DEPARTMENT OF THEOLOGY.—Instruction is given by the President, five Professors, and eminent special lecturers appointed from year to year. Students have commodious furnished rooms in the new and attractive building, COUNCIL HALL, which is devoted exclusively to the uses of this Department. They have free access to all the classes, libraries, and cabinets of the other Departments. Fifteen weeks during the summer can be spent in Home Missionary or other labor, with compensation, without interference with studies. The demand for such labor is greater than the supply. During the last half of the course the students have frequent opportunities to supply the neighboring churches. Students who need pecuniary assistance receive the usual aid from the American Education Society and from special funds under the control of the Seminary, enough in all cases to relieve them from embarrassment in pursuing their studies.

DEPARTMENT OF PHILOSOPHY AND THE ARTS.—Eleven Professors give instruction in this Department. The *Classical and Scientific Course* embraces the studies of our best colleges, so arranged that after the Freshman year the student may, by elective studies, give a classical or scientific character to his course, receiving the degree of A. B. at its close. For entrance, three years of Latin, two of Greek, and one term of Geometry are necessary. The *Literary Course* is like the above, with the exception that no Greek and less Latin is required.

DEPARTMENT OF PREPARATORY INSTRUCTION.—Comprises a Classical School, which prepares students for the best colleges, and an English School, which offers the advantages of a first-class academy to those who can spend but a little time at school. Instruction is given by the Principal of this Department, six tutors, and about fifteen special teachers.

Expenses in all departments for tuition, incidentals, and board are *very low*. Students who do not wish to take a full course can select such studies in any department as they are prepared to pursue to advantage. Both sexes admitted. 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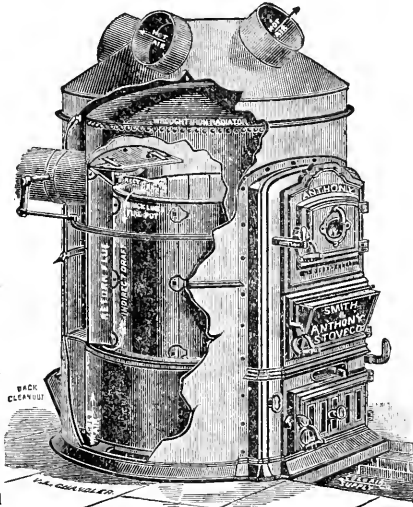
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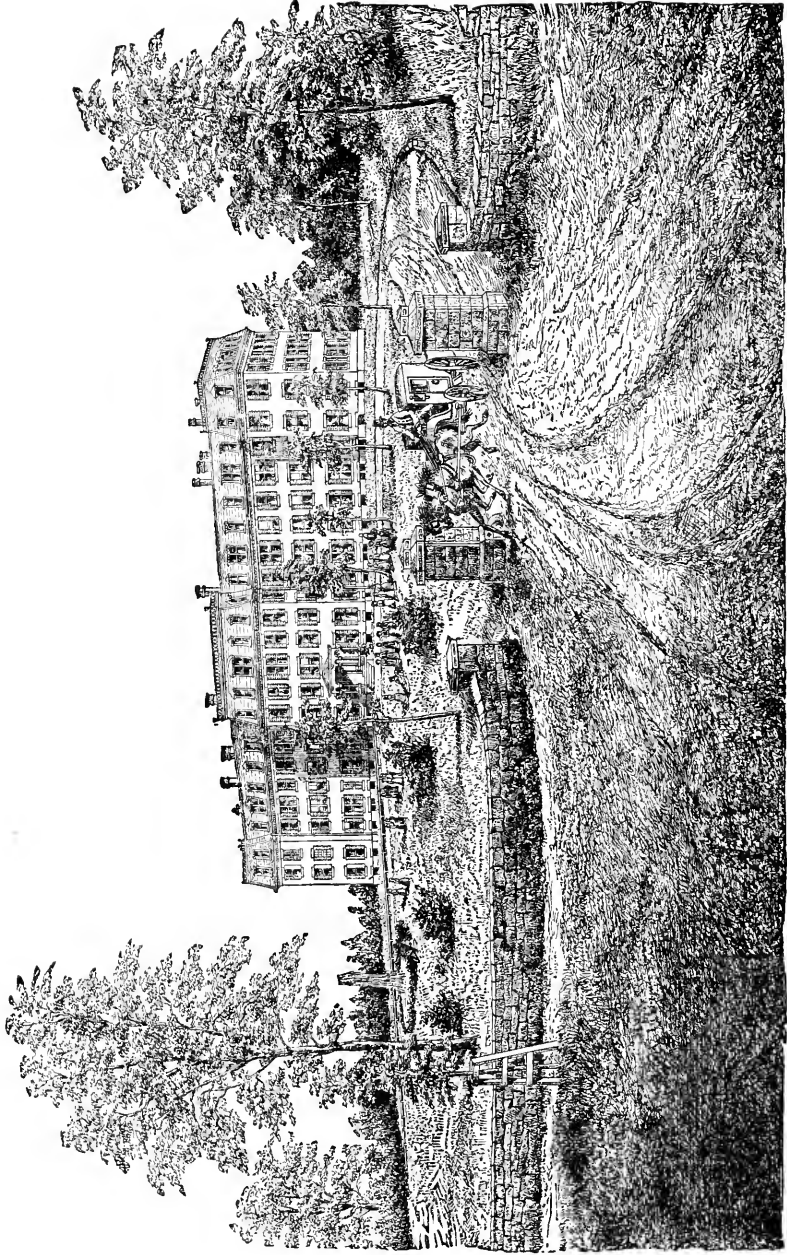
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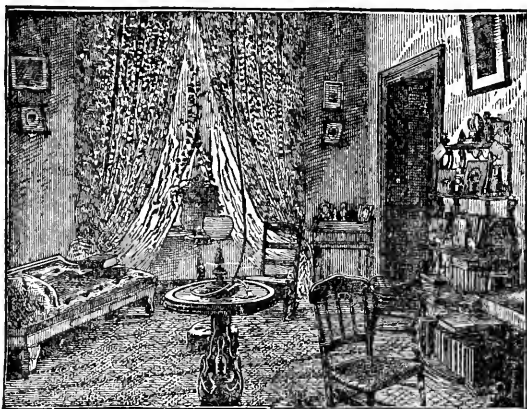

Bradford Academy is the oldest Seminary for young ladies in the country. Founded in 1803 and incorporated in 1804, it has been in successful operation ever since.

Bradford is on the line of the Boston & Maine Railroad, thirty miles from Boston. The situation is elevated, overlooking the city of Haverhill, across the river Merrimac, and commanding broad views on every side. The air is fresh and invigorating, and the healthfulness of the location has been abundantly proved during the past years of the school.

The building is of brick, four stories high, in the form of a cross, wide corridors extending from east to west, and affording healthful promenades in inclement weather. A parlor and two bedrooms constitute a suite of rooms for four pupils. These rooms are eleven and twelve feet high, and receive a full supply of air and sunlight. The school hall, recitation and music rooms, library, reading-room, gymnasium, parlors, dining-room, rooms for business, bathing-rooms and closets are all ordered on a generous scale for convenience, health and comfort. The entire building is heated by steam and lighted with gas, and supplied with abundance of pure water. No efforts are spared to make this a model establishment.

# LASELL SEMINARY FOR YOUNG WOMEN,

AUBURNDALE, MASS.

We suggest to parents seeking a good school for their daughters the following considerations in regard to the special aims of Lasell Seminary in the education of young women:—

*First.* It is thoroughly home-like in character. A large number will never be received. A judicious, motherly care takes the place of given rules. Believing that cooking, dress-cutting, millinery, and similar branches are of importance in every young woman’s preparation for actual life, whether ever required for self-support or not, we have for some years given them attention quite unusual in schools. The instructors are Boston specialists, and these branches are placed on the basis of history, music, bookkeeping, or any of the studies taught.


*Fourth.* It gives unusual opportunities for the study of the modern languages. French and German are taught by one of the best masters in the United States. A few advanced pupils are received into the family of this teacher, who lives near the Seminary, where, while under our care as entirely as in the large building, they will in reality enjoy the advantage of living in a *foreign family*.

*Fifth.* Its musical advantages are unexcelled. Our teachers are specialists of established reputation in Boston. Instruction is given in limited classes, or privately, as desired. The courses for diplomas are more extended than in most conservatories, and pupils have the great advantage of hearing what is best in Boston, a centre of musical culture. Fifteen new and carefully selected pianos have just been placed at the service of the music pupils. They are mostly uprights, and are from Decker & Son, Knabe, Emerson, Hallett & Davis, Chickering, Miller, and Steinway.

*Sixth.* It gives thorough instruction in a broadly planned course of study *quite above the grade of most seminaries*. It utilizes constantly the rare opportunities which its nearness to Boston gives it, for securing the best masters in the various departments. In history and English literature we do unusually extended work. Mr. Henry N. Hudson supplements the class instruction in literature by weekly readings with the pupils, of Shakespeare and other English classics.

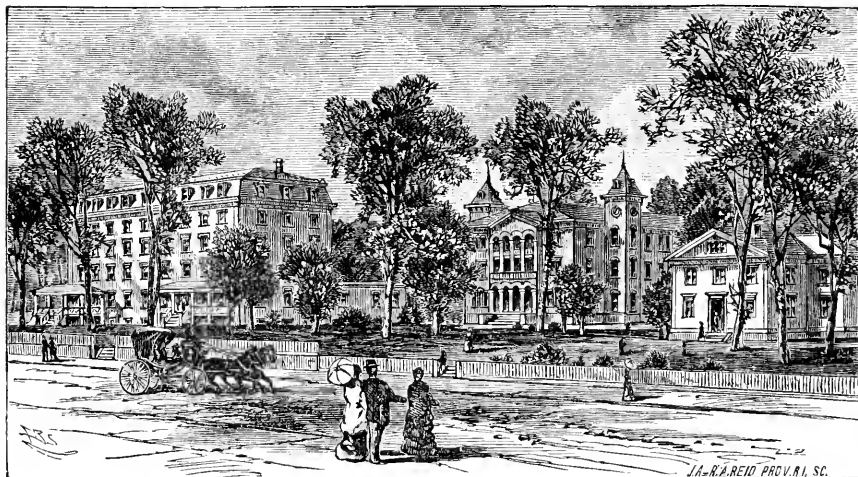

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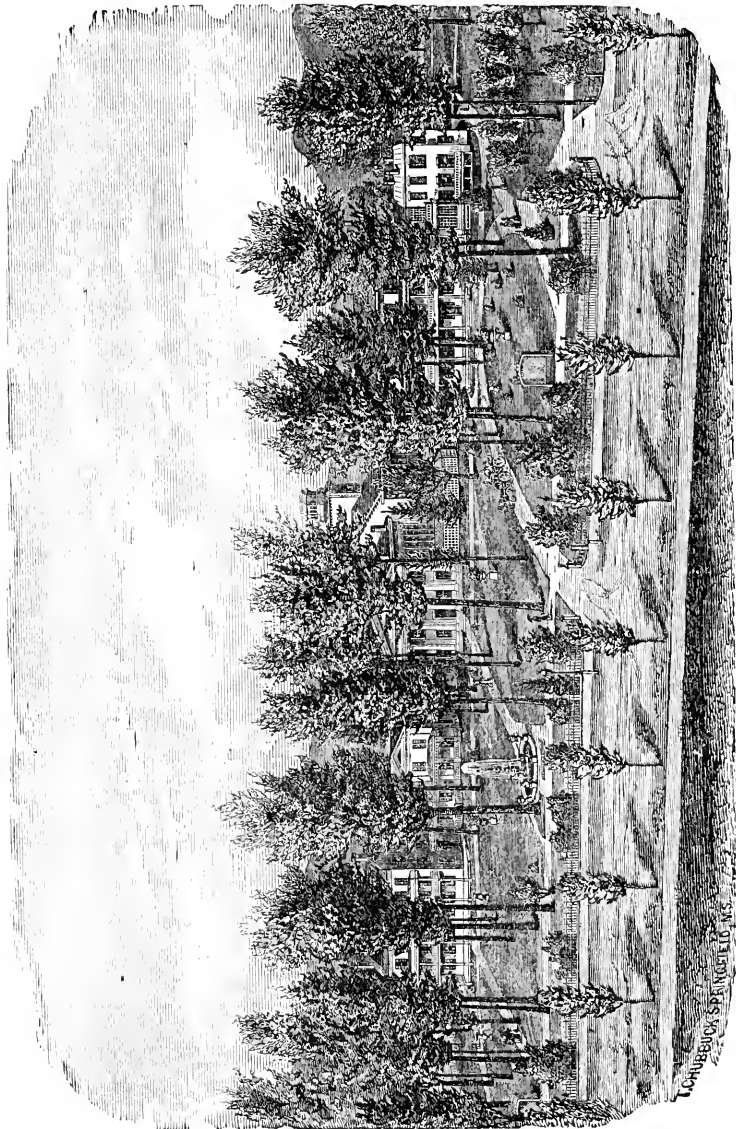

Was founded by Hon. Laban Wheaton, of Norton, in 1834, in memory of his daughter, to be a school for Christian education. It is on the Boston, Clinton, Fitchburg and New Bedford Railroad (Old Colony, Northern Division), within an hour's ride of Boston, and is in connection with all important points by railway and telegraph. It is in a healthful village, entirely free from all temptations and excitements. It is not a large school, and gives, therefore, opportunity for familiar personal intercourse between teachers and pupils. It has a very choice reference library of over three thousand volumes, one of the best furnished laboratories in the country, ample philosophical apparatus, an observatory with a fine telescope, and cabinets of natural history, all of which are accessible for study.

The design of the school is to impart an accurate, thorough and practical education. It especially aims, as it has done from the beginning, to base such education upon a hearty faith in the Bible, and a conscientious Christian life; and it is the endeavor that a pervasive but not officious Christian influence be constantly felt throughout the school.

The regular course of study for graduation covers four years. But pupils can join temporarily such classes as they are prepared to enter, without pursuing the full course.

The expense for the regular course, including tuition, board, room and heating, lights, washing (twelve pieces per week), \$235 per year. The regular tuition of the daughters of clergymen and missionaries is remitted upon application before the beginning of a term. Several scholarships of one hundred dollars each are provided for deserving pupils.

This Academy enjoys many incidental advantages through other literary institutions,—the Theological Seminary and Phillips Academy, in the same village, while easy access to Boston and Cambridge brings within its reach fine Music, Art Galleries, Museums, Cabinets, and the Botanical Garden, to all of which, classes with their teachers have occasional access. The Academy has a fine Clark Telescope, good working cabinets, models and apparatus of its own.

The domestic arrangements are peculiarly homelike. The school is divided into three separate families in separate houses, each under its own matron and teachers. One of these families is made up wholly of pupils in French, in which language the daily table-talk is carried on under the direction of the French teacher. Another family is occupied with German in like manner.

The school has been successfully conducted for twenty years by the same principal teachers, whose constant endeavor is to so educate girls that they may mature into healthful, cultivated, earnest, Christian womanhood.

One reason for the thorough preparation for college at this school is the small size of the Latin classes. 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## OBJECT.

