TIMBER RIDGE CHRISTIAN CHURCH—AUGUST 14-16, 1929.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We, your Executive Committee, have transacted the following items of busi-

ness during the year:

We made an appropriation of \$35 to each of the following Churches: Island Ford, Bethel, Palmyra, Joppa, Dry Run, Woods Chapel, Whistler's Chapel, High Point, East Liberty, Mt. Lebanon, and St. Peter's; said appropriations to be paid at the end of each quarter and on condition that the pastors of said Churches be approved by the Executive and Home Mission Committees.

We asked Rev. B. J. Earp to preach at Island Ford, High Point, Christian Chapel, and Sandy Bottom, and voted that he be paid \$100 out of the Home

Mission Fund, in addition to the appropriations already made.

We approved of Rev. Joe French as a pastor of several of the above-named Churches, and voted to make no deduction from appropriations made to his Churches on account of his late start in the year, and to pay him half of his appropriation December 15, 1928.

Rev. W. B. Fuller tendered his resignation as Stewardship Secretary, which

was accepted. Mrs. J. J. Lincoln was elected in his stead.

The following amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws were adopted:

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Article IV, section 1, of the Constitution amended to include standing committees on Sunday Schools, Christian Endeavor, Evangelism, Social Service, Woman's Board, and Christian Union. Amended further, that the President (if an elder) be a member ex-officio of the Committee on Education.

Article V, section 1, of the Constitution amended to include in the list of officers a Director of Religious Education, a Conference Missionary Secretary, and a Stewardship Secretary.

Article III, section 1, amended to include as members of Conference all duly elected officers of the Conference and the chairman of each standing committee, with the proviso that no one person have more than one vote on any one question.

Article III of the Constitution amended by adding section 3, as follows: "The members of the Woman's Mission Board shall be associate members of Conference."

Section 1 of the By-Laws amended to read as follows: "The Conference shall meet annually on Wednesday before the second Sunday in August."

Vacancies on standing committees were supplied. The annual address was delivered by Rev. B. J. Earp. Adjourned for dinner.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference called to order at 1:45 by President.

Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. Joe French.

On motion, the following were invited to seats as deliberative members: Dr. W. P. Minton, Dr. J. O. Atkinson, C. D. Johnston, J. Osear Atkinson, Jr., Rev. W. C. Hook, Rev. Joe French, Rev. R. L. Williamson. Each responded with appropriate remarks.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Religious literature should be a large part of the reading matter of every individual. The literature of a home is incomplete without something that is of a religious nature. It is more important in this day to use religious literature than in previous times, as there is so much literature that has not for its purpose that which is high and noble.

We, the committee, recommend the prayerful and thoughtful reading of that perfect Book, the Bible. There are other books which are uplifting and educational, but the Bible is second to none.

We recommend that the Church papers be used throughout the denomination. This will aid us in rendering service to our Master and keep us well informed of the work our Church is doing.

We recommend the use of our own Sunday School literature in our Sunday Schools, thereby proving loyalty to our own publishing houses.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE.

Since we have no special worker for social service in our Conference, we submit the following:

Proud of the name Christian, we know that the pastors and leaders of our Christian Church wish to show in their religious life the spirit of Christ, upon whose life and teaching our faith is founded. He said, "The Lord sent me to heal the broken-hearted, to give recovery of sight to the blind." He also said, "I came not to be ministered unto, but to minister."

In consideration of this, we recommend that the pastors and lay leaders of our Churches make use of every opportunity to comfort the distressed, to minister to the needs of the poor, to aid in the problems of the perplexed, to give sympathy, understanding, and cheer whenever and wherever possible, and to aid when necessary in the restoration of the sick to health, in memory of our Christ, who stands without parallel in history, in this matter of ministering to the needs, both of mind and body, of the people of his day.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

Evangelism is the recruiting work of the Church, the winning of souls for the Master, helping men and women to the experience of real salvation.

We should not depend only on a revival in the Church. The fires of evangelism should be kept burning every day in the year. There is the visitation, pastoral, lay, and educational evangelism—all of which are essential to help carry out our Lord's command, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."

Soul-winning should not be left to the pastor alone, but members of every local Church should share with the pastor the responsibility of winning souls to Christ. We fear that far too many Church members get so busy with the material things of the Church that they forget the one essential thing—the one thing for which Christ died, and for which the Church exists, namely: to save and bring men to Him and enlist them in His service.

Evangelism should begin in the home. If parents pray, children will easily follow.

Church people should get a real revival of religion, and then look after the backsliders and the unsaved.

The music should be made interesting and spiritual in a revival. Jazz songs will not win souls to Christ.

Our 2,511 members and six ministers have brought to Christ during the year 144 souls—an average of one soul to every seventeen members. Is it not evident that we need greater emphasis upon evangelism, and a deeper consecration to our task?

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN UNION.

This is, perhaps, the first report on Christian union ever presented to this Conference. The fact that the Southern Christian Convention has recently added a committee of this kind to the list of standing committees indicates the

growing sentiment in favor of the union of the followers of Christ. Nor is this the only evidence of the growing sentiment along this line. Many articles appear in religious papers, and books are written favoring the idea of Christian union, and the matter is receiving serious consideration in many and various Church gatherings.

Our own Church has, throughout its entire history, stood strong for the union of all followers of Christ. We rejoice that we have pioneered in this field. We are glad to see the Christian world now coming slowly but surely to the position we have held for 132 years, which position was for many years a very unpopular one.

At the present time we are negotiating with the Congregationalists with a view to uniting, and present indications are that the union will take place at no far distant date. Our General Convention is called to meet one year earlier than the regular time, in order to discuss and hasten on this important matter.

We recommend that our people strive to promote the cause of Christian union in every way possible.

No greater task was ever assigned to any individual or group of people than that of our Lord and Saviour when He said unto His disciples, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."

Every true Christian wants to be faithful and loyal in carrying out this great task. According to the report of Churches in our Conference as given in The Annual, our missionary offerings have increased every year. This is very encouraging, and we sincerely hope this will continue from year to year. We must increase our missionary giving to help accomplish this great task.

We should keep ourselves informed about the work being done by our denomination in the foreign mission fields by reading our publications and other literature put out from time to time by our missionary departments.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference called to order at 9:30 o'clock by the President.

Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. R. L. Williamson. Roll called. Minutes of yesterday read and approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

We strongly urge upon our people the necessity for obtaining an education in these days of progress and intelligence. We emphasize the necessity for obtaining this education in a Christian college nad in a religious atmosphere. With this in mind, we recommend to our young people our own institution, Elon College, and urge upon them to investigate the advantages and opportunities there when selecting a college.

We recommend that our Sunday Schools take the offering for Elon College on each fifth Sunday, as requested by the Southern Christian Convention.

Bro. Alfred A. Dofflemyre, a candidate for the ministry, reports that, owing to lack of funds, he does not expect to enter Elon College this fall, but wishes to be continued as a candidate for the ministry, hoping to enter college again in a year or two.

We have received letter of transfer for Rev. Joe French, and recommend that he be received into this Conference.

We recommend that Rev. R. L. Williamson be received, subject to his transfer, which will doubtless arrive in the near future.

Address by Prof. A. L. Hook, dean of Elon College.

REPORT OF STEWARDSHIP SECRETARY.

As the most tenable means of presenting stewardship directly and equitably to the Conference constituency, an effort to get people to reading on the subject was made the key undertaking. Nothing else is so fundamentally instructive as reading, and, with us as a Conference, apparently foundational knowledge of the early doctrine of Christian stewardship woefully is lacking. Thus, it seeming certain that some general information must constitute the background for a worthy development of the stewardship idea and enterprise, as a first step we set about to formulate a reading project (not a contest) for all the Churches. To do this, in choice of material it was necessary to find the level of requirement both as to content and cost of procurement. There were reasons why books or even a book could not be made the basis of employment, although a book, "The Call to Christian Stewardship," by Crawford, was recommended as additional, and in a few cases read with profit and delight.

The main course of suggested reading has consisted of Layman's widely known thirty-seven pamphlets, approximating 375 pages, to be divided into packs and, by a rotating method, circulated as a book is circulated in a book club. These pamphlets did not perfectly fill our need because they emphasize only one phase of stewardship; that is, tithing. However, since, in the main, our need was so primary, and since there can be no real stewardship without tithing—tithing and keeping the Sabbath being the most basic laws of Christian living—it seemed both wise and sufficient to make the pamphlet material first choice in the reading selection.

Sixteen of the twenty-six Churches, part of which supported the effort very kindly, made some attempt at the reading project. Considering conditions, several of the secretaries did excellently by the work. Others did their best, and well. Of still others, it would seem that ready insight into the necessity for study, intensive prosecution of the reading plan has been lacking. Twelve secretaries reporting give these figures: A few persons (nine, to be exact) read the prescribed or some other stewardship book; 41 persons, including 8 Church officials, read all of the 37 pamphlets; 90 other persons read more than half; 300 others read from fewer than half down to half-a-dozen or less, making in all 449 persons, or more than one person in every six of the entire Conference membership doing some measure of requested reading. Not a bad showing for all ages, sizes, and conditions. That the project already has borne some fruit is evidenced in the fact that there is discernible some small interest in, and desire for, further stewardship light and information. On the whole, it cannot be said the Conference leadership has shown itself to be sanguine for stewardship reading, but it does appear that the wonderful uplift to be gained thereby has begun to be felt by some who have had the matter in hand.

And last, in some Churches criticism and near-hostility made their contribution, all of which, by God's help, patiently has been overlooked, as, in His

name, eventually it shall be overcome.

In view of the foregoing, by way of constructive aim and as guide and help to your future Stewardship Secretary, the more important part of this report embodies itself in the following recommendations:

INFORMATION.

1. Continued and continuous reading of all current stewardship matter at hand, especially the weekly writings of our own stewardship leaders in *The Christian Sun* and *Herald of Gospel Liberty*. Also books on Christian stewardship, such as can be purchased or made available through a Church or community library or otherwise.

2. The adoption of a stewardship book to be used for class study during

the special stewardship period, November-December.

Administration.

3. Creation or continuance, as the case may be, of a finance committee, to be composed of the pastor as ex-officio, the financial secretary, treasurer, stewardship secretary, and from one to three other members whose obligation shall be to study; and, as rapidly as can be made practicable to a given situation, apply to the Church's financial management the best methods known to good business.

4. Looking toward acquiring the highest standard of Christian character, and to a more commensurate and adequate Church and benevolence support through systematic, individual paying and giving; the finance committee and the pastor conferring and concurring, immediate urge of definite, constructive preparation for early introduction of the annual every-member canvass.

DEDICATION.

5. Where a pulpit is occupied by a pastor every Sunday, a series of four to six stewardship sermons; and where preaching is monthly, stewardship expressly to be stressed in not less than three consecutive sermons—in either instance, preferably immediately preceding "Tithers' Enrollment Day," second Sunday in December.

