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

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
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PREFACE.

The arrangement of records in the following pages has been simplified as far as possible. Following the sketch of each individual is a list of the children, numbered consecutively in small Roman figures at the left. If any of the children are to appear again as heads of families, they have also a number, in Arabic figures at the left of the Roman figures, and by looking for this number in the center of the page further on in the book, the persons will be found. Descendants in female lines, however, are not given separate Arabic numbers at the left, but are all given in order, from the eldest to the youngest, through the several generations, following the sketch of the last individual whose name was Douglas. Small figures are placed just above the names of all descendants, whether in male or female lines, which denote the number of the generation, reckoning from the progenitor of the family, who is number 1. By observing these generation numbers, as well as the consecutive numbers, both Roman and Arabic, of the names, the relationship of persons can be readily determined.

In a large number of instances female lines have been traced for several generations; and in order to gain space for the increased amount of records thus introduced, abbreviations have been employed to a considerable extent in the fine print, though none have been used in the coarse print. The principal abbreviations used are: æt., aged; aft., after or afterward; app., appointed; b., born; bapt., baptized; bef., before; bro., brother; ch., child or church; d., died; dau., daughter; educ., educated; ent., entered; estab., established; exc., except; fr., from; gr., grand; grad., graduated; inf., infancy; m., married: memb., member; prac., practiced; prep., prepared; prom., promoted; res., resides or resided; ret., returned; s., son; serv., served; set., settled; sist., sister; s. p. (sans prole), without offspring; stud., studied; unm., unmarried; w., wife; wh., where; wid., widow or widower. A few other abbreviations are used, which need no explanation.

All dates have been given as received, without any attempt at reducing those before 1752 to the new style. The correct spelling of baptismal names has been adhered to. Pet names have

been rigidly excluded, as hardly consistent with the dignity of a family history, and the real names have been given in all instances. Family names have in most cases been spelled as the records gave them. It would not be surprising if, among so many hundred names as the book contains, some have been incorrectly printed, though especial pains have been taken to avoid such extremely annoying mistakes.

I am much pleased at the elegant manner in which the book has been brought out by the publishers, and I feel under especial obligations to the Hon. Edward L. Freeman, for his personal attention to this matter. In order to insure perfection of typography, the publishers procured new type never before used, and selected a fine paper of a tint very agreeable to the eye. The result is a book which, I think, has not been surpassed for elegance and beauty of finish by any family history which has been published.

I regret that I have been unable to obtain portraits of some of the prominent members of the family, especially of the earlier generations. Of later generations I have sought without success engravings of Nathaniel P. Willis, of Newburgh, N. Y., the Hon. George P. Marsh, of Rome, Italy, Jehiel Todd, of Worcester, Mass., Alanson D., of Troy, N. Y., William B. D., of Rochester, N. Y., D. Deforrest D., of Springfield, Mass., John W. D., of Washington, D. C., Jacob Davies D., of Alexandria, Va., Stephen R. D., of Milford, Neb., Francis Dane D., of Hartford, Conn., John D., of New Haven, Conn., and the Rev. Dr. William K. D., of Dry Grove, Miss. Of the portraits presented, those of Col. William D., his wife Hannah Mansfield, William D., of Middletown, Conn., and the Hon. Benjamin D. and his wife, were furnished by Gov. D., of Middletown; that of Maj. David B. D., by his son, the Rev. Dr. Malcolm D., of Andover, Mass.; and nearly all the others by the subjects themselves. Nine of the portraits, those of Col. D. and wife, William D., of Middletown, Mrs. Benjamin D., Dr. Isaac D., the Rev. Dr. Malcolm D., Capt. Joel R. L. D., Henry F. D., and the author, were engraved at an expense of nearly one hundred dollars each, by Samuel Sartain, of Philadelphia, who has in them fully maintained his position at the head of the portrait engravers of the Union.

Those into whose hands this volume may fall will confer a favor by advising me of any errors or omissions which they may discover. If my life is spared, I intend at some future time, say in twenty or twenty-five years, to publish an enlarged and corrected edition of the history of my own family. It is not impossible that I may also publish a revised edition of the history of the New London family, in a separate volume. If not, all corrections and additions will be carefully preserved and deposited in some safe place for inspection and use should they ever be wanted by any future historian.

HISTORY OF THIS BOOK.

I distinctly remember hearing the church bells of my native village tolling one day, when not more than four or five years old, and when I enquired what they were tolling for, I was told that Stephen A. Douglas was dead. From this time I was interested in the name of Douglas, and my curiosity was excited to find out who Stephen A. Douglas was. I eagerly marked the occurrence of the name of Douglas in my reading book at school, and not unfrequently noticed it in the other books which fell into my hands. I learned that it belonged to the far away Scotland, and that it held an important place in the history of that country. I was particularly fascinated with an old, dog-eared copy of the Scottish Chiefs which I chanced to pick up, but which, before I had finished it, was taken away from me, because it was too exciting. Some time afterward a school-fellow loaned me another book of Scottish legends, called Saint Claire This I suspected would share the fate of of the Isles. the Scottish Chiefs; but by hiding it in my trunk, and watching my opportunity to read it unobserved, I managed to finish and return it without detection. 1 procured books upon Scottish history from the village library, and read considerable upon the subject. But I still had an ardent desire to finish the Scottish Chiefs, and see what became of Sir William Wallace and King Robert Bruce; and it was not many years before I became the owner of a copy of the coveted book. In this way I acquired a taste for history, and especially for the wild and romantic legends of Scotland, which has since been a source of much enjoyment.

But all this reading had been very desultory; and it was not till I was some sixteen or eighteen years old that I became really interested in tracing the history of my immediate ancestors. It was in the summer of 1874 that my father and myself paid a visit to his relatives in Voluntown, Conn., and Exeter, R. I.; and, strange as it may seem, when the amount of materials in the present volume is considered, I had then seen none of my father's relatives further back than his brothers and sisters, and knew absolutely nothing of the early history of my ancestors. My father, although very familiar with the family history from his grandfather down, could tell me nothing back of him; and it was with the purpose of visiting his only surviving uncle and aunts, and finding out who their grandfather was, that this journey was undertaken. It was fruitful in awakening a deeper interest in the subject, and disclosing the existence of hitherto unknown relatives. I began a systematic arrangement of the family; but my plan was very modest, and I neglected to note down more than the names in their proper order, and a few of the more important facts. I returned to school; but during the subsequent Christmas vacation 1 paid a visit to New London, Conn., where I knew there were persons of the name. Inexperienced in such matters as I was, I did not make the acquaintance of any of the Douglases of New London, but 1 did get much valuable information from the town records. The town clerk told me of an ancient burial ground in the city, and thither, in the afternoon, I posted. There was a heavy snow upon the ground, and the day was intensely cold, so that I nearly froze my face and ears while deciphering and copying some of the inscriptions from the grave stones. But I did not mind this, for I discovered that the Douglases had been settled in New London for a much longer time than I had suspected; and by that one day's work I was enabled to trace them back, in a somewhat imperfect way, for two hundred years.

But this was my last year in preparing for college, and I was able to devote but little time to investigation. During the summer of 1875, however, after I had passed the college examinations, we made a second trip into Connecticut, visiting this time all our relatives, far and near. I was enabled to add much to my little account, -all contained on a few pages of note paper, -and to make out tolerably complete lists of most of the families we visited. I now began to think I had a very good account of the family, and that, by a few more inquiries, it could be made quite complete. The more inquiries I made, however, the more incomplete my records appeared; and I had not written fifty letters before I came to the conclusion that if I intended to obtain the merest outline of a history of the Douglases of the United States, I must proceed in some more expeditious way than by writing letters. In April, 1876, I caused to be printed several hundred circulars. These were sent out to those of the name whose addresses were known, and large numbers of letters were received in reply. Still I found the work continually growing on my hands, and absorbing much more time and attention. Nearly every letter received in answer to the circulars referred to still other relatives and disclosed the existence of branches hitherto unknown. The records, as fast as they were received, were arranged in proper order, and the circulars were sent out as fast as new names were obtained. All the time which could possibly be spared from college and other duties was devoted to the work in hand; and the author had the satisfaction, after several months of constant correspondence, of seeing his records begin to assume form and propor-Two subsequent editions of the circular have tion. been exhausted, and the work of sending them out has been continued down to the present time. In addition to the circulars a great number of letters and postal cards have been written, the number of these sent and received during the last year alone being upward of two thousand. Ever since the author began seriously to

contemplate publishing a history of the Douglases in the United States the work has been prosecuted with all the vigor of which the circumstances would admit. From the beginning until the present time its plan and scope have been continually expanding, until it has assumed proportions of which the author himself had originally not the slightest suspicion. Indeed, had he foreseen that the work would require one-tenth the time and labor he has bestowed upon it, he would never have ventured to undertake it.

Such in brief, are the steps which have led to the publication of the present volume. What the results attained are, the book itself will best show. There may be those who think more time should have been given to the preparation of a work of this character. It is true the author has been engaged upon it but a comparatively short time,—a shorter time, indeed, than any similar work with which he is acquainted, has been completed in. But he trusts that he has made up for the shortness of the time by the zeal with which he has prosecuted the undertaking since he has been about it. For four years he has given a great deal of attention to investigating the early history of the Douglas families in this country, and collecting records of the numerous branches belonging to them, sometimes to the partial neglect of other duties and at the risk of impairing his own health by too close application. In many cases those from whom the most valuable information has been obtained have been aged people,-some over seventy years of age, a few over eighty, and one or two over ninety,—and this class, as a rule, have shown the greatest interest in the success of the family history. Among so large a number as are embraced in these records, the hand of Death comes all too frequently; some of these aged fathers and mothers in Israel have passed away within a brief period. For the sake of those who remain, and who may live to behold the completion of the work in which they have so great an interest and to whose success they have in no small degree

contributed, its publication should be delayed no longer than is necessary to attain a reasonable degree of completeness. Perfection in a work of this character is simply out of the question; and in a first edition absolutely impossible. Very many facts are gone beyond recovery, "buried with the years before the flood;" other facts can only be had by personal visitation, and perhaps not even then; and still others only by an examination of public and private records, and the headstones which mark the last resting place of our ancestors. All this has been largely done by the author and others who have taken especial interest in the work, and still there is much which is incomplete. Such as it is, however, the author now submits the book to those interested, conscious of its imperfections,-far more conscious of them than any who may casually examine its pages can be,—but feeling that he has conscientiously performed his self-imposed task, and that he will be abundantly repaid for his labor of love and duty if he shall have produced a memorial volume worthy the American representatives of the noble family of Douglas.

But I must not forget to return my most sincere thanks to all who have aided me in my protracted labor; and before all others I wish to acknowledge my great indebtedness to my father, Henry F. Douglas, of Providence, Since the very beginning of the work he has been R. I. a constant adviser and helper, and by his wise counsels has contributed very materially to its value. By his timely suggestions many inaccuracies of statement, into which a person of fewer years and less experience would be very likely to be led, have been avoided. In early life he was brought by his business into frequent intercourse with the older members of his family, now long since passed away, and having a decided taste for genealogical subjects, he made the most of his opportunities for obtaining items of family history. A remarkably good memory enabled him to retain almost all of what he heard, and at the time the present work was begun he had without doubt a much better knowledge of his

own family and those connected with it than any other person living. On this account, and knowing the advantage such knowledge would afford anyone in compiling a family history, I was the more willing to begin a work which I knew he had much at heart, but which the cares of an active business life afforded him no opportunity of undertaking himself. During the last few vears, however, he has devoted much time to the subject. For three successive summers we have travelled together through most of the towns of Eastern Connecticut, where the early representatives of the New England Douglases settled,—Plainfield, Sterling, Voluntown, Griswold, Preston, Lisbon, Thompson, Stonington, --visiting old people and out-of-the-way graveyards, examining and copying church, town and private records, and gleaning information wherever and whenever we might.

I would also acknowledge my indebtedness to the Hon. Benjamin Douglas, of Middletown, Conn., for information and other assistance. Gov. Douglas, with the true spirit of loyalty to family so characteristic of our Scottish ancestors, has taken a deep interest in the publication of this history, an undertaking which he has long had at heart, and upon which he made very considerable beginnings several years since. The results of his investigations were freely placed at my disposal, and have contributed much to the completeness of the early history of the family. I wish to thank him for the confidence he has shown in the present work by his generous subscription for fifteen copies which heads the subscription list, as well as by furnishing the five elegant engravings which are accredited to him in the preface. Two of these portraits, those of his grandfather, Col. William Douglas, and wife, Hannah Mansfield, Gov. Douglas has taken especial pains to have accurately engraved. The originals, from which the engravings were made, were painted from life by a French artist, in 1772, and Gov. Douglas was unwilling to allow them to go out of his possession, even for the length of time necessary to engrave them. He therefore prevailed upon Mr.

Sartain, although at a pressing season of the year, to come up from Philadelphia and make drawings from them at his own home in Middletown. By this means very satisfactory engravings were obtained, the likeness being much more accurately caught than is usually the case with such old paintings.

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FAMILY NAME AND COAT OF ARMS.

ORIGIN AND MEANING OF THE NAME.

Of the origin and primitive signification of the name Douglas, one of the most ancient and honored in the annals of Scotland, there is no account which is altogether satisfactory. Much attention has been bestowed upon the subject, but no theory has yet been advanced which can be relied upon as absolutely trustworthy. The theory which is commonly given, and which, on the whole, is open to the fewest objections, is thus stated at length by the historian Hume; but, as hereafter shown, it is rejected by some as purely fabulous:

"According then to the constant and general Tradition of Men, thus was their Original. During the Reign of Solvathius, King of Scotland, one Donald Bain (that is, Donald the white, or fair) having possest himself of all the Western Islands (called Ebudes or Hebrides) and instituting himself King thereof, aspired to set the Crown of Scotland also upon his Head. For effectuating whereof he gathered a great Army; wherein he confided so much, that he set Foot on the nearest Continent of Scotland, to wit, the Province of Kintyre and Lorne. The King's Lieutenants Duchal and Culen Governors of Athol and Argyle make Head against him with such Forces as they could assemble on the sudden. Donald trusting to the Number of his Men, did bid them Battle, and so prevailed at first, that he made the King's Army to give Ground, and had now almost gained the Day, and withal the Kingdom, that lay at Stake both in his own Conceit, and the Estimation of his Enemies. In the mean time a certain Nobleman disdaining to see so bad a Cause have so good Success, out of his Love to his Prince, and Desire of Honour, accompanied with his Sons and Followers, made an Onset upon these prevailing Rebels, with such Courage and Resolution, that he brought them to a Stand, and then heartning the discouraged Fliers, both by Word and Example, he turns the Chace, and, instead of Victory, they got a Defeat; for *Donald's* Men being

overthrown and fled, he himself was slain. This Fact was so much the more noted, as the Danger had been great, and the Victory unexpected. Therefore the King being desirous to know of his Lieutenants the Particulars of the Fight, and enquiring for the Author of so valiant an Act, the Nobleman being there in Person, Answer was made unto the King in the Irish Tongue (which was then only in use) Sholto Du glasse, that is to say, Behold yonder black-gray Man, pointing at him with the Finger, and designing by his Colour and Complexion, without more Ceremony or Addition of Titles of Honour. The King considering his Service and Merits in preserving his Crown, and delighted with that homely Designation rewarded him royally with many great Lands, and imposed upon himself the Name of Douglas, which hath continued with his Posterity until this Day. And from him the Shire and County, which he got, is called still Douglasdale, the River that watereth it, Douglas-River, the Castle which he built therein, Douglas-Castle."-History of the House and Race of Douglas and Angus, Vol. I, pp. 5-6.

According to another theory, the name was first applied to the Douglas water, on account of its dark gray color; but there is nothing to sustain this conjecture. Another tradition as to the origin of the *family* is referred to on a subsequent page.

In regard to the proper way of spelling the name, whether with one s or two, there has been much discussion, without, however, quite settling the point. There is something to be said on both sides of the question, and, as the ground has already been very thoroughly gone over by antiquarians, it is not probable that anything new will be discovered which will throw additional light on the subject. The argument from analogy in favor of Douglass, that is, that because glass, brass and similar words are spelled with a double s, this too should be spelled so, is unworthy the slightest consideration. As well reason that the word gas should be spelled gass. The truth is, that arguments from analogy, either in spelling or pronunciation, are utterly worthless, as anyone must be convinced who considers the spelling and pronunciation of the words cough, doff, rough, cuff, dough, mow, slough and plow, out of an almost endless list which might be given. The only guide to spelling in such a case is the probable derivation of the word and the form which centuries of use has generally sanc-

tioned and made familiar. But even this method of settling the question is not without its difficulties in the present case. Although Douglas is the spelling almost universally followed by the Scottish branches of the family, as far back as any records exist, in certain branches Douglass is sometimes found. Indeed in the family records of Bishop Douglas, of Dunkeld, (1474-1522) "all the earlier names are spelled with the double s," although the bishop himself, one of the most learned men of his time, used but one. Hume, the historian of the family, who always spells the name Douglas, derives it, in the extract given above, from du glasse, and might be charged with inconsistency for not spelling it Douglasse. In other writers who give the same tradition as Hume, however, the Gaelic word for dark is spelled glas. Now, considering the entire unfixedness of spelling only a few centuries back, it would seem that no certain decision can be based on an appeal to this source. As regards the present work, the author finds himself absolutely compelled to adopt throughout the book the usual spelling, with one s. Though himself preferring this method on every account, he would not venture to depart from the usage of particular families, were it not that even in the same family the method of spelling often varies so greatly that he despairs of being able to present it with any degree of accuracy. Members of the same family, father and son, and sometimes the same person himself, in different times and places, are found spelling the name in different ways, sometimes with one s, sometimes with two, so that in many cases it is simply impossible to ascertain who would wish to use the additional letter and who would not. After consultation, therefore, with friends representing both views, it has been deemed on the whole the wisest and best solution of this difficulty, to adopt a uniform method of spelling the name throughout the book. The author deems this explanation no more than just to those who, whether influenced by argument or by a revered parent's example, or through total indifference to the question, have retained the double s in their own usage.

EXPLANATION OF THE COAT OF ARMS.

The description of the Douglas Coat of Arms is, in heraldic terms, "Argent a man's heart Gules ensigned with an imperial crown proper; on a chief Azure three stars of the first." This, in ordinary language, would be: Upon a field of silver, a man's heart, red, beneath an imperial crown in its proper colors; above the dividing line, upon a blue ground, three stars of silver. This, which is finely represented in the frontispiece to this volume, is given in Burke's Heraldry as "the Paternal arms of the name of Douglas," and is, as Sir Walter Scott has expressed it, "the cognizance of Douglas blood" wherever found and with whatever other arms combined. In Great Britain the several branches of the Douglas family bear different crests and mottoes in addition to the Douglas Arms which are common to all the race. Thus some bear above the shield a winged heart, a hand grasping a broken spear, a wild boar, or other device; while there are several mottoes used, as "Lock Sicker," "Forward," "Audax," "Jamais Arriere," "Nunquam Postremus," "Never Behind," most of them having a meaning similar to the latter. In the cut here



given, the crest is a salamander in the midst of flames, and the motto, "Jamais Arriere" is the French for "Never Behind." The simple "paternal coat of the name of Douglas" has been selected as the frontispiece to this work, for the reason that it is not known to what particular branch or branches of the old Scottish Douglases the Ameri-


can representatives of the family belong.

The original arms of the Douglases were simply three silver stars on a blue field. The origin of this coat is unknown. It was thought several centuries ago that the Murrays were nearly related to the Douglases, from the fact that the arms of the former also contained the three stars; and this ancient conjecture contains all that is known about it. The origin and significance

of the crowned heart is better known. It was assumed by the family as a memorial of the fate of the Good Sir James of Douglas, who perished in Spain in 1330, while on a journey to the Holy Land with the heart of Robert Bruce. The dying king had bequeathed his heart to the Good Sir James, who had been his greatest captain, with the request that he would carry it to Jerusalem and there bury it before the High Altar. It is sometimes stated that Sir James died on his way to the Holy Land, and that he had the heart with him at the time in a silver box; but Hume, the historian of the family, distinctly states that the errand had been accomplished and that Sir James was on his way back to Scotland.

"He carried with him to Jerusalem the King's Heart embalmed and put into a Box of Gold, which he solemnly burried before the high Altar there; and this is the Reason why the Douglas bear the crowned Heart in their Arms ever since."—History of the Houses of Douglas and Angus, Vol. I, p. 94.

ANCIENT DOUGLAS FAMILY OF SCOTLAND.

ORIGIN AND EARLY HISTORY.*

Archaeology has failed in its efforts to pierce the obscurity which veils the origin of the heroic race of which it has been said:

"So many, so good as of Douglas blood have been, Of one surname, in one kingrick, never yet were seen."

