L. Z. being the SEE of the BISHOF presiding over the whole County of Cambridge, it might be expected that I should have began this Collection with an Account of it, and of the Monuments extant in that venerable CHURCH; but as it is done so well by that judicious Antiquary Browne Willis Esq; in the second Volume of his Survey of the Catbedrals Po. 331, and as the Inscriptions omitted there, are to be met with in Le Neve's 5 Volumes of monumental Inscriptions, beginning at the Year

1600, and deduced to 1718, I thought it better not to repeat it, but rather to insert the Memorials of these Rlaces, which are no where extant in print; in Order to preserve them from devouring Time, all Collections of this Nature being made publick for that Purpose.

HINTON,

OMMONL: Y called CHERRY-HINTON, from the abundance of Cherry Trees heretofore growing in the Parish; hath it's Church dedicated to St. Andrew, which is a Vicarage in the Gift of Peter-House in Cambridge; it stands in the King's Books at 91. 144. 7d. but being sworn of the clear yearly Value of 211. 135. 8d. ob. it is discharged both of First-Fruits and Tenths, and is capable of Augmentation. It was appropriated 20 March, 1395, by John Fordbam Bishop of Ely, for the better support of his poor Scholars studying the liberal Sciences in St. Peter's House in Cambridge, that they might be as Champions against the Enemies of the Orthodox Faith, able to place themselves as

an invincible Barrier against all sacrilegious and perverse Doctrines, advanced against the Catholick Church; and because the Revenues settled by Hugh de Balsbam Bishop of Ely their Founder, was not sufficient for the support of a Master & 14 Scholars, & as Simon de Langbam Bishop of Ely designed to appropriate it, as did John Barnet Bishop of Ely, Bishop Fordham's immediate Successor, but were hindred by the Pope's Provision of a Rector thereto, from compleating the Affair: King Ric. IId's. Licence was obtain'd, and a Vicarage fetled, to be presented to, by the College; and a Pention of 6 s. 8 d. per Ann. was referred to the See, & all Episcopal Jurisdiction whatever. It is in the Deanry of Cambridge; and in the Archdeacon of Eh's old Register, wrote in 1276, it is thus enter'd, " Hinton is taxed at 30 Marks, and it's Vicarage at 40 s." It is not appropriated, the' there is a Vicar and Rector: the Sinodals are 2 s. Ad. Peter-Pence 51. Procurations 18d. Among the Ornaments, there are several Vestments of the Gift of John Malebraunche. The Chancel, Nave, and two Isles, are leaded, the South Porch and N. Vestry, which joins to the Chancel, are tiled. The Tower is square, in which are five Bells; On the third, Ave Mazia Magdalena. On the 4th, Cum Pfalmis venite ad Bominum. On the 5th, Omnis Populus ter. re plaudite Domino. In the Chancel on a black Marble,

Here keth the Body of Mr. William Watson, born at Hull in the County of York; in Testimony of his Love to Religion, and the Decency of God's Worship, he beautified this Chancel, and crected this Altar; and in Gratitude to the Place of his Nativity, endowed the Hospital there, built by his Brother Thomas Lord Bishop of St. Da-

vid's, he died Dec. 2, A. D. 1721, et. 84.

The Screens are beautifully painted with the Virgin of Pity, Mary Magdalen, &c. and on those of the Chapel at the East End of the South Isle, are curiously pourtraited the Essigles of a Man in a praying Posture on his Knees, and a Woman by him on her Knees, with a Vail turn'd over her Head, and this,

BARTON

ORBERTON, is situate about two Miles from Cambridge, in a pleasant open Country, and takes it's Name from the abundance of Corn which antiently grew here, and with which it still abounds, Bene signifying Wheat in the Saxon Language. It is a Vicarage valued at 8 1. 11 1. 3 d. in the King's Books, and consequently pays 17 1. 3 d. yearly Tenths; & being above Value, is not capable of Augmentation.

It gives Name to the Deanny, and is in Wetherley Hundred, and in the

Patronage of the See of ELY.

The Church is dedicated to St. Mary, and had two Gilds, one of the Holy Trinity, and another of Corpus Christi. The Prior of Bernewell's

Temporals

temporals were valued at 13 li. 16 s. 8 d. The Prioress of St. Radegunds in Cambridge at 16 s. per Ann. The Prior of Ely's at 12 d. The Prior of Bernwell, had a Portion of Tithes valued at 3 s. The Rectory was Appropriated to Merton Priory, the Collation of the Vicars being reserved to the See, for the Licence of Appropriation; the Rectory was valued at 26 li. 13 s. 4 d. to the tax.

In 1390, John Fendour was Vicar & in 1395, John Major, who then exchanged it with Richard Jery Rector of Testerton in Norfole & the said Riehard in 1401, changed with John South Rector of Lange-ford in London Diocess. & in 1720, Mr Francis Bedford was Vicar.

The Church is dedicated to St. Peter & is a long narrow Stone Building, covered with Lead, as is the Chancel, the Tower is Square & hath 4 Bells, It appears by the date 1634, cut on the Beams, that the Chancel was then new Roofed, In the Windows are these Arms, 1 Gul. a ofs Arg 2, Vert a fess indented Ermine, 3. Vert on a pale Arg. an Eagle displaied S.

On a black Marble having, on a chief 2 Eagles displaied, impaling on

LITTLE SHELFORD.

In the Chancel there is an Arch in the North Wall, and an Altar Tomb fixed in it, which hath the Effigies of a Knight compleatly armed, his Head lying on two Pillows, his Crest is a Lion couchant, and Arms, Gul. 3 Crescents Erm. the Inscription is very entire, and it is plain that this Sir John Frevile lived in Edward II. Time.

ICI GIST SIRE IODAN DE FRIVILE, KE FVST SEIGNOVR DE LESTE VILLE, VOVS KE PAR ICI PASSET, PVR CDARITE PVR L'ALDE PRIET.

There are many Stones, and defaced Arms and Inscriptions in the Windows, for several of this Family, and indeed the present Church seems to have been Built by this Sir John.

In 1393 WALLER KNIGHT' Rector here, Refigned, & King Richard II. as Guardian to the Heir of Rob. de Frevile deceased, presented Robert Cooke to the Rectory of the Church of ALL SAINTS at Shelford Parva.

There was a HERMITAGE at the Bridge between Great & Little
Skelford

Steiner, for in 1708 J. FORDHAM Bishop of ELY, granted an Indulgency of 40 days Pardon, to all Such, as would Contribute to Repair the Bridge and Cause way between Great and Little Shelford, & to support Yohn Laws, then HERMIT, in the Hermitage there.

I find that in 1286 BALDEWIN de FRIVILE was Lord of Litcham

This Seat and Side Chapel belong to the Lords of this Manour, here-tofore the Freviles, Esquires, afterwards John Bankes Esq; deceafed, and now Priscilla Bankes his Widowe; in whom for her time the said Lordship is; at whose charge this inscribed Plate was fixed here for Testimony Anno Dom. MDCXXII.

There are diverse Arms in the Windows, as St. George, Est. Angles, and Gul. 3 Chev. Arg. Sab. 2 Chev. between 3 Doves Gul. Sab. 3 Flower-Pots Arg. in each a Lilly. Az. a Chev. Or. between 3 Swans proper. Frevile, impaling Sab. a Fess Nebulé, Sab. and Or. between 3 Boars or Wolves Heads cooped Or. In one Window is the Legend of St. Christopher, but much defaced; in another St. George and the Dragon. In another Window is this thrice over, 1. France, 2d and 3d England, 4th Vert. Frette Az. Semidelis's Or. over all 2 Label of 3 Arg. on each File 3 Bezants: The Apostiles with the Greed in Labels from their Mouths, were in the South Windows.

Ann Wife of Gilbert Wigmore, Rebecca, another Wife, and Gilbert himself buried 1683.

There is a Head-Stone for John Ilgiere 1729, 80. Death is carved with a Bow and Arrow ready to let fly.

The ancient Book belonging to the Archdeaconry of ELY, in Caius College Library, written about the Beginning of Edw. 3d Time, tells us, that this Rectary was taxed at 14, &t after at 16 Marks, that it paid 12d. Procurations, and 18 d. Peterpence, That the principal Vestment was given by the Lady Eleanor Frivile; an Antice of the Gift of Sir Henry de Stoke Chaplain, and an Altar Cloth of the Gift of Richard Cooke. In 1400 William Frevile was Patron. In 1539 Mr. Thomas Hinde, was Rector, In 1709 Gilbert Wigmore, S. T. P. and now (13 July 1730) The Rev. Mr. ROGER GILLINGHAM is Lord, Patron, and Rector. It stands thus in the King's Books.

TOFT,

I Sa small Village in STOW Hundred, and BOURNE Dearry, of which we read thus in the Archdeacen's Register; Toft is not appropriated, the Rectory there is taxed at 12 Marks, it paid 2s. 4 d. Sinodali, 12 d. Procurations, and 18 d. Peterpence; The Church is dedicated to St. Andrew, there was in it a Missal, &cc. given by Sir Robert Rector there, another by Sir Ralf de Beeston, formerly Rector. There were 3 GILDs here, one of All Saints, the other of Corpus Christi, and the 3d of St. Andrew. In 1405 Thomas Margerys died, and Thomas Bradfield of Barlon, presented John Lolleworth, and it was after that in the Bendishes, and now Christ's College in Cambridge are Patrons.

This Town is part of the Honour of Clare, of which the King is Lord, and some lands are held of the Honour of Richmond; The Register begins thus, "This Booke was begun in Mr. Edmund Bendisbe's "Time, who was Parson of the Church of St. Andrew in Toft, "Ano 1539." The Rev. Mr. Thomas Metcalfe, is now Rector. The

The Tower is Square and bar > 3 Bells, on the Second,

Banga Katerina oza pro nobis.

The Chancel is Tiled; at the North Corner lies an old Stone, with this imperfect Inscription,

Hic facet Katerina Anne Dui Pocccolerixo, cuius aninte propicietur Peus.

The Church and South Porch are Tiled, the South Isle, and Chapel at it's East End are Leaded, but all the Brass Plates are pulled off.

Under a Stone in the Chancel lies Robert Peeft, Rector, buried in 1487. In 1360 Roger Beefton, Patron. Bdmund Bendish of Barenton, about 1500. In 1556 Francis Hynde, Esq. The Church was rebuilt in 1352, and was dedicated by the Bishop of Ely, on the Feast of St. Andrew. In 1340 Sir John de Beefton, Knt. was Lord. It stands thus in the King's Books.

HARDWICK,

I S another Village in the same Hundred and Deanry, It's South Porch, Nave and Chancel, are leaded, There is a square Tower, Freestone Spire and three Bells.

On the 2d, Per Thome meritis mercamur Gaudia Lucis. On the 3d, Sanna Maria oza pro nobis.

This Rectory stands thus in the KING's Book,

8 li. 14 s. 2 d. HARDWICKE Rectory, Yearly Tenths 17 s. 5 d. So that it is incapable of Augmentation. The Church is dedicated to St. MARY, who had a GILD held to her Honour here, It is in the Patronage of the Bishop of ELY, but the Manor belongs to Penbrook-Hall in Cambridge, and is a very good one, the Copyhold being at the Lord's Will. In 1340 The Bishop of Edy was returned Lord and Patron.

In Edward III. Time, John Rouceby, Parson of Hardwicke, was Surveyor and Controller of the King's Works, (Weaver P. 72.)

In 1408 Thomas Beylbam refigned to Thomas Bolton, in exchange for

Redenball Vicarage in NORPOLK.

RECTORS extracted from the Register; Nicholas Stinit, afterwards Rector of Eversden Parva. 1562 William Middleton, there is an Altar Tomb over him in the Churchyard, on the South Side, which shews that he was Bachelor of Divinity, and died Jane 14, 1613, this Man, reco-pered several Rights, and Town Lands, and gave himself 3 or 4 Acres of Land, to support his Tomb, which is in a decaying Condition; tho it is ordered in the Settlement of the Land, that if the Town neglect such Reparation, the Land shall devolve to the Rector for Gleba. 1662 Rightsund Keene, Mr. John Urlin of Pembrook-ball, Mr. Arthur Orthard of St. John's. 1706 NICHOLAS PENNY, D. D. asteswards Prebend of Norwich, Rector of Bedington in Surry, and Dean of Litchfield and Coventry. 1721 Thomas Husband of Christ's College Cambridge, and this 20th of April 1727, Mr. Thomas Methalse, late Fellow of Christ's College, is RECTOR here and of Tort.

The ARCHDBACON's Register says, HARDWICK Rectory is taxed at 12 Marks, paid 12 d Peter-pence, and 12 d. Procurations, and had one

In a North Chancel Window are the Effigies of St. Etheldred and the Arms of ELY-See, but find no other Memorials, except a Stone over Robert Challis, who died June 16, 1723. Ætat. 45.

KINGSTON,

OR the King's-Town, so called from it's being ancient Demean of the Crown; It is in the same Hundred and Deanry with the sormer Village, and was in the Mortimer's antiently, for in 1340 Sir Confantine de Mortuo Mari, was Lord; In 1389 John Cooke was Rector. In 1390 John Barle, Sen. Esq. Lord and Patron, presented John Borle Clerk, who in 1408 changed with Simeon Dominyk, Vicar of Mildenball,

and

and then William Somerestams Honry. Formmeston, Clerks, and William Salle of Cambridge were Pattons. The Patronage was soon after vested in the Provost and Fellows of King's College in Cambridge, who on February 27, 1457, presented ROBERT WOODLARK, their then Provost (and Founder of Catherine-Hall) to it. The Church is dedicated to All-Saints and St. Andrew, and was rebuilt, and the High Altar consecrated by the Bishop of Ely in 1352. The Archdeacon's Register says, Kingston is not appropriated, the Rectory is taxed at 8 Marks, pays 14 d. Peterpence, 2 s. 4 d. Sinodals and 18 d. Procurations, among the Ornaments, There are 3 Crosses, and 2 Wax-Tapers to be perpetually found Burning, at the Elevation of our Lord, of the Gift of Sir Guy. There is a Manual at St. James's Altar, and a Cup of the Offr of Sir William Chaplain of Stow, and a Cup and Vestment given by Sir Richard de Hélmingham.

It is not capable of Augmentation, being valued in the King's Beek,

At 11 li. 15 s. 5 d. It pays 1 li. 3 s. 6 d. ob. Yearly Tenths.

The Manon was fold by the Lee's, and the late Earl of Oxford had it, and now to belonge to Philipp Handwick; Loud High Chancellor of Great Britain.

The Tower is square, and hath 3 Bells, The Church, Chancel, 2 Isles

and South Porch are all Tiled.

Mr. WILLIAM TODD founded a Free-School here, and endowed it with 10 li per Ann. in this Parish, and left 40; per Ann. to the Rector, to Catechize the Children.

SIMON DE KYNGSTON of the Abby of St. Edmund's Bury, was born here, he was first Cellerer, then Chamberer, and afterwards Sacrift of that Monastery.

On a Freeestone, at the South East Corner of the Chancel.

S T O W E,

OMMONLY called Long-Stowe, is the Town from which the Hundred takes it's Name; It is in BOURNE Deanry, & it's Lordship in 1340 belonged to Sir Warine de Bassingbourne, Knt. In 1306 Jeffry Pye Rector, died, and Thomas Oky was presented by John Wanten shen, Lord, he refigned in 1405, and John Rykysby was instituted at the Prefentation of the said Thomas Oky and John Lucas Clerks, John Burgoyn' and Robert Forth, Peoffees of the Manor of Long-Stowe by Canton.

The Archdeacons Register saith, Srow is not appropriated; but hath a Rector and Victor, is taxed at 17 Marks, pays 12 d. Peterpence, 18 d Procurations, 2 s. 4 d. Sinodals, and hath a Tapeftry for the Altar, of the Gift of Master Richard de Conington. Apr. 29, 1727, when I was there, Mr. Cross was Rector. The Tower is square and hath 2

Bells.

4 H, 8s. 4d. STOW-LONGA Rectory. Yearly Tenths 8s. 10d. and 10 it is incapable of Augmentation.

WALTER, Vicar here, in Henry III. Time, founded an HOSPITAL of Poor Sifters, and dedicated it to the Bleffed Virgin, and in 1340 they

were excused from all Taxes by the King's Writ.

On the North Side is a neat CHAPEL, parted from the Church by an Iron Pallisade, and under it is a Vault in which the Bovey's are interr'd, and against the East Wall is fixed a most sumptuous Monument, with a Man represented as half out of the Waves of the Sea, ilretching out his Arms, and having with one Hand gotten hold of an Anchor, by that means, keeps himself above the Water, and under him is this,

Opposite to this, is another CHAPEL now in Ruins, with all the Monuments, &c. in a difinal broken Condition, there are two vaulted Arches under it, in which there are the Remains of 7 Cossins; In the middle of the Chapel is a fine Altar-Tomb of black and white Marble, on the Table of which lie 2 Essigns, one of a Knight in compleat Armour, the other Of his Lady, but both are much batter d, and with difficulty I read this at the West End of the Tomb.

O'There remain the Effigies of a Lady in Marble, kneeling on a Cufhion, her Head is broken off; another of a Knight in Armour in the same Posture, and a defaced Effigies of another Lady kneeling; and broken Pieces of the Monuments, but so small or defaced that I could make out nothing of the Inscriptions.

At the South East Corner of the Chancel is a noble Tomb for one of the same Family, for on it are the Arms of CAGE, Quartering Gul.

In RADWELL Church in Hertfordsbire, is a Stone thus inscrib'd,

Here lyeth buried the Body of ELIZABETHPARKER, Wife of JOHN PARKER, Gent. and eldest Daughter of ANTHO-N' CAGE of STOW in the County of CAMBRIDGE, Esq. She lived the Life of the Godly, and died (in the true Faith of Christ) the Death of the Righteous, 26 January 1602, in the 26th Year of her Age.

BOURNE,

HIS Town gives Name to the DEANRY, as STOW doth to the HUNDRED; it is written antiently BRUNNE and BURN, which fignifies a Brook or Small Rivulet; MORCAR was Lord of Brunne, and had a numerous and warlike Family, Ano 870, but he and most of them were killed in Battle by the DANES.

It was the ancient Seat of PAIN PEVEREL, Founder of Barnwell Priory, whose Mansion-House was called BOURN-CASTLE; Mr. HAGAR the present Lord hath his Seat in the midst of the old Fortifications, encompassed with Hills and a broad Moat; There is a Well or Spring of Mineral Water here, formerly much frequented, but now quite forsaken, from which probably at first the Place might receive it's Name.

PEVEREL gave the Church, to his Ca.o. s at Bernwell, and at the Dissolution

Dissolution it went to the Crown, and was given by the Countess of RICHMOND to Christ's College, when the founded it; which College

hath the Patronage at present.

In 1286 BRUNNE had been then long appropriated to the Prior of Bernewell, and had a Vicarage valued at 25 Marks, and it paid 18 d. Procurations, 2 s. 4 d. Sinodals and 4 s. Peterpence. In 1440 the Dela-Inpoles were Lords, for Sir RICHARD AT POLE, Knt. had it. In 1394 ROGER BLASE, Vicar of Multon in Canterbury Diocess, changed his Vicarage with John Alvene Chaplain, for the perpetual CHANTRY in the Parish Church of Brunne, lately founded for the Souls of Sir John Massingham and Roger Sergeant, and he was inflituted at the Profentation of Sir John DE Ashwell Vicar of Brunne, He and his Succession for being perpetual Patrons of the CHANTRY. In 1400 Blafe exchanged it, with William Son of Reger de Normanton Vicar of Wentworth, and in 1402, he changed it with Robert Hawkesworth, Rector of Clopebam in Winchester Diocess, and in 1406 he changed it with Richard Morbun Vicar of Chaure in London Diocess, who resigned it the . fame Year, and Sir John Ashewell Vicar, presented Richard Forster or Forester, who in 1407 changed it with Thomas Hare, Rector of St. Peter of Maydenwell in Lincoln Dioces; The last Custos of the CHANTRY of the Virgin Mary in BRUNNE, was Sir John Archer in 1539.

