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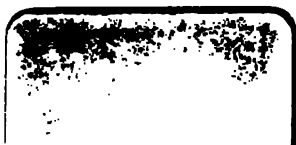
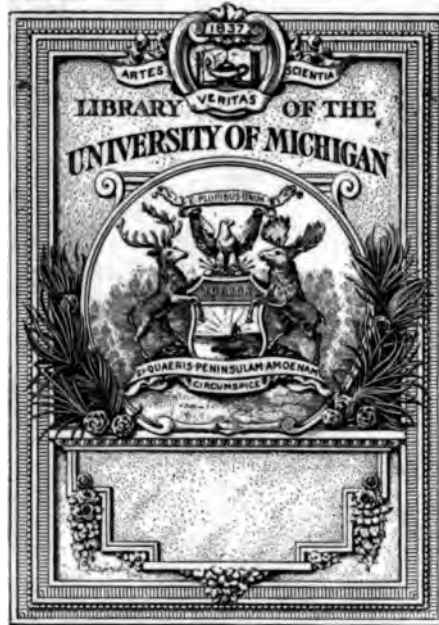

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## PREFACE TO THE JOURNAL OF THE UPPER HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

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The Upper House of Assembly was the King's Council sitting as a branch of the Legislature. It was composed of fourteen persons, all appointed by the King to serve during his pleasure; twelve Councilors in ordinary and two extraordinary, the Surveyor General of Customs and the General Commissioner of Indian Affairs. As a Council they sat with the Governor to advise him in the discharge of the executive duties, and he performed all important acts "by the advice of his Majesty's Council." When sitting as an Executive Council the Governor presided. As a legislative body it was presided over by the senior member of the body, who was styled the President of the Council. It, for a long time, seldom originated bills, but confined its work to amending and perfecting such as were sent up to it by the Commons House of Assembly. But during the last few years of British rule it originated some bills which were passed by the Commons House, but appropriation and tax bills had to originate in the Commons House, and had to pass as the Commons House had passed them, for the Upper House was not permitted to amend them.

Indeed, the Assemblymen, all of whom were elected by the people, who were qualified to vote were always jealous of the Council and disputed their right to call themselves "the Upper House of Assembly" until a few years prior

to the subversion of the King's government in the province, when they seem to have recognized their right to the title.

This and the following volume contain all the Journals of the body now in existence. Up to the beginning of the disturbances that culminated in the War of the Revolution they are full and complete. From that time forward they are meager, imperfect and fragmentary. From the subversion of the King's government in the early part of 1776, to its restoration in 1779, there are, of course, no Journals, for there was no royal government in the province. After the return of Governor Wright he called a Legislature, which met in May, 1780, and continued until June, 1782. This Legislature was an unconstitutional body, for never at any time was there present a lawful quorum of the Commons House of Assembly. Still, the Governor recognized it, from necessity, as a Legislature, and feeble efforts at legislation were made, but very little was accomplished.

While we have imperfect Journals of the proceedings of the Lower House of this Legislature, we have been unable to find even a vestige of a Journal of the Upper House, either here or in England.

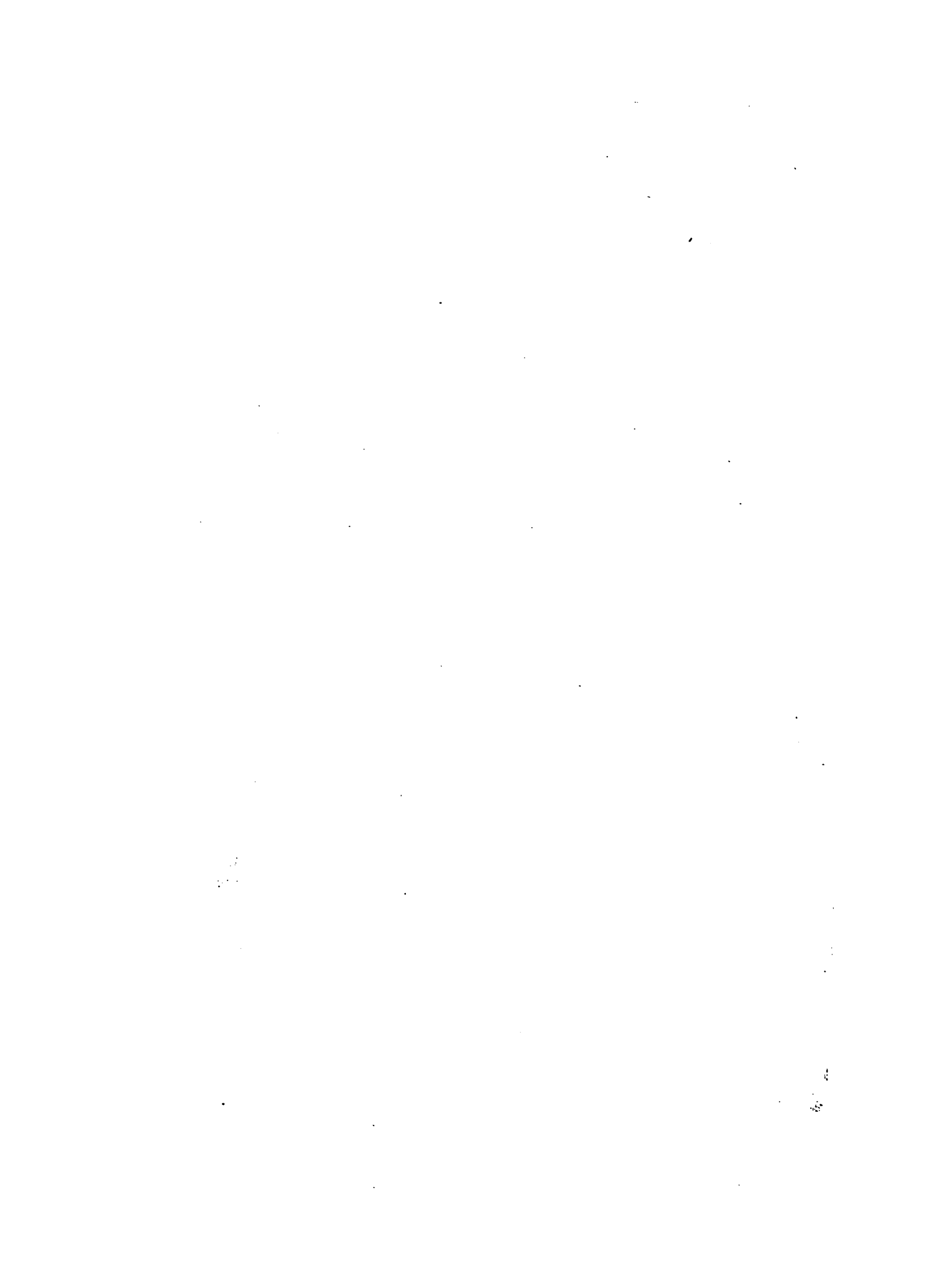

Tuesday the 7<sup>th</sup> January 1755

His Excellency the Governor came to this House, and the House of Representatives attending, He made a Speech to both Houses, after which His Excellency left the House, and M<sup>r</sup> President took the Chair, and acquainted the House, that He had obtained a Copy of His Excellency's Speech, which was read, and is as followeth, Viz<sup>t</sup>

“mediate Consideration at your first meeting and afterwards Things of lesser Moment—I think it proper for the public Service that you first of all frame some Provisional Laws for the well regulating the Militia, for the making public roads and establishing a Provision for defraying the Expences of holding the two Courts of Oyer and Terminer, which His Majesty has directed to be held on the second Tuesday in December and the second Tuesday in June, and I likewise recommend to your Consideration the making a Provision for the Ordinary Contingencies of Government as far as the Circumstances of the People will conveniently admit of the same.

“Gentlemen, as you are called together for no other Purpose but to consult about the best Methods of promoting your own Welfare, I doubt not but you’ll take care to suffer nothing to disunite you or draw of <sup>(sic)</sup> your Attention from the public Good, I, on my Part shall be ready to concur with you in every thing that can be conducive to your true and lasting Interest.

RESOLVED That the Thanks of this House be given to His Excellency for his Speech, and that an Address be drawn up and presented to His Excellency to that Purpose.

ORDERED That S<sup>r</sup> Patrick Houstoun, M<sup>r</sup> Kellet and M<sup>r</sup> Harris be a Committee to prepare the said Address

RESOLVED That four Members of this House with the President or Chairman inclusive shall constitute a House.

bers of your Majesty's Council and the House of Representatives for the Province of Georgia in General Assembly met, beg leave humbly to remonstrate to your most sacred Majesty, that whereas His Excellency John Reynolds Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over this your Majesty's Province has in Consequence of your Majesty's royal Instructions issued a Proclamation "Obliging all Grantees of Lands to clear and cultivate at the rate of five Acres per Year for every Hundred Acres contained in their Grants, in failure of which such Grants are to be void"—And whereas we humbly conceive the Compliance with this Condition is impracticable, or has a Tendency destructive to the present Planters, and will effectually prevent the future Settlement of the Colony, as it lays the Proprietors under the fatal Necessity of annually employing so much of their Time and so great a part of their Hands in clearing of their Lands, as wou'd prevent their planting to any advantage, as well as of cutting down their valuable Timber in waste whereby they are deprived of a considerable part of their Profit, and as at least one half of the Lands now possessed are not fit for any Manner of Cultivation, their Possessors wou'd be put under an extreme Hardship by being obliged to clear and cultivate such Lands, and in Twenty Years under these Restrictions, and the Conditions so far complied with, such Lands must nevertheless become forfeited as the said Proprietors will then have no more Lands to clear

We therefore with humble Submission to your most sacred Majesty pray that the above Condition may be alter'd, and that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to consider, that as this is an infant and Frontier Colony to your Majesty's Provinces on the Continent, which exposes us more to the insults of the Enemy and renders our Property more precarious, we should enjoy our

Lands on such Terms as will encourage Settlers to come amongst us, and that you will be pleased to grant such Redress as to your most sacred Majesty's great Wisdom shall seem meet

The humble Address of the Council and House of Representatives in General Assembly met

May it please your Excellency

We His Majesty's loyal Subjects the Members of His Majesty's Council and of the House of Representatives for the Province of Georgia in General Assembly met, Beg leave to lay before your Excellency for your Approbation a Remonstrance to His Majesty on the subject of the Proclamation published by your Excellency relating to the granting of Lands; as we apprehend that the Conditions therein required are such as will not only hurt the present Inhabitants, but also deter others from becoming Settlers amongst us; We therefore Request of your Excellency your Concurrence with us in endeavouring to procure of His Majesty a favourable Alteration of the Terms required in the Proclamation; We are of Opinion that if Lands were Granted in such Proportions as are agreeable to His Majesty's Instructions without any other Restriction or Condition than that the Grantee shall be obliged to reside with his Family in the Colony for at least three years after the obtaining of the Grant, this wou'd be sufficient encouragement for Settlers to come in, and also would effectually prevent People from taking up Land who have no intention to cultivate it (which we humbly apprehend is what is in-

tended to be obviated by that Part of the Proclamation complained of) as they will be obliged for their own Advantage to employ the Slaves they have brought into the Colony, and we are certain they cannot employ them in any way that will be profitable as that of clearing and cultivating their own Lands; If this has your Excellency's Approbation we beg that you would be pleased to use your Interest that Lands may be granted on the above Terms; We likewise pray that Your Excellency will be pleased to allow a longer Time than what is required in the Proclamation for the Possessors of Lands to bring in their Claims that His Majesty's Pleasure may be known on the subject of the Remonstrance

ORDERED, That the said Remonstrance and Address be signed by M<sup>r</sup> President.

