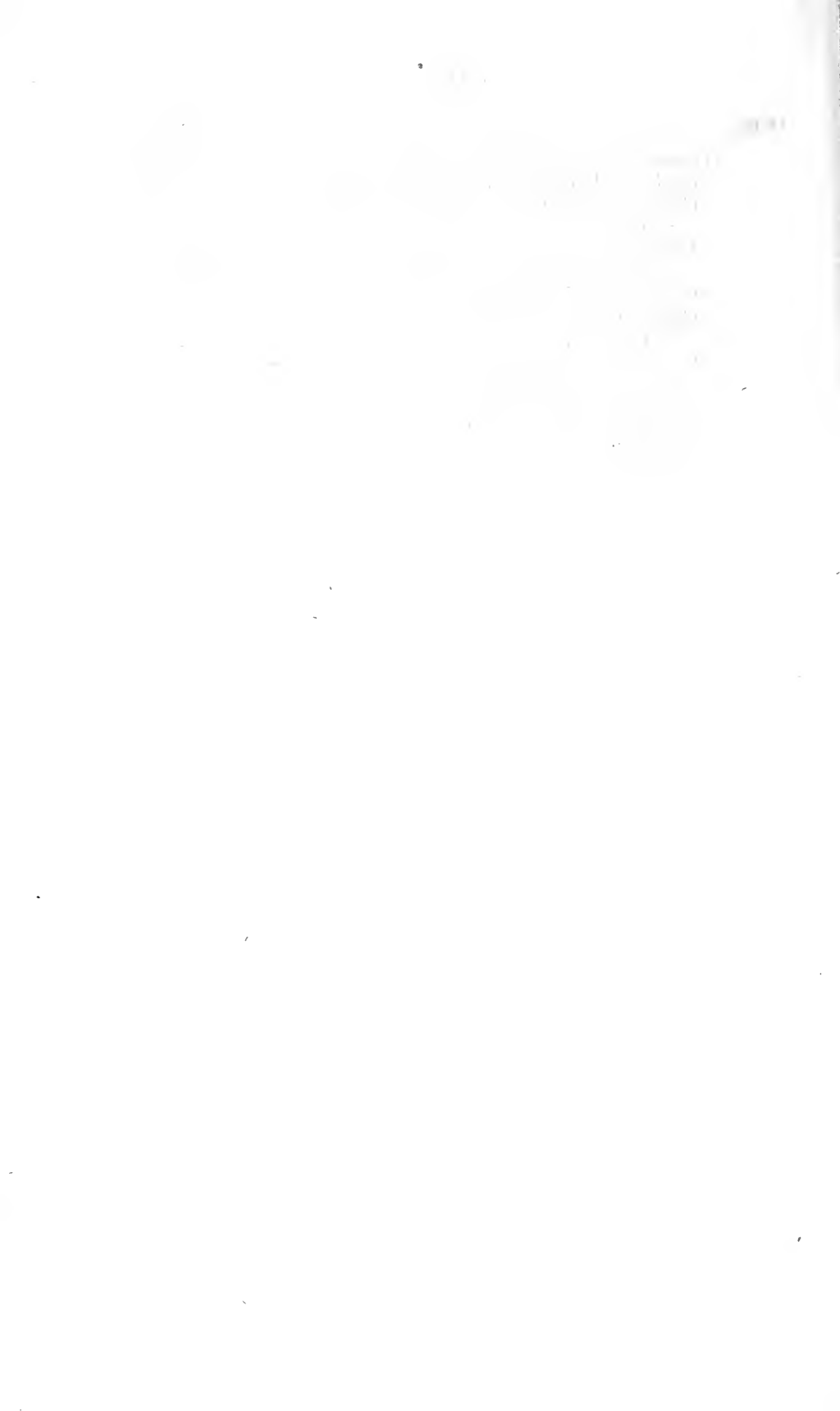

CITY OF ROXBURY, FEBRUARY, 17, 1847.

The Overseers of the Poor, in their first Report to their fellow Citizens, regret the necessity of announcing an unprecedented increase of the number of poor within the City, and the consequent increase of expenditure for their support.

(The present Board of Overseers did not enter upon the discharge of their duties until the latter part of the month of April, 1846. The statistics herein given respecting the number of inmates of the Alms-house, and the work done, refer to the year commencing on the first of February, 1846, while those of the expenditures relate to that commencing with the organization of the City Government.)

showing a still continued increase.	

By the Report of the Almshouse Physician hereto annexed, it will be seen that comparatively very few of those admitted, were in a fit state to labor for their own support, and that the number of cases treated by him has increased in a still greater ratio than the number of admissions.

