Musser Chemistry Building

On August 25, 1982, the formal groundbreaking ceremony for the new chemistry building was held as students, professors, and college administrators observed. The building, which will be located in the area between Esbenshade Hall and Baugher Avenue, is the first building to be constructed in ten years on the college campus. December 1983 is the anticipated opening date for the facility.

The Harrisburg architectural firm of Murray, Savann designed the facility, and Warfel Construction Company of Lancaster was given the contract to build. The new building which will cost 2.5 million dollars, is being built to facilitate the expanding curriculum Elizabethtown offers in the sciences. The old Gibble Science Hall is no longer suitable for expanding chemistry department needs. The oldest wing of Gibble Hall is approximately fifty years old, and the facilities are both inadequate and outdated.

The new chemistry building was named Musser Hall, in honor of two distinguished alumni of the college. Dr. Benjamin G. Musser '43 and his wife, Vera Shoop '43. Dr. Musser's long and illustrious career in medicine directly relates to the uses to which Musser Hall will be put. He has been a member of the Board of Trustees since 1965 and Mrs. Musser has long been active in the many good works of the Auxiliary to Elizabethtown College. Willoughby led the team with 14 stolen bases and 19 runs scored. Karen Hubler and Jackie Jackson shared the pitching chores throughout the season.

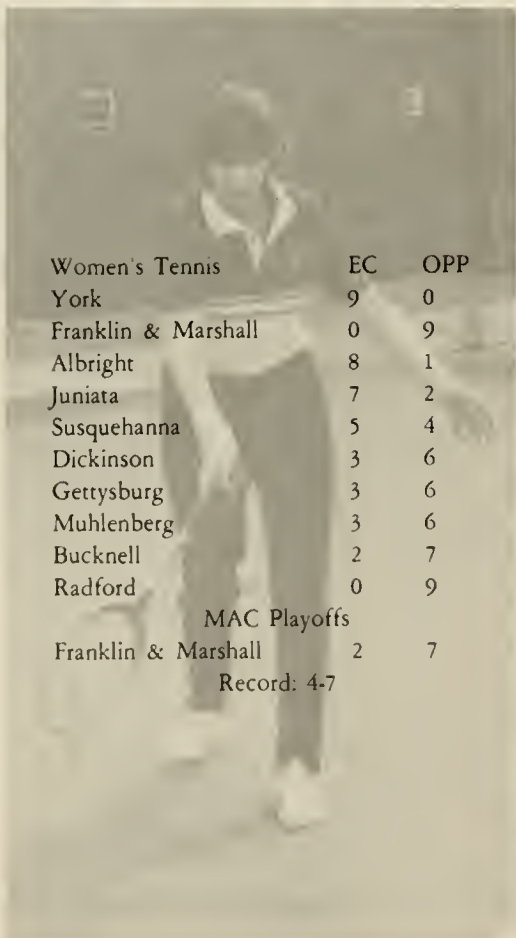

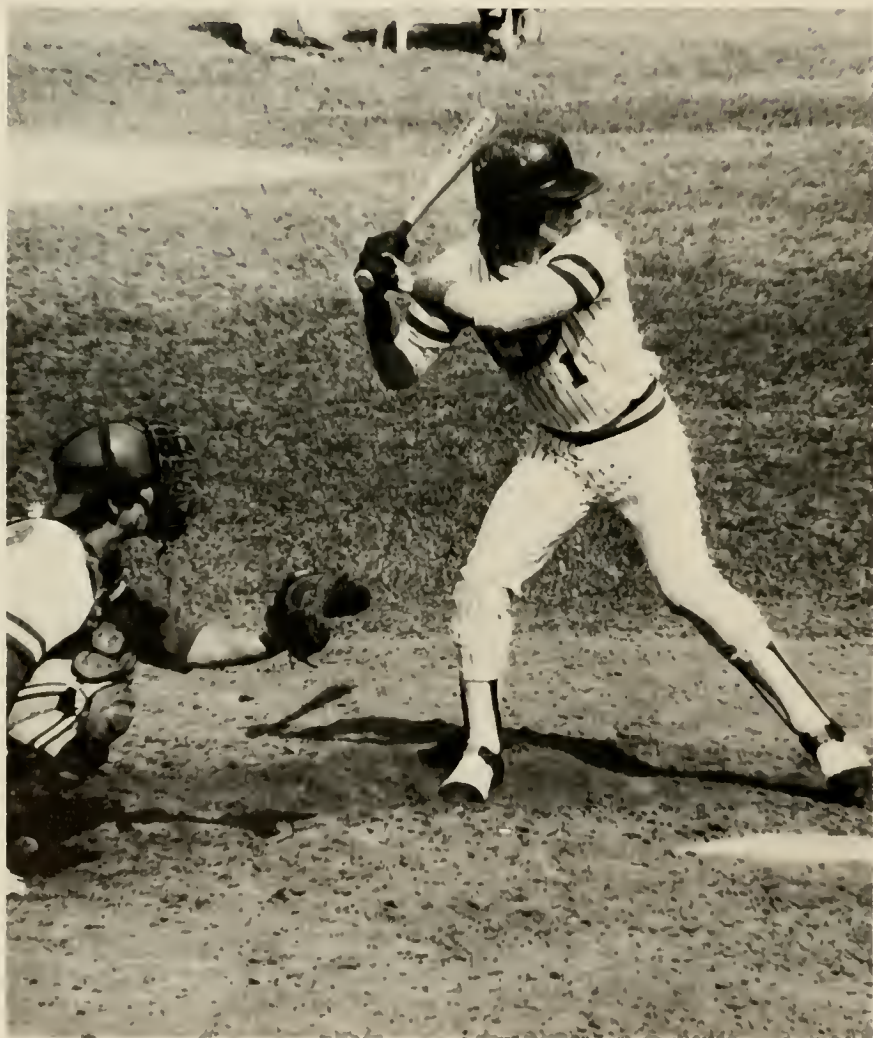
Most importantly the blue and grey earned a berth in the NCAA Nationalis. Although the Jays lost the first and only two games, it was an accomplishment just to make the tournament.

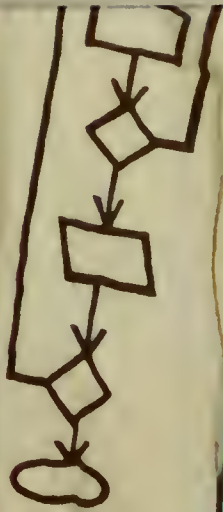

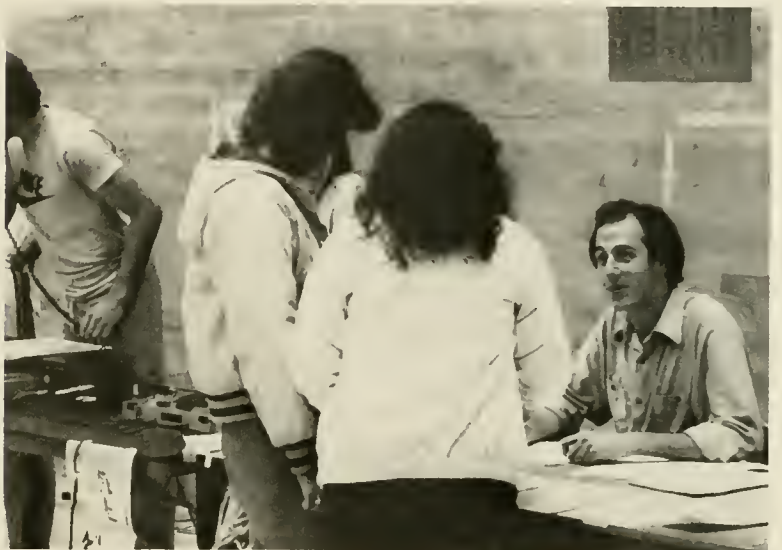
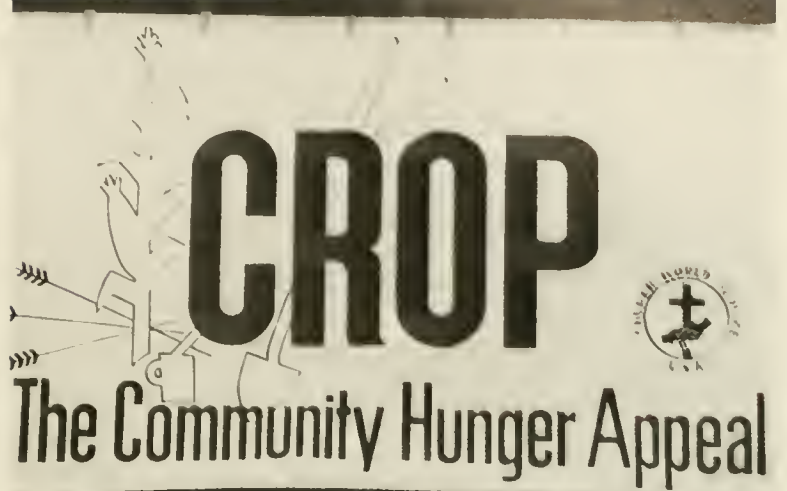