ORDERED, That M<sup>r</sup> Kellet do carry the Bill, intituled an Act for regulating the Militia of this Province and for the Security and better Defence of the same, to the House of Representatives, and acquaint them that this House hath agreed to the same, with some Amendments, to which Amendments this House doth desire their Concurrence; and also,

I am very far from desiring you to load your selves or your Constituents with any heavy Impositions I have already declared that I think the last Tax renewed and fairly collected is Sufficient for this Province in it's present Circumstances to to <sup>(sic)</sup> raise for the Current year and if I

am rightly informed this Tax was so easy that scarce an Individual felt the Weight of it

In like manner I have not the least Inclination that any of the Inhabitants of this Province shall be Abridged of the Rights and Priviledges of free Britons on the Con- trary If any thing unprovided for should appear benefi- cial to the Welfare and good Settlement of this Colony I will concur with you in Joint Endeavours to procure it on Condition they are employed in a dutyfull application to the King for the trust reposed in me and the duty I owe my Royal Master will not permit me to go farther:

It may not be improper to Advice you to all possible Unanimity and to prevent all Partial Altercations which may impede and obstruct the Public Prosperity and even endanger the Safety of the Colony

We have too much reason to know the French are daily using every invidious Method to alienate the Affections of our Neighbouring Indians from us wherein they have not Proved altogether unsuccessfull—How alarming then must be to us, thus Situated, the Probability of having the Weight of the French Indian Power on our Back The Importance of preserving this Province from the Enemy is obvious as by its Situation His Majesty's Neighbouring Provinces on this Continent are greatly secured; the Precariousness of our present State; the

desire we have that our Security may encourage more Persons of Substance to Settle amongst us, whereby the Province may be Strengthened and raise it's drooping Credit, which in its Present Circumstances is not to be Expected, the duty and Gratitude due from us to the best of Kings—All these Motives urge us in a Crisis of such Iminent danger Zealously to exert our selves to the utmost of our Power but as we have the Honour of Appealing to your Excellency for the truth how Incapable and weak we are, so from your Excellencys Representation of a Loyal People (which we Earnestly desire) We humbly hope our most gracious Sovereign will approve of his Lordships Strengthening our hands and thereby enable us to give that protection to others, which we now Solicit for ourselves

them to me I have likewise sent Orders to the Colonels of the Militia to take Effectual Care that the Companys of which their Regiments are Composed are well Armed and supplied with Ammunition and that they are ready to March with proper Accoutrements as the Law directs upon the Shortest Notice and to the persons Employed in the Lookouts along the Sea Coasts I sent orders to be very Vigilant in performing their duty—On the 24<sup>th</sup> I received a packet from Cap<sup>t</sup> Demere containing the Two Inclosed papers Marked Number One and Two and on the Twenty Seventh I had another from him with that marked Number Three together with others Importing that the french were preparing to come into the Cherokee Nation Upon the receipt of the first dispatch I resolved to Augment Cap<sup>t</sup> Demeres force as Speedily as possible which now consists of Near Two Hundred Men, four score of which are of the Independant Companys and the rest Provincials under Martial Law I sent Orders to the Commanding Officer at Fort Augusta to Cause Thirty Men to March from that place and Fort Moor to fort Prince George at Keowee from whence upon their Arrival an Officer will March with Thirty of the best Men to Cap<sup>t</sup> Demere I have also ordered a party to March from Hence which will Increase the Garrison of Fort Prince George to above Thirty Men which may remain there for the better security of that place unless Cap<sup>t</sup> Demere shall find it necessary to order any part of them up to him as a further reinforcement another party is ordered from thence to Fort Moor and Augusta to Compleat the Officers Command there to Thirty Men which should I receive any bad News from our Agent in the Creek Nation I will Endeavour to make some further provision for the defence of I have likewise sent an Express to Cap<sup>t</sup> Demere Impowering him to Engage such and so many of the Traders and pack-horsemen that are in the Nation as he shall think proper

to come in and Join him by Enlisting them upon the same pay as the Provincials now have if they will enter upon those terms but leaving it to his direction to engage them to Act with him upon such Conditions and such manner as he shall think most Expedient and If he shall have Occasion to employ any ready money for that purpose or for any other for the good of the Service I have directed the Commissary who is with him to Supply him out of such Public Money as he has in his Hands I have also Impowered him to use all such means as he shall Judge proper to Induce the Indians throughout the Nation to take up the Hatchet and March with him against the french and their Indians and the better to Effect this to promise a certain reward to every Man who shall bring in the Scalp of a french Man or Indian I have further Ordered a Supply of Ammunition to be sent to him with all dispatch altho' a very considerable Quantity has at different times been sent up to him and he does not express that he is in any want and lastly I have directed that fifty Head of Cattle should be driven up to Fort Prince George which he may avail himself of in Case of need but in his last dispatches he Informs me that Eighty One Head were Just come into the Camp and One Hundred and Thirty Hogs with flour &c were on their way thither he has with him a Large Quantity of presents for the Indians which may be of great use upon the present Occasion Thus Sir I have Endeavoured in the best manner I could to enable him to defeat the designs of the Enemy and have Ordered him if any french shall Attempt to enter into the Nation whatever their designs may be to Attack them together with any such Indians as shall act In Conjunction With them making the best provision he can for the Security of the New fort during the time he shall be employed in the Execution of these Orders unless the Enemy should be so Numerous (which I hope is not probable) that he shall

Judge it Necessary with the force he has or shall have been able to Assemble to remain in the Fort but with respect to any Cherokee Indians who may Join the French I have directed him to Consult with such other Cherokees as shall Act with him concerning the Conduct he shall observe towards them The Officer who is to Conduct the Thirty Men to him from Fort Prince George will also have orders to Endeavour to get a Number of the Indians to March up along with him In Cap<sup>t</sup> Demeres last dispatch he tells me that the Little Carpenter has Assured him that he will in a few days set out with some other Indians and come down to me I should be extremely pleased with a Visit from him at this time but his Conduct has been of such a sort ever since Captain Demere went into the Nation that I know not what reliance there may be upon any thing he says The Cherokees mentioned in the Inclosed papers as have been at the Albama Fort are part of five and Twenty who went thither from the Town of Tilligus and proposed to the Creeks to take up the Hatchet against us but M<sup>r</sup> Pepper the Agent Acquaints me that the Creeks refuse with great Spirit and Demonstration of regard for the English —whatever turn Affairs may take I am persuaded your Excellency will do every thing on your part which may be for his Majestys Service I return you many thanks for the favour of your Letter of the Eleventh and hope your late Transactions with the Creeks will Contribute much to keep that Nation in a good disposition towards us

This Day the Old Warrior of Tomotley came to Cap<sup>t</sup> Raymond Demere and gave him the following Intelligence present Cap<sup>t</sup> John Stewart and Lieu<sup>t</sup> Robert Wall

Information of a Cherokee Indian concerning some Designs of the French in that Nation transmitted from thence by Capt. Raymd. Demere to the Governor of So. Carolina

He says that he went to the Prince of Tellico and told him that as the Messenger from the Mankiller who had been with the french were come in to him he Imagined that he had a Great deal of News to tell him upon which the Prince said that as he was a Warrior he would tell him all he knew

He says that the Prince told him all the Head men of the Creeks had a Meeting with the French at the Albama Fort and that as the Tellico people went to the Albas the Creeks came away by another path so that they did not meet Each other

He says that after the Tellico People came from the Albama Fort they went to the Oakchois a Town in the Creek Nation where they staid Three or four days and that then the French Officer at the Albama sent for them again upon which they went to him and on their Arrival at the Fort the Second time they found a Number of Choctaws there who told them that Notwithstanding they had for a Long time been at War with them and killed great Numbers of their people they were extreamly proud to see them and had forgot all past Injurys and hoped that for the future they should be of One Way of thinking and Acknowledge One Father and depend on one Man for Supplies &° &° &° whereupon the French Officer aforesaid told them that such a friendly meeting was very agreeable to him and that he received a Letter

from Tellico last Spring which he had sent down the River to the Governor who Immediately called together All his Council and Shew'd them the Letter and was much pleased and promised to have some good Guns made to give every man in the Cherokee Nation he says that one Brown a Son of Samuel Brown who was formerly a Trader in the Creek Nation is now with Lantignac at the Albama and that the said Brown and Lantignac ordered the Mankiller to send them One Hundred and Twenty Horses to that Fort and that they should load them all with Goods and bring them to Tellico and that they did not intend to purchase Skins with them but to a Woman who should bring in a Loaf of Bread they would give a Yard of Strouds and for a peice of Venison they would give a Shirt and that they would bring Three such Cargoes before they should Expect any Skins but that it all should be laid out in the purchase of provisions and given them as Presents

