











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## PREFATORY NOTE.

THE present is the first of the two volumes of the "Kemble Papers," forming the sixteenth and seventeenth volumes of the series of "Collections" of the Society, for the years 1883 and 1884, respectively. It consists of two parts, first, the Journals of Colonel Stephen Kemble, from June 9th., 1773, to October 23d., 1779, while Deputy Adjutant-General of the British army in North America, under Generals Thomas Gage, Sir William Howe, and Sir Henry Clinton; with his subsequent Journals for the years 1784-1785 and 1788, those for 1786 and 1787 having been lost. The second part consists of the official Order Books of General Sir William Howe during the entire period of his commandin-chief in America, from November 15th., 1775. to May 23d., 1778; and of his successor, Sir Henry Clinton, from May 24th. to July 5th., 1778, the day the British army arrived at Sandy Hook from its march across New Jersey, after evacuating Philadelphia—Colonel Kemble's official copies as Deputy Adjutant-General. The volume thus forms, practically, an official and authentic record of the movements and actions of the British army in America, from 1773 to the middle of July, 1778, during the momentous period immediately preceding and succeeding the outbreak of the American Revolution. In it is also included Kemble's copy of the orders issued by General Daniel Jones while in command of the garrison on the Island of New York, from the 2d. of May, 1778, to June 2d., 1778.

It is, therefore, not only of new and great value to present and future students of, and writers upon, Revolutionary history, but throws a clearer and truer light upon the researches and writings of their predecessors

in that field.

The Society is indebted for the use of these manuscript Journals and Order Books of Colonel Stephen Kemble to his great-nephew, the late Mr. Peter Kemble of the city of New York, and the latter's son, the present Mr. Peter Kemble, who have generously permitted them to be transcribed for publication in its "Collections." The manuscript Journals are in several small, leather-bound books, in Colonel Kemble's own neat handwriting. The Order Books are in similar volumes, but in the even and distinct writing of some practiced clerk in Colonel Kemble's office. All have remained among the Kemble family papers to this day. Four of the small Order Books-viz.: June 30th. to October 5th., 1776, January 29th. to June 19th., 1777, November 20th., 1777, to February 22d., 1778, July 6th. to October 23d., 1779, when Kemble resigned his office—were, unfortunately, not among those received from the late Mr. Peter Kemble, and a subsequent search for them among his family papers, by the present Mr. Peter Kemble, failed to discover them. The Committee on Publications then caused inquiries and searches to be made in the Public Record offices in England, and in the libraries of certain institutions in London, for similar official records or copies of the same; but likewise, they are sorry to say, without success. Nor were they able to learn of the existence in England of any Order Books, or copies of Order Books, of the British commanders-in-chief in America, Sir William Howe and Sir Henry Clinton. Those of the former printed in this volume are therefore of very great, as well as unique, value.

Colonel Stephen Kemble, born at New Brunswick, New Jersey, in 1740, was the fourth son, and fifth child, of the Hon. Peter Kemble, of Mount Kemble, Morris County, New Jersey, by his first wife Ger-

trude Bayard, the second daughter of Samuel Bayard (only son of Nicholas Bayard, the youngest of the three nephews of Governor Peter Stuyvesant) and his wife Margaret van Cortlandt, the eldest daughter of Stephanus van Cortlandt of the Manor of Cortlandt, the head of that family. He thus belonged to that great group of affiliated New York families which formed that wide kinship, the potency of which, politically and socially, in the colony and the state, was such a striking fact. Though closely connected with New York, Peter Kemble had large estates in New Jersey, and was a member of its governor's council from 1745 to 1775, and at one period its president. A younger son, Stephen Kemble, was early placed in the British regular army, in which he was commissioned an ensign in the 44th. Regiment of Foot, on May 5th., 1757. On the 24th. of January, 1765, he was made a captain in the 60th. (or Royal American) Regiment of Foot. His only sister of the full blood was Margaret Kemble, who married the British commander-in-chief, General Thomas Gage, and their eldest son became the second Viscount Gage. Warm friends as well as brothers-inlaw, Captain Kemble was appointed in August 7th., 1772, "Deputy-Adjutant-General of the Forces in North America," a promotion which carried with it the rank of "Major in the Army." On the 30th. of July of the next year, while on a visit to England, he was presented to King George III., and "kissed hands," as his Journal tells us, on this appointment. He became Major of the 60th. Foot, First Battalion, June 6th., 1775, and Lieutenant-Colonel of the same regiment and battalion, June 6th., 1778, of which Lord Amherst was the Colonel in Chief. He had previously, on the 29th. of August, 1777, received the rank of "Lieutenant-Colonel in the Army," and on November 20th., 1782, he was commissioned a full "Colonel in the Army." The first full Adjutant-General of the British army in America was appointed by Sir William Howe, while the British army lay at Halifax in the

spring of 1776. Previously to that date the chief of that department was styled "Deputy-Adjutant-General of the Forces in North America," and possessed all its powers, duties, and emoluments. This position was held before Kemble's appointment by Lieutenant-Colonel the Hon. Richard Maitland, who being incapacitated by ill health, the former performed its duties for the year preceding Maitland's death, upon which event he was made his successor. Kemble attended General Gage as Deputy-Adjutant-General to Boston in 1774, and as such continued under him, and his successor Sir William Howe, for that date, and through the siege and evacuation of Boston, and until after the arrival of the army at Halifax in 1776. There, in consequence of the expected junction of the German auxiliaries, an Adjutant-General for the united armies, who necessarily had to be an officer of high rank, had to be appointed, and Sir William Howe chose Lord Rawdon for the position. This change made Kemble the second in the office of which he had so long been the principal; but, being friendly with Lord Rawdon, he remained as such under Sir William Howe and Sir Henry Clinton until the 23d. of October, 1779. On that day, after certain preliminary negotiations with Captain John André of the 54th. Regiment of Foot, an officer of junior rank to his own, and with Sir Henry Clinton, he resigned his office in favor of the former, whom the latter immediately appointed "Deputy-Adjutant-General," a promotion which gave him his rank as "Major André."

Colonel Kemble had now to rejoin his regiment, of which he was the Major of its First Battalion, the 60th. Foot, then on duty in the Island of Jamaica; and thither he sailed from New York in the ship Echo on the 30th. of November, 1779. The second volume of these papers, "Collections" for the year 1784, will contain Colonel Kemble's Journals of his services in the West Indies in the years 1780 and 1781, and the Order Books of the expedition to the Spanish Main for the capture of Nicaragua under his

command, with the documents relating thereto. Subsequently to the Nicaragua expedition Colonel Kemble returned to England. In 1785 he went again to the West Indies, having been appointed to the command of the Second Battalion of the 60th. Regiment, and joined it at the Island of Granada. He served with it there and in other West India islands. In 1788 he was again in England, and in July of that year sailed for St. John, New Brunswick, in which province he and one of his brothers possessed lands on the St. John River. In the beginning of 1789 he returned to England. There he remained several years on half pay. After General Gage's death he devoted himself to the management of the General's estate in the West Indies and in the State of New York, and the affairs of his sister, the General's widow, in England. In 1793 he was appointed a "Deputy Judge Advocate in America," and in 1797 a Deputy Judge Advocate of an expedition intended for the continent of Europe under the Earl of Moira, his old friend the Lord Rawdon of 1776. This was his last military appointment. He returned to America in 1805, and dwelt at New Brunswick, New Jersey, until his own death in 1829.

The portrait prefixed to this volume is from a beautifully executed miniature on ivory in possession of Mr.



## LIEUT.-COL. STEPHEN KEMBLE.

#### 1773.

Wednesday, June 9th. At 12 o'Clock sailed from New York with a small Breeze at N. W. At one past by the Man of War at the Watering Place, who Saluted us as did the Fort George, and Artillery at the General's Embarking,\* at two P. M. our Pilot and several Gentlemen of N. Y. left us without Sandy Hook with a small Air of Wind at N. W. set Royalls, Steering Sails on all sides &c. at 8. P. M. the Neversink bore N. W. 7 or 8 leagues distance. Wind E. very light air of Wind and flattering, all sail set. Wind E. S. E. At 4 A. M. in steering sails, flattering from the East. Set Stay sails fore and aft, flattering cloudy weather and small sea, at Meridian Tackt to the East, thick weather. Distance 69. No observation. Lat. 39.33. Long. in 72.55.

Gazetteer, June 10, 1773, No. 8.

The General was attended by the principal officers of the Army, to the Waterside, at Murray's Wharf near the Coffee House, where a Company of the Royal Artillery, under Arms waited his coming. As soon as the Ship got under sail, he was saluted by 19 Discharges of 2 Field Pieces, belonging to the Artillery; and as he passed the Battery by the like Number from thence.—The N. Y.

<sup>\*</sup> New York, Thursday, June 10. On Tuesday about eleven o'clock, his Excellency the Hon. General Gage, with his Lady, their son and two daughters, Miss Morris, Major Sheriffe, and the Captains Kemble and Dobson, embarked on board the Ship Earl of Dunmore, Capt. Lawrence, for London. The Royal Artillery were under arms, and saluted his Excellency with 17 guns, a great company of Gentlemen attended his Excellency to the ship, expressing in very fervent terms, their wishes of safety and felicity to this most valuable and sincerely beloved personage, his truly amiable Lady and Family. - Rivington's N. Y.

Thursday, June 10th. Wind S. B. E. in Top G. S. fresh Breeze and thick unsettled Weather. S. R. T. S. in stay sails. Wind South, D. R. T. S. in Jibb. and Mizn. T. S. Strong breeze and thick Weather, large head sea rising. Strong Gales with thick and Rain, high sea going, Ship a good deal of water, hard Rain, Thunder and Lightning from the West. Wind S. W. flattering with high sea and much Rain, ship labouring a good deal, at Meridian, almost Calm, thick Weather and Rain. Distance 134. No Observation Lat. 39.26. Long. 70.1.

Friday, June 11th. Wind W. N. W. Light Airs and flattering with Cloudy unsettled Weather and high Sea from S. E. Quarter, at 4 P. M. set T. G. Sails Driver &c. Wind N. W. variable and flattering with much Rain and large head Sea going, in steering sails. Wind N. set stay Sails fore and aft, set Steering Sails below and aloft Royalls &c. Wind N. W. at Meridian flattering and small Air of wind inclining to S. W. Shifted steering sails. Distance 97. Lat. observed

38.45. Long. 68.7.

Saturday, June 12th. Wind S. W. almost Calm, with a large swell from the S. E. Quarter. Wind W. B. S. in Royals and Mizzn. T. G. S. set Larbd. lower Steering Sail. Wind W. handed F. T. G. Sail. Squally with Rain, in Steering sails and driver. Wind W. N. W. Set Steering sails and driver, Set Royals, T. G. Steering Sails, Mizn. T. S. &c. Wind N. W. At Meridian Pleasant little Breeze and clear with all Sail set. Distance

155. Lat. observed 39.9. Long. 64.50.

Sunday, June 13th. Winds variable, small air and inclining to the East, and flattering weather. Saw Brig to the Northward standing to the Southward, in Steering sails, tacked to the N. E. Wind S. S. E. Calm and Clouding, Clewed all up. Small Air from the N. E. Wind N. B. E., variable and flattering, swell from the S. E. Quarter, in T. G. Sails. Wind E. B. N. Pleasant weather and small Air of Wind, set T. G. sails. Distance 35. Lat. observed 39.9. Long. 64.5.

Monday, June 14th. Wind E. N. E. Light Airs of wind and flattering inclining to Calm, with clear Weather, swell from the S. E. Quarter. Calm. Small breeze from the Southward, made Sail. Wind S. B. E. set T. G. S. Royall's, &c. Squally in Royalls, at Meridian thick Weather and much Rain, in Driver. Dis-

tance 60. Lat. observed 39.13. Long. 62.47.

Tuesday, June 15th. Wind W. N. W. Fresh of a sudden from W. N. W., with a hard shower of Rain, then clear Weather, set Steering sails, driver &c. set stay sails fore and aft. Small breeze and pleasant Weather, set Royalls also T. G. steering sails, Water Sail &c. At Meridan Pleasant little breeze and fine Weather with smooth Sea, all Sail set. Current setting to the Southward. Distance 132. Lat. observed 39.50. Long. 59.58.

Wednesday, June 16th. Wind W. N. W. Pleasant little breeze and clear Weather, all Sail set, at 4 P. M. in Starboard Steering sails, the Wind inclining to the N. W. Set stay sails fore and aft, in Royals, in M. T. M. steering sail and Mizn T. G. Sail, Set Royals Mizn T. G. sail &c. at Meridian fine pleasant breeze and clear Weather, all sail set. Distance 176. Lat.

observed 41.4. Long. 56.27.

Thursday, June 17th. Wind N.W. Pleasant and clear weather, all sail set. In Royalls squally, in T. G. steering sails, wind W. N.W. Set Royalls T. G. stearing sails, &c. Flattering, the wind inclining to the S.W. Shift steering sails, driver &c. Distance 154. Lat.

observed 42.5. Long. 53.17.

Friday, June 18th. Wind S. W. Small winds and hazy Weather with Smooth Sea, all sail set. In small sails, wind W. S. W. Fresh breeze and thick Weather with Rain. Set steering sails below and aloft Royalls &c. on all sides. At meridian Cloudy Weather and fresh Breeze, in T. G. Steering Sails, Royalls and set Stay Sails and M. Sails. Distance 165. Lat. observed 43.37. Long. 50.8.


Saturday, June 19th. Wind W. S. W. Fresh

Breeze, in Royals and T. G. steering sails, handed M. S. Stay Sails and F. T. G. Sail. Wind West. Thick Fog and smooth sea. Set Royalls T. G. Steering Sails, &c. at half Past 10 A.M. brought too, Sounded 30 Fathom Water, caught 30 odd Codd fish, at 12 Meridian thick foggy Weather, small Winds at West. Distance 148.

No Observation. Lat. 44.17. Long. 56.51.

Sunday, June 20th. Wind W. B. S. Small breeze and thick Fog, at 2 P. M. made sail having caught thirty odd Codd fish, set Steering sails on all sides below and aloft, driver, water sail, &c. Very thick fog in T. G. Steering sails. Set T. G. Steering sails, at Meridian almost calm, have a cast of the lead, no Ground with 200 fathom line. Distance 93. Lat. 44.54. Long. 45.5.

Monday, June 21st. Wind W. B. S. Small Wind inclining to the S. W. with thick foggy Weather, in

larboard steering sails, set stay sails and M. sail, rain, at 8 P. M. Past by two small Islands of Ice, in T. G. steering sails, driver, &c. Wind W. S. W. Set Royals, T. G. Steering sail, &c. At 11 A. M. Past by a large Island of Ice, and many small pieces, at Meridian thick foggy Weather and small Winds inclining to the Southward, smooth Sea, in labd. Steering sails, set Stay Sails, M. sail, &c., very thick Weather. No observation. Distance 139. Lat. 45.34. Long. 41.56.

Tuesday, June 22d. Wind W. B. S. Pleasant little breeze and still hazy and thick foggy weather, with smooth sea. Wind W. S. W. in Royals T. G. steering sails, sprit S. T. S., Water sail, &c. Wind S. W. Set Royals, &c., thick foggy with a moderate breeze. At Meridian Foggy, no observation. Distance 152. Lat.

45.56. Long. 38.20.

Wednesday, June 23d. Wind S. W. Small Rain, at 3 the Wind shifted to the N. W. Shifted steering sails and driver. Pleasant breeze, Flattering and small Wind, in steering sails. Wind Northward. Calm. Wind W. N. W. small breeze set all sail, at 11 the Wind at Westward set starboard Steering sails, still hazy Weather, Wind West. Distance 95. Lat. 46.41. Long. 36.18.

Thursday, June 24th. Wind West, Light Air of Wind along with thick Foggy Weather, small Rain and smooth Sea. Wind W. S. W. Still thick Weather smooth Sea and very light Air of Wind. Saw a sail head standing to the Eastward about 4 Leagues. At Meridian almost Calm. Distance 76. Lat. observed

47. Long. 34.29.

Friday, June 25th. Wind W. S. W. Very light Air of Wind and Cloudy Weather all sail set, swell from the N. E. Wind S. S. W. in Larboard Steering sails, set M. Sail and Stay Sails fore and aft, in T. G. Steering Sail, Wind S. W. set T. G. Steering Sail. Spoke a Ship from St. Croix bound for Copenhagen, 4 Weeks out, the Roosavel, Capt. Johnson. At Meridian fine pleasant Weather small air of Wind and smooth Sea,

the Dean astern. Distance 90. Lat. 47.39. Long.

32.29.

Saturday, June 26th. Wind S. W. Light Airs of Wind and clear pleasant Weather, all sail set with smooth sea, saw a Brig to the Northward standing to the East. In T. G. steering sail. Set T. G. Steering Sail, saw a Snow to the S. E. standing to the Eastward. Wind S. S. W. at Meridian thick foggy Weather. small wind, and swell from N. W. No observation.

Distance 110. Lat. 48.11. Long. 29.52.

Sunday, June 27th. Wind W. S. W. Light air of Wind, thick foggy Weather, swell from the N. W. Wind variable and flattering to the Northward, in Royals and T. G. Steering Sails. In Steering Sails and set Stay Sails fore and aft, the wind inclining to the N. E. A sail to the S. W. a Snow, which we take to be the Mercury Packet from New York, at Meridian small air and pleasant Weather. Distance 132. Lat. observed 48.23. Long. 26.36.

Monday, June 28th. Wind N. E. Light Airs of wind and flattering with pleasant clear Weather and smooth Sea, a Snow to the S. W. going astern fast, set Mizn. T. G. sail and driver. Saw a sail to the S. S. E. a great distance off. At Meridian very light Air of wind inclining to a Calm with pleasant Weather.

Distance 92. Lat. observed 48.9. Long. 24.35.

Tuesday, June 29th. Wind N. E. A very light air of wind and flattering, with clear Pleasant Weather, a sail to the S. E. a great distance steering to the Eastward. Wind E. B. N. small air inclining to a Calm. Wind S. E. Tack to the N. Eastward, at Meridian small air and fine pleasant weather, southerly current. Distance 54. Lat. observed 47.47. Long. 23.22.

Wednesday, June 30th. Wind S. E. B. S. Small breeze and clear pleasant Weather, swell from N. E. a large ship to the Southward of us, standing to the East. Wind S. S. E. In Royals and T. G. Stay sails, Cloudy unsettled Weather, Wind South set sprit sail T. S. and Mizn T. G. Sail, at Meridian cloudy Weather with a

pleasant little Breeze, all sail set. Distance 152. Lat.

observed 48.30. Long. 19.45.

Thursday, July 1st. Wind South. Fresh breeze cloudy unsettled Weather Swell from S. W. in Royals Sprit sail F. S. T. G. Stay Sail &c. In driver, in middle stay sail &c. T. G. Sails, strong breeze and thick weather with Rain. Set Royals and Steering sails below and aloft Wind S. W. at Meridian small wind inclining to a calm with thick foggy Weather. Distance 150. Lat. 48.53. Long. 15.59.

Friday, July 2d. Wind S. W. Light air and flattering with thick hazy Weather and smooth sea. Wind variable, almost Calm. Wind S. E. B. S. set Mizn. T. G. Sail, driver, &c. At Meridian nothing extraordinary, set Royals and driver, Sprit S. T. Sail

&c. Distance 50. Lat. 49.25. Long. 14.59.

Saturday, July 3d. Wind S. B. W. Fine pleasant breeze with thick hazy Weather and small rain, all sail set to advantage Wind S. S. W. Thick cloudy Weather in Royals, Mizn. T. G. S. and Sprit Sail. T. Sail, at 12 brought too and sounded, no ground. Set driver, still thick foggy Weather, Wind W. S. W. set Steering Sails small wind, Royalls, &c. Wind-West, Light winds, steering Sails all sides. Distance 175. Lat. 49.30. Long. 10.52.

Sunday, July 4th. Wind W. N. W. Light airs of Wind and thick foggy Weather, all sails set smooth Sea. Shifted driver and steering sails, set T. G. Steering sails, sprit Sail, T. G. &c. foggy with pleasant breeze, saw several Gannets. Distance 131. Lat. observed

49.21. Long. 7.34.

Monday, July 5th. Wind N.W. Pleasant breeze with thick foggy Weather and swell from N.W. bent Cables, at 8, P. M. at 80 Fathom water fine white sand. Variable and flattering, in Steering Sails, set stay sails, about 78 Fathom water fine sand. Wind N.N. E. Squally with some rain unsettled Weather. Wind N.B. E. at Meridian fine Breeze and cloudy Weather. Distance 137. Lat. observed 49.29. Long. 4.16. M. Distance 2,971.

Tuesday, July 6th. At half after 4 P. M. made Scilly about 5 Leagues distant, stood up Channel. Met Admiral Spry with five or six sail on their Passage from Portsmouth to Falmouth, where they had been to receive his Majesty who was greatly pleased with the Appearance of the Fleet in Portsmouth.

Wednesday, July 7th. half after ten in the Morning Embarked off Dunnose in the Isle of Wight on board a small Cutter and got to Portsmouth about three in the Afternoon. The Harbour a very fine one and a great Arsenal for Kings Shipping of which great Numbers were laid up, our Time too short to see the dock Yards.

Landed at Portsmouth from the good Ship Earl of Dunmore Capt. Effingham Lawrence, Master. It being late in the day, and General Gage being desirous to get a stage or two on the Road that Evening we had not time to Visit the Dock Yards. The harbour is certainly one of the finest in the Kingdom, where there are always great numbers of the Kings Ships laid up. The Town appears to be neatly built, the Fortifications are clean and appear to be kept in good order. We lay that Evening at Petersfield, a small Village about 18 Miles from Portsmouth.

Thursday, July 8th. We proceeded on our Journey, Breakfasted at Liphook 12, or 14 Miles, from Liphook, we passed thro' Guilford, a pretty Town, situated on the side of a Hill. Two old, or rather the Ruins of two old Castles appear on two heights at the back of the Town, we pursued our Road and were landed at the end of our stage at Godlemin a small pleasant Village where we Dined, our next stage was to Kingston, from whence we got to London about 7 in the Evening. I was surprised to see so much heath and Uncultivated Country as appeared particularly on the Road, between Petersfield and Liphook, tho' the Country from the heights was as beautiful as could be imagined, and shown to the greatest advantage, the Corn near its full growth and the general verdure of the Country exceeds description.

Attended General Gage to the Kings Levee, was presented to his Majesty, who graciously permitted me

to kiss his hand \*

Friday, July 9th, to Monday, 12th. Employed in different observations. Saw Westminster Abbey was struck with Awe on entering it. The Dome of St. Pauls gives a Wonderful Idea of the power of the Celebrated Artist, Sir Christopher Wren, İt's whole Appearance and Magnitude exceeding any Idea I could form of it. Vaux-Hall has a surprising effect. The number of Lights disposed to advantage is very great. You pay one Shilling entrance but if you eat or Drink, they Charge most extravagantly for it. Sir Sampson Gideon's place, Belvedere, is very pretty the view of the Thames from it is fine and in some places very extensive Sir Henry Bank's at Wimbledon, is likewise finely improved, and many Elegant views from it. Lord Despencer borders on him and gives him several handsome Water Views.

Tuesday, July 20th. Paid my respects to the Sec-

retary at War.

Thursday, July 22d. Was presented to her Majesty, who with a small portion of beauty, has something very pleasing in her countenance; in the Evening went to Vaux-Hall, returned by Water thro' Westminster Bridge which is a very fine one, as is Black Friars,

Landed at White Hall.

Saturday. July 24th. Accompanied Lord Gage, The Generals and their Ladies to Sion house founded by Protector Somerset Duke, now in the possession of his Grace the Duke of Northumberland in whose absence it is necessary to procure a Ticket for admittance which was brought by Sir H. Banks, who, with his Lady and Daughter met us there. The appearance of the house is not very striking and is built in the Gothic Style but requires more Taste and knowledge than I possess to

give any Idea of it's magnificence within. The house is not large, but the apartments in general well proportioned. You enter a spacious Hall, the Floor of which is of the finest Black and white Marble, a Statue of Apollo, and one of a dying Gladiator are opposite to each other at the ends of the Hall, both of excellent workmanship as are the Statues of Augustus Cesar Scipio and Livy, affixed in niches in the wall. On ascending three or four marble steps, you enter whats called the Vestibule, a room about 26 feet square, adorned with 12 Magnificant Pillars of Ver Antique said to come from the Herculaneum; The floor of Cement in the form of variagated Marble inlaid, the whole furniture of the Room supposed to cost 30 Thousand Pounds.

The Dining Room joins it, elegantly furnished, six Marble Statues appear in Niches in the Wall, The Ceil-

ing Stucco finely Gilt.

A most Elegant Drawing Room joins it, hung with a Crimson Silk ground and with a white sprig running thro' it, The Ceiling in Mosaic work with many Fine Antique paintings. Three large Pier Glasses of a great size, one over the Chimney piece, the other between the windows, each 9 feet 3 inches high by 6 feet 1 inch Broad. A very fine Screen of the Gobelin Manufacture is found in one of the Corners of the Room, it appears at a small distance like the finest painting. The Chimney piece is of the finest white Marble elegantly gilt, the hearth of variagated Marble inlaid in the most superb manner. The next Room we saw was the Library a long Gallery of 136 feet in length 14 wide, and 14 high; the whole back face of the Building, 10 windows in front, and adorned with Paintings books &c. but valuable most for the heads of the family finely painted, beginning with Charlemagne in the year 800 from whom the family claim their descent-from Sion House went to Hampton Court, but as I could not take so particular a view of the Apartments as I wished have reserved the description of them to a

further Visit. Dined on Richmond Hill, the prospect from which is most beautiful and very extensive with several charming Views of the Thames. Drank Tea at Sir H. Banks's whose politeness as well as his Lady's

merit & have my sincere thanks.

Tuesday, July 27th. Went to the Pantheon, which is a large Oval Room, with Gallery's at sides, and in many apartments on the same Floor with the Gallery is for various uses, the Dome of the Grand Room is very spacious and finely lit from above when closed, and when lit for the Evenings entertainment it requires 16 Thousand Lamps to light it in a proper manner above and below. Underneath are Tables and Seats for six thousand People, who may be served with Tea Coffee and Chocolate, Cold Meats &c.

The same day went to Mr. Coxe's Museum, which is a wonderful piece of Mechanism and of the Richest nature, many of the pieces composed of fine Paste with

rich Stones of different sorts and some Jewels.

Thursday, July 29th. Went to White Lands to see Miss Gage at her Boarding School, met with an Accident disagreeable particularly as it will prevent me from going to Court as I intended.

Friday, July 30th. Went to Court and kissed his Majesty's hand on my Promotion being appointed

Deputy Adjutant General for North America.

Sunday, August 1st. Was at Chelsea Hospital, where there is a noble Institution for Maimed, and worn out Soldiers. The building Fine and worthy of the

generous spirit of the British Nation.

Monday, August 2d. Visited Mr. Child's House near Brentford, called Osterly House. It is on a level Situation, the House large, four faces, and a Court within very handsomely furnished with many fine Paintings, and in some Respects, especially as an habitable House superior to Sion House. The Grounds about it very extensive and kept in the neatest order with several Ponds of Water well disposed, and of a great extent which must have been very expensive in mak-

ing, at a considerable distance from the House is the Poultry Yards, Aviary &c. with many curious Birds from the Several parts of the World, a fine large piece of water prettily bordered with Trees, where are Water fowl of all sorts and a Chinese Bark with several Appartments for Family use. In the Library which is very fine are several Capital Paintings. King Charles 1st. excellently done, with the Earl of Stratford who was sacrificed to the times, and a superior Portrait on horseback of Villiers Duke of Buckingham who was stabbed by Felton, in the ground of the Picture is a fleet described which he was then fitting out for a Expedition to the Isle of Rhé.

Sunday, August 8th. Went by Water from London to Woolwich, past by Greenwich where there is a most Noble Hospital for the Reception of old, Wounded, and Infirm Sailors Discharged from the Navy. At Woolwich is an Artillery Store house where all sorts of Cannon are lodged and a Battalion of Artillery Quartered. An Academy is there founded for the Education of Young Gentlemen who are intended for the Military Life, where fortification, Gunnery &c. is taught in the highest Perfection. Was much pleased with the dry Dock for Building his Majesty's Shipping, several of which were there on the Stocks, one or two 74 Gun Ships and some smaller.

Wednesday, August 11th. From London to Croydon 10 Miles, a small Village of one Street only. Godstone 10 Miles, Situated very low and surrounded with Hills. East Grinsted 12 miles a small village situated on a rough rising ground, Uchkfield 10 miles. Lewes 8 miles a County Town in Sussex where the Races are held Yearly, at which the Duke of Richmond Presides as Lord Lieutenant, and gives a fifty pound Plate himself. The Course a very fine one and so situated as to be seen the whole four miles round. Lewes is situated on the side of a Hill, is not very large, but clean and neat. Lord Gage's Seat at Firle is five miles from Lewes, pleasantly situated but Commands no great

prospect of Country. The House is a very good one with four faces and a small Court within from which you enter a fine Hall, above the Gate way is a long Gal-

lery upwards of one hundred feet long.

Wednesday, August 18th. From Lewes to Brighthelmstone 8 miles, a Pretty Town situated on the Sea with a fine fertile Country round it, many of the Nobility and Gentry resort to it during the Summer Months to drink and bathe in the Sea Water, but it has no buildings or anything else worth remarking. From Brighthelmstone to Bramber is 9 miles, over a high and very extensive down, with the Sea on your left and a rich and pleasant Country on your right, and in front, the whole Affording a most extensive View of the richest nature and very beautiful to the Eye. The downs in this Country feed large Flocks of Sheep. From Bramber to Finelon 6 miles, the like Views and Country but rather exceeding it in height and prospect.

Thursday, August 19th. To Arundel 9 miles, thro'a low road between Hills and not anything worth Remarking. Arundel is a small Sea Port Town in Sussex and a great Corn Market, Ship, Timber, Malt &c. Balance of trade greatly in its favor Importing little but Coal in Return. Remarkable for having near it an Ancient Castle, now in Ruins the only one in England that gives the Title of Earl to the Possessor. The Defences were destroyed by Oliver Cromwell, and is now in possession of the Duke of Norfolk, who is of the Romish faith, and a neat Chapel is now to be seen among those Appartments that are habitable, none of which are Elegant, or have any fine Paintings in them, at this time there are none but Servants, and its but seldom that the possessor resides there.

Friday, August 20th. From Arundel to Chichester by Lord Newburgh's and Slindon is 12 miles, the Prospect from Lord Newburgh's is fine, but nothing in the House either Curious or extraordinary. Chichester is a Bishop's See pleasantly situated about 4 miles from the Sea, it's Trade not so great as Arundel, but the

same Staple. The Cathedral is very well worth seeing, it is a very Ancient Building & very curious in it's style, near Chichester the Duke of Richmond has a Seat, but as there was nothing particular in it's furniture, We did not go to see it, having an equal View from the Down in our Road to Midhurst. About five miles from Chichester you gain the Ascent of a very high Hill, On your right is the Duke of Richmonds, on your left and rear is a prospect of a highly cultivated Country, with a View of Portsmouth, St. Helens Road, Isle of Wight, &c. Midhurst is a small Country Town, visited for its Neighborhood to Cowdray House belonging to Lord Montague who is a Catholic. Cowdray House is a square with Towers at each Angle and is very Ancient, Accounts having been found for repairs done near a thousand Years. It is situated very low with a pretty Stream of Water near it. There are many fine Paintings to be seen. In the Dining Room are Representations done by Holbein on the Wainscot, of Henry the 8ths Attack of Boulogne, his Interview with the King of France, and Coronation Procession of Edward the 6th.

Sunday, August 22d. From Midhurst to Petworth is 7 Miles, thro' a rough Stony Country and bad Roads. Petworth is a small Town sought by the Traveller, on Account of a most Elegant House near it belonging to the Earl of Egremont, which is built in the Modern Style, but the Apartments very Noble and I think on the whole exceed any House I've seen for the Largeness and just proportion of the Rooms, furnished in the most Superb Manner, in one Gallery are 11 Statues, and 12 Busts, all said to come from the Herculaneum with several others in the Hall which is very handsomely floored with different colored Marble, but none of the Statues are perfect, either decayed by time, or having suffered some Mutilation. The Paintings on the great Stair Way are very fine and have a noble Effect, besides many Elegant Paintings done by the best hands in which the several Appartments abound. The Emperor Charles the Fifth is said to have lodged in this House when he was in England, and show the Room he then lay in, now called the Royal Chamber. The Present Earl of Egremont is just of Age, and was left by his

Father about 18 thousand a year.

Monday, August 23d. Went to Midhurst again and from thence to Petersfield, which is 11 Miles, from Petersfield to West Main in Hampshire, to Colonel Skinners, 7 Miles from Skinners to Wickham, by Lord Clanrickards 12 Miles. Lord Clanrickards House is situated very low, but has a pleasant Stream of Water running near it, which adds greatly to its beauty.

Tuesday, August 24th. from Wickham to Gosport is 9 miles, directly opposite to Portsmouth, which we visited with the Dock Yards which are the finest in the World, was on board the Princess Royal a ninety Gun Ship on the Stocks near Compleat, and to be Launched in two Months, as well as the Britannia, one of the largest Ships in the Navy, moored in the Harbour carrying 120 Guns. We likewise took a View of the Extensive Works carrying on for the defence of the place by land, which are scarcely more to be seen now, but their traces of the designed Work. Gosport is fortified with a Rampart and Ditch, the whole Works on both sides of the Harbour, would require great numbers of men to defend them, supposed not less than 20 Thousand Men at least.

Wednesday, August 25th. Went to Southampton 22 Miles from Gosport by Water, a pretty agreeable Navigation, with the Isle of Wight on our left about 5 Miles, till you come opposite to South Sea Castle, which is about 9 Miles from Southampton, which is a Water drinking place for the Great and Idle. From Southampton to Romsey is 8 miles, and 16 from thence to Salisbury, over a high Country and fine Road, with many pleasing Prospects. Salisbury is a pretty Town on the Avon, famous for Woolen Manufactures and Cutlery, within three miles of Wilton, where the Carpets are made, in the Neighborhood of which is Wilton

Abbey, a Seat of the Earl of Pembrooke's whose Father was a great encourager of the Carpeting Manufacturies, which by his Encouragement only was brought to the flourishing state it now is in. Wilton Abbey was one of the Religious Houses Henry the 8th. laid his hands on and gave to the Predecessors of the present Lord. It is of a Quadrangular form of a Noble Approach. In the Area are several Noble Statues in Niches, and many more in a Superb Hall, with a great number of fine Paintings that are shown you, the Avon and Nadder both run near it, and supply it with plenty of Water of which there are many Elegant Views. on the whole it is supposed to be one of the most completely furnished Houses in England and the grounds about laid out and Ornamented in the finest manner.

Thursday, August 26th. after Visiting Wilton we went to Lord Radnor's House, about three miles from Salisbury, commonly called Longfordhouse. It is an Ancient house of a Triangular form Situated very low on the Banks of the Avon, which affords a most pleasing view from the House, many fine Paintings are to be seen in it, in which consists it's greatest beauty, tho' the appearance of the House, is neat and pleasing as are the Apartments within. The Cathedral at Salisbury is very well worth seeing for it's curious and Ancient Workmanship, the Pillars are admired for their peculiar form and smallness, as well as numbers. This Building

is very large and Ancient.

Friday, August 27th. From Salisbury to Deptford over the Downs by Stone Henge is 18 miles, after passing half way over the Down you come to a Stone Henge, which is so called from moving a monstrous Stone, which lying on another so equally poised that the weight of the Body puts it in motion. There are 25 upright stones about 10 or 20 feet high, and 10 or 12 feet square of great thickness, they seem to have been disposed in a Circular form, some of the upright Stones are joined by a large flat Stone Communicating from one to the other which Appears to have been done by Art,

as the upright Stones are let into the Flat ones by a Mortise, and forms as it were a bridge, there are many more large and small lying about, some without, but most within the Circle, one at a good distance is said to have been thrown there by the Devil, who was enraged at a Monk and threw it at him, and hit him in the Heel, the impression of which is now seen in the Stone. discovery has yet been made for what end these Stones could have been put there, or how such large Bodies could be moved, for they must have been brought a great distance as there is not the Appearance of a Stone within many miles. From Deptford to Warminster 11 miles, thro' a fine Corn Country, Warminster is a pretty large Country Town but not remarkable for anything. From Warminster to Bath, thro' Norton St. Philips, to which place the Country is rather close but after you pass thro' N. St. Philips it opens and is very Hilly, affords many rich and pleasing prospects, about a Mile and a half from Bath you gain the Ascent of a very high Hill, which looks into the City and Adjacent Country which is very delightful. Ancient Bath lay's very low, on the Banks of the Avon, and was only famous for the Baths hot and Cold, but is now admired for the Elegance of it's new Buildings, which exceed anything in England, the Streets are broad and Houses Magnificent situated on the side, and some near the summit of a very high Hill. The Circus is an Oval pile of Building uniformly Completed, and is pretty to the Eye, but the Crescent which is in form of an half Moon now near Compleated is very Grand, in it's design and Execution, and has a Noble view of the Country from every front in the whole pile. The Ball Room, Tea Room, Card Room, &c. are of the first order and far surpass anything of the kind in England. The Baths are very Curious, and deserve great Attention. From Oxford Road, are several Views of the low Country, one in particular very fine about four miles from Bath, at a Monument erected to the Memory of Sir Bevil Granville, by Lord Lansdowne, Sir Bevil Granville was Killed

in an Action between him & Sir William Waller, who commanded a part of the Parliamentary Forces in Charles the First's time, from this Monument you have a View of the Bristol Channel, City of Bristol, part of Wales, and great part of Gloucestershire, Worcestershire and Wiltshire, and from one point of View you see the Cities of Bath & Bristol at the same time.

Saturday, August 28th. From Bath to Bristol is 13 miles, Bristol is a large fine City, situated partly on the side of a fine Hill, and many fine prospects from it, among the rest is that height Oliver Cromwell possessed when he took Bristol, with the perfect form of the Lines and Batterie's he threw up on that occasion, which Commanded the whole City. Prince Rupert's place of Encampment is likewise shown when he came to the relief of Bristol, which he could not effect. This Country is full of Coal, and abounds in brass and Copper Manufacturies, which are carried on here with great success on account of the ease in getting Coal for those works. The Rivers Frome and Avon meet here, large Boats go 70 and 80 miles up the Avon, and bring down the Produce of the Country and Manufacturies. About 4 or 5 Miles from Bristol, is a house of Mr. Southwell, which is most delightfully situated having an extensive prospect of the Channel, Wales, and of the low Country on the Bristol side of the Channel. Castle Blase belonging to a Mr. Farr, deserves particular notice for it's beautiful Situation, and neat appearance, having a full view of the Channel, King Road, Wales &c., near it is a very steep Valley, and if we believe Ancient Stories, where the Avon did Run formerly, but that St. Jerome having had a Quarrel with a Giant of a Monstrous size, who was in the Valley, the Saint turned the course of the Water to prevent the Giant from Washing his feet, as he was accustomd to do. Opposite to the Hills are the Vestiges of two Ancient Encampments, supposed one to be Roman from the Cement that had been used in facing the Rampart, the other British from no Cement being used, but only loose stone. The Situation of

both is very Strong and requires but one face to be fortified, the other being protected by nature. From Bristol to London 113 Miles, thro' Bath, Marlborough, Reading, Maidenhead &c. but as we came the first part of the way in the dark, and the other part were very Sleepy, we made but few Observations, Reading Appeared to be a very pretty, and tolerably extensive Town, with some Water Running thro' it, and several fine looking houses in its Environs.

We left Bristol at 9 in the Evening, and were at

London at six the next Evening.

Sunday, August 29th to Monday, Sept. 13th. London. Went to see Mr. Foote in Major Sturgeon, Viewed the Tower, and most that is in it worth seeing, Particularly the Armory, which contains now 10,000 Small Arms fit for immediate Service, the Artillery Apartment has its curiosities, Muns Megg a monstrous large Cannon brought from the Castle at Edinburgh, a three Barreled piece of Ordnance, a monstrous large Bomb, fired at Bergenopzoom, only with the touch hole Run, Queen Annes Pocket Pistol, Elegant wrought, with a most Superb piece of Brass Ordnance, made in 1662, wrought in the richest manner possible, done when Lord Ligonier was at the Head of the Board, the Regalia is an Exhibition of the greatest riches to be seen perhaps in the world. The Spanish armory is an assemblage of Weapons taken out of the Spanish Armada, in the time of Queen Elizabeth, extraordinary in the purposes related to employ them in. The Apartment where are the figures of many of our Kings in complete Armor on horse Back, with a variety of Weapons formerly made use of, deserves our serious consideration. After Visiting the Tower I went to the Exchange, and from thence to the Bank, a most Elegant and Noble Building, which is Built in a triangular form, on the Right and left are long fine Rooms, lighted by a number of small Sky lights, the Centre room is oval and lighted by a most superb Dome, the reason for having no Windows below is to prevent Robbers from

doing Mischief, it being impossible for them to climb to so great a height as the lights above. From the Bank to Guild Hall, where the Mayor's Court is Held, and much of the Citys business respecting the Police

regulated.

Tuesday, Sept. 14th. Left London for High Meadow, with Lord and Lady Gage, where we arrived the 15th. in Evening went over Hounslow Heath, which is on the borders of Middlesex, and you cross the end of Buchinghamshire, get into a Skirt of Berkshire thro' Maidenhead, and in the course of 10 Miles into Oxfordshire, to Henley, Oxford, and Burford, near which last place we breakfasted at Mr. Dutton's, a Gentleman of a large fortune, with a fine large old House, forming a Square with a Court in the Centre. Burford is on the borders of Gloucesstshire, and from thence to Gloster, is about 30 miles, part of it a Hilly Country. Gloucester is a fine large inland City, lying on the Severn, over which there is a fine Bridge. The Manufacturing of Pins, was the only thing we saw there, which is only Curious, from the Number of hands, thro' which a Pin goes in making. From Gloster to High meadow, is about 32 or 33 miles. High meadow is a Seat of Lord Gages, in Gloucestershire, near a Village called Newland: where his Lordship has an Estate of about 2500 a Year, including Woodland adjoining to his Majesty's Forest of Dean, which supply the Iron Work (of which there are several in the Neighborhood) with Charred Coal. The Country therabout is very rough and Stony, not unlike Morris County, in New Jersey, in America, but Healthy and Cheap, for England.

Thursday, Oct. 28th. Went to see Tintern Abbey, about 8 miles from High Meadow, Tintern is in Monmouth. Here you cross the Wye just opposite to it, from whence you see it at a distance to great advantage, and has a most pleasing effect, the River making a most remarkable Elbow there. The Abbey belongs to the Duke of Beaufort, and is well worth seeing and affords a good Support to an Old Woman, who has the

care of it, and shows it to the Curious. The Gateway as you enter, is very Magnificent, and more perfect than any other part of it. It is about six hundred Years since it was built, and was founded by Earl Strigil, or Strongbow, Earl of Pembroke, whose monument is shown you in the Abbey.

Friday, Oct. 29th. Went to see Mr. Morris's near Chepstow, a beautiful place on the Wye, which affords the Eye every different view, that the Senses can be pleased with, with this a pleasing reflection, that the Vanity of the owner has reduced himself to the necessity of flying the place, and selling it to pay his Debts.

It is call'd Persfield.

Sidney, a Seat of Mr. Bathurst, has likewise many beauties, it lays about 3 Miles above Chepstow, on the Severn, at a very good Distance from the River, which it Commands for many miles up and down. There are several very fine Views about High Meadow, the two principal ones are first, Simmons Yett, which is a point of land from whence you have a noble View of the Country for many Miles round, and of the Wye, which makes a most remarkable and very beautiful Elbow there. The second, is the Kimmin, which is a hill directly back of Monmouth. from whence you have a fine View of the Town, and Country with the Wye.

Monday, Nov. 22d. Left High Meadow, on a Visit to Mr. Hanburg, at Ponte Pool, who is Member for Monmouth Co. This Gentleman's Father and Grandfather, carried on great Iron Works, at Pontepool, where they made great fortunes, and is still increasing, under the direction of the present possessor who is a Young man. The Pontepool Ware was formerly in vogue, but is now much Eclipsed by Birmingham. I there saw Hitting and Rolling of Iron. Tin was first made in England, by this Gentlemans Ancestors, who, by great pains got an Insight into the method of doing it, at Turin, and

was for years a profitable branch of Business.

