


PREFACE.

The readers of this book may consider that a few words of explanation of the circumstances under which the following pages came into existence will not be out of place.

When on a visit more than twenty years ago to Dorchester, the old home of my ancestors, I had the good fortune to meet the Rev. Henry Everett, then Rector of Holy Trinity, and through his kind introduction became acquainted with Mr. Henry Joseph Moule, with whom I subsequently entered into frequent correspondence concerning the Dorchester Municipal Records, and through whom I learned that the Corporation had deemed it wise to cause transcripts to be made of their valuable Charters and other documents, together with copious extracts from the Minute Books, and that Canon Mayo had undertaken the work on their behalf.

Stowed away in wooden boxes in the cellars of the Town Hall were documents showing those signs of decay which result from long retention in a too moist atmosphere—a mass of parchments, papers, etc., precious records of great interest—the Charters, Minute Books and other writings of the Corporation.

On the examination and transcription of these documents Canon Mayo expended much care and time, bringing his arduous task to completion in 1900.

The sight of the formidable pile of transcripts thus accumulated, a privilege afforded me through the courtesy of the Town Clerk, Mr. Arthur G. Symonds, led forcibly to the reflection that their loss by fire would be calamitous, while the destruction of the originals would mean the irrevocable obliteration of the early history of the Borough.

After waiting more than six years, during which time no steps were taken by the Town Authorites in the direction of printing, my anxiety that the work already done should not be fruitless induced me to agitate afresh.

Frequent letters passed between the Town Clerk, Mr. Moule and myself, and I urged that the Corporation should print and publish these records, but without effect.

On the death of Mr. Moule in 1904 I realised that I had lost a keen and interested supporter, but, unwilling to give in, I obtained the co-operation of Canon Mayo in an application to the Corporation for permission to bring out the work by private subscription, an appeal to which the Corporation, though unable to contribute financial aid, at length acceded in July, 1906, Canon Mayo undertaking to act as Editor.

A prospectus was then issued, and although circulated with a covering letter among some fifteen hundred persons, the response represented a promise of forty subscribers—a result eminently disappointing and discouraging.

By accident about this time I chanced on an account of Beethoven's endeavour to obtain the publication of his Mass in D Major; the record of his uphill experiences only inspired me to further effort, and I devoted many hours daily for several months to a canvas of friends and acquaintances, antiquarian societies and literary institutions in the United Kingdom, succeeding in the end in augmenting my subscribers by about sixty.

The expense of producing the Municipal Records of Dorchester in a form worthy of the traditions of this ancient and honourable Town far exceeds, it is scarcely necessary to say, the amount at present subscribed, and any deficiency will fall on myself and Canon Mayo.

It is, however, a great pleasure to us both to see the work at last brought to a successful issue, and we indulge in the hope that the result will commend itself to the kindly judgment of the reader, who will find therein, not indeed a complete history of the County Town, which it is not the aim of this volume to supply, but the materials with the help of which such a history may be composed.

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* In this Catalogue the classification and numeration adopted by Mr. Moule has been maintained, though it has not been precisely followed in the arrangement of the present work. References will be found to nearly every item, with the exception of the Counterparts of Leases. Of some of these, of which Mr. Moule had made special mention, the Catalogue itself gives sufficient information, but a large number of such documents Mr. Moule has grouped together under B. 15, B. 35a, and B. 65—68, as being of late date and of comparatively little interest. Considerations of space have prevented these being treated in detail. A few of the topographical allusions which they contain are noted in the Introduction.

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THE INTRODUCTION.

The steps which have led to the production of this book have already been adequately described by Mr. A. W. Gould, who has devoted much time and attention to securing the present result, and they need not now be further dealt with. Some words of introduction are, however, required for the information of the reader.

Dorchester, the shire town of the County of Dorset, besides the associations it cherishes with the Roman occupation of Britain, and even with a past far more remote, is fortunate in the possession of a series of Charters, dating from the reign of Edward I., of a register of Conveyances and Devises of lands and burgages within its boundaries called "Domesday," beginning in 1395, and of a large number of Account and Minute Books, from which many interesting particulars may be gathered, bearing upon the life of the townsmen in their social, religious and trading relations.* These are enumerated in the preceding Calendar or Catalogue, based upon the hand-list drawn up in 1886 by the late Mr. H. J. Moule, and are fully described in the body of this book. Of their value the reader of this work will be able to form an

* Considerations of space and of the limited pecuniary support received have rendered it impossible to print the Royal Charters of the Borough, and the Deeds enrolled in the "Domesday," both in the original Latin and in an English translation. The course here adopted has been to print the former class of documents in their original form, with an abstract of their contents in English,—and to present the latter, in which the same formula constantly recurs, in an English abstract only, which, however, comprises all the local and personal names the Deeds contain, and the boundaries as therein described. To have inserted both originals and translations would have doubled the bulk of the book, without adding any material of value. The Bye-laws in the "Domesday" have, however, been given in full, as well as various other documents occurring elsewhere. It is obvious that to print the Minute Books in their entirety would have been impracticable, but copious extracts will be found in the following pages, grouped under convenient headings.

accurate judgment, and it will be sufficient here to sketch briefly the corporate development of the Town, and then to set forth, in some detail, the topography of Dorchester as therein illustrated.

THE CORPORATE DEVELOPMENT OF DORCHESTER.

Dorchester was a Royal Borough, and in the time of Edward the Confessor contained 172 houses, with two moneyers, as compared with the 257 houses and three moneyers of Shaftesbury. At the Domesday Survey only 88 houses remained, owing either to dissentions between the English and Norman Burgesses, the malfeasance of the Sheriff, Hugh Fitz Grip, or other unknown cause. The town had gelded for 10 hides, and the resulting payment had been commuted at one mark for the use of the "Huscarls," and in addition it discharged the burden of firma unius noctis.

By degrees Dorchester must have recovered its prosperity, and between 1221 and 1337 the farm of the vill varied between £16 and £20, paid by the men of the Borough or some other grantee (p. 5), and the grant by Edward I. to the men of Dorset (A.D. 1305) of permission to erect a prison at Dorchester, in preference to any other town in the County, is itself a recognition of the leading position it then held. It is not, however, possible to determine the precise moment when municipal life began. Two Bailiffs, however (elected, probably from their first appearance, at the Court Leet of the Town), are named as grantees, together with the Burgesses, of the custody of the Borough in 1324, for which a rent of £20 was paid. This grant was made perpetual by Edward III. in 1337, after it had been ascertained by the Sheriff of Dorset that it would not be to the King's damage to grant the Borough to the townsmen at the rent aforesaid. At this time, besides the rents of assize, the assize of bread and beer, and perquisites of Courts, the grant comprised Fairs at the festivals of Holy Trinity, the Nativity of St. John Baptist, and St. James, Markets on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays, and the right of Weighing twelve miles about the Borough (p. 5). In this manner the town obtained the liberty of controlling its internal discipline, subject to the general law, in return for an annual money payment to the Crown. See the Bye-laws printed at page 104.

Matters thus continued, with confirmations in successive

reigns, until 1484, when Richard III. not only confirmed the privileges which the Burgesses already possessed in general terms, but added express mention of relief from various tolls and other payments, freedom from the jurisdiction of Admiral, Escheator, Sheriff, Coroner or Bailiff, with power to appoint their own Clerk of the Market, Coroner and Constables, and providing that all personal actions, not exceeding the sum of 40s., should be impleaded in the Court of the Steward of the Borough (p. 27).

Henry VIII. in 1535 granted that Gaol Deliveries within the County should henceforth be held in Dorchester only, as previously accustomed. This was confirmed by Elizabeth in 1559, who at the same time conferred the right of holding a three days' Fair at Candlemas (p. 35).

With the reign of James I. came the first formal Charter of Incorporation, dated 26th June, 1610, which confirmed the office of the Bailiffs, created a Common Council of fifteen Capital Burgesses, a Court of Record and Recorder, and gave the position of Justice of Peace to the Recorder, the Bailiffs for the time being and their immediate predecessors in office (p. 41). These privileges were amplified by Charles I. in 1629 by the grant of the various particulars enumerated at p. 56, and from henceforth the governing body consisted of a Mayor, two Bailiffs, six Aldermen and six other Burgesses, in all fifteen in number, ranking as Capital Burgesses. Thus the office of Mayor, which appears at Exeter so early as 1206, when it superseded the Portreeve or Bailiff, is not found at Dorchester until upwards of 400 years later. At both the Bailiffs were still maintained as subordinate to the Mayor. and their office formed part of the style or title of the Corporation. By Charles's Charter the inhabitants of Dorchester were also made a Body Corporate by the name of the Governor, Assistants and Freemen of the Borough of Dorchester. This latter provision, by strengthening the restrictive action of the Town as a close and exclusive trading community, must have had considerable effect in arresting its growth and development. But long before the passing of the Municipal Corporations Act it had outgrown these trammels, which then ceased to exist.

The history of Dorchester, like that of other corporate towns, thus illustrates the rise of municipal activity, independent of the Crown or other manorial lord, the gradual concentration of power in the hands of a governing oligarchy, and at the same time the growth of an exclusive trading spirit within the general body of the freemen or commonalty as against outsiders, "foreigners" as they were termed, and the final dissolution of the old system in the presence of the reforming spirit of the nineteenth century.*

THE TOPOGRAPHY OF OLD DORCHESTER.

The deeds enrolled in the Dorchester Domesday disclose many particulars bearing upon the topography of the Town at the period to which they refer. These are here collected, references being given to the documents quoted by the special numeration assigned to them. To these have been also added some notes drawn from documents of a later date. Further references may be obtained by consulting the Index.

The Castle.

An allusion to the ancient Castle of Dorchester occurs in the phrase which appears in Charters 77 and 133 (A.D. 1401 and 1403), where a burgage is said to be situated *juxta castrum fratrum minorum*, into whose hands it had passed.

The name may be traced to much later dates, e.g., in a lease of 20th October, 30 Elizabeth, to Elioner Avyne, C. 14. In another lease of 19th November, 1708, a messuage on north side of Pease Lane or Sheep Lane in St. Peter's parish, is bounded on the north by land of the Duke of Newcastle, called the Castle, B. 65. The close called "the Castle" is frequently mentioned as a boundary, e.g., 11th July, 1755, B. 15, and 17th January, 1796. B. 65.

On 31st August, 1775, it is "ordered that a wall of stone and brick be immediately built between the Castle and the garden belonging to the house late in the occupation of John Fone, now in hand." C. 27.

* The Town of Dorchester, in its corporate capacity, has no Coat of Arms, but is possessed of Seals bearing a castle triple-towered, charged in the base with the Royal Arms. See p. 38. Some controversy has arisen regarding the precise form the Royal Arms should take on the Town Seal, and as Dorchester was held of the King by the annual payment of a fee farm rent, it seems reasonable that the arms, placed, in this position, should vary with those of the reigning Sovereign. Had Dorchester been possessed of a Coat of its own, the Arms borne by the Town, whatever they were, would not be subject to variation.

The Town Walls.

William Bradeston, in the first Charter enrolled in the Domesday, conveys a burgage on the east side of South Street, bounded on its southern extremity by the *muros communitatis ville* (1).

1668, July 2. "This day Mr. Major, Mr. Arthur Gould and Mr. Joseph Seward, two other of the Capitall Burgesses of this Borough going vp to the west end of the towne about the disposall of the watch howse there, built in the tyme of the late siknes, were informed by John Gilbert of a parcell of the old towne wall that was then beateing downe by Mr. John Churchill in the West Walles, he declareing that it was pitty that parte of soe ancient a monument of the towne should be demolished; wherevppon they went and found one Brine and Mathew Traske beateing downe parte of the wall, which they said they did by the appoyntment of Mr. Churchill, and therevppon they forbidd them to proceed therein. And afterwards Mr. Churchill met Mr. Major and the two other Burgesses and said that the wall was his, and not the townes, and that in case he could not get men out of the towne to pull downe the wall, he would gett some out of Forthington. Mr. Major this afternoone desired the Company and some other of the neighborhood to view the place, and the wall doth conteyne about thirty-five foote and halfe and three inches in length, and the breadth of the wall is about six foot without the dropping of the howseing adjoyning to the wall, there being present at the viewing thereof of the Capitall Burgesses, William Pitt, Major, Arthur Gould, Hugh Baker, Robert Napper, Joseph Seward, Gilbert Whiffen. C. 15.

The West Walls.

Peter Blount grants to William Ayssh two acres of arable land in Dorchester, *jacentes in les West Walles*, which were lately William Hamond's (63).

This parcel of land is again mentioned in the Will of William Ayssh, as jacentes in West Wall' de Dorchestre (262).

John Morton, clerk, John Jurdan of Wolveton, and Robert Mose convey two acres of arable land, prout jacent in les West Wall' de Dorchestre (367).

Juxta campum de West Wallys describes the position of "A Dayne," situate on the west side of South Street. There were gardens of Robert Childecombe and the Abbot of Middleton adjoining (489).

The muri occidentales burgi are named as the western boundary of certain messuages, and seven acres of land lying within the west walls of the Borough are conveyed by 662.

Robert Williams, Esq., grants a burgage in the parish of Holy Trinity on the south side of High West Street, bounded on the south by the West Walls of the Borough (666).

Roger Abyndon, alias Knyghte, conveys two burgages, also in the parish of Holy Trinity, and on the south side of High West Street, the West Walls forming the southern boundary (673).

In the Byelaws of the Town (A.D. 1414) there is a restriction laid upon the use of the East and West Wallys from the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary to the feast of her Nativity, during which time the burgesses or residents are not to place stock in separali de les Est Wallys et West Wallys ut in communi. In this byelaw, as well as in most of the preceding references, "West Walls" serves as the name of a portion of land.

The East Walls.

The same remark applies to the East Walls.

The executors of John Syward, sen., convey the curtilage of a burgage on the east side of South Street, which extends towards the north as far as Durnelane, and towards the south usque terram arabilem de les Estwalles (126). The same curtilage is conveyed in 324 and 344.

John Estafeld and Joan his wife grant their curtilage, lying on the east side of South Street, versus campum de Estewall' inter gardinum Henrici Prest ex parte australi et viam aque Communitatis ex parte boriali et gardinum Rogeri Cowke et gardinum Alicie Greynlyf ex parte occidentali, et terram Communitatis ex parte orientali (210).

John Wroxale grants four acres of arable land in one piece of land, in la Est Walles infra libertatem ville predicte (227).

"Whereas wee, the Burgesses of the Burroughe towne of Dorchester in the Countye of Dorset, beinge indebted vnto Mathew Chubb of Dorchester aforesaide in the somme of one hundred and fiftye poundes for the debt of the saide towne and for the paymente thereof, haue made a lease by our writinge bearinge date the tenth daye of October, in the eighte and thirteth yeare of the raigne of our soveraigne ladye Elizabeth, vnto John Watts and William Golsey, whoe have vndertaken and geuen securitye for the

paymente of the saide somme and our bonde deliuered vpp cancelled, of all tharrable lande commonlye called the towne lande within the west and east walles in Dorchester aforesaide, and all the east greene walles on the west parte of the gallowes there, for terme of threescore yeares from the feaste of St. Michaell th'archaungell last past, with free power and authoritye to inclose, deuide, take in, wall, seuer or hedge the same, as to them or theire assignes shoulde bee thought good; and whereas the saide John Watts and William Golsey, for the raisinge, makinge vpp and better paymente of the saide some of one hundred and fiftye poundes, haue parcelled out the same grounds vnto seuerall persons, namelye to Roberte Colson, John Yeat, Richarde Barker, John Goulde and to William Adin, and haue reserved some parte thereof to themselves, as by the seuerall grauntes thereof bearinge date with theise presents graunted in the name of the Burgesses, vnder theire common seale, appeareth, which seuerall persons, and the saide John Watts and William Golsey and others, namelye the parson of the holye Trenitye in Dorchester aforesaide the saide William Adin and James Goulde of Dorchester aforesaide, beinge freeholders and havinge lande within the same walles, doe purpose seuerallie to deuide, inclose, walle, hedge, ditche and seuer theire seuerall grounds to each of them belonginge; WEE THE SAIDE Burgesses and the freeholders aboue named, for the better confirmacion thereof to avoide future quarrels, braules, ambiguityes or questions that hereafter shall or maye arrise, bee stirred or moued touchinge the saide inclosures, takinge in, deuidinge or seuerannee of the saide groundes or anie parte thereof by any Burgesse or freeholder within this towne att any tyme hereafter, doe by this our presente writinge make yt knowen to all posteritye hereafter, that wee the saide Burgesses for us and our successors foreuer, and the saide freeholders for them and theire heires and successors foreuer, haue geuen and graunted and by this our presente writinge doe geue and graunte our and euerye our full, whole and absolute consente, assente, powers, authorityes, agreements and good likings, That the saide arrable groundes and greene walles aforesaide and euerye parte thereof bee enclosed, taken in, seuered, deuided, walled, hedged, ditched and planted by the saide freeholders, the saide John Watts, William Golsey, Roberte Colson, John Yeat, Richard Barker and John Goulde, and by euerye or anie of them and by thexecutors, administrators or assignes of them or anie of them, when they or anie of them shall thinke good and the same soe deuided, seuered or taken in to remayne and contynew foreuer without the laufull lett, troble, vexacion or ympedimente of the saide Burgesses or theire successors, or of the saide freeholders theire heires or successors or anie of them, or of anie other person or persons laufullye clayminge or pretendinge anie laufull estate, righte, title, or interest from, by or vnder them or anie of them, anie lawe, order, vsage, prescripcion or custom to the contrarye notwithstandinge. WITNES whereof aswell the saide Burgesses have sette [to] theise presents theire common seale, as the saide freeholders theire hands and seales, the thirteth daye of November in the nyne and thirteth yeare of the raigne of our soueraigne ladye Elizabeth, the Queenes Ma'tie that now ys, 1596."

No signatures. The seal is gone.

"Md. that I the within named Mathew Chubbe, the first day of December in the yeer within writen, doe acknowledg my selfe to bee fully paid of the whole some of CLi. within mencioned. Per me, Mathew Chubbe."

Endorsed, "For divyding the Walls." B. 10.

North Gate.

This gate is rarely mentioned independently, but it frequently occurs in the phrase "the lane which leads towards the North Gate" (45), or vicus qui ducit versus le Northgate (276).

William Ayssh bequeaths a close in North Street next the North Gate, unum clausum in vico boriali juxta portam borialem (262).

John Almer and Alice his wife convey to William Fyssher of Pudelton their burgage, quod situm est ad portam borialem ejusdem ville ex parte orientali vici ibidem (483).

South Gate.

Thomas Rycheman, alias Belhous, conveys to his son and daughter-in-law a burgage with curtilage at the South Gate in South Street, ad portam australem in vico australi ejusdem Burgi ex parte occidentali ejusdem vici inter metas d'ni de Fordyngton ex parte australi et burgagium Johannis Bomyl de Dorchestre ex parte boriali (93),

East Gate.

Alice Wyther, widow, grants to William Assh and Alienor, his wife, her tenement in the Borough of Dorchester, juxta portam orientalem (49).

In 207, the High Street which leads to the East Gate, alta strata que ducit ad portam orientalem, is mentioned as a boundary. William Ayssh bequeaths a shop at East Gate, quedam shoppa ad portam orientalem (262). It also forms part of a personal appellation. William Ayssh grants a tenement on the west of a lane leading from East Street towards la Durnegate, between the tenement of Robert Sturey on the south, and tenementum Johannis Jurdan atteystegate on the north (187).

John Jurdan, who releases all right in a burgage in Dorchester to Joan Grygori, is termed "atteysteyate" in 221.

West Gate.

William Walyssh bequeaths to his wife a tenement situate in occidentali vico prope portam ex parte boriali ejusdem vici (205).

Reginald Jacob bequeaths his tenement with dove-house annexed, situatum ad portam occidentalem (383).

Durnegate.

This name is of very frequent occurrence in the phrase, "the lane which leads towards la Durnegate."*

It is found mentioned independently in the grant of a burgage by Richard and Ema Burgeis, situatum juxta la Durnegate (143), and in a further grant of the same by Richard Bartlet, clerk (234). This burgage was bounded by that of the Master of St. John on the west, and that of Robert Burlok on the east.

By the Minute made on the 7th October, 1642, it appears that the Town then possessed three main gates, at the East, West and South, and six back gates, viz., two South Gates, one East and one West Gate, the Gallows Hill Gate, and the gate at Glippath. See p. 681.

Southwerk.

A solitary mention of this locality is made in the Will of John Syward, sen., who bequeathed to Richard Northbury an annual rent of five marks which the testator was accustomed to receive from a tenement in Southwerk (41).

West Ward.

Nicholas Martyn of Athelhampston, Esq., conveys seven acres of meadow lying together in the West Warde, "in le Weaste Warde," next the great bridge called the new bridge, and on the north side of the stream (662).

South Street.

The principal streets of the Town occur very frequently in the Charters in Domesday. South Street is mentioned under the name of Vicus australis (1), Vicus regius australis (8), Altus vicus australis (119), Altus vicus australis regius (168), and la South strete (55, 121, 162).

West Street.

This street is called Vicus occidentalis (3), Vicus regius occidentalis (2), Altus vicus occidentalis (142), Altus vicus occidentalis regius (45), and Westrete or la Westret (88, 107, 149, 327).

* The meaning of Durnegate is frequently explained as Watergate, but it is probably derived from dern, "dark, secret, private"; see New English Dict. There was a gate so named in Northampton.

It is sometimes called High Street without any other addition, as in 400, when a burgage is described as situate in occidentali vico vocato Heyestret.

West Street must be intended in the conveyance of a tenement in parte australi alti vici ex opposito ecclesie Sancte Trinitatis (22), and in the Charter of Peter Blount, wherein a tenement is described as being on the south side of the High Street, opposite "la Nywehyn" (37, cf. 57), as the New Inn was situated near Holy Trinity Church.

East Street.

This street also occurs under the name of Vicus orientalis (5), Vicus orientalis regius (56), Altus vicus orientalis (110), Altus vicus regius orientalis (9, 24), Altus vicus vocatus Est street (471), Este Highe Street (650), and Highe Easte streat (659).

In the Will of John Champion the Via Regia there mentioned stands for this street (171), and similarly in 207 the alta strata which leads to the East Gate, and in 365 the altus vicus regius, which in 368 is termed altus vicus regius orientalis.

North Street.

There are several streets mentioned in the Domesday which are called North Street, or North Lane, with or without an addition for the sake of distinction. It is a matter of some difficulty to discriminate them.

Agnes Hamondes, in her will, bequeaths two tenements on the west side of North Street, vicus borialis, between the tenement of the Rector of St. Peter's Church and the tenement of Edward Mason (5).

John Fyuyan and John Duddill convey the moiety of a tenement on the west side of North Street, between the tenement of the Prior of St. John on the south, and that of Walter Peytenyn on the north (13). This tenement is again conveyed in 283, wherein the situation is similarly described.

Nicholas Latymer conveys a messuage with curtilage in "Northstrete," lying between the tenements of Magot Diew and the Prior of St. John of Dorchester (84).

William Compton grants his burgage on the east side of North Street, juxta bondas de Fordyngton (292).

Thomas Trenchard of Wolueton, Esq., sells his messuage on the east side of "High Northe Strete," between burgages belonging to John Churchyll and John Corbyn (639).

One other charter is important as settling the position of North Street by placing it at the west end of Puselane. William Portland, alias Hykkes, grants a tenement in North Street, in parte orientali ejusdem vici ad finem occidentalem venelle vocate Puselane (416). It thus appears to be identical with the following.

North Street which leads towards Glydepath, or North Street which leads towards la Northgate.

That these descriptions indicate the same street is shown by the will of John Merchant (150) who bequeaths to Cristina Childes a place in vico boriali ejusdem ville qui ducit versus la Northgate, when compared with the Charter by which Cristina Childs grants the same property a few months later to John and Agnes Dun, then describing it as in vico boriali qui ducit versus Glydepatth (153).

This street is also mentioned in a conveyance by John Barbour, alias Nicolas, and Beatrix, his wife, of a tenement in vico boriali qui ducit versus Glydepath, ex parte orientali ejusdem vici, between the place of the Abbot of Abbotisbury on the north, and the place formerly John Merchant's on the south (151, 155).

John Cowde, of Tolpydel, grants a messuage in vico qui ducit versus Glydepath, ex parte orientali illius vici (293).

Cristina Mason conveys her burgage on the east side of the North Street which leads towards Glidepatth, between the tenement of Robert Veel on the south, and the Prior of St. John of Dorchester on the north (330).

It is also called via que ducit ad le glyte pathe in Richard Howell's conveyance (607), where it is the western boundary of a house at the west end of Peselane.

Lane which leads from High West Street towards the North Gate.

Thomasin Goldsmyth conveys the south end of a tenement situate in venella que ducit ab alto vico regio occidentali versus portam borialem," between the tenement of Nicholas Cole on the north, and that held by Robert Portland on the south (45). She again deals with the same tenement, similarly described, in 189, and it is bequeathed by John Goldsmyth the grantee in 349, and conveyed by his daughter Emmote (373), and re-conveyed to her after her marriage with Thomas Bayly (377). The property was on the west side of the lane.

which in all the documents bears the same relation to High West Street and the North Gate.

In one instance (264) the lane is said to lead to North Street, not to the North Gate, viz., in the seisin of Thomas Crymelford, who inherited after the death of his father and mother a tenement on the north side of West Street, between the tenement of Richard Beryll on the west, and venellam que ducit ad vicum borialem ex parte orientali.

On another occasion this lane seems to be called "le Northlane" without other addition, when Thomas Kyllynge-forde conveys to Richard and Agnes Lewys, 10th May, 38 Henry VIII., a burgage in quadam venella ibidem vocata le Northlane, viz. in orientali parte ejusdem venelle, between the burgage formerly Stephen Crymelforde's, now Margaret Wynsore's on the north, and the burgage late Roger Howell's on the south ((597).

The North Street which leads towards the Friars Minors.

This appears to be the street leading northwards from the centre of the town, to be distinguished from "the North Street which leads towards the North Gate" on the west, and Frerenlane on the east. It is repeatedly mentioned in the Domesday under the titles of Vicus qui ducit erga Fratres Minores (9), Vicus quo itur versus Fratres Minores (30), Via que ducit versus Fratres Minores (113), Altus vicus qui ducit usque Fratres Minores (376), Vicus borialis qui ducit versus Fratres Minores (12), and Altus vicus borialis qui ducit versus Fratres Minores (132).

The charter of Henry Brouks seems to settle its position by terming it *Vicus qui ducit a foro mercati versus Fratres Minores* (62), for, as shown by 618, the market was held at the centre of the town, near St. Peter's Church.

In this street was the Cross, to which reference will presently be made, and the Pinfold or Pound (431). Towards its northern end it joined Frerenlane.

On 10th June, 7 James [1609], the Burgesses granted a lease to Ellen, wife of John Ellen, ropemaker, of a burgage "on the west part of the street leading out of the North Streete towards the Friery there." C. 14.

A lease of 19th November, 1762, refers to a stable, bounded on east by the street leading to the Friary, and on the west by a close called the Castle. B. 65.

Frevenlane.

This lane, which is frequently named in the documents enrolled in the Domesday, ran from East Street towards the Church or Precinct of the Friars Minors. It is called *Venella que vocatur Frerenlane* (34), venella que tendit ad ecclesiam Fratrum Minorum (68), Fryars' lane (630, 659), and finally "the lane which leads towards the precinct of the late dissolved Friars" (652).

The will of Margaret Auden (579) in which she bequeaths a burgage on the north side of East Street, between a burgage of John Jurden's on the west, and venella vocata Freernelane que ducit de vico predicto versus Fratres Minores, identifies it with the present Friary Lane.*

Durnelane and the Lane which leads towards la Dernegate.

The narrow thoroughfare running eastward from South Street finds frequent mention in the Domesday. The first occurrence is in No. 7, the will of William Fraunceys, 20th October, 1394, where it is called venella que vocatur Durnelane. It is sometimes designated by a periphrasis, as in No. 8, where John Shudde grants a burgage with curtilage in venella que ducit a vico regio australi versus la Durnegate ex parte australi dicte venelle (cf. 25, 29).

It seems to be the same as the lane called Durnegate, venella vocata Durnegate, mentioned in the will of John Shydde, who bequeaths to his wife a burgage so situated, between burgages of William Morton on the east and of John Hakelet on the west (471).

There is also the variation, "Durnegate Lane," so named in the grant of a burgage by William Drake on the north side of cujusdam venelle ibidem vocate Durne gate lane (660), but this is a document of much later date, viz., 15th August, 7 Elizabeth [1565].