A legend of the 16th or 17th century told how, about the year 770, a Scottish king, whose ranks had been broken by a fierce onset of a Lord of the Isles, saw the tide of battle suddenly turned by an unknown chief; how, when the victory was won, the monarch asked where was his deliverer; how the answer ran in Erse, Sholto Du-glas ('Behold that dark-gray man'); and how the warrior was rewarded with that Clydesdale valley which, taking from him its name of Douglas, gave surname to his descendants. This fable has long ceased to be believed. Equal discredit has fallen on the theory which, sixty years ago, the laborious Chalmers advanced in his Caledonia, that the Douglases sprang from a Fleming of the name of Theobald, who, between the years 1147 and 1164, had a grant of lands on the Douglas Water from the Abbot of Kelso. There is no trace of

any connection between the Flemish Theobald and the Douglases; nor were the lands which he acquired on one side of the stream any part of their domain on the other. What was boasted of the Douglases by their historian, two centuries ago, therefore still holds true: 'We do not know them in the fountain, but in the stream; not in the root, but in the stem; for we know not who was the first mean man that did by his virtue raise himself above the vulgar.' It was thought likely, in the beginning of the 15th century, that the Douglases and the Murrays had come of the same stock, and in this old conjecture all that is known on the subject must still be summed up.

William of Douglas, the first of the family who appears in record, was so called, doubtless, from the wild pastoral dale which he possessed. He is found witnessing charters by the king and the Bishop of Glasgow between 1175 and 1213. He was either the brother or the brother-in-law of Sir Freskin of Murray, and had six sons, of whom Archibald, or Erkenbald, was his heir; and Brice, a monk of Kelso, rose to be Prior of Lesmahogo (a dependency of Kelso, on the outskirts of Douglasdale), and in 1203 was preferred to the great bishopric of Murray. He owed this promotion, no doubt, to the influence of his kinsmen, the Murrays, and it contributed not a little to the rising fortunes of his own house. He was followed beyond the Spey by four brothers, of whom one became sheriff of Elgin; another became a canon of Murray; a third, who had been a monk of Kelso, seems to have become Archdeacon of Murray; and a fourth, who had been parson of Douglas, appears to have become Dean of Murray.

Sir Archibald, or Erkenbald, of Douglas, is a witness to charters between 1190 and 1232. He attained the rank of knighthood, and besides his inheritance of Douglas, held the lands of Hailes, on the Water of Leith, from the monks of Dunfermline, and had a grant of the lands of Levingston and Hirdmanston from the Earl of Fife. He is said to have acquired other lands in Clydesdale by his marriage with one of the two daughters and heiresses of Sir John of Crawford.

Sir William of Douglas, apparently the son of Sir Archibald, figures in record from 1240 to 1273. He appears in 1255 as one of the Scottish partisans of King Henry III. of England; and, in 1267, is found in possession of the manor of Fawdon, in Northumberland, by gift of the king's son (afterwards Edward I.) He seems to have had a brother, Sir Andrew, the progenitor of the Douglases of Dalkeith and Morton, and certainly had two sons.

Hugh of Douglas, the elder, acquired land in Glencorse, in Lothian, by marriage with the sister of Sir Hugh of Abernethy; and dying without issue, about 1287, was succeeded by his younger brother.

Sir William of Douglas, distinguished in the family traditions as William the Hardy, had all the daring and restless spirit which was characteristic of his descendants. His first appearance is in 1267, when his head was nearly severed from his shoulders in defending his father's English manor from a foray of the men of Redes-Twenty years later, he is found at the head of an dale. armed band, carrying off his future wife, a wealthy widow, Alionora of Lovaine, from the manor of her kinsfolks, the La Zouches, at Tranent, in Lothian. We hear of him immediately afterwards as spoiling the monks of Melrose, deforcing the king's officers in the execution of a judgment in favor of his mother, unlawfully imprisoning three men in his castle of Douglas, and beheading one of them. He was the first man of mark who joined Wallace in the rising against the English in 1297; and for this his lands of Douglas were wasted with fire and sword, and his wife and children carried off, by Robert Bruce, the young Earl of Carrick, then a partisan of England. But the Knight of Douglas soon left the insurgent banners, and submitting to his old patron, King Edward I., to whom he had again and again sworn fealty, was sent prisoner to the castle of York, where he died about 1302. It appears that he

possessed lands in one English, and in seven Scottish counties—Northumberland, Berwick, Edinburgh, Fife, Lanark, Ayr, Dumfries and Wigton.

The history of his son, the Good Sir James of Douglas, is familiar to every one, as Bruce's greatest captain in the long War of the Succession. The hero of seventy fights, he is said to have won them all but thirteen, leaving the name of 'the Black Douglas'—so he was called from his swarthy complexion—as a word of fear by which English mothers stilled their children. He was slain in Andalusia, in 1330, on his way to the Holy Land* with the heart of his royal master, and, dying unmarried, was succeeded by his brother.

Hugh of Douglas, of whom nothing is known except that he made over the now great domains of his family, in 1342, to his nephew, Sir William of Douglas, (son of a younger brother of the Good Sir James—Sir Archibald of Douglas, Regent of Scotland, slain at Halidon Hill in 1333).

EARLS OF DOUGLAS.

Hitherto the Douglases had no higher title than that of knight; but in 1357, Sir William of Douglas, who had fought at Poitiers, and distinguished himself in other fields, was made Earl of Douglas, and afterwards, by marriage, became Earl of Mar. His ambition aimed at still greater things, and in 1371 he disputed the succession to the Scottish crown with Robert II. (the first of the Stewarts). He claimed as a descendant of the Baliols and Cummings; and his pretensions were abandoned only on condition that his son should marry the king's daughter. He died in 1384. His son James, second Earl of Douglas and Mar, the conqueror of Hotspur, fell at Otterburn in 1388; and as he left no legitimate issue, the direct male line of William the Hardy and the Good Sir James now came to an end. His aunt had married for her second husband one of her

brother's esquires, James of Sandilands, and through her, Lord Torphichen is now the heir general and representative at common law of the House of Douglas.

The earldom of Douglas, meanwhile, was bestowed on an illegitimate son of the Good Sir James-Archibald, Lord of Galloway, surnamed the Grim. By his marriage with the heiress of Bothwell he added that fair barony to the Douglas domains; and having married his only daughter to the heir-apparent of the Scottish crown, and his eldest son to the eldest daughter of the Scottish king, he died in 1401. His son and successor, Archibald, fourth Earl of Douglas, was, from his many misfortunes in battle, surnamed 'The Tyneman,' i. e., the loser. At Homildon, in 1402, he was wounded in five places, lost an eye, and was taken prisoner by Hotspur. Next year, at Shrewsbury, he felled the English king to the earth, but was again wounded and taken prisoner. Repairing to France, he was there made Duke of Touraine, and fell at Verneuil in 1424. He was succeeded by his son Archibald, who distinguished himself in the French wars, and dying in 1439, was buried in the church of Douglas, where his tomb yet remains, inscribed with his high titles of 'Duke of Touraine, Earl of Douglas and Longueville, Lord of Galloway, Wigton and Annandale, Lieutenant of the King of Scots.' His son and successor, William, a boy of sixteen, is said to have kept a thousand horsemen in his train, to have created knights, and to have affected the pomp of parliament in his baronial courts. His power and foreign possessions made him an object of fear to the Scottish crown; and, having been decoyed into the castle of Edinburgh by the crafty and unscrupulous Crichton, he was, after a hasty trial, beheaded, along with his brother, within the walls of the castle in 1440. His French duchy and county died with him; his Scottish earldom was bestowed on his grand-uncle, (the second son of Archibald the Grim), James, surnamed the Gross, who, in 1437, had been made Earl of Avondale. He died in 1443, being succeeded by his son

William, who, by marriage with his kinswoman (the only daughter of Archibald, fifth Earl of Douglas, and second Duke of Touraine), again added the lordship of Galloway to the Douglas possessions. He was, for a time, all-powerful with King James II., who made him lieutenant-general of the realm; but afterwards losing the royal favour, he seems to have entered into a confederacy against the king, by whom he was killed in Stirling Castle, in 1452. Leaving no child, he was succeeded by his brother James, who, in 1454, made open war against King James II., as the murderer of his brother and kinsman (the sixth and eighth Earls of Douglas). The issue seemed doubtful for a time, but the Hamiltons and others being gained over to the king's side, Douglas fled to England. The struggle was still maintained by his brothers, Archibald, who by marriage had become Earl of Murray, and Hugh, who in 1445 had been made Earl of Ormond. They were defeated at Arkinholm, in May, 1455, Murray being slain on the field, and Ormond taken prisoner, and afterwards beheaded. Abercorn, Douglas, Strathaven, Thrieve, and other castles of the Douglases were dismantled; and the earldom of Douglas came to an end by forfeiture, after an existence of ninety-eight years, during which it had been held by no fewer than nine lords. The last earl lived many years in England, where he had a pension from the crown, and was made a knight of the Garter. In 1484, he leagued himself with the exiled Duke of Albany to invade Scotland. He was defeated and taken prisoner at Lochmaben, and, on being brought to the royal presence, is said to have turned his back upon the king. The compassionate James III. spared his life, on condition of his taking the cowl. 'He who may no better be, must be a monk,' muttered the old man, as he bowed to his fate. He died in the abbey of Lindores, in April, 1488; and so ended the elder illegitimate line of the Douglases.

EARLS OF ANGUS.

Meanwhile a younger illegitimate branch had been rising to great power. William, first Earl of Douglas, was the faithless husband of a faithless wife. She was believed to have had a paramour in Sir William Douglas of Liddesdale. Her jealous husband, who slew that 'flower of chivalry,' had himself shared the affections of the wife of his wife's brother, Margaret Stewart, Countess of Angus and Mar. The issue of this amour, which in that age was accounted incestuous, was a son George, who in 1389 had a grant of his mother's earldom of Angus; married, in 1397, the youngest daughter of King Robert III.; was taken prisoner at Homildon in 1402; and died of the plague in England in the following year. He was succeeded by his son William, who, dying in 1437, was succeeded by his son James, who died without issue, when the title reverted to his uncle. George, fourth Earl of Angus, took part with the king against the Douglases in 1454; his loyalty was rewarded by a grant of their old inheritance of Douglasdale; and so, in the phrase of the time, 'the Red Douglas'-such was the complexion of Angus-'put down the Black.' He died in 1462, being succeeded by his son Archibald, surnamed Bell-the-Cat, and sometimes also called the Great Earl. After filling the highest offices in the state, and adding largely to the family possessions, he retired to the priory of Canons Regular at Whithern, in Galloway, where he died in 1514. Having outlived his eldest son, he was succeeded by his grandson, Archibald, who in 1514 married the Queen-dowager of Scotland, Margaret, sister of Henry VIII. of England, and widow of James IV. of Scotland. The fruit of this marriage was a daughter, Margaret, who, marrying the Earl of Lennox, became the mother of Henry, Lord Darnley, the husband of Queen Mary, and father of King James VI. The Earl of Angus had for a time supreme power in Scotland, but, in 1528, the young

king, James V., escaped from his hands, and sentence of forfeiture was pronounced against Angus and his kins-The king swore that while he lived the Douglases men. should have no place in his kingdom; and he kept his vow. On his death in 1542, Angus returned to Scotland and was restored to his honours and possessions. He died at Tantallon in 1556. His nephew, who succeeded him, died two years afterwards, leaving an only son, Archibald, eighth Earl of Angus. This 'Good Earl,' as he was called, died in 1588, when his title devolved on his kinsman, William, the grandson of Sir William Douglas of Glenbervie, second son of Archibald Bell-the-Cat. Dying in 1591, he was succeeded by his son William, who next year obtained from the crown a special recognition of his high privileges as Earl of Angus, of taking the first place and giving the first vote in parliament, of leading the vanguard in battle, and of bearing the crown in parliament. He seems to have been a man of scholarly tastes, and is said to have written a history of the Douglases. Having turned Roman Catholic, he was forced to leave Scotland, and spent his latter years in exercises of devotion in Paris, where he died in 1611, being succeeded by his son.

MARQUISES AND DUKE OF DOUGLAS, AND LORDS DOUGLAS.

William, eleventh Earl of Angus, was created Marquis of Douglas in 1633, and dying in 1660, was succeeded by his grandson James, who died in 1700, leaving issue one son and one daughter. The son, Archibald, third Marquis of Douglas, was created Duke of Douglas in 1703, and died childless in 1761, when his dukedom became extinct, and his marquisate devolved on the Duke of Hamilton, as descended in the male line from William Earl of Selkirk, third son of the first Marquis of Douglas. His grace's sister, Lady Jane Douglas, born in 1698, and married in 1746 to Sir John Stewart of Grandtully, was said to have given birth at Paris to twin sons in 1748. One of them died in 1753; the

other, in 1761, was served heir of entail and provision general to the Duke of Douglas. An attempt was made to reduce his service, on the ground that he was not the child of Lady Jane Douglas; but the House of Lords, in 1771, gave final judgment in his favour. He was made a British peer in 1790, by the title of Baron Douglas of Douglas Castle, which became extinct on the death of his son James, fourth Lord Douglas, in 1857, when the Douglas estates devolved on his niece, the Countess of Home. The title of Earl of Angus was claimed in 1762, as well by the Duke of Hamilton as by Archibald Stewart, afterwards Lord Douglas; but neither urged his claim to a decision, and the claim is still in abeyance. The right attached to it of bearing the crown of Scotland, was debated before the Privy Council in 1823, when it was ruled that Lord Douglas's claim to that honour, being a claim of heritable right, fell to be decided in a court of law. * * * ×-

EARLS OF MORTON.

Sir Andrew of Douglas, who appears in record in 1248, was apparently a younger son of Sir Archibald, or Erkenbald, of Douglas, the second chief of the house. He was the father of William of Douglas, who, in 1296, swore fealty to King Edward I. for his lands in West Lothian, and who was probably the father of Sir James of Douglas,-surnamed of Lothian, to distinguish him from his kinsman of Clydesdale-who, in 1315, had a grant from Bruce of the lands of Kincavil and Calderclere. He died about 1320, being succeeded by his son, Sir William of Douglas of Liddesdale, who acquired the lordship of Dalkeith (by resignation of the Grahames), the barony of Aberdour in Fife, lands in Tweeddale, and great territories in Liddesdale, Eskdale, and Ewesdale which had been forfeited by the Soulises and Lovels. In 1335 he had a grant of the earldom of Athol, but resigned it in 1342. The Knight of Liddes-

dale-as he was called by his contemporaries, who regarded him as 'the flower of chivalry '-was assassinated in 1353 by his kinsman, William first Earl of Douglas, partly to revenge his wife's dishonour, partly to revenge the death of Sir David Barclay, who had been assassinated at the instance of the Knight of Liddesdale, in revenge for the daughter of his brother John. Dying childless, he was succeeded by his nephew, Sir James of Douglas of Dalkeith. This great chief, who died in 1420, saw Froissart sit as a guest at his board; himself possessed of books of law, grammar, logic and romance; and enjoined in his will that all the volumes which he had borrowed from his friends should be returned to them. His alliances were as princely as his life. His first wife was a daughter of 'Black Agnes,' the heroic Countess of Dunbar; his second was a sister of King Robert II.: and he matched his eldest son, Sir James of Douglas of Dalkeith, with a daughter of King Robert III. Their grandson married a daughter of King James I., and in 1458 was created Earl of Morton. His grandson, the third earl, dying without male issue in 1553, the earldom devolved on his daughter's husband, the Regent Morton—James Douglas, great-grandson of Archibald Bell-the-Cat. After his fall, the title went to Archibald eighth Earl of Angus; and when he died childless in 1558, it passed to the lineal male descendant of Sir Henry of Douglas (the son of Sir John of Douglas, the brother of the Knight of Liddesdale). Sir William Douglas of Lochleven, who thus became seventh Earl of Morton. His losses in the great civil war compelled him, in 1642, to sell Dalkeith to the Earl of Buccleuch. and his Tweeddale and Eskdale lands to others; but Aberdour and other old domains of the family still remain with his successor, the Earl of Morton, who, there is every reason to believe, descends legitimately in the male line from William of Douglas, the great progenitor of the race in the 12th century.

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EARLS, MARQUISES AND DUKES OF QUEENSBERRY, EARLS OF MARCH AND EARLS OF SOLWAY.

James, second Earl of Douglas and Mar—the hero of Otterburn—had an illegitimate son, Sir William of Douglas of Drumlanrig, whose descendants were created Viscounts of Drumlanrig in 1628, Earls of Queensberry in 1682, Dukes of Queensberry in 1684, Earls of March in 1697, and Earls of Solway in 1706. On the death of the fourth Duke of Queensberry in 1810, that title, with the barony of Drumlanrig and other lands, went to the Duke of Buccleuch; the title of Marquis of Queensberry, with the baronies of Tinwald, Torthorwald, etc., went to the heir-male of the family, Sir Charles Douglas of Kelhead, and the title of Earl of March, with the barony of Neidpath, went to the Earl of Wymyss. The title of Earl of Solway had become extinct in 1778.

EARLS OF SELKIRK, FORFAR AND DUMBARTON; VISCOUNT BELHAVEN, AND LORDS MORDINGTON.

In 1646, the third son of the first Marquis of Douglas was created Earl of Selkirk. In 1651, the oldest son of the same marquis was created Earl of Ormond, and in 1661, Earl of Forfar. In 1675, the fourth son of the same marquis was created Earl of Dumbarton. In 1641, the second son of the tenth Earl of Angus was created Lord Mordington. In 1633, Sir Robert Douglas of Spot, a descendant of the Morton family, was created Viscount of Belhaven. Of all these titles, that of the Earl of Selkirk is the only one not now dormant or extinct.

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WORKS RELATING TO THE FAMILY.

A History of the Houses of Douglas and Angus, by David Hume of Godscroft, was published at Edinburgh in 1644, in 1 vol. fol., and reprinted in 1748 in 2 vols. 8vo. It preserves the traditions of the family, and has some literary merit, but its accuracy is not to be trusted. The earlier history of the Douglases has been critically examined by the late George Chalmers in his *Caledonia*, vol. i, pp. 579–584 (Lond, 1807); by Mr. Riddell in his Remarks upon Scotch Peerage Law, pp. 174-178 (Edin. 1833); by Mr. Cosmo Innes, in the Registrum Episcopatus Moraviensis, pp. xliv.-xlvii. (Edin. 1837); and the Liber S. Marie de Calchou, vol. i. pp. xxvii., xxviii. (Edin. 1846); and by Mr. Joseph Robertson in the Origines Parochiale Scotice, vol. i. pp. 152–160 (Edin. 1851). The descent of the Houses of Angus and Dalkeith was first ascertained by Mr. Riddell in his *Remarks* upon Scotch Peerage Law, pp. 154–164 (Edin. 1833); and in his Stewartiana, pp. 82–84, 137–142. The charters and correspondence of the Morton family have been edited for the Bannatyne Club by Mr. Cosmo Innes in the Registrum Honoris de Morton (Edin. 1853, 2 vols. 4to).

In America nothing relating to the history of the Douglases has hitherto been published, excepting the fragments contained in Savage's Genealogical Dictionary of New England, and papers from the pens of Mr. Joshua L. Douglas, of Bath, Me., and the author of the present work, scattered through various numbers of the *New-England Historical and Genealogical Register*. Mr. Douglas, of Bath, is now at work upon a genealogy of his own family, descendants of John Douglas, of Boston, *circ.* 1717, which he intends publishing at an early day. This family, which settled largely in Maine, is not included in the present work.

INTRODUCTION.

The "New London family" has seemed the most fitting designation for this great branch of the Douglases in America; for, although its members are, at the present time, scattered over all lands, and although Dea. William Douglas, the original emigrant, first settled at Gloucester, yet he soon removed to New London with all his family, was one of the first settlers in the town, always took an important part in its affairs, and became the head of one of the most worthy families in the colony; no inconsiderable number of his descendants have always settled there, and to this day they form a large proportion of the inhabitants. New London has in all times since its settlement been the *home* of the family; and from it they have scattered and gone forth, until the descendants of Dea. William Douglas are now found in every state in the Union, in the British provinces, in South America and in many of the countries of the Old World. It was here that the good old deacon passed the noontide and evening of his life; it was here that his children's children were born, lived and died; it was here that many of his descendants hazarded their lives and property for their country, both on land and water; and it is here that the ashes of ancestors and descendants, undisturbed by all the changes which have passed over them during two hundred years, now

rest in the old burying ground on the hill, awaiting the last day.

The New London family is the oldest and by far the largest of any included in the present work. It is hardly necessary to add that it yields to none of the others in wealth, influence and honor. It would be impossible to give a complete record of all its distinguished members, for the tracing of descendants through all the various changes of names which are introduced into the family by marriages is extremely difficult; and to obtain all the descendants of a progenitor who lived more than two centuries ago would be next to an utter impossibility. The mantle of the worthy deacon seems to have descended to successive generations, and the influence of his character may be seen to-day in the sobriety, thrift and morality which distinguish his descendants. For four consecutive generations was the office of deacon handed down from father to son; and it is said there always has been and always will be a Dea. William Douglas in the family. The precepts of the first Deacon William were treasured by his children, and bore lasting fruit in the christian character which has marked the progress of the family to the present time. It is but just for the author to say that he has never heard of one of the family being punished for any crime, and that the only case of imprisonment by the authorities which has come to his notice was for presuming to worship God according to personal convictions.

No pains have been spared to ascertain correctly the early history of the New London family, and especially to find the direct connection of the emigrant ancestor with the old stock of Douglases in Scotland. In what manner these investigations have been prosecuted and what results have been obtained, the following will show. It is comparatively easy, where town records have been preserved, to trace the ancestral line back to about the time of the emigrant's arrival in this country; but here, in nearly every case, the line abruptly ends.