Thursday, Nov. 25th. Went to Ruparra, a House belonging to Mr. Morgan, in Glamorganshire, it is an

Ancient building and of a particular structure with four Towers, one at each Angle. From a Hill at the back of this house is one of the finest Views I ever saw of the Severn, and a fine though very Hilly Country.

Friday, Nov. 26th. Went to another house about 4 miles off, belonging to the same Person, in Monmouthshire, called Trediger, which is a Noble Building, but Modern, and only one fourth of a square finished, with Elegant Stables for 90 horses. Proceded Home thro' Newport, and Chepstow, with the Severn in View for many miles. past by a House of one Mr. Van's, who married a sister of Mr. Morgan's, which is a square building with a Court within, and said to Cost 20,000 Pounds. Newport and Chepstow, have both been fortified Towns, and are both Sea Ports. The first, a very dusty Place, the latter, not much better, but has the Ruins of an Ancient and very fine Castle, formerly belonging to the Earls of Pembroke, now in the possession of the Duke of Beaufort, and destroyed by Oliver Cromwell, one Tower is still so perfect, that you can go to the top of it, with the Battlements entire and Mutilated Stone figures on the top of them. The Castle was composed of three large Courts, separated by cross Walls, and is very extensive, lying on the River Wye, and Joining to the Town Wall, of which it did form a part. The Bridge over the River is remarkable for its height, and only curious on that Account. Monmouth is the County Town of the same name, a great Market for Cattle from Wales, It lies on the Wye, down which River most of the produce of the Country goes in Barges, that carry about 25 Tons, to Chepstow, and from thence into the Severn, by Shipping it for Foreign Markets.

Thursday, Dec. 16th. Left High Meadows for Hereford, the County Town. 24 Miles, thro' a very bad Road and uneven Country. Hereford lays on the Wye, Situated low.

Friday, Dec. 17th. In the Morning went to the Cathedral, a very fine building, and has a Noble Appearance,

the Spire which is a very fine one, is bent, and appears as if it was tumbling. This Church, and the Castle Green, which is a very handsome walk bordering on the Wye, are the only two things worth seeing in Hereford. Pursued our Route to Ledbury, 16 Miles, a Country Town of no note, and in our way past by Stoke Edith, a very Elegant House of Mr. Foley's, crossed the Lugwardin, and thro' Tarrington Village. The Country very fine Interspersed with up and lowlands, and many fine Meadows. From Ledbury to Upton 11 miles, cross the Malvern Hills, a fine Natural Terrace, but so foggy that you could not see the Country on either side. From Upton to Tewkesbury's, 8 Miles, fine Country and good Roads. Tewkesbury is in Gloucestershire, a burough Town, and sends two Members to Parliament, it lays on the Severn, at the. Junction of the Severn and Avon, has one principal Street which is pretty wide and long, which, and the Church, are only worth seeing. The Church is old, and has a fine appearance, said to be founded by Robert Fitz-Hamon, a follower of William the Conquerors, who returned and died in Normandy, and his Remains were sent to be interred in his Cathedral, in the Year 1102. Monuments of the Duke and Dutchess of Clarence, are shown, whose figures are as well preserved as any I have seen. Took this Opportunity of Paying my respects to Mr. Kemble, was well received, and offered Bed, the old Gentleman spoke very obliging of my Brother Sam., and seemed to be much pleased to hear that, he was so well provided for.

Saturday, Dec. 18th. Proceded to Worcester 16 Miles, and parted with General and Mrs. Gage, who went to Bath, our Roads very good and a fine Country, the Severn frequently in sight, whose banks are very pretty. Worcester is a very fine City and a County Town of the same Name. The principal Street called Foregate is a very fine extensive Street. The Cathedral is an Ancient Building from the top of which, you have a fine View of the Severn and Country round

the Town, which you likewise see to great Advantage and a very handsome, pretty place it is, something larger than New York. In the Cathedral you are shown St. Wulstan's Tomb, who was the founder in the year 1084, you are likewise shown King John's, and Prince Arthur's Monuments, Son to Henry 7th. Doctor Johnston, formerly at Westminster, is now Bishop of Worcester. The China Manufactury at this place is well worth seeing, where China of the first and finest patterns are made, Many Setts have been sold to the King, and the justest Imitation of old China taken, and the most Elegant fashions of the newest samples to be had, It is almost the only work of the nature that has throve in England. From Worcester and Broomsgrove 14 Miles, Good Road and a pleasant Country, past thro' Droitwich a small village, where there is a great Manufactury of Salt made from Salt Springs, and larger quantities might be made if they had a Vent for it, Broomsgrove is a Village of no great Note, their Manufactories consist only in some Linen. To Birmingham which is Warrickshire 13 Miles, a good Country and nothing Remarkable on the Road but Lickey Common, or hill, from whence you see Birmingham, and have a prospect of a fine Country. To Litchfield 16 Miles, you pass thro' Yinton, Sutton-Coldfield, and over Hill Common, from whence you have a fine View of Litchfield, and a fine Country. Lord Arnhams Seat and Shinston Village you pass but none of them Considerable, Litchfield is a good Country Town, is with Coventry a Bishops See, has an old Cathedral, said to be of an hundred Years standing, but not remarkable for anything else. From Litchfield to Birmingham, by Stratton, Aldridge, and the Beacon, is 20 Miles. From the Beacon there is a very fine View, but the day was so dull that we could see but a short distance.

Two Miles from Birmingham, is Mr. Boltons Manufactory, where we saw the process of Button making, Watch Chains, Trinkets, Tea Table Furniture, Orna-

mental Figures, Curious Machinery, &c. There are 800 Souls daily employed in this Manufactory, but many of whom are Children, and Women; Steel, Silver and inlaid Swords are made there, with Buckles in different Metals, all in the greatest perfection. Birmingham, is a large Town but sends no Memberers to Parliament, and is the greatest hard Ware Manufacturing Town in the Kingdom, and perhaps in the World. The Paper Manufactory is likewise worth Notice, we were shown the different process a Snuff Box goes thro', Toothpick Cases, Salvers, Tea boards, Panels for Coaches, &c. is likewise made of Paper, which is there worked to as great perfection as in France. Water Navigation is brought from the Severn, to Birmingham about 50 Miles, by which all the Coal for the Consumption of the Inhabitants and Manufactories, is brought in Boats that carry from 22 to 27 tons, and delivered at the Wharf, at 4.3 per hundred, whereas when brought by land Carriage, it was never less than 6½ or 7 per hundred. 200 Boats at least are employed in this business, and pay a Toll of 3 per Ton. Canal is about 16 feet broad and 6 or 7 deep.

The plating and Gilding for Coffins, Picture frames, bordering for Rooms, is there done by Stamps and dies, with incredible expedition and Cheapness. From Birmingham to Henley is 14 miles, bad Road but fine Country, to Stratford 8 Miles, and 2 from Henley, is a handsome House of a Mr. Hottains. To Shipton is 11 miles; to the Chapel Inn is 10 Miles, Hilly and deep Country, past by a house of Mr. Shildons, called Weston in Oxfordshire. From Chapel Inn to Woodstock 10 Miles, good road and fine Country, Breakfasted at the Bear, took Horse and went to see Blenheim Park, and Waters, Bridges, Cascades, &c. which are certainly the Noblest I have seen. Lord Litchfields about 3 Miles from Blenheim, called Ditchley, we viewed, it's an Elegant House, and has many fine paintings, returned thro' the Park over a new bridge to Blenheim House, which has four fronts, but one of them and the Prin-

cipal, faces the Obelisk, and a fine Avenue, is a Crescent. You enter the House by a Spacious Hall, with a bust of the great Duke Marlborough fronting you. You go on the left hand thro' a Gallery to a Suite of Rooms which are Elegantly furnished. The Virgin and Child, with St. John and St. Nicholas, one on each side, and a Magdalen, are very fine Paintings; in the blue Drawing Room are six Capital Pictures, said to be worth two thousand Guineas each, and a seventh, our Saviour taken from the Cross, by Raphael, worth two thousand seven hundred. Three Tapiestry Rooms represent Gobelin work, the first the four Cardinal Virtues, the other two, the great Dukes several Battles. Library is a most Magnificent Room, 183 feet 5 Inches long, and 21 feet 9 Inches wide, at the upper end is a Statue of Queen Ann, of white Marble, most Elegantly finished by the famous Sculpture Rysbrack, reckoned as fine a Statue as any in England. At the other end is a bust of Alexander the Great, which his Grace gave two thousand Guineas for, brought from some Ruins in Egypt. There are in the Library 24,000 Volumes, said to cost 30 thousand pounds, the Saloon is a fine Room, on the Ceiling is painted the great Duke in a Triumphal Chariot with Eagle on his Staff. The Panels represent the figures and Dress of different Nations, and all below of different Coloured Marble. The Hall is lighted by Sky lights very finely. In the Chapel is a Monument of 1st Duke of Marlborough, and his Duchess, in white Marble, with their two Sons, done in white Marble, on a black ground, Supported by Fame and History, at the bottom a bas Relief, the Taking Marshal Tallard Prisoner. From Woodstock to Oxford 8 miles, good road and fine Country. Mr. Burt good enough to attend us thro' the Town, went first to the Bodleian Library, which is a fine building, and incloses one hundred fifty thousand Volumes, from thence we went to Radcliffe Library, a donation to that Seminary of Learning from Bishop Radcliffe. It is a very fine oval building, and very Elegant within, Lighted in a great measure

by a very fine Dome, closed at the top, but has very few Books in it. All Souls College, is a very fine Quadrangular building, in a Gallery of which are many fine Paintings, with a noble Statue in Brass of the Earl of Pembroke, who was Chancellor of Oxford in James 1st time. There is likewise a very fine Library in this College, as well as in all the rest, and a handsome Chapel. New College is of the preceeding form, Elegantly built, with a fine Library left by Governor Codrington, of Barbadoes, whose bust is there well done.

## 1774.

About Monday, Fan. 10th. Took a ride with General Gage, to Sir Jeffry Amherst's, near Sevenoak's in Kent, about 24 Miles from London. Who has built a very clever convenient small house, and beautifully situated, the Obelisk before his door relates his conquests in America, under the Auspicies of that able Statesman Mr. Pitt,\* there is a Bas Relief of Montreal over his

\* Soon after General Amherst returned from America, he pulled down his old family seat, called Brookes Place, at Riverhead, about a mile from Sevenoaks, in Kent, and erected at a small distance from it an elegant stone mansion, which he named Montreal, in memory of his success in Canada.

Col. Kemble copied the following inscriptions from the four sides of the base of the obelisk.

Thursday, Feb. 10th. Accompanied Sir Sampson Gideon, to Hays a place of Lord Chathams, about 14 Miles from London, which is a very habitable good House, but no more, nor it remarkable, tho' a pleasant situation.

Saturday, Feb. 19th. Accompanied Mrs. James, and Mrs. Gage, to see the Queens Palace, which is a very pretty building, part of the Wainscoating on the top of the Stairs, is so finely painted that you can imagine on coming up, that it is an Alcove, when it's only a deception. There are many very Capital Paintings in the several Apartments, Charles the 1st. on horse back, as big as the Life, most Elegantly done by Vandyke, The Battle before Quebec, and Mr. Wolfe's death, is there likewise finely painted by Mr. West.

Thursday, March 3rd. Went to the drawing Room at Court, and to the Candle room in the Evening, and

to a large Rout at Mr. Franks's at Night.

The Winter taken up in going to Publick places of Diversion, Plays, Operas, Concerts, Orations, &c. Bach's Concert the most esteemed, where one Cramar leads the Concert, who is one of the first Violins in the World, Mr. Fisher, on the Hautboy is extremely great. Miss. Davis, is the first Singer at the Opera's, Signor Millico, a Eunuch, is her Competitor, the rest very Indifferent, except the Dancers, who are, first Madam Henneel, who came from Paris, to dance at her husbands benefit Signor Fiervall, who is the first Italian Dancer on our Stage. Slingsby, an English Man, Danced at the same time, and for Agility and position, equal, if not Superior, to the Italian. Signor Sceiolly & Signora Gauly, are likewise on the Opera Stage, but of no great Note. Lucio Vevo, Perseo, and Antigonus, are the Operas I have seen. The Oratorios are Samson and the Messiah.

About Friday, April 1st. Went to the Museum, with our friends of Arlington Street, Saville Row, and

St. James's Square, a View of the Lava, a good Representation running from Mount Vesuvius or Etna, well worth seeing, but passed thro' the different rooms so quick, that it was impossible to take a just or exact survey of any of the Curiosities now there, Models of the large Diamonds belonging to several Crowned Heads to be seen there, as well as private People.

Thursday, April 28th. Went down to New Market, with Sir Sampson, Lady Gideon, Lord and Lady Gage, and my Sister, to Sir Sampsons house, called Abington, saw the Horses in the Course, but could not stay to

see them Run, and returned to London.

Monday, May 2d. Viewed Cambridge, and the Colleges, with many Curious Manuscripts of Chinese and other Nations, Lord Montforts House, very well worth seeing, but in many Peoples opinion much spoilt

by a large but spacious Hall.

Mr. Vernons hot House at New Market, well worth seeing, Strawberrys ripe on 1st May, with Apricots, Peaches, &c. half grown, and the greatest variety of flowers of the finest sorts, the Country in general about New Market, very low and fenny, and much land in the Country of little Value from the foregoing reason.

Tuesday, May 3d. Got a Ticket from Mrs. Gage, a Compliment from Sir Charles Davers, to see Boodis Subscription Masquerade at the Pantheon, was in the Character of Don Felix, and in the Evening at Lady Flemings, and Mrs ————, who saw Marks; where there was a great Number of People, and many various as well as strange Characters, went to the Pantheon at one, found Capt. Campbell, and sought Mrs. Barton, but could not find her, stayed to view the Room which was Elegantly Lighted indeed, at the Upper end a round Temple, which was Transparent, and a grand Staircase leading to the Gallerys on each side. Figures were painted on the Temple, which was Transparent, and had a pretty appearance.

A Communication was opened at the Opposite end of the Room as you came in, from Gallery to Gallery,

and Pillars raised in Imitation of Variegated Marble, on which the lights had a good effect, in the Centre was an Oval form of Lamps, behind and thro' which you saw a Globe made of variagated Lamps, which was continually burning and very beautiful, the Dome lighted as formerly but rather in a more elegant manner, and the Lights clearer.

Friday, May 6th. Saw two Regiments of Light Horse Viz: Elliot's, and Burgoyne's, viewed by General Preston, on Black Heath, but by a severe Shower of Rain, was prevented from seeing them go thro' their Maneuveurs, with so much order and celerity, as they would have done. Marching off by files to the Rear

by the left, a very pretty Movement.

Sunday, May 8th. Left London for Gravesend accompanied by Lord and Master Gage's, who returned

in the Evening to Town.

Monday, May 9th. Embarked on board the Lady Gage, Captain Mesnard, for North America, with the following Cabin Passengers: Colonel and Mrs. James, and Miss Dea, Captain and Mrs. Blakeney, Captain Groves, Lts. Lenthall, Beckwith, Wood, and Blucke, all of the 28th Regiment, Mr. Morris, a French Gentleman, Mr. Erkelens, a Dutch Gentleman, Mr. Kohl, Mr. Stark, Mr. English, Captain Southgait, Mrs. Gage and Nurse.

Sailed at one with a moderate breeze, and came to

anchor at 8 off Holy Haven.

Tuesday, May 10th. Winds Easterly and fair Weather; at I A. M. weighed and came to Anchor at 7, on the Wash, in 7 fathom; Land End of Shippy, S. S. W. Afternoon, strong Gales at E. S. E.; wore away two thirds of Cable.

Wednesday, May 11th. Winds E. at 1 P. M. Weighed and worked down in Horse Shoe hole; Anchored at 5 in five fathom, Reculver's Church bearing S. S. W.

weighed and sailed thro' the Narrows, with the Wind at E. N. E.; least Water 31 fathoms; at 8 P. M. passed

Friday, June 17th. Wind S. W. All these 24 hours Pleasant Weather but hazy, smooth Water, and all sail set. Distance, 93. Lat. observed, 41.58. Long. 55.12.

Saturday, June 18th. Wind S. W. All the fore part of these 24 hours fine Weather, and smooth Sea. At 11 P. M. spoke a Sloop from Nantucket, but at too great a distance to be heard distinctly; we supposed her to be a Whaler. At 11 A. M. spoke a Brig, the Diana, Capt. Riddle, from New York, 8 days out, Reckoned himself in 56.30, W. Long. bound to Liverpool. The latter part of these 24 hours pleasant Weather, but threatning Rain. Distance, 110. Lat. observed, 41.57. Long. 57.40.

Sunday, June 19th. Wind S. W. Light Breezes with small showers of Rain in the beginning of these 24 hours. The latter part, light Breezes and fair Weather, with a large Sea from the S. W. Distance, 52. Lat.

observed, 42.39. Long. 57.58.

Monday, June 20th. Wind S. W. Light Breeze and fair Weather all the fore part of these 24 hours. At 4 A. M. Spoke a Brig from the Coast of Guinea, bound to Nantucket, reckoned himself in 56 Long. At 6 A. M. Sounded with 100 fathom line, no Bottom. At noon Sounded with the same line, no Bottom. Distance, 74. Lat. observed, 43.32. Long. 59.9.

Tuesday, June 21st. Wind W. S. W. The fore

part of these 24 hours, moderate Gales and mostly fair. Sounded 35 Fathom and failed. At 6 P. M. saw the Isle of Sable bearing N. N. W. about 3 Leagues. At 7 Saw two Sail, one standing to the Westward and Southward, whom we had in view in the morning, but ran her out of sight by 10 A. M. The latter part of the 24 hours breezy and cloudy. Distance, 86. Lat. observed, 42.56. Long. 60.57.

Wednesday, June 22d. Wind S. S. E. The first part and middle of these 24 hours very hard Squalls with Rain, and a heavy Sea from the Southward. Ship labours much. At 4 P. M. down both T. G. Yards. At 8 handed both Top Sails. Set both top Sails. The latter part moderate. Distance, 94. Lat. observed, 42:7.

Long. 62.43.

Thursday, June 23d. Wind S. B. W. The fore part of these 24 hours unsettled Weather with a large Swell from the Westward; Tacked. Heavy Squalls and large Sea. In 1st and 2d F. T. S.; handed M. T. S. Wind W. B. N. Set M. T. S., out Reefs; up M. T. Gallant Yards. Distance, 50. Lat. observed, 41.17. Long. 62.43.

Friday, June 24th. Wind S. W. These whole 24 hours pleasant Breeze and fair Weather. ‡ before 12, P. M. saw a Sloop distant about half a mile, Standing to the Eastward. Distance, 91. Lat. observed, 41.22.

Long. 64.43.

Saturday, June 25th. Wind S. S. W. and variable throughout these 24 hours. In 1st Reef F. T. S. and down T. G. Yards. In 2d Reef M. T. S. Wore Ship. Fresh Breeze and heavy swell from Westward, Squally, very hard Rain. Calm, headed to the Southward. No observation. Distance, 19. Lat. 41.10. Long. 65.2.

Sunday, June 26th. Wind N. N. E. Light Breezes and exceeding pleasant Weather these whole 24 hours throughout. Distance, 78. Lat. observed, 40.9. Long.

66.6.

Monday, June 27th. Wind N. E. All these 24 hours light Breezes, very pleasant Weather and a re-

markable Smooth Sea. Distance, 70. Lat. observed,

39.29. Long. 67.20.

Tuesday, June 28th. Wind S. E. These 24 hours light breeze, pleasant Weather and smooth Sea. At 1 P. M. the Mate struck and brought on board a Bonetta, a short, Chuncy fish, resembling a Mackarel in Taste and appearance of the flesh, with two or three black stripes running from the Tail at about half way the Back. Distance, 77. Lat. observed, 39.38. Long. 68.59.

Wednesday, June 29th. Wind W. All these 24 hours light Breezes and Calms, with mostly fair and pleasant weather. At 10 A. M. saw a Sloop about four miles distant, standing to the S. and Eastward. Distance, 51. Lat. observed, 39.34. Long. 70.5.

Thursday, June 30th. Wind S. All these 24 hours pleasant breeze and fair Weather. At 9 A. M. saw a Sloop steering to the Eastward. At noon spoke a Brig from New York, bound to Liverpool, informed us that Sandy Hook bore W. B. N. 45 Leagues, left the Hook Tuesday, 28th, at 5 o'clock. Distance, 122. Lat. observed, 39.37. Long. 72.45.

Friday, July 1st. Wind S. W. B. S. All these 24 hours light Breeses and pleasant Weather, saw many Weeds, Reeds, &c., pass by; Sounded, no bottom with 80 fathoms; Sounded 52 fathoms, fine sand and Ooze. At 10 A. M. saw a large Ship standing to the Southward. Sounding, 37 fathoms, fine sand. Sandy Hook bears N. W. about 55 Miles. Distance, 76. Lat. observed, 39.54. Long. 74.21.

Saturday, July 2d. Wind S. W. B. W. All these 24 hours Light Breezes with pleasant, tho mostly hazy Weather. Sounded, 35, 34, 28, 24, and 16½ fathoms. No observation. Distance, 50. Lat. 40.12. Long. 75.21. M.

Distance, 3,023.\*

Monday, July 18th. Embarked at New York for Boston, Sailed thro' the Sound and landed at Rhode Island the 20th, to Boston the 21st, and to Danvers the 22d; found the General and the rest of my friends in good health.

Saturday, August 6th. His Majesty's Ship Scarborough arrived with the Acts of Parliament for regulating the Government of the Massachusetts Bay.

Monday, August 8th. A number of the New Coun-

cil met and were sworn in.

Tuesday, August 16th. The whole of the Council were Assembled at Salem, when 25 in all took the Oaths, several of whom were in a short time after, from the necessity of their Situations, obliged to relinquish their Appointments. From the preceding date of the Councils meeting, till about the 26th September, the whole Province was in Commotion, obliging every Man who had shown any disposition towards upholding the Authority of Government to swear not to Act in their several stations, or to quit their habitations, and retire into Boston for Security, the Governor not excepted, whose residence at Danvers was not thought longer safe or convenient at that place.

Friday, Oct. 14th. Governor Gage was waited upon by a Committee from the Provincial Congress held at Concord, at the head of which was Mr. Hancock; but he would not receive their Address, tho' he has the perusal of it. The purport of the Address was that the Works

at the Neck should be leveled.

Monday, Oct. 17th. He received a Letter from the General Congress at Philadelphia, informing him that it was reported to them that the Inhabitants of Boston were insulted in their passage to and from the Country

by the Military: with other falshoods.

Tuesday, Oct. 18th. Lieut. Col. Cleveland and Capt. Montresor were accosted by a Man who had been carried from Boston by Admiral Montague to England for Inveigling the Soldiers from their Colours, who asked if they were not either of them Lieut. Col. Madison, on

their Answering no he drew Lieut. Col. Cleveland's Sword from his side and made several Cuts at him with it, cut him in the Cheek and on the Arm; drew a Pistol and snapped it at Col. Cleveland; drew the other and it flashed in the pan at Capt. Montresor; he then made off, but was taken at Cambridge.

Thursday, Oct. 20th. Governor Gage's Answer to the Provincial Congress appeared in the Publick Papers, which gave great pleasure to the People of every Rank who were well disposed to Government, and staggered

the opposite Party.

Friday, Oct. 21st. The Inhabitants of the Country still Continue refractory and refuse to bring or let straw be brought in for the use of the Troops. The Works on the Neck Compleated, and the Barracks for the use

of the Troops in great forwardness.

Sunday, Oct. 23d. Major General Haldimand arrived from New York with the Staff he had with him, Vizt: Major of Brigade Moncrieffe, Capt. Gamble, Capt. Hutchinson, & Lieut. Brehn, his Aide-de-Camp. and on the Evening of the same day arrived Major Carncross with two Transports containing part of the 47th Regiment. On Saturday, Oct. 29th. Col. Jones arrived from Quebec with part of the 52d Regiment, the whole of which was in Port early in the morning of the 31st. The Transports of the 10th Regiment below.

Monday, Oct. 31st. Governor Gage received a Messenger from a Committee of the Provincial Congress, desiring to know when they might wait on him, with an Address, to which he replied that they might come when ever they pleased, but that he could not receive them as a Legal Body; they accordingly waited on him

and left their Address.

Monday, Nov. 14th. The Troops went into Winter Quarters, except the 10th & 52d Regiments, which did not land till some time after.

The intermediate time between 31st. October and December, was prevented, by my Landlords death, and Indisposition of the rest of the family, from get-

ting at my Journal, which renders that Period imperfect.

Sunday, Dec. 3d. The Scarborough arrived in 41 days from Portsmouth, with dispatches for the Com-

mander in Chief.

Tuesday, Dec. 5th. Major Pitcairn landed from the Asia, who was sent out with the Command of 500 Marines. two other Men of War, on board of which part of the Marines were Embarked, are not arrived, and the Asia still below.

About Wednesday, Dec. 6th. the Provincial Congress removed from Cambridge to Worcester, and dissolved

themselves, to be assembled again in February.

Sunday, Dec. 10th. Or thereabouts, the Boyne got in. Thursday, Dec. 14th. Capt. Maturin, the Generals Secretary, died about four in the afternoon. The same day an Account was received of the Colony of Rhode Island ordering Arms, Amunition, and other Military Stores to be bought, and the raising of four Companies, one of Artillery, and a troop of Horse, for the county of Providence. The North Providence Rangers and Fuziliers, 40,000 flints, 300 Barrels Gun Powder, 3 tons lead, and 4 Brass field pieces to be bought.

Thursday, Dec. 15th. Colonel Prescott sailed in the

Transport.

Friday, Dec. 16th. Between 3 & 4 hundred Men Assembled at Portsmouth, took possession of the Fort, and took 97 barrels of Powder out of it, with other things.

## 1775.

Thursday, Jan. 26th. The Assembly of New York carried the question against adopting the Measures of the General Congress by one Vote only, or even taking any Notice of them. The Quebec and Massachusetts Bills strongly contested to be included in their Petition to the King, but rejected by the Loyalists as making no part of the Grievnance of that Province.

About 10th Feb. the Government and Merchants of

New York assure the Master of a Vessel from Glasgow of their Protection, but he declined accepting it, and

proceeds to Jamaica.

The Jersey Assembly about this time adopt the measures of the Congress, as that of Pennsylvania had done some time before. The Inhabitants of which Province much changed and become very Violent since the sitting of the Continental Congress. But about the 10th. Feby. much changed for the better.

Friday, Feb. 17th. The Provincial Congress Adjourned themselves to 21st. March, then to meet at

Concord.

From 10th. Feb. to 5th. March little material Hap-

pened.

Sunday, March 5th. An Anniversary Oration was delivered by Doctor Warren, in Cooper's old Meeting, on the Bloody Massacre, as it is called, when a Riot had near ensued, which, if pursued, some of the Popular leaders must have fallen. During all this Spring the minds of the People appeared to be intent on Mischief, and ready to take up Arms on the First Alarm, which sufficiently shewed itself on the following occasion.

Friday, April 14th or 15th. The Grenadier and Light Infantry were ordered to be exempt from duty. On Tuesday, April the 18th, about eleven at Night, they were ordered to March, crossed the water at Phips's Farm, and pursued their Route to Lexington and Concord, on their advancing as far as Lexington, they were opposed by about 150 Men, who fired on the Troops and wounded one Man, the fire was return'd; 8 Rebels killed and 11 Wounded. The Troops then marched to Concord, about 3 miles, and while effecting their business (which was to destroy Military Stores) a large Body of the Enemy Assembled, fired on some of the detached Companies Light Infantry at a Bridge, who having joined the Body, and the whole began to retreat towards Boston, a General fire was given on them from behind Walls, &c., put our people in a little

Confusion, but Lord Percy coming up with Brigade, and a field piece being fired, they kept at a distance, as soon as the whole were on their March, the fire from the Rebels was renewed and continued the whole day till we got to Charles Town, where the Troops were formed and fresh Troops sent to releive the fatigued, who had marched near Forty Miles wothout food or having time to rest; the Troops did not get to Charles Town till after SunSet. We lost about 25 Killed, and about 150 Wounded during the day.

Wednesday, April 19th. From this day the Rebels assembled in great numbers about Boston, 2,000 at least, prevented all supplies of Provision coming into

Town, and used every Act of Hostility.

Sunday, May 28th. A small party of the Rebels drove some Cattle off of Hog Island, on which the Admiral dispatched a small armed Schooner between the Island and the Main, (a narrow passage) and some Marines on the Island to drive the Rebels off, this about 2 or 3 o'clock in the Afternoon, but, the Tide not allowing the Schooner to return till late in the Evening, the Rebels brought Cannon and fired on her briskly, and in the confusion the Schooner ran on Shore on the Winnessimet Ways, on which She was quitted by the People, and left to be burnt by the Rebels. Admiral applied to the General, and got a Detatchment of 80 Marines on the Island about 9 in the Evening, who remained in Williams's house. The General by no means approved of the Admiral's scheme, supposing it to be a trap, which it proved to be; we lost two or three Men Killed, and a few Wounded.

Monday, June 12th. The Arrival of the Dragoons, the 35th, 49th, and 63d Regiments, between the 12th and 13th instant, having increased our small Army, it was thought advisable to take possession of Charles Town Heights, which was intended to be done on the 18th. but the Rebels it is supposed got Intelligence of it, and on the Night of the 16th threw up a Redoubt on them, which we perceived on the morning of Saturday, June

17th, in great forwardness, when our Battery on Copp's Hill, began to fire on them. A Council of General Officers being held, it was resolved to attack them, which was done with about 2,000 Men, about 4 in the Afternoon, under General Howe's Command. The Redoubt was defended with obstinacy by the Rebels, as well as the Fences to Bunker's Hill, which were Barricaded, and notwithstanding every advantage of numbers (being by the best Computation 6,000), and the advantage of Ground, were entirely routed in half-anhour, and drove off the field. Our loss was great, being — Killed and near 700 hundred Wounded, Officers included; five pieces of Cannon of a small Caliber fell in our hands. All this Night the Rebels kept a popping fire on our Advanced Posts, from Houses on the opposite side of Charles Town Neck, wounded several Men, and Killed one officer, Lieut. Dutton, 38th, by a random shot.

Sunday, June 18th. In the morning we discovered them at Work on a Redoubt on Mount Pisga, in great numbers, Lines from which have since been carried to the road leading to Cambridge.

Monday, June 19th. In the morning we discovered their works on a Hill, at the back of Roxborough Church, in great forwardness, which Commands the

Roads to Jamaica and Cambridge.

Thursday, June 22nd. An Attack was proposed for the next morning to take possession of Dorchester Hill, but the Enemy appearing to have taken the alarm, and our numbers not very strong, being able to carry only twelve hundred Men into the field, and to leave not above 700 in the Town of Boston, it was thought proper to lay that project aside, especially as our Guns from the Block House, were thought sufficient to dislodge them should they attempt to annoy us from thence.

Saturday, June 24th. In the Evening the Rebels fired a few shot from small cannon, 3 pounders, from a rising ground on the left of the Road leading to the

Castle, not a great distance from the burying ground, one of which went thro' Brown's house, where our Advance Guard was posted; but a Howitzer and two or three Shot being fired from the lines, they disappeared. The preceding day two Rebels advanced to Brown's House, when our Guard was withdrawn, and were proceeding to set it on fire, when Brig. General Robertson ordered a small party under a Sergeant to see that they did no harm, supposing at first that they were deserting to us, but on the Sergeants coming near them they fired on his party and missed them, on which the Sergeant fired, killed one, and the other was soon demolished.

Monday, June 26th. In the Evening they fired several Cannon Shot from a gravel pit adjoining the Burying Ground at the lines, some two or three of which went over the Works, but did no harm. General Howe remained all this time unmolested.

Tuesday, June 27th. A Ship arrived from Halifax in the Evening, with a small quantity of Provisions, and about 12 Tons of hay, likewise a Ship from Newfoundland with 37 Artillery Men and Officers.

Wednesday, June 28th. A Transport with two Companies of the 44th arrived; our People employed

in making Hay on Charles Town heights.

Thursday, June 29th. In the Morning arrived Major Grant with three Companies of the 40th Regiment.

A Report of Colonel Washington's being expected this day to take upon him the Command of the Rebel Army, but not Authenticated. On the preceding Evening wrote an Order to Lieut.-Colonel Leslie to send 2 Sergeants and 22 Men on board the Symmetry Transport, to be under the Command of Mr. Boormasters. Sent an order likewise on the morning of the 29th to Lieut. Graves to bring his Sloop from Charles Town to Dorchester, and to lay a little below the Neck.

Friday, June 30th. In the Evening about 7 o'Clock, the Rebels fired five or six Shot from a rising Ground

on the right of Roxborough burying Ground, but retreated with their Cannon by the time we could get

ready to answer them.

Saturday, July 1st. About half after six in the Afternoon, the Rebels fired two 24 pounders from their Works on the height behind Roxborough Church, when the Relief of our Lines was taking place, one Shot struck in the Slope of the Couvre port, and within a yard or two of our Men, but did no harm. Orders given Earl Percy to attempt to burn Roxborough, as soon as possible after day light.

Sunday, July 2d. Our Lines fired some Shot and a few Carcasses, with a view of setting Roxborough on fire, but had not the desired effect, only one or two houses at most being consumed, in other respects all

quiet.

Gave an order to the Captain of the Main Guard to permit all fishing boats to leave the Long Wharf, that had the Admirals pass and a Committee of the Councils.

Monday, July 3d. Nothing extraordinary, but the Death of Ensign Graham of 52d, who died very unexpectedly, and the Death of Mr. Jordan of the Navy, both of their Wounds received the 17th June.

Tuesday, July 4th. All quiet except a few popping Shot at our Centinels at the Lines about 10 at Night.

Reported General Burgoyne had received this Afternoon a letter from General Lee, desiring a Conference.

Wednesday, July 5th. every thing quiet, about 3 in the afternoon, a Trumpeter dispatched with a Note from General Burgoyne to General (Rebel) Lee, at Roxborough, who returned about half after 8, with several Letters for Merchants in Boston, and a Note from Lee to General Burgoyne, in which he tells him that the Rebels had about fifteen hundred men [on Bunker's Hill in the action of the 17th] in the Hills at Charles Town, and not more than five hundred Engaged, which must be a most egregious falsehood, as we had an opportunity of seeing all that came to the Relief

of the Redoubt, before our Troops attacked, whose numbers could not be less at the smallest computation than four thousand.

Thursday, July 6th. Nothing particular this day, but Letters from General Lee to Majors Bruce and Butler, in which he repines at his appearing in a Station that must make him an Enemy to his old friends, and tells them they have forty thousand Men in Arms, and if they are beat, three times the number are ready to succeed them; find by the papers Washington is Appointed Lieut. General; Ward and Lee, Majors General. A French Man came in this day from the Rebels say's, a French Man, one Dubue, is their Chief Engineer, as Gridley cannot Act from his Wound. Sent the French Man to the Provosts.

Friday, July 7th. Went to the Lines as usual; at the Neck was informed by an Officer, Mr. Thwaites, Adjutant to the 10th Regiment, that the Rebels had cut down some Trees near the George Tavern, and thrown them across the road, as well as some in the fields, which I found to be true on going to Brown's house, from the Upper Windows of which I could see their Centinels in the Bushes of the Tops, but could discern no Works behind them, things remain in this

state the whole day.

Saturday, July 8th. At half after two this morning, the Rebels advanced on the Causeway from Roxborough, fired several Cannon, drove in the Advanced Guard to the Lines, and burnt two houses, Brown's and another, but left the Store untouched. In the morning our party was again Advanced, on whom they fired, wounded a Marine in the head, of which he Died. At night a Working party of One hundred Men, and four Pickets, forming a hundred more, to cover them, was ordered to the Lines to throw up two Fleches in front of our Works, they began about 9 and made them defencible by one o'Clock without the smallest interruption, in which state they remain.

Sunday, July 9th. Nothing Extraordinary; the

Rebels employed in Working at their Redoubts as usual.

Monday, July 10th. Nothing Extraordinary, but the Fleches thrown up in front of our Lines, improperly

laid out, one firing into the other.

Tuesday, July 11th. About two o'Clock this morning, the Rebels began to fire on our Advanced Guard, but at so great a distance that we received not the least harm from them; at 7 threw up another Fleche in front of the one on the right face of the Line, paralell with the one on the left. Working party Employed in finshing the Epaulement on the left of the Block House, making the Ditch in front of the Palisades on the right of the right Bastion, and finishing the ditch across the Causeway.

Wednesday, July 12th. Nothing Extraordinary, but the Enemy setting fire to some Houses on Long Island, and carrying off a few Sheep, &c. The Ships of War fired on them, but no execution apprehended to be

done.

Thursday, July 13th. The Enemy observed to carry about 20 Whale Boats over from Dorchester to Roxborough, and Working at a Breast Work on a height on the left face of our Lines to the Causeway near the George Tavern; fired some Shot and Howitzers at them.

Friday, July 14th. Nothing extraordinary, the Rebel desist from Working as on the preceding day; in the Evening went over to General Howe with a

proposed disposition for Brigading the Troops.

Saturday, July 15th. the whole remain very quiet, observed some Whale Boats passing from a Creek (Muddy River) near Roxborough, and going into Cambridge River. The 5 Companies 18th. and a Transport of 40th. came up from the Light House this afternoon, the Companies 18th from New York.

Sunday, July 16th. Everything very quiet. Proposed to cut a Ditch across the Neck, between the two Bastions, and to close the Battery at the Block House,

by making a Redoubt, which will defend the landing on the Neck, between the Neck Guard and the lines. Received an Account from Captain Handfield, of the taking of a Sloop from Annapolis with Hay, and carried into Penobscot River. Three Companies of the 40th. arrived this day, under the Command of Captain McLean.

Monday, July 17th. Everything very quiet this

day, nor any extraordinary News.

Tuesday, July 18th. Everything very quiet on all sides, our People employed on the Back end, closing

the Battery at the Block House into a Redoubt.

Wednesday, July 19th. The Report of the Rebels erecting a Work on Phips's Farm of last night, appears to be without foundation, as no traces of one can be seen this day; in other respects very quiet; five Companies of 22d., of 45th. and two of the 40th. arrived and landed this day, which Comprehends the whole Troops expected from Ireland.

Thursday, July 20th. Nothing Extraordinary. A report from the Observation of a Serjeant or two, of the Enemies being at Work on Forsters Hill, opposite the

Neck, but no Credit given to the Report.

Friday, July 21st. Nothing extraordinary. The Rebels remain very quiet, more so than usual; a Report of the Light house at the entrance of the harbour being

destroyed.

Saturday, July 22d. Everything remains very quiet, the destruction of the Light house confirmed. Some Sheep arrived and two Bullocks. The Admirals Boats, as usual took at least half; inquiry made into it, done without the Admirals orders.

A Ship appeared this morning off, but bore away for Marblehead; not known from whence she came or whom she is.

Sunday, July 23d. Everything remarkably quiet.

Monday, July 24th. Every thing quiet without; the duty ordered to be taken by such and such Regiments Light Infantry and Grenadiers 4th., 18th., 44th. and

39th take it this day, 10th., 22d., 23d., 40th., and 2d. Marines tomorrow. 35th., 45th., 49th., 63d. Regiments

and 4 Companies 65th, the next day.

Tuesday, July 25th. All very quiet. A Deserter came in from the Virginia Rifle Men on Winter Hill, says he's a Virginian born, that he was in a Vessel from Virginia to Salem, Coming out of which place about the 15th. June, 'She was taken by a King's Ship, some of the Men Pressed, the rest got on Shore at Marblehead, where he was obliged to enter into the Rebel Service, his backwardness to which was the cause of his being confined; but, being released, he entered into their Artillery, having learnt a little of Gunnery, but finding his Situation more disagreeable every day, and having no liberty of speech, but what was most pleasing to the Rebels way of thinking. He deserted from them on the Night of the 24th. and got off by swimming down the Mystic River to General Howe's Post.

Wednesday, July 26th. Nothing extraordinary. Thursday, July 27th. Two Men of 52d. Regiment Deserted from the Advanced post on the Charles Town side, and one from the 23d., a sensible intelligent fellow, some knowledge of fortification and Gunnery. Supposed to be sent by design, tho' little credit to be given for it, and reasons sufficient from Authority that it is a feint.

Friday, July 28th. Nothing at all Extraordinary. · Saturday, July 29th. Received Accounts of an Interview, the preceding day, between Lieut. Lea, of Artillery, and General Lee, in which the latter intimated a pleasure to hear that Mr. Lea had been preferred, sup-

posed designedly to create disgust, and offered Fresh Provisions, &c.; but was answered properly that we had sufficient, and the Conference broke up rather abruptly.

Sunday, July 30th. Brig-Gen. Grant arrived in the Morning with Mr. Hanley, of the Dragoons. The 1st. Division, Lord Percy's, off duty. About half after eleven, went down to the Lines with the General. Gen. Clinton followed about twelve, with Grenadiers, Light Infantry, 4th. and 44th. Regiments. The Gun boats, having received their Orders, moved up to the Heads of the Bays and began firing. About one o'Clock Gen. Clinton advanced with the 4th. Regiment on right of Lines towards Roxborough, a few Minutes preceding which three 3 and 4 Pounders, carried by us to Brown's House, began firing, on their ceasing, General. Clinton advanced to Roxborough, his advanced parties entered it, found it deserted, waited there threequarters of an hour before Materials could be got to set a house, called the George Tavern, on fire; effected it and retired: before which General Howe had ordered two parties, of 60 Men each, to attempt burning the Enemies advanced posts on His side. the Men behaved ill, left their Officers, one of whom they Wounded badly. Capt. Sabine, Marines, Lieut. Chetwynd, 52d. likewise Wounded, two Men Missing, one of them Killed, left on the field, the enemy desirous to recover his body. The preceeding Evening one Man taken Prisoner—an Irish Man from Virginia; says he was forced into the service.

Monday, July 31st. About 4 o'Clock in the morning, the Rebels to the number of 350 attacked a party of an Officer of Marines at the Light House with 18 Men and some Carpenters, killed the Officer and Serjeant, took the rest Prisoners. Some Carpenters escaped by Swimming to the Man of War's Boats, the Officer of Marines, Killed in the Boat he attempted to get off in, quit his Post, because of his disasters, burnt the House, and destroyed the Light, which we had repaired from a late attack of theirs. The Admiral thought much to blame in this as well as in many other things. Everything tolerably quiet, some Shot fired from General Howe's side.

Tuesday, August 1st. In the afternoon of this day several Shot (Cannon) fired by the Rebels from the Works behind Roxborough; three of them lit near our Advance Works, but did no harm. About one at Night an Alarm was given to the Encampment by Boats Row-

ing in Cambridge Bay; 44th. and 22d. Regiments turned out; supposed to be the Rebels Boats rowing from

Cambridge River to Dorchester Creek.

Wednesday, August 2d. All quiet on our side: some firing in the Afternoon from the Fleches on General Howe's side, but of no consequence. On the Night of Tuesday the 1st. a Deserter from the Enemy, a Scotchman, came into General Howe's.

Thursday, August 3d. General Gage saw the first division under Arms. The 44th a prodigious fine Regiment; the 22d. also fine. Little firing this day and re-

main tolerably quiet.

Friday, August 4th. Nothing extraordinary this day, everything very quiet. A Ship from Philadelphia with 2,200 Barrels Flour brought in by one of our Cruisers.

Saturday, August 5th. Nothing extraordinary; reason to think the Corporal taken on Sunday Evening to be a Captain, from an interview with a Rebel Major, by name Tupper, and that our Ships sent in a foraging

party to have succeeded in their business.

Sunday, August 6th. Lieut. Berry, 52d. was sent to burn a house on the opposite side of a small ferry just beyond Charles Town neck, and effected it without the smallest loss. Arrived, a Navy Store Ship from London, the King Fisher, Capt. Montague, from New York, and a Brig, a Prize. Little or no firing these 24 hours.

Monday, August 7th. Everything extremely quiet; got intelligence of some Letters taken from Messrs. Hichborn and Thomas White, from Mr. J. Adams, of which the following is a Copy, directed to the Chair Man of the Provincial Congress:

July 24th.

Dear Sir,

In Confidence,

I am determined to write fully to you this time. A certain great Fortune, and piddling genius, whose Fame

has been trumpeted so loudly, has given a silly cast to our whole doings. We are between Hawk and Buzzard.

We ought to have had in our hands a month ago the whole Legislative, Executive, and Judicial of the whole Continent, and have compleatly modeled a Constitution; to have raised a Naval Power and opened all our Ports wide; to have Arrested every friend of Government on the Continent and held them as Hostages for the poor Victims in Boston; and then opened the door as wide as possible for peace and Reconciliation; after this they might have Petitioned and Negotiated and Addressed, &c., if they would. Is all this Extravagant? is it wild? is it not the soundest Policy? One piece of news—7,000 Weight of Powder arrived last night; we shall send away some of it as soon as we can, but

you must be patient and frugal.

