OF THE

COMMITTEE ON ACCOUNTS.

The Joint Standing Committee on Accounts in compliance with the provisions of the 3d section of the Ordinance establishing a system of Accountability in the Expenditures of the City, requiring that "they shall on or before the first Monday in March annually, and whenever requested by the City Council, or either branch thereof, report to the City the whole amount of accounts, claims and demands allowed" by them, respectfully

The times when this sum becomes payable may be seen by referring to the Schedule of the City Debt, accompanying

this report.

The expenditures for support of Poor the past year have been increased about \$5,000 in consequence of the great influx of foreign Paupers, which is expected will be allowed by the Commonwealth. For a detailed statement of the Poor and the Alms House, reference may be had to the report of the Board of Overseers of the Poor which is appended.

By an examination of the details of the expenditures under the different heads accompanying this report, it will be seen that besides the ordinary expenditures, there has been an outlay for permanent improvements of \$9,928 37,

such as :--

The purchase of land and building a School House in

Eustis street, costing \$3,994 87;—

The purchase of land and building a School House in Vernon street, costing thus far, \$3,843 50;—(There is an undrawn balance of \$1,456 50 in the Treasury to the credit of this account.)

The payment of \$300 to Henry Codman for 5,000 feet of

land on Green street for a School House;-

The construction of five Reservoirs, one on Washington,

one on Vernon, one on Warren, one on Kenilworth and one on Dudley street; and six hydrants in the vicinity of and supplied by the Reservoir on Mount Warren, at an expense of \$2,090;—

The purchase of one new Engine for Company No. 4,

Jamaica Plain, at a cost of \$825.

The Appropriation for Highways, Bridges and Sidewalks was made general; but the expenditures have been made in three sections as was formerly the practice under the town government. These sections were assigned a certain sum by the Surveyors of Highways. It will be observed that the expenditures in the upper section, or Ward 8, are unusually large, which is accounted for by the unusually small expenditures the year previous. There was an undrawn balance on Feb. 1, 1847, of \$495 28, which with the appropriation this past year has been expended.

The amount of \$1,350 stated in the Treasurer's account, as received from Judson Chapin, Treasurer of a School Fund in W. Roxbury, is for a new School House in Ward 8, which sum is to be increased to \$1,500. A like sum is

agreed to be added by the City.

Annexed to this report are statements of the unexpended balances of the appropriations of the previous year, and the appropriations and transfers for 1847; the details of the expenditures under their proper heads, and the present balance of each appropriation, and a Schedule of the Real and Personal Property of the City.

Appended will be found the reports of the Overseers of the Poor, Physician to the Alms House, and Chief Engineer

of the Fire Department.

REPORT

OF THE

OVERSEERS OF THE POOR.

The Overseers of the Poor of the City of Roxbury, respectfully submit the following

REPORT.

In consequence of the large number of foreign sick paupers, which were received into the Alms House during the past year, it became indispensably necessary that appropriate apartments for their accommodation should be provided; and in such a manner as to isolate them as much as possible to prevent the contagious disease with which they were affected, from being communicated to the other inmates of the establishment; and as an apartment had been commenced early in the season, on the site of the wood house, at the western end of the Alms House, for the convalescent in summer, and as a work room during the winter, an addition was made thereto in conformity to the advice of the Consulting Physicians, and the approbation of the Board of Health, which afforded two rooms for the ship fever patients, and will be found to answer all the purposes of a Hospital, for a number of years at least.

There not being a sufficient number of sleeping apartments, an extra appropriation was granted for finishing three dormitories in the third story of the Alms House, which was done, and fifty beds have been placed in them; but they are so spacious that eighty or ninety persons can be conveniently lodged therein, should it become necessary.

The School Committee having proposed to furnish an instructress for the children in the Alms House, if her board was provided for, and a school room furnished, the Overseers did not hesitate in acceding to those terms, and the shed at the eastern end of the Alms House was fitted up for that purpose, where there are about seventy scholars in daily attendance.

The dictates of philanthropy required that means of instruction should be afforded to those unfortunate children, both as respects their present and future condition here and hereafter; for they are thus not only enabled to receive an education equal to that which is obtained in our Primary Schools; but the vicious may be thereby reclaimed, and all prevented from acquiring those ruinous habits which are too often superinduced by the baneful influence of idleness.