In the following charter a distinction is drawn between Durnelane, and the lane which leads to la Durnegate.

John Sherere, 3rd January, 1395, bequeaths a burgage

* This name seems to have been corrupted in the Seventeenth Century into Brewers' Lane, and is so named in a lease granted by John and Henry Churchill to John Snooke, of a messuage on north side of High East Street, between land of Thomas Walker (late William Miller's) beer brewer, on the west, Brewer's Lane on the east, and High East Street on the south, 1st May, 1665.

in quadam venella vocata la Durnelane ex parte australi illius venelle, inter placeam Johannis Shudde ex parte occidentali et venellam que ducit versus la Durnegate in quodam angulo exopposito tenemento nuper Johannis Warmwelle (17). Durnelane ran east and west, having tenements on the north and south of it, while the other lane, whatever name it bore, came into it at right angles, with tenements lying on the east and west sides.

Walter and Joan Burgeys convey a burgage on the south side of la Durnelane, between the place of John Shydde on the west, et venellam qua [que] ducit versus la Durgate [sic] in quodam angulo ex opposito tenemento nuper Johannis Warmewell ex parte orientali (245).

By another charter (499) Henry Syvier conveys a burgage in australi angulo cujusdam venelle in eadem villa que ducit ab alto vico ejusdem ville in vicum vocatum Durnelane, ex parte occidentali ejusdem venelle, inter burgagium Johannis Playce ex parte boriali et predictum vicum vocatum Durnelane ex parte australi, ac inter predictam venellam ex parte orientali et burgagium nuper Radulphi Bedeford ex parte occidentali. The High Street here named is evidently High East Street, from which the lane led into Durnelane, and it is so stated in the certificate of seisin of Thomas Stoyte in the burgage which William, his father, lately had by grant of Henry Syvier in the south corner of a lane which leads ab alto vico orientali . . . in vicum vocatum Durnelane (512).

William Ayssh grants a tenement on the west side of the *venella que ducit a vico orientali versus la Durnegate*, between other tenements to the north and south (187).

But this lane is also sometimes called Durnelane, as in 91, when William atte Assche grants a tenement on the west side of Durnelane, between burgages on the north and south; and in 170, where the same tenement is again conveyed.

Henry Durant (287) grants to John Crauel a burgage in venella que vocatur Durngate ex parte occidentali, between burgages of William Bouchere on the south and Henry Crauel on the north.

With this may be compared a sentence in the will of John Shydde (471), who bequeaths unam vacuam placeam, jacentem in Durnegate predicta, between the burgage called Cravellysbern on the south and that of William Morton on the north.

The point in East Street from which this lane started is shown by the will of John Fytheler, A.D. 1395, to have

been All Saints' Church, as the lane is called venella que ducit ab ecclesia omnium sanctorum versus la Durnegate (16).

Also John Fyuyan receives a grant, 16 Richard II. [1392-3], of a tenement in quodam angulo ex parte orientali ecclesie omnium Sanctorum et inter viam regis que ducit versus la Durnegate ex parte occidentali (6, cf. 69).

The Lane which leads towards Fordyngton.

There are a few instances in which this name occurs, and it seems to be used for Church Lane. Thus, in No. 448, Robert Stoury grants to Walter and Margaret Baron a burgage with curtilage in East Street, in quadam venella que ducit versus Fordyngton vocata Durnelane, ex parte occidentali ejusdem venelle, between burgages of Richard Vicary on the north, and of Walter Sergent on the south.

Robert and Joan Talbotte release to Thomas Hoskyn all right in a burgage called le Rakehey, on the south side of East Street, between the burgage of William Ployce on the east, and the via regia que ducit a vico orientali usque Forthynton (546).

Richard Wilmet grants to Thomas Hoskyns and Alice, his wife, a burgage on the south side of Durnelane, between the burgage of Nycolas Molyn on the west, and the via regia que ducit versus Forthyngton on the east (548).

Allhallon Church Lane.

Although this lane, running from East Street, at the west end of All Saints' Church, to Durnelane, is frequently indicated in the documents enrolled in Domesday, it first occurs by this name in a grant made 15th May, 32 Henry VIII. [1540], by John Clerke to John Corbyn, baker, of Belamys bakehouse, situate on the east side of the venella ibidem communiter vocata Alhalon Churche lane, having the King's burgage (late the Abbot of Byndon's) on the north, and the burgage of John Pynge, formerly Margaret Boith's, on the south (600).

The same messuage is conveyed by John Corbyn to another baker, Peter Goodfellowe, 10th January, 4 Elizabeth [1561-2], and its situation is stated as being in venella vocata Alhallen Churche lane in parochia Omnium Sanctorum (648).

The Twelve Men Way.

The name of this lane only once occurs. On 24th February 5 Edward VI. [1551], John Talbott, of Okeforde Shelynge,

conveys to Richard Fevyan, aliter Hoggarde, of Ewerne Mynster a burgage with curtilage in St. Peter's parish, inter tenementum Johannis Stratford ex parte australi, tenementum Johannis Peryn ex parte boriali, viam Regiam ex parte orientali, et viam ville predicte vocatam the Twelve Men Way ex parte occidentali (623).

Perhaps the name may come from the twelve Jurors sworn at the Court of the Town, who went by this way to their place of meeting.

Glydepath.

This way has already been several times mentioned as occurring in the phrase, "the North Street which leads towards Glydepath," to which reference may be made.

Its position is further defined in the will of William Stone, sen., who bequeaths to his wife a burgage with curtilage, jacens apud Glydepathe in orientali parte cujusdam vici ibidem vocati Colyncolrew, between the King's burgage, late the Friars Minors', on the north, and the burgage of the Master of the Chapel of St. John on the south (591).

Glidelane.

This lane, which must be distinguished from Glydepath, ran into Durnelane from the north, and must have led to it from High East Street. It is only once mentioned in Domesday, viz., in the grant by Sarah Cras of a tenement in quadam venella vocata Durnelane ex parte boriali ejusdem venelle inter tenementum quondam Johannis Pensent nunc vero Johannis Drake ex parte orientali et venellam que dicitur Glidelane ex parte occidentali (389).

If this lane should be considered identical with Church Lane, its name may be connected with the family of Glide, which had property there at an earlier date. See Nos. 69 and 71.

The North Lane.

Robert Barnes and Agnes, his wife, convey to George Robynson, 10th August, 16 Elizabeth [1574], a burgage and garden on the north side of Durnelane, between the burgage of John Hennyng on the east, and the lane, venellam vocatam the Northe lane, on the west (675). It must have been a lane running northwards from Durnelane towards High East Street. See Glidelane.

Colyncolrew.

William Stone, sen., by his will, dated 17th April, 1542, bequeaths a burgage with curtilage, jacens apud Glydepathe in orientali parte cujusdam vici ibidem vocati Colyncolrew, between the King's burgage, late of the Friars Minors, on the north, and the burgage of the Master of the Chapel of St. John on the south (591).

In the will of Roger Howell, 28th August, 1545, cited in the charter executed by Richard his son, a burgage was bequeathed lying on the east side of it. It is there termed vicus vocatus Collyncolle Rew in Dorchestre (604). In 605, relating to the same property, it is written as "Collencollrew."

Later on James Hyll conveys a burgage with curtilage on the east side, cujusdam vici vulgariter vocati collyncolrewe streate (651).

A comparison of 604 with 597 seems to suggest that Colyncolrew was also called le Northlane.

Peaselane.

This lane is frequently named in Domesday, and is variously spelt as Piselane (16), Pisselane (18), Puselane (19), Pusselane (89), Puzelane (117), Pislane (225), Pyselane (241), Pyslane (284), Pyzelane (476), Peselane (583), and Peaselane (618), the last being its latest form.

It ran east and west, from "the Cross which leads towards the Friars Minors" on the east, (132) to the North Street on the west. Its western extremity is thus described in 416, the conveyance by William Portland, alias Hykkes, of a tenement, quod situatum est in vico boriali in angulo ex opposito tenemento Johannis Jurdan et quondam Nicholai Cole in Dorchestre predicta videlicet in parte orientali ejusdem vici ad finem occidentalem venelle vocate Puselane et in parte australi ejusdem venelle vocate Puselane.

In another charter, 607, Richard Howell conveys a burgage in quodam vico ibidem communiter vocato le Peselane ex boriali parte dicti vici inter burgagium nuper Ricardi Haywarde ex parte orientali et viam que ducit ad le glyte pathe ex parte occidentali.

It is identical with Ulnenlane. A later name is Sheep lane.

Ulnenlane.

This lane is named in the will of Henry Duddill, 1399, who bequeathed to his wife a tenement on the north side of it, ex parte boriali venelle vocate la Vlnenlane (52).

In the conveyance of a burgage by William Lytefoot it is termed *venella vocata Ilnenelane* (100), and in a grant by John Duddill, la Vlnenelane.

Its identity with Puselane is established by No. 418, in which William Portland grants to Peter Skynnere a burgage situate in angulo cujusdam venelle vocate Ilnenlane alias dicte Puselane, and by 476, the will of John Purye, who bequeaths a tenement in venella vocata Vlnenlane alias Pyzelane.

The Market.

In the will of John Syward, sen., the market is mentioned as being opposite to the soil of the Abbot and Convent of Cerne (41), and in a charter by Henry Brouks occurs the market place, forum mercati, from which a street led towards the Friars Minors (62). Elianor, wife of Robert Greynlef, alias Bakere, bequeaths two butchers' shops on the west side of the market, and one other shop in the market (268), and William Payn conveys a tenement with curtilage situate between the tenement of the Prior of St. John, on the east, and the tenement late John Skynnere's on the west, opposite the market place, forum mercati (301).

The position of the market place is defined in 618 by John Hayward selling a burgage on the north side of High West Street, habens ex parte australi locum venalem regium vocatum le merket place, Cimiterium divi Petri ex parte boriali, quandam viam in predictum Cimiterium inducentem ex parte occidentali, et quoddam Burgagium Johannis Lewston generosi ex parte orientali.

Hayward's burgage must have been one of the houses which at one time blocked up the southern side of St. Peter's Church, while the market was held near the crossing at the centre of the town.

Market Street

This street which, as shown by the position of the houses in it, ran from north to south, is mentioned in a release by which John Nagard, alias Webbe, releases to Peter Goldsmyth, and Scolastica, his wife, a burgage situate in vico mercato,

between the burgage of the grantees, and the fabric of the Prior of St. John of Dorchester (122, 124).

The executors of the will of Robert Greynlyf aliter Baker, convey a burgage on the east side of Market Street in vico mercato, between the burgage late of John Prentes on the south, and the burgage late of Robert Crokker on the north (396).

Dorchester Parishes.

The Town of Dorchester comprised from early times the three parishes of Holy Trinity, St. Peter's, and All Saints. These parishes, their churches, burying grounds and rectors are from time to time noticed in the Domesday.

Holy Trinity.

In this Church there were two Fraternities, and Thomas Waryn, the Rector, in his will, Wednesday next before the Feast of All Saints, 1441, bequeathed "to the two Fraternities in the Church of Holy Trinity," 6s. 8d. (492).

These Fraternities were that of the Holy Trinity which owned a tenement on the south side of Peaselane (424, 533), and received a legacy of 12d. from Philip Helyer, in 1441 (487), and that of the Blessed Virgin Mary, to which he also bequeathed the same sum.

Thomas Waryn desires that he should be buried in his church, before the image of the Holy Trinity (492).

The Rectory of Holy Trinity possessed land in les West Walls (367), and a tenement on the south side of Peaselane (459, 473, 492), and a tenement of the Wardens of the Church on the south side of the same lane is mentioned in 534, and a burgage of the Feoffees of the Church on the north side in 639.

The tenement, quod pertinet ad ecclesiam S. Trinitatis, on the south side of Peaselane, occurs in 272, and is that which belonged to the Fraternity of the Holy Trinity (see 533).

The exchange of the rectory house for another residence is referred to, post, on p. 610.

Seward's Chantry, founded in the Church of the Holy Trinity, is alluded to in 367, when John and Matilda Artour are the grantees of two acres of arable land in les West Wall', one of which lies inter terram Cantarie Johannis Seward, ex parte occidentali, et terram Rectoris S. Trinitatis de Dorchestre ex parte orientali.

William Tolett and his wife grant a burgage on the north side of High East Street, between the burgage *Cantarie Rogeri Syward* on the west, and that of the feoffees of All Saints' Church on the east (514).

In 613 is mentioned the burgagium Cantarie de Dorchester in the parish of All Saints.

St. Peter's.

In the charter of Henry and Joan Gylot is conveyed a tenement, ten feet in length and breadth, situate juxta scalam orientalem Cimiterii ecclesie S. Petri (267). These steps are frequently mentioned.

In this Church were three Fraternities: I, The Fraternity of the Holy Cross, to which John Purye bequeathed 3s. 4d. in 1436 (476), and John Pascowe two ewe sheep in 1473 (567). 2, The Fraternity of Corpus Christi, to which Richard Bryce bequeathed a sheep in 1444 (489), and Thomas Waryn, the Rector, 3s. 4d. in 1441 (492). 3, The Fraternity of Blessed Virgin Mary. This Brotherhood was well endowed with tenements in various parts of the town, the Domesday mentioning them as being in the North Street which led to the Friars Minors (12), the north side of High North Street (132), Street leading from the Market to the Friars Minors (62), south side (22), and north side (220) of West Street, east side (43) and west side (203) of South Street, north side (570) of East Street, south side of Peaselane (416), east side of Durnelane (434).

Its full title was Fraternitas Beate Marie in ecclesia Sancti Petri in Dorchestre (203), and it is also called the Cantaria beate Marie Sancti Petri (398). It had Wardens for the management of its concerns (508), and an official seal, sigillum officii senescallorum sive custodum Fraternitatis (560). The grant of a burgage by the Stewards or Wardens, and the confratres of the Brotherhood, may be read in 560, and they are the recipients of a rent of 12d. from a tenement on east side of South Street (164), and of grants, as seen in 431 and 444, and an arbitration, in regard to an annual rent of 5s. due to them, was made 20th November, 32 Henry VI. (576).

Upon the suppression of Chantries, the Burgesses obtained their property by letters patent, 1st August, 2 Edward VI. (627), and soon after sold a burgage and garden late belonging to the Fraternity (629).

The Rector of St. Peter's had a tenement on the west side of North Street (5).

Richard Hayne bequeathed, A.D. 1413, to his wife, Alice, a tenement on the west side of South Street, rendering yearly for the maintenance of the bell-tower, pro sustentacione campanille, of the Church of St. Peter's, 4d. (244).

All Saints.

The Fraternity of Corpus Christi in this Church is mentioned in the Will of John Welford, 1434, as the recipient of a legacy of 12d., "fratribus Fraternitatis Corporis Christi ibidem" (479).

The Rector of this Church held a tenement on the south side of Durnelane, tenementum quod Rector ecclesie Omnium Sanctorum tenet (47, 50, 447), and the mansio Rectoris ecclesie Omnium Sanctorum on the south side of a lane to which no name is given, is mentioned in 616 and 633.

Tenements belonging to the Church of All Saints on the north side of East Street are mentioned under the name of burgagium Feoffatorum ad opus Ecclesie O.S. (514, 599), pertinens ecclesie parochiali O.S. (570, 650); on the south side of East Street, now in the tenure of the feoffees, and late of the heirs of William Hoskyns (634) and pertinens ad ecclesiam, etc. (645); on the east side of South Street, burgagium gardianorum ecclesie O.S. (601), and burgagium ecclesie parochialis O.S. (674); and on the north side of Durnegate lane (600). A rent charge of 6d. per annum to the Church of All Saints is mentioned in A.D. 1406 (138). See also p. 705.

St. Rowald's Chapel.

This Chapel is spoken of as though it were still standing in 6 Henry IV. [1404-5], when the executors of John Syward, sen., conveyed to John Roggere of Brydeport a burgage on the east side of South Street, of which this chapel formed the southern boundary, in vico australi ejusdem ville ex parte orientali ejusdem vici inter tenementum Johannis Wespray ex parte boriali et capellam quondam Sancti Rowaldi ex parte australi (126).

The same property is again dealt with in 7 Henry V., when John Roger, now called Lord of Bryanston conveys it to George Rushley and Robert Mose, the southern boundary now being described as placiam quondam capelle Sancti Rowaldi, as though the chapel were no longer standing (324, see also 344).

The Chapel of St. John Baptist.

There were several burgages belonging to this chapel in Dorchester, though the usual name employed is that of the Prior of St. John (e.g., 13, 143, 243, 283, 296, 301, 334, 434), the Prior of St. John Baptist (19), Prior of St. John of Dorchester (3, 14, 84, 94, 122, 130, 158, 288, 330, 488, 545, 650), or Prior of St. John Baptist of Dorchester (193, 224).

The expression, Master of St. John, Magister Sancti Johannis, occurs in 208 and 234, Master of St. John of Dorchester in 293, and Magister Capelle S. Johannis Baptiste de Dorchester in 519.

That the Prior of St. John and the Master of St. John are to be identified, becomes apparent on comparison of 143 and 234, where the two expressions are used to describe the western boundary of the same burgage situate next la Durnegate.

That the Master of St. John of Dorchester is not to be confounded with the Master of Mayne, the local head of the Commandery of the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem at Mayne, is seen from the grant by Alice and Margaret Toly, 17 Edward IV., of a burgage on the north side of High East Street, between the burgage of Sancti Johannis Hospitalis Jerusalem in Anglia apud Mayne Hospitalis ex parte occidentali et burgagium Magistri Sancti Johannis in Dorchestre predicta ex parte orientali (545).

The independence of this Chapel of the Friars Minors becomes apparent in the will of William Stone, sen., 27th April, 1542, 34 Henry VIII., who bequeaths a burgage, etc., at Glydepath, on the east side of a street called Colyncolrew, inter burgagium Domini Regis nuper Fratrum Minorum ibidem ex parte boriali et burgagium Magistri capelle Sancti Johannis ibidem ex parte australi (591). At this date the Friary had been dissolved, and its possessions confiscated, but those of the Chapel of St. John still remained. But a later document (612) recites letters patent, 12th March, 3 Edward VI., which conveyed a burgage late belonging to the Priory of St. John of Dorchester, modo dissoluti, on the west side of South Street.

Tenements belonging to this Corporation were situate on west side of North Street (13, 283), on the east side of North Street which leads towards Glydepath (330, 293, 591), on the south side of East Street (519), on the north side (3, 14, 94, 650, 545), opposite the market (301), and in Market Street (122), next la Durnegate (143, 234, 224), on north side of Durnelane (224, 296), on east side (434), and on the west side (434), in the lane which leads towards the Friars Minors [from East Street] (208), on north side of Ilnenelane (158), or Peaselane (258, cf. 19), on the west side of South Street (334, 488, 193, 612).

The Friars Minors.

The name of this community frequently occurs, but chiefly in connection with a street "which leads towards the Friars Minors." The most interesting allusion is that which occurs in the conveyance by Robert Grey to Thomas and Petronilla Gardyner of a burgage in Dorchester, situate juxta castrum Fratrum Minorum, 2 Henry IV. (77, cf. 133), between other tenements on the north and south.

A burgage of the Friars Minors on the east side of Frerenlane, is mentioned in the will of Margaret Auden, dated 8th July, 1535, 27 Henry VIII. (579), and another on the east side of Colyncolrew, late of the Friars Minors, in the will of William Stone, sen., 27th April, 1542 (591).

The precinctum Fratrum Minorum nuper dissolutorum occurs in 652, "the river and streame of water running from the Friary Mills in or near Dorchester" in 692, and the Friary wall is the north boundary of a messuage and garden situate on the north side of East Street (699).

Commonalty Land.

Lands and tenements belonging to the Commonalty of the town are occasionally mentioned in the charters. In the North Street which leads towards the Friars Minors was terra communitatis ville de Dorchestre (12). On the east side of Frerenlane was a tenementum communitatis (177, 190, 457), not identical with the preceding.

On the south side of High Street and opposite the Fysheshamelles was a tenementum ville (566, cf. 653, 666), on the east side of South Street a burgagium communitatis Burgi (596, 658, cf. 210), and on the north side of Peaselane a burgagium burgensium (618, cf. 638, 639).

The Liberty of the Town of Dorchester.

This expression is used in No. 191, whereby Richard Bertlot and others release all right in a tenement lying *infra libertatem ville Dorcestrie in alto vico orientali ex parte boriali ejusdem vici*, though it is not employed in 166, where the same property is conveyed.

No. 227 is a grant of four acres in la Est Walles infra libertatem ville.

Hutchins' Dorset (Vol. ii., p. 366) states that "The Priory, the north part of Priory-lane, the Castle, and the lime-kills, are in the Liberty of Bindon."

The Pintold.

The Pound or Pinfold of the town is mentioned as ponfaldum communitatis, in North Street which leads towards the Friars Minors, and opposite the "Cross" (431, 440).

In 1412 Emota, widow of William Pulhare, conveyed a tenement on the north side of Peaselane, bounded by that of John Bomel on the west, and placeam vocatam le Pount ex parte orientali (225).

Robert Coker, goldsmith, had a lease, 13th November, 1604, of a burgage lying on the north part of the North Street, Dorchester, "and next on the north east parte of the pownde there." C. 14.

A plot called Hell Pound occurs in a lease, 7th June, 1746, as the eastern boundary of a messuage in Pease Lane, Holy Trinity parish, and again 28th March, 1785, B. 15, and "near unto a place there (St. Peter's Parish) called Hell pound, on the south side of the Castle," is a description in a lease of 5th April, 1754. B. 64.

The Common Spring.

This is once mentioned in the charter by which John Pascow, Rector of Warmwelle, grants a burgage in St. Peter's parish, erga communem fontem in orientali parte illius vici, between the burgages of St. Mary of St. Peter's Church on either side (544). The name of the street is not mentioned.

A watercourse, viam aque of the Commonalty, is mentioned in 210 as the northern boundary of a curtilage situate on the east side of South Street, and lying versus campum de Este Wall.

1658, Aug. 6. At the request of the inhabitants a well may be dug near the Pound, "so as care be taken for the preservation of children from danger of the said well." C. 15.

The New Bridge.

On 27th October, 7 Elizabeth [1565], Nicholas Martyn of Athelhampston, Esq., conveys seven acres of meadow lying together in le Weaste warde juxta magnum pontem vocatum novum pontem, and on the north side of the stream (662). See ante, p. xxxv.

Moones Bridge.

On a loose sheet, inserted with wafers in C. 7:-

"1625, A.D. De Recordo in Blandford Sessions vj° die Januarij, Anno R's Jacobi nunc Anglie etc., xxij° et Scocie lviij°.

Dorsett. Whereas itt hath been heretofore presented that the highway by Moones-bridge, lyinge between the towne of Dorchester and the parish of Charminster, was in decay, and was ordered to be repayred by the parish of Fordington and such other parishes that had grounds lyinge neer vnto the same. Now forasmuch as vppon examinacion it hath been found very doubtfull who should repaire the same way for that divers parishes have grounds lyinge in the great common meadow called the West-ward which adiovneth to the said way; And moreover it is conceived that the way ought to bee mainteyned by the County for that itt lyeth within 200 foot of the bridge. Therefore for the avoidinge of the present perrill that may happen to travailers the said way beinge extremely foundrous, many persons havinge been thereby in danger of their liues, Sir Thomas Trenchard and Sir Francis Ashley, Knts., John Browne, Esq., and other persons wishing well to soe necessary a worke persuaded the towne of Dorchester, the parishes of Fordington, Charmister, Stratton and Grimstone to joyne in reparacion of the said way. wherevnto they yeilded condiconally that they might not in future bee bound therevnto as a service to bee performed of right, and accordingly they have ioyned in reparacion of the same way. Itt is therefore now ordered that the said towne of Dorchester nor any of the said parishes of Fordingeton, Charminster, Stratton or Grimstone, or any other that have ioyned in the said worke, shall hereafter be chardged with reparacion of the said way by reason of their assistance therein att this tyme, but shall bee as free in that behalfe as if now they had don noethinge therein. Exa per Ph'um Alexander, deputatum Clerici pacis Comitatus."

1631, May 6. £5 to be contributed to Mr. John Browne, towards the reparation of Moones Bridge, and the way adjoining on both sides, though the Town is in no ways chargeable. C. q.

The Gaol.

This important institution, though it forms the subject of the earliest document now among the municipal records, does not occur again in the charters till A.D. 1458, when

John Mone, Esq., releases all right in a messuage in Dorchester, inter burgagium vocatum la Gowle ibidem, on the west, and the burgage of Paul Bedford on the east (527); and John Frampton of Caundell Mersshe demises the same, the western boundary being then described as Gaolem Domini Regis (528), A.D. 1497. In 530 it is said to be on the north side of East Street.

1634, Dec. 19. "It is agreed that the Towne Steward shall deliuer unto Beniamyn Derby five marks wherewith he shall fitt one roome of his howse to make it a strong prison for the Towne." C. 9.

1642, May 18. "For as much as Robert Hoskins hath for divers yeares held the possession of the old gaole which thes Company conceives to be the Towne land, and therefore it is desired that Mr. Edward Dashwood and Mr. John Bushrode shall view the bownds of the same old gaole, and certific thes Company what probability there is that the said Hoskins hath any title to any parte of the same gaole. But it is since agreed that Nathaniell Bower shall take hes oportunity to take quiet possession of it." C. 12.

1649, Nov. 31. "To confer with Mr. Richard Scovile, the Towne Clark, at his next coming to Towne, concerning the land which belongs to the Towne, which was formerly the Old Gaole." C. 12.

1775, Aug. 31. The house of Robert Stickland in All Saints' parish, is bounded on the east by Gaol Lane. C. 7.

Les Fyshe shamelles.

These were situated on the north side of the High Street, and are mentioned in the charter of John Pascowe, Rector of Warmwelle, but whether of East or West Street is not stated (566, 568).

The Butchers' Stalls.

These are frequently mentioned, but not in the Domesday Book. See post, p. 493.

The Glovers' Standings.

The glovers held their stalls in South Street. See post, p. 494, note.

Shops.

Shops in Dorchester several times occur in the Charters. The reversions of three in the High Street, between other tenements on the east and west, are conveyed A.D. 1398 (36). Three other shops standing together on the west side of the

High Street (i.e., North Street), which leads towards the Friars Minors, occur in A.D. 1409-10 (197, 198, 199), and in A.D. 1423 (376). A shop on the south side of High [West] Street is mentioned in A.D. 1409-10 (185), which by a later charter A.D. 1417, is stated to be opposite St. Peter's Church. A shop at the East Gate in 1410 (262) and another in 1500, between le New Inne on the east and Holy Trinity Church on the west (551). Three butchers' shops in 1410 (262), two of which are again mentioned in 1416 as situate on the west side of the Market (268).

Shops under the special name of Les Nyweshoppes are referred to in No. 12, as situate in the North Street which leads towards the Friars Minors, and opposite the Cross there, and two others, called Les Northshoppes, in St. Peter's parish, were inherited by Sir John Pasco in 1474 (511).

La Nywehyn.

The New Inn is mentioned as early as A.D. 1398, to indicate the position of a tenement which is said to be situate, ex parte australi alti vici ex opposito la Nywehyn (37), and a similar expression, in alto vico ex opposito Novo hospicio, occurs in 57 and in 76.

Its position is established by a charter of 16 Henry VI. (A.D. 1437), by which Robert Rempston conveys to John Martyn a tenement on the north side of West Street, between the tenement called *novum hospicium* on the east, and the cemetery of Holy Trinity Church on the west (477), and John Martyn bequeaths it in his will as bounded by *hospicium vocatum le New Inne* on the east, and Holy Trinity Church on the west (551).

La Dayne.

Several pieces of ground bearing this name are mentioned in the charters.

In 20 Richard II. [1397] William Cole conveys to John Joce placea terre vocata la dayne in Burgo Dorcestre in vico australi ex parte occidentali illius vici, lying at the end of the curtilage of the Abbot of Milton on the south, and that of Thomas Bertram on the north (28). It is again mentioned in 212, when John Joce conveys it to Richard Brys, but its southern boundary is then, A.D. 1411, called the curtilage of the Abbot of Byndon.

Once more, in A.D. 1444, it is bequeathed by Richard Bryce to Alienore, his daughter, as vnam quantitatem terre

vocatam a Dayne sitam in vico australi ejusdem ville ex parte occidentali illius vici, iuxta campum de West Wallys, and bounded by gardens of Robert Childecumbe on the north, and of the Abbot of Middleton on the south (489).