We are lost in the Extensive field of Business. have a Continental Treasure to Establish, a Paymaster to choose, and a Committee of Correspondence or Safety. Our Accounts, or something I know not what, that has confounded us all day. Shall I hail you Speaker of the House or Councillor or what? what kind of an Election had you? What sort of Magistrates do you intend to make? will your new Legislative and Executive feel bold or irresolute? will your Judicial hang, and whip, and fine and imprison without scruple? I long to see our distressful Country once more, yet I dread the sight of devastation. You observe in your Letter the Oddities of a great Man. He is a queer Creation, but you must love his Dog's if you love him, and forgive a thousand Whims for the sake of the Soldier and Scholar.

My Dear,

It is now almost three Months since I left you, in every part of which my anxiety about you and the Children, as well as our Country, has been extreme. The Business I have had upon my mind has been

as great and important as can be entrusted to Man, and the difficulty and Intricacy of it is prodigious, when 50 or 60 Men have a Constitution to form for a great Empire at the same time that they have a Country of 1,500 Miles Extent to fortify, Millions to Arm and train, a Naval power to begin, an Extensive Commerce to Regulate, a Standing Army of 27,000 to raise, pay, Victual, and Officer. I really shall pity those 50 or 60 Men. I wish I had given you a compleat History from the beginning to the End of the Journey, of the Behaviour of my Compatriots; no Martial tale could equal it. I will tell you in future, but you must keep it secret.

The figgets, the Whims, the Caprice, the Vanity, the Superstitution, the Irritability of some of us is enough

to

Tuesday, August 8th. Everything remarkably quiet on all sides. The Rebel works in front of left Bastion at the Lines near Compleated, but at least a Miles distance.

Wednesday, August 9th. Everything perfectly quiet on our side the Waters; some firing on General Howe's

side; the reason not known.

Thursday, August 10th. Everything very quiet on both sides the Water. Capt. Lindsay arrived this day, brought Accounts of his taking a small Vessel off Cape Ann, pursued another into the harbour, Boarded her with his Boats, but received so severe a fire from the Shore, that his People, the Lieutenant, and one man excepted, escaped from her; the Lieut., Wounded, left 27 Men in the Rebels hands.

Friday, August 11th. All quiet still. The General received a Letter from the Rebel General Washington complaining of the treatment of their Prisoners, and threatening to Retaliate on ours in like manner. Received Accounts of the taking of an Armed Schooner

by the Rebels at Metias [Machias], called the Adventure, but not positive.

Saturday, August 12th. Nothing extraordinary, all

very quiet, remarkably so.

- Sunday, August 13th. Nothing at all extraordinary during these [24 hours], except the view of a Work, the Rebels were discovered this Morning throwing up, on the left of the burying Ground, near Roxborough.

Monday, August 14th. The Rebels continue to Work, but not very assiduous, everything else per-

fectly quiet.

Tuesday, August 15th. The Rebels fired some Shot this day from a Battery under Roxborough, and from a Battery under Winslow's house to the right of it, at our Gondola's. They likewise fired from their new erected Work on the left of the burying Ground, but did no Damage, one Shot lodged in an Embrasure on the left face of the Work.

Our Mutton fleet arrived this Evening with near two thousand Sheep and 103 Cattle, taken from Gardiners, and Fishers Islands—without any sort of oposition, not even one Shot fired.

Wednesday, August 16th. Nothing Extraordinary this day. Our Gondola near the Lines very imprudently fired some Shot at the Rebels, which was re-

turned, but no damage done.

Thursday, August 17th. Some Shot from the Gondola at the Lines against the Rebels Entrenchment. Orders given to the Midshipman, by the Admiral, to prevent it. The Rebels continuing their work from the Tavern in Roxborough to their left.

One Turner, a Rifle Man, taken or Surrendered himself the 14th. suspected of an Intention to Desert the

16th. and Confined in the Provosts Guard.

The Capt. of the Man of War that Conveyed the Inhabitants to Salem returned, and brought with him Monsieur Dubuque, a French Man, who had been employed by the Rebels as an Engineer.

Friday, August 18th. Everything very quiet, tried

a French 13 inch Mortar for Roxborough about 8 in

the Evening; supposed to have fallen short.

Saturday, August 19th. Nothing extraordinary, but the bursting of a 32 Pounder, Iron, at the Lines, by which accident we had the misfortune to loose one Artillery Man and another much wounded, and took at the lines 8 Cows and Bullocks strayed from the Rebels.

Sunday, August 20th. Nothing at all Extraordi-

nary, everything remains quiet.

Monday, August 21st. Nothing extraordinary in the Military Line, Sailed about 10 o'Clock, the Charming Nancy; God send her safe and a good Passage. She was not to be seen at 6 o'Clock, and a fair and gentle Wind, which I hope may continue to the end of her Voyage. The General Gage to New York the same success.

Tuesday, August 22d. Last Night a Deserter from the Virginia Rifle Men came in from Roxborough, by name Johnson, an Irish Man.

A Marine Deserted from our Advanced Post at the

Lines; nothing else extraordinary.

Wednesday, August 23d. Nothing extraordinary.

Thursday, August 24th. Nothing Extraordinary, but the taking up of a Man and Boy at the North End, on suspicion of harbouring Rebels, a Carpenter by Trade.

Friday, August 25th. Placed a Guard of a Sub-Serjeant and 20 Men in the North Battery, a measure much approved of. Some firing this Evening at Charles Town; the cause of no great consequence, otherwise would be reported.

Saturday, August 26th. All quiet, nothing Extraordinary, but the arrival of the ————, Man of War,

Capt. ——, from Plymouth, out 9 Weeks.

Sunday, August 27th. This morning a Rifler taken by being drove over in a Boat from Noddles Island. Some firing, but of no Consequence. The Night before (Saturday), the Rebels fired on our advanced Guards at the Lines, and Wounded three Men in the Relief.

The Guard, by some mistake of their officers, were ordered to Retreat improperly.

Monday, August 28th. A Deserter of 43d. taken

going off; nothing else extraordinary.

Tuesday, August 29th. Very quiet on our side, General Howe fired several Shells during the Night. A deserter of the 43d. Executed this day for Desertion.

Wednesday, August 30th. The Deserter of 43d. Executed this day, and not Yesterday. Very Wet, and

nothing extraordinary.

Thursday, August 31st. Nothing extraordinary; but it's being very Rainy, the General thought proper to order some Rockets to be fired, and Guns drawn on the Causeway to Alarm the Enemy, which had its effect.

Friday, Sept. 1st. Two of last Nights Guard at the lines from 63d. Regiment Deserted; were posted on

the light Raft; nothing else extraordinary.

Sunday, Sept. 3d. Nothing extraordinary; arrived Mr. Hay, from Quebec.

Monday, Sept. 4th. Nothing Extraordinary, every-

thing quiet.

Tuesday, Sept. 5th. Everything very quiet; the Rebels employed on their Work opposite our left Bastion; nothing else extraordinary.

Wednesday, Sept. 6th. Nothing Extraordinary,

Colonel Goreham arrived from London.

Thursday, Sept. 7th. This morning discovered three Fleches the Rebels had thrown up—two in front of our

fleches at the line about 6 or 7 hundred Yards distant, the other on the point in front of the left angle of our left Bastion. A Rebel Artillery Serjeant, by name Johnson, Deserted this Evening from Roxborough, an

Irish Man, a smart, sensible fellow.

Friday, Sept. 8th. This morning, very early, another Rifle Man came in, also an Active looking fellow. during the [day] nothing extraordinary; a few shots from our Lines returned by the Rebels. This Evening, about dusk, another Rifle Man came in, a fine fellow, an Irishman, from Kings County, says that General Lee is reported to be in Arrest; that a report has been spread that one of their Deserters, a Rifle Man, had been Hanged, which checked the spirit of their People coming over to us.

Saturday, Sept. 9th. One of the Virginia Rifle Men (an Irish Man) Deserted from the Enemy this morning by pretending to come out to take a Shot at our Sentries, but when at a proper Distance ran into our

Post. Nothing else extraordinary.

Sunday, Sept. 10th. This Evening a French Lad Enlisted in the Rhode Island Troops Deserted to us; he set out from their Advanced Posts on a Run; had two Shot fired at him, but escaped. These frequent Desertions have occasioned the Rebel General to remove the Rifle Men to Cambridge.

Monday, Sept. 11th. The Rebels still continue to carry on their Works in front of our Lines; nothing

else extraordinary.

Tuesday, Sept. 12th. Nothing extraordinary; all

-quiet.

Wednesday, Sept. 13th. Nothing extraordinary but the arrival of several Prizes from Sea; one of ours, taken by the Lively, retaken and carried into Cape Ann.

Thursday, Sept. 14th. Nothing extraordinary. Capt. Wynn arrived from New York, after escaping the Committee and more Savage Populace, who pursued him to destroy his Ship.

Friday, Sept. 15th. Two of our Advanced Sentries Deserted,—One of the 5th. from Charles Town, and one of the 59th. from our Advanced Lines.

Saturday, Sept. 16th. Nothing extraordinary.

Sunday, Sept. 17th. The Rebels fired on our Relief going to the Lines, from a Gun just brought to their right Flech; wounded a Man of the 4th. an additional Gunner, in the Knee; his Leg obliged to be taken off.

Monday, Sept. 18th. The Rebels observed this morning, on clearing up of the fog, to be at Work in joining their Fleches, on whom we kept a fire to prevent their proceeding; nothing else extraordinary.

Tuesday, Sept. 19th. Nothing extraordinary, Wednesday, Sept. 20th. Nothing extraordinary. Thursday, Sept. 21st. Nothing extraordinary.

Friday, Sept. 22d. Some firing from our Lines, and from General Howe's, but nothing of Consequence.

Saturday, Sept. 23d. Frequent firing this morning from our Lines at the Rebels Works, which they returned; three of their Shot came thro' the Barrack in the left Bastion and wounded Capt. Pawlet in the Ancle, while at breakfast. We Apprehend the Rebels intend to build a Battery on Dorchester Hill. A Rifle Man came in this Evening, from their Flech under the two Trees, on the Point, says the Minute Men of the Country is called in; supposed with some design, but does not know what; he's an English Man born in the West of England, near Plymouth.

Sunday, Sept. 24th. Nothing extraordinary, but a Deserter from the Rebels came in to General Howe's

whose character appears to be doubtful.

Monday, Sept. 25th. Nothing extraordinary.

This day employed the first working party of 100

Men on the new works at the Weigh House.

Tuesday, Sept. 26th. This day arrived the Cerberus in seven Weeks; private Letters say the 5 Regiments and 4 Companies of Artillery are to sail immediately for Boston; nothing else extraordinary.

Wednesday, Sept. 27th. Yesterday arrived the Scarborough, Ship of War, by whom we learn from private Letters that 5 Regiments, 1000 Marines and 4 Companies of Artillery are ordered with the greatest expedition, with a large quantity of Artillery Stores, for America, by the same Vessel General Gage's leave of Absence, and the Appointment of General Howe to the Command of the Troops on the Sea Coast, and General Carleton to the Command of all the interior Country. Nothing extraordinary done by us or the Rebels.

Thursday, Sept. 28th. Nothing extraordinary. Friday, Sept. 29th. Nothing extraordinary. Saturday, Sept. 30th. Nothing extraordinary. Sunday, Oct. 1st. Nothing extraordinary.

Monday, Oct. 2d. Little passed this day. Lieut. Desaguliers, of Artillery, at the Lines; of course some firing.

Tuesday, Oct. 3d, to Thursday, 5th. Nothing ma-

terial.

Friday, Oct. 6th. One Man Killed of 63d. Regiment, going to the lines of the Guard.

Saturday, Oct. 7th, to Monday, 9th. Nothing ma-

terial.

Tuesday, Oct. 10th. This day left General Gage in Nantucket road at two in the afternoon, on advice of Letters being Received from Quebec. General Gage Sailed from Nantucket at 9 in the Evening.

Wednesday, Oct. 11th. Second Battalion of Marines Ordered to be in readiness to Embark for Quebec, but, on Consulting with the Sea Officers, thought impracti-

cable to get up the river.

Thursday, Oct. 12th, to Monday, 16th. Nothing ex-

traordinary.

Tuesday, Oct. 17th. In the Evening, at 9 o'clock, the Rebels came out of Cambridge River with Row Gallies, and fired several shots into our Encampment, without doing any mischief. after their last Shot they were heard to cry out to row on Shore, and appeared to be in distress. We afterwards learned that the Gun

burst and shattered the boat so much that she sunk; several Men drowned, 9 Wounded and 2 Killed by the

Gun bursting.

Wednesday, Oct. 18th, to Tuesday, 31st. Nothing extraordinary, but the surrender of James Garland, on this day, a Deserter from the First Battalion Royal Americans, who says he deserted the 17th. March, in Company with Thomas Roberts and Henry Baker.

Wednesday, Nov. 1st. Nothing material.

Thursday, Nov. 2d. Mr. Monet arrived this day from his expedition to Annoy the Coast; says that on Wednesday, 18th of October, he burned Falmouth; that General Preble came on board to know their Intentions, not believing it was intended to destroy the place; but, when assured of it, returned on shore to apprise the Inhabitants, after assuring the Officers that he had taken no part in the Rebellion, that he had been offered a Command in the Provincial Troops, but would not accept it.

Lieut. Grant, who was there, says there is a Boom or strong Chain thrown across the Harbour of Portsmouth, which is raised or lowered by Windlasses on each side, that all the Vessels from Cape Ann are in Newbury River, and the mouth of it shut up by driving Piles or Stakes into the Bottom, except a small passage, which is left open for Vessels, where a Raft is moored, to be sunk occasionally. That those of the Inhabitants he saw were in a wretched situation for

want of Cloathing, Flour, &c., &c.

Friday, Nov. 3d, to Monday, Nov. 6th. Nothing ex-

traordinary.

Tuesday, Nov. 7th. This day a Victualer arrived from England says it was mentioned in the Papers that Mrs. Gage was arrived; met the General 18 days ago, about 1,000 miles on his Passage; also says 5 Artillery Ships, 6 Victualers, and a Man of War sailed with him.

Wednesday, Nov. 8th. Arrived the Phenix Ship of War, and a transport with four Companies 17th. Regi-

ment.

: Thursday, Nov. 9th. Arrived two Artillery Store Ships and two transports, with four Companies of Artillery. The Rebel Privateers frequently seen; also arrived the Wood Fleet with Capt. Payne, 18th. Commandant on that Service.

Friday, Nov. 10th, to Thursday, 23d. Nothing ex-

traordinary, but my Journal is here imperfect.

Friday, Nov. 24th. A Brig with Forage from Nova Scotia, lying at Anchor outside of the Light House, taken by the Rebels. A ship likewise in danger; Captain Bowmaster rescued them and retook the Brig, her

hands having escaped the Ship.

Saturday, Nov. 25th, to Friday, Dec. 29th. My Journal imperfect; in that time a Rebel Brig taken by the Fowey, Capt. Montague; all the Prisoners went Home in the Cerebus, Convoy to the 18th. and 59th. Regiments; and the Rebels erecting a Work on Phipps's Farm, after our landing there, and taking some cattle from thence.

Saturday, Dec. 30th & 31st. Arrived 6 Companies 17th. and 6 of 55th. Regiments, with Admiral Shuld-

ham. Admiral Graves to go home.

A Portrait of the American Leaders taken from facts. They openly avow that they have a right to oppress others; but they complain, without cause, of being oppressed themselves. They acknowledge, in words, Subjection to the King; but they will not submit to his Government.

They will have a right to ravage and murder all that stand in their way; but the King has no right to appoint the Commander in Chief of his Forces Governor over them; it is arbitrary and despotic. Their flying in the face of Government and destroying private property is not so much as a trespass; but the King's calling them to an Account for it is insult and oppression.

Their forcing the Merchants to destroy with their own hands the goods they imported there according to Law was right and just; but the King's empowering the Judges of the Admiralty and Vice Admiralty Courts

to receive their Salaries and fees out of the Moneys hat arise from the sale of such goods as are seized and Condemned and sold for being run into the Country contrary to Law, is wrong and the height of Injustice. Their Violently seizing, tarring, feathering, Drenching with Tea, and putting in fear of his Life, the King's Officer, was all lenity and mercy; but the King's impowering his Officers to break open and enter their houses on proper information, without the Authority of a Civil Magistrate (when no Civil Magistrate in the Country would assist them), is nothing but hardship and Cruelty. Their Rebelling against Government is a master stroke of good Policy and prudence; but the King's sending an Army to suppress them is the most despotic and imprudent step in the World. Their denying the Army Quarters and destroying the King's stores, &c., that were for their use, was loyal to his Majesty, and a token of their Affection for him; but General Gage's providing for their safety, and blocking up the Town of Boston, to defend himself against them, made him an Enemy to his King and Country. Their seizing the King's forces, Stores, and Garrison, was for his Majesty's honor and benefit; but General Gage's destroying the Arms, &c., that were deposited at Concord for the use of an Army that was assembling to Act against him, was contrary to his honor and intrest. Their breaking the Laws to serve their purposes is being at liberty and free; but their being forced to keep them is Slavery and Chains. Their flying in the face of Authority and declaring themselves independent of our Government shews their duty, love, and affection to the King; but his Majesty not supporting them in it, as they would have him, makes him a tyrant to them. Their Agents have a right to be factious, Seditious, and Rebellious, but the King and his Ministers have no right to discountenance them.

They have a right to hold Illegal Assemblies, and to meet on purpose to destroy the peace and Constitution of the State, but the King and his Ministers have no right to oppose them or to take any measures to prevent it.

They are, as Subjects of Great Britain, free from Taxes; and the imposing duties upon them, to raise a Revenue, is such a Cruel piece of Ministerial avarice and oppression as never was heard of. They have a right to break the laws that restrain their Trade, but the giving Courts of Admiralty a power to condemn the goods that are seized for being run into the Country contrary to Law is extending them beyond their An-

cient bounds and oppressing them.

Their packing Juries to serve their purposes, and appointing them for life, is a wise regulation for the Administration of Justice, but the King and his Ministers abolishing them, and appointing others that are indifferent, to be chose in the manner our Juries are here, is the vilest way of coming at Justice that ever was heard of in America. It gives a deadly wound to the internal policy and makes their Courts, which have been hitherto Courts of the vilest oppressions, Courts of Law and Equity. They cannot bear it. Outrage, Violence, Insurrection, and Rebellion are no crimes to them; and to try them for these supposed Offences here, where they are Capital Crimes, is a Grievance. They may break the Laws and be good Subjects; but the King's Punishing them for it makes him a Tyrant. They were peaceable and quiet on the 19th of April last, when they attacked the King's Troops; but the King's Troops were savage and brutish in meddling with them. There was no harm in waylaying the King's Troops and firing upon them from Houses, &c., but it was inhuman for them, in defending them selves, to fire the Houses, and to Kill, wound, and frighten old Women, Women and Children. The first firing upon the King's Troops from the Wall and Meeting-house was giving them no provocation; for they say in Congress "that a number of respectable inhabitants of this Colony have been Illegaly, wantonly, and inhumanly Slaughtered by the Kings' Troops, without any provocation given by them."

And the Governor of Connecticut, in his letter to General Gage, says: "it was a most unprovoked Attack upon the Lives and property of his Majesty's subjects;" but the troops returning the fire was nothing but wan-

tonness and inhumanity.

And from these outlines in American Policy we see that their leaders take refuge in, and support themselves by, falsehood, lieing, and deceit; and make Fraud, Violence, Insurrection, and Rebellion the distinguishing badge of their liberty and freedom; and, to finish their picture, they even abuse and vilify in the grossest manner his Majesty and his Ministers, for Contradicting and opposing them. And these are the Men that our Modern Patriots have in the highest Veneration, and cry up for the only lovers of Truth and the Natural rights of Mankind: but even humanity calls, away with such fellows from the earth, for it is not fit they should live.

## 1776.

Monday, Jan. 1st. We got the King's Speech. Wednesday, Jan. 3d. Admiral Shuldham's Ship came up. From 1st. to 8th. Nothing extraordinary.

Monday, Jan. 8th. In the Evening of this day an Alarm, when at the Play, about 9 at Night, of an Attack, the Farce of the Blockade of Boston just ready to be performed, but disappointed by this Accident: The Rebels stole into Charles Town, our Guards being withdrawn to the fortress, and burnt two or three Houses, and took four Men who were in them Contrary to orders.

Wednesday, Jan. 17th. The Centurion and a Ship

with Bedding arrived.

Thursday, Jan. 25th. I am not certain if positively this day a Ship and Brig were taken by the Rebels very near the Light House, no Man of War being in the Road to Succour them. Various Reports, from 25th. to 30th. of the Rebels being beat in Canada, confirmed the 30th. by the Rebel Paper.

The Account as follows, from the Watertown Gazette:

Watertown, about 25th. Jany., 1776. By a Letter from Montreal dated Jany. 6th. we learn that General Montgomery made an Attack upon the City of Ouebec between the hours of 4 & 6 in the Morning of 31st. Dec., which, notwithstanding it's being bold and resolute, by some means or other proved not successful. The Letter does not mention how the Attack was made: but it is probable that about 500 of our Troops entered the City, but were overpowered by Numbers and heavy The brave General Montgomery, his Aid-De-Camp · Captain McPherson, and Captains Cheeseman and Hendrick of the Rifle Men, two or three Subaltern Officers, and between 60 and 80 privates, the number uncertain, fell in the Action, and near three hundred Officers and Soldiers taken Prisoners, among whom were Lieut.-Col. Green, Major Bigelow, Major Meigs, and a number of Captains and inferior Officers.

Colonel Arnold succeeded in his attempt in taking possession of the lower Town, but was Wounded in the Leg in the beginning of the Action, and Major Ogden in the Shoulder, and carried to the General Hospital.

In all probability the Action was desperate, and a

great number of the Enemy Killed.

General Wooster from Montreal, and Colonel Warner from the Green Mountains, and a great number of Recruits from Albany and the Western Towns, it is

said are Marching to their Assistance.

Wednesday, Jan. 31st. The frost for these 6 days past has been very severe, so much so as to close the Harbour almost, and a free Communication over the Ice from Cambridge and Dorchester. four or five Rebels came on the Ice very near Fox Hill Battery, but nothing extraordinary has happened in Consequence of it.

Thursday, Feb. 1st. Admiral Graves sailed for England, the same day Captain Dawson arrived from a Cruise and informs that he had destroyed a Rebel

Privateer Schooner near Cohasset Rocks, by running her on Shore; said to be the same that Manley commanded, who has done so much Mischief on the Coast, by taking our Merchant Ships. Capt. Dawson says he went on board her after She was on shore and the People had gutted her.

Our Intelligence from Canada likewise confirmed from the Rebel Papers, that General Montgomery was defeated in attacking Quebec, himself, his Aid-De-Camp McPherson, Killed 70 Men, and near three hundred

taken prisoners with many Officers.

Friday, Feb. 2d. A Deserter that came in says that the Country about Boston are very uneasy that no Attempt is made on the Town, That their Taxes lay heavy on them, and that, if nothing is done within these two Months, they threaten a Separation; but Intelligence from Deserters is not to be depended upon; this Deserter is a Connecticut Man born at Litchfield.

Sunday, Feb. 4th. A Boy Deserted from the Rebels this day, says His Father was a Soldier in 27th. and that he was born at Crown Point, has lived with his Mother several years at Hartford in Connecticut.

Tuesday, Feb. 6th. Major Shirreff received an Account from the Master of a Transport of his being taken, from Fort Cumberland, Bay of Fundy, bound to Boston with a quantity of fresh Meat, and carried into a

small port near Cape Ann, by three Privateers.

Friday, Feb. 9th. A deserter from the Rebels came in to Charles Town, about 4 in the Afternoon; informed that they had beat up for 200 Volunteers to burn our Hospital at Charles Town about 11 at Night; that there were not above 4000 men on Mt. Pisga, Prospect, &c., and that they talked of bringing the Mortar to Phips's Farm, and were making a Platform for it there. The General, on receiving the Notice of their Intentions to burn the Hospital, ordered 150 Light Infantry in Garrison at Charles Town to lay on the Heights near it, to receive them, the Guns to be pointed for the

road, and Musgraves Light Infantry to be in readiness to go over on shortest notice; 45th. to sustain them if Necessary; but no Attempt made; suppose the Deserters prevented it. The Deserter, an English Man, taken in a small Vessel from Halifax, and obliged to enter into their Service about 3 Weeks ago, having nothing to subsist on; he likewise says it is reported among them that a twenty and an eight & twenty Gun Ship are building in Newbury River; that Mr. Lee was said to have been taken Prisoner at New York, but he has only publick report for it.

Saturday, Feb. 10th. & 11th. The Frost continues very severe, and a free Communication over the Ice to

Dorchester and Cambridge.

Tuesday, Feb. 13th. This day Musgraves Light Infantry being ordered by the General to be struck out of the Detail gave me reason to apprehend something was going forward; the Major of Brigade of the day calling on me in the Afternoon with the General's directions for Musgraves Corps being intended in the detail did not shake my opinion, in which I was confirmed by the Generals acquainting me in the Evening that Major Musgrave, with Corps and 7 Companies of Grenadiers, were to cross the River to Dorchester at 3 in the Morning; the two Corps composing about 330 Men, and that Col. Leslie with six Companies of 64th. were to land from the Castle on the Neck directly opposite to it, the Intention of both to burn the Houses on the Neck from Forsters Hill to the Castle, which was executed between 4 and 5 in the Morning very effectually, without the loss of one Man either Killed or Wounded. Five Deserters were taken, all country Born and belonging to Col. Ward's Regiment, who say they were Sentries, and part of a Guard of 70 or 80 Men placed there at a House near Forsters Hill, but the Guard got entirely off, thro' the Darkness of the Night, during which some snow fell, so as to make it impossible for our People to see them when hid in the Wood. These Prisoners give little Intelligence, nor

were there found any Fascines or Gabions, as a preparation for building a Battery on Fosters Hill, as we had been given to understand was intended. The General gave all the Prisoners leave to return if they chose it, but only two of the six Chose it.

Saturday, Feb. 17th. This day came in a Vessel from London in twelve Weeks, with a quantity of Coal,

&c., &c.

Tuesday, Feb. 20th. Three of the Prisoners taken by Major Musgrave on the morning of the 14th. were sent to the Lines, to be set at liberty. The Rebel Officers refused to receive them till he had acquainted his General of it, but they were soon accepted, being discharged without any terms demanded by our General.

Report says General Clinton is at New York, but no certain intelligence of it, and that Lee is in the Country

laid up with the Gout.

Saturday, Feb. 24th. Now said that General Clinton was expected soon to leave New York, and that Lee is Assembling Troops from Connecticut and Jersey, with an Intention to fortify that place. Last Night A Corporal of 22d. and two Men of 35th. either Deserted or were taken from the Chimnies between 6 or 7 oClock.

Monday, Feb. 26th. The Rebels have been these four or five days, and still continue, busy at Phips's Farm, from which they threaten to Bombard Boston. We this day commenced a Battery near the Magazine, but find it difficult to Work on Account of the hardness of the Ground, being frozen.

A few days ago Mr. Dawson sent in a Prize from

Falmouth, outward Bound.

Tuesday, Feb. 27th. Arrived a ship from England with Papers as late as the 15th. Dec.; but little news; not anything from my Brother, and only a line from Rooke, from which nothing could be gleaned that's either new or entertaining.

Thursday, Feb. 29th. The Cold being this day rather severe prevents our working at the New Battery, which is almost compleated for three Guns. The

Rebels are likewise obliged to desist from working at

Phips's Farm.

We likewise near compleated a Battery to cover one 13 inch Iron Mortar and bed, upon the verge of the Bank below the 3 Gun Battery. The Rebels also at Work at the two trees in front of the left of our lines, supposed to repair their Works; tho' Deserters say they intend to fix their Battery for Shells, and to Bombard the Town from Dorchester; but as yet no signs of their Works.

Saturday, March 2d. The Rebels, having completed and strengthened their Works at Phips's farm, and at the two Trees in front of our left Bastion at the Lines, began a fire, about 11 at Night, of Cannon and Mortars from both places, which they continued till six the next Morning, during which time they threw about fifteen Shells, three of which fell in Sir Henry Calder's yard, one in Molyneux's, two near Colonel Monckton's; two from Roxborough in the Water near the neck.

Our Battery compleated, and threw several Shells, the Rebels several Cannon shot that came into the Town and through some Houses. Received this day letters from New York so late as 15th. Feb'y, acquainting that there were some thousand of Connecticut Men in New York at this time, and that 8,000 were expected

to be there by 1st. March.

That Lord Sterling was the head of them with Lee and Sears, and that the noble Peer had commanded the

Vessel that took the Transport from England.

Sunday, March 3d. The Rebels fired Several Shot and some Shells again this Night, but did little or no harm.

Monday, March 4th. Accounts received this morning that the Transport the Sisters, had run on Shore, near Cape Cod, and had fallen into the Enemys hands. She was bound to New York.

The Evening of this day, the Rebels began to fire on us from Phips's Farm, Cobble Hill, and Roxborough, which was returned by us very smartly. We had five Men Wounded in the Barrack Guard of 22d. Regt.,

most of them badly.

Tuesday, March 5th. Discovered the Rebels had raised two Redoubts on the Heights of Dorchester, at which they were at Work very hard, and had raised to the height of a Man's head, and had as many Men as could be employed on them. Brig. Gen. Jones was ordered to Embark about two o'Clock with the 40th. 44th. 49th. 52d. and 55th. Regiments to proceed to the Castle and form an Attack on that side of their Works, while General Howe, at the head of 2 Corps of Light Infantry, 2 Corps of Grenadiers, 23d. & 38th. Regiments, Attacked them from the other, intending to land just below the Hills on this side the Castle; but the Weather coming on very bad prevented the Transports getting down to the Castle, as well as our Flatbottomed Boats from proceeding with us, which put an end to the project, and the Rebels having so far fortified themselves as to make an Attack on them the day after a most hazardous thing, it was laid aside entirely, and the Town of Boston untenable, as they might come to Forsters Hill, the General thought proper to Embark all the Stores and sail away as fast as possible, which it is hoped may be affected by Tuesday the 11th, tho' we are to apprehend difficulties in the Execution of it. Little firing in the Night of the 5th. and hardly any on the day of the 6th. Our People all employed in getting stores on board. If the Expedition had taken place, I am informed General Pigot was intended to have attacked Roxborough with the Troops in Town. From the Evening of the 5th. to the Evening of the 6th. the Wind continued very high, and is likely to do so, from the appearance of the Weather.

Thursday, March 7th. In the Morning. Everything quiet last Night. Wind continues fresh, so as to prevent the Vessels with the Troops coming from the Castle. No appearance of the Rebels throwing up any Works as yet on Forsters Hill. From Morning to Evening everything quiet, as well as during the Night. Our Troops employed in putting Stores on board, not

without some confusion, unavoidable on these Occasions.

Friday, March 8th. This morning all quiet. The Rebels appeared in small parties, on Noddles Island, but no signs of a Work thrown up—nor at Forsters Hill tho' we have reason to apprehend they will not remain long so. At retreat Beating of this day all quiet. All quiet during the Night.

Saturday, March 9th. No Accounts yet of the Rebels having begun Batteries or Redoubts on Noddles Island

or Forsters Hill.

Yesterday a Flag of Truce, the Select Men of it; but nothing done in consequence, suppose the Rebel Commanders would take no notice of it, as they had no Authority to Treat from the General. Evening, the Rebels observed this Afternoon to trace out Works on Forsters Hill, and to have begun a Work on a Hill towards the Bay below their Redoubts. The Baggage of the Army mostly on board, but much from the Publick Stores still to go on board.

A smart firing Commenced about 9 at Night, from our Lines, and 3 Gun Battery at New Works at the Rebels Working on the Forsters Hill, but they effected

nothing that Night.

Sunday, March 10th. Everything very quiet, the Town remarkably so. The Baggage of the Troops

mostly on board.

Monday, March 11th. The Rebels, from their Movements, wish us gone; they, notwithstanding, have begun a Work on a small Hill below their Redoubts, supposed to Annoy our Shipping in their Passage down. Many of our Soldiers this day Drunk, being Employed by the Inhabitants. Orders given to the Contrary, and a Bell Man sent round the Town to forbid it.

Evening at half after 7, we began to fire on Forsters Hill; the Engineer, Capt. Robinson, having reported that a number of Facines and Gabions were collected behind the Hill. Our fire Returned from the Rebels on Dorchester, but most of their Shot fell short, suppose they may have six or seven pieces of Cannon.

Tuesday, March 12th. No signs of a Work on Forsters Hill, and everything quiet for the day; our Embarkation of Stores and baggage near compleated. Not one piece of Cannon left at the Lines; 3 at Block house and 3 at New Works.

Wednesday, March 13th. Embarkation of stores, &c., almost completed, and everything very quiet these 24 hours; the Rebels busy on their Battery below D. Hill, and the Embrasures cut thro' the top, so as to look

just over it.

Thursday, March 14th. The Wind proving unfavorable prevented our Embarking in the day; the Night being dark and the Wind continuing would not

allow us to go on board at Night.

Friday, March 15th. The Wind promised fair, the Rear Guard ordered to take the Guards, and everything ready for Embarkation, when the Wind hauling round to the Eastward prevented it, and continued contrary all the Afternoon and Evening, with Rainy bad Weather.

Saturday, March 16th. the Weather bad, Wind good; but still cloudy, and so uncertain that we could not go on board; the tide at the same time not acting.

Sunday, March 17th. Fine Weather and fair Wind, the Troops ordered to Embark at 5 in the Morning, compleated by eight, and all under Sail by nine, without one Shot being fired at or from the Rebels, except by our New Works and Block house at Forsters Hill, upon which the Rebels had during the preceding Night erected a Work which was in some forwardness as usual, but our Embarkation taking place prevented their doing any Execution from it; Landed at the Castle at 10, saw upwards of 1,000 drawn up before their Redoubts as we passed, at 12 went on board the Admiral in King Road.

Monday, March 18th. The Transports busy in

Watering, &c.

Tuesday, March 19th. Employed the same way. Wednesday, March 20th. About 3 in the Afternoon were surprised to find the Rebels had brought a Gun on Thompsons Island, and fired about a Dozen Shot at our Waterers on Spectacle Island, but did no harm. In the Evening they were seen to Coast Long Island with about 20 Whale Boats, going towards Hull. The Afternoon and Evening squally. About 9 at Night, the first Explosion for the Destruction of Castle William; in 20 minutes the whole was in flames. the

Conflagration.

Thursday, March 20th. Morning bad, the whole fleet except the Centurion Sailed for Nantasket, An-

repeated Shocks and Explosions of the Mines; the whole Scene most beautiful and Awful from the general

chored about 12; fine Weather.

Friday, March 21st. About 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon a Signal made for an Attack at Sea, from the Light House. The Savage Sloop of War, and a Brig, the Diligence, ordered to Slip and pursue at five; saw four Schooners in chase of a Brig making for the Port; about six the Schooners fired; the Brig let fly her all Sails, but, our Vessels coming up fast, the Schooners did not choose to wait to take possession, and we recovered the Brig, from the West Indies, with Coal, Porter, and Sour Crout, having been drove off the Coast the preceding Fall. The Rebel Privateers escaped our Vessels, one of them had a Flag hoisted at the Main Topmast Gallant head as a mark of Distinction.

Saturday, March 22d. This day a small Vessel arrived from England (a Sloop) with Dispatches for

the General and some Sour Crout.

Sunday, March 23d. All quiet, Strong Gales and rough Water; several Vessels drove on Shore; two Sail

at Sea but not able to get in.

Monday, March 24th. Gale still continues; the Rebels appeared this Afternoon in small parties, and appeared to be desirous to seize a Boat or two that drove on Shore under the Admirals Guns; but a few

Shot being fired, prevented them from pursuing their Scheme.

Tuesday, March 25th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Wednesday, March 26th. Employed as usual with the Transports; about 3 o'Clock in the Afternoon arrived the Milford, in nine Weeks from Falmouth, with Dispatches for the General and Admiral, and welcome Letters from our friends in London, being the first we received since their departure.

Wednesday, March 27th. One o'Clock; hove Short and ready for Sailing. The Light House Detachment ordered to be relieved this day by 20 Men from 1st. Marines, and the like number from the Renown; at 3 weighed and sailed with a fair wind at N. N. W. and high Sea; Schooner rolls much; passed an uneasy

Night.

Thursday, March 28th. Fine Morning, small Wind and great Swell, signal for making Sail early out; at 12 breeze freshened W. N. W. Latt. by Observation, 42.18 No. difference from Boston, 12 Miles So. Course, 2½ So. Dist., 80 Miles So. from Light House.

Friday, March 29th. Fine Weather 24 hours, and pleasant Weather. Latt. by Observation, 42.35 No. difference of Latt. 17 Miles No. Course, E. & B. No.

Distance, 98 Miles.

Saturday, March 30th. At 6 A.M. hard Squalls and heavy Sea, with some hail, and large Swell all Night; morning, light Breeze; at 11 P. M. lay too, Caught a Halibut. Latt. 42.46 No. difference of Latt. 11 Miles No. Course, E. & No. Distance, 71 Miles.

Sunday, March 31st. The fore part of these 24 hours light Breeze and fine Weather; latter part fresh Breeze and Cloudy; at 4 A. M. lay too, caught One Cod fish. Latt. 43.41. difference of Latt. 55 Miles North. Course, N. E. Distance, 70 miles.

Monday, April 1st. First part of these 24 hours clever breeze at S. E. all Sail set. close haul. at 7 in the Evening Tacked and stood to the Southward. Fresh Wind during the Night and great Swell—all lat-

ter part of these 24 hours strong Gales with high Sea. Wind N. N. E. tacked at 12 and stood to the Westward. Latt. by Observation, 43.48. difference of Latt.,

7 miles. Course, E. B. N. Distance, 45 miles.

Tuesday, April 2d. first part of these 24 hours fresh Gale and rough Sea; middle less wind and fair Weather; latter part fine Weather, Smooth Sea, and fair Wind. Latt. by Observation, 43.51. difference of Latt., 3 miles North. Course, E. B. S. Distance, —.

Wednesday, April 3d. At two, by Sea Account, saw the Land; at three, the Light House. Anchored in Halifax Harbour at 7 in the Evening. 3 at Night, a Violent Storm at S. S. E. The General's Baggage Ship, on board which great part of mine was, still out, fear her Safety.

Thursday, April 4th, to Tuesday, 9th. Baggage Ship still absent, but arrived in the Afternoon, to our great Satisfaction; the fault owing to the Drunkeness of

the Master.

Wednesday, April 10th. to Wednesday, 14th. May. Nothing very remarkable; our Troops out at Exercise

when the Weather would permit.

Thursday, May 15th, to Sunday, June 2d. Many arrivals from different parts, among the rest the Niger, Capt. Talbot, from Quebec, with the pleasing Accounts of Quebec being safe, and the dispersion of the Rebels before that place on the 6th. of May.

Saturday, June 7th. The Army Embarked and ready to sail except a few Ships not having Compleated

their Victualing.

This Afternoon arrived a Ship from Glasgow, with Highlanders on board, part of a Fleet of thirty Sail, four more off.

Tuesday, June 11th. On board the Fanny. Wind N. W. at 5 P. M. came to sail with the Fleet. at 12

the Light House N. B. E. 5 Leagues.

Wednesday, June 12th. Wind S. B. W. Moderate and clear; in Company with Fleet. at five lay too, joined 5 sail from England, Highlanders. At 8 wind

W. made sail, foggy. Distance, 78. Lat. observed,

were on board that Ship with Governor Tryon.

Monday, July 1st. Moved up to Gravesend in order to Land; measures changed. Sailed the next day for the Watering place, could not get up; the next day in the Evening got to the Watering Place and landed the 3d on Staten Island; that day and the next taken up in sending the Troops to their respective Quarters, who form a Chain round the Island. The Rebels had a Body of 3 or 4 hundred Men at the Narrows, on this Island, in a Redoubt near the Flag Staff; but they quit the place the day before we Landed, drove off a few Cattle, and would have taken all off the Island, if they could. Several Rifle Men have Deserted to us, and may expect more daily.

Friday, July 5th. At Head Quarters. Went to Deckers Ferry to give Orders. All quiet, except a Shot or two from the Rebels opposite the Church, which are frequent and not noticed by us, except on the Night of the 3d, when the Rebels brought down Cannon and fired on the George and other Schooners lying opposite Deckers Ferry; killed one Man and Wounded four in the George, and it was thought

proper for the George to haul into the Dock.

Saturday, July 6th, 7th, & 8th. Nothing extraordinary, but the Coming in, on the Evening of the 6th. about 58 Men from Shrewsbury, with Lieut. Morris. Observe the Rebels have fortified Governors Island very strongly, as well as Red Hook and the Heights to Brookline Ferry. Paulus's Hook likewise defensible, with an Encampment of about 700 Men on it. Are told they have 5,000 encamped on King's Bridge under the Command of Miflin, and 3,000 at Col. Morris's, tho' the leaders are very suspicious of the Majority of their Army and don't rely on any but the New England Forces, about 7,000 Men.

Tuesday,, July 9th. & 10th. Everything very quiet. By a Deserter come in this Night we are told they have 35 thousand Men Assembled, we likewise hear of a project by one Musherow [Mesereau] to bring a Body of Troops to Surprise the Island. Caution taken

on the Quarter they have proposed to Land.

Intelligence given that a large Body of Jersey Troops had joined the Rebel Army at New York. No sign of their Constructing a Work on Bergen Common, opposite the Dutch Church, or Deckers Ferry. Hear that Messrs. Fairholme and Turnbull are taken into Custody, and that Gov. Franklin was carried to Connecticut, to be put into the hands of Gov. Trumbull (or Governor of that Colony).

Thursday, July 11th. all quiet, Arrived a Transport with Highlanders, and some other Ships below.

Friday, July 12th. About half after 3 in the Afternoon His Majesty's Ship Phenix, Commanded by Capt. Parker, and the Rose, by Capt. Wallace, with the Tryal Schooner and two Tenders, got under Sail to pass the Town of New York; in about forty minutes they got a breast of Paulus's Hook, before which time they did not fire a Shot, tho' they received the whole of the Rebels fire from Red Hook, Governors Island, the Battery, and from some Guns in the Town. When they opened Paulus's Hook they began to fire on both sides, on which the Rebels fled from their Works at Paulus's Hook, but returned at intervals to their Guns and fired them; at half past four the Ships were past all the Batteries, and as far as we could judge received little hurt.

At 7 o'Clock Lord Howe came to an Anchor at the landing Place; was Saluted by the Admiral and the rest of the Fleet; at half past 8 the General went on board

to see his Brother. Number of Shot fired by the

Rebels, 196.

Saturday, July 13th. About half past five in the Afternoon Lieut. Blenerhasset, 10th. Regt., was sent from the Quarters of that Regt. near Elizabeth Town Point, to endeavour to cut off one of the Rebel Boats, but, going too near, was fired upon from the Redoubt and breast Work with small Arms and Cannon, by which the Lieut. was dangerously Wounded in the head, and

one Man in the Leg and thigh but slightly.

Sunday, July 14th. This day a Flag of Truce sent by Lord Howe to New York was stopped by the Rebels off Red Hook; it carried a Letter for Mr. Washington, which was not received, as the Title was not thought honorable enough, being only directed to Geo: Washington, Esqr. Letters carried by another Flag to Amboy was received, but we know no further, or what was the intent of it. From appearances think the Rebels will not listen to any proffers for an Accomodation; their declaration of Independancy is a convincing proof that they will oppose every mode for a Reconciliation unless on their own terms.

Monday, July 15th. This day a flag of truce came to the Admiral; the purport not known. Two Rifle Men came in with two Inhabitants from Rahway; the Rifle Men Desert every day; in other respects all

quiet.

Tuesday, July 16th. A Flag of Truce this day from the Rebels; one from us with Letters from Lord and General Howe, but refused the superscription, not being so honorable as they thought it ought to be. The Guard Sloop lying in the harbour, a fine Vessel, mounting fourteen Carriage Guns. The Rebels have this day brought two Guns, six pounders, and fixed them in the bank directly opposite to Brigadier Agnew's Quarters on Staten Island. All quiet in other respects.

Wednesday, July 17th. Nothing extraordinary. Thursday, July 18th. All quiet still, some Persons Reconnoitering opposite the Ferry at Deckers. Friday, July 19th. A Flag of Truce sent this Evening to New York, but Nothing material passed

worth relating.

