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MINUTES

OF THE

SUPREME EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

PHILADELPHIA, Friday, July 18th, 1781.

An order was drawn on the Treasurer in favour of Mr. John Nichelson, for the sum of three thousand pounds, State money, dated the seventh day of April last, for the purpose of paying to officers and soldiers of the Pennsylvania line, one-third of their de-Petitation certificates, for which the said Nicholson is to account.

On consideration,

Resolved, That Captain Joseph Stiles, Commissary of Military Stores, be directed to deliver to the Hon'ble Thomas Smith, Esquire, three hundred weight of gun powder and four hundred weight of [96], to be by him forwarded to Colonel George Ashmant, Lieutenant of the county of Bedford, for the use of the militia of the said county.

WEEREAS, A number of well affected inhabitants of Charles two, who have suffered a long and painful captivity, have been "Ichanged and arrived in this city, after having been plundered by the common enemy, and thereby left destitute of the means of prowing accommodations suitable to their merit and rank in life:

And Whereas, It is an indispensible duty to provide them with mitable quarters free of any expense :

Resolved, That the Deputy Quarter Master General of this city immediately accommodate all such persons as shall apply to him

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under the above description, with suitable apartments, in such houses in this city and liberties as are most convenient for that purpose, having due respect to the numbers of persons in family and the size of the houses; and that the wardens of the city, or so many as may be necessary, be requested to assist the said Quarter Nastor in the said service.

WHEREAS. The Hon'ble the delegates of the States of Virginia have presented a memorial to this Board, representing that fiftees bales of merchandize, the property of the said State, have been sttached, by virtue of a process issuing out of the Court of Common Pleas of this city, at the suit of Simon Nathan, at present a resident of this State. That the said merchandize is now accordingly arrested in the hands of Messrs. Mifflin and Butler as garnishees. That the said memorialists apprehend that the State of Virginia, now in union with this and the other United States of America, as free, sovereign and independant, cannot nor ought not to be in any respect held to answer in the Courts of Justice of any other State, nor reduced to the alternative of yielding its property to a claim made by any individual in any such court, and that such procedure is in other respects dangerous to the publick interests: Whereupon, due deliberation having been had, and the opinion of the Attorney General of the State taken in the premises,

Resolved, First. That the said process is derogatory to the rights and sovereignty of the Commonwealth of Virginia as a free sovereign and independent State, and that farther procedure thereon ought not to be had.

Newardly. That the Sheriff of the city of Philadelphia, and all other civil officers of this State, concerned in the arrest or detention of said goods, do immediately deliver the same to such persons as may be appointed in behalf of said State by the Homorable Polegrates thereof, in Congress assembled, and forbear farther molestation or disturbance of the said State or its legal agents in the premisers.

AND WREERAS. The said Simon Nathan, the plaintiff in midsuit, having been brought before this Board, examined touching his conduct, and having declared that he had taken out the said process merely as a matter supposed of right, and being ignorant of the privihelpes of the Nate in this respect: The Sheriff and Prothonotary allocities, the same, and the delegator of Virginia having signified their desire that as this is the first instance of such aggression, no factor notice may be taken of any of the parties.

An order was drawn on the Treasurer in favour of Major James Parr, for the sum of six hundred pounds specie, payable out of the subscription raised pursuant to a vote of the twenty-second day of June last, for the purpose of raising three hundred Riflemen for the service of the United States, for which he is to account.

WHEREAS, It appears by a certificate, signed by William Pollard of this city, that there is due from him to William Price, formerly of this city, merchant, an attainted traitor, the sum of three hundred and sixty-seven pounds eleven shillings and four pence, Pennsylvania currency, and the same becoming the property of the State, ought to be paid to the Agents for Forfeited Estates in the city of Philadelphia; wherefore,

Ordered, That if the said sum be not accordingly paid on or before the first day of August next, the Attorney General be required to sue for the same without further delay.

A letter was read from David Brearly, dated Trenton, June 28th, 1781, and directed to the Hon'ble Thomas McKeau, Esquire, Chief Justice of Pennsylvanis, informing that a certain Joseph Shackleton alias Smith, who is charged with having committed a robbery in Philadelphia; and thereupon,

Ordered, That the said letter be sent to the Honourable George Bryan, Eeq'r; that he be requested to inquire into the said case, and, if he shall think it proper, to send for the said Shackleton, at the expense of the county of Philadelphia.

On consideration,

Resolved, 'That the Commissioners for selling the city lots do suspend the sale of such lots as are now within the inclosures of St. Peter's church, and also of the Presbyterian meeting house in Pine street, until farther orders.

A letter from divers inhabitants of the town of York, in the county of York, in this State, of the seventh instant, was read, informing that the office of Clerk of the Market in the said town is now vacant, and recommending Mr. John Ehrman as a proper person to be appointed to said office ; thereupon,

Resolved, That Mr. John Ehrman be appointed and commisnioned to be Clerk of the Market in the town of Yozk aforesaid. The following proclamation being read and considered, the same was agreed to and ordered to be published, vist :

By his Excellency JOSEPH REED, Esquire, President, and the Supreme Executive Council of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, Divers ill-disposed persons have manufactured or imported into this State quantities of base metal, in the similitude of British half pence, but much inferior in value and weight to gonuine British half-pence, to the great depreciation of that coin, the injury of the community in general, and the poor in particalar, such practices having a natural tendency to raise the necessarys of life and introduce new confusion in the currency of the country : We have, therefore, thought proper to prohibit, and do hereby strictly enjoin all officers employed in the receipt of taxes or other publick dues, not to receive such hase coin in any payments whatsoever; and do earnestly recommend to all the faithfull inhabitants of this State to refuse it in payment, and by all other lawful ways and means discourage the currency thereof; and we do in a special manner direct and enjoin all Magistrates, Sheriffs, Constables and other civil officers within this State, to make due inquiry after offenders in the premises, that they may be brought to speedy and condign punishment.

Given by order of the Council, under the hand of his Excellency JOSEPH REED, Ecquire, President, and the less seal of the State, at Philadelphia, this fourteenth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one.

The Board taking into consideration the resolve of the Hon'ble Congress of the United States, passed the twelfth instant, setting forth that "Whereas, It has been represented to the United States, "in Congress assembled, that there are many French scamen, sub-"jects of his most Christian Majesty, in the United States, em-"ployed on board armed and other vessels in the service of the "mid States or the citizens thereof : And whereas, It has also been "represented that the said seamen are necessary for compleatly "manning the squadron under the Count De Barras; all officers, "therefore, commanding armed or other vessels, under commis-"sions from the United States, in Congress assembled, are hereby "ordered and directed immediately to deliver to the said Count De "Barras, or to any person or persons by him appointed to receive "the same, all French seamen, subjects of his said Majesty, who "are or may be entered on board their vessels respectively; and if "any officer commissioned as aforesaid, shall neglect or refuse com-"plying with this order, he shall forfeit his commission, and be "subject to such other punishment as to right shall appertain ; and "it is earnestly recommended to the Legislatures and Executives "of the several States to give effectual aid and support for the exe-"cuting this order, and also for delivering to the Count De Barras "all French seamen, as aforesaid, that may be otherwise employed "within their respective jurisdictions ;" whereupon,

Resolved, That all Merchants, Captains of vessels, and other citizens or inhabitants of this State, be strictly enjoined to pay due obedience to the above resolve, and all Magistrates, Sheriffs, and Constables, and other civil officers, be directed to aid and astist such persons as may be legally appointed by the Commander of the Fleet of his most Christian Majesty, in apprehending and securing such French mariners, as they will answer the contrary at their peril.

An order was drawn on the Treasurer in favour of Hon'ble John Lacey, Jun'r, Esq'r, for the sum of twenty-five pounds specie, in part of his pay as a member of this Board, for which sum he is to account.

A petition from George A. Baker, was read, setting forth that Captain Robert Bothel purchased at a vendue of confiscated estates, the messuage and lot of ground late the estate of Abraham Carlisle, an attainted traitor; that the right of the said Robert Bethel is since become vested in him, the said George A. Baker; that the widow of the said Abraham Carlisle is in possesion of the premises, and refuses to deliver them up; whereupon, he hath prayed the aid of this Board to cause possesion to be given him, agreeable to the act of Assembly; and the same act being considered,

Resolved, That the Secriff of the city and county of Philadelphia do give possession of the said premises to him, the said George A. Baker, in due form of law, he paying the incident expenses.

A petition from Edward Evans and John Linnington, was read, setting forth a claim to a city lot, appartement to the original parchase of William Salway, and praying a hearing in the premises; and the same being considered; thereupon,

Resolved. That this Board cannot grant the prayer thereof, or direct the Attorney General to receive a declaration in ejectment for said premises, until the possession thereof be given up to the publick, and that in failure thereof, the Wardens be directed to execute the late act of Assembly intitled "An Act for the better "support of the publick credit by an immediate sale of the lauds "therein mentioned, and fully securing the purchaser thereof in "their titles, and also for preserving the common lands appurte-"nant to the city of Philadelphia and other towns in this State, "from unwarrantable encroachment," such possession being deemed and an unwarrantable usurpation of publick property.

"SIR :-- According to the form and effect of sundry resolutions "of the Honourable the General Assembly of the Commonwealth "of Pennsylvania, of the twenty-fifth day of June 1781, you are "hereby required to pay or cause to be paid to Thomas Smith, Ke-"quire, Continental Loan Officer, the sum of one hundred and for-"ty-six thousand two hundred and fifty pounds, being in payment "of the ballance due to the United States for four-tenths of the " bills of credit to have been issued according to the resolutions of "Congress of the eighteenth of March, 1780, for which this shall "be your sufficient warrant.

A return of Justices for the township of Milford, in the county of Cumberland, was read, by which it appears that Thomas Beale, William Bell, Alexander Robinson, and John Williams, were duly elected by the freeholders of the township aforesaid; whereupon,

Resolved, That Thomas Beale and William Bell, Esquires, be appointed and commissioned to be Justices of the Peace for the county of Cumberland.

An order was drawn on the Treasurer in favour of Colonel Jacob Morgan, for the sum of three hundred and ten pounds, one specie, for the purpose of procuring supplies of provisions for the army, for which he is to account as Superintendant of the Commissioners of Purchases of the several counties.

Mr. Philip Audibert, Deputy Paymaster General of the United States, presented to the Council an order of Congress in the following words, vizt:

For 4,000 dollars, new emission.

GENTLEMEN: — Pay to John Pierce, Paymaster General of the United States, or his assistant, the sum of four thousand dollars, new emission, to enable him to discharge the warrant upon him for three months pay to the invalid regiment, for which sum the said Paymaster General is to be accountable.

A memorial was read from Samuel Preston Moore, Henry Hill and Richard Wells, representing that they are intitled to sundry lots and liberty lands, appurtenant to original purchases, in right of divers therein named, and declaring a readiness to produce the several rights therein named, before Council, at such time and manner as they shall be pleased to direct; and requesting the respective lots appurtenant to the said purchases may not be sold amongst others, but that the same may be laid out agreeable to the first intention of the grants.