He says that the Old Prince and a few old Warriors at Tellico say that they Immagine the Creek Nation is entirely Lost to the English and that those Tellico people who are gone to the Albama may remain there for tho' they are Old Men they never would buy a Blankett or Match Coat brought in by the french Traders and that they will not sell the White people for what Goods the Mankiller can bring in on his Back and though the Tellico people may be called Rogues yet the English shall find them as true as any Indians in the Nation and when it is said that the Tellico people are gone to the French they will contradict them and say it is only part of the Town that is gone he says that Lantignac and Brown are to be in here in Two Moons with the Goods afore-said He says that the French have sent Three Messengers to the Chicasaws to Join them but that the Chicasaws refused to Join them and talked of Warr upon

which the Creeks said that if they would not Join the french and fall into their Measures they would give them War and Immediately went out and killed Three Chickasaws and brought their Scalps into the french before the Tellico people came away He says that when the Tellico people first went to the Creeks (in their way to the french) The Headman of Oakechois tak't very Strong for the English and had got some White Men building a Fort about his House but that before the Tellico people came away he talk'd more in favour of the French and Savannahs than ever he had done for the English—He says he looks upon the Creek Nation to be intirely lost and is convinced they are Strongly in the french Interest

N. B. this Warrior is a true friend to us and any thing he says is matter of fact I sent him on purpose to Tellico for this Intelligence

Information of Walker Bateman of four Cherokee Indians being gone to Mowille to embark for France, and also of an intended Meeting of the French with the whole Nation of the Cherokees in order to give them a Talk and presents

This Day Walter Bateman waited on Cap<sup>t</sup> Raymond Demere being sent by Cornelius Doharty of Highwassey to give Cap<sup>t</sup> Demere and Cap<sup>t</sup> John Stewart the following Intelligence He says that M<sup>r</sup> Doharty received a Message by a Tellico Runner who had Just returned from the Albama Fort who told him that there was four of the Tellico People gone to Mowille with an Intent to proceed to New Orleans to Imbark for Old france and that in the Month of February next Lantignac with Sixty frenchmen and a Number of Indians was to come to the Cold Springs on the other side of the Coosewetee River and that there are Runners sent through out the whole Nation to invite the Indians of every Town to repair to the Cold Springs aforesaid to receive a Talk from the

French and partake of about Sixty Horse Loads of presents which Horses are sent for from Tellico and from the Cold Springs the French are to proceed to Highwassey Old Town and Erect a Fort there

He says that his Brother and he are now together and that he hears such bad News that he cannot Sleep at Nights and that he will Acquaint them with it he says that he well remembers the Governors talk and he looks on the White People to be his absolute Brothers as having only Two fathers God and the King and he says that One shall not fall without the other he desires the Governor may hear his Talk and be told he is not afraid of the french and their Indians notwithstanding he Expects them Immediately—and that after his death the Governor may remember his talk for he knows he is shortly to die and does not know but that it may be either to Morrow or in a few days

He says that he was at the talk that the Mankiller brought in but he did not at that time hear all his News and Intentions but since he has heard a great deal about it, which he will not hide from us and begs that this

talk may go to Virginia as well as Carolina that we may have proper Assistance before its Too Late—He says He does not know but that all the Overhill Towns may Join the french but that it will always be the same and that he will send of <sup>(sic)</sup> Runners to other Parts of the Nation and that he believes all the Nation will not Join them he says when Cap<sup>t</sup> Demere first came up he desired him to stay at home and not go out a hunting but at that time he did not think there would be so great an Occasion for it as he no <sup>(sic)</sup> perceives for which reason he is determined not to go out of hearing of the Fort and as this Land belongs to us and the Cherokees he shall die upon it—He says that he has often been at War alone and never was Conquer'd and now he has his Brothers about him to Assist him—his <sup>(sic)</sup> he and them to be beaten and drove out of their Land by the Enemy he says that these Thoughts give him the greatest uneasiness he desires that the Governor may be Immediately Acquainted with this Talk and be told that he is at home—He says that his Talk must be Immediately sent to the Governors of Carolina and Virginia and that there must not be the least delay therein that he hopes we will be advised by him and that it is his desire that it shall go as Swift as an Arrow out of a Bow he desires that the Governor may be told that though they are at a Great distance from each other yet he hopes that this Letter will soon reach his Hands and with that dispatch as if they were near Neighbours—Cap<sup>t</sup> Raymond Demere hereupon Asked Judges friend if he would desire any Number of Men more from Carolina to Assist this Nation to which he Answered that the Governor must be Informed that he shall certainly be in want of Assistance from him and the Governor of Virginia but he will not send for the Men at this time as he is now Going to send Runners of <sup>(sic)</sup> Immediately all over the Nation to know every particular and he Expects that very soon he shall send to the



Governor for a Number of Men and as he does not know how soon he shall be obliged to send for them he hopes that the Governor will have them all in readiness to set out as soon as he shall send for them without delay One Night after his Messenger gets to him

CHARLES TOWN 15<sup>th</sup> December 1756

Information of William Birch to the Governor of So. Carolina of 9 Men of War, and a Number of Transports being arrived at Cape Francois that the Inhabitants of Jamaica were greatly alarmed, and the most effectual Measures were taken to defend themselves, but was afterwards informed, that the Design of the French was to make a Descent on this Province & So. Carolina—

About the 4<sup>th</sup> November last the Inhabitants of Jamaica was greatly Alarmed by certain Advices that a fleet consisting of Nine Men of War and a Great Number of Transports were arrived at Cape Francois in the Island of S<sup>t</sup> Domingo in Consequence of this Alarm a Council of War was called and it was the General Opinion there was an Immediate necessity for the better security of the Island to Assemble the Militia Martial Law was proclaimed the day following and the Most Effectual Measures taken for their defence in Case the Armament was intended against them but M<sup>r</sup> Doyley a Gentleman of this Town who had been taken prisoner by a French Frigate arrived at Kingston about the 10<sup>th</sup> of the same Month in a Flag of Truce from Port Prince in Saint Domingo and Communicated to me the following Particulars with a design that I should acquaint the Governor and Council of this Province therewith Viz: that during the four Months he was a Prisoner among the French in the above Port and Island Several Large Vessells laden with War like and other Stores were sent from thence to the Mississippi to which place they have for Twelve Months past been constantly sending great Supplies and where he was well Assured they were Assembling a Large Body of Troops for some Grand Expedition their particular destination was kept as Secret as possible but by Insinuating himself into the favour and Confidence of some of the Weaker People he Learnt

they were certainly intended to make a Desent on Georgia and South Carolina the ensuing Spring

We his Majestys most Dutifull and Loyall Subjects the Members of his Majestys Council and House of Representatives now met in General Assembly beg leave to Inform your Excellency that we have taken under our Mature Consideration the Letter from his Excellency the Governor of South Carolina & the Several Papers therewith Inclosed laid before us by your Order and with great Concern we find by their Contents the Imminent Dangers that now threaten us which Induced him to write to your Excellency on so emergent an Occasion as well as the Corroborating Accounts we have from time to time had from other parts of an Invasion intended from S<sup>to</sup> Domingo by a Number of Men of War and a Large Body of Troops against this and his Majestys Province of South Carolina and what more Immediately Alarms us at this Juncture is an Attack designed by the French and Indians on our Western Frontiers as we observe by the Purport of the above Papers from the Commanding Officer in the

Indian Country and also it is apprehended that the greatest part of the Creek Nation by the Influence of the french at the Albama Fort are to us lost in Consequence of which they have Concluded a Peace With our Enemys the Chactaws and threatened our friends the Chickasaws with war if they would not with them Join the french against these Provinces

When we consider these Approaching dangers that threaten the Destruction of this his Majestys Province by an Invasion from the french at St<sup>o</sup> Domingo and their Intended descent Conjointly with the Indians on our Western frontiers the Naked defenceless State of the Province wherewith your Excellency is well Acquainted our Inability in all respects to oppose one or the other we are deeply concerned with the Melancholy Prospect of our present Situation that we are unable sufficiently by words to Express and have no other Consolation in this our Extreme distress but what Arises from reflecting on the continual Tender and Paternal regard our most gracious Sovereign has always manifested to his Subjects of this Province all these Motives urge us in the most Interesting manner to Address your Excellency that you will be pleased to take our Necessitous Circumstances under your Consideration and Immediately compleat the present Company of Rangers to Seventy Men and raise two other Companys of the same Number each and that they be ordered to encamp at the most Convenient Place on the Main Body of the Altamaha River where they will be a Check on the Indians and may prevent their Joining with the french and likewise will be ready to March (when it may appear to your Excellency it can be done with the Consent of a sufficient Number of the Indians) into the Creek Nation to Join such of them as may remain well Affected to his Majesty in the Demolition of Albamah fort which if happily effected we are Assured

would disappoint the Schemes of our Enemies from that Quarter And as we find that one Scout Boat is inadequate to the Services required Especially at this Crisis we hope your Excellency will also be pleased to order another Scout Boat with Ten Men a Coxswain and Mate to be Stationed on the North End of Cumberland Island which will be of great Service not only to give Intelligence of the Appearance of an Enemy upon the Sea Coasts but will also prevent the desertion of our Domesticks and Slaves we also beg leave to represent to your Excellency the want of Ammunition and War like Stores in the Province and request your Excellency will order the same to be Provided We doubt not but his Most Gracious Majesty in order to prevent our impending Ruin will be pleased to approve of these Measures indispensably Necessary to the preservation of the Province and the Lives and fortunes of all its Inhabitants and in Compassion to our Calamitous Circumstances will extend his Tender and Paternal Care to us his Loyal but distressed Subjects so far as to give Orders for the Payment of such Expences as must be unavoidably entered into upon this Emergent Occasion or otherwise this Province must become an Easy prey to a very Inconsiderable Number of the Enemy as it's Impossible for the present Inhabitants to defray any Expences of this Nature

Perswaded I am that the surest Means of doing this will be to consult your Felicity and the general Welfare of this infant Colony—

Directed by these Considerations, I shall always be glad of your Advice and Assistance, and shall esteem every Proposal of yours of the same Tendency as the most important Service you can render me—

I can with unfeigned Sincerity declare that I enter upon this Station with the most disinterested Views without Prejudice to any Man, or Body of Men, or Retrospect to past Transactions or Disputes; but animated with the warmest Zeal for whatever concerns your Happiness, or the public Utility: sincerely inclined to concur with you in every just and necessary Measure; and fully resolved that if, unfortunately, my Wishes and Endeavours prove fruitless, to be the First to solicit my Recall.—

From such Dispositions on my Part I would willingly hope that you will not be wanting on yours; I flatter my Self that your Zeal for the public Good is, at least, equal, and that you come together in the most dispassionate Temper, divested of Prepossession, Animosity, and Distrust: Heartily disposed to co-operate with me in promoting the public Service, by establishing Order, mutual Confidence, and domestic Tranquility; as there never was a Conjunction when these were more immediately necessary.