Saturday, July 20th. Col. Patterson, the Adjutant General, went on a Flag of truce to New York; was received with great Pomp by a Guard, Conducted to Capt. Kennedy's House, where he saw a great Court, Gentlemen well dressed, &c.; had an Audience of Mr. Washington, the particulars not come to my knowledge.

Sunday, July 21st. & 22d. Nothing Extraordinary

but the arrival of 6 Highland Ships.

Tuesday, July 23d. About two o'Clock in the Afternoon a Boat was seen to pass with a Single Man in, towards Deckers Ferry; when it came near Deckers, several men came down to the Waters edge and fired at him; he continued to Scull his Boat to our Shores; when he got opposite the Ferry, a party of ten or twelve came and fired on him; some guns, 3 and 12 Pounders, fired for the protection of the Man. made them to desist, and the Man fortunately escaped, tho' amazingly Drunk; he belonged to the Sloop, a tender of the Chatham's.

Wednesday, July 24th. Nothing at all Extra-

ordinary as to Military Transactions.

By Pennsylvania Papers as far as the 19th. July, we are informed in a long Laboured Letter, an Extract of General Lee's, that our Troops and Ships of War had Attacked Sullivan's Island, in Carolina, that the Men of War were roughly handled, many Men Killed, one Ship lost, and the rest much damaged. That our Troops were repulsed, &c., &c.

Thursday, July 25th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Friday, July 26th. Seven Sail in sight, supposed from Halifax. The two Mr. Auchmuty's this day joined us from Jersey; left Brunswick two days ago, all well. Our Redoubts, begun on the heights above the Watering-place, in great forwardness. They consist of a Redoubt to contain 200, another of 60, and a third of 20 Men.

Saturday, July 27th. By some fugitives from Long

Island we are told that a Large fleet was seen off.

Sunday, July 28th. A Frigate, the Brune, came into harbour, informs that a large fleet is in the offing, but no particulars. The Packet from England arrived Yesterday; but few letters; one from Gen. Gage, acquainting that my Sister was well.

Monday, July 29th, to Wednesday, 31st. Nothing

extraordinary.

Thursday, August 1st. Arrived Lieut. Generals Clinton and Cornwallis, and Major General Vaughan, with seven Regiments from Charles Town, South Carolina.

Friday, August 2d. Nothing extraordinary. The Seven Regiments arrived ordered to Land. The Light Horse arrived the 30th. July from Halifax.

Saturday, August 3d, to Tuesday 6th. Nothing Ex-

traordinary.

Wednesday, August 7th. Miss Moncrieffe was per-

mitted to come to her Father's from New York.

The Rebels Papers inform of their having Attacked the ships with five Row Gallies and one fire Raft in the North River, in which they were worsted, two Gallies Sunk, the others damaged, and the fire Ship or float destroyed.

Thursday, August 8th, & 9th. Nothing Extraor-

dinary.

Saturday, August 10th. A very large float was carried from Town to be sunk in the North River, the Passage of which the Rebels are endeavouring to stop in such a manner as to oblige our Ships to come nearer their Batteries in their course up. All accounts concur in saying that the Rebels are very Sickly in the Town of New York. Late Accounts say there are 3,000 Men on Long Island Heights.

Sunday, August 11th. A Packet arrived from Falmouth. Sailed the 16th. June. Left the 2d. Division of Hessians in Soundings, three days ago was Chased on the Passage by two large and one small Privateer.

The two large She run out of sight. The small one preferred keeping at a distance after receiving a Shot. Two Schooners chased her another time.

Monday, August 12th. The Hessians arrived at the

Hook.

Tuesday, August 13th. The Hessians Came up. 15th. & 16th. landed. Guards arrived at the same. the 2d. part of 1st. Division of Hessians arrived with the first; met off the Hook.

The 1st. and 5th. Brigades were ordered to Embark, and the 2 Battalions Grenadiers to take their Quarters; this Step supposed to occasion the Rebels withdrawing their Cannon from Amboy towards Bergen.

The Rebels for some time past Employed in sinking

Hulks in the North River, to stop the Passage.

Wednesday, August 14th. Lord Dunmore arrived. Lord William Campbell also arrived about the same time, or the day or two before.

Saturday, August 17th. Nothing Extraordinary. Sunday, August 18th. Early in the morning a smart Cannonade gave us the Idea of the Ships coming down the River, verified by their Appearance shortly after; being obliged by the sinking of Rafts and hulks from keeping the mid Channel, they were under a necessity of going near the York Shore, but received no Damage, one Man, only, being Wounded by a Splinter. Every thing else quiet; the Orders of the day indicate a Movement very soon. The Troops, most of them, being to Embark.

Monday, August 19th. Nothing Extraordinary. Tuesday, August 20th. Very bad Weather this and

the preceeding day. Nothing extraordinary.

Wednesday, August 21st. Embarkation of the whole Troops compleated. Embark about Eleven thousand eight hundred and fifty English Foot, Near five hundred Artillery and about 120 Light Horse, with fifteen hundred Foreigners under Col. Donop.

Thursday, August 22d. At Day break the Reserve Embarked in Flat Boats; were towed over to Long

Island and Landed about 9 in the Morning, at New Utrecht, without the smallest opposition. The Ships with the rest of the Troops fell down at the same time; the whole on the Shore by 12 o'Clock, making Fourteen Thousand Seven Hundred Men. The advance under Lieut. Gen. Clinton and Earl Cornwallis, consisting of the reserve, composed of Grenadiers, 42d. and 33d. Regiments with part of the Light Infantry, immediately proceeded to Flat Bush, with 1,500 Hessians under Col. Donop, where they had some Skirmishing with the Rebels from the Heights leading to the Brookland Ferry, and a few men Killed and Wounded, but of no consequence. Part of the Light Infantry and 71st. took Post at Flat Lands Church. The rest of our Army, extending from Gravesend to New Utrecht, remained in that position till the 26th. at Night when we were ordered to March; Gen. De Heister having joined us the day before, and taken post at Flat Bush, keeping Donops Corps with him. We were ordered to March by the Right, Light Infantry in front, Grenadiers 23d., 42d. 1st. Brigade, 71st., 3d. Brigade, 5th. and 2d. followed by Flat Land Church into Jamaica Road at the half way House, where we arrived at sunrise; pursued our Route, after a Short halt to Brookland, about a Mile before we came to Bedford saw the Rebels on our left; the Light Infantry ordered to Attack them, which they did with success, and drove them every way; the Grenadiers and Brigades continued the Road to Brookland, with the General at their head, in order to cut off the Enemy's Retreat from Brookland Heights, which was happily Executed. Lieut, Gen. De Heister Attacked from Flat Bush at the same time; and Major Gen. Grant, with the 4th and 6th Brigades, from the Heights of the Narrows, by which means the Rebels were cut off from all Retreat, and cooped in the Woods to the right of the Road from Brookland to Flat Bush. Major General Grant had Attacked early in the Morning, but, the Enemy, under Brig. Gen. Lord Sterling and Major Gen. Sullivan, being strongly posted in the Woods, could not

proceed far. The Action between them and part of the Main Body, Grenadiers, Light Infantry, 42d. and 71st. Regiments continued till late in the Afternoon. The Rebels lost upwards of 3,000 Men during the day, 3 General Officers, viz. Maj. Gen. Sullivan, Brig.Gen. Lord Sterling, and Brig. Woodhull, 3 Colonels, 4 Lieut. Colonels, 3 Majors, 18 Captains, 52 Subaltens, and upwards of 1,100 Men taken Prisoners, most of them Rifle Men, of whom they lost near 1,500.

Wednesday, August 28th. & 29th. Employed in erecting Batteries to Attack their Works on Brookland

Heights.

Friday, August 30th. In the Morning, to our great Astonishment, found they had Evacuated all their Works on Brookland and Red Hook, without a Shot being fired at them, and to the best of our observation found a Body of three or four hundred remaining upon Governors Island, who might have been taken by flat Boats, but for what reason was not attempted; neither could our shipping get up for want of Wind, and the whole Escaped the following Night to New York.

Saturday, August 31st. Marched to Newtown, with

Saturday, August 31st. Marched to Newtown, with the Grenadiers, Light Infantry, 1st., 2d., 3d., 5th. and 6th. Brigades and 71st. Regt., who occupied Flushing and Jamaica. Gen. Sullivan about this time sent to New York, and from thence went to Philadelphia, supposed on the Subject of Negotiation with the Congress.

Sunday, Sept. 1st. & 2d. Nothing Extraordinary. 3d. 4th., 5th. and 6th. Employed in Erecting two Batteries at Hell Gate, one of three 24, the other three 12 Pounders.

Saturday, Sept. 7th. Nothing material.

Sunday, Sept. 8th. Our Batteries opened early in the morning upon the Rebel Redoubt at Hornes Hook; had one Sailor and one Soldier Killed during the day. This Night and the following day the Rebels increased their fire, having brought down some say four, some six Mortars. One of our 24 Pounders rendered useless by running at the Muzzle.

Monday, Sept. 9th. The morning quiet, except very early, when the Cannonade was sharp. this Night begun a new Battery compleated in 36 hours very quietly. Mr. Sullivan returned from Philadelphia, no prospect of a Reconcilliation taking place, nor could it

be expected.

Think the Rebels may derive great Advantage from our delays, and have erected Batteries from New York at every Landing to Hell Gate, and a large Body Encamped on the Heights behind it. Our proposed Attack of Hell Gate Redoubt, and landing there, thought very hazardous by many. The strength of the Tides must unavoidably make our landings very difficult, as well as dangerous, from the length of time it will take between them.

Tuesday, Sept. 10th. All quiet.

Wednesday, Sept. 11th. Some firing the Night past, thro' mistake, the Highlanders and our Seamen in Flat Boats. Our 1st. and 2d. Light Infantry on Montresors Island, 1st. Brigade on Bohannas. Are informed that three Commissioners, Vizt. Franklin, John Adams and Rutledge, from the General Congress, had this day arrived at Staten Island, to Treat with Lord and General Howe. His Lordship only met them, and their Interviews short, as the Deputies from the Congress would Treat on no other terms than that of Independant States.

Thursday, Sept. 12th. Nothing particular; part of

the preceeding days Relation, being, I apprehend, the subject of the 12th.

Friday, Sept. 13th. The forepart of this day, pretty

warm firing from ours and the Rebels Batteries.

Saturday, Sept. 14th. Very quiet.

Sunday, Sept. 15th. About 9 in the Morning the Reserve, 33d. and 42d. Regiments excluded, Embarked in Flat Boats in Newtown Creek. The rest of the Army marched to the point of Land opposite to Kipps's Bay and embarked there; the 1st. Brigade and 71st. excepted, who were Left at Hell Gate. About 12 the whole first Landing pulled to the Shore, consisting of the Reserve and Donop's Corps, covered by two 40 Gun Ships and three Frigates, whose fire was both terrible and pleasing, and so terrible to the Rebels that they dare not come within half a Mile of the Shore instead of defending their Lines on the Shore. As we were going on Shore we saw a party of about 5co hundred Rebels, who were marching in great haste to take possession of their Works in the Rear of Stuyvesant's House; suppose them to be the People that afterwards fell in with the Hessians. The Light Infantry landed upon the Right of the Bay, got up a Rock, the Grenadiers, &c. in it; the Light Infantry took possession of the Post on their Right; the Grenadiers, 33d. and 42d. Marched thro' to Inclenberg Hill, and the Hessians to the left, where they met with a party of the Rebels, of whom they Killed 30 or 40 and took about 60 Prisoners. The Grenadiers met with a small party and exchanged a few shot, Maj. Gen. Vaughan the only Person Wounded and that Slightly. Our loss the whole day about 3 Killed and 16 or 18 wounded. The advance of our Army Marched to the Black Horse, and across from thence by Apthorp's House to North River, and had very near cut off Mr. Putnam's Retreat, who brought off the Rebel Rear Guard from New York, most of whom and their Troops in general got off by the North River Road. On a survey of their Works the Day after, find the whole Coast from Kipps's Bay

to New York on the East River, and from New York to Little Bloomingdale on the North River, fortified with a Line of Entrenchment, except where the Marshes obstructed it, with a Chain of Redoubts and Works from Jones's House, across the Island to Lispenard's and Mortimers House by Bayard's Mount, on which they have a Fort called Bunkers Hill, the only Work of any consequence or strength on the Island, and tolerably well finished. It is made of Sod. All the rest of their Works (which are innumerable) appear Calculated more to Amuse than for use.

Monday, Sept. 16th. In the morning a Party of the Enemy showed themselves at Jones's House; were inconsiderately pursued by two Companies of Light Infantry who Engaged and drove a very Superior Body to a great distance, supported by 42d. Regiment and some Light Infantry; were fired at from a Breast work, and, it not being thought proper to support them, were ordered to Retreat. I Serjeant and 13 Privates Killed; 2 Majors, 2 Captains, 7 Subaltens, 5 Serjeants, 3 Drummers, and 138 Wounded. This day took possession of New York; found some Flour and other Stores of no great Consequence, with some Cannon in their Redoubts, but those of little use to us.

General Robertson Ordered to take the Command in Town.

Tuesday, Sept. 17th, to Friday, 20th. Everything quiet till 12 at Night of the 20th. and 21st. in the morning, when the Town of New York took fire. The Wind blowing hard at South East. The fire was first discovered between 12 and 1 o'Clock in that block of Houses fronting Mr. Watts's, and near the Exchange, in a House facing the Water; from thence it ranged up the Broadway and Broad Street to the City Hall. one way, and near Smiths, the other, at Flattenberg Hill. The other side of the Broad way was all consumed from Cortlands House to Hills Tavern, and from thence to St. Pauls Church, with all the Buildings back of that to the North River.

Many People taken up and confined on suspicion of setting the Town on fire, and it is not to be doubted; but it was done by design, Combustibles, Matches, &c., having been found in Houses since, hid under stairways, and ready for another Conflagration.

Saturday, Sept. 21st. & 22d. All quiet.

Monday, Sept. 23d. Three Frigates Anchored off Paulus's Hook, and, after firing some shot, made the Signal for a Deserted place about 2 o'Clock. The 57th. Regt. was immediately ordered into their Boats, and proceeded over under the Command of Lieut. Gen. Earl Percy, the rest of the 6th. Brigade and Light Infantry ordered to Camp again. The Rebels fired three shot at the Ships and then went off, having strip't the place before of everything.

Tuesday, Sept. 24th. All quiet.

Wednesday, Sept. 25th. General Prescott came to Head Quarters, having been exchanged for General Sullivan. Some reason to think General Burgoyne was gone by Oswego, but apprehend it will turn out to be Sir John Johnston, and that General Burgoyne will pursue his way over Lake Champlain.

Thursday, Sept. 26th. Took possession of a Redoubt over the Neck or Causeway from Paulus's Hook;

had one man Wounded.

Friday, Sept. 27th, to Monday, 30th. Nothing Extra-

ordinary.

Tuesday, Oct. 1st. All about us very quiet. Mr. Young came this day from Philadelphia by permission. Reports that the General Congress had ordered 80 Battalions to be raised, but thinks they will find great difficulty in the Execution of their purpose, from the great alteration in the Inhabitants of the Country, whose General Aversion to Independancy was plainly perceivable.

Wednesday, Oct. 2d. This day came over a Person who had been Captain in the Provincial Service from Jersey, who says that about 7,000 Men were collected on Bergen Heights, most of them of the Militia of the

Country. The Rebels made a Movement from Morris's House and marched about 2,000 Men into Harlem plains, supposed to take off the Forage. Our Reserve removed this day likewise, and took up the Ground of

the 3d. and 6th. Brigades, who replaced them.

Thursday, Oct. 3d. From Intelligence received by People from the back parts of Connecticut and other places, we are apt to think Mr. Burgoyne has crossed Lake Champlain, and is advancing on this side of it with his Troops, the whole Militia of Connecticut being Ordered to March and oppose him,—a Shabby, Ragged Sett, without Arms and Ammunition. Colonel Harcourt arrived with the 16th. Light Horse; One Transport excepted. The Hessians had sailed before they left England; Horses to compleat the 17th. Light Dragoons and a number for the General Service were Embarked at the same time with the Hessians, but the Length of their passage makes it very much to be apprehended that most of them have Perished. Ravages committed by the Hessians, and all Ranks of the Army, on the poor Inhabitants of the Country, make their case deplorable; the Hessians destroy all the fruits of the Earth without regard to Loyalists or Rebels, the property of both being equaly a prey to them, in which our Troops are too ready to follow their Example, and are but too much Licensed in it. the Hessians receive Forage as other Troops do, they keep so many more Horses than Government allows Forage for, that they Maraud throughout the Country, and take Hay and Oats whereever they find it, without the smallest means being used to restrain them, except a letter or two being wrote to their Officers, who pay no attention to them, and Publicly permit, or rather direct, these Depredations to be made.

This Afternoon the Phenix and Roebuck, two forty Gun Ships, sailed up the North River, have no Intelli-

gence from them yet.

By Intelligence from Philadelphia we find many of their Leaders in Congress have left them since the Declaration of Independancey. The Allens, Hamiltons,

Fews and Williams among them.

Am Informed Colonel McDonald, of New Jersey, is at the head of an Association, ready to take Arms as soon as the Kings Army can support him.

Friday, Oct. 4th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Saturday, Oct. 5th. General Howe and Lord Howe went this day to Long Island, supposed on a Reconnoitering Party, and that it is intended to Land on

some part of Westchester.

The Roebuck and Phenix lay off Bloomingdale waiting a Wind to proceed up the River. Three Rebel Vessels are seen lying between Forts Washington and Constitution, the first on this Island, the other on Jersey, Shore; the Vessels not above five Miles asunder.

Sunday, Oct. 6th. The 2d. and 6th. Brigades in orders to March for Jamaica upon Long Island. The Squadron of 17th. Light Horse to Flushing, suppose an Attack intended and to Land on West Chester, Mr.

Wilkins consulted on this occasion.

Monday, Oct. 7th. My Brother Bob. came last night from Jersey, having with another Gentleman found means to pass the Guard at the Highlands near the Light House; says that some of the most Intelligent People of Jersey are struck with the Progress we have made, and that they think more justly of the Cause of Government, but that the Ignorant and more extensive part of the Province are in their false error, and still belive the King's Arms have not made that Progress they really have.

Tuesday, Oct. 8th. A long Council of General Officers with the Commander in Chief and Admiral did

not break up till half past three in the Afternoon.

Wednesday, Oct. 9th. At eight o'Clock this morning the Phenix, Capt. Parker, Roebuck, Capt. Hammond, and Tartar, Capt. Ommeny, past the Forts Washington and Constitution on the North River, a very heavy fire on them from the Enemy, but the Signal was made by the Rear Ship of all being well. The firing was con-

tinued at intervals afterwards; suppose our Ships firing at the Rebel Galleys and other Craft they pursued up the River.

General Robertson's Brigade given to General Prescott in the Orders of Yesterday; an Explanation being required by General Robertson, he was told that the Command of a Brigade in Town, and the consequence of it, was considered as of much more honor than if he acted with his Brigade.

Sir William Erskine Appointed in the Orders of the

7th. as Quarter Master General.

Thursday, Oct. 10th. Nothing Extraordinary, but our preparations for an Attack upon the Enemy, which gives room to think it is designed for West Chester, and to get upon the back of the Enemy's Encamp-

ment on that side of the Country.

Friday, Oct. 11th. Lieut. General Earl Percy appointed in the After Orders of this day to Command the Troops on York Island, the Troops ordered to strike their Tents at 6 in the Evening. 3d. and 4th. Brigades, British and Stirn's Hessian Brigade left with Earl Percy to defend our Redoubts on York Island, 5th. Brigade left in New York with Major General Robertson.

Saturday, Oct. 12th. Embarked at day light this morning, the Light Infantry Reserve 1st. 2d. & 6th. British Brigades and 71st. Regt., two Hessian Brigades under De Heister and Donop, Rogers's Corps and one New York Company passed thro' Hell Gate about day light and landed about 9 o'Clock on Frogs Neck without the smallest opposition. Marched about 3 miles to a Pass, took Post there; the Rebels on the other side of the March about one Mile from West Chester; were Cannonaded by the Enemy this and the following day, had four or five Men Killed and Wounded.

Sunday, 13th, to Thursday, 17th. Continued on

Frogs Neck; nothing new.

Friday, Oct. 18th. Passed over to Pelhams Manor, took Post opposite to East Chester, with our right ex-

tending towards New Rochelle; in our Route, which was about 3 miles, our Light Infantry Engaged a party of the Rebels in a Wood, who fled before us; we had about 20 Killed and wounded, with 3 Officers—Major Musgrave, Captain Evelin, 4th. dangerously, and Lieut. Rutherford, 22d.—the first and last not badly.

Saturday, Oct. 19th. A severe order against Plundering, to no Effect; about this day received accounts

of the arrival of the Hessians, long expected.

Sunday, Oct. 20th. Remained in same Position;

nothing Extraordinary.

Monday, Oct. 21st. At six in the morning Marched by the right about 3 mile, and occupied some heights in New Rochelle District, our left where our right had been before. 240 Light Horse joined us Yesterday from Long Island, and 3 Battalions Hessians from Staten Island; the Enemies Encampments in view; at Dusk last night the Rebels Attacked and cut off a Company of Rogers Corps at Mamarioneck, advanced about 3 mile. Our March to this Post not in the smallest degree molested; we Keep the Sound in Short views on our Right; many Deserters come in, say the Rebels are removing their Baggage to the White Plains; that Washington and Lee are in our Front with about 10,000 Men; that the Rebels wish us to guit the Coast, when they propose to surround us and cut off our Communication with our Shipping. No news of General Burgoyne.

Tuesday, Oct. 22d. Three o'Clock in the Afternoon;

nothing Extraordinary.

Wednesday, Oct. 23d. In the Night arrived a Young man by Name of Smith, whose Parents lived on Phillips's Manor, and brought in 17 Men from Dutchess County, who wanted a Guide.

Thursday, Oct. 24th. Nothing extraordinary.

Friday, Oct. 25th. Marched in two Columns, the right led by Lieut. Gen. Clinton, left by Lieut. Gen. De Heister; occupied Grounds in East Chester, on the White Plain Road, Wards Head Quarters, a noted

Rebel. The Enemy in three separate Camps in our Front, on the opposite side of the Brunks, and advantageously posted on rough and Commanding Heights.

Saturday, Oct. 26th. Nothing Extraordinary, but various reports of General Burgoyne. some say he has beat the Rebels on Lake Champlain, others that he has been obliged to return; but none of them to be Credited. The Rebels in our Front supposed not to be above two Thousand, their Sentries and ours very near, and no firing from our side or theirs. An Officer Observed that they Marched off with great composure the last Evening. and in Much better Order than he had ever seen them when he first came to the Ground, and behaved more like Soldiers than he had ever known them to do before.

Sunday, Oct. 27th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Monday, Oct. 28th. Marched in two Columns by the Right to the White Plains, about four Miles from last position; our right opposite the Court House; our left opposite a Commanding piece of Ground possessed by the Rebels; the Brunks between us. A Cannonade ensued, but about 2 o'Clock the Enemy appearing to intend throwing a strong Body on the Height to our left and in the Wood, a Body of Hessians and 2d. Brigade British were ordered to attack and drive them from them, which was done with great spirit; the Ground was warmly disputed for a short time, but our Troops pushing them with Expedition, they fled and left us Heights that might have cost us dear had we attempted it the next day; by this Vigorous measure we possest Grounds in their front of White Plain that are most Advantageous, and enable us to come by Commanding Grounds on their right flank. The Rebels very strongly Entrenched on a tongue of land, with a hollow way on each side, particularly on their right, where a deep Valley runs, at the head of which are strong Hills to the right of their Rear, where they are fortifying, and have a strong Camp.

Tuesday, Oct. 29th. General Schmidt pushed on to

Mile Square, with about two Battalins, or rather more. About the same time General Kniphausen Detached to Fort Independence with about 6 Battalions, the Enemy having Abandoned it the day before.

In the Action of the 28th. we lost about one Hundred and eighty Men Killed and Wounded, with several Officers. Colonel Carr Killed with two Captains,

Hessians included.

Wednesday, Oct. 30th. Nothing very Material at 3 in the Afternoon.

Thursday, Oct. 31st. After Orders II at Night, the Army ordered to March in three Colums to Attack the Rebels, as supposed, but bad weather prevented the Execution of the Intended Project, let it what would. The Army to be in readiness to move upon the Shortest notice. the Provost Marshal ordered to Execute all

Marauders upon the spot.

Friday, Nov. 1st. The Rebels quit their Works upon White Plains; our Troops took possession of them at Nine in the Morning. The Rebels retire to North Castle, leaving their Rear in possession of strong Hills in our front; suppose them to be about 7,000 strong; and Cannonaded us from them the greatest part of the day; we lost 9 Men by this business. Six of them Hessians.

Saturday, Nov. 2d. Nothing Extraordinary with us and all quiet. General Kniphausen in possession of a Post on the Island of New York near Kings Bridge. Gen. Earl Cornwallis with Sir William Erskine reconnoitered to the North River, and from thence to Kings

Bridge, the Country clear of Rebels.

The Country all this time unmercifully Pillaged by our Troops, Hessians in particular, no wonder if the Country People refuse to join us. General Clinton supposed to have a Command in a few days; his destination not known. By Accounts from the Northward General Carleton had beat the Rebels on Lake Champlain, had destroyed II or I2 of their Vessels at the Split Rock about 15 Miles from Crown

Point; Arnold's Vessel struck to General Carleton; Arnold himself escaped to the Shore; and many of the Rebels taken, this Action on the 14th. of October.

From observation find several of the Governors of Provinces discontented with the little attention that is

paid to them by people in Power.

Sunday, Nov. 3d. Dragoons ordered to make up 3 days forage to carry with them the Baggage of the Army two days, several of our Soldiers taken Prisoners this and the preceding day plundering beyond the out Posts; ordered to the Congress for Examination.

Monday, Nov. 4th. The Army ordered to Strike their Tents at day break to morrow, and be in readiness to March immediately. Lieut. Gen. Clinton to Command the Right, Lieut. Gen. De Heister the left

Column of the Army.

Tuesday, Nov. 5th. At 10 o'Clock left Head Quarters, at 12 went to Donop's Post; found 1st Brigade and Donop's Grenadiers Marched from their Post without Orders; remanded back till the Reserve and right came off; some Confusion in the Arrangement and the Artillery going a wrong road made it so late in the day, that the Army only quit the Heights in front of White Plains and lay upon their Arms till the next Morning. The Rebels took possession of their Works on White Plains in our presence, but did not disturb us further than a few straggling Shot which did no Damage.

Wednesday, Nov. 6th. Marched early in the morning by the left to Dobbs's Ferry; got there by 12 o'Clock; fine Ground for an Encampment; found a Frigate and two Victuaiers who had come up the day before, had a few Men Killed and Wounded in passing Forts Washington and Constitution; found from Enquiry of Captains Hammond and Parker that they had lost four or five Men each, and 10 or 12 Wounded in passing said forts; the Lieut. of Hammond's Ship Killed and Young Skinner lost his Arm,—a fine Boy and behaved well. The March of our Baggage marked by

the Licentionness of the Troops, who committed every species of Rapine and plunder.

The Rebels on the opposite side of the River in no

great numbers, possess a quantity of Provisions.

Thursday, Nov. 7th. All quiet. 8 or 10 of our People taken Marauding; Scandalous behavior for British Troops; and the Hessians Outrageously Licentious, and Cruel to such a degree as to threaten with death all such as dare obstruct them in their depredations. Violence to Officers frequently used, and every Degree of Insolence offered. Shudder for Jersey, the Army being thought to move there Shortly; think it very

probable.

Friday, Nov. 8th. The Rebels from the opposite side of Dobbs Ferry Fired at our Victualers and the Men of War lying off the Landing; their Shot just reached, but did no damage. Had the pleasure of Breakfasting this day with Mrs. Philips and Mrs. Morris—all well. Nothing extraordinary on the Land side. Yesterday the 3d. Battalion Light Infantry, Commanded by Major Johnson, took several Boats belonging to the Rebels, about 2 Miles above our Advanced Posts—no resistance; some Stores found; propose to bring them off.

Saturday, Nov. 9th. Everything very quiet. The Commander in Chief this day viewed the ground laid out for our New Encampment. The Rebels reported to burn the Houses and Corn in Front, in order that it may not fall into our hands. Cruel Alternative, and what was not Expected from People who profess, or, Rather, would have it believed that they profess, the true principles of liberty and are friends to their Country, but, by their proceedings, are the Cruelest of Enemies.

Various Reports from the Canadian Army: some say that they have got as far as Saratoga, but apprehend it cannot be confided in; believe General Carleton has defeated the Rebels on Lake Champlain, and that he will take Ticonderoga, but think, from the advanced

Season of the Year, that he can proceed no farther. Mrs. Philips and other friends of Government complain heavily of the depredations of our Troops; believe our Commander in Chief very sorry, but, in the present situation of affairs, cannot prevent it; think, from his probity, the next Campaign will be more regular, and prevent every Irregularity of this nature.

Sunday, Nov. 10th. The two Battalions Light Infantry Ordered to March last Night did not proceed on the business proposed, by a failure in Boats, and, I

believe, from other reasons, now dropped.

Am for many reasons very much dissatisfied with my present Situation, but hope all will turn out for the best.

Monday, Nov. 11th. About 8 o'Clock this morning the Rebels fired from the opposite side of the Ferry at a Schooner and Sloop turning up the River, but Missed them, tho' their Shot reached the Shore. The Army ordered to March by the Left tomorrow morning.

Tuesday, Nov. 12th. The Army Marched as ordered Yesterday. Occupied Grounds from Colonel Phillips's

to East Chester.

Wednesday, Nov. 13th. Marched to Kings Bridge, the Line extending to the Right beyond Delancey's Mills, part in front and part in Rear of the Brunks.

Thursday, Nov. 14th. & 15th. Nothing Extra-

ordinary.

Saturday, Nov. 16th. In the Orders of the proceeding day the 1st and 2d Light Infantry and Guards were ordered to march this morning at four; the Reserve at an hour before day Light; General Kniphausens Corps to receive their Orders from him; the whole to Attack the Rebels on the Heights leading to Fort Washington. General Kniphausen, with about Hessians, to Advance on the right. The first Landing of British, composed of 1st. and 2d. Light Infantry, about a Mile below Kings Bridge, which was Effected at 12 at Noon, the tide not permitting it sooner, and by some neglect not foreseen before; at the same time the Hessians Ad-

vanced upon the right, the Brigade of Guards and Light Infantry landed in the Harlem River were opposed by a small Body of Rebels, who soon fled, but carried off a piece of Cannon they had in a Redoubt, which was meant to prevent our landing; here we received little loss—only 4 or 5 Killed and 9 or 10 Wounded.

The 42d. Regt. Attacked at the same time near Mor-

ris's House, where they were opposed and lost

Lord Percy attacked at the same time and Carried all the Rebel Lines with little loss, taking them in flank as he approached them; by two o'Clock were in possession of all their Forts and Redoubts except Washington, and cut them off from Escaping to the Jersey Shore,—this latter done by the Hessians. Our Troops behaved with their usual spiritness, and have added Laurels to the British Nation.

The Attack, having commenced at 12, was over about one; at 4 in the Afternoon the Rebels Surrendered the Fort, having treated for some time before with our Officers, particularly the Hessians, who Cut off-their Retreat to the Water, and desired the honors of War; but were given their lives only, and surrendered as Prisoners of War. It is Amazing to say that they had not above 12 Men Killed and as many Wounded. The Officers to keep their side Arms, the Men to lay down their Arms, which was done about five. To our shame, tho' they Capitulated for the Safety of their Baggage, they were stripped of their Wearing Apparel as they Marched out by Hessians, till a Stop was put to it by making them take a different Route. They were so thronged in the Fort that they could not have subsisted there above 3 days; 2,600, I believe, is near the number of Prisoners, Officers included.

Sunday, Nov. 17th. In General Orders the Troops thanked with the Officers most conspicuous on the day. The 3d. and 5th. Brigades British, 2 Brigades Hessians, 3d. Light Infantry, 3d. Grenadiers, one Troop Light Dragoons, ordered to encamp near New York, these Troops to compose the Body to be Commanded by

Lieut. Gen. Clinton, and to go to

as soon

as they can be prepared.

Monday, Nov. 18th. Nothing Extraordinary, but the finest Weather for the Season ever Known, and such a Fall as no Man can recollect; the Weather has been as favorable for our Operations since We took the field as it possibly could be.

Tuesday, Nov. 19th. At 9 at Night, the Reserves, two Battalions Light Infantry, Chasseurs, and three Battalions Hessians, Embarked under the Command of Lord Cornwallis, and Crossed the North River the next morning early (the 20th.) and landed without any

opposition nearly opposite Colonel Philips's.

Wednesday, Nov. 20th. This day our Troops in possession of Fort Lee. The Troops under Lord Cornwallis's Command amount to about 4,000 Men. Fort Constitution taken by his Lordship the same day; a quantity of Provisions, Ammunition, &c., were found in it, with about 30 pieces of Cannon, among which were two Brass Mortars. they likewise left their Tents standing, to the number of 300 or better, and their Kettles boiling; supposed to have quitted these Posts with between 3 and 4 thousand Men.

Thursday, Nov. 21st. Nothing extraordinary. Am told Lord Cornwallis is to pursue his Route thro' Jersey; the situation of my Friends there induce me to wish to be with them, but must be contented to remain, leave having been refused me to go to New York, the preceeding day, tho' the General gave me such Reasons as to make me think it proper I should remain, but at the same time prevents me

from asking leave to go with his Lordship.

Friday, Nov. 22d. Lord Cornwallis still about 3 Miles from the Landing; this Evening come to Town. The General went to Jersey; return'd about 11 at Night.

Saturday, Nov. 23d. In Town. My Brother this day arrived from London; happy to hear all my friends were well.

Sunday, Nov. 24th. Am told the Light Horse have

proceeded as far as Second River, but don't know with what certainty, for his Lordship will not be able to restrain the Troops from Plundering the Country; their Excess in that respect carried to a most unjustifiable length.

Monday, Nov. 25th, 26th, & 27th. Lord Cornwallis still about Newark. the Rebels made a show on the 26th, of opposing our troops near Newark, but soon

went off.

Thursday, Nov. 28th, 29th, 30th. His Lordship proceeded towards Brunswick.

Sunday, Dec. 1st. Got there without the smallest

opposition.

Monday, Dec. 2d. Our Advance parties on their Road to Princetown, thro' which the Rebels had Retreated a few days before with 2 12-Pounders and 10 6-Pounders.

Tuesday, Dec. 3d. & 4th. Nothing new But the departure of the , with the Generals

Dispatches by Captain Gardner.

Thursday, Dec. 5th. General Howe went to Jersey. Remain at New York to attend the Drafting of the 14th. and 6th. Regiments, and superintend the Office.

Friday, Dec. 6th. & 7th. the General still at Brunswick, and the Troops not Advanced beyond it, except by detachments a small way into the Country. Undoubted Intelligence received that General Lee had passed into Jersey with a body of Troops, Supposed to amount to five and twenty hundred or three thousand, and destined for Philadelphia, at least as far as we can learn.

Sunday, Dec. 8th. General Howe Marched to Trentown with Reserves, 4th Brigade, Light Infantry 2 Battalions, and three Battalions Hessian Grenadiers arrived at Trentown.

Monday, Dec. 9th. The Rebels had passed the Ferry and fired a few shot from the opposite Shore. Lee at this time in Jersey with a Corps of about 3 Thousand Men.

Tuesday, Dec. 10th. Gates from Albany also in

Jersey, landed the 8th. or 9th. at New Windsor.

From what I hear of General Howe's Situation, he will not be able to pass the Delaware; in that case he must return, and I hope will find Mr. Lee out.

This day Mr. Brindley, a Commissary of Provisions, was severely Wounded between Newark and Elizabeth

Town, and its feared dangerously.

Wednesday, Dec. 11th. & 12th. Nothing Extraor-

dinary.

Friday, Dec. 13th. General Lee taken Prisoner by a party of Light Horse, in one White's House, at Baskenridge, New Jersey.

Saturday, Dec. 14th. Nothing Extraordinary. Sunday, Dec. 15th. Major Cuyler arrived from England, with Dispatches for General Howe.

Monday, Dec. 16th. Nothing extraordinary, except

a Report of Lee's being taken.

Tuesday, Dec. 17th. General Howe lay last night on his return to New York from Trentown, after having pushed Mr. Washington over the Delaware; certain Accounts this day of Mr. Lee's being taken at Baskenridge, by Colonel Harcourt with about 25 Light Horse; two of his Aid-de-Camps killed, Morris and Bird. He himself requested his Life Might be spared, and was brought to Penny Town on the 14th.

Sullivan Commands his Troops, who we hear are

making for New England.

Colonel Clerk this day arrived from Rhode Island, of which we took possession without opposition. The Rebels had taken and brought in, a few days before, a Ship Laden with 14 or 15 thousand Suits of Woolen Clothing for our Troops, and carried her with two Frigates up to Providence, on the Approach of our Fleet.

Wednesday, Dec. 18th. Nothing Extraordinary. Thursday, Dec. 19th. A Hessian Battalion ordred to March for Jersey.

Friday, Dec. 20th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Saturday, Dec. 21st. A Report of an Action between the Rebels and General Leslie's Brigade.

Sunday, Dec. 22d. to Thursday, 26th. Nothing very

Extraordinary.

Friday, Dec. 27th. This Morning Captain Payne arrived from Amboy, with Letters from Gen. Grant, acquainting that Colonel Rall, with three Hessians Battalions, were cut to pieces and taken Prisoners at Trentown; that Donop Marched to his Assistance, but too late to Succour him. Lord Sterling said to Command the Rebels on this occasion; we hope it is not so bad as represented, and think it hardly possible, the Whole should be taken away by surprise, only 6 or 8 People said to Escape.

Saturday, Dec. 28th. No News from Jersey.

Sunday, Dec. 29th. Informed by Accounts lately received that Washington, Putnam, &c., were at the Attack of Rall; that he knew their passing the River, and made no disposition for his defence; as yet the number of Killed and Wounded not known, of our side. About three hundred Hessians of the three Battalions have joined Donop; the Chasseurs, Light Horse, and a Detachment of Light Infantry escaped, with the loss one Chasseur only.

Monday, Dec. 30th. & 31st. Our Troops in motion

at and near Princetown.

OBSERVATIONS OF THE CONDUCT OF COMMANDERS IN CHIEF OF ARMIES, &c.

The delay of our Army under General Howe, at New York Island, for some days, unnecessary. The Landing at Froggs Neck, from whence no Issue but by a Narrow Causeway, not to be passed but with difficulty, without an Enemy to oppose—why not move to the White Plains immediately, and Attack the Rebels before their Works were completead?

After Fort Washington was taken, why not send a Detachment of the Army to Brunswick to cut off Mr.

Washington's Retreat, while Lord Cornwallis was pursuing him to Newark, &c.? General Clinton's Troops would have answered that purpose Effectually. Why not pursue Washington from Brunswick with more Spirit?—his Cannon and Baggage must have fallen into our hands. Provisions might have been sent to Brunswick for all these Services by Water, and no delay in the proceedings of the Troops.

Why Post so small Detachments as to be in danger of Insult, as happened in Rall's Affair, upon the Frontiers of your Line of Communication, or why put Hessians at the advanced Posts, particularly the Man at Trentown, who was Noisy, but not sullen, unacquainted with the Language, and a Drunkard?

## 1777.

Wednesday, Jan. 1st. & 2d. Our Troops in motion at and near Prince Town.

Friday, Jan. 3d. Our Troops advanced beyond Prince Town; the 17th. 40th. and 55th. Regiments, having arrived at Prince Town the Evening before, were attacked this morning by a very superior body of the Rebels, but defended themselves bravely, tho' with the loss of about two hundred Men Killed, Wounded, and Missing, and several Officers, Capt. Leslie of 17th. Regiment of the Number. Several Officers within these few days Killed or taken Prisoners by the Rebels, Capt. Williamson, 52d. and Philips, 35th. both Grenadiers, among the number.

Saturday, Jan. 4th, to Tuesday, 7th. Nothing Extraordinary; our Troops in advance of Brunswick assembled at that place, prior to which I should have given a Relation of Major Crewe's attempt to cut off a Detachment of the Rebels near Springfield, which was endeavoured to be put into Execution on the 5th.; but, the Waldeck Detachment not behaving well, he was enabled only to take 4 or 5 Prisoners, and run a great risk of being cut off himself; made his way to New Ark, and got in on the 6th. Lieut. Mesnard, of the 17th., went out with about 12 Light Horse and 50 Waldeckers, marched about 4 Miles, came to a Hollow, halted the Waldeckers, and proposed to Return, having observed some appearance of an Enemy, advanced a little himself, and was fired upon; the Waldeckers, in attempting their Retreat up the Hill, found their passage stopped, and retreated from the Rebels to a House, where they sustained some fire, but were in the end all taken Prisoners. Mr. Mesnard, finding his Retreat cut off, with about 10 Light Dragoons marched towards Springfield, thro' which place he went thro' a smart fire, had several of his Men and Horses Wounded, but luckily got off with all but one, a Servant.

Tuesday; Jan. 7th. I was ordered to Elizabeth Town, to order General Vaughan to Amboy, and

bring back the 7th. and 26th. to Staten Island.

Wednesday, Jan. 8th. General Vaughan, with the Waldeckers and 71st. Regiment, Marched to Amboy, about 11 o'Clock, the 7th. and 26th., a little before to Elizabeth Point, had all the stores over by half after 11, and the two Regiments by half past 2 o'Clock. very happy that my Rear Guard were not Insulted. About 3 in the Afternoon sent the Flat Boat for some Rum and Provisions that had been carried by mistake to the lower ferry, in the attempt to take which off She was seized by the Rebels, and a Sloop fired upon.

Saturday, Jan. 11th, to Friday, 17th. All quiet. Great preparations making for the Queen's Birth day on to-morrow the 18th. The King's Commissioners gave their first Dinner on this day; a Ball and Fire

Works at the General's in the Evening.\*

Sunday, Jan. 18th. About ten this Morning the Rebels appeared in number about 2,500 before Fort Independance, under the Command of General Wooster, and Summoned it to Surrender, offering the Hessians the best Terms; Rogers and New York Companies to surrender at discretion, as most of them were supposed to be Americans; a denial; some Cannon Shot exchanged, and the Rebels retired as far as Cortland's house, which they have plundered, and where they remained on the 22d.

Sunday, Jan. 19th, 20th, & 21st All quiet except a threatened Attack from the Rebels on Paulus's

Hook.

Wednesday, Jan. 22d. By a Letter from Capt. Payne, A. D., Quarter Master General, are informed that our foraging Parties fell in with the Rebels near Brunswick, Killed near four Hundred and took one hundred with the loss of but few on our side.

Thursday, Jan. 23d. This Evening a Party of Rebels attacked a House in front of Fort Independance, supposing there had been only a small Guard in it, when two Companies, Sallying, routed and killed a few, making 6 or 8 Prisoners.

In Honor of the Day, the General was invested with the most honorable Order of the Bath, by Lord Howe, assisted by General de Heister, in the Pres-

ence of a numerous Assembly.

<sup>\*</sup> Saturday being the Anniversary appointed for the Celebration of Her Majesty's Birth Day, the Guns, as usual, were fired at Fort George. His Majesty's Commissioners gave a grand Entertainment to the Governors and Officers of Distinction, both British and Hessian; and in the Evening a very splendid Exhibition of Fire Works, under the Direction of Col. Montressor, was played off at Whitehall, upon the Occasion.

Sir William Howe gave an elegant Ball and Supper in the Evening. The Ball was opened by Miss Clark and His Excellency Governor Tryon. N. Y. Gazette; and the Weekly Mercury, Monday, Jan. 20, 1777.

Friday, Jan. 24th. & 25th. Nothing Extraordinary. Fear all Mr. Paynes Intelligence will prove false; have reason to think so. Our People quiet at Paulus's Hook.

Sunday, Jan. 26th. & 27th. Everything quiet. Reports of the Rebels taking Boats from North River and putting them into the East River, but cannot

say with what certainty.

Tuesday, Jan. 28th. & 29th. Nothing extraordinary. Thursday, Jan. 30th. The Rebels at King's Bridge discovering our Transports in the Sound with 3d. Brigade, 3d. Light Infantry, and 3d. Grenadiers, quitted their Posts and retreated towards the White Plains destroying all the Bridges in their Retreat.