Previously, however, A.D. 1423, Alice, widow of John Jurdan, and John, son and heir of John Jurdan, had granted a tenement on the west side of South Street, together with the reversion cujusdam Dayne terre jacentis ad finem occidentalem curtillagii ejusdem tenementi, which may be another property of the same name (369).

In A.D. 1474 Sir John Pasco is placed in possession of "j dayne" with appurtenances in the parish of St. Peter's, which had descended to him on his father's death (511).

In 1482-3 John Hull and Joan, his wife, convey to trustees illud Dayne cum suis pertinenciis jacens in eadem venella vocata Pyselane ex parte australi ejusdem venelle, between burgages of the Fraternity of S. Mary on east, and of the grantors on the west (524).

Lastly in 1545 William Jerard conveys unum Deane or le Deane, with burgage and curtilage attached on the east side of South Street, between burgage of Owin Hayman on the north, and Michael Vase on the south (592).

In the List of Lessees of the Town Burgages, 1582—1633, mention is made of "a passage called the Dane," in the parish of All Saints. See p. 698.

From the above quotations it would appear that there were several distinct pieces of ground called by this name.

Fordington.

This adjoining parish to Dorchester is rarely mentioned in the charters except as a place of residence.

The bounds of the Lord of Fordyngton, metas d'ni de Fordyngton, are given as the southern boundary of a burgage at the South Gate, and on the west side of South Street in A.D. 1402 (93), and a close of the demesne of Fordyngton "d'nij de Fordyngton" on the east side of North Street is twice mentioned, in A.D. 1439-40 (483), and in A.D. 1482-3 (524).

Fordington Field, campus de Fordyngton, occurs as the western boundary of burgages and gardens on the south side of West Street, conveyed by Robert Martyn of Adelmyston in A.D. 1547 (606).

The "Common Corn Field of Forthington" is mentioned as the south boundary of $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land and a house in All Saints' parish, 25th May, 1750.

The Cross.

On three occasions mention is made of the Cross, situated in or near the North Street which leads towards the Friars Minors, but it is not made quite clear whether a crossing of the ways or a structural cross is intended. In any case the situation would be where Peaselane joins North Street, the spot called subsequently Bullstake.

The three occurrences of the name are as follows:---

In A.D. 1395-6 William Wyther grants a messuage in vico boriali qui ducit versus Fratres Minores inter les Nyweshoppes ex opposito cruci ibidem inter shoppam Fraternitatis Sancte Marie ex parte orientali et terram Communitatis ville de Dorchestre ex parte occidentali (12).

In A.D. 1405-6 Peter Blount bequeaths a tenement quod situm est ex opposito cruci que ducit versus Fratres Minores et in quodam angulo cujusdam venelle in Dorchestre vocate Puselane ex parte boriali ejusdem venelle et in fine orientali (132).

By a charter from John Jacob, clerk, and Joan, widow of Reginald Jacob, is conveyed in A.D. 1429 to the Fraternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary a tenement in vico boriali qui ducit versus fratres minores ex opposito cruci ex parte boriali, inter tenementum Fraternitatis B. Marie in ecclesia Sancti Petri de Dorchestre predicta ex parte orientali, et Ponfoldum communitatis ex parte occidentali (431).

Helle.

A place so-called existed in Dorchester A.D. 1401, when Edward Chepman granted to Peter Blount a toft on the north side of Vlnenlane, inter tenementum Thome Gardyner ex parte occidentali, et placeam Roberti Sutton vocatam helle, ex parte orientali (72). It occurs again in 1412, when John Jurdan, sen., and Alice, his wife, who had been wife of Robert Sutton, release all their right in a burgage called Helle in Dorchestre, quondam Roberti Sutton mariti ipsius Alicie (226). See ante, p. 1, for Hell Pound.

Le Rakehay.

A burgage so called, which came into the King's hands through the failure of the heirs of Henry Wooge, was granted by the Bailiffs and the Jurors at the Court held at Michaelmas, A.D. 1481, to Henry Hoskyns and Alice, his wife (547), and the next year all right in it was released by Robert Talbotte

and Joane, his wife, late wife of Thomas Russeheton (546). It is there called a toft, on the south side of High East Street, and adjoined the way that led from East Street to Forthynton.

La Pentys.

This is the name of a burgage in Dorchester, 26 ft. long by 8 ft. broad, the situation of which is thus described in a charter dated 1399, Unam placeam in Burgo predicto que vocatur la Pentys sitam in quodam angulo ex opposito angulo Abbatis de Cerne ex parte australi alti vici (53). It had belonged to John Syward, sen., deceased, whose executors conveyed it to John Skynner.

In 1408 John Skynner bequeathed it to his wife, Alice (165), and in 1423 Thomas Oliver, and Alice, his wife, who was Skynner's widow, convey it to John Plays of Sydelyng (382). However, in 1425, Alice Skynner bequeaths it to her husband (388).

Long after, in 1546, Robert Aden bequeathed a burgage on the north side of the High Street, of which a burgage called Le Pentice was the eastern boundary (641).

In a lease, 3rd April, 16 James [1618], the town grants to Phillip Nicholls of Dorchester, tayler, the messuage "called the Bow or Pentice house or by whatsoever other name or names the same is now or hath ben called or known," lying on the north part of the dwelling house and shop of William Churchill, gent., now deceased, in St. Peter's parish. C. 14.

The Bow. The Stairs to St. Peter's Churchyard. The Blind-house.

A lease was granted to Robert Coker, goldsmith, 20th April, 16 James [1618], of a chamber and loft already builded adjoining the house of the said Robert Coker on the west side, and to the land of the said Bailiffs and Burgesses called the Bow on theast side, and alsoe all that voyd roome from the Chamber northward ouer the Blind howse and over the staires that doe lead out of the Churchyard of St. Peter's in Dorchester into the streate there," in the parish of St. Peter. C. 14. See B. 35a, and post, at p. 494.

1641, April 9. The Bow or Pentice howse. It is agreed that in regard that the executors or ouerseers of Philip Nicholles hath let the howse or suffered others to enjoy the howse called the Bow without license of the Major and Company and thereby forfeited the same unto the Townehands. It is

ordered that a lease of eiectment shall be made and sealed to William Riall and Benjamyn Derby to haue a letter of attorney made to him to deliuer it. C. 12.

1642, Nov. 25. "It is this day agreed with Mr. Gilbert Loder that thear shall be a copie licence granted for the Bow for the price of fiue pounds to be paid betwixt this and Christide upon condicion that it be lett vnto a mercer or a draper." C. 12.

1642, Dec. 1. "It is agreed that there shall be a chaine prepared and set vp at the Bow and a post to be set vp to receive it, leaving a passage betwene the post and Blindhowse, and that Mr. Savage shall take the care of it, and the iron of the starts that remaine in Mr. Dashwood's hands shall be weighed and deliuered to the smyth towards making of it." C. 12.

1648, June 23. Mention is made of Charles Stone's butcher's standing under the Bow. C. 12.

1649, Nov. 31 (sic). "This day Mr. Robert Coker desired that this Company would give him a price for the adding of two lives vnto his owne life, vpon the Chambers which he now holds from the Towne which are built ouer the Blindhouse and the Hall stayres." C. 12.

1661, May 31. "It is agreed that Mris. Martha Coker, widow, shall have the fee of the roomes over the Blindhouse at the fine and for the somme of twelve pounds, vpon consideration that shee pretends that there was money due to them for entertayning of Humes in time of the warrs, and pleading also their relation to Mris. Chub, a benefactor to the Towne." C. 15.

1661, June 14. "This day the Companie sealed unto Mris. Martha Coker a deed of the fee of the chamber over the Blindhouse and the staires out of the Churchyard." C. 15. See B. 35a, and post, p. 708.

1747-8, March 23. "It is agreed that the messuage or tenement, called the Bow, within this Borough, lately fallen into the Corporacion's hands by the death of James Bilson, be taken down at the expence of the Corporacion, and for that purpose it is agreed that Elizabeth Hutchins, widow, the present tenant thereof, shall forthwith have notice to quit possession of it on or before the 24th day of June next." C. 27.

In a lease of 25th May, 1761, are mentioned a butcher's shop and room over it, late the Blindhouse, in St. Peter's

parish, bounded on the north by the steps leading to the Guildhall, and on the south by Mr. George Arden's corner shop, and another butcher's shop, in the said parish, bounded on the north by John Pouncey's shop, and on the south by the steps leading to the Guildhall. B. 35a and B. 66.

La Northbern.

This burgage, which belonged to Walter Bouer and Sarah, his wife, was situated in Frerenlane, leading from the East Street, having on the north a burgage of the Master of St. John's. It was conveyed to William Portland in 1411 (208). It is also mentioned as a boundary in 207.

Cravellysbern.

This was situated in Durnegate, and formed the southern boundary of a vacant place bequeathed in 1431 by John Shydde to his wife Cristina (471).

It was doubtless so called from having been the property of Henry Crauel, who, by will in 1416, bequeathed a burgage on the west side of Durnelane, having a burgage of John Shydd's for its northern boundary (289).

La Stenynhouse.

This was a messuage conveyed in 1406 by Cristina, relict of John Godrigge, to William Hore of Bridport. It lay on the north side of West Street (136). It was again conveyed in 1428, by William Hore to trustees (422). It lay between tenements of Nicholas Pires or Pyrys (late John Dodell's) on the west, and Henry Coupere's on the east, and was probably a dyehouse for staining cloth.

Tanhous.

This was the property of William Ayssh, and bequeathed by him in 1410 to his wife in reversion after the death of William Tannere who then held it (262). That it was situated on the south side of Durnelane appears from 268, the will of Eleanor, wife of Robert Greynlef, alias Bakere, and formerly wife of William Ayssh.

Bernys.

In 1492 John Pascow, Rector of Warmwelle, grants to Walter Pascow two burgages on the east side of [South] Street bearing that name, *ubi plures arbores crescunt*, between the burgage of John Martyn on the south, and that of St. Mary in St. Peter's Church on the north. (544).

Wasys. Le Gurnard.

These were two burgages lying together on the south side of High West Street in the following order, from west to east: viz., Laurence Balerner's burgage, Le Gurnard, Wasys, John Williams's burgage, and bequeathed by the will of William Stone, sen., in 1542 (591).

Belamy's Bakehouse.

This was situated on the east side of "Alhalon Churche Lane," between a burgage of the King's, formerly the Abbot of Byndon's, on the north, and that of John Pynge's, formerly Margaret Boith's, on the south. In 1540 it consisted of two burgages, then said to have formerly borne the name of Belamy's bakehouse. In 1561-2 it was again conveyed, and, being held by bakers, was probably still put to this appropriate use.

Abbot of Abbotsbury.

Possessions of this Monastery are mentioned as boundaries of other properties lying on the east side of South Street, in Nos. 15, 81, 299, 560 and 561, on the west side of South Street in 181, 238 and 451, on the east side of North Street which leads towards Glydepath, in 151, and on the south side of East Street in 470, where a burgage is described as lying in the High Street called "Est trete," between a burgage of the Abbot of Abbotysbury on the west, and a lane extending to Durnegate on the east. In a later charter the same is called "the burgage of Roger Stourton and Agnes, his wife, late wife of Walter Eyre, and late of the Abbot and Convent of the dissolved monastery of Abbotisbury" (634).

They are also found on the south side of High [West] Street, opposite the Trinity Church, Nos. 22, 46, 145, 280, 578 and perhaps 517.

Abbot of Bindon.

A tenement was held by this Monastery on the east side of Durne lane (503) and (512). This is probably the burgage in Alhalon Lane mentioned in 600. To this may be added a tenement on the south side of High East Street (110, 385, 401, 436, 464, 471), a tenement on the south side of West Street (157, 363), a curtilage on the west side of South Street (212) ascribed in 28 to the Abbot of Milton, and a tenement there (258, 402).

A messuage with two curtilages adjacent in All Saints' parish, "lately belonging to the dissolved Monastery of Byndon," is mentioned in 654.

Abbot of Cerne.

John Syward, sen., in his will dated 23rd November, 1398, has these words: "I bequeath to the Abbot and Convent of Cerne, my state, right and term which I have in a messuage which I have newly built upon the soil of the Abbot and Convent in Dorchester, in which Robert Deueneshire and Geoffrey Mose now dwell, opposite the Market, to pray for my soul and the souls of my father and mother, according to the conscience of the Abbot and Convent." (41).

In the bounds of "La Pentys," which was also bequeathed by John Syward, it is stated to be situate in a certain corner opposite the corner of the Abbot of Cerne on the south side of the High Street (53). See also 165.

One of the witnesses to the charter of John Frampton of Caundell Mersshe, 12th December, 1479 (528), was Roger Rope, Abbot of Cerne. On reference to the list of the Abbots of Cerne in Hutchins' *Dorset* (Vol. iv., p. 28), it appears that Roger Bemynster, previously Prior, was licensed to be elected Abbot, 14th February, 1470. The present charter gives his paternal name, which seems otherwise unknown, Bemynster, being the name derived from his birthplace, by which he was known in religion.

Abbot of Milton.

Milton Abbey possessed, according to the charters, a curtilage on the west side of South Street (28),* and a garden near the field of West Walls (489), also on the west of South Street; a tenement on the west side of Frerenlane (129); and a tenement in All Saints' parish, between the burgage of the chantry of Dorchester on the west, and that of the Church of All Saints on the east, late belonging to the Monastery of Mylton, Dorset (613).

Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem at Mayne.

The Master or Prior of the Preceptory or Commandery of the Knights of St. John at Mayne, near Dorchester, held several tenements in the Town. They are described indifferently as belonging to the "Master of Mayne" or the "Prior of Mayne," or of "St. John of Mayne," the "Hospital of Mayne," or the "Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem at Mayne." They lay on the north side of East Street (5, 14, 94, 358, 545), on

the south side of East Street (115, 171, 175, 347, 624), and on the north side of West Street (220, 235, 406, 489).

No. 643 shews that a messuage and garden belonging to this Preceptory came into the hands of Thomas, Lord Seymor of Sudeley, who was attainted of high treason. They were granted by Robert Barbet, *alias* Aden, A.D. 1554.

The distinction between the Master of St. John of Mayne and the Master of St. John of Dorchester has already been pointed out.

Prior of Christ Church, Twynham.

A burgage belonging to this religious house was situated on the south side of a lane which leads from South Street towards la Durnegate, and is mentioned in 8, 25, 29, 388, 426.

Feoffees of the Parish Church of Netherbury.

A burgage belonging to these Feoffees, in Holy Trinity parish, situate in the south side of High West Street, is mentioned as a boundary in a charter (667) granted by Robert Corbyn, 12th February, 14 Elizabeth [1571-2], and previously in another charter of 20th May, 2 Elizabeth [1560] (665).

Among the Netherbury Charity muniments is a power of attorney from John Moustyr, clerk, to John Goldesmyth, of Dorchester, to deliver to Walter Bagge, clerk, and Walter Tracy, or one of them, and their heirs, possession in a burgage with curtilage on south side of West Street, Dorchester, between the tenement of Walter Gaylord on the west, and the tenement of Blessed Mary of Dorchester, on the east, Monday after Michaelmas, 8 Henry V. (A.D. 1420).

Also Robert More, Esq., Thomas Pokeswell, Esq., William Combe, Henry Salesbury, and William Belett grant to William Bugge of Dorchester and Alice, his wife, for life, a burgage on south side of West Street, Dorchester, 14th December, 15 Henry VII. (A.D. 1499). These deeds are printed in Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. vii., pp. 288 and 293.

Feoffees of the Parish Church of Warmwell.

A burgage belonging to these Feoffees, situate on the south side of Durnelane, is mentioned as a boundary in a charter (656), granted by Thomas Wynsor, 10th June, 3 Elizabeth [1561].

Cornhill.

This is mentioned as the situation of a house purchased in 1652 to serve as a new Parsonage House for the Rector of Holy Trinity Church. See p. 610. Cf. pp. 380—383.

Bowling Alley.

1635-6, Jan. 20. The inhabitants of Fordington, who have made of late a common trade way over the Bowling Alley with horses, carts and carriages, to be presented at the next Law day. C. 9.

1650-1, Feb. 12. Mention is made of a lease of Widow Woods' in the Bowling Alley. C. 12.

1779, May 7. The Bowling Alley Walk is let to Mr. Robert Willis and Mr. Richard Cozens, for a guinea a year from Lady day last. C. 27.

1832, Aug. 13. "It is highly desirable for the public convenience that the Corporation should endeavour to purchase the piece of land belonging to Mr. Pitman adjoining the Bowling Alley Walk, now advertised for sale in lots." (Aug. 21, Mr. Pitman would sell for £1,000, but the Corporation would not go beyond £800.)

1716, Feb. 26. The Mayor, etc., for £1. I. 0, and a rent of one shilling covenant with John Watts, jun., lime-burner, that for 99 years or for his life, and the lives of John Watts his son, and Anne Bennett, spinster, his servant, he shall enjoy the herbage of the West Walk, commonly called the Bowling Green, and the South Walk, all which walks are within the ditches of the Borough. John Watts undertaking to keep the trees in good order, without shrouding, lopping or topping any of them, and plant new trees in the room of those that decay, and keep the banks and fences in repair, or feed any cattle upon the walks that will injure or disorder the ground, or hinder any person from walking in the said walks. Signed, John Watts. Seal. Crest, a talbot tripping. B. 66.

The "Bowling Alley, or West Walls" occurs in the Survey of Lands of Chubb's Alms House. C. 39. See p. 702.

Sawpit Lane and Gallows Hill Lane.

1669, July 2. "Md. that ther being a great flod of water att a backe lane of this towne called the Sawpitt, the which was very dangerous for passengers and for children living there; itt was att Christ-tide last promised by Mathew Where to

take in the said water into his garden, vnder the rent of eight shillings a yeare, but prouided that he keepe the passage open that the water may have free passage in." C. 15.

Two acres of land bounded on north by Sawpit Lane, on south by Forthington Field, on east by the Town Lands. and on west by Glebe lands of Holy Trinity, were leased to Mary, Countess Dowager of Abingdon, 28th August, 1740. B. 66.

Two messuages, gardens and plot, and ground called Yeats' Close, in All Saints' parish, bounded on north by Sawpit Lane, on south by the walls of the Borough against Fordington Field, on east by part of Sawpit Lane, and on west by lands of Ann, Countess of Abingdon, were leased 20th March, 1783. B. 66. See also Lease of 25th May, 1750. B. 35a.

1784, Oct. 6. "At this Court [of Dorchester Quarter Sessions] was brought an Order (under the Hands and Seals of Edward Cozens, Mayor, and William Templeman, Richard Cozens and William Gundry, four of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said Borough) made at a special Sessions held in and for the said Borough the twelfth day of May, 1788, setting forth that a certain highway from the place called the Saw Pitt in the parish of All Saints in the Borough of Dorchester aforesaid to a Lane called Gallows Hill, containing in length 430 feet, and in breadth 24 feet, or thereabouts, should be disused and stopt up, and the land and soil thereof vested in Robert Stickland, gent., in lieu of a new highway (more commodious) through the lands of the said Robert Stickland, leading from an old highway there into a Lane called Durn Lane, in parish of All Saints aforesaid, containing 206 feet in length, and in breadth 22 feet, and in recompence and satisfaction of his the said Robert Stickland having taken down and removed a dwelling house and outhouses lately standing at the north end of the said new Highway, and for the land and soil through which the said new Highway is now made and passes, which land and soil of the said old Highway the said Robert Stickland covenanted to accept accordingly. which order was desired to be entered of Record; this Courte doth thereupon record the same, and the same is hereby recorded accordingly." C. 34.
1786, Aug. 14. "Mr. Robert Stickland, having now

proposed both to accommodate the Public as well as himself,

and also for the better improvement of the Corporation Lands and Revenues to open a communication from Durn Lane to the West Back Street (which is at present so blocked up as to be very inconvenient to the owners and occupiers of Land and Property there), and also to take in exchange in lieu of such new road the present old road from Gallows Hill Street to the west corner of the cottage (late Cooper's), and to hold to himself so much of the said old road in fee, when thus exchanged, as shall be the measurement of the said new road, and all the other part of the said new road and waste. there to be thrown into and become the lands of the Corporation And further also proposed to pull down the several cottages and buildings, now standing on the lands now held of the Corporation and hereinafter mentioned, and in lieu thereof to erect on such part of the said leasehold premises, as the said Mr. Stickland shall think proper, six cottages to be built with brick or stone and tiled, according to the plan now delivered in to the Corporation and signed by the said Mr. Stickland and the Corporation now present. Such proposal therefore is now approved of," etc. C. 27.

In a licence, 20th July, 1804, to assign a lease of a messuage in All Saints' parish, mention is made of the "Back Lane, heretofore leading to Gallows Hill and now into a street called Charles Street." B. 15. So in a lease, 8th November, 1819, of three new-built cottages, bounded on south "by a lane formerly leading to a place called Gallows Hill, but now to Charles Street." B. 65.

Bullstake.

1664, Sept. 23. A house in St. Peter's parish, "over against the Bulstake," is named. C. 15.

In a lease of 29th August, 1777, is mentioned a messuage in St. Peter's parish, "at the higher end of a street or place called the Bull Stake, bounded on west by the common Pound of the Borough, on north by a close called the Castle, and on south by a street called Bull Stake." B. 65.

The Pillory.

1632, Nov. 8. Henry Kippin, of Ringwood, was threatened with the punishment of the Pillory. C. 8. See p. 662.

1648, April 28. John Cardrow's standing, under the Pillory, is mentioned. C. 12.

Whitewell House.

1665, Nov. 3. Whitewell House in the parish of Holy Trinity occurs in C. 15.

Mount Whittle.

1666, Sept. 14. A house, bearing this name, was leased by the Company to William Facy, alias Scholler. C. 15.

The Thoroughfare.

A messuage in the High Street, parish of Holy Trinity, is described as bounded by the "Thorough Fair" on the west, in a lease of 30th September, 1721. B. 65. A messuage in Holy Trinity parish, on east side of a passage called the "Thorough Fair," was leased 11th July, 1755, and again 4th June, 1789. B. 65. A burgage in the "thoroughfare of Holy Trinity" is mentioned in C. 39. See p. 701.

The Pest House.

1704, April 28. The Pest House, in the parish of Holy Trinity, to be held and enjoyed by the parishioners thereof for seven years, at 50s. rent per annum. C. 7.

Presbyterian Meeting House.

1743, Feb. 6. A messuage on north side of Sheeplane, was bounded on east by the Presbyterian Meeting-house, and on north by the Castle. Lease B. 65. See also Lease of 7th July, 1783.

Quakers' Meeting.

This was situated in the parish of Holy Trinity and paid a rate of 6d. in 1737, being then in the possession of —Antrim, and in 1766 was ordered to be rated, being then held by—Oxford. See pp. 672, 691.

Trinity School.

1748, Aug. 1. A stable or fuel house is mentioned on south side of Pease Lane, in Holy Trinity parish, bounded on south by Churchyard and School house of the said parish. Lease B. 66.

The Pipe Kiln.

1748-9, Jan. 1. The messuage called the Pipekiln, situate at Gallows Hill, having fallen into the hands of the Corporation by the death of Christopher Foy, to be taken down. C. 27.

Engine House.

1777, Aug. 29. "A little room under the messuage called the Engine House" was leased at this date, *inter alia*, to Joseph, Lord Milton. B. 65.

The New Walks.

1744, March 30. "That Mr. Cooper, the present Town Steward, doth pay unto Mr. John Pitman ten guineas towards the railing out and compleating the New Walks." C. 27.

1803, June 30. "That the Walks belonging to the Town be repaired under the direction of Mr. Churchill, the Town Steward, and Mr. William Bower." C. 42a.

1817, Jan. 8. "That no tree or trees be cut or shrouded in the Walks round the Town without the consent and direction of the Corporation to be given in writing at a meeting for that purpose. C. 42a.

1829, June 29. "That no person be allowed to open any

1829, June 29. "That no person be allowed to open any door or other communication from any property or place into the Walks or either of them." C. 42a.

George Inn.

1620, April 30. A lease was granted to Margarett Chubb, wid., of three messuages, called the George, lying together in the parish of St. Peter's, on north side of High West Street, between the Church and Churchyard of St. Peter's on the east and the dwelling house of Richard Bushrode on the west. C. 14.

1766, July 22. In a lease of a corner shop in St. Peter's parish, on north side of High West Street, the boundaries are a tenement *formerly called* the George Inn on west, and St. Peter's Churchyard on north. This inn is frequently mentioned.

Queen's Arms.

1696, March 9. A messuage in Holy Trinity parish, on north side of High West Street, adjoining the Queen's Arms on the east, is mentioned in a lease of this date (B. 64), but the Corporation agreed to grant to William Bower, Esq., a lease of a dwelling house called the Queen's Arms, in Pease lane, 12th August, 1807. C. 42a.

Half Moon.

1743, Feb. 6. A messuage on north side of Sheeplane was bounded on west by William Pate's malthouse, on north by the Castle, and on east by the Half Moon. B. 65.

White Hart.

1753, March 29. In All Saints' Parish, bounded on west by the Common Gaol of the County of Dorset, on east by the Great River, and on south by High East Street. B. 65.

Green Dragon.

1754, April 5. A messuage in All Saints' parish was bounded on east by the backside leading to the Green Dragon, on north by part of the same, and on south by the Back Lane to Gallows Hill. B. 64.

Mermaid.

1757, Jan. 31. "The messuage, called the Mermaid," was situate on south side of High West Street.

Greyhound.

1759, Jan. 27. The passage to the Greyhound Inn is mentioned as the eastern boundary of a messuage in High South Street, St. Peter's parish.

Other inns are mentioned in the Burgage List, 1737. See post, p. 690, sq.

It will be unnecessary to carry this Introduction further, though it might have been extended without difficulty, and the Reader is now referred to the succeeding pages wherein he will find an opportunity provided for studying the life of the Borough from various points of view. A full account of the "Dorchester Domesday" is given at page 91.

The multitude of details which required attention has rendered the arrangement and classification of the materials no easy task. Nevertheless, the Editor ventures to express the hope that the result may be deemed satisfactory, and that the Calendar of Documents and the Index, to which he has devoted much time and close attention, will be found useful to those who may have occasion to consult them.

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CHARTERS AND OTHER MUNIMENTS.

In Dorchester, in the time of Edward the Confessor, were 172 houses, rated for ten hides, and two moneyers. There are now 88 houses, and 100 houses have been wholly destroyed, from the time of Hugh, the Sheriff, until now, etc.—Domesday, A.D. 1086.

(1337).

Precept by the King to the Sheriff of Dorset to enquire whether it would be to the King's damage to grant the Borough to the Burgesses.—28 March, 11 Edward III., with a copy of the Inquisition, taken by Hildebrand of London, the Sheriff.

The Jury found that it was not to the King's damage to grant to the Burgesses and their successors the said Borough with its liberties, free customs, and all other thing's regarding it, to fee farm for £20.

The Borough was worth £16 5s. od., viz., Rents of Assize 73 sh., Broken Assize of Bread and Beer 70 sh., Pleas and Perquisites of Courts, etc., 52 sh., Three Fairs at feasts of H. Trinity,

Nativity of St. John Baptist, and St. James, 20 sh., Three Markets weekly, viz. on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays, 57 sh., and Right of Weighing around the Borough, 53 sh. This right extended from Dorchester to La Ridedich beyond Wynterborne St. Martin, thence to the ash in the middle of Maydene Newtone, thence to Puttestable, thence to Sherborne on the Greyne, nigh the chapel of St. Thomas the Martyr, thence to Kingstake [Kingstag], thence to Haifordesbrigge, Blandfordesbrigge, Craufordesbrigge, and to the bridge of Stourminstre Marshal, thence to Wirgerede [Worgret], and thence by the bank of the Frome, on the north side, to Eastwordesford, to Frarenemayne and Dorchestre.—Inquisition taken on Sunday after the feast of St. Mark, II Edward III. (1337). A 30.*

This Confirmation of the Fee Farm of the Borough is an

mportant document, for in addition to the Confirmation he previous Grant, certain valuable privileges are concedent the Burgesses of the Borough had made it appear that the Grant made to them by Edward III. Was only expressed general terms, and in consequence they were compelled contribute with others in proportion to the amount of the possessions in all subventions and aids granted to the King the payment of the fee farm of the Borough.

By this means they were so reduced that they couscarcely sustain themselves.