In 1407 Sir John Aschewell, Vicar religned, and the PRIOR of Bern-well presented John Helywell. In 1539 Christopher Willre was Vicar, and after him George Wheelbouse. 1602 Thomas Saunders. 1603 John Ourrer. 1604 Edward Forster. 1655 Edward Buncheley, Vicar and Rector of Caldecote, April 26, 1727, when I was at this Parish, Richard Buncheley his Son was Vicar, and in August 1739, the Rev. Mr. Buncheley (his Son as I suppose) was presented by the Master and Fel-

lows of Christ's College.

The Vicarage was valued at 9 h. 15 s. 10 d. in the King's Books. Sworn of the clear yearly Value of 32 h. 3 s. 4 d. and so is discharged of First fruits, &c. and is capable of Augmentation.

The Church is a year large antique Fabrick, originally delicated the St. Helm, on whose Day their Feash is still kept; but at the Foundation of the Chantry, was re-dedicated to St. Marx. The Tower is square and hath 5 Bells, the South Porch, Nave, two Isles, and two transfept Chapels, which make the Church in form of a Gress, are all Leaderd, and the Chancel is Tiled! The South Chapel was built by some of the old Lords for their Burial Place, the Founder dies under an inarch'd Monument in the South Wall. The Hagar's, the present Lord's Family are inter'd in it, and there are two or three mean Stones there, all cover'd with Mortar. There is a Stone in the Nave for William Croples, Sen. 1608. 72. and William his Son 1694. 42. There is cut on an old Seat, A. P. de B. 1517.

I meet with nothing more here, but the following Inscription, on a mural Monument at the East End of the Chancel.

The Archdeacon of Ely's Register says, that in 1276 there were both Rector and Vicar, that the Procurations were 25 4 d. the Sinodals 18d. and the Peter pents 28. That the Church was dedicated to St. Andrew, and that Sir John Westmand

Woodward Vical there, was a Beneficion; In 1389 John de Breton, had Licence from the Bishop to have Divine Service in his private Chapel at Caxton for a Term of Years, which was renewed in 1398 to Sir John Stanground, Priest. In 1410 William Roos, called also Rees, Esq.; (descended from Roos Lord of Hamlake,) and Matth his Wise, Daughter and Coheir of Sir William de Nerford of Norfolk, by his Wise, Daughter and Coheir of Sir William de Nerford of Norfolk, by his Wise, Daughter Manors of Caxton and Wratting in Cambridgeshire, to Found a Chantry in the College of St. Mary in the Fields in Norwich, and io pay Sir Thomas the Anchorite, near that College, 2 s. a Week for Life, together with the Manors of Nerford, and that of St. Omer's in Tharston in Norfolk, to be sold by his Executors for that Purpose.

JOHN CAIUS, M. D. gave to his College in Cambridge; his Manor of SWANSLEY or SWANNESLEY in Canton, which that College now enjoys, There being a Manor-House, 28 Acres of Pasture, 12 Acres of Land in the Town, 44 Acres in the Fields, Swanneshy-bill containing 100 Acres; The Money Rent Annually is 6 li. 13 s. 4 d. and for a Brawn at Christmass 2 li. Corn Rent, 5 Quarters of Wheat; MALT, 6 Quarters, 1 Comb,

Bushel and Peck.

The Church and South Isle are Leaded, the South Porch is Tiled, and there is a square Tower, in which are ς Bells; In the East Chancel Window is a Shield of St. George, put up by Windfor College, who repair that Fabrick as Impropriators.

Here lieth the Body of MARY HENSON, youngest Daughter of William Barnard of Caxton, Gent. she was married to John Henson, junior of Sautrey in the County of Huntyngdon, Gent. the 15th of April 1718, her Husband died in June following, and left her with Child, she was brought to Bed Jan. 31st after, and died February 3d after that, Aged about 25 Years; so in the Compass of less than 10 Months, she was Maid, Wife, Widow, a Mother, Behold! Reader, a most remarkable Instance of the Changeableness and Instability of human Life: She was in her Life time of an un-diffembled Piety towards God, a dutiful Child, a tender Wife, a forrowful Widow, a loving Sister, Curteous to her Neighbours, Charitable to the Poor, of a Disposition ready to forgive Injuries, and eminently remarkable for speaking Evil of no One. Though these and many other good Qualities, could not skreen her from the stroke of Death; yet 'tis humbly hop'd, thro' the merits of her Saviour, they have open'd her a Passa e to the Regions of Everlasting Happiness. Reader, therefore lament not ber Death, but strive to Imitate her Virtues, that thou may'st inherit an equal Crown of Glory. Underneath this Stone lieth also the Body of John Henson an Infant, and Son to the abovesaid John and Mary Henson, who departed this Life the 4th of June, 1719, Aged 5 Months and 4 Days.

In 1496 JOHN LOLHAM of this Parish, was buried in the Church-yard of St. James, and gave his best Vest for his Mortuary; he settled an House at the East End of the Town, and gave 3 Cows and 6 Ewes, to be Lett with the House, by the Parson and Churchwardens for Ever, and after keeping up the House, the clear Profits to find his Anniversary in the Church for ever; the Parson to have 4 d for Dirige and Mass, and the Church-Wardens 4 d. each for Attendance; and the rest, to every Priest present 4 d. and every Clerk (or Person in any of the inserior Orders, as Shaveling, Accolite, Subdeacon or Deacon) ij d. each, and to every Child that can Sing & Read jd. and iijd. to be offer'd for his Soul, and the Overplus to be spent in Ale, Bread, Cheese and Meat for the poor People.

In 1716 Martha Wife of Anthony Digby, with his consent, by her Will, gave 10 Acres of Meadow and Marsh Grounds, after both their deceases, to RALF PERKINS, L. L. D. Rector here, and to Edward Morden and William Read of Stretham, in Trust; that the clear Profits shall be distributed every Year, 6 Days before Easter Sunday, and 6 Days before Christmass-Day, unto so many of the poorest Housekeepers in Stretham, which do not receive any Collection; and also her Moiety of 4 Acres and half a Rood of Arable Land, the clear Profits to be distributed in like manner to 6 of the poorest Widows in STRETHAM, as an Augmentation to what they have, and by no means to lessen their Allowance or Collection: And also her Moiety in one Acre of Copyhold Land Arrable in Stretham or Thetford, and held of that Manor, as a further Augmentation to the aforesaid six Widows; there are always to be 3 Trustees, The Rector for the being always to be one, and two substantial Inhabitants besides. (Regr' Elienss.)

This Rectory is undischarged, and stands thus in the King's Books. 22 li. Stretham Rectory, with the Chapel of Thetford, 2 li. 4s. Yearly-Ienths. It is in the Ratropage of the Bishop of ELV. Here was a GILD of All-Saints; in 1340 the Bishop of ELV was return'd to be Lord of the Town, and was to raise 22 Stones of Wool for the Wool-Tax, of which John Attribute. Chaplain was to pay him 2 Stones. This Town is in the Isle of ELY and Jurisdiction thereof, and to it belongs the

HAMLET or Town of THETFORD,

Which hath a CHAPEL dedicated to St. George, and is a CHAPEL of Ease to STRETHAM, served by the Rector of that Parish; there was formerly a GILD of the Virgin Mary, and in 1459 Henry Bykerstaff, Parish Chaplain here, was a Benefactor to the Chapel, which hath no Tower, but two small Bells hanging at the West End, the Nave and Chancel are Thatched, I find no Memorials, only these Shields in the Windows.

The Rev. Mr. Cort, is the present Vicar. The Vicarage being sworp of the clear yearly Value of 50 h. only, is discharged of First Fruits and Tenths, and is capable of Augmentation: The Church is dedicated to St. Andrew. twas appropriated to the Prior and Convent of ELY, and now belongs to the DEAN and Chapter there, who present to the Vicarage, which was augmented with 36 h. per Ann. Increase; by the Dean and Chapter, according to Bishop Kennets Case of Impropriations, P. 283.

In 1392 JOHN Prior of ELY, presented Robert Say of Ely, who was succeeded by Richard Powler, and he in 1397 by John Crowle, and the Restory then paid 18 d. Peterpence, and was taxed at 18 Marks, and

the Vicarage at 6 Marks and an half.

Among the Knights that ROGER BIGOT Earl of Norfolk, held of the Bilbop of ELY, GILBERT PECCHE, Knt. held in this Town, of the Earl, and he of the Bilbop, one Fee; and John Fitz Simon another Fee, which Simon, I find was Simon de Infala or Life.

There were two GILDs kept here, one of St. Catherine, the other of

the Refurrection.

In 1496 Henry Monoy gave an Acre of Land to this Church, lying in Chesterton Field, to keep his Obit for ever.

CHESTERTON.

THE CHURCH, 2 Isles, Chancel and Nave, are Leaded, the South Forch Tiled, there is a square Tower, a Clock, and 5 Bells, on which,

The Church is dedicated to St. Andrew, and is the principal or Head Town, from which this Deanry is denominated; it is a Vicarage valued in the King's Books at 12 l. 12 s. 3 d. ob. and pays 1 li. 1 s. 2 d. ob. qr. yearly Tenths, belides First fruits, it being not discharged, it is not capable of Augmentation; it formerly belonged to King's-Hall, and with that, went to Trinity College in Cambridge, to which the Impropriation now belongs, and the Patronage of the Vicarage. There were 3 GILDs, of the Resurrection, St. Catherine and St. Anne. The Restory with the Vicarage, was originally valued at Bo Marks. In the Archdeacons Book, it is said then to be appropriated to the Abby of Vercellis in Lom-Bardy, and was taxed at 50 Marks and paid 16 d. Peter-pence. In 1504 Joan Boxford of this Town, was buried in our Ladies Chapel, by William her Brother, and gave a Legacy to Corpus Christi, commonly called the Resurrection Gild.

In 1154 it appears that every one that kept a Fire here, were bound to pay a Farthing to St. Peter's Altar in ELY Cathedral, by the Name of Ely Farthings, and the 4th Farthing ariling from this Town, and that of Grancestre, originally given to ELY by the King, when Lord of both these Towns, used to be paid to the Castle of Norwich, by the Name of ELY Wardpenny: The Rural Dean of CHESTER TON Deanry, of which this is the Head Town, had an authentick Seal of his Deanry

in 1294.

In 1389 Sir William Burewell resigned, and John Granby Vicar, was presented by Andrew de Alice, Canon of the Monastry of St. Andrew of Vercellis in Lombardy, of the Order of St. Austin, and Proctor for that Abby at Chesterton, who had it appropriated to them. In 1399 John Loret alias Granby, exchanged it for Swafeld in Lincoln Diocess, with John Merchaunt, who in 1408 exchanged it for Thurgarton in Norfolk, with Robert Wolston, who was presented by the Prior of Bernwell. In 467 Thomas Baro, L.L.B. was presented by John Gunthorp, the Master and Fellows of King's-Hall in Cambridge, Archdeacon of Cokhester, and Chancellor to Richard III. 15.8 Jestry Blithe Master of King's-Hall was Vicar. 1661 Theodore Crossland, S. T. B. on the Death of Richard Watts.

CALDECOTE,

Now called Camket or Cozket, in Domesday Caldecota, (that is, the Cold Divelling) is a small Village in the Hundred of Stowe, and Deanry of Bourn, 'twas appropriated to the Priory of Barnswell, and had a Vicarage endowed, for in 1393, Robert Elg of Exemington Vicar here, exchanged with Tho. Cartwright, Chaplain of the Chantry in the Church of St Laurence Poultney in London. in Candlebugh Street, with the Stall belonging to it, next to the Master of the said Church, on the Right-Hand of the Choir and in 1395, Cartwright resigned this Vicarage, and the Prior presented John Platte. Is paid 25. 4d. Sinodals, 18 d. Procurations and 8d. Peter-Pence, and there was an Altar of St. Mary at the South East Corner of the Nave; there was a Pention of 105. per Ann

paid

paid to Barnwell Priory, and now to Christ's College, who are Patrons, it being about 50% per Ann. the Honour of Richmont hath Rents here, most of the Land being free, and held of it, there are about 20 Families. The Nave, Chancel, and N. Porch, are tiled, and are very small, there are no Inscriptions either modern or antique, the Tower is square and hath 3 Bells, on the second,

Here lyeth Margaret the Daughter of William Conningesbye of Kings Lynn one of the Justices of the Common Pleas at Westminster, who married with Robert Alyngton Esq. Son & Heir of Sir Giles Alyngton of Horseheth Knt. by whom he had five Sons and six Daughters, Will: John, Giles, James, and George, Alice, Anne, Margaret, Elizabeth, Frances, & Beatrix, and after, she married with Tho. Pledger Gent. with whom she lived 4 Years, and died 16 May 1596, Æt. 78, & he died 13 Mar. 1599, aged 70, and lieth here buried. By his last Will and Testament he gave 40% to be bestowed in Pree hold Lands, the Yearly Rent to be bestowed upon 8 of the Poor and antient Inhabitants, dwelling in this Parish of Bottisham for ever.

There is another mural Monument in the sime Chapel in form of a Tent supported by 2 Cherubims, and in it lie 2 Children.

Stay Passengers, and wonder whom these Stones Have learned to speak, two Infants, Alingtons, These the World's Strangers, came not here to dwell, They tasted, liked it not, and bad farewell, Nature hath granted what they begg'd with Tears, As soon as they begun, to end their Years.

In 1396, the Bishop granted Licence to Joan Relict of Mautice Cone, to have Divine Service performed in her Oratory, in her House at Botesham-Lode.

The Church is dedicated to the Holy-Trofs, was appropriated to Anglesey Priory, and had a Vicarage taxed at 51. the Advowfon of which at the Dissolution was given by H. VIII. to Trinity College at Cambridge, who are now Patrons; 'ris in Stane Hundred and Camps Deanry.

The Prior of Burnwell had a Portion of Tithes here, taxed at 2s. In 1393, John Duncke died, and gave 6s. 8 d. to Anglesep Priory, and 6s. 8 d. towards maintaining the Lights or Torches in Lovellver, Longmedow, and Bottisham Street, to which Lights, most that died here gave Legacies, they being of great Use to direct Strangers and Others by Night.

The Nuns of Smattham had Temporals here taxed at 16 s. 6 d.

The Abby of Ruttele 5 /. Temporals in Anglesege.

The Prior of Tunbzidge's Temporals taxed at 20 1. 3 s. 4 d.

The Prior of Longantile had a Pention of 41. 13 s. 4d. paid out of this Church for a Portion of Tithes here, perpetually compounded for, by the Prior of Anglesepe, who paid it.

In this Parish was a Priory of Canons Regular, of the Order of St. Augustine, founded by Richard De Clare, in an Island called Angleset, valued at it's Dissolution according to Speed at 149 l. 18 s. 6 d. ob: but according to Dughdale at 24 l. 19 s. the said Ric. was Patron of this Church, which he gave to the Priory, his Arms, viz. Or. 3 Chev. Gul. are in the Church Windows, and over the

Porch

Porch of the Priory, impaling the Arms of that House, viz. a Cross Humetty, the same Arms are on a Piece of Copper in my Possession, which was ploughed up in the Fields here. In 1388, William de Bottisham, Subprior here, was appointed by the Bishop of Elp. to be Confessor to the Prioress and Nuns of su assham, which is not far distant he was created titular Bishop of Bethleem, by the Pope, and in 1389, Bishop of Landass, thence translated to Roch: ester, where he died in feb. 1399, and was born as Godwin says in this Town, from which he took his Name, the same Author says, he was Doctor of Divinity in Cambridge, and a Dominican, which seems to be a Mistake, tho' it is evident he was a good Schollar and celebrated Preacher, for which he was preferr'd by Ric. II. he was succeeded by John de Bottesham, Chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterburg, who died in 1401, before he saw his Cathedral, he was a Benefactor to the University, and to Peterhouse College there.

In 1553, John Bonar, (the last Prior as I take it) was alive, and had a Pention of 20 l. per Ann. paid him, the Priory had Temporals in Anglesept taxed at 27 l. 7 s. 8 d. in Wilburgham: Parva 7 l. 12 s. 4 d. in Wilburgham: Regis 6 s. in Stepelmozden 4 l. 10 s. in Littlelyngton 3 l. 6 s. 8 d, in Kulbourn 3 l. 14 s. in Haselings field 2 l. 17 s. 6 d. in Swaffham: Prior 4 l. 4 s. in Swaffham: Bulbek 6 s. in Cambridge 2 l. 17 s. 6 d. in Store 2 l. in Wilburgsham: Magna 6 s. 1 d. in Gildenmozden 10 s. in Duye 2 l. 5 d. in

Dullingham 5s.

They had these Churches appropriated to them, and were taxed for their Appropriations as follow,

Bodekesham or Bottisham 261. 135. 4d. St. Mary at Swaffham 91. 65. 8d.

The whole of their Spirituals being 361.

So that their Revenues in this County, (besides what they might have else where) were taxed at 105 1. 35. 7 d.

Which shews, that Speed's is the truest Valuation.

FULBOURN!

This Village is about 3 Miles Eastward of Cambridge, the Name signifies The full Brook, Boupne or Bupn, importing so much in the Saxon Language. It is a large Village, the now much wasted by a

Fire this Year, which hath confumed about 12 or 14 Houses.

There were originally two Manors, the Head Manor (to which the Church of All Saints belonged) was in the Earls of Richmond till Alan de Rohan, gave the Advowson to Bon Repos Abby in Pozmandy, and it was leased by that Abbot in 1226, to the Abby of Sautre in Huntingdonshire, and at Alan's Death the Manor escheated to the Crown, and King John gave it to Roger de Mostrai, after this, it was in H. III. Hands, who granted it in exchange for Lands in Brittanny.

The other Manor (to which St. Aiga?'s Church belonged) was first in the Crown, afterwards confirmed by H. I. to the Church of Esp, by them infeoffed in the Kitz-Walter's, of whom it was held of the Family stramed De Mineries, or Manors, for I find that Will be Maneries, held it of Rob Kitz Walter a Knight, of the Church of Gly in 1256, and in 1311, Baldwin de Maneries sold it to John Butetozt, and in 1388, John Colville had it.

The Churches are large and in good repair, standing in one Churchyard, All-Baints being S. East of St. Uiger's, there is an

Alms-House on the North Side of the Churchyard.

The Rectory of St. Wigoz's Church was taxed at 34 Marks, tho' formerly at 17 only, it paid 2s. 4d. Sinodals, 1s. 6d. Procurations, 4s. 6d. Peter-pence. There was a Lamp burning in the Chancel, a good Missal of the Gift of Will. De Sulbourne a Portifory, and a Cope of the Gift of Roger Grom.

This Church is a regular building, having it's Nave, Chancel, N. and South Porch tiled, the N. & S. Isles and N. Vestry (now the School-House) are leaded, the Tower is square, and hath two large

Bells, and a Saints Bell, on which,

JESUS NAZARENUS REX JVDEORUM. LAMBANA SANCTI VIGORIS.

Sande Andrea Apollole oga pzo Pobis.

Here is a good Clock, to look after which, and to ring the Bell, at 8 every Night, and 4 every Morning, there is 7? per Ann. in Land in this Parish, as the Church-Warden informed me.

On a Black Marble in the Altar Rails.

Under this Stone is referved all that was Earth of Anne the Wife of William Lyng Rector of this Parish, and Daughter of Rob. Twells LL. D. and Commissary to the University of Cambridge, buried 25 March, 1683.

In the N. Wall, is an antique Monument of Freestone, being the Representation of a Meagre Corse, lying on it's Winding Sheet, the Inscription was on a Brass Plate fixed to the Wall, but is now lost, the Church-Warden told me, it was the Monument of one Mr. Cazzowag sometime Rector, who lest an Estate, now lett at 38 l. per Ann. to the Use of the Poor, as appears by his Will in the Church Chest.

There are many Brasses lost both in the Nave and Chancel, where the Effigies of a Priest remains on one of the Stones, with this in a Scrowl from his Mouth, Laus sit Deo. On another are two Coats, viz. 1. 3 Herns. 2. on a Chev a Mullet.

