

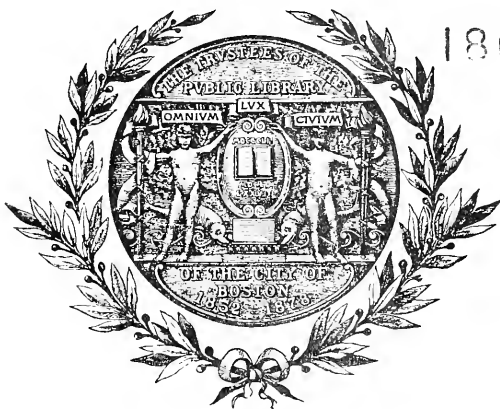

THE Joint Standing Committee on Accounts respectfully submit their Fifteenth Annual

REPORT.

In accordance with the provisions of the City Charter, the Committee have prepared and herewith submit a particular account of the Receipts and Expenditures for the year ending January 31, 1861, and also a schedule of the City Property. The details of the Expenditures will be found under their separate heads.

There has been received from the sales of land, the sum of \$3,965 46, and this has been appropriated towards the reduction of the City Debt, in conformity to a vote of the City Council.

There remain in the Treasury the notes of sundry individuals, secured by mortgage, of \$34,192 62, which, as they become due, will be appropriated to the liquidation of the City Debt, as directed.

By law, the proceeds of sales of lots or rights of burial in the Cemetery at Forest Hills are yearly paid into the City Treasury, and kept separate from all other funds of the City, and subject to the order of the Commissioners, to be applied by them in the manner provided by law. For further details concerning the affairs of the Cemetery, reference may be made to the Annual Report of the Commissioners, which is appended.

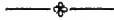

The City have belonging to the Alms-house, one horse, three cows, six hogs, three wagons, one horse cart, one sleigh, three harnesses, and farming utensils necessary to carry on and cultivate the land belonging to the establishment; also, two horses, two wagons and harnesses used for the collection of house offal, neither of which belong to the Alms-house property, and the expense for keeping is charged to another appropriation. With the exception of potatoes, there has been raised sufficient vegetables on the place for the use of the house the present year. There were 2,300 lbs. of pork raised and killed on the place during the year. The house and out-buildings are in good condition; having been painted and thoroughly repaired the past year, little expense will be necessary for the present or coming year for repairs. The house is heated by steam, which is also used for washing purposes. The house is furnished with sufficient furniture, beds and bedding for all of the occupants. The health of the inmates, many of them, the past year, has been feeble, requiring much attention from the Physician, and constant nursing, many of whom must, necessarily, from their infirmities and age, continue so through life.

The Physician, Dr. Flint, has been attentive, and discharged his professional duties in a highly satisfactory manner to all those intrusted to his care, and we cheerfully recommend him to the kind consideration of the present Board of Overseers. For further particulars relating to the Medical Department, you are referred to the Physician's Report.

In conclusion, we say the general deportment of most of the inmates during the year has been good, and that many of them exhibit sufficient evidence of having been in much better circumstances, and are here only from accidental causes entirely beyond their control, and are not insensible to the many favors they have received from the Overseers, in trying to make them comfortable and happy, while from necessity they are obliged to accept the hospitalities of the City Alms-house.

REPORT OF THE AGENT OF THE OVERSEERS OF THE POOR.

BOSTON, JAN. 28, 1861.

To the Overseers of the Poor for the City of Roxbury :

GENTLEMEN—I herewith transmit to you the yearly account of my doings as the “Agent for the Overseers of the Poor” for the year commencing with the 1st of February, 1860. The report details the proceedings only for the five months in which I remain confined to the office, viz. :—February, March, November, December and January. The entire number of families aided with *fuel only*, during said time, were 432 ; whole number comprising said families, 1,583.

The expense for fuel on each order is \$2.75, costing \$1,225.50.