The colleges of no section of our country rely upon their students for the salaries of professors.

The current expenses of Fisk University have thus far been principally met by the A. M. A., but with the hope that the success of its work would create for it friends, who would gladly endow it.

We present to all who have money, and wish to use it in the interests of humanity, this opportunity of investing money in a permanent form, to do a most noble work in behalf of Christian education for the centuries to come, in this country and in Africa.

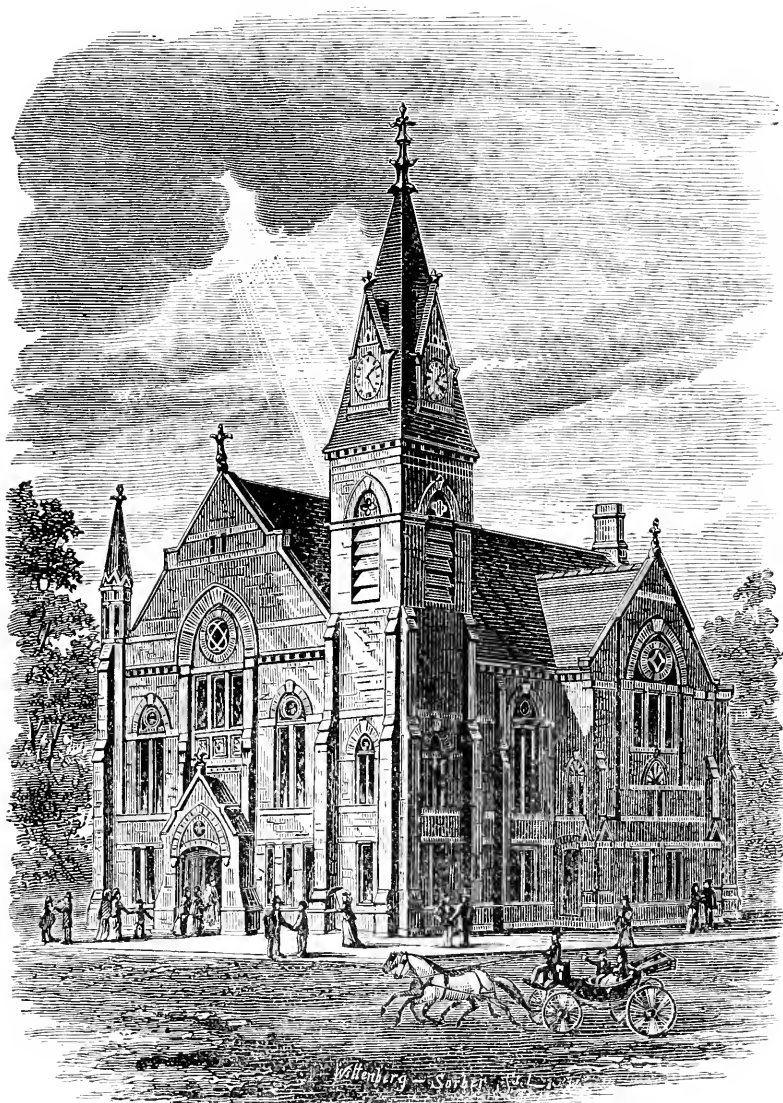

## PREFATORY NOTE.

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THIS issue is made by the direction of the National Council of the Congregational Churches assembled at St. Louis, Mo., in November last. The lateness of the date when it was ordered, and the omission of all tables last year (rendering double work now necessary), has delayed the publication.

By order of the Council, a copy is sent to each church, and one to each minister, by mail, postpaid.

The issue of 1879 contained illustrations, of whose cost some complaint was made. The present issue contains still more, especially plans of churches. It should be said, (1) that the former plans proved to be of material assistance to various churches; and (2) that the added cost this year is far more than provided for by special donations for that purpose.

The addresses of the officers and committees of the National Council will be found on page 215, and of the State organizations upon page 216 and those immediately following. The addresses of officers of our benevolent societies are on pages 42-52; of the professors of the theological seminaries, on pages 53-61.

The preparation of the *Year-Book* of 1882 is already commenced. It is believed that the plans now matured will secure its issue in the first week of January next. But for one State, whose date of meeting is late in the autumn, it could be issued in December, and it is decided to issue the *Year-Book* promptly, whether complete or otherwise.

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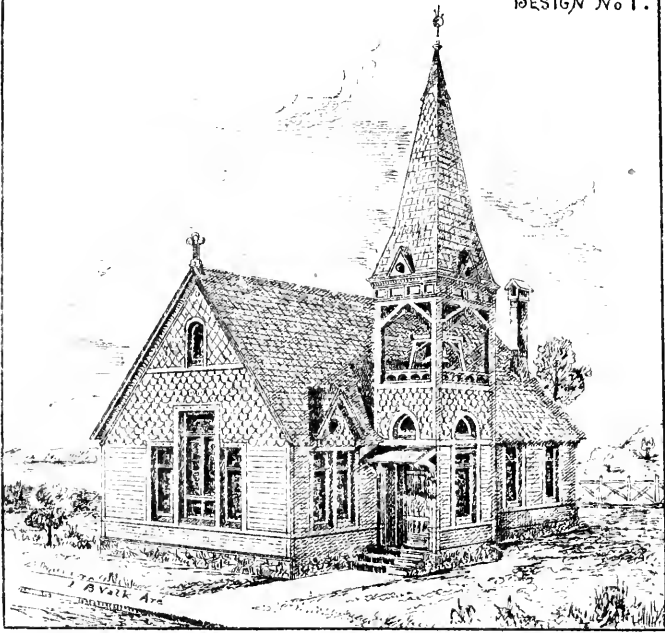

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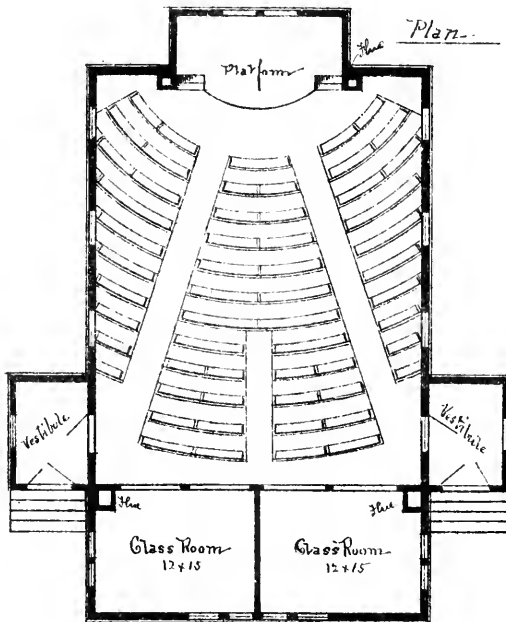




DESIGN No 1.

## DESIGNS IN CHURCH ARCHITECTURE.

IN 1879, with the first issue of the YEAR-BOOK, we illustrated some nine designs for churches, small and large, with a view to introduce to our local and Western societies the new forms which have now become extensively adopted as embracing essential features in building a church. The tendency of the present age is rapidly developing towards the artistic in architecture; and in this second effort to bring to the notice of pastors and building committees some of the later forms and designs we have taken the care and trouble to illustrate, we hope that they will give them the study and thought the plans and designs merit. To build a house to the Lord, and invest your money in it to him, does require close study *how best to do it*; how best to secure the greatest effect for the cost, both inside and out, and how best to secure that comfort, that beauty in unspeakable and inanimate forms, for the cost. The cost,—yes, that is the point. It is asked at once, Can we obtain the beautiful front? and we say, Why not? We show it here in these illustrations; why don't you try it? Why not let every dollar spent represent a feature of strength and beauty? And here it is fully exemplified in these plans. Study them; see how they are seated; notice how the people are clustered around the platform; notice the plan of the lecture rooms, in the arrangement of the doors and windows, and the embellishment of the necessary open fireplace for comfort, warmth, and ventilation. It is often asked, Why are not the prayer-meetings better attended? Pray, what is there to attract? When evening comes round for our religious duty, in what does the attraction consist from your own warm parlors and firesides? In so many hundreds of cases, what is there beautiful, cosy, comfortable, and interesting in our present lecture rooms? To solve that problem we here show how it is done. By so making these audience rooms the very picture of cheerfulness in their arrangement, having open fireplaces, the room seated with chairs or most comfortable seats, and an entire absence of that set form and stiffness to be seen everywhere. The house of the Lord demands it; demands everything beautiful, and in keeping with his holy work; everything that tends to elevate and refine our fellow beings, and teach them to appreciate the beautiful, as given to us and implanted in us by our Lord. With these few remarks we now ask you to study these plans and designs, and then go and build likewise. Write to the architect. He will tell you what, and how to do it; how to build for your means, and within your means, and how to obtain the points and results we conscientiously lay before you.

We present to building committees and trustees the accompanying plans and designs, prepared expressly for this issue of our YEAR-BOOK, and designed by the same architect as illustrated the Book of 1879, Lawrence B. Valk, of New York city. We call especial attention and examination of these PLANS in particular, as illustrating the points heretofore mentioned, as combining the essential features required and needed in our small churches throughout the land, and the adaptability to any kind of a location or site. The circular seating with the radiating aisles at once gives —

*First*, the social element of congregational worship.

*Second*, the advantage of several sizes in the pews, to seat three, four, five, and six persons.

*Third*, the inclined *bowled* floor, — yes, *bowled*, — which is the secret of the great success of these plans.

*Fourth*, any style of architecture will adapt itself to these plans. We show a variety of forms in this issue in the outward appearances, and our building committees and trustees will now find, on reading the short descriptions of each design, just what they want, or approximating to their requirements.

The following gives the description of the church plans furnished by Lawrence B. Valk for this issue of the YEAR-BOOK. For the places where each plan may be found, see "List of Illustrations" following "Table of Contents":—

#### PLAN AND DESIGN NO. 1.

This small church is 32 x 40, with two class rooms directly in front, opening into and a part of audience room; seats 220 in the pews; two vestibules. The class rooms are 12 x 15, or there can be only one room 12 x 32 in front. The partition is of vertical sliding sash, and when down this makes one or two fine, pleasant meeting rooms. Every attention is paid to the heating by stoves of a new make and pattern, and securing a perfect circulation and ventilation. This church is a frame building, on a stone foundation; small cellar; shingle roof; gables and tower shingled; open belfry; enamelled glass; pews pine; interior with wood ceiling; side walls plastered, and its cost complete was \$3,670.

#### PLAN AND DESIGN NO. 2.

This building is also a frame structure; audience room 36 x 36, with a fine, beautiful class or prayer meeting room in front, 13 x 22, opening into audience room, with sliding sash; and off the rear end are two more fine class rooms, each 11 x 15, with sliding sashes. This plan seats 190 in pews, and was designed especially to accommodate a large Sunday school; construction same as No. 1; cost complete was \$4,800.

In both Nos. 1 and 2 the outside is painted two coats; inside is filled, rubbed, and hard oil finished.

#### PLAN AND DESIGN NO. 3.

This plan is for a brick structure, with timber framing in the walls of gables; size of audience room, 28 x 50; seats 227 in pews; has a fine lecture room in front, 14 x 20, used for infant class; two vestibules, each 9 x 12; choir and organ back of pulpit; shingle roof; the walls are built hollow, of local hard brick, rubbed, stained, and pencilled black; open bell-cote; arched wood ceiling; all outside woodwork is painted two coats; inside is filled, rubbed, and hard oil finished. Cost complete was \$3,780.

#### PLAN AND DESIGN NO. 4.

This is for a brick building; size, 36 x 47; seats 240 in the pews; two vestibules, and a beautiful lecture and Sunday-school room, opening full into and a part of the audience room, as needed; the organ is back of the pulpit; choir and keyboard down in front; roof is slate; ceiling arched, of wood; cost complete was \$4,875.

#### PLAN AND DESIGN NO. 5.

This church was designed for a frame structure, slate roof, stone foundation; size, 40 x 45; seats 275 in the pews, which are of ash and cherry; organ is back of pulpit; choir is down in front in first three middle pews. The peculiarity of this design is the open clear-story to a beautiful arched ceiling of iron (now so much used, as there is nothing yet used or invented equal to it). It is heated by one furnace in a small cellar. The cost of this building was \$5,200.

#### PLAN AND DESIGN NO. 6.

This beautiful church is a frame building; the size is 40 x 50 to audience room, seating 325 in the pews of ash and cherry; slate roof; iron ceiling, in groined arches; Sunday-school adjoins and opens into audience room; choir back of pulpit, with organ; and in all its appointments every feature is first-class; cost was \$7,800. This price included two furnaces, lighting-by-gas machine and fixtures, and Valk's complete system of ventilation, which is in all of these designs, in part or wholly so.

## PLAN AND DESIGN NO. 7.

This is for a stone structure, built of stone local to the place, laid up in rock-face ashlar work, in square courses. The audience room is 56 x 60, seating 436 in the pews. The roof is of slate; the ceiling iron, in groined arches, decorated. The vestry or Sunday-school is 20 x 60, and is divided into three rooms, the middle one opening into church. We have a study; three fine vestibules; organ back of pulpit; choir down in front; and I will here say that this arrangement of having choir down in front is rapidly advancing in its perfect adaptation to congregational and social worship in this form of plan. The cost of this structure complete was \$11,870, including *decorating, heating, lighting, and ventilating.*

## PLAN AND DESIGN NO. 8.

This elegant structure is also of stone, with a tall spire 120 feet; walls of local blue granite, rock-face, Ohio stone trimmings, sills, lintels, caps, etc.; slate roof; stained glass; hard-wood, ash, and cherry for all internal finish; iron arched ceiling, decorated, and decorated side walls; size of audience room, 60 x 60; seats 525 in comfortable sittings; and choir and organ back of pulpit; vestry adjoins the church, opens into it, and has a fine lecture room, 20 x 41; parlor, 17 x 26; kitchen, 9 x 15; study, 9 x 14, and every convenience, with heating, lighting, ventilating, everything to make it complete. The cost was \$28,000.

## NORTH CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH, ST. JOHNSBURY, VT.

We quote from the pastor's Statement at the dedication:—

“At a meeting of the congregation called for Monday, April 9, 1877, the committee reported \$37,114.68 subscribed. Thereupon, a building committee was appointed, of which Gov. Horace Fairbanks was made chairman. . . .

“Before winter set in the foundation was completed, and the ground brought up nearly to grade. For this, and to complete the grading, 3,514 cartloads of earth were requisite.

“We had thus far expected to build of brick. During the winter the desire became general and strong to employ stone. At length, as the season drew near for renewing operations, Messrs. Horace and Franklin Fairbanks made to the building committee this proposition: To build a stone church, substantially according to the plans before us, for the subscriptions, the committee keeping the amount good as nearly as possible, and the old house. Such an offer was of course accepted, and the opening spring, 1878, witnessed the vigorous renewal of operations. The stone selected was the Isle La Motte marble. It was brought by boat to Maquam Bay, and thence across the State by rail. The walls are backed with brick. The main partitions are also of brick.