However interesting the Objects that used to engage your Thoughts may seem, they certainly bear no Proportion to those that now demand your Attention; Your Religion! Your Liberty! Your All! is at Stake: I do therefore earnestly exhort you to study your true Interests only; not to spend your Time, so valuable to your Selves, and the Public, in the Pursuit of things, trivial or unseasonable, that may defeat the great Ends of your Meeting: Lay aside your Jealousies of each other, and of Government, and do not forget that you are a People who have great and daily Obligations to your Mother Country for Support and Protection in this your exposed and helpless State; that you have a constitutional Dependence upon her, calculated for your Advantage, Security, and the general Good; and that, from a suitable and becoming Conduct alone, you will be intitled to, and may reasonably expect, a Continuation of her Regard and Assistance, and every Sort of Encouragement and Indulgence from me that his Majesty's Instructions (framed upon the purest Principles of Equity and the strictest Regard to your Happiness) can authorise.

It is evident how much you have been the Object of the royal Attention and Favour by the late Establishment of a regular System of Government among You; where-

in your Interest and Convenience were principally consulted.

It is further manifested by the Readiness with which the late Supply of Arms and Ammunition were granted, and Presents for securing the Indians in your Alliance and Defence, at a Time of great Exigence when the very Existence of the State is threatened by the Efforts of a Powerfull and implacable Enemy.

These Considerations ought to inspire you with the deepest Sentiments of Gratitude, and these Sentiments will be best shewn in the Discharge of those Duties you owe your Selves and your Countrey on this important Occasion.

As I know how precious your Time now is, I call you together but for a short Sitting, although upon Points of the last Consequence to your present Safety, Credit, and future Prosperity.

Gentlemen,

It would be needless to represent to you the dangerous Situation you are in, and the absolute Necessity there is of exerting your Selves vigorously by employing, in the most speedy and efficacious Manner, every Means in your Power that may tend to avert those affecting Calamities that have already been so severely felt by some, and are justly dreaded by all his Majesty's American Subjects; notwithstanding his paternal Endeavours to prevent them.

The chief Part of these Misfortunes may not improperly be ascribed to the shamefull Neglect, not to say Perverseness of those who suffer, and by whose timely Efforts and Attention they might in a great Measure have been prevented.

Instructed by so fatal an Example, and urged by so many pressing and alarming Circumstances, I doubt not that you will distinguish yourselves by an uncommon Zeal and Alacrity in concerting and carrying into Execution such Measures as are most suitable to this dangerous Crisis.

When Alarms are sounding from every Quarter, and when so active and formidable an Enemy is upon your Borders projecting by every Means that inveterate Malice can suggest the Accomplishment of your Ruin; No Time is to be lost.

I am sensible it is but little you are able to do yet that little should be done with Spirit and Chearfulness becoming Englishmen who know how to prize the peculiar and inestimable Blessings they enjoy.

The Construction of Log Forts in proper Situations would certainly contribute to your Safety by affording places of Retreat where, upon any suddain Emergency a short Stand might be made untill Succor could arrive: and any Encouragement that can be given towards procuring an Accession of Inhabitants, would accelerate your Prosperity, add to your Strength, and be the best Security in Times to come.

These weighty Considerations naturally suggest the Expediency, and even Necessity of framing forthwith such Laws as shall be most conducive to those salutatory Ends.

Gentlemen of the Commons House of Assembly,

I have ordered the State of the public Debt to be laid before you, and I rely upon your taking the most effectual and least burthensome Method for it's Discharge, and

for preventing the like Incumbrances for the future: As the Maintainance of the public Faith and Credit of this Province is at all Times essentially necessary, more especially at the present when your Safety is so closely connected with it; I therefore hope it will constitute a capital Object of your Deliberations.

Gentlemen of the Council and of the Commons House of Assembly,

I defer Matters of a more general Nature to a future Occasion when the Season will admit of a longer Absence from your private Concerns; and have now only to recommend to you in the strongest Manner Unanimity and Dispatch: and you may depend on my ready Concurrence in every Thing that can promote your real Happiness.

Second. That when the House is sat every Member that shall enter is not to sit down unless he has made an Obeysance to the Chair.

Third. That no Member is to remove out of his Place without just Cause to the Hindrance of others that sit near him and Disorder of the House; but when they must needs go across the House from one Side to the other they are to make an Obeysance to the Chair.

Fourth. That when any Member speaks he is to address himself to the House in General.

Fifth. That when any Question hath been intirely put by the President or Chairman no Member is to speak against the Question before voting.

Sixth. That no Member is to speak twice to any Bill at one Time of reading it, or any other Proposition, unless

it be to explain himself in some material Point of his Speech, but no new Matter; and that not without Leave of the House first obtained: Every Member speaks standing and names not Members of the House Commonly by their Names but the Gentleman that spoke last, last but one, last but two &c or some other Note of Distinction.

Seventh. That no Bill shall be read twice the same Day, and no Committee of the whole House shall proceed on any Bill the same Day the Bill is Committed, and no Report shall be received from any Committee of the whole House the same Day such Committee goes through the Bill when any Amendments are made to such Bill; and no Bill shall be read the third Time the same Day reported from the Committee.

Eighth. That the Clerk is to enter no Order untill the President or Chairman first demands the Assent of the House; And the Clerk is to read every Order first in the House before it be entred.

Ninth. The King, having nothing more at Heart than the Preservation of his good Subjects and Colonies of North America, has come to a Resolution of acting with the greatest Vigour in those Parts the ensuing Campaign, and all Necessary Preparations are making for sending a considerable Reinforcement of Troops, together with a strong Squadron of Ships for that Purpose, and in Order to act offensively against the French in Canada.

It is his Majesty's Pleasure that you should forthwith call together your Council and Assembly and press them in the strongest Manner to raise, with the utmost Expedition, as large a Number of provincial Troops, as may be, for the Service of the ensuing Campaign, over and above what they shall judge necessary for the immediate Defence of their own Province; and that the Troops so raised do act in such Parts as the Earl of Loudoun, or the Commander in chief of his Majesty's Forces for the Time being, shall judge most conducive to the Service in general— And the King doubts not but that the several Provinces, truly sensible of his paternal Care, in sending so large a force for their Security, will exert their utmost Endeavours to second and strengthen such offensive Operations against the French as the Earl of Loudoun or the Commander in Chief for the Time being shall judge ex-



pedient; and will not clogg the Enlistment of the Men, or the raising of the Money for their Pay &c with such Limitations as have been hitherto found to render their Service difficult or ineffectual— And as a further Encouragement I am to acquaint you that the raising of the Men, their Pay, Arms, and Clothing, will be all that will be required, for the Campaign on the Part of the several Provinces; Measures having been already taken for laying up Magazines of Stores and Provisions of all Kinds at the Expence of the Crown.

I cannot too strongly recommend it to you to use all your Influence with your Council and Assembly for the punctual and immediate Execution of these his Majesty's Commands.

I am likewise to acquaint you that the Earl of Loudoun is directed to send forthwith to Virginia a Batalion of regular Forces to be employed as the Exigency shall require for the Succour and Defence of the said Province of Virginia, South Carolina, or any other of the southern Colonies—

The very seasonable and vigourous Measures his Majesty has been graciously pleased to take for the Preservation and Defence of his American Dominions, at this critical Conjunction, has a just Title to our most dutifull and gratefull Acknowledgements.

It is with the utmost Concern we reflect upon the extreme Poverty of the Inhabitants of this Province, as we are thereby deprived of an Opportunity of manifesting our Inclination of contributing effectually to the common Cause, and of demonstrating with what Chearfullness we should embrace every Opportunity of testifying our Loyalty and Zeal for the best of Kings: But when your Honour considers the great Efforts we have made this Session by doubling our Taxes and appropriating so great a Share of our Time and Labour for erecting Places of public Defence in different Districts of this Province; you will, Sir, be convinced that we are unable to do more, and that nothing has been wanting on our Parts but Ability to vie with the most zealous and opulent of his Majesty's Subjects.

It would be Presumption in Us, Sir, to suppose your Honour a Stranger to the melancholly State of this Colony; a bare Recollection of which awakens in Us every Apprehension that can result from a Knowledge of the most imminent and complicated Danger: To find our Selves in a Country surrounded with the most cruel and insolent Savages absolutely destitute of every Means of defending ourselves from their Barbarities in Case of a Rupture; without any Forts that are not utterly in Ruins; or Artillery, but what are in a Manner unfit for Service; without Magazines or Fund to erect them; without any Troops stationed here, save twenty odd Rangers (raised in the Hurry of an Alarm) yet unestablished, unpaid, and undisciplined; without any Vessel of War for the

Protection of our Coast; with but few Inhabitants and those poor and widely dispersed over the Province; open, on the one Side, to every Incursion of Indians; and, on the other, exposed to every possible Insult from the most inconsiderable of the Enemy's Vessels:— In such a Situation our All is precarious.

When we reflect on his Majesty's unabating Goodness to the lowest and most distant of his Subjects, and advert to the recent Instances we have experienced of his paternal Regard to this Colony; When we consider, Sir, the Importance of this Province to the Mother Countrey, and it's being a Barrier to the other Provinces on this Continent against such formidable Neighbours as the French, Spaniards, and some of the most powerfull and numerous of the Indian Nations; and when at the same Time we observe the Manner in which his Majesty's principal Secretary of State has wrote to your Honour (so unsuitable to our present Circumstances) We must conclude that his Majesty and his Ministers have not been so frequently and so fully informed of the real State and Condition of this important Frontier as our necessities and the critical Situation of Things on this Continent required.

The uncommon Zeal your Honour has displayed for the Welfare of this Province, since your Arrival here, justly demands our hearty Thanks and merits our utmost Confidence; It is therefore, Sir, upon you that we must depend for a faithfull Transmission of these Facts to his Majesty in the most clear and precise Manner: not doubting but they will have all the Weight and produce all the Effects we can reasonably desire.