In a South Window, Az. a Castle Or. In the North Isle Windows Gul. a Pale Lozengee Arg. Arg. a Lyon ramp. S. Arg. on a Chev. Gul. a Mustlet Or. between 3 Croslets formy Fitchee Az.

In the South Isle, in a Labell from a Man's Mouth.

In te Domine Specavi non confundar in eternum.

And from a Woman's is the same; under the Man is a Boy kneeling, with this,

Jelu Kili Dei, Milerere mef.

And

And under the Woman is a Girl, with the same; at each Corner is

Itsu Miserere.

The rest being lost.

In the S. Chantry is a Woman and 8 Boys, and this only left,

Soli weo honoz et Glozia.

On another Stone are these Arms, quarterly, Barry of 6, & quarterly in the 1st and 4th Quarters 3 Roundels, impaling 3 Boars Heads cooped, 2 & 1.

There is a black Marble for Eliz. Relict of Tirrel Dalton Esq. Daughter of Sir Will. Goring of Burton in Sussex Barr. who died

Nov. 15 1715, Æt: 79.

At the S. East Corner of this Chantry, is erected a fine Altar Tomb, on the Table of which, are placed two Effigies of good Workmanship, the one is a Man compleatly armed, his Head lies on his Helmet, and at his Feet is a Lyon Couchant, the other is his Wise, with her Crest at her Feet, viz. a Greyhound, at the W. Bnd are two Boys and a Girl kneeling, and on the N. Side these Arms,

1. A Chev. between 3 Cinquesoils. 2. quarterly, 1st a Bull Passant, 2d a Bend between two Cotizes indented. 3. a Lyon ramp. surmounted of a Fess Compone. 4. a Saltyr between 4 Crossets formy, impaling a Chev. between 3 Cinquesoils, Crest a Lyon Passant.

There is no Inscription, but they told me it was for Sir John Woods and his Lady, who owned the Hall here, before the Dalton's.

In this Chantry also, is a neat mural Monument against the South Wall.

This Sir Milliam de Kulburne, was Rector of Mydyton or Middington in Elex, which he refigned in 1326, Prebendary of Holywell or Kingburg Prebend, in the Church of St. Paul's London; was the King's Chaplain, and had that Prebend which was Ro: de Berkbam's in Penryn Chapel in Cornwall, of the King's Gift, Dec. 151328, and the same Year, King Edw. II. made him one of the Barons of the Exchequer. (Newcourt Vol. 1. p. 160.) He was Patron of this Church.

The Prior of Paunsheld had a Portion of Tithes taxed at 31.6 s. 8 d.

There was a Free Chapel by the Manor House, dedicated to St. Edmund. which was in the Gift of the Colvile's, who were Lords and resided here, in 1389, Sir John Colville Knt. presented Mr. Henry Willes, alias Wilton, to the said Chapel, then void by the Death of Sir John Petit, last Custos thereof, and in 1393, Henry exchanged it with John Woodball Rector of Berton-Tuit in Post. he resigned in 1395, and Sir John presented Dic. Mothing.

In 1388, Sir John Shutelow Kat. Lord of a Manor here, had Licence to have Divine Service performed in his Oratory in his Manor. and the same was also granted to one Will banifeld of this

Town.

In 1391, Will. de Kulburne presented Roger Dide to the Rectory of St Uigoz, at the Death of Will. de Kulburne last Rector, he having recovered the Turn against Caterine Cutwoss, who sued for it.

Mr. Perkins late Fellow of St. John's College, and twice Proctor for the Clergy in the County of Cambridge, is now Rector. (Nov. 6. 1727.)

Near this Place liesh the Body of WILLIAM RARMER'S Gent. descended from the antient Family of the FARMER'S of Norton in Leicestersbire, he was twice married, but having no Issue, he lest his Estate to his poor Relations, and to such poor Inhabitants of this Parish. as shall most duly attend upon the Worship of God in the Church, he died May 3 1712, aged 75. Years.

Sacred to the Memory of Mrs. Eliz. March, late of Fulbourn Widow, who sometime before her Death, towards promoting God's Glory, by instructing Youth to serve Him, their Country, and themselves the better, setled a Farm in Oakington near Cambridge, of the Yearly Rent of about 701 the clear annual Profits thereof for ever, to be equally divided and paid to each Master of these five Schools following, viz. Fulbourn; Haddinham, Brinkley, Fen-Duton, and Histon, but the Children of the Tenant or Sub-Tenant of Uakington, are to be taught Gratis by the Master of Histon, and the respective Mass. ter of each School for the Time being, is obliged to teach al' the Boys and Girles, to read English Gratis, which shall be ferre by the poorer fort of Persons in each Parish respectively, and the said Mrs. MARCH, after having lest Gists and Legacies to her other Relations and Friends, as in and by her last Will declared, gave the Remainder of what was left, to her two joint Executors, Roger Pepys of Impington in the County of Cambridge Esq; and to Thomas Whitstons in Whittlesea, in the !sle of Ely Esq; who out of Gratitude for the same, ordered this Monument to be here erected, and that Posterity might keep in Remembrance her pious Charity, the died March 28th 1722, in the 87th Year of her Age.

In 1395, Rob. Hetersete Vicar. was licenced Confessor, to all his Parishioners.

St. Michael's Church, is dedicated to the Arch Angel of that Name, and formerly belonged to the House of St. Michael, which stood where now is the West-Side of Trinity College, which enjoys all the antient Revenues of that House, and among them this Appropriation, which ever since, hath been served by a Chaplain, nominated now by Trinity College; antiently the S. Isle of this Church, was the Chapel to Michael House, and the N. Isle to Gonvile Hall, but when those Colleges had Chapels of their own, they became burial Places for the Scholars of each Society, the Chancel or Choir, served sometime as a Chapel to Trinity College, since it's Foundation. The North Vestry and Isle is leaded, at the West-End of which stands a square Tower, which contains 4 Bells, and hath a Spire on it's Top, the S. Isle, Nave, and Chancel, are also leaded, the North Porch being tiled.

The Steeple is square, and hathonly one Bell in it, there is a Free Stone Spire on it's Top, the Church and Chancel are tiled, and the S. Isle is dilapidated. On a Stall in the Church is carved a Shield, on which, 3 Chev. in a Bordure Guttee, impaling a Cross, the Stones are all disrobed, on one there is a

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Cup and Wafer, on another is the Effigies in Brass, of a Man in Armour, and the Evangelists are at the Corners, there are no Inscriptions in the Church.

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St. GILES'S Church,

Stands on the East Side of the same Street, and was sounded in 1092, by a Norman Nobleman, named Pigot, or Pygot, who was then the Vicecomes or Sheriff, at the Request of Hugoline his Wise, who placed a House of Canons here, to whom * Henry L confirmed this Church, and gave them the Tithes of all his Demeans in Cambridge, they were removed to Bernwell in 1102, by Pain Peverel, according to Stow, (so. 131.) the Church always belonged to Bernwell Priory, and now to Ely Bishoprick, and is served by a Parish Chaplain, it is a small mean building, without a Steeple, the there are 2 Bells hanging in a wooden Shod made for that Purpose; the Nave, Chancel, N. Isle, and S. Porch, are tiled.

Before the Pulpit lies a Stone, with the Effigies of a Man in Armour in the midle of it, and at each Corner is a Brass Shield, on 2 of which is his Arms viz. on a Fess. 2 Cocks, on the other two, is a Tun and a Bon it, it being a Rebus for the Persons Name that is here interred, viz. Tunbs or Tunbs, in the chief of the Shield is

In the Chancel against the North Wall, is a Monument very much defaced, with these Arms, per Chev. 3 Unicorns Heads crased, impaling on a Chev. 3 Mullets, a De-lis for difference, then follows a Quotation out of the 140th Psalm, Abscondis faciem &c. then it divides into 3 Columns, over the 1st is, Fuit Nich. Carre, over the 2d. Fuit Cath. Carre, over the third, Fuit Will. Fames.

N. B. If in Health, the Feoffees generally allow them about 12 d. per Week, if ill, according to their necessities, they having a good Estate setled on them for this Purpose.

John Austin, gave Paradise-Close in the Bounds of Grantchester Parish, to this Parish, the Rent to be yearly distributed to the Poor, on St. Thomas's Day, by the Church Wardens and Overfeers, Ao. 1645.

John Dixon of this Parish, gave 201. the Interest and Coles, to be given to the Poor on St. John's Day, payable out of Dolls-Close in this Parish, A° 1696.

The Church of the Holy Sepulcher,

Is so called by reason of it's being like the Church o thes Holy Sepulcher at Jerusalem, in Honour of which, this Church was dedicated, it shews a very odd antique Building, and is commonly called the Round Church, the Body of the Church being round, the Steeple is

also of the same form, and stands directly in the midst, supported by large Gothic Pillars, it contains 4 Bells and a Saints Bell; the Chancel is much more modern, join'd to the East part of the Church, and was at it's Erection, dedicated to St. Andrew, it was built before 1396, for in that Year, Tho. Berkere alias Alston Priest, was instituted to the Vicarage of the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, otherwise called St. Andrew's in Cambridge, then void by the Death of John Hervy, at the Presentation of the Prior of Bernwell, at whose Presentation in 1406, John Cornwail Batchelor in the Decrees, of Peter-House College, was instituted Vicar, and from that Time, it continued in the Priory to it's Dissolution.

Sir ROBERT TABOR gave 40s. to interest, for ever to the Poor, Sep. 16 1677.

Mr. Duport, Master of Magdalen College Cambridge, Parson sometime here, gave 101. the Interest to the Poor. A. 1670.

Stephen Perse Dr. of Phisick, gave 6 Alms-Houses in this Parish, for 6 Poor Widows to dwell in, and each to have 4 l. per Ann. paid by the Master and Fellows of Cajus College, who put in such Widows as they choose.

William Herbert Cook, gave 601. the Interest to buy Coals for

the Use of the Clerk and the Poor of the Parish for ever.

Tho. Ellis Pikemonger, gave 6s. 8d. per Ann. to be paid by the Major and Bailiffs of the Town, to the Poor of this Parish.

The Colleges of Clare-Hall and Trinity-Hall, have each a Seat appropriated to them in this Chancel.

This Church was at first a Rectory, and was afterwards appropriated to Barnwell Priory, and a Vicarage endowed: in 1396, that Convent presented Brother John Asbefeld S. T. P. (one of their Canons) to the Vicarage, then void by the Death of Master Tho. Walpole; in 1402, Ashefeld died, and John Halliwell was instituted, who refigned in 1407, and Tho. Braffington a Canon of Barnwell took it. In 1445, the Prior and Convent granted this Advowson, with that of the now dissolved Church of St. John Zachary, to the King, who immediately after, granted this Church and Advowson, to the Master and Fellows of Trinit)-Hall, without any Vicarage endowed, in Recompence for the Service that College had done him, by yeilding up several of their Lands, without which he could not have founded his College from him, now called King's-College; in 1446, St. Edward, and St. John Zachary, were united, and the latter demolished to makeway for the aforesaid Foundation. Hugh de Luffenham was the last Vicar here, at whose Death, the whole, besides the Mansion House belonging to the Vicar, was appropriated to the College, and that still belongs to the Minister, and ever since it hath been served by Stipendary Curates, as it still is: on the Union there was referved to the Bishop rs. 8 d. Sinodals, Procurations 3 d. and 2 s. 4 d. to the Archdeacon of Ely annually; The present Minister is the Rev. Will.

The Church that first stood in this Church-Yard, was dedicated to the Honour of St. Peter the Apostle, and was called St. Peter's out of Trumpington Gates, and was founded very antiently, for in 1195, upon an Inquisition then taken, it was found that one Langline was Patron and Parson here, who gave it to his Father Segar, according to the Custom of the City of Cambridge, and Segar held it above 60 Years, and gave it to his Son Hen. who held it more than 60 Years, and then gave it by Deed to the Hospital of St. John the Evangelist in Cambridge, which being included in Peter-House College, the Advowson still belongs to that House. Selden in his History of Tithes P. 386, brings this as an example, that often when the Father or other Ancestor, was Incumbent and Patron, he disposed of the Church abso-Intely without the Bishop's Consent, and therefore he says, they discreetly find the Custom of the City to maintain the Conveyance, but Dr. Comber P. 237, in his Answer to that Work of Selden's, says, that as for this Verdict in 1195, of a Priest that gave a Living to his Son, according to the Custom of Cambridge then, let it be noted that this Priest was both Patron and Incumbent, and so might well be faid to give his Son the Living, if he gave him only a Presentation to it, to intitle him to the Bilhop's Institution, and those Words, according to the Custom of Cambridgethen, were added, because of old, Priest's Sons there, might have succeeded their Fathers, tho' now, when this Verdict was given, such Succession was not allowed. This Church of St. Peter, gave Name to the adjoining College, to which the Chancel served as a Chapel 'till 1350, which then fell down to the Ground. in the Place of which, that Noble Chancel now standing, was rebuilt, and dedicated to St. Mary, and from that Time was called the Church of St. Miry de Gratis, or St. Marie's of Grace, other-

wife

wise Grace-Church, by Reason (I suppose) of some peculiar Grace or Indulgence granted by the Pope, to all such as would contribute towards it's building, or make their Offerings there when built. This also served as a College Chapel, 'till 1632, when the new Chapel was built, it is called Little St. Mary's, to distinguish it from St. Mary ad Forum, or Great St. Maries. The Tower is square, having only one Bell, on which is this.

Browne Master of Pembrook Hall, gave a Silver Plate and Cup, to administer to the Sick at their Houses. 1715, Dr. Thomas Richardson, Master of St. Peters College, gave 40l. with which was purchased a Rent Charge of 2l. per Ann. to be given to the Minister for preaching a Sermon on Good-Friday. 1713, a Silver Plate or Bason was given to gather the Offerings in.

Tere is a Commomration Sermon every Sunday before May-Day, preached by a Fellow of St Peter's College, in Remembrance of Dr. Andrew Penne, sometime Master of Peter-House, who built them their Library, gave them many Books, sounded 2 Felloshwips, and as many (if not more) Scholarships, brought the Rivulet that runs down the Street higher, and gave several Parishes Legacies, besides being a good Benefactor to both Universities, as well in procuring

them

them the Act of 18 Eliz. to turn a 3d Part of their Revenues into-Barley Rents, by which much Good hath accrued to both Universities, as in other Benefactions. It is in the Afternoon, the Vice Chancellor and Heads of the University are present, and dine at Peter-House.

GREAT St. MARY.

St. Mary ad Forum, or the University Church, as to the present Building (the old Church being pulled down) was begun May 16, 1478, 17 Edw. 4. the Church was finished in 1519, but no Tower to it, which was built by Degrees afterwards, being finished in 1608, so that from the begining to the ending, were no less than 130 Years, the Church alone cost 795 l. 25. 1 d. all given by charitable People for that Purpose, of which 40 l. was given by King H. VII. when he was at Cambridge, and Tho. Barrow Doctor of Civil Law, Archdeacon of Colchester, formerly of Kings-Hall, and Chancellor to K. Rich. III. gave 240 l.

The Church is a handsome regular Building, consisting of a square Tower, with a Peal of 10 Bells and a Clock in it, a Nave, S. Porch, S. & N. Isles, and a Chancel, with a Vestry on it's S. Side; there are also two Chapels joining to the Chancel, that on the N. Side is dedicated to St. Andrew, as I learn by some old Deeds in my Custody, and all are leaded; on the N. Wall of St. Andrew' Chapel, is a Brass Plate fixed. having a Bird with this on a Scrowl issuing from his Mouth,

The CHAPEL belonging to GONVILE and CAJUS College, is: neat and beautifull, being re-built about 25 Years fince; it was dedicated to the Annunciation of the Bleffed Virgin, the History of which, is represented in an elegant Picture over the Communion Table; at the re-building it was made longer than it was at first, for Cajus's Tomb was at the E. End against the N. Wall, close by the Altar, and then stood upon the Floor, tho' now raised against the Wall, at it's removal, his Body was found whole and perfect, his Beard was very long, so that upon comparing his Picture with his Visage, it is sid, there was a great Resemblance; The Tomb consists of a Canopy.

The Roof is covered with Lead on the out-side, and is inwardly arched and colour'd with Blew, beautisted all over with Cherubs-Heads in Rays of Light, the Altar Piece is Wainscor, having sour large Pillars on each Side, and in the Midst a large Picture of the Salutation in a gilt Frame, on the Top stands 7 mock Candlesticks & Tapers, & on each Side of the Picture, are Fruits, Corn, Flowers, &c. sinely carved in Wood, the Altar is fail'd in, and paved with black and white Marble, the Cloath for the Table is of Velvet, on which stands two large Silver gilt Candlesticks with Wax Tapers, a large Silver Dish, two Books of Common Prayer, and two Velvet Cushions, all fringed with Gold, the Cloath and Cushion of the Litany Desk, are of Velvet, laid with Gold Lace and fringed with Gold, as are the Masters and Presidents Cushions; over the Antichapel is a neat Gallery, the Entrance of which, is out of the Masters Lodge.

IN CATHERINE-HALL CHAPEL

The ancient Chapel belonging to this College, food in the middle of the Count, where the Garden now is, and the Bones were removed and bunied in the new one, which was confected by Simon Biftop of Ely, Sept. 1. 1904. The Confectation Sermon was preached by John Leng, B. D. Fellow there, and afterwards Biftop of Norwich, which was printed with the Form of it's Confectation at the ends thereof: it is decently wainfooted, and passed with black and white Marble; under the Altap is, a Vanlt, in which Sir William Bosses Archbiftop of York; formerly Marber, and his Lady, are interred. There is a Monument erected in her Mannary in the Antichapel, with this Infeription,

Stands on the N. Side of the first Court: In the North Wall of the Antichapel is a Tomb inclosed with Iron Rails, being a Table supported by Marble Pillars, on which lies the Effigies of Archdeacon Ashton, and under it lies a Skeleton neatly cut in Marble, the former to shew us what he was, the latter, what he is, thereby remembring all that veiw his Tomb, of their own Mortality; on this Monument is his Rebus or Device, viz. an Ash out of a Time; and on a Brass is this,

The Reverend and learned Mr. Baker, late of this College, was Scholar and Fellow of Asheton's Foundation, and had a good Picture of him in his Chamber, which he much valued; As Chaplain and Comptroller of the Household to Margaret Countess of Richmond & Derby, the Foundress of this College, he was always called SIR Hugh Ashton, and being one of her Executors, greatly forwarded the finishing of the College.

The Vestry here was formerly a Chapel, founded by Dr. Heton (or Keyton, as Fuller calls him) in which he had his Chantry Priest to say Mass for his Soul, and keep his Anniversary; he lies buried under the old arched Tomb between that and the Antichapel, as Mr. Baker informed me.

KING's College CHAPEL.

