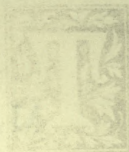

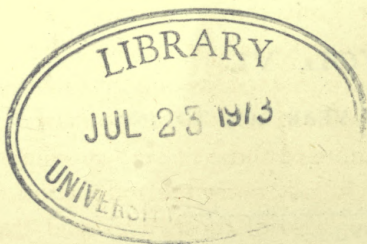

INTRODUCTION.



THE following pages bring the account of the proceedings of the Manchester Court Leet and Court Baron, which, as before explained, were held at the same time, down to Easter, 1687. They commence with the Court held on the 12th October, 1675, and so cover a period of twelve and a half years. The proceedings of two of the Courts, those held at Michaelmas, 1682, and Michaelmas, 1685, are incomplete, some of the leaves on which they were entered having probably become loose before the volume was re-bound. (See p. 258.) The names of the Boroughreeves and Constables for those years I have fortunately been able to supply from other sources. (See p. 287.)

The proceedings of the Courts as contained in these pages are very similar, as might indeed be expected, to those contained in Vols. iv. and v. of these Records. We have the same long lists of those who were fined for selling Ale and Beer "by unsealed [or unstamped] measures" contrary to the statute, for disposing of bread contrary to the laws regulating its sale, and for making spice bread, &c. Here, too, we find mention of the various kinds of bread at that time in use in the town, such as the fine rolls called "manchets," the coarser "household loaf," and "bolted bread," and, finally, the still coarser "horsebread" or "horse loaf," used to feed animals with. There is also the first and only reference (p. 246) to the still familiar Lancashire "jannock," and one to "French bread," which Thomas Cogan, who died High Schoolmaster of Manchester, described, in 1596, as only fit to fatten swine. (See p. 288.) The names of those who used "unlawful weights and measures" frequently comprised those of very prominent Manchester tradespeople, who could not resist the temptation to cheat their neighbours. The names also of those who sold "unbaited beef," that is, the flesh of bulls which had not previously been "baited" by bulldogs, as well as those who sold unwholesome food, or who bought and sold on the same day, are all in turn duly recorded. There are also long lists of those who were fined for "gashing and cutting" hides and skins, as well as those who allowed their swine to ramble in the town "unyoaked and unringed," or their dogs to

go about unmuzzled, or who did not clean or repair the streets before their houses, or who in some other way violated the regulations of the town.

The number of "officers" appointed at the Michaelmas Court Leet held on the 5th October, 1686, was exactly 110, and it is clear that all those who were so appointed were expected to do their duty. The Jury of the Court Leet not only fined them, if they did not attend and swear to perform their allotted tasks in seeing to the general welfare of the town, but they also fined them, if they dared to come to the subsequent Easter and Michaelmas Courts without making all proper "presentments" against public "nuisances," or the neglect of their neighbours. The "Deputy Constable," who had a salary of £10 per annum, and the "Beadle," who had two shillings a week and a suit of clothes, were regularly appointed at each Court, as well as the "Winter Watch," the members of which had to see to the safety of the town during the long winter nights. But this seems not to have been sufficient, for at the Court held on the 8th October, 1678, attention was called to the fact that "this Towne hath been wonderfully preserved from fire and other accidents," which had happened elsewhere, particularly in the night time and in the winter months, and it was accordingly enacted that, with the object of taking "every possible care for the better security and safety of this Towne," every one of the inhabitants was "according to his turne and time [to] either watch himselfe in person or hire some sufficient person" to do so for him. The Constables, moreover, were enjoined "to take care that the same bee performed," and the Deputy Constable was ordered to "keepe an account of every nights watch and of the persons that Refuse."

At the Court held on the 12th April, 1681, the Constables were enjoined to see that the various forms of punishment then in vogue were duly put into good repair, and these are set forth as follows:—the "Cook stool" or cucking stool, the "Stocks," the "Rogues Post," and the "Pillory." In the first of these, scolding women were punished by being ducked, or "cucked" as the old term was, in the water, whilst the Stocks held the feet of those who were convicted of drunkenness and other misdemeanours demanding only light punishment. Those, who were sentenced by the magistrates to be publicly whipped, were tied to the Rogues Post, whilst the standing on the Pillory for a given space of time was either a serious

or a light form of punishment, according as the populace chose to regard the conduct of the unfortunate person, who was exposed to their tender mercies. The "Butts," or places where the inhabitants were enjoined by Act of Parliament to keep up their skill in archery, are also frequently referred to, and it would appear that at one time they were placed in Alport Lane, but later on they were taken to their old position in Garrett Lane. (See p. 241.)

The most important event chronicled in this volume was the public taking of the Oath of Allegiance by the inhabitants of the town on the 14th May, 1679, not the 29th April, as has been frequently stated elsewhere. The list of the names of those who took the Oath fills ten pages, the total number of persons being 812, as against 582, whose names occur as having taken the Oath of Allegiance on the 7th October, 1661. (See vol. iv., p. 305.) This list of names of the inhabitants of Manchester is a very valuable one. The more important members of the community are distinguished by the "esq.," "gent.," "clerk," "M." attached to their names.

When the proceedings of the Courts noticed in this volume begin, the manor of Manchester was held by the Right Honourable "CHARLES LORD NORTH, Baron of Kirtling and Lord Grey, Baron of Rolleston," and the "LADY KATHERINE," his wife, who are described as lord and lady of the manor down to the year 1680. At the Court held on the 5th October in that year he occurs alone, and it is therefore probable that his wife had died between April and October in that year. As already stated in the Introduction to Volume V., this Lady Katherine was the daughter of Lord Grey, of Wark, and she had married, for her first husband, Sir Edward Mosley, Bart., the second and last Baronet of that name, who died on the 14th October, 1665, without issue. She subsequently married Charles, son and heir of Dudley Lord North, who was created Lord Grey, of Rolleston, in 1673, and who became Lord North, Baron of Kirtling, on the death of his father *c.* 1677. After Lady Katherine's death, in 1680, he is described as sole lord of the manor of Manchester till his own death in 1683. At the Court held on the 9th October, 1683, EDWARD MOSLEY, Esq., is described as lord of the manor, and he was still the lord when this volume closes. This Edward Mosley, Esq., who subsequently became Sir Edward Mosley, Knt., was the second son of Oswald Mosley, of Ancoats, Esq.

(who died in 1630), and he had succeeded to the manor of Manchester as a remainder-man, created by the will of Sir Edward Mosley, the last Baronet, in 1665, who calls him "my cozen Edward Mosley, Esq., Councillor at Law." The manor of Manchester was in the first instance devised, after certain trusts were fulfilled, to Edward Mosley, "son of my said cozen Edward Mosley Esq." and his heirs male, with remainder in default of such issue to the said Edward Mosley, Esq., and his heirs male. Edward Mosley, the son, died unmarried, and was buried at Didsbury on the 10th April, 1677, and consequently his father succeeded to it on the death of Lord North in 1683, when he would be about 65 years of age. He died on the 25th and was buried at Didsbury on the 31st July, 1695, when the manor of Manchester passed to his only surviving child, Lady Anne Bland, the wife of Sir John Bland, of Kippax, co. York, Bart.

Oswald Mosley, Esq., who had been appointed Steward of the Court in 1669, was holding this office when the contents of this volume begin, and he presided over the Courts till 1681, when, at the Court held on the 5th October in that year, *James Lightbowne*, Esq., occurs as Steward. On the manor of Manchester falling to Edward Mosley, Esq., he appointed *Joseph Yates*, Esq., as his Steward, and he accordingly presided at the Court held on the 9th October, 1683. The name of *John Ashton*, Esq., occurs as Steward at the Court held on the 5th October, 1686, and he was holding that office when this volume closes.

We have now reached a period when a most unfortunate break in the continuity of these Court Leet Records occurs. From Michaelmas, 1552, to Easter, 1687, the records of the Courts, save for a break of a few years during the Civil War, 1642 to 1647, and an occasional missing year or a portion of one, are complete, and, as previously stated, are contained in three folio volumes. The fourth volume, however, which contained the proceedings of the Courts held between Michaelmas, 1687, and Easter, 1731, was never in the possession of the Corporation, to whom all the other volumes of the Court Leet Records were handed over on the purchase of the Manor of Manchester from Sir Oswald Mosley, Bart., in 1846. Since the printing of these Records began, every enquiry has been made, and advertisements have been inserted in various papers, with a view to the recovery of this missing volume, but so far all these

attempts have been in vain. As the missing volume would be a large-sized folio book of some five or six hundred pages, it is hardly likely to have been wilfully destroyed, but has probably been mislaid, and so lost. Mr. G. H. Hankinson, of Manchester, has pointed out that there is clear evidence that this particular volume was missing so long ago as 1826, twenty years prior to the purchase of the manor of Manchester by the Corporation. He quotes from the report of a trial at Lancaster, *Mosley v. Walker*, a report of which appears in *7 Barnewall and Cresswell's Reports* (pp. 42-43), where the following statement occurs:—"At the trial before Hallock. B. at the summer assizes for the county of Lancaster, 1826, the following documentary evidence, coming out of the plaintiff's muni-ment-room, was produced by his steward, in order to prove the title of the plaintiff to the market. Thirdly, the books of the Court Leet from 1552 to 1687, and from 1731 to the time of the trial, *the intervening book was lost.*" (The italics are mine.) He further suggests that the most probable period when the loss of this volume occurred, would be during the litigation between the lord of the manor and various persons against whom he was obliged to bring actions in the latter part of the last century. He mentions the actions "*Mosley v. Chadwick and others* (finally disposed of in 1782), *Mosley v. Pierson* (1790), and *Mosley v. Norris* (1791)." In all these cases, he adds, "the lord would presumably have to show his title in like manner to *Mosley v. Walker*, as quoted above, and in the transit of the Court Leet Records from place to place a volume might easily be left behind or mislaid and never recovered." I am sadly afraid the chances of recovering this missing volume are now very remote.

It only remains to add that, as in the previous volumes, the proceedings of the Courts, here printed, have been compared, line for line, with the original, so as to ensure an exact reproduction in print. All points of interest have been, as far as possible, explained, and particulars of the family history of many of the persons, whose deaths are here recorded, derived from family papers, wills, &c., have been added in the notes. In the Appendices some attempt has been made to bridge over the period 1687 to 1731 by the printing of several documents belonging to that period.

As many persons may refer to this book who are, perhaps, not very familiar with the old forms of writing and spelling, &c., the following notes are offered for their assistance.