6. Signers of the tithers' enrollment card definitely to be sought and enrolled at the preaching service second Sunday in December, or nearest Sunday thereto.

We recommend that each local Church elect a committee of three to confer with a committee of five elected by Conference to try to group our Churches into pastorates by the 1930 session of Conference.

We appreciate the efforts of our President in bringing this matter before

Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON S. S. & CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

We recommend to every Sunday School the standardization adopted by our Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention in session at Newport this year. We urge every school to attain an average of at least 75 per cent, so they will receive a banner. This was a very forward step in our Convention, and we hope it will be the means of improving our Sunday Schools.

We recommend that special emphasis be made to organize more Christian Endeavor Societies in our Conference.

We heartily endorse the giving to missions and our orphanage at Elon College. We commend the idea of giving a quarterly offering to our own Elon College.

SECOND DAY—EVENING SESSION.

This service was in charge of the Woman's Home and Foreign Mission Board. After a devotional and song service, a report was given of the missionary conferences and rallies held during the year, a copy of which follows:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSION BOARD.

This year has shown some progress in the field of the Woman's Missionary Conference; also some discouragements. Several societies failed to live through the year.

The district rallies were held in May and June. The Churches of Shenandoah County met and organized in a district, making five districts over the Conference.

Rev. R. L. Williamson, Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Rev. Joe French and others gave inspiring addresses at the rallies. The rallies were well attended, and it was encouraging to have so large a number of people come in touch with mission ideas.

The Woman's Missionary Conference was held at Leaksville, August 1st. The officers were encouraged to have nearly all the ministers of the Conference present and helping in one way and another to carry the burden of the day. There were eight Churches represented. Two others, with active missionary societies, were not represented. There are yet sixteen Churches where no missionary society exists. What a wonderful opportunity awaits us! Shall we sit idle and enjoy ease when a little effort might gain new societies? Reports showed six Woman's Societies, with 174 members, sent in \$296; 4 Young People's Societies, with 94 members, sent in \$168.14; 5 Cradle Roll Societies, with about 100 members, sent in \$19.30. Funds sent in from rallies amounted to \$58.84, and from miscellaneous sources, \$87.93, making a total sent in to our Treasurer during the year, \$630.21.

Our financial goal the past year was \$500 for missions, and \$10 for Convention expenses to be sent to the Southern Christian Convention, and for the coming year is \$541.75, but since we went about \$29 over the top this year we have faith to believe we shall raise the amount asked for next year.

Winchester Woman's Society was the banner society, having reached 100 per cent on the goals. Others deserving special mention are Bethlehem Woman's Society, Antioch Young People's Society, and Linville Woman's Society.

An offering was taken for Porto Rico rebuilding fund, amounting to \$12.51.

The Woman's Conference will be held next year at Antioch.

We would, therefore, urge:

1. That presidents of missionary societies see to it that a mission cradle roll department, using mission mite boxes, be organized in their respective societies.

- That Sunday School superintendents keep the mission cause continually before their schools by making short talks or having some one make them who is deeply interested in missions.
- 3. That Sunday School teachers use their opportunities to make lasting impressions on the children's minds, which may be done by telling of the heroic deeds of great missionaries in their work of love.
 - 4. That our ministers preach more missionary sermons.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM.

The conduct of the human family has never been, is not, and never will be perfect; hence the abiding necessity for moral reform. The catalogue of immorality is too long to give here, even if it were necessary. Suffice it to say that we believe that this intelligent audience and those who read this report in The Annual are highly capable of distinguishing between morality and immorality. It is, therefore, not a matter of ignorance in knowing right from wrong, but a lack of moral courage sufficient to enable us to do what we already know to be right.

That it is sinful to be profane, vulgar, dishonest, intemperate, adulterous, untruthful, unkind, unholy, Sabbath-desecrater, etc., we all know. That too often we lack grace and moral courage sufficient to live above these things is a sad fact that we regret to have to admit. Let us pray for grace to overcome these habits, realizing that Christian people are the only living evidence of Christ in the world. Our prayers are that all may come to realize that our lives are an open book that the world is reading, whether we wish them to do so or not. The only Bible that many read is that given out by our every-day lives. May our daily prayer be that it may reflect the true spirit of the Holy Writ. There is a gospel according to every one of us; whether we realize it or not, we are leading others. The question that should concern us most is "whither are we leading."

Your committee is thankful to report that it sees signs of moral improvement in the last year. One of these evidences is that the Church has begun to view with alarm the immoral conditions as now exists. History reveals the fact that these and worse conditions have existed in various forms at all times. "Where there is no vision, the people perish." We believe that the Church is beginning to see the dangerous cloud of sin that has been threatening, yea destroying, the world for a long time. Our hope is that when man is made to realize his danger, some effort will be made to void it. As the sunshine against the cloud makes it appear darker, so we believe that it is the "sunshine of righteousness" against the cloud of sin that is causing it to appear darker just now.

The prohibition movement is a mighty step forward, and if it is not effective—if it does not hinder the liquor crowd in their ungodly business of making merchandise of the souls, health, and self-respect of our people—why, the great howl against it?—a hit dog hollows." Your committee favors beating this dog until he can't hollow.

No one who knows the facts can deny that this great moral movement is gaining ground day by day. We thank God and take courage for the mighty impetus given this movement at our last general election, which should settle for years to come the question of how the citizens of this country stand on this question. May God help us to continue to vote as we pray.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

That despotic tyrant Berkely said, "I thank God that there are no public schools in America, and I hope there never will be." Why? So that he and his kind could take an unfair advantage of the ignorance of the people and rob them of their liberty and many other things that are dear to them. We are grateful that since Berkely, God has raised up one-our own great and good Horace Mann—who has rightly been called "the father of our public school system." That movement has continued to grow until a high school education is within the reach of practically every child in this country. Thank God that this removes forever, we hope, the possibility of despotic rule in this country.

But education of the head to the neglect of the heart is dangerous. Babylon, Egypt, Greece, Rome and Germany all did that to their own downfall and the injury of the world. To do this makes education dangerous, because it becomes a weapon in the hands of evil men. The curse of denominationalism has made it impossible for the State schools to give the religious training that they should give. The denominational school is the only institution now that combines religious training with mental and physical training. It is a physical

impossibility for the State college to care for the college students at the present time. For these two reasons alone, we cannot afford to fail to support by means and patronage our denominational schools.

We are thankful for the progress and present outlook of our own Piedmont Junior College, at Wadley, Ala., with its arrangement for full accreditment of the first two years of college work and the cost of attendance within the reach of most every one, we see no reason why all within reach of it, and especially those who are members of the Congregational-Christian Church, should not patronize it by sending their sons and daughters there. It does not seem business-like to build a mill and carry our grinding somewhere else.

Therefore, we recommend:

 That we give our loyal support to our denominational colleges.
 That all of our people that feel themselves called of God to preach His gospel seek to train themselves for His work in one of our Church schools.

3. That we approve of the method of securing the \$10,000 for current expenses for Piedmont Junior College, as stated in The Christian Sun arranged by the Executive Board and Board of Finance of the Southern Christian Convention, which is as follows: from the Convention treasury, as interest on the Convention note for \$12,000, \$750; fifth-Sunday offerings from the Sunday Schools, \$250; from the Churches of the Georgia and Alabama Conferences, \$1,000 from the Southern Christian Convention membership outside of Georgia and Alabama, \$5,000; from interested friends every where, \$3,000.

4. That we accept as our share of the offerings from the Sunday Schools

on the fifth Sunday of the Georgia and Alabama Conference, \$100.

5. That we favor the policy of the Conferences of Georgia and Alabama giving their note for \$20,000 endowment for Piedmont Junior College, the interest of 5 per cent on the same to be paid semi-annually, but the principle never to be paid, and that the Georgia and Alabama Conference accept as their share \$7,500, the interest of \$375 be apportioned to the Churches.

6. That the usual offering be taken for Piedmont Junior College by the Georgia and Alabama Conference during the Conference session of \$100, and that all money subscribed by the Sunday Schools be applied on the \$100 to be raised by fifth-Sunday offerings and all money raised or pledged by missionary societies, Christian Endeavor Societies, Churches or individuals be applied on the interest on the endowment note.

7. That we heartily endorse the work of Dr. Frank E. Jenkins and his co-worker in their efforts to raise \$300,000 for Piedmont Junior College, and that we will do our best to help him raise at least ten thousand dollars within

the next thirty days.

8. That each Church of the Conference observe "Piedmont Junior College Day" with a suitable program this Conference year.

9. That each family in the Conference subscribe for the college paper,

"The Purple and Gold," which will cost 50 cents for the college year.

- 10. That a suitable person be chosen by each Church in the Conference to look after the interests of education and Piedmont Junior College, as to publicity, students and finances.
- 11. We recommend that all our Churches send representatives to our Summer School of Religious Education at Wadley.
- 12. That we ordain Rev. H. R. Heard to the full work of the gospel
- 13. That we extend the license of Revs. A. B. Mann, E. B. Smith, C. L. Reese, W. W. Willingham, and H. A. Screws another year.
- 14. That we drop from our ministerial roll W. D. Wilkerson, W. H. Brewer, Vinson Reese, E. J. Eastwood.

LETTER FROM MISSION SECRETARY.

Since I cannot be at your Conference, because of an engagement made without noticing the date of your meeting, I submit some facts which I think your Conference, the pastors and delegates should have.

During the year, from September 1, 1928, to September 1, 1929, all the Churches, individuals and Sunday Schools of your Conference contributed to missions, half to home and half to foreign, a total of \$171.07. This was contributed by the following Churches: Lanett, \$58.47; Vanceville, \$23.53; Richland, \$7; North Highlands, \$13.99; Ambrose, \$33.38; First, La Grange, \$34.70—total, \$171.07.

The following Churches have for the past year sent in no contribution, so far as our record shows, either from the Church, individual members or Sunday Schools: Beulah, East La Grange, Enigma, Union, Rose Hill, Oak Grove, Hillside.

These Churches may have considered that they were giving something to missions through Conference apportionments, but no part of Conference apportionments last year from your Conference, and no part of Conference apportionments this year went to missions, or can go to missions, save that which is sent directly for that purpose. The Southern Convention voted in May, 1928, that hereafter all mission money be sent to the Secretary of Missions monthly or quarterly, which money is to be sent on to the Treasurer for the purposes designated, and that Conference apportionments be used for other purposes than that of missions. This was done in order that every Church and every individual in the Church and Sunday School might know just when and how much they were giving to missions, or how much they were not giving. The Churches generally adopted this plan, and the pastors generally throughout the Convention used the plan to great effect, and more mission money has been raised by the Churches the past year than ever before.