This incomparable Building had *Henry* VI. for it's Founder, tho' the unhappy Prince meeting with fo many troubles, left it unfinished as to the Inside, which was compleated by *Henry* VIII. as appears by the fine carved Work on the Organ Loft, on which the last Judgement represented in a most beautifull Manner, is a great Curiosity: This Chapel is a

Gothic

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Cothic Building, one of the most sumptuous Edifices in the World, being 304 Feet from East to West, and 73 Feet from North to South, and from the Ground to the top of the Battlements it measures or Feet; at each Corner is an octogon Tower, terminating in a Dome, the whole is of Freestone, and is thought to be the longest and largest Room in the World, whose Roof is not supported by Pillars, it being covered with a Stone Arch, and that by a Timber Roof well leaded, to preferve the Arch from the Weather: on each Side of the Building is a Porch and 9 finall Chapels, which had private Altars in them before the Reformation. but are now used as burial Places, except those on the South Side, some of which ferve for a Library, Veltry, Muniment Room, &c. This noble Pile was dedicated by it's Founder, in Honour of the Bleffed Virgin and St. Nicholas, to which Saint he had a peculiar Reverence, as being born on his Day, and was further led to it by Reason of a Church dedicated to him, which he was forced to pull down to make way for this, Fuller in his History of Cambridge says, that it " is one of the ra-" rest Fabricks in Christendom, wherein the Stone-Work, Wood-work, " and Glass-Work contend, which most deserve Admiration. Yet the " first generally carieth away the Credit, (as being a Stone-Henge indeed) " so geometrically contrived, that voluminous Stones mutually support "themselves in the arched Roof, as if Art had made them to forget Na-" ture, and weaned them from their fondness to descend to their Center. " And yet the there be so much of Minerva, there is nothing of Arach-" ne in this Building: I mean not a Spider appearing, of Copweb to be " feen on the (Irish-Wood or Cedar) Beams thereof. No wonder then " if this Chappel, so rare a Structure, was the Work of three succeed-" ing Kings, Henrie the fixth, who founded; the feventh, who father-" ed; the eighth, who finished it; but the untimely Death, sor rather deposing) of King Henrie the fixth, hindered the same." The Chapel and Cemitery, was confecrated in 1443, by the Billions of Salibury and Lincoln; it being then fit for present use, tho pot fitted up in an agreeable Manner, "As touching the Dimensions of the Church of my "College (lays King Henry the VI. in his will) Thave deviled and

appointed that the same Church shall contain colxxxviii Feete of as-" fife in length without any Yles, and all of the widenesse of xl Feet, " and the length of the same Church from the west End to the Altare " at the Quier Doore shall contain cxx Feete, & from the Provosts Stalk " unto the Greece, called Gradus Chori xc Feet, for xxxvi Stalles on either "Side of the same Quier, answering to lxx Fellows and x Priests Con-" ducts, which must be de Prima Forma, and from the said Stalles un-" to the est End of the said Church, lxii Feet of affisse. Also a Rere-" dos bearing the Rodelofte, departing the Quier and the Body of " the Church, conteining in length xl Feet and in bredth xiv Feet, "the Walls of the same Church to be in height xc Feet, imbattled, " vawted, and chare-roffed, sufficiently butteraced, and every Butterace " fined with Finials, and in the est End of the said Church shall be a "Window of nine Daies (or Lights) and betwixt every Butterace a "Window of v Daies, and betwixt every of the fame Butteraces in the Body of the Church, on both Sides of the same Church, a Closet. " (or inclosed Chapel) with an Altar therein, containing in length 20 "Feet, and in bredth x Feet, vawted, and finished undre the Soile of " the Yle Windowes, & the Pavement of the Church to be enhaunfed iiii "Feet above the Ground without, and the height of the Pavement of "the Quier one Foot and half above the Pavement of the Church. " and the Pavement of the Altar iii Feet above that, Item, on the N. "Side of the Quier, a Vestry, containing in length 50 Feet, and in " breadth xxii Feet, departed into ij Houses beneath, and ij Houses ace bove, which shall contain in height xxij Feet in all, with an Entry of from the Quier, vawted. Item, at the west End of the Church a Cloise fter Square, the est Pane containing in length clxxv Feet, and the west Pane as much, and the north Pane (br Side) cc Feet, and the fouth Pane as much, of which the Deambulatory xiii Feet wide, & in height " XX Feet to the corbill Tabel, with clear Stories, and Butteraces with " Finials, vawted and imbatteled, and the Ground thereof iii Feet lower. " than the Church Ground, and in the middle of the west Pane of the « Cloistre, a strong Tower Square, containg xxiiij Feet, within the Walls

"and in height cxx Feet to the Corbyt Table, and iiij small Furrets of ver that, fined with Pinnacles, & a Door into the said Cloistre inward, and outward none." By which we may see that it would have been much more grand, had the Vestry, Cloister, and Tower, been built, which was never done, tho' the 5 Bells designed to hang in the Tower, were afterwards put up in a small Clocher, or House erected for that purpose near the east End of the Chapel, which being decaied is now taken down, and they stand at present on the Floor in the Chapel; they are (I believe) the largest 5 Bells in England, being sent (according to tradition) as a Present to the Founder, by Pope Calint the third, about 1456.

The Windows are extreamly heautifull of painted Glass, except the west Window, which was entirely defaced by the wicked Rabble in the late Civil Wars; the other, being fortunately taken down and concealed, before that wicked Crew took it in their Heads, to make use of this House of God to train and exercise their Souldiers in, they contain the History of the old and new Testament compleat, except that Part of it which was in the west Window.

On the Brass Stand in the Quire is the Name, Reserves tracumblen, who was Donor, being D. D. and Provost in 1509.

At the Corners are the Emblems of the 4 Evangelists, as also in the Window; one Shield of his Arms is lost, and the remaining Shield hath the five Hounds of our SAVIOUR bleeding; intimating, that by his Wounds, he hoped for Salvation.

This is the Gravestone of ROBERT HACUMBLEN, some time Pro-

vost here.

In the Window is the Effigies of K. Henry VI. the Founder, and that of St. Nicbolas it's Patron.

Here also lies buried Master John Plente, formerly Fellow of this College, who in 1484, by Indenture between Walter Felde Clerk, then Provost, on one Part; John, Bishop of Lincoln on the second Part, & Hen. Boost Clerk, Provost of Eton on the third Part, settled by Consent of the said Bishop their Ordinary; a Fellow to be a Priest, who should say daily Mass in the Morning for the Reading Scholars, and then pray for the Souls of the said Master John Plente, his Friends, Parents, and Benefactors, and for such Service he was to receive a Mark every Quarter, of the College Bursars; which if they neglected to pay, they were to forfeit 4 Marks to the Bishop of Lincoln, & 4 Marks to the Provost of Eton, each Time; who had Power to seize on the Manor and Priory of Ruyssepp in Middlesex, for non Payment; and for this Payment to be constantly made, he give the College 160 Marks, and his Name was to be enter'd in their Bead-Roll, and he was to be annually commemrated among the Benefactors.

At the West End, is a mural Monument with the Arms of the College, the University, and

This learned Doctor was born at Bunbury, or Bonifocebury in Chefbire; and when he was Provoss here, stoutly and honestly protested in a publick manner, against the Visitors of the University in Queen Mary's Days

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as to his own College, thereby taking off the Edge of those persecuting. Commissioners. When many of the Heads of the University were refolved to fell their Right in Sturbridge-Fair for a Trisle, to the Townsmen, he dashed their Designs; which manly Opposition, prevented the VICE CHANCELEORS holding the Stirrup to the Mayer. The Windows are all scatter'd with his Name in Capitals.

By him according to his earnest Delire, was interr'd Charles Roderick, with this,

ANDREW DUCKET, formerly a Frier, afterwards Rector of St. Buttolph in Cambridge, Principal of Bernard's Hoftle, was the first Matter and living so 40 Years, greatly advanced the Foundation, his Stone lies at the Enterance of the Anti-Chapel, but the Brasses are lost.

The Chapel of JESUS COLLEGE,

Was the Conventual Church of the dissolved Numery of St. Mary and St. Radegund, which Monastery was founded by Malcolm IV King of Scotland, about 1160; and in 1497, by Licence of Henry VII. & Pope Alex. VI was converted by that learned Prelate John Alcock Bp. of Ely, into a College, called Jusus College. The Windows of the Hall here, are adorned with Cooks, as a Rebus for his Name, which is sometimes expressed by the Word as, by a Cook, and sometimes by an Ausland a Cook:

Tobias Rustat, Yeoman of the Robes to King Charles the second, whom he served with all Duty and Faithfullness in his Adversity, as well as Prosperity; the greatest Part of the Estate he gather'd, by God's Blessing, the King's Favour, and his Industry, he disposed in his Life time in Works of Charity; he found, the more he bestowed upon Churches, Hospitals, Universities, and Colleges, and upon Poor Widows of Orthodox Ministers, the more he had at the Years End; neither was he unmindfull of his Kindred and Relations, in making them Provisions out of what remained. He died a Bachelour the 15th Day of March in the Year of our Lord God 1693, aged 87 Years.

Whither this Monastery had ever any Monks before the establishment of the Nuns here, I can't say, or whither this Stone might not be brought from the neighbouring Convent of Franciscans, after the Dissolution of their grand Church, I know not; but am rather inclined to think the latter, and that he might be one of the antient Priors of that House.

The Chapel of CORPUS CHRISTI, otherwise called BENNET College,

From the Church of St. Bunedict, which joins to the S. Side of the College, hath a new elegant Altar Peice of carved Oak, supported by a large Corinthian Pillars; and in the middle a Pannel of Crimson Velvet in a gilt Prame; of the Gift of Sir Jacob Aftley of Melton Constable in Norfolk Baronet, formerly a Member here.

Over the Door of the Anti-Chapel, which (as Parker says) was built

by Sir Nichelas Bacon, is this,

In 1643, William Dowfing, the great Cambridgeshire Reformer of those Times, who spoiled the Monuments in most of the Churches in this County, was here, to putify this Chapel from the Dregs of Popery:

I don't

I don't well understand his Dialogue with Dr. Law, the Master of the College; but take it in his own Language,

"1643, Benet Colledg Dec. 28, Dr. Love Master. Nothing in the Chapell to be amended. 1 Sam. 1. 9. The word Temple, he told me,

was a common Name given to puplique Places, set apart for Worthip,

" both among Heathens and Christians: and they told him, in Rochel,

and in the Churches in France, being there, when Rochell was beseiged; and he told, they used not the word Ecclesia for a Church, but

"the other word Templum, for a Place of Worship.

" Witnes Will. Dowling."

This Dr. Love was a Favorrite of those Times, for the continued Master all the Time of the Usurpation, and at the Restauration he was appointed Dean of Edy.

And were granted by ROB. COOK Clarencieux, Dec. 23, 1570, as Fuller says, at the Request of Archbishop Parker; by Reason, some People thought the antient Arms superstitious, because over the two Shields (one of which belonged to the old Gild of Corpus Christi, & contained the Instruments of Christ's Passion, and the other the triangular Emblem of the Trinity, which belonged to the Gild of the Virgin-Marry) the Image of our Saviour crowning the Virgin were placed, in order therefore that the Arms should allude to the antient Gilds, and yet give no Offence, he pitched upon these, for

Signat Avis Christum, qui sanguine pascit alumnos, Lilia, virgo parens intemerata retert.

And at the same Time (as Strype observes) out of a grateful Regard to the Remembrance of the antient dissolved College of Stoke-Clare in Suffelk (of which he was the last Dean) he brought away with him the Arms of that House, on an old Peice of Glass, which he put up in one

of-

of the Windows in the Lodge here, which remains to this Day, and under it is wrote with a Diamond (vide Strype's Life of Archbp Parker page 22), so that the 2d Quarter of these Arms, viz. the Lillies, were the antient Arms of Stoke-Clare College.

This College sometimes gives the Arms of Henry Plantagenet Duke of Lancaster, viz England with a Label of France, he being esteemed their

Founder or Protector. (Hist' Norwich fo. 225.).

He was Prehend of Litebsside, Vice-Chancellos in 1663; Lady Margaret's Pre-faster in Divinity, and Rector of Elization, in Danhybrey, also one of the sout Heads of the Colleges in Cambridge, which, as Fuller expresses, by the especial Favour of their Friends, and their own wary Complied ance, kept their Places: at the Restauration, he had Address and Merit enough to recommend limitels to the Favour of the Court; and the continued Master, and was also made Down of Ely Sept. 28, 1660; and died in less than half a Year after, in the beginning of Feb, and was untered bere, but both ho Memorial over him.

Esq; who lives in the Priory, to which this Advowson belonged. Towards the East End, lies a Freestone over Mr. Nicholas Butler, who was buried Feb. 1, 1686. There is also a Marble over Mr. Charles Butler, who was the 15th Child of Dr. John and Mrs. Susanna Butler, 1669. Ambrose Butler Esq; died March 11, 1685.

John Butler D. D. is buried here; he was Father to Jacob Butler Esq; the present Patron.

In 1409, John Hore of Bernwell, was buried in the Priory Church of Barnwell, and gave to the Farish Church of St. Andrew in Bernwell in

Cambridge,

Gambridge, a Service Book called a Portifory; and in 1466, Margaret Hore his Widow, was buried in the Church of the Nuns of St. Radegund in Cambridge, now Jesus College Chapel, where her Daughter Emma was then a Nun.

Picot a Norman, Lord of Bourne, and many Years Sheriff of Cambridgeshire, began a Religious House of Regular Canons, by St. Giles's Church in Cambridge, (as is mentioned at P. 64.) which was removed in 1102, by PAIN PEVEREL the Founder, to Bernwell. after he had obtain'd of K. H. I. a Grant of 13 Acres of Land for the Scite of his Priory, lying in Cambridge Fields, by the Springs of Bernwell, or The Childrens Springs, for so the Words originally signify; and as the Leiger of this Priory says, they were called The Childrens Wells, because the Children of Cambridge every Year on the Day of St. John Baptist's Nativity, used to go to see publick Diversions there, as wrestling, Shews, &c. which was the original of Midsummer Fair, which is held at this Time.

This Pain Peverel the Founder, was that famous Soldier who was Standard-Bearer to Robt. Duke of Normandy in the Holy Wars; he built the Priory in Honour of St. Giles and St. Andrew; to the former of which he had the Priory Church dedicated, and the Parish Chapel to the latter, which was also of his Foundation. He placed 30 Canons here of the Order of St. Austin, and so much did it increase, that at the Dissolution (according to Mr. Speed) it's Revenues where valued at 351 l. 15 s. 4 d. and it was granted to Anthony Browne; an Account of it may be seen in Fuller's History of Cambridge, so. 3, 4, 5. and Tanner's Notitia so. 41.

In 1388, King RIC II: held a Parliament at this Priory, which is faid to be held at *Cambridge*, (this being then a Parish in *Cambridge*) and as Sir *Thomas Trivet* rode to the King's Lodgings here, his Horse fell so violently with him to the Ground, that his Entrails burst out, & he died the next Day.

In 1402, John Bernwell Prior of Bernwell, certifyed, that the Patron-

age of his Priory was Bytton Rectory in Lincoln Diocess, The Vicarages of St. Edward and St. Sepulchre in Cambridge, of Madingley, Cumberton, Caldecote, Brunne, Crawden, Tadlow, Mordon, Hinxton, Harleston, Waterbech, all in Cambridgeshire, and Warden, in London Diocess.

STERES-BRIGGE,

Or STURBRIGE, where the famous Mart or Fair (commonly called Sturbrige Fair) is kept, does not take it's Name from the Bridge over the River of that Name, but from the Toll or Custom that was paid at it, for all Steres and young Cattle that passed here; and now there is a Turnpike erected, by a late Act of Parliament for repairing the Road: just by this Place on the Right-Hand, stands an antient Chapel built of Freestone, the Nave and Chancel of which are tiled, and serve now for a Repository for the Stuff to build the FAIR with. formerly a Burial Place, and Houses round it for LEPERS to inhabit, it being an HOSPITAL or Free-Chapel, in the Donation of the Burgesses of Cambridge, 'till about 1245, when Hugh de Norwold Bishop of Ely, got the Patronage, and his Successors collated the Custos or Master; in 1391, Robert Takell then Custos died, and Bishop Fordham collated John Metfield LL. B. and in 1390, that Bishop granted an Indulgence of 40 Days Pardon, to all that extended their charitable Benevolence to the Hospital and Free-Chapel of Mary Magdalen at Steres-Brigge. figned it to Rob. Flate, and he in 1391, exchanged it with Thomas de Pattesle, for Waldeneuton in Winchester Diocess, who resigned it the same Year, & Metsield had it again, & after resigned it to John Wynkeperie, who in 1395 refigned, and Metfield had it again, who refigned to Flate in 1402, and in 1403, Metfeld had it at Flate's Resignation: and in 1407 exchanged it with Will. Wynwyk for the Custody of the Free-Chapel of St. Radegund, in the Arches under St. Paul's in London. he changed it with Will. Waltham, who refigned in 1408 to Metfeld

again.

again. In 1412, John Arundel was Custos, and at the Dissolution Christopher Fulvebye, who was alive in 1553, and received a yearly Pention of 61. out of the Revenues, which was reserved to him for Life. This Chapel is in the Bounds of the Parish of Bernwell. The Profits of this Hospital were first leased in 1497, for 99 Years, to the Corporation of Cambridge, and in 1544, they obtain'd another Lease of it for 60 Years, of H VIII. but in 1605, they were granted by Jac. I. to John Shelbury and Philip Chewte Gent.

MIDLETON or MILTON,

Church, hath it's Nave, North Isle, and Chancel tiled, it's South Isle & Porch leaded; the Tower is square and bath 3 Bells; the Rectory is a Sinecure, which, with the Vicarage, is in the Gift of Kings College, to which it was given by Provost Goad, who died in 1610; it is in the Deanry of Chesterton, Archdeaconry of Ely, and Hundred of N. Stow; is dedicated to All the Saints, valued in the King's Books at 4 l. 6 s. 11 d. and the Vicarage at 4 l. 15 s. 11 d. and paid 2 s. Peter-Pence.

In 1288, Simon de Infula (or Liste) Knt. gave the two Fees held by John de Extraneus (or Le Strange) and Eleanor his Wife, in Midletone, to John Bishop of Ely, paying yearly to the said Simon, a pair of gilt Spurs; at which Time, Sir Will de Midleton Knt. held the other Part of the Town; but the Advowsion of the Rectory belonged to Le Strange's Part, and the Advowsion of the Vicarage was always in the Gift of the

Rector.

In 1395, John Epurston Rector died, and Sir John le Strange Lord ef Knokyn, presented Eubulo le Strange. In 1397, John Hawforth Vicar died, and John Godhyne succeeded. 1399, Lady Maud le Strange Lady of Knokyn, presented Philip Seneschal at Le Strange's Death, and he in 1401, presented Richard Moreys to the Vicarage, Godhyne having exchanged with him for Ben-Valeye Chantery in Corberleye Church, in

Worcester

Worcester Diocess. In 1401 Seneschal changed with Eudo la Zouche, for Midel Cleydon in Lincoln Diocess; the King presented as Guardian to Ric. le Strange of Knokyn, Son and Heir of the Lord Le Strange, and in 1403, Eudo exchanged with Tho. Kirkebird for the Rectory of Hoggesthorp in Lincoln Diocess, who presented John Haukere to the Vicarage in exchange with Moreys, who took Greskam Vicarage in Norfolk. In 1406, Kirkebird changed with John Wodham Rector of Suldrop in Lincoln Diocess, at which Time the noble Richard le Strange Lord of Knokyn was Patron here. In 1742, George Towers was Minister, and the Rev. Mr. Lane late Fellow of King's College, is the present Rector &cc. In the Chancel on a black Marble.

About 1720, Mr. Dunne was Rector here, and Mr. Blythe Vicar. Mr. Lane hath not had the Vicarage (which is held by Sequestration) long; and before that Time he lived at Long Melford in Suffolk, where he was Curate to Dr. Oaks; he is also Vicar of Newport in Essex.

At the North East Corner of the Chancel, is an Altar Tomb adorned with Brass Plates, viz. a Man in Judge's Robes, with 2 Sons under him, and this in a Scroll from his Mouth, Pitts fine Legt vuit. Under the Effigies of the Woman are 2 Daughters, and from her Mouth this, Pulser casta, Dos pulcherrima. At the Corners are the Emblems of the 4 Evangelists, and on Brass Fillets round the Stone this,

Deate peo anima Gulielmi Coke Armigeri, Unius Julicia: riozum Domini Begis de Communi Banco, qui obiit vicelimo quinto Die Auguli Anno Bomini Pilleumo quingentelimo quinquageumo tercio, et peo Bono latu Alicie Urozis eius, que Ponumentum feri ferit.

This William in 1552, by the Name of William Coke or Cooke, on the 16th of Novem. was made King's Serjeant, and the same Day one of the Justices of the Common Pleas; in the midst of the Stone are the Arms of Coke or Cooke of Warwickshire, per Fale A. S. 3 Wolves Heads erased counterchanged. Crest, a Wolfe's Fload erased per Pale A. S. and this Inscription.