In addition to fuel furnished, I have, in some instances, furnished other supplies, in the whole about \$100. The Roxbury Charitable Society, whose agent has an office in the same room with me, has also aided the above applicants to quite a large amount, in provisions, clothing, shoes and other supplies.

None of the applicants enumerated above have any settlement in this City or State, and are, consequently, a proper State charge. The whole number sent to the State Alms-house during the year from this City is 87.

For the seven months, which are the Spring, Summer and early Fall months, but little was given, except to relieve in urgent cases, the particular expense of which I have not placed here.

In addition to the above expenditure, I have, under the direction and approval of the Overseer for the Ward in which the applicant resided, furnished fuel and other necessaries to persons in destitute circumstances, *having a legal settlement here*, to an amount in all, less than \$100—the above does not include the amounts voted expressly by the Board. The present winter has been unusually severe for all classes of laborers, and the applications for aid more than usual, although there is a certain class who are annual applicants, and would be so if business was ever so prosperous for labor. As a rule established by the Board, I refuse aid where the head of a family is an able-bodied man, and all in good health. Nearly all the cases where aid has been granted, are laboring women with children.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICIAN TO THE ALMS-HOUSE.

ROXBURY, JAN. 28, 1861.

To the Overseers of the Poor of the City of Roxbury :

GENTLEMEN—The record of the sanitary condition of the Alms-house for the past year does not vary essentially from the reports of many preceding years. The number of inmates has been much greater than at any period since the removal from Brook Farm. In general, the health of these people (exclusive now of the Truant Children) has been much the same as hitherto reported, as good perhaps as could reasonably be expected, in remembrance of the fact, that many are confirmed invalids, with constitutions ruined by past excesses, and that nearly all are subjects of some infirmity, bodily or mental.

The oldest person in the house has nearly attained the age of ninety, and though bed-ridden, and at times a sufferer, is yet for the most part cheerful, and has often expressed to me her grateful thanks for the many comforts afforded her, and the readiness with which her every want even was anticipated. The youngest inmate is a child of only seven years, who, born in the Alms-house and abandoned by parents, has never yet known other home than this.

Of the exact number of cases treated, no record has been kept, but it is safe to assert that nearly all of the inmates have at some time during the year been under medical treatment. Among them have been five affected with paralysis ; one with an ulcer of three years' duration ; two cases have been admitted of severe burn, one of which, at my suggestion, was transferred to the Hospital in Boston ; four of variolous disease, one a fatal case ; and one each of pulmonary hemorrhage of syphilis. Two insane persons were admitted, but were soon removed to an Insane Asylum. One young man, a State pauper, suffering from an attack of acute rheumatism, was attended at his place of residence till convalescence was sufficiently established to allow of his removal to Bridgewater. Three deaths have occurred in the house and one birth.

The Truant Children confined here by order of Court, of whom there were seven at the commencement of my term of service, have increased during the year to the number of twenty-five. No case of sickness has occurred among them, but a few have been troubled with cutaneous disease, which readily yielded to

treatment, and several have been vaccinated who never had been before.

One little fellow is now under treatment with fracture of the arm, near to the wrist, caused by the rudeness of an older and most vicious companion.

Every needed provision for cleanliness is furnished them, and vigilant care used that this important element to health be not neglected. Many of these little ones, deprived of their liberty and confined within this establishment, I doubt not find here a happier home than has ever fallen to their lot outside its walls. One, indeed, when informed that he could shortly be released, seemed dejected, and in reply to my inquiry whether he would prefer to remain, or be again subjected to parental care, unhesitatingly made choice of the former.

The house is, in all respects, well adapted to the purposes of its construction, creditable alike to the community which provides for its maintenance, and to the Board of Supervisors who control its management.

The rooms and halls are capacious, well warmed by steam, and at all times to be found in a state of the most perfect cleanliness. The repairs made upon it the past season have not only added to its comfort internally, but have likewise improved its outward aspect. The Pest-house, so called, for the reception of contagious disease, having been thoroughly repaired and cleansed, is now in fit state for occupancy.