1. *These pages being an exact reproduction in print of the original MS. volume (each line of print having been compared word for word with the original), all the curious and in many cases phonetic spellings of the original will here be found. The use or disuse of capital letters was at the date of these Records most arbitrary, and the same word will be found spelt in three or four different ways on the same page.*

2. *All words or sentences between square brackets [] have been inserted by the Editor, either as elucidatory of the text or supplying an occasional missing word, &c.*

3. *The most frequent contractions are p or p for per, pre, or pro; thus, pson for person, psent for present, pceed for proceed, &c.; s stands for ser, svice for service, svant for servant; u is used for v, thus, haue for have, euery for every, Glouer for Glover, svice for service. Words are often joined together, thus, anorder for an order, shalbe for shall be, thenheritance for the inheritance, &c.*

4. *The various contractions ð, t, n, f, s, v, &c., &c., have been used throughout this and the former volumes, not as expressing the meanings often specially attached to them, but simply to give the contracted form of the original writing as closely as could be managed in print.*

5. *The use of Roman numerals was becoming less common than in previous volumes. Thus, j, ij, iij, iiij or iv, v, vj, vij, viij, ix, x, xj, xij, xiiij, and so on, are used for 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, &c. Thus, iij^a iiij^d stands for 3s. 4d., vj^a viij^d for 6s. 8d., and so on.*

6. *The headings of most of the Courts being in Latin, a translation of one of them as illustrative of the rest will be found on p. 1.*

7. *When an order was carried out, factum est or fact est (it is done) was written in the margin. These words have been printed in italics.*

8. *The duties of the various officers appointed at the Michaelmas Courts will be found explained in the notes on pp. 1 to 4 of Volume 1.*

To Mr. Henry Newcome, of Manchester, he bequeathed a legacy of 20s.; to Mr. Robert Eaton, of Manchester, 20s.; and to Mr. Henry Finch, of Manchester, £2 10s. ³ The Cuckstool or Cuckingstool has been frequently mentioned in previous volumes. (See Indexes.) It was used for the punishment of scolding women and women of ill repute, and consisted of a chair fixed at the end of a long pole, suspended over a pool of water, into which the culprit, who was tied to the chair, could be ducked overhead as often as required. The Cuckstool at this time was placed on the edge of the Horsepool in Market Street Lane.

² The name of George Hilton has frequently occurred in these Records (see Indexes to volumes iv. and v.), but it is most probable that more than one person of that name is referred to. The will of George Hilton, of Manchester, butcher, dated 9th April, 1676, was proved at Chester on the 3rd May in that year. He mentions his wife, Ellen Hilton, his daughter, Jane Hilton, his son [and heir], James Hilton, and his [younger] son, Robert Hilton, the latter of whom was to have £60 and "one flesh board stall and standing in the which he is already stalling." He appointed his brother, Robert Hilton, and his (the testator's) son, James Hilton, to be his executors.

³ The said James came and was sworn to the lord in open Court.

⁴ Thomas Illingworth's name has frequently occurred in these Records. (See Indexes to volumes iv. and v.) He was the son and heir of Thomas Illingworth, of Manchester, chapman, by his wife Margaret Goodier, and was under age at the time of his father's death in 1639. (See vol. iij., p. 288). He was married on the 21st September, 1641, to Anne, one of the daughters and co-heirs of Mr. Nield, by whom he had a large family. He was one of the two Constables for the year 1651-2, and was elected Burghreeve on the 12th October, 1658. His burial took place at the Collegiate Church, on the 25th March, 1670, but his will, if he made any, is not now to be found at Chester. At the Court held 3rd October, 1671, "the heires of m^r Thomas Illingworth" are mentioned, shewing he was then dead (see vol. v., p. 156), and it is probable that Robert, his son and heir, was then under age, and that he had now come of age, and was ordered to do his suit and service.

¹ At the Court held on the 8th October, 1672, it was announced that "James Hynd Junio^r hath purchased a parcell of land of m^r John Radclyffe lyeinge in the Markett stidd lane," and this is the land referred to in the text. There is no will of any James Hinde or Hynde now preserved at Chester.

² John Hartley, of Strangeways, Esq., the elder, had succeeded to that estate in consequence of his marriage with Ellen, daughter and heiress of another John Hartley, of Strangeways, Esq., who was buried at the Collegiate Church on the 3rd October, 1655. By his wife, Ellen, he had a son and heir, John Hartley, baptized at the Collegiate Church on the 24th April, 1653, who is stated in the text to be now seized of certain lands, probably granted to him by his father, and late in the latter's possession. John Hartley, Esq., senior, did not die till June, 1681.

³ The Town Hall has been frequently mentioned in volumes iv. and v. of these Records, and at one time I was disposed to think that it was a building, which had either been erected on the site of, or had supplanted "The Booths" as a place for holding the town's meetings and the Quarter Sessions, &c. (See vol. iv., p. 321.) It now appears, from an entry later on in this volume (see p. 73), that the Town Hall and the Booths were one and the same building, the former being a name only slowly coming into use.

¹ Mr. Edward Byrom was a younger son of Edward Byrom, of Manchester, gent., who died in June, 1655. The death of his elder brother, William Byrom, of Manchester, gent., which occurred in December, 1665, has already been noticed in these Records. (See vol. v., p. 82.) Mr. Edward Byrom, who was born in 1627, was married at Deane, near Bolton, on the 13th November, 1654, to Ann, daughter of John Crompton, of Halliwell, by whom he had a family of three sons and three daughters. He was one of the two Constables elected 6th October, 1663, but does not appear to have held the office of Boroughreeve. In his will, dated 14th June, 1668, he describes himself as Edward Byrom, of Manchester, and devised to Ann, his wife, until his son Edward attained the age of 21 years, all the messuage he then dwelt in, except the two shops and chambers then in the possession of Ann Booker, widow, and widow Russell, which he left to his said wife for her life. To his son Joseph he left all his lands in St. Mary's Gate when 21 years of age, and to his youngest son, William, "all that housing in Boulton, that I purchased of Mr. Ellis Hey" when he attained 21 years of age. If his son Joseph died under age, then the premises in St. Mary's Gate were to go to his son William, and if the latter died under age, the premises in Bolton were to go to his son Joseph, but if both died, then these properties passed to Edward Byrom, his son and heir. To Ann, his wife, he bequeathed £300; to his son, Edward, £30; his son, Joseph, £10; and his son, William, £200; and to his daughter, Ellen, £200. To his two sisters, 20s. each; to his "cosen" [? nephew], William Byrom, 20s.; to "my brother[-in-law] [Francis] Worthington 20s" "To Mr Warden [of the Collegiate Church] and his wife 20s" To Mr. Stamp and his wife, 20s.; to Thomas Byrom, 10s.; to Elizabeth Marsh, 20s.; to his servants, Roger and John, 10s. each. To "my son Edward my sealing Gould ring"; to his "cosen," Ellen Tilsley, 10s.; and "I assign over my two apprentices Roger and John to Ann my wife and my other two executors." He appointed his brother-in-law, Joseph Crompton, Nicodemus Moncks, and Ann, his [the testator's] wife, the executors of his will, and gave to the two former £5 each, and he desired his brother [-in-law], [Francis] Worthington, and his "cosen," Thomas Booker, to be overseers thereof. The will is signed by the testator and sealed with his armorial seal, the witnesses being Henry Newcome, Francis Worthington, and Roger Mekin. It was proved at Chester on the 10th August, 1668, but the inventory of his effects placed with it bears the date of 1st June, 1669, when it was taken by John Leadbeater and Roger Mekin. The "goods in the shop" were valued at £398 6s. 9d.; "in burnt silver," £11 5s.; in money, £144; "in gold and silver boxes," £5 6s.; and in debts, £384 14s. 8d. The total amounted to £1,695 12s 6d. Ann Byrom, the widow, married for her second husband the Mr. Roger Mekin above mentioned, who died in 1684, leaving by her two daughters and co-heirs. Edward Byrom, the son and heir, who was born on the 10th October, 1656, was under age at the time of his father's death in 1668. Having now come of age, he is ordered to attend and do his suit and service for his father's lands. He was the father of the celebrated John Byrom, M.A., F.R.S.

Also the Jury aforesaide fynd that m^r James Johnson of Salford hath purchased certeine lands of Micah Barrett of Manchester aforesaide Scituate and beinge att the Smithy doore and therefore hee is to come into this Court to doe his suite and Service.

Alsoe the Jury aforesaide fynd that John Heywood of Manchester hathe purchased certeine lands of m^r Henry Whitehead of Bury Scituate and beinge neare the church yard side and is to come into this Court to doe his suite and Service.

Alsoe the Jury aforesaide fynd that m^r Samuel Lightbowne of Manchestr^r hath by his fathers will m^r James Lightbowne¹ deçd certeine lands given to him Scituate and beinge pte att Smithye doore and pte att Church yard side and is therefore to come into this Court to doe his suite & Service.

M^r Samuel Lightbowne Jur^t

¹ Mr. James Lightbowne's name has occurred frequently in these Records. (See Indexes to previous volumes.) He was the second son of Mr. James Lightbowne, of Manchester, merchant, whose death was announced at the Court held 10th October, 1621. (See vol. iij., p. 47, where a long account of him will be found.) He was a woollen draper in Manchester, and at Sir William Dugdale's Visitation of Lancashire, in 1664, he was 50 years of age. He married Jane, the eldest daughter and co-heir of Adam Jepson, of Moston, near Manchester, and succeeded to his father-in-law's estate at Moston, in right of his wife, in 1652. (See vol. iv., p. 168.) By her he had a family of four sons and two daughters, living in 1664. He was elected one of the two Constables on the 12th October, 1658, and Boroughreeve on the 6th October, 1663. His will, dated 6th November, 1664, was proved both at Chester and Canterbury, in 1665. He devised to his eldest son, James Lightbowne, all his messuages, lands, &c., in Moston, except one messuage in the Street Fold, in Moston, which he held by grant for Henry Hardman. He also devised to the said James, the chambers in Gray's Inn, "which I bought of Thomas Birch Esq and took the grant therefore in his name, he paying to my children Elizabeth, Samuel, John, Adam and Mary Lightbowne £50 apiece when 21." "To my son Samuel I give one messuage &c in Manchester wherein I now dwell and one little building and garden in Manchester at the churchyard side upon the river Irwell, and all my messuages, walk milne, lands &c in Blakeley, which I lately purchased." To his son, John Lightbowne, all his messuages, lands, &c., in Spotland, and to his son, Adam Lightbowne, all his messuages, lands, &c., in Castleton, Buerdsell, and Buerdsell Moor, and all the benefit of the redemption thereof. One half of his goods he left to his younger children equally between them, and the other half he reserved to himself, out of which to pay the following bequests:—to his daughter, Elizabeth, £100; to his son, Samuel, as much money as will make up his part of the other moiety to £200; to his daughter, Mary, £50; to his executors, either of them a mourning cloak. "To the poor of Manchester and the places thereabouts that shall come to my funeral as much money as shall be thought fit by my executors." The rest of his moiety of his personal estate he left to his children, Elizabeth, John, Adam, and Mary, equally between them. He appointed his brother, John Lightbowne, Esq., and his brother-in-law, Thomas Minshull, gentlemen, his executors during the minority of his son, James, but on his reaching the age of 21 he was to act as sole executor. But if he died a minor, then the said two executors were to act until his brother, Samuel, came of age, who was then to become sole executor. He desired his brothers-in-law, John Cowpe and Joseph Werden, to act as overseers of his will. This will was witnessed by Thomas Mynshall, jun., Nathan Leech, and Ralph Heaton, and it was proved at Chester, on the 20th April, 1665.

Alsoe the Jury aforesaide doe fynd that m^r John Gathorne hath purchased three mesuages of m^r Edward Gathorne Scituate and beinge in the market streete Lane and therefore hee is to come into this Court to doe his suite and Service.