An Atchewment hangs in the Chancel with the Arms of Duncomb, party per Chev. ingrailed Sab. & A. 3 Talbots Heads erased counterchanged, with Uster Arms, impaling party per Chev. A. G. in Cheif 2 Cocks S. in Base a Saltyr humette Or. Motto, MORIENDO VIVO. The Arms of the Bishoprick of Bly, and of the Le Stranger the antient Patrons, are in the Windows and on the Stalls in the Chancel. There is a Chapel at the East End of the South Isle, in which is a very antient Altar Tomb with the Circumscription lost, & by the Arms of Le Strange in the East Window, and it's being called Strange's Chapel, I make no doubt but one of that antient Family is interred under it. On a Brass Plate in the South Wall, HARRIS, Sub. 3 Crescents 2 & 1, in a Bordure Arg. impaling Tempest, Arg. a Bend between 6 Martlets Sab.

Here lieth the Body of John Harris Gent. Son of William Harris Esq. borne 24 June 1809, and also the Bodies of William, James, George, Michale, Briget, Anne & Briget, the younger Sonnes and Daughters of the said John Harris & Martha his Wife, Dr. of Tho. Tempest of Whaddon Esq. she had living then, when she erected this, 3 Sonnes and 7 Daughters, A. D. 1660.

There is a small Freestone for Will. Kettle, 30 June 1700, Æt. 69, Cath. his Wife Aug. 20, 1727, æt. 86.

There are 3 Montiments at the East End of the Chancel, that in the midst hath this Inscription, composed by the late Dr. SNAPE Provost of King's College; on it's Table,

SWAFFHAM

CONTAENS Three Parilhes, two of the Parilh Churches stand in one Church-Yard, upon a very high Hill, and are seen a great Distance, being a beautiful Ornament to the adjacent Country, These Parishes constitute that Village commonly called

SWAFFHAM PRIOR'S, or Little-Swaffbam-

THE Church that stands most North, is general called SWABPHAM-High-Church, from the Stone Spire on it's Steeple; of which we read thus in the antient Mss. of the Archdescenry of ELV, new in Caius College Library, marked in the printed Catalogue No. 27, and in the new Catalogue No. 33.

"The Church of St. MARY at Swaffbam Priors, is appropriated to

se the

the Priory of Angleseye; it hath a Vicarage taxed at 12 Marks, it pays 2 s. 4d. Sinodals, 30 d. Peter-pence, and 18 d. Procurations, it hath

" an Antiphonary of the Gift of Sir Hugh, formerly Vicar there.

The Tower is square at Bottom, with an Octogon Story above that, and double that number of Sides upwards, in which there are 5 Bells & a Clock; at the West Part of the Tower is a tiled Porch, elegantly roofed with wrought Stone, which was built by one of the Totbylls or Tutballs, as appears by the Arms of

TOTHYL, viz. Or. on a Chev. Az. 3 Crescents Arg. impaling Gul. 6 Croslets humette 3 2 1, Arg.

The Nave and two Side Isles are leaded, and the Chancel is tiled. It is in the Deanry of Camps, Archdeaconry of Ely, and Hundred of Staine, The Vicarage is valued in the King's Books at 14 l. 12 s. 11 d. these 2 Churches are lately consolidated by Act of Parliament; the Bishop of Ely hath the first Turn, and the Chapter the next, and so to continue an alternate Presentation for ever. Dr. Peter Allix the present Dean of Ely, and Rector of Castle Camps, is Vicar of both these Churches, and hath built a very neat Vicarage House opposite to the W. Part of the Church Yard; by the W. Church-yard Gate, is a School-house, endowed with about 5 l. per Ann. I find nothing in the Chancel, it being just as old Daussing left it, in whose Journal we find this,

"Jan. 3, 1643, at Little Swaffham, we brake down a great many Pictures superstitious, 20 Cherubins, and the Rails we brake in peices, and diged down the Stops."

In the Nave there are Stones for Ric. Human alias Rutter Apr. 14, 1587. Another Stone hath lost all it's Brasses, but the Effigies of a Woman, and this, where pan most are quite piasest. In the midst of the Nave lies a black Marble with the Arms of

ELLYS, Arg. a Mermaid Gul.

Here

Master of Gonvill and Caius Collège in Cantoridge, where Cacen Anne of Blessed Memory Knighted him, being Vice-Chancellor A. 1705, He then desended the Privileges of the University, with Courage, Prudence and Success, in his Post of Master of Caius Collège, for about 14 Yeares, the Promotion of true Religion, good Morals, regular Discipline, and usefull Learning, were the Ends; the College and University, with the Lawes of the Land, the Rules of his Government. While Fellow, he was above 40 Years a Tutour, emigent for Piety, Vertue, and Learning, Diligence and Integrity; an admirable Method of Instruction, exemplary Convertation, constant keeping Chapel, Church, and Lectures, and Care his Papils should do the like. By his Interest he procured several considerable Benefactions to the College, and about 1693, gave them fifty Pounds towards their buying the Advowson of Brhadway in Dorfetshire: In all the Stages of his Life, he was a true Friend, temperate in all things, humble, fineter, meek, and obligeing, charitable & generous. He died Nov. 29, 1716, in the 86 Year of his Age.

The Memory of the Righteous shall be blessed.

He had an Estate here, for which Reason I suppose, he chose to be buried here.

In Tothyll's Chapel at the East End of the S. Isle, lies it's Founder John Tothyll Gent. he is armed Cap-a-pè, standing on a Dog couchant, with his Sword hanging before him; his Wife also is in the usual Habit of those Times, with a Pair of Beads in her Hands, and each their Arms over their Heads, and under them Tothyl impales on a Chev. 3 Mullets, in Base a Martlet.

St. Circ, Cyryake, or as commonly called, St. Siris, and St. Julitt.

IT hath a large Tower, square below, and Octogonal at top, with three

three Bells in it, on one of which is the Name 29 ARJA. It is adorned at Top with Flower Work in Black Flint, and small Spires at the sour Corners, on which the Octogon rests; it was designed for a Spire, but was with great difficulty finished in the manner we now see it, for it was many Years in Building. In 1493, Will. Lard gave a Legacy towards the Building, as did John Dullyngham, and it was not finished in 1504, for then John Meede gave a Legacy towards simishing it. The Chancel was re-built about 1344, and the High Altar was consecrated by the Bishop of Elv in 1346. The Chancel and North Porch are tiled, and the Nave and side likes leaded. In the aforementioned Mss. we read thus,

The Church of St. CIRIC of Swafbam Priors, is appropriated to the Prior of Exy, the Vicarage is taxed at 20 Marks, it pays 2 s. 4 d. Sinodals, 30 d. Peter-Pence, and 18 d. Procurations; there is one Vestment of the Gift of the Parishioners, in 1338, and another at the Altar of St. Mary. It is valued in the King's Books at 16 l. 18 s.

1393, LAURENCE * STYWARD was Vicar, and was presented by the Prior of Ely; in 1397 he changed with John † Rowland Vicar of Gaysele, at whose Death in 1398, Ric. Fulhood succeeded, who in 1400, changed for Lakenbithe Vicarage with Henry Fychet, and he in 1403, changed for Gelbam Parva Rectory with John Bury.

Which takes it's Name from the BOLEBEKS, antient Lords thereof, one of which founded a Benedictine Nunnery here, before King John's time, and dedicated it to St. Mary; the Nuns Church was re-built about 1350, being finished and dedicated by the Bishop of Ely in 1352, between the Feasts of St. Michael and St. Andrew. There was a Prioress and 8 Nuns at the Dissolution; their Revenues according to Mr. Speed, were taxed at 461. 10 s. 8 d. and were conveyed to the Bishop of Ely and his Successors in exchange, in H. VIII. Time. As to the Parochial Church, the Archdeacon's Book says, it was appropriated to the Nunnery; the Vicarage was taxed at 20 Marks, stands now in the King's Books at 161.

the clear yearly value of 47 l. 3 s. 4 d. the Chancel was re-built, & the High-Alear confectated by the Bishop of Ely in 1346. It paid 2 s. 4 d. Sinodals, 3 s. Peter-Pence, and 18 d. Procurations; there was a Vestment and all it's Furniture, of the Gift of Sir Hugh Glanvile, and a good Iron Chest to keep the Books in, given by Tho. Bockesham of Lyn. These Nuns had a House and Rents in Norwich, which Alice Prioress here, and the Convent, sold to Sir Hamon the Master, and Bretheren of St. Giles's Hospital in that City, in 1264; and Estates in Livermere and Mildenball in Suffolk; and in Swasham, Tost, Hardwick, &c. in Cambridgeshire. In 1496, Tho. Rolf gave them a Legacy, & in 1505, there was an Image of St. Mary in the Chancel of the Parish Church, to which Rob. Degnes left 26 s. 8 d

In 1388, Nic. Plumtone refigned the Vicarage to Will. Hundene, in exchange for Wrating Vicarage. In 1401, Will. Boole was presented by the Prioress and Nuns. In 1495, the Bishop of Ely granted an Indulgence of 40 Days Pardon to all that would contribute towards repairing the Priory and Cloister, and the Support of the Prioress and Nuns. In 1399, Bishop Fordbam desired his Suffragan Thomas Bishop of Lade or Killala in Ireland, to profess Margaret de Lisle, Cecily de Brethenbam, & Cecily Pakenbam, Nuns here; and in 1404, he licenced Eliz. Prioress here, to choose her Confessor. The Vicarage is in the Gift of the Bishop of Ely. In 1402, Eliz. Teversham Prioress here, certifyed that they had only this Vicarage in their Patronage.

TEVERSHAM

Church is dedicated to All the Saints, & is a Rectory valued at 191. 16 s, in the King's Books; it is in the Archdeaconry of Ely, but is exempt from the Archdeacon's Jurisdiction, being one of the Livings in the Bishop's Patronage; it is in Cambridge Deanry, and Flendish Hundred; the Archdeacon's Mss. values it at 30 Marks, the Sinodals 2 s. 4 d. Peter-

pence 3 s. & Procurations 12 d. In 1400 John Quye Rector died, and Ric. Lentwardyn succeeded, and the same Year changed with John Wadyn for Chevyngton Rectory in Suffolk. In 1403 John Asleton Rector here, and Will. Manpriest, were wounded by John Reeve Cnaplain, & Maud Pyrye, in the Parsonage House, for which they were excommunicated by John Judd Official, & John Potton Commissary to the Bishop, in all the Churches in Cambridgeshire.

Here is a square Tower and 3 Bells, on two of which, Sanga Katerina oza pzo nobis.

And these Arms, on a Cheif 3 Mullets party per Chev. in Base a Decrescent. The Nave, Chancel, two side siles, and south Porch, are all tiled.

Will. Dowfing had his Hands full when he was here, to purge this Church of Superstition, as appears by his Entry.

"Teversham March 26, 1643, I brake down a Crucifix in the Chancell, and there was JESUS written in great capital Letters on 6 Arches in the Church, and in 12 Places in the Chancell, and Steps there, the Pavement digged up. The 6 Jesus in the Church I did out, and 6 in the Chancell, and the other 6 I could not reach, but gave Orders to do them out; there was on one Side of the Altar written Phil. 11. 10. and on the other Side Psalm xcv. Come let us worship and kneele &c. and 4 Suns painted, within the first writt. GOD the Father, &c in the second, the Son, and in the third, the Holy Ghest, &c in the fourth, Three Persons and one God."

In the East Chancel Window, the Arms of Mortimer Earl of March, Quarters Or. a Cross Gul. In another Window in a Shield Gul. are the three Nails, Crown of Thoms, and Spear, as the Instruments of Chriss's Crucifision.

He was 2d. Son of Roger Rant of Swaffam Priory in this County Esq; baptised Sept. 20, 1626. He was Bachelor of Civill Laws, Barrister at Common Law, and Justice of the Peace; he died Oct. 30, 1696, leaving behind him two Children John & Elizabeth.

At the East End of the North Isle, formerly the Chapel and Altar of St. Mary, against the North Wall, is a very magnificent Altar Tomb, of various kinds of Marble, with 2 Cumbent Figures on it, a Man in compleat Armour, and a Woman with a Greyhound at her Feet, in the Dress of the Times, painted black, with a Ruff &c. 1554, Laurence Maptid D. D. Master of Corpus Christi College, was inducted Rector, and on his Account, that College still pays a Dole of

54s. per Ann. to the Poor of this Parish.

Matnew Freeman S. T. B. who was succeeded by Daniel Darnelly in 1635. In 1644, William Sharpe was Pastor here, as he stiles himself, on whose Death in 1661, Edw. Sterne A. M. succeeded, and at his Death in 1664, Joseph Beaumont S. T. P. he was Master of St. Peter's College, King's Divinity Professor, and is buried in his College Chapel and was succeeded by Ralf Witty in 1700, who was Fellow of St. Peter's College, and Proctor in 1698. In 1717, Will. Malcher A. M. Fellow of King's College, Eason College, and Rector of Hadstock, had it; and in 1724, Thomas Sturges A. M. on Malcher's Death, succeeded here and at Hadstock. He is the present Rector, and is son to the late Archdeacon of Huntingdon, he was also Fellow of King's College, and now resides at his Rectory of Fen-Ditton.

Among the Ornaments of this Church, there was a Tunick and Dalmatick of the Gift of Sir John de Theversbam, formerly Lord here.

WEST WICKHAM.

The Church here hath a square Tower and 5 Bells, a Nave, Chancel, and N. Chapel tiled; it is a Donative or perpetual Curacy, formerly bedonging to Colne Priory in Essex, to which it was impropriated by Simon Bishop of Ess, and was served by one of their Monks; & is now in the Gist of the Right Honourable the Lord Montford, who lately bought the great Tithes of Dr. Harrison, to whom they were given by Lord Alington, with whom the Doctor travelled abroad. It stands in Camps Deanry, Ess Archdeaconry, and Chilford Hundred, and is dedicated to the Virgin Mary. Dowsing was here

"March 23, 1643. We brake down 8 superstitious Pictures in the Church, one a Crucifix, and one the Virgin Mary with Christ in her

Arms; and 6 in the Chancel, and gave Order to level the Steps in the Chancel, and to take down a Crosson the Church."

In a South Chancel window, are the Arms of Vere Earl of Oxford, with a Label of 5 Az.

On a Brass fixed to a Marble in the Altar Rails.

Here lyeth Phillip Richardson of West-Wickham in the Countie of Cambridge Gent. aged 60 Years, dyed the 9th Daye of April 1634, and was buried the 11th Daye following. he gave to the Poor People of West-Wickham, tenn Pounds by Will, for the purchaseinge of Lande.

CARTER, party per Bend dancette 3 Cinquefoils instead of Cart-Wheels. Mr. Carter lived in the Farm belonging to Caius College, at the S. E. Corner of the Church-yard.

This Rectory is in the Gift of the Chapter of ELY, is valued at 3 l. 6 s. 8 d. It is in *Wichford Hundred*, and being in the Archdeaconry and Deanry of Ely, it is exempt from the Archdeacon's, being solely in the Bishop's Jurisdiction.

The Tower here is square, and hath 5 Bells, the Nave and two Side: Isles & South Porch, are leaded, and the Chancel is tiled.

Against the N. Chancel Wall is a mural Monument, with this Inscription on it's lower Part.

Lord Paget of Bewdeferte, of the most honourable Order of the Garter Knt. who lived with her 15 Years and an halse, by whom he had Anne, Merabel, married to Chris. Heden of Bakensthorpe in the Countie of Norst. Esq; Isbel died in her Cradel. Alice married Tho. Jarrat, Sonne & Heire of Sir Gilbarde Jarrat Knt. Mr. of the Rowles.

Over this Inscription on one Side, is Sir Thomas kneeling in Armour, with a Book before him, and opposite to him are his two Ladies in the same Posture, with 4 Children between them.

Sir Thomas was a Benefactor to the Parish; his second Lady, Dr. to Lord Paget, who in King Edward's Time had been degraded from his Knighthood of the Garter, (but restored to it by Q. Mary) under Pretence that he was desective in Blood and Arms for 3 Descents, and who died a zealous Roman Catholick in 1563, married to her second Husband, Sir Will. Waldegrave Knt. by whom she had several Children, she being the second Lady.

In the Chapel at the East End of the N. Isle, is a mural Monument of painted wood, with a Woman's Effigies on her Knees, with a Book before her, but no Inscription or Arms. At the Bottom of this Isle is a Vestry, round which are Lozenges of white Marble, fixed about two Feet from the Ground, with the Names of the Insant Children of Dr. Tookie. They were for the Earl and Countess of Orford, viz the Right Honourable EDWARD RUSSELL, Earl of ORFORD in Suffolk, Viscount Barfleur in Normandy, and Baron Shengay in the County of Cambridge. and Lady MARGARET his Wife, 3d. and youngest Dr. to William the sirst Duke of Bedford, his Father's Brother, Sister to William Lord Russell, who was be-headed in 1683; so that his Lordship was Couz n Germain to his Countes: He died sans Issue Nev. 26, 1727, aged 75, and is buried at Woburne Abby in Bedfordskire, and left his fine House in Covent Garden, to Thomas Archer of Umberstade in Warwickshire Esq; & his fine Seat, with one of the finest Estates in this County, to SAMUEL SANDYS Eig; now Lord SANDYS, a Descendant from the Archbishop of York, of that Name, in Q. Elizabeth's Time. These two Gentlemen having married his Lordship's two great Neices, the Daughters of Sir Thomas Tipping of Whit field in Oxfordsbire Bart. by his Lady Anne, the Daughter of Thomas Cheek of Pyrgo in Effex Esq. who married one of his Lordships Sisters: his Lordship was Lord Leiutenant of Cambridgesbire; there is a good Picture of him in the County Club Room, at the Tuns Tavern in Cambridge. (see P. 150.)

There is a good Collection of Books in the Chapel, at the East End of the South Isle, & a handsome Marble Font guarded by Iron Palisados. The Church is dedicated to St. MARGARET, is in the Deanry of Fordbam, Archdeaconry of Sudbury, and Diocess of Norwich, as lying on the Eastern Side of Devil's Ditch, the old Boundary of the Kingdoms of the Mercians and East Angles, and therefore was never Part of the old Diocess of Lincoln, which extended thus far, before Els was dismembered from it, and made a separate Diocess. It is in the Hundred of Stapello, in the County of Cambridge, is a Vicarage valued at 11 l. 12 s. 6 st. in the Gift of Lord Sandys, and is discharged of First Fruits and Tenths, being sworn of the real Value of 41 l. 9 s. 4 d. ob. them by Jeffey de Mandevil (or Magna Villa) Earl of Effex, their Founder. In 1311 Henry de Haverhill, In 1326, Stephen de Magna Waltham, were presented Vicars by John Abbot of Walden, In 1376, Tho. Smith Vicar here, refigned to Sir Edmund Ive, in exchange for Cranwich. In Dowling's Journal in 1643, is this,

"Chepengham cum Badlingham, (3 s. 4 d.) March 23, two superstitious."

WILLIAM DE MANDEVIL Earl of Effex, in 1184, gave this Manor to the Knights Hospitalers, and so it became a Preceptory, subordinate to their Great House at Landon, and used for their Sick Bretheren, who often removed hither for Country Air; In the Valuation of Carbrook, the Yerusalem Estate here, & in the adjacent Towns, is reckoned at 33 1. 6 s. 8 d: per Ann. and was granted 38 H. VIII. to Sir Edward North, as Tanner in his Notitia fo. 46. They had a Monday Market & Fair at Chipenham, the Day before and upon St. Michael, granted by H. III. and Free-warren by Edw. I. It had many Benefactors, several of which here follow, from their Original Donation Deeds, most without Date, now in the Collection of Mr. Tho. Martin of Palgrave. DE. GYNES Son of Rob. de Gyneo, of Aseele or Ashley in Cambridgeshire, gave to God, St. Mary, and St. John Baptist, and to the poor Bretheren of the Holy House or Hospital of Jerusalem, dwelling at Chypenham, a 6 d. Rent, out of Land in Ascele. Ralph de Coggesbale gave them an Acre of Land in his Manor of Silverle, towards finding a Chaplain in the Chapel belonging to the Infirmary of Hospitalers at Chippinham; Sir Tho. de Lavenbam, Roger Arfic, John de Gynis, and others, being Witnesses. Agnes Dr. of Robert de Padebroc and Helewysa her, Sister, gave them 2 Acres and an half in Ascele and Silverle, Richard de Camera or Chambers, gave them 19 Acres & 1 Rood in Chipenham, and one House and Crost thereto belonging. Thomas Son of Jeffry Stanulf of Silverle, gave 2 Acres and 3 Roods in Situerle, 10 Edw. I. Tha, le Mercuellus of

Delbam.