The King is therefore pleased to grant to them and the successors to be quit of various tolls or other payments heolonio, pontagio, passagio, paagio, kayagio, ankeragi estagio, stallagio, cariagio, pauagio for all things conveyed l and or sea. The Burgesses are to have a Clerk of the mark to fulfil the usual duties of that official, and to have all fine edemptions and amercements, issues, penalties and forfeitur to their use. No Admiral or his Deputy for the time being summon, distrain, attach, take or otherwise disturb in person goods or chattels, any person within the said Borough.

The Burgesses are to have return and execution of a he King's writs and precepts concerning all things with he said Borough which ought there to be done, and all summor estreats and precepts of the exchequer, and the execution he same, except they affect the King and his heirs: and the Burgesses are also to have the levying of all the King's pend vithin the Borough, and they may depute their Bailiffs to mal these executions as often as required. No Escheator, Sherif Coroner or Bailiff, nor any servant of the King's may enter th Borough for any execution, unless in default of the said Bu resses and their successors. Lastly, the King grants for imself and his heirs that all personal actions, causes and con plaints within the Borough, which do not exceed the sum os., be impleaded before the Steward in his Court of the sai Borough, and further that they may appoint their own Corone vithin the Borough and two Constables.

This is a memorandum on a single sheet of paper, headed 'The grants & lib'ties by chr'es '' [charters]. It enumerates he several privileges granted or secured by Edward III. A° II° grant of the Borough), 27 Henry VIII., 2 Edward VI. and I Elizabeth, and adds "By prescripc'on iij other faires reerlie vizt., the moroe of the feast daie of the holie Trynitie, he feast day of St. John Baptist & St. James' day. The

This memorandum is endorsed "The lib'ties of the charter," and seems to have been drawn up previous to the Charter granted by James I.

XXVIII.

The Charter of James I., 26 June, 1610 (with portrait of the King and ornamental heading).—A. 25.

The Borough of Dorchester is held in ancient demesne, and the Burgesses and Inhabitants, both by charters and prescription, have possessed divers liberties and privileges; and the Bailiffs and Burgesses have petitioned that the Burgesses and Inhabitants be made a Body Corporate and Politic, by the name of the Bailiffs and Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester.

The King thereupon grants their request, with legal ability to hold land, tenements, etc., in fee and perpetuity, for term of years or otherwise, to plead and be impleaded and to have a Common Seal.

There shall be two Bailiffs, chosen from the Burgesses, of whom Henry Whittell and Richard Blachford, junr., shall be the first, to continue in office until the Monday after Michaelmas next ensuing; and fifteen Capital Burgesses and Councillors, to form a Common Council, thirteen of whom are to assist the Bailiffs in their office, and to hold office for life or good behaviour.

The first Capital Burgesses and Councillors are to be Henry Whittell and Richard Blachford aforesaid, Mathew Chubb, John Greene, John Yeat, John Spicer, James Golde, Oliver Hayne, John Golde, Richard Barker, William Miller, Nicholas Vawter, Joseph Eyres, John Parkins and William Whitwaye. The said Capital Burgesses and Councillors are to have power to fill vacancies caused by death or removal—the oath to be taken before a Bailiff; and to elect on the Monday after Michaelmas two of the said fifteen Burgesses to be Bailiffs for the year following, to be sworn before the Bailiffs, their

predecessors, and to fill vacancies caused through death removal. Persons, duly elected, and refusing to hold offi may be committed to the prison of the Borough until the submit to serve, and may be fined, and imprisoned until the fines be paid.

The Bailiffs and Burgesses shall have a Recorder, if first being Sir George Trenchard, senr., Knt.

The Bailiffs for the time being, and their predecess for one year after quitting office, and the Recorder, shall Justices of the Peace within the Borough.

The Bailiffs and their immediate predecessors and a Recorder, or three of them (of whom must be the two Bail in office and the Recorder, or two of them) shall have por to enquire into felonies, etc., within the Borough, as can done by Justices of the Peace elsewhere, but shall not proce to determination of murder or felony, or matters touch loss of life or members; but shall determine all other trespass etc., which belong to the office of Justice of the Peace.

No one of our Justices of Peace or labourers or Artific in the County shall intermeddle within the Borough.

The Bailiffs and Burgesses shall hold every three wee on Mondays, a Court of Record, before the Bailiffs and Recorder (or his sufficient deputy) or any two of them, complaints of debts, etc., not exceeding £10. The defenda to be attached by their bodies, or their goods and chatt found within the Borough, and to be committed to the Borouprison.

The Bailiffs and Capital Burgesses, in the Town I or other competent place assembled, shall have power make bye-laws (not repugnant to the laws of the realm) we penalties attached, for the government of the Bailiffs, B gesses and Inhabitants; shall have a prison within the Borou and two Serjeants-at-Mace, to execute processes and attupon the Bailiffs and carry before them, within the Borou gilt or silver maces, with the Arms of England, as they he before been used to do.

No one not a free Burgess or free Inhabitant shall exer any art, occupation or mistery, or use any shop or stat for sale, except only in the time of fairs and markets, wit the Borough, under pain of forfeiture, fine and imprisonment

The Bailiffs and Burgesses shall have to their own the goods and chattells of felons, fugitives, outlaws, e with the exception of the offences of high treason and munire; shall have Return and Execution of Briefs, etc., and possess all Liberties, Franchises, etc., already enjoyed, and all Charters and Letters Patent, rendering to the King and his successors the accustomed rents and services.

The Bailiffs and Burgesses may acquire lands and tenements not exceeding £40 in clear annual value, and have these Letters Patent, under the Great Seal, without fine or fee.

The Charter of Charles I.—22 September, 1629. A. 2

The Borough of Dorchester is held of the King in ancie demesne, and has enjoyed divers liberties by charters a prescription.

The Bailiffs and Burgesses have petitioned to be ma and confirmed to be a Body Corporate and Politic by t name of the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses of De chester, with the addition of certain liberties.

The King thereupon grants that the Borough of Dorchest shall be a Free Borough, and the Bailiffs, Burgesses a Inhabitants a Body Corporate and Politic, by the name afor said, with perpetual succession, capable of acquiring, holdi and demising lands, liberties, hereditaments, etc., in found goods and chattels, of pleading and being impleade etc., and shall have a Common Seal.

A Mayor shall be chosen from the more honest and discre Burgesses, two Bailiffs, six Aldermen, chosen from among t Burgesses, and six other Burgesses, similarly chosen, w together, to the number of fifteen, shall be termed the Capital Burgesses of the Borough, with power to elect so many freemen, dwelling or not dwelling within the Borough, as they please, to be Burgesses.

The Bailiffs, Aldermen and Capital Burgesses shall be a Common Council to assist the Mayor, with power to make bye-laws, with fines and imprisonment upon delinquents, not repugnant to the laws of England.

Francis Ashley, Knight, John Gould, Richard Blachford, John Perkins, William Whitwey, senr., Edmund Dashwood, William Joliff, Bernard Toup, Dennis Bond, John Hill, John Blachford, James Gould, William Whitwey, junr., William Derby, and Richard Savage, now inhabitants and freemen of the Borough, shall be the first fifteen Capital Burgesses.

John Perkins shall be Mayor, until the Monday after Michaelmas next, and for one year after, being first sworn before the present Bailiffs. William Joliff and William Derby shall be Bailiffs; John Gould, Richard Blachford, John Perkins, William Whitewey, senr., Edmund Dashwood and William Joliffe shall be the first Aldermen, for life or good behaviour, if resident, the said Bailiffs and Aldermen having been first sworn before the Mayor. The fifteen Capital Burgesses shall continue for life, unless removed for bad behaviour or non-residence. They shall assemble on the Monday after Michaelmas yearly, and elect one of the Capital Burgesses to be Mayor, (the Mayor, before executing his office, to be sworn before the last Mayor, or the Bailiffs and Capital Burgesses present) and two to be Bailiffs for one year (to be sworn before the Mayor before executing their office). On a vacancy occurring during the year of office another Capital Burgess shall be chosen for the residue of the term. The Mayor shall be removable for bad government, or other reasonable cause.

Similar provisions are made as to the Bailiffs, and Aldermen upon their death or removal from office and the Capital Burgesses.

Full power is given to the Mayor and Bailiffs, and their successors, to administer the oaths, as aforesaid, without further warrant.

If the persons elected refuse to hold office, they shall be liable to fine and imprisonment in the Prison of the Borough.

They shall have within the Borough a man learned in the law, as Recorder. Francis Ashley, Knight, Serjeantat-Law, shall be the first Recorder, and hold office for life, being first sworn before the Mayor. Subsequent Record shall be chosen by the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and ot Capital Burgesses, to hold office at their pleasure, being if sworn before the Mayor.

They shall also have a Common Clerk—William Der gentleman, to be the first—to hold office during pleas of the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Capital Burgesses, v shall elect the subsequent Clerks. The Clerk shall be sw before the Mayor.

A Court of Record shall be held every three weeks, Monday, before the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen, Record and the Common Clerk, or before two or more of them, of wh the Mayor and Recorder (or in his absence the Common Cle to be one, in which may be tried pleas and actions emerg within the jurisdiction of the Borough, not exceeding f with power of attachment by person or goods.

The Mayor, Recorder, the Mayor's last predecessor one year, the Bailiffs, and one Capital Burgess elected by Mayor and Capital Burgesses, shall be Justices of the Pewithin the Borough, and they or any three or more of the of whom the Mayor and Recorder to be two, shall have pow to enquire concerning felonies, etc., as County Justices has but not to determine treason, murder, or felony, or any mat touching the loss of life or members, but to hear and determine the offences which pertain to the office of Justice of the Pea

No one of our Justices of Peace or Labourers or Artific in the County of Dorset shall intermeddle within the lim of the Borough.

The aforesaid John Perkins, before executing the off of Justice of the Peace, shall be sworn before the Bailiffs.

All other Justices of the Peace shall be sworn before t Mayor.

There shall be a prison within the Borough; two S jeants-at-Mace, to execute processes and attend upon t Mayor, and carry before the Mayor within the Borough ϱ or silver maces, with the arms of England, as they have befoleen used to do.

No one, not a free Burgess or free Inhabitant, shall exerc any art, occupation or mistery, or use any shop or stati for sale, except only in the time of Fairs or Markets, within t Borough, under pain of forfeiture, fine and imprisonme

The Corporation shall have to their own use the got and chattells of felons, fugitives, outlaws, etc., with the

ception of offences of high treason and premunire, to have Return and Execution of Briefs, etc., and to have all tolls of corn brought for sale in the market, as accustomed.

All the Inhabitants of the Borough to be a Body Corporate and Politic, by the name of the Governor, Assistants, and Free Men of the Borough of Dorchester, with perpetual succession, capable of holding lands and tenements, goods and chattells, to plead and be impleaded, and to have a Common Seal.

A Governor of the Free Men of the Borough shall be chosen, and twenty-four Free Men or free inhabitants to be the Common Council of the Free Men of the Borough to assist the Governor.

The Governor, four assistants chosen by the Free Men from among the twenty-four assistants, and five other assistants chosen by the Mayor from among the Capital Burgesses, shall hold four Courts yearly, for the purpose of admitting persons to the liberty of the Borough and for treating of matters concerning the Free Men; and four other Courts yearly, to consult on matters concerning merchandise, with power of making bye-laws with penalties by way of fines and amercements (provided that in all the Courts as many Capital Burgesses be present as the Governor and other assistants), and have power of administering oaths in the said Courts and of examining upon oath.

All Free Men of the Borough, Justices of the Peace alone excepted, shall attend the Courts under pain of fines and amercements.

Questions which may arise in the execution of the premises shall be determined by the Mayor, Bailiffs and Capital Burgesses.

John Long, of Dorchester, shall be the first Governor, to continue in office till the Monday after Michaelmas, and to be sworn before the Mayor.

The Freemen shall assemble yearly on this day, and choose one of the Common Council of Freemen to be Governor for the ensuing year, to be sworn before the Mayor.

On the death of a Governor while in office, another shall be chosen for the remainder of the term.

The first twenty-four of the Common Council shall be Simon Hasselbury, Joseph Patie, Robert Coker, William Perkins, John Coke, John Long, Henry Derby, Mathew Butler, Joseph Vnderwood, Edward Dashwood, Richard Williams, Henry Maber, Richard Burye, Thomas Whitle, Thomas Blachford, John Dashwood, Thomas Bushrode, Josiah Tirrey, John Allombrig, Amias Martin, Henry Sims, Robert Napper,

John Stevens and George Munden, to be removable by Mayor, Bailiffs and Capital Burgesses.

On a vacancy, another Freeman of the Borough shall chosen by the Mayor, Bailiffs and Capital Burgesses.

The Governor and Assistants may elect a Clerk, a Receione or two Bedels, and other inferior officers.

Ratification to the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burger of previously existing liberties, lands, etc., and of all Charand Letters Patents, and all markets and fairs, etc.

They shall render to the King and his successors accustomed rents and services.

Such his demaund is conceived bee both vniust and vnreasonable, yet it is thought fitt, as the same Charter be delinered vnder the broad seale v John Conduit to bee brought downe by the Monday at Michaelmas next, that he be paid more 40 h, and for the moto bee raised for the presente for the expedition, it is agre that there shall bee lent these somes following by the pers vnder named," viz.:

This is a bundle of Acquittances to the Burgesses of Dorchester for the annual payment of £20, their fee farm rent, " pro hospicio domini Regis," from Michaelmas to Michaelmas, payable half-yearly. There are fifty-one of these documents, beginning I Mary. For the reign of Elizabeth the following years are extant, viz., 15, 17, 22, 23, 28, 31, 35, 36, 38, 39, 41, 42, 43, 44; of James I., 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 10-22 inclusive; of Charles I., 1-17 inclusive. Three years, 18, 19, 20 Charles I. (1643-4-5) were respited. The last acquittance is for 23 Charles I. (1648) for £54, part of £60 due for the past three years to Michaelmas, 1648, paid to Thos. Fauconberge, Esq., Receiver General within the Receipt of the Exchequer. This is endorsed, "The 'Quietus est Dorchester,' for 3 yeares ended att Mich'mas, 1648. Mr. Bushrod, Mr. Whiteway & Mr. Blachford Mayors. When this made there was hope of abatemt of 2 s p l p rat': but could not bee allowed, so it was pd Mich. 1649, wh Mr. Loders quiet' est. 3 yeres respected viz' 1643, 1644, 1645."

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THE DORCHESTER DOMESDAY BOOK.

The most remarkable among the Records belonging to the Corporation is its "Domesday Book." This is a thick square volume of 181 parchment leaves (each measuring 11 ins. deep by 14 ins. high), bound in stout oak boards, covered with stamped pigskin.

At the beginning are six fly leaves of paper, followed by two blank leaves of parchment, To these immediately succeed seven (numbered) leaves of parchment, with writing, and an eighth blank and unnumbered. These seven leaves contain: (I) The bye-laws sanctioned by the Court of the town, on Monday next after Michaelmas, 2 Henry V., 1414. (2) A statement of the reason of the institution of this book. (3) The custom as to actions to be brought in the Court of the town, presented at a View of Frank Pledge, 2 October, 26 Henry VI., 1447. (4) Sixteen enrolments of the reign of Henry VIII., entered here out of their natural order. The analyses of these documents have been placed in their proper position later on.

After the eighth and blank leaf the numbering of the leaves begins anew, commencing with enrolments made while Robert Sutton and John Blount held the office of Bailiff, 18 Richard II., 1394-5. This numbering is correctly made until the ninety-first leaf is reached, which, by mistake, is numbered 90. Another mistake is made through ten being dropped in the reckoning, by which what would otherwise have been 97 becomes 87.

A third mistake is occasioned by the verso of fol. 104 being numbered 105, as though it were a distinct leaf. In this way one of the previous errors is neutralized, the numbering being now ten behind what it ought to be.

Once more, a fourth deviation is made by the scribe, which may be an intentional rectification of the former miscount. Ten leaves, beginning with 109, are numbered on the

recto and verso as pages, and as soon as this new paginat coincides with the actual number of leaves, it ceases, ε henceforth the numbering of the folios is renewed, this ti correctly. The last seven leaves are unnumbered.

The book thus comprises (in addition to the six blapaper fly-leaves) 2 blank leaves, 7 with writing, 1 blapand 171 to the end of the volume, in all 181, and of parchme

That the book is not in its original condition may be so (1) From the worn and tender state of the first numbered for of the first series of leaves, containing the Bye-laws, while two preceding parchment leaves are clean and strong. the rebinding, this, the outside leaf, was evidently protect by the insertion of the other leaves of stouter material. From the inner margins, on which the contents of some the enrolled documents are written, being in several instant bound in and partly concealed from view, e.g., fol. 38. From the outer edges in some cases being cut down, and p of the writing shorn off, e.g., fols. 76, 104.

The present binding, which is rudely tooled, has on excover four corner pieces and one centre piece of brass, and I had a pair of clasps, or rather buckles, now removed. It not earlier than the Tudor period. The back has been rough repaired since the rebinding.

This book is called "Domesday," and is so termed the Bye-laws of 2 Henry V., 1414: "Fiat etiam commi registrum ad certificandum de tenementis in burgo nos venditis... Et ille qui hoc habeat necesse, et morabitur in Burgum nostrum, dabit... clerico pro scriptura in Domeso tres denarios."

"Let there also be made a Common Register to cert concerning tenements sold in our Borough . . . And he w may have this need, and shall sojourn within our Boroughall give . . . to the clerk for writing in Domesday th pence."

It is also referred to under this name in an Enrolme No. 521, where Robert Syred, of London, mercer, stat "And for as moche that it shall be known that this is Wille and Dede y have procured hit to be enrolled in Kynges towne and borugh of Dorchestre yn a boke there this called Domesday." 22 December, 19 Edward IV., 147

The name also occurs in Nos. 698 (12 Charles II., 166 700 (31 Charles II., 1679), and 701 (13 William III., 170 which are records of elections of High Stewards of the Borot

at those dates, the fact of the election being directed to be "enrolled in the Doomesday booke of the said Borough."

Two original deeds which have been preserved (B. 1a and B. 1b) are endorsed "Dorchestre Irrotulatur in Domesday ibidem folio lijmo." (No. 256).*

The purpose to be served by the institution of this volume is set forth in the memorandum entered on the second folio, which recites that insomuch as the charters, muniments and wills of the Burgesses of old time had been torn, lost or wilfully concealed, it is ordered that such deeds and wills, affecting the Borough, which henceforth shall come into the hands of the Bailiffs, shall be entered in this book. The registration of title, thus initiated, anticipates a reform for which the country, as a whole, still waits.

· On turning to the contents of the volume, it appears fully to bear out the purpose for which it was called into existence. It comprises (1) Charters for the conveyance of real property in Dorchester, together with such subsidiary documents as Releases and Ouitclaims, and Letters of Attorney for the nomination of persons to put the grantee or purchaser in full and peaceable possession. (2) Wills devising lands and tenements in Dorchester. These are generally given only so far as they relate to such property, though in some cases the entire will seems to have been registered. It is needless to add that this proof before the Bailiffs was in addition to, not in substitution for, the usual probate before the Archdeacon or other ecclesiastical authority. (3) In some cases the deeds enrolled relate to lands, etc., not situated in Dorchester, but were registered here by special request, as a security against loss. If Robert Syred, already mentioned, were a member of the Dorchester family of Syward, the entry of his deed would thus be readily accounted for.

The deeds enrolled are usually either genuine sales, or conveyances to trustees by way of settlement. For example, (No. 175) Matilda, widow of John Champion, conveys a tenement to John Claymond, clerk, and Richard Calabre, I July, 10 Henry IV., 1409, and they re-convey it (No. 178) to John Jos and Matilda his wife, at the Feast of Holy Cross (September 14) the same year, the lady apparently having contracted a second alliance in the meantime.

Again (No. 236), Robert Deveneshire grants a tenement

Sometimes the process is reversed, as in No. 151, wh John Barbour, alias Nicolas, and Beatrix his wife contheir tenement to Robert Bertlot, clerk, and Robert Bak 17th August, 8 Henry IV., 1407, and these grantees re-contit to John Barbour, alias Nicolas, alone, on the 17th of next month (No. 155).

In cases of this kind, where the wife was required to j in the conveyance with her husband, the salutary rule 1 down in one of the Bye-laws came into operation: "Also any one in our Borough shall have acquired any tenem in perpetuity, and his wife shall have been named in the char of feoffment, and afterwards it happen that they desire alienate to anyone the aforesaid tenement, let the ven himself at once produce his wife in full court before us and Bailiffs, and there let inquiry be made of the wife if it be her consent or no, and if it be found that she hath done to by her free and good will, no cause of coercion by her husbaintervening, then let that process be enrolled in the Comm Register, and the purchaser shall give by way of fine for hav recognisance, and for the seal of office, and for the clei writing, as before ordered."

A good instance of this may be seen in the charter m by John Shyrborn and Alice his wife (No. 445), which cludes these words, "Et ut verius cognosci poterit infutur quod donum et concessio predicta, ut prefertur, per me p dictam Aliciam sponte et mera voluntate mea facta sunt nullo modo per predictum maritum meum minata coart nec minis(?) preoppressa ad aliqua in dicta presenti ca contenta facienda, Ideo ego dicta Alicia ad meum special rogatum Sigillum officii Ballivorum ejusdem ville in fider testimonium omnium et singulorum in eadem carta predicontenta eidem carte apponi procuravi."

It should be noticed how frequently the services of local clergy were invoked in these conveyances for purpose settlement, showing the confidence the inhabitants of I chester had in those days in their parish priests and chapla

In some instances the grants of property were made way of mortgage, though this seems infrequent. An examp to be seen in No. 108, where the title of two messuages first made secure by a Release of I January, 4 Henry

1402-3, and then conveyed by way of mortgage on 20 January following (No. 109).

A much later instance (No. 692) is noticeable for the enormous return exacted for the loan of £100, 8 November, 1646. Stephen Moorecock, dyer, and Anne his wife mortgage their messuage in High East Street to Richard Bury, of Dorchester, merchant, for this sum, covenanting to pay him £16 per annum for six years, commencing 24 December that year, and £204 at Lady Day, 1653, i.e., interest at 16 per cent., and a return at the end of the term of double the capital borrowed. Perhaps the insecurity of the times may account for a transaction so usurious.

A frequent occasion for the sale of tenements arises out of the bequests of testators who devised their burgages to trustees to sell the same, and apply the "pence" thence arising to be devoted to pious uses, for the poor, or for the souls of the deceased, his immediate relations or ancestors, and all Christian souls.

Conveyances direct from the Bailiffs and Burgesses as a body are infrequent. Some occur in cases where, through failure of heirs, a tenement in the town has fallen into the hands of the Burgesses as possessors of the manor. For instance, they grant to John Fourde and his heirs a burgage on "the north side of Durnelane," which lately came into the hands of the Bailiffs by failure of heirs of a certain Thomas Drewe, 18 February, 4 Edward IV., 1464-5 (No. 500).

No. 547 is a grant to Thomas Hoskyns and Alice his wife of a burgage called Rakehay, which came into the King's hands by failure of the heirs of Henry Wooge, Monday after Michaelmas, 21 Edward IV., 1481. (See also No. 572.)

Other cases are those dealing with the property of the dissolved fraternity of St. Mary the Virgin, which came to the Burgesses by grant of Edward VI., I August, the second year of his reign, 1548.* Thus, in No. 627, an annuity lately belonging to this dissolved Fraternity was granted by the town to Owin Hayman, I October, 5 Edward VI., 1551, and a burgage and garden in South Street, which the Fraternity had also held, was sold to him, for £8, 17 June, I and 2 Philip and Mary, 1555 (No. 629).

The second class of documents enrolled in "Domesday"

were the wills of inhabitants and others, devising lands tenements in Dorchester. This practice is thus descri in the Bye-laws of 2 Henry V., but the custom of exhibit the wills before the Court was doubtless of an earlier ori "Also if any one has any tenement in our Borough, and s have willed to bequeath that tenement in his testament anyone, let him to whom that tenement shall have t bequeathed have therein no seisin before the testament s have been proved in full court before us and our Bailiffs, the seal of office have been affixed to the same testament and he, to whom that tenement shall have thus fallen, s give by way of fine for the probate of that testament and the seal of office, and for the clerk's writing, according to w has been said above."

The wills, as already has been stated, were also pro in due course before the ecclesiastical authority, and this sometimes expressly stated to have been the case. The after the will of Alice Chyryell, 1431, (No. 469), is add "Et hoc presens testamentum probatum est tam coram off domini Archidiaconi Dorset' quam coram Ballivis ville 1 dicte." See also the will of Alice Almer, of Pudelton, 1 (No. 494).

These wills were not usually registered in full in "Don day," but only so far as the property in Dorchester was c cerned. The first will, apparently complete, is that of Regin Jacob in 1423 (No. 383). Another is that of Thomas War Rector of Holy Trinity (No. 492), which is here given in f but an abstract of it in English will also be found in its proplace on a subsequent page.

Some instances occur of wives making wills in favour of their husbands, when they were possessed of tenements in their own right, e.g., when Agnes, wife of William Bastard, bequeaths to her husband her tenement in the south side of West Street, 1409 (No. 183), and when Margaret, wife of John Gryffyn, bequeaths to her husband her burgage in the lane leading from All Saints' Church towards la Durnegate, 12 June, 1417 (No. 300).

In another instance, Joan, wife of Thomas Faryngdon, bequeaths her burgage to William Peverell and Robert Crawford, probably for pious uses, II Henry IV., 1409-10 (No. 201).

In Nos. 358 and 359 occurs the registration of two wills made by one and the same testator.

There was exhibited to the Court on 2 March, 9 Henry V., 1421-2, the will of Walter Codmour, by which he bequeathed a tenement in East Street to Edith his wife and Thomas Budde, who were then put in possession of a moiety thereof, each.

But on 4 May, 10 Henry V., 1422, Adam Tyrell, son-inlaw of the deceased, produced the record of a nuncupative will of the deceased, dated 4 May, 1421, and of later date than the written will, by which a moiety of the tenement was gi to Edith, the testator's wife, and the other moiety to Ad Tyrell and Edith his wife, daughter of the testator. I record, which was confirmed by the seal of the official of Archdeacon of Dorset, in full chapter held at Westauord (W Stafford), 18 February, the same year, was duly enroll It is not said distinctly that livery of seisin was again giv

At the end of the will of John Pascowe, of Dorchest proved 15 Edward IV., 1475 (No. 567), is written an en in an irregular hand, very different from that of the clerk scrivener, and is probably a memorandum in the hand-writ

of his son, Sir John Pascowe, Rector of Warmwell: "Super predictum testamentum ego Johannes Pascw clericus et Rector ecclesie parochialis de Warmwell scripci quandam cartam de burgagiis meis situatis in villa Dorcestrie quam cartam ego predictus Johannes Pascw in curia publica coram ballivis et pluribus aliis honestis viris revoco et pro nichilo reputo tempore Roberti Adyn et Roberti Pycher ballivorum tunc temporis."

Bequests, other than those of lands or houses, when they happen to be registered, are of the usual character found in mediæval wills, small sums being given to the mother church of Sarum, to the incumbent of the parish, for tithes forgotten, and to the Fraternities in the town.

Joan Almer bequeaths in 1448 a silver spoon to the Church of Pudelton, and another to the Fraternity of the Holy Cross in the same Church (No. 494).

In some cases the dedications of churches (other than those of the Dorchester churches) are named. These are:

St. John Baptist, Cerne (457).

St. John Baptist, Evershot (471).

All Saints, Wyke Regis (482).

St. George, Fordington (486).

St. Mary, Pudelton (494).

All Saints, Wynterborne Waste [Monkton] (556).

Besides the documents of the classes already mentioned, several of a miscellaneous character occur, especially towards the end of the volume. Such are the bargain of sale of three

(No. 576); several compositions for toll on sale of corn, a to the town (Nos. 680, 681, 692-7); three releases of all actic etc., from the beginning of the world (Nos. 428, 689, 69 and appointments of High Stewards of the Borough (Nos. 700, 701).

It may be mentioned that all the documents in t volume, to No. 678, inclusive, are in Latin, and the rest English, the only exception being Syred's sale (No. 521), t Bonds (Nos. 596, 626), an Indenture (No. 639), and a Mer randum relative to a lease at Frierne Waddon (No. 649)

It should also be observed that the order in which deeds, etc., occur in the volume is not that of their executi but of their enrolment. In some cases a considerable inter elapsed between the former and the latter date, as in the c of the Arbitration (No. 576), which was settled 20 Novemb 32 Henry VI., 1453, but enrolled 27 Henry VIII., 1535 and the will of William Ayssh (No. 262) was registered a a charter granted by his widow (No. 222).