Alsoe the Jury aforesaide find that m^r Nathan Wallworke is sonn and heir to Captaine Nathan Wallworke² and hath a mesuage in the possession of Anthony Moore neare the Hyde Crosse late the Inheritance of the said Captaine Wallworke and therefore is to come into this Court to doe his suite and Service.

M^r Nathan Wallworke Jur^ſ

Alsoe the Jury aforesaid find that m^r William Wilson Is sonn and heire vnto his father m^r James Wilson³ deçd and hath c^oteine lands in the Ould mealgate late the Inheritance of his said late fath^r And that hee the said m^r William Wilson hath purchased other lands in the Ould mealgate of m^r Henry Whitehead next therevnto adioyninge and therefore is to come into this Court to doe his suite and Service.

Alsoe the Jury aforesaid doe fynd that m^r Samuel Dickanson hath made an Incroachment Vpon the Lords wast by Erectinge a Porch before his lands in the Milnegate and therefore leave him ad miserecordiã domini.

In the inventory of his effects, taken on the 5th July, 1667, when his son and heir, James, came of age, his debts, good and bad, were valued at £1217 10s. 5d., and "the moneys due by specialities lett out att interest for the younger children" amounted to £639 16s. 8d. Mr. Thomas Dickanson, who had married Elizabeth, one of the said younger children, had in his possession £64 7s. Although his son and heir, James Lightbowne, must have come of age in 1667, there has been no reference in these Records to his taking up his father's lands and doing his suit and service for them. The second son, Samuel, being now of age, the Jury desire him to do his suit and service for the lands he had inherited by his father's will. The death of James Lightbowne the elder, in 1664, is thus alluded to by Henry Newcome, in his *Autobiography* (vol. i., p. 144.)—"We went out but on Saturday and returned on Monday and I found my friend Mr. James Lightbowne dead; who fell violently ill on Saturday night and died on Sabbath day night. I was much startled with the providence and affected."

² Captain Nathan *Walworth*, or *Walwork*, who lived at the Old Hall, in Pilkington, was the son and heir of Peter *Walworth*, or *Walwork*, whose death was announced at the Court held 10th October, 1626. (See vol. iij., p. 123.) He was therefore the nephew of Nathan *Walworth*, the pious founder of Ringley Chapel, whose interesting letters to Peter Seddon have recently been printed by the Chetham Society, vol. cix. The administration bond of Nathan *Walwork*, of Pilkington, and the inventory of his effects is at the Probate Court, Chester, but he clearly died intestate.

³ The name of a James Wilson, who was a shopkeeper (? a fishmonger) in the town, is occasionally met with in vol. v. of these Records (see Index), but there is nothing to show his parentage or connections, nor is it certain that he is the James Wilson mentioned in the text. The only will of any James Wilson now at Chester is that of a James Wilson, of Poppythorne, and that, unfortunately, cannot now be found.

Alsoe the Jury aforesaid p^rsent & fynd that the Chamber belongeinge to the Townes hall¹ is very much out of reparaire and in decay and therefore doe ord^r the Lord of this Manno^r forthwith to reparaire the same.

Whereas m^r John Abraham and m^r John Barlowe of Deansgate ou̇seers of the highwayes of the Towne and P^rish of Manchester for the yre past have neglected to bringe in their acc^{ts} vnto vs this p^rsent Jurye therefore they doe amerce them in twenty shillings apeece And doe ord^r that the said Overseers accordinge to their vse and Custome doe bringe in their account to the Jury of the next Court Leete subpena 40^s apeece.

Whereas there are seūall ditches belongeinge to m^r Samuel Butler m^r Henry Jackson m^r William Hunter, the occupants of m^r William Plungen's land James Wilson Isaac Mosse and William Stockdale wth beinge not scoured and cleansed is become noisome and a nusance to the Neighborhood therefore the Jury aforesaid doe ord^r that they the said psons shall Cleanse and Scoure their said ditches att or before the first day of June next Vpon payne of ffive shillings apeece.

Alsoe the Jury aforesaid doe ord^r that all former good ord^{rs} made by this Court bee forthwith putt in execuçon.

¹ The name of Thomas Beck has frequently occurred in these Records. (See Indexes to vols. iv. and v.) He was the son and heir of Thomas Beck, of Manchester and Hopwood Clayden, gent., by his wife Esther, daughter of Thomas Haworth, of Manchester, to whom he was married at the Collegiate Church on the 23rd December, 1628. Thomas Beck, senior, died in July, 1645, and was buried at the Collegiate Church on the 20th of that month. Thomas Beck, the son, the one whose death is noticed in the text, was baptized at Manchester on the 17th January, 1629-30. He married Mary, daughter of Mr. William Bardsley, of Manchester (see these Records, vol. v., p. 115), by whom he had a family of four sons and five daughters. He entered his pedigree at the Lancashire Visitation of 1664-5, when he was 34 years of age. He was elected one of the two Constables of the Town on the 7th October, 1661, and was Boroughreeve in the following year, elected 7th October, 1662. He was also apparently re-elected Boroughreeve some five years later, for the year beginning October, 1667, and ending in October, 1668. (See vol. v., p. 259.) His will, if he made any, is not now to be found at Chester, but I have a copy of a deed of settlement of his estates made on the 11th February, 1668-9, which supplies some interesting information. This deed was made between Thomas Beck, of Manchester, gent., on the one part, and Samuel Dickanson, of Manchester, gent., William Bardsley, of Manchester, yeoman, and John Beck, of the city of Bristol, merchant, on the other part, the last-mentioned person being probably a younger brother of Thomas Beck. He mentions Mary, his wife, John Beck, his son and heir apparent, then under age, William Beck, his second son, Thomas Beck, the third son, and Richard Beck, the fourth son. His daughters, who are necessarily not named in the above deed of settlement, are ascertained from other sources to have been Margaret, Esther, died young, Elizabeth, Mary, and Sarah. Mr. Thomas Beck must have died before the 5th August, 1678, because on that date his son and heir, describing himself as John Becke, of Manchester, gent., was a party to a deed to levy a fine of all the messuages, lands, &c., mentioned in the settlement of 1669, which he had then just inherited from his father. This deed seems to have been in connection with the transfer of his estate, either by mortgage or absolute conveyance, to Thomas Minshul the elder, of Manchester, gent. The messuages and lands named in this deed were as follows:—All that messuage or tenement, called Hopwood Cleyden, and the lands thereto belonging, in Manchester, about 20 acres in all; a messuage and lands in Newton, about 10 acres, then in the tenure of Robert Wrightson, son of Christopher Wrightson, the late tenant; another messuage and lands in Newton, then in the tenure of Edmund Grundy, son of Randle Grundy, the late tenant; a messuage called Morrisses, in Manchester; three other messuages in Manchester; and all those three closes of land in Manchester, called the Nearer Ashley, the Midlest Ashley, and the Furthest Ashley, containing 5 acres of land.

¹ At p. 305 of Volume IV. will be found the list of the names of those who took the Oath of Allegiance in Manchester on the 7th October, 1661, soon after the Restoration of Charles II. For some reason or other it was considered desirable by the authorities that all those persons, who resided in the town, and were under the supervision of the Court Leet, should be desired to attend and take the Oath again, nearly eighteen years later. On the previous occasion the names of 582 persons are entered, whilst the lists here printed contain 812. This list of names, unlike the previous one, is not printed here for the first time, as in 1862 it was transcribed by the late Mr. John Harland, F.S.A., and appears in vol. 57 of the *Chetham Society's* publications, printed in that year, a few copies of which were reprinted for private circulation. He entitled it "The Names of the eight hundred inhabitants of Manchester, who took the Oath of Allegiance to Charles II. in April, 1679." There is an error in the month, which is repeated in the short introduction prefixed to the list, in which Mr. Harland states that the burgesses attended on the 29th April and following days, whereas it is abundantly clear from the heading that the true date is May 14th. Mr. Harland arranged the names alphabetically, but they are printed here exactly as they stand in the Court Book. It is somewhat strange that there is no mention of this taking of the Oath of Allegiance, which must have been a source of much comment in the town, in Henry Newcome's *Autobiography*, although his name duly occurs as having attended and taken it.

Alsoe wee the present Jury Doe find that m^r Robert Marler¹ late of Manchester by his will beareing Date March the third 1678[-9] Did bequeath vnto m^r James Kay one Messuage or Dwelling house Scituate in the Deansgate And likewise the said Robert Marler by the same will Did bequeath vnto George Williamson a Mesuage or Mesuages scituate att the Sude Hill for wth the said James Kay and George Williamson are to come into this Court to Doe their suite and service..... *Fur*'

Alsoe wee the present Jury doe find that m^r John Worthington is sonne and heire to m^r ffrancis Worthington² Late of Manchester for certeine Lands Scituate in the Old Mealegate and is to come into this Court to Doe his suite and Service.

¹ Robert Marler's name is only occasionally met with in volume v. of these Records (see Index), but occurs frequently in volume iv. He was elected one of the two Constables on the 12th October, 1652, and Boroughreeve on the 10th October, 1654. In his will, dated 3rd March, 1678[-9], and proved at Chester on the 17th September, 1679, he describes himself as of Manchester, chapman, but in 1654 he is called a hosier. (See vol. iv., p. 240 n.) He states that, "concerning all that messuage, burgage and tenement with the appurtenances in Manchester, wherein I now dwell, I devise the same to James Kay, of Salford, dyer, his heirs and assigns for ever." And "as concerning all those my messuages with the appurtenances situate in Manchester aforesaid, in a certain street or place there called the Sudehill, I devise the same to George Williamson, my grandson, his heirs and assigns for ever." These are the messuages respectively referred to in the text. The testator then proceeds to bequeath the following legacies: "to Joseph Poynton, my son in law," £20; "to my said grandson George Williamson," £10; "to my grandson Robert Marler," £10; "and all the residue of my personal estate I give to Amy Shelmerdine, widow, my daughter, and to my daughter Hannah, now wife of James Kay aforesaid." The said James Kay was appointed sole executor. The inventory of his goods, taken 1st August, 1679, by George Buerdsell and George Williamson, amounted to £332 11s. 7d.