All further trace is as completely obliterated as the wake of the good ship which crossed the Atlantic with its precious freight so long ago; and to attempt, without any clue, to fix upon the locality in the Old World from which the ancestor came is like "hunting for a needle in a hay-mow." Such was the case in tracing back the New London family. No shadow of a clue could be found previous to 1640, when William Douglas appears to have been living in Gloucester, Mass. But in the course of the author's investigations in the summer of 1876, among the old records of New London, Conn., whither William subsequently removed, he discovered a deposition before Gov. Bellingham, in Boston, by Ann Douglas, wife of William Douglas, which showed that she, at least, came from Ringstead, Northamptonshire, England. Feeling certain that the right clue had now been discovered, he wrote at once, June 8, 1876, to the Rector of Ringstead parish, asking that the parish and other records might be searched for any trace of William Douglas and his family. No answer was ever received to this letter, and probably it never reached its destination. After waiting some six months in vain, the author wrote a second letter, to his friend, William P. W. Phillimore, B. A., at Snenton, Nottinghamshire, giving all the particulars he was able, and directing him to make researches in whatever way he might think best. An answer was received in less than three weeks. which was as follows:

HILL HOUSE, SNENTON, NOTTINGHAM,

19 January, 1877.

To Charles H. J. Douglas.

DEAR SIR:—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 28th ult.

I wrote immediately to the Vicar of Denford eum Ringstead, whose reply I enclose.

I find there are two or three other Ringsteads. Your former letter might have miscarried to Ringstead in Norfolk, which would account for your not receiving an answer.

It seems probable from the reply that William Douglas and his family did not reside at Ringstead, and that he married his

wife at his own parish church. This occasionally happened, I find.

I put the questions explicitly to Mr. Sandford. They were baptisms of William Douglas and two elder children and his marriage. The clue might be found possibly by making searches in the various parishes named Ringstead, or by searching the wills at Somerset House, London, and at the Diocesan Probate Court.

There are, I believe, professional pedigree hunters in London, but I should not like to recommend anyone to employ them.

If I can assist you in any way I shall be glad to do so.

The note referred to, from the Rev. Edward Sandford, is as follows:

DENFORD VICARAGE, THRAPSTON,

I have searched in the Register of the parish, but have found no entries therein of any of the persons referred to in your letter to me of the 11th instant.

This seemed conclusive, and no further search in that direction was then made. But, reluctant to give the matter up, after nearly a year had elapsed, the author determined to make one more effort. He wrote directly to Mr. Sandford in January, 1878, directing him to have all the parish or other records in his possession, or which he thought might contain anything relating to the families of either the Douglases or Mattles, subjected to the most thorough examination, in order to ascertain with absolute certainty whether they contained any entries relating to these families. The records were examined with the greatest care by two persons, and the results are contained in Mr. Sandford's letter;

DENFORD VICARAGE, THRAPSTON, NORTHAMPTONSHIRE, February 18, 1878.

DEAR SIR:—In compliance with the request contained in your letter of January 16, I have examined the Ringstead Parochial Registers for more than 15 years previous to 1670 for the deaths of Thomas and Robert Mattle, also for birth of Robert or Ann or other Mattles from 1595 to 1615, also for the marriage of William Douglas and Ann Mattle, and the baptisms of Ann and Robert, their children.

Seeing that you expressed yourself most anxious that the Registers should be searched with the utmost care and accuracy, I have not only made the search myself, but also entrusted the books to another party for a further and full investigation, but all we can find is, in 1595,

"Robert Motles sonne of Thomas was baptized the fifth of October, in the yeare above wrighten."

Also in 1599,

"William Motley sonne of Thomas Motley was baptd. twenty 6th of Aprill."

This is all the information we can find in reference to any of the persons to whom your enquiries refer.

We can find no entry as to the marriage of William Douglas or the births of his children.

It will be seen from the above correspondence that this source of information, the only one which seemed in any way likely to throw the least light on the subject, has now been exhausted; and, although the results obtained are not all which might be desired, the author feels satisfied, because he has done all in his power, and because the information, meagre though it be, is more than has usually been obtained in such cases. It is very rarely that a family which has been in America much over a hundred years, can, even after the most laborious investigation, fix upon the locality in the Old World from which the original emigrant came, with even a high degree of probability. "Seldom or never," says

William Courthorpe, Somerset Registrar of the College . of Arms, London, "can we connect the families of emigrants to America at that early period [1645] with their relatives in England; they were probably designedly left out of the English pedigree, and unless they carried with them to their adopted country a clue to their English ancestry it was soon lost altogether." The same might be said in regard to families which emigrated from Scotland, Ireland, France and other countries. William Douglas came with his family to New England, in all probability, in 1640, and it is unusually fortunate that the previous home of his wife, and perhaps of himself also, has been ascertained with absolute certainty. What has been learned, then, concerning the family of William Douglas previous to his arrival in New England in 1640, and concerning him and his descendants since that date may be thus stated.

FIRST GENERATION.

1.

DEA. WILLIAM¹ DOUGLAS, was born in the year 1610, without doubt in Scotland, though in what part of Scotland there is no means of knowing. Had he been born in England, and been acquainted with his wife from childhood, there would doubtless have been · some mention of the Douglases on the parish records of Ringstead, the home of his wife and her family, the Mattles. His father, whose name there is reason to believe was Robert Douglas, was born not far from 1588, and beyond this point no effort has been able to penetrate, in this line. How and where William Douglas became acquainted with his wife, Ann Mattle, is unknown; but their marriage must have taken place at *his* parish church, probably in 1636, when they were, each of them, 26 years old, as their daughter Ann was born in 1637.

Ann Mattle was the only daughter of Thomas Mattle, of Ringstead,* Northamptonshire, England, where she was born in 1610, the year of her husband's birth. She had two brothers, both older than she, Robert, born in Ringstead, Oct. 5, 1595, and William, baptized at the parish church, April 6, 1599. Of these, William appears to have died young, no mention being made of him when the family estate was inherited by Ann; and Robert, the eldest of the children, was unmarried or without descendants at the time of his death, for Ann was the "next heare." Robert and the father, Thomas, both died previous to 1670, the latter probably many years before, and their property fell to Ann. It thus appears that Ann's descendants are the only descendants of Thomas Mattle, who, judging by the birth of his son Robert, was born as early as 1575, more than three hundred years ago.

William Douglas emigrated to New England with his wife and two children, Ann and Robert, in 1640, though the exact time of their arrival and the name of the ship which brought them are unknown. The very common tradition is that the company landed at Cape Ann.[†] William settled at Gloucester, [‡] near by, but removed to Boston that same year. The first mention of him on the Boston records is under date of "The 31st of the 6th moneth, 1640," [Aug. 31, 1640].[§] "William Douglas is allowed to be a townesman, he behaving himselfe as becometh a Christian man." He did not, however, remain in Boston,

but removed the next year to Ipswich, where he was entitled to a share of the public land, Feb. 28, 1641.* He remained at Ipswich some four years, returning to Boston in 1645.

He followed the cooper's trade in Boston, and May 1, 1646, purchased of Walter Merry and Thomas Anchor, "one dwelling house in Boston, situate betweene the lotts of John Sweete and John Seabury, to-gether with the shopp which was Thomas Anchors and the ground thereunto belonging;"† also, March 12, 1647, of Walter Merry, "one little house with the ouse late in the tenure and occupation of John Newgrove, adjoining to the former house and ground."†

June 20, 1648, he sold "unto Henry Browne of Limehouse, mariner, a parcell of land, part of his houselott in Boston, containing fifty six perches, three quarters, of land, be the same more or lesse; being in front at the sea thirty one foote, and in fronte toward the streete fyve rod, three foote, or thereabouts." In December, 1659, he purchased of William Hough, of New London, Conn., "the house that was Robert Isbell's in New street." Soon after, in 1660, he removed with his wife and three of his children, Robert, Sarah and William, to New London. That same year he purchased "a house on the so, side of meeting-house hill." A tract of land "by the waterside, on the bank so. of Mr. Raymond's" was also granted him by the town. He had besides. two farms, both granted him in remuneration of services to the town; the first, in 1660, consisting of 60 acres, and described as being "three miles or more west of the town plot, with a brook running through it." This farm was inherited by his second son, William, and has remained in the family, in the direct line of his male descendants, for over two centuries. Miss Caulkins, the historian, speaking of the house in 1865 says: "The

house is very ancient, and a part of it, which has heavy timbers overhead and is propped with rude posts in the area, probably belongs to the first dwelling built upon the spot, which was before 1670."

In the winter of 1662-3, William Douglas and Cary Latham were appointed appraisers of property for the town of New London. They duly made their appraisal, which was delivered to the General Court at Hartford. But, for some reason, the court was not satisfied with the result, and

> "At a Genⁿ Assembly held at Hartford, March 11, 1682.

"This Court having duly considered the valuation of ye estate of N: London, apprized by Cary Latham and William Douglas, doe judge, that they have not attended any rule of Righteousness in their worke, but have acted very corruptly therein, and therefore doe order the Treasurer that he send forth his Warrant to y^e Constable of N: London, to Levy Four pounds vpon y^e estate of Cary Latham, and Two pounds vpon Mr. Douglas his estate, as a fine for their corrupt and deceatful acting therein."*

At this proceeding, which was altogether too severe, the town was indignant; and, at a Town Meeting held March 31, it was resolved that,

"Whereas Cary Latham and M^r Douglas are by the Court fined for not fully presenting the town list anno 1662, the town see cause to petition the court as a grievance, not finding wherein they have failed, except in some few houses." +

The remonstrance had the desired effect, and

"At a Genⁿ Assembly of Electors held at Hartford, May 14, 1663.

"This Court remits Cary Latham and Mr. Douglas fine, weh was imposed upon them by the Court in March, for there transgressions in making their list." ‡

In 1665, the church at New London began to feel some uneasiness in regard to their minister's views. In 1661, the Rev. Gershom Bulkeley (so written by himself)

had succeeded the Rev. Richard Blinman as preacher. When he came, he entered into a covenant, as Miss Caulkins says, "to become minister of the town on a salary of £80 for three years, and afterwards more, if the people found themselves able to give it." Feb. 25, 1664-5, their uneasiness had increased, but the town voted that "they were willing to leave Mr. Bulkley to the libertye of his conscience without compelling him or enforcing him to anything in the execution of his place and office contrarye to his light according to the laws of the commonwealth."

June 10, 1665.—" The Towne understanding Mr. Buckleys intention to goe into the Bay have sent James Morgan and M[†] Douglas to desire him to stay untill seacond day com seaventnight wich day the Towne have agreed to ask againe M[†] Fitch to speake with him in order to know M[†] Buckleys mynde fullye whether he will continue with us or no to preach the gospell."

The application was unsuccessful; and Oct. 9, another town meeting was held, in which " M^r Douglas by a full voate none manifesting themselves to the contrary was chosen to goe to M^r Wilson and M^r Eliott to desire there advise and help for the procurinage of a minister." Nov. 24,—" a town meeting concerning what M^r Douglas hath done about a minister" was held, and they decided to extend a call to the Rev. Simon Bradstreet, of Boston. In consideration of his journey to Boston for a minister, twenty acres were added by the town to Mr. Douglas's farm.

Mr. Bulkeley now stood in debt to the town for his year's salary, paid in advance; and Jan. 12, 1666, "Mr Douglas and goodman Hough are voted by ye Towne to demand the 80 pound of M^r Buckley which he stands ingaged to pay to ye towne." It was not, however, till after repeated dunning, and Mr. Bulkeley had mortgaged his house, that he paid back his salary.

Mr. Bradstreet arrived early in the year, and the town purchased of Mr. Douglas, a house and lot for the new minister, until they should build a parsonage. June 1, it was "Voted by the towne that the house now agreed

upon to be built for the ministry and also the house and land bought of M^r Douglas together with ye land which hath hitherto been reserved for the ministry both to us and our succeeding generations never to be sold or alienated to any vse forever." To this day the land is occupied by the old first burial ground of New London, and there repose the ashes of the good old deacon.

He was always active in the church economy. There appears upon the records under date of Aug. 15, 1667, while he was town clerk :—"Myselfe chosen to hold the box for contributions and this to be propounded to M^r Bradstreet to have his advise therein. William Nichols is also chosen for that worke." Mr. Douglas was chosen one of the first two deacons of the church in 1670.

Dec. 9, 1667, another farm of one hundred acres was granted him "towards the head of the brook Jordan about four miles from town," on the northeast side of the swamp called "Cranberry Meadow." Across the farm ran the Indian path from Mohegan to Nayhantic. It was inherited by his oldest son, Robert, and this, too, is still in possession of the family in the direct line of male descendants.

At the breaking out of King Phillip's war in 1675, the colonists took active measures for their safety. A General Council was convened at Hartford. At a meeting of this council, May 19, 1676,—

"This Councill doe appoynt and fully impower M^r Daniel Witherell and M^r William Douglas of New London to be Commissarys to the army at that place or elcewhere as they shall be appointed, to see to the provisions, arms, ammunition and other such things as shall be needfull for the warr, and to provide what shall be wanting and dispose of such things as are committed to them or either of them, according to such orders as shall be given them, and the duty of that place in all respects: and what either of them shall doe in attendance of that duty shall be held as good, whether it be for impressing or quartering or any other thing within the compass of that office; and they are to keep true accompts of all their transactions, and to render their accompts, or any estate of the country's in their custody, to such as shall be impowered to require and receive the same."

June 21,—² The Councill ordered that M^r Willerby and M^r Dowglass send to Norwich to be deliuerede to Commissary Tracey

seven hundred of bread, a barrell of porck, ten bushells of pease and fifty bush: of Indian corn, and the powder and bullits in their hands and fifty pounds of tobaccoe; and in case Capt. Denison send for any Indian corn, what he sends for is to be abatted out of the fifty bushells of corn they are to send to Norwich, all of which is to be at Norwich Munday night next."

As may be seen from the foregoing and from the frequent mention of his name on the records of the town, Dea. Douglas was one of the most prominent members of the flourishing community of New London. His education, for those times, was liberal. He was consulted on all occasions of embarrassment or danger, and manifested a lively interest in the welfare of his town. He was one of the townsmen in 1663, 1666 and 1667, recorder and moderator in 1667 and 1668, sealer and packer in 1673 and 1674, and on various important committees from year to year. He was chosen deputy to the General Court at Hartford in 1672, and once or twice later. He continued to take an active part in the affairs of the church and town till the time of his death. The Rev. Simon Bradstreet, in his diary, which is still preserved,* says :---

"1682 July 26, M^r William Douglas one of y^e Deacons of this Church dyed in y^e 72 year of his age. He was an able christian & this poor chh will mych want him."

In May, 1670, Mrs. Douglas made a journey to Boston and appeared before Gov. Bellingham in order to establish her claim to an inheritance which had fallen to her in the old country.[†] James Johnson and the widow Elizabeth Meares, then of Boston, but formerly of Little Broughton, Northamptonshire, testified that they had known her and her family in England, and that she was the daughter of Thomas, and sister of Robert Mattle, of Ringstead. But father and brother were now dead, and

Ann was proved to be legal heir to both. She was at this time 60 years of age, and was, consequently, born in 1610. She must have been possessed of great energy and endurance, to have performed, at her advanced age, the journey from New London to Boston and back, when the conveniences for traveling were extremely limited. Mrs. Douglas died at New London about 1685. They had but five children as far as known.

ROBERT² DOUGLAS (William¹), born in Scotland* in 1639. He was a year old when his parents came to Massachusetts, and twenty-one when he removed with them to New London, Conn., in 1660. Lands were set off to him in New London, April 16, 1663. He also inherited from his father, in 1682, a house and lands in New street, which he sold in 1700, to his son William. That same year he gave William two house-lots in New street, on opposite sides of the town street; and also a dwelling-house (on the corner of Douglas street) on condition of his providing in the house a home for Robert's unmarried daughters, whenever they should wish to occupy it. In 1704, he gave William a deed of the farm of one hundred acres, granted by the town to his father, and which he had inherited from him in 1682, together with fifteen acres since added.

Robert was a cooper—a trade which his father had taught him, and which he in turn taught his son William. His name occurs frequently on both church and town records. From 1671, he appears to have taken much interest in the affairs of the church; and he served on important town committees, from time to time. He died Jan. 15, 1715-6.

He married, Sept. 28, 1665, Mary, daughter of Robert Hempstead, of New London. She was the first child of English parents born in the town. Her father was one of the four inhabitants who assisted Winthrop in settling the place. The old Hempstead house is still standing in good repair, and, having been entailed, is in the possession of the Hempstead family. Mrs. Douglas died Dec. 26, 1711. Children, all born in New London:—

DEA. WILLIAM² DOUGLAS (*William*¹), born in Boston, Mass., April 1, 1645; baptized March 8, 1646. He came to New London, Conn., with his parents, in 1660. Lands were set off to him in Voluntown, March 29, 1706, which he afterward sold to his son William³, of Plainfield. He also inherited the farm of sixty acres in New London, which the town had granted his father in 1660. This farm he gave to his grandson, William⁴, son of Richard³, on condition of William's⁴ living with him and taking care of him till death.

He and his wife, Abiah, were received into the church in 1670. The church records also give the dates of admission of his three sons :—

"July 24, 1689, W. Douglas-oldest son of Deac. Douglas.

"July 20, 1705, Richard Douglas Son of Deacon.

"March 6, 1709, Samuel Douglas ye son of ye Deacon."

After the death of his father, in 1682, he was chosen deacon, an office which he held for upward of fifty ' years, until his death. In the ancient burial ground in New London may still be seen a moss-covered tablet, carved with curious figures and crumbling with age, bearing the inscription—

Here Lyeth ye Body of Deacon William Douglas who died Mar ye 9th 1724-5, Aged 80 years.

Deacon Douglas was twice married. His first wife, whom he married Dec. 18, 1667, was Abiah, daughter of William Hough, of New London, and granddaughter of Edward Hough, of Westchester, Cheshire, England. She was born Sept. 15, 1648; and died Feb. 21, 1715. William married, second, in July, 1715, the widow

DEA. WILLIAM³ DOUGLAS (*William*², *William*¹), born in New London, Conn., Feb. 19, 1672-3. He was admitted to the church, July 24, 1698. The next year he removed with his wife and two children to "the new plantation on the Quinnebaug, which was afterwards named Plainfield." Here lands were set off to him "on the east side of the river." He also owned lands in

Voluntown, which he purchased of his father, Aug. 18, 1715, for "thirteen pounds of good and current money."

He was one of the little company that covenanted together and formed a church in Plainfield, in 1705. The Rev. Joseph Coit was called to the charge of this little flock, and William Douglas was chosen the first deacon. In the old burial ground at Plainfield, an ancient gravestone bears this inscription :—

"In memory of M^{*} William Douglas, Who was ye first Deaton of ye chu^h of Christ in Plainfield who Departed this Life August y^e 10th A. D. 1719 in y^e 46th year of his Age."

Deacon Douglas died in the prime of life, and greatly lamented. All the church and town records, and all but a few files of the probate records, of Plainfield, were consumed at the burning of the town by Arnold, in 1781. Among the probate records saved, was the will of Dea. William Douglas. It was dated July 6, 1717, and proved Sept. 25, 1717. In it he provides for his wife, Sarah, and eleven children, all of the latter under twenty-one years of age. His wife was Sarah Proctor, but no date of his marriage can be found in the New London records. His eldest two children were born in New London, all the others in Plainfield. His widow, Sarah, was living in 1729, but no record of her death has been found. Children:—

CAPT. RICHARD³ DOUGLAS (William², William¹), born in New London, Conn., July 19, 1682. He married, Dec. 7, 1704, Margaret Abell, of New London. In "1713, Capt. Richard Douglas bought of Samuel Spooner of Norwich, a house-lot on Bank street, which his father, Stephen Spooner, bought of John Packer, for £80." "June 14, 1716, Richard Douglas raised his house, which was on the east side of the town street, next to David Gardiner's."*

Richard was a sea-captain and accumulated a very comfortable competence by his industry. He was occasionally chosen surveyor of highways by the town. Hempstead says he "fell dead as he was steering a scow up to Mr. Richards's wharf," Feb. 26, 1734-5. The inventory of his estate was £2,868, but it was not divided till 1751. Margaret, his wife, died April 18, 1752. Children, born in New London:-

CAPT. JOHN⁴ DOUGLAS (*Thomas*³, *Robert*², *William*⁴), born in New London, Conn., April 8, 1724; married, May 11, 1746, Esther, daughter of Clement Leach, of New London. They at first lived in the village, but in 1760 removed to the Douglas farm on the Colchester road, four miles west of the town plot. They are said to have been "pious and respectable people." Their children were remarkable for their tallness, nearly all of them being six feet or more in height. The following

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particulars are taken from a MS. account of the family written in 1805 by one of Capt. John's children, Daniel Douglas, then in his 38th year.