“Sept. 16, the corner stone was laid. Before another winter set in the chapel walls were up and covered, and those of the main building had reached the eaves. The dimensions of this house are as follows: Length of audience room on the floor, 76 feet; including gallery, 90 feet; breadth, 56 feet; do. including transepts (each 35 by 9), 74 feet; height, 42 feet. Dimensions of chapel, including parlors, 73 by 35 feet. All these are inside measurements. Entire length outside, 162 feet. Height of turret from the ground, 140 feet.

“The contract for building was made with E & T. Fairbanks & Co., who proposed to take the subscriptions pledged, and the old house when the church was through with it, and erect a new one substantially according to the plan adopted by the building committee. This has been done, and the beautiful edifice dedicated to-day is free from debt.”

The cost is not made public.

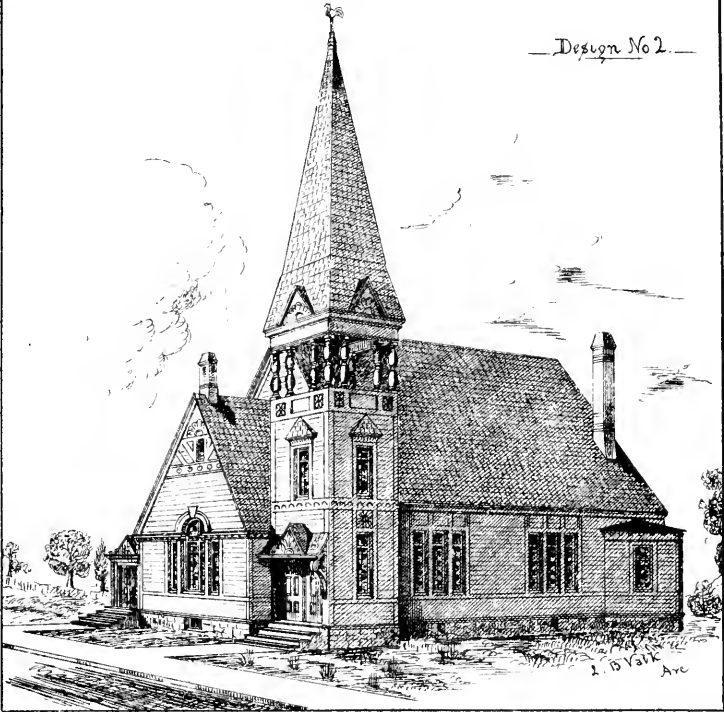

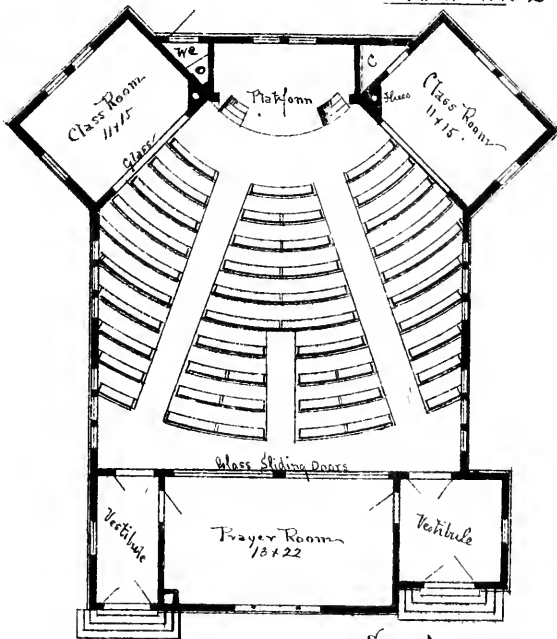

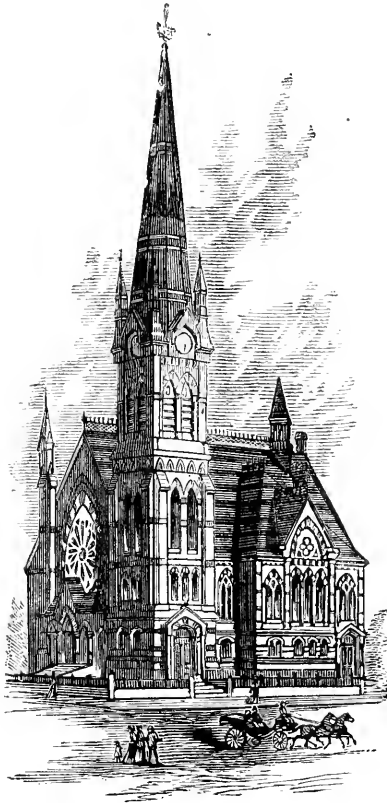

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AIKEN, JOHN FRANCIS, son of Hon. John and Mary Means (Appleton) Aiken, was born in Lowell, Mass., 1835, Oct. 31. Phillips Academy. Graduated, Dartmouth College, 1858. Teacher, Phillips Academy, 1858-9. Studied law, Chicago and New York, 1860-3, and practised that profession in New York, 1863-6. Resided in Andover after 1866. Read theology privately, and in 1870 was a member of the Seminary. Ordained at Pawlet, Vt., 1873, Oct. 2, and acting pastor there until 1878, and afterwards in Chichester, N. H., till death. Published *The History of Liberty*. Died of pneumonia, in Chichester, 1880, Aug. 13, aged 44 years, 9 months, and 13 days.

ALVORD, JOHN WATSON, son of Dea. James H. and Lucy (Cook) Alvord, was born in Easthampton, Conn., 1807, April 18. Oneida Institute. One year in Lane Seminary. Graduated, Oberlin Theological Seminary, 1836. Ordained, 1836, Sept. 16. Acting pastor, Maumee City, Ohio, 1836-7. Barkhamsted, Conn., 1838-42. Installed, Stamford, 1842, March 16; dismissed, 1864, Oct. 14. Installed, Phillips Church, South Boston, Mass., 1846 Nov. 4; dismissed, 1852, March 24. Secretary American Tract Society, Boston, 1858-66. Superintendent of schools, etc., Freedmen's Bureau, at Washington, 1866-70. Treasurer Freedmen's Savings and Trust Company, 1871-4. Married, 1845, June 3, Myrtila Mead, daughter of Obadiah and Lisette (Mead) Peck, of Greenwich, Conn. Eight children. Died in Denver, Col., 1880, Jan. 14, aged 72 years, 8 months, and 26 days.

ANDERSON, RUFUS, D. D., son of Rev. Rufus and Hannah (Parsons) Anderson, was born in North Yarmouth, the part now Cumberland, Me., 1796, Aug. 17. Graduated, Bowdoin College, 1818, and Andover Theological Seminary, 1822. Assistant of the Secretary A. B. C. F. M., 1822-4; Assistant Secretary, 1824-32; Foreign Secretary, 1832-66. During this service, he twice visited the Levant, 1828-9 and 1845. In 1854-5, he visited India, Syria, and Turkey, and in 1863 the Hawaiian Islands. Dartmouth College conferred the honorary D. SNOW, BENJAMIN GALEN, son of Benjamin and Nancy (Burrell) Snow, was born in Brewer, Me., 1817, Oct. 4. North Yarmouth Academy. Graduated, Bowdoin College, 1846, and Bangor Theological Seminary, 1849. Acting pastor, Pembroke, Me., 1850, July, to 1851, July. Ordained, at Brewer, 1851, Sept. 25, and sailed in November for Honolulu, to become one of the pioneer missionaries of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions to Micronesia. Stationed ten years at Kusaie, or Strong's Island, and afterwards at Ebon, Marshall Islands. Returned to America, 1870-1, and on account of health, in 1877. He reduced the language of Kusaie to writing, and in large part that of the Marshall Islands, and with his hand press printed much. Married, 1851, Sept. 1, Lydia Vose, daughter of Ebenezer and Mehitable (Vose) Buck, of Robbinston. One son and one daughter. Died in Brewer, of paralysis, 1880, May 1, aged 62 years, 6 months, and 28 days.

SNOW, ROSWELL ROBINSON, son of Samuel and Jerusha (Robinson) Snow, was born in Ashford, Conn., 1810, June 30. Monson Academy. Student Yale College, 1833-5. Read law with Gov. C F. Cleveland, and admitted to the bar, Brooklyn, Conn., 1838. Practised law in Connecticut until 1840, and Racine, Wis., 1840-1. Graduated, Yale Theological Seminary, 1844. Ordained, Troy, Wis., 1845, Feb. 26; dismissed, 1847. Acting pastor, Rochester and Waterford, 1847, November, to 1855, and 1857 to 1862; Bristol, 1855-6; Hartland and Pewaukee, 1856-7; Udina, Ill., 1862-8; Wilmot, Wis., 1869-72. Agent American Tract Society, 1867, and of American Peace Society, 1868. Acting pastor, Wayne, Ill., 1874-6. Without charge, Elgin, until death. Married, 1844, Oct. 6, Elizabeth M., daughter of Charles and Sarah (Ayer) Smith. No children. Died in Elgin, of a cancerous affection of the bowels, 1880, Dec. 3, aged 70 years, 5 months, and 3 days.

STREETER, SERENO WRIGHT, son of Rufus and Sarah (Fisher) Streeter, was born in Rome, Mass., 1810, Dec. 12. Shelburne Academy and Oneida Institute. Member of Lane Theological Seminary, 1833-4. Graduated, Oberlin Theological Seminary, 1836. Ordained in Oberlin, 1836, August. Agent of Antislavery Society, 1886-8, and 1839-40. Acting pastor, Madison, Ohio, 1838-9. Installed, Austinburg, 1842, March 2; dismissed, 1848, May 1. This pastorate he resumed 1861-74. Acting pastor, Henrietta, Ohio, 1848-57. Professor of Intellectual Philosophy, Otterbein University, Westerville, Ohio, 1857-60. Acting pastor, Union City, Mich., 1859, Nov. 9, until installed there, 1863, February; dismissed, 1869, November. Acting pastor, Saybrook, Ohio, 1874-9; Wayne, 1879, till death. Published, "Slavery a Sin, *per se*." Married, 1838, October, Mary Williams, of Ware, Mass. She had three sons, and died 1843. He married, 1844, February, Sarah Jane, daughter of John and Beede Mary (Cooper) Willard, of Wilton, Me., who has four children. Died in Wayne, of heart disease, 1880, April 7, aged 69 years, 3 months, and 26 days.

THACHER, ISAIAH CROCKER, son of Matthew and Betsey (Crocker) Thacher, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., 1815, July 2. Monson and Wilbraham Academies. Graduated, Union College, 1841, and Yale Theological Seminary, 1844. Ordained, Mattapoisett, Mass., 1844, Dec. 25; dismissed, 1849, July 31. Installed, Middleboro', 1849, Aug. 16; dismissed, 1852, Nov. 22; and again 1856, April 16, to 1860, April 2. Installed, South

Dennis, 1852, Dec. 21; dismissed, 1856, March 24. Installed, Gloucester, 1860, April 26; dismissed, 1870, Aug. 18. Installed, Wareham, 1870, Oct. 27; dismissed, 1877, Sept. 13. Acting pastor, Lakeville, from 1877, October, until installed there, 1879, Jan. 15. Resigned in the autumn, and removed to Peabody a few weeks before his death. Married, 1845, Jan. 7, Elizabeth Russell, daughter of Rev. Charles and Mary L. Hyde, of Ashford, Conn. She died 1848, Nov. 24, leaving one child. He married, 1849, Oct. 24, Mary C. Hyde, her sister. She had four children, and died 1865, Aug. 27. He married, 1866, Nov. 21, Lydia W., daughter of Abel and Lydia P. Proctor, of South Danvers. He died in Peabody, of heart disease, 1880, March 16, aged 63 years, 8 months, and 14 days.

THOMPSON, SAMUEL HOPKINS, son of Samuel and Betsey (Hull) Thompson, was born in Berlin, Ohio, 1814, Sept. 4. Entered Lane Seminary, but went to Oberlin, where he graduated, 1839, and from Oberlin Theological Seminary, 1842. Ordained, 1842, August. Acting pastor, Whitford and Wakeman, Ohio, 1842-3. Home missionary in Wisconsin, 1843-77; at Waterloo (now Shopiere) and Mount Zion, 1844-8; Johnstown and Rock River, 1848-51; Salem, Wilmot, Bristol, Antioch, and Liberty, 1851-4; Udina, 1855-6; Ringwood and Greenwood, 1856-60; Pleasant Prairie, 1860-3; Kenosha, 1863-4, supplying neighboring churches; Allen's Grove, 1864-5; Portland and Waterloo, 1865-7; Rio and Wyocena, 1867-9; Osseo and neighboring churches, 1869-74; De Soto, Wheatland, and Sterling, 1874-7; Smith Centre and Cora, Kansas, 1878; and Smith Centre, Gaylord, Harlan, and Bethany, 1879-80. Married, 1842, Aug. 25, Abigail Hull, daughter of Benoni and Lois Elizabeth (Hull) Dickerman, of Berlin, Ohio. WALCOTT, JEREMIAH WHIPPLE, son of James Dexter and Hannah (Jencks) Walcott, was born in Cumberland, R. I., 1812, Nov. 27. Kimball Union Academy, Meriden, N. H. Graduated, Dartmouth College, 1839, and Auburn Theological Seminary, 1843. Ordained, 1852, July 1, at Stockbridge, Wis. Home missionary, Virgil, N. Y., 1844-5. Principal Munroe Academy, 1845-6. Teacher, Elbridge, N. Y., 1846-8, and Auburn Female Seminary, 1848-50. Home missionary, Menasha, Wis., 1850-2. Acting pastor, Ripon, 1853. Teacher, 1853-9. Without charge, Ripon, 1858, until death. General agent of Ripon College, 1858. Married, 1844, May 21, Hannah Burton Church, who died 1849, July 5. He married, 1853, June 27, Caroline, daughter of Jacob and Azubah Cooper, formerly of Croydon, N. H. Of four children, two are living. Died at Green Lake, Wis., of cancer in the throat, 1880, Aug. 14, aged 67 years, 8 months, and 17 days.

WELLS, MILTON, son of Rufus and Anna (Jones) Wells, was born in Johnstown, N. Y., 1814, April 22. Student at Kingsboro', N. Y., and Farmington, Ohio, and Oberlin College and Theological Seminary. Ordained, 1843, September. Home missionary, Rochester, Wis., 1843-7; Burlington, 1843-5; North Rochester, 1845-7; Troy, 1847-53; Shopiere, 1853-7; New Lisbon, 1857-62; Hartland, 1862-7. Without charge, Beaver Dam, 1867-9. Acting pastor, Oak Grove, 1869-71; Fulton, 1871-6. With-

out charge, Milwaukee, 1876-9. Acting pastor, Palmyra, 1879, April, till death. Married, 1843, Sept. 21, Melissa, daughter of Chauncey and Priscilla (Pinney) Smith, of Butler, N. Y. Two of five children are living. Died of general debility, Palmyra, Wis., 1880, April 28, aged 66 years and 6 days.

