


THREE SPECIALS.

In the past week we could have used a paper a dozen times the size of the News in order to notice all the happenings at Tent City. Many items of interest we have been forced to omit. Three of the most prominent and best enjoyed events were the special concerts Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Immense crowds attended all, and all previous records of attendance were broken.

Thursday was Cinctnnati night. A special program was given in honor of the visiting members of the Cincinnati Coronado Tent City Club. The first piece played was a new vocal march by Charles R. Stickney, and specially composed for and dedicated to the Ohions. At its conclusion calls were made for the composer, and after he had bowed his acknowledgments A. A. Weiss was forced to show himself to the enthusiastic crowd of Easterners present. Mr. Weiss is the gentleman who organized the first Tent City Club, and was also in charge of the special train which brought the members west. The camp was certainly in the hands of the Cincinnati people on Thursday. It is estimated that 300 people from that city were wearing badges, and many more demanded them, but could not be be supplied.

Friday's musical event was in the shape of a decided novelty. The much talked of "Night in Venice" attracted many hundreds to the bay front, and dozens of boats were drifting idly while the occupants listened to the excellent music played from the platform erected in the bay. Another "Night in Venice" on a much more elaborate scale is promised.

The request program played on Saturday night was enjoyed by all present. It is to be hoped that we shall get a program of classical requests in the near future.

SAN DIEGO MISSION AND OLD TOWN.

This trip takes you through an interesting district of the city, over a portion of the 1,400-acre City Park, up the beautiful Mission Valley to the Old Mission. This is the oldest Mission in California, established in 1769 by Father Junipero Serra, and the first of a chain of Franciscan Missions extending from San Diego to Sonoma. It is largely in ruins and fast crumbling away, but the original adobe walls and some portions of the interior can yet be seen. The olive orchard at this Mission was started from cuttings brought from Spain, and is the oldest in California. All the olive trees in the State are children of this grove. There is also at this Mission an Indian school of about eighty pupils.

On the return you pass through Old Town, by Palms, 134 years old; the Old Fort, the house where Ramona was married; the old Mission bell, the old church and cemetery.

The trip is usually taken in tally-hos made up of congenial parties from Tent City.

ANOTHER SCARBINA CONTEST.

For the biggest scarbina caught before September I the Cycle & Arms Co., operating in Tent City, will give a Van Hoff \$12 reel, and the Tent City management a \$10 split bamboo surf rod and a Gulf tarpon line, making a total value of \$25. The conditions are as follows:

- 1. All intending competitors must register at the Cycle & Arms, Tent City, before eligible for entering.
- 2. The contest will begin August 1 and close at 8 p. m. August 31.
- 3. Fish must be caught with rod and reel from the shore. No deep-sea fishing allowed.
- 4. Fish must be caught on the surf line between the government jetty and the boundary monument.
- 5. Fish must be weighed at the Cycle & Arms store, where record is kept.
- 6. The judges reserve the right to open all fish before weighing.

Be sure and bring your tickets, as baggage cannot be checked without them.

Personally conducted excursions leave Tent City every day at 8 a. m. for La Jolla and the wonderful caves. The train makes a short stop at Old Town, the oldest settlement of San Diego; in fact, the oldest settlement in California, famous as one of the scenes of Helen Hunt Jackson's "Ramona."

The beach here is peculiarly well adapted to surf bathing, having a very gradual slope and being free from undertow. Despite the fact that no serious accident has ever occurred, the management have taken all possible precautions for the bathers.

TENT CITY COURT--POLICE PRO-CEEDINGS-MANY "SENT UP."

[Special to the News by I. M. A. Lyre, court reporter.]

At 4:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon Charles E. Sumner took his place at the judge's bench. The honorable magistrate was attired in his official robes-duck trousers, shirt waist and straw brimmer. The seriousness of the charges against the prisoners brought many sensation mongers to the floating court house, and Constables T. J. Fisher and Alex. Roff were kept very busy hustling the mob. After charging the jury Judge Sumner called for the first offender. There was a deep silence as A. A. Weiss was led forward. He was charged with trying to absorb all the earth's moisture. Defence: Tried to drown troubles in drink, taking it for medicine to cure injury received in wreck on Santa Fe. Fined \$1. Constable Fisher collected the fine, got permission to leave the court, came back in five minutes, looking very much refreshed.

Ah Chin, described as a Chinaman, but looking more like a licked Russian, was accused of stealing. As he was not "found with the goods," Ah Chin very emphatically denied stealing the complainant's sox. Records proved his accuser to be wearing the only pair he was ever known to buy. Chinaman wore no sox at all. Lewis R. Kirby and Eugene Daney prosecuting and defending attorneys had a heated argument as to whether overworked sox should be considered as live stock. Not being in order Bailiff Thill ejected both at the order of the worthy Judge.

J. J. Cluxton, a tramp negro, came before the court to answer the serious charge of stealing watermelons from Monroe's store. Although the evidence was very conclusive, prisoner was dismissed, this unlooked ending coming through the Judge and jury fighting for the melon and Attorney Daney eventually securing it.

The next case tried was that against B. M. Warner, who was charged with "combining and conspiracy to give San Diego and Coronado the finest street railways in Southern California." It was a heartrending sight to see the noble visaged prisoner hustled to his stand by about twenty deputies. Sitting there bound and handcuffed, he reminded us of one of those old British Kings brought before the Roman tribunal. After the charge was read, prisoner with a lofty survey of the court said in loud, impassioned tones: "Yes, and if I had to do it again I would do better-if it were possible." Sensation in court. Loud hissing from delegation from a northern city. In summing up the Judge said the charge was proven and impressed the jury to attend to the carrying out of the law. Sentenced to receive \$1,200 increase to his yearly salary. Prisoner

Joshua Hammond, the manager of Tent City, was charged with appearing in public without a coat, discharging skyrockets within the city limits, and working all night making plans for the betterment of the resort. A nominal fine was imposed

and a sum from the poor box given prisoner to buy a coat with.

Ed Cole and Ed Gottesburen were before the court for vagrancy and disturbing the peace. Held over.

At the next session of the court another batch of offenders will be tried. Some of them are H. W. Moore, defying the laws of the constitution by holding a bull fight on American soil. Edwin Thill, Clifford Radston, W. J. Wagner, and John, forcing residents of the United States to leave for Mexico.

The heavy sentences awarded is accounted for by the fact that half the jury were ladies and the other half their husbands. A case of "do as I tell you," you know.