Ordered, To lie on the table.

The Council taking into consideration the case of Mr. William Pollard, who has refused to pay to the Agents the monies in his hands late the property of William Price, an attainted traitor; and thereupon,

Ordered, That the Agents for Confiscated Estates for the city of Philadelphia, be directed to lay before the Attorney General Mr. Pollard's written acknowledgment of the debt due from him to the said Price, and inquire of him whether any more summary process may be had for the recovery of the same than that directed in common cases, and if there be, to issue the same, otherwise to issue common process for the recovery of the said money, with the penalty, as by law directed.

WHEREAS, It appears by the accounts rendered by Archibald M'Clean, Esquire, that the sum of thirty-one pounds seventeen shillings and six pence, State money, hath been advanced by him to Major James Moore; therefore, Ordered, That the said Major James Moore do repay the said

The Board taking consideration the resolution of the Honourable House of Assembly of the twelfth day of March last, vizt :

IN GENERAL ASSEMBLY, March 12th, 1781.

WHEREAS, The confederation of the United States is now happily compleated, and an opportunity is thereby offered to bring to final settlement the long depending dispute between this State and that of Connecticut; therefore,

Resolved, That it be recommended to the Supreme Executive Council, to take all necessary and expeditious measures for the consideration and determination of the said dispute. agreeable to the ninth article of the Confederation of the United States.

Whereupon,

Resolved, That the following petition be presented, vist:

To the Honorable the Congress of the United States of America.

The petition of the President and Supreme Executive Council of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, humbly sheweth :

That a controversy has long subsisted between the said Commonwealth and the State of Connecticutt, respecting sundry lands laying within the northern boundary of the State of Pennsylvania, and as your petitioners alleged, clearly comprehended within the limits of the charter or grant made by Charles the Second, and dated the fourth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand six hundred and eighty, to William Penn, Esquire, the first proprietary of Pennsylvania, vizt:

All that tract or part of land in America, with all the Islands therein contained, as the same is bounded on the east by Delaware river, from twelve miles distant northwards of New-Castle town unto the three-fortieth degree of northern latitude, if the said river doth extend so far, but if the said river shall not extend so far northward, then by the said river so far as it doth extend; and from the head of the said river, the eastern bounds are to be determined by a meridian line to be drawn from the head of the said river unto the three and fortieth degree; the said land to extend westward five degrees in longitude, to be computed from the said eastern bounds; and the said lands to be bounded on the north by the beginning of the three and fortieth degree of northern lattitude, and on the south by a circle drawn at twelve miles distance from New Castle northward and westward unto the beginning of the fortieth degree of northern latitude; and then by a straight line westward to the limits of longitude above mentioned.

That by an act of Assembly passed the twenty-seventh day of November, 1779, the right and title to all and singular the premises, is now become duly vested in the Commonwealth.

That certain persons calling themselves the Susquehanna company, first set up a claim upon the said lands usually called the Wyoming lands. That the said claim was first patronized, and afterwards adapted by the Legislature of the State of Connecticutt, and sundry settlements on said lands under the authority of said State.

That your petitioners do most expressly deny that the State of Connecticutt hath any just or lawful right claim to the premises above mentioned, or any other comprized within the limits aforesaid, and do pray the Hon'ble Congress to grant them a hearing in the premises, agreeble to the ninth article of the Confederation and perpetual Union entered into by the United States of America.

Ordered, That the Agents for Confiscated Estates in the county of Chester, be directed not to receive any money on account of the sale made by them of Hogg Island, or any part of it, on Saturday last, the said sale being directly contrary to the orders given them by this Board; and that the agents concerned in the said sale, be ordered to attend in the Council chamber, as soon as may be, to give to the Board an account of their proceedings in that male.

'The Board taking into consideration the letters received from the Hon'ble Mr. Searle, by which it appears that unexpected embarrassments and obstructions have impeded the designs of his mission, and Congress have reasonable prospects of a considerable supply of cloathing and military stores, which make it less necessary to involve this State in partial expense:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that Mr. Searle do return as soon as conveniently he can after the receipt of this minute, unless he should have actually obtained a loan of money, or entered into a positive contract for the articles enumerated in his instructions, for the completion of which his attendance should be absolutely necessary.

A deed was examined and signed by his Excellency the President, to Dr. James Hutchinson, of the city of Philadelphia, practitioner in physick, conveying a certain messuage or tenement and plantation or tract of land situate on the river Schuylkill, in the township of the Northern Liberties, in the county of Philadelphia, and according to a late survey thereof, bounded and being as follows, to wit: Beginning at a white oak tree standing by the side of the river Schuylkill aforesaid; thence extending by land late of Samuel Shoemaker, south fifty-one degrees east fifty-six perches to a white oak tree; thence still by the same land south forty-six degrees thirty minutes east forty-three perches to a post standing by the side of a road or lane leading from Wissaheckon road to Schuylkill; thence along the said road er lane south sixty-one degrees

thirty minutes west ninety-five perches to a post; thence by land now or late of John Macpherson north forty-eight degrees thirty minutes west sixty perches and six-tenths of a perch to the side of the river Schuylkill aforesaid ; thence up the said river the several courses thereof eighty-nine perches and five-tenths of a perch to the place of beginning; containing forty-four acres and one hundred and twenty-two perches, be the same more or less : Seized and sold agreeable to law, as the estate late of Joseph Galloway, an attainted traitor, to the said Dr. James Hutchinson, for the sum of twenty-four thousand and four hundred pounds Continental money; subject to the yearly ground rent of ten bushels and two tenth parts of a bushel of good merchantable wheat, payable to the Trustees of the University of this State; three-fourths of which sum he hath paid into the hands of the Agents of Confiscated Estates in the said county, the remaining one-fourth being reserved for the purpose aforesaid. Deed dated the twenty-third day of July instant.

WHEREAS, This Board lately taking into consideration the state of the prisoners in the old gaol, and the dangers to which they, as well as the inhabitants of this city, might be exposed from contagious disorders arising. from their and the narrow limits of that place of confinement, did dismiss a number who have been in long confinement, and Samuel R. Fisher having now sustained an imprisonment of two years upon a conviction of misprision of treason, and being represented to us in a bad state of health, and that his life may be endangered by his continuance in prison during the summer months:

Resolved, That so much of the sentence as inflicts imprisonment during the war be remitted, and he be discharged from his present confinement, paying the costs and charges which have arisen on the prosecution, and that the Secretary do make out a pardon in form.

A letter from John Ord, Esquire, of the fourteenth instant, setting forth his intention of going into the country for the recovery of his health, and requesting that his son-in-law, Mr. William Webb, may be appointed a Notary Publick to transact the busimess of his office in his absence, was read 4 and thereupon,

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, The public service requires a speedy exertion by the authority of this State to procure the most immediate transportation by water; we have, therefore, thought proper, and do hereby lay an embargo on all river oraft and vessels of and under the burthen of one hundred tons; to which all the citizens of the State and others are required to conform and govern themselves accordingly, as they will answer the contrary at their peril.

GENTLEMEN-The usual engagements of this season of the year, and the time allotted for public business, will not permit our laying before you any other than that which is indispensably necessary: But we think it highly proper to inform you, that the deficiency of recruits proposed to be raised by the late acts of Assembly, has been very considerable, and that there are some material defects in those acts, of which the delinquent classes have availed themselves, and which will require your attention, that justice may be done to all, and this important service properly completed. We would also recommend a provisionary act in favor of those virtuous inhabitants of Carolina, who, after suffering greatly in the common cause, have, with a few domestics, retired into this State from the oppressions of the tyranny of the British government: By the operation of a law of this Commonwealth, just and humane in itself, and highly reasonable when extended only to the proper inhabitants of this State, they will be in danger of loosing the services of those few domestics they have saved from the depredations of the enemy, unless some cautionary regulation is soon adopted, and which we make no doubt you will provide.

The Secretary will deliver you sundry papers relative to the above, and some other important concerns of the State; and we shall chcerfully concur in every measure tending to facilitate the public business with harmony and dispatch.

Gentlemen :---On the representation of the General officers of e line, and our own knowledge of the difficulties the officers susin in point of subsistence, we think it necessary to recommend the Honorable House the passing a permanent law to empower e Justices of Peace to provide suitable quarters for troops march-

ing or occasionally resident in this State, whose necessities may require such provision; and we are of opinion it would redound much to the credit of the State to include in such a bill those of our virtuous countrymen from other States who may be compelled by the oppressions of the enemy to seek an asylum in the State of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Lewis and Mr. Rush on the part of the complainants & petitioners, against the election of a Councillor for the county of Philadelphia, and Mr. Bradford, Mr. Sergeant and Mr. Ingersoll in support of the said election, attending the Council, proceeded to hear the Counsel upon the evidence given in and now lying before the Board, the said evidence having been reported by a committee of Council, and read before the Council at several meetings of the Council previous to this day.

The complaint and petition against said election was read; and also the following tweenty-three charges respecting the same, vist:

To his Excellency the President and the Honorable the Supreme Exceutive Council of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania :

The subscribers, in behalf of themselves and others, freemen and inhabitants of the county of Philadelphia, who lately petitioned this Honorable Board against certain abuses and irregularities which happened at the late general election for the said county, do, in obedience to an order of this Board for that purpose made, humbly charged and shew:

1. That when the militia of a part of the State were collected for the defence of the county, at the time and place in the petitions now depending before this Board mentioned, Jonathan D. Sergean, Esquire, made his appearance there, in order, by the undue mean hereafter mentioned, to procure their votes and interest at the them next ensuing election for the county of Philadelphia, which Men

Hanna, Aid-du-Camp to General Lacey, who then commanded at that station, gave orders to the officers of the militia of the county of Philadelphia to meet at the General's quarters on a Sunflay evening shortly preceding the said election, upon business of great importance, as he termed it.

2. That in compliance therewith, Col. McVeagh, Colonel Bitting, Major Jolly, Major Hart, Major Bayard, Captuin Nice, Captain Irwin, Captain Beck, Captain Downing, Captain Dierman, Captain Buskirk, Captain Peterman, Captain Loury, Captain Hinds, Captain Schneider, Captain Roberts, Adjutant Potts, Quarter Master Davis, Lieutenant Kite, Lieutenant Knox, Lieutenant Axe, Lieutenant Euston, Lieutenant Gorgas, Lieutenant Duffield, Epsign Schlomaster and Ensign Jones, with many other officers of the militia aforesaid, whose names are at present unknown to the subscribers, but which, when discovered, they humbly pray may be added hereto, met at the said General's quarters on the said Sunday evening, and then and there, by the undue procurement of the said Mr. Sergeant, held a private meeting, apart from their men, with the said General, his Aid-du-Camp, Major Hanna, Major Bayard, and the said Mr. Sergeant, not upon the subject of warfare, but of the election; and the said Mr. Sergeant having sufficiently harangued them thereon, produced to them tickets containing the names of divers persons to be proposed and run as candidates at the anid election, and did very untruly and unjustly, and in order to impose upon and deceive the said officers and men under the command of the said General, declare and say that the same ticket had been agreed upon by a majority of electors for the said county, who had shortly theretofore met at Neff's tavern, for the purpose of agreeing on a proper ticket, when, in truth and in fuct, the same ticket had not been so fixed and agreed; whereby the said officers and men were wrongfully imposed upon and deceived.