Volleyball Marathon

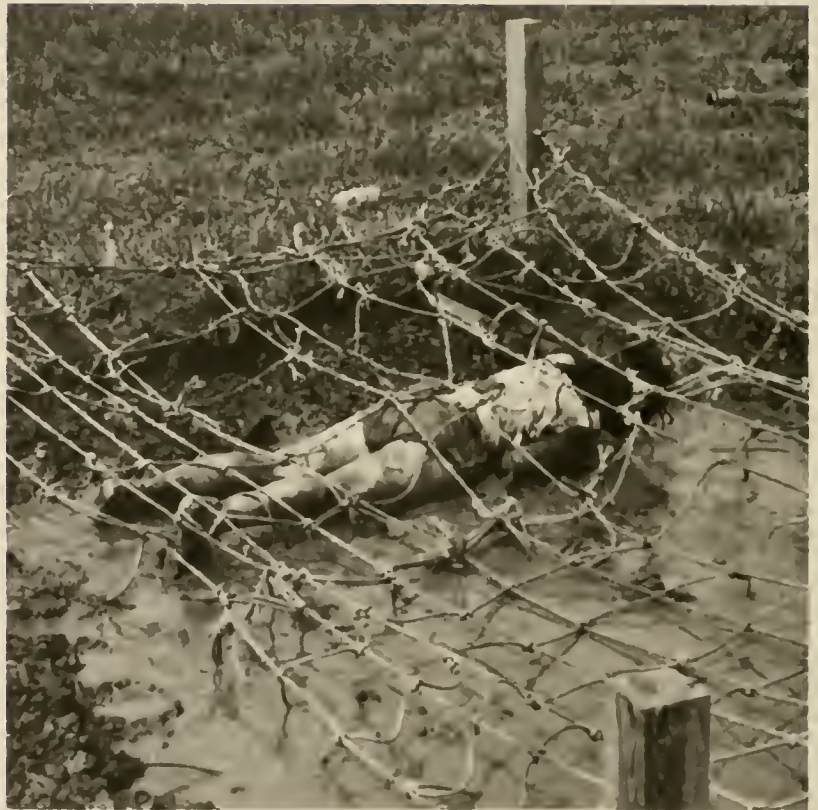
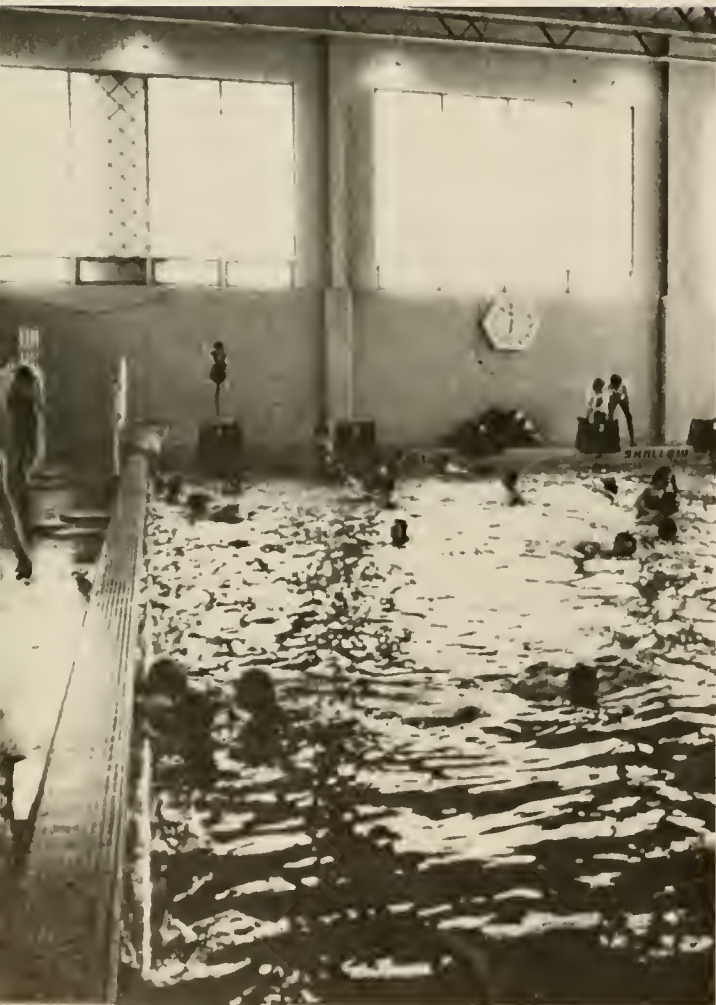