WHITE, ORRIN WASHINGTON, son of Oliver and Pamela (Bacon) White, was born in Winsted, Conn., 1821, April 5. Graduated, Oberlin College, 1848, and Theological Seminary, 1854. Ordained, Olmsted, Ohio, 1854, Dec. 6. Acting pastor there one year; Strongsville, 1856, January, to 1863, January; Unionville, 1863-6; Rockport, 1868-72; Weymouth, 1872, until death. Principal Morrisville Union School, three years. Published several sermons, addresses, and poems. OUR PRESENT FIELD, as reported in 1880, includes seventeen missions, the statistics of which for a single year are exceedingly instructive, illustrating both the breadth and variety of our work. This work includes direct evangelistic effort through missionaries and native helpers; an immense educational trust extending from the primary school to the college and theological seminary; Sunday-school instruction; the preparation, publication, and circulation in different languages of books, tracts, and newspapers; assistance in the erection of buildings for churches and schools; grants in aid to feeble churches and to native home missionary societies; the humane service of missionary physicians, sometimes in the care of large dispensaries and hospitals; also charitable ministry, continuous and varied, to the sick, the poor, and the oppressed. All these departments upon the foreign field are economically managed under the one efficient and experienced administration of the American Board.

OUR PRESENT FORCE, now occupying seven hundred and nineteen stations and out-stations, numbers but one hundred and forty-seven ordained missionaries, of whom seven are physicians, and two hundred and fifty assistant missionaries, making a total from this country of three hundred and ninety-seven. Our native force is more than thrice this number, a total of 1,427, of whom 465 are native pastors, preachers, and catechists.

OUR NATIVE CHURCHES, two hundred and seventy-three in number, not including those of the Hawaiian Islands, enroll nearly seventeen thousand members, of which number over nineteen hundred were received last year, over fifty-seven hundred during the last three years, on confession of their faith in Christ.

OUR TRAINING AND THEOLOGICAL SCHOOLS, including station classes, twenty-nine in number, are giving instruction to nearly twelve hundred young men, many of them fitting for the Christian Ministry.

OUR GIRLS' SCHOOLS, of the higher order, thirty-eight in number, enroll over thirteen hundred pupils, many of them fitting to be teachers, many of them to be Christian wives and mothers, constituting the educational power of Christian homes for the next generation.

OUR COMMON SCHOOLS, seven hundred and thirty-seven in number, enroll over twenty-seven thousand pupils, making a total of over thirty thousand under Christian instruction.

REGULAR DONATIONS FROM THE CHURCHES, which during the past three years have fallen below the contributions of the preceding three years by more than \$100,000, need to advance at least *twenty per cent* in order to meet the annual appropriations. Upon these donations and upon ordinary legacies we must rely for the support of the regular work of the Board, the munificent Otis bequest having been sacredly set apart, and already to a considerable degree expended, for evangelistic and educational enlargement, and for new missions in Africa. May we hope for a contribution, as generous as possible, not only from every church and Sunday school, but also from every individual who desires to be personally identified with this broad Christian work? Our main instrumental reliance for awakening and deepening missionary interest is upon pastors, sustained by their churches and Sunday-schools.

## AMERICAN COLLEGE AND EDUCATION SOCIETY.

FORMED by the union, in 1874, of the "American Education Society" and the "Society for the Promotion of Collegiate and Theological Education." The American Education Society was organized and received its charter from Massachusetts in the year 1816. The College Society, as the other organization was popularly called, was formed in 1843. It was for years a voluntary association without a charter. In 1872 it received a charter also from the State of Massachusetts. These two organizations were brought together under a new charter from the same State, in May, 1874.

Income of the Society for year ending April 30, 1880, \$64,097.47. Of this amount \$38,983.15 was devoted to the help of Western institutions, and \$21,800 was appropriated to young men in colleges and theological seminaries, studying for the ministry. The balance was for current expenses.

In both departments the Society has had a large agency in the formation of society throughout the great West. The men who were pioneers in the work of preaching the gospel in the new settlements, and in the founding of churches and schools, were largely educated by this Society. The colleges which are now among the foremost in these Western fields were largely built up by the same agency.

The whole number of young men assisted by the Society in their studies for the ministry since 1816 is 6,809. The institutions at the West which have been assisted by the Society since 1843 are the following, viz.: Western Reserve, Illinois, Wabash, and Marietta Colleges, and Lane Theological Seminary. These five are the institutions which the Society took under its care at the beginning, in 1843. Those which have since been received on the list are Knox, Beloit, Thayer, Wittenberg, Oberlin, and Berea Colleges, the College of California, Pacific University, Olivet, Ripon, Iowa, Carelton, Doane, Drury, Washburn, and Colorado Colleges, and Pacific Theological Seminary.


The ten last named are still upon the Society's list.

The number of young men now receiving assistance from the Society is 280.

At the time when the Education Society began its work of helping young men into the Christian ministry in the year 1816, the condition of things in this country was very peculiar. The great movement of emigration toward the West was setting in with strength. The American Board had been organized a few years before, and the cause of Foreign Missions was taking strong hold upon the churches. But "the laborers were few." Ever since the close of the Revolutionary war, the churches had been in a confused and preoccupied state, and the number of men coming forward for the work of the ministry was alarmingly small. It was in such a state of things that this Society began its enterprise. Through the aid thus afforded, and through the impulses thus imparted, a host of living preachers was raised up to go with the moving colonies out into the fields of the West, or to go far hence to the Gentiles to proclaim the Gospel of Salvation through Jesus Christ. A work of inestimable importance for the Christianizing and civilizing of our own land was accomplished by this instrumentality. The ministers raised up by this Society became to a large extent the pioneers in the way of founding churches, schools, colleges throughout all those Western fields, while in foreign lands half the missionaries laboring under the care of the American Board had been brought forward in the same way.

## THE AMERICAN CONGREGATIONAL ASSOCIATION

Was organized May 25, 1853, at Boston, and received its charter from the Massachusetts Legislature, April 12, 1854. Its present officers, in part, are:—

The object of this Association is "to establish and perpetuate the religious history and literature of New England, and for the erection of a suitable building for the accommodation of the same, and for the use of charitable societies; also to do such acts as may promote the interests of Congregational churches." etc.

Its library is intended for reference, having as its specialties everything published by the Pilgrims and Puritans, and their predecessors, contemporaries, and successors, which states or illustrates the principles and polity of Congregationalism, its history, its doctrines, its influence, and indeed the same things in regard to every denomination: thus everything ecclesiastical, — theology, controversy, results of councils, sermons, church manuals, minutes of religious bodies, *every one*; Year Books, and all such like; also all local histories, county, State, and United States histories, genealogies centennial, ordination, funeral, and all historical sermons, all commentaries on the Scriptures, every biography, national, State, and municipal statistics, printed reports of all kinds, catalogues, obituary records, and inaugurations of all our literary institutions, together with any manuscripts, autographs, or mementoes which relate to the objects above named.

On the 20th of May, 1880, the library had 27,549 books — 6,039 of which were duplicates — and over 120,000 pamphlets, including duplicates secured almost exclusively by gifts, as there has never been a dollar appropriated from the building fund with which to buy a book, nor can there be until the present onerous debt is greatly reduced. Duplicates furnish a basis for exchanges, for which the librarian has large facilities, and of which he avails himself to the uttermost; and in this way he can assure all kindly disposed persons that they can send him no printed pamphlet or book that he cannot make useful here.

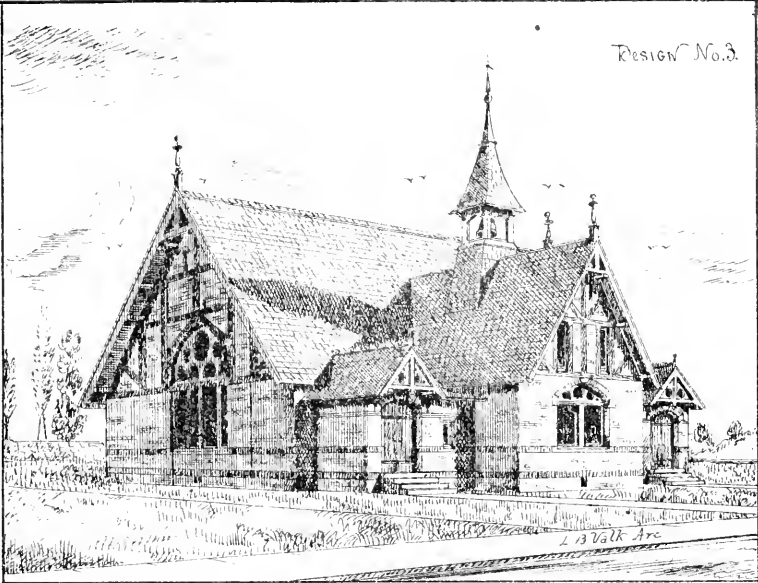
The library has now more of the early publications of our country and of the mother country which illustrate the principles and relate the deeds of our first settlers than any other public library in the United States; but it is still lacking very much of this sort that is scattered here and there, essentially useless where it is, but would be invaluable here; also much more of the later and contemporaneous issues of the same general character found in every parish and town, more or less. Now, let these be collected and sent here by some good friend in each church, as a few have already done.

The Congregational House is a four-story granite structure, one hundred and three feet on Beacon Street, and ninety-three feet on Somerset Street, having stores on lower floors on Beacon Street, and rooms above for the A. B. C. F. M., the Woman's Board, the American College and Education Society, American Missionary Association, City Missionary Society, Woman's Home Missionary Society, Massachusetts Home Missionary Society, American Peace Society, the *Congregationalist*, etc. The fire-proof library room is in a connected building; accessible, light, pleasant, safe, and has capacity for more than 100,000 volumes.

The great WANT of this Association is the hearty sympathy and co-operation of every Congregationalist, expressed in "one fair contribution" from each of the more than 2,300 Congregational churches that have not made it; the gift of at least one dollar from every member, to be made a life-member of the Association; the gift of the twenties fifties, hundreds, and thousands from the more highly favored; testamentary gifts, if not earlier bestowed. Then this great property would be disencumbered, and all our strictly benevolent societies would be forever afterwards free from rent, thus insuring a good dividend to the cause of Christ upon every benefaction.

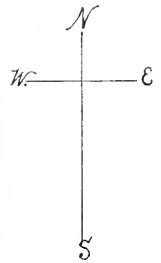
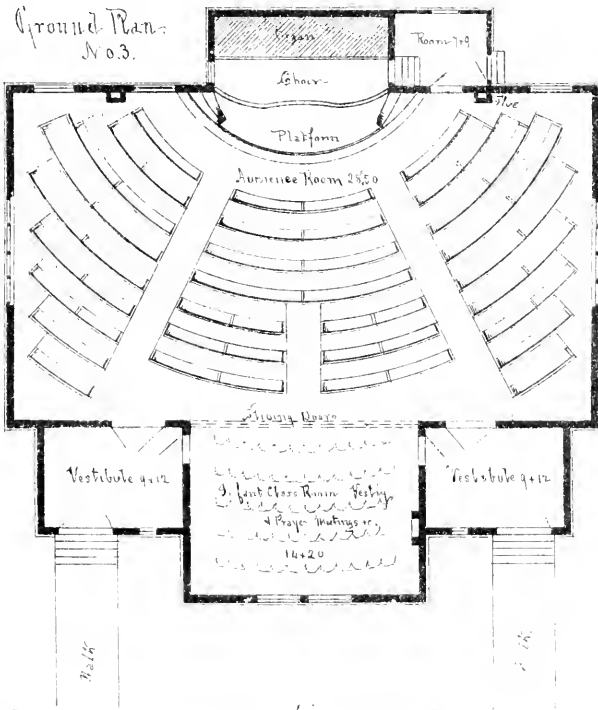

## AMERICAN CONGREGATIONAL UNION.

The American Congregational Union was organized in 1853. Its chief work has been to aid feeble churches in building houses of worship. It has helped to build, East and West, chiefly West (including those aided from the Albany Fund), 1,110 meeting-houses, and is now pledged, Jan. 1, 1881, to sixty-seven others; which is many more than one third of all the Congregational Churches in the land. Most of these sanctuaries could not have been built at all, and none of them when they were, but for the aid furnished by the Union. The aggregate sum expended in this church-building work is about \$1,000,000. This money is protected from loss to the Congregational cause should the churches aided fail, or cease to be evangelical Congregational Churches. Our protection now, and for years past, is in the form of a trust mortgage on the whole property — carefully drawn, executed, and recorded — on payment of last bills. We have thus accumulated claims of one sort or another upon upwards of \$3,000,000 of property. Nothing can be lost should any of the churches fail, as, for one reason or another, they sometimes do. In the last few years we have received back from churches that have failed or gone over to other denominations, over \$50,000. If all the money given by Congregational churches and people to the work of church-building could go to its destination through the Union, not a dollar would be lost. Every house built is dedicated free of debt; and our trust-mortgages, besides protecting the gifts, keep the churches from running in debt afterwards, as they cannot borrow money on their property because of our underlying claim.

Churches, if they are to live and prosper, must have sanctuaries. As well might families live in the streets, or business men carry on business without offices, factories, store-rooms, or farms, as for churches to live, grow, and become strong and useful without houses of worship. It is coming to be more and more recognized that, as a rule, if a church cannot be housed it should not be organized. And as a rule, too, new churches, in a new country, must have a little help if they build early, and they must build early if they are to build at all. A meeting-house often more than doubles, at once, the strength of a congregation, and adds from 50 to 100 per cent to the efficiency of the minister. In no other way can \$500 do so much for a new and struggling church as to secure for it a neat house of worship; and to secure this by so stimulating and developing the energies of the people as to make church-building a possibility, and the church a nucleus around which the neighborhood may crystallize.

The new regions on the frontier advancing westward are opening as they never did before; and the little churches, everywhere organizing, are calling on the Union almost daily for aid in building roof-trees over their heads. They need missionaries; but the missionary must have a meeting-house to preach in. This is not simply desirable; it is imperative. A missionary can do no more without a meeting-house than a meeting-house can do without a missionary. And yet one half of the missionary churches, west of the Missouri, are houseless.

The funds of the Congregational Union, though increasing, are utterly insufficient to meet the demand. While our sixty-seven pledges in advance, amounting to about \$28,000, are beyond our receipts, we should yet be glad to pay a large proportion of them immediately, and are only waiting for the terms, mutually agreed upon, to be complied with. We do not pledge what we shall not promptly pay.

The late National Council at St. Louis voted, unanimously, recommending that the Congregational churches contribute annually to the Congregational Union not less than \$100,000. With this sum, and no less, the most urgent calls can be promptly met. If every Congregational church in the land will put this cause on its list of annual contributions, will make it the peer of the other great benevolent societies, and give to it as generously, then the recommendation of the National Council will be met, and not the Union only, but all the other great interests interlinked with church-building, and dependent on it for their success, will be advanced as well. In the name of the little churches on the border lines that must have help or die, in behalf of the work of Home Missions that cannot prosper without meeting-houses, and of Foreign Missions also, in the interests of our own denomination, and especially of our common country and the world, we make our appeal.

THE HOME MISSIONARY, a monthly magazine, published by the Society, at sixty cents a year, including postage, gives a running account of the progress of the work in all parts of the country, chiefly from the pens of the superintendents and missionaries personally engaged in it. An Annual Report sums up the results of the year.