The Experience I have already had of your Zeal and Regard for the Security and Welfare of this Colony, convinces me that every Thing of that Tendency depending upon your Will and Abilities may confidently be expected.— I have therefore only to recommend to you the forming such Laws as will be most conducive to your private Happiness and the public Quiet, by preventing Violence Injustice and Licentiousness and diffusing a Knowledge of the Duty of every Individual in doing which the Institutes and Practice of your Mother Country will be the best general Guide: in those Concerns that are local, and more peculiar to your Circumstances and Situation, the Experience and Example of the neighbouring Province's may be usefull—

I cannot conclude, Gentlemen, without earnestly exhorting you to persevere in that Temper and Moderation that distinguished your last Session, and had so happy an Influence in the Course of your Proceedings—

But we humbly apprehend that many Inconveniencies will still remain, and your Honour's good Intentions to preserve the Tranquility of this Province be in a great Measure frustrated, so long as Indians are permitted to trade within the Settlements of South Carolina, as they are thereby induced to traverse our Settlements, and, from the Length of their Journey, to plunder the Plantations for Subsistence—

We therefore humbly request your Honour to represent to the Governour of South Carolina the ill Consequence of such Indulgence; and concert with him such Measures as may prevent such Irregularities for the future: Or that your Honour will permit trading Houses to be erected in such Situations as that the Inhabitants of this Province may enjoy the Benefit of the Trade whilst they suffer the Injuries consequent to the carrying it on—

What seems more particularly necessary at this Juncture is the putting a Stop to the disorderly and illegal Practices of the back Settlers and Vagrants from other Provinces; and remedying the Defects which Experience has discovered in the Law for preventing a clandestine Traffic with the Indians.

I must acquaint you that the Taxes for the Service of the last Year have fallen short of your Expectations. A State of the Deficiencies occasioned thereby I shall order to be laid before you, together with an Estimate of the Expences for the Service of the current Year, I desire nothing upon this Occasion but what you yourselves

shall think necessary to provide, and I can rely that will be done in a Manner the least burthensome to the People.

In the Mean Time I have sent all the Force I could collect to the westward for the Defence of the back Settlers: and importunately demanded from the Creeks that Assistance which they promised to afford us in Case we should be molested by the Cherokees.

I have set every Person of Influence upon endeavouring to create a Rupture between those two Nations as a Point of the last Consequence; and the better to effect this my Agents have a credit upon me for Goods to the Amount of One thousand Pounds Sterling: Besides an Authority to promise a Reward of near five Pounds Sterling in Goods for every Cherokee Scalp brought in by a Creek or Chicasaw Indian.

In fine I have omitted nothing in my Power and I shall readily promote any thing you may Suggest for the public Service.

What I apprehend to be further necessary is the reviving amending and carrying into immediate Execution the Act for erecting Places of Defence throughout the Province.

And as it may be requisite still more to strengthen the important Post of Augusta, and the Body of Rangers

doing Duty there: And also to cover and protect the Settlements on the Southern Frontier from any IncurSION of the Savages; I trust you will enable me to do it by providing Subsistence for such of the Militia of the Adjacent Parts as may be found necessary to draft for those Important Services.

When I call upon you in this Manner I do not forget the small Abilities of this young Colony, but in your present dangerous Situation you have only this Alternative either to contribute a Part of your Property or Suffer yourselves to be plundered of the whole. I can depend the good Inclinations and Spirit of the People will in a great Degree supply other Deficiencies; And there cannot be a more proper Time to exert that Spirit than when the Preservation of themselves and their fellow Subjects stand so greatly in need of it.

us to have been perpetrated by only a few Cherokee Partizans in revenge of those Cherokees who had been killed by the different Parties of Indians fitted out from this Province The weak and defenceless Condition of the Colony and the calamitous Consequence with which an Indian War would at this Time be attended Oblige us to request your Excellency to suffer Justice to give Way to Prudence and to make Use of every Means in your Power to prevent this Colony from being involved in a War and to restore the public Tranquility.

We cannot without great Sorrow reflect that the Measures which your Excellency pursued and which we Judged so highly laudable and proper for Assisting our fellow Subjects of the neighbouring Province in their War against the Cherokee Indians should have been attended with such Alarming Effects as we could ever wish to employ every Advantage we might be possessed of in promoting the common Felicity of all his Majesty's Subjects regardless of the lessening our provincial Importance and it is therefore with no less concern that we find ourselves pressed by the Attention which we owe to our own Safety the Apparent Impossibility of defending our Properties against the united Force of the Creeks and Cherokees whose Union it is now evident must be the Consequence of any further Attempts to create a Rupture between them to intreat your Excellency to put a Stop to every proceeding of that Tendency or that may appear to draw the Resentment of the Savages upon the Inhabitants of this Province.

the same Time that we congratulate your Excellency on your obtaining a Permission which this Climate, and your intense Application to the Duties of your Station, made necessary; allows us to express our unfeigned Sorrow at being deprived of your Excellency's prudent and upright Administration, to which, under divine Providence, we hold ourselves indebted for that Measure of interior Quiet and Happiness we have hitherto enjoyed.

The many useful Laws which have received your Excellency's Assent, whereby Proceedings in the Courts of Law have been rendered more easy and expeditious, and the civil Rights and Properties of the People fenced against the corrupt Practices of wicked and designing Men; the Ability which you have exerted in healing those unhappy Divisions with which the Colony was rent at your Arrival; the Credit you have restored to the Government; and the Zeal with which you have promoted and encouraged every Measure tending to the public Advantage; intitule your Excellency to our most grateful and hearty Acknowledgements: nor do we esteem it less happy for Us, nor less honourable for you, Sir, that whilst other more opulent and more populous Provinces have been ravaged by a barbarous and cruel Enemy this infant Colony, surrounded with more numerous Savages, an open and defenceless Frontier to our powerful European Enemy, has not been involved in a ruinous and destructive War.

We beg Leave to assure your Excellency that we have the greatest Relyance on your Attention to the Welfare and true Interests of this Colony, so fully manifested in the whole Course of your Administration; and we persuade our Selves that your Excellency will, on your Arrival in England, repeat your Representations of the Dangers to which we are exposed, and the little Proba-

bility there is of our receiving timely and adequate Succour from the neighbouring Provinces should any Calamity befall Us: His Majesty's great Goodness to all his People, and his equal Regard to their Happiness and Prosperity, give us the strongest Reasons to hope that this Colony will soon more amply partake of the Protection afforded to his American Subjects; and that through your Excellency's good Offices the Province will be immediately put in such a State of Defence as shall not only give real Security to its Inhabitants but render it an effectual Barrier to his Majesty's southern Provinces.

I am not insensible of the Merit and Abilities of that Gentleman, and consequently of the Disadvantages I may be under in succeeding him.

But let me assure you Gentlemen that I shall with the utmost Diligence and Integrity discharge my Duty to his Majesty, and, consistent with that, will at all Times and in every Respect, with very great Sincerity endeavour to promote the true Interest and Prosperity of this Prov-

ince: In the Pursuit of which I am well perswaded I shall always meet with the Approbation and Aid of all worthy Men and true Lovers of their Countrey, and therefore cannot fail of your candid Assistance.

The Very short Time I have been amongst you, Gentlemen, has not been sufficient for me to acquire that Knowledge of the state and Condition of the Province necessary to enable me to suggest to you every Circumstance that may be proper for your present Consideration, and which might have made a further Adjournment convenient.

But there is one Object which is very striking, and which requires our immediate Attention; I mean the Dangers this Province in general is exposed to from the Creek Indians: the yet defenceless Condition of the Town; and the necessity of putting it into some better State of Security by finishing the Works already begun, and erecting such other within the Lines and elsewhere as may appear necessary for that End: for although a great deal is already done yet much is still wanting, and a Supply of proper Guns and Ammunition for the Block Houses and small Forts, in Order to render the several Works effectual: and therefore I have thought expedient to continue sitting at this Time.

From our Situation and Circumstances our Plan must chiefly be that of Security and Defence; and although the very great Success with which it has pleased God to bless the Arms of our most gracious Sovereign in the north part of this Continent is a most interesting and important Event in general, and to us in particular, as it gives Us sanguine Hopes that this southern Frontier will very speedily be strengthened, yet, Gentlemen, let Us not be wanting to our Selves, let Us act as becomes Us, and

every Consideration every View in which we see our present Circumstances must excite Us to exert our utmost Efforts at this critical Conjunction.

The Success of the Cherokees against our Sister Colony which the Savages well know to be populous rich and powerful has greatly extended its Influence amongst our Neighbours the Creeks, and made them most insolent and daring: but I trust those Dangers that we are exposed to from thence will animate Us, and convince Us how necessary it is to be vigilant, to be active.

Gentlemen, from your usual and well known Zeal for his Majesty's Service, and Readiness, on all Occasions, to promote the Welfare of this Province, I doubt not but you will chearfully concur with me and make such Provisions as will be sufficient for the immediate Execution of these Salutary Measures, on which the Safety and Tranquility of this Province so much depends. I must likewise recommend to your Consideration the Condition of the Light House on Tybee Island; and also what Laws are near expiring and may require immediate Continuance.

Yet from the pleasing general State of Affairs consequent to the very great Successes which have every where attended the Arms of his Majesty and his Allies, we have the greatest Reason to expect that those gloomy Appearances which sometimes hang over and threaten Us, will soon be totally dissipated, and succeeded by a Serenity that will afford Us uninterrupted Peace and Happiness.

I need not point out to you those little Matters that are in the mean Time so apparently necessary for our Security and Defence, as they must occur to every one; and I am persuaded you will readily join with me in every salutary Measure for the Prosperity of this Province.

Your Committee having taken into Consideration the Extracts from the Journals of the Commons House of Assembly in this Session of Assembly and also the Estimates referred to them by your Honours; And it being the Opinion of your Committee that the said Extracts contained Matters that highly affected the Reputation of the Governour and Council of this Province, your Committee thought it their Duty to inquire into the Truth of the Facts stated in the said Extracts and report the Matter as it should appear to them; your Committee therefore beg Leave humbly to lay before your Honours a just State of the Facts alledged in the said Extracts in so far as they were able to discover it.

