The said castle, manors and lands are held of the king in chief, service unknown.

Richard de Chelmesho, aged 50 years, agrees, adding that he was at Lyes with Sir Philip de Virli when Petronilla, mother of the said Margaret, was

purified from her.

Richard le Duk, aged 50 years, agrees, adding that he was the king's bailiff of the hundred of Chelmesford, in which the aforesaid manor of Lyes is situated, and by the dates of his extracts he has clear knowledge (noticiam) of her age.

William de Pervile, aged 40 years, agrees, adding that, in the year when the said Margaret was born, William de Morton married Helen, his sister, and by the date of the agreement made between them, the [date of the] birth

of the said Margaret is manifest to him.

Peter de Barutun, aged 50 years, agrees, adding that, at the time when the said Margaret was born, he acquired to himself and his heirs nine acres of land from William Jordon, and by the date of the enfeoffment he has clear knowledge of the age of the said Margaret.

The sheriff of Suffolk also returned that he had warned Richard de Wyngefeld, guardian of the lands and tenements of the said Margaret, of the

John de Vernay, aged 46 years, says the same, and knows it because in

the same year he took his journey for Santiago.

Richard son of Alexander, aged 43 years, says the same, and knows it because on the day of his (the said Richard's) birth he brought the news to Margaret de la Rokaylle his aunt, and had for it a silk purse with half a mark.

William Vincent, aged 63 years, says the same, and knows it because in

the same year his father died.

Capgrave's Chronicle extends from the Creation of the World to the year 1417. Being written in English, it is of value as a record of the language epoken in Norfolk.

This Chronicle traces the history of the monastery from its foundation by King Ina of Wessex, to the reign of Richard I. The author incorporates into his history various charters of the Saxon kings, as illustrating not only the history of the locality but that of the kingdom.

The first is a poem in French, probably written in 1245. The second is an anonymous poem, written between 1440 and 1450, which is mainly valuable as a specimen of the Latin poetry of the time. The third, also by an anonymous author, was apparently written between 1066 and 1074.

The first part relates only to the history of the Empire from the election of Henry I. the Fowler, to the end of the reign of the Emperor Henry VI. The second part is devoted to English history, from the accession of Henry I. in 1100, to 1446, which was the twenty-fourth year of the reign of Henry VI. The third part contains the lives of illustrious meu who have borne the name of Henry in various parts of the world.

The contents of this volume are—(1) a life of Henry VII., by his poet Laureate and historiographer, Bernard André, of Toulouse, with some compositions in verse, of which he is supposed to have been the author; (2) the journals of Roger Machado during certain embassies to Spain and Brittany, the first of which had reference to the marriage of the King'e son, Arthur, with Catharine of Arragon; (3) two curious reports by envoys sent to Spain in 1505 touching the succession to the Crown of Castile, and a project of marriaga between Henry VII. and the Queen of Naples; and (4) as eccount of Philip of Castile's reception in England in 1506. Other documents of interest are given in an appendix.

Domesday Survey is in two parts or volumes. The first, in folio, contains the counties of Bedford, Berks, Bucks, Cambridge, Chester and Lancsster, Cornwall, Derhy, Devon, Dorset, Gloucester, Hants, Hereford, Herts, Huntingdon, Kent, Leicester and Rutland, Lincoln, Middlesex, Northampton, Nottingham, Oxford, Salop, Somerset, Stafford, Surrey, Sussex, Warwick, Wilts, Worcester, and York. The second volume, in quarto, contains the counties of Essex, Norfolk, and Suffolk.

Domesday Book was printed verbatim at literatim during the last century, in consequence of an address of the House of Lords to King George III. in 1767. It was not, however, commenced until 1773, and was completed early in 1783. In 1860, Her Majesty's Government, with the concurrence of the Master of the Rolls, determined to apply the art of photozincography in the production of a fac-simile of Domesday Book.

This work forms a comprehensive Palæographic Series for Ireland. It furnishes characteristic specimens of the documents which have come down from each of the classes which, in past ages, formed principal elements in the population of Ireland, or exercised an influence in her affairs. With these reproductions are combined fac-similes of writings connected with eminent personages or transactions of importance in the annals of the country to the early part of the eighteenth century.

The specimens have been reproduced as nearly as possible in accordance with the originals, in dimensions, colouring, and general appearance.