² Mr. Francis Worthington, who, according to the list of the inhabitants of Manchester in 1668 (see vol. v., p. 253), lived in Cateaton Street, or at any rate had property there, is much more frequently referred to in volume iv. of these Records than in volume v. (See the respective Indexes.) He was elected one of the two constables on the 7th October, 1661, but does not ever appear to have been Boroughreeve. He was a younger son of Roger Worthington, of Manchester, draper, but although the baptism of his elder brother, John (afterwards D.D. and Master of Jesus College, Cambridge), and of his brothers Edmund and William occur in the Manchester Registers, his own baptism is not. I believe, to be found there. He was married at the Collegiate Church, Manchester, on the 15th Sept., 1646, to Sarah, daughter of Edward Byrom, of Manchester, gent. (see vol. v., p. 82 n, and also p. 52 n of this volume), by whom he had issue. He was buried there on the 10th Sept.,

1668, in the same grave as his wife, who had been interred there on the 3rd Oct., 1664. In his will, dated the 7th August, 1668, and proved at Chester on the 30th September in that year, he styles himself "Francis Worthington, of Manchester, woollen draper." He desired that his son-in-law, Thomas Booker, should have £50, and the residue of his goods and his personal estate he wished to be divided into two equal parts, one of which he gave to his son, Francis Worthington, and his daughter, Sarah Worthington, equally between them, and the other part he reserved to himself, out of which he bequeathed the following legacies:—"To my loving brother John Worthington Doctor in Divinity, one mourning cloak, now in my possession as a token of my love"; "to my loving friend and kinsman Henry Newcome, Master of Arts, 20s." The residue of his personal estate he bequeathed to his son, Francis, and his daughter, Sarah, equally between them, with benefit of survivorship, and should they both die under age, then to his son-in-law, Thomas Booker, and his wife and their issue. "I hereby give and bequeath to my son, John Worthington, and to the heirs of his body lawfully begotten, all my land and tenement in Manchester, in or near a street there commonly called the Ould Mealgate, now in the occupation of Ralph Shelmerdine, Samuel Booth and John Yarwood, and all my land in Salford, being one house and two crofts now in the occupation of myself and Thomas Nightingall and James Ouldham." With remainder to the testator's son, Francis Worthington, and his heirs, he paying to his sister, Sarah, £100, with remainder to the testator's daughters, Katherine Booker and Sarah Worthington, and their heirs, equally between them, with remainder to his brother, John Worthington, D.D., and his heirs for ever. He appointed his son-in-law, Thomas Booker, and his loving friend, William Edmondson, executors. The witnesses were Samuel Dickonson and Francis Mosley. The inventory of his goods, &c., was taken in September, 1668, by James Barret, William Bardsley, and Evan Clarke. Two items are noteworthy:—

The total amounting to the then large sum of £1416 2s. 5½d. All his children were under age at the time of his death, but his son and heir, John, being now of age, is ordered to attend and do his suit and service. His son, Francis, mentioned in the above will, was buried in his father's grave on the 23rd September, 1678.

¹ The building of the Almshouses in Miller's Lane has not previously been referred to. When Edward Mayes, by his will dated 7th May, 1621, left £120 for the use of the poor of Manchester, he stipulated that this sum should be invested in lands. (See vol. iij., pp. 39-41, where this will is printed in full.) His trustees accordingly purchased certain houses and lands in Miller's Lane. In the year 1680, the churchwardens of Manchester finding themselves in the possession of the sum of £158 13s., which had been given to the poor of Manchester in or before the year 1622, and no doubt of other small sums which had been bequeathed from time to time since then, determined to erect some almshouses in Miller's Lane with this money. The above-named £158 13s. was derived from the bequests of the following persons:—Richard Holland, £100; William Mosier, £10; John Clough, £3 13s.; a widow in London (unknown), £9 10s.; Ralph Sandforth, £5 10s.; and a Mr. Coale, £30. It is not improbable that these almshouses were erected on or near the land belonging to Mayes' Charity, but they appear to have been distinct from it. In front of the building a stone was inserted, bearing the following Latin inscription:—

The following is a translation of the above inscription:—

These buildings were erected in the year of our Lord, 1680, for the use of the poor people of Manchester, the magistrates approving and the trustees freely handing over the same in the year aforesaid by the care [or with the advice] of the churchwardens [or overseers] to Oswald Mosley, Esq., James Marler, gentleman, James Radcliffe, gentleman, Richard Fox, gentleman, Samuel Dickinson, gentleman, John Alexander, gentleman, Edward Bootle, gentleman, Humphrey Marler, gentleman, [as trustees].

These Almshouses remained in Miller's Lane for the space of 127 years, when, for some reason or other, they were pulled down. Mr. R. W. Procter, in his *Memorials of Bygone Manchester*, pp. 80-81, prints an abstract of an account of their destruction, taken from a newspaper entitled *The Manchester Observer, or Literary, Commercial, and*

Political Register, published in 1818, which had but a short-lived existence. From this paper it appears that the houses were two stories in height, the whole building being about 150 feet in length, and accommodating 20 families. To each house there was a piece of ground for a garden. In 1807, in making the present Edward Street, between Hanover Street and Miller Street, two or three of the Almshouses were taken down. About twelve months afterwards a person who acted as steward for the charity ordered the poor people to leave the houses without providing any other homes for them, and on their refusing to go, the buildings were pulled down over their heads. Finally about ten families were provided with cellar accommodation, the rents of which were paid for them in 1818. The stone bearing the inscription given above was then in a timber yard in Mayes Street, but it was subsequently mislaid or lost. In December, 1886, it was discovered by Harry Rawson, Esq., in one of the cellars of the Royal Institution in Mosley Street, but it does not appear to be known how it got there.

³ Although the father's name is not given in the text, I have ascertained that it was *John Abraham*, whose will, dated 10th May, 1681, was proved at Chester on the 10th September in that year. He was living in the Smithy Door in 1668 (see vol. v., p. 249), and his name has frequently occurred in volumes iv. and v. (See Indexes.) At the Court held on the 3rd October, 1665, it was stated that he had purchased two messuages of Mr. Thomas Beck and Mr. Richard Hunt, and he was ordered to attend and do his suit and service. In his will he desires to ratify a lease dated the 17th November last past [1680], made between him of the one part, and Thomas Lower, of Marsh Grange, co. Lanc., gent., and Leonard fell, of Beachley-within-furnes, co. Lanc., husbandman, of the other part, and all the uses and estates thereby granted. He also bequeathed to his son, Daniel Abraham, all that his messuage, with its appurtenances, in Echells [Etechells], co. He appointed his loving friends, Thomas Rudyard, gent., and Roger Haddock aforesaid, the said Rachel, his wife, and Daniel, his son, executors, and if the two former accept the same, he gave them 50s. The original will is much damaged, but a copy on paper is preserved with it, from which this abstract was made. This will was proved on the 10th September, 1681, by Rachel Abraham, the relict, and on the 11th February, 1685[-6], administration of the goods unadministered by the said Rachel Abraham, she having died, was granted to Mary, wife of Edward Chetham, daughter of the deceased.

The inventory of his goods, &c., taken on the 30th March, 1682, by Francis Davenport, Thomas Walker, John Runnigar, and Gyles Syddall was exhibited at the same time, the total amounting to £284 10s., of which £102 15s. was "debts owing to the decedent." Amongst the rooms in the house, which are named, one is called "the Calender Chamber," and another "the Working Chamber."

Alsoe Wee the Jurie of this p^rsent Leet doe find that m^r mathew Bootle is possessed of a pcell of land & howses near the Withen Greave formerly in the possession of m^r Henry Dickanson² deceased for which hee is to come into this Court to doe his Suite & Service.

¹ The name of Joseph Higham has frequently occurred in these Records. (See Indexes to Volumes iv. and v.) He seems to have held the office of Constable for the year 1667-8. (See vol. v., p. 260.) In his will, dated 7th April, 1683, and proved at Chester on the 18th May in that year, he left £200 to his daughter, Elizabeth Higham, together with various articles of domestic utility, including "one great silver Cawdall Cupp, one old silver boule one little silver cup and two silver spoons." The residue of his goods he gave to his son, Joseph Higham, and appointed his kinsmen, James Johnson and Joshua Gerard, his executors. At the Court held on the 27th April, 1671, Mr. Joseph Higham, of Manchester, chapman, is mentioned as having purchased one field called Burkehouse meadow, near Manchester, of John Hartley, Esq. (See vol. v., p. 135.)

² For an account of Mr. Henry Dickanson see p. 168, note 4. It may, however, here be noted, that by his will dated the 15th December, 1682, and proved at Chester on the 18th May, 1683, he devised to his son-in-law, Matthew Bootle, and his heirs for ever, "all those my three houses, one stable, one barn, one croft, with the gardens and orchards thereto belonging, lying at the Suedhill or Withingreave in Manchester, aforesaid, the house now in Abraham Gartside's possession excepted, which I give unto the said Abraham, during his life only, and after his decease I give the reversion thereof unto the said Mathew Bootle, and his heirs for ever. Item I give unto my said son-in-law, Mathew Bootle, the lease and all my interest of and in a certain messuage with the appurtenances in the Deansgate in Manchester aforesaid, called by the name of the *Rose and the Crowne*. Item I devise to the said Mathew Bootle the lease of all those houses in the fennel street and Half Street in Manchester, which I hold by lease under Mr. Dautesey [of Agecroft]." The former of these devises are the houses referred to in the text.

¹ Thomas Shaw was another son-in-law of Mr. Henry Dickanson, who in his will (referred to in the previous note) devised to him and his heirs for ever "all that messuage with the appurtenances near unto the Shambles in Manchester, aforesaid, now or late in the possession of John Barlow, together with the Chambers and shop thereto adjoining." This is the burgage mentioned in the text.

² See p. 136.

³ Mr. Ralph *Hough* was the son of Mr. Ralph Hough, whose death was announced at the Court held on the 7th April, 1657. (See vol. iv., p. 185.) It was then returned that "the Jurie doth finde that M^r Raph Hough M^rchant is heire to his ffather M^r Raph Hough deceased, of the Garrett Hall and demeasne Lands there vnto appertaineinge in Manchest^r ffor which he is to come into this Court and doe his suite and service." The next paragraph states that "the said M^r Raph Hough of Manchest^r Merchant hath bought one Messuage or dwellinge house wherein he now liveth in the Deanesgate for which he is to come into this Court to doe his suite and service or be Amerced in xx^s." In a note attached to the first of these paragraphs I referred to the entry at the Court held on the 27th April, 1631, in which it was stated that Mr. Ralph Hough "hath purchased Certaine Lands of M^r Samuel Mossley of the Garrett" (see vol. iij., p. 179), which lands evidently included Garrett Hall. Unfortunately I have not been able as yet to ascertain many particulars of this family.