8. That the said officers being, by the unfair practice aforesaid, deceived, met the General again the next morning, upon like invitation, at his quarters, and wishing to support the ticket which they were led to believe had been agreed upon by their friends as aforesaid, subscribed a written agreement, drawn up by Major Hanna, to support the said ticket by their votes and those of their men, so far as should be in their power.

4. That the plan being thus agreed on, General Lacey desired the said officers to apply to him by an address, in writing, for liberty to go to the said election, which was accordingly done, and the permission granted, and the Clerks of the different companies, together with Major Bayard, Mr. Strickman, Mr. Redman, Andrew Coxe, and many others, unknown, were called upon by the General's Aid du-Camp to repair to his quarters, to write a sufficient number of tickets, to be delivered to the men at or near the election ground, except that the name of a certain gentleman, against whom the body of the officers objected, was left out.

5. That the matters being thus prepared, General Lacey, in order the more effectually to secure the success thereof, issued his General Orders on the seventh day of October last, the substance of which is contained in the petitions now depending before this House, and a true copy whereof will be exhibited, and which could not have been better calculated to prevent the above mentioned deception from being detected till after voting.

6. That upon the eighth day of October, a part of the militia marched, under the command of Colonel Bitting, for Wents's tayern, and the remainder of them under Colonel McVeaugh, to Garmantown, at which places the said elections were held; and before their arrival there the said tickets were delivered them by the said Colonels, and by their orders; and although most of the said offeers shewed a disposition favorable to liberty and to the rights of the people, yet being under military law and rigid military orders, they had it not in their power, without disobedience of orders and the dangers of subjecting themselves to military punishments, the allow the men time, opportunity, or the necessary convenience of detecting the said deception, by consulting with their friends, or of learning what ticket had been agreed upon by them at Naff's, or who were proposed as candidates, or of acting and judging like freemen, as they ought to have done.

7. That Colonel McVeaugh, through a sense of his duty as an officer, which, from the extraordinary nature of his orders, was unfortunately opposed to his duty as a citizen, marched his men to the election ground in their ranks, with drums beating and coloan flying, under the command of himself and his said officers, with their swords drawn, in all the display of military parade, and not finding the election opened, from the same sense of duty, marched them to a distance, and there kept them separated from the body of their friends till they marched in companies (except Erwin's company, which he dismissed) to the election ground, and voted in that manner, without being at all examined as to their qualifiestions, and it was not till then they were allowed refreshment, of which they stood in great need. That the battalion under the casemand of Colonel McVeaugh, had their said tickets delivered them at Jenkinstown, by his orders; and although they were told they should have an hour to alter them, yet only a part of them, by s tender regard of their officers, could procure pen, ink, or paper, that they were obliged to march before the expiration of the said hour, before they could consult with their friends, and even this time was not industriously employed, as they expected to have fall time and opportunity at Germantown, as of right they ought, but which the Colonel, from the nature of his orders, was obliged w refuse them.

8th. That Adjutant Barlet, of Colonel Bitting's battalion, define ered bundles of the said tickets to the said officers and the the election ground, and they were afforded neither suffic

nor opportunity to alter them, that they marched to the election ground, and after drawing up before the door, left their ranks man by man to give in their said tickets.

9. That on their march from Newtown to the election ground, Colonel Bitting told the men they must give in the said ticketa, and upon their shewing their disapprobation thereof, he said every man who refused was a tory and he would whip him.

10. That at Germantown Colonel McVeaugh with his drawn sword, and Major Hanna, ordered the men in a military manner to keep in their ranks and not to speak to any body, and when some of them attempted to get drink or to rest themselves, they were by the same officers, and by Captains Bock, Lewellen, Young, a Sub-lieutenant, and many other officers, ordered back and were obliged to obey.

11. That when John Shubert, who had been sick, and left Captain **Erwin's company** for a time, and returned with a number of tickets which the men of the said company gladly accepted and gave in, he was reprimanded by Colonel M'Veaugh for so doing.

12. That when Phiness Roberts, who had two sons and a sonin-law in the militia, who had been ordered into Jersey upon duty. attempted to speak to them in the ranks relative to their welfare, at the request of their wives and families, he was reprimanded by Major Hanna and another officer, whose name is unknown, for so doing, and was told he had no business to speak to the men or to attempt biassing their minds.

13. That Phineas Roberts, Daniel Rees, Adam Whartman, George Oceaninger, Michael Whitmar, and many others qualified to vote, returned without voting at all, by reason of there being no freedom of election.

14. That James Fulton, an Inspector at Germantown, after receiving two tickets and the electors had retired, opened, read, and tere them to pieces.

15. That at Germantown there were four boxes to put the tickets in and only four Clerks, namely : Archibald Engle, Mr. Oliver, Mr. Norton, and Mr. McNet, who could, therefore, be no check upon each other, and who were not under oath.

16. That at Germantown Major Bethel, Captain Ashmead, and Captain Nice, who were no officers of the election, acted as Inspectors, while two of the Inspectors, whose names are unknown, were asleep, and the said Bethel, Nice, and Ashmead, counted all the tickets contained in one of the boxes, to the amount of near two hundred, without being on oath.

17. That a large bundle of tickets was delivered by Captain Haslet, an Inspector at Germantown, out of his box to Mr. Engle,. to call out, which he did, though he was not an Inspector.

• 18. That the election at Wents's was not opened till near four e'clock, although by law it ought to have been done before two e'clock.

19. That at Wents's many of the Inspectors did not stay till the tickets were counted, and that Andrew Knox, Esquire, who acted in the double capacity of Deputy of the Sheriff and as Judge of the election, also acted as Inspector, without really being such, delivered the tickets of the box for a time and called out the names, and then desired Jacob Linld, who was not an Inspector, or under oath, to do for him, which he did; that Mr. Liuld said as the tickets appeared to be all camp tickets he might as well lump them, and did so, without calling out the names, to the amount of upwards of seventy, and Mr. Knox did not return until the business was ended.

20. That at Wontz's, Henry Giger, an Inspector, admitted Jacob Strechler to give in his vote, although he was under age and well known to the Inspector.

21. That at Germantown, Jacob Ashton, an Inspector, did, without asking a single question, receive the votes of Daniel Delary and Simon Ramston, two apprentice lads under twenty-one years of age and well known to the said Inspector.

22nd. That at the election at Wentz's, Colonel Bitting finding some of his men were altering the tickets, reprimanded and alter them therefor, tore the tickets they were getting, to pieces will er pilt la ordered his clerks to write new ones.

23. That John Whitman, upon being desired by his father the election at Wentz's, to let him see his ticket, was' total by Lieutenant, Adam Gilbert, that if he or any of the men did pass the tickets they had delivored them, they would be ill treated and despised when they got to camp, upon which the said John; we and the law has the daring to alter his ticket, did not vote at all.

Dissentient:

I. Because divers matters are set forth and inferences drawn in the specific charges touching the said election, which not being

criminal in themselves, can only become so by the express prohibition of some municipal law or parliamentary usage, which in such case becomes law. In a cause, therefore, of such magnitude and importance, which has drawn the attention of other States, and raised so great a ferment in this; we esteem ourselves wholly inexcusable if we should refuse or neglect to obtain every information and assistance which may enable us to decide upon law as well as facts with the utmost clearness and precision.

2. B cause we apprehend the present determination will become a precedent in all future elections, and it is indispensably necessary after such objections have been offered and so fully considered, to estimate with legal accuracy how far they ought or ought not to invalidate an election, in order, that if the laws are sufficiently erplicit, they may in future be inforced, and if they are defective, they may be supplied and amended. But to form a decision which those skilled in the laws of the land may deem illegal, will, we clearly conceive, expose this Board to deserved censure, lay a foundation for future disputes in elections, occasion a great waste of public time and expenditure of public money, both which have been so much regretted in the present instance.

8. Because, we cannot conceive it derogatory to the honor of the Board to suppose the members unpossessed of that legal knowledge necessary to determine the operation of law on facts so special and particular as those set forth in the specified charges on this clotion. On the other hand we know, and appeal to legal history for proof, that public bodies the most celebrated for gravity, wisdom, and Senatorial abilities, have thought it incumbent from time to time to consult persons of professional knowledge, whose station and character insured their impartiality, and gave weight and dignity to their decision.

4. Because we apprehend it to be one of the most important and interesting enquiries in a civil government, how far any of its members shall be abridged of their rights as citizens when, for a short time, they become soldiers. The law, we apprehend, should be plain, clear and explicit, to invalidate an election for the interference of persons thus circumstanced, or any irregularities in the mode of conducting it, which have not had the manifest and deci-We who dissent on this occasion, are sive influence on the event. not sufficiently informed of the law in this respect, nor, highly # we may esteem the legal abilities of our fellow members, can we suppose they have at once become such able lawyers and distinguished casuists, as to claim our confidence in preference to those who have made that science their particular study and professional duty. And while on the one hand, we would earnestly wish to preserve the freedom of cleation from undue exertion of power; @ the other, we would as carnestly preclude an idea that those defending their country, and on special occasions called from the daties of civil to military life, lose any portion of their privileges is

Answers to the questions proposed :

The officers of the militia violated no law by barely marching r private men under military command to the places of election in the county of which they were inhabitants, and they, or any r persons, had an undoubted right to furnish them with tickets, to advise them to vote accordingly. The latter part of this tion appears to be incomplete *p* however, if the meaning is that private men in the militia were prevented from "acting and ring like freemen," the following questions will occur : How y were thus prevented ? By whom were they prevented ? In t manner were they prevented? Were they restrained from ag or compelled to vote through violence or fear ? Without e are answered, no opinion can be given to this part of the prod question.

This charge depends upon the nature and effect of Major ma's and the other officer's reprimand. This is not stated. If neas Roberts, notwithstanding this reprimand, did speak to his 1, no injury was received. The consequence of the reprimand he material part; but this does not appear. Upon this state of question we can perceive no ground for logal punishment, much for making the election void.

As Major Bethel and the two Captains were employed only epositing the tickets in the box after they had passed through hands of the Inspectors and were read by them, there is no on for judicial consure, nor the least foundation for vacating the tion on this account. The act of Assembly passed in 1705, sta that the election shall be conducted in the presence of the Sheriff, Judges and Inspectors, not that they shall personally perform overy immaterial little act relating to it.

4. We apprehend that Mr. Engle, as a Judge of the election, was in the discharge of his duty, and not an intruder upon the province of the Inspectors, in reading or calling out tickets when casting up the polls. By the act of Assembly passed February the 8th, 1766, he had a concurrent power with the Sheriff and Inspetors to read, count, and cast up the votes.