"John's father dying when he was a youth, he was apprenticed to Esquire Lee to learn blacksmithing in his native town. His boss dying, he was again bound to Samuel Chipman, of Groton, who had been a fellow-apprentice, and went to Salsbury, a frontier town, but soon after removed to New London. He there married Esther, oldest daughter of Clement Leach. She was born at New London in 1727. He sold the inherited property to his brother Robert, built a house and shop, and carried on blacksmithing on a large scale. He lived here till about 1758, when he sold, and bought a farm adjoining that of his brother Robert. He farmed and blacksmithed and kept a tavern many years. He commanded a company of militia. He was often employed to decide differences; was clerk in the church, and lined the hymns, as the custom was. He died here on the 13th of December, 1777. His widow moved with her son David, in 1803, to Whitestown, N. Y., where she died, Nov. 6, 1803, aged 76 years."

He was a very energetic member of the order, which had taken its name on account of its separation from the orthodox church.^{*} He was arrested in 1744 for unlawfully exhorting and breaking the peace, and imprisoned in Windham county jail. On giving bonds to Justice Dyer that he would "carry good behavior toward all His Majesty's subjects, especially in Canterbury meeting house on Sabbath day," he was released. He was again sentenced, July 9, 1747, by the town of

Windham, for resisting an arrest for exhorting, and imprisoned in Windham county jail, where he was kept at hard labor for many months. JAMES⁴ DOUGLAS (*William*³, *William*², *William*⁴), born in Plainfield, Conn., May 20, 1711. His father was a farmer, and brought up his large family of boys to follow the same occupation. James and his brothers worked on the farm in summer, but were sent to school during the winter months. Possessed of an active mind, he made such use of these opportunities as to gain a thorough common school education.

In 1738 he purchased, in the town of Cornwall, fifty acres on what was known as Crean hill—so named from the fertility of the soil. He also purchased that year, for $\pounds 400$, two rights of Timothy Pierce, an original proprietor of the town. In 1739 he removed, with his family, to their new purchase. They were among the first settlers in the town. A small and hastily built house was soon completed, and James at once commenced to clear his land and prepare it for cultivation.

In 1748, ten years after he had purchased the land, he built a large two story house, and vacated the small one which had served them hitherto. But in two years, unfortunately, this house was burned to the ground. In 1750 he erected a second house upon the same spot, and this is still ('77) standing in good repair, being the oldest house in Cornwall.

Mr. Douglas was one of the most active pioneers in the settlement of the town. In addition to his farming, he opened the first school in the town, and, by the assistance of his wife in the summer, continued it many years. He also spent considerable time in opening a gold mine upon his farm, to a depth of some hundred and twenty feet. Specimens of the ore were sent to Boston for analysis, and small quantities of gold obtained from them, but the expense of working the mine was so great that it was finally abandoned.

He married, Dec. 4, 1732, Rachel Marsh, of Plainfield. She was a woman of unusual energy, and had a good education. She shared with her husband the inconveniences of their newly settled home in Cornwall, and cheerfully aided him by teaching the school in summer, in order that he might have more time for the farm work. He died Aug. 18, 1785. She died April 13, 1790, aged 78 years. Children:—

child, now ('77) in her 86th year, relates the following anecdote concerning him, which her mother repeated to the children on the fourth of every July while she lived, adding the remark, "You don't know what this day cost, but I do."

"On the day New London was burned, my father, as was his practice, rose early in the morning and went out to look around, as the British were expected at any time. He soon came back in great haste, saying that the enemy were coming and he must get out his company; and that mother must take care of the three children. Anticipating such an event, they had already prepared a place of a safety a few miles out of town, and taking a loaf of bread in a bag, and the youngest child in her arms, my mother started thither. When they had proceeded some little distance one of the children could go no farther; but a man came along just then and carried her out of danger. When they returned, after the British had left, they found the house still standing but everything was destroyed."

After the close of the war Capt. Ebenezer was appointed keeper of the jail, and inspector of vessels for the port of New London. He was a man of decided Christian character. He died, on Sunday night, Sept. 3, 1798, of the yellow fever, taken while watching with a friend. His widow survived him 43 years, and died at St. Albans, Me., Aug. 19, 1841. pectations here, they subsequently removed the press to Hanover, a town then embraced in the state of Vermont, where they published a newspaper for a short time. In 1778, in consequence of an invitation from the newly formed government of Vermont, they removed their office to Westminster, and, in February, 1781, commenced the publication of the first newspaper printed in the state. The paper, which was called the Vermont Gazette; or Green Mountain Post-Boy, was printed on small, pot-sized sheets and was issued every Monday. It was continued till 1783, when the firm was dissolved and the press removed to Windsor, where Mr. Spooner was afterward engaged in printing with his younger brother, Alden. He entered the army in 1775, and was present at the battle of Bunker's Hill. He was subsequently captured in a privateer, and confined in the Jersey prison ship, in Wallabout bay, N. Y., where he contracted a fever, from the ultimate effects of which he died at Rutland, Vt., in February, 1807. His widow, Deborah, died at Wainscot, Long Island, March 25, 1823. 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RUSSELL⁵ DOUGLAS (*Nathan*⁴, *Thomas*⁸, *Robert*², *William*¹), born in New London, Conn., March 18, 1767. He was apprenticed to a sailmaker in his native place, and was there employed when New London was burned by the British in 1781. His employer's business was interrupted, and Russell was released from his apprenticeship. After the close of the Revolutionary war he went to Boston, and there formed an engagement with a merchant from Liverpool, N. S., to return to Liverpool with him and make the sails for a vessel then on the stocks. After filling his engagement, seeing the place offered a good opportunity for establishing himself, he opened a sail-loft. His business proved remunerative, and he remained in it many years.

During the war of 1812–15, Mr. Douglas was, on account of his avowed sympathies with the Americans, the object of much ill will from his neighbors, who were nearly all loyalists. He never failed to bid off the American flags which were brought into port among other prize goods and sold at auction. In this way a large number accumulated in the garret over the sailloft. Upon one occasion, a workman, searching in the garret for a signal to inform some sailors at the docks that their sails were finished, hung out the largest of these flags. It was seen by some royalists at work upon a vessel across the river, who hurriedly collected a small company and, with the British flag flying, put across to capture the obnoxious standard. They were armed with calking-irons, broad-axes and such weapons as they had hastily seized. As they landed the privateersmen came up for their sails. Both parties had been drinking too freely, and, mistaking each other's intentions, engaged in a skirmish. The ship-carpenters were quickly driven to their boats and obliged to put back without accomplishing their purpose.

In the latter part of 1813 a British ship of 44 guns put into Liverpool, and landed about 300 American prisoners. They were crowded into the jail and courthouse; but no provision had been made in the little port for victualing all these men. Mr. Douglas immediately applied to the authorities for permission to open his sail-loft for cooking and washing for the prisoners. It was reluctantly given, and they were allowed to go there, two at a time, under guard, to bathe and wash clothes. The prisoners were detained in Liverpool for over a week, and then sent to England. For this act of humanity and patriotism Mr. Douglas received no compensation.

Intemperance was prevalent in Liverpool, and Mr. Douglas used his influence to suppress it. The first temperance meetings were held at his house, and he was instrumental in forming a strong public sentiment against the evil. A temperance society was organized, and by the coöperation of some of the most influential citizens, the practice was in great measure broken up. He was active in the cause until the time of his death. He died Aug. 17, 1849, at the age of 82.

Mr. Douglas married, Feb. 3, 1793, Mary, daughter of Josiah and Eunice Godfrey, of Liverpool. She was a native of Boston, Mass., born March 1, 1769. She died Jan. 4, 1816. Children, born in Liverpool:—

REV. CALEB⁵ DOUGLAS (*John*⁴, *Thomas*³, *Robert*², *William*¹), born in New London, Conn., Feb. 11, 1756. When he was four years old his parents moved about five miles into the country, where he received such an education as was common in those days. He learned the trade of nail making in Hartford. When he was twenty years of age a revival of religion began in his neighborhood, and his mind was powerfully affected. But it was not till 1779 that he openly made a profession of religion, and united with the Separatists in Lyme. In October of that year he removed, with his wife and child, to Middletown, and joined a church of the same order.

"In 1785," he says, "I removed to Sandisfield, Mass., where I found myself in a very destitute region. No religious denomination maintained public worship within seven miles. In these circumstances I felt irresistibly urged, with one other individual, to establish a meeting. In conducting divine worship, I endeavored, as far as I was able, to instruct the people, without entertaining a thought of ever attempting to preach."

In 1791 he removed to Whitestown, N. Y. After much reflection he experienced a change of feeling on the subject of infant baptism, and united with the Baptist denomination. He received the ordinance of baptism at the hand of the Rev. Stephen Parsons, being one of the first persons ever baptized in Whitestown. Not far from this time, a Baptist church was formed in the village of Whitesborough, of which he became a member. In 1799 he was chosen deacon of this church ; and on the 7th of January, 1802, was set apart, by ordination, to the work of the gospel ministry.

"In 1803 he yielded to the earnest solicitations of his brethren, and consented to take the pastoral charge of the church in Whitesborough, which he continued with fidelity and success till 1816, when he was succeeded by Elder Galusha. This transfer of his pastoral responsibilities, which was at his own instance, abated neither his activity nor his usefulness. While his zeal for the

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welfare of the church at home was not diminished, his evangelical labors in destitute neighborhoods, and among feeble churches abroad, were more abundant. Thus he spent eight happy years."

In February, 1824, he was attacked with inflammation of the eyes, which gradually increased till total blindness ensued. In September of this year he removed, with his family, to Gorham, at which place he remained till his death. From the 15th of May, 1833, he was almost wholly confined to his bed. His last days were those of intense suffering. His disease progressed rapidly, and on Sept. 27, 1833, he fell asleep at the age of 77 years. Mr. Douglas was twice married. His first wife, whom he married Nov. 20, 1777, was Bethiah, daughter of Jonathan and Esther Chapel, of New Lon-She was born Sept. 10, 1758, and died Aug. 19, don. 1788. "I was the tenth child and sixth succeeding son of John and Esther Douglas. In my tenth year was left fatherless; obtained a common school education, and attended grammar school in Middletown, Conn.; learned something of blacksmithing and farming; went to Sandisfield in March, 1788; the season was cold and wet; went to New London the next winter; coasted to Egg Harbor, N. J., the next spring; returned to Jordan creek to my mother's; in the fall of 1791 went to Whitestown, N. Y.; returned, married on the 4th of March, 1792, Lucy, daughter of Daniel Ames; on April 12th, following, sailed for Albany, N. Y., and went up the Mohawk to Whitesborough; journey was about fourteen days. My wife, Lucy, was born Nov. 2, 1761."

He was considerable of a poet, and among other things composed his own epitaph in rhyme. After settling in New York, he purchased large quantities of land and became comparatively wealthy. His wife died

BRIG.-GEN. JOHN⁵ DOUGLAS (*John*⁴, *William*³, *William*², *William*¹), born in Plainfield, Conn., April 12, 1734. His first wife, Susannah, by whom he had seven

children, died March 20, 1776, in her 40th year. He married, second, in January, 1778, Susannah Freyers, of Newport, R. I. She died Dec. 27, 1810, aged 74 years. He was in service during the French and Indian war of 1754–9. He also took an active part in the Revolution-ary war. Fish,* of North Stonington. She died without issue, in 1766, aged 27 years. Prof. Benjamin Silliman, of Yale College, her nephew, says:—

"In addition to her beauty, she was distinguished by brilliant wit and vivid sentiment, as appears in her letters still preserved. But she was cut off by the small-pox, accidentally taken, at the early age of twenty-seven. Secluded from the society of all her friends, except that of her devoted husband, Mr. Douglas, she died in a pest house near New Haven. Emerging from a temporary hallucination, occasioned by her malady,—on being informed of her immediate danger, she uttered distinctly a prayer of twenty minutes in length, in exact method, with well chosen expressions, and without repetition, and perfectly appropriate to her situation and that of her husband's friends."

COL. WILLIAM⁵ DOUGLAS (John⁴, William³, William², William¹), born in Plainfield, Conn., Jan. 27, 1742. At the early age of 16 years he engaged in the old French and Indian war. He was chosen orderly sergeant in a company under Israel Putnam, and participated in the expedition which resulted in the surrender of

Quebec, in 1759, and the speedy termination of the war. He soon after removed from Plainfield to New Haven, where he engaged in the seafaring business, and soon became commander of a merchant ship sailing between New Haven and the West Indies. In this he was very successful, and accumulated a fortune considered in those days more than ample.

At the breaking out of hostilities between this country and Great Britain he abandoned the water and raised a military company in New Haven. He was commissioned captain of this company, May 16, 1775, and immediately proceeded to the north with provisions and supplies for the troops under Montgomery. When he reported, Gen. Montgomery, finding he was a good seaman, requested him to take command of the flotilla on Lake Champlain. He accepted the position of commodore of this little fleet, and in the fall of 1775 rendered important service in the seige and capture of St. Johns, at the head of the lake,—taking large quantities of provisions, arms and other military stores, together with cannon which were carried across the country and used in the defence of Boston.

Early the next year, 1776, he raised a regiment of soldiers in the vicinity of New Haven, of which he was commissioned colonel by Gov. Jonathan Trumbull, June 20, 1776. As soon as the regiment was equipped he marched to New York and joined the Continental army under Gen. Washington. He participated in the disastrous campaign of Long Island, taking part at Harlem Heights, White Plains, Philips Manor, Croton River and New York. In the battle of September 15th, his clothes were perforated by bullets and his horse shot from under him. In this engagement he became so exhausted that, in connection with subsequent exposure, he lost his voice, and was never able afterward to speak a loud word. From the day of this battle until toward the middle of December, he was so constantly on duty that he rarely slept beneath a roof.

When the war broke out, and after Col. Douglas had .

joined the army, New Haven, being in an exposed position, was continually harassed by the British soldiers, who were driving the families of the whigs out of their houses at the point of the bayonet, while the homes of the tories were protected from molestation by the royal To save his young wife and children from soldiers. these annoyances, Col. Douglas purchased a farm of 150 acres about eight miles from New Haven, in the town of Northford, and moved his family thither. When he was disabled at the battle of New York, and was no longer able to render service to his country, he returned to his family in Northford, where, surrounded by those nearest and dearest, and comforted by their ministrations, he quietly breathed his last on the 28th of May, 1777, at the early age of 35 years.

Here, while he was on his dying bed, speculators came out from New Haven, and persuaded him to sell his New Haven property, and paid him in Continental bills. These bills became, after the war, almost worthless, so that Col. Douglas's family lost all his large property in New Haven by the depreciation of the Continental money. It is a lasting shame to our Government that it has never redeemed its Continental currency. Thus Col. Douglas literally sacrificed his life and fortune for his country. He was not only a brave and faithful officer, but a true patriot and christian. The letters written by him to his family, often from amid the dangers of camp, evince at once the warmth of his affection and his self-denying patriotism and firm reliance on God. A modest brown stone monument in the old burial-ground at Northford, marks the last resting place of this patriot of the Revolution.

Col. Douglas married, July 5, 1767, Hannah, daughter of Stephen Mansfield, of New Haven, where she was born Nov. 17, 1747. She was sister of Col. SARAH⁵ DOUGLAS (John⁴, William³, William², William¹), born in Plainfield, Conn., April 18, 1744. She married, Sept. 23, 1762, Dr. Elisha Perkins, of Lisbon, brother of Capt. Simon Perkins, who married her sister Olive. He was the son of Dr. Joseph Perkins, and was born in Newent Society (Norwich), Jan. 16, 1741; studied medicine with his father, and settled in Plainfield. He became widely known from his invention of "Tractors."* He also introduced with great success a powerful antiseptic remedy, and during the prevalence of the yellow fever in New York in 1799, he visited that city to try the efficacy of his remedies upon that formidable disease. After about four weeks of assiduous labor, he took the disease himself, and died Sept. 6, at the age of 58.

"My grandmother, Sarah Douglas," writes Mrs. Charles Coit, of Norwich, "has ever been represented to me as a woman of uncommon force of character, as well as great sweetness of spirit, and a most earnest and devout christian, training her large family of ten children all to be useful members of society. Her husband was a physician of great skill and large practice, which called him much from home. Yet he founded and largely sustained the Academy in Plainfield, which is still flourishing. As there was no other resort for them, he opened his large house for the

scholars from other towns, and at times his family numbered fifty, all provided for and made comfortable by his admirable wife, who was his sympathizing and capable friend in every good Dr. P. often received invalids into his family, who, by work. his wise treatment, were restored to health. One of them was the Hon. James Burrill of your city, member of Congress, and grandfather of George William Curtis; another the Hon. Calvin Goddard, sent to Congress from this district, who told me that when he left college, he went to Plainfield in poor health, and with all his worldly possessions in a pack on his back. He was most kindly received by my grand-parents, made teacher in the new Academy, comforted, encouraged and helped in every way, and became one of the first men in Connecticut,-Mayor and Judge, and used often to say, 'If I have any goodness or hospitality in me, I owe it to Dr. and Mrs. Perkins.' He never tired of praising my grandmother as the noblest of women, and often added he had never seen her equal. I have often heard similar testimony to their liberality and hospitality from other aged people, and been delighted by their recital of instances of the christian-like living and working of Dr. Perkins and his most excellent . and pious wife; and it is from what I know of her and my own dear mother that I get my impression of the Douglas blood."

Y., and became extensive farmers in that town. He also raised large numbers of horses for sale. He took part in the Revolutionary war, and became a major in the Continental army. He made himself so troublesome to the British that a large re-

ward was offered for his apprehension. When Burgoyne was marching from Canada to meet Clinton at Albany, and so cut off New England from the other provinces, it became necessary for Maj. Douglas to take to the woods. He spent several weeks in the forest, never staying two nights in the same place. He lost all his property and was imprisoned a long time for debt. After the death of his first wife he married a lady by the name of Wynkoop, from Albany, whither he then removed. After spending ten years in Albany, in mercantile pursuits, he returned to Canaan, N. Y., where he died.* He is buried, together with his wives and others of the family, in the old cemetery in that town. All his children were born there. These were :---

In the spring of 1766, William removed with his wife and their first child, with an ox team, to what was then Jericho Hol-

low, Mass. The place was then unsettled, and he was the first man to cut down a tree and begin a clearing. His father followed him the next year, with a company of workmen, who built a large house and cleared thirty acres of land. Mrs. Douglas lived here six months before she saw another white woman. Their nearest saw-mill was fourteen miles away, and the nearest neighbor four. This town was afterwards, by a change in the state line, brought into Rensselaer county, N. Y., and became a part of Stephentown. Mr. Douglas was a captain in one of the Revolutionary companies, and rendered important services at the battle of Bennington, where he was sent out as a spy upon the British works, and brought back valuable information. He had upon his farm a store, and a forge where the smithing for many miles around was done. He died Dec. 29, 1811. His wife, Hannah, died Dec. 24, 1795, aged 54 years. He married in 1771 Martha, daughter of the Rev. John Rathbone, and settled in Stephentown. In 1780 he removed to Albany, where, in company with a cousin named Wheeler, a nephew of his mother's, he opened a store, and for several years continued in business, the firm name being Douglas & Wheeler. About 1798 his property in Albany was destroyed by fire, and he made a journey to Brant's ford, Ca., where he remained about a year with Capt. Joseph Brant, the famous chief of the Six Nations of Indians. In 1799 he removed with his family to Canada, and settled on the Grand river, in the midst of the Indians, where the city of Brantford now stands. After a few years he removed about eight miles to the west, where he took up a tract of about 500 acres, receiving his lease from Capt. Brant. There he carved out a home in the wilderness, and was able to spend his later years in comparative comfort, leaving the homestead to his son Stephen. Wheeler and his wife were staunch Methodists, and their house was the home of the early itinerant preachers. His son Stephen, at the age of 19, brought into this home in 1809, the daughter of an old and prominent itinerant minister, who was only 16 years of age; and for sixty years they dispensed the same generous hospitality that had been found when the older ones had control of the family mansion. For many years preaching was held in their house, and several of their children were named after the preachers and their wives. Wheeler Douglas died at the home of his daughter Harriet, in Smithville, in January, 1829; and his wife Martha at the same place, Nov. 28, 1837, at the age of 84. They had ten children:---

NATHANIEL⁵ DOUGLAS (Asa⁴, William³, William², William¹), born in Canaan, Conn., Aug. 11, 1754. He married, in 1772, his cousin Prudence, daughter of Judge (James?) and Mrs. Hannah⁵ (Douglas) Brown, of Pittstown, N. Y., [88. ii.]. They were farmers, passing part of their lives in Connecticut and part in New York. -In 1790 he went to Chazy, N. Y., and settled, with his brother, Capt. John, on land granted to their father, Major Asa, for services in the Revolutionary war. Mrs. Douglas died April 17, 1796, aged 45 years. In 1812 Mr. Douglas removed to Douglasville, Que., which his sons, Nathaniel, James and Jonathan, settled. After his removal to Canada he married, as his second wife, a Miss Travaissa, whose father came from France with LaFayette. By her he had five or six children, but no account of them or their descendants has been obtained. Nathaniel Douglas died at Douglasville, Oct. 5, 1821. CAPT. JOHN⁵ DOUGLAS (Asa⁴, William³, William², William¹), born in Canaan, Conn., Aug. 2, 1758. His eighteenth year was passed in the American army. He married, May 12, 1779, Hannah, daughter of Judge (James?) Brown and Hannah⁵ Douglas [88.], of Pittstown. They settled in Stephentown, but subsequently removed to the town of Chazy, on the shore of Lake Champlain. "On the 15th of March, 1793, he landed at the lake shore of Chazy, with his family, of wife and seven children. His was the first English family which settled in this town." He was a man of great influence

as the town became settled, and his death was mourned as an irreparable loss. He died at Plattsburgh, as he was on the way to visit his aged mother and his son in Albany, Oct. 16, 1808, fifteen years after his first arrival in Chazy.* His widow passed the last years of her eventful and useful life in the family of her granddaughter in Chazy. Her vigor of body and mind were preserved to a remarkable degree to the end of her life. She died Oct. 4, 1853, at the advanced age of nearly 93 years. Children:—

1780. She removed with her parents, in 1797, to Wallingford, Vt., and there married, in January, 1806, the Hon. Jacob Houghton. He was then a lawyer, living in Troy, N. Y. The following extract from a letter of their daughter, Mrs. Bradish, written in March, 1877, gives an interesting account of their life on the New York frontier:—

"In 1811 they removed to Chantanqua county, N. Y., then an almost unbroken wilderness. Where the city of Rochester now stands were one house and a mill. Buffalo was a frontier post, and a very small village. Mr. Houghton designed to live in Mayville, the county seat, and visited the place in the spring and engaged a house to be built for his family in the fall. The journey was very long, as they went with wagons and horses. When they reached Mayville, the house had not even the cellar His goods were put on board a schooner at Buffalo, to be dug. landed at Portland harbor, now Barcelona, the nearest port on Lake Erie. The schooner was blown back to Black Rock, and the season was so late there was no possibility of their reaching Mayville. The only house to be obtained was at the mouth of Cattaraugus creek, now Irving, thirty-three miles from Mayville. This journey was taken in ox-teams, following blazed trees, and occupied five days. He soon concluded to settle at Fredonia, then called Canadawa, and built there, in 1812, a house, which, with the exception of three years spent in Mayville, he occupied until his death, and which still belongs to his children. Soon after the burning of Buffalo, feeling the frontier to be unsafe, the family returned for a few months to Wallingford. Judge Hough-ton died of apoplexy July 30, 1861, aged 84 years. Mrs. Houghton died Jan. 2, 1871, after three hours' illness, aged 91, in full possession of all her faculties except hearing, bright and active to the last."