⁴ Henry Dickanson was a rich linen draper or merchant in Manchester, whose name has frequently occurred in these Records. (See Indexes to volumes iij., iv., and v.) He was elected one of the two Constables on the 10th October, 1648, Boroughreeve on the 11th October, 1653, and again on the 26th April, 1660. (See vol. iv., pp. 326-7.) He is called Mr. Henry Dickanson, the elder, on the 7th October, 1673, and was evidently an old man at the time of his death. His will is a very long and interesting document, of which the following is an abstract. It is dated the 15th December, 1682, and he described himself as of Manchester, linen draper, and desired to be buried in the parish church there. He devised to his son, Samuel Dickanson, and his heirs for ever, all that messuage, lands, &c., situate in Blakeley, co. Lanc., then or late in the possession of William Buckley, together with one messuage with the appurtenances situate in the Milngate, in Manchester, wherein the said Samuel Dickanson now dwells, "with the rest of my houses and lands thereto next adjoining." And also one dwelling house with

And further he gave to his said son Samuel the lease of a certain messuage and tenement, situate in the parish of Oldham, late in the possession of Ottiwell Wild, and which is held under Joshua Cudworth, gentleman. To his son, Henry Dickanson, he devised the lease of his messuage, lands, &c., now in the possession of John Dixon, and the Moorfields, which he held under Sir Robert Cooke, Bart. Also he gave to his said son Henry, and his heirs for ever, all those two messuages, with the appurtenances, in Salford, in the possession of John Renshaw and widow Hulme, and also those two messuages and dwelling houses, with the appurtenances, in Salford, in the possession of Francis Davenport and Thomas Sidebotham. He gave to his son, Thomas Dickanson, the sum of £305, which he had formerly lent him. He devised to his son-in-law, Thomas Shaw, and his heirs for ever, all that messuage, with the appurtenances, near unto the Shambles in Manchester, now or late in the possession of John Barlow, together with the chambers and shops thereto adjoining. (See note 1.) He devised to his son-in-law, Matthew Bootle, and his heirs for ever, all those his three houses, one stable, one barn, one croft, with the gardens and orchards thereto belonging, lying at the Suedhill or Withingreave, in Manchester, the house now in Abraham Gartside's possession excepted, which he gave to the said Abraham during his life only, and after his decease he gave the reversion thereof to the said Matthew Bootle and his heirs for ever. He further gave to his said son-in-law, Matthew Bootle, the lease and all his interest of and in a certain messuage, with the appurtenances, in the Deansgate in Manchester, called by the name of the Rose and the Crown. Also he devised to the said Matthew Bootle the lease of all those houses in the ffennelstreet and Half Street in Manchester, which he held by lease under Mr. Dauntesey [of Agecroft]. He devised to his son-in-law, Alexander Davie, and his heirs for ever, all those two houses in Salford in the possession of widow Tilsley and Ralph Newton, and all the benefit of a lease made by the testator to Mr. Robert Illingworth of certain lands in Salford, formerly Mr. Pilkington's, and now the inheritance of the said Alexander Davie. To his son-in-law, Nathaniel Jeynson, he gave £300. To his son-in-law, Thomas Shrigley, and his heirs for ever, he devised the messuage in which he dwelt, and all those his two houses in Salford in the possession of Edward Atkinson and John Bradshaw, together with the croft on the backside, now in the possession of Edward Atkinson, and the plantation next adjoining. He bequeathed to his grandchildren, Samuel Dickanson and Henry Dickanson, sons of his son Samuel Dickanson, £100 a piece, "and to the rest of his children as shall be living at my decease" the sum of £50 a piece. To his grandson Henry, son of his son Henry Dickanson, £100, and to every child of his son-in-law, Alexander Davie, as shall be living at his decease, £100 a piece. To every other of his grandchildren to whom no legacy is hereinbefore bequeathed, and who shall be living at his decease, £50 a piece. Further he bequeathed to his eight sons and sons-in-law £100 each. To all his nephews and nieces who shall be living at the time of his decease, he bequeathed £3 a piece. To his servant, Elizabeth Leech, £5. To the poor of Manchester £100, the profits thereof, to wit, £5, to be disbursed amongst them yearly before Christmas Day for ever at the discretion of my executors hereinafter named. After his debts, funeral expenses, and legacies are paid, then all the residue of his goods, &c., real and personal, he bequeathed to his three sons, Samuel Dickanson, Henry Dickanson, and Thomas Dickanson, equally to be divided amongst them, and he appointed them his executors. This will was proved at Chester on the 18th May, 1683, and the probate copy of it is now preserved among the old local deeds in the Free Library, Manchester. The inventory of the effects of Henry Dickanson, late of Manchester, gentleman, was taken on the

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15th February, 1682-3, and the various items are as follows:—Household Goods, £120; Plate and Rings, £70; Ready Money, £500; Bonds and Good Debts, £4,000; Cloath Yarn and other goods in the warehouse, £300; the testator's wearing apparel, £20; Desperate Debts £500; "huslements" [*i.e.*, odds and ends] 5s., and in Leases for years £500. The total of the personalty amounting to the very large sum of £6,010 5s. The testator appears to have made a former will dated 1st August, 1681, and a codicil to it dated 8th November, 1682, which codicil, referring to a messuage, &c., at Mottram Andrew, co. Chester, which he had sold to Nathaniel Booth and Henry Booth, Esquires, is now in the Free Library, Manchester. At the Court held on the 19th October, 1647, Henry Dickanson was found to have lately purchased a messuage or dwelling house in the Toad Lane (see vol. iv., p. 5), and at the Court held on the 7th October, 1651, it was reported that he had purchased a messuage of Robert Symond, clerk, in the Half Street, near the churchyard. (See vol. iv., p. 60). Also at the Court held on the 12th October, 1658, it was found by the Jury that he had purchased certain lands near the Shambles from Richard Radclyffe, Esq., deceased. (See vol. iv., p. 239.) These are the messuages and lands mentioned in his will.

Allsoe wee the Jury aforesaid vpon view doe finde that Mary Walker hath not observed an Order of Co^t made last Easter Co^t Leete for the removeing of certaine Swine Coates or Piles of building by her erected Sub pena Tenne Shillings wee therefore Amerce her in Tenne Shillings and doe Order her to pull Downe the said Buildings before the ffirst day of March next ensuing Sub pena Twenty Shillings.

Whereas vpon view wee the Jury aforesaid doe finde that Thomas Percivall hath altered his ffence betwixt him and William Hibbert wee doe therefore Order the said Thomas Percivall to make up the said fence as it was formerly and according to its ancient Lymitts before the first of December next Sub pena Twenty Shillings.

Whereas vpon view wee the Jury aforesaid doe finde that there is a platting² not sufficiently repaired over a watercourse goeing from the Poole neare the Ackers wee therefore doe order that the said Platting bee repaired by the ffirst of December next sub pena ffive Shillings.

Whereas there hath beene severall Orders that the Lord of this Towne and Manno^r should provide a standard or measure of brasse for measureing of Corne according to the Statute in that Case provided which hath hitherto beene neglected though formerly Amerced in ffive Poundes and Tenne Poundes which neglect is a greate p'judice and dissatisfacçon to the Inhabitants of this Towne some refusing to lett their Corne Measures bee tryed by the sworne Officers for want of such Standard and therefore wee cannot further pceed to Amerce any Offenders for want of such Standard or measure.

Whereas Joseph Wood hath likewise p^rsented to our Consideraçon that the now wife of m^r Thomas Drinkewater when formerly called m^{rs} Beck¹ erected a Porch vpon the lords West before her then House in the Deanesgate which the s^d m^r Drinkewater is now possessed of and suffereth to stand wee the Jury aforesaid doe therefore leave the said m^r Drinkewater to the Consideraçon and mercy of the Lord of this Manno^r.

Allsoe wee the p^rsent Jury doe finde that m^r John Leadbeater is possessed of a certaine Messuage Burgage and Lands in the Milne-Gate formerly in the possession of m^r William Jackson² Deçd for which hee is to come into this Co^t to doe his Suite and Service.

¹ This Mrs. Beck was probably the widow of Thomas Beck, of Manchester, gentleman, whose death was reported at the Court held on the 8th October, 1678. (See p. 65.)

² The name of Mr. William Jackson has frequently occurred in volume iv. of these Records, but only occasionally in volume v. (See Indexes.) Nothing, however, appears to be known of his parentage, &c. He was elected Boroughreeve on the 12th October, 1652, and he is probably the same person described as "William Jackson of Manchester, hosier," who at the Court held on the 9th October, 1660, was "proved upon oath" to have used "divers opprobrious and Scandalous words against the Jurisdicon of this Court (To witt) that the Steward and Jury are all Rogues," for which he had to pay a fine of £2 10s. (See vol. iv., p. 273.) If he is the same man he was also one of the Churchwardens in that year. William Jackson, of Manchester, hosier, was one of the feoffees for the College Barn in 1657. (See vol. iv., p. 187, &c.) At the Court held on the 7th October, 1651, the Jury found that he had purchased a certain messuage in the Milnegate of Richard Hunt, clerk, for which he appeared and did his suite and service. (See vol. iv., p. 60.) His will, if he made any, is not now at Chester.

¹ Although the father's name is not given in the text, he is clearly to be identified with *Thomas Stevenson*, of Manchester, butcher, whose will, made on the 28th January, 1680-1, was proved at Chester on the 27th May, 1682. His name as Stevenson, or Stephenson, occurs occasionally in volumes iv. and v. (See Indexes.) At the Court held on the 19th April, 1664, it was reported to the Jury that he had purchased a messuage or burgage in the Hanging Ditch from William Rodley, Esq., for which he did his suit and service. (See vol. v., p. 36.) Again at the Court held on the 27th April, 1671, it was found by the Jury that he had purchased a messuage on the north side of the church from John Ratcliffe, gent., and John Gell, Esq., for which he was ordered to come to the Court to do his suit and service. (See vol. v., p. 136.) The former of these two messages, that in the Hanging Ditch, he sold in 1674 to Mr. Samuel Butler and Susanna, his wife, as reported at the Court held on the 14th October in that year. (See vol. v., p. 229.) In his will above referred to he mentions Jane, his wife, his daughters, Mary Hamson, Jane Stevenson, and Katherine Stevenson. To Robert Stevenson, his son, he gave the reversion of his "three flesh boards" in case his wife, Jane, should marry again. To Jane, his wife, he devised the land in Failsworth which he had purchased of Mr. Robert Turner, except that land now in the occupation of William Chetham, and he also devised to her the land he bought of John Taylor "lying in Lime" [? Lymm, in Cheshire], and his dwelling-house in Manchester "where I now dwell or M^r Allens house next to it" at her choice, and also "a garden at the Huntsbanke formerly in the possession of Edward Rostorne deceased" for her life, she keeping herself sole and unmarried. If she marry, then he devised the same to Thomas Stevenson, his son, he paying to Jane Stevenson, "my wife," £10 yearly. The testator also bequeathed to his daughter, Mary Hamson, £20, and to his two daughters, Jane and Katherine Stevenson, £150 apiece. To Isabel Shepard, his sister, £10. To Thomas Stevenson, his son, 6 acres of land called Moor Ground, lying at Wrigley Head, and his land [at Failsworth] then in the occupation of William Chetham, and 8 acres of land called Sidgreaves, "which I bought of James Schoales and all my lands in Manchester and Salford with the deeds concerning the same, he paying all my debts and legacies and also paying to Jane Stevenson and Katherine Stevenson my daughters £5 a piece yearly till they shall attain 21 years of age, towards their education, if their mother shall die or marry before they attain to that age." "If my said son Thomas Stevenson shall die and leave no issue male then I give to Robert Stevenson, my son, all my lands in Manchester, Salford, Failsworth, Lime, Wrigley head and elsewhere and to his heirs male, he paying to my said daughters Mary Hamson, Jane Stevenson and Katherine Stevenson £50 a piece." He made his brother-in-law, James Ashton, and Thomas Stevenson, his son, executors. In the inventory of his effects, taken 19th October, 1681, he is described as Thomas Stevenson, late of Failsworth, butcher, deceased, and amongst the items is an entry of "three bibles and one practice of piety" valued at 16s. It would appear from the entry in the text that Thomas Stevenson, his son and heir, had died before this date without issue, and that Robert Stevenson, his second son, had therefore succeeded to his father's lands in Manchester and elsewhere.

Allsoe wee the Jury afores^d vpon Complaint to vs made That John Ellor doeth Suffer a house of Office to continue and stand vpon a ditch belonging to Robert Hyde wee therefore vpon our view thereof doe Amerce the s^d John Ellor in ffive Shillings and doe Order him to remove the s^d house of Office before the first of December next sub pena ffourty Shillings.

