades, the child has been growing into a larger world knowledge and thought. The independent class of young people today is the product of our better educational advantages and larger opportunities of observation. They are thinking for themselves, and the force that controls them must be directive rather than coercive. If we are to save them for the Church and kingdom, we must concentrate our efforts in the preparation of spiritual leaders. It is this need—this crying demand of the hour—that has brought the various religious educational organizations into being. The most far-reaching work of the Church today is its leadership training.

Your Board of Religious Education, since its formation in 1918, has been endeavoring to meet this need in the Churches of the Southern Christian Convention, as far as our limited means would permit. We have kept a secretary in the field most of the time, have assisted in better organization of the schools and Christian Endeavor Societies, and conducted daily vacation Bible schools.

We have promoted and furnished teachers for teacher-training classes, held institutes, assisted in organization of Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions, and in planning and promoting the annual programs of said conventions, conducted Chautauqua and School of Methods at Elon and Bethlehem Colleges, in addition to regular field and office work in securing statistics and furnishing information and literature. The Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Handbook has been published both years of the biennium.

Daily vacation Bible schools have been conducted in the following Churches in the last two years: Eastern Virginia Conference—Christian Temple, First Church, Norfolk; Portsmouth, First and Elm Avenue; Richmond, Newport News, Holland and Holy Neck, Franklin, Suffolk, Waverly; North Carolina Conferences—Burlington, Elon College with Chautauqua, Greensboro First, Henderson, Bethel; Virginia Valley—Bethlehem, Winchester, Antioch, Linville; Alabama—Wadley, with Chautauqua.

The office work has included maintaining a bureau of information, preparation for "Children's Day," including issuance of special program, furnishing material for *Christian Sun* and other periodicals, and all work incident to the two annual Chautauquas. Christian Endeavor notes have been furnished for *The Sun* by the field secretary, and the Sunday School notes by Rev. H. S. Hardcastle, to whom the board wishes to express its deep appreciation.

We wish to record our appreciation for the helpful co-operation of the Board of Christian Education of the General Convention of the Christian Church, through its chairman, Dr. W. A. Harper, and the regional director of Christian education of Rev. J. H. Lightbourne, and for the services of Mr. Hermon Eldredge, who has served on faculty at both the Elon and Bethlehem Chautauquas, and Miss Lucy M. Eldredge, who has given more than three months of time to the Southern Convention during this biennium, and for lit-

erature which has been furnished for all phases of our work by the General Board.

PLANS.

We plan to co-operate in every way in our power with Churches planning to hold daily vacation Bible schools this summer. There is a decided increase in interest in this phase of our work, and to the limit of our resources we plan to provide information, promote and furnish workers to help in this work.

We plan to promote leadership training, through local training classes, through training classes for a week in centers, and through our two Chautauquas, and also that more and more our Convention programs may be planned to become agencies in leadership training.

In order that our Sunday Schools may determine to what extent they are meeting the needs of their respective communities, the board is hoping to arrange for a community survey in each locality, plans and promotion in charge of field secretary.

In our Elon program for this summer, eight standard credit courses will be offered. Next year, or as soon as the books are available, we shall hope to offer the newly worked out courses, including the high school level course, standard course (representing freshman and sophomore college work), and the graduate, or advanced course.

The board, in session at Elon College, in August, 1925, voted to endeavor to organize the young people of the Southern Christian Convention into young people's congresses. Some progress has been made, and we plan to promote young people's work throughout all parts of the Convention in every way in our power.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

That each Church send two or more representatives to the summer schools at Elon and Bethlehem each year, paying all or a part of their expenses.

In view of the two separate offerings which we have been taking, one for our board and one for the Board of Christian Education of the General Convention, we recommend the combining of the two.

That this board request the Board of Christian Education of the General Convention to elect the field secretary of this board as regional director for the South.

Report of the Board of Education was read by Dr. W. A. Harper, Chairman, and, on motion, adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Education is a continuous process. The years spent in school and college are most valuable in developing habits of thought and attitudes of life. In Christian colleges, these years should prepare us to live with and for each other and unto God as revealed in Jesus Christ. Particularly speaking, they should lead to the understanding of the persons whom we seek to influence for Christ, enable us to develop the resources for character building which the gospel puts at our disposal, and help us find the most effective point of contact for the Christian message in circles with which the Church is now practically out of touch. The ultimate goal of Christian education is a redeemed humanity and a social order completely dominated by the spirit of our Master.

The Universal Christian Conference on Life and Work issued a statement for the world, from which we quote two paragraphs, as follows:

"Christian education, to be effective, must begin at home. On this we all agree. If we have failed in the larger sphere, it is because we have first of

all failed there. We have spoken of love, and too often our conduct has given our words the lie. We have preached brotherhood and lived as strangers, sometimes even as enemies. Much has been said, and rightly, about the impossibility of a Christian society apart from the Christian individuals who compose it, and doubts have been expressed even in this conference as to whether such a society is really possible. But may it not prove that one reason why the Christianization of society as a whole seems so impossible is because we who call ourselves Christians have made so poor a showing in the sphere in which we profess to believe that the Christian life is possible? With one heart and mind we confess our common sin; and pray for that life-giving Spirit which is able to renew and to transform each surrendered soul.

"We recognize the present need of education. The individual must be educated by the Church so that he may be expected to experience a Christian discernment in all things. The churches must educate themselves by study, conference, and prayer, so that being led by the spirit of truth into all truth, they may be enabled in increasing measure to apprehend the mind of Christ. We recognize that the root of evil is to be found in the human will, and we, therefore, desire to re-emphasize our conviction that this will must be surrendered to the high and holy will of God, whose service is perfect freedom. Even Christian ideas and ideals cannot save the world, being separated from their personal source in the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, and unless these are taken up into the personal life of the believer."

ELON AND LEADERSHIP TRAINING.

The Mooney Christian Education Building gives Elon College an unique opportunity of service to the Church. It is the first instance of a Laboratory Building in Christian Education in an American college. The course of study given in Elon's Department of Christian Education is designed to train young people to be directors of religious education in local churches, to prepare for seminary and graduate work in the same subjects, and to qualify a much larger group for efficient work as volunteer lay workers in our churches. Those who complete the courses Bible I and Religious Education I are awarded the International Certificate in Teacher Training. After this work is completed, those who desire to go further in the department are given advanced courses in both Bible and Religious Education and used as teachers in the Week Day Religious School maintained as the laboratory of the department. Prof. S. A. Bennett is the director of this work.

THE EMERGENCY BUILDING PROGRAM.

Soon after the fire of January 18, 1923, the Board of Trustees of the college created two committees which will become historic in the history of Elon. These were The Emergency Fund and The Building Committees. The members of the Emergency Fund Committee were Col. E. E. Holland, chairman, Dr. I. W. Johnson, recording secretary, Col. J. E. West, P. J. Carlton, J. D. Gray (deceased), Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Hon. K. B. Johnson, Dr. W. H. Boone, Dr. L. E. Smith, Dr. W. W. Staley, Dr. E. L. Moffitt, and W. A. Harper, field agent. The Building Committee consisted of W. A. Harper, chairman, D. R. Fonville, secretary, Dr. R. M. Morrow, Chas. D. Johnston, Col. Robert L. Holt (deceased), and Col. F. L. Williamson. These committees functioned if ever committees did, and a new Elon is the result. The new building program has cost \$787,121.10. The details are given herewith.

As a protection against its debt the College and its friends are carrying \$215,000.00 insurance on the life of the president. The insurance carried on the buildings and equipment is \$600,000.00. During the year 1925-26, the College has reduced its indebtedness \$85,000.00.

Elon has enrolled her full quota of 400 students for the year 1925-26.

ELON'S FINANCIAL NEEDS.

Elon has asked the Special Committee on Finance for \$36,750.00 annually, which includes interest on the note of \$112,500 given the college several years ago and which has been paid by the Conference Apportionment. The College's asking is for 6 per cent interest on this note. The remainder of Elon's asking, \$30,000.00, is to aid in caring for the balance due on the Emergency Building Program.

Elon needs to bring her endowment speedily to \$1,000,000.00, and to secure large gifts for the liquidation of the indebtedness. All payments on the principal of the indebtedness will be credited on the Convention Bonds, and bonds in corresponding amounts surrendered to the Convention Treasurer.

BETHLEHEM COLLEGE.

Bethlehem College, Wadley, Ala., is doing an educational work for Georgia and Alabama. Rev. H. W. Elder is financial agent to secure funds for a much needed Administration Building to cost \$50,000.00 on which work has already begun. We understand that they have pledges to meet the expense

*The Convention is to be asked to vote the full \$500,000.00 in bonds for Elon at this session. Two years ago only \$400,000.00 of them were specifically voted to Elon.

of this building. We congratulate them and hope their constituency will see them through with the proposition. Dr. S. L. Beougher, as president, and his faculty are doing a fine work for the Church in their efforts and sacrifices for Bethlehem.

Bethlehem's assets are \$29,200, invested in buildings and equipment, and the Convention note for endowment of \$12,500.00, making a total of \$41,700.00. There is a mortgage indebtedness of \$11,050.00 and current indebtedness of \$6,356.00, making a total of \$17,406.00 indebtedness. This makes the net assets \$24,296.00. This however does not include the \$100,000.00 of Convention Bonds voted to Bethlehem two years ago and which were returned to the vault of Elon College, awaiting the Convention's further instructions. We recommend that these bonds be given to the Board of Trustees of Elon College on the same terms as the \$400,000.00 they already hold.

Bethlehem asks the Special Committee on Finance to include them in the budget for \$10,000.00 next year for current expenses.

The enrollment this year has been 116, and there are ten members of the faculty.

President Beougher says he must secure for endowment shortly an additional \$250,000.00.

We recommend nine additional trustees be allowed Bethlehem College at this time.

DRS. LONG AND BARRETT AND MR. CORWITH.

Dr. W. S. Long, a member of this Board, has passed to his reward since the last session of the Convention. Dr. Long was the first president of Elon College and led in its founding. His death came as a shock to a host that loved and honored him.

Dr. J. Pressley Barrett died while the Convention was in session two years ago. He was a trustee of Elon College and did constructive work in creating sentiment for the College's founding. His death removed a valiant and trusted friend of Christian Education from our active leadership.

Elon has done what she could to express its appreciation for these distinguished leaders. Bronze tablets on the walls of the rotunda of the Alamance Building memorialize them and their great labors. We beg leave to quote these tablets in full as follows:

REV. WILLIAM SAMUEL LONG, A. M., D. D.

Oct. 23, 1839—Aug. 3, 1924

Founder and First President of Elon College

Christian Minister, Christian Educator, Christian Statesman
Christian Gentleman. A man great in faith, whole hearted in
consecration, consistently energetic, and possessed of rare

Feb. 5, 1852—May 1, 1924

Minister, Religious Journalist and Author

As a man, pious and devout; as an editor, a staunch defender
of the truth; as an author, concerned only for the highest
ideals; as a minister, loyal to the Gospel and to Jesus Christ.
A Trustee of Elon College from the beginning and an un-
wavering friend. As editor of *The Christian Sun*, he created
sentiment that made the founding of Elon College possible.

Since the last session of the Convention, Mr. William F. Corwith of Brooklyn, N. Y., a trustee of the College and generous friend, has passed to his reward. He was a man modest but devout and profoundly interested in the program and future of the College, of whose Board of Trustees he was an honored and generous member. The Convention should adopt suitable resolutions at this time and forward them to his family.