For the purpose of still more extending the precious advantages of intellectual, moral and pious instruction, one of the Overseers, aided by a member of the School Committee and a few other beneficent gentlemen of the city, have volunteered their services as teachers of a Sunday School, not merely for the children, but the adults of the Alms House: and from the experiment which has been made, the most favorable results are confidently anticipated. Education is the guardian angel of the human race, for morals, manners, and pure religion are the admirable results of mental culture; and whoever generously and kindly undertakes the duty of guiding the rising generation in the beautiful paths of rectitude, of deportment and education, may be rightfully called the Howards of "Little Children," whom the messenger of the Almighty "blessed," and emphatically declared "of such is the kingdom of heaven."

The accompanying report of Doctor B. E. Cotting, the physician of the Alms House, contains such a clear and full account of the number of patients which he has attended during the year, the variety of the diseases with which they have been afflicted, and the results of his treatment, that it is unnecessary to make any additional remarks upon those

subjects.

The arduous duties of Doctor Cotting have been performed in the most faithful and efficient manner, and he is eminently entitled to the highest commendation for his unremitted and kind attentions to the numerous persons who were affected with that fatally malignant disease, whose terrible ravages have been so sadly experienced in Europe and on this continent.

As the cooking establishment and oven were in the large room where the inmates breakfasted, dined and supped, great inconvenience was experienced by those who prepared the food, as well as by those who partook of it; and the heat produced by the several fires which were kept up during the day and a large portion of the night, extended into all the apartments of the edifice, which, in the opinion of the Physician and Overseers, had not merely an unpleasant but very deleterious effect upon the men, women and children who occupied them. It was therefore determined to fit up one of the basement rooms for a kitchen, which was accomplished, and thus all the difficulties which arose from its

previous location have been happily obviated in such a perfect manner as to render the air more salubrious, and the

entire household more comfortable.

From the imperfect manner in which the grounds are enclosed, and the greatly augmented population of the city, and of the persons in the Alms House, since the yard was formed around it, it has been impracticable to so control the intercourse between the inmates and their acquaintances, as is requisite to guard against the injudicious consequences resulting therefrom to the former, and to secure that quietude which is so important to the sick, and for enforcing the regulations which have been established for the preservation of sobriety and order throughout the institution. It was therefore considered necessary that a sufficiently high and substantial fence should be erected on Highland street, and on the eastern and western bounds of the cultivated land. To accomplish this very desirable object will require an expenditure of about six hundred dollars; and it is earnestly recommended that an appropriation be made for that purpose next year; but in the mean time, that authority be given to the Overseers to contract for the materials immediately, to enable them to erect the fence in April or May.

Isaac H. Meserve, the superintendent of the Alms House, has discharged his various responsible duties in a most acceptable manner. Although constantly exposed to the danger of being stricken down, as have been his excellent wife and infant son, by the complicated and terrible epidemics with which so many of the persons in the Alms House have been affected, still he has never been deterred from the performance of his duty in the most attentive and humane manner, and laboriously endeavoring day and night to administer to the wants and alleviate the sufferings of those

who were so dependent upon his kind offices.

The services and character of the late Mrs. Meserve have been so appropriately described in the report of the Physician, that it is only necessary to add, that the Overseers fully concur in the just tribute of respect therein paid to the memory of that excellent and estimable wife, mother and matron of

REPORT

OF THE

PHYSICIAN TO THE ALMS HOUSE.

To the Overseers of the Poor of the City of Roxbury.

· Gentlemen:

During the year ending this day, the amount of sickness in the Alms House has far exceeded, and the number of patients has been greater than that of any previous All the predictions of the report of last year have been fully realized. The House has been greatly overcrowded, and the necessity for further provision for the sick been urgent and imperative. Through the instrumentality of the Board of Health, a Hospital building has been erected, adjoining the Alms House, capable of containing in its two stories from forty to fifty beds. This has been of very great service to the sick, and their attendants; and is also a subject of gratulation to many families in the city, who, during the prevalence of severe and alarming diseases, have had occasion to avail themselves of its advantages. either for their own members, or their domestics.

The proportion of deaths is a fraction over one in ten, in all diseases—the same holding true with regard to those admitted sick of ship fever. This proportion must be considered small if the crowded state of the House, previous to the erection of the Hospital building, be taken into account. It should be remembered also that many were sent in after all hope of recovery was past, and even when in a dying condition. By reference to the tables, it will be seen that the number of such amounts to no less than fourteen, or one fourth of all the deaths.

