

PRESENTER BIOGRAPHIES

Faith Fjeld (Moderator) holds a Masters degree in American Indian Studies from San Francisco State University (SFSU). She has lectured on Indigenous identity at SFSU, as well as at the University of Toronto (Canada), Simone de Beauvoir Institute (Concordia University, Montreal), Fond du Lac Tribal Community College (Fond du Lac Reservation, MN), Suomi College (Hancock, MI), Sinte Gleska University (Rosebud Reservation, SD), the Center for Sami Studies (University of Tromsø, Norway), the California Institute for Integral Studies (San Francisco), and the Finnish Studies Department at U. C. Berkeley. As editor of Báiki: the North American Sami Journal, she has been instrumental in the reawakening of Sami consciousness within the Norwegian, Swedish and Finnish American immigrant populations and has been involved at the grassroots as well as the academic level.

Harald Gaski is professor in Sami literature at the world's northernmost university, the University of Tromsø, Norway. He has been a visiting scholar at several universities in the US, Australia, and in Greenland, and is a regular speaker internationally on Sami issues. Gaski's research topics include indigenous peoples' literatures with a specific emphasis on Sami literature. He has also specialized on oral tradition — especially the transition of the traditional Sami singing, the yoik poetry, into contemporary lyrics. Gaski is the author and editor of several books and articles on Sami literature and culture. His latest books in English are the anthology In the Shadow of the Midnight Sun: Contemporary Sami Prose and Poetry and Sami Culture in a New Era: The Norwegian Sami Experience. His most recent work is a fiction book for young adult readers, written in Sami, titled Ciezain caziin (Seven kinds of water).

Rose-Marie Huuva is a visual artist, poet and designer. She studied traditional samicraft at the Sami College in Jokkmokk, Sweden and also studied weaving and design at the Jamtslojds School in Ostersund. She is a self-taught contemporary visual artist. She has studied at the Institute of American Indian Art in Santa Fe, and has privately toured Canada, Panama, Greenland, Morocco, Tunisia, Japan and Tibet, among other countries, in her pursuit of knowledge of art from around the globe. She has been exhibiting her work internationally since 1971, and had her first solo exhibitition in 1984. She has received numerous scholarships and awards in Scandinavia, Europe, USA, and Japan. She has published three books of poetry, has designed stamps for the Swedish Postal Service, and has designed costumes and scenery for theaters in Norway and Sweden.

Rauna Kuokkanen is a PhD candidate in the Center for Study of Curriculum and Instruction at the University of British Columbia where she received her Masters degree in Comparative Literature. A Sami native of Finland, she has also completed studies at the Arctic Center at the University of Ravaniemi Finland and at the Program of Sami Language and Culture at Oulu, Finland. Rauna has received numerous scholarships and awards, including Graduate Fellowships from the University of British Columbia, the Arctic Center and the Finnish Cultural Foundation. She has been a contributor to several publications, including The Impact of War Trauma on Civilian Populations and the forthcoming Monoacculturation, Power Relations and Diversity with Dr. Kaarina Kailo.

Ande Somby is currently in a post doctoral scholarship in the Faculty of Law at Tromsö University in Norway. He received his law degree from the University of Oslo and his doctorate of Law from the University of Tromso. He has been practising as a legal professional since 1987. He is the former Chair of the Center for Saami Studies at Tromsö University. Somby has taught at the University of Tromso and the University of Alaska. He has been active performing with yoiks (traditional Saami songs) since 1976. He has written numerous publications, including The Legal Situation of The Nordic Indigenous Peoples (in Norwegian) and Yoik and The theory of Knowlegde (in English). He spent the past year in the United States teaching in the University of Arizona's Program on International Indigenous People's Law on scholarships from the Fulbright Commission and the American-Scandinavian Foundation.

The Larry Vuckovich Trio: Larry Vuckovich (piano) was born in Kotor, Yugoslavia. He came to San Francisco in 1951 at the height of a flourishing jazz scene. Classically trained in his youth, he completed his music studies at San Francisco State University with an emphasis on jazz. He has peformed with numerous acclaimed musicians including Mel Torme and Dexter Gordon, and had a 25-year association with lyricist and vocalist Jon Hendricks. Having toured extensively for a number of years, he returned to San Francisco in 1990. He is currently the featured pianist and music director at Bistro 339. Completing Larry's Trio today, we are fortunate to have **Buca Necak** (bass). Buca has performed with Clark Terry, Jessica Williams, Anita O'Day and Chet Baker. **Omar Clay** (drums) spent many years on the New York scene, and has performed with Charles Mingus, Max Roach, Sarah Vaughn, Sonny Stitt and others.



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
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