5. It does not seem to be a sufficient ground to set the election aside because it was not opened till after two o'clock. The ast directs that the election shall begin before that hour, but does not make this act of so much consequence as that the election should be void in case it was begun after that hour. If this had been the intention of the Legislature, they certainly would have made it so by express words; but it is only directory, and mentions that as the most convenient. However, an officer may be punishable for a neglect of duty. The people are not to be deprived of Representatives on account of this omission.

6. As there appears to be no fraud nor injury in this transaction, (though it was not conformable to the directions of the act of Assembly,) we do not conceive it a sufficient reason for vacating the election.

7. The election ought not to be declared void because some of the Inspectors left their stations before the election was ended. They indeed were offenders, and may be punished for not performing their duty, unless they quit their stations through indisposition or some other good cause.

If elections were to be set aside for irregularities which do not affect, obviously and materially, the truth of the poll, the craft of the Judges or Inspectors might lead them to contrive such departure from duty, or to commit some irregularity, in order to overturn an election, in case they should dislike the event of it. The rights of the people do not depend upon so precarious a foundation.

8. This question is not stated with sufficient precision. It does not appear whether the Inspectors knew the apprentice to be such, or whether he was under age. Deceptions respecting unqualified persons often happen, but it would be very wrong to set aside all election for a whole county, upon proof of a single instance of this kind, especially if the sitting member has more than a bare majority. The utmost that ought to be done in this case, would be to subtract the vote from the sitting member.

9. Though Colonel Bitting reprimanded a man for altering his ticket, and tore it to pieces at the place of election, yet this is not a good reason for vacating the election. For aught that appears, the man may have procured another ticket and delivered it to the proper Inspector. It might not have been a ticket for a Councillor. Be this as it may, it does not appear to us a sufficient ground

GENTLEMEN : Our desire to preserve the harmony so essential to the public welfare, has kept us silent under the various measures adopted by your House, which we conceive prejudicial to the State But as and derogatory to the Constitutional rights of this Board. we perceive a system to be adopted and steadily pursued, which evidently tends to aunihilate the powers and usefulness of the Executive part of government, our duty to our constituents, and a due regard to the sacred obligations we have entered into, oblige us to speak with freedom, and to declare that, as we will never make a voluntary surrender of our privileges, so we will not tamely and silently submit to any invasion of them. Secondly: The draughts of public money from the Treasury, without the intervention of the Council, when the appropriation or use of the money is declared, we apprehend to be inconsistent with the Constitution, which declares it to be the right of the Council to "draw upon the Treasury for such sums as shall be appropriated by the House." This appropriation we clearly conceive to mean a declaration of the use, and not of the person to draw for it; and that the giving this power to any other persons, by a special law, is a violation of the Constitutional privileges of the Counoil—an unjust and unnecessary wound to their feelings, and calorlated to lessen their influence and utility.

It is altogether unprecedented in this or any of the neighboring States, as far as we know and believe, and must be attended with the greatest inconveniences, if there should be any failure in the collection of the taxes in point of time or quantity.

In a late bill published for consideration, entitled

Though there have been instances wherein he river Delaware. he Assembly, since the resolution, have by law nominated Comaissioners for special purposes, yet we apprchend there is no pre-edent for the powers granted by this law; but, on the contrary, rhen on a former occasion provision was made for the defence of he river and trade, the direction thereof was in all respects inrusted to the Council, who conducted it in such manner as to give fectual relief to the commerce of the city, without any eventual marge to the State. The Constitution expressly declares it to be he right and duty of the Council to expedite the execution of such neasures as may be resolved on by the General Assembly. But the language of your laws, gentlemen, is that "other persons shall expedite the execution of your measures," and, in our opinion, plainly encroaches on the rights of the people, who have elected you for the purpose of devising measures, and us for that of executing them; and so far as we attempt to legislate, or you to execute, so far we depart from the principles of the Constitution, usurp the The clause rights of each other, and do injustice to the people. in the law published for consideration, by which the present Auotioneers are removed from office without any complaint against them, though they have held their offices for a short time, we cannot but consider it as ... part of the system to increase your own power and lessen the weight of the Council in the eyes of the world. It is but little more than a year since a former Assembly, in the spirit of the Constitution, placed the appointment of these offices in the Council. Men of approved fidelity in the general cause, and of known capacity, were commissioned. They have just become masters of the business, made their arrangements, and prosured suitable accommodations and clerks, when a special act of Assembly is proposed to dismiss them from office and appoint others. What persons will in future be induced to accept of appointments under the Council, even under the sanction of your own laws, which are to be held on so precarious a tenure? or what can be more degrading to a public body than to see persons of their sppointment thus displaced, without any cause assigned? We do not contend but that the House might have reserved the original sppointment, though we think the spirit of the Constitution dispuntenances appointments of the Assembly. But to re-assume it by ex post facto law, without any complaint of its being improperly secuted, in our opinion, manifests such disrespect to the former Assembly, such an unfreindly disposition towards the Council, and enmity to the present officers, that all candid and considerate nen will deem it an undue stretch of Legislative power, and incomstible with the Constitution.

We wish you to consider, gentlemen, before you proceed further n this system, what consequences will be likely to flow from it.... An Assembly with different views, may think it proper and just, by ther laws, to alter your appointments and displace those whom

The goodness of the Supreme Being to all his rational creatures, demands their acknowledgments of gratitude and love; his absolute government of this world dictates that it is the interest, and people ardently to supplicate his favor and implore his protection. When the lust of dominion or lawless ambition excites arbitrary power to invade their rights, or to endeavour to wrest from a people their sacred and invaluable privileges, and compels them, in defence of the same, to encounter all the horrors and calamities of a bloody and vindictive war, then is that people loudly called upon to fly unto that God for protection who hears the cries of the distressed, and will not turn a deaf ear to the supplication of the oppressed. Great Britain, hitherto left to infatuated councils, and to parsue measures repugnant to her own interest and distressing to this country, still persists in the design of subjugating these United States, which will compel us into another active, and perhaps bloody campaign.

The United States, in Congress assembled, therefore, taking into consideration our present situation, our multiplied transgressions of the holy laws of our God, and his past kindness and goodness towards us, which we ought to record with the livelicst gratitude, think it their indispensable duty to call upon the several States to set apart Thursday, the twenty-fifth day of April next, as a day of fasting, humiliation and prayer; that our joint supplications may then ascend to the throne of the Ruler of the Universe, beseeching him to diffuse a spirit of Universal reformation among all ranks and degrees of our citizens, and make us an holy, that so we may be an happy people; that it may please him to impart wisdom, ananimity and integrity to our Councillors; to bless and prosper the reign of our illustrious Ally, and give success to his arms em. ployed in the defence of the rights of human nature; that he would smile upon our military arrangements by sea and land, ad. muister comfort and consolation to our prisoners in a cruel captivity, protect the life and health of our Commander-in-Chief, grant us victory over our enemies, establish peace in all our borders, and give happiness to all our inhabitants; that he would prosper the labour of the husbandmen, making the earth yield her increase in abundance, and give a proper season for the in-gathering of the fruits thereof; that he would grant success to all engaged in lawfal trade and c mmerce, and take under his guardianship all schools and seminarics of learning, and make them nurseries of virtue and piety; that he would incline the hearts to peace, and fill them with universal charity and benevolence; and that the religion of our Divine Redeemer, with all its benign influences, may cover the earth as the waters cover the sea.

Wherefore, as well in respect of the said recommendation of Congress as from a due sense of humbling ourselves before the Governor of the Universe, and emploring His protection and support, we do hereby direct and order, that the said Thursday the twenty-fifth day of April instant, be set apart in this Commonwealth as a day of humiliation, fasting, and prayer, according to the said resolve; and that all persons within the State abstain from servile labour and recreation on that day.

that we present our warmest congratulations to his most Christian Majesty, and to his Royal Consort, for whom we feel a respect which we cannot express, and felicitate them on this auspicious occasion.

The attention which you, sir, have always shewn to the State of Pennsylvania, affords us full assurance that you will represent to your august Sovereign the sincerity with which we rejoice at every event that adds to his glory or happiness, and more especially in the present instance.

May the great Governor of the Universe take into his holy keeping the King, the Queen, and the Dauphin of France, and pour out his choicest blessings upon them.

GENTLEMEN :--- I cannot be charged with a duty more agreeable to fulfil than that of transmitting to his Majesty testimonies of the part you take in the favour which Heaven has done him, in granting a Dauphin to his wishes and to those of the French Nation.-Since I have had the advantage of living among you, gentlemen, I have been frequently a witness of the sincere interest you have taken in every thing that may concern your ally. The more the two nations are acquainted, the more they love and esteem each other, and the more they are sensible of the necessity of an unalterable union. These circumstances will render still more agreeable to his Majesty the sentiments of the Council of Pennsylvania on the subject of the birth of an heir to his crown. The young Prince will one day be informed of the joy which the Pennsylvanians have shewn on this occasion. He will learn that they were his friends from his cradle, and it will please him to be theirs the whole time of his life.

¹⁴ with an exclusive authority to treat with the King of Great ¹⁵ Britain, or Commissioners by him duly appointed, respecting a ¹⁴ peace between the two countries.

2. "*Resolved, unanimously,* That any man, or body of men, "who shall presume to make any separate or partial convention or "agreement with the King of Great Britain, or with any Commis-"sioner or Commissioners under the crown of Great Britain, ought "to be considered and treated as open and avowed enemies of the "United States of America.

3. "Resolved, unanimously, That this House highly approve of ¹⁴ the declaration of Congress, 'that these United States cannot ¹⁵ with propriety, hold any conference or treaty with any Commis-¹⁴ sioners on the part of Great Britain, unless they shall, as a pre-¹⁴ liminary thereto, either withdraw their fleets and armies, or else ¹⁴ in positive and express terms, acknowledge the independence of ¹⁶ the said States.'

4. "Resolved unanimously, That Congress have no power, autho-"rity or right, to do any act, matter or thing, whatsoever, that may "have a tendency to yield up or abridge the sovereignty or independence of this State, without its consent previously obtained.

5. "Resolved unanimously, That this House will maintain, sup-" port and defend, the sovereignty and independence of this State, " with their lives and fortunes.

6. "Resolved unanimously, That it be recommended to the Su-"preme Executive Council of this State forthwith to order the "militia to hold themselves in readiness to act as occasion may "require.