THE LEAFLET, a monthly tract, price five dollars a hundred for the year, is devoted to the Sunday-school department of the Society's work.

For nearly fifty-five years the Society has been organizing churches, mainly in the West, and aiding in the support of their ministers till those churches are able to assume the whole expense. Its missionaries have from the first organized Sunday schools, provided proper teachers for them, and by watchful oversight have secured their permanence and highest usefulness. The Society now also raises and disburses money for supplying these missionary Sunday schools with libraries and other helps.

In connection with the labor of its missionaries, 4,022 churches have been organized, and 2,053 have come to self-support. It has collected and disbursed in cash about \$8,740,000, and in clothing, books, and other supplies, largely the offerings of Christian women, more than \$1,238,000: in all, over \$9,970,000. The additions to the churches have been 297,368. Schools, academies, and colleges in nearly every Western State are among the direct fruits of the work.

The number of missionaries employed in its fifty-fourth year (1879-80) was 1,015, nearly 650 of them in States and Territories west of New York. They preached regularly in 2,308 stations, and at frequent intervals in many hundreds more. The number of Sunday-school and Bible-class scholars was about 96,724. The additions to the churches were 5,598—2,940 of them on profession of faith. Eighty-six churches were organized, and forty-four came to self-support. Last year's receipts were, in cash, \$266,720.41; in supplies, \$60,000: in all, about \$326,741.

At least \$350,000 in cash are needed this year to sustain the missionaries now in the field, and to take up only such new work as the providence and Spirit of God imperatively call upon the Society to assume *at once*. For securing the means essential to the carrying on of this great work the Society depends, under God, on the zealous co-operation of the pastors and members of the Congregational churches of the land.

## FORM OF A BEQUEST.

“ I BEQUEATH to my executor (or executors) the sum of — dollars in trust, to pay the same in — days after my decease to the person who, when the same is payable, shall act as Treasurer of the ‘ American Missionary Association,’ of New York city, to be applied, under the direction of the Executive Committee of the Association, to its charitable uses and purposes.”

The will should be attested by three witnesses [in some States three are required, in other States only two], who should write against their names, their places of residence [if in cities, their street and number]. The following form of attestation will answer for every State in the Union: “ Signed, sealed, published, and declared by the said [A. B.] as his last will and testament, in presence of us, who, at the request of the said A. B., and in his presence, and in the presence of each other, have hereunto subscribed our names as witnesses.” In some States it is required that the will should be made at least two months before the death of the testator.

### THE CONGREGATIONAL PUBLISHING SOCIETY

Is the servant of Congregational churches. It is economically managed, and all its gains mure to the profit of the churches, and the upbuilding of the Kingdom of Christ.

If the principles of our denomination are essential to the growth of that Kingdom, then a publishing society is necessary to the prosperity of the denomination. It proclaims through the press what ministers proclaim from the pulpit. It declares the great facts concerning the Kingdom of God. It sets forth the history and explains the principles of our polity. It prepares and furnishes all kinds of aids to study in our Sunday schools. It seeks to provide appropriate books and papers for children and youth in our congregations. It has appointed, and proposes to sustain a Sunday-school Secretary, whose business it shall be to supervise the preparation of this literature, to systematize and give direction to Sunday-school movements, to increase enthusiasm among the churches in this important work, and to direct the charities of the churches towards establishing Sunday schools, and providing weak and new ones with such equipment as shall enable them to move on to success. All money contributed for Sunday-school work will be devoted to that object *without any deduction for expenses*. All money contributed to the publishing fund will be appropriated for the printing and distribution of religious books and tracts, and for promoting the interests of the denomination as a factor in hastening the triumphs of the Kingdom of Christ. All money contributed without specified object will be divided between the publishing fund and the Sunday-school work, according to the judgment of the managers. The good of the churches will in all cases be the first aim.

We can have no successful denominational Sunday-school work without a publishing society. Other denominations discovered this fifty years ago. The Methodist Church has equipped its Book Concern with a capital of \$2,000,000, and has a thoroughly organized Sunday-school Board. The Baptist and Presbyterian Boards of Publication, with large capital, commodious buildings, and well-chosen officers, have contributed largely to the superior success of those denominations. The Congregationalists have largely neglected their interests in this direction, and have fallen behind in consequence. We believe that our work as a denomination is needed to maintain the principles of self-government and freedom by which New England was settled, and by which truth has been maintained in the land; that by loyalty to the denomination we shall be most loyal to the Kingdom of which we are a part.

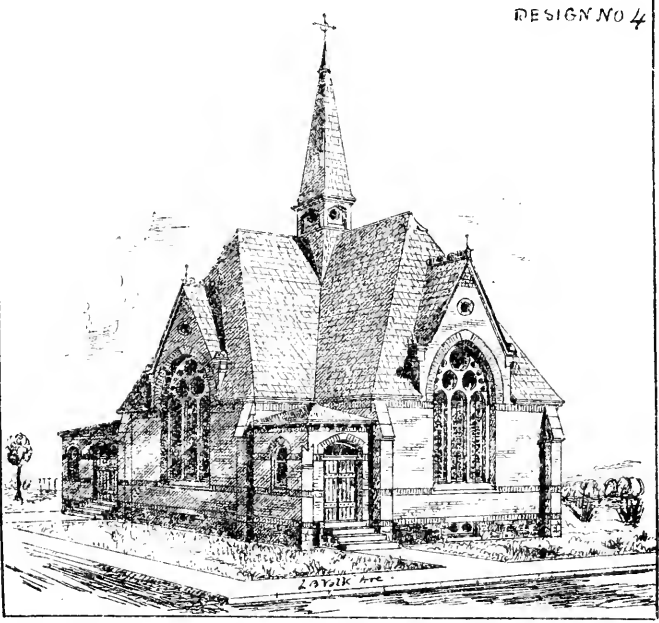
In order that our denomination may advance, its principles and polity must be made known. This is especially important in new communities, where people are considering on what basis to form churches. It is one object of our Society to make these principles known through its publications. We have brief, popular, clear statements of the character and workings of Congregationalism, as well as excellent books and tracts on general religious subjects, but from lack of funds they have been distributed far less than they should be. One Home Missionary Superintendent writes that he has himself borne the expense of circulating as many as he is able, with effective results. But it is not right that such burdens should be laid by the churches on our missionaries.

Especially does the Sunday-school Work imperatively demand help. From newly formed schools at the West, from the multitude of colored schools at the South, come urgent requests for charts, papers, lesson helps, libraries. No other source of help is open to them than our Society. They will soon be the churches, and their present teaching will determine the spiritual type of those churches. What more useful charity than to extend to our weaker brethren that light on the Word of God, that in these days we who work in Sunday schools so much enjoy! No work, preaching excepted, is more urgent and effective.

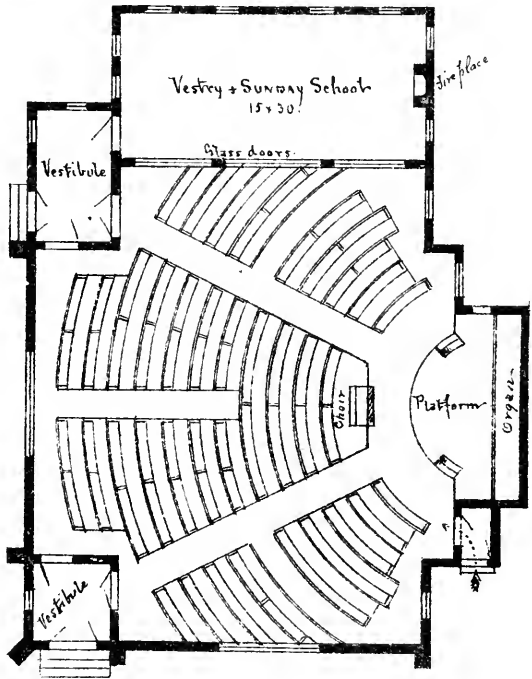
We ask the support of every Congregational church and Sunday school in contributions. We also ask their patronage. The profits will all go to promote the efficiency of the work of the churches. Orders from the most distant points will be supplied by mail or express at minimum cost.

## THE NEW WEST EDUCATION COMMISSION

Was incorporated November 3, 1879, after mature deliberation, discussions in several ministerial bodies, and extended correspondence. Its founders were deeply reluctant to add another to existing benevolent societies, and refrained from doing so till convinced that no other organization would assume the work which, in their view, was of most pressing importance. New emergencies had arisen, disclosing new perils; and they believed that imperative demands justified the creation of special instrumentalities to meet them.

*Nature of the Demands.* — Several States and Territories of immense extent, and enriched with mineral deposits and agricultural wealth of inconceivable value, are attracting a vast immigration; and the institutions of education and religion fail, utterly, to keep pace with the demand for them.

The question demanding careful consideration is, Whether Christians and patriots ought not, by immediate and liberal gifts, to establish and maintain at various central points in all those regions well-taught Christian schools?

The time is propitious. New life is entering these Territories. Old customs are giving way. Even Pueblo Indians are purchasing American plows, and the younger Mormons and Mexicans are uneasy under the reproach that attaches to their people. It is seed-time; and the best seed in hundreds of localities is the Christian school.

*Work Already Commenced.* — The Commission has now under its charge six Academies and five schools of lower grade.

The current year is a very prosperous one. The schools have now more than seven hundred enrolled pupils; and late letters speak of increasing numbers, the decay of opposing prejudice, and opening fields.

A more needy and promising field cannot be found in the world. It will repay teachers, and the charitable who support them, as richly as Turkey or Japan.

The Woman's Home Missionary Association have taken the responsibility of supporting one of the teachers named above. Another Ladies' Society in Worcester have assumed the support of another. Various churches and individuals and Sabbath schools have lent their aid, but much more remains to be done; increased donations are needed to prosecute the work, and these are earnestly solicited. "Woman's work for woman" has risen within a few years into great prominence, and in this channel such work may find not only safe avenues, but opportunities for effecting immeasurable good.

The Commission was started in the West, and more than three fifths of its revenue the current year has been given by Western men. But the East is equally interested with the West, and it is believed will welcome with equal heartiness the appeal herein made.

*Economy of Expenditure.* — The Commission intends to press its work with the least possible outlay. Only such expense will be incurred as shall be found essential to the vigorous and complete prosecution of its plans.

## THE WOMAN'S HOME MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

On the 4th of November, 1879, in pursuance to a call issued by Mrs. Withrow, of Boston, Mrs. Barnes, of Haverhill, Miss Johnson, of Bradford, and others, a meeting was held in the vestry of Park Street Church, to organize "a society for the prosecution of Home missionary work." This meeting, which was largely attended, resulted in the appointment of a committee to draw up a constitution, to nominate an executive committee and list of officers, to propose a name for the new organization, and to report at such time and place as deemed best by them. This committee worked steadily and patiently in the midst of many perplexities, and at last presented the report, at a meeting called for the purpose. Feb. 26. At this meeting the present name of the Woman's Home Missionary Association was accepted; the constitution presented was adopted, article by article; and the Executive Committee nominated were voted in by ballot.

The Executive Committee thus chosen entered immediately upon its work, holding its first meeting a week from that time, March 4. At this meeting the first call for aid came in a letter from Mrs. Joseph Cook, asking for co-operation with the work of the Anti-Polygamy Society, in Utah. The month of March, during which five meetings were held by the Committee, was spent largely in the work incident to the formation of all new societies — such as preparing By-Laws, appointing sub-committees, providing and furnishing a suitable room, distributing notices of the new Association through the churches, etc. A public meeting, however, was held March 18, when the minutes of the previous meeting, at which the Association was organized, were read and approved, as were the By-Laws of the Executive Committee. At the meeting which followed, in the afternoon of the same day, addresses were made by Dr. Webb, of Boston, Dr. Strieby and Mr. Woodworth, of the American Missionary Association, and by the Rev. Robert West, of St. Louis, and Dr. Storrs, of the American Home Missionary Society.

Of the missionaries suggested, Miss Keith was appointed, at the suggestion of Mr. Tenney, of the Christian Commission of the New West; Mrs. Steele works in connection with the Home Missionary Society; Miss Snyder with the Christian Commission of the New West; Miss Carter with the American Missionary Association; while Miss Wilson is sent out simply under the auspices of this Association.

The Association has thus, in the first eight months of its existence, done something towards carrying the gospel to the Mormons in Utah, the refugees in Kansas, the poor whites in Maryland, the colored people in the South, and the New Mexicans in Albuquerque.

Appeals are made for thirty teachers for Utah; for teachers who can speak Spanish, to go to New Mexico; for many fields suggested by the American Missionary Association.

Forty-one auxiliaries, sixty-nine life members, and two hundred and four annual members were enrolled before the first annual meeting.

**FOREIGN WORK.** — This Board has under its care in the foreign field, eighty-two missionaries and assistant missionaries, who superintend the work among women in its various departments, and seventy-one Bible-readers, who go from house to house to read and teach the Scriptures; the number of women reached by six of these in the city of Madura, India, alone is estimated at more than fourteen thousand. The Board also supports twenty-three boarding and high schools, besides the female department of Armenia College, and five homes for higher education, containing in all over one thousand pupils; and ninety-four village and day schools, with between two and three thousand pupils.

**HOME DEPARTMENT OF WORK.** — In this country there are connected with the Board twenty branch societies, each comprising not less than twenty auxiliaries and five conference associations, including a less number of societies. In these larger organizations there are between nine hundred and one thousand auxiliaries and more than six hundred mission circles among children and young people, making a total of over fifteen hundred organizations. The receipts for the year 1880, including a gift of \$25,000 for Armenia College, and \$20,000 for the enlargement of the Constantinople Home, were \$127,968.17.

**FOREIGN WORK.** — The Woman's Board of the Interior, at the close of the year ending Nov. 1, 1880, had in the foreign field, doing similar work to that done in the other Board; thirty missionaries, six boarding and high schools, containing between two and three hundred pupils, forty-one village and day schools, with upwards of fourteen hundred scholars, and fifty-six native Bible-women, teachers, and helpers.

**HOME DEPARTMENT OF WORK.** — This Board has connected with it ten State branches, comprising eight hundred and two auxiliaries, young ladies' societies, and mission circles among the children. The receipts for the last financial year were \$24,011.