We call upon the Convention to stand to its feet in recognition of the lives and services of these three stalwart friends of Christian Education, and that a prayer of thanks to God and of sympathy for the bereaved relatives and friends be offered.

TRUSTEES TO BE NOMINATED AT THIS SESSION.

The term of office of the following trustees expires in May, 1926:

J. E. West, M. L. Gray, A. T. Holland, P. H. Fleming, Chas. D. Johnston, E. L. Moffitt, C. H. Rowland, J. M. Darden, and Joe W. Stout.

In addition to this, Rev. W. T. Walters, upon becoming field secretary, resigned from the Board and Mr. W. F. Corwith has died. It will, therefore, be necessary for the Convention at this session to nominate twenty-two persons, from whom the trustees at their May session this year will elect eleven.

We call upon our people to support our institutions of Christian Education by their patronage, by their gifts, and by their prayers.

Report of Committee on Finance was read and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF SPECIAL FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The committee recommends that the Convention adopt the financial budget of \$150,000 per year, \$25,000 of which is to be raised by apportionment through the several Conferences and as recommended by the report of the Apportionment Committee, page 36 of the 1925 ANNUAL, and be distributed as follows:

And that the balance of \$12,000 be distributed 40 per cent to colleges, 32 per cent to missions, 20 per cent to orphanage, 8 per cent to Christian education.

And that this amount—viz, \$125,000.00—be apportioned to the Churches of the Convention through the Conferences as a benevolent budget, but gifts made by individuals and organizations not a member of a Christian Church or congregation shall not be credited on the apportionment of any Church, but shall be credited as an additional gift from any Church receiving said gift, but shall not be charged against the quota of any board or institution receiving said gift. All other gifts or contributions by Churches, members thereof, or any Sunday School, society, or organization connected therewith, except individual gifts of \$5,000 or more, shall be credited to the local Church and charged to said board or institution on their apportionment. No board or institution shall receive any distribution from suggested benevolent budget unless said board or institution keeps an accurate account with each Church as to all contributions received

from such Church, member thereof, or Sunday School, society, or organization connected therewith.

At end of the year, the Budget Commission is authorized for purposes of equalization to change the percentage of distribution of undesignated funds. It is also authorized to change the percentage for the succeeding year, to the end that each institution or board may receive its prorata part of the suggested benevolent budget each year.

That all pledges to Special Mission Fund, Standardization Fund, and Men and Millions Fund be given the local Churches to be collected, compromised, or canceled, as the local Church may deem wise. However, any collections on these special pledges may be credited to said Church collecting same on their benevolent budget.

The committee recommends a Church calendar year for educating our people to all the needs of the Church. The Church calendar suggested to be in harmony with the Church calendar suggested by the General Convention, and is as follows:

January—Interdenominational co-operation.

February-March—Foreign missions.

April—Evangelism.

May-June—Home missions.

July, August, September and October—Christian education.

November-December—Stewardship, superannuation, Church publication, and orphanage.

The committee further recommends that the method of distribution of Church funds be as follows:

1. The Sunday School and all other organizations within the local Church shall report receipts, disbursements and balances to the last Conference of the local Church before the annual Conference meets.

2. The local Church shall make a full report of all receipts and disbursements, including the Sunday School and all other organizations within the congregations, to the annual Conference of which it is a member.

3. All money raised by or for the Conference shall be paid to the Conference Treasurer, and paid out only by order of the Conference.

4. All money raised by the Convention, or for the Convention by the annual Conferences, shall be paid to the Convention Treasurer.

5. All money raised by or for incorporated organizations of the Convention shall be paid to the treasurers of their respective boards, and paid out only upon the order of said boards; and annual reports of all their financial transactions shall be made to the Southern Christian Convention, or its President.

6. All independent Conference organizations, not incorporated, shall handle their funds through their own treasurer, but shall report all receipts and disbursements, annually, to the body under which they exist and operate.

7. All dependent Convention organizations or boards, not incorporated and not authorized to raise money, shall make payments for distribution or expenses only through the Convention Treasurer, on order of the President.

8. That no incorporated board of the Convention shall assume any financial obligation beyond the means in hand, or already provided, without the approval and consent of the Southern Christian Convention.

Report of the Woman's Board and the Woman's Missionary Convention was read by Mrs. J. A. Williams and, on motion, adopted and approved, as follows:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONVENTION.

The Woman's Missionary Convention of the Southern Christian Convention submits the following report:

One hundred and eighteen Churches in the North Carolina Conference: 37 Woman's Missionary Societies, 12 Young People's Missionary Societies, 8 Willing Workers' Societies, 8 Cradle Roll Societies. Amount apportioned for the biennium 1924-1926, \$7,200.00; amount raised, \$7,193.92.

Virginia Valley Conference: 27 Churches, 4 Woman's Missionary Societies, 133 members; 6 Young People's Missionary Societies, 177 members; 6 Cradle Roll Societies, 93 members. Amount apportioned for biennium 1924-1926, \$1,000.00; amount raised, \$677.46.

Georgia and Alabama Conference: Amount raised for biennium 1924-1926, \$26.58.

Alabama Conference: 27 Churches, 9 Woman's Missionary Societies, 134 members; 1 cradle roll, 7 members. Amount apportioned for the biennium 1924-1926, \$450.00; total amount raised, \$135.66.

Eastern Virginia Conference: 47 Churches, 25 Woman's Societies, 1,008 members; 14 Willing Workers' Societies, 310 members; 17 Cradle Rolls, 399 members. Amount apportioned for biennium 1924-1926, \$11,000.00; amount raised, \$12,366.94.

Total apportionment, \$20,000.00; total amount raised, \$20,400.50.

The Woman's Missionary Convention was in session Wednesday morning and Thursday morning, with an attendance of 100 delegates. At the Wednesday morning session we were favored with an address by Mrs. Dan. C. Brummitt, of Chicago, who delighted her audience.

With the approval of this body, the Woman's Missionary Convention will meet Tuesday before the first Sunday in May, 1928, at 10 A. M., and request one evening service during the Convention.

The following officers were elected, subject to approval of this body: president, Mrs. J. A. Williams; vice-president, Mrs. J. L. Foster; secretary, Miss Margaret Alston; corresponding secretary, Mrs. E. L. Beale; treasurer, Mrs. H. S. Hardcastle; superintendent of young people's work, Mrs. R. T. Bradford; superintendent of cradle roll, Mrs. I. W. Johnson; superintendent of literature and mite boxes, Miss Gertrude Browne.

In a task so great as that of missions there cannot be freedom from imperfection. There are natural as well as unforeseen difficulties, lack of co-operation and vision in some Churches, lack of knowledge in others; but in the face of all difficulties we are grateful to God and to our leadership for the way in which we have been led. Missionary activities have done much for us individually—they have deepened our devotional life and our faith.

A successful advance also means a change in outlook. We face a broader

field of usefulness; we must go forward and follow up the advantage gained, to meet the present and coming situation and to plan for the real mission of the Church and to accomplish the vital task God has for us to do. We have before us an unfinished task which is the task of the whole Church, and that will not be consummated until we have reached the last member of the Church with the spirit of missions, and this can never be reached by money standard, but because of heart-beats of human brotherhood.

While great emphasis has been widely placed on securing finances, the time has come for greater spiritual emphasis on stewardship of time and service for the building up and the extension of the kingdom in the local Church and community. To this end, our giving of money should not be less, but more, as God prospers us, and that we should add to our gift of money our gift of time and self.

We heartily approve the definite and far-sighted policy which has been adopted by our Mission Board; therefore, we intend to co-operate by putting spiritual value first and raising our standard 10 per cent higher in goals, organizations and membership each year, and giving ourselves to definite prayer, that obstacles may be removed, that hearts may be opened, that goals may be reached, to the end that our Lord Jesus Christ may be crowned Lord of all.

Address: "The Results of the Program of Christian Education," by Dr. W. A. Harper.

The report of the Committee on Organization was taken up for consideration, and after much discussion the report was finally adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORGANIZATION.

1. That the Southern Christian Convention, at each session, shall appoint a board of nine members to be known as the Board of Policy and Finance; said board to be composed of the three members of the Executive Committee of the Convention and six members elected from the body of the Convention.

2. The said board shall elect from its own body a chairman, a vice-chairman, and a secretary, whose duties shall be prescribed by said board.

3. The board shall meet annually on Monday preceding the first Sunday of May, and at such other times as conditions may require, upon the call of either the chairman of the board or the President of the Convention.

4. The duties of the board shall be to co-ordinate the financial program of the Convention by preparing a biannual budget for the different departments and boards of the Convention, said budget to be based upon the cash receipts of the previous year and the needs of the respective departments and boards, the said departments and boards to prepare and submit in writing to the Board

of Policy and Finance an annual estimate of their respective requirements and a statement of their expenditures for the previous year; which report shall be made thirty days prior to the meeting of the Board of Policy and Finance. The boards and departments shall confer with and secure the consent of the Board of Policy and Finance before contracting any debts in excess of its budget or before asking any special offering from the Churches or their constituencies. It shall be the duty of any board or department receiving a contribution from any source to report the same to the Board of Policy and Finance.

5. The Treasurer of the Convention shall be the general treasurer for all departments and boards of the Convention. All offerings and funds received by the departments from the Churches and Conferences shall be sent to the general treasurer for the purpose of record; and a report of all individual designated gifts, and interest therefrom, shall be submitted to the general treasurer quarterly. All designated gifts shall be used specifically for the purpose for which they were contributed. The treasurer shall send all designated funds in his possession to the respective departments and boards weekly, and the funds from Conference apportionments on order of the President and Secretary of the Convention. The general treasurer shall be required to make a complete annual statement to the Board of Policy and Finance of all receipts and disbursements thirty days prior to the meeting of the board.

6. This board shall execute the policies of the Southern Christian Convention in its various relationships to the General Convention.

7. The Executive Committee of the Convention, the Mission Secretary, the superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, chairman of the Board of Christian Education, and the president of Elon College shall constitute a benevolence commission, whose duty it shall be to promote the benevolence budget.

8. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Convention to notify all persons elected or appointed to office or membership on any committee, commission or board of the Convention within thirty days after its adjournment.

It was moved and carried that we reconsider the action taken this afternoon providing for a Woman's Advisory Board for Elon College and Bethlehem College to appoint such a board. The Secretary was instructed to inform the college boards of this request.

Committee on Group Insurance for Ministers made the following report, which was adopted:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE.

O. L. Group—100 men, carrying \$2,000.00 each, \$200,000.00; average age, 43; gross premium cost, \$1,900.00.

This insurance carries dividends with which to reduce the premiums.

Premiums may be paid monthly, but if they are paid annually, 3 per cent discount is allowed. From this the dividends are deducted. This policy is paid for by organization, and should the insured individuals pay to the organization any part of the premium, the group may include only 75 per cent of your membership (but if the organization pays all, then all are required to be insured—it has no surrender value). Disability benefit is to the effect that when insured is totally disabled the face of his policy is due either in lump sum or in installments until face of policy has been paid.

If as much as \$200,000.00 is taken, the maximum amount for any one is \$4,000.00 (minimum in any amount is \$500.00). If the sum is \$400,000.00, the maximum is \$5,000.00. Short medical examination is required for disability; otherwise, insurance is issued without examination.