RUSSELL⁶ DOUGLAS (Russell⁵, Nathan⁴, Thomas³, Robert², William¹), born in Liverpool, N. S., Feb. 6, 1801. At the age of twenty he united with the Methodist church in Liverpool. He left home June 20, 1822, to visit the United States and seek his fortune. In June, 1823, he established the first sail-loft at Chatham (Cape Cod). Mass., which encouraged the townsmen to fit out and rig their vessels at home. He remained here till June, 1826, when, at the request of his father, he returned to Liverpool and entered into partnership with him. In August, 1829, he established a sail-loft on the Bristol side of Liverpool river. Intemperance was at this time prevalent in the place. With the aid of his venerable father, at whose house the first temperance lectures were given, he was instrumental in forming a large temperance society, and in creating a strong public sentiment against the practice. The effect of this society was immediate and lasting, and Liverpool to-day. is a stronghold of temperance.

In 1834, Mr. Douglas made a journey to Ohio to investigate the claims of his father to a part of the "fire lands" in that state. He was so much pleased with the country that his father presented him with his portion

He determined to learn the new art, and, going to New York, entered the studio of J. Gurney, the well-known artist of that city. Here he remained until he became proficient in the business, and then established himself at Sag Harbor. In 1848 he made a tour of the Southern states, and on his return gave his attention to photography, which was a great improvement upon daguerreotyping. Taking a partner in his business, he remained at Sag Harbor till the year 1855, when, owing to delicate health, brought on by the use of chemicals employed in his business, he determined to abandon it for a more healthful occupation. He accordingly purchased a farm at Bridgehampton and re-

sided there till 1868, when he returned to Sag Harbor. In 1875 he removed to Glastonbury, Conn., where he purchased a farm in the central portion of the village, upon which he now ('78) resides. ALANSON⁶ DOUGLAS (*Wheeler⁵*, Asa⁴, *William⁸*, *William²*, *William¹*), born in Stephentown, N. Y., Feb. 11, 1779. At the request of the author the following sketch of him has been prepared by his son William B. Douglas, of Rochester:—

"Ile was educated a lawyer, settled in the village of Lansingburgh, and there entered upon the practice of his profession. He married, June 12, 1803, Anna, daughter of the Hon. Solomon* and Mrs. Tamma (Thompson) Sutherland, of Stanford. In WEISE'S History of Troy, which village was the rival of Lansingburgh, the name of Alanson Douglas is given among the leading lawyers of that district. In 1806 he was appointed surrogate of Rensselaer county. In 1811, by an act of the Legislature of New York, the bank of Troy was incorporated, and Mr. Douglas was elected cashier. At this time it became evident that the location of Troy, three miles below Lansingburgh, on the same side of the Hudson river, was superior to that of its rival, and that it would eventually supersede Lansingburgh as a commercial and manufacturing town. These considerations operated upon the mind of Mr. Douglas, as they did upon the minds of other leading men in Lansingburgh, and induced a removal to Troy, and the acceptance by Mr. Douglas of the position of financial officer of the bank of Troy. The institution was successful and prosperous under his management, and he was regarded as one of the ablest bankers in the state. In 1827, Mr. Douglas was invited to take the cashiership in the Chemical bank in the city of New York, and, accepting it, he removed to that city. But he found a residence in New York less to his taste than he had anticipated; and, on being elected, in 1829, cashier of the Merchants' and Mechanics' bank, of Troy, then just chartered, he decided to resign his office in the Chemical bank and return to the city of Troy, endeared to him by many

valued associations. He entered on his duties as cashier of this bank at its opening, in 1829, and continued until 1836, when he resigned the office and was succeeded by his son, Charles S. Douglas.

"On thus retiring from the activities of a business life at the early age of 57, with unimpaired mental and physical powers, Mr. Douglas withdrew for the most part from public responsibilities, and devoted his time to the care of a large personal estate, and to reading, for which he had a decided fondness. He was by nature endowed with a clear intellect, which was strengthened and developed by the study and practice of law, and further enlarged and quickened by his connection with business and finance. An exact thinker and close observer, governing himself and his business by fixed principles and not by untested theories, as a lawyer, a banker, a man and a christian, he always commanded the confidence of the people among whom his lot was cast. His will was strong, while his nature was gentle and affectionate. His habit was to concentrate his attention and strength upon the responsibilities that, in God's providence, were laid upon him, and he was content with success therein. After about two years of failing health and increasing infirmities, borne patiently and without a murmur, in the entire possession of his mental faculties, revealing to those in close contact with him much of the childlike simplicity and affection which characterized his nature, combined with his unusually clear thought and foresight, he fell asleep, at his home in Troy, on the 9th day of April, 1856. His widow survived him until Feb. 28, 1869."

To the foregoing excellent sketch of Mr. Douglas's business life, are appended some reminiscences by his daughter Mary, now Mrs. George Miller, also prepared at the request of the author, which exhibit his character in more domestic relations. Mrs. Miller thus writes:—

"My remembrance of my father in my youth was that of a man moving with quiet dignity among his children and servants, methodical and neat in all his ways—never hurried. I remember no instance of procrastination in either my father or mother. Doing every thing at its proper time, he was always ready for emergencies, and his life seemed to me a leisurely one, for he read much daily, and generally slept a while on the sofa after dinner. When I would playfully say to him, 'Mother is the one to rise early, and work hard,' he would smile and say, 'But I do the head-work.' He left the entire management of his children to her; and I have often seen her go across the hall to the bank door, (the banking-house being in the same building with his dwelling) and say, 'Mr. Douglas, will you come and whip this or that boy,' and he would come, administer the whipping, without knowing what it was for, and at once return to his business. As his children became older he talked more with them, and I was sometimes deeply touched by his frank acknowledgment of his besetting sins, in conversation with me. As they grew up and left home, he could scarcely read a letter from them without his voice faltering from emotion. He was an excellent reader, and was very appreciative of poetry. I remember being particularly impressed with his manner of reading aloud the Book of Job. After he made a profession of religion, the Bible, and commentarics upon it, constituted a large part of his reading. "Pilgrim's Progress" was a favorite book with him. Published with notes, he read it over and over again. From the little tract, "Come to Jesus," he gleaned much comfort the last year or two of his life. He was a very kind son and brother. To his sisters he was tenderly attached. Three of them, as well as his parents, lived in Canada West. They were warm-hearted Methodists. I visited them with him, when I was about fifteen years old, and also when I was twenty-two: and I remember well their loving intercourse, and how he enjoyed listening to their singing of Methodist hymns. I remember too his generous interest in his sister Mary and her children, who lived at Albany, only six miles away from him; also his frequent visits to his sister Martha at Sand Lake, and his peculiar attachment to her daughter Mary, who was in delicate health, and to whom he left a special bequest. One of the pleasures of my childhood was the accompanying him in his frequent visits to his sister Content, at Waterford. I enjoyed much his conversations with her husband, Gen. Samuel Stewart, a most lovely, genial man. Their daughter, afterwards Mrs. Ten Evck Lansing, was a favorite with him and with us all.

"While his son Sutherland was preparing for the ministry, in the years 1824 and 1825, he grew earnestly desirous that his father should become a christian (he had always been a regular attendant at church), and corresponded with him on the subject. In the winter of 1825-6, the Rev. Charles G. Finney held a series of special religious services in Troy, in connection with Dr. S. S. Beman, pastor of the First Presbyterian church. Having studied and practiced law, his preaching, in the earlier years of his ministry, seemed peculiarly adapted to impress men of the legal profession. My father went regularly to hear him, and I remember how solemnly he was impressed by one sermon of Mr. F.'s, in which he dwelt on "Sin as an infinite evil, because committed against an infinite God." A clerk in his bank, an earnest member of Dr. Beman's church, at this time made him a subject of special prayer. A few months after he made a profession of religion in the Protestant Episcopal church. To the close of his life, however, the accumulation of wealth continued much to engross him. With my husband and my youngest child, I spent the last three months of my father's life with him. He often expressed his doubts of his preparations for an exchange of worlds, and one sentence was often on his lips—'How can I expect peace now, when I have led such a worldly life?' His nights, at the last, were spent in an easy chair, within my hearing, in the next room. When waking, I often heard his voice in prayer, and one expression was very frequent—'Blessed Spirit, do thy office work in my heart.' The day he died, as I stood by his bedside, he said to me, 'Mary, I want you to make up for what I have failed to do, in giving to the Lord.'"

The will of Alanson Douglas, drawn by himself, was a long and admirably written instrument, and on its first publication excited much curiosity, and attracted the attention of legal and financial circles. Among its provisions, after providing annuities for his brothers and sisters, he left a bequest of \$100,000, to be equally divided among his nephews and nieces in eight equal annual payments. He had six children, all born in Lansinburgh, except the last two, who were born in Troy:—

All their married life was spent on the farm his father had cleared in the township of Brantford, and within eight miles of Brantford city.

"He was," says one who knew him well, "a man of strict moral character; and although he never united with the church, still he was a regular attendant on the services of the house of God, and always welcomed the ministers to his hospitable home. His wife was a model mother and noble christian woman, with a strong, retentive memory and well-balanced mind; and by her precepts and practice, trained up their very large family in the paths of righteousness and duty. They both lived to see their children grown up, and most of them settled in life; lived to see the wilderness removed and the fruitful fields and fine farm houses in the place thereof. He died April 5, 1867. His wife, Caroline, died Nov. 21, 1875."

DR. STEPHEN ARNOLD⁶ DOUGLAS (Benajah⁵, Asa⁴, William³, William², William¹), born in Stephentown, N. Y., in 1781. When quite a youth, his parents removed with him to Brandon, Vt., in order that he might have better advantages for an education. Here he attended Middlebury College, but left before the regular course was completed, in order to begin the study of medicine. He studied with Joel Green, M. D., of Brandon, and then began the practice of his profession there. He married, Jan. 10, 1811, Sarah, daughter of Nathaniel Fisk, an extensive farmer of Brandon, by his wife Sarah (Arnold) Rhodes, widow of Daniel Rhodes. On the first of July, 1813, without any previous illness or physical warning, Dr. Douglas died suddenly of disease of the heart, in the 32d year of his age. At the very moment of his attack and of his death he was playing with his daughter at his knee, and holding his son Stephen in his arms. Immediately after the death of Dr. Douglas, his widow removed with her two children from their native village to a farm about three miles in the country, where they resided with her bachelor brother on their patrimonial estate. She afterward, Dec. 2, 1830, married Gehazi Granger, of Ontario county, N. Y., and removed to a farm near Canandaigua, where she lived till the time of her death, May 30, 1869, having attained her 80th birth-day on the

After Alaska was purchased by the government, in 1867, he compassed the earliest landing made on those shores by American traders, and brought home as the first cargo forty thousand seal-skins. "As a railroad president, a bank president, an administrator of involved estates and of trust funds, as a referee and arbitrator, as a director in various important concerns, he was always faithful and always efficient." He possessed a decidedly antiquarian taste, and was deeply interested in whatever pertained to the history of his native state. He was for many years a prominent member of the New England Historic, Genealogical Society, and at the time of his death was vice president for Connecticut, being succeeded by the Hon. The following sketch of Dr. Douglas is principally taken from a work just published, on the "Eminent and Self-Made Men of Michigan," for which it was prepared by one who has been an intimate friend of his for many years:—

" Isaac Douglas had in early life only the advantages of a winter school, when he could be spared from the duties of the farm. During his 20th summer, he studied dentistry with his elder brother, Caleb S. Douglas, who had an office temporarily in his father's house. The winter previous to and summer following his majority he continued studying with his brother at Romeo, where the latter had settled. He remained with Caleb until his death, in June, 1852, when he continued the business in his own name. In the fall of 1852, finding that in order to practice his profession thoroughly, he needed a better knowledge of medicine than could be obtained from dental books, he began the study of medicine with Dr. Wyker, of Romeo. In 1854, his health failed, and he was obliged to relinquish his profession in part, and receive medical treatment. He continued in ill health for a vear and a half under allopathic treatment, when he changed to homeopathic treatment, and at the end of four weeks was able to resume professional duties. At this time he began the study of homeopathy with Drs. Ellis and Drake, and in the winter of 1858 entered the Homeopathic Medical College, at Cleveland, O. Here he pursued one course of lectures, passing all the examinations and taking a high standing in his class. Returning to Romeo, where there was no settled physician, he cheerfully responded to calls for his medical services, at the same time pursuing his dental duties until 1865, since which time he has given his entire attention to dentistry. Since 1865 a number of young men have studied with him, including his brothers Henry F. and Elon G., both of whom are now practicing dentistry with marked success, beside others who have become physicians, allopathic as well as homeopathic. As an example of his skill, it may be

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stated that he put in nineteen fillings in six hours, and had the satisfaction of seeing them seventeen years afterward all in good condition. The longest time he has ever devoted to one filling was ten and a half hours, and the largest number ever put in in one year was 1196. From Jan. 1, 1866, to Jan. 1, 1872, he put in 4394 fillings, only seventeen of which had to be replaced within two years of the operation. He was one of the organizing members of the Michigan Dental Association, and always made it a point to be present at its meetings, contributing greatly to their interest by verbal and written discussions. He has occupied every office in the association except those of secretary and treasurer, both of which he has declined. He was also one of the organizing members of the Michigan Homeopathic Institute, and was connected with it until its dissolution. In May, 1877, he was elected a member of its successor, the Michigan Homeopathic Society. As a recognition of his large experience, and his reputation as a practitioner and contributor to dental science, the degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery was conferred upon him by the Ohio College of Dental Surgery, in March, 1871.

"Dr. Douglas became a member of the Baptist church in Troy in February, 1844, and at the early age of 16 was appointed a church committee. In 1853 he changed his membership to the Baptist church in Romeo. In 1872, in consequence of a change of views, he severed his connection with the Baptist society, since which time he has been connected with the Congregational church in Romeo. For seven summers past he has been superintendent of a Sunday-school in the county adjoining his own. For the seven years previous to his uniting with the Congregational church, he was one of the deacons in the Baptist church in Romeo, and for five years the leading member, paying from one-tenth to one-eighth of the current expenses of the church. He has been a generous contributor to christian societies of various denominations, helping largely to build up the cause of religion in his locality. In polities the doctor has always been a In a professional way he is considered very generrepublican. ous, largely favoring the poor when commanding his services, either making very light charges or none at all. His habits have always been strictly temperate. In 1876 he joined the Sons of Temperance, and in April, 1877, he became a member of the Knights of Honor. He married, Oct. 2, 1852, Elizabeth Clark, who, with her parents, emigrated from Bedford, England, in They were shipwrecked off New York harbor, after being 1834.on the ocean 21 weeks, losing everything, and barely escaping with their lives. In 1869 he took his letter from the latter church, and, with thirteen others, organized the church at Richmond, of which he was elected clerk and trustee; but he soon removed his membership to the Fenton church. "He early began to exhibit signs of rare mechanical genius, and although by his father's will and according to family tradition he was to possess the family estate, he renounced his claims and removed to New Haven to begin life as an humble mechanic. He first found employment in the cabinet shop of Mr. Seth Bliss, afterward secretary of the American Tract Society, of Boston. Mr. Bliss soon leaving his business for the Congregational ministry, Mr. Douglas set up a general machine works, first in Artisan street, afterward removed to State street. The older citizens of New Haven will bear witness that in the quarter century of its existence this humble establishment exceeded in the variety and perfection of the work it sent forth any other in the world. The work-rooms were the frequent resort of some noted scientists of the last generation. Here the visitor might see, lying in what appeared to be inextricable confusion, half finished parts of almost all known machines, from the largest fire engine to the most delicate surgical instrument. And the wonder was that everything worked. There was no failure in any adjustment, nor fatal cheapness of material in anything that left the hands of John Douglas. In 1830 he made the first 'Douglas pump.' Though he continued to manufacture these while he lived, he never exerted himself to extend their use beyond his own city. The honor of building up the extensive manufactory which now sends its pumps to every quarter of the globe, and has gained premiums at every International Exhibition, is due to

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the extraordinary energy and business capacity of his youngest brother, the Hon. Benjamin Douglas, of Middletown. Indeed John Douglas never sought to 'make money'. To provide for a table which was never without its guests, to pay promptly his debts, with a dollar over to lend to some of his less prosperous acquaintance, to hear his clocks in the city steeples striking the hour together,—this was his life. Though while he lived it seemed humble and obscure, yet when in middle life he passed away, men recognized his worth and gave it the tribute of one of the largest funeral processions the city had ever witnessed."



WILLIAM⁷ DOUGLAS (*William*⁶, *William*⁵, *John*⁴, *William*³, *William*², *William*¹), born in Northford, Conn., Jan. 19, 1812. Having received a plain English education, he devoted himself to acquiring the business of a machinist, with his brother John, residing in New Haven. For this pursuit he was admirably qualified by a decided mechanical talent, which he early developed. 'He removed to Middletown in 1832, and started business in a very small way, with W. H. Guild, as a job machinist and manufacturer of small engines.

In 1839, in company with his younger brother, Benjamin, he bought out Mr. Guild, and established the firm of W. & B. Douglas, now the oldest and most extensive manufacturers of pumps in the world. At first the two brothers labored with their own hands most diligently, doing all the critical portions of the work themselves, and performing the duties, not merely of mechanics, but also of packer, clerk and salesman. The first year of their enterprise the number of pumps sold was about 300; within two years they produced and sold as many in a week; and now they find a market for a number which seems almost incredible.

William Douglas died April 21, 1858, at the age of 46 years; and the management of the business devolved upon his brother Benjamin. "He was a man of good sense, thoughtful, reflective and intelligent, delighting in scientific investigations, and devoted to mechanical pursuits. He was a man of few words, modest, gentle, unassuming, valued and respected in the community in which he dwelt, yet shrinking from all public notoriety. He delighted in the enjoyment of the domestic circle, and well fulfilled the duties of a husband, a father and a friend."

He was twice married. His first wife, whom he married April 12, 1835, was Grace Caroline, daughter of Elias Parker, of Middletown, and sister of the wife of Benjamin Douglas. By her he had two children, but


Hon. BENJAMIN⁷ DOUGLAS (William⁶, William⁵, John⁴, William³, William², William¹), born in Northford, Conn., April 3, 1816. At the age of 16 he applied himself to the trade of a machinist; and, in 1836, began working with the firm of Guild & Douglas, at Middletown. In 1839 he and his brother William, who had established the business in 1832, purchased the whole interest, and continued it under the now well-known name of W. & B. Douglas. For three years their business was that of an ordinary foundry and machine shop, supplying steam engines and other work of such description to the surrounding factories. But, in 1842, they invented the celebrated revolving stand pump, and first conceived the idea of introducing pumps as a regular article of manufacture and commerce. The idea was entirely novel, and their beginning was very small. Their first orders were not large, but their expectations were more than realized. They produced an article the

convenience and advantage of which were at once appreciated by the public, and their trade rapidly increased.