"AND WHEREAS, There is the fullest evidence that the same "spirit of wickedness and folly which, at that time, governed the "Councils of the British nation, has excited the rulers of that "people under more specious names and pretences, to repeat the "insulting attempt:

"And Whereas, The people of a free State are entitled to the " fullest and clearest information of the principles on which their "Representatives in the Executive as well as the Legislative, mean "to proceed in every great concern, this Council conceive it to be " their duty to declare that, as they fully and unanimously approve " of the said recited resolutions, so they determine to adhere " strictly to them on all occasions; and it is the unanimous opinion of " this Council, that any propositions which may be made by the Court " of Great Britain, in any manner whatsoever, tending to violate the " treaty subsisting between us and our illustrious Ally, ought to be " treated with every mark of indignity and contempt; and at the " time this Council, considering the advantages which Nations derive "from amity and commerce founded on good faith, esteem and " mutual interest, and well knowing the benefit which Great Bri-" tain might derive from America were she to adopt principles of "moderation, wisdom and justice, cannot so far suppress their

"desire for the general interest of mankind and the dignity of "human nature as not to feel some concern while they see that "once powerful and respectable nation continuing to act upon prin-"ciples which, if persisted in much longer, must, by destroying "all title to the esteem, faith and confidence of these United States, "render treaties of amity and commerce between us and them ab "solutely and altogether impracticable."

WHEREAS, The southern post was robbed of his mail on Sunday, the sixteenth day of this present month, within five miles of Harford, in the State of Maryland, and the United States in Congress assembled, by their act of the nueteenth day of the mane month, resolved that the Executives of the States of New Jerrey, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland, be requested to pursue the most likely measures, by offering public rewards at the expense of the United States, and otherwise, for recovering the mail, and bringing the robbers to due punishment:

Wherefore, from a due regard to the said request, as well as from a strong sense of the justice and propriety thereof, we do hereby offer a public reward of two hundred dollars to any person or persons who shall secure the said mail and deliver the same to any Justice of this State within sixty days from the day of the date hereof; and also the further reward of one hundred dollars for each and every person who shall be apprchended and convicted of the said robbery, to be paid to such person or persons who shall apprehend such robber or robbers and secure him or them in any jail within this State : And we do hereby strictly charge and require all Judges, Justices, Sheriffs, Constables and other prace officers of the State, that they make dilligent search for the said mail, and on finding the same to give due notice thereof to us: And we do hereby charge and require them and every of them, to make dilligent search for, and apprehend and secure all and every person and persons concerned in the said robbery, so that the said robbers may be brought to condign punishment for the same : And we do here-· by offer free pardon to any person concerned in the said robbery. who shall surrender himself and give information of his accomplices therein, so that they or either of them shall be apprehended and convicted of the said robbery.

See the return made to Robert Prismal, in right of John Martin, between the Fourth and Fifth streets from Delaware river, and between Sassafras and Vine streets. GENTLEMEN :--- It has been with great reluctance that we have called you together at an earlier day than that to which you stand adjourned; but the state of the treasury rendered it in our opinim indispensably necessary. The sum which we have been able * procure on loan, in consequence of the act of Assembly passed the last session, entitled "An Act to enable the Supreme Executive Council to negotiate such loans as may be necessary to procare s sufficient sum of money for the defence of the frontiers of State, and the support of civil Government," has been so wy

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fling, as to leave us no room to hope for a supply of money by it means; and we had great reason to apprehend a severe blow uld be aimed at the frontiers by the Indians. Our fears in this peet have been but too well justified by events which have since opened, and there is reason to believe that the blow has fallen in redoubled force in consequence of killing the Moravian Inns at Muskingham, an act which never had our approbation or intenance in any manner whatever.

The monies becoming due on contracts for supplying the men on frontiers will be very considerable; and as the continuance of supplies will depend on the payment thereof with punctuality, s object becomes of very great importance, and requires immete attention.

Since the time of your adjournment, a great quantity of British rchandize has been imported into this State from the city of w York, and paid for in specie. This has occasioned a considble deficiency in our circulating medium, and justly alarmed ry good citizen with apprehensions of the most fatal consequences that destructive trade is not immediately and effectually re-The intercourse between the disaffected of the State and ained. enemy at New York is so easy and unrestrained, as to become remely injurious and really dangerous; and it is, in our opinion, come absolutely necessary to restrain it. We are sensible that ameness of language and similarity of dress and manners render difficult to devise effectual means for this purpose; but those difulties, far from preventing, ought to redouble our diligence and orts in a case on which so much depends.

The insults and robberies committed within the State by several rties of armed men, some of whom have talked of open defiance, we induced us to offer public rewards for apprchending and bringg them to justice, and a number of them have been arrested and a now in confinement.

A letter from the Minister of Foreign Affairs of the fifteenth of of September, 1782, informing the Board that he has hely received official advices from Mr. Adams, of the resolutions of their high mightinesses, the States General of the United Provinces of the Netherlands, to receive and acknowledge the said Mr Adams in quality of Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States of Amorica, and requesting the Council to cause the same to be made public, was read; whereupon,

By his Excellency WILLIAM MOORE, Esquire, President, and the Supreme Exe: utive Council of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, It hath pleased the Great Ruler of the Universe to remove the United States of America from a state of dependance, and establish them one among the nations of the earth, and in the course of His Providence to raise up to us allies and friends among the most powerful Princes and Commonwealths of Europe, from whom we have received the most important and essential services, of which the magnanimous conduct of His Most Christian Majesty, known and acknowledged by every good citizen, affords an example equally glorious to him and beneficial to us. And official information is now before us that their High Mightinesses the States General of the United Provinces of the Netherlands have received and acknowledged in due form the Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States of America, appointed to reside in that nation, an event which widens the basis of our independance and leads to an immediate connection with a powerful nation, whose alliance a variety of circumstances in their origin and government render extremely desirable:

We have thought fit, and do hereby, in solemn manner, make known and proclaim the same, to the end and intent that the good people of this Commonwealth may know the amity subsisting between the two nations, and in return for the kindness and affection shewn to us by their High Mightinesses, may on all occasions shew to the citizens and subjects of the States General every mark of solid esteem and respect:

And we do hereby strictly charge, enjoin and require all officers, civil and military, of this Commonwealth, to aid and assist the citi-

sens and subjects of the said States General, according to the law and usage of nations in amity.

Given in Council, under the hand of his Excellency WILLIAM MOORE, Esquire, President, and the seal of the State, at Philadelphia, this twenty-third day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-two.

A message from the Vice President and Supreme Excentive Council, to the Representatives of the Freemen of the Counciwealth of Pennsylvania. in General Assembly met:

GENTLEMEN :- The expeditions planned against the Western Indians having been laid aside, after the preparations for them were in great forwardness, in which the spirit of patriotism among the people of the frontier counties shewed itself in a conspicuous manner; and there was reason to hope for success even beyond what so sudden a movement at first view seemed to promise. We think it proper to lay before you the intelligence upon which the Council was induced to countermand their first orders, and to lay aside the expedition, in full expectation that the House will see the propriety and policy of the measure. With those papers the Secretary will lay before you several letters from the Superintendant of of Finance, inclosing resolutions of Congress which contain matter of great importance, and deserve the earliest attention, as the state of affairs in Europe render it prudent and necessary to make vigorous preparations in expectation of a continuance of the war.

The resolutions of Congress of the twenty-third of April last, respecting provisions to be made for sick and wounded soldiers, also requires the attention of the House, as several applications have already been made to us for the aid which Congress have recommended to be made for them.

We shall cultivate, on all occasions, that perfect harmony between the Executive and Legislative, which is essentially necessary for the support of government at all times, and more especially in times of danger and difficulty.

Upon considering the nature of these accounts, and the restablishing the Comptroller General's office, doubts have arisen our minds whether it would be regular in us to decide upon them; 1, therefore, we have judged it proper to transmit them to your morable House.

We also send a letter from the Secretary at War, of the seventh tant, and an act of Council of the ninth, upon an application of lonel Richard Butler, that you may be fully possessed of the n in contemplation with respect to our line, and have the nesary information for taking other measures on that head, if they ill be deemed expedient.

In compliance with your resolution of the eleventh instant, we lose a state of the disposal of the five thousand pounds obtained in the National Bank for the further defence of the frontiers.

Referring to that subject, we beg leave to observe that we have d under our consideration the accounts of Mr. William Brown d Messieurs Montgomery and Reese, now inclosed, and the imptroller General's reports upon them, which we approve. We have conferred with Mr. Jones, who is mentioned in that letter, and desired him to attend in case you should incline to see him, as his intelligence seems to be important. As these lands constitute a fund that may contribute towards rendering justice to our deserving and suffering officers and soldiers, we apprehend the most early, vigorous and decisive measures should be adopted for preventing and removing every difficulty that may tend to obstruct or delay such a disposition of them as the interests, good faith, and honor of the Commonwealth may, in the wisdom of the Legislature, require.

A PROCLAMATION.

As the greatest and best of Beings commanded mankind into existence, with a capacity for happiness, bestowing upon him understanding and many good gifts, so when they by an abuse of the blessings thus intrusted, had involved themselves in guilt and misery, his compassion was extended towards them, and in "his tender mercies," not only seed time, and harvest, and cold, and heat, and summer, and winter, and day, and night, were continued usto them, but the "eternal purposes" were revealed, and the hesvenly treasuries opened to restore the human race to the transcendent privileges from which by transgression they were fallen ; and in "this marvellous work," the laws of righteousness have been with such infinite wisdom adjusted and united in the obligations of nature, that while they jointly tend to promote the filicity of men in a fature state, they evidently co-operate to advance their welfare in the present, and to offend against the sanctions of revolution or the lictates of reason and conscience, is assuredly to betray the joys of this life as well as those of another : Wherefore, we are entirely Persuaded that just impressions of the Deity are the great supports of morality; and as the experience of sges demonstrates that regu-. larity of manners is essential to the tranquility and prosperity of accieties, and the assistance of the Almighty, on which we rely to stablish the estimable blessings our afflicted country is contending for, cannot be expected without an observance of his holy laws.

We esteem it our principal and indispensable duty to endeavour, a much as we can, that a sense of these interesting truths may provail in the hearts and appear in the lives of the inhabitants of this State, and therefore have thought proper to issue this proclamation, sincerely desiring that they, scriously meditating on the may signal and unmeritted benefits of public and private import, conferred upon them, the affecting invitations and munificent promises of Divine goodness, and the terrors set in array against the disobedient, may be urged to exert themselves in avoiding, discounte-VOL. XIII.-28. nancing, and suppressing all vice, prophaneness, and immorality; and feeling a due gratitude, love, and veneration, for their most gracious, all-wise, and connipotent Benefactor, Sovereign, and Judge, and a correspondent temper of resignation to the dispensations of bis Sepreme Government, may become a people "trusting in Him in whom they live and move," and doing good: And to the intent that these desirable ends may be forwarded, all persons are hereby erhorted to observe the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, and thereon constantly to attend the worship of God, as a service plesing to Him "who is a hearer of prayer," and condescends to inhabit the praises of his people, and profitably to themselves—a neglect of which duty has, in a multitude of instances, been the beginning of a deviation into the ways of presumption, that at length have led into the deepest distresses and severest sorrows.