As in former years, the larger proportion of those who have received support from the City are foreigners, who have been attracted to this country by the hope of escaping from the wretched condition which was their lot in older and less favored nations, or who have been shipped from abroad, in order to relieve those whose duty it is to support them, of the burden they are unwilling to bear. Not a few of the patients received at our Almshouse, have been suffering from ship fever when admitted, and it would almost seem that they had come to us directly from the ships, so short has been the interval between their landing and their appearance to claim our sympathy and support. The capitation tax paid in the seaports is of no advantage to Roxbury, though it would be but just that we should be repaid for the expenses incurred in such cases, which that tax is intended to meet. A representation to this effect will be made, and it is hoped will not be without avail.

The Overseers have been as discriminating as possible, and have endeavored to reconcile their duty towards the suffering poor with that of a careful and economical expenditure of the money entrusted to them. They have labored and are laboring under great disadvantages occasioned by the comparatively high price of all articles of consumption, which enhanced price, while favorable to the pecuniary prosperity of the country in general, increases the number of those whose labor is insufficient for their support, and the expenses of this department.

The decision of the State Legislature not to reimburse expenses incurred for the support of State Paupers, not inmates of Almshouses, has caused the Overseers to insist upon an entrance into the house of all such, whose out-door support would, in their opinion, exceed the cost of their maintenance in the house, taking into view the allowance made by the State in the latter case. The number of persons requiring partial assistance out of the house has nevertheless increased very largely, being certainly double, perhaps three-fold, that of any other year, and here the Overseers have endeavored to exercise the strictest discrimination.

Whatever labor the inmates have been capable of, has been required of them; and though that labor, with the exception of that expended on the farm and the highways, has not been profitable, the Overseers have thought it best to keep the inmates constantly employed.

In work done on the farm, and in moving soil about the house, there have been employed,

No account has been taken of work in the house; apart from the necessary household and yard work, the men have generally been employed in the house during unfavorable weather, in picking Manilla bands, there being a large quantity of oakum, the product of the labor of former years, now on hand and unavailable.

It will readily be perceived that a large amount of work must be required in a house containing such numbers of sick and disabled, with a large proportion of young children, and this has generally been accomplished without resorting to hired labor, though the time seems fast approaching when this will be no longer possible.

The number of children in the house bears an unprecedentedly large proportion to the number of inmates, being at this day fifty-eight, the greater part under eight years of age. Forty-four of these children attend the school established in the house within the last few months. The overseers have thought it advisable there should be a school within the house, for the purpose of receiving those too young to go the necessary distance to the public schools, and to avoid disagreeable occurrences arising from the presence of Almhouse children among other scholars. The result of the school has hitherto been satisfactory, both as to the relief felt in the care of so many young children, and as regards their advancement. The overseers believe that this school will soon be of sufficient importance to merit the fostering care of the School Committee, though they have, as yet, made no representation to that effect. The room now appropriated for the school, is not such as could be desired, being in an out-house recently erected for a pump-room; but in the present crowded state of the house, no better can be provided.

Besides the erection of the building above referred to, the women's yard has been secured, during the past year, by a fence twelve feet high; water has been introduced into the men's yard, by a pipe leading from the barn well, which affords an ample supply, and of excellent quality, while the former supply was entirely inadequate, and often failed altogether; a carpenter's shop has been made of an old engine house, on the premises; the barn has been repaired and reshingled; three strong rooms have been constructed on the first floor, for the confinement of the refractory and furiously insane, the old cells in the cellar being, in many respects, unfit for the purpose; and the wash-room has been paved with brick. These improvements, with other minor ones, were, in the opinion of the overseers, absolutely necessary, and have been effected with the greatest possible economy; as much of the work as practicable having been performed by the inmates.

As regards the expenses incurred for the support of the poor, and

There are on hand about fifteen hundred loads of stone chips, value seven-hundred and fifty dollars, which will be available in the coming year. We have also a claim against the Commonwealth for the support of State Insane Paupers, during this and previous years, of one thousand thirty-one dollars and twenty-four cents.

(Should this claim not be allowed by the State Legislature, it is the opinion of the Overseers that the inmates of this class should be removed to the State Hospital at Worcester, whenever practicable.)

The City Council have advanced two thousand dollars on the bills against the State, to be repaid by this Department on settlement of those bills, and have made an additional appropriation of one thousand dollars, which, in the opinion of the Overseers, will be amply sufficient for the remainder of the municipal year.