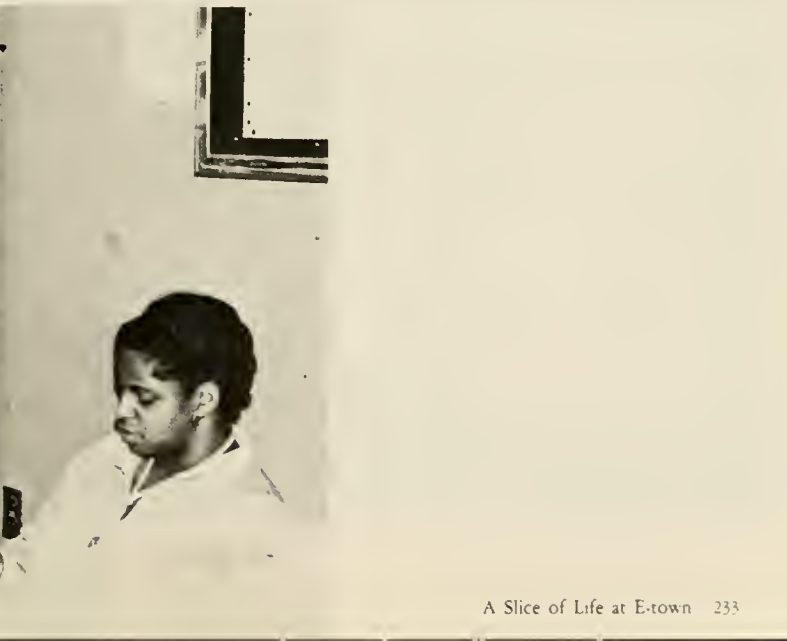

Leonid Brezhnev Is Dead at 75 Kremlin Plans Largest Funeral Since Death of Stalin

MOSCOW — The Soviet leader who announced Thursday that Leonid I. Brezhnev had died suddenly at the age of 75 Wednesday after a chronic illness of heart ailment and would be buried in Red Square apparently on Monday.