¹ The death of Mr. William Deane has not previously been announced in these Records. His name does not appear to occur in vol. v., and only twice in vol. iv. At the Court held on the 28th April, 1652, it was found by the Jury that he had bought lands from Mr. Henry Pendleton. (See vol. iv., p. 74.) There is no will of any William Deane of about this time now to be found at Chester, but among the "Infra" wills there, there is the inventory of the goods, &c., of "William Deane *clerk*, late of Manchester deceased taken on the 1st October 1673," who is probably the William Deane named in the text. The total of his inventory was only £7 3s. 8d., and two of the items were "4 Coates of Armes" and "twoe Mapps." Administration of his effects was granted to Mr. Thomas Dickanson, of Salford, the principal creditor, in 1673.

The indenture is dated 6th March, 1683[-4], and was made between Nicholas Hawett, of Salford, gentleman, on the one part, and John Besswick, of Manchester, gentleman, on the other part. The former conveyed to the latter, his heirs and assigns for ever, in consideration of the sum of £222 3s., all that messuage or tenement with the appurtenances situate in Manchester, in a certain street called the Milnegate, abutting upon the said street on the east part and on the land of William, Earl of Derby, on the west part, and then in the occupation of Mrs. Frances ffranckland, widow. It seems probable that Hawett sold this property in consequence of a judgment for debt given against him at the Assizes held in August, 1683, at the Court of Common Pleas at Lancaster, at the suit of Besswick. As already explained in a note to vol. iv., p. 251, Mr. Hawett, then described as Nicholas Hawett, of Manchester, mercer, had married Mary, the widow of Mr. John Griffin, of Manchester, gentleman, the only daughter of Henry Keeley, of Manchester, chapman, and sole heir to her brother, Thomas Keeley, who died without issue before 1647. Mr. Hawett, in his will dated 29th June, 1688, bequeathed £30 to his daughter, Elizabeth Salmon, "if she come over into England and demand the same," and £10 to Nicholas Hawett, his grandson, "if he come over into England and demand the same." The residue of his goods and chattels, and all his houses, messuages, lands, &c., he left to William Hawett, his son, his heirs and assigns for ever, and made him sole executor.

² The name of Joseph Vigor (or Vigors, as sometimes written) occurs for the first time in these Records at the Court held 8th April, 1662. (See vol. iv., p. 316.) His name is more frequently met with in vol. v. (see Index), and in 1668 he appears to have been living near the Conduit. (See vol. v., p. 250.) This family held a very good position in Manchester in the 18th century. They were closely connected with Bristol at the end of the 17th and beginning of the 18th centuries.

¹ At the Court held on the 8th October, 1678, Mr. John Beck was found heir to his father, Mr. Thomas Beck, deceased. (See p. 65, where a long account of the latter will be found.) As quoted in the note on p. 65, this John Beck was a party to a deed dated 5th August, 1678, to levy a fine of all his messuages, lands, &c., in or near Manchester. These lands included the Nearer Ashley, the Midlest Ashley, and the Furthest Ashley, containing in all 5 acres of land. This John Beck had a brother, William, living in 1669, and it would seem probable from the fact that Mr. William Beck is now found selling these and other messuages and lands that he had inherited them on the death of his brother John without male issue.

² These fields have been mentioned before in these Records, or in the notes to them. Thus, at the Court held on the 16th April, 1601, Mr. Robert Langley was ordered "to laye open two places and sett two steeles [stiles] in the syde of Asheley fields in the accustomed places accordinge to auntyent order." (See vol. ij., p. 168.) Again, at the Court held on the 12th October, 1608, Mr. Laurence Langley, the son and successor of Mr. Robert Langley, who was then dead, was ordered to do the same thing. (See vol. ij., p. 239.) Ashley Lane is also very frequently mentioned in the earlier volumes of these Records. At the Court held on the 12th April, 1636, it was found by the Jury "that Thomas Becke hath purchased of Thomas Haworth ffinue Acars of Land called Ashley feilds & is to come into this Co^t to doe his suit & service for the same," which he duly performed. (See vol. iij., p. 240.) This Thomas Beck died in July, 1645, leaving a son and heir, also called Thomas Beck, whose death was announced at the Court held on the 8th October, 1678. (See p. 65.) As stated in the previous note (1) these Ashley Fields are there shown to have formed part of his estate.

³ The death of Mr. Joseph Higham was announced at the Court held 23rd April, 1683, (see p. 167), where a short account of him will be found. He left an only son, Joseph Higham, junr., whose death was announced at the Court held 15th April, 1684 (see p. 192), and an only daughter, Elizabeth. The latter, on the death of her brother without issue, became heir to her father, and, as stated in the text, married Mr. Robert Alexander.

¹ At the Court held on the 9th October, 1683, the name of EDWARD MOSLEY, Esquire, occurs for the first time as lord of the manor of Manchester. (See p. 171.) At the period when this volume commences, October, 1675, the Rt. Hon. Charles, Lord Gray, Baron of Rolleston, and the Lady Katherine, his wife (the widow of Sir Edward Mosley, Bart., who died in 1665), were the lord and lady of the manor of Manchester (see p. 1), but at the Court held on the 5th October, 1680, the name of Lord North occurs alone as lord of the manor of Manchester (see p. 105), and he was still so called at the Court held on the 23rd April, 1683. (See p. 160.) Sir Edward Mosley, Knt., as he afterwards became, was the second son of Oswald Mosley, of Ancoats, gent., who was buried at Manchester on 11th November, 1630. (See vol. iij, p. 197.) He is mentioned in the will of Sir Edward Mosley, Bart., who died in 1665, where he calls him "my cozen Edward Mosley Esq. Councillor at Law," and he subsequently devised all his manors, lands, &c., except his Leicestershire estates, after certain trusts were fulfilled, to Edward Mosley, "son of my said cozen Edward Mosley Esq." and his heirs male, with remainder in default of such issue to the said Edward Mosley, Esq., and his heirs male. (See a full abstract of this important will, vol. v., in the note to pp. 78-80.) Edward Mosley, the son, died unmarried, and was buried at Didsbury on the 10th April, 1677. Edward Mosley, Esq., who thus became lord of the manor of Manchester in 1683, was then about 65 years of age, having been baptized at the Collegiate Church of Manchester on the 6th December, 1618. He married Meriel, daughter of Richard Saltingstall, of Huntwich, co. York, who died on the 8th, and was buried at Didsbury on the 14th July, 1697. By her he had three sons, Edward, Nicholas, and Francis, who all died young, and an only daughter, Anne, who became heiress to her father, and who was married on the 31st March, 1685, to Sir John Bland, of Kippax, co. York, Bart. Sir Edward Mosley died on the 25th, and was buried at Didsbury on the 31st July, 1695.

He left £10 to be paid to the Churchwardens of Manchester, and the interest to be distributed yearly "among the most ancient and most needy poor of Manchester aforesaid," with a further proviso "that when it is considered convenient to build any Almshouse or houses the said £10 shall be paid towards the same building." He bequeathed 25s. to his mother, Anne Greene, to be paid her quarterly during her life. To his loving friend, Mrs. Elizabeth Bradshaw, of Manchester, widow, £10, and to his executors £5 each for their pains. The residue of his goods, &c., he bequeathed to his only son, Alexander Green, his executors to attend to his son's tuition and education until he came of age. He refers to a lease of a messuage in St. Mary's Gate, Manchester, held under Mr. Finch, clerk, and then in the possession of James Smith, distiller, and also to the messuage wherein he dwelt, purchased from Mr. William Beck (see p. 214), which he was altering and building. In case of his said son's death without issue, he left a further sum of £10 to the poor of Manchester; to Elizabeth, his youngest sister, £10, and £25 more each to his executors, and the rest of his real and personal estate he devised to his loving brother, Edmund Greene, and Anne, Mary, and Elizabeth, his sisters, equally amongst them. He appointed his loving friends, Edward Bootle, of Manchester, gent., and John Greené, of the same, apothecary, to be his executors.

¹ Edward Goodall, clerk, was at this time Vicar of Prescott, near Liverpool, and it is not very easy to understand the statement in the text, that "in right of his wife" he was possessed of several houses and lands in Manchester, formerly in the possession of "William Bell clerke deceased," of whom an account will be found in the following note. An indenture, dated 18th March, 1 James II. [1684-5], for the suffering of a common recovery, relates to the land mentioned in the text. This indenture was made between Edward Goodall, clerk, Vicar of Prescott, and Ann, his wife, daughter of Lawrence Shaw, Vicar of Cockerham, co. Lanc., of the first part; John Roberts, of Preston, and Daniel Lawton, of Prescott, gentlemen, of the second part; Richard Fleetwood, of Rossall, Esq., George Allanson, of the Inner Temple, gent., Robert Shawe, of Adlington, gent., and Richard Fleetwood, of Leyland, gent., of the third part. The property to be settled is described as messuages, shops, &c., in Manchester; land in Hanging Ditch, now used for laying manure on; messuages, &c., at Huyton, Ashton-under-Lyne, and Wheston. William Bell, of Manchester, in his will dated 1st March, 1633-4, devised property in Manchester to his two grand-children, Mary and Anne Bell, daughters of his son William Bell, clerk (see vol. iij. pp. 217-18 note). Of these Anne Bell married c. 1661, Mr. Samuel Somersall, of Mansfield, co. Nottingham (see vol. iv., p. 298), and to explain the statement in the text it must have happened that the other daughter, Mary, married Lawrence Shaw, Vicar of Cockerham, who must have had an only daughter and heiress, Ann, who married the above named Edward Goodall, Vicar of Prescott.