We, your Committee on Group Insurance, submit this plan and recommend that the Convention President appoint a committee of three to place the plan before the ministers of the Convention without delay. And that this committee, so named, carry the plan through.

prepare a plan of suggested methods for reporting Conference financial receipts.

Report of Committee on Temperance was read by Dr. G. O. Lankford and was, on motion, adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

1. We call upon the constituency of the Southern Christian Convention to give all possible aid to every agency that is seeking to carry into effect the eighteenth amendment, and pledge our support to all faithful officers who are endeavoring to uphold the law, at the same time calling upon all officers to do their utmost in the direction of law enforcement in our land.

2. We deplore the fact that in certain centers and sections the press is giving aid to the wet propaganda of the liquor forces, and call upon this great agency for public welfare to use its mighty power to assist the righteous forces of the nation in upholding the laws of the land.

3. We earnestly suggest that we set ourselves positively against all crime, lawlessness and immorality prevalent throughout the nation, and urge that in our homes, Churches, public schools and civic institutions increasing instruction and emphasis be given for the strengthening of the cause of righteousness in our national life.

4. We desire to express our hearty appreciation to every organization, agency, or individual that has made or is making any worthy contribution to the proper respect and observance of the laws of the nation.

Report of Board of Publications was read by Rev. Stanley C. Harrell. On motion, the report was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS.

We, your Board of Publications, beg leave to submit the following report:

It is the agreement of the board that *The Christian Sun*, as it has been produced during the closing biennium, has been, in material presented, in mechanical make-up, and general appearance and tone, such as to be creditable to our Church and people. It is to be sincerely regretted that *The Christian Sun* is not receiving a far wider circulation among our people.

We recommend that the Convention make the following contract with the Central Publishing Company, of Richmond, Va.:

P. J. Kernode will serve as managing editor of *The Christian Sun*, and the Central Publishing Company will print, mail and post an average weekly issue of three thousand (3,000) copies of *The Christian Sun*, of sixteen pages, size 11x14 inches trimmed, set in ten-point type, the advertising therein not to exceed an average of six pages per week, same to be printed on fifty-eight-pound machine book white paper.

Provided and upon condition that the said company shall have and receive, as and for full payment for its services and all expenses, the subscriptions to the said paper and all amounts received from advertisements appearing therein, and, in addition, the Southern Christian Convention shall pay \$4,000.00 per year, payable in monthly installments, for 3,000 copies. All additional copies to be printed and mailed at rate of \$2.20 per 100, and all revenue received from subscriptions above 3,000 shall be paid over to Convention.

It is further agreed and understood that the only other expense to be borne by the said Convention is the cost of editing *The Christian Sun*.

It is further agreed that this contract shall be, and remain, in force for a period of two years from and after July 1, 1926, unless said contract shall be

sooner terminated by the mutual consent of the Central Publishing Company and the Board of Publications of the Southern Christian Convention.

In case this contract should be terminated by mutual consent, or at the expiration of said contract, the subscription list, together with all unpaid subscriptions and accounts of *The Christian Sun*, shall become the property of the Southern Christian Convention.

Report of P. J. Kernodle, Managing Editor, was read.

Report of Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Editor of *The Christian Sun*, was submitted and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF EDITOR OF THE CHRISTIAN SUN.

THE CHRISTIAN SUN.

At the last session of the Southern Convention, a Board of Editors of *The Christian Sun* was elected, to-wit: J. O. Atkinson, editor, Elon College, N. C.; contributing editors—Dr. W. W. Staley, Suffolk, Va.; Dr. W. A. Harper, Elon College, N. C.; Rev. Stanley C. Harrell, Durham, N. C.; Dr. Roy C. Helfenstein, Dover, Del; news editor, Rev. Sion M. Lynam, Wadley, Ala.

At an early date after the Convention adjourned, the Board of Editors met at Elon College and decided upon the plan and method of work for the two years. This board has co-operated loyally and heartily in the work assigned them, and while the members of the board had many other duties they have sought to give the Church a paper reflecting the attitudes and activities and sentiments of the Church, in so far as they were able. Rev. H. S. Hardcastle, Suffolk, Va., was asked to contribute the comment on the Sunday School Lessons each week, and Chaplain H. E. Rountree, of the United States Navy, was asked to furnish a Family Altar page each week; Miss Madge Moffitt, of Burlington, was asked to edit a children's page, and Superintendent Charles D. Johnston, of the Orphanage, was asked to furnish and edit copy and reports pertaining to the Orphanage for *The Sun* each week.

All these have done their work unselfishly and without price or charges to the paper. It has been a genuine privilege and joy to be associated with these co-workers who have all performed their tasks constantly and efficiently. The editor is profoundly grateful for the services rendered. Moreover, our pastors and interested laymen have been advised that the columns of *The Sun* were

open to their contributions, Church news, and reports, and many have availed themselves of this privilege and helped to make the paper interesting and valuable.

PRINCIPLES AND GOVERNMENT.

After the adjournment of the last session of the Convention, there were turned over to the editor of *The Christian Sun*, to be deposited in the safety vault of Elon College Library, 307 copies of the "Principles and Government of the Christian Church," to be sold at 50 cents the copy. Of this number, 113 copies have been sold. Of this number 67 copies are charged on our books, having been sent out on orders, and 60 copies have been paid for at 50 cents per copy; total, \$30.00. (As per instruction of the Convention, I have given a copy each to 14 ministerial students who made applications for same under the grant of the Convention.) I hand you herewith cashier's check for this amount. There remains on hand and unsold in the safety vault of Elon College Library 180 copies. There should be issued some copies in cheaper binding, as there is a constant, though not a vigorous, demand for these books.

Report of W. E. McClenny, Historian, was submitted and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

To the Southern Christian Convention, in Session Assembled at Durham, N. C.:

Your Historian begs leave to submit the following report:

During the past two years not a great deal has been accomplished for the Convention, owing to the work done in other lines of research in which he has been engaged. The first thing that came up was the fact that Rev. James O'Kelly's "Testament" was located, giving several facts regarding the leader of the Christian Church that were not known before.

At the last session of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference, held in Greensboro, N. C., there was one day set apart for the discussion of the historical phases of the Christian denomination in the State of North Carolina. Several valuable papers were prepared by leading ministers and laymen of the Church for that occasion, education in the Church being treated by Captain W. H. Turrentine and Dr. W. W. Staley, both being very valuable papers. One of these has since been published in *The Christian Sun*. A paper was prepared by your historian on the history of the Christians in North Carolina and central Virginia from the beginning of the Church in 1792 down to the present. In this, the history of each Conference that has played a part in the work of the denomination was traced out as best he could from the data to be found. Several other papers were prepared for this session bearing on the ministers, laymen and other phases of the Church in the State.

A typewritten copy of the minutes of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference from 1828 to about 1859, and also a copy of the original minutes of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference from 1817 to 1859, and several other historical manuscripts were sent to the library at Elon College, N. C., about January 1, 1926, to be bound and kept in the college library for the use of any one who cares to make any original research into the history of the Christian Church in the future. The original minutes of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference were burned in the great fire, and it was only by chance that your Historian had three copies made of these in 1910 and saved two of these copies; the other was also burned in the same fire. These manuscripts were only loaned, and cannot be taken from the library.

In ransacking the old ANNUALS from 1873 down, he came across an account of the beginning of the colored Christian Conferences in the South, and it was found that the colored Christians in North Carolina, so far as known,

had the first Church body composed entirely of colored people in the United States. The white ministers of the Christians in North Carolina assisted them in the organization. A little later the colored Christians in Virginia were organized in a Conference at Mount Ararat, near Suffolk, Va., Revs. William B. Wellons, John N. Manning and others assisting them in the organization.

Some weeks ago an extract was published from "The Life of Rev. Isaac N. Walter," telling of an ordination service held in the Christian Church in Raleigh, N. C., and the ordaining of Isaac Scott, colored, who then expected to sail in a few months for Liberia, Africa, to preach to his kinsmen in that far-off land, but we have been able to find no record further about him or his work. It is not definitely known whether or not he went, and if he did go, whether he was aided by the Christians of North Carolina, yet the presumption is that he was helped by some one. This may be found out later.

Within the past few months, your Historian has endeavored to collect some data relative to the beginning of the Christian Church in Georgia and Alabama. A good many letters were written to the ministers in those Conferences. Some of these letters were returned undelivered; a few replied that they did not have the data at hand to send for this. Rev. S. L. Beougher, president of Bethlehem Christian College, Wadley, Ala., got together what he could and sent it, some of it being very valuable data. It was thought, with what is now known of the Christian Conferences in Virginia and North Carolina, and if as much could be collected about the work in the Georgia and Alabama Christian Conferences, we, as a Church, would be nearing the point where we would have the foundation for our history, so that it could be given to our people, in order that they might become better acquainted with our own Church; but that day seems some distance in the future as yet.

In looking up other things, we have been impressed several times with the bitterness that existed among Church people at the time the Christian Church began. These impressions are borne out by court records in old Church deeds and by the writings of men prominent in their Churches, and it often appeared that they were as much interested in the growth of their individual Church as they were in the saving of souls. We have in our possession a letter from a prominent churchman congratulating a Church of his faith for not allowing the use of their Church to another denomination to hold one service in it. In the vicinity of some of the early Christian Churches, other denominations would start a Church, but would be very careful to have it inserted in the deed that the building could only be used by ministers and members of their own denomination. All this goes to show that, since the Christian Church started, a great deal of the bitterness of the different Churches has died out, and it is believed that our Church has had its influence in bringing about the present condition.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Report of Committee on Finance was submitted by Judge J. F. West and, on motion, adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

We, the Committee on Finance, respectfully report as follows:

We have examined the report of Chas. D. Johnston, Executive Secretary of the Men and Millions Forward Movement, showing a balance in his hands of \$69.37 as of April 1, 1926, and find the same to be correct.

We have examined the accounts of C. D. West, treasurer of Men and Millions Forward Movement, showing a balance to the credit of said fund as of April 27, 1926, of \$402.98, and find same to be correct.

We have examined the report and accounts of W. C. Wicker, Treasurer of the Southern Christian Convention, showing a balance in his hands as of April 22, 1926, of \$7,921.22, of which \$3,000 is composed of superannuated fund bonds, and find same to be correct.

We recommend that the \$215.38 shown in the report of the Treasurer as

interest collected on money in bank be placed to the credit of the Convention fund, and that all interest which may hereafter be collected on money in bank be placed to the credit of this same fund.

The attention of your committee has been called to a resolution passed by your Convention in 1918, in which the Convention fixed the salary of the Treasurer at \$50.00 per year. No part of the salary has ever been paid, and your committee is allowing an account in favor of the Treasurer for \$400.00 to cover his services for the past eight years.

Our attention has also been drawn to a resolution passed by the Convention in 1918, requiring that the Treasurer of the Convention be bonded in the sum of \$10,000.00, with some guaranty company as surety, and that the premium on the bond be paid out of the Convention funds. We learned that no bond has ever been executed, and we recommend that the Treasurer secure a bond at once, in accordance with the foregoing resolution of the Convention in the sum of \$10,000, and that the bond carry a rider which will protect the funds of the Convention against loss from the failure of the bank in which the Treasurer shall deposit the funds under his control. The premium for the rider, as well as the bond, to be paid out of the Convention funds in his hands.