Friday, Jan. 31st. Nothing Extraordinary. Saturday, Feb. 1st. Sir William Erskine, with 1st. Light Infantry, 1st. Grenadiers, and 42d. Regiment, met with 1,500 Rebels near Springfield, who drew up and waited till our Troops got with in three hundred Yards of them and then Retreated; we Killed about 40 Rebels, took a few Prisoners, with a loss of about 20 Men and one Officer, Lieut. Cunningham in the 22d. Regiment. N. B.—Colonel Harcourt Commanded, not Sir William Erskine.

Sunday, Feb. 2d, to Friday, 7th. Nothing Extra-

ordinary.

Saturday, Feb. 8th. Our Foragers met with a party of Rebels near Quibble Town, Killed some of them, with the loss of one Killed and four wounded.

Sunday, Feb. 9th, to Wednesday, 12th. Nothing

Extraordinary.

Substance of a Letter to General Gage, dated 28th. 30th. January, and 2d. February. That the Rebels had attempted, under General Wooster, to intimidate the Garrison of Fort Independance to a Surrender; if they refused, all to be put to the Sword; a threat of Bringing boats to the sound to destroy our Shipping in New Town Creek, &c. Provincial Troops, their Tardiness in Levies. Col. Brown's forward; Bayards,

Buskirks, Morris's, &c., very slow on account of their being cut off from their supplies. New York Island, Long Island, Brunswick, Amboy, Paulus's Hook, our principal Territory; loss of Men on several late occasions not less than fourteen or fifteen hundred.

Our General's inattention Apparently so to these Circumstances, but think he has sufficient reasons for

his Conduct.

The Weather Milder, Rebels Lurking about Kings Bridge and infesting our Ports in Jersey, our Foraging Parties not exempt from Insult, but come off with Credit upon every occasion. Arrival of 3d. Brigade, their Influence upon the Rebels at Kings Bridge.

Sentiments of People with respect to the Canadian Army's coming to Ticonderoga; think the Expedition

not Feasible.

Accounts of the Actions with the Rebels near Quibble Town; their loss, our Advantage.

Thursday, Feb. 13th. to 16th. Nothing extraordi-

nary.

Monday, Feb. 17th. Major Gordon with the 26th. Regt. Attacked [Feb. 12th.] a party of Rebels at the Neversink; killed five or six and took 70 Prisoners.

Tuesday, Feb. 18th. General Howe went to Jersey. Friday, Feb. 21st. Colonel Mawhood, with 3d. Brigade, and Flank Corps, foraged between Woodbridge and Spanktown; fell in with a party of 900 Rebels, who lay in Ambush and Attacked our flank Corps, by whom they were pushed from their lurking places, but with some loss on our side, one Officer and 5 Men Killed, and about 65 Wounded. 42d. Company Grenadiers had 22 Men Wounded; the Rebels attempted to cut off our Retreat, but dare not stand our Charge, and fled.

Saturday, Feb. 22d. to Friday, 28th. Nothing Extra-

ordinary.

Saturday, March 1st. to Wednesday, 5th. Nothing Extraordinary. Very bad Weather, the latter end of last and beginning of this Month, prevents our Gen-

eral from Undertaking anything in Jersey, let his Inclinations be what they will.

Thursday, March 6th. & 7th. Nothing Extra-

ordinary.

Saturday, March 8th. The General left Brunswick for Amboy, his Escort composed of three Battalions Infantry, one of Light Troops, and one of Grenadiers; the rear Guard attacked between Bonham Town and Amboy by near a thousand Rebels; the Enemy Repulsed, and 52d. Regiment bore the Brunt of the Action; we had two Men Killed and 7 or 8 Wounded, the Rebels left 8 or ten Killed on the field.

Sunday, March 9th. The General came to New

York.

Monday, March 10th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Capt. Gamble informs that he was Prisoner at Prince Town; about this time, being exchanged, was desirous on the 7th. to go to Brunswick; was told by Putnam that he would meet General Howe at New York on the 9th. (Sunday). The Light House attacked on the night of the 7th. and morning of the 8th., but the Rebels did not effect their purpose, tho' wishing to surprise it; feared they will bring Cannon and destroy it before Succour can be sent them; on which Enterprise they seem to be intent.

Received on the *10th*. Letters from my friends in England, and from General Gage in particular; one of mine to him of 2d. December, 1776, shown to the King, containing Intelligence not received; the con-

tents forgot by me.

Tuesday, March 11th, to Tuesday, 18th. Nothing very particular; our Foraging Parties meet with the Rebels as usual, and a Man or two Killed now and

then in Jersey.

Wednesday, March 19th. Capt. Campbell's New York Company attacked a party of Rebels in Wards House; Killed between 30 and 40 and took 20 and odd Prisoners, but on entering the house was Killed himself with four or five Men.

Thursday, March 20th. Colonel Bird, with a Detachment of 500 Men, sailed up the North River, destination not known.

Friday, March 21st, to Tuesday, 25th. Nothing Extraordinary. No Accounts from Colonel Bird.

Wednesday, March 26th. The Detachment Commanded by Lieut. Col. Bird returned to New York, having destroyed a quantity of Rebel stores at Peeks Kill, as follows: four hundred Hogsheads of Rum, 20 pipes wine, some Brandy, a great quantity of Molasses, Sugar, Coffee, Chocolate and Salt, about 600 Barrels of Flour and Pork, 130 waggons with their Harness, a few Ox Carts, between 2 and 3 hundred boxes of Candles, a great parcel of Entrenching Tools, and two or three pieces of Cannon, and a great parcel of Smoked Beef and Dried Tongues.

Thursday, March 27th, to Tuesday, April 1st. Nothing Extraordinary. Transports from all quarters getting into the Bay and North River, ready for service; and several Deserters lately from the Rebels, with their Arms, who report, as all deserters do, that most of the Irish and English will leave them

on our taking the field.

Wednesday, April 2d. & 3d. Nothing Extraordi-

nary.

Friday, April 4th. Information received that a Man who was sent to Philadelphia, by name Molesworth, was taken up for a Spy, tried on Friday, and ordered for Execution on Monday; this Man said to be sent by Mr. Galloway, but believe him employed by the Commander-in-Chief to get Pilots to pass the Chevaux-de-Frise with.

Saturday, April 5th. Nothing Extraordinary. Sunday, April 6th, to Thursday, 10th. Nothing

Extraordinary.

Friday, April 11th, 12th. Nothing Extraordinary. Sunday, April 13th. About one in the Morning Lord Cornwallis Marched from Brunswick up the Raritan to Boundbrook, with one Battalion Grena-

diers and 2 of Light Infantry. Gen. Grant on the opposite side with one Battalion Guards, and 5th. Regiment with the Yagers; part of our Troops got in the Rear or flank of the Rebels at Bound Brook, while the others Attacked in Front; the Rebels were surprised, and run off in their Shirts and hid in the Woods near; a few were killed, about 80 taken, with three field Pieces, two 3's and one 6 pounder; most of their Baggage fell into our hands. Our Troops returned to their Quarters quietly.

Many Deserters come in lately, both of their Continental and Minute Men, with Numbers of the

Country People.

Monday, April 14th, & 15th. Nothing Extraordinary. Am given to Understand I'm to remain with the Troops at New York, but know nothing for certain.

The 14th. at Night, the Rebels attacked Bonham and carried off a Serjeant and 12 Men, an advance Picket, but Marching in Two columns, in the Dark, fired upon one another and left 18 Men on the Field.

Wednesday, March 16th, to Saturday, 19th. Nothing very new, but the arrival of a Rebel Privateer Brig, and the news of another blowing up in the Delaware, not a soul saved; supposed to be the ship Franklin went to France in, and to have had a great deal of powder by the Explosion and her total destruction. Deserters come in as usual. Learn that our Light Infantry Killed thirty of the Rebels in their flight from Bound Brook.

My last letter to General Gage, dated the 18th. April, 1777.

Sunday, April 20th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Monday, April 21st. The 4th., 15th., 23d., 27th., 44th., and 64th. Regiments, two hundred men each, Embarked about three or four in the Afternoon, in the Vessels prepared for their reception in the North River, and were to have Sailed immediately, but the tide being far spent before they were on board, their

Sailing deferred till to morrow. Governor Tryon to Command this Expedition, General Agnew Second. Exclusive of the above Troops are One hundred Men from 57th. Regiment, and one hundred and fifty Pro-

vincials of Lieut. Col. Bayard's Corps.

It is surprising, when Arrangements of this Sort are made that require Expedition, that so little attention is paid to Embarkations; this delay may cause the loss of several good Soldiers, and the Service less Effectually performed, by the Rebels having time to remove

their Stores and prepare for defence.

Tuesday, April 22d. The Troops Embarked, Sailed about two o'Clock, luckily got thro' the Chevaux-de-Frise opposite the Battery with little or no bad consequences, tho' one Transport run on them, but sprung off and got clear of other Ships with good Management, or two if not three must have been drove on Shore; this fleet left on the 23d., early in the Morning off Frogs Point; the Weather has been Foggy, and Wind Contrary since they sailed; fear they have made little progress.

Some Provincials and three Frigates went up the North River at the same time this Detachment Sailed,

supposed to make a Diversion that way.

Wednesday, April 23d. & 24th. Nothing Extraordinary but the bringing in a great Tory Hunter, John Fell, by some People from near Tappan. A Captain and part of his Company came into Brunswick from

the Rebels on the 23d. past.

The Rebels have now near eight hundred Men at Newark, with seven or eight Flat Boats of different sorts. The 3d. Brigade removed from the Communication to Amboy to Deckers Ferry, and on that Shore.

Friday, April 25th, 26th, & 27th. Nothing Extra-

ordinary.

Monday, April 28th. Received Accounts that the Troops under Major General Tryon's Command had succeeded in their Attempt, destroyed a Quantity of

Stores, and brought off greater Quantities in Waggons provided by the Country People, numbers of whom had joined the Troops; the Report says one thousand Waggons had been Collected.

Tuesday, April 29th. Captain Wemys came this day from Governor Tryon, informs that the Rebels had collected in large Bodys near Ridgefield, and attacked our Troops on Sunday the 27th. on their Return from Danbury; that the Detachment had destroyed a great quantity of Stores of different Sorts,

but have not the particulars.

Wednesday, April 30th. Accounts of the Success of our Detachment under Governor Tryon very different from that of Yesterday; Shall suspend my Opinion till I have the particulars from best hands. Our Troops in Jersey remain remarkably quiet, but by what we learn from the Actions of the People who were in Arms against us in Connecticut, the Majority Continue very bitter, and I fear bodes no Speedy Issue to the present Contest. Late this Night and in the Morning of 1st. May, our Troops returned from their Expedition in Connecticut. They Landed at Compo Creek, on Friday, 25th. April, between 6 and 8 in the Afternoon. Marched about three miles and lay upon their Arms till 11 at Night, when the Moon rose; pursued their March till 11 o'Clock the next Day, when they Halted at Richmond, within six Miles of Danbury, till one; resumed their March, and arrived at Danbury about six in the Evening, burnt about 20 Houses with a large Quantity of Medicines and Stores of different sorts in them, with a great quantity of Provisions in the Streets, piled up on the borders of the Street, and about seven the next morning took their Route Home by a different Road, to avoid Mr. Arnold, who lay in their way with a Body of near fifteen hundred Men. Arnold, being apprised of their Intentions, Crossed the Country and intercepted them about four miles from the landing, and posted himself very advantageously at a difficult pass, River and Bridge between them and our Troops. Sir William Erskine, who principally conducted the March of our Troops, by a Show of Attack in Front, led our Troops to the left, crossed

the River, and gained heights to their right; as soon as the Rebels perceived this, they pushed for the rising grounds near the Landing; we did the same, and happily seized them first; the 4th. Regiment in the rear upon this occasion very near being cut off, but happily escaped. The Rebels collected all their force upon this occasion, and drove our Troops from two stone Walls; at the third it was thought expedient to make a push, the Artillery, &c., being ordered down to the landing and Embarked, the 4th. and 15th. Regiments principally, dashed over the Stone Wall and drove the Rebels with considerable loss. The whole had this order, but they, being most Contiguous, had the greatest opportunity of acting, then Marched to the landing place and Embarked without any Molestation, but that so situated that our Shipping and gun boats could cover them. On the whole it was Executed with Judgement and Success, due Honor to Sir William Erskine and Major General Tryon. Killed and wounded, as in my Return in this Book [page 115]. The Rebels acknowledged the loss of one Field Officer, 2 Captains, and 4 Sub alterns Killed, the wounded in greater proportion; their loss in Men must have been great from the above.

Friday, May 2d, to Tuesday, 6th. Nothing Extraordinary. A Man from Morris Town, in Jersey, says the greatest part of Washington's Army are removed to Bound Brook, and some to Newark, and Erecting fortifications at each place, principally at Bound Brook. No arrivals from England, tho' the Wind has been remarkably fair for some time. My last Letters to General Gage dated about from 27th.

April to 2d. May.

Wednesday, May 7th. & 8th. Nothing Extraordinary but that no Vessels from England arrive, tho' we have constant fair Winds. Late this Evening arrived Majors Balfour and Gardiner.

Friday, May 9th. The Rebels attacked the 42d. Regiment at Piscataway with near two thousand

Troops, most new Levies; Killed 2 Sarjeants and 6 Men; left 27 of their own on the field, and had 38 taken Prisoners; the Light Infantry took eleven Prisoners.

Saturday, May 10th, to Tuesday, 13th. Nothing

Extraordinary.

Wednesday, May 14th. Was acquainted by Colonel Paterson, Adjutant General, that I was to go to Kings Bridge with General Jones on Saturday following (the 17th.), there to remain till further Orders, who had not the Politeness to say more to me on the Subject, but it's like him.

Saturday, May 17th. Proceeded to Kings Bridge, viewed the ground on which the Redoubts were to be

placed.

Sunday, May 18th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Monday, May 19th. The Provincials began to Work upon the Redoubts, Number 5 and 6, in front

of the Provincial Encampment.

From Tuesday, May 20th. to Thursday, 20th. Nothing Extraordinary. The Redoubts in forwardness; 44th. 23d. and 64th. Embarked the 17th, and Sailed for Jersey.

Friday, May 30th. Came to Town, ordered to

remain.

Sunday, June 1st. Acquainted by Colonel Paterson that I was to stay at New York or upon the Island;

Lieut. General Kniphausen to Command.

Monday, June 2d, 3d, & 4th: Nothing new, Except the arrival of 2 Battalions Anspach; some Hessians Recruits; and a Detachment of Yagers with a Com-

pany of 112 Anspach Chasseurs.

British Troops to Embark with General Howe, Guards, 2 Battalions; Light Infantry, 2 Battalions Grenadiers, 1st Brigade, 4th., 23d., 38th., 49th., 2d., 10th., 27th., 40th., 52d., 3d., 15th., 33d., 44th., 55th., 17th., 37th., 46th., 64th., Guards, and 42d., Reserve Chasseurs, 4 Battalions Hessians Grenadiers, and three Regiments Vizt. Grenadiers Linsing.

Thursaay, June 5th, to Sunday, 8th. Nothing

Extraordinary.

Monday, June 9th. The Commander - in - Chief Embarked for Jersey about half-past three in the Afternoon; gave my Letter to him of which the following is a Copy.

New York, June 9th, 1777.

Sir.

The politeness with which I have always been treated by you, and the friendly assurances you gave me at Halifax, that you would Exert yourself to procure me the Rank of Lieut. Colonel, which you were then pleased to say you thought I merited, induce me

to trouble you now.

Give me leave in the first place, Sir, to thank you for past favours, and to assure you I shall ever be mindful of them; and I flatter myself no Anticedent bahaviour of mine, to this time, has given you cause to regret the promises you made, or to lessen me in your Esteem: If I have Erred in any respect, or failed in any point of duty, believe me it arose from no froward principle, and that I have in every instance (as far as my judgment could discern) done everything in my power for the Service, and never was happier than when I executed your Commands to your Satisfaction.

I am now, Sir, to set forth my present Situation to you. In few words, I have been near five years Deputy Adjutant General, during which time (part of it under your immediate Command) I have made it my business to Study your pleasure, and that of my Superiors; and I think I may claim the Appellation of a Diligent Officer, tho' not an Intelligent one; by my Assiduity in the former I have endeavoured to supply the difficiencies of the latter, but I find myself as far from any Compensation of Rank (which is my first motive) as I ever was, and unless I attain it thro' your friendship, I've little probability of getting it in any other Channel.

The duty of my office allows no Relaxation, but that is by no means a hardship; it is what I with chearfulness subscribe to; but I must confess I think the Appointment Inadequate; every Major of Brigade in the Army has an Equivalent to it, and I leave it to your Judgement whether a Comparison can be made in the Consequence of our different departments. I mean only by this to set forth what I think a just observation; precedent pleads against me; and am far from pressing a Subject that may appear to have lucrative motives for its basis, Confident if you think it deserves notice that your Attention will not be withheld.

I will not trouble you any further but to Assure you that I shall ever be happy to Obey your Commands, and hope upon any future occasion wherein you can Serve me that I shall not be forgot.

Tuesday, June 10th. & 11th. Nothing Extraordinary. Firing of Cannon heard this day in Jersey, not known what it is; suppose the Rebels firing upon our Boats going up the Raritan.

Went Yesterday to Morrisania to pitch upon Ground for to Encamp the Battallion of Robinson's

Provincials.

Thursday, June 12th. & 13th. Nothing Extraordinary. Our Troops Assembled at Brunswick. Mr. Washington in his former position. The Troops ex-

pected to move from Brunswick the 15th.

Saturday, June 14th. The Army marched in two Columns from Brunswick to Bushwick, about five Miles. At Hillsborough, a Battalion of Light Infantry fell in with a Body of Rebels, took a few Prisoners, and Killed five or six, with the loss of one Man Killed and three wounded; Captain Lysaght, 63d. wounded. The Rebels remain in their Position above Bound Brook strongly Entrenched.

Sunday, June 15th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Monday, June 16th. Nothing Extraordinary, everything quiet as far as we have been able to learn from the Army. Our Army posted at Hillsborough about five Miles from the Rebels, who are Encamped, as far as I can learn, between first and second Mountain; their Front upon the Summit of the Mountain on the Road in Mordacais Gap.

Tuesday, June 17th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Wednesday, June 18th. By Accounts from Deserters of this day, we are informed that Putnam had crossed the North River with 700 Men to join Washington, and that there remained only Six hundred Men at Peekskill. No news from the Army.

Thursday, June 19th. Nothing Extraordinary till the Evening, when Captain Mulcaster came to Town with the Accounts of General Howe's withdrawing his Army to Brunswick, the Rebels being so strongly posted that it was not thought proper to Attack them, and a request to Lord Howe to order the Shipping to Amboy, to receive the Troops, Stores, &c. fear this will Elate the Rebels very much.

Friday, June 20th. All the small Craft ordered from New York to Brunswick; the General expected in

Town to-morrow.

Saturday, June 21st. By a Letter from Captain Hutchison at Brunswick, of the 19th., am informed that the Army marched from thence on the 14th. past to Hillsborough and Middle Bush, leaving The Tents and Baggage behind them, supposed in hopes of bringing Mr. Washington to an Engagement; but, not succeeding in that, they returned again to Brunswick on the 20th. the 17th. Dragoons, 35th., 38th., and 52d. Regiments marched for Amboy, taking the Pontoon Flat, and Boats, &c., with them. Upon this Service we lost about half-a-dozen Men, and two Lieuts. of 55th. Grenadiers, supposed Prisoners, as they were known to have had an Intrigue in that Quarter.

Sunday, June 22d. Great Reports of firing this

Morning in Jersey, but cannot say upon what occasion; suppose the Evacuation of Brunswick by our Troops.

Evening, nothing Extraordinary. Wind at South

East, strong, but no Arrivals.

General Howe Evacuated Brunswick this day; the Rear of the Army Attacked; had five or six Men Killed, and about forty wounded; the Rebels had by Accounts upwards of 30 Men Killed.

Monday, June 23d. Part of our Troops Encamped

at Amboy, the rest upon Staten Island.

Tuesday, June 24th. Transports Sailed for Princes Bay, Staten Island, to take in the Troops. Lord Howe Embarks to-morrow on board the Eagle; supposed the Troops are to proceed to Sea, and the Delaware their destination. The Retreat of our Troops from Jersey will give the Rebels great Encouragement, and strengthen their Cause much; but have that Confidence in our General as to think his measures right, for few can know his Reasons and judge of the propriety of the Steps he has taken. Paulus Hook must be well secured, and Kings Bridge fortified, before the Army moves, as well as Staten Island, or Mr. Washington may be troublesome in the General's absence, and this place (New York) of such consequence, as to make any disaster attending it of fatal consequence to the General Cause.

Wednesday, June 25th. Nothing Extraordinary,

Part of our Troops still at Amboy.

Mr. Washington said to be at Brunswick; and some Accounts of the Northern Army having crossed the

Lakes, that wear a face of probability with it.

Thursday, June 26th. Much firing heard this morning in Jersey, both of Cannon and small Arms, which we are told took it's course towards Brunswick, we hope from thence a glorious issue to our Arms, and a total Defeat of Mr. Washington's Forces.

Friday, June 27th. Accounts vary so strangely, that there is no Confidence to be put in them, the only Authentic is, that Lord Cornwallis had met with

Lord Sterling, Commanding upwards of 3,000 Rebels, at or near Quibble Town, Attacked, and put them to a Total Route, and took three pieces of Cannon from them. This is all the Accounts we have this day at six in the Afternoon.

Saturday, June 28th. Captain Mulcaster, this Afternoon arrived from Jersey and Amboy, informs that General Howe came there last Night with the whole Army; that Lord Cornwallis had fell in with Lord Sterling between SampTown and Quibble Town, had put him to flight without loss, except that of Captain Finch of the Guards, who is most dangerously Wounded, but does not say how far General Howe

proceeded, or anything more of him.

Sunday, June 29th. Short Relation of late Affairs in Jersey. On 26th. at four in the Morning, Lord Cornwallis Marched from Amboy with one Battalion Light Infantry, one of Grenadiers, some Yagers, Donops Grenadiers, Brigade of Guards, and three Brigades British, 17th. Light Dragoons and Rangers, in all upwards of five thousand; am told their March was retarded by Hessians; and his Lordship fell in with Lord Sterling's Brigade, about 14 hundred men, near Short Hills, about o'Clock, who had received Intelligence and were preparing to go off, but could not get away in time enough to save three pieces of Cannon, which fell into our hands, with about 70 Prisoners, and had about 100 Men Killed and Wounded. General Howe marched with the rest of the Army on the Brunswick Road, leaving Bonham town on his left, quitting that road at the Black Horse, about four miles from Ambov.

The Hessians Embarked, and the British preparing

to do the same.

Monday, June 30th. This Night our Troops passed from Amboy to Staten, Island, where they are now Encamped. The Rebels made no attempt to molest them in their crossing.

Tuesday, July 1st. Gen. Sir William Howe came

this Evening from Staten Island to New York; noth-

ing else Extraordinary.

Wednesday, July 2d. & 3d. Nothing Extraordinary. Friday, July 4th. All quiet. Major General Vaughan to Command at Kings Bridge, much against his inclination. Major General Jones to go to Canada. Lieut. Gen. Clinton to Command (as said) upon the Island of New York, and posts depending. Suppose from thence I shall go with the Army, with all my

heart, in spite of Inconveniences.

Find from the general tenor of Officers Conversation that they are not well pleased with Affairs, but they often speak without thought. Asserted by severals that Guides offered to Conduct General Howe by a Road where he might Attack the Rebels in their Entrenchments to advantage, but that he took no Notice of it, this may be without foundation as well as the former, and the General is the best judge of his own Actions.

Saturday, July 5th, to Tuesday, 8th. Nothing Ex-

traordinary.

Wednesday, July 9th. Accounts of General Burgoyne, with the Northern Army, being at Ticonderoga, and of his Advance having cut off three Provincial Battalions; but this wants Confirmation.

Thursday, July 10th. & 11th. Our Army Embarked

at Staten Island.

Saturday, July 12th. All aboard, except the Regiments destined for this Island and Posts Adjacent.

Sunday, July 13th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Monday, July 14th. Received Accounts of General Prescott's being taken by the Rebels on the 11th, at 12 at Night. It appears a party of Men in two Whale Boats, under the Command of a Major Barton, a Providence Man, passed our Men of War, surprised the Sentry at the General's door, entered the house, and took him, with Lieut. Barrington, off, without spreading the least Alarm, even without the Notice of his Guard, which consisted of a Corporal and six Men,

not three hundred Yards from the House. The wideness of the Channel, and the disposition of the Men of War, made Prescott think his situation the more secure.

Major General Pigot ordered to take the Command at Rhode Island till relieved by Major General Robertson.

Lieut. General Clinton went this day to Kings Bridge, who is to Command the Troops on New York

Island, and Posts depending.

Tuesday, July 15th. The Commander in Chief received a Letter this day from General Burgoyne, who had just opened his Batteries against Ticonderoga. He says he heard the place was taken, but does not alledge it as a fact. Accounts are likewise to be credited that Mr. Washington had removed towards the North River, and that part of his Troops were some days since at Pompton, but that is not to be depended upon. If he quits and goes up to oppose Mr. Burgoyne, we shall Attack him in the Rear, in all probability, or why the delay in our Movement from this.

Friday, July 18th. Morris's House.

The Commander-in-Chief having Embarked the preceding Evening, I came here this day to attend Gen. Sir Henry Clinton, being ordered for that Service Officially. Sir William Howe had upon this Service upwards of 13 thousand fighting Men.

Saturday, July 19th. Went to Kings Bridge, and Visited the Posts, No. 4, 7, and 8. Redoubts begun,

but not finished.

Sunday, July 20th. Two Deserters from the Rebel

Army; the Fleet still at Staten Island.

Monday, July 21st. More Deserters, two of whom come from a party of 300 Men under a Colonel Cortland, posted at White Plains; they say there are no Detachments nearer than Peekskill, where Putnam Commands about 7 or 8 thousand Men; that Mr. Washington is at the Clove; and that a large Detach-

ment under Sullivan had marched up the North River. About 18 hundred Men, an Officer of 71st., and a Corporal of 10th. Regiment, came in this day having made their escape from Newburg Fort.

Tuesday, July 22d. The fleet, most of them, at

Sandy Hook.

Wednesday, July 23d. Reported the Fleet Sailed out of the Hook; nothing alse Extraordinary.

Friday, July 25th. Fleet Sailed; several Deserters

came from the Rebels.

Saturday, July 26th. More Deserters from the Rebels; some say Mr. Washington is at Peekskill, others at Fish Kill, at the Clove, and others at Morris Town; but no dependance can be had on any of them,

being Ignorant to a degree.

Sunday, July 27th. Lieut. Colonel (Rebel) Livingston, a Brother of Mrs. Maturin's, came with a flag of truce; was sent from the fore Post by mistake to General Tryons Quarters, where he behaved very rudely, telling the General he heard him say he never would bear Arms against Americans (a palpable falsehood), and that he knew no such Person as King George, and otherwise very Insolent. General Sir Henry Clinton ordered him to be sent back immediately, and not to have liberty to speak to his Sister, the Errand he pretended to come upon.

Monday, July 28th. More Deserters; nothing else

Extraordinary,

Tuesday, July 29th. Accounts of Lord Sterling passing with 3,000 Men thro' Elizabeth Town and Newark in his way to the Delaware, as was Mr. Washington supposed to be, and a Report of Gen. Howe's

landing in the Delaware.

Wednesday, July 30th, to Thursday, August 21st. Nothing very Extraordinary, or any thing worth mentioning, but a few Deserters coming into us from time to time; latterly very few, occasioned by the Removal of Livingston's and Cortlandt's Corps from the White Plains and it's neighborhood.

Friday, August 22d. The Rebels Attacked Staten Island, Long Island, and made a Diversion with about 1,000 Men, under the Command of Putnam, in the

Kings Bridge Quarter.

They landed early in the morning near Satulket [Setauket] upon Long Island; fired some hours with three pieces of Cannon upon a Redoubt at that place, which was Garrisoned by Delancy's 1st. Battalion, Commanded by Lieut. Colonel Hewlett; then summoned the place, which was rejected; and the Rebels soon after Re-embarked and returned to New England.

The same day, about an hour after Sun rise, Sullivan, Deborre, and another General Officer [Smallwood] landed upon Staten Island, with near two thousand Men, part at the old Blazing Star, the others at Elizabeth Point, the latter surprised Colonel Barton, and five and twenty Men of his Provincial Corps, and took them prisoners; a Detachment proceeded to Deckers Ferry, and burnt some bad forage there. Brig. Gen. Campbell in the meantime Marched with the 52d. Regiment, Regiment of Waldeck, and a few Provincials, to Richmond, and, hearing the Rebels were Retreating to and Crossing there to the Jersey shore, he pushed forward, ordering a Body of Provincials in that neighborhood to pursue and Attack them, which they did with Spirit, being assured of support. The 52d. soon came up, and, charging the Rebels with the Bayonet, they immediately gave way; killed about 70 and took 150; a Colonel, Lieut. Colonel, and Major, with 3 Captains and a number of other Officers among them; the Rebels fled with great precipitation to their Boats; our Troops followed, with two pieces of Cannon. Lieut. Grant's Artillery fired several rounds of Grape Shot into them as they were Crossing; they were heard to make a great outcry, and some of them seen to Jump over board. The Rebels have lost, by last Accounts, near two hundred Killed and three hundred Prisoners; ours about six Killed, and twenty five prisoners; first mentioned 3 of 32d.

Killed. Colonel Dongan, who behaved with spirit,

mortally Wounded, and died a few days after.

Major General Tryon marched out from Kings Bridge to attack the Rebels, but taking this step without Gen. Sir Henry Clinton's directions, was Countermanded; it was wrong to move without the General's permission and not to be excused, but had he been permitted to proceed it would probably have had a glorious issue, but that we could not foresee at the time, and a Check would have been attended with bad Consequences, especialy as that Post is the Key to New York, and its preservation of the utmost consequence, upon the whole, the Rebels have made a most despicable figure, their Men behaving in a very Dastardly manner.

Sir Henry Clinton Embarked the 7th. 26th. British and Grenadier Anspach Company, at 12 at Night, at Greenwich; they landed on Staten Island before day,

but were too late to be of any Service.

Saturday, August 23d, to Tuesday, 26th. A few Deserters, come into us, say the Detachment that landed upon Staten Island were the flower of their (the Rebel Troops), my School mate (Antill) among the Prisoners. Reports prevail that Washington is moving to the Northward, and we prepare for him here; it is also said that Gen. Howe is landed in Virginia, but we have no Certainty of it, nor have we had any positive Accounts from him since he sailed about the 21st July from the Hook. No late Accounts from the Northward; wonder at it; fear some Check in that Quarter, tho' that General is said to be at Albany, but we don't give credit to it. Copy of a Letter from Brig. Gen. Campbell.

Staten Island, 23d. Augt., 1777.

Sir,

I had the honor of Informing you Yesterday morning of a Descent made by the Rebels on Staten Island,

and of my being on my March with the 52d. Regiment of British, Regiment of Waldeck, with two field pieces to each Battalion, to Recconoitere, and, if possible, to Attack them. I am sorry to add that the Rebels effected almost a total Surprise of two Battalions of Jersey Provincials, which occasioned nearly the whole loss sustained by His Majesty's Troops, as will appear by the inclosed return. Soon after I wrote, I had Intelligence that the Enemy was moving towards Richmond, with an Intention (as I conjecture) of occupying the Adjacent heights, and thereby be enabled to cut off the Retreat of the Jersey Provincial Regiments stationed beyond that Village; which determind me to move forward to prevent Sacrifice of that Corps, but a Messenger soon after arrived from Colonel Dongan with Information that an Attack had likewise been made on the West part of the Island, that Lieut. Col. Laurence and a good many of his Corps had been made prisoners; but that he, with Lieut. Col. Allen, and their Battalions, with a few of Laurence's that had joind them, had taken possession of some works formerly thrown up by the Rebels near Princes Bay, where they should be able to Defend themselves till supported, or that boats should arrive to take them This Strengthening me in my former resolution, I advanced on the footsteps of the Enemy, and proceeded without the least Interruption to the Village of Richmond, where I was obliged to halt, to bring up the rear and to refresh the Troops, who were even at this time very much fatigued from the excessive heat. From this place Brig. General Skinner was directed to send repeated Expresses to inform Colonel Dongan of my Approach, and desire him to endeavour a Junction. I had proceeded but a short way beyond Richmond, when I was informed the Rebels had reached the old Blazing Star, and were using the greatest diligence in transporting their Troops to the Jersey shore, at this very instant an Officer arrived from Colonel Dongan that he was little more than a

mile distance on his way to Join me, whereupon I sent him orders to turn towards the Enemy, and to Attack whatever Body he could come up with, and that I was following with all expedition and would support him; he obeyed my orders with spirit, bravery. and resolution, and engaged their rear for near half an hour, when the 52d. Regiment came up, exchanging some shots and moving to take them in flank; and the Cannon having by this time begun to play upon their boats, about 150 surrendered Prisoners to Lieut. Col. Campbell, of the 52d. Regiment; and the remainder, of near the same number, retreated towards the extremity of the Island, opposite Amboy, of which last number was Brig. Gen. De Boore; and reports render it still doubtful whether he has as yet made his escape off the Island; however, the Troops were at this time so much fatigued that I found it altogether impossible to pursue them.

I must not forget to mention that Colonel Buskirk's Brigade was early in the day ordered to attack a party left to cover the Enemies Boats, which they did with charge of Bayonet, and obliged them to retreat

to the Jersey Shore.

The troops lay for that night under Arms, and this day I detached the greatest part of Skinners's Brigade towards Amboy, and proceeded with the Regular Troops on my return. A Party was this day ordered to bring off the Enemy's Boats under cover of a piece

of Cannon, which was effected without any loss.

By Prisoners Reports, and from the enclosed order found in General Smallwood's, Major of Brigades, pocket, who was killed, it appears that this attack was carried on by Select and chosen Troops, and formed from three Brigades, Sullivan's, Smallwood's, and De Boore's, and headed by their respective Generals, besides Dayton's and Ogden's Battalions.

We have taken in all 250 Prisoners, among whom are one Lieut. Col., one Major, two Captains, and 15 infeior Officers: their loss in Killed cannot be Ascertained, but must have been considerable. I cannot do too much justice to the Troops, who seemd to be only Anxious who should engage the Enemy first, and be foremost in the race of Glory.

Wednesday, August 27th. The Rebels reported to be coming to Attack our Lines at Kings Bridge by

Country People, but no foundation in it.

Thursday, August 28th. A Man came in from the Oblong; says he was positively assured General Burgoyne was at Bennington upon the East side of the Hudson, and about 25 Miles from Albany; that all the Whig Inhabitants had quit Albany, and most of them retired to the Oblong, where they turned the Tories into their Kitchens, and took possession of the other part of the House; that our Advanced parties of Indians and Irregulars were frequently in the Town of Albany. The same Man says the Rebels have frequently fired at Mr. David Johnson, but never hurt him, tho' he has been once Shot thro' the Coat.

A Vessel come in says Sir William Howe's fleet was left 150 miles up Chesapeake Bay on the 14th. instant.

A Brigade of Rebels remain at and in the Neighborhood of the White Plains, who send Detached parties frequently towards East Chester, and on that Line. He had not heard that any Engagement lately happened with any of our Troops, nor that Fort Stanwix had been Attacked, and our Troops repulsed.

Friday, August 29th. 30th. & 31st. Nothing Ex

traordinary.

Monday, Sept. 1st. to Saturday, 6th. Nothing Ex

traordinary.

Sunday, Sept. 7th. Accounts from Albany that General Burgoyne had beat the Rebels, by a feint he drew them in between his Wings, the Centre or Main body retreating for that purpose; upon the Centre facing about to the Charge, the Wings fell on, and put the Rebels totally to the Route with great Slaughter.

Monday, Sept. 8th. 9th. & 10th. Nothing Extraor-

dinary.

Thursday, Sept. 11th. At Night the 57th. 63d. Detached Corps and Prince Charles's Regiment Embarked and crossed the North River to Fort Lee. The 7th. 26th. and 71st. with a Squadron of Light Dragoons, Marched to New York; supposed to go over to Paulus Hook.

Friday, Sept. 12th. & 13th. Nothing Extraordi-

nary.

Sunday, Sept. 14th. & 15th. Nothing Extraordinary. Tuesday, Sept. 16th. Received Accounts of an Engagement between Sir William Howe and the Rebels, in which the latter had been defeated. Mr. Washington's Letter to Congress of 11th. confirms it, in which he tells the Congress that they were obliged to leave the field; had lost, as far as he could learn, eight pieces of Cannon; that the Baggage, being luckily sent off before, none of it fell into our hands. He supposes, from the Nature of the Action, we lost a great many Men, and more than they did; that he had ordered the Troops to Assemble behind Chester for the Night, and hoped to make up for this loss by some future good fortune.

Wednesday, Sept. 17th. to Sept. 24th. Various Ac-

counts, but nothing to be depended upon.

Previous to this I should speak of an Excursion into Jersey. On the 11th. Sept., at Night, the 63d. Detached Corps, 57th., Prince Charles, and Emmerich's Corps Crossed the North River, and Marched to Hackinsack and New Bridge; at the same time the 7th., 26th., 52d. and Provincials, with Grenadiers of Anspach and Waldeck, landed at Elizabeth Point, and Marched to Newark; were fired upon in their Route. Detachment of 71st. and Bayard's Corps from Paulus Hook, marched to the opposite of Passaic to Near Newark; the whole returned on the 17th. with some Cattle, &c. During this Excursion none of the Inhabitants of Bergen, Hackinsack or thereabouts offered the least obstruction to the Troops in their March, and only the old Villains of Jersey, from Elizabeth Town, Newark, &c., opposed them. We are told Mr. McDougal was near our Rear with

1,200 Men when they crossed at Fort Lee; many People were of my Opinion that Sir Henry Clinton would have Marched his whole Detachment to Paulus Hook, and crossed there, where there would have been no possibility of an obstruction, but by Crossing at Fort Lee they might have been annoyed; and no possibility of annoying them.

No Intelligence of the Northern Army; wonderful Silence; hope they are in good Condition. Everything remains quiet at Rhode Island. Report says Fort Stanwix is taken by Col. St. Leger, but uncertain.

Thursday, Sept. 25th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Friday, Sept. 26th. General Robertson, Sir Thomas S. Wilson, and General Pattison, of Artillery, arrived with eleven hundred British and 700 German Recruits, and 170 Artillery Men. General Robertson brought me Letters from General Gage and some other friends.

Saturday, Sept. 27th. Nothing extraordinary.

Sunday, Sept. 28th. Certain Accounts that General Burgoyne has beat the Rebels near Still Water, who

left 700 upon the field.

Accounts from the Army under Gen. Howe, as late as the 15th., with some certainty says that he had Engaged the Rebels, Killed 1,400, and took 400 Prisoners.

Monday, Sept. 29th. to October 2d. Nothing Extraor-

dinary.

Friday, Oct. 3d. This day, at five in the Afternoon, 57th. 63d. Fanning's, and Bayard's Provincial Corps marched and Embarked under the Command of General Tryon in Spiking Devils Creek; the 7th. 26th. and 52d.

having Embarked in Transports the day before.

Saturday, Oct. 4th. In the morning Sir Henry Clinton marched with Detached Corps, Regiment of De Trumbach, Chasseurs, Emmerich's Corps, Grant's and Robinson's Provincials, and One hundred Highlanders to Tarry Town, where the Transports and Tryon's Corps had arrived, the whole Embarked and Sailed by one at night.

The Confusion of our March to Mile Square is beyond conception, where Gen. Schmidt remained with 35th., Kohler's Grenadiers, Light Horse, and Detachment of Guards, for the Night, and returned to Camp next morning.

Sunday, Oct. 5th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Monday, Oct. 6th. About sun set Sir Henry Clinton attacked Forts Montgomery and Clinton, and carried them by storm, with the loss of Lieut. Col. Campbell 52d., Major Sile, 63d., Capt. Stuart, 26th., Commanders Detached Corps, and Major Grant's New York Volunteers, a Polish Count [Gabrouski], and several other Officers.

Lieut. Col. Campbell Commanded the Attack on Fort

Montgomery at the head of the 52d. Regiment.

The principal Attack of Fort Clinton was sustained by Detached Corps and 63d. Regiment. The Attack was made upon both Forts of the same instant of time, and both carried in the course of half an hour. We lost 188 men Killed and Wounded, 40 Killed, the rest wounded; the Rebels lost about 50 Killed, many of them escaped, and about 200 taken prisoners.

Tuesday, Oct. 7th. 8th. & 9th. Nothing new.

Friday, Oct. 10th. Lord Rawdon came down, says Sir Henry had possession of Fort Constitution without firing a Shot and had opened the Highlands; that Mr. Tryon had Marched with 800 Men on the 9th. to Continental City, and destroyed a Considerable Magazine, and that the People of the Country came in fast, not only with Provisions, but to join the Troops, and said they were tired of the War and would take Arms no more.

Putnam, at Fish Kill, has sent word to the Connec-

ticut Men if they don't join him he will be taken.

Saturday, Oct. 11th. At Night Sir Henry Clinton came down; Flattered me with the prospect of accompanying him, but countermanded the next day, and ordered to remain at Morris's House; the reasons Flattering, that he Wished to have me with him, but

that he relied so much upon my knowledge of Kings Bridge, &c., that he thought it much better I should remain, and that he expected I would write him often.

Monday, Oct. 13th. At one in the Morning Sir Henry Clinton Embarked for Fort Clinton, now Fort Vaughan, and, with the addition of 2 Battalions, Anspach, Waldeck, Kohler's Grenadiers, and 45th., with a Detachment of Light Dragoons, he has, exclusive of Artillery, near 6,000 Men; I mean Rank and File. How many he will think necessary to have at Fort Clinton is uncertain, but he may very well proceed up the River with 5,000 Men.

Tuesday, Oct. 14th. & 15th. Nothing Extraordinary. Thursday, Oct. 16th. Arrived Despatches from Sir William Howe, with a Confirmation of the Rebels having been beat on the 4th. near German Town; but few particulars; and I am informed the Rebels began the Attack and drove in our Piquets. We had Brig. Gen. Agnew, Lieut. Col. Bird, 15th. and Capt. Nairne, of 64th. Killed; am told my Nephew is Wounded; but we are left much in the dark as usual.

It is much feared General Burgoyne is in a ticklish Situation. Mr. Clinton's going up the River will relieve him, if anything can, except his own Cleverness and

threshing the Rebels.

Sir Henry Clinton's proceeding to Forts Clinton and Montgomery (the first now Fort Vaughan), the 6th. in the morning, landed at Stony Point about day light. The Advanced Guard of 500 Regulars and 400 Provincials (52d. and 57th. Regiments, Robinson's and Grant's Provincials) under Lieut. Col. Campbell, of 52d. marched to occupy the pass of Thunder Hill, and having passed this mountain were to proceed by a detour of 7 Miles round the Hills and appear at the back of Fort Montgomery, while General Vaughan, with the Grenadiers, Light Infantry, 26th. and 63d. Regiments. and one Company of Highlanders, some Hessians, Chasseurs, &c., about 1,200 Men, continued his march towards Fort Clinton, covering Lieut. Col. Campbell in case of need; and Major General Tryon brought up the Rear with 7th. Regiment, Regiment of Trumbach, leaving a Battalion on Thunder Hill to keep up the Communication with the fleet.

Lieut. Col. Campbell's Corps Attacked Fort Montgomery and General Vaughan's Fort Clinton, both defended with Abbattis and Cannon, and stormed them in the course of half an hour, with the loss of Lieut. Col. Campbell, Major Sill, 63d., Capt. Stuart, Grenadiers, and Major Grant, New York Volunteers, several other Officers, and 41 Men Killed, 147 wounded with several Officers. The possession of these Forts, tho' cost dear, are of infinite consequence, and does honor to the Troops that effected it. The Highlands are thereby opened, and our progress up the North River cannot be much impeded; and Sir Henry Clinton, having increased his strength by more Troops, is now upon his way towards Albany to join Mr. Burgoyne or facilitate his March down the Country.

Many Ships of War, Row Gallies, &c., are upon this Service, and secure our Retreat, and forward Provisions, &c.

Characters are dangerous things to Meddle with; but that of the Shining Star in our Hemisphere is known only to few; and of all I ever saw, if Merit is the reward, he has the least pretentions to it. Success may attend his steps, but it will never be the Effect of sound Judgement. Wild to a degree, and leaky as a sieve, with all the appearance of Mystery.

Friday, Oct. 17th. Nothing Extraordinary came to

my knowledge.