The system of registration continues with fair regular until and throughout the reign of Elizabeth, after which d the "Domesday" seems to have dropped out of popu favour, and was little used, only thirty-two enrolme occurring later than her reign, the last being 13 William I. 1701.

The names of witnesses to the Charters will furnish reader with a catalogue of Dorchester townsmen during fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. From the fact that witnesses usually comprise the two Bailiffs, it seems proba that the deeds were attested at a meeting of the to authorities.

The trades practised in Dorchester during the per covered by the "Domesday" to the end of the reign of Eli beth, so far as is disclosed by the enrolments, are as follow

Bye-laws of the Borough—2 Henry V., 1414. (Fol. i.)

At a Court held on Monday before Michaelmas, 14 before Thomas Wyke and William Forde, Bailiffs, and Jo Blount and John Gouldesmyth, Constables of Dorchest it was found by a Jury of twenty-four, as set forth in following brief abstract:—

1. No one shall expose carcases of animals within town, but immediately after their death by disease they she sent beyond the gates.

- 2. No Skinner shall beat skins or hides (?) in the street where human food may be sold.
- 3. No one shall cast manure in the street beyond a week without removal.
 - 4. None shall be chosen Bailiff out of turn.
- 5. Bailiffs shall render accounts before persons chosen for that purpose.
- 6. The Common Money shall be wholly delivered to the Bailiffs and placed in the Common Chest.
 - 7. The Bailiffs shall render account yearly.
- 8. Courtesy to any Justice or King's Minister, for business touching the Community, shall be given by the discretion of twelve discreet and lawful men.
- 9. There shall be a Common Register of tenements sold in the Borough, and a seal for the Bailiffs bearing in the midst a leopard crowned, and the legend Sigillum Ballivorum Dorcestrie, and for the use of this seal dwellers within the Borough shall pay 6d., and others as shall be agreed. The clerk shall have 3d. for writing in Domesday.
- 10. If a tenement be acquired by a man and his wife, she being named in the feoffment, and they desire to sell it, the wife's assent shall be ascertained in full Court.
- II. None shall have seisin of a tenement devised by will, until the will be proved and sealed in full Court.
- 12. Pledges taken by the Bailiffs for debt, and not redeemed within the year, shall be cried, and appraised by twelve men, and no pledges shall be absconded under penalty of 20 shillings.
- 13. Any execution, ordered in Court by the Bailiffs, shall at once be carried into effect by the Serjeants.
- 14. Bailiffs may distrain within and without the houses, except in the bedchamber of the husband and wife.
- 15. If this consideration be opposed by any, when he shall come into a similar mishap, the Bailiffs shall seal the door of the chamber, until a sufficient distress be delivered them, if there be any.
- 16. Every collection for the King's use shall be made by good and lawful men, nor levied until the names of the payers and the amount due from each be entered on a roll indented, and sealed in the middle with the seals of the collectors, and placed in the Common Chest. This shall be read at the Michaelmas Court before the collectors and the whole community, and, this notwithstanding, the collectors

shall render account, and any residue shall remain to the of the whole community. The collectors shall not be c of their contributions to the collection, but be paid for tl labour as the community think fit. Collectors disobey this order shall pay 100 shillings.

- 17. The same rule shall apply to collections by C stables for arming and charges of hobilers and bowmen a of men to guard the sea.
- 18. No bakers of white wheat bread shall make bal bread or bread of masline for sale.
- 19. The Bailiffs shall be paid 20 shillings per ann., their fees for sale of tenements and for their seal of off and toll of grain coming to market.
- 20. The Town Clerk shall be paid 6 sh. 8d. a year, a his fees.
 - 21. The Serjeants shall receive according to custom
- 22. All profits from the bailiwick, beyond the Kir rent and things aforesaid, shall remain to the use of the wl community.
- 23. The sum of any residue shall be enrolled bethe auditors with the names of the Bailiffs and date of year, sealed, and placed in the chest, which account stremain unerased, and the expenditure be entered by its
- 24. The Common Chest shall have three different loc the keys to be kept by three men chosen for the purpowho shall be changed every year.
- 25. The Common Money shall not be lent or delive to any for trading, except for the profit of the whole or munity.
- 26. No gutters shall be retained in any street as nuisance.
- 27. No one shall have a female wolf-dog (?) wander through the town under penalty of 40 pence.
- 28. No pig-keepers shall allow their pigs to go wit three . . . and the lane on the south side of Robert Bak tenement, under pain of losing the same pig.
- 29. No son or next heir of a Free Burgess, though shall come to his inheritance by his father's or kinsmideath, shall enter upon it [unless] by usual proclamat doubling his rent, &c. Nevertheless he shall not be a I Burgess, unless he has made a fine by pledge. (See Cha No. 39, following.)
 - 30. No Burgess or resident shall keep bullock or he

in the enclosure of the East and West Wallys, as in common, from Feb. 2nd to Sept. 8th, but during that time it shall be placed in fence. After Sept 8th it shall be common to all Burgesses and residents to Nov. 11th, for great beasts, and thenceforward to Feb. 2nd for sheep, &c., and for no great beast.

- 31. Two able and discreet men shall be chosen Bailiffs by twenty-four lawful men of the town on Monday after Michaelmas, to be then sworn, if present; if absent, on that day three weeks. On refusal, the defaulter shall lose £10 to the use of the town.
- 32. The Hockday Court shall be held on Monday, the 8th day after Easter.

These are the chief provisions enacted in these Bye-laws, but a full English version of them may be found in Hutchins' *History of Dorset*, 3rd edition, Vol. ii., pp. 362-4.

The loss, mutilation or concealment of deeds and wills, whereby the Burgesses in time past have granted or given their lands and tenements, having caused expense to some and disinheritance to many, it is ordered that in future copies and

The custom as to Actions brought in the Court of the Town, presented at a View of Frank Pledge, 2nd October, 26 Henry VI., 1447. (Fol. iii.)

At an Inquisition taken before John Pasco and John Golsmyth, Bailiffs, it was found by a Jury of twelve that if any Free Burgess shall implead any Burgess, tenant or resident of Dorchester in any plea in any court whatsoever other than the Court of the Town, which plea, action or demand could well and lawfully be determined in the latter, the person so doing shall pay the Bailiffs 100 shillings, and lose his freedom, and the Bailiffs may distrain him for the said sum.

If any other tenant or resident shall similarly offend, he shall pay the Bailiffs and community 20 shillings.

If any of the twelve Jurors shall reveal any matter of council held amongst them, he shall pay 40 shillings.

If any Burgess, tenant or resident shall not lawfully obey

the Bailiffs, he shall lose his freedom, and be chastised in prison; and the Bailiffs may distrain, and at the end of their year, may cause the distress, if not delivered, to be valued and sold.

This is an exemplification, 10th May, 8 Elizabeth [1566], of a decree in Chancery in the suit brought by William Cardrowe of Cerne, merchant, against Richard Sampforde, George Golde, and Symon Golde. Richard Sampforde, of Cerne. yeoman. was seised in fee of three closes of land, meadow and pasture, called Rodehill, in the parish of Minterne, and of a copse or "springe of woode," with the ground and soil thereof, about 4 acres, in the parish of Hermitage, and divers other lands, etc., under the will of Nicholas Sampforde, his father, for term of years, and to the use of Elizabeth and Mary, daughters of the said Nicholas, and for their education and maintenance. And he, being so seised, about 3 years past agreed to convey the premises to the complainant, William Cardrowe, for 100 marks, and received £56 13s. 4d. of that sum, the rest to be paid thereafter, and promised to make to the complainant a good and sufficient estate in the premises, in fee simple. This the defendant eventually refused to do, and also demised the premises to one, George Golde, "a man of great substance and wealthe and of no lesse frendes and power in the County," and to Simon Golde, his son, for 99 years, who have since cut down, etc., the hedges, quicksettes, and woods growing about the premises.

The judgment of the Court was against Sampforde, who was ordered, 28th November, last, before the feast of the Purification following, to convey to the complainant the premises in fee simple, discharged of the lease made to George and Symon Golde, (or else repay him the £56 13s. 4d., together with £20 towards his charges) and receive from him £10, the residue of the 100 marks, and the "obligation" he had made to the plaintiff. Should the defendant refuse to perform either alternative, the possession of the lands would be assigned to the complainant by decree of the Court. And as it appeared that the defendant refused, it is ordered by decree of the Court 6th February, 8 Elizabeth [1566], that the complainant, his heirs and assigns, shall enjoy the premises.

A commission is appointed to examine into and assess the waste and spoil done by the defendant and his assigns since 28th November last, which was alleged to have been great, the defendant to satisfy the plaintiff for the same. A. 22.



THE COMPANY OF FREEMEN OF THE BOROUGH OF DORCHESTER.

The Charter granted by James I. to the Borough of Dorchester, 26th June, 1610, provided that no person not being a free burgess or free inhabitant of the Borough should presume to exercise any art, occupation or mistery, or use any shop or station for sale therein, except in the time of fairs and markets, under pain of forfeiture, fine and imprisonment. The Bailiffs and Capital Burgesses were also given power to make Bye-laws for the due government of the inhabitants.

In accordance with these provisions of the Charter, the Bailiffs, Capital Burgesses and Common Council issued fourteen Bye-laws or Constitutions (B. 27) on 22nd October, 1621, which called into existence "The Company of Freemen of the Borough of Dorchester," consisting of all the freemen, with power to elect yearly a Governor, four Assistants, and a Receiver, the Governor and Assistants, when elected, to appoint a Clerk and Beadle; the Governor to call a Hall four times a year for the election of freemen, and the Governor, the four Assistants and five Capital Burgesses to have power to allow of, for Freemen, all the free inhabitants of the Borough, and their apprentices who have served their time, on payment of 12d, for a handicrafts man, and 2s, for every other person, and to admit "forreigners and strangers as they shall hold meete," on payment of a fine. No person not a free Burgess or free inhabitant shall exercise or work at any art, occupation, or mistery within the Borough under a penalty of 40s, a month. It is provided that the Freemen shall be liable to certain rates, taxes and fines, that a common purse and stock be kept by the Receiver, that apprentices be enrolled, that no inhabitant shall take a tenant who is not a freeman, or demise a building site to any other, or employ a journeyman or servant not approved by the Governing Body, or sell the goods of any foreigner which he has not lawfully bought.

These Constitutions are as follows (B. 27a):—

Constitutions of the Company of Freemen, made the 22nd October, 1621.

- I. Upon complaynt and desire of reformacion to the Bayliffs and Capitall Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset lately made by their neighbours Inhabitants of the same Borough of the manifold abuses and disorders dayly arising within the said Borough by the want of care to put in execucion his Majesties Royall Charter or Letters Patents lately graunted to the Bayliffs and Burgesses of the said Borough as well as in that parte thereof which concernes the prohibicion of all (except Freemen and their apprentices) to vse or exercise any arte occupacion or mistery or to sell or vtter any merchandize within the said Borough (but only in the tyme of Faires there) as alsoe for want of fitt ordinances and constitucions for the better government of the Inhabitants of the said Borough in poynt of trade, which the Bayliffs and Capitall Burgesses of this Borough have authority to make by vertue of the said Charter or Letters Patents. Wee the Bayliffs and major parte of the Capitall Burgesses and Common Counsell of the said Borough, vpon Consideracion of the premisses, assembling and meeting togither in the Towne hall of the said Borough on the two and twentith day of October A'no D'ni 1621, doe by vertue of the power vnto vs given by his Maiesties said Charter or Letters Patents with our generall consent constitute ordeyne make and establish these Lawes institucions ordinances and constitucions following to be for ever heerafter inviolably kept, and observed within the said Borough, viz.
- 2. IMPRIMIS, that all the Freemen of the said Borough shall from henceforth for ever bee called by the name of The Company of Freemen of the Borough of Dorchester, and that there shall bee for ever heerafter chosen yearly at the Towne Hall of the said Borough, on the next Munday after the Feast of St. Michaell Tharchangell by the major parte of Freemen of the said Borough (not being Capitall Burgesses) which shall bee present at such choice, one person that shall be Governor of the Company of Freemen of the said Borough and fower Assistants vnto him, and one Receiver for the same Company of meete and discreete Freemen of the said Borough (not being Capitall Burgesses there) whoe shall vndertake the saide places whervnto they shall bee soe chosen and shall

continewe in their places by the space of one whole yeare then next following, vpon payne of euery of them refusing, to forfeite the some of Forty shillings. And in case any of the saide Governor Assistants or Receiver shall dve in tyme of his or their office then an other Freeman or Freemen of the said Borough shall bee chosen in his or their place or places so dying in manner aforesaid, within one weeke after the death of any such person soe dying, whoe shall vndertake and execute the place or places where vnto he or they shall be chosen vntill a new officer or officers shall be chosen in his or their places vpon the payne aforesaid. And for the first Gouernor of the said company John Hill of the Borough aforesaid is elected and appoynted, and for the first iiii Assistants Robert Coker, Joseph Paty, John Conduit, and John Cooke are elected and appoynted, and for the first Receiver Morgan Havne is elected and appoynted.

- 3. ITEM, that the said Governor and his Fower Assistants shall chuse and have of fitt and discreete persons for such places one Clerke and one Beadle of the said company to doe and performe such things as to their places or offices shall appertayne.
- 4. ITEM, that the said Governor shall for ever heerafter (yf there bee cause) Fower tymes in the yeare, viz. every quarter once, and noe oftner, without extraordinary occasion, call a Hall, at which tymes and none other (except vpon vrgent cause) Freemen of the said Borough shall bee elected or allowed.
- 5. ITEM, that the said Governor and Fower Assistants togither with five of the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough (which shall be from tyme to tyme appointed by the then Bayliffs of the said Borough), or the major parte of them (soe as there be as many of the said Capitall Burgesses presente as of the said Governor and Assistants) shall at all tymes heerafter have power to allow of for Freemen, all Free Inhabitants of the said Borough, and all Free Mens apprentices of the said Borough which shall have served out their apprentishippes within this Borough for the Fyne of Twelve pence for every handicrafts man, and of two shillings for any other person, and admitt and infranchise for Freemen of the said Borough such other forreigners and strangers as they shall hold meete and for such Fynes as they shall agree of, the names of which Freemen with their Fynes shall be from tyme to tyme registred and recorded in a booke by the Clarke of

the Company within one weeke after such allowance or admittance.

- 6. ITEM, that noe person (which shall not bee a Free Burgesse or Free Inhabitant of the said Borough after one monethes warning vnto him given by the said Governor, or in his absence by any of the said fower Assistants, to desist or forbeare) shall at any time heerafter exercise any arte occupacion or mistery within the said Borough and the precincts of the same nor shall worke or labor in any arte occupacion or mistery within the Borough aforesaid and the precincts of the same, or shall have or vse any howse shop place or standing in the Borough aforesaid and the precincts of the same for the selling or vttering of any merchandize or any other thing there (except victuelles only) or for the exercising of any arte, occupacion or mistery in the Borough aforesaid (except only in the tymes of Faires and Marketts there) vpon paine to forfeite loose and pay to the hands of the said Governor of the said Company for the tyme being the somme of Forty shillings to be by him deliuered over to the Receiver of the said Company, for every moneth that any such person shall breake or disobey this Constitucion, to be recovered by distres and sale of the gooddes of every person soe offending or by any other course, as a Fyne on him heerby imposed for his contempt and disobedience in not fullfilling and performing his Maiestys graunt and Royall comaundement in this behalfe mencioned and expressed in the said Charter or Letters Patents.
- 7. ITEM, that the Governor of the said Company and his fower Assistants for the tyme being shall from tyme to tyme for ever heerafter endevor to recover and receive all such Fyne and Fines as shall be by any person or personnes forfeited by force of any of these Constitucions, and attend prosecute and defend all suits in Law and Complaynts which shall be comenced or prosecuted concerning the execucion of these presente Constitucions or follow any other fitt course for the vpholding and mayntayning of these presente Constitucions at the Costs of the Common purse of the said Company.
- 8. ITEM, that the Governor of the said Company and his fower Assistants for the tyme being togither with Five of the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough to bee from tyme to tyme named by the then presente Bayliffs or the greater parte of them (soe as there bee as many of the said Five Capitall Burgesses presente as of the said Governor and Assistants) shall for ever heerafter as they shall see occasion assesse

rate and tax all Freemen and Free Inhabitants of the said Borough (the then presente Bayliffs only excepted) at such reasonable rates and taxes as to them shall seeme meete towards defraying of such charges and expences and raising of such sommes as by the said Capitall Burgesses Governor and Assistants or the greater parte of them (wherof the said Governor to be one) shall be thought fitt to be defraied, expended and raised for the good and benefitt of the said Company of Freemen and the suppressing of forreigners. Or if the said Capitall Burgesses Governor and Assistants shall differ about any of the said rates, then the said presente Bayliffs shall decide such difference. And that every Freeman of the said Borough shall for ever heerafter within eight dayes after demaund to him made, satisfy and pay to the said Receiver all such somme and sommes of mony as he shall bee rated or taxed at, vpon payne to forfeite for every such offence three shillings and fower pence and three shillings and fower pence more for every moneth that such his rate shall be vnpaid after the end of the said eight dayes.

- o. ITEM, that the Governor of the said Company and his Fower Assistants for the tyme being or the greater parte of them togither with Five of the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough to be from tyme to tyme appoynted by the then Bayliffs of the said Borough or the major parte of them wherof the said Governor to be one, soe as there bee as many of the said Capitall Burgesses presente as of the said Governor and Assistants, shall and may for ever heerafter fyne or amerce every Freeman and Free Inhabitant of the said Borough that shall carry himselfe stubornely or otherwise misdemeane himselfe or shall refuse to observe such Orders for the goverment of the same Company and for the ordring of trade amongest the tradesmen of the said Borough as by the said Capitall Burgesses Governor and Assistants shall be thought fitt, soe as the same Fyne on any person for any such offence exceed not Tenne shillings, the same Orders being first allowed off and confirmed by the Bayliffs and Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough or by the greater parte of them.
- 10. ITEM, that there shall bee a common purse and stock for the said Company which shall be kept by the Receiver for the said Company for the tyme being and that the said Receiver shall collect, distreyne for, sew for, receive and gather such seuerall rates and taxes as shall be vpon the Freemen and Free Inhabitants of the said Borough sett and assessed,

and shall receive all Fynes and other monyes which shall bee forfeited by breach of any of these Constitucions and all other monyes which shall belong to the said Company, and shall out of the same deliver and pay all such sommes of mony as shall bee thought needfull by the Governor of the said Company and his said Assistants for the tyme being, or the major parte of them, wherof the said Governor to be one, for any cause or matter whatsoever for the good of the said Company, And shall within tenne dayes next after a new Receiver shall be chosen in his place, make his Accompt faire writen in a booke for that purpose before the Bayliffs and Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough and before the Governor of the said Company and his Fower Assistants which were in office that yeare that he was Receiver, or before as many of them as will be presente at such accompt, of all such sommes of mony as he hath or shall receive or disburse by vertue of his office of Receivershipp and pay over the Remaynder vpon his accompt to the next Receiver for the said Company within one weeke next after his Accompt soe made vpon payne to forfeite Five shillings: and Five shillings more for enery weeke after that he shall not make his accompt and deliver over the Remaynder as aforesaid.

- II. ITEM, that every person that shall bee bownd Apprentice to any Freeman within this Borough shall have his name registred by the Clerke of the said Company at or before the next Quarter calling of a Hall, after he shall bee soe bownd, in a faire booke to be provided for such purpose, vpon payne that every such Freeman shall forfeite Forty shillings, and such Apprentice his Freedom, and every such Apprentise to pay for the entry of his Apprentiship fower pence and noe more.
- Dorchester shall take into his howse or any parte therof any Tenant Inmate or vndertenant for their habitacion other then such as are or shall bee Freemen of the same Borough, nor shall graunt nor demise any parcell of grownd within the same Borough to any person that shall theron erect or build any messuage or dwelling howse but only to a Freeman of the said Borough (except the same person that is or shall bee soe taken in or to whome such grownd shall bee graunted or demised, bee first allowed of by the said Five Capitals Burgesses to be chosen as aforesaid, and by the said Governor and his Assistants or the maior parte of them).

- 13. ITEM, that noe Freeman or Free Inhabitant of the said Borough shall entertayne into his service any iorney man or servant (except apprentices) vnles the same iorney man or servant shall bee first approved of and allowed by the said Five Capitall Burgesses and by the said Governor and his Fower Assistants or the maior parte of them: vpon payne to forfeite for every such iorney man or servant that he shall soe entertayne contrary to this Constitucion the somme of six shillings and eight pence for every moneth that he shall soe entertayne any such iorney man or servant.
- 14. ITEM, that noe Freeman or Free Inhabitant of the said Borough shall directly or indirectly vtter or sell within the said Borough the goodes wares or merchandize of any forreigner ther then such as he hath himselfe lawfully bought, and is his owne proper goodds before such sale or vtterance vpon payne to forfeite for every tyme that he shall breake this Constitucion the summe of five powndes.

In testimony of allowance of these Constitucions we the Bailiffs and major parte of the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough have heervnto subscribed our names and set our Common Seale the day and yeare first above written.

Wee the Inhabitants Freemen of the Borough of Dorchester haue seene and pervsed the Constitucions abovesaid and doe heerby submitt our selves to performe and observe them and euery of them and for the breach of them or any of them doe consent and agree to pay and be lyable to the paines penaltyes and forfeitures therin conteyned in manner and forme therin expressed.

Here follow, for the rest of the skin of parchment, and on the back of it, a very large number of signatures of Freemen, closely written, some few being dated, the latest 1679. No seal is now attached to the document.

It will be seen that these Bye-laws were not made until the lapse of eleven years subsequent to the granting of the Charter. Perhaps the two following extracts from Minute Book C. 4 may record a circumstance which impressed upon the Corporation the need of definite rules and constitutions for the protection of the interests of the townsmen.

6th Nov., 1619. "Upon complaynt made vnto the Bayliffs and Burgesses of this Borough that one Thomas Ford is come to this Borough and heere intendeth to set vp a wholesale Trade for mercery wares for a Londoner, to the greate hindrance of the mercers within this Borough; the Bailiffs and Capitall Burgesses of the same Borough being assembled did hold it fitt and soe did agree that seeing they have a charter within this Borough to exclude all Forreiners that the said Thomas Ford and his master for whome he deales shall be kept out of this Borough for setting vp their said Trade here."

20th August, 1620. "The day and yeare abouseaid the company being called togither about a peticion preferred to ye Duke of Lenox by one Thomas Ford who hath lately set vp trade in this borough wherin he hath suggested that he was admitted leave and allowance of 7 of the cheifest magistrates and Justices of this towne, now all these of the Common Counsell of this borough whose names are heervnder written doe vtterly disavow that ever they gave consent to any admittance vnto him but have been very much against it and doe all agree that vsing his trade he shall bee expulsed this borough.

In pursuance of these Constitutions adopted the following year the first meeting of the governing body was held on 25th October, 1621. The minutes of this and subsequent meetings until 6th August, 11 Charles, 1635, are contained in a paper book with parchment cover (C. 6), entitled "A DAIE BOOKE FOR THE COMPANY OF FREEMEN OF THE BOROUGH OF DORCHESTER BEGON THE 25TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1621."

The first meeting is thus introduced: "Att the calling of a Hall the xxvth day of October, 1625 [? 1621], by the Governor of the Company of Freemen of the Borough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset before John Hill, Governor for this yeare, and before William Jolliff, Bernard Toupe and Diones Bond, three of the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough, and Robert Coker and Joseph Paty, two of the Assis-

tants of the said Gouvenor, these particulars vnder writen were concluded on."

The proceedings chiefly relate to the admission of freemen, warnings to non-freemen to discontinue the use of their trades, permission to employ journeymen, expulsion of "foreigners," warnings not to intermeddle with other trades, and so forth.

Some of the more interesting entries are as follow:—

7th November, 1621. James James, grocer, when warned to discontinue his trade, "replied to the Governor that he would take no warning at his hands."

23rd January, 1621-2. The beadle "distrayned ij sugar loaves and a barrell of soape of the goodds of James James, a forreignor, for exercising his trade within this Borough contrary to the Constitucion, which goods he ymediately sold to the said James James his owne servant for xxxs."

27th March, 1622. "It is agreed that from henceforth euery foreigner that shall be admitted a Freeman shall besids his Fyne pay to the Clerke for his inrollemt xijd., and to the Bedle vjd. and euery Freeman of the Borough To the Clerke for his inrollemt vjd, and to the Bedle iijd."

"Alsoe that towards the raising of a Stock to the common purse to mayntayne the privilege of the Company and defray such charge as the company shall have occasion or think fitt to disburse for the good and benefitt of the Company there shall be henceforth paid quarterlie to the Receiver, to be collected by the Bedle, by every Freeman that is not a handicrafts man iiijd., and by every free handicrafts man ijd."

22nd August, 1622. "Henry Goare, weaver, is now come to Towne and is in house with Nath. Bower. Thomas Bryne inioyned to remove Chafy, a forreigne Tailor, out of his howse."

30th August, 1622. "John Norrington, Sherman, having had distresse taken for contemptuous using his trade heere yet ordered to have his sheeres againe which were distreyned soe as he bring in an other pledge and yf he forbeare his trade after one moneth from henceforth he shall pay for his contempt but 1s."

"Md that by a warrant dated 21 Dec., 1621, beside xxxs., formerly levied by the same, Patrochus Cooke levied on James James, which was by a sugar loafe which was sold to his man for ixs."

"Also there was by a second warrant levied on the goodds of the same James James viz. 14li. 2 oz. of callicow pepper

meate at 19d. is jl, ijs. sold to Joseph Vnderwood. Warrant dated 5 Marcij, 1621, and by the same warrant levied more on his goods j sugar loafe cont' $10\frac{3}{4}li$. at 12d., j more of 10li. 90z., j of 8li., j more weighing $8\frac{3}{4}li$., j [l] xiiijs. xd.; sold to Richard Berrie."

18th March, 1623. Freemen forbidden to entertain any person, not a freeman, who shall work at any trade, unless servants or apprentices, on pain of 10s. a month.

Freemen who exercise any trade, etc., to which they have not been apprenticed, and which any other freemen of the Borough may lawfully use, to forfeit 40s. a month.

Action was frequently taken under these rules, e.g.:-

14th December, 1624. "Thomas Cossens and John Terrm complayned of for buying and selling of furres to the preiudice of Rob'te Short Furryer, doe now vndertake to vse that dealing no more within the Borough."

20th January, 1624-5. "Robert Roy complained of for buying of Skynes being not [h]is trade pretends his meanes is not sufficient to maintain himselfe and his family: but it is considered off by the next sitting."

"George Way being forewarned to desist selling of Callocowes within this Borough and having had iij monethes warning to desist, it was testified that after the end of the said iij monethes he hath since sold iij peeces of Callocoes to one Mary Harris 5° Januarij, 1624, it is this presente day ordered to pay xls. for every moneth he contineweth selling of callocoues or linnencloth within this borough from henceforth."

Circa, April, 1625. "It is ordered that xxl. of the mony now in purse shall be lent to John Long till Michaelmas and xl more till that tyme to Walter Huet vpon security, each of them with a sufficient suerty, and to pay for it such recompense according to their gaines by it as they in their conscience shall think reasonable."

30th June, 1625. "Lawrence Riton, Cutler, complained of by the Sadlers and by George Holliday for interloping into other mens trades, as namely, for buying and selling of raynes, bridles and spurres, nayles, locks & other things belonging to the trade of an Ironmonger, is this presente day ordered to desist the vse of the trade of an Ironmonger within this borough vntill further consideracion, and afterwardes he hath liberty given him a monethes tyme to dispose of Ironmonger wares."

15th September, 1625. "Lawrence Riton is allowed to

sell all sorts of nailes within this Borough as well as George Holliday."

"John Thomas, a Dutchman, complained against for vsing the trade of a Clockmaker within this Borough is ordered to departe this Towne by Munday next."

2nd September, 1625. "It is agreed that Fifty pownds or a lesse somme, as occasion shall require, shall bee taken out of the generall stock or purse of the Freemen of the said Borough for such vse as a Present for the Kings ma'tie or the right ho'ble the Lord Dukes Grace of Buk: as to the Bailiffs and maior parte of the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough shalbe thought fitt, and that such somme as shall bee soe taken out shall bee raised vp againe by a rate to bee made for a quarterly payment by all able Freemen of the same Borough, which rate shall contynew till the same mony shall bee againe fully made vp."