Official bulletins released at intervals throughout the day suggested that the Kremlin was preparing for the largest funeral the Soviet union has seen since the death of Joseph Stalin in 1953.

There was no announcement of any decision on a successor to Brezhnev who had held the key post of general secretary of the Communist Party's Central Committee for slightly more than 10 years. It was expected only by Mikhail Gorbachev, the most important post of chairman of the Supreme Soviet — the president.

— a position Brezhnev had held since 1977.

In an announcement by the 287-member Central Committee, convened before Brezhnev's death for a regular November session, the leader who also earned of "a crushing retaliatory strike" against any attempts by "aggressive circles of imperialism" to take advantage of the loss. The statement, also issued in the name of the executive and legislative organs of government, said the Soviet Union would continue to try to eliminate the threat of nuclear war and ensure detente and disarmament.

Speculation on a new party leader focused on two of the 11 men who remain active members of the Politburo, the Central Committee's inner cabinet. One, Yuri V. Andropov, 66, is the former head of the KGB, the state security police, a post he vacated only six months ago. The other, Konstantin U. Chernenko, 71, is a career party

bureaucrat who was Brezhnev's closest political lieutenant for 20 years. Some Western diplomats believed that the leadership had given a hint of its choice with the announcement that Andropov would be the chairman of the official funeral commission, a 25-member body that will oversee all arrangements for the lying in state and the burial. The diplomats recalled that the chairman of the funeral commission appointed on Stalin's death was Nikita S. Khrushchev, who emerged from a bitter struggle with two other leaders to become the pre-eminent Kremlin figure.

Chernenko was also named to the funeral commission, in a listing that placed the eight Politburo members who live in Moscow in alphabetical order after Andropov. Also on the commission was Viktor V. Grishin, aged 61, the Moscow party boss, considered a possible compromise choice for party leader if neither Andropov

nor Chernenko can gain a majority in the Politburo. The Politburo has the effective power to make the selection, which must be formally ratified by the Central Committee, a body with more than 200 members.

One of the first acts of the leadership after the announcement of Brezhnev's death was the publication of an "address" directed, as the heading put it, "to the Communist Party and to the Soviet people." The document took the form of a eulogy to Brezhnev, but one of its purposes appeared to be to signal to the world that the Kremlin leadership remained committed to the detente policy that Brezhnev claimed as his greatest accomplishment.

The document described Brezhnev as "the glorious son of the working class" who was an inspiration to "hundreds of millions of peoples in all continents," and emphasized his commitment to "the policy of peace and peaceful cooperation, detente and

disarmament, of resolutely repudiating imperialism's aggressive designs, of averting a nuclear catastrophe."

It added what sounded like a veiled warning to the United States not to take advantage of the uncertainty in the wake of Brezhnev's death, coupled with a reassurance to the Soviet people that the Kremlin could handle any threat that arose.

"We see the entire complexity of the international situation, the attempts by the aggressive circles of imperialism to undermine peaceful co-existence, to push the people to the path of enmity and military confrontation," the message said.

"But this cannot waver our resolve to uphold peace. We will do everything necessary for those who are tired of military adventures not to catch the Soviet land overseas, for the potential aggressor to know a