I sincerely trust that the pastors and delegates present will take this to heart and carry the message back to their Churches and Sunday Schools. I stated before the Conference one year ago that the worst thing any one in the Conference could do about missions the coming year was to do nothing at all. I meant by that that the Convention had changed the plan of financing missions, and that through the old plan of sending money to Conference for missions, missions would get nothing. No part of your Conference apportionments last year went to missions. No part this year will go to missions. Our Convention has called upon the pastors and people to take the matter of missions home to their hearts, individually, and to make individual, personal contributions to missions directly, that every individual in the Church may know just when he is giving to missions and how much.

Our Mission Board works on a basis of dividing the mission funds half and half—one-half going to home, the other half to foreign missions. However, any individual, Church or Sunday School may designate how their funds should go, and the Mission Secretary invariably sends the funds designated to the purpose named. But the Church, as a whole, is working on the basis of one-half for home missions, one-half for foreign missions.

As to the home mission side, may I call attention to the fact that Churches of this Conference have received far more from the Mission Board in proportion to the amount sent in than any Conference in the Southern Convention. Moreover, it has received since I have been Mission Secretary more by several hundred dollars for its home mission work than it has contributed both to home and foreign missions. The Mission Board has sought with diligence and care to distribute the funds coming into its hands to the very best advantage in kingdom work, and it has given, with pleasure, heed and help to the Churches in this Conference most liberally. As stated above, the Conference, as a whole, has received back by several hundred dollars far more for its home mission Churches

than it has paid in the last twelve years for both home and foreign missions. I am giving these facts for two reasons:

1. That the Conference may realize the benefits it has received in donations from the Mission Board, and that it has received the most friendly and liberal support of any Conference in all the Convention.

2. That a plea may be made to pastors and delegates for proper considera-

tion of our missionary enterprise and undertaking.

A non-missionary Church has never yet prospered. A non-missionary Conference cannot hope to prosper. Christianity only grows in our hearts and communities as we share it with others. That Church grows most that does most to give the gospel, not to its own members only, but to the great world without who have never had the privilege of the gospel. The money we give to missions is the most unselfish and Christ-like we can give to any cause, for the reason that it is given solely for the sake of our Lord. It is not our message, nor our love, nor our life, that we are trying to make known through missions. It is the message, the life and the love of our Lord that we, for His sake, are trying to make known. Many of us will not give money to carry the gospel to people afar off, excusing ourselves on the ground that we do not know them and they are too far from us, and so we cannot love them much. We should bear in mind that it is not our knowledge of them, nor our love for them, that is to save them. It is the knowledge of our Lord and His love for them that is to save them. And we are commissioned and given the high and blessed privilege to send that knowledge and the message of His undying love to the places afar off and nearby who have not had that message. When we of the Christian Church shall be moved with a missionary passion and stirred to self-denial in the name and for the sake of our Lord, that the message of His undying love and saving grace may be carried to the uttermost parts, then, and not till then, will God bless our Churches at home with increase in numbers and in strength, and our own souls with joy and with gladness.

I crave the co-operation of every pastor and every delegate in the Conference the coming year in trying to build Churches at home and abroad where they have not Churches, and to send the gospel to those at home and abroad who have not had the privilege and the joy of it. The gospel has made us what we are, and only as we share it with others through self-denial do we ourselves come to know it in its fullness and in its power. We seem to be in the dawn of a new day for growth, progress and power in the Christian Church, and I beg the members of this Conference to share this spirit with that of all the other Conferences, and let us try the coming year to do more for our Lord than we

have ever done in the past.

I thank you, and only regret that I cannot be with you to explain the burden that is upon my heart for the growth and the progress in spiritual things of every Church, individual and Sunday School in your Conference.

1. That we co-operate with the Woman's Missionary Societies of the various Churches in the splendid work they are doing.

2. That we do all we can for the mission cause, and pray earnestly for the success of our missionary enterprises.

Report on schools and colleges was read by Dr. S. L. Beougher. Special song by the student body of Piedmont Junior College. Discussion. While the report was pending, there was an offering taken for Piedmont Junior College in cash and subscription (mostly cash), amounting to \$100.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES.

Bismark said, "The nation that has the schools has the future"; and what is true of the nation is just as true of the Church. Education does not simply mean teaching people what they do not know. It is not simply teaching the youth the shapes of letters and the tricks of numbers, and then leaving them to turn their arithmetic into roguery, and their literature into lust. It means teaching them to behave as they do not now behave. It means training them into the perfect exercise and kingly continence of their bodies and souls by kindness, watching, warning, precept, and praise; but above all, by example.

Our denominational schools and colleges stand for Christian character first, last and always. Our own Piedmont Junior College, located at Wadley, Ala., has some very definite purposes. It seeks to bring education with a high standard of scholarship and character within the reach of young people of limited means. It is now an accredited co-educational junior college of Piedmont College, Demorest, Ga., and its courses are co-ordinated with those of Piedmont, having full credit with the Association of Georgia Colleges, the Association of American Colleges, and the Southern Association of Colleges.

Therefore, we would recommend:

- 1. That we give our loyal support to our denominational schools and colleges.
- 2. That all our people that feel themselves called of God to preach His gospel seek to train for His work in one of our Church schools.
- 3. That we approve of the method of securing the \$10,000 for current expenses for Piedmont Junior College, as stated in *The Christian Sun*, arranged by the Executive Board and Board of Finance of the Southern Christian Convention, which is as follows: On Convention note of \$12,500, interest \$750; fifth-Sunday offerings from Sunday Schools, \$250; from Georgia and Alabama Conferences, \$1,000; from membership of the Convention outside of the Georgia and Alabama Conferences, \$5,000; from interested friends any where, \$3,000—total, \$10,000.
- 4. That the Alabama Conference accept as their share of the offerings from the Sunday Schools, \$150.
- 5. That we favor the policy of the Conferences of Georgia and Alabama giving their note for twenty thousand dollars as endowment for Piedmont Junior College, the interest at five per cent on the same to be paid semi-annually, but the principal never to be paid; and that the Alabama Conference accept as their share \$12,500, the interest of \$625 be apportioned to the Churches of the Conference.
- 6. That the usual offering of \$100 taken during the Conference session for Piedmont Junior College be continued, and that all money subscribed by the Sunday Schools be applied on the \$150 to be raised by Sunday School offerings, and all money raised or pledged by missionary societies, Christian Endeavor societies, Churches or individuals be applied on the interest on the endowment note.
- 7. That we heartily endorse the work of Dr. Frank E. Jenkins and his coworkers in their efforts to raise \$300,000 for Piedmont Junior College, and that we will do our best to help him raise at least \$10,000 within the next thirty days.

- 8. That each Church of the Conference observe "Piedmont College Day" with a suitable program this Conference year.
- 9. That each family in the Conference subscribe for the college paper, "Purple and Gold," which is issued monthly during the school year, and the subscription price is 50 cents.
- 10. That a suitable person be chosen by each Church in the Conference to look after the interests of education and Piedmont Junior College, as to publicity, students and finances.
- 11. That W. N. Archer be granted license to preach, and that the licenses of Rev. G. R. Walker and Rev. J. Y. Vicers be renewed or extended for another year.

Report of the Committee on Stewardship was read by Rev. J. W. Fix, and, on motion, adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

This year your Committee on Stewardship and Finance has endeavored to encourage the larger stewardship throughout the Churches of the entire Conference. The committee realizes as never before that stewardship means consecration, not only of money but of time, talent, opportunity, and all of life.

We, your committee, have sought to discover what pastors and Churches have been doing toward promoting stewardship in all of its phases. The chairman of the committee has written no less than fifty letters bearing directly upon a larger stewardship program.

The following facts have been gathered from seventeen questionnaires that have been returned:

1. What books on stewardship, tithing, ownership, Church finance, etc., have you read during the past year? To this question, only six pastors out of seventeen that answered reported having read any books. No wonder Churches have trouble in raising funds for the kingdom when the leaders are neglecting the reading of the hundreds of good books on this current topic that are flowing in endless stream from the press.

Listed among the fourteen books read during the past year by the six pastors reporting are "Larger Stewardship," by Cook; "The New Christian"; "Stewardship for All of Life," by Lovejoy; "Call to Christian Stewardship," by Crawford; "Money, the Acid Test"; "Studies in Christian Stewardship," Harrison; "Man and His Money Problems"; "Life as Stewardship," by Merrill.

- 2. Do you put special emphasis on every-member canvass? Eleven answered yes, six no.
- 3. How many participate in the every-member canvass? In answer to this question, from sixty to fifteen names were given for Churches using the canvass. Through this plan of Church finance, large numbers of men have gone forth in the interest of Church finance once a year.

- 4. How many sermons preached during the year on stewardship? Seven ministers reported, the total number of sermons being sixty.
- 5. Has your Church had a stewardship study class during the past two years? Only three Churches answered yes. Those answering were Holland, First Church (Norfolk), and Franklin.
- 6. Has your Church had a stewardship pageant or play? Seven Churches answered yes, reporting 110 participants. Through pageantry and drama, great lessons of stewardship may be taught. Some suggested stewardship pageants are "America's Call to Service," "Aunt Tillie Learns to Tithe," "Making Ends Meet," and "A Woman Shall Lead Them."
- 7. To the question, Are you a tither? seventeen ministers answered yes, two no. Members of ministers family tithing numbered 31.
- 8. To the question, How many members of your Church tithe? Christian Temple, 50; Waverly, 2; First, Norfolk, 20; Elm Avenue, 23; Dendron, 1; South Norfolk, 75; Franklin, 18—total, 190.
- 9. What per cent of membership contribute toward local and benevolent expenses: Holland, 70 per cent; Portsmouth, 85 per cent; Richmond, 50 per cent; Suffolk, 45 per cent; First Church, Norfolk, 50 per cent; Christian Temple, 60 per cent; South Norfolk, 65 per cent; Portsmouth Congregational, 75 per cent; Holy Neck, 75 per cent; Dendron, 60 per cent; Elm Avenue, 40 per cent; Cypress Chapel, 75 per cent; Waverly, 50 per cent; Franklin, 80 per cent.
 - 10. Number of Churches using budget plan and find it satisfactory, 11.

Your committee recommends the following:

- 1. That every pastor read at least one book on stewardship each quarter during the year, and that every layman read at least one book during the year.
- 2. That at least one month of preparation be given to study and plans for the every-member canvass.
- 3. That during the stewardship months, special efforts be given to enlisting tithers.
- 4. That each Church have a stewardship secretary and work toward using the budget system of Church finance.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.

When the Program Committee of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference met to plan for the annual conference, which was held November 5, 1929, in Franklin Christian Church, they were of one mind in thinking that the general theme of the program should be "Unrestricted Vision." We took a rather retrospective view at first, and then tried to broaden our horizon enough to realize something of the value of a vision that carried with it a deep conviction with unlimited opportunity for service. So many of our Bible characters built the great outstanding works of their lives because of visions. But what has vision to do with our report to this body?