9th November, 1625. A meeting of the Governor of the Freemen and of the Capital Burgesses joyned unto him, and the Assistants of the Governor, ordered to be held the first Thursday of every month at I p.m., and a general meeting the first Thursday of every month next before every quarter day.

£40 to be lent to the Towne Brewhowse and delivered to Benjamyn Devenish (Dec. 8).

27th September, 1626. "This day Mr Bailiffs the said Governor and Capitall Burgesses and Assistants, fynding the great inconvenience that comes to this Borough and is like farther to come to the tradesmen of the same by the towensmen frequenting of faires and markets abroad in the Country, did move the company of Freemen now assembled at the Townshall vpon a generall warning to forbeare in tyme to come to goe forth to the faires & markets to sell any wares at any place within Forty miles of this Towne. Vnto which mocion all the said Freemen give their consent vnless Mr. Rich: Sauage, Mr. Roger Stevens, & Richard Ryall and Peter Gailerd thelder. And therefore in the presence and by the consent of the Bailiffs and major parte of the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough it is this presente day by the said Governor and Capitall Burgesses abouesaid and the said Governors Assistants agreed & ordered, That noe tradesman of this Borough shall at any tyme hereafter frequent or vse any market or faire to sell any wares at any place within Forty miles of this Borough vpon payne for every tyme that any

tradesman of this Borough shall infringe this order of xs.

Tenne shillings."

"It is above agreed that noe merchant adventurer of this Borough dealing on lyncloth shall sell any lynnen cloth at any tyme heerafter but only to mercers and lynnen drapers, vpon payne for euery tyme that any person shall breake the order Tenne shillings."

25th February, 1627-8. "The ho'ble Mr Densill Hollis, second sonne of the Erle of Clare, is admitted a freeman of the said Borough."

The renewing of the charter of the Borough naturally

engages the notice of the Company:-

of the Charter for the said Borough and the inlarging of the liberties and privileges of the Governor and Freemen of the said Borough there shall bee paid ynto that vse by the Receiver of the company of Freemen of the same Borough threescore pownds out of the Freemens mony already in purse; and wheras Mr Bailiff Whiteway hath vndertaken that the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough shall disburse thirty pownds more to the same vse which will in all make xch, now it is also further ordered that what more mony the said Charter shall cost shall bee raised and made up by a generall rate to bee made and a tax on all the Freemen of the said Borough (the Bailiffs and Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough only excepted)."

18th September, 1629. "It is agreed there shall be Twenty pounds of the Freemens mony paid to the Towne Stewards to be imployed towards the procuring of the Charter of incorporation for the Towne and the Freemen [which is so much lent to be repayd agayne]." These latter words are struck out.

On the next page follow "The names of the first xxiiij of the Common Counsell of the Freemen of the said Borough, as they are named in the Charter." "The first Governor since the Charter of 5 Caroli R's, Mr Iohn Long," and nine "assistants chosen."

The Freemen assembled in the Tounhall, 6th October, 1629, under the presidency of Mr. John Long, the Governor aforesaid, and chose as Assistants to the Governor, Mr. Richard Blachford, Mr. Will. Whiteway, sen., Mr. Dennis Bond, Mr. John Hill, Mr. Will: Derbie, Richard Bury, Joseph Patie, John Coker, Henrie Derbie.

The Governor and Assistants immediately after chose William Derbie to be Clerk, Henry Maber, Receiver, and John Conduit, Beadle. (C. 6.)

The grant of a new Charter to the Borough by Charles I., 22nd September, 1629, by which the inhabitants were created a Body Corporate with a Common Seal, necessitated the passing of some additional constitutions, to regulate the election of the Governor and his Assistants, the holding of the Courts, wearing of Gowns, appointment of a Receiver and the levying of a quarterly rate to be paid by all the Freemen, etc. These new ordinances were as follows (B. 27b):—

Additional Constitutions of the Company of Freemen, made the 22nd October, 1629.

Constitutions, Institucions and ordinances made established and agreed vpon the Thirteenth day of October, 1629, and in the Fift yeare of the reigne of our Soueraigne Lord Charles by the grace of God of England Scotland Fraunce and Ireland King, defender of the faith, &c., By John Longe, Governor of the Company of freemen of the Borough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset, and Will'm Derby, one of the Bailiffes of the said Borough, Richard Blachford, Will'm Whiteway thelder, Dennys Bond and John Hill, Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough, and Joseph Paty, John Coke, Henry Derby* and Richard Bury, all of them Assistants of the said Governor being assembled in the Towne Hall of the said Borough in manner and forme following vizt.

First that the Governor and his Assistants which are to be chosen out of the common counsell shall be for ever heerafter elected and chosen in manner following, viz., The names of the common counsell shall bee writen in two severall papers and two scrutinyes to be made for such choise at one and the same instant for expedicion of the busines, at either of which scrutinyes there shall be presente to see faire cariage therein one of the common counsell and one of the commons, and all the common counsell to give their voyces last of all, in the scrutiny, and if there be equall voyces for choise of

seuerall men either for Governor or Assistant then the presente Governor shall have a casting voyce to decide that difference.

Alsoe that the tymes for the keeping of the Fower generall Courts of the Governor and Assistants shall be as followeth, vizt., the first Thursday after New Yeares day, the first Thursday after the feast of Thanunciacion of the blessed Virgin Mary, the first Thursday after St. James' day, and the first Thursday before the feast of St. Michaell Tharchangell (except for speciall causes the said Governor and Assistants shall by the space of one weeke before any such day appoint the said Courts to be held vpon some other day and of such day shall cause notice to be given to the freemen of the said Borough). And that the Fower speciall or private Courts shall be held at such times as the Governor and his Assistants shall from tyme to tyme appoint.

ALSOE that the Governor shall keep the Eight Courts yearely at the appoynted tymes sub pena for every generall Court that he shall omit, xls., and of every speciall Court that he shall omit, xxs., and that the Assistants and Clerke of the Company shall be presente at such Courts from the beginning to the end of them sub pena for every man making default at any of the generall Courts, xs., and of any of the perticuler Courts, vs., and that every one of the common counsell shall be present at every general Court from the beginning to the end thereof vpon paine for every one of them making default, ijs. vjd., and that every freeman that shall be particularly warned in person by the Beadle of the company by a note vnder the Governors hand to come to any generall or particuler Court shall make his apparence there accordingly vpon paine for every one making default, for his first default, vs., and for his second default, xs., for his third default, xxs., and for his fowerth default, xls., and for his fift default to be disfranchised (except in all the cases aforesaid the party absentinge himselfe shall alledge such a reasonable excuse as shall be allowed of by the Governor & Assistants or the major parte of them).

ALSOE that the Governor and his Assistants of the common counsell shall every of them haue and make a decent gowne of such an Uniforme forme and fashion as by the Governor & the said Assistants or the maior parte of them shall be agreed on, And that the said Governor shall weare his gowne at every generall Court sub pena, xxs., and at every speciall Court, sub pena, xs., and that every of his said Assistants shall

weare his gowne at every generall Court sub pena, xs., and at every speciall Court sub pena, vs.

Alsoe that the Receivor of the said Company shall be chosen at the next speciall Court to be holden after the choise of the Governor and Assistants and at such speciall Court the old Receivor haueinge notice of the tyme of such speciall Court shall give his iust and true accompt to the said Governor and Assistants sub pena, xls., and of xls. more for every moneth after vntill he shall give vp such his accompt And that the old Receivor shall pay and deliver vp to the new Receivor all such mony securityes for mony and other thinges belonging to the Incorporacion of the Governor Assistants and freemen as he shall haue in his hands or wherewith he shall be charged by his said accompt. And that the accompt of the Receivor shall be entred into a Booke of accompt and subscribed by the said Governor and Assistants.

Also that the Receivor shall dispose of noe monyes or other thing belonginge to the said Incorporacion but by warrant vnder the hands of the Governor and Assistants for the tyme beinge or the maior parte of them whereof the Governor to be one *sub pena* to make good all such monyes and other thinges as he shall otherwise dispose of and that noe monyes be issued out of the Incorporacion purse for any other cause then for the mayntenance of the previledges of the Incorporacion but by the consent of the maior parte of the said common counsell.

ALSOE that the Receivor shall either himselfe collect or charge the Beadle to collect all such monyes as are to be collected for the said Incorporacion, and shall take accompt of the Beadle of all such monyes as shall be collected by the said Beadle and receive the same of him and bring it in vpon his accompt when he shall give vp his accompt.

ALSOE the Beadle shall collect the monyes appoynted by the Receivor to be collected and deliver in the same to the Receivor within one month after receipt thereof and returne the names to the Receivor of such as shall refuse vpon paine of expulcion.

Also that there shall be for ever heerafter a quarterly rate paid by all free men of the said Borough to the Receivor, vizt., by every tradesmen (except handy craftsmen), vjd., and by every handy craftsman, iiijd., and by every servant or iournyman, ijd. And the first quarterly payment to begin to be paid at the feast of St. John Baptist next.

ALSOE that the Governor and Assistants with the consent of the residew of the common counsell or the maior parte of them (whereof the Governor to be one) shall from tyme to tyme make such rates and levy monyes vpon all freemen of the said Borough as they shall thinke necessary for the good of the Incorporacion.

ALSOE that noe freeman or free Inhabitant of the said Borough shall at any tyme heerafter let set or demise any howse or shop or any parte of any howse or shop within this Borough to any person or persons that is not or shall not be a freeman or free inhabitant which shall there vse or exercise any art mistery or manuell occupacion nor shall nor will at any tyme permit or suffer any such person or persons to dwell and inhabit in his howse or shop within the Borough aforesaid as long as such person or persons shall vse or exercise any art, trade, mistery, or manuell occupacion, except on faire or market daies only vpon paine that every person breaking this constitucion shall forfeit and loose for every moneth that he shall so offend, xs. of lawfull mony of England.

This is signed by the persons named at the beginning of the Constitutions, except Henry Derby, and also by Symond Hussle, cler., Robert Coker, Mathew Butler, Thomas Whittell, Richard Williams, Henry Symes, Edw. Dashwood, Henry Maber, Josiah Terry.

A seal, at the side of the document, has disappeared.

To these Constitutions were added a series of Bye-laws without date, but referred to as of 13th October, 1629. (C. 6.)

- I. That the Governor and Assistants shall be thus chosen, vizt., the 24 names of the common counsell to be written in two papers and two screwtinies to be made; whereat to be presente one of the 24 and one of the commons, and in the screwtiny the common counsell to give their voyces last & the Governor to have a casting voyce.
- 2. For the tyme of the 4 generall Courts as shall be agreed vizt., the first Thursday after New Yeares day, the first Thursday after our Lady day, the first Thursday after St. James' Day and the first Thursday before Mich'mas day except it be agreed by the Governor and company adiourned to another day.
- 3. That the Governor shall keep 3 Courts [the "4" altered into "3"] yearely and appoint one speciall Court betwene every general Court sub pena for every speciall Court

omitted xxs., and xls. for the other and for the Assistants and Clerks absence for the speciall vs. and xs. for the other and for every of the common Counsell besides for absence at the generall Court ijs. vjd. without reasonable cause, and for every one warned by the Beadle to come, vs., and for the second offence double.

- 4. That the Governor alwaies at Courts to come to the Hall in a gowne suppena every generall Court xxs. and vs for speciall.
- 5. That the Assistants alwaies to have every of them Gownes and soe to come to the Hall and to provide them by the first generall Court paine xs., pen' vs. after for the generall ijs. vjd. for speciall Courts vniformes.
- 6. That the Receivor be chosen at the next private Court after the choise of the Governor and Assistants and then the old Receiver to give vp his accompt to be allowed & subscribed by the Governor and Assistants vpon paine of xs. and xls. more for every moneth that he shall neglect it.
- 7. That the Receivor shall have all monies delivered vnto him in purse and all bondes and securityes for money due to the company and this to be entred on the booke of accompt.
- 8. That the Receivor shall dispose of the monies by warrant vnder the hands of the Governor and Assistants whereof the Governor to be one or of the major parte of them, *pen*'.
- 9. That the Receivor shall charge the Beadle to collect all monies to be collected and take the accompt of the Beadles of the quarterly payment and other monies to be received by them.
- to. That the Beadle shall collect the monies appointed by the Receivor and deliuer in the mony collected every moneth to the Receivor and the names of such as shall refuse to pay *pen'* expulsion yet to answeare the mony.
- II. A quarterly rate of all free men, viz., all tradesmen except handicrafts men vjd. a quarter and all handy crafts men 4d. a quarter and all free men that are servants or enioyned ijd. qr.
- 12. That the Governor and Assistants with the consent of the residew of the 24 of the common counsell or the maior parte of them whereof the Governor to be one shall from tyme to tyme make levyes of such monyes as they shall thinke necessary for the good of the Incorporacion and the Governor & Assistants to make the rates vpon all free men.

The first Particular Court of the Governor, Assistants and Freemen was held on 21st October, 1629, and the first General Court on 7th January, 1629-30. The regulations at once became more strict.

21st October, 1629. "Vpon complaynt of the Shoomakers of this Burough that divers shoomakers that have no standings graunted vnto them by the Towne doe bring base ware to this market and sell the same in buy corners, to the great damage of the Shoomakers of the Burough: It is therefore ordered that such interloping shoomakers shall be prohibited to sell any ware in this Borough heerafter, as namely Alexander Bennet, John Paty and Edward Knight of Cerne Abbis."

"William Riall [tailor] having entertayned John Hulett a maried man who hath a wife and a child and likely to bee chargeable to the Towne, is now inioyned to put him off at the end of a fortnight next vpon payne of 6s. 8d. the moneth for all the tyme after that he shall contynue heer."

"Vpon complaynt of the haberdashers of hatts against the Feltmakers for selling felts by retaile: It is ordered that the Feltmakers of this borough shall not henceforth sell felts by retayle vpon payne for every one that shall break this order for every offence vs."

7th January, 1629-30. Richard Ryall is named "for his scoffing words against the Governor and Assistants and particularly he said to the Governor that he gave them sweete words but noe performance of it."

"Memorand', it is agreed that the rate agreed on shall stand to raise vp the mony for the Charter by the freemen being 120*li*. by our Lady day next."

Also that euery of the xxiiij shall have and procure Gownes by the next generall Court of the fashion of Mr. Governors pen' xs."

Ist March, 1629-30. "This day there was opened in the Hall publikely a fardell of goodds which was seised by the Beadles by warrant vnder the seale of the Governor and Assistants for being forreigne bought and forreigne sold which Mr. Josiah Cooth of Shirborne claymes as his owne gooddes, and vpon opening there was found a surplesse and cord wherewith ye fardle was made vp, six halfe peecs of dowlas N°. 41, and I qte peece of \(\frac{3}{4}\) dowlas N°. 4, 6 Reames of writing Pott paper market vpon with the pott and flower de Luce: and it is agreed that there it shall remayne in custody vntill it be ordered at the next Court, all the foresaid gooddes except

the sarplesse and coarde and the quarter of dowlas, bicause it is conceived it was bought of a Freeman, Mr James Gould. and therefore that surplesse and coard and quarter peece of cloath is ordered to be deliuered back to Mr. Josiah Cooth."

Thursday after the Annunciation, 1630. "John Rasker for his sawcy caryage to the Governor and Assistants in open Court saying That his estate was advanced by some of the Company and rated to mischeife him and afterwards particularized Mr Joseph Paty, and for this contemptuous cariage is fined xs.

2nd June, 1630. "John Colefox, feltmaker, for his contempt in not appearing at the last generall Court being iij tymes sent for was fined at vs. and a warrant is now made to distrayne him for the same. Vpon which warrant a felt hat was distrayned, and Henry Symes tooke the band for 5s."

29th July, 1630. "Henry Baily, alias Brownsey, being noe freeman but complayned of for vsing the trade of a Sherman in the Towne is warned to desist vpon payne for euery moneth he shall offend heerin xls., but it is permitted to him to worke on the keepers worke only in the prison."

An important step for the better regulation of the tradesmen within the Borough was taken at a Special Court of the Governor, Assistants and Freemen, 24th September, 1630:

"It is agreed by the Court: That the Tradesmen and Handicraftesmen of this Borough shall be divided into five seuerall companies as they are heereafter writen, viz.:

"It is agreed that there shall bee a Warden chosen yearely of every of the said Five Companies for that Company with whome he is chosen and ranked out of any of the Freemen except the Capitall Burgesses and except the presente Governor and Assistants."

On 21st October, 1630, before the Governor and Assistants the following Wardens were chosen for the Five Companies, viz., I, Mr. Henry Derby; 2, Mr. Joseph Paty; 3, Mr. Robert Coker; 4, Mathew Bonger; 5, Robert Laurence, and the following order was made-

"It is also agreed on by the Governor and Assistants aforesaid at the meeting aforesaid That the said wardens shall give their attendance at every of the Governor's Court held this whole yeere. And that they shall enquire of all oppressions and abuses in tradeing within the compasse of their Warde either by Forraigners or by Freemen, and that they receive all just informacions of wronges done in this kinde to anie of their Wards and do informe the same: and d' dr [deliver] the same in writeing to the Governor at every of the next Courtes holden after knowledge or informacion received or had of anie oppressions or abuses aforesaid and do prosecute the said informacions vntill the same be reformed as farre forth as it may be."

4th November, 1630. "It is agreed that the Governor and all his Assistants as well of the Capitall Burgesses as of the Common Counsell shall come to the next generall Court in their gownes vpon paine to haue the penalty in the Constitucion levied without any remission."

7th January, 1630-I. "Clothworkers. It is agreed that Henry Bridges being noe freeman shall keep but iij apprentizes and one iourny man, and James Dennys being noe freeman shall keep but one iourny man and one apprentice till the next Court vpon payne never to [be] admitted freeman, and the clothiers are desired to consider against the next Court whether it will be fitt to admit the said Bridges and Dennys, or either of them, and then it shall be peremptorily concluded for or against them." [They were not admitted.]

16th June, 1631. "Upon long debating of the difference betwene the glovers of the Towne, viz., John Baylam, Hugh Buckland, John Bartlet and William Banks, and Richard Gurd, Poyntemaker. That whereas the said Richard hath heeretofore and to this tyme intruded on the glovers trade by selling of gloves, and the said glovers have complayned for the same, It is now by the consent and agreement of each side ordered, That the said glovers shall thes day give to the said Richard Gurd money for all his gloves and glovers ware which he now hath at the price that the said Richard Gurd paid for the same, And that the said Richard Gurd shall not henceforth vse or exercise any part of the trade or a glover or seller of gloves within thes Borough, or of any made ware with leather, except poynts and whole skyns to sell at whole sale or by retaile."

21st September, 1631. The quarterly payments for the benefit of the Company, ordered to be paid, 13th October, 1629, at the rate of 6d. for every tradesman, not a handicraftsman, 3d. for every handicraftsman, 2d. for every servant or journeyman, are now reduced one half.

8th March, 1631-2. "Whereas it is formerly ordered by a Constitution that the Governor and his Assistants should make vniforme gownes and weare them at the Courts, which Constitucion hath hitherto ben by most men neglected; Vpon a thorough debate this day by the Governor, Assistants and Common Counsell present, it is agreed that all former neclects in that respect shall bee passed by. But that for all tymes to come after the next generall Court the said Constitucion shall bee inviolably observed, and the forme and color of those gownes are agreed on, viz., to bee of a sad russet and the facing to bee of velvet and the fashion to bee such as the now Governor's gowne is. Yet bicause Mr. Coke and Mr. Berry haue provided gownes of other formes they are not by thes order to bee bownd to alter them."

13th December, 1632. "William Bampfeild whoe is newly come to this Towne, and hath set vp the trade or art of a barber, is inioyned to desist upon paine of 40s. for every moneth that he shall vse his trade heere."

13th September, 1633. "It is agreed that the forme of the Gownes wherein the Governor and Assistants of the Common Counsell shall come to the Courtes shall bee of a sad color and faced with ffurre, And that they shall come to the Courts enery of them in their gownes at enery Court henceforth according to the Constitucion vnder seale vpon paines in the Constitucion."

"It is agreed vpon by Mr Governor and his Assistants of the Common Counsell whose names are subscribed that from henceforth euery Governor shall once in the yeare, viz. on the day of his last Court, entertaine all the Assistants and Common Counsell at a dynner, and thee meeting at dynner at the Inne to cease from henceforth."

26th September, 1633. John Balam fined 5s. for using contemptuous words against the Governor and Assistants, saying that "he was ledd along like a calfe by the eare."

27th March, 1634. "Upon the mocion of Mr William Derby, one of the Assistants of the Governor, it is agreed that Christofer Derby, gent., shall have liberty to take his sonne

Wm Derby his mercers shopp heere in Dorchester, and by himselfe and his servants keep that mercers shopp and sell mercery wares only in Dorchester for two yeares from Easter next for the Fyne of xls."

roth April, 1634. "John Elford, Tallow Chaundler, of Chetnole, desiring to be admitted a Freeman and to vse his trade heere by his children and servants, but refuseth to come to thes Toune to inhabit here constantly as a Townesman Mr. Governour and iij of his Assistants did consent there vnto and iiij of the Assistants dissented, and therefore it is referred to Mr. Maior and Capital Burgesses to decide the difference." [He was admitted.]

September, 1634. "It is agreed that the Grand Jury chamber with the consent of Mr. Maior and his brethren shall bee fitted vp for a Court howse for Mr. Governor and his Assistants, and the Shirehall paved with freestone betwene Court barre and barre at the charge of the Common purse of the Governor, Assistants and Freemen for a common walke for the Townesmen of this Borough."

21st May, 11 Charles [1635]. A pewter bason, 3 small pewter pottingers, a brasse chafer, a gilded case with barber's instruments, "prized at xviijs.," taken by distress from William Bampfeild, for using the trade of a barber, not being a freeman.

6th August, II Charles [1635]. "Thomas Hiatt, Christofer Way. It is ordered that they being Assistants of the Governor, coming to Court without their gownes thes day, shall be distrayned for xs. a peece according to the constitucion."

Two other notes are worth extracting from another Minute Book (C. 12):—

and November, 1655. "It was ordered & agreed that leave bee granted to John Moon of Pudletowne, scrivener, to come to this towne freely without any interruption from this Company, and to exercise his faculty in writing and teaching to write all such youths and others which shall bee willing to bee taught."

17th February, 1649-50. "This day one John Wood of Charmister, Labourer, was questioned for intending to liue in this Towne, which he denyeth, and promiseth to leave the Towne whether he marryeth the mayd with whome he is in league or no."

"THE RECEUERS BOOKE FOR THE COMPANY OF FREEMEN MADE YE XXTH OF JANUARY, 1652." (C. 14a.)

This is a book of receipts and expenditure of the Company of Freemen, beginning 20th January, 1652 (for years 1646-99), and ending 4th February, 1716.* Forty-seven leaves are occupied, being less than half the book. At the other end one page contains four receipts for payments of salaries, etc., 1672-3.

The accounts contain very little of interest. The receipts relate to moneys taken from persons admitted Freemen, with an occasional fine, the expenditure to the payment of salaries to the Clerk, £2, the two Sergeants, £1 each, and the Beadle, 5 shillings. The sums dealt with are therefore small.

The Minute Book (C. 23) is a folio paper volume of many leaves, bound in limp parchment, and bearing on the cover the words, "The Borough of Dorchester, A° 1698." It begins with the Freeman's Oath, after which commence the minutes of the Courts of Governor, Assistants and Freemen of the Borough, 5th January, 1698-9, to 12th May, 1718, but one or two years are unrecorded. Rather less than half the book is occupied, the remainder being blank. Beyond the lists of the Assistants, Common Council, and five Wardens of the Trading Companies, the admission of Freemen, and enrolment of Apprentices, there is little to excite remark. It was the custom to elect the retiring Governor to the office of Receiver. In several cases fines are inflicted for trading without admission to the freedom, and for neglect of enrolment of apprentices. Robert Loder acts as Clerk to the Company till 19th November, 1711, when his place is taken by Robert Colson.

This list, which is not perfect, is compiled from Minute Books C. 7, C. 9, C. 14a, C. 23, C. 27, C. 28, and from one certificate of election, 1749 (B. 49), and five others, 1766-1824 (B. 50). THE FREEMAN'S OATH.

Dorsett. Borough of Dorchester. "You shall sweare that you shall be a good and true Subject to our Soveraigne Lord King William the Third his Heires and Successors and as long as you shall continue a Freeman of this Borough: You shall be obedient to the authority established in this Borough, the Franchises and Customes thereof You shall mainteine and this Borough keepe harmless in that that in you is: You shall be contributory to all manner of taxes and Contribucions which shall be reasonably imposed on you by the Governor and Assistants for the good of the Borough bearing your parte: You shall collour no Forreigners' goods vnder or in your name whereby the Towne might or may loose their advantages: You shall know noe Forreigner to buy or sell any wares or merchandize with any other Forreigner except in Faires or Marketts within this Towne or the Franchises thereof, but you shall warne the Governor thereof or one of his Assistants: You shall take noe Apprentice for lesse than seaven yeares without fraud or deceite, and within the first yeare you shall cause such an Apprentice to be inrolled, or else pay such Fine as shall be reasonably imposed upon you for omitting the same: All these Points and Articles you shall well and truly keepe as neere as God shall give you grace. Soe helpe you God." C. 23.

In course of time the Freeman's oath was reduced to a much smaller compass, and appears on the fly-leaf of C. 28 in the following form:—"You shall swear that you will as a Freeman of this Borough strictly observe and keep the Laws, Liberties, and Customs of this Borough as far as in you lye. So help you God,"

SEALS USED ON ADMISSION OF FREEMEN.

The seals used on the admission of Freemen from 4th October, 1734, to 8th February, 1768, are circular, 1.05 inch in diameter, bearing the arms of Dorchester, with the legend SIG: MAIORIS. DE. DORCHESTER \(\frac{1}{2} \)

N.B.—In the royal arms in the gateway of the Castle on the shield, the first grand quarter is I and 4, France; 2 and 3, England.

Beginning with 2nd October, 1780, a larger and different seal is used, viz., 1.7 inch in diameter, with the arms of Dorchester, but the legend runs SIG. GVB. ASSIST. ET. LIBER. HOMINUM. DE. DORCHESTER.

The engraver of this seal miscalculated the space at his disposal, and hence had to run together the "h" and "e," and the "t" and "e" in the name of Dorchester, and has scarcely left room for the stop which follows it.

N.B.—In the royal shield contained in the Dorchester arms, the first and fourth quarters of the first grand quarter are *England*, the second and third, *France*. B. 50.

BURGESSES IN PARLIAMENT.

A list of Members representing Dorchester in Parliament will be found in Hutchins' *Dorset*, and elsewhere. The particulars here given are taken from the Borough papers, but cover but a small portion of the field.

1620, Dec. 13. "A choise was made by the Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester for Burgesses for the Parliament for the said Borough to bee held the xvjth day of January next these personnes, viz.:

Sr Francis Ashley, Mr John Parkins." C. 4.

1639-40, January 24. "Thes day the most parte of the Company did declare their opynion that the fittest men to be chosen for Burgesses of the Parliament, if any writt come, to be Denzell Hollis, esqr, and Mr. Dennis Bond." C. 12.

"Answer to the Earle of Suffolk's letter for a Burgess for the Parliament.

Friday, 7th of February, 1639.

Right ho'ble: having received your letters by your servant, Mr. Salter, & having considered the contents of them, These are humbly to thank your Lo'p for your care for, and good intencions towards thes Towne therein mencioned, and according to your Lo'p's intimacions I shall in observance to your ho'ble mocion propose vnto the Townesmen heere your Lo'p's mynd when I shall have received his Mats writt for election of Burgesses for the Parliament. However by a constitucion of this Towne heertofore made none can bee chosen a Burgesse for a Parliament for vs, but one that shall bee a free Burgesse of the Borough, and how they can or will dispense with that Constitucion I cannot yet resolve your honor. And thus with remembrance of my due respect vnto your Lo'p I humbly take my leave, and shall ever remayne,

Your Lo'ps in all I may to be comaunded. Dorchester, February 9, 1639." C. 12.

1639-40, Feb. 29. "Mr. Maior propownding a question which Mr. Salter pressed Mr. Maior to give a resolute answeare

whether the Towne will choose Sr Dudley Carleton at the Erle of Suff. request for Burgesse of the Parliamt. The Company thought fitt that the best answ. was to give that Mr. Maior had talked with diuers of the Towne and Company and they resolve to choose Townesmen, and some refuse to declare their opinions of choice vntill the tyme of choise." C. 12.