In the spring of 1858 William, the senior partner, died, and the entire control of the business devolved upon Benjamin. By a special act of the Legislature of Connecticut the firm was formed into a stock company, of which Benjamin is the president; and thus the business was enabled to be carried on without obstruction or embarrassment. By adopting the principle of making their articles invariably good, they have earned the confidence of their customers, and established faith in their own integrity. A vast trade is the natural and necessary consequence, not merely in the United States, but in the Canadas, South America, the Sandwich Islands, the West Indies, Australia, Europe, Asia;—in a word, in almost the entire eivilized world, do they find a market for their manufactures, and a steadily and rapidly increasing demand for their wares. The popular estimation of their productions is evident from the fact that wherever hydraulic machines have been exhibited, they have invariably been awarded the first honors, including the highest medals at Paris in 1867, at Vienna in 1873, at Philadelphia in 1876, and at Paris again in 1878.

Mr. Douglas has several times represented his town in the General Assembly of the state. He was mayor of the eity of Middletown from 1849 to 1855. He was lieutenant-governor of Connecticut in 1861 and 1862, and presidential elector, casting for Abraham Lincoln one of the six electoral votes of the state, in 1860. By intelligence and strict attention to business, Mr. Douglas has been mainly instrumental in building up, from a very small beginning, a new industry, until it has expanded into its present immense proportions. The author does not feel at liberty to say all he could wish, but cannot deny himself the gratification of stating that Mr. Douglas possesses in an eminent degree the properties which qualify him for his present responsible position. Gentle and unassuming, but yet experienced, sagacious and determined, he appears admirably adapted to administer

He was for a brief period settled at Georgetown, D. C. While there he received a call to St. Paul's church, Rochester,

N. Y., and entered on his duties in that parish in September, 1828. On the 23d of the following November, he received priest's orders from Bishop Hobart, in St. John's church in the eity of New York. A naturally delicate constitution soon vielded to the demands and responsibilities of the care of souls. He sought relief by a change in the sphere of his labors, but soon, with broken health, was constrained to seek rest and restoration in foreign travel. The last sermon he preached in America was well suited to one so soon to end his earthly course. Its subject was 'Life, the Infancy of Being.' June 10, 1830, he sailed from New York for England. Travel and rest and change seemed to be restoring him to health. He arrived in London, the last of April, the year following, on his way back to his own country, was suddenly seized by a fever, and died May 6, 1831. He was born in Chittenden, Vt., Dec. 24, 1802. He studied medicine at Rutland, and graduated at Middlebury in 1824. After six years' practice in Rutland he attended lectures at the University of Pennsylvania in 1830–1, and subsequently practiced five years more in Rutland, after which he settled in New York city. His medical education was completed in Paris, which he visited in 1838. Soon after returning to the United States, he read before the New York Surgical Society a paper on the method and value of topical medication for the diseases of the air-passages, a mode of treatment original with him, and now become general. From 1840 to 1843 he was a professor in the medical college at Castleton, Vt., and in 1850 he assisted in founding the New York Medical College, in which he became president of the faculty and trustees, and afterward emeritus professor of the theory and practice of medicine. In 1854 he joined his colleagues in the college in establishing the *American Medical Monthly*, with the editorial department of which he was for some time connected.

He was president of Castleton Medical College in 1842. He published a number of works on medical subjects, and many essays in American and English journals. He was a member of the medical society of London, England, and of the Society of the Cincinnati. He received the degree of Doctor of Medicine from Middlebury College in 1824; the honorary degree of Master of Arts from the same institution in 1834, and of Doctor of Laws from the University of Vermont in 1853. 
He studied in an academy at Canandaigua, N. Y., from 1830 to 1833. He adopted the profession of law, removed to Illinois, in 1833, and began to practice at Jacksonville. He soon became an active politician and popular orator of the democratic party, who, in allusion to his small stature, gave him the name of "the Little Giant." He was nominated for Congress in 1838, but was defeated by a small majority. In the canvass for President, in 1840, he distinguished himself as a "stump speaker." He was elected judge of the Supreme Court of Illinois, in February, 1841. In 1843, he was elected a member of Congress, in which he advocated the annexation of Texas to the Union. He represented Illinois in the Senate of the United States from March, 1847, to 1853, during which term he was chairman of the committee on territories. He supported Clay's "compromise measures" of 1850, and in relation to the extension of slavery in the

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territories maintained that Congress should not interfere, but that the people of each territory should be permitted to decide whether it should be a free state or a slave state. This was called the doctrine of "popular sovereignty," of which Douglas was the reputed author. He was re-elected a senator of the United States for a term of six years, 1853–59. In January, 1854, he reported from the committee on territories an important bill organizing the territories of Nebraska and Kansas. This bill, which was afterward passed, and by which the Missouri compromise was repealed, produced a great excitement, and was denounced by many northern democrats, who, on this account, separated from their party. In the national democratic convention of 1856, Buchanan and Douglas were rival candidates for the nomination, which the former obtained. Douglas opposed the admission of Kansas, in 1857, under the Lecompton constitution, and was thus involved in a controversy with President Buchanan and a majority of his party in the Senate. This affair caused a division of the democratic party, and those who acted with Douglass were styled anti-Lecompton democrats. Henceforth Buchanan and Douglas were bitter enemies. In 1858 Illinois was the arena of a memorable contest between Douglas and Abraham Lincoln, who were competitors for the office of senator of the United States, and canvassed the state in joint discussion in various places. Douglas gained his election as senator, receiving 54 votes out of 100. He was supported by a majority of northern democrats as candidate for President at the national convention which met at Charleston, in April, 1860. This convention adopted a platform which was in accordance with his policy and was not satisfactory to the extreme southern politicians. The delegations of Alabama, Mississippi, South Carolina, Georgia, Louisiana, Arkansas and Florida then withdrew from the convention. On the first ballot Douglas received 145, and no other candidate received more than 42. Having taken more than fifty ballots without effecting a nomination, the convention adjourned to meet in Baltimore in June. He received 181 votes at Baltimore, and was declared the regular nominee. The seceders nominated John C. Breckinridge, and thus rendered the election of Douglas almost The latter, however, advocated his cause by many hopeless. public speeches in the northern and southern states. At the end of the contest Douglas received only twelve electoral votes. After the rebellion began he supported the government in efforts to suppress it. On the 25th of April, 1861, he made a patriotic speech at Springfield, Ill., before the Legislature. He died at Chicago, June 3, 1861.

INTRODUCTION.

This family the author presumes to be in reality a branch of the New London family. A number of facts incline him to this opinion, but as no absolute proof has been discovered, the family has been given a separate place and name. The exact truth might, perhaps, have been learned from the records of New Fairfield, Conn., whither the family has been traced, had they not been completely destroyed by fire in 1867. Diligent search has been made to trace the ancestral line one or two generations further back, but without success; and its connection with the New London family, if such there be, will probably not be discovered, unless by accident. The following account of Thomas Douglas and his descendants has been prepared almost entirely by Richard D. Douglas, A. B., [13.], of Brooklyn, N. Y., and the author wishes to express to him, as well as to all who have in any way assisted in collecting the records, his thanks for their interest and help. It is possible that Mr. Douglas may at some future time publish a more extended account of the family, and all additions and corrections may be sent to him at Brooklyn.

FIRST GENERATION.

THOMAS¹ DOUGLAS, who was born about 1750, was living in New Fairfield, Conn., a few years prior to the Revolutionary war. His wife, Eleanor Seeley, was born in New Fairfield, May 21, 1754. Probably they were married in 1771. In 1773 or 1774, while their first child was an infant, they removed to Pownal, Vt. At the breaking out of the Revolution, in 1775, Thomas Douglas entered the army as a volunteer, and marched to Boston, Mass. His first engagement was at Bunker Hill, where he fell, mortally wounded, as a neighbor of his who had accompanied him reported to his wife. She mourned his loss for more than three years, and then married William Stewart, by whom she had one son, William. After the close of the war, Mrs. Stewart was sitting one day knitting or sewing, with her two children, Ebenezer Douglas, aged about eight years, and William Stewart, aged about three, playing near by, when Thomas Douglas walked into the house. The scene which ensued Ebenezer never forgot, and he related it many years afterward to his descendants. It appeared that Thomas had not been wounded, but stunned by a ball striking the buckle of his cross-belt, and not recovering until the patriots had been swept from their advanced position, he became a prisoner in the hands of the British. He was sent to the infamous prison-ship at Halifax, N. S., where he was confined during the entire war, not being allowed to communicate with his family, or let them know of his whereabouts. At the close of the war he was released, and coming home found, like Enoch Arden, that his wife had supposed him dead, and had married again. An arrangement was made whereby Mr. Stewart paid Mr. Douglas a certain sum for the property which had come by his wife, and the latter retired to Prescott, Ca., leaving his wife to procure in due form a bill of separation for desertion. Mrs. Stewart finally removed with her children to Ticonderoga, N. Y., where she died, Dec. 5, 1822. She had but one child by Thomas Douglas:—

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

NOTE.—The records of this family, as well as those of "other New Jersey families," which immediately follow them, have been collected entirely by the Rev. Malcolm Douglas, D. D., of Andover, Mass.; and the author wishes here to acknowledge his indebtedness to him, not only for these records, but for assistance in following up the clues to various families scattered through the book, as well as for many kindly suggestions during the progress of his investigations. For two years past Dr. Douglas has devoted much time and attention to the work of tracing the history of the various New Jersey families of Douglases, writing several hundred letters, making a journey to New Jersey and personally examining the records in various parts of the state during the time, and in fact doing everything in his power to make this part of the Douglas history complete. Both Dr. Douglas and the author return thankful acknowledgments to the various individuals who have kindly interested themselves to answer inquiries, and beg that at any time hereafter each and every person who can furnish corrections or further additions to the following lists of New Jersey Douglases, will forward them to Dr. Douglas, who will enter them in their proper places in an interleaved copy, in order that they may be available to any historian who may in the future undertake a second edition of this part of the work.]

INTRODUCTION.

As early as 1671, the name of William Douglas, of Bergen, N. J., appears upon record, and reappears in 1686. In 1686, William Douglas and Charles Douglas arrived at Perth Amboy, in the expedition organized by George Scott, Laird of Pitlochie, in Scotland. From 1686 to 1725 others of the name also appear upon record. In regard to these various families, it is as yet impossible to make out an authentic genealogical record, except of the most fragmentary kind. As New Jersey was the scene of stirring events during the Revolutionary period, it is probable that many records which might have thrown light upon family histories were destroyed or lost. Such facts, however, as have thus far been ascertained will be found in the following lists. They may lead others to enquire and possibly to discover the lost links of relationship.

As we approach the middle of the 18th century two or three families can be traced more distinctly. Between the years 1700 and 1725, at least four contemporary Douglases were born in or moved into the counties of Morris and Essex : viz., Samuel Douglas, of Basking Ridge, then West Hanover, David Douglas, (born about 1715–20), of Hanover Neck, Samuel Douglas, of Hanover Neck, and John Douglas, of Newark. Of the last two mentioned we have thus far no particulars, unless it be in a will dated June 25, 1773, in which Samuel Douglas, of Hanover, mentions his wife Mary, and his four daughters, Elizabeth, Hannah (who is believed to have married William Dixon, July 13, 1758), Charlotte and Martha, one of whom, it appears, married a Prudden, of Hanover Neck. John Douglas, of Newark, may have been the same with one John whose father, Nathaniel, was living at Hanover Neck in 1757, and probably in 1764. Some have thought that the three last named above were brothers, and nearly related also to Samuel, of Basking Ridge, but as yet there is no reliable evidence on these points.

DAVID DOUGLAS AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

Even after the most diligent research the following lists are in some respects partial and imperfect; partly because many of the departed have left little or no record of their knowledge of descents and relationships, and partly because the living do not always realize the interest and importance to themselves and their children of the information which they actually have close at hand. It is hoped that the publication of these papers will prove the most direct way to secure the correction of errors, if any, and the supply of omissions, and perhaps full lists of other branches of the name in New Jersey.

"The unfortunate destruction of his private and business papers by fire, not long after his death, deprives us of one important means of information in regard to him. He lived for a time in Pompton, where one, at least, of his children was born. He was for many years one of the respected firm of Vanderpoel & Douglas, leather manufacturers and dealers, in Newark, N. J. In 1813, he moved to Caldwell, and in 1815, with his son

Marcus, bought an iron furnace and forge, with 700 acres of woodland, in Bloomingdale. Being disappointed in this investment, he moved, in 1816, to Caldwell. There he died, May 15, 1824. His letters to his son, David B., from 1813 to 1824, show good training, sound judgment, and a systematic mind. In respect of style and accuracy they will compare favorably with the letters of any well trained business man of these days. He was a deacon in the First Presbyterian church, Caldwell, from He was a proficient in music. He was a quiet, reso-1819 - 24. lute, devout man; one who ruled his own household well. In his wife Sarah, daughter of Capt. David Bates, whom he married Jan. 15, 1782, he was exceptionally blessed. She was born March 31, 1762, and died Jan. 22, 1816. She was the sister of David Stanhope Bates, of Rochester, a civil engineer of eminence who was assistant engineer on the middle divisions of the Erie canal, and afterward chief engineer of canals in Ohio. His life is given in Stuart's Civil and Military Engineers of America. The father, Capt. David Bates, of Whippany, was a remarkable man, of great and varied experience. He died Sept. 7, 1820, aged 95 years, in the enjoyment of his full mental power and faculties of observation and perfect memory, almost to the last day. His wife was Phebe Tappan, of Morristown, 'an accomplished lady of quiet and winning manners.' Sarah, his daughter, and the wife of Mr. Douglas, was a woman of singular clearness of understanding, sound judgment and decided character. Of her and her husband the Rey, Dr. Samuel H. Coxe thus writes: One who though not ineloquent was fluent and pointed, and mighty in the scriptures, the venerable and now, I trust, glorified Mrs. Douglas (wife of the excellent and now, I trust, glorified person with whom I then boarded), a lady to whom, under God, I am happy in the opportunity of recording my deep obligations; she ever succeeded in disputation by that celestial weaponry with which I was unprovided, and which she used with skill and courage against the *light within* and all its arrogant manifestations. I attribute my conversion to christianity very much instrumentally to her wisdom, benevolence and valor for the truth.' And the late Rev. Simeon R. Jones, of Elmira, N. Y., thus wrote: 'I began to tread the pedagogic round in Nathaniel Douglas's family, and such a family in this age is rara avis in terris. Christian faithfulness and candor existed and was practiced in that family, and as far as possible there was perfection of parental harmony in the family government and order.

MAJ. DAVID BATES³ DOUGLAS, LL.D., (Nathaniel², David¹), born at Pompton, N. J., March 21, 1790; died Oct. 21, 1849; married, Dec. 12, 1815, Ann Eliza, daughter of Andrew and Sarah Brown Ellicott,* who was born in Lancaster, Pa., in 1792, and died in Batavia, N. Y., July 1, 1873.

David Bates Douglas, LL.D., usually known as Major Douglas, graduated at Yale College, B. A. Sept. 1, 1813 (M. A. Sept. 11, 1816). He was commissioned 2d lieutenant of Engineers, U. S. A., thirty days after, and ordered to West Point. He was ordered to the front in the Niagara campaign of 1814; was promoted 1st lieutenant Sept. 17, 1814, and was brevetted captain from the same date, "for distinguished and meritorious services during the siege of Fort Erie." Was commissioned captain of engineers March 31, 1819. Jan. 1, 1815, was appointed assistant professor of natural philosophy, U. S. M. A. In April, 1815, was ordered to examine and report upon the defences of Narragansett bay, New London harbor, Saybrook and New Haven. In October, 1815, being officer in charge at West Point, he systematized the details and carried into effect the organization of 1812 as to the military academy and corps of cadets. Dec. 12, 1815, married Ann E. Ellicott. In 1817, was ordered to make a reconnoissance with a view of fortifying the eastern entrance of Long Island Sound. In 1819, was appointed the U. S. astronomical surveyor to the joint commission on the boundary, appointed under the 6th and ith articles of the treaty at Ghent to survey the Niagara river and the islands of Lake Erie. In 1820, was ordered to join the N. W. expedition as civil and military engineer and astronomer. This was an expedition under charge of Lewis Cass, organized to explore the country bordering upon Lake Superior and the head waters of the Mississippi. Aug. 29, 1820, he was appointed to succeed Major Andrew Efficient, deceased, as professor of mathematics, U. S. M. A.; May 1, 1823, was appointed professor of engineering, U. S. M. A.; resigned March 1, 1831.

Ile was well known as an engineer in connection with various important public works. In 1826–7, he was employed by the board of internal improvements in Pennsylvania to make surveys and estimates for a canal in Pennsylvania from Conneaut Lake to Lake Erie, and for the French Creek feeder. In 1828, he was employed upon the surveys and location of the upper Delaware canal, Pennsylvania, and the Sandy and Beaver canal, Ohio. In

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^{*} Andrew Ellicott, professor of mathematics, U. S. M. A., West Point, was an astronomer and mathematician of eminence, who discharged in his time some of the most important duties of his profession. He was the oldest son of Joseph E., son of Andrew Ellicott, the founder of Ellicott's Mills, in Maryland. A sketch of his life appears in STUART'S *Civil and Military Engineers of America*.

1829, made a survey and report to settle the terminus of the Pennsylvania R. R. at Philadelphia. In 1829-31, solved, on the Morris and Essex canal, N. J., the problem of successfully applying the inclined plane to canal navigation over long slopes. In 1831, directed the reconnoissance necessary for uniting the city of Pittsburgh with the Ohio canal by R. R. In 1831-2, surveyed the Philadelphia, Germantown and Norristown R. R. In 1832 was professor of natural philosophy, New York University. In 1833 surveyed the route of the Brooklyn and Jamaica R. R., and made the preliminary surveys for supplying the city of New York with pure water. In 1834-6, as first chief engineer of the Croton water works, made the surveys and projected the outlines of that great work. In 1836-7, professor of architecture and civil engineering in the New York University. In 1837-8, examined and reported on the hydraulic power of the Monmouth purchase; and made a reconnoissance of the coal region of the upper Potomac. In 1838-9, laid out the Greenwood cemetery, and was first president of its corporation. In 1840-4, president of Kenvon College, Ohio. 1841, degree of LL.D., Yale College Aug. 3, and Geneva College Aug. 4. Honorary member of the Phi Beta Kappa in 1842. 1844–8, was engaged in various professional works, including the laying out of the Albany Rural cemetery, and the Quebec Protestant cemetery, and improvements in Brooklyn. Professor of mathematics, Geneva College, 1848 - 9.

"Major Douglas in stature was several inches above the medium height, slender, but finely proportioned, with an energetic, earnest movement and distinguished military presence. His features were strongly marked and striking; his hair was dark, and his eyes black, large and restless; his voice deep-toned and firm. With brilliant conversational powers he combined a manner of address polished, quiet and unostentatious. His spirit was deeply religious; he superintended with pious vigilance the education of his family."—(Gen. C. B. STUART).

"He possessed great powers of analysis, which he exercised, not in a captious or doubting spirit, but that he might better know and form the material whereon to exercise that faculty of his intellect which was more peculiarly his characteristic, the constructive talent." Hence whatever he knew he knew thoroughly and systematically. Hence his yiews, his opinions, his aims, were all definite. Hence the depth and clearness of his instruction. Hence in conversation he was still the teacher, and without any of the forms of argument, his discourse, clear in its own light, was full of information."—(Dr. HALE).

^{*} Plans and drawings prepared by him in 1838 or 1839, for a high bridge over the East River, near where the present high bridge is situated, and for a tunnel, with carriage-way, under the river, are now in the possession of his family.



THOMAS¹ DOUGLAS, born in Scotland, about 1745; married, in 1769, Margaret Martin; settled in the parish

of Monigoff; emigrated, in 1776 or 1777, to New Jersey, and settled at Charlotteburgh Furnace, Bergen county. A certificate, attested April 5, 1776, in the name and by appointment of the kirk session of Monigoff, and signed by Ebenezer Stottman, testifies that

¹⁰ The bearer, Thomas Douglas, and his wife, Margaret Martin, resided in the parish of Monigoff for the space of five years preceding this date, and always behaved themselves soberly and honestly, as becometh christians. They leave this parish free of church censure and public scandal, and as they propose going to America with a design to settle there for life, they are hereby recommended as peaceable members of civil and christian society in any place where Divine Providence may order their future residence."

He remained in the employ of the company at Charlotteburgh until the business declined. He died about 1783, and his widow afterward lived with her brother, Thomas Martin, in the Susquehanna region, in Pennsylvania, where she married a German by the name of Canouse. FIRST GENERATION.

JAMES¹ DOUGLAS, was born in 1697, without doubt in the northern part of Ireland, probably in Ulster county. It is almost certain that he was the son of WILLIAM DOUGLAS, who was born in 1677, or before, and that his mother's name was Elizabeth.^{*} He married, in Ireland, at the age of twenty, and with his wife Janet and son William, emigrated to Connecticut in the summer of 1729, and soon after settled in Voluntown, where a colony of his countrymen were already located.

^{*} This is rendered almost certain by the custom of giving the children patronymics which was carried to the greatest extent among the Scotch and Irish, and which here has evidently been followed out to the last degree. The oldest son was named for the father's father, the oldest dau. for the father's mother, the second son for the mother's father, the second dau. for the mother's mother, the third son for the father and the third dau. for the mother. James's third son was named James and his third dau. Janet, and presuming the other children also to have been named in accordance with the custom, it appears that James's parents were named William and Elizabeth Douglas, and that the names of his wife Janet's parents were Samuel and Margaret. James's fourth son, John, was probably named from an uncle.