Your committee recommends that Dr. I. W. Johnson, Secretary of the Convention, be allowed \$50.00 for his services during the past two years; and that Mrs. Mary Andrews Rollings, Assistant Secretary of the Convention, be paid \$25.00 for her services during the past two years; and we further recommend that their compensation be fixed at these amounts until otherwise ordered by the Convention.

Your committee regards it just as important to check receipts as disbursements, in checking up the accounts of persons handling funds belonging to the Convention. We, therefore, recommend that the Secretary of this Convention be instructed to prepare and have printed a sufficient number of official receipt books, which shall contain blank receipts and stubs in duplicate, numbered consecutively, and that he send all treasurers and secretaries and all other persons receiving money for any of the benevolences of the Convention with these receipt, requiring such persons receiving funds for any of the benevolences of the Convention to issue to any person or persons paying money to them an official receipt, retaining in his hands the duplicate stub attached to such receipt. All persons required to use the official receipt books shall return the stubs to each session of this Convention to be used by the committees of the Convention in checking up the various financial accounts of those handling funds belonging to the Convention.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, beg leave to report that we have had no matters referred to us for consideration; but would ask that a rising vote of thanks be given by this Convention to the pastor, to the Durham Christian Church, and friends, for their hospitality and excellent entertainment; to the choir for the beautiful music rendered; to the Press Committee, and to the newspapers for space given and good display in reporting the proceedings of the Convention.

It was moved and carried that the provision made in the report of the Special Committee on Finance concerning the Special Mission Fund, Standardization Fund, and the Men and Millions subscriptions become effective on July 1, 1926.

The following were elected members of the Board of Polity and Finance: L. E. Smith, I. W. Johnson, E. E. Holland, G. O. Lankford, K. B. Johnson, H. C. Simpson, R. A. Larrick, Mrs. H. S. Hardcastle, H. W. Elder.

Dr. W. A. Harper offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

RESOLUTIONS.

Whereas, there is an evident lack of appreciation and loyalty to our Church on the part of so many of our members, and feeling that this lack of loyalty and appreciation is due to a lack of information as to the history, aims, and purposes of our Church; therefore, be it resolved:

1. That this Convention authorize the publication of a catechetical course to be taught in the lower grades of our Sunday Schools which will give the desired information regarding our Church, and that W. E. McClenny's "Life of James O'Kelly," together with an outlined course of study, be recommended for adult classes.

2. That all Convention institutions that are supported or partly supported by the Church be required to teach these courses according as their respective enrollment may require. If the institution does not have children in its enrollment, it would not be required to give the catechetical course.

3. That a course covering a quarter's work in our Church and Sunday Schools be prepared for instructing young people when they have joined the Churches or contemplate joining.

4. That this Convention do now appoint a committee to prepare such courses and arrange for their publication.

We reaffirm our faith in Elon College as an institution that fosters a high moral standard, having but one graduate in its thirty-six years of existence

who was not a member of the Church. The college deserves our financial support, and also our patronage.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

There are many reasons why this Conference should become more intensely interested in foreign missions, some of which are as follows: (1) Christ commanded His disciples to preach the gospel in all the world; (2) a true Christian spirit prompts us to desire that all men be saved; (3) all men need the gospel we possess; (4) Christ can do for all men what He has done for us; (5) Christ's program for the Church of God is a world program.

Your committee recommends, therefore:

1. That the ministers of this Conference strive to develop in their own lives, and to emphasize in their ministry a greater spirit of missions. One great need of our Conference, we believe, is a greater missionary atmosphere. We urge the co-operation of both laymen and ministers in this creation of a greater missionary atmosphere.

2. That special foreign mission services be held in our Churches at least once a year, and an opportunity be given at these services for a special offering to foreign missions. Many of our congregations have probably never been asked to make an offering specifically to foreign missions. Why not give them a chance?

3. That the missionary program in our Churches include the teaching of foreign missions, not only to adults, but to young people, children, and even the cradle roll as well.

4. That each Church appoint a secretary of missions to assist the pastor in directing the entire missionary instruction of the Church; and that this secretary be assisted by a committee on missions, composed of a representative of each department of the Church.

5. That our Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies be provided with a foreign missionary program most adequate for raising funds for foreign missions in each local Sunday School.

6. That the "one-day school of missions" so successfully begun last year at the Mayland Church, on May 2nd, be continued each year under the joint auspices of the Conference Mission Secretary and the Woman's Board, thus giving our people a better opportunity to receive expert missionary instruction each year.

7. That we congratulate the Woman's Board on the splendid work these

women are doing, and that we pledge to them our heartiest co-operation, both as ministers and laymen, in carrying on this good work.

Following is a brief report of the Woman's Missionary Conference, held at the Methodist Church, in Linville, on Thursday afternoon, during the sitting of the regular Conference:

The Superintendent of Women's Societies reported one new society organized at Bethlehem, with fifteen active members and one honorary member. Other societies at Leaksville, Linville, New Hope, and Winchester, with a total membership of 122. The Superintendent of Young People's Societies reported one new society organized at New Hope, and other societies at Antioch, Bethlehem, Concord, Mt. Olivet (R), Timber Ridge, and Winchester, with a total membership of 172. The Superintendents of Cradle Rolls had reports from Antioch, Bethlehem, Leaksville, Linville, Mayland and Winchester, with a total membership of 112. The Superintendent of Literature reported 76 copies of the *Christian Missionary* taken, 45 books and 655 tracts read during the year.

The Woman's Conference decided to place \$75.00 in the Conference Missionary Association this year, \$71.00 of which was pledged on the floor.

Rev. and Mrs. W. Q. McKnight were present, and spoke and sang to the delight of all. An offering was taken to help defray the expenses of the McKnights. Offering amounted to \$8.20.

FRIDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference called to order at 9:40 by President. Devotional services conducted by Rev. W. M. Clem.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

Whatever the future has for the Church is now held in childhood, and whatever childhood shall work out for us in the future will depend on the training of childhood.

Every Church enterprise is looking toward the Sunday School for future constituency and support, because the Sunday School is the best training place for our childhood for Church work.

For leadership training, Christian Endeavor has been a great help and will continue to be, for it stands for all that is best in the development of young Christians. It is a success everywhere when faithfully pushed, but, like all other organizations, it will die when neglected. Christian Endeavor is practical in the rural sections, and we need more societies in our Churches.

We feel that loyalty and a desire for information and instruction, so they will be better equipped to render more efficient service in their respective communities should cause all our Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies to send representatives to our own Chautauqua and School of Methods held at Elon College each year.

We urge that all our Sunday School officers and teachers and Christian Endeavor presidents make a special effort to attend our own Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention each year.

We also wish to make mention of Rev. V. T. Crawford, from the Winchester Church, who spoke along the line of home mission work. Several other ministers were there taking some part on the program. In all, we feel that this was a great rally and that the interest in missions was greatly strengthened.

By arrangement, Dr. Minton spoke at three other Churches while in the Valley, viz.: Concord, Bethlehem, and Dry Run.

We believe that the interest in missions is steadily growing, and that we as a Church are beginning to realize that this is the supreme business of the Church.

We, therefore, urge that pastors, superintendents, teachers, and especially those who have the children under their care, keep the mission cause continually before them, realizing that the future progress of the Church depends on the proper training and educating the children.

We recommend a 24 per cent increase over last year's apportionment. This will provide for the following amounts: home missions, \$225; Church extension, \$200; Conference fund, \$150; foreign missions, \$105; Convention missions, \$105; publications, \$300; Convention fund, \$300; Orphanage, \$150; Christian education, \$60; Elon College, \$300; superannuated fund, \$180—total, \$2,075.

Report of President of C. M. A. was read and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

The Christian Missionary Association can report good health and high hopes. It has never accomplished any great thing, and perhaps was not organized with any thought that it should. But it can lay claim to having done a small work well.

The 1925 session of the association was held at the Oakland Christian Church, Nansemond County, Va. The session was well attended, the program was attractive, and the financial result was gratifying. The 1926 session will be held with our new Church at South Norfolk, Va.

The association is purely a financial organization, its membership being secured on a basis of membership dues of ten dollars for men and adult organizations and five dollars for women, children and children's organizations.

Since 1914 the following sums have been received at the annual sessions of the association:

Since the association has suggested that a C. M. A. Sunday be observed annually by the Churches of our Conference, we, therefore, petition the Conference to designate and observe the third Sunday of November as C. M. A. Sunday.

And we recommend:

First. That, on C. M. A. Sunday, the ministers of our Conference preach on some phase of Church extension and seek to secure memberships for the C. M. A.

Second. That it is the conviction of this Conference that each and every Church of the Conference should be represented in the C. M. A. by at least one full membership.

Report of the Committee on Christian Education was read by Rev. J. H. Lightbourne, chairman, and adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Since the Convention of Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies is the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference at work in the field of Christian education, your Committee on Christian Education will present as its report a resumee of the activities and objectives of the Convention as revealed by the minutes of its 1926 session.

The said session of the Convention was held with the Waverly Christian Church, Waverly, Va., and was perhaps as representatively attended as any session of the last decade. The program provided both inspirational and constructive elements, and some Conference work was realized.

The Convention is organized to give emphasis to the major interests of the educational program, and it now has a very efficient and consecrated staff of departmental secretaries. These secretaries have not clearly defined duties as yet, but it would appear the field of each is under process of development, the development being determined very largely by the interest and initiative of the secretaries.

It has been the policy of the Convention to co-operate fully with the Board of Religious Education of the Southern Christian Convention, and it has given liberally of its treasury to the support of the board. There is a growing sentiment in the Convention to the effect that all of its funds should be used for educational purposes.

Christian education remains undefined in the minds of many of our people, and, consequently, fails to secure from them the moral and financial support it deserves, and must have, if it is to become the foundation of a vital and effective department of our Conference work.

In the five-year period, 1920-1926, the Sunday School Department of our educational work has experienced a consistent development; the enrollment has increased 3,123, the Convention dues \$200, the missionary offerings more than \$500, and the Orphanage gifts more than \$1,000. Comparisons with last year indicate for this year increases comparable with those of the five-year period.

The Department of Christian Endeavor has also experienced growth over this five-year period, but the data relative to the work of this department are so

difficult to obtain it is practically impossible to enter into comparisons. The Convention Department of Christian Endeavor has been and is now ably officered, but it is difficult for the department to receive a sympathetic reception from our Churches.

A very heartening phase of our educational work is the interest manifested all over the territory of the Convention in more adequate equipment through re-modeled or new plants. The day is not far distant when every Church of our Convention will have an improved and modern educational plant.

During the year Rev. J. G. Truitt was appointed Conference Director of Christian Education, to succeed Rev. J. H. Lightbourne. The director is the representative in the Conference of the Board of Religious Education and renders valuable service.

We recommend:

First. That the Conference give to the Board of Religious Education the suggested 5 per cent of the apportionment funds.

Second. That the Churches of the Conference which did not receive the September offering for Christian education be urged to promote and receive the offering before January 1st.

Third. That our Churches be urged to co-operate with and to make use of the Board of Religious Education of the Southern Christian Convention.