In the annual Eastern Virginia Christian Conference, held in the Suffolk Christian Church in the fall of 1911, some of the officials of that Conference had a vision. They saw the possibilities of an organized woman's work in their midst. Consequently, a committee was appointed to talk over plans for such an organization. That committee met in Dr. W. W. Staley's study in December, 1911, and, with only a few present, planned the organization. We have existed for seventeen years, and in taking stock of our assets I am wondering if the vision of that Conference committee has in any way been realized. We have had only two presidents during the seventeen years, and only two treasurers during the last fifteen years. It is unique that our officers hold office for a long time because it certainly is not strictly an honorary position. It has meant hard work. We have grown until we are now an army of 2,223, and we are still growing. We have touched many lives, cultivated mission study, raised much money and increased missionary interest.

Report of Committee on Foreign Missions was read by Dr. L. E. Smith and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The past year is one of the greatest that we have known as a Conference in our missionary efforts. A systematic program of missionary education has been carried on throughout our Conference by our Mission Secretary for the Southern Convention and by the Woman's Missionary Conference of this Conference. We are beginning to look beyond ourselves and to feel a definite responsibility for non-Christian people everywhere. The spirit for missions is fine. The disposition to give for the spread of the gospel is more marked than ever before in our Church.

Last year we undertook to raise in the Southern Convention for missions alone \$45,000, and in this Conference \$15,563. Many thought that this was just another one of those resolutions that we pass, impossible of realization; but we raised it, and more.

There are five factors that enter into this achievement:

- 1. Our faith in God.
- 2. The tireless effort of our Mission Secretary for the Convention.
- 3. The fine work of our woman's organization.
- 4. The challenge given to us and the entire Convention by Mr. J. M. Darden of a cash donation of \$5,000 on the condition that we raise the remaining \$40,000, and the \$2,500 given by Mr. P. J. Carlton, of Richmond, to help us on the \$40,000.
 - 5. The prayers, the faith, the sacrifice and the co-operation of every one.

And now we look forward to another year. Already plans are beginning—and what shall our goals be? Certainly they cannot be less than we had last year. Therefore, your committee submits the following recommendations:

1. That we approve the Convention's askings of \$45,000 for missions from the various Conferences, and that we undertake to raise our part of this amount, which is \$15,563.

2. That in order to raise this amount, as last year, the Churches be requested to raise for missions, including gifts from Churches and Sunday Schools, but not including gifts from missionary societies, as a minimum two-thirds of their pastor's salary. A number of our Churches reached this goal last year, and a number of others made honest efforts. They are all to be congratulated. Let every Church do its best this year.

3. That we congratulate the Woman's Missionary Societies of the Conference for the fine work they are doing, and that we offer to them every possible assist-

ance.

4. That we express our grateful appreciation to Bro. J. M. Darden for the magnificent challenge that he gave the Convention last year with his cash donation of five thousand dollars during the session of this Conference, and that again we are ready to follow his lead.

FIRST DAY—EVENING SESSION.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference met and called to order at 9:30 o'clock. Song service conducted by Mr. W. H. Baker. Devotional service conducted by Rev. W. H. Garman.

Report of Committee on Religious Literature was read by Rev. C. E. Gerringer, chairman, and, on motion, adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

We realize that for a man to live that well-rounded life and to be that well-rounded person, that the different phases of his development must be cared for; and to take care of the different needs in this development, there is no better factor to turn to than the printed page; yet, we are conscious that never before has there come from the press so many books, papers, magazines and periodicals, which increases our responsibilities in choosing what we are to read and what our families are to read.

We know from the facts that we have gathered that there is being done a great amount of reading, yet there is not being the quantity and quality of reading by the constituency of our Church that we wish that there might be. However, we are delighted to know that our President's statement that "the

pastor is the key-man" has been verified, and we find that by an investigation that we have made that we do have many men who are taking the lead in the matter of informing themselves, and that the pastors that make the most of reading lead the folks who read the most wholesome and worth-while literature; and yet we are sorry that some don't read much and don't know whether their people read much or not.

"He that provideth not for his household, that man's religion is vain," saith God, and we certainly believe that includes more than the necessities of

physical life, but includes the provision for spiritual life also.

We, your Committee on Religious Literature, wish to submit the following recommendations for your consideration:

- 1. Since the Bible is the Book of books, and since on its foundations civilization stands, and the Church of God is built and grows, we therefore recommend once more that the Word of God be read and studied in the home and be made the rule and guide of our daily living.
- 2. It is further recommended that the Churches of the Conference engage in Bible study of that particular character which depicts the life of Christ with reference to His life, death and resurrection, during the period assigned for the Jubilee Celebration of the Lord Jesus Christ.
- 3. Realizing that The Christian Sun and Herald of Gospel Liberty are the vital organs of our Church, and that they occupy a place second to none in religious literature, that a religious literature committee be appointed in each Church, whose duty it will be to increase the circulation of the papers and to encourage the reading of such wholesome religious literature as they may wish to recommend, and to promote the special Bible study as recommended above.

We urge our constituency to patronize and support our publishing house in the use of our Sunday School and Church literature.

The report of the Committee on Education was read by Dr. W. W. Staley, chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

For nearly two hundred years after Columbus discovered America, in 1492, the English colonies were without schools. A few good men finally secured from the General Assembly permission to petition King William and Queen Mary, through a Mr. Blair, for a charter to found a college, and this was granted by the court of England by the kind inclination of William and Mary, the archbishop of Canterbury and the bishop of London. That was the origin of William and Mary College, at Williamsburg, Va., the oldest college in the United States, in 1691-1693. Blair was made president, but many difficulties had to be overcome, and the buildings were destroyed by fire in 1705. But, by patience and perseverance, the buildings were restored, and Blair continued as president. Three objects were named in this school. (1) That the youth of Virginia be educated in learning and good morals. (2) That the Churches be supplied with good ministers. (3) That the college be a seminary for this purpose. It was to work in harmony with the English Church. The first college in this country was a religious institution.

In the sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, European universities laid emphasis on theological studies. The Church of England had 23 theological schools; English Methodists, 10; Baptists, 9; Congregationalists, 11, and 2 undenominational. Dutch Reformed had in 1784 a seminary in New Brunswick, N. J.; the United Presbyterian Church, one in Xenia, Ohio, in 1794. The theological schools in the United States numbered, in the nineteenth

century, 120.

All modern educational institutions had their origin in Christianity; but State-supported schools do not teach theology, hence Churches must support schools for that important service, and that is the reason for the founding of Elon College and the reason why the Christian Church should support it as a Christian institution.

We recommend the ordination of Rev. Richie Edwin Brittle, who has served Cypress Chapel the past year acceptably, and has accepted calls to Cypress Chapel and Bethlehem for the coming year.

That Revs. D. D. Nash, J. B. Chadwick, Dennis F. Parsons, and J. T.

Harrod be continued on the list of licentiates.

The following resolutions, offered by Dr. I. W. Johnson, were adopted:

RESOLUTIONS.

Whereas, the General Convention of the Christian Church, in recent session, approved the plan of union of the Congregational and Christian Churches; and, whereas, this plan contemplates a closer co-operation of the Churches, looking towards final union; therefore, be it resolved:

- 1. That the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference express its grateful appreciation of the presence of representatives from the Congregational Churches, as heretofore recorded in the records of this session, and that they be seated as deliberative members of this Conference.
- 2. That this Conference elect three fraternal messengers to attend the next session of the Association of Congregational Churches of Washington, D. C., with suggestions to cultivate a closer official affiliation of this Conference with that body.
- 3. That the First Congregational Church, Portsmouth, Va., and the other Congregational Churches in Virginia and their pastors be hereby invited to associate with this Conference in an official way.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met at 2:30 o'clock. Song service conducted by Rev. J. F. Morgan. Devotional service conducted by Rev. W. C. Hook.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Ethics was read by Dr. N. G. Newman, chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL ETHICS.

Your committee believes that the ministry is a high and holy calling, which demands of its messengers the utmost sanctity of life, loyalty to the Church and its great Head, and fidelity to those to whom they minister. Ministers should maintain such lofty ideals and such circumspect conduct and purity of life as to maintain the dignity of the office and render themselves proof against the shafts of a critical world.

Your committee is grateful to say that, so far as its knowledge goes, all our ministers are above reproach in their personal life and conduct. But, recognizing the constancy and the subtlety of the evil to which ministers are exposed, we would recommend the following:

- 1. That the Conference diligently guard the portals to the ministry and lay hands suddenly on no man, to the end that only the competent and worthy be admitted, and that the Conference, in a spirit of a Christian democracy, keep a jealous watch over the character and reputation of its ministers, that the worthy may be protected and commended and the unworthy admonished or excluded.
- 2. That our ministers endeavor to be pure and prudent in speech in all social and business intercourse, and not violate the sanctity of the pulpit by the use therein of course language, irrelevant themes, personal flings, or otherwise uncalled-for and improper remarks.
- 3. That ministers, in their attitude to one another, be careful to observe the ethics of their calling, and in their visits with a brother pastor's field and people recognize the rights and interests of said pastor in his own field.
- 4. That ministers practice the utmost fidelity in meeting their financial obligations, and, so far as possible, avoid incurring debt for current living expenses.
- 5. The ministers, in their social relations and pastoral duties among women of their congregations, exercise such severe prudence and let their conduct be on such a high plane as to give no pretext for idle gossipers or malicious tongues.
- 6. Since large opportunities come to gifted pastors to accept outside service, for which a liberal remuneration is given and their regular pay continues from their fields, neglected for the time being, such service involves an ethical problem; and that ministers should accept such service with due regard to the rights and wishes of their Churches and the ethical problems involved.

The Christian Missionary Association was discussed by Rev. O. D. Poythress, president.

It was moved and carried that it is the sense of this Conference that every Church and Sunday School should have a membership in the Christian Missionary Association.

The Secretary was instructed to write a letter of sympathy to Rev. E. W. Jones, who was called away from Conference on account of the death of his wife's sister.

Rev. D. M. Spence, pastor of the Ocean View Church, was introduced to the Conference.

Report of Mr. W. E. MacClenny, Historian, was read and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

We beg leave to report that the monument commemorating the life and labors of Rev. James O'Kelly, on the campus of Elon College, was unveiled, with appropriate ceremonies, on October 16, 1929, on the 103rd anniversary of his death. This is the second shaft erected to his memory by the Church which he labored so hard to establish in his lifetime, the first one being erected at his grave in Chatham County, N. C., in 1854, while the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference was in session at O'Kelly's Chapel.

This monument completes the work assigned to the Memorial Committee at the Southern Christian Convention in Norfolk, Va.; the other marker being on the site of Old Lebanon Church, in Surry County, Va. These will serve to point the coming generations to our past, and it is hoped to give them inspiration for the future.