"Among the first settlers of Voluntown, Conn., were a number of the thrifty Scotch-Irish, of whom large numbers emigrated to New England and Pennsylvania early in the last century. The most of those who settled in Voluntown were from Ulster, the extreme northern county of Ireland, and separated from Argyleshire, Scotland, by the narrow North Channel. They formed so large a proportion of the inhabitants of Voluntown, that they organized a Presbyterian church, the first, and for many years the only one of the denomination in Connecticut, and called to be their pastor the Rev. Samuel Dorrance, himself lately arrived from Ireland, but a graduate of Glasgow University in Scotland. From these old Scotch-Irish families, the Campbells, Dixons, Douglases, Edmonds, Gibsons, Houstons, Hunters, Kassons, Kegwins, Kennedys, Parkes, Wylies, and others, have descended many of the prominent men of Connecticut, as well as of other states west and south where their de-scendants have settled."-DOUGLAS'S Robert Compbell and his Descendants.

James Douglas and his wife, Janet, having procured letters of dismissal from the church of which they were members before leaving Ireland, were received into the church in Voluntown "upon their certificates," with a number of others,* Nov. 30, 1729. Four years later he purchased of Dr. Thomas Leavenworth, of Stratford, a fract of land in Voluntown, containing 80 acres, and "all right in undivided lands not laid out." The deed was given at Newtown, May 20, 1734, and recorded in Voluntown, May 27, 1734. In it the purchaser is styled "of Stonington," which is just south of Voluntown. This farm was situated on the east side of Ekonk hill, near where the line between Voluntown and Sterling now runs, and contained some of the best land in the town. Here he erected a forge and followed his trade of blacksmith. He was the first, and for many years the only blacksmith in the town, and in the newly settled community, composed entirely of farmers who depended upon him to keep their cattle and horses shod and farming tools in repair, assumed a position of importance

second only to that of the minister. The inventory of his property shows a complete set of blacksmith's tools, which he bequeathed in his will to his son Samuel. He is remembered as a man of magnificent physique, a true type of the stalwart and sturdy Scotch-Irish. He was constant and faithful in his church relations, having his children baptized in infancy, and bringing them up strictly in the faith of their fathers. By his industry on the farm and at the forge, he accumulated a property larger than most of his neighbors could boast of, and he passed the later years of his life as a country gentleman, in such style as the limited resources of the little settlement could afford. His negro servant, Quacko, was devotedly attached to his master, and surviving him, lived to a great age, being cared for by the family. In the inventory of his estate, Quacko is valued at £50, while four oxen were worth only £20. James Douglas died Jan. 15, 1770, in his 73d year, and was buried in the parish burial-ground, which is still used by the church, and where his head-stone, a large slab of blue slate, covered with quaint and elaborate carvings, still remains, one of the oldest and handsomest in the cemetery.* His wife, Janet, survived him, and died Feb. 8, 1779. ^{*} This cemetery, known as the "Plains," has, within two or three years, been greatly improved in appearance, the alterations being made at the expense of Joel R. L. Douglas, of Thompson, a great-grand-son of James Douglas. The whole front has been remodeled, the old wall which had stood probably from the time when the place was set apart to the purposes of burial being replaced by a substantial wall with heavy iron gates. The Douglas monument, erected by Mr. Douglas in 1875, the largest and most costly in the cemetery, is on the eastern side of the central avenue, just after entering the main gate. The grave of James Douglas is on the western side of the central avenue, near the southern wall. The headstone bears on its western side the following inscription:—

WILLIAM² DOUGLAS (*James*¹), born in Ireland, probably in Ulster county, Feb. 15, 1728; came with his parents to Connecticut in 1729, and was brought up on the farm in Voluntown, where they first settled.

"When a young man William used winters to drive his father's stock, sometimes numbering thirty head, from their farm at Ekonk down to another which his father owned near Beach pond, to feed out hay to them. At such times he lived in a small cabin which had been built for the purpose, and tended the stock. During one of these winter visits there came a long, dreary snow

^{*} Robert Jackson's reputation as a clever cabinet-maker has come down to our time. A few pieces of his workmanship are still in existence. A great arm-chair, which he made at the time of his marriage, and which, after his death, became the property of his wife's nephew, Joseph Douglas, is still (77) in daily use in the family of Joseph's daughter, Mrs. Dinah Douglas, a lady of 85 years, in Voluntown. The chair is made in the generous fashion of a century ago, and is of the kind known to our grand-parents as "fiddle-back." It has been in constant use for more than a hundred years, serving as cradle for a score or more of babies, and to all appearance is as strong as when it left the maker's hand. Since the above was written Mrs. Dinah Douglas died, leaving the chair to the author, in whose possession it now (78) is.

storm, uncommonly severe even for a New England winter. His small store of provisions was nearly exhausted, and it was impossible to find his way through the woods and huge drifts of snow to where food could be obtained. He had noticed during the day a large flock of quails hovering about the cabin, and, having a little corn, he strewed it along to his door, which he left open. The hungry quails soon found the train of corn, and, following it along, came into the cabin, when he quickly closed the door and secured them. They furnished him with food until the storm abated, and he could get to his friends. At another time he heard what he supposed to be an Indian climbing an oak tree which grew beside his stone chimney, and attempting to come down the inside. He quietly pulled out a large armful of straw from his bed and threw it on to the smouldering ashes in the fire-place, when it burst into a bright blaze and the intruder made haste to scramble out and take himself off."-(EARL DOU-GLAS, 1875.)

This land William inherited from his father. About 1758 a farm house was built upon it, similar in style to the oldest farm houses now standing. The huge stone chimney was placed at the west end, and a large addition was subsequently built beyond the chimney. Here all of William's children were born. The oldest half of the house was taken down about 1830, and the more recent part has now been demolished twenty-five years or more. When the author visited the spot in the summer of 1875, the old chimney had partially fallen over and the cellar was filled with the stones and an apple tree of some twenty years' growth. William was a man of sterling qualities, and possessed an earnest christian character. He brought up his children to habits of industry and frugality, and accumulated a property which in those times was considered ample. His estate he bequeathed, after the custom of his ancestors, almost wholly to his eldest son, James. During the last years of his life he suffered much from his eyes, and he finally became nearly blind. He died at his home July 7, 1806. He married, first, May 1, 1760, Mary Pettis, who died Dec. 29, 1779, aged 49 years; second, Dec. 13, 1781, Martha Adams, of Richmond, R. I. He and his first wife, Mary, were buried in the old Douglas

burial ground near the western shore of Beach pond, in Voluntown. Martha Adams was a woman of great energy and ability, keen and intelligent, and possessed of an admirable faculty for governing the large family of children who had been left orphans by the death of their mother, whose place she filled as far as it was possible for her to do. She had no children of her own. Subsequent to the death of Mr. Douglas she married John Richmond, of Exeter, R. I., whither she removed, and where she died about 1822. Children, born in Voluntown:—

^{*} This sword, an ancient three-edged rapier of exquisite workmanship, the blade covered with engraved figures, the hilt and fenders of polished brass, and the handle wound with heavy silver wire, has been preserved as an heir-loom in the family for 150 years, and is probably over 200 years old. It was brought from Ireland by James Douglas in 1729, and is said to have been used by an ancestor of his at the seige of Londonderry in 1689. By James's directions it is never to pass out of the family, and is to be forever owned by a "James Douglas." JOSEPH³ DOUGLAS (*William*², *James*¹), born in Voluntown, Conn., Sept. 2, 1756; married, Aug. 11, 1791, Mary, daughter of Lieut. James Campbell, by his wife Dinah Macmain, and grand-daughter of Dr. John Campbell, the first physician of Voluntown. She was born in Groton, July S, 1763. He purchased a farm in Voluntown, on the southern side of the lake called by the Indians "Pancamack," and now known as Beach

pond. Here he erected a substantial farm-house, on a hill overlooking the lake, and commanding an extensive and beautiful view of the surrounding country. In this house, he says in a memorandum still preserved, "we went to keeping house February 15th day, 1792." It is now ('77) occupied by the widow and daughter of their son, Henry W. Douglas. Upon the southern side of the great stone chimney may still be seen, in quaint, old-fashioned characters, the inscription, "J D 1791."

The daily life at Pancamack farm, as remembered by the children who grew up under the paternal roof, presents a pleasing picture of the domestic and social relations which existed among the better class of Connecticut farmers in the latter part of the preceeding century and first part of the present. Joseph Douglas, himself a man of unwearied industry, brought up his children to habits of strict economy, but gave them all the advantages of education in his power, and was careful that they should obtain the benefit of whatever social life there was at that time in the rather sparsely settled region. He had built his house on a high hill near the southern shore of Paneamack lake, from which a magnificent view of the mirror-like sheet of water below, dotted with woody islands, and enclosed in its border of white and glistening sand which gave it its later name of "beach pond," and of the surrounding country for several miles, pleasantly diversified by hills and woods, was obtained. But it was not on account of the beautiful scenery alone that he had chosen this spot for his home and built his dwelling by the shore of the lake. There the land was richer, and lay more open to the warming rays of the spring sun. The lake was filled with various kinds of fish, hitherto undisturbed, which furnished a welcome variation of the plain but wholesome diet of the farmer's table. Small game was plentiful in the woods. The boys set snares for the quails, partridges and rabbits which they knew would be found dangling by the neck, or peering with frightened eyes from the traps the next time they were visited; and many were the foxes and raccoons which suddenly gave up their life with a spasmodic kick at the sharp report of the shot-gun. There were also in the woods numerous swarms of wild bees which every summer furnished quantities of delicious honey; and it was a day long looked forward to, when, equipped with his compass to guide him through the woods, the father set out with the older boys upon a bee-hunt, from which they were sure to return at night-fall laden with a plentiful store of the coveted sweet, carefully packed away in its six-sided cells of comb, greatly to the jollification of the younger children, who made much of it while it lasted.

The home of Joseph Douglas was one of the centers of social life in the neighborhood. In those days there was less visiting and more working. But the frugal board of Joseph Douglas was often enlivened by the presence of neighbors and friends, who always found a simple and hearty welcome there. Not an unfrequent visitor was Dr. Allen Campbell, a famous physician in all eastern Connecticut in his day, but whose fame was not confined to the medical profession, for he served at different times with great acceptance as clergyman and legislator. He was the eldest brother of Mrs. Douglas, and, with the exception of the minister, no guest was received with such respect and ceremony as he. Whenever his professional duties called him into the neighborhood, he would manage to ride over and "take tea with Molly." The saddle-bags were deposited by the kitchen fire, the horse taken to the barn and fed by one of the boys, and soon the worthy doctor, in the most immaculate of ruffled shirt bosoms, seated at the head of the table, would be sipping his fragrant tea, a quantity of which was always kept on hand for state occasions, while he dispensed the freshest bit of gossip he had picked up in his visits, or the latest news from Hartford and New Haven, where he spent considerable portions of the year as state representative and afterward as senator. While the war of 1812–15 was in progress the doctor's visits were eagerly expected. as he was sure to have the latest news of the war. On some of these occasions he was accompanied by his son Harvey, then a medical student in New Haven, and about to take his degree at Yale College, who often referred to them in after life with the most pleasant recollections.

"He had a sound education. For his times, his culture was broad in extent and excellent in character. In his boyhood our country knew very little of newspapers, magazines, libraries, academies and colleges; it knew chiefly country school-houses, and thinking men and women. From the famed Connecticut common school, and such books as were accessible, and the society of educators and public men, he secured a mental training and a measure of knowledge superior to that of most of his contemporaries. * * * His proficiency in what were then the higher branches of mathematics qualified him to act largely as a practical surveyor in the township; and many are the metes and bounds of farms and highways and lots of land that now testify to his skill; and he continued to thus serve his fellow townsmen until within a few years of his death. * * * He was a true economist. He was educated in an economical family, and in economical times, so that thoughfulness and prudence were ingrained in his life. He accepted the golden rules of duty and thrift found in the Bible, and in the writings of Dr. Franklin; text-books that are beyond price to the wise, but distasteful and unfashionable among spendthrifts. He proved the Divine law "the hand of the dili-

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gent maketh rich." Solomon was his favorite teacher. To be convinced of his wisdom and care, you had only to look on his fields and meadows, his walls and buildings, his barns and stalls, his stacks and cribs. And that he was felicitously seconded and supported in his forethought and skill by his loving consort, you had only to look in and around his home." *

His wife Mary died May 3, 1837; and he married, second, about 1842, Elizabeth, widow of Wait Reynolds, of Voluntown. He died Aug. 8, 1847. His widow married again soon after his death and removed to Exeter, R. I. Children (by first wife):—

STEPHEN³ DOUGLAS (William², James¹), born in Voluntown, Conn., July 9, 1777; married April 12, 1798, Susannah, daughter of Income and Elizabeth (Arnold) Potter, of Voluntown. She was born in Richmond, R. I., Dec. 9, 1777. They settled in Voluntown. In 1802, Stephen made a journey to Wayne county, N. Y., and took up land near his brother-in-law, Daniel Douglas, who had located there in the fall of 1800. He returned to Voluntown, and in February, 1803, removed his family in a covered emigrant wagon to their new home in the wilderness. Λ small settlement gradually sprang up around them, and was know among the frontiersmen as Douglas Corners. It is now embraced within the town of Walworth, and the whole county has become thickly settled since then. The original farm, reclaimed from the forest by Stephen Douglas, has increased very much in value as the country has become thickly populated, and has been retained in the family until the present time, being now ('77) occupied by Julian J. Finley, a grandson of Stephen. Mr. Douglas died in Walworth in February, 1813. His widow subsequently married

Enoch Clark, and lived until Oct. 11, 1873, when she died at the age of nearly 96 years. She retained all her faculties up to her last moments, and was as quick in perception and as sound in judgment as she was in her prime. In many respects she was a truly remarkable woman, and the changes which she witnessed from an unnamed clearing in the wilderness, in 1803, to a populous town, with churches, academies, and all the refinements of a cultivated, christian community, are as great, perhaps, as occur in the brief span of years allotted to human life. DANIEL³ DOUGLAS (Samuel², James¹), born in Voluntown, Conn., Nov. 27, 1769; married, March 30, 1797, his cousin, Hannah³ Douglas [2. viii.]. In the fall of 1800 he made a journey to Wayne county, New York. Here, in what is now the town of Walworth, he built a log cabin and made a clearing of eight acres. In January, 1801, he returned to Voluntown, disposed of his property there, and in February, removed his wife and two small children in a sleigh to their new home. The road ended about half a mile from his clearing, and he was obliged to move their effects the remainder of the way on horseback and by hand through the woods. The region which was then a wilderness is now a populous and delightful farming district. Daniel's cousin, Stephen Douglas, the youngest brother of his wife, followed with his family, and a small settlement sprang up, which in honor of the first comers, was called Douglas Corners. From this little settlement the thriving town of Walworth has grown. Esquire Douglas was for many years one of the most prominent men in the town, and was repeatedly placed in positions of trust and responsibility. He was chosen justice of the peace, and discharged his duties to such general satisfaction that he was successively elected for nearly twenty years. He died very suddenly at Macedon on his way to court, June 12, 1827. His widow removed in 1833 to the home of one of her children in Michigan, where she died Sept. 15, 1836. 

She was the daughter of Daniel Palmer Stanton and Catharine Fanning Roth, and a sister of Mary Stanton who married his brother, Daniel Macmain Douglas.

DOUGLAS GENEALOGY.

Mrs. Douglas was a woman of rare qualities,—genial, industrious and kind, and one who looked well to the ways of her household. She died May 1, 1841, at the early age of 36 years, leaving a family of eight children, who experienced an irreparable loss when she was removed from them. At the present time ('76) Mr. Douglas is living upon his farm in Exeter, R. I., where, in 1822, in company with his brother Daniel, he built the house he now occupies, and where the most of his life since that time has been spent. He has been a man of great energy, bringing up the children who were left orphans, some of them in infancy, by the death of their mother, and until within a few years taking an active part in the management of the farm.

Since the above was written Mr. Douglas passed calmly and trustfully away, just as he had always desired, without great pain and without any formal parting. The following obituary notice, from the accurate pen of his nephew, Henry F. Douglas, was published in the *Narra*gausett Weekly, of Jan. 25th, 1877, and is a just estimate of his life and character :—

ALLEN CAMPBELL DOUGLAS.

Died in Exeter, R. I., Saturday, Jan. 13, 1877, ALLEN CAMP-BELL DOUGLAS, in the 80th year of his age.

Mr. Douglas was the son of Joseph and Mary (Campbell) Douglas, and was born in Voluntown, Conn., March 5, 1797. He was a descendant of the old Scotch Douglases, a branch of whom emigrated to Ulster county, in the north of Ireland, to escape persecution for their religious views. The family were staunch old Scotch Presbyterians, and one of them distinguished himself as an officer in the dreadful siege of Londonderry, by the Irish Catholics, in 1689. A branch of the family afterward emigrated to America with the Scotch-Irish who left their homes in Ireland, as their forefathers had left theirs in Scotland, to seek in a new country freedom to worship God as their consciences dictated. James Douglas, the immediate ancestor of the Voluntown Douglases, landed, it is thought, in Stonington, Conn., in 1729, but soon removed with his family to Voluntown. James was the great-grandfather of Allen Campbell Douglas.

On his mother's side Mr. Douglas was also descended from the thrifty Scotch-Irish. His mother, Mary Campbell, was the daughter of Lieut. James Campbell, granddaughter of Dr. John Camp-

bell, and great-granddaughter of Robert Campbell, who came from Ulster county with his family in 1719, and was among the very earliest settlers in Voluntown.

In the quiet and unostentatious life of a thrifty farmer there is little to attract public notice. Mr. Douglas was always much attached to his home. Left by the death of his young wife, in 1841, with the care of eight small children, he gave his whole attention to caring for them and training them up to lives of usefulness. For more than fifty years he continued to reside on the old place, much of the time with no other family than his unmarried son and a housekeeper, preferring to remain where he could each day look upon the old familiar fields and hills.

Mr. Douglas's circle of acquaintance was not large, considering his years. He had not an enemy in the world. The number of his intimate friends was confined mostly to his relatives and neighbors. But the influence of the life of an eminently good man is not lost, even if it does not extend to large numbers. Mr. Douglas experienced a change of heart in early manhood, and was baptized by the Rev. Gershom Palmer, for many years pastor of the old Baptist church in Exeter. For more than two generations he lived the life of a consistent, faithful christian; in manhood setting an example for his children, and in declining years sustained by his faith in Christ, and the anticipation of a blessed immortality.

Mr. Douglas married, Dec. 23, 1824, Catharine Fanning, daughter of Daniel Palmer Stanton and Catharine Fanning Roth, of Preston, Conn. Her grandfather, Daniel Stanton, was a descendant of Capt. Thomas Stanton, the noted Indian interpreter, who came from London to Virginia in 1635, afterward removed to Hartford, of which he was one of the original proprietors, and finally settled at Stonington in 1658. Mrs. Douglas was the mother of eight children, six of whom are now living. She died May 1, 1841, at the age of 36 years.

DANIEL MACMAIN⁴ DOUGLAS (Joseph³, William², James¹), born in Voluntown, Conn., June 15, 1798; married, Aug. 18, 1822, Mary Stanton, of Preston. In 1822, in company with his brother Allen, he purchased a farm in Exeter, R. I., and built upon it the house now (78) occupied by his nephew, Allen S. Douglas. He was an active and industrious farmer. Orderly and methodical in whatever he undertook, wisely taught in the school of experience, yet quick to perceive any advantage in new methods proposed, he wasted no material in trying doubtful experiments in farming, and was never behind his neighbors in adopting real improvements; so that his farm was always a model of thrift and comfort. He was cut off in the midst of usefulness by a fatal attack of billious colic, almost before his family realized the dangerous character of his sickness. The following obituary notice, elipped from an old number of the Norwich Courier, is from the pen of his beloved friend and cousin, the Hon. Harvey Campbell, M. D., who was for many years a valued correspondent of that paper :---

"Died, at his home in Excter, R. I., after a brief but very painful illness, July 21, 1834, DANIEL M. DOUGLAS, aged 36 years.

JAMES DOUGLAS AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

For some time previous to his death his mind seemed to be occupied with a premonitory sentiment that his dissolution was near at hand; and as the world passed from his view and the grave opened before him, his faith in the Saviour whom he had professed to follow was confirmed, and the light of eternity beamed on his soul with a more exalted splendor. Thus bereaved of one in the meridian of life, who was a dutiful and affectionate son, a tender husband, a kind father, and a helping, counselling brother, his afflicted family have the heartfelt sympathy of their friends in this their hour of trial."