Saturday, Oct. 18th. Informed that Sir Henry Clinton had received almost positive Intelligence that General Burgoyne had been Attacked on the 7th. instant by Gates, and obliged to retire towards Lake George or Skeensborough, as we don't know the particulars of this Affair, suppose Mr. Burgoyne's retreat proceeded from his want of Provisions; at any rate his Retreat

must be attended with bad Consequences.

General Sir William Howe's Express, which arrived on the 16th., demanding 4,500 Troops, and forwarded to Sir Henry Clinton by Colonel Shirreff, counteracts his proceedings up the North River, and prevents Mr. Clinton's succouring Burgoyne in any respect; for if the latter is Worsted, Clinton has nothing to do but to defend New York in the best manner he can, and the few Troops that remain only sufficient for the purpose, and that in a very incompetent manner. Upon the whole, our Affairs wear a very unpromising Aspect; how much Changed from what we had reason to hope a few days ago! 45th, and Waldeck Regiments arrived this day at Spiting Devil from up the River, and we suppose are to form a part of the Embarkation to Sir William Howe. Major Cuyler writes that my nephew, Lieut. Kemble, of 4th. Regiment, was Wounded on the 4th. instant near German Town; said to be Slightly, and I hope sincerely so, for he's a clever Boy and will make a good Officer. Am sorry to find General Robertson much debilitated with his late Attack, which hangs upon him much longer than I expected it would. Sir Henry Clinton expected immediately from the Country, or, rather, from up the River.

Deprived of all chance of Promotion in the Army, my Regiment not being present; see younger Majors every day made Lieutenant Colonels; acting with the Army, and not my fault if not with Sir William Howe; left Officially with Sir Henry Clinton, who wishes to show, by his Neglect of me, that he has no occasion for any Person of the Commander in Chief's appointment; In short, I am heartily tired of my Situation and wish myself with my Regiment, and the Appointment of Deputy Adjutant General in the hands of one more pleasing to my superiors.

A Report prevails, and strongly Credited, that Mr. Gates attacked General Burgoyne on the 7th. and obliged him to retire; if so, what must be General Burgoyne's fate, a powerful Army at his Heels if he Retreats, tho' we have great Confidence in his Conduct and Judgement; still he must be subject to infinite

hazards if he is obliged to Return.

Sunday, Oct. 19th. to Saturday, 25th. Nothing Extraordinary. Informed this Evening by an Officer from General Vaughan that he had been as far as Livingston's Manor; that he had burn't Livingston's House, and some others. His Intelligence from General Burgoyne not the most favorable, and that he has surrendered; but we don't believe it. Putnam on the River, watching Vaughan's motions, with about 5,000 Men, firing at our Shipping as they come down, but with very little damage to us, only Wounding five or six Men.

Gen. Vaughan left by this Gentleman near New Windsor, and may be expected here to morrow if the Wind is fair.

We must now prepare for an Attack on our side; for if Burgoyne is in their hands, we cannot doubt of their attempting some thing here, or I think they don't know what they are about.

The Troops ordered to Embark under Major General Sir Thomas Spencer Wilson in readiness, but the Ship-

ping not ready to receive them.

Accounts from General Skinner from Staten Island threaten an Attack there; He says they are preparing Boats, &c.; but as that Island is Strengthened with the Waldeck Regiment for it's defence, we think they will not make the Attempt, if they ever had the design. All remains quiet upon Long Island.

Sunday, Oct. 26th. General Vaughan, with the Troops under his Command, arrived from Livingston's Manor; those for the Grand Army arrived at New York; the whole to Land (those intended for Kings

Bridge) as soon as come down.

Our unfavorable accounts of General Burgoyne being Prisoner with his Army, confirmed. He capitulated on the 16th. and 17th.; the Brunswickers and Hannau and British to be sent to Boston, to be exchanged or sent to Europe; said [troops] not to serve during the War.

Reported that He was Attacked as formerly said, on the 7th.; the Rebels most of them Drunk; they themselves say he Killed and Wounded 5,000 (cannot believe it). Skirmishes of Consequence on the 8th. and 9th. Burgoyne Retreated as far as Saratoga; Brunswick Troops, left to Guard the Provisions, did not defend them, and the whole taken; Brunswickers lay down their Arms; the whole Surrounded and Surrendered for want of Provisions. Gates said to have Detached 6,000 Men to Ticonderoga; don't believe it; and a large Body to Washington, probable. Whether he will bend his Force to this place or Rhode Island uncertain; if he has made large Detachments, Rhode Island the most probable; if he has not, New York his Object.

After the Reinforcement is gone to Sir William Howe we shall have 6,000 Men to Defend this place (Kings Bridge) and its dependancies, exclusive of the Troops expected from Rhode Island,—one thousand. A great change from what we had a prospect a few days

ago but we must make the best of the bargain.

Monday, Oct. 27th. Nothing Extraordinary, nor any more favorable accounts from General Burgoyne.

or some where out of the way.

No Barracks thought of, or anything else, for the defence of Kings Bridge, Redoubts, &c.; the Season advances fast.

Tuesday, Oct. 28th. & 29th. Nothing Extraordinary, but a Man come in who says General Burgoyne still

holds out, and is not Prisoner with the Rebels.

Thoughts of demolishing the Redoubts at Kings-Bridge, and confining our defences to the Bridges, and making a Strong Redoubt upon Laurel Hill, near Knyphausen Fort.

Thursday, Oct. 30th. The Troops Embarked and ready to Sail for Sir William Howe, at Philadelphia, Vizt., 17th. Dragoons, 7th., 26th., and 63d. Regiments, Recruits and Convalescents of the Army, making about 4,000.

Friday, Oct. 31st. Lord Petersham arrived from Albany with a positive Account of General Burgoyne's Surrender and Capitulation. It appears that the Rebels had about 19,000 Men to oppose him, that he with fifteen hundred went on the 7th. to take a position that Commanded the Rebels' Encampment, to which, if he could have drawn his whole Force, the storming of their Lines might have been practicable; but the Enemy, observing his Intention, frustrated his purpose, and he had a severe Conflict to get back. The 8th. and 9th. He retreated, and the 10th. got possession of the heights of Saratoga, just above the plain; but the Rebels possessed more commanding Grounds, and left him not a moment's rest from a great number of Cannon they brought to fire upon his Lines and Encampment, which was extended near three miles, and only 3,500 Men to defend it. Finding his Communication cut off, and four thousand of the Enemy in possession of Fort Edward, and having only two days Provision left, he was under a necessity of Capitulating, which he did upon the most honorable terms for a Man in his deplorable situation. Time and a more Circumstantial account of this Affair must be given hereafter.

Saturday, Nov. 1st. Nothing Extraordinary, but Reports of Rebels coming in Bodies upon Long Island,

&c., but little Credit to be given to them.

Sunday, Nov. 2d. to Wednesday, 5th. Nothing Extraordinary here; by Accounts from Sir William Howe, at Philadelphia, of 26th. October, it appears that his Communication for Provisions was very uncertain, boats being obliged to pass within Musket Shot of Mud Fort, or Bank, and the Fort upon Red Bank still in possession of the Rebels, which protects their Shipping at the Chevaux-de-frise, and covers Mud Fort or Bank.

No News from Sir William Howe, and whether he has taken Mud Island or Red Bank uncertain; the certainty of that makes us uneasy, as it is a thing of the utmost consequence to be done before Gates can join

Washington, as appears to us here.

Our Troops for the defence of this Quarter, Kings Bridge, McGowan's pass, New York, Paulus Hook, Long and Staten Islands, consist of 6,200 Rank and File, 720 upon Staten Island, 180 Paulus Hook, 330 Long Island; New York, McGowan's, and Kings Bridge, 4.970, exclusive of Artillery and a Detachment of Light Horse.

Sunday, Nov. 16th. Information received by a Mr. Brush that Mud Island and Red Bank were taken; the

Rebels lost on this occasion (as said) 5,000 Men (improbable); we a third of those that Attacked; and that each Man of ours received one Guinea employed upon this Service; the precedent of paying Men an improper one, and may lead to bad Consequences in future. All quiet in our Quarter.

Monday, Nov. 17th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Tuesday, Nov. 18th. Accounts from a Quaker, which bear the face of Probability, says that General Howe attacked the Rebels near German Town on the 5th.; was near surrounding them; and that the Rebels lost near three thousand Men; all quiet about us; and that near four thousand Men had marched to join Washington from the Northward.

The Sheds in the Redoubts at Kings Bridge nearly finished for the Guards—much wanted for the Comfort of the Soldiers; 24 Men of four Provincial Corps de-

serted within this week past.

Wednesday, Nov. 19th. 20th. & 21st. Nothing Ex-

traordinary.

Saturday, Nov. 22d. More Accounts from Jersey of the taking of Mud Island, but no positive Confirmation.

Sunday, Nov. 23d. Arrived the Grampus, Store Ship, one of a fleet that Sailed from Portsmouth the 12th. September; no Accounts then received of the Operations of our Army to the Southward. All quiet in and about New York.

A small party appeared this day to annoy some Carpenters employed by the Engineer to unroof Houses near Valentine's Hill, to cover the Men in the Redoubts, etc., but were driven beyond the Brunks with the loss of one Man only Killed of Capt. Emmerick's Company. Letters this Evening from the Commander in Chief at Philadelphia, with the Accounts of Mud Island and Red Bank being taken. Great promotions in the Army, Major Cuyler made Lieut. Colonel in room of Meadows -how hard for me who have been Major and upon the same Service, older by three Years.

The Rebels who committed the above Outrage, we hear, were a Party of about twenty Continental Troops, sent from Connecticut for no other Purpose than to destroy General De Lancey's House, with Promise of great Rewards should they compleat the Work. They retreated by Way of Seccacus, called at a poor Man's House there, and robbed him of all the Family Cloathing, Blankets, etc., etc.—

Last week a small party of men made an excursion to Greenwich, about three miles from New York; they arrived there in the evening; advanced to Oliver Delancey's: a centry was at the door, whom they secured; found a few ladies and gentlemen in the house; the ladies were suffered to depart in peace, though in some haste; we hear five men were made prisoners; they set the house on fire, and, hearing the alarm guns in New York, thought it was time to decamp, crossed the river, and burnt their barge, and got safe off.

On Wednesday Morning, the 26th. of November, a Party of Rebel Troops landed at Bloomendale, about Six Miles from this City, near Brigadier General De Lancey's, robbed and plundered his House of the most valuable Furniture and Money, set the House on Fire before Mrs. De Lancey, her two Daughters, and two other young Ladies could remove out of it, which was effected through the Flames, in only their Bed Dresses, when they were most cruelly insulted, beat, and abused, and what Money they had, taken from them; an Infant Grandchild in a most barbarous Manner thrown on the Ground; at last, in their Fright and Distress, they ran different Ways in the Woods, where they remained till Day-Light, exposed to every Inclemency. The Promotion of several Junior Majors to myself in the Army under your Command, cannot but be felt by a sensible mind; tho' my duty has removed me from under your immediate Eye, I flatter myself I am still acting under your Patronage, and I hope without Censure; if that is the case, you cannot but feel for me and think I suffer much; have still a reliance on your friendship, and that it is your wish to Promote me; It is thought to be in your power (by Brevet), but let Rank come thro' what Channel it will, and I get it from your goodness, I shall ever acknowledge the favor.

Monday, Déc. 15th. Nothing Extraordinary. Tuesday, Dec. 16th. Arrived the Maidstone, Ship of War, with a Convoy and a number of Recruits for the Army; numbers not known, none of the Ships being come up; find all prospect of Promotion vanished, by a letter from Sir S. Gideon of 30th. Sept.

material has offered, but the Descent of a few Rebels upon Long Island; the Militia in pursuit of them, Reported a few of them taken. Sir Henry informed me he was appointed to the Command, vice Sir William Howe; General Robertson and others informed of the circumstance, and made publick by them; this Vessel brings an Account of ten thousand Men being ordered to America, of which 7,000 are Highlanders, and of terms to be offered the Americans.

Thursday, April 16th. to Friday, April 24th.

Nothing Extraordinary.

Saturday, April 25th. Informed some of the Acts of Parliament had been received in Connecticut and

in Jersey, and with pleasure read by most ranks of People; but the Congress have not had time to make their Sentiments known; till that is done, the People may imagine, but they really don't know their own minds, or at least dare not avow their Sentiments.

Sunday, April 26th. to Thursday, 30th. All quiet;

no News.

Friday, May 1st. & 2d. Sir Henry Clinton sailed this day to Philadelphia, to take upon him the Command. Lord Rawdon and Capt. Sutherland raising Provincial Battalions, the latter a Caledonian, the former Hibernian; both have their views: the latter promotion from a temporary rank; the former, in case his Company in the Guards does not succeed, the temporary Rank of Colonel may give him a plea to be appointed Adjutant General if Colonel Paterson should decline, which I think will be the case; what am I to do?—why, wretch, Grin and bear it, for you are not in a Situation to kick, poor devil.

Sunday, May 3d. General Daniel Jones succeeded to the Command of York Island and Posts depending; find him as precise and Exact as Sir Henry was on the Contrary; don't dislike him the worse for it, and think

I shall do very well with him.

Monday, May 4th. to 9th. Nothing Extraordinary. Sunday, May 10th. Arrived a Ship with a few Recruits of the 15th. and 17th. Regiments in the Greenwich, India Man, in eight Weeks from Portsmouth. She sailed with Admiral Gambier.

Monday, May 11th. & 12th. Nothing Extraordinary. Wednesday, May 13th. 14th. & 15th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Saturday, May 16th. to Wednesday, 20th. Nothing

new.

Thursday, May 21st. Received a Letter from General Gage inclosing a Note from Lord Barrington to him, informing that I was appointed Lieutenant Colonel by Brevet, my Commission bearing date the 29th. August, 1777.

Friday, May 22d. to Saturday, 30th. Nothing new

but the arrival of Admiral Gambier on the 29th.

Sunday, May 21st. Accounts from Philadelphia says Sir Henry Clinton marched out with the Army on 19th., and drove a Body of 3,000 Rebels from Chestnut Hill, who Crossed the Delaware, and broke their

Bridge over the Schuykill.

Monday, June 1st. to Friday, 5th. Nothing Extraordinary but an Account from Rhode Island of Lieut. Col. Campbell's having gone out with 500 Men composed of 22d. Regiment, flank Companies of 54th. and some Hessians, and destroying 125 Boats collected for an Invasion of the Island, supposed intended to be made under the Command of Sullivan, some Vessels, &c., the Whole Executed with success and Judgment.

Saturday, June 6th. An Armed Brig arrived with an Account of having met the Trident off the Capes of Delaware with the Commissioners, Lord Carlisle, Mr.

Eden, Mr. Jackson, and Governor Johnson.

Sunday, June 7th. A Vessel arrived from Philadelphia in four days says the Baggage of the Army was Embarked, and all the Traders and Inhabitants that chose to quit it were desired to put their Effects on board Ship, most of them fallen down the River, and

part of the Army crossed to Jersey.

The Trident with the Commissioners then at Reedy Island. This same day arrived a Ship from London with Mr. Robert Cambridge Livingston, whose Papers were examined on an Information of some one or two of the Passengers; find from some of his friends that the People in England are ready to give up everything the Americans can ask but Independency, and are tired of the War. Reported that the Recruits and new Levies for the Army that were not Embarked are stopped; if so a Compromise is intended at all Events.

Monday, June 8th. to Saturday, 13th. Nothing

Extraordinary.

Sunday, June 14th. About 2 o'Clock this Morning a party said to be about 20 Men, some Armed, others

not, with their Faces blacked, and otherwise disguised, came into Flatbush, took off Major Moncreiffe and Mr. Bache; attempted the Mayor, Mr. Matthews's house, but it being well fastened, and a Shot being fired which they Apprehended might give the Alarm, induced them to go off with the two first mentioned Gentlemen, supposed into Jersey, but at this time no certain Account can be given; all else quiet.

Monday, June 15th. 16th. & 17th. Nothing Extraor-

dinary.

Thursday, June 18th. Reported the Commissioners and a Committee from Congress are met at Philadelphia, and a Suspension of Arms taken place for Six Weeks; don't think it improbable, tho' the Intelligence is not to be depended upon. A fleet said below. Private Anecdote. Informed by Lt. Cd. At. At. Gl. [Lieut Cramond, Assistant Adjutant General that on Sr William Howe's last Excursion with a view of Attacking the Marquis Fayate, who had crossed the Schuykil with 3,000 Men, that Major Gen. Grant Commanded the Corps of Choice Troops, ordered by a circuit to get in his Rear, which was effected; but this General, having orders to be cautious, which he too punctually obeyed, and would not attack when he might have done Considerable Execution and Cut them almost entirely off; he is fallen in Repute greatly, and is much despised by all the Army; this Account may be Exaggerated, but I think there is some truth in it.

Friday, June 19th. The Troops expected daily from Philadelphia. The Hospital arrived with about six hundred sick and Wounded, but most of the former.

Saturday, June 20th. Nothing Extraordinary, but two Battalions of Delancy's on Long Island, to hold themselves in readiness to Embark, and two Battalions of Anspach arrived from Philadelphia.

Sunday, June 21st. to Thursday, 25th. Nothing Extraordinary, but various Reports of a Movement of Sir Henry Clinton's Army, tho' nothing certain.

Friday, June 26th. Nothing new, my own Conject-

ures that the Preliminaries to a Negotiation is taking place, or else why the delay of Sir Henry's March this way, when we know he was prepared a fortnight ago, some say three Weeks; the quietness in Jersey gives

room for this Conjecture.

Saturday, June 27th. General Robertson this day arrived from Philadelphia, and has brought us Accounts that Sir Henry Clinton and the Army were to March from thence the 20th. or 21st.; the General left it the 18th. Accounts from Jersey say the Van Guard were at Somerset Court House in that Province on the Night of 25th., but we have no particular Intelligence of them. Vast quantites of Merchandise, Salt, &c., left in the

Town, a great resource for the Rebels.

The Propositions from the Commissioners to Congress were not Answered, but as little or no firing was heard in Jersey, we suppose no opposition is made to the March of our Troops, and I conjecture little will be made till the Answer from Congress is received, which will most probably be postponed till the Sentiments of their Constituents is known, and will cause great delay. General Robertson likewise says that Lord Rawdon is Appointed Adjutant General, Sir Henry Clinton his Author; this most like true, and what I have ever thought.

General Account of the March of the Army from Philadelphia. On the 18th. June the Army passed over to the Jersey Shore and marched seven Miles, and Continued its march with little material happening except a few popping Shot from the Rebel parties, who continually followed them, but on the 28th. the Main Rebel Army, under General Washington, having crossed the Delaware at Coryell's Ferry on the 20th. and 21st., being the day before come up, an Attack on our Troops was resolved on. General Lee, with a Detachment of 1,500, reinforced by a Strong body of Militia, advanced to English Town, Washington's Main army about four miles in their Rear. At three o'Clock in the Morning of 28th., our first Division, under General Knyphausen, began to

move from near Monmouth Court House; Lee then advanced to begin the Attack, but falling in with our two Battalions Grenadiers, and a Battalion of the Guards, who, facing About charged and pushed them above two Miles, till, being met by General Washington's whole force, and not being sustained, were obliged to Retire under a heavy Cannonade, by which we suffered some loss. Lieut. Col. Monckton, 45th., Killed; we left on the field some Officers (five), and about 40 Wounded. Night coming on prevented anything further, and our Army Marched to the Heights of Never Sink. Mr. Washington went off next day towards Brunswick. Sir Henry Clinton showed himself the Soldier, but not the wise General, on this occasion, exposing himself and charging at the head of a few Dragoons.

Of the above number 56 died of severe heat of the Weather.

Wednesday, July 1st. 2d. & 3d. The Army Embarked at the Hook; 1st. and 2d. Brigades upon Staten Island; 3d., 4th., and 5th. New Utrecht, Long Island; the rest of the Army upon New York Island.

Saturday, July 4th. to Tuesday, 7th. Nothing Extraordinary but a report of a French fleet being seen, but their destination not known.

Wednesday, July 8th. Advice received that the Andromeda had been off the Capes of Delaware, and saw ten Sail of the line, French. Lord Howe proposed to the Transports to turn out Seamen Volunteers to Man the Fleet, 1,000 offered in a few hours for the Service. The French fleet supposed going into the Chesapeake.

Thursday, July 9th. & 10th. Nothing Extraordinary, but that Mr. Washington's Army was at Newark, Hackinsack, English Neighborhood, &c. Reported that a Camp was forming in the Clove, and that Gates with Several Regiments were at White Plains, all very

probable.

Friday, July 11th. The Count D'Estaing, with 13 Ships of the Line, came to Anchor off the Hook; our Fleet under Lord Howe drawn up within the Hook to

receive them.

Saturday, July 12th. 13th. & 14th. The French Fleet and ours remain in the same Position, and since their arrival no favorable Winds to induce them to Enter and attack us, tho' my own Opinion, never their Intention, and their sole motive to block us up, with a View to let all the Tobacco trade out, and, as soon as they have Effected that, to retire for fear of Mr. Byron, who may be soon Expected with a superior fleet from England. Our Packet stopped by this, and proceeding thro' the Sound; hope she will get home safe, having wrote to General Gage materialy on my own Affairs.

Wednesday, July 15th. 16th. & 17th. The French fleet still in the same Position, and nothing new on their side. Reported this day that a Large Body of Rebels had moved to West Chester and Frog's Neck. That Mr. Washington will Attempt something to countenance the French is undoubted; but that he will commit himself upon Frog's Neck to interrupt the Passage of the Sound is what we can hardly suppose. It is likewise said that the Raisonable and Centurion are arrived at

Hell Gate, but it seems to be doubted. With the addition of these two ships Lord Howe may be induced to Attack the French Squadron, but I hope he will not attempt it till things are brought to a great Extremity. The French may grow Sickly; our Fleet may always be manned from the Transports, who have shown an Alac-

rity to be Commended.

This day the 1st. Brigade and 2d. Battalion 71st., were brought from Staten Island, the 71st. to proceed to Kings Bridge, the 1st. Brigade to occupy McGowan's Pass. We have now on this Island: 1st. Brigade, 4th., 23d., 27th., and 49th., 35th., 52d., 45th., 71st. Regiments, 13 Battalions Hessians, Queen's Rangers, 2d. Brigade Delancy's and Robinson's Provincials; in the whole about 9,000 fit for Duty.

Saturday, July 18th. 19th. & 20th. The French fleet lay in the same Position; no Accounts of Admiral Byron, nor of the Raisonable and Centurion that were

said to be coming from Rhode Island.

Find the dissolution of the Flank Corps without any Compliment paid them to be taken very ill by the Officers, and no very warm Attachment to the Commander in Chief by the Army in general. General Daniel Jones very much estranged, Sir William Erskine and Sherriffe also; Colonel Innes in great repute at Head Quarters. The 10th., 45th., and 52d. Regiments to be shortly Drafted.

So little notice taken of myself, that ever since Sir Henry's return I have not been asked to Dine there;

for what reason I cannot say.

Tuesday, July 21st. Nothing Extraordinary.

Wednesday, July 22d. About ten this Morning the French Fleet made Sail to the Southward, and have

not since been seen that we know of.

Thursday, July 23d. No appearance of the French fleet; informed that General Washington had crossed the North River the 19th. and 20th. at King's Ferry; his Numbers not Ascertained, but supposed to be about 6 or 7,000.

Should the French Admiral have Intelligence of Mr. Byron's absence for some time, he may co-operate with him in the Reduction of Rhode Island, but want of Water may have induced Count D'Estaing to leave His position without the Hook, as well as having Effected his present business, the Opening Southern Ports, and taking the Tobacco Trade under his Convoy, which may, by this time, be prepared and ready to Sail. If Mr. Byron is near, he never will venture himself in Rhode Island Harbour.

General Knyphausen gone this day to Kings Bridge, to Command there. The Rebels alarmed our out Posts last Night by firing upon the Sentries, but nothing more. General Tryon's March to the East End of Long Island Countermanded.

Friday, July 24th. Nothing Extraordinary till late

at night.

The movement of Troops transacted with out any publick Order, and no knowing whom they are or where Posted; a General Court Martial ordered; a Commissary Ordered to be examined about Vinegar bought for the Troops—found bad of its kind, and not fit for use.

The 22d. the French Fleet made sail in the Evening, leaving 7 or 8 Anchors behind them, and stood to the Southward. The 24th. they were seen off the Delaware.

Saturday, July 25th. The Renown, a 50 Gun ship, and her Prize, saw the French Fleet of the Capes of Virginia in her Passage from Antiqua; did not know who they were, and, being to Leeward, could not reach them, or would have been taken, not suspecting their presence on this coast.

Sunday, July 26th. & 27th. Nothing new.

Tuesday, July 28th. Reported that Admiral Byron was below, but all a falsehood, and strong Suspicions that The French fleet is gone to Rhode Island. The 3d. and 4th. Brigades British, and Brigade of Guards, ordered to be in readiness; supposed to go to Rhode Island;

but if the French are gone there they can never be for that Service. They may make a diversion on some part of the Connecticut Coast, or we may March out from Kings Bridge towards White Plains.

Wednesday, July 29th. Sir Henry gone to the Hook, supposed to Consult with Lord Howe on the Operations necessary to pursue if the French are gone

to Rhode Island.

We have now on New York, Staten, and Long

Island, 20,000 Rank and File fit for duty.

Thursday, July 30th. The Cornwall, of 74 Guns, one of Admiral Byron's Fleet, arrived and at anchor in the Hook; parted Company the 3d. or 4th. of this month in a Gale of Wind. The Centurion and Raisonable also arrived from Halifax, Strongly Conjectured that the French Fleet is going to Rhode Island.

Friday, July 31st. Nothing Extraordinary.

Mr. Washington said to be at the White Plains with about 15,000 Men; some say 3,000; but do not think from the present Situation of the Country he has any thing like the first number.

Saturday, August 1st. Reported that Mr. Washington had Detached 3,000 Men to Rhode Island. Sailed

this day for the Hook.

Sunday, August 2d. About two o'Clock this day, Lord Howe made the Signal for the Fleet to Weigh; in twenty Minutes the whole were under Sail, Consisting of one 74, seven 64, five of 50 Guns, with two forty Gun Ships, several frigates, and three fire Ships; but the Packet coming in and the Wind Scanty, the Fleet came to Anchor in half an hour, no Ship being got over the Shoal.

Monday, August 3d. Fleet remains in the same position; about two o'Clock on our way up from the Hook, observed a fire in New York, which had broke out the Night before about one o'Clock near the Square upon the Wharves, and destroyed all the block of Houses and Stores between that and Mr. Isaac Low's, with some King's Stores, Provincial Clothing, &c.

Tuesday, August 4th. A Sloop with one hundred Barrels of Powder blew up, supposed to be occasioned by Lightning; the shock so great that many people were Knocked down, and considerable damage done to Roofs of houses, &c.

Wednesday, August 5th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Thursday, August 6th. Confidently Said that the French Fleet was off Rhode Island, and an Attack intended by the Rebels on this day. We have near five thousand Men fit for duty at that place. Lord

Howe's fleet Sailed this day out of the Hook.

Friday, August 7th. Lord Howe this Morning in the Offing, but as the Wind has sprung up fair supposed he has sailed to the Eastward. Accounts this day from Rhode Island that our Troops had quit Conanicut Island and that two French Ships of the Line were between that and Narragansett Shore; the Sphinx, one of our Sloops, Burnt by ourselves in the Harbour.

Lord Howe seen in the Evening about 30 Miles to the Eastward of the Hook with a Fresh Breeze; sup-

posed to reach Rhode Island tomorrow.

The Count D'Estaing's Fleet Attacked our Batteries on Rhode Island, but were beat off, the Count's Ship by swinging round with her Stern to the Shore was raked fore and aft; and received some damage, as well as some of his other Ships. At the same time five thousand Rebels are said to have landed; but no Attack made that we know of.

Saturday, August 8th. Nothing Extraordinary. Sunday, August 9th. Lord Howe's Fleet Anchored

off Point Judith in the Afternoon.

Monday, August 10th. & 11th. The Wind Shifted to the North East, when the French fleet were enabled to gain the Sea. Lord Howe weighed also, and the Fleets were both in Sight till the 11th. in the Evening. The French having the Weather Gage, Lord Howe could not attack them, nor did they choose to come to Action; the Weather at this time became hard, and, a Violent Storm succeeding, both fleets were separated.

Wednesday, August 12th. to Saturday, 15th. Noth-

ing Extraordinary.

Sunday, August 16th. The Isis, Capt. Raynor, fell in with a French 74 Gun Ship with a flag at the Mizzen Foremast head, about twenty Leagues to the Southward of the Hook, whom She Engaged with Success, and would probably have taken, but, the Isis's Sails and Rigging being much damaged, She could not pursue, and the French got off. Commodore Hotham also fell in with another 74 French Ship dismasted, and would have taken her if some of his Squadron had not appeard to rescue him.

Monday, August 17th. & 18th. All our fleet assembled at the Hook preparing to go to Sea as soon as

possible.

Wednesday, August 19th. The Monmouth, one of

Byron's Squadron, came into the Hook.

Tuesday, August 20th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Friday, August 21st. Reported the French fleet left all their Troops upon Conanicut Island in Rhode Island Harbour, said to be about 2,000 under the Command of the Marquis De Lafayette. All this time our Army lays idle.

Saturday, August 22d. Nothing Extraordinary.

Sunday, August 23d. Went down to the Hook and Dined on board Commodore Hotham, with a number of Captains of Men of War, whose Unanimity and Confidence in Lord Howe is most pleasing, who they talk of as the best Officer ever known.

Monday, August 24th. Lord Howe sailed out of the Hook with his fleet and Anchored about six or eight Miles off; in the Evening the Experiment joined them, who had Sailed about eight days before for Rhode Island, but was Chased on her arrival there by three 74 Gun French Ships, and obliged to come thro' the Sound, and was the first 50 Gun Ship ever known to come through Hell Gate. The whole French fleet off Rhode Island the 21st. past. The 21st., a Whale boat came from General Pigot with Dispatches for Lord

Howe and Sir Henry Clinton, saying all was then well; the French fleet still in the Offing, but had not entered the Harbour of Rhode Island.

Tuesday, August 25th. Left Lord Howe off the Hook with thirteen Sail, including four fifty Gun ships. The Cork Fleet arrived in twelve Weeks' passage; had been up the Delaware as far as Reedy Island, where they discovered the Troops had left Philadelphia.

Wednesday, August 26th. Informed the French Fleet had left Rhode Island; that Lord Howe had sent the Experiment in there, and was in pursuit of the French Fleet, supposed to be gone to Boston. One Battalion Grenadiers (1st.), one of Light Infantry (1st.), and 3d. and 4th. Brigades Marched this day from Bedford towards Flushing, under Command of General Grey, supposed to Embark there for Rhode Island. Sir Henry Clinton went this day to Flushing, and to stay on Long Island some days.

Thursday, August 27th. Informed the above Troops

are Embarked.

Friday, August 28th. Nothing extraordinary. Saturday, August 29th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Sunday, August 30th. A Ship from Rhode Island left all well the 28th. and Lord Howe in pursuit of the French fleet, known to be gone to Boston; the Rebels had then made their Approaches within 900 Yards of our Redoubts, but apprehended, from their Motions, that they were taking off their heavy Artillery, and would soon Evacuate the place. Sir Henry Clinton Sailed this day for Rhode Island with near four thousand Men.

Monday, August 31st. & Sept. 1st. Nothing Extraordinary but the arrival of Admiral Parker and four Ships of Byron's fleet, all 74's.

Wednesday, Sept. 2d. to Sunday, 6th. Nothing

Extraordinary.

Monday, Sept. 7th. Sir Henry returned to New York, having not been able to do anything at Rhode Island, Mr. Sullivan thinking it proper to draw off his

Army from before the Town, and to quit the Island about the 29th. and 30th. August. Two days before this, part of the Garrison Attacked Mr. Sullivan, but without success, and as we do not know the particulars will say nothing of the Matter.

Tuesday, Sept. 8th. Find from Captain Hammond that the French fleet got into Boston Harbour only sixteen hours before Lord Howe arrived there; and that his Lordship and fleet are returnd to Rhode Island.

Wednesday, Sept. 9th. General Grey's Aid-De-Camp, Capt. André, arrived this day, having left the General at Block Island, and informs that the Troops, those Embarked for Rhode Island, with Sir Henry Clinton, and left under General Grey's Command, had landed at Bedford, in Clark's Cove, to the Eastward of Rhode Island, and destroyed a great quantity of Stores at that place and in it's Neighbourhood, with upwards of sixty Sail of Shipping, some of them armed.

Thursday, Sept. 10th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Friday, Sept. 11th. Lord Howe arrived with his fleet, and to go home immediately.

Saturday, Sept. 12th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Sunday, Sept. 13th. to Sunday, Sept. 20th. Nothing extraordinary.

Monday, Sept. 21st. Colonel Sherriffe Embarked this day for England on board the Eagle, with Lord Howe.

The First and Second Light Infantry, 1st. and 2d. Grenadiers, 3d. and 4th. Brigades, Lord Rawdon's Corps, Guards, and Buskirk's Jersey Volunteers, proceed this Night on some Service under the Command of Lieut. Gen. Earl Cornwallis, supposed on a Foraging party into Jersey; the same day ordered to attend Lord Cornwallis.

Tuesday, Sept. 22d. to Sunday, Sept. 27th. The Troops under Lord Cornwallis's Command crossed the North River to Bergen; on the 23d. took Post, their right within three quarters of a Mile of the North River, near Fort Lee, their left extending to New Bridge. Two Redoubts being erected on the Height on the other

side of the Hackinsack, and one of them being tenable on the Night of the 27th., The Troops moved on that Night in two Columns, the right upon the Tappan road, led by Lord Cornwallis; the left, by General Grey, crossed the Hackinsack at New Bridge; the whole proposed to meet at Tappan at day break, with a view of surprising a party of 700 Militia in that neighbourhood, but they were apprised of our march by two Deserters, and escaped. General Grey was more lucky by getting notice of a party of Dragoons lying on his Route, called Lady Washington's, whom he Effectually surprised, and without one Shot being fired; out of 120, Killed about 50, and took as many prisoners—the Colonel, by name Baylor, and Major, with one Capt. and 6 Subalterns-of the latter number the Colonel like to recover, the Major dead; the 2d. Battalion Light Infantry were thought to be active and Bloody on this Service, and it's acknowledged on all hands they might have spared some who made no resistance, the whole being compleatly surprised and all their Officers in bed; this Regiment consisted of 180, and by this rencounter totally disabled from further Service.

Monday, Sept. 28th. The whole returned to Camp. Tuesday, Sept. 29th. Boats arrived to take off

Forage from the Hackinsack River.

Wednesday, Sept. 30th. A Grand Foraging Party, 44th. and 46th. Regiments, advanced on the main Road to Tappan, Volunteers of Ireland, and 6 Companies of Light Infantry, with cannon, on the Stralenburg Road, as covering parties. The Redoubts at New Bridge both Compleated. General Knyphausen, with the greatest part of the Troops from Kings Bridge at this time, advanced to the Heights above Phillips's House, on the North River; small parties of Militia come near us, but nothing worth mentioning.

Thursday, Oct. 1st. to Thursday, Oct. 15th. Nothing Extraordinary, but Foraging Parties, the most considerable at Hackinsack, the Ground to Cover which most

advantageous and beautiful.

All this time Mr. Washington lay at Fredericksburg, with near seven thousand Men, another Corps at Fish Kills, and one at Danbury, but made no movement but that of sending Lord Sterling with two Brigades to watch our Motions, who was so wary as not to give us an opportunity of Attacking him, keeping his Baggage loaded and ready to move off at a moment's warning, seldom lying one Night in the same place.

Intelligence received from a Gentleman of veracity that Mr. D'Estaing had demanded Eleven thousand Barrels of Bread from Congress before he could Sail, that the Militia could not be kept together, and that the Country were in General dissatisfied. Paper Currency depreciating daily, and from twelve to twenty Discount

given at Boston, &c., for hard Cash.

Saturday, Oct. 17th. Went to the Hook with my Brother's Family, who sailed the 19th. under Convoy of the Leviathan; Admiral Byron's Squadron, consisting of 13 Line Ships and one 50, sailed at the same time to Cruise for Monsr. D'Estaing off Boston.

This day Colonels O'Hara and Stevens, of the Guards, proposed to go and settle a mode of Exchange

of prisoners with the Rebels.

Mr. Washington has crossed the North River, and proposing to proceed to the Southward; thought in consequence of our Expeditions going to that part of the Continent. Our Prisoners removed also from the East to the Southern Colonies.

Admiral Byron was left by Captain Fielding making the best of his way to Rhode Island with nine great Ships, and one fifty.

The motive for this in the Rebels is easily to be foreseen, and their Insolence to our Commissioners very great.

Friday, Jan. 1st. & 2d. Nothing Extraordinary. Sunday, Jan. 3d. Having previously, three or four Days before, acquainted Lord Rawdon that I intended to Apply to the General to use his Good Offices in Ex-

changing me from the 60th, to an old Regiment under his Command, pointing out the difficulties I knew the Commander in Chief lay under, and my own Sentiments on the occasion, which his Lordship thought feasible and what the General would approve of, and promised to mention it to the General at my desire, that he might be prepared at our Interview, but previous to that Lord Rawdon intimated to me what I might expect from Sir Henry, and this day the following was the tenor of our Conversation. On Admittance, I told him that My Lord Rawdon had told him of the Subject of the request I intended to make, which was to remove me to an old Regiment under his Command; he replied he did not know how it could be done, and if he was ever so willing those at Home would not agree to it. I replied that I was sensible of the difficulties attending it, but would be obliged to him if he would do it, provided I could procure Lord Barrington's promise that he should fill up the Succession in the 60th. He seemed to be Ignorant of my being Lieut. Colonel to the Regiment, and could not see what advantage it would be of to me. I replied that I was the youngest of four Lieutenant Colonels. He said they were incroaching on his Command, or words to that purpose, and that they, meaning Lords Barrington and Amherst, would never come into my plan; that he could not write on the Subject or appear in it. I then said I would write and endeavour to get it fixed in England, and if I could get Lord Barrington's promise for him to fill up the Lieutenant Colonelcy I should be obliged to him if he would remove me; he said I might write to General Gage on that head, but he would promise nothing; that he saw many Objections, among the rest, by putting me into an old Regiment while I continued in the Adjutant General's Department, he should lose a field Officer, and perhaps an Active one, which in the present situation of Affairs would not be agreeable; upon the whole he almost gave me a denial, and repeated his uncertainty of doing it, even should I get Lord Barrington's promise for him to appoint my successor, and I've reason to think he wishes me, from the foregoing, to give up my Appointment of Deputy Adjutant General.

## COPY OF A LETTER TO LORD AMHERST.

My Lord,

From the good offices I have already received at your Lordship's hands, I flatter myself you incline to the favorable side in what concerns me, and that you are ready to extend your friendship upon any occasion that may carry propriety with it; I therefore take the liberty of requesting your further protection.

I have now been, my Lord, two and twenty Years in his Majesty's Service, and have rose to a Rank that does me honor, I hope with Credit to myself, and to the Satisfaction of those who have promoted me, but I find I am still under the necessity of asking the further Aid of

my Benefactors.

An Exchange or removal into an old Regiment is what I have much at heart, to accomplish which I again have recourse to your Lordship's friendship and Assistance. Should a reduction of the Troops take place before I attain that end, I can expect nothing else but to be put upon half pay, and after all my Services be reduced to so small an income as to have little hopes of Comfort when that period may arrive.

Your Lordship's power and Influence as head of the Army may do much, and, as Colonel in Chief of the Regiment to which I belong, my first Applications are due; should your Lordship Countenance this request, I.

promise myself the Completion of my wishes.

## COPY OF A LETTER TO LORD BARRINGTON.

My Lord,

After the numerous Solicitations your Lordship has had on my Account, I am loath to trouble you with a new Grievance, but, my Lord, I think I have cause to Complain. I did the duty of Deputy Adjutant General a year before the Death of my predecessor (the late Lieut. Col. Maitland), and attended General Gage in that Capacity to Boston in the Year 1774; was a principal in Office under his Successor, Sir William Howe, at the Evacuation of Boston, and till the arrival of the Troops at Halifax; there it was thought proper to Appoint an Adjutant General, and the Expected junction of Foreign Troops with the Army made it necessary he should be an Officer of Superior Rank; but when Sir William Howe made this Appointment he was pleased to say he had every reason to be satisfied with my Conduct. From a principal I then became a Second in Office, and I submit to your Lordship's Enquiries of Sir William Howe for the tenor of my Conduct as such; but, my Lord, on Sir Henry Clinton's succeeding to the Command, I was again set aside, and what I think I had pretentions to conferred by him on a Junior Officer in every respect; this was a grating Circumstance, and could not but give me pain, and tho' I have all imaginable reason to be pleased with the present Adjutant General, I cannot but feel myself Injured.

Your Lordship, I flatter myself, will not think my complaints ill founded, and if what I have said appears to you deserving of Attention, may I request your kind

Interposition on a future occasion.

I have lately applied to Sir Henry Clinton to remove me to an old Regiment, but I find there are objections to it; could your Lordship be prevailed upon to Consent that Sir Henry should Nominate my Successor in case of a removal, these difficulties might possibly be got the better of.

This is a favor I am led to ask, and I hope your

Lordship will not think it unreasonable after being disappointed in what I think I had pretentions to from my situation and Services.

I have been two and twenty Years in his Majesty's Service, and should a Reduction of the Troops take place before I acquire an Establishment in an old Regiment, I shall most probably be reduced after all my Services to half pay, an Income so much inferior to my present one, as to leave little hopes of Comfort when that is withdrawn.

I will not trouble your Lordship further, but to submit what I have said to your Consideration.

We lost 130 Killed and Wounded. Captain Hay, of 28th., the only officer of ours said to be Killed; General Meadows slightly wounded.

cruising off the Delaware, supposed to Intercept the Romulus coming out with £200,000; said the Admiral had sent to Rhode Island for Vessels to attack them;

Heard of Colonel Campbell's and General Provost's inroad into Georgia, of the taking of Savannah, Sunbury, &c.; the Account from the first says the Province is entirely subdued, the latter that a body of 3,000 Rebels are assembled at Parisburg, and his intentions of proceeding against them.

Thursday, Feb. 4th. to Friday, 12th. Nothing new. Saturday, Feb. 13th. The King's Speech thought to be mild, and gives no general Idea of what's to be done in this Country; suppose it's calculated for a Meridian the Operations of which depend upon a French

Friday, Feb. 19th. to Tuesday, 23d. Nothing Ex-

traordinary.

Wednesday, Feb. 24th. In the Evening the Light Company Guards, 33d., and 42d. Regiments, Embarked in flat Boats, and proceeded to Newark Bay, and landed about two in the morning a little higher up than Crane's Ferry; but the 33d. Regiment, having missed the Rendevous, did not land so soon as the other Troops, who Marched a Mile and an half, where they halted an hour and better for the 33d.; during this time a party was sent to take a man in an adjoining house, which they did, but whether they were discovered by a Man in a house near, or the Women run and gave the Alarm in Elizabeth Town, or Plundering discovered them, is a doubt; both are reported; and when the Troops

arrived, which they did about 4 in the morning, General (Rebel) Maxwell with three hundred Men had gone off. Our Troops, after having burnt the Barracks and Court House, returned, but found their Boats aground, which delayed their reembarking till 10 in the morning, by which time the Rebels had Assembled, and Attacked the Light Company of the Guards, which formed the rear; Killed one and wounded fifteen, most of them slightly; one flat boat was left, being so high and dry that they could not get her off; two Men of 33d. Killed in her.

The Admiral was on this Expedition, and hoisted his Flag on board a Galley, with which he paraded the Bay on his Return; the General was likewise there, but did not land, Governor Franklin also was there, but did

not venture on Shore.

Thursday, Feb. 25th. General Tryon made an Excursion to Horseneck, burnt two small Vessels, and destroyed a few Stores; took three pieces of Iron Cannon; knocked the Trunnels off and spiked them; his rear infested; had two or three Men Killed, fourteen Wounded, and about 40 Missing, being most of them obliged to remain behind thro' fatigue, as supposed.

Saturday, Feb. 27th. A Vessel from Bermuda, by her Letters, say that late intelligence from South Carolina inform that Colonel Campbell was at Beaufort, about 40 Miles from Charles Town, and proceeding to that place; think it doubtful.

No Vessel of War in the Harbour to attend any Expedition.