Should there be extant any copies of THE ANNUAL for the years 1854 and 1855, there might be found much historical data in these for the use of coming generations. It would be well for those who have copies of the old Minutes, or ANNUALS, of the Conferences for those years to look them over and see if there are not some of these preserved and let it be known, or send them to the library at Elon College for future reference.

Report of Committee on Christian Education was read by Rev. F. C. Lester and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

This is a report of a standing committee. For a full year it has been standing, and moved only in time to prepare a report. The reason is that at the time of the last Conference the chairman was ill and requested to be relieved from all committees and was under the impression that the request had been granted until notified this fall that a report was expected.

Believing that there is a work that should be done by this Conference committee, and believing that the work is worthy of our best effort as a Conference, your committee recommends the following:

- 1. That the Conference Committee on Christian Education shall be composed (mostly) of the officers of the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention of Eastern Virginia. This will correlate the Conference and the Convention and centralize working units.
- 2. That the committee for the coming year be authorized to make a complete survey of Christian education or leadership training in the Churches of the Conference. The co-operation of the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention and the Board of Christian Education of the Southern Christian

Convention should be sought in the matter. The expense of the survey should be paid from the Conference fund or shared with the other organizations named above.

- 3. That when the survey is completed, plans be made to reach every Church with courses in leadership training. This work should be done in co-operation with the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention and Woman's Missionary Board of Eastern Virginia and the Board of Christian Education of the Southern Christian Convention.
- 4. That all Churches be urged to patronize the Summer School of Methods at Elon College. This promotion to be a part of the work of this committee.

5. That in all plans for promotion, the co-operation of Congregational

Churches in our midst be sought in the most kindly fashion.

- 6. That the Conference pledge its support to the Board of Christian Education of the Southern Christian Convention, and through its committee seek to raise its proportional share of the funds for same, the funds to be raised in Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies, and the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention.
- 7. That Churches be urged hereby and through the committee to use the field secretary of the Board of Christian Education of the Southern Christian Convention.
- 8. That through the committee the Conference co-operate with and assist the Young People's Congress of Eastern Virginia.

Report of Committee on Evangelism was submitted, and, on motion, adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

We, your Committee on Evangelism, submit the following report:

- 1. We desire to congratulate the Churches of the Conference for the spirit of evangelism which seems to permeate both the pulpit and pew of the various charges and humbly express our appreciation to our Heavenly Father therefor.
- 2. We recommend, however, a greater zeal, increased effort, and more complete consecration to this, the vital work of the Church, recognizing that no Church ever failed who majored in this altogether important work and will of God.

We highly commend those papers of Tidewater Virginia which make daily insertion of an appropriate Bible verse in their columns, for we are assured that "the gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation," and that "we are born again not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God which liveth and abideth forever."

4. We recommend that individual evangelism become the great program of the Church, for that this effort has developed the Church of today, occasioned the spiritual growth of the individual, and evidenced the obedience of the disciple to his Lord. Who hath commanded us to go into the whole world and "preach the gospel to every creature"? "He that is wise winneth souls," and "they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness, as the stars forever and ever." We affirm that all wisdom which does not point men to this supreme objective of life, viz: the winning of souls, is both false and fatal.

5. We further recommend that the first Sunday in January be used by the local Churches of the Conference to enroll a volunteer band of personal workers, to be selected by the pastor through personal solicitation, whose business it shall be, under God's grace and guidance, to lead men, women and children to Jesus Christ in individual or personal evangelism during the coming year, and that a report of these endeavors and results be rendered at the annual session of this Conference. That this first Sunday in January be used as a dedication service of those who are to engage in personal work, in which the Church membership may be asked to evidence their sympathy and support, and such program rendered as is suitable to the dedication for this high and holy work.

SECOND DAY—EVENING SESSION.

A splendid program was rendered, and a Young People's Missionary Conference was duly organized. The principal address of the evening was delivered by Miss Ida Patterson, Ph.D., of the University of Virginia.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference met and was called to order at 9:45 o'clock. Song service conducted by Mr. L. E. Huber. Devotional service conducted by Dr. W. D. Harward.

Dr. W. A. Harper, president of Elon College, and Rev. Charles Eldred Shelton, pastor First Congregational Church, Portsmouth, Va., were presented to the Conference.

It was moved and carried that the minutes be printed in The Annual, 600 copies be purchased and distributed pro rata among the Churches, and the Secretary was instructed to draw draft on the Conference fund to pay for same.

Dr. W. A. Harper spoke concerning his visit to the recent meeting of the advisory board of the Southeastern Congregational Society, held at Charleston, S. C.

The President appointed the following presbytery to ordain Rev. R. E. Brittle: W. W. Staley, N. G. Newman and I. W. Johnson.

Report of the Committee on Superannuation was read by Dr. L. E. Smith, chairman, and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Your Committee on Superannuation has had no cases of need referred to it during the past year; consequently we have no report to submit.

However, the attention of the Conference should be called to the condition that confronts the entire Church as a result of union with the Congregational Church. The Congregational Church has invested and other funds for ministerial relief to the amount of nine million dollars. The Christian Church has been content to take care of its needy ministers after a fashion, with meagre funds provided annually by the Conference. In the meantime, it will be necessary for us to provide permanent funds for this purpose. This question is to be worked out by the General Board, and recommendations will be submitted to the entire Church.

Therefore, we would recommend that this Conference hold itself in readiness to co-operate with the General Board in its plans to provide for the ministry.

Report of Committee on Moral Reform was read by Rev. M. F. Allen, and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM.

Never in the history of the world has there been such a high standard of development for efficiency. Machinery and all kinds of labor-saving devices have been reshaped and tested and reshaped again with certain ideas of service in mind. Beauty of form, accuracy of motion, durability of material, cheapness of production have all been in the mind of men in the development of mechanical devices.

In the care and development of livestock, the same care has been manifested.

Certain types for distinct purposes.

In the whole field of production, much care has been taken to so sift and winnow, to fashion and refashion, to make and remake so that the product may best suit the purpose. Man has joined hands with God, and trees have been transformed into ships and houses, so that the sea has become a highway and humanity is comfortable. Man and God join hands and the earth produces fruits and grains, and the earth is fed. Man joins hands with God, and crude ores become machines and engines and instruments of use, and man's labor is made easier.

But in the development of men, we wonder if we have considered God and have failed to consider the Divine purpose, which is to "glorify God and

enjoy Him forever."

Never was man greater in many ways than he is today. Strong of body, quick to perceive, brave to undertake, and shrewd to execute. But is it not a fact that he has been developed physically and intellectually to the neglect of the moral and spiritual? We are asking the question: Have even the men and women of the Church the ideals of life that will bring them to their best, and so glorify God? If not, then there needs to be a reincarnation of the moral law as exemplified in the life and teaching of Jesus. And it is the duty of the Church not only to uphold the right by teaching the law of righteousness, but to set pace, by example, that others seeing our good works may glorify our Father which is in heaven.

The Christian Church has been the pioneer in many of the world's great reforms, and we would not take a backward step by lowering our standards or surrendering our principles.

To the end that the weak might be made strong, and the faltering be made brave, that the Church may be looked upon as the organized force of righteousness in the world, we declare again in favor of keeping the law. No one can be legislated into righteousness, but our obedience to the law is a mark of our obedience to the higher law. An obedience to all law on the part not only of the common people but by the exalted as well, is an absolute necessity that we be a Christian nation. The eighteenth amendment should be obeyed; so also should the law against stealing, and profanity, and adultery, and the rest.

We register again our desire for a better observance of the Holy Sabbath Day; for a more serious consideration of the sacred relationship of marriage. Both young and old are too careless in thought and conversation relative to the marriage relation. The home and family are the foundation of our national life. Whatever strikes a blow at the home and family life strikes a blow at our nation. We deplore the ease with which a bill of divorcement is obtained, and

would again hear what Jesus said about marriage.

Believing that influence upon the coming generations is demoralizing, we regard with disfavor the extent to which many Church members engage in

dealing in the stock markets.

Looking to the future for better conditions, we are depending upon God and a Church whose members have had an experience of regeneration through Jesus Christ. Therefore, we wish to emphasize the importance of Christianizing the family life of our nation.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Moved and carried that the report of the Committee on Foreign Missions be taken up at this time.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Southern Christian Convention recommended that the Churches pay an amount for foreign missions equal to one-third of their pastor's salary. We, your committee, recommend that each Church strive to meet the request of the Convention.

We recommend that the pastors of this Conference put on at least once a

year a mission program.

We recommend that the people of the Christian Church subscribe for and read the "Mission Number" of *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*. The subscription price is \$1.00 per year.

We recommend that the pastors and lay members comprising this Conference be requested to pray that God will make us conscious of our responsibility

for the heathen's ignorance of God.

Addresses on the subject of missions were delivered by Rev. P. T. Klapp, Dr. J. O. Atkinson, and Rev. J. W. Patton.

On motion, the report on foreign missions was adopted.

The President appointed an ordaining presbytery, composed of Drs. J. O. Atkinson, J. U. Newman, and P. H. Fleming. By motion, the President, Dr. Rowland, was added to the presbytery.

Moved and carried that the Conference send a letter of greeting to

Moved and carried that this Conference recognize and endorse the work, as evangelistic singers, of the Higgins sisters, and recommend that our people use them whenever possible. Their address is Guilford College, N. C., Route 1.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSION BOARD.

Out of a total of forty-three Woman's Missionary Societies in the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Conference, there are nineteen within the bounds of the Conference; of thirteen Young People's Societies, six are in the Conference; of six Willing Workers' Societies, five are in this Conference; and of eleven Cradle Rolls, four are in this Conference. There are less than one-third of the Churches in the bounds of the N. C. W. M. Conference which have any kind of organized work among the women. The total amount raised by our women last year was \$4,839.19, of which \$1,897.83 was contributed from the N. C. & Va. Conference. The goal was \$5,000, and if we had reached \$2,000 in this Conference we would more than have reached the goal.

We bring these facts before you that we may be moved to greater efforts, and thus attain to better results another year. We appeal to the pastors, for they are the ones to whom we look to inspire and to lead our women out to missionary undertakings. A few cannot do the work that calls for the co-opera-

tion of all if we are to measure up to our ideals.

During the spring, seven missionary rallies were held, which were well attended. The annual Conference in Burlington was fine. There were more

than 300 women present, and the spirit was inspiring.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year, subject to your approval: Mrs. C. H. Rowland, president; Mrs. S. C. Harrell, vice-president; Mrs. J. J. Henderson, secretary; Mrs. W. R. Sellars, treasurer; Mrs. W. H. Carroll, superintendent of spiritual life; Miss Essie Cotton, superintendent of literature; Miss Lucile Mulholland, superintendent of Y. P. work; Mrs. R. M. Rothgeb, superintendent of cradle rolls.

On motion, the report of the Woman's Missionary Conference was adopted.