Dalham, by Deed without Date, released to Brother Wilham de Hauile, Prior of Jerusalem Hospital in England, 8 Acres of Land, and 2 d. Rent in Silverle, which Will. Randolf gave them; Sir Alan Fraunceis, Sir In. de Scalarijs or Scales, Knts. Jeffry Arfick & Nic. his Brother, & others, being Witnesses. By Deed sans Date, Brother Teric de Nussa, Prior of St. John of Jerusalem in England, with the Consent of his whole Chapter, confirmed to Humfry. Son of Ralf Prat and his Heirs, a Messuage and Croft which his Father held in Ascele, of the Demeans of Jeffry Arfick, paying yearly to their House at Chipenbam, to find a Light before the Image of the Virgin there, half a Mark, & doing Suit to their Court at Chipenham; they granted him also, Commonage for young Cattle, and 20 Sheep, on their Commons of Ayfele & Silverle, paying half a Mark Releif at every Death, to the Altar in their Hospital Church; Will. de Nutstede, Walter de Ewyas, Will. de Booland, Ric. de Ruffegrey, Hugh their Chaplain at Chipenham, Gisebert Marescall, John de Suardebi, & Ralf de Dawres, Bretheren at Chipenham, being Witnesses. So that then there dwelt 8 Bretheren here, including the officiating Chaplain in their Chapel or Hospital Church.

SUTTON or SOUTH-TO WN.

This Church is one of the most beautiful regular Buildings in the whole County, it stands on a Hill, and may be seen at a great Distance on the North; it hath an Elegant losty square Tower, on which are two octogon Stories, all adorned with Spire Work and carving, and terminated at Top, by a small leaden Spire, six Bells and a Clock. The spatious Nave, two Isles, Chancel and South Porch, are all cover'd with Lead. The present Church was built by Bishop BARNET, who died in 1373, whose Bust with his Mitre on, still remains carved in Stone, on the arched Roof of the South Porch, and his Arms also, Arg. a Saltyr & Leopard's Face in Cheif Sab. over the Arch of the West Door, is the Saltyr

single for St. Andrew, Patron of this Church; and a Shield of the Arms of Eby See; there are also two Shields more on the Posch Roof, one of the Instruments of the Crucificion, and the other combaning the Symbol of the Trinity.

There is only one Stone now to be thet with, that hath any inicripiton, which lies near the Passage out of the Nave site South Ele, and is the burial Place of Mr. Edward Stracy, who died May 8, 1686, 56.

This Vicarage is in the Gift of the Chapter of Ely, valued at 10 l. It is in the Hundred of Wichford, Archdeaeonry and Destity of Ely, and

so is folely under the Bishop's Jurisdiction.

in this Paristr in 1634, several Peices of Antiquity were sliceworld accidentally, by a Plough, which laid hold of a thin Plate of Lead (or Pewter Dish) and brought up with it several Cours and Rings; and one of the Labourers thrusting his Hand into the Earth (for it was a moorish. By which it seems to be a Dish only, of EADUWEN MEAGAGE'S, before the Conquest, and might be laid over some other Things, to preserve them when they were hid, in Time of War in all likelihood.

There is an Account of these Things being found in Dr. GIBSON's Cambden so. 415. of his first Edition, where that learned Person says, he

could not fix any entire natural Sense upon the whole.

BALSHAM,

This Rectory from the Erection to Q. Eliz. Time, was always in the Collation of the See of ELY; it was first taxed at 30, then 40, then 60 Marks, and now stands in the King's Books at 39 l. 16 s. 8 d and so pays 3 1. 19 s. 8 d. yearly Tenths. The Manor and Advowson was taken from the See by the faid Queen, and it is now in the Patronage of the Charter House London. It stands in Camps Deanry, and Ely Archdeaconry, but is not subject to the Archdeacon's Jurisdiction, it being one of the Bishop's Manors when the Composition was made between the Bishop & Archdeacon; it is in Radfield Hundred, & was with the Manor given to the Charter-House, by * Mr. Tho. Sutton the Founder, who lived in this Parish, where his Wite was first buried, but afterwards removed. He erected two large Buttresses to support this Steeple, on which are the initial Letters of his Name, and 1589. The Situation is lofty, and the Tower is seen almost all over the County. Cambden makes Mention of this Place thus, " Hard by Cambridge to the South East, are certain high Hills, by the Students called Gogmagog Hills, & by Henry of Hunting don, the most pleasant Hills of BALSHAM, from a Village " by them, where the Danes committed all Barbarities imaginable."

The Church is a large fair Building, with a lofty square Tower, and 5 good Bells, which were put into Order at Mr. Sutton's Death, who left 20 l. for that Purpose. The Nave, Chancel, Isles, & South Porch, are leaded. The Church is dedicated to the Holy Trinity, and had two

GILD Chapels in it; in that at the East End of the S. Me, officiated the Chaplain or Chantry Priest of TRINITY GILD, and in the opposite one. the Priest of St. NICHOLAS'S GILD; these Priests on Sundays & Holy-Days, used to assist the Rector and his Chaplains, and made a Choir Service; when they used to six in the Chancel in the Stalls, which remain there to this Day. The Archdeacen's Book faith, that among the Ornaments of this Church, there was a Chalice given by Ric. Spynk, another by Hugh Bila, a Baudekyn by John, Bishop of Ely, a compleat Portifory worth 5 l. by Master Roger de Huntingfeld Rector here; and a Missal by Wil. de Hansthorp Rector; & that the Parish pd. 5 s. Peter Pence. There was also a CHANTRY here, endowed with Lands & Tenements, which was dissolved by Edw. VI. for in 1553, 1st of Q. Mary, Will. Fervice the last Incumbent in Balsham Chantry, had an Annuity of 51. per Ann. paid by the Crown, out of the Revenues of his late diffolved Chantry. In 1493, John Cornel settled one Acre and an half of Land, on the Priest of Trinity Gild, to keep his Anniversary; the Screens between the Church and Chancel under the Rode-Loft, were painted and adorned, with a Legacy given by John Brown of Balfbam.

In the Church-Yard at the East End of the Chancel, are 4 Freestone Cossin Monuments, very old and much alike, each having 3 Crosses slore on their Tops; that most North, was opened some Years agone, and a Stone Cossin with a Sceleton found in it; and in 1744, when the Gentlemen of the Charterbouse were on their Circuit, Dr. Basses had that most South opened, which was found filled with Gravel, being bricked on the Sides and Bottom, where lay a Sceleton of a Person, who had never been in a Cossin: I find this was a common way of Burial for Persons of Distinction, in Edw. II. and III. Time, when some chose rather to have their Bodies committed to the Earth without a Stone Cossin, than with it. At Thorndon in Susfolk, the Rector opened for me, a Monument of this kind, which had also a Cross slore on the Top, and an Escalop Shell, to denote his having been a Pilgrimage to St. James at Compostella; by it's being join'd to the South Chancel Wall on the Church-Yard Side, it

appears

appears to have been the Monument of the Builder of the Chancel, supposed to be Nic de Bokland Rector here, who was instituted in Ag. 1333, at the Presentation of John of Corawall, ad. Son to King Edv. II. the Grave was fitted up with a Stone Glab on each Side, and one at each End, the Body was faid at bottom with nothing but the Common Earth under the Cossia, which was of very thick Oak, it was filled up with Earth and Gravel, and then large Flint Stones, and so one above another to the Surface of the Earth, and the whole Monument above, was folid Masons Work. I mention this, as in some measure shewing, about what Time, these antient Monuments that now ternain in many Places, were likely to be placed there.

Dougling was here in 1643.

BALSHAM March 21, (35. 4 d.) we brake down diverse superstitions Pictures, one Crucifix, and gave Order to take down a Cross on the Church, and to take down another on the Steeple, and to level the Steep of the Chancel within a Month."

How he came to space the fine Brasses in the Church, I can't account for, no other way, than by the Protection of Dr. TEMPLER, who too much sell into the Humour of those Times, and as he had an Interest with these People, made use of it to save the Monuments of his Church, for which he differves Commendation.

Exactly in the midle of the Chancel, lies a noble grey Marble, over JOHN SLEFORD, who as Bishop Fordham's Register (so. 68, b.) informs us, was Rector here, and Patron of Berklowe, and died in 1401. It is adorned with Brass Plates, representing him in a Cope, with I. S. on his Breast, the initial Letters of his Name, and ten Saints depicted on his Cope, viz. St. Mary, St. John the Evangelist, St. Catherine, St. Paul, St. Mary Magdalen, St. John Baptist, St. Etheldred, St. Peter, St. Margaret, & St. Winifeid. On each side of his Head is a Shield, the first hath the Arms of Exp See, and the second is lost. At Top are the Arms of England & France quarter'd, viz. semè de Flours de Lis. And on the Lest side the same, impaling the Arms of

HEINAULT, viz. 4 Lions ramp. quarterly, being the Arms of Queen Phallippa of Heinault, Wife to Edward III. whose Chaplain he was in his younger Years; his Device is

the two initial Letters of his Name, being the common Cypher for the Name of JESUS. The Canopy is curiously adorned with Angels and other Figures; over his Head are two Angels slying.

holding a Sheet, in which is a Representation of himself, very small, with a Label over his Head, the Letters of which, are now illegible; designed to signify the Hope he had, of the Angels conducting his Soul to Heaven. The following Verses are still legible.

Besides a Canonry in each of the Churches of Wells and Rippon, he was made Prebend in the Collegiate Church of Westminster St. Stephen, June 20, 1363, in Room of Henry de Snayth, to whom Dec. 16 solowing, it was restored. (Newcourt Vol. I. Fo. 179.) Le Neve mentions one John Rippon, to have been Archdeacon of Wells in 1390, which seems to be the same Man, for Sleford being Canon of Rippon, it was usual at that Time, for the Clergy to denominate themselves from their Preferments, as Henry of Huntingdon did, from being Archdeacon of that Place. He built this Chancel, and stalled it with 28 Stalls, of good Oak, which have been carefully preserved to this Day.

On the North Side of this Storie lies another, over Mrs. Eliz. Relict of the Rev. NAT. GURDON D. D. of Affington-Hall in Suffolk, and some Time Rector of Chelmesford in Esfex. Jan. 8, 1727, æt. 90.

There is a Monument against the North-Wall with the Arms of WOODROOFFE, Arg. a Chev. between 3 Crossets pate fitche Gul. impaling
Gurdon, Sab. 3 Leopards Faces jessant Fleurs de Lis Or.

Woodrooffe's Crest, is a Woodpicker proper.

Sacred to the Memory of WILLIAM WOODROFFE D. D. formerly Fellow of Queen's College in Cambridge, and Rector of this Parish 34 Years, where he constantly resided, and faithfully discharged the Duties of his Function, and enforced his Doctrine by a good and pious Example, which caused him to live beloved, and die lamented, June 20, 1732, in the 76 Year of his Age. He married Eliz. 2d. Daughter of NAT: Gurdon D. D. of Assington-Hall in Susfolk, who was remarkable for her Piety and Charity, as in all Respects a Wise suitable to so good a Husband, she died Sept. 25, 1741, in the 70th. Year of her Age. They had 4 Sons and 2 Daughters, who survived them, viz. Thomas, William, John, Nathaniel, Ann, and Elizabeth.

In the Nave lies a noble grey marble, almost cover'd with Brass, in the midle of it, is a Priest in an extraordinary rich Cope, with Lions Heads erased in Ovals upon it, & 8 Saints down the Sides of it, viz., St. Michael, St. Gabriel, St. Margaret, &c. and on the Pillars supporting the Canopy, are also eight Saints, St. John Baptist, St. Peter, St. Asapt the Bishop, & St. Brigid, St. John the Evangelist, St. Andrew, St. Nicholas the Bishop, & St. Winefride; on each Side of his Head is a Shield, both alike, seemingly, of a Lion ramp. in a Bordure ingrail'd, but they are so worn, I can't be positive; if so, they are the Arms of GRAY Bishop of Ely, who lived in those Times. The 12 following Verses are on a Plate at his Feet, and this Inscription round the Stone.

This Man was LL. D. D. & Administrator of the Temporalities of ELY See, to Lewis de Luxemburgh Archbishop of Roan, who held Ely in Commendam, (Newcourt's Rep' Vol. II, fo. 202.) for in 1439, he presented to Hadstock Rectory, which belonged to that See. In 1533, he was collated to the Prebend of Warham in the Church of Hereford, which he resigned in 1441, to David Blodwell. (Willie's Cath' Vol. I. Fo. 602.) when he grew old and blind he resigned this Rectory, having a Pention for Life reserved, and convenience for his residence, to which the third Line alludes.

On a Stone near the former, is a Man in Armour standing on a Lyom-Arms, a Chev. between 3 Leopards Faces.

The CHAREL is neat and elegant, being wainfcotted about 10 Feet high on both Sides, but quite up to the Top at the End, with a Pediment, making a very handsome Altar-Peice; in the midle of which over the Altar, is a fine large Picture, of our LADY offering our SAVI-OUR in the Temple to the Priest.

The Altar is raised one Step, inclosed with Iron Rails, cover'd withan clegant Carpet of blew Velvet, laced and fringed with Gold, the Cultions are of the same, as are those at the Master's and President's Stalk, their Curtains being of blew Silk Damask; the whole Furniture of the Chapel is correspondent, and very handsome. Above the Enterance into the Chapel, between the aforesaid Stalls, is the Date 1729, and the Arms of Sir NATHANAEL LLOYD, their late Master and great Benefactor. Quarterly 1 & 4, per Fess a Lyon ramp. 2 & 3, a Chev. between the Pheons. Crest, a Demi-Lyon ramp. issuing from a Ducal Coronet. The Chapel is paved throughout with white Marble, and the Stalls round it are of the neatest workmanship of Norway Oak, the Roof is arched with Stucho, adorned with 15 Shields of the Founder and Benefactors. The three over the Altar are (as to the Shield Work) all Gold, the reft only gilt in Part, the 5 in the midle belong to 5 Bishops, and are adorned with Mitres; that of the Founder being directly over the Altar, in which NORWICH See, Az. 2 Mitres O. impales Bishop BATEMAN the Founder. NORWICH See impales Bishop Nix's Arms. (Hist' of Norwich fo. 389) The Archiepiscopal See of CANTERBURY impales SIMON of SUDBU-RY Archbishop there, Arg. on a Cross Az. a Text 99. crowned Or. A Mitre and the Garter, in which 3 Coats impaled, 1, The See of Win-3, The College Arms. Canterbury See im-2, GARDINER. pales Archbishop PARKER, (see Hist' Norw. fo 217, 25. where his Life and Benefactions occur at large.)

The five Shields on the South Side are,

KNAPP, a Lyon passant in Base, and 3 Helmets in Cheif Sab. and by adding on a Canton Arg. a Text & Sab. is made a Sort of a Rebus for GOODKNAPP. Robert Goodknapp being a Considerable Benefactor.

LAURENCE MAPTYDE, Girrony of 8 A. G. on an Escutcheon of Pretence A. a Cinquesoil B. He was Fellow here, and asterwards. Master of Corpus Christi see p. 105. he was a Benefactor.

The College Arms impaling WILL. MOUSE Master here.

Or. 3 Arrows, their Points downwards Sab. on a Chief of the 2d. 3. Mullets of the Field.

The College Arms impale Eden, Master here, at p. 108, only here the Chev'rons are Gul, and there is a Crescent for Difference. Crest, 2 Demi-Dragon holding a Rose Branch.

Sir Nathanael died out of College, where he had not lived for many Years before his Refignation; he was a Confiderable Benefactor all his Life time; at his Death he left them 3000 l. with which the Common-Hall was re-built, the Court new faced with Stone and fashed, and the new Front to the Street made, and the whole College fitted up in the legant manner we now see it. He had been Fellow of All-Souls College in Oxford.

The Altar Peice was given by the late Dr. John Chetwood, Pellow Here, who fitted up the Combination Room in a most elegant manner, where his Arms are put up with Supporters, as claimed by that Family.

There is a Stone with the Effigies of a Doctor of Law upon it, but the Inscription being reaved, I know not who it was for:

In the Master's Lodge.

In the Room over the Anti-chapel, which hath a Window fronting the Altar to hear Divine Service at, are 5 Pictures, 1, a large Peice over the the Chimney, of Dr. Crew Bishop of Durbam, another of Bishop Gardiner, which is on Board; behind it is wrote, "Burnet in his History of the Reformation, has by Mistake, given a Picture of Bishop Horn for him." This is full faced and without any Beard, whereas Horn's hath a very long Beard, and a thin Face. There is another old Picture of a Bishop, with a long Beard, a Crosser in one Hand, and a Book in the other. The 4th is Dr. Henry Martin Master here, in a surred Gown, Ruff, and laced Cap. The 5th is an exceeding good one; on the back, Dr. Clement Corbet Master, elected Oct. 12, admitted Oct. 15, 1611. This Picture was given by Will, by the Rev. Mr. Thomas Baker of St. John's College, to Dr. Dickens of Trinity Hall, for himself or College. Mr. Baker died July 2, 1740, and is buried in St John's College Anti-Chapel, not far from Dr. Asheton's Monument, see p. 122. He is in a straight black flower'd Coat & Ruff, and a black Beard.

In the next Room to the former,

CORBET, Or. a Raven proper, on it's Breast a Crescent Arg. and in the Dexter Cheif, a Cinquesoil Gul.

EDEN'S Arms & Crest as before; the College Arms impaled with Eden; the same single; the same impaled with King; Eden impales Peyton, Sab. a Cross ingrail'd Or. a Mullet Arg. in the 1st Quarter, for Difference: Eden impales Waldegrave, per pale A. & G. a Crescent of the 2d for Difference.

There are Pictures of Archbishops, Laud, Sancroft, & Williams; Blashops, Andrews, Curle, & Archbishop Abbot. Bishop Crew was Godfather to Sir Nathanael Lloyd, which may be the Reason of his Picture being here.

In the LIBRARY Windows, are 4 or 5 old Coats of the College, in plain Bordures; and the Arms of MATHEW STOKES Esquire Beadle, as at page 127. Crest, A Dexter Arm holding his Beadle's Staff and Mace.