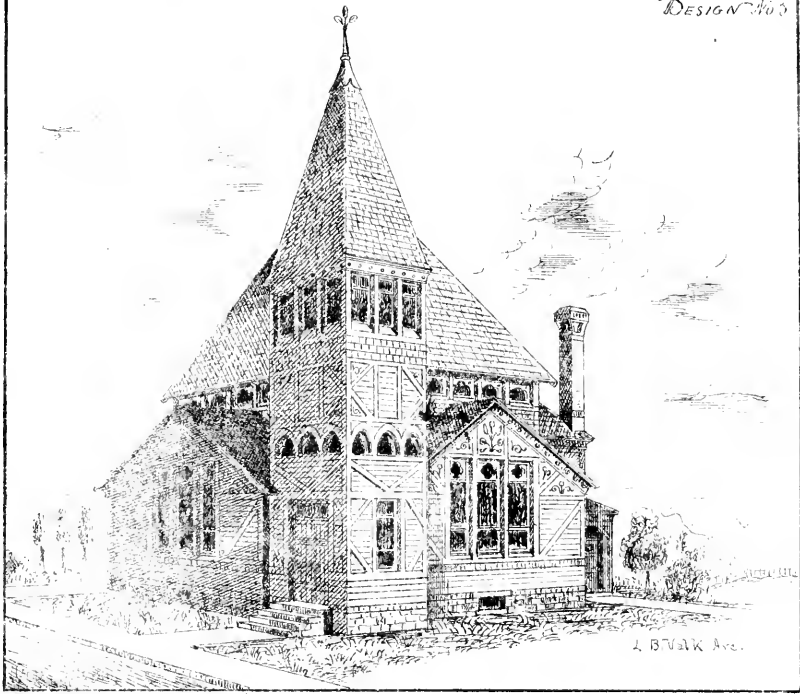

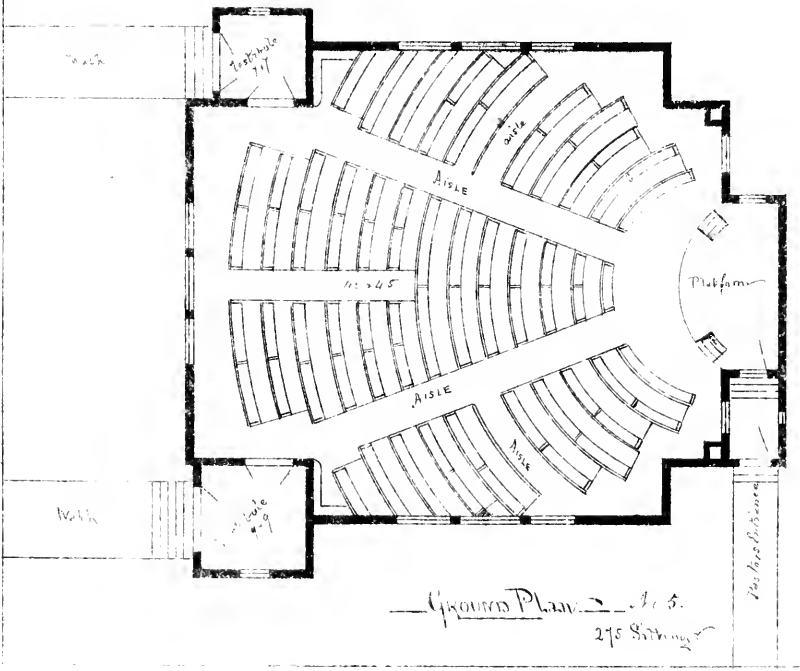

The Seminary was located with a view to the advantages of uninterrupted study. These advantages have been retained, and are accounted of increasing value. At the same time, through the rise and growth of cities in the immediate vicinity, the students of the Seminary have special opportunities for studying the various conditions of Church Work, and the different methods of preaching.

The annual period of study embraces forty weeks, and is divided into two terms. The first term of the present Seminary year will end on Thursday, March 10, and be followed by a vacation of three weeks. The second term will commence on Thursday, March 31, and continue till the Anniversary, Thursday, June 30, to be followed by a vacation of nine weeks. The first term of the next Seminary year will begin on Thursday, September 1. The Lectures to all the classes begin promptly; it is therefore important that all the students should be present at the beginning of the Seminary year.

In addition to the regular course of instruction, special courses of lectures are delivered by eminent clergymen, on Foreign Missions, and on Congregationalism. Familiar addresses are also given every year on practical questions relating to pastoral life by clergymen and others, invited by the students.

A Fourth Year has been established for advanced study. All the departments will be represented in the instruction of this year, special attention being given to the higher and more difficult questions — whether philosophical, critical, or more immediately practical — which are engaging the attention of Christian scholars, pastors, and teachers. One aim of the year will be the promotion of productive work on the part of students. The required lectures, therefore, will be fewer than in the preceding years, and special facilities will be afforded for private research and study. Provision will be made for a system of scholarships and fellowships. Admission to this course will be by vote of the Faculty.

The Library now numbers more than 38,000 volumes, is constantly increased, and is open every week-day for the examination and drawing of books. The accession of the library of the late Professor Niedner, of Berlin, has proved to be of exceptional value. The Museum comprises a cabinet of minerals, objects relating to missionary life and work, a monumental slab from Nimroud, a relief model of Jerusalem, and the large and choice collection of Palestinian birds, animals, flowers, coins, inscriptions, photographs, etc, gathered by Dr. Selah Merrill, the archaeologist of the American Palestine Exploration Society. A well-furnished Gymnasium is open for the use of the students.

**TERMS OF ADMISSION.** — Bangor Seminary is open to all denominations of Christians. Candidates for admission must produce testimony of their church-membership, and of their collegiate education. If they have not pursued a college course, they will be examined, and must exhibit mental training and attainments sufficient, in the judgment of the Faculty, to warrant their entering upon a course of theological study. Those whose age or circumstances forbid the pursuit of the complete course of study may, at the discretion of the Faculty, be admitted to the studies of the Middle year, and continue their course with the full privileges of the Seminary.

**COURSE OF STUDY.** — *Junior Year,* Hebrew Grammar, Principles of Interpretation, Exegesis of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures; New Testament Greek; Introductory Philosophy, with text-book and lectures; Rhetoric, Essays, and Lectures on Style and English Literature.

*Middle Year,* Systematic Theology; Ancient Church History; Exegetical studies continued; New Testament Greek continued; Vocal Culture and Oratory.

*Senior Year,* Medieval and Modern Church History; Homiletics; Pastoral Theology and Church Polity; Exegetical studies continued; New Testament Greek continued.

**PREACHING.** — As it is believed to be conducive to the best professional training to combine practice with theory, students are encouraged during the Senior year to preach as opportunity offers, and so far as they may without interfering with their Seminary duties. They usually take a license to preach at the close of the Middle year; and during the vacation are employed as missionaries of the Maine Missionary Society. Through the remainder of their course they are frequently called upon to supply vacant churches, or the missionary outposts of the region.

**POST-GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP.** — A Scholarship of one thousand dollars has recently been given to Bowdoin College for the purpose of aiding any student who, after graduating at the Seminary, desires to take a post-graduate year at the College.

**EXPENSES.** — Each student is charged two dollars a year for incidental expenses. There is no other charge for tuition, room, furniture, library, or any privilege of the Seminary. The dormitory has been thoroughly repaired and refitted. The rooms are carpeted and furnished. The Washburn fund and some other funds were given expressly to aid members of the Seminary. The income of these funds will be distributed to those students whose circumstances require it, and will amount to about half the expense of board.

**LIBRARY.** — The Seminary has an excellent library, numbering between fifteen and sixteen thousand volumes, specially selected to meet the wants of the students. There is a permanent library fund of ten thousand dollars, with the income of which constant additions are made of the latest and most valuable literature.

The next Seminary year will open on Thursday, Sept. 8, 1881.

**TERMS OF ADMISSION.** — The Seminary is open to students of all denominations. Candidates for admission to the regular course must be of good moral character and must have received a collegiate education, or an equivalent preparation for theological studies. Students from other theological seminaries may be admitted, and applicants to advanced standing.

**TERMS AND VACATIONS.** — The next term of study will begin on Wednesday, Sept. 14, 1881, and continue till the last Thursday in April, when will follow a vacation of four months, to be devoted by the students to reading on assigned topics, and to missionary or other remunerative labor.

**SEMINARY GROUNDS AND BUILDINGS.** — The Seminary grounds front Union Park, in the West Division of the city. The location is pleasant and healthful, removed from the busier parts of the city, and yet connected with the centre of business by two lines of city railway. The Seminary buildings — Keyes Hall and Carpenter Hall — are arranged according to approved models, each study having two bedrooms attached, and provide accommodations for about eighty students.

**COURSE OF STUDY.** — The Junior Year is mainly devoted to the study of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures; the Middle Year to Systematic Theology, Exegesis of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures, and Church History; and the Senior Year to Homiletics, Pastoral Theology, Church History, and Old and New Testament Exegesis. The "Special Course" includes the entire instruction afforded by the Seminary, except in Hebrew and Greek. Great prominence is given to the Interpretation of the Scriptures from the English Version. Studies are also pursued in Moral Philosophy and Rhetoric. Instruction (elective) will be given each year either in Chaldee, Syriac, or Arabic, if desired. Assistance will also be afforded to those who wish to study grammatical and exegetical works in German. There is a Rhetorical Exercise each week for the Junior and Middle Classes, devoted to Essays, Orations, Discussions, and the reading of Scriptures and Hymns.

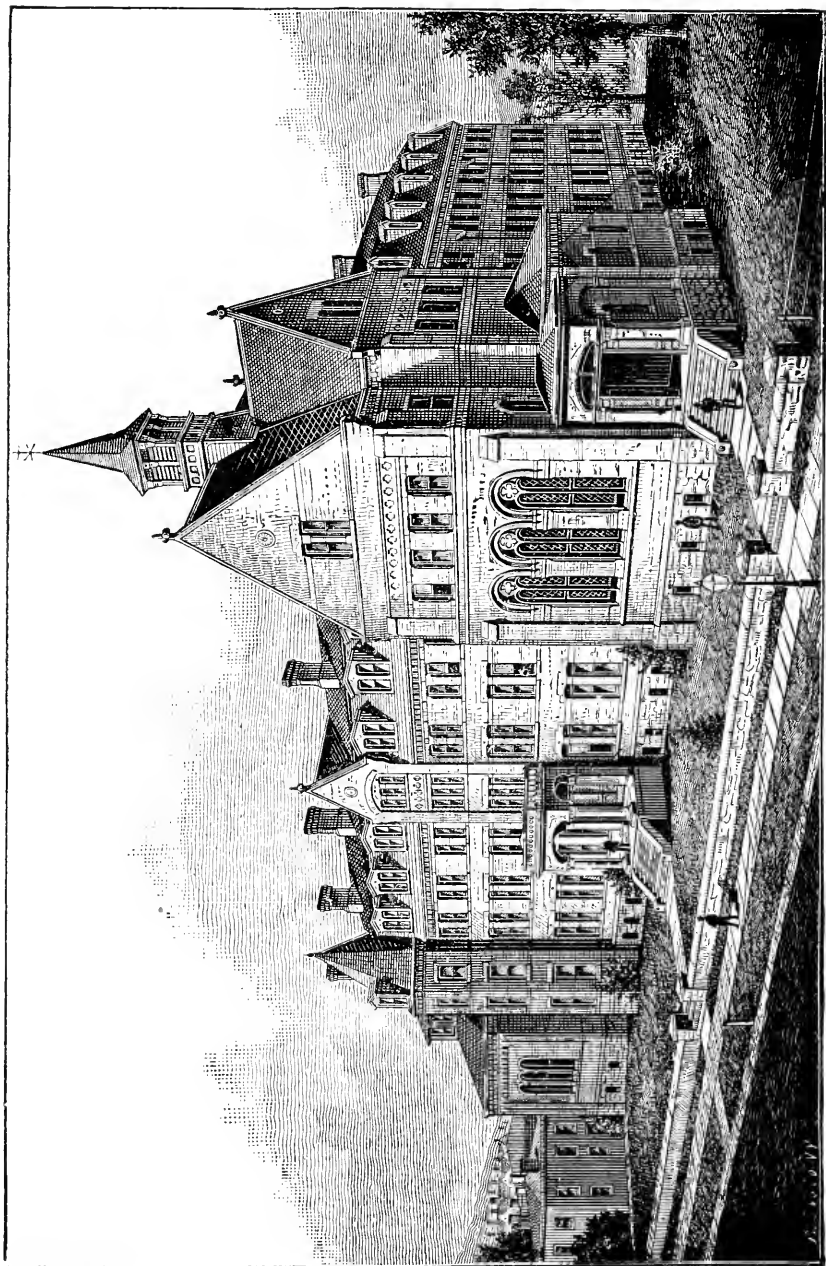
**EXAMINATIONS.** — In each year there are two public examinations, oral and written, of all the classes: the first during the week before the twenty-first day of December, and the second during the week before the Anniversary in April.

**LIBRARY.** — The Seminary Library consists at present of about fifty-five hundred volumes, mainly works of standard value. The students also have access to the large public library of the city.

**EXPENSES.** — No charges are made for instruction, the rent of rooms, or for the use of the Library and Reading-room. Suites of rooms have been furnished throughout by churches, or individuals, whose names they bear. The only necessary expenses of the students are for board, fuel, gas, text-books, the care of rooms, washing, and for such especial damages as the property of the Seminary may suffer at their hands. Board can be had in private families in the neighborhood of the Seminary at about three dollars a week.

**PECUNIARY AID.** — From the American Education Society, supplemented by the Western Education Society and the Scholarship funds of the Seminary, a total one hundred and fifty dollars a week during term time; additional aid in clothing is furnished, when needed, by Ladies' Benevolent Societies; medical attendance without charge in case of illness; and such sums as may be received for preaching or teaching.

By its organization the Seminary is closely allied to the churches through the Pastoral Union, which annually elects the Trustees.

The plan of instruction is so arranged as to make the study of the Bible the chief feature of the entire course. The patrons, guardians, and teachers of the Institution are persuaded that an exegetical and experimental knowledge of the Divine Word should be sought first of all by candidates for the gospel ministry. They also believe that scholarly investigation, controlled and tempered by the spirit of truth, justifies unflinching adherence to the doctrinal system set forth in the accredited formularies of New England Congregationalism.

It is the aim of each Professor to strengthen, on the part of the students, the habit of personal investigation. Daily drills bring teachers and pupils into such close relations as favor mental activity and appropriate criticism. This confidential intercourse also contributes in many ways to the promotion of personal piety; and it is gratifying to observe how promptly the young men co-operate with their instructors in seeking this fundamental qualification for the sacred office.

**TERMS OF ADMISSION.** — Candidates for admission are expected to produce evidence that they are members of some Christian church, and that they have graduated at some college, or have made such literary acquisitions as, in the opinion of the Faculty, are an equivalent preparation for theological studies. They will be examined in reference to their personal piety and their motives in seeking the ministry.

The special or short course has been discontinued.

Besides lectures on Congregationalism, Moot Councils are held from time to time, for the purpose of making the student familiar with the principles and usages of our Church Polity.

**EXPENSES.** — No charge is made for tuition, room rent, or the use of the library. The rooms are supplied with necessary articles of furniture.

Arrangements for board, at a common table, are made by the Trustees. The price of board will not exceed \$3.50 per week. Assistance will be furnished towards defraying this expense, in proportion to the necessities of each student, at the discretion of the Faculty. Fuel and lights may be estimated at from \$15 to \$20 the year for each room. In addition, the American Education Society renders aid to the amount of \$100 annually. Students who are licensed have occasional opportunities to preach for compensation.

**CALENDAR.** — There is but one term of study in the year, which begins on the second Thursday of September, and closes on the second Thursday of May. Students have opportunity in the long vacation to engage in some form of Christian activity, from which they may derive religious advantages and practical knowledge, as well as pecuniary benefit.