A prayer of thanksgiving for the blessings that have come through missions was led by Mrs. Rowland.

On motion, Conference adjourned. Benediction by Rev. J. L. Foster.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference called to order at 2 P. M.

Devotional service led by Rev. J. S. Carden.

Dr. W. M. Jay presented the report of the Committee on Religious Literature, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

We are interested particularly in this report with the field of religious literature. There is an abundant supply of good religious books for every grade of reader from the child to the adult, coming from our printing presses all the time. Our denominational publishing interests are glad to supply you with a graded list of books suitable for all ages.

There is also an abundant number of good religious magazines, undenominational in their interests and most helpful and broadening in their influence. The following are some we can commend: Christian Endeavor World, Christian

Herald, Christian Century, Missionary Review, National Journal of Religious

Education, and others.

There will, doubtless, be some changes and merging in our denominational papers and Sunday School literature since the merger of our Church with the Congregationalists, but pending those changes and afterward we urge the most hearty loyalty to and co-operation with all our publications.

The Christian Sun is the local organ of our Southern constituency. It is the effective medium through which the needs and achievements of our local institutions—the colleges, the orphanage, and our other Church interests—are made known to the people. We commend The Christian Sun to every home of

our Conference.

Rev. S. A. Bennett addressed the Conference concerning the importance of religious literature.

On motion, the report was adopted.

Rev. P. T. Klapp presented the claims of the Christian Orphanage. Prayers for the Orphanage and Bro. Johnston were led by Rev. S. A. Bennett and Dr. J. O. Atkinson.

Dr. J. O. Atkinson presented the report of the Committee on Education.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Christian education is the need of the hour. Our own Elon College is seeking to supply this need. As such, it should have our hearty and loyal support. As a Christian college, we should seek in every way to make it not only a Christian college, but the best Christian college, both for our own sons and daughters and for all who are looking for a distinctively Christian college. It was founded and has been built upon the prayers, the sacrifices and the devotion of Christian people, and the slogan, "Christian Character, First and Always, at Elon," is not only appropriate, but signifies the desires, the spirit and the devotion of those who have founded and fostered the institution. We rejoice in its prosperity and crave its enlargement and growth in development and in service.

Licentiates I. T. Underwood and R. H. Coble made their annual report to the committee in writing, with the request that they be continued as licentiates, and that they were doing some work and would be pleased to serve as pastors at any point desiring their services. We recommend that they be continued as licentiates.

Bro. Sheldon Brady, a member of the biblical class the past two years, failed to make any report to your committee.

Licentiate H. George Robertson graduated from Elon College one year ago and is now director of religious education and assistant to the pastor in our Richmond Church. Favorable reports come of his faithful and efficient service in this capacity. We have no request for his ordination, and recom-

mend that he be continued as a licentiate.

Rev. S. E. Madren, who has been a licentiate for three years, graduating from Elon College last May, is serving, and has served for some time, two Churches in Carroll County, Va., Elk Spur and Rocky Ford. The request comes that he be ordained, and having been duly examined by your committee, we recommend his ordination.

Rev. J. L. Neese, who was accepted as a licentiate a year ago by the Executive Committee of this Conference, has served acceptably as pastor of Palm Street Church, Greensboro, the past year. He has also been called to and accepted the pastorate of Hines Chapel and Monticello. His ordination has been asked for, and after due examination by the committee, we recommend that Conference grant him ordination.

Rev. A. P. Hurst, of the Western Iowa Christian Conference, requests a transfer to this Conference, with credentials of membership presented. We recommend that he be received and enrolled as a member of this Conference.

Revs. H. E. Crutchfield and T. F. Wright request letters of transfer from this Conference to the Eastern North Carolina Christian Conference. We recommend that their requests be granted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

We would recommend:

- 1. That during the stewardship period—November and December—that every pastor in this Conference read or reread at least two stewardship books, in addition to a study of the subject from the Bible.
- That we seek to have definite stewardship instruction in all our Churches during this time, and at the close of the period, that we seek to enlist tithers and life-recruits.
- That every Church use the every-member canvass and the envelopes for regular, systematic giving.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference called to order at 9:30 A. M.

Devotional service led by Rev. L. L. Wyrick.

Minutes of previous day's session read, and approved as corrected. The ministerial letters and Church reports were read before Conference.

Rev. J. R. Gill, of the Methodist Church, and Rev. E. R. Harris, of the Baptist Church, were presented to Conference and seated as deliberative members.

On motion, the report of the Committee on Stewardship, which had been presented at a previous session, was adopted.

Moved and carried that the Committee on Superannuation be requested to make report to the Executive Committee of Conference, the Executive Committee being authorized to approve the report.

The report on men's work was presented by Dr. W. M. Jay, Conference representative on men's work.

REPORT ON MEN'S ORGANIZATIONS.

We have been informed that the following Churches have men's organizations: Elon College, Danville, Durham, Greensboro, and Lynchburg, the last named having been organized during this Conference year.

I am not unmindful of the fact that it means another organization in the Church, but this one seems to fill a vital need and I would heartily recommend such a men's organization in our Churches, wherever one can be successfully launched, not only for the added interest in Church work that is created, but also for the good fellowship of men with men.

Dr. Jay addressed the Conference concerning the work of such organizations of men.

Moved and carried that the report on men's work be approved, and that Rev. W. M. Jay be continued as Conference representative on men's work, he being requested to communicate with all men's organizations within the Conference and make report at the next session.

The report of the Home Mission Board was presented, as follows:

REPORT OF HOME MISSION BOARD.

Your Board notes with interest marks of improvement and progress within the bounds of the Conference during the past year. Our Third Avenue Church, Danville, Va., has added, at a cost of about \$3,000, equipment to its plant, the same having been paid for and dedicated during the past year. United Church, at Lynchburg, also finished paying for and dedicated its building during the past year. Palm Street Church, Greensboro, has also, at considerable expense, enlarged its plant, paid for and dedicated the same.

We recommend that, from the funds sent up to this Conference, \$500 be retained for home mission work within the bounds of this Conference. We recommend that the same be turned over to the Secretary of the Southern Christian Convention Mission Board, the same to be expended upon recommendation of this Board for the purpose of assisting Churches within the bounds of this

Conference. We further recommend that of the \$500 thus separated, \$100 be appropriated to the United Church, Lynchburg, same to be paid quarterly.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We, your committee, wish to report that we have not been called upon to pass upon any matters of business since our last annual session. Hence, it has been unnecessary to have a meeting of your Executive Committee.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Your Committee on Religious Literature finds a wide field before it, and one difficult to occupy, due largely to the fact that our people as a whole read very little; hence, the difficulty in reaching them.

First. We recommend that the Holy Bible be read more carefully and

more prayerfully.

Second. That *The Christian Sun*, edited by Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Elon College, N. C., being a true exponent of our principles and the organ of the Southern Christian Convention, be subscribed to and read by more of our people.

Third. That the books published by our own people be secured and read

by all.

Fourth. That the *Herald of Gospel Liberty*, the organ of the General Christian Convention, and the oldest religious newspaper, be subscribed to and read by more of our people.

Fifth. That every Sunday School within the bounds of our Conference

study our own literature and subscribe to the Sunday School Herald.

The report of the Committee on Christian Education was offered by T. E. White, chairman, and, after discussion, adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Elon College was never better prepared to serve her constituency than she is now. We commend this Christian institution to our young people who are seeking a college education, and we would urge our pastors to co-operate in bringing this institution to the attention of boys and girls who are selecting a college, that our own institution may have that loyal support and patronage which it so justly deserves.

We recommend that our Sunday Schools be given the privilege, on every fifth Sunday, of contributing their offering to its support. And that all our Churches be requested to continue their support to its expenses. As a campaign is to be launched this year for additional endowment, we would commend this laudable undertaking, and earnestly request those who have financial ability to

give it their moral and financial support.

Rev. B. H. Loudermilk has made commendable progress, and we recommend

that he be continued as a licentiate.

Bro. George M. Tally, of the Glendon Church, came before us highly recommended by his Church for licensure to preach. After examining him, we recommend that he be licensed at this Conference.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Conference was called to order at 9:30 A. M. by President T. J. Green.

After selections by the choir, devotional services were conducted by Rev. H. V. Cox.

The minutes for the first day's session were read and, after correction, approved.

Dr. G. O. Lankford presented Rev. J. A. Denton, of the Eastern

North Carolina Christian Conference, who was seated as a deliberative member.

Rev. E. C. Brady, Vice-President, takes the chair as Rev. T. J. Green, chairman, presents the report of the Committee on Home Missions, which, after discussion, is adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on Home Missions, submit the following report:

We have no Churches under construction, so far as we know, at present. This Church (Smithwood), Biscoe and Hank's Chapel have all recently been rebuilt. The latter has been formally dedicated on the fourth Sunday in August, which indicates that all indebtedness has been settled. Biscoe asks this Conference to help them or recommend that they receive help from the Home Mission Board. We recommend that they be given three hundred dollars to help them on their Church debt.

We have a nice Church at Bennett, and also at Addor, and no regular pastor for either. We recommend that each of these Churches receive a supplement of one hundred dollars each from the home mission fund, that they may have regular preaching and pastors; provided that pastors be secured that will meet the approval of the Home Mission Board, and that said pastors report quarterly to the said Board.

Stafford, chairman, presented the report of the Committee on Christian Endeavor, and, after speaking for the adoption thereof with great earnestness, and with much pleasure and interest manifested by the Conference, Bro. Stafford moved the adoption of the report, which was adopted unanimously.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

We, your committee, would urge this Conference, both ministers and laymen, to give more consideration to the great Christian Endeavor movement and to put forth every effort toward extending this work for, by, and among the young people in the different Churches of this Conference.

It would be a wonderful thing, and would be of untold value to the future of our Church if our pastors and laymen would develop the same interest, knowledge and enthusiasm toward Christian Endeavor as they manifest in any other department of our Church life; for instance, the Sunday School. The peculiar value of Christian Endeavor lies in the fact that it promotes individual thinking, acting and leadership among our young people. In that manner it

carries forward, so to speak, the work of the Sunday School.

In Sunday School, the young mind is taught, trained and receives certain definite impressions concerning spiritual truths. Christian Endeavor goes beyond this, for while it continues to teach and train, it also gives the young people expression of those impressions; and we all know that expression deepens impression. In this manner, Christian Endeavor provides an unequaled field for training in future Church leadership, and we would not be so short-sighted as to neglect to look forward to the future of the Church. It might be surprising to some to know how many Sunday School teachers, department officers and Church workers in general a well-organized Church recruits from an active Christian Endeavor Society, especially the senior societies.

We would close this report with the following recommendations: Inasmuch, therefore, as this department of the Church is so essential to the spiritual growth of all, we recommend:

1. That each pastor in this Conference put forth a special effort to organize a Christian Endeavor Society in each one of his Churches.