In concluding this brief report, I should be negligent indeed, did I fail to bear testimony to the efficiency and unvarying kindness of the Superintendent and his wife in the discharge of their duties, which, at times, as I well know, have been not a little annoying, and to record my belief that to worthier or more faithful hands could not be entrusted the care of the house and the welfare of its inmates.

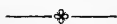

OF THE

CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.



To the Honorable Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council :

GENTLEMEN,—Since my last Annual Report, a vital change has been commenced in our method of extinguishing fires. Agreeably to a petition from many prominent citizens, it was decided early in the season to purchase a Steam Fire Engine. The City Government accordingly contracted with J. M. Stone of Manchester, N. H., who gave ample evidence of his ability to furnish such a machine as would be desirable. The machine was completed and brought to the City. After a full and satisfactory trial, it was accepted by the City Government. We also built, in the most substantial and thorough manner, a hose carriage, to be drawn by horse, capable of carrying 800 feet of hose. This was also accepted by the City. While these machines were being constructed, a convenient and suitable house was erected, to contain the Steam Fire Engine, hose carriage, and a stable for three horses used in drawing them. An Ordinance has been passed regulating the Steam Fire Engine, defining its officers and their duties, and under it competent and faithful men have been selected as Engineer, Firemen, Drivers, &c. We feel sure in saying that the whole establishment, for perfection, convenience and completeness, cannot be surpassed by any similar one in the State.

In order to still further complete the efficiency of the Steamer, I would recommend that there be purchased for its use, one thou-

sand feet of rubber hose, manufactured by the Rubber Belting Company in this City. It has long been used in other cities on Steam Fire Engines with great success, and, from the trial we have given it, we are satisfied it is cheaper, full as durable, and kept in order with far less trouble than leather hose.

It seemed to be no longer necessary that the former number of Hand Engines should be kept in active service ; accordingly the Company attached to Engine No. 2 was honorably discharged, some of their members having attached themselves to the Steamer and Hose Company. The engine will be hereafter used as a relief engine.

A petition has been presented from residents of Phillips Street and vicinity, praying that Engine No. 2 may be stationed in that vicinity. We should deem it wiser for the City not to incur the expense of erecting a house and equipping a company in that or any other vicinity at the present time. But we earnestly would urge upon the City Government the importance of constructing additional Reservoirs. Last year but one was built, and a much larger number should be built the present year. Our Steamer can pass as much water as two Hand Engines, if a supply of water can be had. Without Reservoirs in many parts of the City, a fire may break out, and the whole department be compelled to look on utterly powerless to prevent it.

We have now but three Hand Engines with Companies, a Hook and Ladder and Hose Company. They are all in a satisfactory condition. Whenever called to duty they have promptly responded. But a single case of insubordination or disobedience has been reported during the year. We further believe that as we get used to the operations of steam in the extinguishment of fires, just so fast will the fire spirit be driven out of the minds of our young men ; that foolish rivalry, which has so severely taxed their energies, will disappear, and all will wonder that calamities so serious as that of fire ever were a source of pleasure and recreation to anybody.

The house of Engine No. 7 is in a rather dilapidated condition, and the house of the Hose Company is unsuitable. Should a new house be built for No. 7, it would be well, I think, to have it

large enough to contain the Hose Company also, if a convenient location can be obtained.

I am happy in being able to state that the number of fires, alarms, &c., were less than last year, and the loss, while being a trifle greater, has been fully covered by insurance. No organized band of incendiaries have carried on their diabolical work. We have reason to be thankful that we have been thus spared from disastrous conflagrations by accident or design.

The accompanying documents give a full report of the members of the department, the condition of the engines and apparatus, list of hydrants and reservoirs, and the general condition of the department.

I cannot close without expressing the deep sense of obligation I feel toward the Assistant Engineers of the Board for their cheerful coöperation in the affairs of the year. A spirit of union and harmony has pervaded all their actions, and their faithful labors deserve the approval of the public. Accept my thanks for your long continued confidence and support.