. And as the education of youth is of so much moment to themselves and to the Commonwealth, which caunot flourish unless that important point be diligently regarded, the sentiments, dispositions, and habits, being then generally formed that pervade the rest of their lives, all parents, guardians, masters, and tators, are hereby streamously called upon to discharge the high trust committed to them, and for which they must account by a faithful attention, that these under their care may be nurtured in piety, filial reverence, submission to superiors in age or station, modesty, sincerity, benevolence, temperance, industry, consistency of behaviour, and a frugality regulated by an humble reliance on Providence, and a kind respect for others, that their inexperienced minds may be, by wholesome instructions, fully convinced that whatsoever employment they are designed for, virtue will be a chief promotor of success, and irregularity of conduct the greatest obstacle to it; that the intellectual faculties are aided by moral improvement, but weakoned by illicit courses; and in brief, that religion is the friend of their peace, health, and happiness; and that to displease their Maker, or to trespass against their neighbours, is inevitably to injure themselves; and we expect, and hereby require, that all well-disposed persons, and especially those in place of authority, will, by their conversation and demeanor, encourage and promote piety and virtue, and to contribute to the rendering these qualities truly laudable and honorable, and the contrary practices justly shameful and contemptible; that thus the influence of good men and the dignity of the laws may be combined in suppressing the insolencies of scorners and profligates, in directing the weak and thoughtless, and in preserving them from the peruicious contagion of cvil examples.

And for further promoting such reformation, it is here by enjoined that all Magistrates, and others whom it may concern, be very vigilant and exact in discovering, prosecuting, and punishing all persons who are guilty of prophanation of the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, blasphemy, prophane swearing or cursing, drunkesmess, lewdness, or other dissolute or immoral practices; that they

suppress all gaming houses and other disorderly houses; that they put in execution the act of General Assembly entitled "An Act for the suppression of vice and immorality," and all other laws now in force for the punishing vice, prophaneness, and immorality: And for the more effectual proceeding herein, all Judges and Justices having cognizance in the premises, are directed to give strict charges at their courts and sessions for the due prosecution and punishment of all who shall presume to offend in any of the kinds aforesaid, and also all such as, contrary to their duty, shall be remiss or negligent in putting the laws in execution ; and that they do, at their respective courts and sessions, cause this proclamation to be publicly read immediately before the charge is given. And every Minister of the Gospel is requested strongly to inculcate in the respective congregations where they officiate, a love of piety and virtue, and an abhorrence of vice, prophaneness, and immomlity.

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A draft of a message from Council to the General Assembly, we laid before the Board, and read, and is in the following words, vizt :

A Message from the President and Supreme Executive Council of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to the General Assembly of the said Commonwealth :

GENTLEMEN :- Doubts have arisen concerning the powers of the Commissioners for the several counties of the State, to raise and levy the sum of ninety three thousand six hundred and forty pounds ten shilling, in pursuance of the supplement to the act entitled "An Act for funding and redeeming the bills of credit of the United States of America, and providing means to bring the pre-sent war to a happy conclusion," without an assessment made for that purpose. It appears to us that an act should be passed at the present sessions confirming the proceedings of Commissioners, where they have been already had without such assessment, and authorizing others who have not yet acted thereupon, to proceed on the last assessment made for raising and levying effective supplies for the year. To prevent future difficulties, it may be proper also to provide that the Commissioners for every county shall in their proceedings to raise and levy the annual sum before mentioned, as long as the same is by law to be raised and levied, be bereafter guided by the last preceding assessment that shall have been made for levying, raising, and effecting supplies.

By the letter from the Commissioners of the twenty-second instant, and the inclosures, you will perceive that a matter is in agitation that may affect the revenue and peace of the State. We can only say that we shall heartily rejoice if the Legislature can possibly devise a mode of affording some kind of satisfaction to many worthy fellow citizens in the same situation. We have repeated applications by persons who are such for debts contracted on the public account. We apprehend that some of them will be very severely and improperly distressed if a law is not soon made for their relief. It appears by the letter from the Treasurer for this county, now sent, that there is no fund for paying the pensions therein mentioned. We trust the peculiar circumstances of the pensioners will recommend their case in the liveliest manner to your Honorable House. The excise law seems to be deficient in

GENTLEMEN :--- Yesterday I ventured out to the State House, but you had adjourned before I got there. To day, being a god deal indisposed, I think it my duty to write to you on a subject of importance that requires dispatch. Our resolution to compleat the line of this State to three regiments by the opening of the next campaign, lately transmitted to the Secretary at War, has been by him communicated to Congress; and, I am informed, that Hononble body has approved our proposal if it is carried into execution by the first day of March. The recruiting service goes on so slowly, for want of money, that I am much afraid we shall not be able to fill up the intended quota in the time limited; and of course, s number of brave, experienced, and deserving officers, who ought, if possible, to be provided for in the most advantageous manner by this State, will be deranged. not to mention other motives for rendering our line as respectable as we can. I have received intelligence from General Sinclair and Colonel Humpton, that upwards of one hundred and sixty eighteen months' men have lately been discharged to the southward, and are now on their way towards this State; that they are good soldiers; that other States intend to inlist them, but that they may be engaged for this, if one thousand pounds could be supplied for the purpose; that this number will go far in executing our design, and that Colonel Humpton will charge himself in a particular manner with managing the affair .-I am sensible that the Treasury is empty; but I beg leave to inform you, that I will immediately advance the sum before mentioned, if the Council will be pleased to agree that it shall be repaid in three months, with interest-a condition that will not put a penny in my pocket. I am with great and sincere esteem, gentlemen, your obedient and humble servant.

A petition from Luzarus Barnett, late of the city of Amsterdam, was read ; and on consideration,

Ordered. That leave be given him to come into this State, from the city of New York, by the way of Dobbs' Ferry, and to bring with him his wife.

A report from William Bradford, Junior, Joseph Reed, Jasse Wilson, Jonathan D. Scrgeant, and Henry Osborne, Esquire, Councillors and Agents for this State in the controversy with Conecticut, dated second of January, 1783, inclosing a decree (in favour of Pennsylvania,) of the Court appointed by Congress for hearing and determining the said controversy, was received and read. A letter from William Whipple, Welcome Arnold, David Brearly, Cyrus Griffin, and William C. Houston, Judges of the said Court, was also received and read. And the several matters and things therein contained having been duly considered.

Ordered, That a proclamation be issued, giving notice of the said decree, and also for preserving peace, and quieting the minds of the people settled on the lands lately disputed between this State and Connecticut, and requiring the settlers to pay due obedience to the laws of this Commonwealth.

The proclamation was agreed to in the words following, vizt :

By the President and the Supreme Executive Council of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, The Court of Commissioners, constituted and declared by the United States, in Congress assembled, to hear and finally determine the controversy between this State and the State of Conmecticut, respecting sundry lands lying within the northern boundary of this State, having heard the said States respectively thereupon, proceeded, on the thirtieth day of December last, to give judgment in the words following, to wit:

"We are unanimously of opinion that the State of Connecticut has no right to the lands in controversy. We are also unanimously of opinion that the jurisdiction and pre-emption of all the territory lying within the charter boundary of Pennsylvania, and now claimed by the State of Connecticut, do of right belong to the State of Pennsylvania."

We have thought fit to make known and proclaim, and do hereby make known and proclaim the same, and we do hereby charge, enjoin, and require all persons whatsoever, and more especially such person and persons who, under the authority or countenance of the late Colony, now State of Connecticut, either before or since the Declaration of Independence, have entered upon and settled lands within the bounds of this State, to take notice of the said judgment, and pay due obedience to the laws of this Commonwealth.

And whereas, There is reason to fear that the animosities and resentments which may have arisen between the people who, under the authority or countenance of the said late Colony, now State of Connecticut, as aforesaid, have made settlements within the bounds of this State, and the citizens of Pennsylvania who claim the lands whereon such settlements have been made, may induce some of the latter to endeavour to gain possession of the said lands by force and violence, contrary to law, whereby the peace of the State may be endangered and individuals greatly injured, we do hereby strictly charge, enjoin all persons whatsoever, to forbear molesting, or in anywise disturbing any person or persons, who, under the authority or countenance of the late Colony, now State of Connectiont, as aforesaid, have settled lands within the bounds of this State, until the Legislature or the courts of justice shall have made laws or passed judgment in such case as to right and justice may appear to belong, as such persons offending therein shall answer the contrary at their peril. And we do hereby charge, enjoin, and require, all Judges,

Justices, Sheriffs, and other peace officers, to use their authority to prevent offences, and to punish according to law, all offences committed, or to be committed against any of the people so as aforesaid settled under the authority or countonance of the said late Colory, now State of Connecticut, as aforesaid, on lands within this State, and who pay due obedience to the laws thereof, as in case of like offences against any of the citizens of this State.

A message from the President and the Supreme Executive Council to the General Assembly :

GENTLEMEN :- We heartily congratulate you on the recovery of Charlestown, and the final determination of the controversy between this State and that of Connecticut in our favor, by the unanimous judgment of the Commissioners.

The first of these events will be attended with very happy e sequences to the Union in general, and in particular to the petric

citizens of a sister State, whose sufferings have only been exceeded by their virtue.

The second is highly interesting in every point of view. The peaceable and conclusive settlement of a dispute between two such powerful sovereign States, concerning a large and valuable territory, and the jurisdiction over it, casts a light upon the American character, the martial spirit of which has been fully and recently displayed, that must attract the attention and esteem of the world.

This uncommon occurrence will furnish to the good and wise a pleasing page in the mournful history of human discords, and we fervently wish, for the repose of mankind, it may be decmed worthy of imitation.

It reflects great honor also on the confederation by yielding a memorable proof of its political energy, having been accomplished in the mode thereby prescribed, and strengthens the bands of the Union, by evincing that it is the best protection against internal mischiefs, as well as against external dangers. Thus the fears of the apprehensive who expected, and the hopes of the disaffected who wished for confusions, are dissipated, and an agreeable presage is formed of the like salutary effects attending similar contexts in future, which cannot fail of giving the firmest stability to the whole system of our affairs. By such a temper and conduct, the United States will exhibit a very singular and truly dignified example of a people who have wisdom and virtue enough not to waste in civil convulsions, the happiness and glory acquired by a successful opposition to their foreign enemies, the fatal gulf in which so many nations have been lost.

This determination will be of the utmost importance to the prosperity of Pennsylvania, if all the benefits are derived from it that probably may be obtained by a prudent management.

We have issued a proclamation for preserving peace, and for quieting the minds of the people, on the lands lately disputed, a copy of which, together with other papers relating to this affair, shall be immediately sent. We rely on the Legislature that such farther measures will be adopted as shall be most advisable, for improving the decision that has been made to the best advantage.

The Secretary will lay before you, gentlemen, letters from the Minister of France, of the tenth and nineteenth instant, from the Commander-in-Chief of the twelfth, from the Kinancier of the twentieth, from the Secretary of War of the seventh of November and eleventh of December, from the Secretary of Foreign Affairs of the twenty-third, from the Commissioners for the defence of the navigation in the bay and river Delaware of the thirteenth, and from the Commissioners for the city and county of Philadelphia of the nineteenth of the same month.