Fourth. That our Churches be urged to co-operate with and make use of the Conference Convention of Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. J. F. Morgan, chairman, and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

In looking back over the history of this Conference, we find that only two missionaries—Rev. and Mrs. D. P. Barrett—have gone out from any Church of the Conference to any foreign land to hold up the banner of the cross and to make known our Lord to those who know Him not. We have been interested in giving the gospel to those at home, and thus have built up a strong Conference of some ten thousand members, and a large percentage of these have

much of this world's goods, that have come to them because of the benefits of the gospel, while the great outside world, in fields afar, has millions of souls who have never had an opportunity to hear the gospel and who, on this account, are perishing without a knowledge of our Lord.

It seems to your committee that this Conference needs to take more seriously the great commission, and to undertake in a more adequate manner the carrying out of the program of our Lord.

Your committee would recommend, therefore:

1. A deeper concern for missions by praying more devoutly for those without the gospel; by keeping the needs and conditions of the foreign lands in the minds and hearts of our young people in the Sunday School and other young people's societies, and in praying the Lord of the harvest that He send forth laborers into His harvest.

2. That our Sunday Schools not only give an offering once a month to missions, but that, in each school, on the Sunday the offering is taken, some missionary program, brief and practical, be put on before the whole school.

3. That the Churches give their aid in organizing and keeping alive the Woman's Missionary Societies, and the young people's missionary organizations, and that an effort be made to organize men's missionary societies or clubs as well, in order that the men of the Church may be better informed along the line of missions.

4. That the pastors of the Conference seek to bring the burden of missions home to the hearts of their hearers in their congregations, and that in every possible way the task of the Church of making Jesus known to all the world be kept prominent in all our services.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Conference was read by Mrs. I. W. Johnson and, on motion, adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.

It has been just fourteen years since organized mission work began among the women of the Southern Christian Convention. Since that year of beginning, the work of the women of this Conference has gone steadily forward. The first annual report showed twelve organizations and less than \$500.00 contributed. This year we report the following: 84 organizations; members, including Young People, Willing Workers and Cradle Roll, 2,287; contributions, \$6,750.34 (\$150.34 over the goal).

Work among the young people has shown a marked increase in interest—many of the societies have well-organized mission study classes, and several gave splendid pageants during the year.

This year the standards of excellence were tried for the second time and proved to be a great incentive to the work, which resulted in banners being awarded as follows: Woman's Societies, Windsor; Young People's, Holland; Willing Workers, Windsor and Rosemont; Cradle Roll, Suffolk and Holland. Many others met most of the requirements, and ten Churches have all four organizations.

The district spring rallies have proven a great success, and were held this year with better results than ever before.

Our Conference this fall was held at Bethlehem, with the largest attendance in its history. More than 500 were present, with 300 registered delegates and visitors and sixteen ministers, fifteen of whom were members of this Conference.

Our work continues along the same lines. The women divide their special between Richmond work and Japan. The young people support the mountain work and Santa Isabel.

Dr. J. O. Atkinson spoke concerning the budget plan as adopted by the last session of the Southern Christian Convention.

The report of the Committee on Education was submitted and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

In recent years education has assumed so many phases and functions that scholastic relations have lost their significance. Public schools overlap college curriculums, colleges imitate universities in elective studies, and universities admit high school graduates, so that college and university diplomas have little meaning. These three branches of education intrude upon technical schools by offering all sorts of technical training. In nearly all of these the Bible is left out, although few such schools exist where the religion of the Bible has never been taught; and where great intellectual schools once flourished without the Bible, the nations have waned or decayed. Schools, like industrial institutions, should hold tenaciously to their respective lines of work.

The public school should prepare for college; the college for the university; and the university should not compete with colleges for students. A college diploma should be required for entrance into a university. Craze for money and numbers has lowered ethical and educational standards.

Elon's ideal, "Character First and Always," should be, in fact, the standard for the Church college; and it should be the obligation of the board of trustees, the faculty and the Convention to see that the work and conduct at Elon harmonize with this ideal. Christian families should patronize Elon, give it their moral and financial support, and help make it what it claims to be, a real Christian Church college.

Ministerial education should have a larger place in Elon, and the instruction should include practical, as well as theological, training. Technical schools teach through work as well as study. Experience in the thing to be done is the lesson taught. Knowledge of the Church, pastoral duties, financial integrity, personal economy, liberality, self-surrender to God, when called by Him, and the subordination of self in all ministerial relations should be ingrained in the very life of young ministers. They should learn the courtesies and amenities of social life, and the same, in a higher degree, for relation with other ministers and ministers of other denominations.

The committee has had no communication from Rev. Dennis F. Parsons, J. T. Harrod and Devaney Cooper, candidates for the ministry.

Rev. J. B. Chadwick, of Dover, Del., remains on the list of licentiates.

We recommend the licensure of Richie Irvin Brittle, a junior in Elon College, and recommended by his pastor, Rev. W. B. Fuller, and Union Christian Church, Surry County, Va.

We recommend the ordination of Rev. Floyd D. Ballard, graduate of Elon College, pastor of Henderson Christian Church, Henderson, N. C., and recommended by the Henderson Church and Fullers Chapel, Vance County, N. C., to this high office. We recommend, further, that Brother Ballard be ordained at Oak Level Church, where the Eastern North Carolina Conference will be held November 23, 1926; and this to be done, after examination by the chairman of this committee and two members of the same committee in that Conference.

We recommend that Rev. W. C. Hook, who will serve Waverly Church, be received into this Conference upon credentials from the New York Eastern Conference.

We recommend that Rev. H. C. Caviness be enrolled as an elder, on a transfer from the Eastern North Carolina Christian Conference.

We recommend that Rev. B. J. Earp be granted a letter of transfer to the Virginia Valley Central Christian Conference.

We recommend that Rev. V. T. Crawford be granted a letter of transfer to unite with the M. E. Church of Kentucky.

We recommend that Rev. H. E. Truitt be granted a letter of transfer to unite with the Lexington Presbytery.

It was moved and carried that the proceedings of this Conference shall be printed in the ANNUAL; that 600 copies of the ANNUAL be purchased for free distribution pro rata among the Churches, and the Secretary shall be authorized to draw a draft to pay for same from the Conference fund.

It was moved and carried that all standing committees be requested to have their reports to Conference typewritten in duplicate for the Conference records.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was submitted by Rev. G. C. Crutchfield, and, on motion, adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

As long as any great movement continues to function, whether that movement be social, industrial, fraternal or religious, it must have its advocates, that its virtues and its interests may be kept before its constituents.

The strength of any movement depends not more on the fact that the constituents have been evangelized than upon the fact of instruction and development.

As long as the Church continues to call men to that higher life of Christian service, she needs the strongest and best of advocates.

Among the acknowledged powers for good in the world is the press, the paper or the book, written and published under the thraldom of Christ's spirit of unselfish giving of self and possessions.

The daily paper is an acknowledged power in the shaping of political destiny. And the power of the modern fiction is well known in the shaping of young life during the period of adolescence.

Knowing these things to be true, we are now aroused to the great need of a literature that will help to shape and fashion our moral and spiritual lives.

The Church paper is not only a mighty power in the home to back up the Christian influence of godly parents, but each copy of the Church paper which comes is an assistant pastor, coming to back up the work of the man of God who, with his many duties, cannot always be on hand to instruct and counsel the young and old.

As your committee, we, therefore, recommend that the following resolutions be adopted and put into effect:

1. Be it resolved, That this Conference do heartily commend *The Christian Sun* and pledge anew our allegiance to the cause of our blessed Lord as presented by our Board of Editors, and published by the Central Publishing Company.

2. Be it further resolved, That we look forward to and work to the end that very soon each regional Convention of our Church may have a paper equal to *The Christian Sun* in presenting to the world the cause of our Blessed Master

and the principles of the Christian Church, and the local news of the Churches in the Conventions; and that the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* may go as the carrier of our faith and representing the interests of our General Convention into the homes where *The Sun* or the other regional papers may go.

3. Be it further resolved, That the *Christian Missionary* be supported to the extent that we subscribe and read it, and that the *Journal of Christian Education*, as edited by Dr. W. A. Harper, be placed in all our Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies.

4. Be it resolved, That our Sunday Schools use the literature as published by our people.

5. We recommend that all our pastors and teachers buy and use such books as will be helpful in the winning of the boys and girls to Jesus Christ.

6. We recommend that each Sunday School establish and build up a library of helpful books and periodicals, that proper reading matter may be accessible to the young, and that the teachers act as overseers in the reading of such books.

7. Resolved, That every pastor in the Conference be asked to make a special effort to secure three times as many subscriptions to *The Christian Sun* as his Church now has on the list, and that every pastor report the results of his efforts to the President of the Conference by December 10th.

We recommend:

1. That the recommendations of the last year be continued, studied and practiced.

2. That we try, in so far as possible, to put on the every-member canvass simultaneously throughout the Conference.

3. That during the coming year special effort be made to secure tithers.

sincere appreciation of the perfectly splendid manner in which the pastor, members and friends of the Webster Community Christian Church have entertained this Conference.

2. That the pastor, Rev. M. W. Sutcliffe, and his loyal congregation are to be heartily commended for the great work they have accomplished in building one of the best rural Church plants in the Conference, and because of their interest in and response to the various denominational enterprises.

3. That we hereby thank the ladies who so efficiently served the meals in the Church dining-room, and that we likewise thank all those who assisted in the rendering of music during the Conference session.

4. That we express our appreciation of the service rendered by the Conference officials during the year, and for the co-operation of all who had part on the Conference program.

5. That we congratulate the members of the cast presenting the play, "How Aunt Tillie Learned to Tithes," for the impressive manner in which they rendered the play, and that we recommend this play to the various Churches of this Conference, urging that some group in each Church put on the play at some evening service. Copies of the play may be secured from Dr. W. H. Denison, Dayton, Ohio.

6. That the plan of having the statistical Church chart as prepared for this session of the Conference by Rev. H. S. Hardcastle, be adopted as a permanent practice; and that Rev. H. S. Hardcastle be appointed as chairman of the Chart Committee, being authorized to procure at the expense of the Conference a suitable blackboard roll for such purpose.

7. That said statistical chart include the following items: membership last year; members received during the year; present membership; Sunday School enrollment; Conference appointments; missions; all other benevolences; pastor's salary; paid on Church property; amount raised for all purposes.

8. That the Church report blanks shall be sent out not later than October 1st each year, and one blank be sent to the pastor and two blanks be sent to the Church secretary.

9. That each pastor shall see that the report of his Church shall be sent to the chairman of the Chart Committee not later than October 20th, in order that he may have ample time to arrange the data for the chart before Conference convenes.

10. That the pastors and Churches of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference be urged to give special prayer in the interest of Christian leadership, asking God to lay upon the hearts of the choice young men of our Sunday Schools and Churches the claims of the gospel ministry as a life work, and that He give our Conference a larger number of trained leaders, that we may enter new fields of service within the bounds of our Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Suggestions and recommendations of the Committee on Religious Literature.

First. That the accredited revealed will of God, as recorded in the Old and New Testaments, known as the Holy Bible, for primal, continued and devout study for the rule and guide of faith and practice.

The study of this library—the Holy Bible—consisting of sixty-six books bound in one volume, must be done without doubtful disputation or adverse criticism for it properly to function in human character and produce the divinely desired and intended results.

The essential doctrines of the Holy Bible need to be emphasized in life and from the pulpit more than they now are.

Second. That our Sunday Schools use our own literature. Such other helps as may be desired are suggested as aids in study.