The Department of Theology is open for the admission of students of every denomination. Applicants must furnish satisfactory evidence of Christian character. A full collegiate education is regarded as furnishing a normal preparation for the course in Theology. Those who are not graduates of reputable colleges are required to furnish evidence of culture, in all essential points, fully equivalent to that which is given by a college course, and are admitted only upon careful examination in the ordinary collegiate branches. Upon the satisfactory completion of the regular three-years' course, the Academic Degree of Bachelor of Divinity (B. D.) is conferred.

**COURSE OF STUDY.**—*First Year.*—Hebrew, and Old Testament Exegesis; Harmony of the Gospels, and Theology of the New Testament; Natural Theology; Evidences of Christianity; Authority and Inspiration of the Scriptures; and Introductory Lectures on the History of the Church.

*Middle Year.*—Systematic Theology; Hebrew Exegesis continued, and Literature of the Old Testament; introductory lectures on Homiletics; History of the Ancient Church; lectures on the Epistles.

*Senior Year.*—History of the Mediæval and Modern Church; History of Doctrine; Homiletics; written and extempore Sermons; Pastoral Theology; and lectures on the various forms of Scepticism.

**LIBRARY.**—The Libraries of the College contain over fifteen thousand volumes.

**COUNCIL HALL**, the building devoted exclusively to the Department of Theology, provides fully furnished rooms for fifty students. No expense is incurred for instruction, for the use of the libraries or of public rooms; and the students in Theology enjoy, without charge, the privileges of all the other departments of the College. The price of board is from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per week; or from \$72 to \$90 for the thirty-six weeks of the Theological year. Fuel and lights will not cost more than \$15. Add the charge of \$5.00 per term for the care of the building, and the entire *necessary* expenses of the year (not including clothing, travelling expenses, and books) need not exceed \$100.

Help is granted from scholarship funds contributed by friends of the Department and by the churches of the State, and from the American Education Society. The amount ordinarily received from both these sources does not vary much from \$150.

The opportunities for students to aid in meeting their expenses are sufficiently numerous. Some are employed as teachers in the Preparatory School connected with the College, and the amount received for teaching an hour each day exceeds the cost of board. Many vacant pulpits in the vicinity are supplied by theological students, for which compensation is rendered. During the summer vacation of fifteen weeks, all members of the Department may supply vacant pulpits in Home Missionary and other fields, and such opportunities are abundant.

The year of study in this Department consists of thirty-six weeks, in three terms. The anniversary occurs June 25, 1881. The next year begins Tuesday, Sept. 13, 1881.

## FACULTY.

REV. JOSEPH A. BENTON, D. D., Professor of Sacred Literature, and (*pro tem.*) of Homiletics.

REV. GEORGE MOGAR, D. D., Professor of Systematic Theology, and (*pro tem.*) of Ecclesiastical History.

Lectures are given frequently by leading pastors of the State.

REGULAR STUDIES. — *First Year.* Greek; Hebrew; Sacred Geography and Antiquities; Origin, History, Authority, Inspiration, and Canon of the Bible; Interpretation of the Scriptures; Religions of the World, other than the Christian; Natural Science; Mental and Moral Science.

*Second Year.* — Biblical Theology; Greek; Hebrew; Exercises in the Exposition of the Scriptures; Systematic Theology; History of Doctrines; Elocution.

*Third Year.* — Pastoral Theology; Church History; Church Polity; Homiletics; Elocution; Connection of Natural Science with Religion. [An exercise in Hebrew and Greek Exegesis once each week during the third year.]

SPECIAL STUDIES. — In special cases, particular and modified courses of instruction will be given to those who cannot remain three years, or who for other reasons cannot take the full course of three years; and these courses of instruction will be adapted to the necessities of each person, it being understood that every one of this class will continue his studies as long as practicable.

PREPARATORY STUDIES. — Young men who have not had the advantage of a collegiate course, and who are, for good reasons, debarred from the prospect of such a course, are enabled to pursue literary and scientific studies under the direction of the Professors in the Golden Gate Academy, immediately associated with the Seminary. These preparatory studies will vary with the requirements of each student.

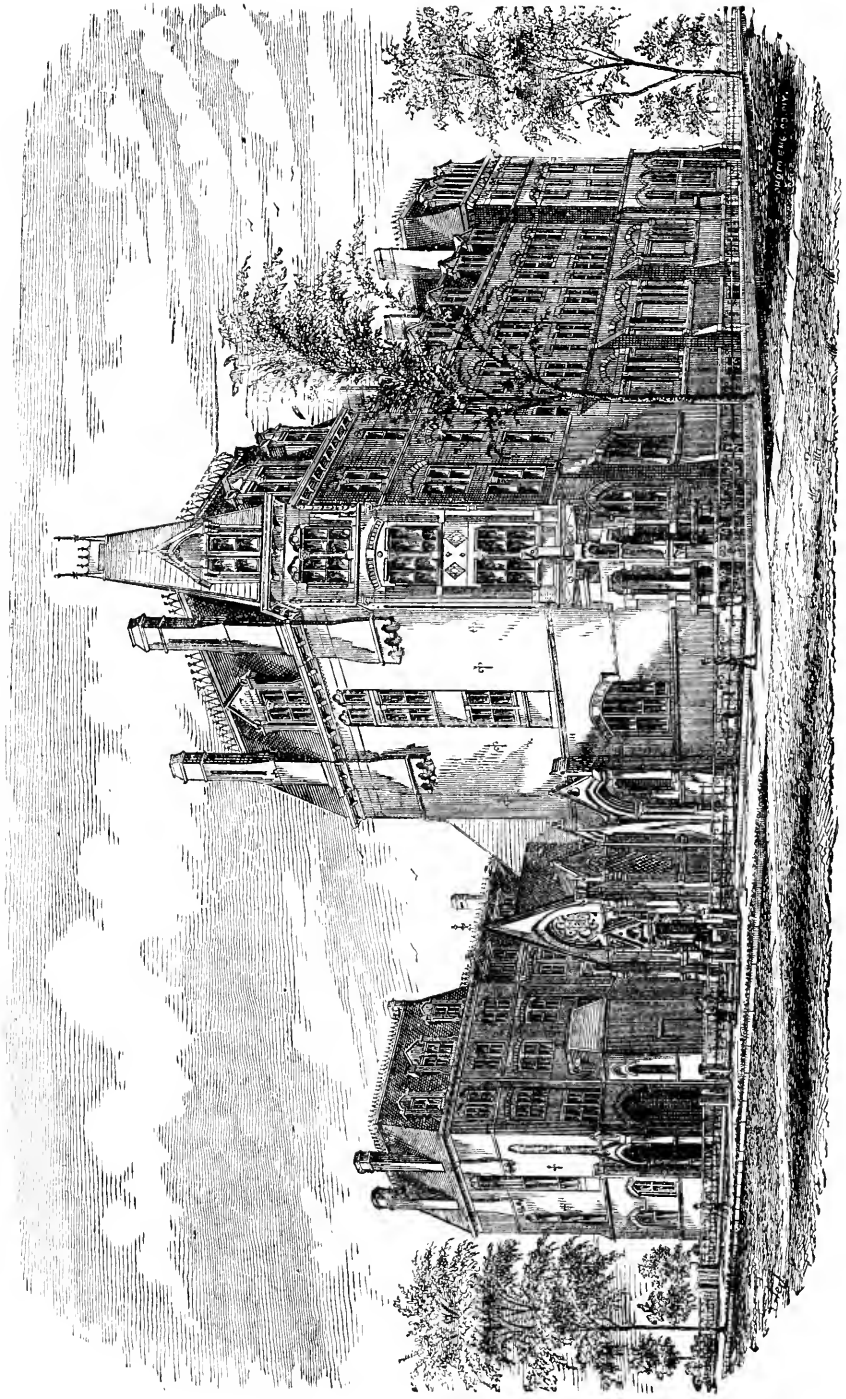
CALENDAR. — The year consists of but one term, and begins with the fourth Thursday in August and ends with the middle of May. There will be a recess from the 20th of December to the 3d of January. Students should begin promptly with the term.

TERMS OF ADMISSION. — Credible evidence of piety, membership in some evangelical church, a collegiate education, or such other literary and scientific attainments as promise a fair degree of usefulness, will entitle all young men to the advantages of this Seminary. The benefits of the institution are accorded alike to students of all denominations of Christians.

EXPENSES. — There will be no charge for tuition, rent of rooms, or use of furniture. The Trustees will, as far as practicable, furnish text-books free to those who are in need, themselves being the judges of the necessity. Those who desire it can board on the premises at the rate of three dollars per week. Fifty cents additional will be charged for washing.

PECUNIARY AID. — The American Education Society will render aid to the pupils of this Seminary who are needy, who are college graduates, and who take the full course of three years. The amount bestowed will be, when possible, \$100 a year to each beneficiary.

An endeavor is continually made to provide for all the wants of every young man who wishes to take the full course of study, and every such person is urged to come to the Seminary whether he has any means of his own or not. It is believed that the necessary expenses of a Theological School are less here than anywhere else in the land.

RELATION TO THE UNIVERSITY.—The Divinity School is one of the Departments of Yale College. Its members receive from the Corporation, on completing their three years' course of study, the degree of B. D. They have access to the public collections of the University, such as the Library, the Peabody Museum, and the collection of paintings and statuary in the School of the Fine Arts. They are permitted to attend, free of expense, so far as will not conflict with their professional studies, the lectures and recitations in the College and the Sheffield Scientific School, and, if expecting to become foreign missionaries, those of the Medical Department.

COURSE OF STUDY.—The first year is devoted chiefly to the Exegesis of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures; the second year to Systematic Theology and Church History; the third year to Sacred Rhetoric, the History of Christian Doctrine, and Church Polity. Additional lectures on Preaching and other important subjects are delivered before all the classes by eminent ministers and scholars in this country and Europe. There are also optional classes conducted by the Professors, in New Testament Introduction, German, Syriac, and Chaldee. Once a week there is a rhetorical exercise for all the classes. Instruction in vocal culture and elocution is continued through the entire course.

GRADUATE CLASS.—Students who have completed a three years' course of theological study, here or elsewhere, are admitted, on application, to the Graduate Class, established two years since, in which advanced studies in Theology are pursued under the direction of the Professors.

THE LIBRARIES of the University, to which the students have access, including the Reference Library of the Divinity School, contain 120,000 volumes.

THE HOOKER FELLOWSHIP, for the encouragement of further theological study in this country or abroad, the income of which is \$700 a year for two years after graduation, is offered every alternate year.

EXPENSES.—There is no charge for instruction, use of libraries, or room rent. The rooms, which will accommodate 150 students, are designed in general for only one occupant. Each room has a bedroom attached, and is carpeted and furnished with all needful furniture except bedclothing. The chief expenses for the session are for board, an average of \$3.20 a week, fuel and light, \$25 to \$30, and \$10 a year for care of room and incidental expenses.

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS AND OTHER AIDS.—Students whose circumstances require it are aided to the amount of \$100 a year, from the income of scholarship funds. Additional aid to the amount of \$75 to \$100 is afforded by the American Educational Society to its beneficiaries.

COMMENCEMENT OF THE TERM.—The next annual term of study will begin on Thursday, Sept. 15, 1881, and continue till the third Thursday in May, when the vacation of four months, in which the students have the opportunity to engage in some form of remunerative labor, will commence.

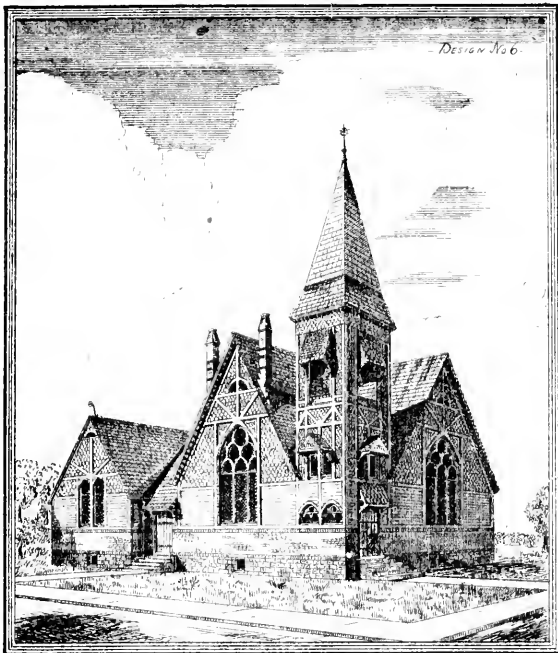

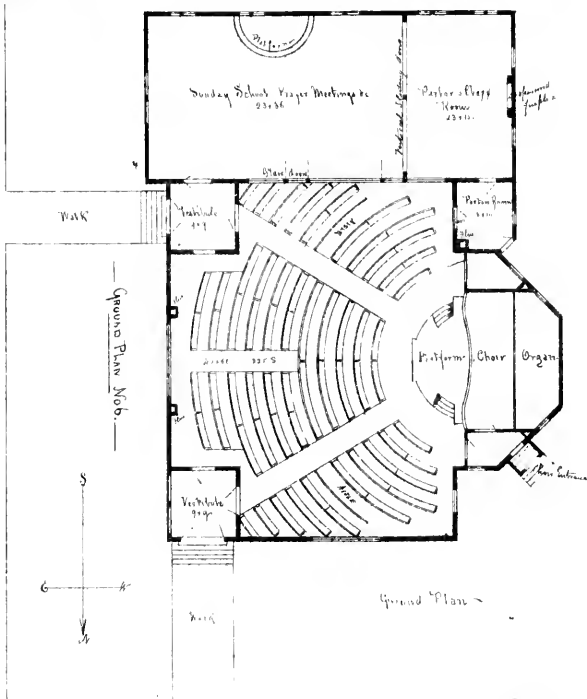

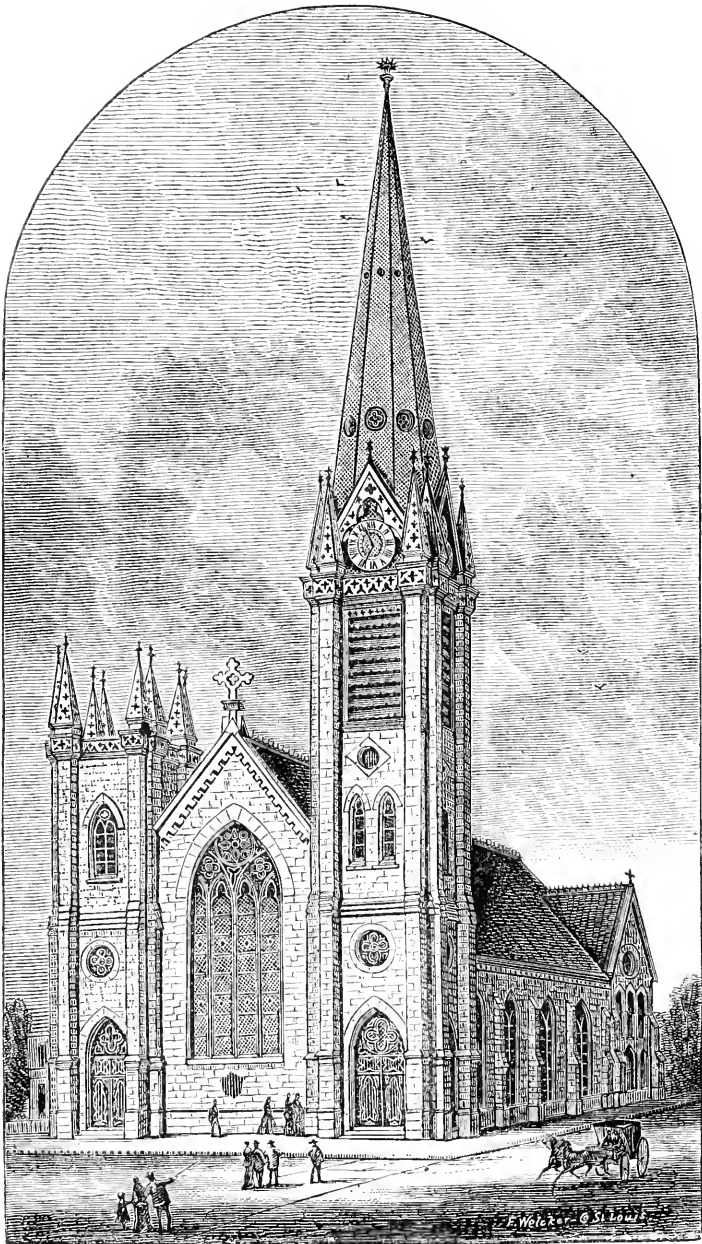

## THE ANNUAL STATISTICS OF THE CHURCHES AND MINISTERS.

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THE following pages contain the statistics as collected in 1880 by the statistical secretaries of the several State organizations, and compiled for this publication by the secretary of the National Council, under vote of the publishing committee appointed by the Council.