In view of the great and constantly increasing numbers of those for whom the City is obliged to provide, the Board of Overseers would recommend the appropriation of five thousand dollars for the support of the poor during the next municipal year, which sum, with six hundred dollars for the repairs of the Almshouse, they hope will

be sufficient. In common with the rest of their fellow Citizens they feel the weight of the burden thus imposed, but it is one which cannot be avoided, and which should be borne cheerfully by those whose lot in life exempts them from the sufferings and privations occasioned by poverty.

Dr. Cotting's Report, before referred to, expresses the conviction of the Overseers respecting the necessity which now exists for a City Hospital. They deem it unnecessary to add anything to the reasons therein set forth, except to say that they fully concur in the opinions expressed. They would therefore recommend the next City Government to bestow their early attention to this subject. An appropriation of six thousand dollars will be necessary for the building and furnishing of such an Institution.

To their successors in the duties of this office, the Overseers would suggest, from their experience of this year, the desirability of purchasing at wholesale all important articles of consumption, especially fuel, at that season when the market is at the lowest, so as to avoid paying the highest prices at the period of the year when most is required for the Almshouse and for out-door relief.

To the Overseers of the Poor of the City of Roxbury :

GENTLEMEN :

The time for the Annual Report of the Medical Department of the Almshouse having arrived, the following is respectfully submitted :

The whole number of Hospital Patients during the year amounts to one hundred and fifty, being an increase of forty-nine, or nearly fifty per cent. over the year previous.

The largest number on the sick list, at any one time, has been thirty-five; the smallest thirteen. At present, there are twenty under treatment. Of the Insane, four have been sent to Worcester, two have deserted, and nine remain in the house.

There have been three births in the house during the year; and eleven have died. All the deaths occurred in those sick on admission, with the exception of one caused by the accidental falling of a bank of earth.

Some details of each case are furnished, in the annexed table, together with the result. Only those are registered, whose sickness required a prolonged attendance; and no account has been made of the numerous daily calls for relief from trivial or minor complaints. To give some idea of the inmates generally, it may be stated that, exclusive of "transient comers," three-sevenths of the whole were admitted on account of sickness, and for the benefits of a hospital; while, on the other hand, only a little more than one-seventh, including those women admitted on account of their children, were able on admission to perform any active labor. Hence it is apparent that

the Almshouse has been little used as a resort for the idle and the lazy, but that it is fast becoming that best of all public charities, a hospital for the sick poor.

Should the number of admissions increase in the same proportion as in the last two years, the house will be crowded to its *utmost limit*, before the close of the coming year. What then is to be done—for you cannot turn your applicants away, and it is to be hoped you would not, if you could. What is to be done? The answer is a ready one. It is simply to build a hospital for the sick. This subject was urged upon former Boards, in the last two Annual Reports. It is again brought to your notice, in the hope that the suggestion will not now prove ineffectual, inasmuch as the necessity is becoming urgent. A building may be placed near or adjoining the present house, on a plan similar, if you please, to one already submitted to you. If this be done, the present house will answer for many years for the well; and the sick will be much better provided for than they can be under the present arrangements. Such a building is also greatly needed for many of the sick poor of this City, who will not now enter on account of the disrepute attached to a residence in an Almshouse. To some the severest suffering seems less terrible. Yet they are often among the most deserving objects of charity; and would find a respectable and comfortable retreat in such a hospital. They cannot be provided for, properly, without such an establishment. Abundant evidence of this is constantly forced upon you, in the daily duties of your office. Is the duty of providing for such persons questioned? Certainly not by you, gentlemen, who know their sufferings and their wants. Is the existence of such sufferers doubted? Let me quote from the observations of one, of enlarged experience and great wisdom: “There are many among the poor, who have, if we may so express it, the form of the necessaries of life without the substance. A man may have a lodging, but it is deficient in all those advantages, which are requisite to the sick. It is a garret, or a cellar, without light and due ventilation, or open to the storms of an inclement winter. In this miserable habitation he may obtain liberty to remain during an illness; but, if honest, he is harassed with the idea of his accumulating rent, which must be paid out of his future labors. In this wretched situation the sick man is destitute of all those common conveniences, without which most of us would think it impossible to live, even in health. Wholesome food and sufficient fuel are wanting; and his own sufferings are aggravated by the cries of hungry children: above all, he suffers from the want of that first requisite in sickness, a kind and skilful nurse.