Third. That the following periodicals be taken and read: *The Christian Sun*, *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, *The Christian Missionary*, *The Teachers' Journal*, and the *Journal of Christian Education*.

Fourth. That our book depository be patronized. This is right and ethical and should be done by our constituency.

Fifth. That our people read more religious literature, both periodicals and books, selecting only the best.

Your committee beg to suggest the following books: "What to Preach," by Henry Sloane Coffin, D. D., price \$2.00; "Making Good in the Ministry," by Rev. A. T. Robertson, D. D., price \$1.50; "The Spirit of Christ," by Dr. Chas. R. Erdman, price \$1.50.

For reading, select the subject or subjects desired to study, and then write to several standard, accredited divinity schools, requesting their recommendation of the best books, magazines and literature on your selected subject for study. This will give you highly censored literature of highest grade in Christian ethics and best thought of man. It will serve as a literary digest, from which you can make your own selection and accept such truth as you may find and may desire to incorporate in your fund of knowledge.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your Board is of the opinion that the time has come for definite action in home mission work. There are many strategic places within the bounds of our Conference. There are weak Churches at certain points that need to be strengthened. When your Board reported two years ago, it was recommended that some new place be found where work looking toward the organization of a Church should be undertaken. Last year a definite recommendation was made that Winston Salem be considered. At the North Carolina Christian Conference a resolution was adopted looking to the organization of a centennial Church, but as yet nothing has been done. We recommend for consideration Winston Salem, Greensboro, High Road, and Bessemer Avenue. We recommend that Liberty (Randolph), Danville, and Palm Street, Greensboro, be considered for receiving aid, or the aiding of the Western North Carolina Christian Conference in establishing a Church at Asheboro, N. C. We recommend that larger apportionments be made by the Finance Committee; that more adequate support be given to our mountain work; that the home mission funds of this Conference be administered as in the previous year.

The Committee on Education reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

We recommend, to the most favorable consideration of all our constituency, Elon College as the institution to which our sons and daughters should be sent after finishing high school, in order that they may obtain collegiate training in a Christian atmosphere and by Christian teachers. Our equipment is equal to the very best in any college, and our people should patronize their own college and prove their unstinted loyalty and devotion to the institution builded by the prayers and sacrifices of the Christian Church.

S. E. Madren, who was admitted to the biblical class a year ago, has pursued his studies and is now a member of the sophomore class in Elon. He is a member of Bethlehem Church, whose pastor and deacons recommend that he be licensed to preach as a probationer. Your committee has duly examined him and recommend his licensure at this session of the Conference. He applies for a \$100.00 loan to enable him to remain in school the present year, and we recommend that this loan be granted in the usual way.

W. J. B. Hines, who was licensed last year, left school at the close of the fall term, and your committee has no report from him. We do not know whether he is pursuing his purpose and plan of equipping himself for the ministry.

I. T. Underwood has reported, through letter, that he has tried to do what he could in his home Church in building up the cause of our Lord and the Church, but that he has no regular work as a pastor. We recommend that his license be continued.

R. H. Coble reports by letter that he has held several prayer meetings, preached a few times, and has held some meetings, resulting in eight conversions. He has worked in Sunday School and in Church, but has no regular charge. We recommend that his license be continued.

We recommend that Rev. G. C. Crutchfield, who comes by letter of transfer from the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference, be received into Conference fellowship.

We recommend, that since Rev. H. B. Hall has connected himself with the Methodist Episcopal Church, his name be dropped from the Conference roll.

We regret to report that so few are entering the ministry in our Conference, and that there seems to be a decreasing number who are offering themselves as preachers of the gospel. Verily, the time has come when we should pray the Lord of the harvest that He send forth laborers into His harvest.

We express the hope that each and every Church will take pride in the effort to raise this money in full.

We resubmit the budget as worked out by the Budget Committee, the total amount of which has already been previously adopted by the Conference. We realize that this is a very decided increase and that there are perhaps certain Churches where local conditions will make it impossible for them to raise the amount suggested. We recommend that this Conference adopt the amounts named as the goals for which we shall strive. Where the local Church feels it is impossible to reach the full goal, that they fix the highest possible amount that they believe they can raise as their goal for the coming year.

We recommend that the Board of Religious Education of the Southern Christian Convention be granted the same amount of financial help (\$150.00) for the ensuing year that was granted last year, and that the chairman of the Budget Committee be requested to transmit to the pastors and secretaries of the Churches the action concerning the apportionments for the coming year.

We further go on record as being determined to repudiate with our ballot any candidate who bids for our suffrage and who himself repudiates in any way the present prohibition law.

We, your committee, also recommend that this Conference go on record as condemning the following:

1. The flagrant law violation that is so widespread.
2. The shielding of law violators by failure to expose.
3. Political corruption so universally extant.
4. All injustice in business.
5. Dishonesty in the use of means and opportunity.
6. Sabbath desecration, improperly supervised recreation, existing low standards of modesty, and all practices participated in by God's created children which are contrary to His will.

The report of the Executive Committee was submitted and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your Executive Committee begs leave to report that during the year the following business has been transacted:

First. At the request of Bro. G. A. Pearce, a licentiate of this Conference, and of the Educational Committee, your committee authorized Dr. W. W. Staley, with such other ministers of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference as he might select, to examine Brother Pearce for ordination according to the rules and regulations of the Christian Church, and, in case he passed a satisfactory examination, to conduct the ordination service. Dr. Staley reported that the examination was passed in a satisfactory manner and that Bro. Pearce was duly ordained by Dr. W. W. Staley under this authority.

Second. Your committee, upon the recommendation of the Educational Committee, revoked the license of A. R. Brothers and published our action in *The Christian Sun*.

Third. Your committee, upon the approval of the Educational Committee, granted a letter of transfer to Rev. H. C. Caviness, commending him to the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference for membership.

Fourth. Your committee accepted the cordial invitation of Oak Level Church to hold the annual Conference with this Church at this session.

Fifth. Your committee authorized the call for fifth Sunday meetings at Wake Chapel in February, and at Liberty in August. These meetings were held and devoted to the study of problems pertaining to the good of the Conference and to the advancement of the kingdom.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was submitted by Rev. R. L. Williamson, chairman. The report was discussed and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Children are greatly influenced by what they see from day to day. The Bible, though it may not be read so much as it should be, yet if it occupies a prominent place in the home, it is constantly making a silent appeal to the young lives.

So it may be said of other good books and periodicals in the home, that they exert a character-forming influence that is beyond computation. To those who desire the best for themselves and for their children, our publishing houses offer a line of books and periodicals that rank with the best.

We think *The Christian Sun* and *The Christian Missionary* should be regular visitors in every home. In addition, we would recommend our Sunday School literature as best suited to our people, and *The Herald of Gospel Liberty* as one of the best denominational organs published.

Our publishing houses also offer a fine line of Bibles, and in addition to the books especially helpful to our people, they furnish any good book desired. We should patronize our own publishing houses.

We recommend that our pastors lead their people in a campaign to place *The Christian Sun* in every home in their respective fields by February 1, 1927.

The Conference adjourned until tomorrow morning at 9:30 o'clock.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Conference was called to order by the President at 9:30 A. M. Song service was conducted by Rev. J. A. Denton. The devotional service was led by Rev. E. M. Carter by reading Psalm 91 and prayer.

The minutes of the first day were read and approved, and delegates from several Churches were enrolled.

Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Mission Secretary, was invited to a seat as a deliberative member of Conference, and he accepted the courtesy extended with fraternal greetings.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

Your Committee on Evangelism reports the work of this department in good condition. Our ministers and Churches have labored faithfully through the year. We are glad to report that a large number of our Churches have availed themselves of Brother Caviness' services during the year, and many of our pastors have held successful evangelistic meetings.

We recommend for the following year:

First. Each Church to have an all-year program of evangelism.

Second. Our Churches and ministers should emphasize the necessity of the new birth or regeneration as a condition for salvation.

Third. That recommendations third and fourth of our report last year be carried out with this year's program.

Fourth. That each Church should keep a record of work accomplished by their program of evangelism.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

We have found an increasing interest in the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor work in this Conference. More Sunday Schools are organizing for departmental work and using graded lessons; a large number of teachers are preparing themselves more thoroughly for their work either by taking teacher-training courses or by reading books on teaching; more literature is being requested, and the Board of Religious Education is being used more in this Conference. Several new Christian Endeavor Societies have been organized, and there is a deeper interest in this work because of efforts of the Christian Endeavor Union.

The Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention, held at Wake Chapel in July, was one of the best held in this Conference, with helpful emphasis placed on practical demonstrations and methods of Sunday School work. The officers for the ensuing year are: president, L. L. Vaughan, Raleigh, N. C.; vice-president, H. W. Johnson, Fuquay Springs, N. C.; secretary, J. Fuller Johnson, Fuquay Springs, N. C., and treasurer, C. H. Stephenson, Raleigh, N. C. The next session will be held in the Damascus Church, near Chapel Hill, Tuesday and Wednesday after the second Sunday in July.

Since the last Conference the Christian Endeavor Union has been quite active, holding three quarterly meetings with splendid programs and good attendance. The officers of this union are: president, Galen Elliott; vice-president, Ruth Johnson; secretary, G. W. Eaves.

PLANS FOR THE ENSUING YEAR.

This committee has worked with the Board of Christian Education of the Southern Convention in promoting Sunday School and Christian Endeavor work, as each member of the committee is directly connected with the board, also with the Christian Endeavor Union.

The Christian Endeavor Union will hold a meeting with the Henderson Church December 11th and 12th. A splendid program has been planned, and every effort possible is being put forward to secure a large representation of young people. Dr. J. H. Lightbourne, C. H. Stephenson, and Prof. L. L. Vaughan have been invited to speak.

At least two, and perhaps three, district Children's Division Institutes have been planned for this Conference as soon after Christmas as possible; also some Young People's Institutes and visits to local Churches in the interest of Sunday School and Christian Endeavor.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That each pastor of this Conference so arrange his revival meetings that none will come during the Elon Summer Training School, which will be held at Elon College, N. C., July 25th to August 3, 1927. That the second week in July of each year be set aside as S. S. & C. E. Week, and every Church be urged to be represented with a full report and a live delegation.

2. That each pastor of the Conference who possibly can, arrange to attend the Summer School at Elon, and that each Church send at least one representative, paying all or part of the expenses.

3. We recommend the Daily Vacation Bible Schools as a splendid means of giving additional training in religion to boys and girls, and that they be held wherever possible.

4. That each young people's organization in the Conference get in touch with the Christian Endeavor Union. This applies to Young People's Mission-

ary Societies, organized classes, Christian Endeavor Societies, and to Churches where none of these organizations exist, but where there are young people.

5. That the Field Secretary of the Board of Christian Education be called upon for assistance in the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Societies wherever help is needed.

Carter presented the candidate for ordination, Dr. Staley read the Scripture and led the prayer, Dr. Lightbourne made the charge, and Dr. Newman presented the Bible. The service was impressive and beautiful. "Blest Be the Tie that Binds" was sung, and the service was closed with the benediction by Rev. F. D. Ballard, who was ordained.