The first Resolution of the Commons House of Assembly contained in the Extracts referred to your Committee is in the following Words—

RESOLVED That it is the Opinion of your Committee that the following Sums in the Estimate allotted for public Officers ought not to be paid by the Public of this Province, His Majesty having allowed each a competent Salary, that is to say,

Your Committee were much surprized at the Extent of this Resolution as the Words seemed to imply that not only the Sums stated in the Estimate and herein particularly objected to were improper, but that no Provision whatever should be made by the general Assembly of this Province for defraying the Expence of such Services and the Reason given in the Close of the said Resolution, viz<sup>t</sup>, because his Majesty had allowed each a competent Salary, seemed to your Committee still more extraordinary and expressive of the highest Ingratitude to our Mother Country to whose Bounty this Province has been so much indebted and to whom we owe every Return of Duty and Affection: But in going through the other Parts of the Extracts we join <sup>(sic)</sup> that the Commons House of Assembly had not formed this Resolution without good and sufficient Authority, for in the Extracts it appears that the Committee of the whole House to whom the Tax Bill was referred had on the 21<sup>st</sup> May 1761 made the following Report to the House which Report, by an Order of the House the same Day made, was entred in the Journals of the House and is as follows.

The Committee of the whole House having taken into Consideration the Tax Bill have gone through the same and made several Amendments thereto; and whereas a Debate arose in the said Committee upon the Salaries allowed by this Province to the several public Officers for Business done by them for the Public. and a Member of the Committee having informed your Committee that a Person in Savannah could give some Light into this Matter and that the said Person. viz<sup>t</sup>, William Grover Esq<sup>r</sup> had authorised him to say he was willing to attend the Committee if required; Upon which Information your Committee desired the Attendance of the said William Grover who appeared before your Committee and made and subscribed the following Deposition, viz<sup>t</sup>,

That about three Years ago when in England he received a Letter from the Lord Cadogan acquainting him that the Earl of Hallifax wanted to see him within a Fortnight as his Lordship was going out of Town; That he waited on the Earl of Hallifax who made him an offer of the Office of chief Justice which he now holds in this Province; That his Lordship told him he had applied to the Lords of the Treasury for a Salary for him of Eight hundred Pounds Sterling  $\text{£}800$  Annum and that the Foundation of his Lordship's Application for so large a Salary was that the Province being an Infant did not provide any Fees for the public Officers, but that he was sorry to tell him he could not obtain more than a Salary of five hundred  $\text{£}500$  Annum the largest given to any chief Justice of any of his Majesty's Provinces in America except to M<sup>r</sup> Belcher the chief Justice of Nova Scotia. That he must expect no Fees from the Public of Georgia as the Province provided none in their Tax Bill for the public Officers for public Services. Upon being asked whether Lord Hallifax said that the additional Salaries granted by the Crown were in Lieu of those Fees? He answered that he was informed whilst in England that additional Salaries had been given to the Attorney general and Provost Marshal on Memorials presented by them to the Lords of Trade suggesting that the Province did not raise Money for public Business, but that he could not positively swear Lord Hallifax told him so, but either his Lordship, M<sup>r</sup> Pownall, M<sup>r</sup> Martin, or the Attorney general told him so.

RESOLVED It is the Opinion of your Committee that the said Deposition should be entred in the Journals of this House.

Your Committee cannot help observing in Justification of the Representatives of the People of this Province

that after so solemn a Declaration upon Oath freely and voluntarily made before the Chairman and Committee of the Commons House of Assembly by so high and so much favoured an Officer as the chief Justice who is also of his Majesty's Council for this Province and one who on entering upon his Office had sworn "Not to give any Council or assent to any Thing which may turn to the Hurt or disheriting of the King by any Way or Colour" and who from the Nature of his Office must be supposed perfectly acquainted with the Constitution of great Britain and this Province, that it would have been a betraying the Trust reposed in them, or have shewn a manifest Disbelief of what had been sworn before them, had they then made any Provision for defraying the Expence of any Service performed by any of the Officers of the Crown for the public of this Province: And although by the Estimate annexed to the Tax Bill since passed that House it appears that Provision has, notwithstanding, been made for several of those Services Your Committee cannot suppose the Commons House did so through any Distrust in the Veracity of the Informant, or through any Suspicion of his being actuated more by private Pique or Resentment against some of those Officers <sup>(sic)</sup> than by true Patriotism and Regard for the Ease of the People of this Province, but consider it as the pure Effect of that Duty and Gratitude to the Crown for which the Representatives of the People of this Province have ever been distinguished.

Your Committee cannot but lament that the Zeal and public Spirit of the chief Justice should have carried him so far as to submit himself to be examined upon Oath before a Committee of the Commons House of Assembly, or to attend that House without Leave from your Honours a President which your Committee apprehend to be of most dangerous Consequence and intirely subversive



of the Constitution of the general Assembly of this Province as established by his Majesty's Commission and royal Instructions to his Governour; Nor can your Committee without the greatest Concern observe that the said Officer in his Affidavit has taken upon himself to repeat, as the Words of the Right honourable the Earl of Hallifax first Lord Commissioner for Trade and Plantations, Expressions that do not consist with his Lordships Knowledge of the Facts, for it is Evident from the Titles and Preambles of every Tax Bill that has been passed in this Province that Provision had always and regularly been made for defraying the Expence of holding the Courts of Oyer and Terminer and the Sitting of the general Assembly, And that in the Tax Bill passed in the Year 1757 which was the first Bill to which an Estimate was annexed particular Sums are appropriated for defraying those Expences; And by the Table of Fees settled by the Governour and Council agreeable to his Majesty's Instructions in January 1755 it appears that the several Fees and Charges of the respective Patent Officers, which were by Authority of the several Tax Laws since passed issued and paid by the Governour and Council to those Officers are the same as inserted in the said Table, a Copy of which Table was transmitted immediately after the settling thereof to the Right honourable the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations, and has not been disapproved by their Lordships. Your Committee in full Confidence that the Noble Lords exalted Character cannot suffer the smallest Injury in the Mind of any Subject of England through the Imputations of any Man, suppress those Expressions of Resentment which Hearts glowing with Gratitude to a Nobleman, who next under his Majesty has long been the Guardian and common Patron of the American Colonies, would dictate, and humbly beg Leave to be excused giv-

ing any Opinion of this Matter as a Thing too high for them.

Your Committee to prevent any Misapprehension that the Word Salary, used in the Preamble of the said Report, might occasion, beg Leave to mention that the said Word is there improperly used, there being no Salaries for any public Officers ever claimed or stated in any Estimate, the Sums stated being only on Supposition that the Services to be performed by such Officers will at the settled Rates amount to such Sum nor has any Sum ever been issued to any of those Officers but upon Vouchers setting forth the Service actually done; which Vouchers have always been regularly laid before the Assembly in their next Session.

Your Committee own themselves utterly unable to discover the Reasons on which the next Resolution of the Commons House of Assembly contained in the Extracts referred to them which they find in the following Words, is founded.

RESOLVED That it is the Opinion of the Committee of the whole House that the Charge of the Clerk of the Council for Business done for his Majesty's Council is an improper Charge to the Public and ought not to be paid out of the Money raised by the Public of this Province; by which Appropriation the Fund appointed to defray the Expence of the general Assembly is exhausted and the Clerk of the Commons House of Assembly hath not been paid any Part of his Account amounting to £81.. 0<sup>s</sup>.. 5<sup>d</sup>

Your Committee would observe that the Transmission of Copies and Duplicates of the Proceedings of the Governour and Council to the Board of Trade is required by his Majesty's royal Instructions to his Governour, and

that such Requisition is as much expressive of his Majesty's Regard for the Happiness and Prosperity of his Subjects here, as of Tenderness for his own just Rights and Prerogatives; for as by his Majesty's Commission and Instructions to his Governour, the Governour and Council are not only made the Dispensers of his Majesty's Bounty to the Settlers in this Province but are also vested with the Power of appointing Magistrates, calling of general Assemblies, and many other Matters of high Concernment to the well being of the Colony; and are still further impowered by the several general Assemblies of this Province, and intrusted with the Execution of their Laws: And as the said Governour and Council are only accountable to his Majesty and his Ministers for their due discharging these important Trusts, It surely is of high Concernment to the People of the Colony that their Proceedings should be regularly transmitted to such of his Majesty's Ministers as his Majesty in his great Wisdom thought proper to direct, that such of his Subjects as might be aggrieved by the partial or wicked Resolutions of the Governour and Council might know where to apply for Redress; and that they knowing themselves to be accountable before Judges who were or must be made acquainted with all their Proceedings might be carefull not to use their Powers but for the Purposes for which they were given. Such have been the Sentiments of every past general Assembly of this Province and they therefore in every Year took Care to provide for this Service, and allowed the several Treasurers Credit in their Account for whatever Sums they issued on that Account; and we find it an Article in every Estimate that was ever laid before the Assembly of this Province under the general Head of General Assembly: Which Head we must also observe has ever comprehended the Transmission of public Papers. But what makes this Resolu-

tion still more extraordinary is that it appears by the Estimate annexed to the Tax Bill that a Sum equal to that which was stated in the Estimate laid before the Commons House of Assembly by the Governour's Order for the Clerk of the Council for incidental Business is granted as a Salary to the Clerk of the upper House, who is one and the same Person with the Clerk of the Council, but to whom as Clerk of the upper House no Salary had ever before been granted, nor was any such Charge stated in the Estimate; so that the Province is not at all benefited by this Alteration. With Respect to the latter Part of this Resolution which seems to imply that the Moneys provided for the Clerk of the Assembly had been issued by the Governour and Council to the Clerk of the Council; your Committee have found that the Clerk of the Assembly had been frequently required as well by public Advertisement as by private Notice to bring in his Account to the Clerk of the Council that Payment might be ordered but that he never could be prevailed upon so to do; and therefore the Account of the Clerk of the Council which amounted to £80.. 14<sup>s</sup>.. 8<sup>d</sup>, which is forty Pounds more than the Sum particularly stated in the Estimate delivered in by Governour Ellis's Order to the last House of Assembly, was paid, as far as the Money then remaining in the Hands of his Majesty's Treasurer granted for defraying the Expence of the general Assembly would go, which was £74.. 7<sup>s</sup>.. 4<sup>d</sup>, So that the Sum actually issued for this Service did not amount to more than £34.. 7<sup>s</sup>.. 4<sup>d</sup> over and above what was stated in the Estimate for that Service; Which Sum might and would have been paid to the Clerk of the Commons House of Assembly had he produced his Accounts as required: But your Committee must further observe on this Article that although in the Estimates laid before the Commons House of Assembly the particular Articles are

stated in Order to shew by what Means the Sum stated under the general Head becomes necessary and requisite, but that the Sums granted are granted under the general Heads and the particular Sums that may probably be requisite for such Service not Specified. So that there remains a Discretion in the Governour and Council to issue to the Amount of the Sum provided under the general Head for defraying the Expence of those particular Services in such Manner as they should find most proper. This your Committee apprehend is agreeable to the Practice in England and authorised by Parliament and as the Service had been approved of by the late Assembly (who raised the Money) in granting the whole Sum stated in the Estimate under the Head of defraying the Expences of the general Assembly, Your Committee are of Opinion that the Governour and Council acted in that Matter agreeable to the Powers vested in them by the Tax Bill of that Year, And therefore the Commons House of Assembly have misapprehended the Matter in their said Resolution.