1639-40. March 13. "This day mr. 1658-9, Jan. 7. "This day at Sheerhall were chosen Burgesses for the Parliament now at hand these two vnderwritten, namely,

1660, April 9. Monday. "This day there was a choyce of Burgesses for the Toune for the next Parliament at the Sheere hall, where were chosen Denzil Holles, esq., & John Whiteway.

At which time Mr. James Gould also was in nominacion, but came short by 11 voyces of the inhabitants in general, and by 10 voyces of Freeholders and freemen."

"At a publique Meeting of mr. Mayor and the Capital Burgesses and Common Council of this Borough, it was resolved and agreed vpon amongst them, that it was only the right of Freeholders and freemen of this Borough to give their voyces for the Election of Burgesses of Parliament. And that this hath bin the Custome of the Borough time out of mind, as by the Ancient men of the Towne was then affirmed.

1660-1, March 22. Original Letter from Thos. Foster, M.P.:-

"London, May 1st, 1765.

"Sir,—As 'tis the Duty and I think ought to be the Pleasure of every member of Parliament to give his Constituents the earlyest Intelligence possible of every great Transaction that is like to come before them, I shall be allways glad of their Sentiments which will guide my Conduct in great measure.

"There's now before the Lords a Bill at the Request of the Crown to establish a Regency which is opposed—and for their argument who oppose the Bill—that the Houses of Parliament on a Demise have sufficient Power to form Regulations and that any Bill passed now will not have any effect to bind the Resolutions of future Parliaments on such an Event, But the Bill will give such power to a few individuals as may justify Civil Commotions.

"Those for the Bill alledge that in case of Demise without Provision by Law, whoever happens to have the infant King in Possession will have the Regal Power as by the Constitution there can be no Interregnum—that the Army being a great and formidable Body with arms in their hands, may assume unconstitutional Powers, and that the People and now great Part deciplined will not readyly nor tamely yeild to such

assumed unjustifyed claims, will resist, and consequently draw on bad if not fatal consequences on the Country.

"At all events our frequent prayers and wishes must be for the long continuance of his present Majesty untill his son at least be taught the true Interest of his and this Kingdom which are so happyly united in his family, that the publick anxiety seems at present how to perpetuate it in that happyest succession to the latest posterity, but about the means men at present are devided. Thro' your means I request this may be communicated to my Constituents, whose wellfare shall ever be my study. I am, Sir, yr most obed' humble ser'

The following is the case submitted to Council, touching the election of 1774, when Anthony Chapman, the defeated candidate, and several electors petitioned against the successful candidates. See Hutchins' *Dorsat*, Vol. ii., p. 359.

Borough of Dorchester.

This is a Borough by Prescription, and the last Determination of the Right of Election, is of the following Tenor:—

"18th May, 1720. RESOLVED that the Right of electing Burgesses to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset is in the *Inhabitants* of the said Borough, paying to Church and Poor in respect of their personal estates; and in such Persons as pay to Church and Poor in Respect of their real Estates within the said Borough."

At the General Election in 1774, W^m Ewer, Esqr., John Damer, Esqr., and Anthony Chapman, Esqr., being Candidates, the two former were returned; and Petitions having been presented by Mr. Chapman and by several Inhabitants and Electors of the Borough, the first setting forth generally that the Petitioner had a majority of legal votes, and ought to have been returned, and the other setting forth specially that divers Persons were admitted to vote, who were neither "Inhabitants, nor Occupiers of real Estates within the Borough," and had no right. The Petitions came on to be heard before a Committee under Mr. Grenville's Bill in Febry., 1775, and the construction of the last Determination came in Question, upon which the Committee, after hearing Counsel, came to the following Resolution:—

"RESOLVED that it is the Opinion of this Committee that pursuant to the last Determination of the House of Commons, such persons as pay to Church and Poor in respect of their real Estates within the Borough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset, tho' not Inhabitants or Occupiers, were en-

titled to vote at the last Election of Members to serve in Parliament for the said Borough."

And on this the Petitioners declined to give the Committee any further trouble, and the sitting Members were declared duly elected.

The Earl of Shaftesbury is owner of many Houses, etc., in this Borough. It has been usual to grant Leases of these Houses to Persons for years determinable on the deaths of the respective Lessees. On these Leases Rents were reserved somewhat below the real yearly Value of the Tenements leased, and Considerations by way of Fine were actually paid by the Lessees for the Grant of the Leases, adequate to the real beneficial Interests granted, and the Rents were received of the Undertenants for the Use of the Lessees, and accounted for to them, and they actually paid or allowed the Rates assessed to the Church and Poor, and these Rates are in Truth pretty generally allowed by Landlords of Estates in the West of England.

It happened that a considerable number of these Leases fell in before, or soon after, Lord Shaftesbury came of Age,* and since November last his Lordship has granted a Number of new Leases of this Nature, mostly to gentlemen, some of whom reside in the West of England, and some in other Places. The Fines or Considerations were fairly proportioned to the beneficial Interests granted by the Leases, and were actually paid; and the Lessees have real Right to hold the Tenements according to the Leases. The Tenements are let, of course, to Undertenants resident in the Borough, on the terms that the Rates to the Church and Poor shall be paid by their Landlords (vizt) those who hold the Leases immediately of Lord Shaftesbury. One Rent Day at least will happen between the Dates of the Leases and the general Election. The Rents will be (or perhaps have been) received by an Agent at Dorchester, who will pay the Rates to the Church and Poor for the Landlords (vizt) Those who hold the Leases immediately of Lord Shaftesbury, and account for and pay the net Surplus Rents; and Lord Shaftesbury will neither have Right to receive, nor will in fact receive, more than the Rents reserved to him from his Lessees.

It is to be observed that the words of the Resolution are "Persons who pay to Church and Poor in Respect of their

real estates within the said Borough." Now the Interests granted by these Leases, tho Chattles Real, as partaking of the Realty, are not what is, strictly speaking, understood by the terms *Real* Estate, but are in truth, Personal Estate, and yet may well be within the Meaning of the Words *Real Estate*, as used in the Resolution, and the late Mr. Dunning, who gave two opinions on the subject, was in the latter, and upon Reconsideration, of that Opinion. However, as in a Case of this Nature, it may be advisable to remove even all Colour of Doubt, if there be any, and if it can now be properly obviated, you are desired to give your Opinion.

Question.—Whether the Interests of the Lessees under these Leases are clearly real Estates within the Meaning of the Resolution. And if you should entertain any Doubt upon this Point, you will please further to advise whether (as another Rent Day probably will not happen before the General Election, tho' perhaps Poors Rates and Church Rates may be collected) it would be advisable for the Lessees to surrender these Leases and for Lord Shaftesbury to grant (by Lease and Release) freehold estates to the respective Lessees during their respective Lives, or whether upon the whole it is better to rest upon the present Leases?

Answer.—I think this Question must depend very much upon the Usage of the Borough at the Time of the last Determination in 1720 and since. If that Usage has been to receive the Votes of such Lessees for long Terms determinable on their Lives who paid to the Church and Poor, tho' not Inhabitants or actual Occupiers, I am of Opinion that they will be held to be within the second Member of the Resolution, altho' in legal Language a Term for Years, however long or however beneficial, cannot be called the Lessees real Estate. If on the Contrary the Usage has been only to admit Persons having freehold Interests, under that last Clause of the Resolution. I think such Usage will govern in the Construction of the Resolution, and on that Supposition the Lessees in Ouestion will not be intitled to vote, and therefore I should, in that Case, think it advisable to convert the Terms into Freeholds. in the Manner here suggested.

Further state—It is not perhaps improbable but that, in Case of a Contest, it may be objected that these Leases are occasional. The Fact, however, is that they are real, actual and bona-fide Leases, which the Lessees have paid for, and have a Right to hold against Lord Shaftesbury. And

tho' it may be urged that they were granted and purchased with a View to the Right of Voting, yet there being no Law to prevent a man from purchasing Property which gives a Right of Voting and as we are not aware that this Right of Voting falls within any of the regulating Statutes, it is hoped that no Objection on the Ground of Occasionality can prevail. Your Opinion, however, is requested.

Question.—Whether Votes given by the Holders of these Leases actually paying to Church and Poor, be good and valid Votes? Note, it is understood that, as the Assessments are now made out, the Names of the Landlords are not inserted, But they do in fact pay or allow the Rates, vide Case of King against Cosens, Douglas' Reports, fo. 410. And Note, this being a Borough by Prescription, the Right of Voting existed before the present Poor Laws, and consequently before the present Mode of Assessment existed.—And whatever Rate of Assessment or Payment was antiently in Use, and however since altered by Statute, it is presumed that no subsequent Statute, however varying the Mode of Assessment, can be construed to vary or affect the Right of Voting, or prevent a Landlord from taking upon himself the Payment of the Rates if he chuses it.

Answer.—I must here refer to my answer to the first Query. But I am of Opinion that no Objection on the Ground of Occasionality will be valid against these Votes, and that the actual Payment to the Church and poor Rates (without the Insertion of the Names in the Rates) will be sufficient.

You shall minister equal justice as well to the poor as to the rich to the best of your cunning, witt and power, and you shall diligently procure such things to be done as may honestly and justly be to the profitt and commodity of the Corporation of this Town. You shall support, vphold and maintain the Customs, Rights, Priviledges, Liberties, Jurisdiccions, Franchises and all lawfull ordinances of this Towne and Burrough, and as concerning all other things appertaining to your office you shall herein faithfully and uprightly behave your selfe. Soe help you God." C. 26. (See also B. 35a.)

The Bayliffes must take the like oath, only changing Mayor for Bailiffes, and both Mayor and Bailiffes must take the oaths following:

"You shall swear that as Justice of the Peace within this Burrough of Dorchester you shall do equall right to the poor and to the rich to the best of your cunning, witt and power, and according to the Laws and Customes of this Realme and Statutes thereof made. You shall not be of Councell with any person in any Quarrell hanging afore you, and that you hold your Sessions after the forme of the Statutes thereof

made. You shall take nothing for your Office of Justice of the Peace to be done but of the Queen and Fees accustomed and costs limited by the Statute, and you shall not direct or cause to be directed any Warrant by you to be made to the Parties but to the Constables of this Burrough or other the Queen's officers or ministers or other indifferent persons to do execution thereof. Soe help you God." C. 26. [Also oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.]

Oath for a Capital Burgess.

"You shall swear that at all times from henceforth as long as you shall be and continue a Capitall Burgesse and of the Common Councill of the Burrough of Dorchester you shall, as much as in you lyeth, observe and keep and according to your power maintain and defend the Liberties, Priviledges, and lawful Customes of the said Burrough and all things touching and concerning the office and place of a Capitall Burgesse and one of the Common Councill of the said Burrough You shall, as farr as you are able, justly and honestly doe, execute and discharge. So help you God."

The like Oath for the Governor and Common Councell men: when either is sworne, the oaths above to the Queen must be taken. C. 26.

BAILIFFS.

The list of Bailiffs which appears in Hutchins' *Dorset*, Third Edition, Vol. iii., p. 354, needs some correction, as may be gathered from a careful examination of the documents enrolled in the "Domesday." These are now given with the reference number of the enrolment. Hutchins' list also stops in the year 1797. It is here continued until the office was abolished by the Municipal Corporations Act. RECORDERS.

SIR GEORGE TRENCHARD, sen., Knt., appointed first Recorder of the Borough by the Charter of James I., June 26th, 1610. Resigned, January 14th, 1610-11. The following is his deed of resignation:—

"To ALL MEN, to whome these presents shall come, Sr George Trenchard of Wolveton, in the County of Dorset, Knight, sendeth greeting. Whereas hee, the said Sr George Trenchard, doth now hold and enioy the place and office of Recorder of the Borough of Dorchester in the County aforesaid, and was thervnto ordeyned and nomynated by the King's Majesty's Letters Patents, lately graunted and made to the said Borough, by which the Bayliffs and Burgesses of the said Borough were incorporated, and made a Body Politique, as by the same letters patents may better appeare.

AND wheras hee, the said Sr George Trenchard, by reason of his remote residence, and dwelling can not be soe farr assistant vnto the said Borough and the Inhabitants therof as hee desireth, and hartely wisheth: Know yee therfore, That hee, the said Sr George Trenchard, out of the greate desire that hee hath to benefitt the said Towne and to procure the good Government therof soe farre as in him lieth, which hee conceiveth cannot by anye meanes bee soe redely effected, as by enabling them to make election of some other fitt person to supply the said place and office, which dwelleth nigh vnto them, and may vpon all occasions aide and assist them in their affaires HATH therfore, for the consideracions aforesaid, surrendred, quitted, and yelded vp, And doth by these presents surrender and yeld vpp the said office, and all fees, pencions and annuyties to the same incident or appertayning, or which hee, the said Sr George Trenchard, hath, or enjoyeth by Graunt from the said Borough or the said Corporacion, and doth heerby leave the said Bailiffs, Burgesses and Townesmen, to whome the same shall appertayne, freely to proceede to a new election of an other person to bee their Recorder and officer in the said place. In witness wherof the said Sr George Trenchard hath heervnto put his hand and seale the Fowerteenth day of January, in the Yeares of the Reigne of our Soueraigne Lord James, by the grace of god, of England, Scotland, France and Ireland, King, Defendor of the faith, &c., That is to saie of England, France and Ireland the Eighth, And of Scotland the Fower and Fortith, 1610.

FRANCIS ASHLEY, Esq., elected January 19th, 1610-11, and also appointed by the Charter of Charles I., Septem-

"Worthy Gentlemen and my ever honored friends,

"In Answere to yours of the 16 instant, your first election of me to do you service in the office of your Recorder was the fruit of your owne goodnes without any meritt of mine, And if enforcing occasions necessitate you to lay him aside whome your former good opinions have thought well of and still do, I should shew myself very vngrateful not to submitt to your plesures and wisdome. Your priuiledge is yet your owne, and for any thing I know to the Contrary may so continue. But if you distrust your owne strength and integrity of your owne Cause, I shall submitt to your owne wille to do what god shall direct you. Only giue me leave to say that since I vnderstood what belongs to order and government I have ever honored Dorchester as a place scarce admitting a second, and surely whosoeuer shall attempt to ouerthrow such a gouernment cannot but have it a Corrosiue long vndigested vpon his stomack. Your owne wills in a Case of this Nature are a Law to mee, and therefore, Gentelmen, do as you please, Only I shall rest assured of your loves and welwishings, and you shall ever find me till I ceas to have a being, Sr. your vnfevned servant.

Constantine as Sr Francis Ashley, the Lord Rolles and others, and considering that this place is the most principle Corporacion in this County and yet wants noe enemyes abroad or at home (but friends as many as wee can obteyne) which wee would endeavour to gett and hope your Lo'pp will not vppon the Consideracions aforesaid take it amisse from vs yf wee pitch vppon some other person that, as our Condicion now stands, may be more for our advantage. "Sir,

"It gave me the utmost concern that I was prevented from attending my duty as usual at your Mich^s Sessions. In the Charters of most other Corporations, the Recorder has a Power of appointing a Deputy, by which the inconvenience arising from his absence is easily obviated.

"Fortunately, this inconvenience has never been experienced before, during the many years I have had the honour of holding that office; But I have now reached a period of Life, more liable to infirmities, and from my present condition, future disappointments of the same sort may naturally be expected. It is with regret, I must own, that I am necessitated to quit a Connection, in which I have long been happy, and to relinquish an office I have ever esteemed an Honor. But, circumstanced as I am, sensible of its present Impropriety, I must no longer indulge a wish to retain it.

I therefore beg the favour of you to communicate these sentiments to the Gentlemen of your Corporation, with my resolution of resigning that office—assuring them of my most grateful sense of all their past Favours and my sincerest wishes for their future uninterrupted Prosperity and Happiness. The Mayor's Reply.

"The Guildhall of the Borough of Dorchester, 3d December, 1781.

Sir,

I was favoured with your Letter of the 28th of last month, containing Sentiments of much Respect and Kindness for the Corporation of this Borough, in which you acquaint me with the necessity you find yourself under of resigning the office of Recorder on account of the impaired state of your Health.

Without delay I communicated your Letter to my Brethren at a publick Hall convened for that Purpose, and I have it in charge from them to assure you of the great Concern we all feel in being deprived of that Integrity, and of those Abilities from which we have derived so much Benefit during a Course of Twenty-five years. We more particularly regret the Cause, which compells you to adopt this Resolution.

On this Occasion we think we cannot better express the sense we entertain of the Obligations we lie under to you for your faithfull and able discharge of that office, than by nominating as your successor one, who, we have reason to believe, will be agreeable to you, and whose abilities will do you no discredit—a young gentleman whose general Learning, whose engaging manners and whose merit in his Profession promise to us the best Compensation for the Loss we now sustain; who, as he derives Honour from, will (we flatter ourselves) reflect it upon his Predecessor in office. Need I say that this young gentleman is your son, Mr. Nathaniel Bond?

From the long connection which has subsisted between your Family and the Corporation of this Borough in the Department of Recorder, which they have so ably filled for not less than Sixty-Four Years in the present century. We cannot but express our joy that there is still a Bond to adorn that office.

"Right Wor¹¹, vpon some difference lately risen betwene the incorporacion of this Borough and the Tenants of the Princes Highnes of his Mannor of Fordington concerning the bounds betwene this Borough and the lands of the said Mannor wee are threatened with suite by the Tenants to bee comenced against vs on his Highnes behalfe although without cause or color (as wee conceive) for wee out of a desire of peace have long suffered the Tenants of the said Mannor to incroach vpon vs, and they findinge our peaceable disposition haue gayned more and more vpon vs, and by degrees haue taken from vs the ditches wherewith this Towne is surrounded, though most vniustly as wee hope to make it appeare. And now (not therewith content) they seeke to gayne from vs alsoe parte of this Towne walles. Good Sr. wee are very vnwilling to enter the lists in any suite or any other course of difference with his Highnes and doe therefore humbly beeseech you to heare our iust defence before you give way for any suite or cause to bee taken against vs heerein, And doe hope to manifest vnto you that not only the walles, but the ditches alsoe do belong vnto vs, which being done, wee hope wee shall have right done vs without suite. And soe desiring you will be pleased to thinke on and prescribe some course for appeasing our difference without suite, wherein wee shall bee much obliged to you, wee take our leave, craving pardon for our boldnes, and remayne,

1634, Oct. 27. "The Towne Clerke shall this Terme follow the busines at the Princes Highnes Counsell Table betwen this Borough and the Mannor of Fordington, concerning the extent of this Borough and the said Mannor," and to be furnished with £10 for expenses.

THE BOROUGH'S JURISDICTION. COLLITON ROW.

A dispute arose in the seventeenth century between Mr. John Churchill and the Mayor and Corporation of the Borough, relative to the latter's jurisdiction over Colliton Row, of which John Churchill was lord and owner. "Colliton Row," says Hutchins' Dorset, 3rd edition, Vol. ii., p. 415, "is a tything in the hundred of St. George, and a small street adjoining to Glidepath Hill on the south. This street and Glidepath Hill, though within the walls of the town of Dorchester, are in the ancient parish of Frome Whitfield. The inhabitants of the street, though properly out of the Borough, claimed and used a right of voting for Members of Parliament, but in 1720 it was resolved by the House of Commons, that it was no part of the Borough, and the inhabitants lost the exercise of this franchise until the passing of the Reform Bill restored it." This disagreement begins to appear in the Town Records, 11th July, 1664, when "This day vppon desire of Mr. Henry Churchill the Towne Charter is delivered to Mr. Joseph Derby, the Towne Clerke, to pleade it at the next Sessions at large for the County in claymeing the priviledge of the Towne for their Jurisdiccion: hee and two others imployed by his brother, Mr. John Churchill, being indicted for severall offences supposed to be donne within the Borough and the Towne Clerke hath engaged to see it returned safe and vudefaced." C. 15.

Four years after negotiations were still proceeding.

1668, Dec. 23. "It is this day ordered That Mr. Maior, Mr. Haviland and Mr. Loder be desired to visit John Churchill, Esqr., of Colliten Rowe, and, as occasion shall offer, to discourse with him about the differences between the Corporacion and the Inhabitants of Colliton Rowe aforesaid, and report the same at the next meeting, this Company being desirous to Compose the Differences aforesaid without suite in Lawe if they can." C. 15.

1668, Dec. 30. "No satisfactory answere thereto was given, It's therefore further resolved that it be proposed to the said Mr. Churchill that the Corporacion wilbe contented to refer the matter in Lawe vppon the Charter which relates to the Controuersie to the Judges of Assizes, at the next Assizes to be held for this County, if he will accept thereof, and that John Whiteway, Esq^r, Mr. John Daniel and Mr. John Knightsbridge, or any two of them, be desired to treate with the said Mr. Churchill about this proposall, &c." C. 15.

The matter came before the Judges at the Assizes, held at Dorchester, 4 March, 22 Charles II., 1670, when it was ordered that a Juror should be withdrawn, with the assent of the parties to the suit, John Churchill, plaintiff, versus John Cardrow and others, defendants, and that all matters of controversy in this and certain other cases should be referred to arbitration. Mr. Serjeant Barton and Sir William Constantine, Knt., were appointed arbitrators. Their award is contained in B. 37, which bears their seals and signatures, and is dated 14th May, 1670. It was followed by an indenture, dated 25 August, 1670, between the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses of the one part, and John Churchill, Esq., of the other part, accepting and confirming the said award. As the award is given in the Indenture, it is unnecessary to repeat it here.

"THIS INDENTURE MADE the Five and Twentith day of August in the Two and Twentith yeare of the Reigne

of our Soveraigne Lord Charles the Second by the Grace of God of England Scotland Fraunce and Ireland King Defendor of the faith, &c., And in the yeare of our Lord God according to the computation of the Church of England One thousand Six hundred and Seaventy Betweene the Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset of the one parte, and John Churchill of Colliton Rowe in the said County of Dorset Esqr of the other parte. WHEREAS by an order at the Assizes held at Dorchester in the County of Dorset the fourth day of March in the Two and Twentith yeare of his Ma'ties Reigne that now is before Sr John Arther Knt one of his Ma'ties Justices of the Courte of Common Pleas and Justice of Assize in the County aforesaid made betweene the said John Churchill plaintiffe and one John Cardrow and others Defendants IT was Ordered by the Courte vppon the assent of the partyes that the last of the Jurors should be withdrawen and that all matters in controversy betweene the partyes aforesaid and allsoe betweene John Cardrow and John Strode and his wife and allsoe all accions causes of accions informacions or indictments against William Pitt, Richard Churchill, Joseph Seward, Samuell Bond, gent., John Cardrow, Edward Chapman, Robert Poldon, James Manuell, Gregory Alamott, William Munden and Samuell Bray, or any or either of them, then depending or being and allsoe all other suites accions trespasses prosecucions causes of accions and demands as well betweene the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester and the aforesaid John Churchill and others as betweene the aforesaid John Churchill and the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough aforesaid should be referred vnto Mr. Serjeant Barton and Sr William Constantine Knt., Arbitrators, by the partyes aforesaid with the Approbacion of the said Courte indifferently elected the same to heare and finally determine soe that the aforesaid Arbitrators their Arbitrement in writeing of and vppon the premisses should make ready to be delivered to the partys aforesaid before the last day of the Terme of Easter then next following and in case the said Arbitrators should make noe Arbitracion of or vppon the premisses within the tyme aforesaid that then all the said accions causes of accions prosecucions informacions indictments matters and controversyes aforesaid should be referred vnto Mathew Davys, Esqr., to heare and determine the same before the sixth day of June then next

following which said Order on Saturday next after the morrow of the Ascencion of our Lord being the fowerteenth day of May in the two and twentith yeare of his Ma'ties Reigne abovesaid was by his Ma'ties Courte of King's Bench at Westminster Ordered to be entred and made a rule of the same Courte as by the Records of the same severall Courtes relacion being vnto them severally had more fully and att large it doth and may appeare. AND WHEREAS the said Mr. Serjeant Barton and Sr William Constantine in pursuance of the said severall Orders and the submission of the partys in the said order of Assizes mencioned concerneing the matters in the same conteyned referred to their Arbitrement did take vppon them the burthen and execucion of the said Arbitracion and did on the said fowerteenth day of May in the two and twentith yeare aforesaid and after the said rule made in the Courte of King's Bench make their Arbitracion in writeing vnder their hands and seales touching and concerning the premisses in these words following.

Whereas severall controversyes and differences have ben risen and stirred Betweene the Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Capitall Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset of the one parte and John Churchill of Colliton Row Esquire of the other parte Touching the Jurisdiccion of the Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses within Colliton row which is the Inheritance of the said John Churchill whether the same and the Inhabitants thereof bee within the power of the Justices of the Peace within the said Borough or the Justices at large within the said County And by reason thereof severall Accions of Law have been brought by several persons who have been Constables of the said Borough for Assaults and Batterys on them in executeing their offices in leavying of distresses there and severall other controversyes and prosecucions of indictments and informacions have ben exhibited against severall persons who have ben officers and Justices within the said Borough and other differences are like to arise betweene the said partyes for other matters concerning the said Jurisdiccion. And whereas all the said matters by rule of Courte att the last Assizes were referred to vs and wee haveing mett and in the presence of all partyes concerned debated the same Now for preserving Amity and friendshipp in tyme to come betweene the said partyes and putting a stopp to all the said controversyes and differences wee doe Order Award and adjudge by and with the consent of the said partyes

FIRST that the said John Churchill his heires or assignes Lords or owners of the Freehold or Inheritance of Colliton Rowe aforesaid shall not doe any Act or thing whereby to hinder or oppose the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen or Burgesses, or any of them or the Justices of the said Borough for the tyme being in the execucion or exercise of any Jurisdiccion within the said Colliton Row which the said Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen or Burgesses or the Justices of the said Borough for the tyme being lawfully may exercise within the said Borough of Dorchester vet Neverthelesse the Inhabitants now dwelling in Colliton Row aforesaid shall and may vse their trades and ymployments there as formerly they have donne without the disturbance of the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses or any of them and such persons as now are or att any tyme hereafter shall be inhabiteing there who shall at any tyme or tymes hereafter desire to be made free or freeman of the said Borough vppon request to be made to the said Maior or other officers therevnto Authorized for the tyme being shall be made free of the said Borough in such manner and forme as freedome is vsually granted in the said Borough paying vsuall Fees and noe more And such Freemen shall from tyme to tyme have and eniov the same and like benefitts and priviledges in all respects within the said Borough as other the Inhabitants of the said Borough have and enioy respectively without any further controversy or dispute. Secondly For that it appeareth that the place called Colliton Rowe aforesaid is the Inheritance of the said John Churchill whoe has allsoe the Inheritance of severall Messuages and Tenements in the Borough of Dorchester, wee doe Order and Award that the said Major and some other Justice or Justices of the said Borough for the tyme being shall sett vp or licence noe Alehowse Keeper within Colliton Row aforesaid without the consent and approbacion of the said John Churchill or his heires or the Lords and Owners of Colliton Rowe aforesaid for the tyme being And farther that yf the said John Churchill his heires or the Owners of the Freehold and Inheritance of Colliton Row aforesaid shall be desirous to have any Alehowses to be there licensed That the said Major and Justices aforesaid vppon request of the said John Churchill his heires and assignes or the Owners of the Freehold or Inheritance of Colliton Row aforesaid shall in reasonable tyme after such a request graunt Licenses for Keepeing Alehowses in Colliton Row aforesaid to such person and persons

as hee or they shall recommend soe as such person and persons be qualified according to the Lawes and Statutes of this Realme and soe as there be not att any one tyme above two severall Alehowses licensed within the said Colliton Rowe aforesaid And the said Mayor or Justices or any of them shall not att any tyme suppresse any of the said Alehowses or restraine any person att any tyme inhabiteing within the said Colliton Rowe from makeing of Mault without first acquainting the said John Churchill or his heires And such suppression and restraint to bee for some breach of the Lawes and Statutes of the Realme in that case made and provided. THIRDLY to the end that there may be noe difference betweene the Tennants of the said John Churchill and his heires and other the Inhabitants of the said Borough of Dorchester the Tennants of the said John Churchill inhabiteing in any place within the said Borough in fitt and convenient howses shall have the like Freedome and Liberty as other Inhabitants within the said Borough to have Lycenses to keepe Alehowses in the said Borough granted there by the said Major and Justices from tyme to tyme and especially such howses of his as have ben formerly licensed And for the future noe licenses to keepe Alehowses shallbe granted by the said Major and Justices or any of them or security taken therevppon for the buying their beere att any Common Brewhowse or with any other clauses whatsoever saveing such onely as by the lawes and statutes of this realme are directed. FOURTHLY that the said John Churchill and his heires or other Lords or Owners of Colliton Rowe aforesaid shall not henceforth contest ioyne with or encourage any person or persons that shall endeavor to exempt the said Colliton Rowe to be out of the Jurisdiccion and Governement of the Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses or Justices of the Borough of Dorchester aforesaid. And yf any Office of Constable or Tithingman bee imposed vppon any of the Inhabitants of Colliton Rowe for the tyme being as inhabiteing there onely by the Steward of the hundred of the George or other officer within the said hundred or Liberty of Stratton or by any of his Ma'ties Justices of the Peace for the said County of Dorset Then and in such case the Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses are to take vppon them the defence of such Constable or Tithingman soe Chosen and shall produce their Charter And att the Charge of the Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses shall acquit the said person or persons from the said Office and from all charge and

damage in respect thereof such person or persons soe elected giveing due notice to the Maior for the tyme being And doeing noe voluntary Act or thing to prejudice himselfe or themselves by submitting thereto or otherwise And all the particulars before mencioned shallbe drawen into a paire of Indentures of Covenants betweene the Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses of the said Borough of Dorchester of th' one parte and the said John Churchill Esquire of the other parte att the equal Costs and Charges of the said partyes One parte whereof shall be sealed by the Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses with the Common Seale of the said Borough and delivered or ready to be delivered vppon demaund to the said John Churchill And the other parte thereof by the said John Churchill and delivered or ready to be delivered to the said Maior for the tyme being before the first day of September next. FIFTHLY that all Indictments and Informacions preferred or prosecuted by either of the partyes occasioned by the said difference be withdrawen and bee noe further prosecuted. Sixthly that all accions betweene the partyes aforesaid or their Agents or which have relacion to or have been risen by occasion of the difference aforesaid and referred as aforesaid att any tyme before the fourth of March last shallbe withdrawen and be noe further prosecuted. In witness whereof wee have herevnto sett our hands and seales this present fowerteenth day of May in the Two and Twentith yeare of the Reigne of our Sovereigne Lord Charles the Second by the Grace of God of England Scotland France and Ireland, King defender of the faith, &c., Annoq' D'ni 1670.