The secretary, as heretofore, in no case presumes to insert or omit the name of church or minister on any authority but that of the State secretaries, representing their own organizations, or of Councils subsequent to the date of annual reports.

The contents of the statistics are as follows:—

1. The Statistics of the Churches and Pastors, by States.
2. List of Foreign Missionaries, arranged by Missions.
3. List of Ministers without Pastoral Charge, by States.
4. General Summary Tables for the year.
5. Tables of Summaries, 1858-1881.
6. Remarks upon the Statistics.
7. The National, State and local Organizations of the Churches; with Officers, and dates of sessions in 1881; and the local organizations.
8. Alphabetical List of Ministers, with P. O. address, and indexed to pages.
9. Alphabetical List of Licentiates.

### RULES OF COMPILATION.

1. To arrange in alphabetical order everything capable of it; except that the churches in any one town or city are placed according to age.

2. To make each State list conform strictly to the *State boundaries*. Churches or ministers reported by the Association of a State other than their own are, therefore, transferred to their proper places; and the summaries are correspondingly corrected.

3. To make *new tables* each year. "Last year's report" (if known to be such) is always omitted. No allowance is made for the membership of any non-reporting church or Sunday school, except such as is made by the State secretaries, who are the proper judges of its propriety. The list of churches of this year is compared, name by name, with that of last year, and all variations are mentioned with the State summary, so that each church can be traced from year year.

4. To examine carefully all the tables, with a view to *correction or addition* by correspondence, especially to correct "pastoral supply" to the latest moment. Proof-sheets have been sent to all the secretaries who could be reached in season. But no such changes have been allowed to affect the summaries.

5. To *complete* the statistics by (1) giving in some form every statistical fact obtainable,— items given by some States, but not by all, being aggregated with the respective State Summaries; and (2) putting into finished State and

general summaries, with "totals" in all cases, everything capable of it; so that no person in search of any statistical fact shall be obliged to perform any arithmetical calculation to find it.

#### MINOR EXPLANATIONS.

1. Any church given in brackets is one organized since the date of State report; not included in the summary, but inserted for information. A few churches temporarily not associated are inserted by their own wish.

2. Installed pastors are marked "p," or "i"; others in service are not marked. Blanks in the column of pastoral supply, meaning *no* regularly engaged minister, are left blank for the convenience of those who note pastoral changes.

3. Post-office addresses of ministers in pastoral service are not found in the tables of churches, but in the General Alphabetical List of Ministers.

4. The two columns following the names of ministers in the tables of churches denote (1) the year of ordination, (2) the year when the minister was installed, or commenced service with that church.

5. A star (\*) prefixed to the name of a minister in pastoral service, not installed, implies that he is not a member of any organization of churches or ministers in *that State*; but not many States so designate in the *tables*. A star similarly prefixed in the General Alphabetical List of Ministers denotes that he is found in the original State alphabetical list, but is reported not to be a member of *any* such organization in the United States; or that he is found supplying some church, but is not in the State alphabetical list.

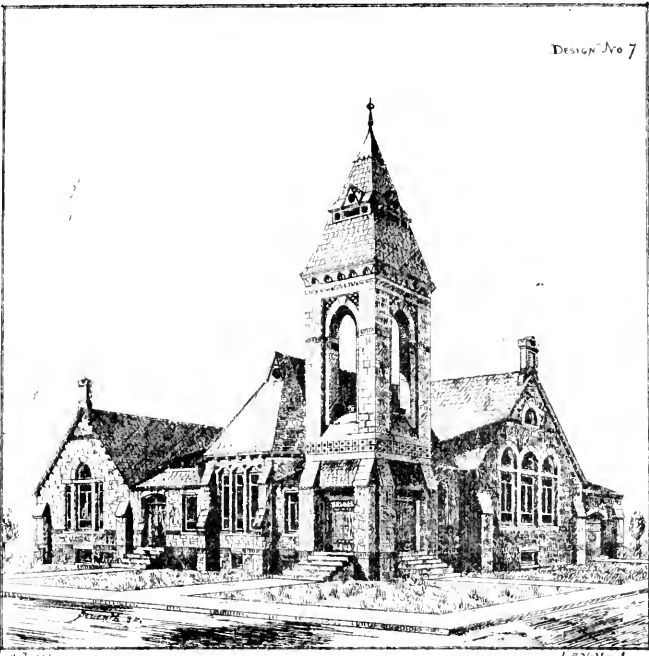
6. Licentiates are not reckoned as ministers. Churches supplied by such, or by ministers of other denominations, are reckoned as vacant; but the number of such churches is given in each State summary. No ministers of other denominations (if so known) are inserted in the General Alphabetical List. Some ministers belong to the two denominations at once.

7. The names of some Congregational ministers are, doubtless, missing; but it is solely because they are not reported by any organization of churches or ministers.

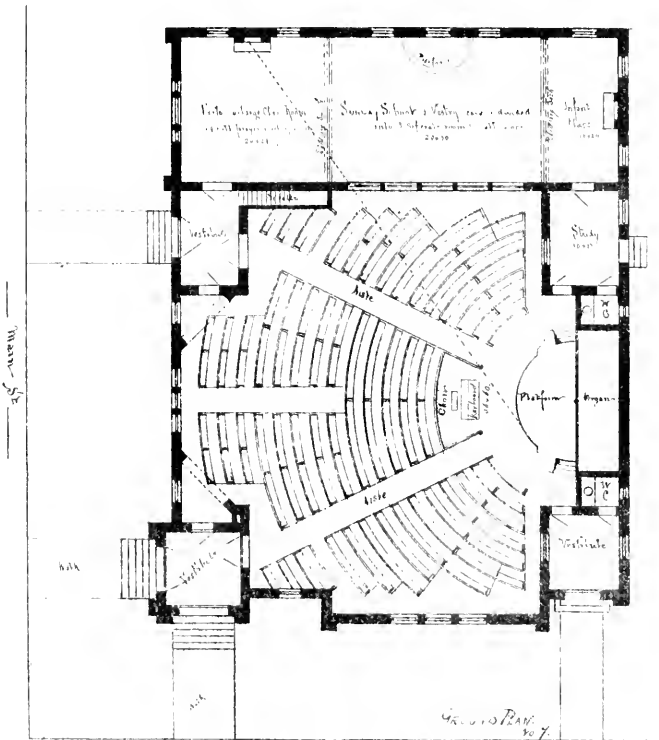
8. Under "Church Members," "Absent" are included in "Males," "Females," and "Total." "Additions," "Removals," and "Baptisms" cover the twelve months next preceding the date of report given with the name of each State.

9. Blanks in any column of figures are such as were so left in the State Minutes. They ought always to signify "no report," but some States do not follow the proper rule of inserting a cipher where "none" is meant, and the examiner must conjecture, in any given case, whether "none" or "no report" is intended. In our General Summaries, a blank invariably signifies "no report."

NOTES. — 1. The distinction is made between contributions for benevolent purposes and moneys raised for any home expenses. For instance, money given to the general Sabbath School cause is benevolent; money expended by a church in supporting its own Sabbath School is a home expenditure, as much as a pastor's salary.

2. The amount of Home Expenditure does not mean all that is spent in a given place, but solely what is raised by a church itself, exclusive of all outside aid.

3. The amounts reported above for the *specific* objects of benevolence are such as are reported by the State organizations, and are

extremely below the facts. They are inserted as indicating proportions, but are not worth adding up. It should be noted that in some States the sums were amounts contributed to a particular society; in others, for causes represented by that society, — a distinction which we cannot preserve this year. Some States so group objects that some items cannot be distinguished.

4. It will be seen that the reports are very imperfect. Only 2,896 report "Benevolent Contributions," and only 2,613 report their "Home Expenditures," but the latter number is a decided increase.

## POSSIBLE IMPROVEMENTS.

Our statistics can be improved if all parties, especially clerks collecting returns, will notice a few points where defects are apt to exist. We venture to suggest some such.

The *items* requested, and their *order*, could be *uniform*. The National Council recommended (in 1877) the schedule below. Each State could follow it, at least as far as up to the questions on moneys. Blanks for the *whole* or the *first half* will be furnished on application to the secretary.

The *first names of ministers* are greatly needed, especially in the Alphabetical Lists. One State omits *every one*.

Licentiates, and ministers of other denominations, should be *so specified*. Some States print them as Congregational ordained ministers.

The *Alphabetical Lists* should be reliable rolls of Congregational ministers. We follow them implicitly.

Each issue of the State Minutes should contain a list of officers, and its date and place of next session.

The *Summaries* should *add up* everything possible.

A State Summary should tell us exactly, —

1. How many churches are served by installed pastors?
2. How many churches have pastors not installed (meaning solely ordained Congregational ministers)?
3. How many churches are statedly supplied at date by licentiates or ministers of other denominations?
4. How many churches are vacant?
5. How many ministers are *pastors* in the State?
6. How many are acting pastors in the State?
7. How many are without charge in the State?

☞ The absence of answers to these simple questions in some States causes days of labor and delay in compiling our national statistics.

Great care is necessary as to *accuracy*. In one large State, three different and irreconcilable "totals" of the *number* of churches in the State are given in the same issue.


Each issue of State Minutes should give a list of all *new* churches, and account (by name) for all dropped from the last previous list.

It is highly important that the P. O. address of each church (when different from its name as given) be inserted. For an admirable example, see Nebraska, or Ohio, in this issue.

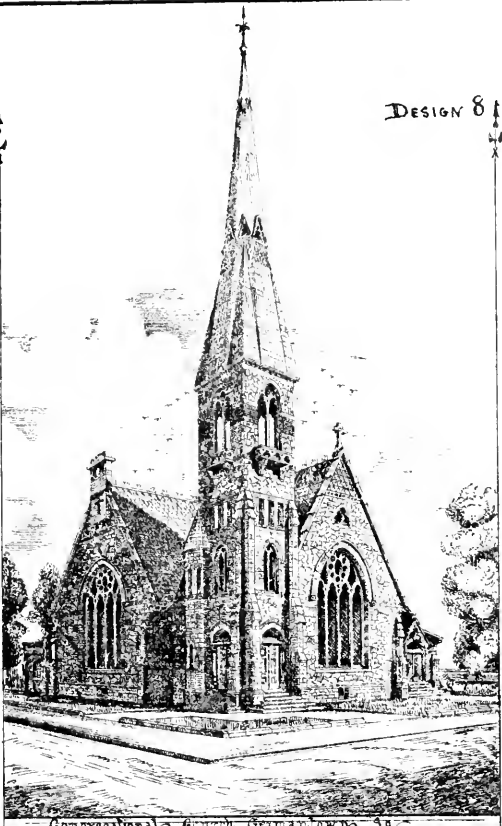

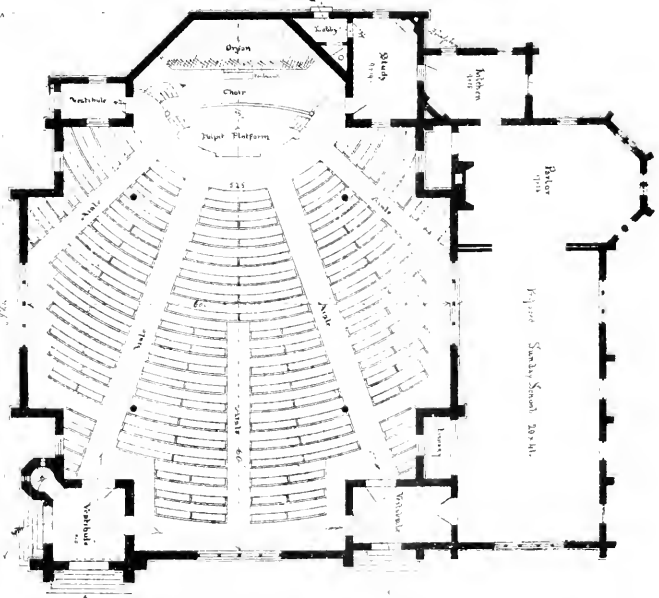

THE following is a compilation of the alphabetical lists furnished by the State Associations and Conferences, corrected by correspondence with their secretaries, to the latest possible date. The secretary of the Council in no case presumes to insert or omit a name upon his own responsibility. The State organizations (or later Councils) are alone responsible; but the secretary has used his utmost endeavors to obtain a complete and correct list. If any names are omitted, it is because they are not reported by any organization in any State.

The figures refer to pages where the name will be found, but apply only to those in pastoral service or to foreign missionaries. Those without figures are presumed to be not in pastoral service, and will be found in the list commencing on page 188.

Names starred (\*) are of persons who, although mentioned (usually as supplying churches), are reported to be members of no organization of Congregational churches or ministers.

Some P. O. addresses are antiquated; but it is the best that could be done.

Licentiates are not included in this list, nor are ministers of other denominations.

Names of persons in last year's list, deceased since Jan. 1, 1880, are retained, with date of death, and with place of residence as given in 1880.

Some errors will be found in first names, initials, and spelling. No pains have been spared to secure accuracy; but efforts failing, the compiler has not ventured to follow even his own convictions, against the unmistakable testimony of the reports.

The compiler again earnestly begs the State secretaries to give the *first name* of every minister. A few States exclude them almost entirely. Great labor has been necessary this year to remedy such neglect.