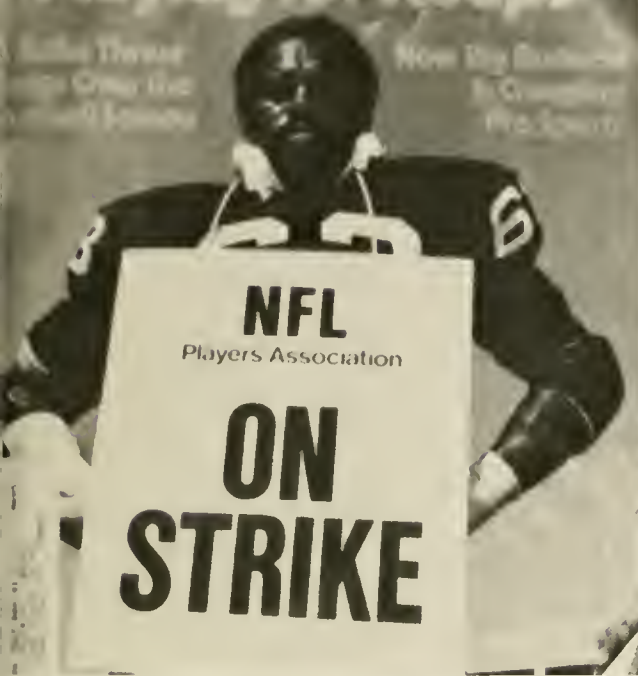

Porter Gets MVP, Sutter Earns Save

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — Bruce Sutter and the St. Louis Cardinals became the world champions.

"As far as I'm concerned, this is the biggest honor of my life," said the Mount Joy native. "It's definitely what I've always wanted to come to in the Baseball Game with a certain kind of pride to hold it."

Sutter, who saved 36 games this season, pitched his biggest save ever Wednesday night, coming in with a 4-3 lead and chopping Milwaukee over the final two innings as the Cardinals defeated the Brewers 6-3 in the decisive seventh game of baseball's 79th World Series.

"We had an injury done on him in the early innings. It was beginning to look bad. Bruce said the Cardinals would beat 3-1 after 3 1/2 innings."

Porter's Tom Herr, who was out of the North at the Cardinals' first run, said the Cardinals always had they could only hope they were helped by a few things.

"I thought we had a chance to win here," Herr said. "We hit we had to win it. We played clean because we had better than the bullpen."

After losing Sutter to the McGee and Smith in center in the fourth inning, they caught in right to send them to third. Once Smith popped to second baseman Jim Gardner, it looked like Smith had an infield

ST. LOUIS — The St. Louis Cardinals — coached by Manager Vinny Herring in his own feisty image and driven by the persistent bats of Darrell Porter, Keith Hernandez and George Hendrick — ended 15 years of frustration Wednesday by beating the Milwaukee Brewers 6-3 and winning baseball's 79th World Series.

Mount Joy's Bruce Sutter pitched the final two innings, putting down six straight batters to earn his second save in the series. He also won the second game of the series.

They were the speed-oriented Cardinals, a replica of Herring's three American League West Division champions in Kansas City, and they were a team of legends.

There was Porter, Herring's catcher at Kansas City, who drove in one of St. Louis' runs in the decisive seventh game and had five RBIs in the Series to earn the Most Valuable Player award.

He continues a struggle against alcoholism that forced him into a treatment center in spring training of 1980, while he was with the Royals, and now he says it's all been worth it.

"This is the most fun I've had playing baseball in my whole career," Porter said. "We've got some people who can really play this game."

Porter was the most overgrown of the baseball version of Mississippi riverboat gamblers. The Cardinals gambled with their present to secure their future back in the front office

there a lot of little things in the field that go unnoticed, and I've just loved to play."

Porter was one of eight players on the Cardinals' World Series roster acquired by Herring after he became manager before the 1981 season. Another was Joseph Anderson, who came back from a leg injury in Georgia to post his second World Series victory and Sutter, the bullpen ace.

Anderson was not perfect, but he was good enough, long enough.

He finally left after seven innings, and Sutter finished the Brewers ready to strike out two and out letting a ball out of the infield.

"Once he (Anderson) got to the seventh," Herring said, "I wanted to go to the best relief pitcher in baseball. We had him a lot of money, we figured we better get him in the game."

Porter and Anderson were also among the Cardinals' legends, however.

Hernandez, who celebrated his 20th birthday Wednesday, won't go to the Series with eight RBIs, and Hendrick had five.

"I don't know what I deserve for MVP," said Porter, who also had been voted Most Valuable Player of the Cardinals' playoff sweep of Atlanta. "There were a lot of guys who could have gotten it."

But I think maybe I got it.