² William Bell, clerk, as already noted (see vol. iv., p. 298, note 2), was the only son and heir of Mr. William Bell, of Manchester and Ashton-under-Lyne, whose death was announced at the Court held on the 14th October 1634. (See vol. iij., pp. 217-18, where a long note about him will be found.) He married about the year 1629, but his wife's name is not at present known, and subsequently, c. 1660, he married for his second wife Anne, daughter of Robert Hyde, of Denton, Esq., and he had issue by both wives. Of those by the first wife, two, Anne and Mary, were living in 1634, and are mentioned in their grandfather's will; whilst in 1640, four children, William, Anne, Mary, and Esther, are named in their grandmother's will. (See vol. iij., pp. 217-18, note.) Mr. Bell, who was a Master of Arts, is stated by Calamy to have been ordained by Bishop Bridgeman, and to have been for some years one of the four King's Preachers for Lancashire. About the year 1642 he was appointed to the vicarage of Huyton, near Liverpool, which he held till 1662, when, on the 24th August in that year, he was forced to resign that living, because of his Non-conformity. He then left Huyton and retired to Sinderland, near Ashton-under-Lyne, where he had an estate. In the year 1672 he obtained a licence to preach, as a Non-conformist, at Huyton, and he returned there, where he remained till his death, in 1684. He died on the 10th March in that year, 1683-4, and was buried in Huyton Church on the 12th of that month, being then in the 80th year of his age. The following inscription, on a brass plate, is still preserved in the church:—

"Here Underneath Lyeth the Body of that Worthy Divine And Most Famous Preacher of Gods Word M^r WILLIAM BELL M^r of Arts Whose Pithy and Sententious Sermons Warmed the Hearts of All Good Christians that Heard Him And Whose Pious Life and Holy Conversation Was a Continual Sermon To Teach Others Imitation. HEE Dyed or Rather Began to Live a Life of Glory Upon Monday the 10th Day of March and was Here Solemnly Interred On Wednesday the 12th of March Anno Dom 1683 And In the 80th Year of His Age Having Been Pastor of This Church Above 20 Years,"

He is described by Calamy as "a great scholar and a good orator," "a learned and pious man," "noted for his neat and sententious preaching." This writer also adds

that "he left several children behind him, and among the rest two sons, who were conforming ministers." His will, in which he describes himself as William Bell, of Huyton, clerk, is dated 9th February, 1683[-4], and was proved at Chester on the 12th June, 1684. He refers to the capital message and tenement in Ashton-under-Lyne, commonly called by the name of Sinderland, of which he was seised, and of which he had made a settlement by a deed bearing date the 20th August, 1683, made between him of the one part, and John Heywood, of Taunton, in Ashton-under-Lyne, gent, John Brownsword, of Aughton, co. Lanc., clerk, and Tabitha Bell, of Huyton, aforesaid, spinster, on the other part. This message, &c., was settled upon him for life, and after his death to such uses as he should appoint in his last will. He now desired that it should be sold, and out of the purchase money to pay his funeral expenses and just debts, and then to pay to his eldest son, Peter Bell, £100, "and I give the said Peter Bell all my ministry notes, whether bound up or loose papers, and all my wearing apparel as gowns, cassocks cloaks and others, in full of his filial portion of my real and personal estate, after the many hundred pounds, which I have paid for him, being much more than would by right have belonged to him." To his son, Timothy Bell, £10; to his daughter, Lydia Bell, £10, for perfecting her education either at Manchester or Chester. To his three younger children, Tabitha Bell, Lydia Bell, and Samuel Bell, all his lands and tenements in the parish of Oldham, co. Lanc., and in Stockport, co. Chester, to hold to them their heirs and assigns for ever, equally amongst them, except those Stockport lands, "which I have already conveyed to my daughter, Elizabeth, wife of the said John Brownsword." To his said daughter, Elizabeth Brownsword, "the virginalls, that were her mothers and also my silver can, in full of her filial portion." To his daughter, Tabitha, all his silver spoons, to his daughter, Lydia, his gold ring, and to his son, Samuel, his watch. All the residue of his real and personal estate he bequeathed to his executrix in the following uses, viz., £200 to such uses as he had already declared to his daughters, Tabitha and Lydia, £3 to be added to the stock for the poor of Huyton, and the residue to be equally divided amongst his said three youngest children, Tabitha, Lydia, and Samuel, and he appointed the said Tabitha Bell his executrix. The total of the inventory of his effects, taken by "two indifferent neighbours," amounted to £87 18s. 8d. only, of which one clock was valued at £1, his silver plate £3, a silver watch £2, and "a Library of books" £30. The above will confirms the statement of his having been twice married, the three younger children, above referred to, probably being the children of his old age. Mr. Bell was the author of several little books, all now of great rarity. These are as follows:—

"Well Doing Well Done to," a sermon on Jeremiah xxij., 15. 1650. 4to.

"Incomparable Company-keeping or a Conversation on Earth in Heaven." 1657. Small 8vo.

"Enoch's Walk," a discourse on Gen. v., 24. 1658. Small 8vo.

"The Excellency, Necessity and Usefulness of Patience as also the Patience of Job and the End of the Lord, in two Treatises." 1674. Small 8vo.

The second of these has an address to the Reader, by Thomas Johnson, Rector of Halsall, dated 14th May, 1656, and the fourth has recommendatory addresses from Richard Baxter, dated 1st February, 1669-70, John Angier, of Denton, dated 17th August, 1668, and John Harrison, late Rector of Ashton-under-Lyne.

he was also returned as right heir to Margaret Nugent for one shop and two chambers, with the appurtenances, also in the "flesh shambles"; and he attended at the Court and did his suit and service for both these premises. (See vol. iij. pp. 323-4.) He was the only surviving son and heir of Richard Tipping, of Manchester, who succeeded to the estates of his grandfather, of the same name, in 1592, when he was under age. This Richard Tipping was married on the 17th April, 1614, to Alice Diggles, of Manchester, but was buried at Middlewich, in Cheshire, on the 5th December, 1621, leaving an only surviving son, George, and two daughters, who died young. George Tipping, who was baptised at Manchester on the 27th November, 1618, married Jane (who was buried at the Collegiate Church on the 12th July, 1677), by whom he had issue an only son, Samuel, baptised on the 23rd December, 1649, and two daughters, Mary and Elizabeth. He was buried at the Collegiate Church, Manchester, on the 13th March, 1684-5. His will, if he made any, is not now at Chester.

does not appear to have ever held the office of Boroughreeve. At the Court held on the 8th October, 1672, it was stated that Mr. Edward Gathorne had given to his son, John Gathorne, certain lands in the Marketstidlane (see vol. v., p. 190), and at the Court held on the 4th April, 1676, the death of a Mr. John Gathorne was announced, which I took to be the same person. (See p. 13.) However, at the Court held on the 11th April, 1678, it is stated that "m^r John Gathorne hath purchased three messuages of m^r Edward Gathorne Scituate and beinge in the market streete Lane" and he was ordered to do his suit and service, which he performed. (See p. 54.) This shows that there must have been two John Gathorne's who were contemporaneous, one of them being called "senior," in 1671 and in 1674. Very little appears to be known about this old Manchester family, and I have not been able at present to make any satisfactory pedigree of them. The will of the Edward Gathorne whose death is now announced, is dated the 15th Jan., 1685[-6], and was proved at Chester on the 16th February in that year. He describes himself as Edward Gathorne, of Manchester, gentleman, and bequeaths to Elizabeth Gathorne, "daughter to my brother Henry Gathorne of Hornesall in Westmoreland gentleman" £10, and to his other daughter [not named], 20 marks. To Samuel Gathorne, of Salford, 20 marks; to Edward Gathorne, brother to John Gathorne, of Manchester, 40s.; to his servant, Richard Gymney, 5 marks, and to Edward Heighfield, of Manchester, 40s. To his servant maiden, Mary Kenyon, 20 marks; to Mary Armstrong, his other maid servant, 5 marks; and to Bridget Sidgewick, wife to Roger Sidgewick, of Manchester, chapman, 5 marks. To "Roger Kenyon my wellbeloved and trustie servant and one of my executors hereafter herein named" £20. "I hereby devise all and singular my messuages, burgages, lands, &c., with their appurtenances in Manchester, Ratcliffe, and Rushford or elsewhere in the county of Lancaster, to my said servant Roger Kenyon of Manchester aforesaid, chapman, and my friend Samuel Dickanson, of Ardwick, near Manchester, chapman, in trust to sell or lease the same and with the money so raised to pay my just debts and legacies in case my personal estate shall not extend to do the same." He appoints the said Roger Kenyon and Samuel Dickanson his executors. The witnesses are John Gathorne, Gilbert Browne, and Thomas White.

¹ The name of Mr. Samuel Butler is met with occasionally in these Records, subsequent to the year 1658. (See Indexes to vols. iv. and v.). On the 26th April, 1660, he was appointed one of the two Constables, there not having been any Court held at Michaelmas, 1659. (See vol. iv., p. 252). At the Court held on the 14th October, 1674, it was found by the jury that Mr. Samuel Butler and Susanna, his wife, had purchased a messuage or burgage in the Hanging Ditch, and they appeared and did their suit and service for the same (see vol. v., p. 229). ¹ The name of Ralph Poole occurred very frequently in volume iv., but much more rarely in volume v. (see Indexes), but there is nothing to show his parentage. At the Court held on the 12th October, 1658, it was returned that Mr. Ralph Poole possessed certain messuages in the Old Mealgate, lately purchased from Mr. Richard Fox, of Manchester, deceased, or from his trustees, for which he appeared and did his suit and service. (See vol. iv., p. 240.) He was elected one of the two Constables on the 9th October, 1660, and served during the eventful year 1661, when the Coronation Day festivities took place in the town, and when the first Oath of Allegiance was taken by the inhabitants. He died in 1665, but his death has not been previously noticed, because his son and heir was under age. In his will, dated the 10th March, 1664[-5], and proved at Chester on the 29th April, 1665, he describes himself as Ralph Poole, of Manchester, linendrap^r. He refers to the several messuages, burgages, tenements, and hereditaments in Manchester, in a certain street or place there called the Old Mealgate, "which I lately purchased or which I had in marriage with Mary my wellbeloved wife," and which had been assigned or conveyed at his marriage to certain uses, and states that he herewith confirmed the deeds, &c., relating to the said premises. After his debts and funeral expenses were paid, he desired that the residue of his goods should be divided into three equal parts, one part whereof he gave to Mary, his wife, another third part to his three daughters, Mary, Elizabeth, and Ellen Poole, "or any other children which I shall have by my said loving wife, except my eldest son if I shall have any such son,"

The other third part he reserved to himself, and disposed of as follows: "To my brother M^r Thomas Poole and to my brothers-in-law M^r John Poole, M^r John Holbrooke and M^r Richard Holbrooke and their wives, 20^s a piece to buy gold rings." "To my eldest son (if I have any) £100 for his maintenance and the reason I give him no more is because he is to have the aforesaid messuages" &c. To his apprentice, Robert Oldham, 40s. He appointed his said wife, Mary, his executrix, and the said Thomas Poole, John Poole, John Holbrooke, and Richard Holbrooke, overseers. The inventory of his goods was taken on the 13th April, 1665, by Mr. Michael Buxton, Thomas Valentine, Thomas Elliot, John Maddocke, and Edward Kelsall, as follows: "In ready money in the house £185 . 2 . 11; in Cloth in the Shop £698 . 1 . 11; In Household goods &c. £169 . 4 . 6; In Debts good and doubtful £460 . 12 . 6; total £1513 . 1 . 10," a large sum at that time. With this inventory another one, taken on the 27th March, 1665, is also preserved. This was taken by the same persons, who are thus described:—M^r Michael Buxton, and M^r Thomas Valentine of Manchester, woollen-drappers, and M^r Thomas Elliot and M^r John Maddock, chapmen. The goods in the various rooms in the house are duly set out, and the total is made to amount to £1,512 2s. 3d. Mary, the wife of Mr. Ralph Poole, was the daughter of Edward Holbrooke, of Manchester, Esq. (by his wife, Mary, daughter of Mr. Richard Fox, of Manchester, merchant), and sister to Mr. John Holbrooke, of Manchester, and Mr. Richard Holbrooke, of Salford, clerk, the latter of whom married Elizabeth, younger daughter of the Rev. Richard Heyrick, Warden of the Collegiate Church. Ralph Poole, the son and heir, was clearly a posthumous son.

¹ A "poke" is a North country word for a bag or sack. It is used here for the first time in these Records. It is not given in the *Lancashire Glossary* as a Lancashire word, although clearly in use at this time.