The most important intelligence we have received relates to the negotiations at Paris. When all circumstances respecting them are deliberately weighed and compared with past transactions, it re-

mains utterly uncertain what the conclusion will be. Policy ditates but a single resolution on the part of America, and that is w make strenuous efforts for continuing the war.

We have judged it our duty to exert all the powers with which we are invested for compleating the line of this State to three regiments of Infantry, besides the Artillery and Dragoons, by the opening of the next campaign, as will appear by our act of the tenth of December last, hercwith transmitted. An act of Congress of the thirty-first of December on that head.

We shall sincerely rejoice if these intentions can be carried into execution oin time, as the line will be rendered more respectable, and several valuable and experienced officers will be employed.

Before we quit this subject, we cannot forbear mentioning with the tendercst concern, the case of retiring officers of our line. Alter bravely and patiently encountering every danger and difficulty for many years in the cause of their country, their former methols of life totally deranged, their fortunes injured or exhausted, their constitutions, in many instances, impaired, to be thrown unput and unprovided for upon experiments for the subsistence of themselves and their families, must be deeply distressing to persons who feel any sentiments of gratitude and benevolence. Permit us to recommend them in the warmest manner to your Honourable body.

From some late proceedings, it appears too probable, unless the National Council can happily devise some effectual mode of removing difficulties, that a necessity will succeed of satisfying the demands of Justice and humanity, on a more divided, and perhaps, less politic plan, than has been wished for and attempted.

In whatever manner those and other exigencies are to be answercd, it is essential to the welfare of the Commonwealth that the affairs of revenue should, with all possible dispatch, be placed in the clearest order, and fixed on a perfectly economical arrangement. To lay a solid foundation for subsequent operations, it is absolutely necessary that all former accounts and past expenditures of publick These, and all that shall folmonies should be speedily adjusted. low, should be laid before our constituents immediately, as they are respectively adjusted, and with as much particularity as the nature A free people have a right to see them and of them will admit. to judge of them. By such means their entire confidence in pablick measures will be gained; and they will not only bear, but be pleased to bear, their several shares of publick burthens, when they find that what they pay is quickly and truly accounted for, and he been faithfully and prudently applied to their service. This, we are convinced, is the generous disposition of the people of Pennsylvania. Such regulations tend directly to the establishment of publick credit on a firm basis. Another step towards it is not to suffer those to be disappointed who have relied upon the faith of the State. This observation reminds us of the officers and soldier

We should be glad if the collection of taxes and fines could be made ifer and less expensive, and if irregular and oppressive proceedge therein, which we have reason to believe too often have hapaed, could be prevented.

The militia laws should be reduced into one act. They make great alteration, for rendering them more efficient and less can sive. It appears to be a hardship upon retiring officers who are tinue in some measure annexed to the army, and other circumstan being considered, that they should be liable to common militian ties.

We think it extremely proper that acts should also be passife making the decisions on references by rule of court, more sinto trials by jury; for quieting titles after long possession; for p venting unnecessary county expenses; and for regulating found preventing extortion. An act for this last purpose should be with such precision as to take away all evasions from offeeden, so generally made known that the innocent may not be prevent by their ignorance of the injuries done them.

Gentlemen—We judged it sufficient thus briefly to sugget a ideas. If they are thought proper to receive such improvement your wisdom can give them, we shall be amply rewarded for care by your approbation, and by the benefits which, is a quence, will be conveyed to our fellow citizens.

GENTLEMEN: --- The Secretary will present to you the report of the Commissioners appointed last year by this Commonwealth and the State of Virginia, with a draft of the country situate between the meridian line run by Messieurs St. Clair and McClean, and that lately run by Messieurs Nevil and McClean, bounded southward by an extension of Mason and Dixon's line, and northward by the Ohio river.

And whereas, Preliminaries for restoring peace between the ad King of Great Britain and the King of Spain, were also signed Versailles, on the same twentieth day of January last:

By which said preliminary articles it hath been agreed, that as on as the same were ratified, Hostilities between the said Kinga,

their Kingdoms, States and Subjects, should cease in all parts of the world. And it was further agreed, that all vessels and efficit that might be taken in the channel and in the North seas, after the space of twelve days from the ratification of the said preliminry articles, should be restored; that the term should be one month from the channel and North scas, as far as the Canary islands, inclusively, whether in the Ocean or the Mediterranean; two months from the said Canary islands, as far as the Equinoctial line or Equator; and lastly, five months in all other parts of the World, without any exception, or more particular description of time or place:

And whereas. It was declared by the Minister Plenipotentiary of the King of Great Britain, in the name and by the express order of the King his Auster, on the said twentieth day of January las, that the said United States of America, their subjects and their possessions, should be comprized in the above mentioned suspesion of arms at the same epochs, and in the same manner as the three ('rowus above mentioned, their subjects and possessions respetively; upon condition, that on the part and in the name of the United States of America, a similar decluration shall be delivered, expression declaring their assent to the said suspension of arms, and contaiing an assurance of the most perfect reciprocity on their part:

And whereas, The Ministers Plenipotentiary of these United States did, on the same twentieth day of January, in the name and by the authority of the said United States, accept the said deekantion, and declare that the said States should cause all hostilities to cease against His Britannic Majesty, his subjects and his possessions, at the terms and epochs agreed upon between his said Majesty the King of Great Britian, His Majesty the King of France, and His Majesty the King of Spain, so, and in the same manner as had been agreed upon between those three Crowns, and to produce the same effects:

And whereas, The ratifications of the said preliminary atticks between their Most Christian and Britannic Majesties, were exchanged by their Ministers on the third day of February last, and between His Britanuic Majesty and the King of Spain, on the ninth day of February last:

And whereas, The United States in Congress assembled. de on the eleventh day of this month, declare it to be their will as pleasure that the cessation of hostilities between the said State and His Britannic Majesty should be conformable to the epoint fixed between their Most Christian and Britannic Majesties:

We have thought fit to make known the same to the citizens of this State; and we do hereby strictly charge and command all su officers, both by sea and land, and other citizens of this State, w forbear all acts of hostility, either by sea or land, against his Britannic Majesty or his subjects, from and after the respective times agreed upon between their Most Christian and Britannic Majesters as aforesaid.

That from motives of prudence, it will be highly proper that this step should be taken with the most profound secret, that Council, before they determine upon it, shall take some me sures to ascertain the temper of the city, and what degree of me rance is to be placed in its exertions; that if, upon making all is inquiry which may be consistent with the secrecy with which is business is to be conducted, Council should not think it precision to draw forth an adequate force immediately, it would be most if viseable, and intirely the sense of Congress, that none should be called for.

In a conference which followed these communications, Comobserved, that in this business much precaution was necessary, that next to the dispositions of the city, it became necessary Council to acquaint themselves with the degree of preparation which it stood. That as the State Magazine had been similar the soldiery, no fixed ammunition was to be precaud.

Colonel Hamilton, in reply to this objection, assured Council that any quantity of musquet and cannon catridge might be commanded in fifteen minutes; that his inquiries had been pointed to this subject, and his information derived from one whose business it was to know. SIR: ---We have the honor to inclose for your Excellency m the Council, a copy of the resolutions communicated in our onference yesterday. And whereas, It is of the utmost importance to the good people of this State that the perpetrators of such attrocious crimes should be brought to condign punishment, we have thought fit to offer, and do hereby offer, a publick reward one hundred pounds in specie, for each and every of the perpetrators of the said robberies, or any of them, to be paid, or conviction for the same, to any person or persons who shall apprehend and secure them, or any of them; and over and above the said reward, we do hereby promise free and fall pardon to any one of the said robbers, their aiders, abettors, or comforters, who shall discover, apprehend, and secure, any other, or others, of the said robbers, so that he, or they, shall be convicted as aforesaid : And all Judges, Justices, Sheriffs, and Constables, are hereby strictly enjoined and required to make diligent search and inquiry after, and to use their utmost endeavors to apprehend and secure the said robbers, their aiders, abetters, and comforters, and every of them, so that they may be dealt with according to law.

ar most andent and devout thanks are due to the Supreme Ruler Ac Universe, for this great disposition of events in which we Dur posterity are so deeply interested; and it should be our imined resolution, with a humble sense of our unworthiness, anifest our grateful veneration for the Divine Author of such a deliverance as this, by an improvement of it to the best of parposes, and by an habitual tenor of life that may be pleasing in his sight.

Our inattention would be inexcusable, if, on this great occasion, we should not warmly acknowledge how much we are indebted for our success, under Providence, to the friendship of our august Aly and the gallantry of his troops, and to the persevering fortitude of our officers and soldiers; an army whose patriotism must ever be remembered with affectionate reverence in these States, as long as that liberty for which they fought and suffered shall continue to be an object of regard.

The institution of a Chamber of Commerce would probably be attended with utility, in disputes among merchants; and perhaps the integrity and experience of many worthy and well informed citizens might thereby be more particularly engaged than they otherwise can be to aid Government in affairs of trade and finance.

COUNCIL CHAMBER, Philadelphia, August 18th, 1783.

A message from the President and the Supreme Executive Court to the General Assembly :

On the ninetcenth day of June we received the inclosed letter from Colonel Richard Butler and William Henry, Esquire, of larcaster, and immediately transmitted them by our delegates to Cargress.

In the conference with the committee appointed on these letter, some of them proposed the stopping the soldiery from Lanceste, by a detachment of the militis to be instantly called out. We informed the committee that Lieutenant Butler, who brought is late dispatches, had represented to us that the soldiers had beland very regularly upon their march; that they said they were comit to have their accounts settled; that they must then be near the town, and that it was very improbable a sufficient force could be collected in time to intercept them.

The case appeared so delicate and difficult, that the committee themselves seemed to doubt the propriety of opposing the solit by force and compelling them to return, and one of them said the "in all cases in which he could not determine precisely what to", it was a maxim with him that the better way was to do nothing.

On the same day orders were issued from the War office, is these soldiers should be received into the Barracks and supplied with rations. On Saturday the twenty first day of June, a party of thirty armed soldiers marched from the quarters in the Barracks, and parading before the State House, where we were then met in Council, sent up to us by the Secretary the following message in writing:

May it please your Excellency :

We the non-commissioned officers and soldiers now in this city, demand of you and the Honorable Council, authority to appoint sommissioned officers to command us, and redress our grievances, which officers to have full power to adopt such measures as they may judge most likely to procure us justice. You will immediately issue such authority and deliver it to us, or otherwise we shall instantly let in those injured soldiers upon you and abide by the consequence. You have only twenty minutes to deliberate on this important matter. The officers in general have forsaken us and refuse to take any further command. This I presume you all know. We are, in behalf of ourselves and the men,

Yours, &ca., &ca.

The immediate object of this message, the terms in which it was expressed, and the further design of the insurgents to procure a sanction for their future proceedings by an authority to be derived from us, determined us unanimously to resolve that the demands contained in it should be rejected.