The third Resolution contained in the Extracts referred to your Committee is conceived in the following Terms.

RESOLVED That the Articles in the Estimate under Contingent Services for making and putting Irons on Prisoners and for Iron Work done for one of the Caponiers as a Prison are wrong Charges and ought not to be paid by the Public of this Province.

On this Resolution your Committee must observe that there are no such Articles contained in the Estimate laid before that House as are in the said Resolution mentioned nor were any such ever inserted in any Estimate as your Committee can discover; but if your Committee may be allowed to suppose what the Commons House of

Assembly mean by the said Resolution they apprehend it to be that the Expence of putting Irons on Prisoners and repairing or fitting up a House for a Prison ought not to have been paid out of the Money heretofore granted for Contingent Services; but this also appears to your Committee to be without Foundation for there appears an Article in the Estimate laid before the Commons House of Assembly in the last Year under the Head of Contingencies For the Repair of public Buildings the Sum of £20., and the whole Sum expended in the fitting up the Place now used for a public Goal does not amount to more than £12.. 1<sup>s</sup>.. 0<sup>d</sup> which with £1.. 16<sup>s</sup>.. 3<sup>d</sup> expended in repairing the Court House and £6.. 13<sup>s</sup>.. 4<sup>d</sup> for the Repair of the State House is the whole Sum issued in that Year for the Repair of public Buildings, and consequently the Governour and Council acted legally in issuing the said Sum of £12.. 1<sup>s</sup>.. 0<sup>d</sup> And it is with great Surprize your Committee observe the same Commons House in the same Session passing a Bill for ascertaining the public Lots in the Town of Savannah among which the Lot heretofore allotted and made use of for a public Goal or Prison is particularly mentioned as public Property and by the said Act appropriated to the Use and Purpose of a public Goal or Prison, at the same Time they had come to a Resolution that the Repair of such public Goal or Prison did not belong to the Public to provide for.

Your Committee further observe that with Respect to so much of the said Resolution as relates to the putting Irons on Prisoners your Committee find that such Service had been thought a proper Article in the contingent Expences from the first Session of Assembly that has been held within this Province to the present; And that the Treasurer has regularly been allowed Credit in his Account for such Sums as he so issued: And that the

whole Sum issued within this Year for such Service amounts to no more than £2. 13<sup>s</sup>. 4<sup>d</sup> Which therefore your Committee cannot deem either a wrong or extravagant Charge.

The last Resolution referred to the Consideration of your Committee is contained in the following Words.

RESOLVED That the appropriating Money out of any Fund not expended to the Use of any other Service for which a Fund was raised, or paying Money for any particular Service more than was raised before a further Provision is made by this House, as a manifest Misapplication of public Money and in some Cases contrary to the express Purposes for which such Sums were provided.

Your Committee in so far as they understand the said Resolution do intirely agree with the Commons House of Assembly in the Propriety of it; And they are hopefull that the Commons House of Assembly will ever be carefull to preserve their public Faith by religiously and without Evasion discharging all Engagements that shall be or have been entered into by Authority from them or any preceeding House of Assembly; your Committee are very sure such has always been the Practice of the Governour and Council of this Province, and are equally cert that the same Conduct will ever be held by them.

Your Committee cannot conclude their Report without observing that all the Moneys provided for ordinary Services in the last general Tax Act were issued during the Administration of his Excellency Governour Ellis, and before the Meeting of the last Assembly, which Assembly was dissolved by the Melancholly Event of the late King's Death: but that a great Majority of the Members in the present Commons House of Assembly were also Members

in the said last Assembly, which Assembly after appointing a Committee to inquire into the State of the Province had presented an Address to his Excellency Governour Ellis at his Departure in which they expressed the highest Satisfaction in his Government and their full and intire Approbation of his Conduct throughout the whole Course of his Administration.

I have the Satisfaction to acquaint you that by my last Accounts from the Creek Countrey, those People appear disposed to continue in Friendship with Us; and, as by the Treaty lately made with Attakullakulla, a Peace seems on the Point of being ratified between the Province of South Carolina and the Cherokees, in which Event his Majesty's Troops may be at Leisure to strengthen my Hands; I am hopeful the Creeks will be induced to comply with their Treaties and Engagements, and to make Satisfaction for the Murders Committed by them.

And whilst we have so fair a Prospect of Tranquility, and are Exempt from the Calamities naturally resulting from an Indian War, let Us turn our Thoughts on such Objects as may best promote his Majesty's Service, and the true Interest and Prosperity of this flourishing Province; in which you may always rely on my utmost Assistance and hearty Concurrence.

The Encouragement of Trade is certainly an Object



worthy your Attention, and the Means by which it may be most effectually promoted and extended, within its proper Channel deserves mature Deliberation.

The erecting a Fort at Cockspur seems to be an expedient Measure, as it is not only necessary, in Time of War for the Protection of Trade, and of the Province, from Insults; but also useful, in Time of Peace, for enforcing a due Observance of our Laws. This Island I have taken a View of, and shall send you a Draught of the Channels running by the East End, and up the North and South Sides, with a Plan of some Works proposed, and a Calculation of the Expence, for your Consideration, that if you judge it a necessary Service Provision may be made for the same.

Gentlemen of the Commons House of Assembly,

The Business of the last Session being so long protracted, and the Season of the Year so far advanced, before the general Tax was laid, the Time for levying it became very Inconvenient, which I hope will be avoided for the future; I have ordered a State of it's Produce to be laid before you from which you will see how far the Means proposed for defraying the several Expences from the 29<sup>th</sup> of September 1760 to the 29<sup>th</sup> Sep<sup>r</sup> 1761 have been effectual: Also an Estimate for the usual and necessary Service of the current Year. And when you reflect on the many heavy Articles for the Support and Encouragement of this Province annually paid by the Crown, I am certain you will most chearfully provide for those now recommended to You and for such other Articles of Expence as may concern our immediate Welfare; and that in such Manner as may be most equal, and least burthensome, to the People.

We his Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Council of Georgia in general Assembly met, beg Leave to return your Honour our hearty Thanks for your affectionate Speech to both Houses of Assembly.

Address of the upper House to the Governour.

The grateful Sense we entertain for his Majesty's paternal Regard to the Welfare and Happiness of all his People; of the many and invaluable Blessings we enjoy under his mild and gracious Government, dilate our Hearts with the warmest Sentiments of Duty and Affection to his sacred Person; and animate our Prayers for the long Continuance of his glorious Reign: 'Tis therefore with unfeigned Pleasure we receive the Intelligence your Honour has been pleased to communicate to Us of his Majesty's declaring in full Council his Resolution to perpetuate the Happiness of his People by demanding in Marriage the Princess Charlotte Sister to the Duke of Mecklenburgh Strelitz, and do most heartily participate

with your Honour in the Joy of an Event portending the greatest Felicity to all his Majesty's Subjects.

The Experience we have had of your Honour's Zeal for the true Interests of this Province; the Assiduity with which you have traced the Dissatisfactions of the Indians to their true Source; the Ability you have manifested in removing the frequent Causes of Disturbance with those People by a prudent and equal Distribution of the Trade, and restraining the Irregularities of the Traders; and the tender Regard you have shewn to the Duties of your Station, and the Rights and Priviledges of the Inhabitants of the Province by a strict Attention to the due and impartial Administration of Justice; demand our most sincere and hearty Acknowledgements: And we do assure your Honour that it is the ardent Desire of our Hearts that we may be long blessed with your Honour's upright and disinterested Administration, and that the Prospect we have of your being speedily appointed Governour in Chief of this Province affords Us the utmost Satisfaction.

We are so thoroughly convinced that the Friendship of the Creek Indians is essential to the Prosperity of this Colony, in its present weak and defenceless State, that the Accounts your Honour has lately had of their peaceable Dispositions give Us great Pleasure; and as we have the strongest Reasons to hope that your Honour's Hands will soon be effectually strengthened, we perswade ourselves that you will be thereby enabled to insist on their Compliance with their Treaties and Engagements, and on their making Satisfaction for the Murders committed by them: Nevertheless when we use the oppulent and populous Province of South Carolina, after incurring so vast an Expence, and having the Assistance of so large a Detachment of his Majesty's Troops, making Peace with

the Cherokees without stipulating any Satisfaction for their Breach of Treaties, and Murders perpetrated by those Savages, We cannot sufficiently applaud the Wisdom of your Honour's Conduct in adopting and hitherto persuing a Plan of Moderation and Forbearance; by which the Creeks have been prevented from discovering the Weakness of the Province, and it's Inhabitants have been preserved from sharing in the Calamities of an Indian War.

We are truly sensible how much the Encouragement of Trade deserves our Attention, and do assure your Honour that we shall employ our best Endeavours for extending and promoting it in its proper Channel and rendring it advantageous and beneficial to the Colony; and as we are convinced that the erecting a Fort at Cockspur, is not only proper for the Protection of the Province from the Insults, and it's Commerce from the Depredations, of the Enemy, but also necessary for enforcing a due Observance of the Laws; We shall heartily concur in making Provision for so expedient a Service: And as we have the greatest Reliance on the Integrity of all your Honour's Purposes, we do with great Sincerity assure you that nothing on our Part shall be wanting for enabling you to carry into full Execution such other Matters as you have been pleased to recommend: And that all our Proceedings shall be conducted with that Temper which is most likely to promote Unanimity and facilitate the Business of the Session.