The number of births during the year was eleven. In several of these cases Ether was administered with the most satisfactory results. All the women did well, with the exception of two, prematurely confined in the midst of the gravest form of ship fever—presenting the most pitiable com-

plications ever witnessed.

The greatest number of sick and confined to the bed, at any one visit, was eighty; of which seventy were cases of ship fever. At this time there were two hundred and forty inmates, of whom not more than ten were able to perform a full day's labor. Throughout the year the well have borne but a small proportion to the sick. Out of seven hundred

and fifty-eight, the whole number admitted (exclusive of "transient comers," or those who come in for a night's lodging), only one hundred and thirty-nine were "well" on admission, and this embraces seventy-one orphans and chil-

dren accompanying sick parents.

Such facts, one would think, ought to satisfy any who still fear that our Alms House is becoming the resort of the idle and lazy. During the past year there has been little opportunity for idleness in the house; but every well inmate, not even excepting the children, has been obliged to perform services, which, at one period at least, could not have been purchased. Besides, of the whole number admitted more than three fourths have been discharged; many of the convalescent leaving before advised to, through anxiety to return to their occupations. And it may be mentioned also of the newly arrived immigrants, that it has been ascertained that, without exception, they came to the city, not for the advantages it possessed of an Alms House and Hospital, but to meet relatives or near friends, who had preceded them; and further, that all such admitted sick had contracted their diseases, including insanity, subsequently to their leaving their homes in their native country.*

That form of Typhus, known under the name of ship fever, of which we have had instances in the House for several years [see former Reports], became unusually prevalent during the past year. These cases occurred chiefly among the newly arrived immigrants; though the disease was communicated to many others, both in and out of the House. Those brought directly from shipboard were sometimes in such a revolting condition that an accurate description would hardly be credited by those who have not been eye-witnesses.

Some of the complications of this disease, and its attending circumstances, may be briefly alluded to. The whole number sick of this fever when admitted was 307. Besides the more common symptoms of fever observable in all these cases, such as a hot dry skin, rapidity of pulse, dark coated tongue, sordes on teeth, urgent thirst, pains in the back and limbs, sleeplessness, &c.,—2 had profuse blecding from the bowels—32 do. from the nose; some requiring plugging of the nostrils—95 had severe diarrhæa, frequently of a dysenteric character—67 vomiting—9 were jaundiced—150 had some inflammation of the lungs; and nearly all had more or less cough—78 had continued, low, muttering delirium—over 200 were deaf during a part of the disease—231 had

decided eruptive spots—sudamina (sweatlike eruption) noticed in 70—16 had severe dropsy of the feet and ankles (ædema). Many had painful swellings of the feet during convalescence—3 had general dropsy (ascites)—3 were prematurely confined—11 had large abscesses of the glands of the neck and under the ears—2 became insane—1 paralytic

(hemiplegia).

This fever was communicated to 30 of the inmates also; and five of the aged and infirm, and two infants died in consequence thereof. Among the victims was the veteran inmate, 'Billy Duff,' who had been a dependant on the town for nearly seventy years, and had reached the age of 103—an inoffensive man, whom great age and quiet thankfulness had rendered an object of interest to many citizens. Moreover, all the attendants were affected, and only two escaped being brought down by it. At the period before alluded to, the condition of the House was deplorable and alarming. But after the erection of the Hospital, some of the more threatening dangers abated. Of late the health of the House has been improving; and only two deaths have occurred during the last three months.

In the season when many a stout heart would have quailed, the Superintendent and members of his family quietly and sedulously devoted their untiring energies, day and night, without murmuring or reluctance, to the necessi-

ties and comfort of the sick and dying.

I forbear to praise the living; I wish that I could do justice to the dead. "Mrs. Meserve was distinguished for the faithful and humane manner in which she performed the various, difficult, onerous and very responsible duties, which were devolved upon her, as Matron of the institution over which her husband has presided since 1842. Such were her kind and unwearied attentions to the unfortunate, poor and sick, men and women, and numerous orphan and destitute children, in the establishment, that she was respected and beloved as a most beneficent and devoted friend and mother. As a wife, parent, and Christian, her example was honorable to her sex, and worthy of the highest commendation and imitation."

So wrote an honored friend—let an humbler pen copy

and attest the record.