The ministers present extended the right hand of fellowship, and Conference adjourned for dinner. Prayer by Rev. J. E. Franks.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Song service was led by Rev. J. A. Denton. Conference was called to order at 1:30 P. M. by the President. Devotional service was conducted by Rev. J. L. Foster by reading thirty-seventh Psalm, comments and prayer.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Jesus Christ Himself was a missionary, and that to a foreign field—the world. He did what He came to do, and on leaving the field, told those whom He had appointed to go ahead with the work and never let us. Paul felt the burden of this task and went about it in no uncertain way, declaring he was an ambassador for God to preach Jesus Christ to the whole world. Many since his day have been moved by the same power to carry on this great work of evangelizing the world. Shall we of today, who were once in darkness, but now have the light, and that by the gospel of missions, sit still or lag and hinder the spread of His salvation? God forbid.

We rejoice and thank God that the work in our own field is still going on, but deplore the little we are doing in the face of the great, great need.

We, your committee, therefore, recommend:

1. That prayer and supplication be made to Him who said, "Pray, ye, therefore, the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth laborers into His harvest," and that He will not only send laborers, but also give us a willingness to support them.

2. That we encourage, in every possible way, the woman's and young people's mission work which has already become such an asset to our mission cause.

3. That missions be preached in all our Churches by all our pastors on particular occasions that may be designated, and also taught in Sunday School, with special offerings thereto.

On motion, Rev. S. A. Bennett, Rev. G. H. Veasey, and Rev. S. E. Maddren were invited to seats as deliberative members of Conference and were introduced. Rev. S. A. Bennett addressed the Conference on "Something Extra," or "The Unfinished Task."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

The work at Antioch, Bethlehem and Cary Churches has been under the direction of our committee, the chairman acting as pastor.

Antioch has had a successful year, resulting in an increase of attendance, a successful revival with seventeen additions to the roll. Sufficient money has been raised to paint and cover the Church. The pastor's salary and Conference apportionment were raised in full, with a pledged increase of pastor's salary for next year.

The outlook for Bethlehem is not so encouraging, although a substantial increase in interest is in evidence, which gives hope of possible success. The Church enjoyed a real revival; however, there were only six additions to the membership. The attendance is necessarily small because of the few whites and the densely colored population. The pastor's salary and Conference apportionment were raised in full, with a pledge of a small increase in salary for next year.

The new organization at Cary has not grown in numbers and interest, as we anticipated. The need of a regular worshiping place accounts in part for this lack of interest. The offer to buy the old Baptist Church was refused by the co-operation of your committee and the Church with an agreement that a

vacant lot should be purchased on which to build. This was done at a cost of \$400.00 for the lot. However, later, through the advice of Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Mission Secretary, the old Baptist Church was purchased at quite a reduced price from the first offer, and said lot exchanged in part payment for the same. We trust that time will prove the wisdom of this action, as the Church now has a place of worship of its own. No revival has been held, but ten members have been added during the year.

While this committee has not been identified with the new organization at Caroleigh, near Raleigh, we are reliably informed that they have a very active membership, and are represented with a delegate to this Conference.

We recommend that Clayton Church, through this Conference to the North Carolina Conference, be granted the privilege of selling thirty feet from the east end of the Church lot of 105x210, leaving the size of the lot 105x180, for the sum of \$200.00, which amount is to be applied on indebtedness for seats.

On account of a misunderstanding on the part of this committee as to the percentage this committee was to receive from the Conference funds, the chairman, J. E. Franks, paid to the Cary Church \$100.00 of his own funds, and when this amount was asked of the Treasurer of the Conference, the Treasurer advised Bro. Franks that there were no more funds available. This has reference to last year's account.

We, therefore, recommend that Bro. J. E. Franks be paid out of this year's funds the sum of \$100.00 to reimburse him, and that we appropriate \$75.00 to Antioch Church, to be paid quarterly, on pastor's salary; and \$75.00 to Bethlehem Church, to be paid quarterly, on pastor's salary.

We also recommend that the balance of the money for home missions be paid to the Cary Church, to be paid quarterly, on pastor's salary, provided a pastor can be secured who will be approved by this committee.

The Church in this age needs to go forward in its program. In order to do this, it needs our whole-hearted financial support. After careful thought, we realize that we owe to God ourselves and what we possess. If we could once get the people to realize this, our Church problem of tithing would be solved, as would all other problems connected with the financial needs of the Church.

We recommend for the coming year:

That each pastor who has work in this Conference emphasize and make plain what stewardship means.

That each Church give whole-hearted support to the pastor in carrying out this program.

That we have a class in stewardship taught during the year, and helpful literature on this subject be provided for such study.

REPORT ON APPORTIONMENTS.

The Apportionment Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. That, in view of the fact that this Conference adopted, at the 1924 session, the recommendation of the Finance Committee of the Southern Christian Convention, as submitted at its 1924 session, namely: that we accept our proportional part of the \$10,000 increase from the Conferences, which is \$3,500; therefore, we recommend Conference apportionments for the several Churches as follows (see the table of apportionments). The total amount apportioned is \$4,690.

2. The Eastern North Carolina Conference voting to divide Church apportionments on a basis of 75 per cent to the Southern Christian Convention and 25 per cent to Conference funds; therefore, 75 per cent of \$4,690, which is \$3,517.50, being the part to send to the Convention, and balance, 25 per cent, which is \$1,172.50, being the part retained in the Conference treasury for Conference expenditures.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education would urge our people to continue their support and patronage of Elon and Bethlehem Colleges. These institutions have

been built and equipped by the sacrifices of our constituency, they are owned and controlled by the Christian Church, and they are the servants of the Church under obligations to inculcate Christian principles and practices among our young people and prepare them for the exemplification of these principles in their service to the Church. Christian education is not and cannot be a part of life, nor apart from life, but must be the spirit of life and the life of the spirit in order to measure up to the ideals which actuated the founders of our colleges. As they are true to these ideals, so should the Church be true to them with their financial support and patronage. They belong to the Church, have been established by the Church, should be guided by the Church, and supported in all their efforts to express the spirit of the Church in building character, in educating for service, and preparing for efficient leadership.

Rev. M. T. Sorrell, an ordained minister of this Conference, requests a loan of \$100, to continue his studies at Elon College. Whenever a licentiate is ordained and becomes an elder in the Conference, he passes from under the direction of your Educational Committee and has reached the purpose for which the educational fund is provided, but owing to peculiar circumstances in this case, we recommend that the loan be granted, but that this action should not become a precedent for future action.

Rev. D. T. McKenney reports that he has had no charge the past year, but is anxious to serve wherever an opportunity is given. He desires to continue his studies until he is prepared for ordination.

Rev. J. A. Denton has served Churches and has exercised his gift in an acceptable manner. We recommend that he continue his preparation looking to his ordination to the full ministry as soon as he is able to pass the required examination as prescribed by our government.

Rev. M. R. Moss, a licentiate of this Conference, requests that his name be dropped from our biblical class. We recommend that his request be granted, as he has returned his license granted at last session.

On motion, the program was changed so as to permit Rev. J. O. Atkinson, D. D., Mission Secretary of the Southern Christian Convention, to use the hour for the annual address of the President for his address to the Conference on "Missions" on account of the fact that Dr. Atkinson could not be present at the hour allotted to him on the program.

An amendment to the preceding motion provided that C. D. Johnston, of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference and superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, also be given time for his address on the opening day.

On motion, Rev. J. O. Atkinson, D. D., and C. D. Johnston, superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference, and Rev. M. A. Pollard, of the Alabama Conference, were seated as deliberative members.

On motion, the Treasurer and Finance Committee were requested to report in detail the amounts apportioned to the various Church enterprises by each Church of the Conference.

At this hour, Rev. J. O. Atkinson, D. D., Mission Secretary, addressed the Conference on the subject of "Missions," with great fervor and great power.

On motion, the Conference adjourned for dinner.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference called to order by the President, Dr. G. O. Lankford.

Devotional services were conducted by Rev. J. M. Allred.

Rev. H. F. Starr, of the M. E. Church, South, was enrolled as a visiting brother. T. B. Dawson, of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference, was seated as deliberative member.

President Lankford appointed the following special committees:

Finance—W. R. Sellars, Dr. M. E. Street, C. L. Bray.

Resolutions—Rev. T. J. Green, Rev. G. R. Underwood.

Place for Next Conference—Paul E. Coble, E. W. Brown.

In submitting the report of the Executive Committee, and on motion for the adoption of the report, Rev. J. O. Atkinson, D. D., was asked to discuss and explain the proposed budget system inaugurated by the last Christian Convention at its meeting in Durham.

After the discussion and explanation by Dr. Atkinson, a motion was lodged to adopt the budget system, which was lost by a rising vote, 13 for and 21 against.

This hour having been set aside by special order to hear C. D. Johnston, of the Christian Orphanage, Mr. Johnston addressed the Conference in the interest of the Orphanage by an appeal that was accepted by all as a wonderful effort in behalf of the orphans of the Christian Church.

The Committee on Religious Literature submitted its report as follows, which, after discussion, was adopted:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Man is of a three-fold nature—physical, mental and spiritual.

The physical man needs the best of food prepared in the best way possible. The mental man needs the best of brain food he can get from the best books, papers, and teachers. The spiritual man needs soul food. He needs Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "I am the bread of life. He that eateth of the bread I shall give him shall never hunger." He also said, "I am the water of life. He that drinketh of this water shall never thirst."

We make the following recommendations:

1. That our people read the Bible more carefully and prayerfully. Jesus said: "Search the Scriptures, for in them ye think ye have eternal life, and they are they which testify of me."

2. We recommend that our people subscribe to and read *The Christian Sun*, the official organ of the S. C. C.; it being sound in doctrine and progressive in thought.

3. We recommend that all, who can, subscribe to the *Herald of Gospel Liberty*, the official organ of the A. C. C., the oldest religious newspaper in America.

4. We recommend that all our Sunday Schools use our own literature published at Dayton, Ohio.

5. We recommend that our people subscribe to and read the *Christian Missionary*.

Ministerial reports were read. On motion, the reading of the ministerial reports were abbreviated to cover only the important statistical items contained therein.

On account of the wonderful report received from Glendon Church, on motion, the Conference stood in recognition of the wonderful accomplishments of the Glendon congregation and the return of the money appropriated for the aid of the Glendon Church to the Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Whereas, we, your Committee on Foreign Missions, recognize that our Lord Jesus Christ was the greatest missionary the world has ever known, and know that His parting command to us was "Go, ye, into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Also, we firmly believe in the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, and, therefore, take cognizance of the fact that we are our brother's keeper. We also realize that there is a great need. Therefore, we beg to repeat as follows:

1. We urge each Church of this Conference, as other committees at other times have, to organize a Woman's Missionary Society.

2. We recommend that every pastor make special effort all through the year to inform His people of the needs of our foreign fields, and that each ask for

frequent contributions to assist in sending the blessed gospel to our 70,000 souls in Porto Rico and our 1,000,000 souls in Japan.

3. We recommend that each Sunday School have a missionary address by some one of its members who is vitally interested in missions, and that an offering be taken once each month for foreign missions.

4. We urge every minister and every other person concerned to read our missionary organ, the *Christian Missionary*.

5. Although the response during "Mission Month" last year was not what we expected and what it might have been from many Churches, yet we wish to commend every minister and every Church for the energy spent and the results accomplished.

6. We recommend the organization and maintenance of mission study classes in every Church—one for young people and one for older people.

Hank's Chapel has a building program, as we have heard, and has asked for assistance.