After the death of her husband, Mrs. Douglas removed, with her six children, to Rockville, but she survived him only four years, dying of typhus fever Oct. 4, 1838, aged 40 years. She was the daughter of Daniel Palmer Stanton and Catharine Fanning Roth, and was born in Preston, Conn., Dec. 14, 1798. Her grandfather, Daniel Stanton, was a direct descendant of Capt. Thomas Stanton, the famous Indian interpreter, who came from London to Virginia in 1635, afterward removed to Hartford, Conn., and finally settled in Stonington in 1658, and became the ancestor of the large family of Connecticut Stantons. She was possessed of a most amiable disposition, combined with great personal beauty, and her sweetness of spirit endeared her to all who knew her. JOEL ROBERT LEE⁴ DOUGLAS (Andrew³, Samuel², James¹), born in Plainfield, Conn., Feb. 23, 1812. A very large part of his life has been spent in connection with manufacturing. When but seven years of age he entered the "Stone Factory" in Sterling, and from that time until 1856, with the exception of the time he passed at school, he was engaged in the same business. He passed successively through all the grades of work up to the highest position, thus becoming thoroughly acquainted with the minutest details of the business, and gaining much practical information, which he was enabled afterward, to turn to good account in the management of other mills. In 1831, he removed to Plainfield, and in a short time was placed in charge of the Union mill at that place. Here he remained six years, giving unqualified satisfaction in the difficult position which he occupied. In December, 1837, he made an engagement with Comfort Tiffany to take charge of his mills at Danielsonville (Brooklyn side), and removed to that place. Mr. Tiffany's death, in 1847, interrupted an arrangement mutually satisfactory. A new company, the Quinebaug Manufacturing Company, was then formed, consisting of Warren Lippitt, his two sons, Robert and Henry, lately Governor of Rhode Island, Peleg A. Rhodes and Mr. Douglas. Under the new arrangement, the company, being unwilling to lose the benefit of Mr. Douglas's long experience, prevailed upon him to take the entire charge of the mills, in-doors and out, he receiving therefor a fixed salary, in addition to his share of the profits as a holder of oneeighth of the stock. Mr. Douglas continued these relations until the death of Warren Lippitt, in January, 1850, when he retired from the firm, and the management of the mills passed into other hands. In the spring of 1849, the company began the erection of the large stone mill, now known as the Quinebaug mill. The building was nearly completed at the time of Mr. Lippitt's death, but none of the machinery had been placed in it. Mr. Douglas had full charge of the building operations and of the running of the small mill, until he retired from the firm. He had now been identified with the manufacturing interests in Danielsonville for over sixteen years. In 1853, he consented to take charge of the mills in Rhodesville for a short time. On. the 15th of June, 1854, he married Miss Hannah Aldena Whitman, daughter of Alden and Hannah Whitman, of Thompson, where she was born Feb. 22, 1832. She was a lady of refined and cultivated taste, and the union proved a most happy one.

Mr. Douglas had now been engaged in active duties for over forty years and began to think of a less labori-

ous life. After some two years spent in charge of the mills at Rhodesville, he resigned the position and purchased a farm in that part of the town of Thompson since included in Putnam. Mrs. Douglas was, however, much attached to Thompson village, and Mr. Douglas embraced the opportunity of purchasing the fine estate of Erastus Knight, which was then for sale, and the following year removed thither. The house, one of the finest in the village, was built by Mr. Knight, about 1830, and is delightfully located on the northern side of the village green which it overlooks. Here, pleasantly occupied with the care of his estate, enjoying the society of congenial friends, and surrounded by everything which refined taste could wish, or ample means supply, they passed seventeen delightful years. But the hand of Death at last intruded even here. Mrs. Douglas, after a few months of lingering illness with a disease which they knew must in the end prove fatal, passed calmly away, Dec. 25, 1874. To unusual personal attractions she united a most amiable disposition and a gentleness and grace of manner which won a place in every heart. A woman who looked well to her household, gentle and dignified toward her servants, careful and loving to her family, she yet found time for the performance of numerous social and religious duties, and in all her relations of mother, wife and friend, was found ever faithful. None knew her but to love her.

Since the death of his wife, Mr. Douglas has continued to reside in Thompson, his time being occupied in the management of his estate and in the care and education of his only son, Joel. A man of tireless energy and unwearied industry since the years of childhood, his practised eye sees much which remains to be done where a less careful observer would detect nothing wrong. His habit is always to do in the very best manner whatever he does; and his estate in Thompson exhibits the perfection of system and good order. Even at the present time of comparative leisure, he accomplishes more than many men who call themselves

SILAS JUDSON⁵ DOUGLAS, LL.B., (Stephen⁴, William³, William², James¹), born in Jamestown, N. Y., Dec. 9, 1847; graduated from Union academy, Jamestown, and was appointed clerk in the United States Treasury Department, Washington, D. C. While there he began the study of law, and in October, 1870, entered the law school of Columbian University, from which he gradua ted in May, 1872. He was admitted to the New York bar in June, 1873, and began practicing in Buffalo, with every prospect of success. A severe affection of his eyes soon compelled him, however, to abandon all study and literary work, under penalty of losing his sight. He is at present ('77) traveling agent for F. S. Pease, wholesale oil merchant, Buffalo, and intends resuming the practice of his profession at an early date. He is unmarried

STEPHEN RALPH⁵ DOUGLAS (*Joseph*⁴, *Joseph*³, *William*², *James*¹), born in Voluntown, Conn., Aug. 2, 1828.

In the spring of 1854, he went to Illinois, and in the fall of that year located at Ionia, taking up land on the Cedar river. At that time the nearest mill was seventy miles distant, and the nearest market was McGregor, Ia., on the Mississippi, one hundred and ten miles distant. He built a log house on the banks of the Cedar, which for a long time was known as the Bachelor's Hotel, serving as a stopping place for the travelers and frontiersmen who happened to be overtaken by night while on their way. For a number of years the Bachelor's Hotel was never without its guests every night. There might be procured, for a trifle, a meal of fresh venison, just brought down on the prairie by the landlord's rifle, and a comfortable night's repose, together with such rude comforts as his frontier home could afford. Mr. Douglas worked his land and traded in stock with the settlers as the county gradually became filled up. When he located there the Sioux Indians were in the vicinity on the war-path, but he was never disturbed by them.

He married, Oct. 15, 1857, Jane Elizabeth Donovan, daughter of Joseph Donovan, a thriving farmer of Franklin county, Pa., where she was born Oct. 4, 1829. In the spring of 1864, Mr. Douglas and wife removed to Seward county, Neb., and took up a homestead on the Big Blue river. The nearest neighbors were some four or five miles distant, and there were three or four tribes of Indians roaming about in the vicinity. He built a log cabin, opened his farm, and commenced again in stock trading with the settlers as they came in, as well as with the Indians. In the fourteen years which have elapsed since Mr. Douglas settled in Nebraska, the country has become comparatively thickly settled, and the rude accommodations of the frontier have been superseded by the improvements common in the older states. Milford, the place of Mr. Douglas's residence, is now a thriving town, within twenty miles of the capital of the state, and within twelve miles of two other cities, the sites of all three of which were trackless prairies when he settled there. He has continued the business of stock-raising and trading, and by perseverence, sagacity and experience, accumulated a very handsome property, some of which has been judiciously invested in real estate in Lincoln and elsewhere, and some of which his neighbors are anxious to hire to carry on their business with. He is now one of the oldest residents of the state of Nebraska, and, by his course of uniform fairness and honorable dealing with his neighbors, has won a place high in their esteem, as well as a reputation for the strictest integrity. He has held a number of town offices, and was for a time school commissioner. He has no children.

CAPT. CHARLES WILLIAM⁵ DOUGLAS (*Joseph*⁴, *Joseph*³, *William*², *James*¹), born in Voluntown, Conn., Feb. 22, 1834; removed to Illinois in the spring of 1854, and to Iowa in the spring of 1855. At the breaking out of the Rebellion he enlisted in the Fourth Minnesota regiment, as a private. He was soon promo-

ted to the office of lieutenant, and was afterward commissioned captain and transferred to company C. His company took part in a number of engagements, including the battle of Corinth and the seige of Vicksburgh, and was with Gen. Sherman in his march to the sea. He remained in the army till the close of the war. His company enlisted ninety-eight men, of whom only eleven survived the war. After the war he went, to Milford, Neb., and there married, in the spring of 1866, Amanda Peal, of Missouri, but a native of Virginia. He then moved to Missouri, and is now a farmer at Rochester, in that state. He has four children, two boys and two girls, whose names have not been ascertained.

JOSEPH ALLEN⁵ DOUGLAS (Daniel⁴, Joseph³, William², James¹), born in Exeter, R. I., June 22, 1823. At the age of ten years he began in the spinning-room of a cotton mill, and from that time until 1868, with the exception of the time which he spent at winter schools, where he received a good English education, he was nearly all the time employed in cotton mills, rising through the various grades of the work, until he was placed in charge of the cotton mills of Dr. John E. Weeden, at Niantie. Having held this position several years, he resigned it in 1868, on the death of his son Henry, and assumed the management of his farm near the village, where he has since resided. Having united with the Baptist church in Voluntown, Conn., in 1843, he transferred his membership to the Niantie Baptist church, in September, 1854. He was elected church clerk in 1859, and again in 1865, and still continues to hold the position. He has also been for many years an active Sundayschool worker, having been connected with the Sundayschool in Niantic since its organization, in 1848, first as teacher and secretary, and for the last ten years as superintendent, during which time the school has enjoyed great prosperity. He has taken much interest in

the public schools of his town, and has been trustee and treasurer in his district for many years. He was one of the organizers and for several years a director of the Hopkinton bank. He was elected a justice of the peace in 1860, and commissioned by Governor Sprague. He has also been several times appointed guardian and administrator on a number of estates, and, in 1873, served as one of the commissioners of the Wood river railroad. In 1877, he was nominated as first representative from Westerly to the General Assembly, on the democratic ticket, his opponent being the Hon. Nathan F. Dixon, formerly member of Congress from Rhode Island. Mr. Douglas consented that his name should be used, not with the expectation that his ticket would be elected, for Westerly had always been overwhelmingly republican. Mr. Dixon was elected, though the democratic ticket received a larger vote than it had done in the town for many years. Mr. Douglas married, June 3, 1844, Lucy Emcline, daughter of Thomas and Abigail (Main) Thompson, of North Stonington, Conn., where she was born, Oct. 6, 1818. Children:-

DANIEL STANTON⁵ DOUGLAS (Daniel⁴, Joseph³. William², James¹), born in Exeter, R. I., Oct. 27, 1824,

When Daniel was in his tenth year, his father died after a few days' illness, leaving his estate in an unsettled condition. At the end of two years his mother, finding it impossible to manage the farm while the children were so small, rented it and removed to Rockville, R. I., where, in about a year, she died, after a brief illness, with typhus fever. The family being thus broken up.

Daniel spent a part of the time till he was twenty in the employ of William Arnold, in the village of Dorrville (now Niantic) in the town of Westerly, where he attended school during the winter months. While in the employ of Mr. Arnold he became acquainted with Miss Catharine Perry Champlin, of Perryville, but then living in Dorrville, whom he married, March 23, 1845. She was the daughter of Elijah and Susannah (Carpenter) Champlin, and was born in South Kingstown, Sept. 27, 1825. She was the twelfth of a family of fourteen children, all but one of whom, the youngest, lived to mature age.

Soon after his marriage Mr. Douglas removed to the village of Westerly, where in 1849 he opened a livery stable on Main street, opposite the old stone mill. In 1853 he formed a copartnership with his brother Henry, under the firm name of D. S. & H. F. Douglas, for the purpose of conveying the United States mail between Westerly and Newport, and carrying on the livery business. They secured the mail contract from the Government, and for two years continued to carry the mails. At the end of this time, the partnership was dissolved by mutual consent, Daniel continning the mail and Henry taking charge of the stable. At the end of the four years for which the contract had been awarded, a new contract was made with different parties, and Mr. Douglas opened a grocery store on Main street near his old place of business. In 1859 he purchsed the steam grist-mill on Canal street, near its junction with High, and fitted it up as a livery stable. In 1861 he was awarded the Government contract for conveying the mails between Westerly and Hopkinton. Having carried them the full term of four years, he was again awarded the same contract in 1865. In 1869, in company with Henry L. Miner, of Westerly, he purchased a part of the Hammond estate on High street. The old buildings were moved to the rear of the lot and the present Douglas & Miner's block crected on the street. This block is three stories high in addition to the basement, and contains three stores and a number of offices, beside a large hall in the upper story.

By habits of industry and thrift he has accumulated a handsome property, and for the last few years has not devoted himself so closely to business, relinquishing it in part to his son Amos. During the thirty years he has been in business in Westerly he has acquired a well merited reputation for fairness and honorable dealing, and is a well known and respected citizen of the town. Both he and his wife are members of the First Baptist church in Westerly. In 1874 a portion of the large estate of the late Hon. Rowse Babcock, lying in the heart of the thriving village of Westerly, was laid out in building lots, avenues were opened, and the property thrown into market. Mr. Douglas at once purchased two of the largest and most desirable lots in the estate, situated at the junction of High street with the newly opened

Grove avenue, and began grading the ground preparatory to the erection of a house. During the following year he completed an elegant residence, and in April, 1876, removed to his new home. He intends to make this his permanent residence. He has secured one of the finest locations in the village, and with ample grounds, trees, and the improvements which in time he will be able to make, may congratulate himself on having obtained a truly delightful and enjoyable home. HENRY FRANCIS⁵ DOUGLAS (*Daniel⁴*, *Joseph³*, *William²*, *James¹*), born in Exeter, R. I., April 29, 1826.

When he was only eight years old his father died after a brief illness, and the whole care of six small children devolved upon his mother and his eldest brother. The next year of his boyhood was passed in the family of his grandfather, Joseph Douglas, a man of sterling qualities. Three years later, by the death of his mother, caused by added trials and a constitution naturally delicate, the doubly orphaned children became scattered into different families. Henry lived for about three years in the family of Oliver D. Wells, in Westerly, R. I., and attended school at the old academy on Union hill, since widely known as the Westerly Institute. Having obtained the foundation of a good English education, in 1845, he began peddling dry-goods, a business which he followed for five years. In 1850, having married, he settled in Baltic, Conn., and opened a store. In 1851 he determined to go to California, which was then attracting great numbers of immigrants, on account of the discovery of gold in that state two years previous. At that date, although a comparatively short time ago, the journey was one of weeks and sometimes months, instead of days, and must be accomplished in emigrant trains over the prairies, or, by water, around Cape Horn or across the Isthmus of Panama. He chose the latter route, and, embarking at New York on the steamer Georgia, June 11, 1851, after a voyage of thirty-nine days, stopping on the way at Havana, Cuba, he arrived at San Francisco. He mingled with the throng which was pouring into California from all parts of the world, and at once entered upon work. He remained in California two years, working hard, and thoroughly acquainting himself with the theory and practice of gold mining. At the end of this time, feeling anxious to be at home once more, and to obtain relief from the care and anxiety inseparable from an active life among such conflicting elements, he sailed from San Francisco, by the same route, Feb. 25, 1853, and after a somewhat shorter voyage than the first, reached New York on the 25th of March.

Mr. Douglas has been by no means idle since his return from California. For the greater part of the last twenty years he has been in the active service of the Government as contractor for mails in Rhode Island and Connecticut, much of the time combining with this business a livery stable. In 1853, in company with his brother Daniel, he opened a livery stable on Main street, Westerly, R. I., having secured the contract for carrying the United States mails between Westerly and Newport. At the end of two years the business was divided, Daniel continuing the mail and Henry taking charge of the stable. In 1861 he was awarded the contract for carrying the mails between Westerly and Norwich, Conn., and at the next term, in 1865, between Westerly and Newport, and also between Norwich and Colchester, Conn. In 1869, on the completion of the Dixon house, then the largest hotel in New England outside of Boston, at the solicitation of the proprietors, Messrs. Babcock and Moss, there being at that time no stable in town suitable for running in connection with the hotel, he erected in Coggswell street the largest stable in the village and opened a strictly first class establishment. At this time the first barouche for public use was brought into Previously there had been no similar public carriage in town. the village, and but one or two private ones; and the opening of this stable marked a great improvement in the livery business in Westerly. In 1866-7, he built for himself a residence in one of the most desirable locations in the village. In December, 1872, he disposed of his livery business to Avery Hoxie, the present proprietor of the Dixon house stable, and in July, 1873, again received the contract for carrying the mails between Westerly and Newport. During the summer of 1875, he again visited the West, this time going by a northern route, by way of the suspension bridge and Canada, and returning through the southern states and Washington. In March, 1876, he removed to the city of Providence, to have a care over his son, who had entered Brown University the previous fall. He has since resided in Providence.

Some years ago Mr. Donglas began a modest collection of books illustrating New England history, mostly biographies, genealogies and books of a kindred nature, which has been gradually en-

larged by the addition from time to time of works of real worth, until the collection has become valuable, though not so much from the number of volumes it embraces, as for the quality of its contents. It includes a considerable number of local histories. of which but small editions were published at the time of issuing, and which are now out of print and are consequently much enhanced in value. In the department of genealogy of New England families it is unusually full; and probably very few private libraries in New England can excel it in this particular branch of history. This collection of books, still very unpretending in numbers, is always accessible for those who may wish to consult it, the owner being pleased to assist those who are searching for light themselves or seeking to illumine any point which rests in obscurity. With a natural taste for historical study, he has improved such opportunities as he possessed for local investigation. He was elected a member of the Worcester (Mass.) Society of Antiquity June 5, 1877, and of the New England Historic, Genealogical Society, of Boston, March 6, 1878. He has contributed several historical papers of value to the New England Historical and Genealogical Register (quarterly), one of which, on "Robert Campbell and his Descendants," was reprinted from the *Register* for July, 1878, for private distribution. He is also an occasional contributor to other periodicals. A quick insight and sound judgment, by which he intuitively selects the most advantageous course, have enabled him to turn to good account circumstances in themselves adverse. His intercourse with many different classes of society and the various kinds of business to which he has turned his attention have afforded him unusual advantages for the study of human nature in its many phases.

He married Sept. 10, 1849, Lydia Lillibridge, of Griswold, Conn. She was the daughter of Clark and Phebe (Bates) Lillibridge, and was born in Exeter, R. I., March 22, 1828. Through her grandfather, Esquire Jonathan Lillibridge, and her greatgrandfather, Benjamin, she was descended from Robert Lillibridge who settled in Newport in 1701. Benjamin Lillibridge married, in 1743, Amy Sherman, of Exeter, and through her Mrs. Douglas is descended from the Hon. Philip Sherman, who came from Dedham, England, and was the first Secretary of State of Rhode Island, under Gov. William Coddington, in 1639.* They have one child:—

CHARLES HENRY JAMES⁶ DOUGLAS, A. B., (*Henry*⁵, *Daniel*⁴, *Joseph*³, *William*², *James*¹), born in Westerly, R. I., May 13, 1856. He enjoyed the advantages of the best select schools of his native village, and at the opening of the graded public schools of the town, in the fall of 1869, he entered the second grammar school. At an early age he showed a taste for music, and was placed under a competent instructor. He continued the study of music with the best teachers, such

as Dr. Eben Tourjee, B. J. Lang and Carl Zerrahn, teaching much of the time, until the demands of his regular studies obliged him to relinquish it, in 1874. During a great part of the time he was in the Westerly high school he acted as local correspondent of various newspapers. In May, 1873, he became connected, as regular correspondent, with the Norwich Daily Advertiser, which relation he continued until he accepted a more advantageous offer from the Norwich Daily Bulletin, with which paper he remained until a change was made in the management. He was editor, for the class of 1875, of the school paper, the Elm Leaf. He was also elected salutatorian of his class, but declined the honor. He graduated from the Westerly high school in June, 1875, on which occasion he received the second Martha C. Babcock Memorial prize, for an essay on "Novels: their bane and benefit." After studying further with the Rev. James Paterson (Edinburgh University) and with Dr. John W. Gorham (Harvard University), he entered, in September, 1875, the freshman class of Brown University, in the regular course for the degree of Bachelor of Arts. He was elected a member of the Brown chapter of the Phi Kappa Alpha fraternity March 24, 1876; secretary, June 2, 1876; corresponding secretary, June 8, 1877; president, Dec. 14, 1878. He was elected a member of the New England Historic, Genealogical Society, May 2, 1877, and of the Worcester Society of Antiquity, June 9, 1877. At the annual declamation of the sophomore class for the Carpenter prizes in elocution, in June, 1877, he received the second prize. He was appointed a speaker at the junior exhibition, April, 1878. In June, 1878, he was elected a senior editor of the college paper, the Brunonian. In October, 1878, he became college organist. During the last two years of his college course he occupied the position of instructor in elocution in the University grammar school. During the winter of 1878–9, he also taught in the city evening schools. These duties, together with the regular college work and the collection

of materials for and publication of the present volume, which has extended over the entire four years of the college course, have fully occupied his time. Graduating in June, 1879, he hopes to begin the study of law the succeeding fall.

JACOB DAVIES¹ DOUGLAS, born in Newton Limavady, county Derry, Ireland, June 11, 1788, was the second son of Jackson Douglas, of the same place, by his wife Jane, daughter of the Rev. Jacob Davies, a Presbyterian clergyman of Bovally, and grandson of the Rev. James Douglas, of Newton Limavady, by his wife Margaret Clarke. The latter had seven other children, Samuel, James, Ann, Elizabeth, Margaret, Rebecca and Jane. Jackson Douglas came to America with his

The general commanding regrets that the injury received by Capt. Douglas while making a charge upon the enemy at Kingsport, Tenn., on Dec. 14, 1864, should have resulted in a permanent disability, and can only commend him to the protection of that government he has so devotedly served.

The author has greatly enjoyed his work, severe and prolonged though it has been. He is now sincerely thankful that it has at last been brought to a successful close this fourth day of March, 1879.]