Accounts by a Vessel from Georgia say that Intelligence being received that the Rebel Army of near two thousand Men had penetrated as far as Miller's burnt Bridge, on Brier Creek, which they were repairing, Lieut. Colonel Prevost, Commanding about 1,600 waiting for their passing the Bridge, but finding them slow in that manoeuver, Detached the 1st. Battalion 71st. with about 150 Carolina Volunteers to Buck Creek, about three Miles South of burnt Bridge, in order to mask the advance Corps, about 1,000, with which he took a Circuit of 50 Miles in order to come in their rear; beginning his march on the 1st. March, which he conducted successfully, and on the 3d., in the Afternoon, Attacked and instantly defeated the Rebels, who no where stood a Charge, Sir James Baird's Light Infantry particularly; about 150 were killed in the pursuit and four hundred taken; the numbers lost in the Marshes and drowned not known; one Brigadier, three Colonels, and 23 other officers were taken Prisoners. General Ashe and some other Officers were mistaken by our People, and suffered to Escape. The loss on our side one Officer Wounded, and five Privates Killed. The Rebels had 300 horse joined them the day before the Engagement.

Arrived a Vessel Express from General Matthew and Sir George Collier, with an Account that they had landed and taken possession of Portsmouth, in the County of Norfolk, Virginia; secured the fort with the loss of one Man Killed and one Officer Wounded; that the Inhabitants of Princess Anne, Norfolk, and Nansemond had all submitted, and that the Town of Suffolk, with a very large quantity of Provisions for the Continental Army, were burned; the Church only saved; a great number of Vessels were taken with 1,800 Hogsheads of Tobacco and a large quantity of Naval Stores; one Frigate of 32 Guns burnt on the Stocks near complete.

Gosport, another Town, with two frigates and two twenty Gun Ships, likewise taken, with a great quantity

of Stores for the Continental Vagabond use.

Thursday, May 20th. Nothing Extraordinary, but a Report that Mr. Washington had set off in great haste for Philadelphia. It is also said, and I believe with reason, that General Matthew finds his Post so tenable, and the disposition of the Inhabitants so favorable, that instead of returning by *1st. June*, as he was ordered, he will remain till he has an Answer from the Commander in Chief to his Letters.

Friday, May 21st. to Friday, 28th. Nothing Extraordinary but the Movement of Troops on the 28th. in order to form an Encampment from Philips's House

on the North River, Extending nearly to the East River, keeping the Brunks in great part on their front; and much talk among the Rebels of a Peace, but the most of this uncertain.

Saturday, May 29th. The Troops under the Com-

mand of General Matthew arrived at the Hook.

Sunday, May 30th. Sailed up the North River, and proceeded that Evening with the British and Hessian Grenadiers, Light Infantry, 300 Yagers, Robinson's Corps Legion, 17th., 63d., 64th., 33d. Regiments, and Ferguson's.

Tuesday, June 1st. Sir Henry landed at Verplanck and Stony Point; on the former a small Fort Garrisoned by a Captain and 60 Men, which Surrendered

at discretion.

Wednesday, June 2d. to Saturday, 5th. The Troops

lay quiet.

Sunday, June 6th. Sir Henry went down to Philips's; the Works at Verplanck and Stony Point begun.

Monday, June 7th. & 8th. All quiet.

Wednesday, June 9th. Informed Mr. Washington had moved.

Thursday, June 10th. Heard Mr. Washington was at the Clove.

Saturday, June 12th. to Saturday, 26th. Employed

on the Works and near complete.

Sunday, June 27th. Embarked, leaving Colonel Webster, 33d., in the Command, with 33d., 17th., 2 Companies 71st., Grenadiers, Ferguson's Corps, and Robinson's; in the whole near 1,100 Men.

Monday, June 28th. Got to Philips's and Disem-

barked.

Tuesday, June 29th. to Saturday, July 3d. Nothing new except preparation for an Expedition under General Tryon.

Sunday, July 4th. General Tryon's Troops all

Embarked.

Monday, July 5th. & 6th. Nothing Extraordinary. Wednesday, July 7th. Landed at New Haven,

opposed by the Militia of the Town and Country. A few Store houses burnt, but by some fatality the Troops were not able to reimbark at the time proposed; the Boats were aground, and I fear Drunkenness was the cause of several Men being left behind Wounded. The Guards lost near 47 Men, and in the whole near one hundred killed, Wounded, and Missing. The Town by unaccountable accident not burnt, tho' the Troops were fired at from the Houses till they got off. The Troops then proceeded to Fairfield, which Town was burned, though no opposition, as yet learned, was made.

mand, then at Mamaroneck.

Thursday, July 8th to Monday, 12th. General

Vaughan in same position.

Tuesday, July 13th. & 14th. Nothing new; remain the same.

Copy of a Letter to Lord Rawdon, July 14th.

My Lord,

I mentioned to your Lordship some time ago that I had received General Gage's directions to give in his Son's name for the purchase of a Company; allow me now to remind you of it; to assure you that Mr. Gage is in his nineteenth Year of Age, and was an older Lieut. in the 7th. Regiment than Captain André when he was allowed to Purchase it in the 44th.

Your Lordship was so kind to say at the time that you would be happy to contribute your good Offices, and I flatter myself the Commander in Chief will likewise favor an application wherein the promotion of so

old a General Officer's Son is the Object.

P. S. It is proper I should acquaint your Lordship that General Gage informs me he intends his Son shall join his Regiment soon; but should he be promoted, his situation in the Corps to which he may be appointed may make a Voyage to America unnecessary. S. K.

Thursday, July 15th. Nothing Extraordinary. Friday, July 16th. At 8 in the Morning M:[essenger] of B. Benson came from Verplanck's Point with the following Account, that in the preceding Night, between twelve and one o'Clock, the Post at Stony Point was stormed by the Rebels; that upon the firing being heard, he went over and was proceeding to the main Redoubt when he was challenged by Rebel Soldiers, from one of whom he heard by accident the Watchword was Washington, and retired availing himself of it; that before he left it, the Rebels had turned some of the Guns and fired upon Verplanck's Point; who of our People were killed or who taken no Account can be given.

Saturday, July 17th. to Friday, 23d. Nothing new. Saturday, July 24th. Received Advice by Lieut. Armstrong, 17th., who was made Prisoner at Stony Point, that the Garrison was not surprised, but was all under Arms; that upon the first Alarm Colonel Johnson marched with a Detachment to the place from whence the firing was heard in front; that the Rebels entered on their left by the Water, got in the Rear, and were in the principal Redoubt before they knew anything of the matter, supposing them to be part of the Garrison; that another party of Rebels got between the principal Redoubts and Out Works, by which means the retreat

from the latter was cut off.

Sunday, July 25th. to Wednesday, 28th. Nothing new, but Sir George Collier's Sailing on the latter day with a 64 and six frigates, supposed to Penobscot, where Brigadier McLean had taken Post, and to which place it is reported the Rebels are sending a force to Attack.

Thursday, July 29th. Sir Henry and Lord Cornwallis went to Stony Point; the Works there to Consist of only one large Redoubt, and in forwardness.

Friday, July 30th. 31st. & August 1st. All quiet; the Troops mostly withdrawn within Kings Bridge.

Monday, August 2d. Accounts from the West Indies that St. Vincent is taken (true), and a report that Granada is also in their hands; that the French fleet has been Reinforced with seven Sail of the Line, bringing with them 8 or 10 thousand Troops; that an Action has happened between the fleets; that though ours were greatly inferior in number of Ships, the Action was favorable on our side, we keeping the Sea, having had near 1,000 Men Killed and Wounded; the loss of the French not known.

Tuesday, August 3d. to Sunday, August 15th.

Nothing extraordinary.

Monday, August 16th. The Signal up for a Fleet, suppose Admiral Arbuthnot.

Tuesday, August 17th. Captain Elphinston arrived

with a fleet from Georgia.

Wednesday, August 18th. Nothing Extraordinary.

Thursday, August 19th. In the morning, about half-past 2, the Post at Paulus Hook was Attacked by about 300 Rebels, who crossed the Ditch a little below the drawbridge, and proceeded to the Gate that leads into the Country; found no opposition but a Shot or two fired from the Sentries on the left; entered between the Post of the Gate and Abbatis, and surprised the Guard in the Block house, and proceeded to the principal Redoubt where the cannon was, which they entered with like ease, and took possession of; The Guards in the other Block houses quitting them.

Major Sutherland (the Commandant) took Refuge with about 30 Hessians in the Round Redoubt on the left, which the Rebels made no attempt to force, and, to the surprise of all, quit the place in about an hour, without setting fire to the Barracks, Spiking the Cannon, or doing any material damage, taking off about 100 of the Garrison and killing 3 men. Colonel Buskirk, with 120 Men, part of the Garrison, went out that Evening to surprise a Rebel Guard or Piquet near New Bridge, and

a Captain and 50 Hessians were sent from the Garrison of New York to strengthen the Post in his Absence. A Court of Enquiry, consisting of Brigadier Generals Martin and Garth, with three Field Officers, ordered to enquire into the Cause of the Affront, and, upon their Report, Major Sutherland was put in Arrest.

Friday, August 20th. to Monday, 23d. Nothing

extraordinary.

Tuesday, August 24th. General Vaughan sailed in the Cork Fleet; the same day the Russell, one of Admiral Arbuthnot's Fleet, arrived with an Account of his being near.

Wednesday, August 25th. Admiral Arbuthnot and the whole Fleet arrived; the Troops in general Un-

healthy; between 4 and 5 thousand.

Thursday, August 26th. to Tuesday, 31st. Nothing

Extraordinary.

Wednesday, Sept. 1st. In Evening the Packet arrived with Accounts of a Spanish War, and the great exertions made in England in consequence of it.

Thursday, Sept. 2d. The 44th. Regiment completed; their Flank Companies joined; supposed intended for some particular Service.

Friday, Sept. 3d. Understand General Leslie is to

take the Command in Georgia.

Saturday, Sept. 4th. & 5th. Nothing Extraordinary. Monday, Sept. 6th. General Leslie so ill that he cannot go to Georgia.

#### COPY OF A LETTER TO SIR HENRY CLINTON.

N. Y., Sept. 6th. 1779.

Lord Rawdon having this day assured me that it will be entirely impossible for him ever to reassume the Office of Adjutant General to the Army under your Command, and having given me free leave to make use of the pretentions which the number of Years I have served in the department may Entitle me to, I therefore take the liberty of submitting myself to your Excellency as a Can-

didate for that appointment, the Duties of which I will endeavour to discharge to the utmost of my Abilities.

S. K.

The next morning his Excellency told me he had received my Letter, but could give no Answer to it, nor did he know he should appoint an Adjutant General; I replied, if he should find it necessary to Appoint one, might I hope for his Countenance; He said that every General Officer had those about him he wished to promote; that General Gage promoted me, he my Lord Rawdon, &c. I then said I observed from his language I had little to expect; he repeated he had those about him he wished to Serve, and that I should think it hard to have a Junior Officer put over my head, adding that the Office was of such a Nature that every one wished to fill it with a Person of their own, in whom they could place an implicit Confidence; I then said, I see, Sir, I have nothing to Expect, and thanked him for being so Explicit. I desired Capt. Ross, Lord Cornwallis's Aid-De-Camp, to Repeat the above to his Lordship, with proposals I had made to Captain André, as I thought it proper he should know what I had done, who brought me for Answer that his Lordship was obliged to me for Communicating it, and hoped I would have every success in my views I wished.

Tuesday, Sept. 7th. General Garth ordered to

Georgia immediately.

Wednesday, Sept. 8th. 9th. & 10th. Nothing Ex-

traordinary.

Saturday, Sept. 11th. Sir Geo. Collier arrived from Penobscot, which place he reached the 14th. August, with one 64 and 4 Frigates, and the Rebels that very day burnt all their Armed Vessels, consisting of 17 Sail, except one 20 and one 18 Gun Ship; their Frigate Warren burnt with about 28 Sail of Transports; the Crews from the whole Landed, and made their way thro' the Woods in a sad plight to Boston. They landed on the 28th. July, about 1,400 Troops besides Marines, from

which time to the 14th. August they had Besieged Brig. Gen. McLean, who was entrenched on an Advantageous ground with about 800 Men; Several Skirmishes happened during the Siege, and the General, with his Troops, must have fallen in the end, if not relieved.

the Troops in Georgia. A Rebel Paper, also received this day, says that the French fleet had taken two Line of Battle Ships, several Frigates, &c., to the Southward, and twenty-five hundred Men, supposed to be the Troops at Beaufort, under the Command of Lieut. Col. Maitland.

How must our Commander in Chief feel with all these blows, added to his own Conduct, despised and detested by the Army, his unheard of Promotion to the first Departments of Boys not three Years in the Service, his neglect of old Officers, and his wavering, strange, mad Behavior.

Army. On their return South Side of Rariton, within two Miles of Brunswick, they were fired upon by a large Body of Rebels in Ambush, whom they Charged and dispersed, but Colonel Simcoe, having his Horse Shot or falling under him, he was taken Prisoner; one Man was Killed and four taken.

Friday, Nov. 19th. The Rosebud, Privateer, arrived from St. Augustine with Letters from the Governor (Tonyn) and Lieut. Col. D'Estaing was upon the Coast, that the 8th. he landed, and on the 11th. following the Rebels joined them, and completed the Blockade, the French encamping between the Savannah and Sunbury Road, the Rebels from that to Augusta Road. The 15th. the Count summoned the Town to surrender in his Master's name only; refused, tho' General Prevost had not above ten Guns mounted on his Works, but in a few days, by the Industry of Captain Moncrieffe, Engineer, he had between seventy and eighty. October they opened their Batteries, consisting of 30 pieces of heavy Cannon and ten Mortars, and fired upon the Town incessantly till 9th. when at day break the united force of 4,000 French, and as many Rebels, attempted to storm our Lines, in which they failed of success, with the loss of near 1,500 French, the loss of the Rebels not ascer-The Count D'Estaing Wounded and Pulaski The Rebels acknowledge having 52 Officers killed and Wounded; our Loss not more than fifty Killed and Wounded.

Port Royal, Granada.

Sir,

Since I had the honor to speak to your Excellency yesterday Morning, I have been round the Barracks occupied by the 2d. Battalion 60th. Regiment, and find them so much out of repair that I cannot avoid (Though so early after my arrival) to address you on the subject, and to request your Excellency will give such orders relative to them as the Service

will permit.

How far the House of Assembly of this Island may deem themselves concerned in providing lodgings for the Troops, &c., is a question I shall not presume to give an opinion upon, but the Military flatter themselves with your Excellency's protection and good Offices in their behalf, and are led to hope that a generous Legislature will take up their situation in the most favorable light, and put them upon as respectable and liberal footing as the Troops are in the Island of Jamaica, or were in the Island of St. Christopher's.

Enclosed I send a sketch of Island pay, and Lodging Money, &c., furnished the Troops by the Island

of Jamaica, and I believe it to be pretty just.

Saturday, August 21st. Letters to Lord Amherst and General Prevost.

Granada.

My Lord.

I Yesterday had the honor to receive your Lordship's Letter of 29th. June, with one from the Secretary at War, relative to the discharges that may in future be given to Serjeants, which shall be duly attended to, as well as your direction with regard to its being given out in Regimental Orders.

Your Lordship will observe, by the Monthly Return for August sent at this time, that the 2d. Battalion 6oth. is very much reduced since December last, by the Number of Men Discharged at different times, and sent to Europe; and I am sorry to add there are upwards of twenty men still left on the

Strength of the Battalion who ought to be discharged whenever Recruits are sent to replace them.

Rt. Hon. Gen. Lord Amherst.

Sir,

I have the pleasure to inform you that I arrived here the 5th. instant. Captain Wickham I found in ill health, and I am sorry to say recovers very slowly, but we hope a little time will bring him about. He tells me all the Returns of clothing, &c., &c., you sent for have been transmitted; it is therefore unnecessary for me to trouble you about them, but to say the Accoutrements are good, as reported by Captain Wickham, and a Complete set on the present Establishment reserved for the Battalion. The Monthly Return that you will receive by this opportunity will show you how much we are reduced in numbers since December last, and I am sorry to add that there are still near thirty Men left who ought to be discharged. There has been for some time past, and is at present, so few Officers with the Battalion, that not any could be spared for the Recruiting Service, and were we to send Officers to Recruit at the places pointed out in our beating Orders (Viz.) Canada, Nova Scotia, and the Island of Newfoundland, we could promise ourselves no great success, but it is very necessary we should be Recruited for some place or other. Captain Wickham informs me our Serjeant Major, by name Tomlin, is in England; that he is a very good Serjeant, and a very Intelligent Man; that he might be employed usefully in the Recruiting Service, and sent out with the care of the first party that may come, as he is greatly wanted with the Battalion, Our Non Commissioned Officers being in General very indifferent.

The Officers are not uniform in their Swords, but they request me to inform you those at present in use with the two Battalions are very Expensive; they therefore hope some on a more reasonable plan may be sent them, and request you to decide for them, being persuaded every attention to their circumstances will be paid by you. The Gentlemen at present with the Battalion I have great reason to be satisfied with, and I shall study to procure them every comfort I possibly can.

Monday, Sept. 13th. Letters to General Prevost and Officer Commanding First Battalion, 60th. Regiment.

Granada.

Sir.

The Packet which arrived Yesterday brought from the Agent several late Regulations relative to Accoutrements, Absent Officers, &c., &c.; the latter a most necessary one for us, as we have not an Officer to a Company, and Captain Wickham's health is such that I cannot make any objection to his having leave of Absence to go to America by first opportunity; he may recover there, and is not of any use here, nor is he like to be should he remain in this Island.

Lieut. Scheedde writes to you by this Packet on the Subject of his Purchasing the Adjutancy should Mr. Ward be desirous and have leave to sell it; Mr. Scheedde offered to do the duty of Adjutant and I recommend him to your Notice on this occasion as a

diligent, deserving Officer.

Permit me to repeat to you the little probability of getting Recruits at the places we are ordered to Enlist, though the order shall be complied with whenever we have Officers to spare, should it not be thought more eligible to Recruit in Europe, where Officers are and may be employed with a prospect of succeeding better in every respect.

The 2d. of this Month we lost a Corporal and three

men, by the blowing up of a magazine over which they were a Guard. It happened by Lightning, and fortunately, being at a distance from any Barrack or house, no other lives were lost. The Magazine contained near one hundred and fifty barrels of powder.

It is Reported the 35th. Regiment is to go to England in the Spring; they have about 120 good Men (as I am informed); would it not be possible to get them turned over to us, for Men we must have, from some place or other; We are now little more than nominal, and what shall we be by the time Recruits or drafts can be sent us?

P. S. I mention to you a draft of a Memorial Col. Etherington told me Lord Amherst would give for the Battalions to have executed, and return to his Lordship, to be presented to the King, praying that we might be removed from the West Indies in turn with his Majesty's other Regiments of foot. [Enclosure.] I think it was a letter wrote you from Gravesend where I am Embarked, I should be glad it was settled one way or other if we are doomed to pass our days in the West Indies, in the name of God let us finish the prayer and say Amen.

That Your Majesty's Second Battalion Sixtieth Regiment was sent from the Continent of America to the West Indies in the year 1772; where they have served ever since with the Attachment, and Spirit that became dutiful Subjects and Soldiers.

That by so long a residence in a Southern Climate, their Constitutions are much impaired from diseases incident to it.

That Your Majesty's Memorialists are concerned to think themselves attached to any particular Country; and that it is their Ambition to be classed in all respects with Your Majesty's other Regiments of Foot, A distinction, they flatter themselves, their future Exertions will continue to merit.

Your Majesty's Memorialists therefore humbly pray You will be graciously pleased, to take their case into Consideration, and to permit them to be removed in turn with Your Majesty's other Regiments of Foot; to any of Your Majesty's Dominions on the Continent of America, or to grant them such other relief as the good of Your Majesty's Service will permit.

Friday, Sept. 17th. Letter to General Matthew.

Fort Royal, Granada.

Dear Sir,

Having Commanded the 1st. Battalion 6oth. Regiment for some time, and knowing it was well formed, composed of a good body of Men and Officers, many

of whom flattered me with expressions of a strong desire that I should return to them, I received my appointment to the 2d. Battalion with some regret; and ceremony in not choosing to make the first advance prevented me only from offering to Exchange with Colonel Etherington, who most probably would have accepted it. But when I understood that the 2d. Battalion was at this Island, and that you, Sir, was to remain on it as Governor, I did not hesitate a Moment to declare my intentions to join, promising my self much happiness in acting under your Patronage, and every advantage Officers Comanding in this Garrison have been heretofore indulged with: Indeed I was led from the representations of Colonel Hicks, who Commanded here for some time, to suppose that my being appointed Captain of the Fort was a thing of course, and was told by him there never had been an instance of the Senior Officer's not holding it, which I find, from Inquiry of Gentlemen of the first Character in this Island, is well founded. In consequence of which, and the honor of a Command (though limited), I withdrew an Application I had made to the Secretary at War, to be removed to an old Regiment, and embarked with the pleasing idea of being considered by you in the same light as Senior Officers heretofore had been, and to have received from you an Appointment, as a mark of your Esteem, what the world in general consider as an appendage to my Rank in the Garrison.

The expectation of Capt. Wickham going from this Island for the recovery of his health (which now seems a distant period), has prevented my addressing you on this Subject before, being loath to give you a shadow of uneasiness; but I look upon it now that I am called upon to give in pretensions (derived from Custom) that I may at least acquit my self to those who may follow me as Senior in Command, and not have it said that I gave up their claim by neglecting to represent the state of the case in the light it has till

now appeared to those Gentlemen who have Com-

manded in Chief in the Island.

Thus far, my Dear Sir, I plead in my public Capacity, but it is to your friendship and the (in some measure) public situation I am placed in, that I rest my great hope of success. I appeal to your Sensibility whether it would not hurt you as an Officer, to have a Captain in the Regiment you Command Exercise a distinct Authority in the Garrison, solely regulated by you, and through whom all Orders from Commander in Chief in the Island are invariably issued.

Had I exchanged with Colonel Etherington, I should not have withdrawn my pretensions of a removal to an old Regiment, nor should I have acted in contradiction to the sentiments of some of my friends, who were Averse to my Embarking for the West Indies, but I beg pardon for making use of these Arguments, as they were Acts of my own. Should you have any doubts of the correctness of my Information relative to the course of Command of the Fort, I refer you to Mr. Winnet as the Person who has it probably in his power to give you the best Information.

I am to acknowledge the receipt of your Excellency's letter of 28th. August, and to thank you for the Money you have been so good to order to be paid to the Detachment of the 60th. Regiment.

Mr. Holmes will receive a credit from the Paymaster of the Battalion by this opportunity, to enable him to repay the same, and a Credit will be settled for

the Detachment in future.

The weather not promising to be the most favorable, and the Vessel this goes by reported to be indifferent, I have detained Serjeant Chattaway and a Serjeant Heywood; has the Character of a Trusty, good Soldier; I would decline returning Serjeant Chattaway to the Detachment unless you should desire it.

Sir.

I have the honor to receive your letter of the 25th. on the 27th., and, agreeable to your desire, have sent a Discharge for Corporal Alnhausen by Mr. Van Hamel, who will deliver it in Person to your Excel-

lency.

Be assured, Sir, I shall always be happy to comply with every request of yours, and should, in any other situation of the Battalion, have been silent on the mode of a return, but our numbers are so very short of our Complement, and so very few good Non-Commissioned Officers left, that I cannot help requesting you will be pleased to direct all possible Enquiry may be made to find a good Man in his room; but, should you prove unsuccessful, Mr. Van Hamel will receive whatever sum you may think sufficient to procure a good Man in this Country.

The Date of Corporal Alnhausen's Discharge is left to be filled up, as I hope, by Enlisting a Man, we shall

only have occasion to change Names.

Being informed the Public Stores are removed, over which the Detachment of the 60th. Regiment were left as a Guard, and presuming your Excellency has not any further use for them, I request they may be ordered to join their Battalion when a proper opportunity offers.

I have the honor to enclose you an Application from Ensign Barrick to retire on half pay. There being no person in this Country with whom he could exchange, leaves it not necessary for me to make any declaration relative to Price or infringement of his Majesty's regulation with regard to Exchanges.

I shall be sorry to lose Ensign Barrick, who is an intelligent, good Officer; but I hope it will be in your power to recommend a Person to succeed him who

will be equally deserving.

Lieuts. Brietenback and Borbeck having left Halifax for this Island prior to the Arrangement of Officers for the 1st. & 2d. Battalions being made known, and having shown their readiness to join by so doing, It is a Justice to these Gentlemen's intentions to repair to their duty, to declare that they have not had any opportunity, since their arrival here, to sail for Jamaica, and that they have now proceeded to other Islands in hopes to find a passage, none promising to offer from this Island soon.

Lieutenants Brietenback and Borbeck have also done duty with the 2d. Battalion from time to time, as there has been occasion to call for their assistance.

Tuesday, Oct. 19th. Letter to Messrs. Gray and Ogilvie, Agents of the Regiment at London:

Gentlemen,

I send you herewith a Copy of a Court of Inquiry held in consequence of an application from the Officers of the 2d. Battalion 6oth. having the care of absent Captains' Companies, with an Account of the Charge of Each Officer on his Captain for Contingent Expenses advanced by him, and admitted by the Court of Enquiry as reasonable and just. In consequence of which I have ordered the Paymaster of the Battalion to reimburse the Officers the sums they have respectively advanced, in order that proper attention may be paid to the Soldier, without which they declare themselves incapable of doing it, and you will please to charge the Captains with the same.

You will please likewise to inform such Field Officers and Captains as may enquire into the cause of these Charges, that I think it reasonable the Officers appointed to the care of Companies should be content with the two Contingent Men, as well for their trouble as to answer every Expense and loss attending the care of a Company, and that I request they will give

their directions on the Subject.

Friday, Nov. 5th. Letter to Major Winnet at Providence Plantation:

St. George's.

Dear Sir,

It is my intention (though late) to speak to General Mathew to appoint Lieut. Scheedde, of the 60th., a superintending Officer over the Negroes to be employed on the Public Works of the Island. He is well calculated for any Employment of the kind, and has a knowledge of fortification sufficient to Execute whatever may be entrusted to his charge in a proper manner.

He is recommended by me for the Adjutancy of the Battalion, and, were he a single man, I would not forward an Application that might Detach him from me, but he has a Wife and two Children, with (I believe) little more than Lieutenant's pay to support them.

Should you not have promised your Interest for another Person, and have it in your power to promote my views for the Service of this Gentleman, I will thank you to employ your Influence in his favor, and what is more, I think you will be satisfied with your own good Works.

Tuesday, Nov. 16th. Letter to Messrs. Gray and Ogilvie, Agents for the Regiment:

Granada.

Gentlemen,

Inclosed I transmit you a list of a number of Men of 27th. and 69th. Regiments, who, in consequence of his Majesty's Proclamation at the end of the War, were entitled to their Discharges and Enlisted Volun-

tarily into the 2d. Battalion 60th. Regiment.

They have lodged a Complaint that they have not received their clothing for the year 1783, or any part of it, though they remained in their respective Regiments to the 24th. August of that year; and though they acknowledge and are sensible that the clothing does not begin till the 25th. June, and that they of Consequence have undergone no more Stoppages but for two months. Yet that his Majesty, by his Proclamation, has been pleased to order that all Soldiers that were to be discharged in consequence of it should carry along with them the Clothing they then wore: That it was no fault of theirs that the Clothing for the Year 1783 had been withheld for so long a time, and that the Colonel's or commanding Officer's neglect in not issuing it should not to occasion them any loss.

They further complain that in said Proclamation his Majesty was pleased to order that every Man at the time of his discharge should be allowed a Bounty of 14 days' pay for the English, and of 28 days for the Scotch and Irish.

Yet, that they, at the time of their Discharge, have been refused the said allowance, though the Men of some other Regiments, especially the 28th. Regiment, then in Garrison in St. John's, Antigua, and in the

same predicament, were allowed the same.

Eight Men, enlisted from the 28th. Regiment, claims £5.6.3. St. Christopher's currency, per Man, being part of the pay allowed them by that Island during their stay there, and which remained due to them, on their settling their Accounts with their Regiment, and were promised by Captain Daly, who at the time of their Enlistment with this Battalion commanded the 28th. Regiment, that the above sum of Money should be sent to each of them to the Regiment.

They further say that the Money for the Island pay was drawn by Major Robarts of that Regiment, who had gone to England. The Exchange at that time

was 165.

They likewise claim their Clothing for the year 1783 in the same manner as the 27th. and 69th. Regiments. You will therefore be pleased to settle this matter with the Agents of the said Regiments, and in case there should be any difficulty made with regard to the payment of their respective demands, you will be pleased to lay this matter before General Lord Amherst and General Prevost, in order to have the claim of those Men Ascertained.

P. S. Thinking it's proper to show the Soldiers that not any of their complaints would be disregarded, and the Officers in general conceiving there's some room for the Application, I have in consequence sent you the enclosed, though it should have been the Act of my predecessors in Command of the Battalion.

As it appears to be Captain Wickham's determination to retire on half pay, and not imagining there will be any objection, I should wish the affair to take place as soon as possible, and the Person who comes in be ordered to join immediately; Captain Wickham's health will probably require his going to Europe or America early in the Spring.

Thursday, Nov. 18th. Letter to Major General Prevost.

Granada.

Sir,

Having found it necessary to order the Officers of the Battalion to provide themselves with Regimental Coats, Swords, Sashes, &c., &c., that they might appear uniform, and agreeable to the King's regulations, which they are wide of at present; and not thinking myself authorized to change any part of their Equipment without your sanction or that of the Colonel in Chief, in consequence wrote to you on the 21st. September last, informing you the Officers of your Battalion had represented to me that the Swords now in use with the two Battalions were very expensive, they therefore hoped one upon a more reasonable plan might be adopted and sent, and requested you would decide for them, being persuaded every attention would be paid to their circumstances by you; but should their request prove unsuccessful I intreat the Agent may be ordered to send Regimental Swords for Ensigns Campbell and Gordon.

The Majority of the Soldiers of your Battalion are composed of Men, that were Discharged from the 27th., 28th., and 69th. Regiments at the Peace, and re-enlisted with us. They are scarcely Disciplined at all (and so few of them even), will probably be left by the time we get Recruits, that we shall in fact have the forming a Complete new Battalion. I have declined discharging a number of Men who are actually unfit for any kind of Service, that we might keep our numbers as high as possible; and whenever Recruits may be sent to us, I must request you will represent

to Lord Amherst the absolute necessity of having an Adjutant with the Battalion. Officers who do the duty think they do you a favor; not that I have any reason to complain of the Person who now Acts; far from it; Mr. Scheedde is capable and assiduous, and if Mr. Ward should decline to come out, I think Mr.

Scheedde deserving of the Appointment.

Inclosed I send you a Return of Arms and Accoutrements which shows the state of them at this time. I have also the honor to enclose you an Application from Captain Wickham to retire on half pay. He is under some agreement with a Captain Brown, ordered to half pay in the 31st. Regiment, and from whom you will probably hear on the subject; but whether Lord Amherst will not give the preference to one of our own half-pay Captains is a doubt with me.

I understand that Mr. Van Hamel, who is now Pay Master to the Battalion, was appointed solely by General Christie, and by some of the Officers, in opposition to the wishes of the Captains then present. General Christie, being no more Colonel Commandant, does not probably consider himself as security for Mr. Van Hamel's conduct. Should you decline confirming Mr. Van Hamel of your own Authority, do you not think it proper the Voices of the Field Officers and Captains of the Battalion should be asked? if you do, be pleased to give your Approbation of the present Gentleman, or name the person you would wish to have appointed, and let the Agent send the Names of the Candidates to the Absent Field Officers and Captains. Mr. Fleming, our Quarter Master, is a Candidate, as is Mr. Henderson, the Surgeon.

Friday, Nov. 19th. Letter to Messrs. Gray and Ogilvie, Agents of the Regiment:

Granada.

Gentlemen:

I have wrote to Mr. Fisher, Tailor, Bedford Street,

Convent Garden, for some Articles wanted by the Officers of this Battalion, of which I send you a list, that when the Account is presented to you for Payment it may be seen if it corresponds, in which case you will please to pay the amount of the Bill and Charge the Paymaster of the Regiment with it. You have also inclosed Captain Wickham's account of Contingent Expenses for Captain Prevost's Company, made out upon a similar principle to those sent you by last Packet, but Captain Wickham being from Quarters for his health, at the time the Court of Enquiry Assembled, he could not lay his charges before them.

I have informed General Prevost that Mr. Van Hamel, our present Paymaster, was solely appointed by General Christie, who, I apprehend, does not look upon himself responsible for his conduct longer than he remained Colonel Commandant of the Battalion. requesting, if he did not choose to confirm Mr. Van Hamel of his own Authority, to give his Vote for the Person he would wish should be appointed, and to desire you would be so good to send the Names of the Candidates to the absent Field Officers and Captains for the same purpose. Should you be satisfied with Mr. Van Hamel's mode of transacting business, I shall give him my Vote if he gets on full pay and can effect an Exchange. The Candidates are Mr. Van Hamel, Mr. Fleming, Quarter Master, and Mr. Henderson, the Surgeon.

In a former letter to General Prevost I acquainted him that the Officers present complain of the Expensive Sword in use with the Regiment, and hope he would adopt one upon a more reasonable plan; but if their request proves not successful, I beg him to desire you will be so good to order two Regimental Swords upon the old plan to be sent out, One for Ensign Gordon,

and one for Ensign Campbell.

I wish you would urge General Prevost to decide upon whatever has been referred to him by me, as well by this conveyance as in former Letters. I inclose him by this Packet an application from Captain Wickham to retire on half pay, which I imagine there will

not be any objection to.

We are now little better than two hundred Rank and File, and a number of them ought to be discharged. It is impossible for me to send Officers Recruiting till more join, and were they sent to the places pointed out, There's little prospect of getting Men. If some of the absent Officers were ordered to Recruit in the parts of Europe where their pleasures or Interest carries them, they might be of use to the Regiment when transacting their own Affairs. Talk to General Prevost on the subject, and endeavor to send us out Recruits, for we shall be so short of our complement soon that Government will put us on half pay as useless.

The Packet which arrived on the 17th. brought directions to the Governour to pay us out of the Public Money remaining in the Deputy Paymaster General's hands; but the Paymaster of the Battalion, having drawn subsequently to 24th. December next, we can only commence from that period by Warrant. I am to acknowledge the receipt of your letters of 6th. October, and inclose the Notary Public's Certificate of the Death of Kuhn.

Thursday, Nov. 25th. Sailed in the Government Brig for St. Vincent's; arrived 28th., a remarkable hilly and rugged Country; Sugar the Staple, as in all the rest; but their Tobacco excels any that grows in the Islands. The Caribs, a race of Negroes, Inhabit the windward part of this Island, are under no subjection, but are totally Independent.

Monday, Dec. 6th. Got to Barbadoes, the Evenest and Less Hilly Country of any of the Islands. Natives a vain People, and resemble the Yankees in their

drawling dialect.

Friday, Dec. 24th. Returned to Granada with the Mail brought by Packet.

Friday, Dec. 31st. Letter to Major General Pre-

vost.

Granada.

Dear Sir,

I am to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of 31st. October, and am sorry to find our prospect of receiving Recruits from Europe is so very precarious; as soon as the St. Lawrence become Navigable, and I can get a good opportunity, I propose to send Ensign Eberard to Canada on the recruiting service. This Gentleman lately arrived from that Province, and gives me reason to hope (if he is not obstructed in the execution of his duty) that his endeavours to raise good Men will not be totally ineffectual. The little intercourse between The Islands and Canada may make it difficult and expensive to transport Recruits to us, but we must attempt some mode to get men, or we shall soon be only a head without a body, and be reduced by Government as a useless Corps.

Captain Lockell had joined the Battalion, but as Captain Wickham's resignation is sent home, and I know of no reason why he should be refused Exchanging on half pay, we shall, whenever that takes place, have only one Captain with the Battalion again. I must therefore request that the Person who succeeds Captain Wickham, or some other Captain, may be

ordered to join as soon as possible.

The following is an extract of my last letter of 18th.

October.

I understand that Mr. Van Hamel, who is now Paymaster to the Battalion was appointed solely by General Christie, and by some of the Officers, in opposition to the Captains than present

tion to the Captains then present.

General Christie, being no more Colonel Commandant, does not probably consider himself as security for Mr. Van Hamel's conduct. Should you decline confirming Mr. Van Hamel of your own Authority, do

you not think it proper the voices of the Field Officers and Captains should be asked; if you do, be pleased to give your Approbation of the present Gentleman, or name the Person you would wish to have appointed, and let the Agent send the names of the Candidates to the absent Field Officers and Captains. Mr. Fleming, our Quarter Master, is a Candidate, as is Mr. Henderson, the Surgeon.

There can be no way so expeditious to get at a Majority of Field Officers and Captains for the Appointment of a Paymaster, as taking their opinions separately, and the Agent to transmit me a Duplicate

of the same.

It is an easier matter for Gray and Ogilvie to collect the Voices, than the Officer Commanding the Battalion, situated as we are.

Inclosed you have a Return of Accourrements I think wanting, though the Battalion has done without them for some Years past. The Serjeants want something to make them a little more conspicuous, and the Pioneers' Accourrements may be necessary occasionally, and shall not be used but where they are really wanted.

I have ordered such Men of the Battalion as are Entitled to Clothing for the Year 1783 to be paid for the same, that the whole may be upon a footing,

and put a stop to all claims in future.

Should the Clothing be not already sent, I wish three hundred Suits may be instantly ordered out; I think they will be as much as we have occasion for from our present Recruiting prospects, and will be hardly in time I fear, to get them filled by the 4th. June, 1785. All returns of Clothing and Accoutrements have been already sent, and require no explanation from me. I am sorry we are like to lose the Serjeant Major; our Non-Commissioned are in general very bad, and no one to replace him.

## 1785.

Saturday, Jan: 1st. Letter to Messrs. Gray and Ogilvie, Agents for the 60th. Regiment, London:

Granada.

Gentlemen,

I am to acknowledge the receipt of your Letters of 13th. October and 2d. November, inclosing the form of an Appointment of a Paymaster, upon which subject you will find I have wrote in my letter of 19th. November last. It is impossible for me to get the Signatures and Seals of the Absent Field Officers and Captains, or a Majority of them, for the Appointment of a Paymaster in any reasonable time, and all that I can do is to give my Vote for the Person I would choose to have appointed should Mr. Van Hamel be thrown out or be appointed to any other Battalion when he gets on full pay; and in that case I give my Vote for Mr. Fleming, Quarter Master to this Battalion. As all or most of the absent Field Officers and Captains are in Britain, it will be little trouble and more expeditious for you to write them a line each, and to collect their voices. You will be able then to decide which of the Candidates has a Majority, and as soon as you inform me of the same, I will order the Accounts of the Battalion to be delivered over.

Inclosed I transmit you Copy of a Court of Enquiry, with several Abstracts, at the request of Ensign Campbell. General Christie is acquainted with the circumstances, I am informed, and it would be a great hardship on Ensign Campbell to lose the Money. Captain Wright should certainly be made accountable for it, unless he can give very sufficient reasons to the contrary. You will oblige me, and Ensign Campbell more, by enquiring into the affair, and give us such information as you can Collect. You will find in the Contingent Account transmitted you by the Paymaster a charge for Stationery and Postage of Letters

exceeding the limited sum; but when I inform you that the greatest part of the Stationery was brought by me, and only charged at the price it was purchased in London, I flatter myself it will be admitted without hesitation. Postage is very high, and Stationery extravagantly dear in this Country, nor do I know how it will be possible for us to bring our expenses of those articles within the limited sum. The Charge for the passage of Troops from Barbadoes unavoidable, and arose from the Battalion being ordered to leave a Detachment there, in Charge of Public Stores, and only at half the common price paid by individuals.

Our Expenses for Regimental Store here has been very trifling lately, but in certain situations it becomes considerable and unavoidable, as has been the case when the Regiment has been obliged to hire stores, houses as Infirmaries for the Sick, Armourers' shops, &c., which may happen again, and for which not an

adequate allowance is made.

The enclosed Letter was delivered me with others received this day by Packet, and the superscription will, I hope, plead my Apology with your Excellency for having opened it. I take the earliest opportunity by the same conveyance of transmitting it to you, and to assure you that I am, with much regard and esteem, Your Excellency's, &c., &c.

Sunday, Jan. 16th. Letter to Major General Prevost.

Dear Sir,

I yesterday had the pleasure to receive your Letter of 30th. November last by Packet. Captain Wickham

has recovered so much since I wrote in September last, that he is capable of doing but trifling duties required from Captains in our situation, but I apprehend would not think himself sufficiently strong to undertake the more fatiguing parts of our profession: Indeed, he is alarmed every now and then with slight returns of his Complaint, and it is the Physician's opinion a Northern residence will only restore him; he has already requested my leave to go to America in the Spring, whether he succeeds in his Application or not, to retire on half pay; but that I suppose there will not be any objection to.

I hope, and dare answer, we shall have every reason to be satisfied with Captain Porter. As to the Adjutancy, since Scheedde has not succeeded, it is indifferent to me who does, and I have only to entreat your good offices for Scheedde whenever it may again become vacant. Colin McKenzie, who is the other Adjutant on half pay, is a Merchant of eminence in London, and when he did purchase from Adjutant Coghlan of 1st. Battalion, I made him give it under his hand that if he was called upon to join and did not choose to do it, that he would not expect to have leave to sell. This Instrument of writing was given to General Conway's Secretary, who should be applied to for it, and have it lodged with the Agent. I mention this circumstance that you may be prepared to assist Scheedde should Westphall decline to join, or be prevented by any other means. The Paymaster wrote by my direction, early after my arrival, to the Agent, relative to Scheedde having the Adjutant's pay during the time he acted, and I request you will be so good to speak to them on this subject. When I saw Mr. Ward in London, I told him it was customary to give the Officer who acted in the absence of the Adjutant half of the pay. In this Country it ought to be the whole.

By the promotion of Ensign Campbell to the 1st. Battalion, we remain with only one Officer to a Company, including Captain Wickam, whose residence with us is uncertain. Will you, therefore, my dear General,

hurry one or two of the Gentlemen out; let us have one Officer to each Company, and a supernumerary one to take charge of a Company in case of accident; and I shall not trouble you, though I may wish, for more. Ensign Clark, I understand, is at Jamaica, on his way to join; but he'll be an Age getting to us. At present I believe he is detained to do duty with the 1st. Battalion. The Discharge of Tomlins is not unexpected. 1 still propose to send Eberard to Recruit in Canada, but he will not leave this till the beginning of April at soonest. The Agents have sent me an Invoice of Clothing sent by the Hope, but that vessel is not yet arrived. now send you a return of Serjeants, Drummers, and Privates, who were entitled to Clothing for the year 1784, and have been paid for the same, according to the customary Rates; this Completes the clothing for the Year 1784.

I observe, by looking over Copy of my Letter of 31st. December last, that there is a Mistake in the following

paragraph:

I have ordered such Men of the Battalion as are entitled to Clothing for the year 1783—say 1784—to be paid for the same, that the whole may be upon a footing, and put a stop to all claims in future. The cause of the numbers being greater in this Return than the one sent arises from Men who have returned from Desertion.

In the same Letter:

Should the Clothing be not already sent, I wish three hundred suits may be instantly ordered out. I think they will be as much as we shall have occasion for from our present Recruiting prospect.

Gentlemen,

I am to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of 1st. December last, enclosing an Invoice of Clothing, and

informing me of Lieut. Porter, from 22d., being promoted to a Company, and Ensigns Gordon and Lenox, to Lieutenancies in the 2d. Battalion, and of the Appointment of Adjutant Westphall to same Battalion, with the Promotion of Ensign John Campbell to a Lieutenancy in the 1st. Battalion. The Paymaster of the Battalion having wrote by my direction to inform you I had appointed Lieut. Scheedde to do the duty of Adjutant, in the absence of Lieut. and Adjutant Ward, and it being customary for the Officer doing the duty to receive half of the Adjutant's Pay, I trust, in consequence of the information given, that you have retained the same in your hands for the use of Lieut. Scheedde.

P. S. I request you will give early information of the fate of our Contingent Account sent by last Packet; for, if real and unavoidable charges are not admitted in its common form, some other mode of Application must be fallen upon to procure Payment.

Thursday, March 3d. Letter to Major General Prevost.

Granada.

Dear Sir,

The Allowance for Contingent Charges to the several Regiments of Foot is so very inadequate to the Expenses incurred, and unavoidably so to the Battalion in its present situation, that I do not know, after repeatedly considering the Matter, how to provide for the following Extra but absolutely necessary and customary charges Regiments are liable to:

Viz.

Per Muster.

To the Serjt. Major, One Shilling per day £ 3 1s.

Or. Master Serjt., sixpence " 1 10s. 6d.

Regimental Clerk, One Shilling " 3 1s.