“But it may be said that instances are rare among us, where a man, who labors with even moderate industry when in health, endures such privations in sickness as are here described. They are not, however, rare among those, who are not industrious; and who, nevertheless, when laboring under sickness, must be considered as having claims to assistance. In cases of long protracted disease,

instances of such a description do occur amongst those of the most industrious class. Such instances are still less rare among those women, who are either widowed, or worse than widowed. It happens too frequently that modest and worthy women are united to men who are profligate and intemperate, by whom they are left to endure disease and poverty, under the most aggravated forms. Among the children of such families also, instances are not rare of real suffering in sickness.

“There are other persons, also, who are of great importance in society, to whom relief afforded by a hospital is exceedingly appropriate. Such are generally those of good and industrious habits, who are affected with sickness, just as they are entering into active life, and who have not had time to provide for this calamity. Cases of this sort are frequently occurring. Disease is often produced by the very anxiety and exertions, which belong to this period of life; and the best are the most liable to suffer. Of such a description, cases are often seen among journeymen mechanics, operatives in factories, and among servants.

“Journeymen mechanics, and, more especially, operatives in factories, commonly live in small boarding houses, where they have accommodations which are sufficient, but nothing more than sufficient, in health. When sick, they are necessarily placed in small, confined apartments, or in rooms crowded with their fellow-workmen. They are sheltered from the weather, and have food of some sort, and these must in many cases be the extent of their accommodations. Persons of this description would do well to enter a hospital, even if they had to pay the expense of their own maintenance. In most cases they would suffer less, and recover sooner by so doing. When, as sometimes happens, they have not the means of payment, they become objects of charity; and the welfare of such persons should be considered among the strong motives in favor of establishing a hospital.

“Servants generally undergo great inconveniences, at least, when they are afflicted with sickness; and oftentimes much more than inconveniences. With so much difficulty is the care of them attended in private families, that many gentlemen would pay the board of their servants at a hospital, in preference to having them sick in their own houses. In some cases, however, neither the master nor the servant can afford the expense of proper care in sickness. Not uncommonly a young girl is taken sick in a large family, where she is the only servant. She lodges in the most remote corner of the house, in a room without a fireplace. The mistress is sufficiently occupied with the unusual labors, which are thrown on her, at a time, perhaps, when she is least fitted to perform them. Under such circumstances, how can the servant receive those attentions, which are due to the sick? Of what use is it that the physician leaves a prescription?—he goes the next day, and finds that there has not been time even to procure the remedies, which he had ordered. Meanwhile the period, in which they would have been useful, has passed away, and the incipient disease of yesterday has now become confirmed.”

To the above may be added the subjects of accidental wounds and fractures. Such occur most frequently among the poor and laboring classes; and oftentimes life, or limbs, are endangered, if not lost, through want of the relief, which might be afforded in a well regulated hospital.

Now all these classes we have amongst us, and some of them enter the House every year. Many more, who are deserving of the charity, and suffer greatly without it, would enter if the stigma alluded to were removed. A better provision would be made for them by the erection of the proposed building. There is no danger that the charity will be abused. "Persons of these descriptions would not be disposed to enter a hospital on every trivial occasion. But, when afflicted with serious indisposition, they would find in such an Institution an alleviation of their sufferings, which it must gladden the heart of the most frigid to contemplate."

The expense attendant on such an establishment may, and probably will be urged against its erection. Grant that the expense will be great, still it must be met: indeed, even now, it is forced from the community in one form or another. If we have, and we always shall have, the sick poor amongst us, they must not be left to suffer and die in misery and want. We must help them if we would not. And if the expense be any argument against the system of relieving the wretched and sick, congregated in a public hospital, it is a greater and far more conclusive one against supporting them, separately, in their own houses. The expense of the latter mode is obviously greater beyond computation, and often comes upon those, who are not able to bear so heavy a burden. The support of the hospital contemplated will be borne by each individual citizen according to his ability, whereas the relief alluded to, though generally inadequate, mostly comes from those whose relative equality of condition calls out the greater sympathy. On this point much more might be said, but enough.

In a few months, judging by the past, the Almshouse will be crowded to its utmost: already it is much too full. The Superintendent has exerted all his ingenuity in the disposal of the inmates, and by his attention and kindness, and that of his family, the sick have been made comfortable and the well have not suffered. But if the house be filled, and applications still be made for public relief and support, as there will assuredly be, the applicants must be boarded out of the House with those who may be willing to receive them, and expense beyond calculation will ultimately accrue.

On the ground then of duty and humanity, on the ground of less comparative expense to the community in general and to the poor in particular; and, finally, as the necessity is urgent, and something must be done and done soon, the subject is urged upon you for serious consideration.

Thus it will be seen, that the great increase of expenses has been in building school houses, and the increase of pay to teachers, and other incidental expenses of the school department.