2. That each society seek information from the chairman of this committee and others regarding Christian Endeavor principles.

3. That each society seek earnestly to live up to the Christian Endeavor motto, "For Christ and the Church," basing its efforts on the opening words of the Christian Endeavor pledge, "Trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ for strength."

It must begin at Jerusalem or at home; then, they that hear must tell it to others, so they may hear. We must live it to prove that there is something to it. "By their fruits ye shall know them."

When we cannot go we must send it by the missionary. We must hold them up by prayer and by means to support them in the foreign field. To be a success in this work, we must all feel our responsibility as Christians, and put our strength in the work. We should pray much that the Holy Spirit may direct this work, and not man. We would recommend most earnestly that this Conference give more time and energy and thought to this all-important phase of our Lord's business. This report will be fruitless unless it is put into practice.

At this hour, B. S. Moffitt submitted the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools, and urged a more active support of and participation in the annual Sunday School Convention by all of the Churches of the denomination. Dr. Underwood spoke on the problems of the rural Sunday Schools. Dr. Lankford reminded the Conference of the action of the General Convention in urging the periodical offerings from the Sunday Schools to Elon College, and recommended that a request to respond to this appeal be incorporated in the report of the committee. The report was amended as suggested and then adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools, make the following report:

We held a Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention at Shiloh Church in June, 1929. About one-third of our schools were represented by delegations, and reports were sent in by nineteen schools. We feel that the Churches in our Conference should take more interest in this work.

We insist that each school send delegates to our next Convention, which will meet with Hank's Chapel Church on the second Sunday in June, 1930. Also that each school send report and finances, as required, and that each pastor attend this Convention.

We ask that each of our schools support this work and the Board of Christian Endeavor and the Board of Christian Education; also that each school send delegates to the Elon Summer School. We ask that each school make monthly contributions to our orphanage and to missions. We recommend that teachertraining classes be organized in each school, and that each school make periodical offerings to Elon College, as has been urged by the General Convention.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. E. C. Brady, chairman; and after an address by Rev. Stanley C. Harrell, which thrilled the Conference with the missionary spirit, his subject being "Missionary Blessings," the report of the committee was unanimously adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We note with keenest appreciation that which has been done during the last year for missions. We have not done that which might have been done, but there is laudable evidence of a renewed interest, and also an increase in gifts for the cause. That we reached our goal for missions is a cause for rejoicing, but our goal was far too low. Our people are giving of their time and their money, but they have not yet caught the spirit of the Master. They have not yet learned that "it is more blessed to give than to receive." Very few have learned that the way to get is to give. This is an inestimable lesson and one that will revolutionize the missionary task.

We hereby record grateful and profound appreciation for the service rendered by our Mission Secretary. The spirit of missions is spreading slowly, but under the leadership of Dr. Atkinson we may expect to reap a harvest. For all interest shown, we are sincerely grateful, and pray that God will speed the day when men may value souls above gold and silver.

It is interesting to note that Dr. M. J. W. White and wife, of our communion, have sailed as missionaries to the foreign field. Our only regret is that they could not sail under the auspices of our own Mission Board. We are glad that the Congregational Board could and did send them, for we are now part

and parcel of each other.

We recommend that each pastor preach at least one missionary sermon during the year; that all pastors appoint some member of each Church to write personal letters to some one of our missionaries, thereby bringing the Church into closer touch with the mission work; that our people be urged to contribute for next year at least an amount equal to one-third of the pastor's salary; that every pastor may put forth an untiring effort to organize a Woman's Missionary Society in every Church of which they are pastor.

Dr. C. H. Rowland and Bro. W. B. Truitt were recognized and, upon motion, were made deliberative members of the Conference.

In the absence of Bro. C. D. Johnston, who was ill in the hospital, Bro. W. B. Truitt spoke on the work and needs of the Orphanage.

Rev. J. U. Fogleman, chairman, read the report of the Committee on Social Service, and the same was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE.

After much thought, consideration, discussion and deliberation, we, the Committee on Social Service, recommend the following:

That all pastors and Christian Church members make a thorough investigation of social conditions in their respective fields of service, so that the moral standards might be improved.

That we, as parents and guardians, who march under the blood-stained banner of Jesus Christ, will see to it that we live 100 per cent Christians, as worthy examples, after which the youth might pattern.

That all Church and community leaders endeavor to encourage the youth

to expend their lives for recreation in the most wholesome way.

That all Christian citizens give their hearty support, both morally and financially, to the Anti-Saloon League and the W. C. T. U. as the two great nation-wide organizations through which our people in the Churches have cooperated effectively for the overthrow of the legalized liquor traffic and through which we may continue to co-operate effectively for the perpetuation of prohibition for the creation and maintenance of a proper sentiment for law observance and law enforcement, and for the education of the masses concerning the evils and destructiveness of strong drink.

That the President of this Conference appoint a committee to correspond with at least one minister in both Gastonia and Marion, N. C., who is familiar with the textile troubles in each of these communities, to ascertain if some method of arbitration may not be provided through which a more friendly re-

lation may be arrived at between employer and employee.

SECOND DAY—EVENING SESSION.

Rev. T. E. White called the Conference to order at 7:30 P. M. for the "Fellowship Hour" and as a special hour to hear the report of the Committee on Christian Unity."

After selections by the choir, the Conference was favored with the rendering of "Bless the Lord, Oh, My Soul." The quartet from the First Christian Church, Burlington, rendered this anthem most charmingly.

After remarks by Rev. T. E. White, based on the 17th chapter of John, he read the report of the Committee on Christian Union, and moved its adoption. Before the discussion of the report, Rev. White introduced Mrs. Ella Keyser Garrett, who rendered an appropriate and beautiful solo.

Bro. White then introduced Dr. C. H. Rowland, who delivered a masterful address on the subject of "Christian Union."

Following another selection by the Burlington quartet, the question was called and the report of the Committee on Christian Union was unanimously adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN UNION.

Christian unity has been one of the cardinal teachings of the Christian Church throughout our history of more than one hundred years. With us, as a denomination, it has been a passion to see the union of the followers of Christ of all persuasions in one great fellowship and brotherhood. In this direction, we have hoped, prayed and labored with increasing earnestness and zeal, and in the more recent years of our history we have witnessed the coming of the dawn of this in the distance until we are, in this good day, beginning to witness the realization of our earnest and prayerful hope: in that the various brotherhoods are manifesting a growing spirit of unity and moving with apparent directness toward this goal.

We have definite cause for great rejoicing because of the unanimous action on June 3rd, at Detroit, Mich., of the National Council of the Congregational Church, and of a like unanimous action on October 25th, at Piqua, Ohio, of the General Convention of the Christian Church in voting the union of these two bodies, whose national body hereafter or until some other name shall be chosen, shall be known as the National Council of Congregational and Christian Churches.

We wish to go on record as heartily approving the plan of union as adopted by the above-mentioned National Council and General Convention, and urge upon the membership of this Conference that we acquaint ourselves as fully and as rapidly as possible with the plan of merger; and further, that we cultivate the acquaintance and fellowship of the Congregational ministers and Churches wherever opportunity may present itself, to the end that the union may be complete and entire in its organic formation and operation at the earliest possible date, and that the prayer of our Lord may be fully and completely answered.

We would recommend that the Conference write Congregational Churches and ministers in the bounds of this Conference to co-operate with us on such basis as they may determine.

On motion, the Conference adjourned until 9:30 tomorrow morning.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Conference was called to order at 9:30 A. M. by President Green. Religious service was conducted by Rev. John M. Allred.

It was moved and adopted that the present beneficiaries of the Conference be continued, as follows: Rev. G. R. Underwood, Rev. W. N. Hayes, Mrs. L. I. Cox, Mrs. L. W. Fogleman.

The report of the Committee on Apportionment was read and submitted by J. H. Harden, and, upon motion, was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENT.

We recommend that one hundred and fifty dollars be retained in the treasury for Conference expenses; that five hundred dollars be designated to home missions, and that three hundred dollars of this sum be given to the Church at Biscoe; that one hundred dollars be given to each of the Churches at Addor and at Bennett, and that these sums be paid under the direction of the Secretary of the Mission Board, as provided in the report of the Committee on Missions; and that the balance of whatever fund may be raised this year shall be remitted to the Treasurer of the Southern Christian Convention in a lump sum, as voted by this Conference at its last annual meeting.

We appeal to the Churches that they endeavor earnestly to raise the apportionments and co-operate with our various departments in raising goals set for missions, the college, the orphanage and Christian education, through offerings and individual gifts.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference was called to order at 1:30 o'clock by the President. Song service led by George McCullers; devotionals by Rev. J. A. Denton.

Rev. J. Lee Johnson presented letters from Dr. C. H. Rowland and Rev. Stanley C. Harrell, stating that Rev. H. E. Crutchfield and Rev. T. F. Wright are ordained ministers in good standing in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference, and wish to transfer their membership to the Eastern North Carolina Conference. Motion passed that these ministers be received in this Conference.

A letter from Rev. D. M. Spence was read, stating that he wished to receive a letter of transfer from the Eastern North Carolina Conference to Eastern Virginia Conference. Motion passed, and the Secretary was authorized to forward letter.

Report of Committee on Education read, discussed and adopted:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

A three-fold development is necessary for a well-rounded life—that of body, mind and spirit. This seems to be suggested in Luke 2:52, where it is said of our Lord that He "increased in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man." There seems to be a good deal being done to develop the physical

and mental, but is the spiritual receiving its proper care?

We believe in Christian education—not merely religious education. Christian education, in its truest sense, is to teach Christ, as the very name implies. Naturally, this suggests the new birth, for the Word of God declares that "The natural man (that is, the unregenerate) receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God." One cannot be educated into that which he cannot receive. It has been often said an educated, unregenerated man can do a great deal more harm than one not educated. We wish to go on record as favoring that, in our Christian colleges, the new birth and other fundamentals of the Christian faith be taught and emphasized, as well as the moral issues and those studies that develop the mind.

Since our last session of Conference, the Education Committee, with the consent of the Executive Committee, ordered that Rev. R. Lee House be ordained as an elder, which was done at the session of the Sunday School Con-

vention which met at Pleasant Union in July.

Licentiate D. T. McKinney has served no Church during the past year. We recommend he be continued as a licentiate.

Sam B. Wilson is still in school at Elon College as a member of the bibli-

cal class. We recommend he continue his studies.

Two other young men—Numa Franks and Wray Dickens—have entered the biblical class at Elon College. We recommend that they continue in this good work.

We recommend that Bro. Jones Lee, of Caroleigh Church, be continued as

a licentiate.

Bro. Henry Collins Hilliard, of Mt. Auburn Christian Church, came before the committee, and having stood a satisfactory examination, and also passing his course at Elon College, we recommend he be licensed as a probationer. We further recommend a loan to him of \$150.