Masters of the Band, sixpence " 1 10s. 6d.

Nine Musicians at 2 per day 4 11s. 6d.

£ 13.14s. 6d.

During the War Establishment, 4 Corporals per Company were allowed; the extra pay of one went towards paying the Musicians and others, as also one Contingent Man per Company, which was stopped from the Captains during the time General Christie commanded the Battalion. But it is impossible for us to make the above Provision in our present situation, and my ideas suggest no other mode of providing for these Contingencies, but by getting them admitted as charges on the non-Effective fund, Which it may be in your power to get done. Will you therefore my dear General, consult with the Agent on the Subject; and as I am persuaded it is one of your first wishes to contribute all in your power to the convenience and good Appearance of your Battalion, I will do the best I can till I receive your Answer; but, should it not be favorable, the band of Music must be laid aside, for it will not be in our power to support them.

Perhaps, upon considering the Matter with the Agent, he may suggest ideas, taken from other Regimental

Accounts, that will be of use to us.

The Extra pay of one Corporal and one Contingent Man per Company, as mentioned above, is communicated to you in confidence, and only expressed now to show former ways and means for a fund, but not possi-

ble to be put in practice at this time.

Captain Wickham has obtained leave to go to the Continent for his health, and Ensign Eberard will sail by the first good Conveyance to Canada, in the Recruiting Service. There will then remain an Officer per Company with the Battalion, including myself. Lieut. Walker, though returned, at present does not do duty with the Battalion, being appointed Major of Brigade to the Governor of the Island.

Monday, March 21st. Letter to General Prevost.

Granada.

Dear Sir,

It is with real concern I find myself under a necessity of submitting to your perusal so public and so scandalous a list of soldiers' names, belonging to your Battalion, as the enclosed. I was in hopes, when I joined the Battalion, that by a very strict attention to their conduct I should have been able to have checked their Drunkenness and other irregularities, and I did flatter myself I had in some measure succeeded; though, from appearances since, it only forced them to combine, and, having formed themselves into a body, they for a time committed the most daring Robberies without a possibility of Discovery; but by the exertions of the Officers in general, particularly Lieut. Scheedde and Ensign Barrick, they were at last laid hold of, and, to our shame, two Serjeants, (Viz.), Jackson and Winter, and Corporal Doran, were parties concerned.

Before the close of the Sessions it became a subject of deliberation with the Bench of Judges how to dispose of the four now confined in Prison; two of them, Williams and Elliot, appeared to be so hardened and so daring, that, to put it out of their power to be guilty of the like again, or to debauch the minds of others, they were sentenced to be imprisoned for two Years, the Governor having it in his power to enlarge them at his pleasure. But as I have informed him that I would write to you on the subject, and request you to make application to his Majesty's Secretary at War, or otherwise, as you may see proper, for their being sent with Stoddard, Whittle, Carrol, and Medley particularly, to the Coast of Africa, I apprehend they will be detained

in Prison till I receive your Answer.

Jackson and Winter have been debauched by Women, and may reform; and should I think it proper to make application for their Enlargement, I believe it will be attended to. All the rest are of such bad Morals, that I am much afraid they will debauch the Minds of any Recruits we may receive; and in order to give us an

opportunity to regain the good Opinion of the World, I could wish they were added to the African list, for it is impossible for Officers to be answerable for the good conduct of a corps, where there are so many indefatigable Villains to encounter with.

It is necessary to observe that the whole of these irregularities may have originated from a party of some forty-nine Convicts sent to this Battalion at Barbadoes about two Years ago, amongst which were several comprehended in the enclosed.

Monday, March 21st. Letter to Edmund Lincoln, Esq., Governor of St. Vincent.

Sir,

Understanding the 10th. Regiment is expected shortly at St. Vincent, to relieve the 35th.; and that the latter is ordered to hold itself in readiness to embark for England, I have in consequence ordered the Bearer, Lieut. Gordon, of the 60th., to proceed to St. Vincent, and, with your Excellency's Approbation, to engage such Soldiers of the 35th. Regiment as are willing to enlist into the 60th., whenever they may be at liberty to do so. Lieut. Gordon is instructed to be very particular in his Enquiries into the behavior of the Men who may offer, and to take only such as are recommended by Major Chester, or the Officer acting as Adjutant to that Regiment, whose good offices are requested by Letter on this occasion.

Wednesday, March 23d. Letter to the Officer commanding the 35th. Regiment at St. Vincent.

Sir,

Being informed the 35th. Regiment is shortly to

be relieved and to Sail for Europe, and apprehending you will be at liberty, if no instructions are sent you to the contrary, to allow such of the Soldiers of your Corps as are willing to enlist into other Regiments, I request you will favor me with your sentiments on the subject by first opportunity, that I may send an Officer to St. Vincent as soon as possible, provided it meets with your approbation.

Thursday, April 21st. Letter to Major William Chester, or Officer Commanding 35th. Regiment at St. Vincent.

Granada.

Sir,

I am to acknowledge the receipt of your favor of 6th. instant, and have in consequence sent Lieut. Gordon, of this Battalion, to Enlist such Soldiers of the 35th. Regiment as may be willing to enter into the 6oth., whenever they are at liberty to do so. But as we have too many bad already, he is ordered to receive no man who is not recommended to him by you, or the Officer acting as Adjutant to the Regiment.

His Instructions confine him to three Guineas per Man, a few exceptions only, which may be extended to

as many more, should you think it advisable.

Sunday, April 24th. Letter to Lieut. Thomas Wheldale, of the Corps of Engineers.

Sir,

The frequent showers we have lately had give room to apprehend the Rainy Season is already set in; and that it will take place in the course of three weeks or a month is beyond a doubt. You must therefore allow me to speak with freedom of the Officers' Quarters of the 60th.

If their situation has been rendered uncomfortable by the rains that have already fallen, what must it be a few weeks hence? If the intended Barrack for the Officers cannot be carried on to any effect, the work had better stop. The old house to have a Temporary repair to make it habitable, and drains constructed to carry off the water from Cellars that are in forwardness, and the Masonry covered, so as to preserve it as much as possible; but if, upon your representation to the General, the wing most in forwardness now can be completed with despatch, it would add so much to the convenience of the Officers that they would be able to do, without affording much, if any, labor toward repairing the old building.

Wednesday, April 27th. Letter to Major William Chester of the 35th. Regiment at St. Vincent.

Granada.

Dear Sir,

Lieut, Gordon, of this Battalion, was under orders to proceed immediately to the Island of St. Vincent, on the Recruiting Service; But, Governor Parry having requested that an Officer or two should be sent from this, to assist in surveying a quantity of Provision at Barbadoes, Lieut. Gordon Sailed for that Island on the 23d., with orders to remain there as short a time as possible; and the Government Brig having directions to land him at St. Vincent, I hope he will be with you by the time this gets to hand; but should accidents prevent him from joining you as soon as is expected, may I request your good offices in engaging such men of the 35th. Regiment as are willing to Enlist, and worth acceptance for the 60th. Lieut. Gordon's Instructions limit him to three Guineas per man (five excepted), who are to be offered at your recommendation three Guineas and a half; and as we are much in want of Non-Commissioned Officers you may assure

such as you think deserving that they shall be promoted on their joining, or as soon after as possible, in rotation, as their Names shall stand on a list you will have the goodness to transmit me.

I request of all things that their Accounts may be settled in the fullest manner, and that every Man shall

sign his Account before witnesses.

Tuesday, May 24th. Letter to Major General Edward Mathew.

Granada.

Sir.

The Officers of the 2d. Battalion 60th. Regiment view with regret the approaching period of your Excellency's departure for England, and request me to offer you their sincere acknowledgments for your attention to them as well during your Command of his Majesty's Troops in the West Indies as since their residence in your Government of Granada.

They flatter themselves one addition to the favors already received at your hands will not be thought to intrude on your goodness, which is, to request your Excellency will support a Memorial they have already sent to his Majesty, and use your Influence with his Ministers, that the Battalion they serve in may be removed from the West Indies to Europe, or to the Continent of America, as shall be thought best and for the good of his Majesty's Service.

A residence of upwards of twelve years in a Southern Climate has impaired the health of many, and an expensive Country impoverished the Pockets of all, but as these are circumstances well known to you, Sir, I shall not dwell longer on them, being persuaded of your good wishes to render us every service in your power, and that there is not anything I could say that would throw light on the subject.

Give me leave now, Sir, in my own, and in the name

of the Officers of the Battalion, to wish your Excellency a safe and pleasant passage to England, where, on your arrival, we doubt not but you will receive those distinguished marks of Royal Approbation we conceive so justly due to your unremitted attention to the King's Service.

Friday, June 3d. Letter to Major General Augustine Prevost.

Granada.

Dear Sir,

I am to acknowledge the receipt of your Letters of 14th. February and 6th. April. I am surprised not any of the absent Captains have given their Voices in favor of the Person they wish to have appointed Paymaster, as I cannot suppose the Agent would have neglected writing to them as they were requested to do. If I had two or three Captains with the Battalion, I should decide; but Lockell not having a voice, as you have given your own, and Wickham being a Seconded Captain, it would be in a great measure taking it upon myself, which I would rather decline, as the others might hereafter say, in case of accident, that, having appointed him myself, I must answer consequences. Captain Wickham is certainly a brave Soldier, but he does not appear to be calculated much for a Commanding Officer; but his services certainly merit some indulgence, and I could wish Lord Amherst would listen to his Application,—perhaps, if you mention it a second time to him, he may.

The necessity of having more than one Captain with the Battalion is proved in the present instance. Captain Lockell is now and has been ill for some time past, and I am afraid his health will require his having leave of absence, for which he has already made application.

The Clothing by the Hope is safe arrived, and in good order. It is already fitted, but will not be issued

to the Soldiers till the whole Battalion can appear in

their new Clothing at the same time.

The 35th. being about to return to Europe, I have sent Lieut. Gordon to Recruit, and hope to pick up some of their good Men. The Commanding Officer has promised to assist him. I have instructed Mr. Gordon not to take any Men whose Characters are bad; we have too many already of them, and a junction of Rascals would lead to more Villainy.

Your letter of *1st. February*, which you mention in that of *14th.* of same Month, is lost, or has by some accident taken another route, for I have not received it. Scheedde and Henderson's Answers have, of course,

shared the same fate.

Inclosed I transmit you an Application from Captain Lockell to sell his Commission, and recommend Lieut. Walker, the oldest Lieutenant in the Battalion, who

will purchase, to succeed him.

It may be objected, as Captain Lockell did not purchase, that he cannot be allowed to sell; but as the good of the Service will always have weight with Lord Amherst, I flatter myself you will be able to carry the sale thro' in Mr. Walker's favor, who is a deserving Young Man, and who will Merit your Warmest exertions in his favor.

You have also enclosed Captain Lockell's Application to retire on half pay should he not succeed in the sale of his Commission; but I request you will not mention that to Lord Amherst, till you have failed in repeated

applications to procure leave for him to Sell.

I wrote to Lord Amherst to throw in my weight for Mr. Walker. If he gets it, it is a step gained to the Battalion; if Lockell goes out on half pay, it will be of no use to the present Officers. Enclosed you have My Certificate, Lieut. Walker's letter to Purchase, and a Monthly return for *1st. May*.

I had the honor to receive your Lordship's Letter of 17th. February by Lieut. Hesselburgh, and return you many thanks for the information it contained; by this Packet I transmit General Prevost, Captain Lockell's Application to retire from the Service, he having agreed to sell to Lieut. Walker, the Senior Lieutenant, for Purchase at the regulated price. Captain Lockell has been attacked with a renewal of a Disorder he formerly had in Florida, and has been so ill for some weeks that he has not been able to do any duty. He has already applied to me for leave of Absence, but there being no Captain but himself with the Battalion, I have declined to grant his request till the Surgeons give him a certificate of the necessity of his Changing the Climate. Lieut. Walker is a young man of great merit, and has been particularly taken notice of by General Mathew, who has his welfare much at heart. On the 5th. April last I forwarded a Memorial from the Officers of the Battalion to General Prevost, addressed to the King, praying that they might be removed to Europe, or to the Continent of America, and requesting his intercession with your Lordship to lay it at his Majesty's feet. I hope it will not be thought improper, in a private letter, to inform your Lordship that the Officers labor under great disadvantages in all the Islands from the extravagant prices they are obliged to pay for the common necessaries of life. When I first came here I had some hopes the Island would have put the Military upon the same footing as at Jamaica, but no step has been taken towards it by the Legislature, and I am apprehensive not any will, though they still hold out the general idea of granting Island pay, &c., if Government will send them another Regiment.

Sunday, July 13th. At 9 A. M. Got under way. At

6 came to in West Gate Bay.

I have the honor to enclose you a Power of Attorney from Lieut. Frederick Haldimand, which was sent uncovered to me, with a Letter of request that I would be of every use to him in my enquires relative to the Lands he holds in this Country. You will also receive a Power from Mr. Alexander Wallace, both entrusted to my Charge, upon a supposition that it was possible I might meet with you in this Province, or accident carry me to Halifax; but as neither of these circumstances are like to happen, having an opportunity to Sail for England from this Port; I have it only in my power to procure these Despatches the safest conveyance to you.

I have only to add that a letter addressed to Col. Kemble, at Messrs. Kemble & Spens, Norfolk Street, Strand, London, will be conveyed to me, should you think it necessary to communicate your sentiments upon the subject of the business entrusted with you at an early period,—Lieut. Frederick Haldimand being at present on the Continent,—or till you hear further from

him.

Sunday, Sept. 14th. Letter to Edmund Fanning, Esq., Governor of St. John's Island.

St. John's, N. B.

My Dear Sir:

Various unpleasant circumstances have intervened since the receipt of your Letter of 24th. September, 1786, to prevent my answering it sooner, to express my sense of your great Goodness, and to thank you for your unremitted attention to my Brother's interest in this Province. A Chain of Events prevented my leaving England sooner than the month of July last; and few opportunities offering for your Government, or when they did I was not in the way, must plead my Apology

for so long a silence.

My Brother, still strongly pressing me to take the trouble of Transacting his business in this Country, has left it to me to thank you for your Letter of 12th. of October, 1786; and to express his Sense of the favors you have conferred on him by your very kind and friendly attention to his Affairs; And believe me, my Dear Sir, you have greatly enhanced the Value of your good Offices both in his Eye and mine, by the very obliging manner in which you have expressed yourself upon subjects that must have given you much trouble, and some anxiety the Conducting.

The fourteen or fifteen Lots thrown out of the Patent by Mr. Sproule's Survey are given by the Possessors by the Governor and Council; but Mr. Wylly's representation, that those Settlements should be considered as an equivalent for the like number in the Grant, was admitted as a plea to the fulfilling the conditions of the

Grant, and was of use in promoting an Escheat.

I go as soon as possible to Fredericton, to pay my respects, and to converse with Mr. Sproule; after which I shall return down the River, adjust matters with the Settlers, and, I hope, take my departure for London by the 20th. of October. As to any Balance that may remain in your hands, you will be so good to remit

it to Messrs. Kemble & Spens, Norfolk Street, Strand, or to my Agent, Messrs. Ross & Ogilvie, Argyle

Street, London.

As to myself, I can only tell you that by the long indisposition and Death of my only friend, General Gage, who would exert himself to support me, I am now left totally disregarded, after 31 years' Service, with a constitution most terribly shaken from the various Vicissitudes of Climate I have been exposed to.

I am, &c., &c., &c.

From St. John's to Fredericton about 80 Mile, and Settlements extend above it near Ninety more. Above Fredericton the Country is more fertile than below it, and the Timber better for Ship building, &c., &c., and in greater quantities. Some old French, and farms occupied by New England Men about twenty Mile below Fredericton, particularly on the Eastern side of the River, are well cleared, and the banks of the River pretty enough. Vessels of two hundred Tons may be and are built fifty Mile up the River, and Vessels of 500 Tons, may be built on Kemble's Manor, and safely Conveyed to St. John's; the Rapids or falls of the River, about a mile above the Town, being passable in every tide twice, at the rising and fall of the Water to a level with the fall or Rapid. The Country for about 3 Mile above the Town of St. John's is very Rugged and Mountainous, When it opens to a large Bay, the West side of which is low, and some farms on its borders; the East side Communicates with a River called the Kenebikasis, very large at its confluence with the St. John's, but not navigable any great distance. The Town or City of St. John's stands upon the side of a hill, has about 300 Houses, many of them deserted, and but few well Built or of any size. The Harbour but a poor one.

Tuesday, October 16th. Embarked for Digby, on the opposite side of the Bay of Fundy, in crossing which we experienced a great Sea, and entered the Gut

of Annapolis about 8 the next morning. This Gut is a narrow passage between two high Hill, about a mile over, and has an extraordinary appearance from its narrowness, but in it there is a very fine harbour. Digby was established by the Refugees in 1783, but many of them have left it, there not being any Trade carrying on there. Annapolis, an old-established place, being only three or four Leagues from it, and enjoys what little Trade there may be exclusive of Halifax. St. John's, N. B., being the Capital of a Province, and enjoying some Trade already, will probably have all in the Bay of Fundy; and its River being already well settled, and land good, will support and increase the Town. From Digby I sailed at three in the Afternoon, and arrived the next day, at eleven, at Windsor, 90 Leagues. Windsor is a very old Settlement and Port, has a good Country about it, and is pleasantly situated. From Windsor to Halifax is forty-six mile, the middle part of the road, the worst I ever knew. The 22d. I arrived at Halifax, and that and the following day Dined with the Governor, Mr. Parr.

Friday, Oct. 24th. When on my way to pay my duty to the Prince,\* with General Ogilvie, we met him, with whom I walked some Hours, when he asked me many questions, as is customary; told me he was well acquainted with my Character and Family; paid me a Compliment; said he was glad to see me, and took me to Dine with him. From Saturday to Wednesday following the 29th. I constantly Dined in Company with him, upon all which occasions he was ever Civil and Jocose; and when in good humor is acceptable Company, and repeated it once or twice that he expected I would call on him when he returned to England. On the 30th. he sailed early in the morning for Jamaica.

Tuesday, Nov. 25th. Embarked on board the Ship Hercules, Captain Wyat, and sailed for England. Ayant pour mes Compagnons De Voyage Messrs. Pem-

berton, Lieut. Col. Brownlow, Capt. Dalrymple, Lieut. Grafton, and Monsieur Turner.

Wednesday, Nov. 26th. Wind N. N. W.; Fresh Gales and clear Weather. At one P. M. got under way. At 2 under a single reef Top sails and M. T. G. Sail. At 5 the Light House bore N. W. ½ N. Distant 7 Leagues. Lat. Light House, 44.28. Long. 63.28. At 6 A. M. Fresh winds and clear, with a hard frost. At 10 out a reef in F. Top sail. Distance, 142. Lat. observed, 43.30. Long. 60.30.

Thursday, Nov. 27th. Wind N. B. E.; Little wind and clear Weather. At 2 A. M. Wind S. E. B. E.; Fresh breezes and cloudy; in 2d reef Top Sails, reefed Mizzen Top Sail, and close reefed Fore Top Sail. No observation. Distance, 63. Lat. 42.30. Long. 60.9.

Friday, Nov. 28th. Wind S. E. B. E.; Fresh breezes and cloudy weather. At 10 with rain. At 4 Squally; hauled Top Sails. At 6 little wind and hard rain. At 8 wore Ship; set the Main Sail. No observation. Distance, 40. Lat. 41.50. Long. 60.9.

Saturday, Nov. 29th. Wind E. S. E.; Calms, with a Southering Sea; her head to the N. E. Distance, 21.

Lat. 42.8. Long. 59.59.

Sunday, Nov. 30th. Wind S. E. B. E.; Strong gales with rain; close reefed the Top Sails; reefed the Main Sail. At 12 handed Square Main Sail. At Noon heavy Squalls; handed the M. Top Sail and scudded under the Fore Sail; heavy Sea running. No observation.

Distance, 151. Lat. 42.29. Long. 56.37.

Monday, Dec. 1st. Wind W. N. W.; Strong gales and successive heavy Squalls Scudding under the Fore Sail. At 12 shipped a heavy sea over the stern, and lost a Man overboard, a Carpenter going from the Dock Yard at Halifax to his friends in England; Excessive heavy sea; handed the Fore Sail, and lay to under the Mizzen Stay Sail. At or near 2 the Ship received a very heavy blow upon her quarter. At 8 bore away and set the close-reefed F. T. Sail. Distance, 141. Lat. observed, 42.43. Long. 53.24.

Tuesday, Dec. 2d. Wind N. N. W.; Strong gales and squally; set Main Topsail. At 2 Wind S. W.; little Wind and hard rain; close reef Main and handed Fore Top Sail; hard rain. At eight set Main Sail and F. T. S., Jib, and M. T. G. Sail. No observation. Distance, 100. Lat. 42.43. Long. 51.7.



# GENERAL ORDERS BY MAJOR GENERAL . THE HONOURABLE WILLIAM HOWE.

HEAD QUARTERS, Boston, 15th. Nov., 1775.

Lieut. Edward McGowan, of His Majesty's Royal Fencible American Regiment, tried by the General Court Martial, of which Major Dilkes is President, for going on shore without leave, and Marauding, Challenging his Commanding Officer in the Execution of His duty, Disobedience of Orders, Quitting his Post, and taking his party to a town when the enemy was within four or five miles, Is found guilty and sentenced to be Dismissed His Majesty's service. The Commander-in-Chief Approves of the above sentence.

The above General Court martial is dissolved.

It having been represented to the Commander-in-Chief that the soldiers have got many of the fire Buckets belonging to the Town. The Commanding Officers of Corps will Direct to have them Collected with all Despatch, and put under the care of their Respective Quarter Masters, and Report to the Deputy Adjutant General the number they collect.

A General Court Martial, consisting of one Field Officer, 8 Captains, and 4 Subalterns, to sit to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock in Concert Hall, to try all such

Prisoners as shall be brought before them.

Lieut. Col. Birch, 17th. Dragoons, President; Royal Artillery, 1 Captain, 1 Subaltern; 1st. Division, 3 Captains, 1 Subaltern; 2d. Division, 2 Captains, 1 Subaltern; 3d. Division, 2 Captains, 1 Subaltern,—members.

The names and dates of the members, commissions, the prisoners' names, and Crimes and Evidences named, to be sent to the Deputy Judge Advocate as soon as possible.

After Orders, 6 o'Clock.

Lieut. Col. Birch being ill, Major Sill is President of the General Court Martial ordered to sit to-morrow.

HEAD QUARTERS, Boston, 16th. Nov., 1775.

All Sentries from the Advanced Posts to be Doubled, and are to be ordered not to separate in their Walks.

HEAD QUARTERS, Boston, 17th. Nov., 1775.

Many of His Majesty's Loyal American Subjects, residing in Boston with their Adherents, having offered their Service for the Defence of the Place, the Commander in Chief has ordered them to be armed, and directed their being formed into three Companies under the Command of the Hon. Timothy Ruggles, to be called the Loyal American Associators; they will be Distinguished by a white sash round the left arm.

The Honorable Timothy Ruggles, Commander.

First Company.—Abijiah Willard, Captain; 1st. Lieuts., Thomas Buman, George Leonard; 2d. Lieuts., Thomas Danforth, James Paine, James Putnam, Junr.

Second Company.—James Putnam, Captain; 1st. Lieuts., John Sergeant, Daniel Oliver; 2d. Lieuts., Jeremiah Dummer Rogers, John Ruggles, Stephen

Jones.

Third Company.—Francis Green, Captain; 1st. Lieuts., Ebenezer Spooner, Joseph Jones; 2nd. Lieuts., Abraham Savage, William Chandler, Nathaniel Coffin.

Brigadier Ruggles will appoint Guard Rooms and Alarm Posts for those Companies, and give them the

necessary orders.

The Commissary General will give rations of Provi-

sions to those Companies according to the returns

signed by the Commandant.

The Commander in Chief's pleasure that the Commanding Officers of Regiments do immediately appoint the additional Serjeants and provide the additional Drummers as soon as they can be had. They will also appoint three Serjeants, three Corporals, and two Drummers for the English additional Company; the non-Commissioned Officers and Drummers having been already appointed for one Company in England.

Each Regiment will have upon the Recruiting Service in England one Captain, one Subaltern, with a Serjeant, Corporal, and Drummer to each Officer. Those Regiments having Officers here, that have leave to go home for the recovery of their health, or that have now Officers in that part in Europe, will not send others from hence, as these Gentlemen are to be appointed

for the Recruiting Service.

The Commanding Officers of Regiments will appoint to the Additional Companies ordered to be raised in England such Officers as they judge least fit for actual service in America, either from want of health or from any other cause. These parties will go in the Transports that will be appointed to carry home the Officers, &c., of the 18th. and 59th. Regiments.

The Commanding Officers of Regiments will send immediately to the Deputy Adjutant General returns of what Camp Equipage they have directed to be provided for their Officers, agreeable to the Orders 19th. October.

They will likewise mention in the return what mode they have fallen upon, of supplying the men of their Respective Corps with necessaries for the Ensuing Campaign. The Guards to mount in leggings or cloth gaiters, till further orders. The Corps that are not provided with them to provide themselves as soon as possible.

HEAD QUARTERS, Boston, 18th. Nov., 1775. Upon the discovery of fire, notice is to be given as

usual by the Ringing of Bells and cry of Fire in the streets, at which time the Regiments will immediately get under arms on their Regimental Parades, and wait there for further orders, unless when a fire may break out in the Quarters of a Regiment; and in that case the Corps is to quit the place to make room for the inhabitants, who are to repair to the fire with all the buckets in their possession, to give their assistance; Every householder putting up a light in a front window —A caution to be observed upon all alarms whatever. All persons failing so to do will be punished in a most exemplary manner. The Bells are not to ring more than one quarter of an hour.

The Firewards, the Engine men, and men acting under them, are not to be interrupted by any Officer or Soldier in the execution of their duty. The Firewards, known by red-painted staffs with the heads of brass, are to have the whole management and conduct of the Engines and People assembled to extinguish a fire. Neither are the inhabitants to be stopped or impeded in times of fires by the Military, unless they are armed,

in which case they are to be taken into custody.

All the Associated Companies, from the essential service they may be of are to attend the fires without arms, the Royal North British Volunteers excepted, who have been already appointed to a particular duty with arms, Women of the army will not be allowed to be present at any fires that may happen.

A premium of 20 Shillings Sterling will be given to the men who bring the first Engine and work it at the

fire.

The Firewards are to take into their possession all buckets found in vacated places, and to distribute them

among the residing inhabitants.

The Court is of the opinion that Lieut. William Hamilton is not Guilty of the first Charge Exhibited against him, Viz. Being Drunk upon Duty, and doth therefore Acquit him of the same. With Respect to the other Charges they are of opinion that he refused going in Arrest when ordered, and that he was not justifiable in so doing, but his Conduct in this appears to them to have proceeded rather from an Error in Judgment than from any Intentional Criminality.

Lastly, the Court is of opinion, that he is Guilty of the Second and Fourth Charges Exhibited against him, Viz. Offering Violence against his Captain when ordered under an Arrest, and behaving in a Scandalous, Infamous Manner, Unbecoming the Character of an Officer and Gentleman, and in Breach of the Twentythird Article of War, of the fifteenth Section, doth therefore adjudge that he, the said Lieut. William Hamilton, be Discharged his Majesty's Service as the

said Article of War directs.

The Court, upon due Consideration of the Evidence for and against the prisoner, Terence Magrath, together with what he had to Offer in his Defense, is of Opinion that his Treatment of Mr. Houghton, does not amount to Scandalous, Infamous behaviour such as is unbecoming the Character of an Officer and a Gentleman, as Stated in the Charge, But that it was highly Improper and unwarrantable; and doth, therefore, by Virtue of the Power and Authority Vested in them by the 3d. Article of War, Section 20, Adjudge that he the said Terence Magrath be suspended from all duty and pay for the space of three months, and be publicly Reprimanded in such a manner and at such place as the Commander in Chief shall be pleased to Direct.

The Commander in Chief looking upon his Reprimand to Lieut. Magrath to be so inferior to the censure passed upon him by the Court that he has Declined

any proceedings further than by his Approbation of the Sentence, which will take place from this day.

The Regiments are to bring Immediately all the Barrack furniture, but such as judged necessary for the Voyage, to the Store in King Street, where the Barrack Master will give Receipts on the back of the Indents for what is then delivered, as the Regiments are answerable for what they Received. It is Recommended to them to keep as little as is merely Necessary. As many Grates as can be spared should be brought to the same Store; only what is necessary for Cooking to be withheld.

The Troops may have some wood if wanted.

Every Regiment is to take care of the Hand Carts they have. The wheels are to be fastened on the Quarters of the Several Transports; These being very necessary for a future Service, and not easily Replaced.

The Commanding Officers of Regiments are to

send the masters of Transports allotted for the Respective Corps, with their Quarter Masters, to Mr. Chamier, the Commissary General, to receive the Provisions ordered for the different ships, for which the masters of Transports are to give Receipts; and the Commanding Officers are to give all the Assistance in their power to put the provisions on Board; and are to Report to the General when the ships are Completed with the several Articles of Provisions, agreeable to the Distribution which has been given to the Commissary General. This is to be done by the Transport Boats, in which the Regiments should Assist one another.

Evening Orders, 7 o'Clock.

The Commanding Officers of Corps to order every Dram shop in their respective Districts to be shut up, and to forbid Liquor to be sold on any Account; to be attentive that their men are in their Quarters as soon as possible in the Evening, and to be particularly Careful that they are all Present at Taptoo beating.

If any person is detected in selling Spirituous Liquors in Contradiction to this order, they are to be made prisoners, and the Liquor found in their

possession Destroyed.

HEAD QUARTERS, Boston, Friday, March 8th., 1776.

The Commanding Officers of Corps to give the Strictest Attention to the Regularity and Discipline of their Respective Corps, which it may now be more necessary than of late to look to, from the duty in which the Soldiers are Employed, and as the Troops may be hourly Called upon to Attack the Enemy, in case a proper opening should offer, where the Rebels Least Expect it.

There being a Large Quantity of Rum to be put on Board Ship for the use of the Army, the Commanding Officers of Corps are to give the proper Directions that the Rum be Destroyed within their Respective Districts that is not bought up for the

use of the Army or Navy; And the General flatters himself that the Soldiers will not at this time Relax in their Discipline, to Oblige him to have Recourse to the most Rigorous means, which he must Carry into Execution, however it may be Disagreeable to him, in order to put a stop to Drunkenness in the Garrison, which has been too prevalent of late.

The Corps of Light Infantry and Grenadiers to do no duty in the Garrison Except Working Parties in

the day.

The Troops to Return immediately to the Engineer's Store in the Corner of Dock Square, near Faneuil Hall, whatever Entrenching tools they may have, and also the Carpenters' Tools they received for fitting up their Quarters, agreeable to the Receipts given in.

HEAD QUARTERS, Boston, 9th. March, 1776.

Returns of the Officers, Sergeants, Drummers, that Carry Arms, and Rank and File of the 10th., 17th., 23d., and 55th. Grenadiers. Sick and Convalescents not included.

The working Parties to parade at 5 o'Clock in the morning till further Orders.

## After Orders, 9 o'Clock at night.

Those men Returned by the different Regiments as are accustomed to row Boats, are to be kept on such duties, when they may be most Expeditiously Relieved, that they may be Assembled as soon as possible if Called for.

The Several Corps to put their Convalescents, and Women on board Ships as early as Possible to-morrow morning.

HEAD QUARTERS, Boston, 10th. March, 1776. Morning orders, o o'Clock. The Commanding Officers of Corps to be Responsible to have all their Sick, Convalescents, and Women on board their Respective Transports before Six o'Clock this Evening, and the utmost Care to be taken that the Town be not set on fire, by Accident or by Design. Any person Detected in Setting fire to the Town without Authority will Suffer Immediate Death.

The Officers will send their Bedding and Soldiers'

Knapsacks on Board to-day.

All Transports and other Vessels may Expect to Receive Immediate orders to proceed to King Road. The masters of Transports and other Vessels will follow such directions as they may Receive from the Officers of the Navy.

Upon Ringing the Church Bells at night, the Troops

are to get under Arms.

#### Orders.

It having been Reported to the Commander in Chief that a number of men have been seen Drunk in the Streets and about the Different Wharfs, the Commanding Officers of Corps to order the Rolls to be Called immediately, and be answerable that none of the men off Duty leave their Barracks during the night.

HEAD QUARTERS, Boston, 11th. March, 1776.

Morning Orders, half-past 8 o'Clock.

The Troops to have all their Baggage put on Board ship by five o'Clock this Afternoon. If any is found on the wharfs after six, it will be thrown into the Sea.

Two Field Officers to Superintend the wharfs Immediately. Lieut.-Col. Collins to take Charge of Hancock's and the wharfs Contiguous to it where Transports lay, and give such directions as he shall think proper for the Speedier removing of any Baggage that may be on them, and to see that they are entirely Clear of Rubbage by Six, and that the Communication is free to the Vessels that lay at them.

All flat Bottom Boats in possession of the Different Troops to be Returned immediately to Lieut. Bowmaster, at the Long Wharf, and none to be made use of but by an order from him. Any Woman belonging to the Army that may be found in Town after one o'Clock will be taken up, and sent to the Provost, and

will be left behind.

### Orders.

The Officers to lay in their men's Rooms this night, and not to suffer one of them to be absent from their Quarters on any Account.

## After Orders, 2 o'Clock.

The Officers of the working Parties on the wharfs to receive such Orders as the Field Officers appointed

this day to Superintend them shall give.

The Commanding Officers of Corps to give Strict Orders that the men are kept as much as possible in their Quarters, and not to suffer them to be Employed by the Inhabitants, as much Drunkenness arises from it.

The Troops to be served with Biscuit instead of Flour; they are to apply immediately for it at Mr.

Lovd's the Contractor's.

The several Corps to take on Board their Transports any Spades, Shovels, Pick and felling Axes, &c., that they may have in their Possession.

The Officers to Continue to lay in their Men's Bar-

racks till further Orders.

The Rolls to be called frequently, and all Soldiers that are absent in the Evening to be sought for and

brought to their Quarters.

The Commanding Officers of Regiments to report in writing to the Commander in Chief if they have got on Board the Week's Provision that was ordered Yesterday.

The Quarter Masters of Regiments to apply to the Deputy Quarter Master General for half a Pint of

Rum for their Working Men.

The Quarter Masters to receive a Week's Flour from the Contractors to-morrow morning at five o'Clock, for their respective Regiments, which the Commanding Officers are to order to be put on Board their respective Transports, and to report to General Howe, in writing, when it is done.

as from one of the General's Aid-de-Camps.

Abraham Pike, William Huston, and John Smith, Private Soldiers in His Majesty's 23d. Regiment, or Royal Welsh Fuzileer Regiment, tried by the above Court Martial for disobedience of Orders and plundering, and found Guilty of the same, are sentenced to receive 1,000 Lashes each.

The Commander in Chief, considering the Punishment inadequate to their Crimes, is pleased to remit the Punishment, and to order the Prisoners to be released

and to join their Regiment.

William King, Drummer in the 27th. Regiment, tried by the above Court Martial for disobedience of Orders by straggling beyond the out-Posts of the Army, past nine o'Clock at night, and Plundering sundry Articles, is found guilty of the 1st. part of the Charge exhibited against him in disobedience of Orders by Straggling beyond the out-Posts, but acquitted of the Article of plundering, and Sentenced to receive 500 Lashes.

As Several Men have been lost by their Straggling from Camp, and the present Encampment being surrounded by the Enemy, no Officers or Soldier is to go beyond the outposts without leave from his Commanding Officer.

The Regimental Rolls to be frequently called, and

An Extract of a Letter from Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne to Sir William Howe, dated Albany, 20th. October, 1777:

Sir,

In conformity to my Orders "to proceed by the most Vigorous Exertions to Albany," I passed the Hudson's River, at Saratoga, on the 13th. September; no Exertions have been left untried.

The Army under my Command has fought twice

against a Superiority of Numbers.

The first Action was on the 19th. September, when, after four hours' sharp Conflict, we remained masters of the Field of Battle. The Second Action (on the 7th. October) was not so successful, and ended with a Storm upon two parts of our Intrenchments,—the One defended by Lieut.-Col. Breymen, who was killed upon the spot, and the post was lost; the other defended by Lord Balcarras at the Head of the British Light Infantry, who repulsed the Enemy with great Loss. The Army afterwards made good their retreat to the Heights of Saratoga, unable to proceed further, the Enemy having possession of all the Fords and the Passes on the East Side Hudson's River.

The Army there waited the chance of Events, and offered themselves to the attack of the Enemy till the

13th. Instant, when only Three days' provision at short allowance remained. At that time, the last Hope of timely assistance being exhausted, my numbers being reduced by past Actions to three Thousand five hundred fighting Men, of which about Nineteen hundred alone were British, invested by the Enemies' Troops to the amount of Sixteen Thousand Men, I was induced by the general Concurrence and advice of the Generals, Field Officers, and Captains Commanding Corps, to open a Treaty with Maj.-Gen. Gates.

Your Excellency will observe, by the papers transmitted herewith, the disagreeable Prospect that attended the first Overtures. The Army determined to die, to a Man, rather than submit to Terms repugnant

to National and Personal Honour.

I trust you will think the Treaty inclosed consistent with both.

(Signed) J. Burgoyne.

The first Overtures alluded to in the above Extract: *1st.*—Gen. Burgoyne's Army being exceedingly reduced by repeated defeats, by desertion, sickness, &c., their Provisions exhausted, their Military Stores, Tents and Baggage taken or destroyed, Their Retreat cut off and their Camp invested, they can only be allowed to Surrender prisoners of War.

Answer.—Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne's Army, however reduced, will never admit that their Retreat is cut off

while they have Arms in their hands.

2d.—The Officers and Soldiers may keep their Baggage belonging to them. The Generals of the United

States never permit Individuals to be pillaged.

3d.—The Troops under Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne will be conducted by the most convenient Route to New England, Marching by easy Marches and sufficiently provided for by the Way.

Answer.—

4th.—The Officers will be admitted on Parole, may wear their side Arms, and will be treated with the

Liberality customary in Europe, so long as they by proper Behaviour continue to deserve it; but those who are apprehended having broke their Paroles (as some British Officers have done) must expect to be close confined.

Answer.—There being no Officer in this Army under or capable of being under the description of breaking

Parole, this Article needs no Answer.

5th.—All Public Stores, Artillery, Arms, Ammunition, Carriages, Horses, &c., &c., must be delivered to Commissaries appointed to receive them.

Answer.—All public Stores may be delivered, Arms

excepted.

6th—These Terms being agreed to and signed, The Troops under His Excellency Gen. Burgoyne's Command may be drawn up in their Encampment, where they will be ordered to Ground their Arms, and may thereupon be marched to the River Side to be passed over in their Way toward Bennington.

Answer.—This Article is inadmissible in any Extremity: sooner than this Army will consent to Ground their Arms in their Encampment, they will rush on

the Enemy determined to take no Quarter.

(Signed) Horatio Gates.

Camp at Saratoga, Oct. 14th., 1777.

These Overtures being rejected, the following Convention took place.

Articles of Convention between Lieut.-Gen. Bur-

goyne and Maj.-Gen. Gates:

Ist.—The Troops under Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne to march out of their Camp with the Honours of War, and the Artillery of the Intrenchments, to the verge of the River, where the old Fort stood, where the Arms and Artillery are to be left.

The Arms to be piled by word of Command from

their own Officers.

2d.—A free passage to be granted to the Army under Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne to Great Britain, on condition

of not serving again in North America during the Present Contest, and the Port of Boston is assigned for the Entry of Transports to receive the Troops, whenever Gen. Howe shall so order.

3d.—Should any Cartel take place by which the Army under Gen. Burgoyne or any part of it may be exchanged, the foregoing Article to be void as far as

such exchange shall be made.

4th.—The Army under Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne to march to Massachusetts Bay by the easiest, most expeditious, and Convenient Route, and to be Quartered in, near, or as Convenient as possible to Boston, that the March of the Troops may not be delayed when Transports arrive to receive them.

5th.—The Troops to be supplied on their March, and during their being in Quarters, with Provisions by Maj.-Gen. Gates's orders, at the same rate of Rations as the Troops of his own Army; and if possible the Officers' Horses and Cattle are to be supplied with Forage at

the usual Rates.

6th.—All Officers to retain their Carriages, Batt Horses and other Cattle, and no Baggage to be molested or Searched, Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne giving his Honour that there are no public Stores secreted therein; Maj.-Gen. Gates will, of course, take the necessary measures for the due performance of this Article. Should any Carriages be wanted during the March for the Transportation of Officers' Baggage they are if possible to be supplied by the Country at the usual Rates.

7th.—Upon the March and during the time the Army shall remain in Quarters in the Massachusetts Bay, the Officers are not (as far as circumstances will admit) to be separated from their Men; The Officers are to be Quartered according to Rank, and are not to be hindered from assembling their Men for Roll callings and other necessary purposes of Regularity.

8th.—All Corps whatever of Gen. Burgoyne's Army,

whether composed of Sailors, Batteaux Men, Artificers, Drivers, Independent Companies, and followers of the Army of whatever Country, shall be included in the fullest sense and utmost extent of the above Articles, and comprehended in every respect as British Sub-

jects.

9th.—All Canadians, and Persons belonging to the Canadian Establishment, consisting of Sailors, Batteaux Men, Artificers, Drivers, Independent Companies, and many other followers of the Army, who come under no particular descriptions, are to be permitted to return there. They are to be conducted immediately by the shortest Route to the first British post on Lake George, are to be supplied with provisions in the same manner as the other Troops, and are to be bound by the same condition of not serving during the present Contest in North America.

10th.—Passports to be immediately granted for three Officers, not exceeding the Rank of Captain, who shall be appointed by Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne, to carry dispatches to Sir William Howe, Sir Guy Carleton, and to Great Britain by way of New York, and Maj.-Gen. Gates engages the public faith that those dispatches shall not be opened; These Officers are to set out immediately after receiving their dispatches, and are to travel the shortest route and in the most expeditious manner.

11th.—During the stay of the Troops in the Massachusetts Bay the Officers are to be admitted upon Parole, and are to be permitted to wear their side Arms.

12th.—Should the Army under Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne find it necessary to send for their Clothing and other Baggage to Canada, they are to be permitted to do it in the most convenient Manner, and the necessary passports granted for that purpose.

13th.—These Articles are to be mutually signed and exchanged to-morrow morning at Nine o'Clock, and the Troops under Lieut.-Gen. Burgoyne are to march

out of their intrenchments at three o'Clock in the afternoon.

#### PROCLAMATION.

It being necessary that a proper supply of Vegetables, fresh Provisions, Hay, and Forage be provided for the use of His Majesty's Army, Navy, and the Inhabitants of the City of Philadelphia and its Environs, I have thought fit, in order to Encourage His Majesty's faithful Subjects cheerfully to exert themselves in raising the said supplies, to issue this Proc-LAMATION assuring them of all possible protection; and hereby strictly charging and Commanding that no person or Persons, under any pretence whatever, presume to commit any trespass upon the Lands enclosed of any other person or persons, or to break down, destroy, carry away, or in any way injure the Banks, Walls, Hedges, or Fences now standing or hereafter to be erected, of any such enclosed lands, as they will answer the same at their Peril.

And to the end that this Proclamation may be most Strictly Obeyed, and the good purposes intended carried into full Execution, I do hereby charge and Command all Officers, Soldiers, and others to seize and deliver over to any Officer Commanding any part of His Majesty's Forces, or to the Provost Martial, all

persons perpetrating any of the Trespasses aforesaid, in order that such offenders may be brought to Condign Punishment; hereby declaring that any neglect shall be considered and Punished as a breach of Orders. And I do further charge the Commanding Officers and Provost Martial aforesaid from time to time to receive into their Custody all such Offenders as shall be brought to them, and duly make report thereof. The Women of the Army are constantly to march upon the flanks of the Baggage of their respective Corps, and the Provost Martial has received positive Orders to Drum out any Woman who shall dare to disobey this order.

The Commanding Officers of Corps will, at all times when they come to their ground, post such Guards and Pickets as they shall think sufficient for the security

of their respective Encampments.

The General Orders of the Army will be given out at Six in the evening, at Head Quarters, until further Orders.

Many of the Women who were sent on board the Transports from Philadelphia being at present with the Army, the Commanding Officers will give in returns as soon as may be convenient of the number of such Women in their respective Corps, and they will specify by whose permission those Women rejoined

the Army.

The Names, Country, and Profession of all followers of the Army, who are not already registered, must be given in to Capt. Madden, of the 15th. Regiment, before to-morrow evening. Any person not giving in his name according to this order will be liable to be imprisoned.