It may be worth while here noting that the MS. Volume III., which commences with the Court held 10th October, 1648, originally possessed 625 pages, or more correctly 624 (the number 394 being accidentally omitted), according to the old pagination still remaining. As now bound up it contains only 600 pages, showing that 24 pages, or 12 leaves, have by some means or other been lost or destroyed prior to the re-binding of the volume. The various leaves which have been lost are as follows:—

Old Pagination.

- Pages 185-6. This appears to have been a blank leaf before the proceedings of the Court held 30th April, 1661.
- Pages 215-16. This may have been a blank leaf, or it may have contained some more of the Bonds copied at the end of the proceedings of the Court held on the 8th April, 1662. (See vol. iv., pp. 319-20.)
- Pages 311-12. Probably a blank page, as pp. 309-10 are blank.
- Pages 335-6. Probably a blank page, as the proceedings of the Court held 7th April, 1670, end on the middle of p. 334. (See vol. v., p. 115.)
- Pages 355-6. These pages contained the transcript of the deed of appointment of new trustees for Nugent's Charity, 1671, printed in vol. v., pp. 138-43.
- Pages 506-7-8-9. These pages probably contained the proceedings of the Court held at Easter, 1680, which are entirely missing. These would come after those for Michaelmas, 1679, which now finish on p. 505, and before those for Michaelmas, 1680, which commence on p. 510. (See this volume, p. 104.)
- Pages 544-5. These pages contained the commencement of the proceedings of the Court held — October, 1682, giving the names of the Boroughreeve, Constables, and many of the other officers. (See this volume, p. 150.)
- Pages 594-5-6-7. These pages contained the commencement of the proceedings of the Court held — October, 1685, giving the names of the Boroughreeve, Constables, and all the other officers except nine. (See p. 225.)
- Pages 604-5-6-7. These pages contained the commencement of the proceedings of the Court held at Easter, 1686. (See p. 236.)

APPOINTMENT OF NEW TRUSTEES FOR CLARKE'S CHARITY,
12TH JULY, 1692, AND 15TH OCTOBER, 1711.

IN previous volumes all the various deeds relating to Clarke's Charity have already been printed in full. The original deed of gift, dated 13th December, 1636, will be found in vol. iij., pp. 301-14, the first appointment of new trustees, on the 16th December, 1657, in vol. iv., pp. 218-26, and another similar appointment, on the 7th May, 1672, in vol. v., pp. 174-81. As the volume of *Court Leet Records*, between the years 1687 and 1731, is now unfortunately lost, it seemed desirable to print the two deeds of appointment of new trustees, dated the 12th July, 1692, and the 15th October, 1711, from the original documents, now in the custody of Sir Joseph Heron, as Clerk to the Trustees, and preserved in the Town Hall. By doing this, if any later deeds belonging to this Charity are copied in full in any of the later volumes of the *Court Leet Records*, the sequence of the series will not be broken. The trustees who were appointed in 1692 and 1711 were selected from the most prominent men in Manchester at those times. These two deeds are as follows:—

IN the previous volumes a list of the words, which may be classified under the above heading, has been given, and as several such are contained in this volume, it seems desirable to print the following list here. The figure opposite each word gives the page on which it occurs, and in the case of most of the rarer words an explanation of their meaning will be found in the notes.

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¹ Thomas Cogan, in his *Haven of Health*, 1596, p. 26, says:—"Turkey wheate, French wheate and such like strange graine . . . they be not usual in our country of England. Yet of French wheate I can say thus much by experience, that in some partes of Lankashire and Chesshire they vse to make bread thereof for their household, being mingled together with barley, but for the Winter time onely. For when the heate of the yeare encreaseth it wareth rancke of sauour. Also, therewith they fatte their swine, for which purpose it is greatly commended, and in my iudgement it is more fit for swine than men."

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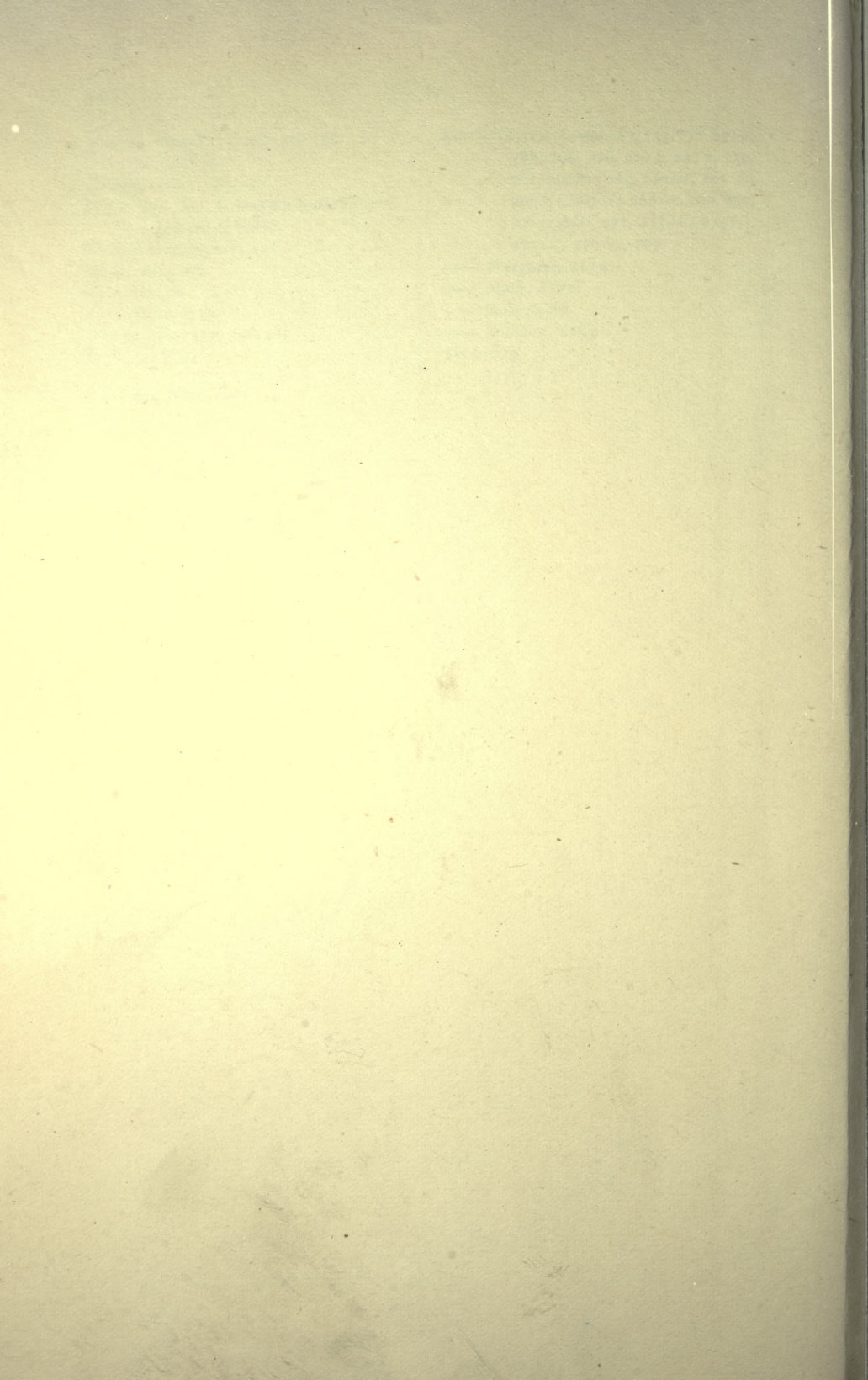
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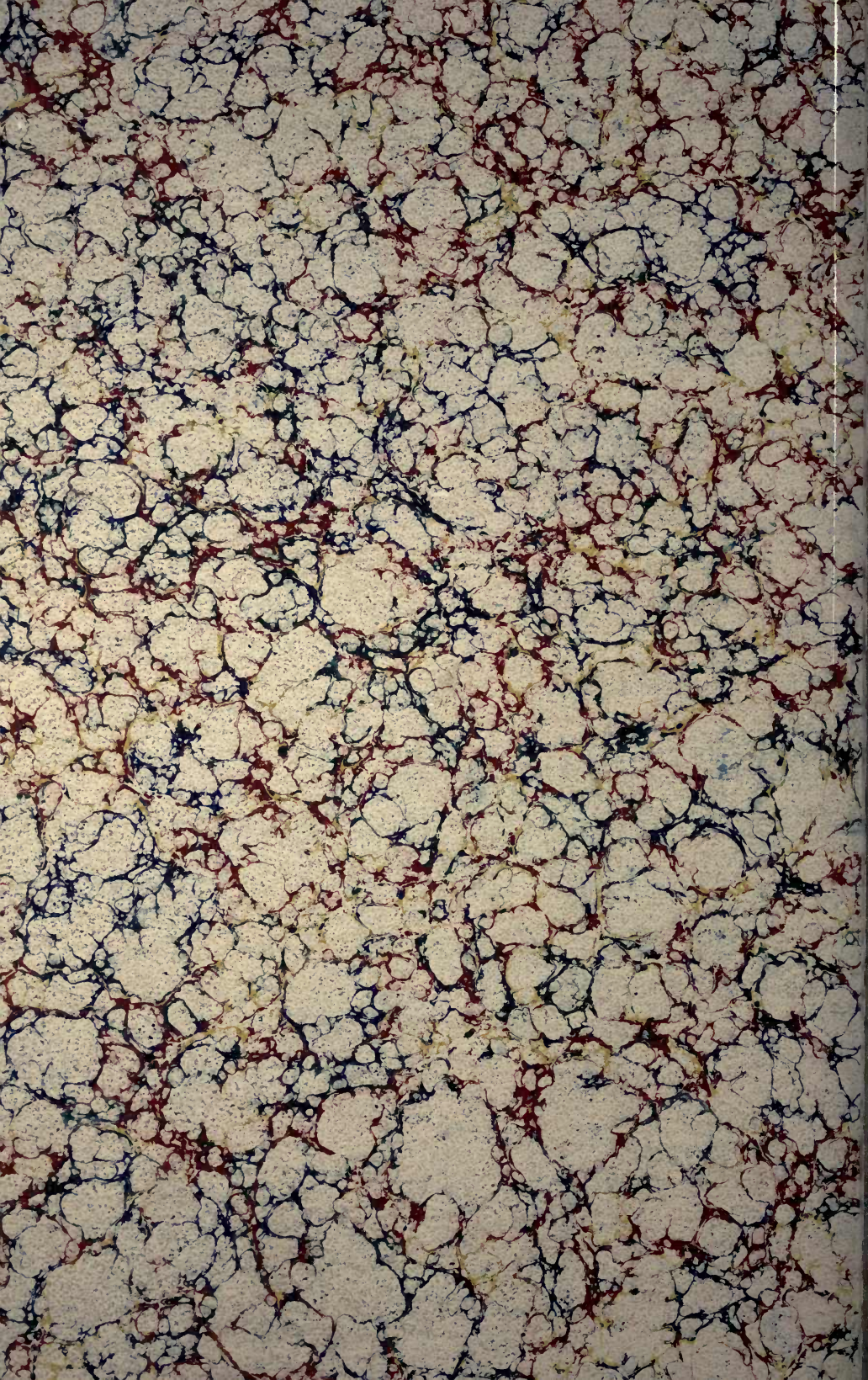
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