Here is preserved a very old and curious MSS, in Vellum, containing an Account of the Succession of the Popes, &c. It belonged originally, to St. Austin's Monastery at Canterbury, and has this particular in the Index of it, where speaking of Pope John VIII, there is added, "Islam Computatur, quia Femina suit," which destroys the Tale of that Reports being a Protestant Invention, since it is here allowed in a Book, wrote long before the Reformation: But indeed, tho' they talk of it so, Plating himself mentions it, tho' at the same Time endeavours to show the Ridicule of it, but owns that he relates it "Ne obstinate nimium & pertinguish citer omissific videar, qued fere Omnes affirmant," (Platina de Vitis Pont' Edit' Colonia Agrippina, A' 1610, Page 133.) And indeed, in a large Folio Chronicle in my own Possession, which formerly belonged to St. Saviour's Abby at Feversham in Kent, printed long before the Reformation at Nuremburgh in Germany, in 1493, so. 169, b. the Papistic

themselves so sar beleived it, that, by the Name of Joannes Septimus (&c. not VIII) there is a Woman exhibited with the triple Crown on, and a Child in her Arms, and the same Account that Platina gives of Pope John the VIII. aforementioned, with this added, "Sunt qui bec duo Scri"bant; Pontificem ipsum, quando ad Lateranensem Basilicam
"Prosicificitur, detestandi facinoris Causa, et Viam Illam (sc. inter Thea"trum, quod Colloseum vocant, a Neronis Collosso, & Sanctum

He was born at St. Edmund's Bury, and is said to be Son of Lienel Bishop of Salisbury, younger Son of Richard Woodvile Earl Rivers, who, that he might the better conceal this Disgrace, married his Mistross, the Mother of Bishop Gardiner, to one Gardiner, one of his menial Servants who own'd him, and so he bore that Name; he was consecrated Bishop of Winchester in 1531, Chancellor of Cambridge in 1538, and Lord Chancellor of England in 1553; he was deprived & imprisoned during Edward VI. Reign, and was a great Benefactor here; his Picture is in the Lodge, and that in Burnet's History is Bishop Horn's, one of his Successor; he died in 1555. You think that this Caused Way, is the High-Way to Heaven. To whom the other as tartly replied; Net so Sir, for then I should not have met you in this Place." He had many Preferments, and died in 1584, leaving his Nephew Lewis Harvey of Eye in Suffolk, his Heir, who was Rather of Rob Harvey Fellow here, LL. D. of Cambridge, & M.D. of the University of Padua. He made a Caule-Way from Cambridge, above 3 Miles towards Newmarket. Or. a Chev. and three Leopards Faces in Chief Gul.
- 17, THOMAS PRESTON A. M. 1584; He is buried in the Chapel P. 105. Arms as at P. 207.
- 18; JOHN COWELL LL. D. 1598, buried/in the Chapel. Arg. three Chev. Sab. between 3 Crescents Gul. on each. 3 Bezants, see p. 106.
- 19, CLEMENT CORBET LL. D. 1611. He was younger son of Sir Miles Corbet Knt. of Sproweston in Norfalk, Fellow of the College, Chancellor of Chickester, and Vice-Chancellor in 1613. He was a handsome black Man, as appears from his Picture in the Lodge. Arms as at page 209.

JOHN HOLEBROOK, S.T.P. was educated in Peter bouse, and in 1412 was chosen Fellow there; being ordain'd Accelite on the 25th of March this Year, Sub-deacen the 28th of the same Month, Deacon the 17th of December following, and Priest, 22 April 1413, he was chosen Master on the Cession of Thomas de Castro Bernardo, before 1420, but the Time doth not appear, and he is not to be found in Le Neve's Catalogue; In 1425 he was Master and Bursar, and in 1430 was Chancellor of the University, and Chaplain to King Henry VI. and was presented to the Vicarage of Hinton in 1436, and was a Benefactor to the University and his own College at his Death, which happen'd in this Year.

The Circumscription round his Stone here, is now wholly lost, but fometime fince, had this remaining,

Unde Capellanum Rex übi fecit eum, Cancellarium bic

Round his Head on a Label, was this,

Pars mes Dominus, dirit anims mes.

And the first Verse remaining, as at Page 87, viz.

Quem tegit ille Lapis, Cavus, En / cognomine Tottens, ec.

The Words, Covus, and Torrens, points out his Name of Hole Brook.

In 1 46 his Executors were at the Charge of Paving the Chancel or Choir, where he was buried, and creeking Seats and Delks in it.

THOMAS

THOMAS LANE, succeeded him as Master, who sounded a CHANTRY in this Church, and here was another CHANTRY sounded by Mr. WARKEWORTH, who settled 13 Acres and an half of Arable Land in Melreth Fields, on it.

In the Chancel Window formerly was this,

Peate peo anima bone memorie Wifelmi be Wittfelege, dudum Episcopi Roffensis

In 1443 the two Altars in the Nave of this Church, were confecrated by the Bishop of ELY's Suffragan, that on the North Side to St. Mary Magdalen and St. Margaret, and that on the South Side, to St. John

the Evangelist.

1307 John de Herwardstoke, and Robert de Lerling consistmed to the Scholaks of St. Peter, the Messuage with the Appurtenances, which the Brethren de Penitentid Jesu Christi used to inhabit in, with the King's Consent; and Roger de Flegg, Vicar-General of that Order in England, and Prior of the Brethren of the said Order at Lynn, granted the Scholars all their right in it, and it appears that they removed hence to Lynn, and that this Messuage was in Trumpington-street, opposite to St. Edmund's Chapel there.

In 1328 The Mayor and Bailiffs, and Bretbren of St. John's Hostle, carried on a Suit against the Fellows of St. Peter's College, but after-

wards agreed Matters with them.

In 1403 the Bursar of the College, in right of this Parish Church, received Tithes, viz. 6 s. 8 d. of the Abbot of Newbow, for the Tithes of his Lecture in the common Law-School, by reason he resided in this Parish, which was appropriated to the College; and 6 d. for Tithe of the Hermits Garden in this Parish, by the small Bridges, and in 14.25 Tithe Pigeons from Pembrook-Hall Dove-house

In 1415 a Subfidy being granted by the Clergy, to their Ambassadors going to the general Council, of 2 d. in the Pound, the College paid for

this Church.

In 1456 John Leystoft, Vicar of St. Stephen's in Norwich, read Divinity Lectures, and because he resided in this Parish, paid the Tithes of them to the Bursar, Mr. Gay.

In 1465 The Bismor of ELY, had a Subfidy of 3 d. in the Pound, granted him by his Chrgy, on going the Vifitation of his Diocefs, and he released to this College 15 s. 6 d. which the College must otherwise have paid him on that Account.

CHESTERTON, fignifies the Town next the Castle or Camp, and was given by King Henry I. 20th of February in the 11th Year of his Reign, to the Prior and Canons at Bernwell, in as ample a Manner as King John had leased it to them at 30 li. per Ann. Fee-Farm, which Lease was made now perpetual, by that annual Payment; so that he and his Successfor be for ever acquitted from the Annuity of 10 li. which that King had given them in Free-Alms for ever, out of the said Manor, which had View of Frankpledge now consirmed, to exempt it from the Hundred and Sheriff.

The Town of CAMBRIDGE,

Was in the King's own Hands, 'till Henry I Time, and the Sheriff of the County, always answer'd the annual Profits to the King's Exchaquer; But that Prince, at the request of the Transfern, granted it in Fee-Farm to his Bu Gresses of Cambridge, to be held of him in Chief, they paying into his Exchaquer, the same Farm, which the Sheriff used to pay.

HENRICUS

HENRICUS De i Gratia, &c. Sciatis me tradidisse ad Firmam Burgensous meis de CANTEBRUGE, Villam meam de Cantebruge, tenendam de me in Capite, per eandem Firmam, quam Vicecomes noster reddere solebatur, ut Ipsi ad Scaccarium meum respondeant: Et ideo precipio, quod presatos Burgenses et omnia sua custodiatis, et manuteneatis, sicut me mea propria, ne quis eis in aliquo Injuriam vel molestiam faciat ant Gravamen: Nolo enim quod ipsi alicui indè respondeant nisi mihi ad Scaccarium meum, Teste, &c.

This King Henry, youngest Son to the Conqueror, had a great Favour for the Place, being educated here, and instructed in the liberal Arts and Sciences, in which he made such a Progress, as to deserve the Sirname of Beau-Clerk, or the Good-Scholar, by which he was then commonly known, and is to this Day distinguished by it, from the other Kings of the same Name. Fuller in his History of the University of CAMBRIDGE, so 2, tells us, that even in these Days CAMBRIDGE was in such Reputation and Eminence for Literature, that this Prince was educated there; and that in Gratitude for his Education, he endowed Readers of several Languages therein; and indeed it is plain, he shew'd as much Gratitude to the Town itself, for besides the former Charter, he soon after order'd, that no Vessel should unlade, or pay Toll for its Goods, any where but in CAMBRIDGE, this must be before the Year II31, because Herry Bishop of Ely died then.

King JOHN in the second Year of his Reign, Ano 1200. granted them a Merchant's-Guild, and that the Merchants of the Guild in Cambridge, should be Free in all Fairs and Ports in the King's Dominions, both here and beyond the Seas, from all Toll, Pajage, Stailage, Pontage, Lastage, &c.

And thus by this CHARTER, they became a perfect Corporation, and wanted nothing but an absolute Power to choose their Provost or Chief Officer themselves; and this Liberty King John also granted them by another Charter, dated the 8th of May, in the 8th Year of his Reign, and in the Year of our Lord 1207, from which Time they were governed by a Provost, chosen annually by themselves.

And thus they continued under the Government of their PROVOSTS till 1226, and then King HENRY III. confirmed all their Charters and Liberties; and before 1231, alter'd the Governmen * from a PROVOST.

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to a MAYOR and 4 BATLIFFS, as it continues at this Day ! and is 1255, granted by another CHARTER, that neither the Burgellos themselves, nor their Goods should be arrested; unless they were principal Debtors themselves, and by another Charter the same Year, he granted them the Return of all Writs, relating to the Town and Liberty thereof, and to hold Gourt, and try all Pleas among themselves, and to elect CO-RONERS for the Burgs; all which Liberties King Edward the Pirst, confirmed in the Year 1210, and to the aforesaid CHARTERS added further, that the Burgesses should be Exempt and Free from Pannage, Murage, and Picage throughout all England, and the Kings Domitions beyond the Seas; and granted them also full Power to begueath by Will, their Lands and Tenements in the Burgh and it's Suburbs, at well-as all their Chattels, to whoever they would, except in Mortmain; and that they should not be answerable any where but in their own Court for any Contracts or Transpressions by them committed, unless they related to the KING himself, and in this CHARTER is this Clause,

"Ita tamen quod Magistris et Scholaribus Universitatis ejusdem Ville, super aliquibus "Libertatibus, eis per Progenitores nostros quondam Reges Anglie concessis, per Concessiones nostras supradictas nullatenus prejudicetur. Testibus venerabilibus patribus, Johanne Norwycensi, et Johanne Bathoniensi et Wellens Episcopis, &c. ?

CAMBRIDGE, having been gowern'd by a MAYOR and 4 BAILLIFFS, ever fince the Year 1231, as there is no perfect List of them Extant, I have endeavour'd to collect one, from such antient Records as I have met with, but except Guy le Spicer in 1320, John de Helysingham in 1329, Edmund Lyster in 1381, and Robert Damay in 1474, I have met with none upon any Certainty; 'till the 4th of HENRY 7th, from which Time, from diverse Records and Authors, I have compleated the following List of MAYORS, wiz.

GRANTCHESTER,

I S said to be the CAMBORITUM of Antonine, and to be changed into this Name by the SAXONS; In BEDE'S Time, it was a little but desolate City, but now a small Village: Out of this ruin'd City, the adjoining UNIVERSITY of Cambridge, is believed to have had it's Original: Part of this VILLAGE, was given by HENRY LACY, Earl of Lincoln, to his base Son HENRY, on Condition that his Male-Issue for ever, should bear that Christian Name; the other Part that descended by the LACY's, to the House of Lancaster, King Henry VI. gave to King's College in Cambridge.

THOMAS DE ELTISLEY, the first Master of Corpus Christic College in Cambridge, gave the Vicarage House and 2 Acres, one Rood and half of Land there; The Advowson and the Manor of Barton, were purchased by the Alderman and Brethren of the Gild of Corpus Christi, &c. at Cambridge, partly of Henry Duke of Lancaster,

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and

and partly of John DE GRANTCHESTER for 500 Marks, 3600f Edw. 3d, and the Rectory was appropriated to the College 3 Years after; The.

mas de Eltesley being Rector here, and of Long Stanton.

The Monastery of St Noets in Huntingdonshire, had a Portion out of this Church of 26 s. per Ann. which Archbishop Parker; obtained of Queen Blizabeth for the College, and procur'd also of the said Queen, a Pention of 11 s. 6:d. per Ann. payable to the Monastery of Hatfeld Broadoaks out of this Church, and then gave it to the College, In 1375 Peterbouse College received 6 d. per Ann. out of this Church which is dedicated to St Andrew the Apostle. In 1338 William de Baud Rector, was non-resident, as Chaplain to the Country of Northampton; In 1376 Thomas de Grantesete, exchanged this for the Rectory of Eltesley, with Richard de Dunmore, who was presented by the Master and Fellows.

7 May, 1379, JOHN KYNNE Master of the College, was appointed Sequestrator of the Rectory, and the 16 May, JOHN, King of Castile and Leon, and DUKE OF LANCASTER, Founder of the College, supplicated the Bishop of ELY to appropriate it to the College, it's Revenues being not sufficient for the Master and Scholars Maintenance; In 1380 besides the Portions of the Priors of BERNEWELL and St. Neots, and 16 d. Pention to James de Grantecestre, it was valued at 32 li. 145. 6d. and tax'd at 21 li. 65. 8d. the ordinary Charges per Ann. were, 3 1 4 d. and a Composition for the Vicarage, which was taxed at 4 li but a Power was reserved to the Bishop and his Successors to

change it.

WILLIAM WENDY Priest, A.B. Vicar, in 1388, the University supplicated the Pope for a Provision formhim, he being a Native of Ely Diocess, and Scholar in Divinity. 1396 William Batchelor Vicar, he exchanged for Kerdington in Lincoln Diocess, with William Berkelawe.

Against the South Chancel Wall is a Monument in Memory of Katherine Relict of Thomas Byng, L. L. D. and Master of Clare-Hall, and Dean of the Arches who had 10 Sons and 2 Daughters, and was buried here 16-7, Aged 74 Years.

TRUMPINGTON.

I N the 1 Edward I. * SIMON DE CAILY had a Manor here, to which the Advowion then belonged; which he held of the Earl of Winchefter, and he of the Earl of Arundel, and he in Chief of the King, and to it belongs a Lete, for which he pays to the SHERIFF's Bailiff 200 per Ann. and to John le Moigne of Schelford for the Ward of Cambridge-Caftle 20 s. for the SHERIFFS Aid 8 s. and owes Suit to the County and Hundred Counts: But of the Advoncion they know not, whither he hath any Warrant or no. This was the capital FEE or Maner of this Town, and had many Free-tenants which held of it, among which Sir Roger de Trumpington, Knt. held a Watermill and Lands at 40 st per Ann. The Prior of Byssende, held 35 Acres in pure Alms of the Gift of Sir John de Caily; The Prioress of St. Radegund in Cambridge, Time immemorial held 30 Acres in pure Alms of the Gift of Ralf de

Caily,

[·] Inquis Hundredi de TRIPPELOWE I. Edw. I.

Caily and the Prior of Shengay held 7 Acres of his Gift, and the Rector of Trumpington had a Mossuage, of one Rood, and 51 Acres of Land of his Gift, and John Bernard held one Acre by the Service of finding a Lamp burning in the Church, which is dedicated to * St. Nicholas, and had a Gilb of St. Mary kept in it.

MORTIMER'S Fee or Manor.

Sir Roger de Trumpington held one Fee of the Earl of Winchester, that + Earl of Sir Roger de Mortimer, and he of the King in Chief, and hith a Lete by permission of the Bailiss of the Hundred, to be held before the Bailiss, with the Assize of Bread and Ale.

Peverel's Fee or Manor.

JOHN Son of WALTER DE TRUMPINGTON, held it of Sir Baldwyn de St. George, and he of Richard Massegros, and he of Peverel, and pays 12 d. to the Sheriff's Aid, and to the Sheriff's Bailiff for View of Frankpledge 18 d. and half a Mark per Ann. for Guard of Cambridge Castle. Among the Free Tenants of this Manor, Jeffry Clark

held 7 Acres, by finding 3 Lamps burning in the Church.

This John Son of Walter de Trumpington, (which Walter was Son of Henry, called Le Loverd or Lord,) gave it to William his Son, and Sarah Daughter of Simon de Caily of Trumpington his Wife, and their Heirs, paying the accustomed Services to Sir Ralf de Bellafago or Beaufoe, and his Heirs, to the Kings Scutage, when it is, 23s. 1 d. and to him the said John for Life, 5 Marks of Silver; and if they have no Heirs, then after their Deaths, it was to remain to Christian his Daughter, Sister of the said William; and for want of her Heirs, to Sir Ralf Beaufoe, Knt. and his Heirs for ever, The Witnesses were, Sir Richard de Frevile, Sir Roger de Trumpington, Sir Ralf de Beaufoe, Sir William de la Haye, Sir William Muchet, Knights, &c. this was in Edward I. Time.

Sir Walter de Trumpington, Knt. and Dame Anne his Wife, were interfed in the Priory Church of Babewell, near St. Edmund's Bury in Suffolk.

The last Valor makes it dedicated to St. Mary and St. Michael, sed q. + EBO-RARDUS held one Fee, of the Fee of Morrimer.

38 Henry 8th, This Manor was fold by Francis Pygot, Esq; and Thomas his Son and Heir, to Edward Pychard, Gent. and Eleanor his Wife, it then contain'd 10 Messinges, 3 Tosts, 300 Acres of Land, 60 of Pasture, 20 of Wood, 300 of Common, and 3 li. Rent, with a Fald-Course in Trumpington and Grantchester.

Bologne's Fee or Manor.

William de Evereux and Alan de Hida, held half a Pee of the Honour of Bologne, and owe neither Suit nor Aid to the Sheriff; There were then in this Village 12 Hides of Land, 9 and an half of which were found Geldable, and the other two and an half, held by William and Alan, not Geldable, and in Edward I. Time, John Danold held it. Among the Pree-Tenants, it appears, that Amy de Haukeston held the 4th of a Pee of the Honour of Bologne, of Sir William de Valence, and paid 7 d.per Ann, and had Tumbrel, Gallows, and Weyf.

Between Trumpington and Shelford Magna there is a certain Moor, where both Villages inter-common, which extends from Shelford to the

Water, dividing Trumpington and Cambridge.

ALBEMARLE'S Fee or Manor.

John de Caily held 2 Pees of the Honour of the Earl of Albemarle, one of the Honour of Chipeton, and owns one Suit of Court, and paies 8 s per Ann to the SHERIFFS Aid, William Bernard owns one Suit, and answers to the Aid with John de Caily.

Henry de Trumpington held a Fee, of the Fee of Maud de Diva and owes one Suit of Court per Ann. and Albinus performs it for him, and

pays 2 s. per Ann. to the Subrier's Aid.

BEAUFOE'S OF CROCHEMAN'S Manor.

Roger Son of William de Begufae of Trumpington, granted to Sir William Crocheman all his Manor, &c. here, late his Father William's, which Sarab his Mother holds for Life, 5th of Edward 3d, Sir William Crocheman, Knt. left two Coheirs, Mary married to John de Winceflow of London, and Elizabeth to Ralph de Muntingdon, and so the Manor divided about

about the latter End of Edward III. but in the 1st of Henry VI. Fobn Winceflow was Lord, but his share came to the Huntingdon Family, on the Death of Agnes Reliest of William Winceflow, about the latter End of Henry VI. and in 1442 Walter Huntingdon after the Death of his Wife, gave the Manor to his 2d Son; In the 5th of Edw. IV. the Lady Margaret Grysacre held the Manor of Crocheman's in Fointure, as Wife to one of the Huntingdon's. In the 4th of Henry VII. Thomas Huntingdon of Hempstede in Essex, Esq; was Lord, and in the 7th of that King. gave it to his Daughter Margaret, on her Marriage to John Paris, Efg. and she and her Husband gave it to Philip Paris, Esq; and Sir Philip on his Marriage with Margaret his Wife, jointured it on her; 8th of Henry VIII. John Paris, Esq; was Lord; and in the 22d of Henry VIII. Philip Paris, Esq. and Margaret his Wife, setled it on WILLIAM Bowyer Alderman of London, and by Jane Daughter of John Paris of Linton, it came to THOMAS COTTON of Conington her Husband, and by Eleanor their Daughter, to her Husband Edward Pychard of Trumpington in the Time of Edward VI. and Thomas Pychard, Big; was their Son and Heir; whose Son George lies buried at the East End of the North Transept, under an Altar Tomb, with the following Inscription, and Arms of

PYCHARD, Arg. 3 Picks Ar. Fitché Gul.

Here lyeth the Body of George Pichard Son of Thomas Pichard, Elq; by Mary his Wife, born 5 Oct. buried 24 Oct. 1650.

Marmore sed Proh! quam Saxo præstantior isto, Hic En! sub Pario Gemma reposta latet, Munera quæ Mundum renuens Natura beare Protulit, et Theca condidit indè sua.