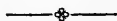

REPORT

OF THE

COMMISSIONERS OF FOREST HILLS CEMETERY.



In conformity to the fifth section of "An Act relative to a Public Cemetery in the City of Roxbury," the Commissioners respectfully submit their

THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

CONSIDERABLE progress has been made in the improvement of the Cemetery the past year.

A green house seventy feet in length, divided for a propagating house, is completed, and found to answer the purpose intended. The large and increasing extent of the Cemetery required that we should have the means of preparing our own plants.

Lake Hibiscus has been enlarged the past season, by excavating one and one half acres to a depth of five feet. We have a surface of water three and one quarter acres; there remains to be completed three quarters of an acre; when finished, the Lake will contain an area of four acres. The copious springs found in the bed of the Lake retarded the work of excavation, but they give confidence that the supply of water will be abundant.

Twenty-two acres of land have been added to the Cemetery, at a cost of nine thousand dollars; the land belonged to Edmund M. Fowler, and is bounded by Walk Hill and Canterbury Streets, in West Roxbury. This purchase gives a permanent boundary on

the south-western side, and enables the Commissioners to lay out to advantage the extending of the present avenues and paths.

The whole number of acres is one hundred and twenty-six; the aggregate cost, exclusive of interest, amounts to \$46,644.67.

The fund which has been created by individuals paying a stipulated sum, the interest of which is to keep their lots in perpetual order, amounts to nineteen hundred and sixty-five dollars. The importance of this arrangement will appear when it is taken into consideration, that the time may come when no one will be living who will feel a personal responsibility as to the care of a lot. We would call the attention of all persons interested, to an Act passed February 25, 1852.

MONUMENTS. Twenty-eight monuments have been erected the past year. Among the number, General Sumner's is deserving of particular notice.

General Sumner's lot on "Sumner Hill," is one of the finest in the Cemetery. On an elevated mound, surrounded by wild and picturesque boulders, stands a statue of most poetical conception and great beauty. A platform of three steps sustains the pedestal and statue. The first step is of Quincy granite, the next two, as also the base, die and capital of the pedestal are of Italian monumental white marble, and the statue is of fine Italian statuary marble, well selected for its uniform color and hardness. The shield having the Sumner arms and motto, the frame to enclose the medallion head, and the moulding of the cap and base indicate the style as "transition," or of the period between classic and Gothic architecture. The figure (of life size) representing the Angel of the Tomb protecting the ashes of the dead, is in a kneeling attitude, easy and natural. The beautiful face wears a most impressive expression. The head is crowned with a wreath of poppy buds, symbol of the eternal sleep. The drapery, which the figure holds in one hand, partially enveloping an urn, is elegantly rendered.

The author of this successful work is N. Cantala Messa Papotti, of Rome, who is quite distinguished in his profession. We are happy to learn that he has orders for other works to be placed in this Cemetery.

LOTS PREPARED. One hundred and eighteen lots have been prepared and ornamented with trees and shrubs.

LOTS SOLD. One hundred and twenty lots and one hundred and fifty graves in the Field of Ephron have been sold the past year.

LOTS FINISHED. One hundred and five lots and one hundred graves in the Field of Ephron are now ready for sale.

AVENUES AND PATHS. Twelve hundred feet of avenues and fourteen hundred feet of paths have been excavated and filled with stones and gravel.

FENCES. Nineteen lots have been enclosed with iron fences, nine with hammered granite and nine with hedges the past year. Granite borders have added much to the ornament of the Cemetery, especially where lots are situated on the corners of avenues.

TOMBS. Four family tombs have been built.

INTERMENTS. Five hundred and forty-four interments in private lots and in the Field of Ephron have been made during the year. The whole number of interments since the consecration, June 28th, 1848, are five thousand and ninety-five.

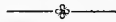