We recommend that license of Walter Watkins be revoked.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON S. S. AND CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor reports the following:

So far as we have been able to ascertain, there has been but little, if any, improvement or advancement in our Sunday School and Christian Endeavor work since our last report.

A convention of Sunday School and Christian Endeavor societies was held at Pleasant Union Christian Church the second week in last July, with only nineteen Sunday Schools and three Christian Endeavor societies represented by delegates or reports from the forty-nine Churches constituting this Conference.

The officers of the Convention elected for this year are: President, Harold Johnson, Fuquay Springs, N. C.; Vice-President, W. A. Newman, Henderson, N. C.; Recording Secretary, Mrs. R. J. Newton, Route 1, Henderson, N. C.; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Ruth Johnson, Fuquay Springs, N. C.; Treasurer, C. H. Stephenson, Raleigh, N. C.

Your committee feels that this Convention should have the loyal support and at least a 75 per cent attendance of every school and society at its next meeting, the second week in July, at Liberty, Vance, near Henderson, N. C.

We recommend that each Sunday School and society send a rally day or special offering to the Board of Christian Education to aid in its work and to show even a greater spirit of co-operation by sending a full delegation to the Summer School of Methods which meets annually about the first of August at Elon College, N. C.

Realizing this department of our Church activities to be of supreme importance, your committee craves the loyal and hearty support of both pastors and laymen in making it worth while and acceptable to Him who said, "Suffer them to come unto me."

Report of Committee on Evangelism by Rev. J. A. Denton. Discussion; report adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

We, your Committee on Evangelism, beg to submit the following report:

1. That we express our thanks to our Heavenly Father for the result of the efforts put forth in the field of evangelism during the year.

2. That seeing the great need of the people for Christ and His gospel this day, we pledge ourselves, both pastors and all other Christian workers, to put forth a greater effort the coming year to preach and teach the same.

3. That special emphasis be placed upon John 3:3, of the new birth, since there seems to be a letting up on the preaching and teaching of this doctrine.

We fear the danger of substituting reformation for regeneration.

4. That more thought and time be given to personal evangelism by both

pastors and personal workers.

5. That much thought be given to the work of evangelism the year 'round, and not for just a week or ten days during the summer. The great work of our Lord was to save the lost, and He is the same yesterday, today, and forever. He Himself said, "As the Father hath sent me into the world, even so I sent them into the world."

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Conference was called to order at 9:30 o'clock by the President. Song Service by George McCullers.

Devotional conducted by Rev. T. F. Wright.

The Secretary read the minutes of the morning session of the first day, which were corrected and approved.

Reports were received from Churches.

The question of number of delegates to represent a Church at the Conference was discussed, and it was decided that each Church was entitled to two for the first fifty members and one additional delegate for each fifty members or fraction thereof until a total of four was reached.

C. O. Wrenn, the delegate from Liberty, was substituted for Miss

Lizzie Roberts, alternate.

The President suggested to the delegates from the Churches to include in their report their total Church membership, active and inactive.

The report on home missions was read by Rev. M. T. Sorrell.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

Realizing that the sole dependence of the Mission Board is from the Sunday School offering, Easter offering from Church and private donations, we know that unless the Sunday Schools and Churches come to the aid of

the Board through these channels it cannot keep going. When we look back over the small amount given by our Churches of the Eastern North Carolina Conference, and then see the work the Board has before it, we feel like saying our Churches and schools are not coming to the great call when Christ said, "Go ye out into all parts of the world and carry my Word." We do not see how our great denomination can hope to prosper when we care so little for our fellow-men, for again Christ our Lord said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples if ye love the brethren."

May we give you a few facts showing you how we have neglected the cause this year in our own Conference. The total amount paid in from our forty-nine Churches and Sunday Schools was only \$1,781.88, or an average of \$36.36 per Church. Note we find that there were twenty-one Sunday Schools that gave absolutely nothing to missions-almost one-half. We find twelve Churches giving nothing, and eight Churches and Sunday Schools giving nothing. should have raised from our 49 Churches and Sunday Schools \$2,888.66, which we see we lacked \$1,106.78. We fell short almost half. We are wondering how many of us could live very long on half-feed! We, therefore, urge:

1. Every Church and Sunday School seek to raise one-third as much for

missions as they pay pastor.

2. That every Sunday School take up an offering once a month for missions; and where there may be no Sunday School, that such a Church, on their preaching Sunday, take up an offering and divide same, sending half to missions and half to the Orphanage.

3. That each Church and Sunday School together take up a special Easter

offering, making this as large as possible.

- 4. That, beginning with next year, we retain four hundred dollars from Conference funds paid in by Churches for mission work in our Conference, such to be spent under the recommendation of the Home Mission Committee of this Conference.
- 5. That Antioch be granted \$100 on pastor's salary next year, to be paid quarterly.
- 6. That Cary be granted \$100 to apply on Church indebtedness, to be paid at once.

7. That Clayton be granted \$100 on pastor's salary, providing they secure

a pastor approved of by this committee. This to be paid quarterly.

8. That Bethlehem be granted the privilege of selling their present Church, and buy at Epworth. This to be done after Dr. Atkinson and Mr. W. A. Newman have approved such action with active pastor. This to be handled by the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Christian Conference.

9. That since the Apportionment Committee last year offered a resolution that the money retained for our use this year be handled by the Executive Committee, that this committee be asked to allow the money not needed for Conference expenditures be turned over to the home mission fund.

10. That the Secretary of this Conference be authorized to draw on the Treasury for the recommendations above as they may become due and payable.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Foreign Missions believes that nothing tells quite so well of the missionary interest in the field of this Conference and the extent of our sharing in the operations on the mission fields as the figures representing our material contributions. The treasure and the heart have not ceased to be associates.

The figures used here represent the actual contributions made during the year just closed, and a very conversative estimate of salaries, other current expenses, etc., based on the reports of 1927 and 1928.

From October 1, 1928, to October 1, 1929, all the Churches and Sunday Schools of this Conference contributed to foreign missions, on our accepted basis of distribution, the sum of \$890.94. This represents an average of approximately 18 cents per Church member; about 7 per cent of the amount of pastors' salaries, and less than 1 per cent of all money raised.

While we are truly grateful for all that has been given and done, we believe the above figures do violence to the pride of our profession. We, therefore, offer two recommendations:

1. That every pastor serving Churches in this Conference state the facts of this report to his congregation and seek to get his congregation, then and there assembled, to set and state its own goal in this work for the ensuing year in terms of the "average" or per capita basis; choosing a committee, or local missionary leader, to direct the work, keep the records and make report monthly.

2. That we speak of foreign missions more often in terms of foreign service.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference was called to order at 1:30 by the President. Song service and special music.

Devotional by Rev. H. E. Crutchfield.

Rev. G. A. Pearce, of the Eastern Virginia Conference, was considered a deliberative member of the Conference.

The report of Committee on Social Service was read by Rev. R. L. House.

After a brief discussion of report by Rev. House and Prof. Smith, the report was adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE.

As time and civilization advance, new problems arise. Transformation of environment, or man's conquest and control over nature, has made his social life much more complex. Now, if the social teachings of the prophets and Jesus are to be regarded as definite directions which are to be obeyed in modern

society, we are impressed at once by the large number of important subjects with which they do not deal. If a list of one hundred of the most vitally important problems of today were to be carefully made, it is doubtful whether any definite statements susceptible of literal application could be found in the entire Bible upon but few of these problems. However, as it has happened a thousand times before, so it is likely to happen again, that the gospel, examined afresh with a new problem in mind, will seem again to have been written, in large part, to meet the needs of the new age. Seemingly, the prophetic mind of Jesus must have looked across the centuries and discerned the distant coming of social conflicts which were in His own time insignificant, but which are now universal and profound. There are texts and allusions in the New Testament which have been passed by as of slight importance or significance, now they are like windows through which we see miles of landscape.

On view of these facts, if they may be considered as such, and also realizing that a religiousless civilization presents an entriely different problem from a religiousless individual, we, the Committee on Social Service, urge the ministers of this Conference go on record as favoring the following recommendations:

- 1. That at least a part of our sermons shall be the proclamation of a social gospel. That is, that we shall be constantly mindful of the ethical teachings of the Bible, and shall exercise our homiletical talent in the application of the gospel to immediate social problems. Many of the greatest teachings of Jesus were provoked by the mere appearance of an immediate social problem. And the constant memory of this fact will keep our preaching nearer to reality. The social gospel, that God loves men and that men ought to love God and to love one another, must be a propaganda. This is the good news of the kingdom. Our social task is a painstaking and continuous effort to understand the problems of modern society. As we discover from time to time opportunities of social amelioration, possibilities of improvement in industry, in education, in correction, in government, we must put these into operation just so far as may be possible of varying degrees of socialization. Only in this way will the kingdoms of this world become the kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ.
- 2. That as a means to this end, we, as ministers and shepherds, engage more frequently in our privilege and duty of pastoral visitation. Teaching from the pulpit does not reach, in thousands of cases, the special need of the individual mind. It is only by talking face to face with one person as Christ talked face to face with Nicodemus, and face to face with the woman at the well, that the source of the difficulty is reached and the darkness is scattered.

Touching certain influences which are being exerted today in an effort to discount the right of the Church to champion certain moral issues, we reaffirm the attitude of this Conference previously taken, as follows:

- (1) That we pledge our unqualified support to the eighteenth amendment and to its enforcements.
- (2) That we urge our ministers to co-operate in every possible way in the campaign now on in the State and nation in the interest of temperance, law observance and good citizenship.
- (3) That we urge our Sunday School teachers to emphasize more the teaching of the temperance lessons each quarter; that we endorse the teaching of temperance and good citizenship as required by law in the schools of North Carolina.
- (4) That we condemn the effort of certain individuals and institutions to encourage lawlessness by ridiculing its enforcement.
- (5) That we endorse the work of the Anti-Saloon League, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and other organizations which represent the Church in action against the forces of evil.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

The need of the time is the teaching and the practice of stewardship. No truth of the Bible is more obvious and outstanding than that of stewardship. God is the Creator and the owner of all things. The cattle upon a thousand hills, and the hills themselves are all His. We are in possession and charge for a season and will have to render an account to Him of how we have managed that with which He has entrusted us for a season. If we are to be faithful stewards, we must practice self-denial. If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross daily and follow me. The trouble, the sin of our day, is indulgence. We are intoxicated with luxuries and indulgence. We are not practicing self-denial.

We recommend:

1. That our pastors seek to keep to the forefront of our thinking and preaching the biblical doctrine of stewardship.

2. That we purchase and read some of the splendid books now coming

from the press on stewardship.

3. That we practice stewardship at least to the extent of tithing our income, and give to the Church at least one-tenth of all, since this is the Lord's, and in tithing we pay to the Church and our Lord that which is His and that which He requires of all His stewards.