In this Church are 2 cross Isles or Transepts, in that on the South Side is a Table in Memory of Thomas Alden, Gent. related to Mrs. Baron, who gave to the Town of Trumpington 19 Acres of Land, valued at 3 li. per Ann. for the putting out poor Boys Apprentices, the Gift bears Date 22 January, 1681.

In the East Window, Paly of 8, Arg. and Az. Arg. in Pale 3 Foxes passant Sab. Thomas Allen, Gent. died Sept. 4, 1692. Susanna Allen, - - - -. In

In another Window, the Arms of Ely See, and the East Angles. BRITHNOD Duke or Adderman of the East-Angles, gave a Manor in Trumpington to the Convent of Ely in King Etbeldreds Time.

In an Arch dividing the North Isle from the Transept, on an Altar Tomb lies a large Brass Effigies, with these Arms on his Sword,

TRUMPINGTON, 2 Trumpets, and crufuly of Croslets, with a Label of 5 for difference, and there are two Shields of the same on the South Side, in Memory of some of the Trumpington Family; but now usurped by another, with this Inscription,

Hic jacet Gulielmus Pycher Generosus, qui Vitam finivit die Seztili, A. D. 1614.

On the Woodwork, a Talbot's Head Or. lingued Vert. In the North Isle Windows are the Arms of Vere Earl of Oxford, Lord Scales, Trumpington. In the Chancel Window, Gul. a tri-corporated Lion with one

Head Arg. and Sab. 3 Luces in Fels Arg.

This RECTORY was taxed at 20 li. and was of the Patronage of the Prioress and Nuns of Haliwell by London, and was appropriated to them with the King's Licence, and Consent of the Bishop, Chapter and Archdeacon of Ely, a Pention of 6 s. 8 d. being reserved to the Archdeacon; Simon Bishop of Ely had granted them the Patronage, which they purchased of the Heirs of John de Caily.

1290 Nicholas was Rector, and it appears that there was a Rector and a Vicar, the last being always presented by the former; in 1389 the

Nuns presented the Rector.

In 1716 Mr. Matthew Bathurst, was Vicar, and Trinity College in

Cambridge were Patrons.

In 1399 The CHAPEL of St. Anne in Trumpington street, had a ferving Chaplain, and a Hermit there, and the Chapel and Common-Road between Cambridge and Trumpington, were repaired by Indulgences, granted by the Bishops of Ely.

The VICARAGE is valued at 5 li. 6 s. 8 d. and pays First fruits, and

10 s. 8 d. yearly Tenths, and is incapable of Augmentation.

The said ROBERT LAWRENCE of this Parish, long before his Death designed, that the Profits of ten Acres of Arable Land in the Fields of the said Parish, should be paid Quarterly to ten of the poor of the said Parish, at the Election and Discretion of the Lord of the Manor of Holme alias Stow-Qui, but liv'd not to finish the said Settlement. The said John Childe, the Grandson, and Heir Male of the said Robert Lawrence now living, who said the Stone near this Place, and erected this Monument; hath by Indenture bearing Date 26 March 1675, conveyed and setled the same, on the Churchwardens and Overseers of the said Town, and their Successors in trust, for the Uses aforesaid.

About 1350 John de Engayn, presented to STOW St. Mary, which belonged to his Lordship in Stow and Quye; In 1483 Sir William Paysworth, Knt. and Alice his Wife presented, and in 1455 Robert Woodlark Provost and the Fellows of King's College Cambridge presented; and in the 35th Henry VI. the College having given it to the King, He gave it to the Priory of Bernwell. 1716 The Bishop of Ely was Patron, and Mr. Mopletoft Vicar.

In 1463, 1st March, Sir John Anesty of Stow, Lord of Holm-Hall there, to which Manor the CHANTRY of St. Anne, Mother to the Virgin Mary belonged, and was called ANESTYES Chantry, and in 1406

Sir John Illey was Chaplain.

Sir Thomas Engain, married Katherine Daughter of the Earl of Devonshire, but died Sans Issue in 1367, and his Sisters were his Heirs, Joyce, Wife to Sir John de Goldington, Elizabeth, Wife of Sir Lawrence Pabenham, and Mary, Wife of Sir William Bernak, who shared his Estate.

The Vicarage of Stow, with Qui Curacy, was not in charge in the King's Books, but being return'd of the clear yearly Value of 37 li. 175. 6 d it is capable of Augmentation, and is in the Gift of the Bishop of Ely.

B. he was afterwards Prebend of ELY, Rector of HARLESTON, and Lecturer of St. Paul's London: 1661 Hugh Loyd, S. T. B. 1689 James Crampton. 1696 Gilbert Hooke. 1713. their Temporals at Twygrand.

FORDHAM Abby was founded in Henry III. Time by Sir ROBERT DE FORDHAM, Father of the aforesaid John, and Sir HENRY DEW, Knt. for Gilbertine Canons, valued at its suppression at 40 li. 13 s. 4 d. annual Rent, (Speed says 46 li. 3 s. 8 d.) and the PRIOR had a Manor and Court here.

WILLIAM DE DIVISA Prior, and the Hospital of St. Peter, and St. Mary Magdalen at FORDHAM, and the Religious of the order of Sempringbam, serving God there, gave for his own and Ancestors Souls, his Fishery in LITTLEPORT, which John de Burwell held of him at Upwere, and HENRY DE KEMSYK Prior of FORDHAM, gave them a Fishery called Swan-were there. William, Prior 39 Edward 3d. John, Prior 1st Edw. 4. John Prior of Fordham in Richard 2d Time. 18 Henry VI. John Greene was Prior 1 Richard 3d Robert Kirby. 13 Henry 7th, John Bray. 22 Henry 7th, William Lynne and then John Bray to the 13th Henry 8th, he was succeeded by William Baynton the last Prior. In 1553 Richard Brown, late a Religious here, had a Penfion of 5 h. 6 s. 8 d. and the Abbat of Ransey had always one Mark annual Rent from Fordham.

At the Diffolution, HENRY VIII. granted the Scite of the Priory and Manor, and Revenues in Fordbam, Sobam, and Snathwell, to PHILIP PARIS, Esq; and MARGARET his Wife.

In 1716 Sir Charles Wager, Admiral, was Lord of Fordham Abby, and built a fine New Seat here, which he soon after sold to Governour Harrison, whose Daughter and Heiress, brought it by Marriage to the Lord Viscount Townesend.

HB Church is dedicated to St. Leonard and St. John Baptist, and in Edw. 1. Time was estimated at 85 k. The Bishop of ELV being them and now Fatron. It is valued in the King's Books at 25 li. 7 d. ob! pays First Fruits and 2 li. 10 s. ob. qr. yearly Touths, and is incapable of Augumentation.

In Edward I. Time, William de Bynflon was Recton, and 20 Edw I. Boso de Clare, a Kinsman to the Earl of Clare, a great Pluralist, being Rector also of Politica in Suffice, Sabam, Dunmore, a Mediety of Walpole in Norfolk and Forthingbrugg, and Canon of Chichester, as Pryntelle us. 12 Edward III. John de Ellerker Rector here, had

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a Wrst against him, to force him to answer and make up his Accounts of the Profits of the Treasureship of Dublin, the Time he was Treasurer; but the Return to the Writ was, that it could not be served, because he was priviledged as the King's Chaplain. In 1341 he was presented to Great St. Mary's in Cambridge. In 1361 David Wollore, was presented by the King. In 1406 there were no less than 7 Chaplains or Soul-Prists, serving under the Rettor, at the several Altars belonging to this Church, viz. Sir John Newman, Sir Reginald Goodeknape, Sir Alan Lyncoln, Sir Simon Lovenorth, Sir John Fitz-Thomas, Sir Adam Herbert and Sir John Pecock.

JOHN WERKWORTH, S. T. B. Master of Peterbouse College, succeeded John Harnham Rector, who was L. L. B. Commissary-General to

the BISHOP, and Proctor for the Clergy in Convocation.

IS45 Thomas Smith, L. L. D. Vicar-General to the Bishop, being Knighted, he resigned in 1849, about 1646 George Bayly, B. D. was sequestred from this Rectory, and lived about 12 Years after, with a great Family of Children, and died about two Years before the Restoration; and Richard Reynolds, A. M. being Episcopally ordain'd in the Time of the Rebellion, got Possession at Bayley's Sequestration, on the Bartholomew Act; he conformed, and having no surviving Predecessor, became lawfull Rector, yet Bishop Wren collated 9 February 1622, Mr. John Randolph, A. M. but Reynolds kept his Possession; he was Father of Richard Reynolds Bishop of Lincoln. This Rectory is now held 1749, by the Rev. Mr. BROCK RAND, with Newton in this Diocess.

In 1389 there was a CHANTRY of St. MARY, in FITTON in Leverington, and in 1407 John Metfield was presented by the Bishop, being then L. L. Licenciate, Chancellor of the Bishop of ELY, Restor of Transington in 1402, and Archdeacon of ELY, a very learned Man. (See for him in Steresbrigge Chapel.) In 1390 a Licence was granted to perform Service in the Chapel in RICHMOND Manor in Leverington; In 1397 a Composition was made between the Restor of Leverington, and the Hamlets of Persons-Drove alias Fen-End, and Pigges-Drove there.

The East Part of the North Isle, bath been a CHAPEL and Burial-Place

Place of some ancient Family, and is inclosed with a Screen, the East Window is curiously illuminated with the Pourtraitures of many Jew-ISH Kings and Prophets, under this hath been an Altar, and the Statue of it's Patron Saint; In the upper Window, in the 1st Pane are two Essignes of a Knight in Armour, and his Lady behind him, both on their Knees, and their Hands erected; on her Surcoat is a Shield of BOKEN-HAM, and in a Label over their Heads.

Lady! lede us from harm, To him pat laged in your Arm.

And over them is the blessed Virgin holding our Saviour after his Crucifixion in her Arms; which is the Representation of our Lady of Pity, to whom probably this CHAPEL was dedicated.

On the lower Pane is another Man in Armour, and Lady behind him on their Knees, &c. and on her Vest is a Shield of Colvile, and over them,

Jelu! from Sine make us fre, For John's Love, yat baptilud ye:

On the South Side of the Chancel is a large Chapel, and against the East Wall is a Marble Compartment in Memory of *Thomas Cross*, who died July 24 1633, with

CROSS, Gul. a Cross Moline Arg. impaled with TILNEY and GIRLING, Ar. on a Bend Gul. cotized Sab. 3 Delis's of the Field.

Against the South Wall is a mural Monument, In Memory of Elizabeth, Wise of Thomas Swain, Esq. Daughter of Roger Spelman of Holme in Norfolk, Esq. ob. April 4 1719, 61. Thomas Swain her Husband, died January 13 1728, 84.

WISBITCH,

R Ouse-Brach, the Town on the Beach or Bank of the Ouse, was given to the Convent of Ely by the Parents of Alwyn, on his being admitted a Monk there; This Alwyn was afterwards Bishop of Elmham, which See he resigned, and retiring to Ely, died and was buried there; He was of noble Birth and Extraction, being Son of Oswi and Leoflede, who was Daughter of Brithnod Duke or Alderman of the East Angles, who was slain by the Danes in 991, besides this Town Steebestwarth, Kirthing and Dullingbam, in the County of Cambridge, March in the Isle of Ely, and others in Norfolk, were presented with him on his Admission aforesaid, and from that Time this Town hath belonged to the Church of Ely, and was one of the Manors that were assigned to the Bishop of Ely at the Erection of that See, to which it now belongs; There is a Castle here, long since a Palace to the Bishop, and in 1308 Richard de Halsted was Constable or Keeper of it.

There was a Manor called Tudenham-Hall at Gyberne in Wisheach, of which Sir Robert de Tudenham was Lord in the 10th of Edward I. and Sir Thomas Tudenham, 17 Edward II. and in 8 Edward III. another Sir Robert Tudenham had it. In 1402 the Bishop licenced Alan Grey of Gyberne, to hear Divine Service in the CHAPEL there for 3 Years, and

in 1406 Sir John Grey, was Chaplain there.

The present Church is dedicated to St. Peter and St. Paul, the Rectory was appropriated to the Prior and Conveys of Ely, and the endowed Vicarage was valued at 10 Marks, but afterwards increased much, for I find it enter'd thus,

26 li. 13 s. 4 d. WISEREACH Vicorage, taxed at 50 Marks.

The Bishop of ELY is Patron of it. In 1373 John Werkeworth, S. T. B. resigned it for the Rectory of Leverington. In 1400 John Judd, Official to the Bishop, Rector of Conington, Doctor in the Decrees, 1403 Rector of Swavessey, and in 1407 Rector of Fendition, had it.

Much of him may be seen in The History of Norrolk, Vol. II. so. 325.

1422

1422 John Oakham, L. L. D. this Oakham was ordain'd Deacon in St. MARY's Chapel in ELY Monastery, by John (Stephanensis Episcopus) Suffragan to the Bishop of ELY, and was Rector of LETTON in Norwich Diocess. In 1525 Robert Clyff, L. L. D. Vicar here, was made General Commissary to the Bishop.

In 1716 Mr. Charles Cole was Vicar, and in 1730 Dr. Bull had it,

and now the Rev. Mr. Burrough.

I find the Chapel of St. MARY in the Church of Wisheach, in which Bishop Alcock ordain'd in 1495. The Chancel of the Holy Trinity in the Church of St. Peter and Paul, The Church of St. George in the Timber-Market. The Church of St. MARY in the Fen End, the Chapel of Corpus Christi in St. Peter and Paul's Church, and the Gilds of the Holy Trinity, and St. MARY the Virgin.

In 1347 Licence was granted for a new Oratory at Pigges-drove in Wisbeach. In 1406 there were the following several CHAPLAINS serving at the Altars in the Churches and Chapels here, Sir John Gray, Sir John Lamysdale, Sir Thomas Wells, Sir Richard Austin, Sir Richard Loke, Sir Richard Blaver, Sir William Thorp, Sir William Marlys, Sir Thomas

Austin, and Sir Thomas Waleys.

St. MARTINS Chantry, with it's Messuage, Lands, &c. and 4 Acres of Lamp-Land were granted to L. Johnston, in James I. Time for 40 Years.

In the HUNDRED of Wisheach was the Chapel of HARRIMORE or HAVERINGMERE, to which Free-Chapel Sir Philip Tilney presented John Berewyke on the Death of Thomas Cotton in 1390, and in 1393 he exchanged it with Thomas Whitewell, for Nettle Curres in Winchester Diocess.

In 1252 Master John DE CADOMO or CAAM, Rector of WISE-BECH, in the presence of HUGH DE Norworld Bishop of Ely, presented William de Norwold Priest, to the Vicarage of Wysebech, saving to himself the Tithe of Wool and Hemp; and the said William was to serve the Chapel of Killbushing, for which he was to have the Tithes of all the Mills, and all the Land settled for the Service of that Chapel, which was purchased of the Prior and Convent of Spinney, and all other Lands belonging to the Chapel, and alto all the Tithes of the Fald, and Fishery, of Eggs, Lambs, Cheese and Butter, Geese, Calves, Piggs,

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and all Offerings and Profits of the Altar, and also the Manors both of the VICARAGE and Chapel, That of the Vicarage extending from the Castle-Ditch to the Sea, towards E LM, and the said William was tied to find a Lamp burning before the High Altar continually, from Vefpers 'till the whole Service by Night and Day is finished. After this in 1275, The Church being then void, HUGH Bishop of ELY Patron of it appropriated it to the Monks of ELY, on the Death of John de Caam the last Rector, and fetled the VICARAGE ON WILLIAM DE NORWOLD the Ist VICAR, and his Successors for ever, as follows, the VICAR to have all the Arable Land belonging to the Church, and the whole Tithe Hay, Corn, Herbage, Fish, and all manner of Tithes arising from all the Land of what Kind soever, between WISBEACH Bank, and ELM Parish. and also the Moiety of the Tithe Hay of all the Demeans, and all the Tithe Hay of all the rest of the Parish, with all the Profits and Offerings at the Altar in Wisheach Church, and all the Tithe Wool, Hemp, Flax, and all other Profits belonging to the faid Church, with this Condition, that if any of the Lands from which the Monks take their Corn Tithes be overflown, they shall have the small Tithes that may arise from such Lands overflown, for that Year, the Vicar to bear all the ordinary Burdens of the whole Living, and all extraordinary ones, according to their several Proportions, and the Monks and Vicar to repair the Chancel together. The Monks had all the Tithe Corn between Wysbeach Bank and Leverington Fields, the Rectory House, and the House belonging to Killbus CHAPEL, and the Barns and Manors and their Rents, and half the Tithe Hay of the Demeans, and no more.

In 1469 King EDWARD IV. went to Bury, Norwich, and Walfingham, and returned by Lynn, thence went to WYSEBEACH, and so over Downdale to Croyland.

1388 The Bishop licenced the Inhabitants of Morrowe Hamlet to hear Divine Service in their Chapel or Oratory, for one Year, by reason of their distance from the Parish Church of Wisheach, and the same to the Inhabitants of Gyherne Hamlet. In 1392 the Bishop granted an Indulgence of 40 Days pardon, to all those that said a Pater Noster, and Ave Mary, for the Souls of William Nune, and Maud his Wise, who are buried in Wisheach Churchyard.

In 1553 the following Pentions were paid, viz.

To William Susan late Chantry Priest of GYHERNE Chantry in Wisbich, 3 li. 10 s. per Ann. To Thomas Camerton, Incumbent of WISBICE Gild, 5 li. per Ann. To George Gawber, CHANTERY PRIEST in Wisbich, 5 li. per Ann. To Robert Lyne, Incumbent of St. Martin's Chantery in Wisbich, 5 li.

On a Stone in the Church, is a Man in Armour with a Lion at his Feet, on Brass Plates, and this circumscribed,

Cy gist Thomas de Bzaunstone iadis Conestable, du Chastel du Wisebech Di morus le vengt et Septisme Jour de May, l'an de nostre Seignour Mil. ccc. primer.

De S' alme de gi, Dieu par Sa Grace ait Mercy, Amen.

A patterne for Townesmen, whom we may Enroll, For at his own Charge, this Town he freed of Toll.

To the immortal Praise of God Almighty that saveth his People in all Adversities, be it kept in perpetual Memory, that on the Feast of All Saints, being the first of November in the Year of our Lord 1613, late in the Night, the Sea broke in, thro' the Violence of a North East Wind, meeting with the Spring-Tide, and overslowed all Marshland, with this Town of Wisbeche, both on the North Side and the South, and almost the whole Hundred round about, to the great Danger of Men's Lives, and the loss of some; besides the exceeding great Losse which these Countries sustain'd, thro' the breach of Banks, and spoil of Corn, Cattel, and Houseing, which could not be estimated The next Year following, (that is to say,) the Year of our Lord 1614, upon the 23d Day of March, this Country was again overslowed with the Frosh-Water, which

which came down in fuch great abundance, thro' the extraordinary great Shows that fell that Year, in January and February, that not only this Town, whereof the South Side only was loft, but the greatest Part of the Grounds within South-Ea-Bank in Holland, from Spalding to Tydd St. Giles was drowned, and almost wholly lost for all that Year, moreover a great Part of Marshland, from their Bank called the Edge, between their Townes and the Smeeth, to the new Pedike was lost, thro' diverse Breaches, between Salter's-Loade and Downham-Bridge; In conclusion many Towns in Norsolk, confining with Marshland, and most Part of this whole life of Elie.

And now having gone through the several Places I have seen in this County, I thought it might not be improper to acquaint my Reader, that These Historical Collections were chiefly made between the Years 1724 and 1734, so that there may occur several Things lost, since that Time; That which induced me to publish them was, my observing that nothing of the Kind for this County hath been hitherto attempted, and as I have continued the Inscriptions in all the College Chapels in the University, and those in all the Parish Churches in the Town, to this present Time; in that respect, the Work may be said to be perfect, and perhaps be not wholly unacceptable to some, on that Account; and as the County is but a small one, I should hope it might induce some other Person (whose Residence gives an Opportunity,) to visit and publish the other Towns, which I can never think of doing myself, by Reason of my distant Situation Accept this therefore in good Part, and candidly Pardon such Errors of the Press, as may have escaped Notice.