In the meantime a larger number of soldiers in arms advanced, and soon joined their companions, making in the whole a body of about three hundred men of the Pennsylvania line, under the direction of Serjcants. They paraded also before the State House; a party of fifteen or twenty men took post in the yard opposite to the south windows of the Council Chamber, and Centinels were fixed "at the doors of the State House, but people still kept continually going out and coming in without being stopped by them.

We remained in the Council Chamber for more than an hour after the receipt of the message before mentioned, and then sent the Secretary to inquire if that message to the Council was approved by the soldiers in general. He reported to us that he was answered insolently by some of the leaders—"it was approved by them, and that we should hear more from them."

While these things past, most of the members of Congress assembled, but not in sufficient number to form a Congress. That Honorable body stood adjourned from Friday till the following Monday, Saturday being a day of usual recess, but upon the alarm the members were specially summoned by their President, and at the place to which the soldiers were moving.

For what purpose they were so summoned, we have not been informed.

should be conducted, Council should not think it practicable to draw forth an adequate force immediately, it would be more adviseably, & intirely the sense of Congress, that none should be drawn forth; for Congress were determined to proceed by coercion, and expected soon to have a force that could be depended on; that the army might be relied on, and that proper representations had been made to the Commander-in-Chief; that as to the want of ammunition, we might be assured that we could be supplied with any quantity of musquet and cannon cartridge in fifteen minutes, one of the committee having pointed his inquiries to that subject, and his information being derived from a person whose business it was to know. We then desired that the ammunition mentioned by the committee might be secured, least it might be discovered and seized by the soldier.

The committee agreed to confer with us again next morning, and then withdrew.*

The committee say that Council informed them, "the exertions of the militia were not to be expected from the repetition of the insult which had happened," the' the Council only said "they could not be sure that such arother insult would produce those exertions."

to betray them; that therefore, we should confide in the candor of the committee, and in the magnanimity of Congress, to put a just construction upon our conduct; that the soldiers had behaved very peaceably since Saturday, had appointed their committee to confer with us, and seemed to rely upon the negotiation which they had been induced to commence, with the concurrence of the President and the members of Congress themselves, who had sent General St. Clair to treat with them, and which we had agreed to proceed in, with the approbation and advice of the President of Congress, and the members who had been spoken to on the occasion; that in this state of affairs, any movement to collect the militia might be regarded by the soldiery as an act of treachery, and unless it should be rapid and efficient, would at once expose Congress, Council, and our fellow-citizens, and endanger the city.

That as to the letter of the committee requesting the determintion of the Council in writing, it appeared to us an unusual mode of proceeding in conferences between committees of Congress and the Council of this State; that this mode did not seem to be intended by Congress; that if they had made the request, we should cheerfully have granted it; if they should now make it, we should not hesitate to comply; that we had received from the committee a verbal and most important explanation of the resolution delivered by them, fully confiding in the honor of those by whom it was given; and that if the committee were apprehensive of any mintake, we wished them to reduce our answer to writing immediately, and we would repeat the several parts of it, to prevent any error.

The committee said they were sensible of the difficulties that occurred; that they did not mean that the conference intended between Council and the committee of the soldiery should be prevented; that collecting an adequate force in readiness to act, would not be inconsistent with this proceedure; that as to the consequences of such an attempt being made and not immediately suceeding, it was suggested that even small bodies of militia might seize certain points where resistance could be made untill the rest of the citizens should come to their aid; that as to our answer, they acknowledged we had thro' this whole business, acted with great candor towards them, but they conceived themselves clearly justifiable in requesting our determination in writing, and instanced the case of inferior and accountable officers, who often ask and seldom are denied such an answer; and that the reason was much stronger that it should be given to a committee of Congress.

We having before expressed our sentiments on the other points, only observed as to the last, that in our opinion the case mentioned did not apply; that it might be very proper for responsible officers to ask for answers in writing to justify themselves to their superiors, and a generous condescension in the persons from whom they were

solicited, would induce them to comply; but the committee were a part of the body representing the sovereignty of the United States, and we had the honor of representing the sovereignty of this State. That conferences, especially between persons vested with such suthorities, were intended to obtain a free and full communication of sentiments without the intervention of writing, and that no inconvenience could be apprchended from proceeding in this usual method, as each party could rely upon the integrity of the other. The committee withdrew, and the Council rose.

In this unhappy affair we found ourselves extremely distressed. On one side we were urged by the representatives of the United States to draw forth, and employ the citizens in immediate hostilities against the soldiers, while on the other hand, the citizens considered them as objects of compassion rather than of terror or resentment. They could not bear to avenge the dignity of Congress, accidently and undesignedly offended, by shedding the blood of men whom they considered as having fought and suffered for the American cause, and perhaps the world may be disposed to ballance the charge of impolicy in this conduct, by giving credit for the humanity of such a behaviour.

We met again in the evening at the President's house, and in order to make particular communications, we directed the Lieutenants of the city and county, all the field officers of the militia in the city and neighborhood, and Captain Morris of the Light Horse, to be convened to meet us at the State House the next morning at ten o'clock.

Accordingly, on Tuesday the twenty-fourth, we met in the Asmembly room: Colonels Shee, Eyre, Knox, Marsh, Read, Will, Dean, Henry, Coates; Majors Rees, Brown, Custrop, McCullough, Boyd and Fanqueke; and Captain Morris; only one field officer being absent.

We laid before these gentlemen the message we had received on Saturlay from the soldiery, and our own resolution thereon, with the resolution of Congress passed that day. We informed them that the committee of Congress had, in a conference, explained the snid resolution, by saying, that by the effectual measures therein mentioned, Congress meant a call of militia into actual service, and their exertions in consequence of such a call; that there was reason to believe Congress would immediately remove from this State, unless they should receive assurances from us that they might rely upon the effectual measures intended by the said resolution being immediately taken for supporting the public authority; that as to the want of ammunition that had been mentioned, the objection was happily removed, we having been assured by one of the committee of Congress that we could be supplied with any quantity of musquet and cannon cartridge in fifteen minutes. We therefore deaired the officers to give us their sentiments on the practicability of assembling the militia in such a manner as to effect the purposes of the resolution before mentioned, and also in what manner a guard of five hundred men could be most quickly collected for inmediate defence, to be relieved by the militia, in consequence of a call for the service proposed. In the course of this conference, it was asked whether some kind of a negotiation had not taken place. We mentioned what had passed on that head. After some time, we retired to the Council Chamber. Soon after we came into the Chamber, one of the committee of Congress entered, and informed the President that he thought himself bound to give him notice of a great mistake that had been committed by the person from whom he had received his intelligence concerning the ammunition, that person having in a late conversation told him there were not more than two hundred musquet cartridges to be found. The President took this opportunity of again desireing that Council might not be precipitated into measures not adapted to the present circumstances; that the soldiers had now been quiet for three years, and we expected every hour to hear from their committee; the gentleman said that no report in writing had yet been made to Congress, and that for his part he should be for taking some time to make it, for the reasons that had been mentioned.

In about an hour after we had left the officers, we returned into the Assembly room to them, and Colonel Shee, speaking for the company, declared it to be their opinion, that it would be very imprudent to make any call of militia at present, as they were convinced it would be ineffectual; that if the negotiation for setting the disturbance should not succeed, and the soldiers should insist on unjust and unreasonable things, or should commit any outrage, they would be willing to make all the exertions in their power for preserving the peace and "supporting public authority," and would use their utmost influence for disposing the minds of all under their command, and of their fellow-citizens, to join in such measures.

We then directed that the officers should have their respective commands as well prepared as could be for action, on the shortest notice, which they promised to do; and we are persuaded that if the occasion for commencing hostilities had appeared as pressing to the militia as it did to some, they would have acted with the same spirit that had always distinguished them, whenever, in their jsdgment, the object claimed their exertions.

Before the Council adjourned, we received the following letter and inclosure from the committee appointed by the soldiers, vist:

SIR :---Yesterday morning we were waited on severally by a committee of Serjeants, who handed to each of us similar appointments, of which the inclosed is one. But upon their being objected to, and refused as inconsistent with the powers granted them and dis-

honorable to us, they made such concessions relative to us as were satisfactory, so far as we could take up the business, and they have confessed their conduct on the twenty-first instant to be disorderly, and have promised to hand in their concessions as soon as possible, which will immediately lay before your Excellency. Council rose, and soon afterwards we received intelligence that Congress was adjourned by their President, to meet at *Princetonon* on the Thursday following.

That evening we met again at the President's house, upon advise that the soldiers meditated an attack on the Bank. We resolved that a strong guard should be immediately collected, and so posted as best to secure that important object, and as several field officers attended, they immediately and with the greatest alacrity, employed themselves in the business. The President, Vice President and General *Irvine*, directed Captain Stiles, the Commissary of Military Stores, to try the next day if he could not get some fixed ammunition out of the State Magazine, in removing powder that was private property. He did, and thro' the pacific or careless disposition of the guard of soldiers, got out a considerable quantity, and distributed it as ordered, in proper places.

Wednesday the twenty fifth, we were informed that the soldiers were in a very tumultuous disposition, and that there was great ,

reason to apprehend it would rise into some violence, as their mtions would be stopped on the *Friday* following.

We therefore, came to the following resolutions :

In Council, Philadelphia, Wednesday, June the twenty-in. 1783.

Ordered, That the Lieutenants of the city militia, &ca, be directed to call forth a guard of one hundred privates, with mininumber of officers as he may think proper, as a measure indipensable and immediately necessary to secure government from insulthe State from disturbance, and the city from injury. Carpent's Hall is assigned for the place of meeting.

Resolved, That the different officers commanding regiment be requested to hold their respective commands in immediate ratiness for action. It is expected, also, that they will meet this day as soon as possible, for the purpose of determining the place of and signals for rendezvous. A report of their proceedings to be made to the President.

Resolved, That the Commissary of Military Stores be directed to issue such public arms and ammunition us he may now have and der his direction, to the militia of the city and liberties, upon application of the different officers commanding regiments.

While the Clerk was copying these resolutions, Captains Coptic and Symonds, two of the committee of the soldiery, presented to us the three papers inclosed and marked number one, two, and three. These being read, it was unanimously resolved that Concil will not even take the proposals now made by the soldiers into consideration, unless they first put themselves under the command of their officers, and make full and satisfactory submission to Cagress.

This resolution was then communicated to Captains Chrystic and Symonds, and they being informed that it was our unalterable determination, were directed to communicate the same as such to be soldiers.

They assured us this should be immediately done, but that he soldiers did not think they had offended Congress, as their intrtion on Saturday was only to apply to Council. They then proceeded to what was and probably would be, the temper of the troops, upon receiving this answer of Council, and entreated us in take all the measures we possibly could for our own safety and that of the city, as everything licentious was to be apprehended. On this intelligence, Council ordered the guard to be increased to five hundred privates.

We then adjourned, and were severally employed in engrish the militia and citizens in general to take arms immediately. 