Honourable Gentlemen,

On the 6<sup>th</sup> of Aprill last I sent you a Message relative to the Repair of the Court House and Jury Rooms in Consequence of which the Sum of £70 was granted and appropriated for that Purpose by the last Tax Law; and on Viewing those Buildings and considering which Way they might be repaired and made most Useful at the least Expence I ordered a Calculation to be made by Workmen of the Expence of repairing them as they now stand, and of adding another Story to the Court House: from which it appears that to repair the Court House and raise another Story on the lower Works, which will furnish very convenient Jury Rooms, exclusive of Iron-Work, will amount to £192.. 10<sup>s</sup>— And that to repair the Court House as it now stands, without any alteration or Addition, and build Jury Rooms, will greatly exceed that Sum. It gives me infinite Pleasure and Satisfaction to have it in my Power, and I do with true Zeal, congratulate you upon the very extraordinary Successes which, by the Blessing of Providence, has attended the Arms of our most gracious Sovereign; more especially upon the Reduction of the City of Havannah and its Dependencies to his Majesty's Obedience, an Event of the utmost Importance to the Peace Safety and Happiness of this Province: The Arms of great Britain never shone with greater Lustre, her Glory and Power never more conspicuous, and such a Continuance of Successes must soon lay the Basis of an Honourable and lasting Peace—

I have also the Pleasure to acquaint you that our Indian Affairs promise Quietude.

But Gentlemen however pleasing our Prospect may be, and whatever Blessings and Advantages we enjoy from the paternal Care and Goodness of the best of Sovereigns, yet it becomes us to provide for our own Security and Defence; to take a View of such Forts as have been



thought necessary to erect, to finish those not already compleated, and to keep in Repair such as require it: Which seems very expedient as well on Account of our Vicinity to the Spaniards, as with Respect to our French and Indian Neighbours.

We should Gentlemen consider the very great Burthen and Expence sustained by our Mother Countrey in the Prosecution and Support of this most extensive War, the Benefit resulting from which we participate of; it is therefore our Duty to be vigilant at Home and exert ourselves as far as our Circumstances will admit of, by effecting such Things as the State of our Affairs more immediately requires, and shewing a proper Spirit and Disposition for the general Support and Defence of this Province.

I would also recommend to your Consideration the framing of a proper Law to prevent the spreading of contagious Distempers, and whether a further Provision for establishing a Watch and preventing Fire in the Town of Savannah, and also a Law for building a Work House may not be useful and necessary.

Gentlemen of the Commons House of Assembly

I have ordered a State of the last Years Tax and also an Estimate for the necessary Service and Expences of Government from the 29<sup>th</sup> of September 1762 to the 29<sup>th</sup> September 1763 to be laid before you— I have nothing to desire but what you yourselves must see is for your own immediate Benefit and Advantage, and am perswaded you will with Alacrity provide for whatever may appear to be for the Honour and Interest of the Province.

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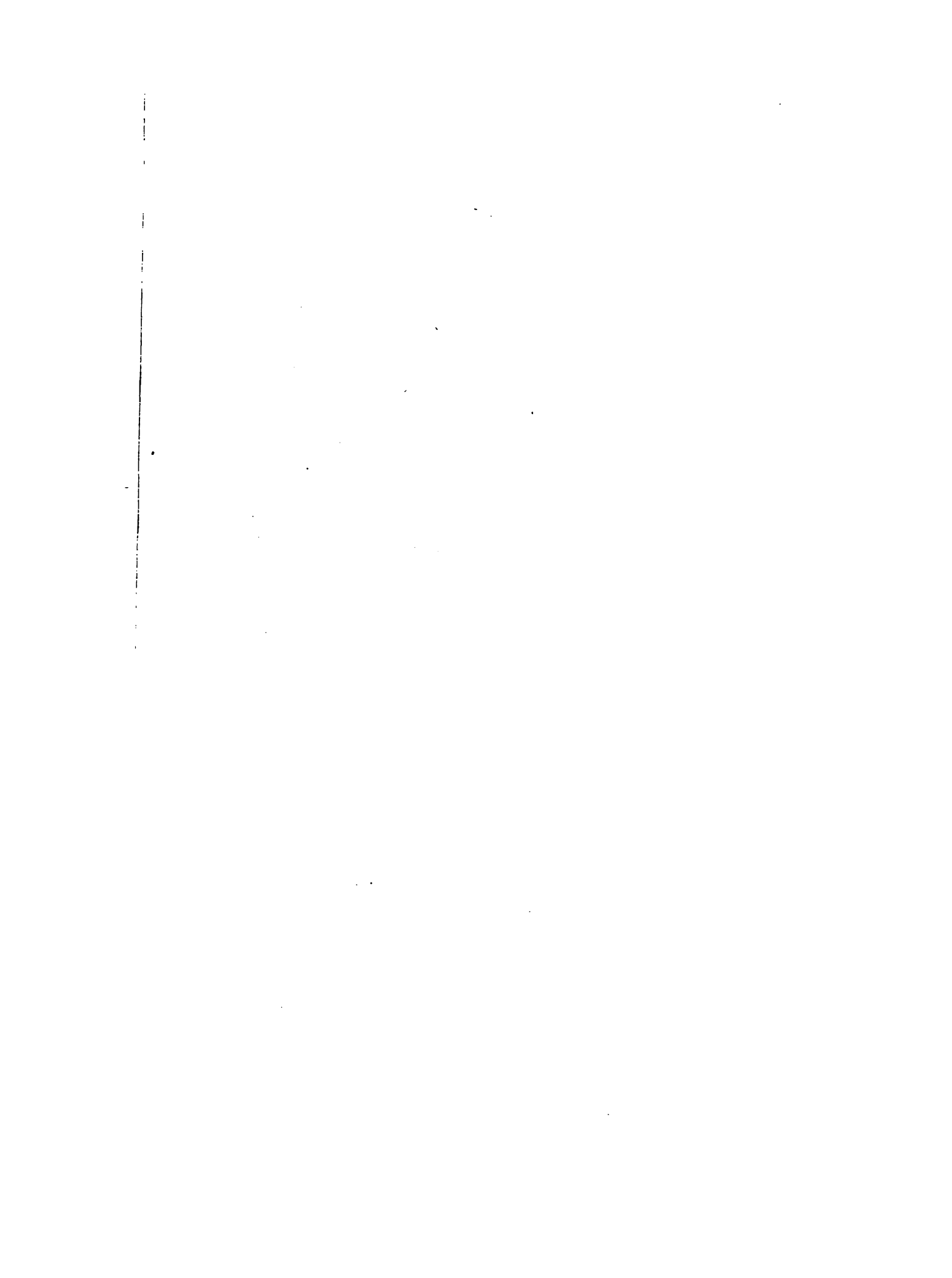
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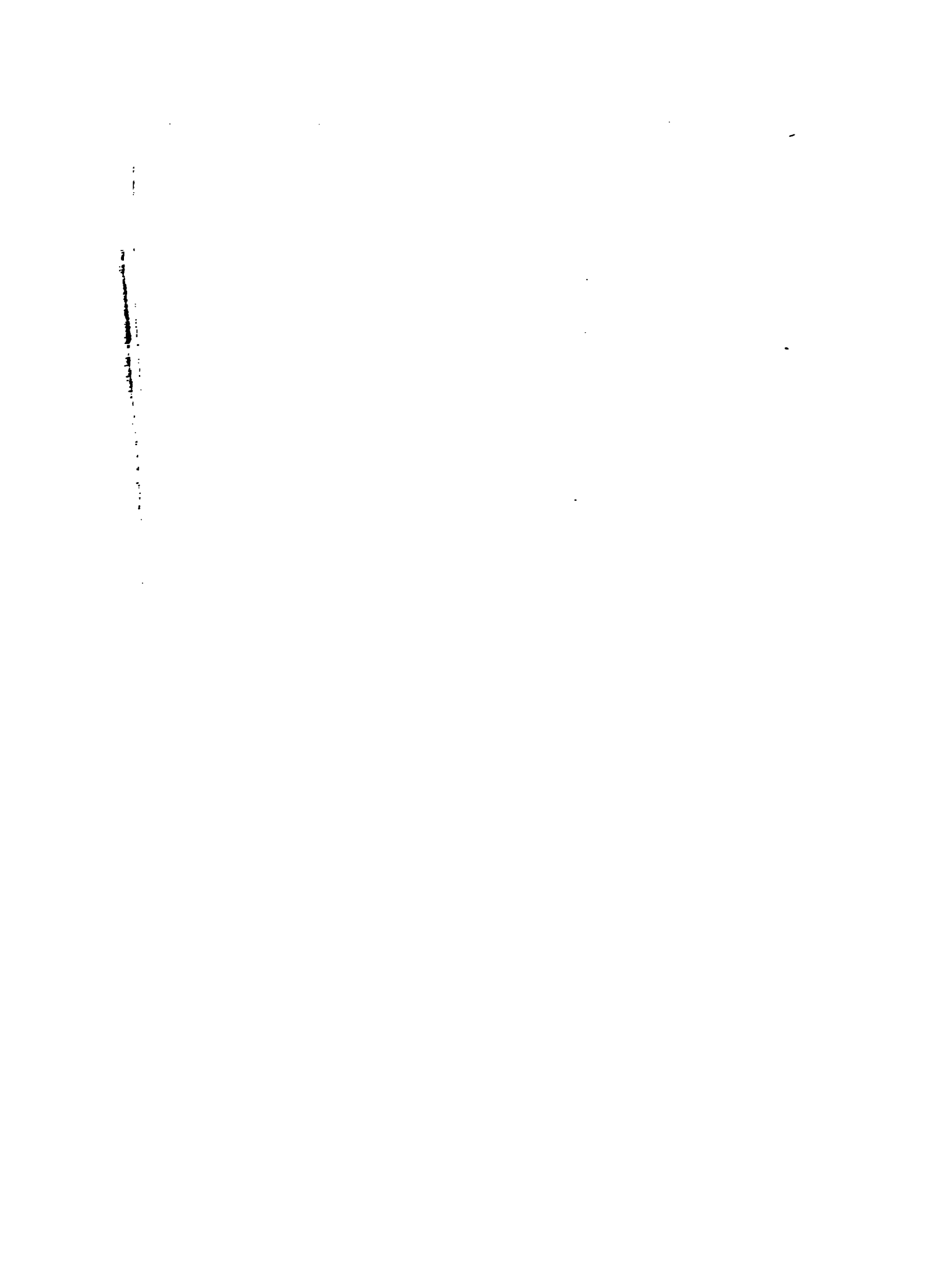






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