We, your committee, recommend that the accrued percentage be disbursed as follows: 25 per cent be retained in the treasury to meet any emergency, and the balance be divided fifty-fifty between Smithwood and Hank's Chapel when Hank's Chapel has commenced building.

We recommend also that this shall be distributed as last year, through the Southern Christian Convention.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Southern Christian Convention has made rapid and wholesome progress during the recent years of our history. This progress and wider outlook can be attributed quite largely to a better educated and trained ministry and laity. The one most potent factor in this more highly trained leadership, as all must recognize, is Elon College. This institution, which is a child of the Convention, is now better prepared to render service to the Church than at any previous time in its history. We would, therefore, urge upon our pastors and people a whole-hearted support of the college with our means, prayers and patronage; for as we render this support we make it possible for the college to give that service for which it was created.

We call to the attention of all our people, particularly our pastors, Sunday School superintendents, and teachers, our Summer School for Christian Workers at Elon College. This school has done and is doing a very fine and constructive work in our Church life. We highly commend this school to the earnest and thoughtful consideration of all who desire a more efficient leadership in our local Churches. We would suggest that, wherever possible, our Churches send one or more of their young people to this school, paying the expenses of the same.

There is no greater need in our Conference, in the judgment of our committee, than a thoroughly prepared ministry. Our standards are not in keeping with the progress of this age. A changing world demands a growing ministry. A preacher must go forward or be left behind. He can go forward if he will. Helps are abundant and available at reasonable prices, and the preacher owes it to himself, his people, and his Lord to make all possible use of the sources of help at his command.

Your committee is deeply sensible of its great responsibility in passing upon the candidates who have appeared before it with recommendations for licensure and ordination from the several Churches interested. We have given our most prayerful thought and consideration to each candidate appearing before us and to every request presented by the local Church. Our decisions are as follow:

1. Licentiate E. C. Brady has completed his course at Elon College; is now engaged in preaching and teaching, and after this year contemplates further preparation for the work to which he is called. We heartily commend him for his achievements thus far and for his worthy aspirations for the future.

2. Licentiates D. R. Moffitt and V. D. Shepherd have appeared before the committee with requests for their ordination. We recommend that they pursue the course of study prescribed by the "Principles and Governments" of our Church, and that they appear before the Educational Committee for examination prior to the next session of this Conference.

3. Bro. H. V. Cox, a member of Pleasant Ridge Christian Church, appeared for licensure, and passed a satisfactory examination. We recommend that he be licensed to preach during the present session of Conference and that he pursue

the course of study prescribed by our "Principles and Government," and that he appear for examination prior to next session.

4. Bro. W. L. Owens, of Randleman, and B. H. Loudermilk, of Pleasant Grove, again appeared for examination. We recommend that they prepare for a satisfactory examination, as required by our "Principles and Government," prior to next session of Conference; in the meantime, that they be authorized to exercise their gifts as opportunity affords.

5. Licentiates R. O. Smith, W. B. Terrell, and J. U. Fogleman have made no reports to the committee.

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools, beg to make the following report:

We held a Sunday School Convention at Ramseur Christian Church July 22 and 23, 1926, for the Western North Carolina Christian Conference.

We had a splendid convention. A good program was rendered. Considerable progress has been made in the work since first organized at Pleasant Ridge three years ago.

Misses Madge Moffitt and Julia Woodson led the singing. They put pep in the entire convention. Some very able talks and discussions by Dr. Atkinson, Dr. Walters, Chas. D. Johnston, Dr. Lankford and others. C. A. Walker, of Burlington, N. C., makes us a splendid president. The minutes of our convention are printed in the "Christian Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Hand Book."

We recommend the following:

1. That teacher-training classes be organized and carried on in all of the schools where they do not now exist.

2. That the subject of missions be taught to the young folks at least once a month, and that each school be given an opportunity to contribute to missions monthly.

3. That each school contribute monthly offerings to our Christian Orphanage.

4. That we use our own literature in our schools, and that all officers and teachers be urged by their pastors to use the *Journal of Christian Education*, a monthly magazine for Christian leadership, with special emphasis on Sunday Schools, and an official organ of the Christian Church.

Problem 1—Consecrated, resourceful leaders; leaders who will sacrifice unselfishly for a live, consecrated Christian Endeavor; leaders who will "search the Scriptures" and impart with interest and reverence God's Holy Book, the Bible.

Problem 2—Plans. Plans and methods for the work have never yet failed

to get the needed response from boys and girls. New methods, new plans, new ideas will bring about the great faith in a welcome, definite way.

Christian Endeavor has proved a complete training school of the Church for Christian leaders, and consecrated Christian leaders are ever a part of our prayers. Let the youth in your Church relax, rest, or become inactive and you see the Church begin to die. Bearing the name "Christian," we, perhaps, have more responsibility than any other denomination; more to live up to, in fact. Why not, then, stress the development of youth by systematic study of the Bible, regular prayer and constant service to God and man?

Inasmuch, therefore, as this department of the Church is so essential to the spiritual culture of all, we recommend:

First. That each pastor in this Conference put forth a special effort to organize a Christian Endeavor Society in each of his Churches.

Second. That each society seek information from the Field Secretary, Miss Pattie Coghill, Henderson, N. C., regarding Christian Endeavor principles.

Third. That each society seek earnestly to live up to the Christian Endeavor motto, "For Christ and the Church."

DURHAM, N. C., APRIL 28, 29, 1926.

FIRST DAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Woman's Missionary Convention of the Southern Christian Convention met in the Duke Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, Durham, N. C., on Wednesday, April 28, 1926, at 10 o'clock A. M., and, on account of sickness of the President, was called to order by the Vice-President, Mrs. J. A. Williams.

Devotional services were conducted by Mrs. H. S. Hardcastle, of Suffolk, Va., after which Mrs. W. D. Parry, of Raleigh, N. C., rendered a special organ selection.

Enrollment of delegates and visitors: Eastern Virginia, 17; North Carolina, 56; Virginia Valley Central, 3; Visitors, 30.

The Vice-President, Mrs. J. A. Williams, gave a very interesting address on the necessity of co-operation in the local societies, district Conferences and the Convention.

Report of young people's work was read and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK.

As Superintendent of the Young People for the Southern Christian Convention, I make the following report:

Eastern Virginia Christian Conference: Number of Young People's Societies in 1924, 21; number of Young People's Societies in 1926, 24; number of Willing Workers' Societies in 1924, 13; number of Willing Workers' Societies in 1926, 17; money raised by Young People and Willing Workers' Societies during biennium, \$4,032.81.

North Carolina Christian Conference: Number of Young People's Societies in 1924, 14; number of Young People's Societies in 1926, 12; number of Willing Workers' Societies in 1924, 12; number of Willing Workers' Societies in 1926, 8; money raised by Young People and Willing Workers' Societies during biennium, \$.....

The Woman's Missionary work of the Alabama Conference is only about two years old, and Mrs. E. M. Carter, President, reports no Young People's Missionary organizations so far. The Christian Endeavor Societies are the

only young people's organizations in the Conference, and only six of these are reported. Mrs. Carter reports the missionary work as moving along very slowly in the Alabama Conference for the great need and want of leadership. She regrets exceedingly, she writes, that their Conference cannot be represented at the Convention, and she asks that the women here will remember them and their young missionary work in your prayers. Can't we do something to help the women and young people to know and realize the great needs of our missionary cause and aid them some way toward organizing the young people?

Have been unable to get reports from the Georgia and Alabama Conference, as well as the Valley Virginia Conference. However, there is very little work being done among the women of the Georgia and Alabama Conference. The work in the Valley Virginia Conference is slowly growing, and it is to be regretted that they failed to make any report.

We feel proud of the splendid work our young people are doing, but when we stop and consider how great is the need and how large the field, we realize that our number of workers is very small and quite insufficient to meet the demands. We must look forward and, with greater interest and zeal, endeavor to organize our young people and help them catch the vision of the great work and opportunity that awaits. May we realize that even greater enthusiasm must be put in our work, and pray more earnestly that the work and workers which we have aided in the past may realize that we are still with them in greater support than ever before.

What can we as a Convention do the coming biennium toward helping to enlist our young people, their interest and influence, in the vital work for which the Church itself was founded?

Sellars, the efficient Treasurer, reported a total received from woman's societies the past year of \$2,994.22; from young people's societies, \$458.83; from junior young people's, \$91.50; from Willing Workers, \$188; Cradle Roll, \$124.87; district meetings, \$73.90; Conference offering, \$40.23—total, \$3,971.55. The goal for the year was \$4,000, making the deficit \$28.45. Mrs. Sellars' report adopted.

Miss Mary D. Atkinson, superintendent of Young People's Societies, presented a chart showing what each society had paid during the year. Report adopted, and Miss Atkinson requested to have same printed in *The Christian Sun*.

The superintendent of literature had no report. President requested members to visit literature table; also urged members to subscribe to *Everyland*, as our North Carolina Conference had been asked to subscribe for twenty-five.

Mrs. C. H. Rowland, superintendent of cradle roll, made an impressive verbal report, stressing a demonstration she had seen at Blue Ridge to awaken interest in cradle roll work. Eight cradle rolls had been active during year.

Mrs. J. A. Williams, President of our Southern Woman's Board, was presented and expressed pleasure at meeting with the session.

The district leaders reported splendid rallies held the past spring. Three splendid reports were read—Miss Margaret Alston, of the Vance, Franklin and Warren District; Mrs. J. B. Montgomery, of the

Alamance, and Miss Emma Hart, of the Lee Chatham. Mrs. Isaac Foust gave a verbal report of the Randolph District. Mrs. C. H. Rowland recommended that the district reports be adopted.

It was moved and adopted that next year the district leaders make the reports for all societies in their group.

The President presented and acknowledged the twelve ministers present and expressed the pleasure of the Conference in having so many interested.

The societies were well represented. Twenty-three (23) Woman's Societies, eight (8) Young People's Societies, three (3) Junior Young People's, seven (7) Willing Workers, eight (8) Cradle Rolls read reports from the floor, and all were excellent. We have thirty-six (36) active Woman's Societies, with a membership of eight hundred and ten (810), two hundred and sixty-nine (269) of whom take the *Christian Missionary*.

Mrs. Vaughan, President, presented a message full of recommendations for the help and good of the organization. Her question of what constitutes an effective organization was answered by the laying of a foundation of prayer and building with faith and service.

A delightful musical program was given by Miss Louise Brockwell and Mrs. Fred Wheeler, accompanied by Mrs. W. D. Parry.

A special offering of \$40.23 was taken, this to paint the Rocky Ford Church.

After the appointment of the special committees, the Conference adjourned and was served a bountiful dinner by the ladies of the Raleigh Church.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon session was opened by devotional service conducted by Mrs. W. M. Jay, of Elon College. Her Scripture lesson was the 3rd chapter of Phil. She spoke very forcefully of Paul's purpose, his zeal for God, how from the day he met Jesus on Damascus road his life was dominated by Christ. A series of prayers was led by Dr. Atkinson and closed by Mrs. Jay.

Mrs. Rowland's subject was "Echoes from the General Convention" at Urbana, Ill. She stressed 10 cents per member for the Ella G. Gunston promotion fund. She spoke of the personal feeling the Convention felt for the McKnights. "They were in Urbana and sailed today," she said. This was November 5th.

Mrs. Denison's retirement as president of the Woman's Board was noted. She had done a wonderful service. Mrs. Hanhauser assumed the office.