Now witnesseth this Indenture that it is hereby concluded condescended vnto granted and agreed on by and betweene the Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester aforesaid and the said John Churchill that the said Arbitracion and Award soe made by the said Mr. Serjeant Barton and Sr William Constantine shall from tyme to tyme and att all tymes forever hereafter stand and bee good and effectuall in Law and equity to all intents and purposes whatsoever according to the true intent and meaneing of the said Award and Arbitrement as itt is therein expressed And the said Award and Arbitrement as itt is therein expressed And the said Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses for themselves their successors and assignes doe covenant promise grant and agree to and with the said John Churchill his heires and assignes that they the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses their successors and assignes and all and every

officer and officers of the said Borough and the servants and agents of the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses and every other person or persons which hath have or had or att any tyme hereafter shall have any relacion vnder them or by or vnder their title or pretence of their title shall and will from tyme to tyme and att all tymes forever hereafter well and truely observe performe fullfill and keepe the said Award or Arbitrement in all and every Article point clause and thing therein conteyned which on their or any of their behalfes is ought or should be observed performed fullfilled and kept by virtue of the same Award or Arbitrement according to the true intent and meaning of the same as it is therein expressed without any Alteracion or deviacion therefrom in any way or meanes whatsoever. AND THE SAID John Churchill doth for himselfe his heires and assignes Covenant promise grant and agree to and with the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses their successors and assignes That hee the said John Churchill his heires and assignes and his and their Tennants, servants or Agents and every of them whoe are comprised in the said Award or Arbitrement shall and will from tyme to tyme and att all times forever hereafter well and truely observe performe fullfill and keepe the said Award or Arbitrement in all and every Article poynt clause or thing therein conteyned which on his their or any of their behalfe is ought or should bee observed performed fullfilled and kept by vertue of the same Award or Arbitrement according to the true intent and meaning of the same as is therein expressed without any alteracion deviacion therefrom in any way or meanes whatsoever. In witness whereof to one parte of these Indentures remaining with the said John Churchill the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses have putt their common seale and to the other parte thereof remaineing with the said Major, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses the said John Churchill hath putt his hand and seale the day and yeare first abovewritten.

1675-6, Feb. 27. "The Award touching Mr. Churchill and this Towne is taken out by me to be made vse of on a tryall against Mr. Arthur Gould at Mr. Cardrowes suite." [Not signed.] C. 15.

THE TOWN FINANCES.

The earliest extant Book of Accounts of the Stewards or Collectors of the Town Rents is numbered "C2" in Mr. Moule's Catalogue. These officers were three in number, and this book commences in the stewardship of John Palmer, Paule Robards and John Chubbe, who rendered their first quarterly account, 25th April, I Mary [1555]. It ends in 1591. Page I is headed "Charges don this [quart]er a [festo] Nativitatis Domini usque ad festum Annunciationis Beate Marie Virginis," which amount to iijli. ixs. iiijd.

The receipts consist of the rents of lands and houses belonging to the Town, the proceeds of an occasional sale of a dwelling house, and money received on "the Verdict day" (e.g., xixs. iiijd. in 1561), and some casual gains.

The charges relate for the most part to outlay on the Town houses, and are chiefly of interest as showing the prices that then prevailed, e.g., "helling stones," called also "blue helling stones" or "slatts" (which were imported at Melcombe Regis) cost 10d. to 12d. a hundred; laths, 13d. a hundred; lath nails, $1\frac{1}{2}d$. to 2d. a hundred; a wey of lime, 1s. 6d.; spars for thatching, 1d. a hundred or 10d. a thousand; 40 read sheaves, 18d. (but the price varies); lime, 4d. the bushel; and the thatcher was paid 12d. a day, and his servant, 5d.

On the sixth page from the end of the book is a memorandum, "It'm, the iij parishes hathe laide owt towards the settinge forthe and furnyture of iiijor men and iiijor corseletts to serue the queenes Ma'tys highness, 1562, viz. Saincte Peter's parishe, xls. It'm, Trinitie parishe xxs. It'm, All Hallon parishe xxs."

Some of the more interesting entries are given below:—
1555. Paid to the Churche of All Hallowes which was layde owte for the Shyre haale, xxs. (Entries relating to the Shire Hall are frequently met with.)

3 Eliz. (1560-1). Pd. to Wyll'm Bayllye for the bryngyng vp of iiij lode of tymber from the fryers, xvjd.

6 Eliz. (1563-4). It'm, dd' [i.e., delivered] to Ollyver Hyggs towards his chargs to ryde to Hartford.

8 Eliz. (1565-6). Charges laide ought by the Stuards to the bildinge of the caidge howse.

It'm, paide Sir John of Mvnkston for the caridge of viij lode of stones from Wadon Quare, ixs. ijd.

1571. Oct. 10. It'm, D' to Mr. Hurde at his goinge vnto London to ymploy aboute the townes affaires, xls.

[14 Eliz., 1571-2?]. Receyuyd for the Stoke of the Crosse before Mr. Brentes dore, iijs. iiijd.

1572. It., pd. Mr. James for the towne the which the Towne was non Suted, to Mr. Turberfilde, iiijh. vjs. viijd.

1573. Md. that Thomas Evens hathe received in monie towards the newe makinge of the comon well vhi.

It'm, the Burgesses owethe to Laurence Stratford which hee layde owt aboute the weast walles, iijli. xijs.

It'm, the Burgesses owethe to the said Laurence Stratford which hee had disbursed aboute certen Armour and settinge forthe of the Souldiers into Ireland whest hee was in Office as did appeare by his bill, xxxvs. vijd.

The "Payments by Matthew Chubbe one of the toune Stewards from Midsomer, 1583," include:—

It'm, pd. Mr. Greene which hee disbursed at London abowt the towne busynes, xxxiijs. viijd.

It'm, pd. Mr. Stratford which hee pd. to Mr. Welsteed for the sute of the parsonage.

It'm, pd. for ij sheaves and xviij new muster arroes and for the fetheringe of one other sheafe and vj arroes, xijs.

It'm, pd. Mr. Hanam's fee and Mr. Napper's fee, xxs., Mr. Robynson, xxxvs. xjd., and for an Indenture, xijd., abowt the mixon, lvjs. xjd.

It'm, pd. my selfe for my chargs and allowannce at London abowt the sute of the parsonaige of froome, iijli. vjs. viijd.

1584, Michaelmas quarter. "Rec' of Mr. Corbyn and Robt. Warren their haulfe yeeres rent for the mixon in the north est part of the west walls, xijd.

1585. Paide Mr. Scrope £33 6. 8 for Frome parsonage.

1585 (since Novr.). Impr'is paid Strongman's wiffe for nursinge the child the 10th of November for one month then ended, iiijs. (A similar entry frequently follows, but "the child" is not explained.)

Paid to Hunte, the Surgion, for healinge of Powncye, vs. Paid William Bartelet for mendinge one of the Toune Calivers the 21th of January, xvjd.

More to Hunte the Suregion the 12th of Marche for curinge of Powncye, xis. viijd.

To the Shreve for an axsion that Wm. Adine had for a mixson againste the towne for the which we were in bande, vijli.

Paid Mr. Napper mechellmas terme for moveing of a norder a gaynst Mr. Trobellfell, xs.

1588, June 9. More the Towne owithe Mr. Grind[ham] for that he paide Mr. Sprynte for the parsenage of Frome Whitfilde the laste yere, xliijs.

1590, Oct. 9. It'm, Mr. Henynge [oweth] for 10li of powder, xijs. vjd. It'm, Mr. Churchill, iij quivers of arroes.

It'm, Mr. Henynge a drie vate which was bought to carrie the armor.

A memorandum on a blank leaf states:

"The towne is to pay for the parsonaige of Froome twoo hundred marks [i.e., £133 6s. 8d.].

Whereof to Mr. ["Scrope" erased] doctor Baylie, chi. It'm, to Mr. Scrope, xxxiijhi. vjs. viijd. Which xxxiijhi. vjs. viijd. is pd. to Matthew Chubbe with the xhi. he is to have of Mr. Napper at Myhelmas.

It'm, the towne is to pay yeerelie the parsones rent for the yeares to come, iijh, vis. viijd.

It'm, the parsonaige will come in hand at Mighelmas, 1590."

The Town Accounts are continued in C 3, which extends from 12th October, 1591, to the last day of January, 1610.

P.I. Imprimis John Ellis owethe to the towne to be paid by xxs. the qrter beginninge the first paymt. at the feast of St. Michaell Tharchangell last past vntill the whole sum be paid, the sum of vijh. viijs. vjd.

It'm, Angell Smythe [owethe], xs. iiijd.

It'm, Mr. Chubbe for the Towne lande which he holdethe in the Walles, which lande he holdethe vntill Mighelmas, 1594, liijs. iiijd.

It'm, Mr. Watts for the Fee Simple of a pece of grownde in the Easte Walls, xxs.

It'm, Mr. Churchill for the xij men Waye, xls.

It'm, Mr. Hennynge for x powndes of powder, xijs. vjd. It'm, of the same Mr. Henynge for a dry fate, vs.

P. 13. Md. Mr. Atwell gave to the vse of the poore of Dorchester fyve pounds for ever which was delyver[ed] by Raffe Pallmer to Mr. Baylyfes Mr. Chube and Mr. Barker, anno 1598.

It is remarkable that no other Account Book occurs subsequent to 1610, until the year 1761, when a book, C. 37a, is found, extending from the latter date until 1800.

1649-50, Jan. 18. "This day Joseph Derby propownded to the Companie that he might have either a lease or deed of that plott of grownd whereon there is a noisome and dangerous Mixon made behind the garden of the house that was late his father's." C. 12. [He was probably son of the late Town Clerk.]

1674, Sept. 25. Agreed to sell Thos. Browne, Esq., for £20, the inheritance of the garden of the house now in the possession of John Gould. C. 15.

Broadway Lands.

1695, May 10. It is mentioned that the Broadway Lands were purchased by money given by several persons, viz., Mr. Edward Dashwood, £50, Wm. Gape, gent., £100, the Lady Tirconnell, £80, and Thos. Freke, Esq., £50. A moiety of the profits of Mr. Gape's £100 was to be given to All Saints' Parish. C. 7.

1698, April I. Rd. Garland, junr., of Broadway, yeoman, agrees to rent the Borough Lands at Nottington (which were purchased of one Notley) at £13 per ann., for 3 years from Lady day last. C. 7.

1707, Dec. 19. "Md. The deede of Feoffment of Broadway Lands and a Mortgage thereof made by Wm. Notley vnto Mr. Wm. Pitt, decd., were now delivered to me in order to have Livery and Seisen executed on the said Feoffment, and an assignment of the said Mortgage by the Executors or assignes of the said Wm. Pitt be made to some persons in Trust for the purchasers of the Inheritance. Witnes my hand, Robt. Loder." C. 7.

1710, Dec. 18. The Lands in Broadway to be sold to the best bidder. C. 7.

Entrance to County Gaol.

1803, Jan. 10. The Corporation had leased on 29th Aug., 1777, to Lord Milton, a messuage at the higher end of a place called the Bull Stake in St. Peter's parish, together with a room under, called the Engine House, for 99 years, determinable on the death of Rev. Wm. Rush Churchill, at a yearly rent of 6s. 6d. "The house has been totally taken down, and the land on which the same stood used for an entrance to the County Gaol." The Corporation ask for £10, for dilapidation and waste, or would sell the reversion to the County for £150.

1804, July 26. Agreed to grant to the County Magistrates a lease of the land late Rose's, for 999 years, to commence at Michaelmas next, in consideration of a surrender of the present lease and payment of £150, under the reserved yearly rent of one shilling. C. 42a.

THE BUTCHERS' SHOPS AND SHAMBLES.

A feature of the Town of Dorchester were the Butchers' Shops or standings and shambles, situate near the east end of St. Peter's Church, which were also Town property. Of

these there were two rows, east and west, and "The Butchers' Standings in the north of the Shambles" are thus given on 10th June, 1645 (C. 12):—

- 2. "Being on the north parte of the stayers leading out and from the East Street in Dorchester aforesaid into the Churchyard of St. Peter there and vnder some parte of the Towne Hall." 20th Sept., 35 Eliz.
- 3. "Lying in the Markett Place of the said Borough vnder the Pentice House over against the shop of Peter Chub, and is on the west parte of and adioyning to the Piller there, and hath on the sowth parte thereof the Butcher's standing of one Thomas Tollerfeild." 25th Sept., 9 Jac.
- 4. "Lying in the west flesh shambles in Dorchester aforesaid, on the sowth side, and next adjoyning to the Stayers
- * C. 14 contains a list of forty (numbered) leaves of Butchers' Standings, and one unnumbered, temp. Elizabeth, James I. and Charles I. It is followed by a list of some twenty or more standings of other trades, principally Glovers (whose standings were in South Street), ranging over the same period.

leading into the east parte of the Churchyard of St. Peter's in Dorchester aforesaid, which shop was late in the tenure of Peter Chub, deceased (except iiij foote and iij ynches on the back west side of the same shop, as it is divided already by an enterclose with free ingresse, egres and regres into and from the same roome)." 17th March, II Jac.

- 5. "Two butchers' standings, lying and being at the north end of the butchers' shambles in Dorchester aforesaid and on the west side of the streete there vnder the wall of the now dwelling house of Christofer Edmonds, whereof one is on the sowth parte of the doare of the same dwelling howse towards the Churchyard of St. Peter's Church, contayning in length xij foote and in breadeth v foot, and the other standing is on the north part therof going to and from the aforesaid doare soe fare as the sowther parte of the dwelling howse of Edward Coish which contayneth in length xv foote and in breadeth v foote." 31st Oct., 12 Jac.
- 6. "Late in the occupation of Thomas Tollerfeild, deceased, standing and being vnder le Bow in Dorchester aforesaid, between a standing of Michaell Fooke on the north, and a standing of John Gould on the east, and the street on the south." 30th Sept., 14 Jac.
- 7. "Lying on the north side of the High East Streete of the same Borough adioyning to the Piller of Stone which beareth parte of the house called the Bow, late in the occupation of John Gould deceased." 26th Oct., 16 Jac.

These notes are valuable for settling the topography of Old Dorchester.

The removal of the Shambles to another site was proposed on 20th March, 1783, but as it eventually appeared that the plans proposed would entail considerable expense, it was resolved on 7th July in that year, "That all further Proceedings therein upon the aforesaid Plans be laid aside. And whereas the Cupola or late Market House is taken down and another Market House much wanted, it is further resolved that the most convenient spot belonging to the Corporation be considered of and fixed on for that purpose forthwith. C. 27.

The Town Hall was erected in Mr. Stickland's Mayoralty in 1791.

In the Accounts of the Town Stewards (C. 37a) it is mentioned that at Michaelmas, 1793, of the seventeen butchers' shops, No. 1, the corner shop, was pulled down; No. 4, late

Rose's, was pulled down and taken into the Market House; as also were No. 5, late J. Pouncy's, No. 6, late Standishes, and No. 7, late Bull's. No. 10, late W. Ewer's, No. 11, late Thomas Ewer's, No. 12, late C. Brune's, No. 13, late Stephen Ford's, and No. 14, late Thomas Pleydall's, were in hand. No. 15, D. R. Michel, Esq., No. 16, Mrs. Edith Slade, No. 17. Robert Lock's, were all pulled down, and only the four following remained paying rent, viz., No. 2, Mr. William Davis, 16s., No. 3, ditto, 8s., No. 8, Thomas White, 16s., and No. 9, late Eames', but taken by Mr. Templeman in lieu of late Rose's, 8s.

On 24th Feb., 1794, it was determined to rebuild on the same site they already occupied the Shambles, which had become "very ruinous and in great decay," together with the Ward of the Serjeants at Mace, standing at the north end thereof. "To defray the above expenses and other expenses incurred in building and completing the New Town Hall and Market House, the shops, when built, are to be sold separately by auction, for a lease of three lives in each shop, except the new intended Pork Shop and Weight House, and the three shops now held on lease for lives." C. 42a.

On 18th August, 1794, it was ordered that £245 be paid to Thomas Curme and Thomas Gritton for new erecting the Butchers' Shambles, now fully performed. C. 42a.

It was also resolved on 27th March, 1797, to "pull down and levell for the public benefit and advantage of the Town" the butcher's shop held on lease by the late Mr. William Davis, which had been purchased for the purpose with £134. 10. 9. C. 42a.

ENCROACHMENTS.

[James I.] "Joseph Paty for his incroachment for a porch at his doare to pay yearly for it ynto the Bailiffs vjd." C. 14.

1639-40, Feb. 21. "Will'm Clarvetto having set vp 2 painted posts before his doare in the Streete is injoyned to take it downe forthwith, or else it will be cut downe and he fined for it, which he hath promised to doe." C. 12.

1661, May 24. "It was agreed that Mr. John Browne, of Frampton, shall pay twenty shillings for leave to sett vp pillars before his new house, at the same distance that mr. Stansbyes pillars are from the wall, and that mr. Bayliff

Stansby shall pay Ten shillings for setting vp of his pillars before his shop." C. 15.

1668, Aug. 6. Mr. Henry Bestland having set up a post in the street upon the Town Waste is ordered to remove this encroachment. Lawrence Righton having "set out a new bulke out of his shopp into the Street to a publiq; anoyance, is desired to remove it—both before 6 of the afternoon. No enlargement of ancient bulkes to be allowed." C. 15.

1666, Oct. 1. "The widow Wilson compounded with the Towne for the setting of a signe post out on the streete from her house for the fine of vjs. viijd." C. 15.

1703-4, Mch. 3. A lease to Enoch Fortescue of two racks on the wast, for his life, and Samuell Bedloe is permitted to put up a racke on the wast for 5s. a year rent. C. 7.

1708, Oct. 29. John Maber, cordwinder, to pay 2d. a year "for erecting a bulke before the shopp window of his house." C. 7.

1770, Oct. 16. Sebastian Pitfield, victualler, to pay 2s. 6d. a year for erecting a Sign Post in the *Butter Market*. C. 27.

1779, 25 Sept. Mr. Wm. Bower to pay 2s. a year for erecting a Bow window in the front of his house called the Royal Oak. C. 27.

1784, 30 Sept. John Hawkins, whitesmith, to pay 1s. a year for erecting two Bow Windows in the front of his house opposite the Assize Hall. C. 27.

1793, June 15. Leave given to John Hackley to erect a Bow Window to his House in the High East Street in parish of All Saints, called the Three Marriners, on payment of yearly sum of one shilling for the encroachment, such Bow Window not to be erected within One Foot of the Pavement. C. 42a.

1823, Aug. 18. Leave given to Robert Williams, Esquire, to fix a Railing in front of Mr. John Bascombe's House, in a line with the adjoining House belonging to Mr. William Davis, Ironmonger, paying a yearly acknowledgment of Sixpence. C. 42a.

1835, March 30. Ordered that Mr. Stephen Gale be appointed on the part of the Corporation to measure and be prepared to prove the dimensions of the open space in front of each House about to be pulled down within the Borough, in order that any future Encroachments be prevented, and that he do begin with the House in the High West Street belonging to Mr. Charles Curm, now pulling down. C. 42a.

THE CUPOLA, OR OLD MARKET HOUSE.

This building stood in Cornhill, near the centre of the town, and is shown in the plan of Dorchester given by the Corporation to the County History in 1772, with which may be compared the older plan of 1610.

1757, Apl. 28. "Ordered that Mr. Wm. Bryer, our Steward, do employ proper persons to take down the Lanthorn of the Cupola which is very ruinous and dangerous, and to fit up the wood-work and other parts of the Cupola in as good and cheap method as he can." C. 27.


1764, Oct. 1. Mary, wife of Edward Hibbs, of Knighton, Dorset, labourer, who pleaded guilty of a felony, was ordered "to be whipped tomorrow morning at the Cupola." C. 34.

1783, Feb. 28. "The Cupola being in a very ruinous state, and in its present situation quite a nuisance to the street. and it being the opinion of the gentlemen present that the Road would be more commodious for travelling if the same was intirely removed. It is resolved that the same be taken down, and that the Pump, which ought to stand for the Benefit of the Neighbourhood, be ornamented in such manner as shall be approved of at a future meeting. And in the mean time such Gentlemen as can conveniently procure a Design of such Ornament, together with an Estimate of the Expence, will be pleased to produce the same. The Town Steward is desired to take down the Cupola forthwith and to dispose of the Lead and other Materials to such Person or Persons who will give the best price for the same. And if in future a Market House shall be found necessary to be erected in the room of the Cupola now ordered to be pulled down, the same will be considered of at such future meeting.

P.S.—Mr. Robt. Stickland is desired to be assisting with the Town Steward in taking down the above Cupola in the course of a few days.

Robt. Lambert, Mayor, and others." C. 27.

1788, May 5. "Mr. Robert Stickland having purchased for the sum of three hundred and fifty two pounds and ten shillings, at the request of the Corporation, all that Burgage Tenement, lying in a street called the Cornhill within the said Borough, in Fee, bounded on the north side by the lands of Charles Martin, and on the south by the lands of the said Robert Stickland, in possession of Mr. Thomas Fisher, with an intent that if the said Parcell of Land should be thought by the said Corporation a convenient spot for building a Market House

and Guildhall for the said Borough, that such Market House and Guildhall might be built thereon; It is agreed that the said sum be paid to the said Robt. Stickland out of the Corporation Revenues, on his conveying to the said Corporation and their Successors in fee the said premises clear of incumbrances." C. 27.

THE NEW MARKET HOUSE.

1791, June 13. A proper Markett house being wanted for this Borough, and no place being found more proper to erect the same on, than from the west pinion end, or gabel end of the Red Lion Inn in the Parish of St. Peter, to the east end of the Church Passage, and extending from North to South, to the North End of the second Butchers' Shops on the west and east sides of the Shambles; And a plan and estimate having been made and delivered in of such building which is to consist of a new Guildhall, Market house and Cellar;

Resolved first, that the same be immediately carried into execution, and that Workmen be applied to for Estimates accordingly.

The Honorable Cropley Ashley having generously offered a sum of Two Hundred Pounds to the Corporation of this Borough towards completing the above work, Resolved that our thanks be given him for the same.

It being necessary for the completion of the work to apply to several Proprietors of Shops for their consent to exchange their property, Resolved that Applications be made to the Right Honorble Lord Shaftesbury, Mr. Wm. Davis, Mrs. Slade, Robert Lock and John Pouncy for that purpose. C. 42a.

1794, Aug. 18. Thomas Curme, Thomas Gritton, Bernard Gale, George Read and Robert Rumsey delivered in their Estimates for finishing the new erected Markett House and Town Hall; such Estimates approved; the Town Clerk to draw up a Contract. C.42a.

1795, Apl. 20. The several workmen employed on building the Town Hall having delivered in their Bills amounting to £160; agreed to borrow of Richard Cozens, gent., of this borough, that sum, paying interest at 5%. C. 42a. (This appears to be the first instalment.)

1802, Dec. 29. Ordered to pay Mr. Fenteman, for surveying and superintending the building of the Guildhall, £36 15s. C. 42a,

This "New" Market House and Town Hall was situated on the east side of St. Peter's Churchyard. It has been succeeded by a still newer building, erected on the further side of the street in 1848, from designs by Benjamin Ferrey. See Hutchins' *Dorset*, Vol. ii., p. 406.

THE SHIREHALL.

This building was enlarged in the year 1638, when there is found "A particular noate of the names of such persons as have promised to contribute towards the charge of enlarging of the Shirehall with the severall somes by them contributed." C. 9, p. 115. A list is given of ninety-eight names. The highest contribution, that of "Mr. maior Ja: Gould," being £2. 10. 0, the lowest 2s. The total promised amounted to £66. 1. 0.

In C. 13 occurs "A note of such moneyes as are to be disbursed about the Shirehall, 1638." The total sum amounts to £72. 15. 2. Between a payment to Jno. Broome, pavier, and Richard Watts (? labourer) is found, "Itt. to Nath. Bower for francumsence 8d." The agreement made with Robert Wyer, 10th April, 1638, for work at the Shirehall, already occurs in Hutchins' *Dorset*, and need not be here reprinted. C. 9, p. 131.

1752-3, Feb. 28. £10 to be paid to Mrs. Ann, Mary and Margaret Cooper, for the damage done them in the Shirehall garden, by the building of the end of the Grand Jury Room on their Ground and loss to the present tenants of the said garden. C. 27.

1769, Oct. 30. "It is resolved that the County Hall be immediately fitted up for the reception of the Judges as a Court for holding the Assizes to prevent any further Complaint from them of the want of repairs, And that the Town Steward and Town Clerk do cause proper Estimates of the Expence of so doing to be prepared and laid before us at our next Meeting: And it is further resolved and agreed that the Town Steward for the time being do take possession of the said Hall and let out the same as a Warehouse or for any other purposes as shall be thought proper, taking care that no damage be done and all things removed in proper time before the Assizes or Sessions or other publick occasions on Notice given thereof, And that the Town Steward be desired to let the same accordingly." C. 27.

1791, II July. At the General Quarter Sessions for the County of Dorset, held before David Robert Michel, Francis John Browne and William Morton Pitt, Esquires, Justices.

It is proposed that the Ground on which the County Hall is built, be conveyed by the Corporation of the Borough of Dorchester to the County at large, for a Term of ninety nine years, and that a Quit Rent of the full value of the Ground, by way of Acknowledgment vizt. Five Pounds Str. be annually paid to the Corporation of the same.

That the Property of the said Buildings be declared to be in the County and the Expence of all Repairs, or Rebuilding when it may become necessary, shall for the future, and in whole be defrayed by the County.

That it be stipulated that the Corporation shall always be allowed the free use of the Hall, gratis for the purpose of holding their Sessions, Public meetings, Balls or any other public entertainments together with a Key of the outer Door for their greater Convenience but to be restricted expressly from letting it to Players, or to any Person or Persons whatsoever.

That the Record Room shall be put under the care, and into the Custody of the Clerk of the Peace for the time being, and his Successors, and never be put to any other Use, but the purposes for which it was intended.

That Troops on their march, or quartered in the Town may be accommodated with the Use of the Hall for a Guard Room and for the Lodging of their Baggage on an Engagement on the part of the Commanding Officer that if any Damage or Nuisance should happen he will defray the Expence thereof.

The Lease to be made to the Justices, who are appointed a Committee to visit and inspect the state of the Gaol, and their Successors as Trustees for the County. C. 42a.

(A lease was subsequently granted on 1st October, 1792, which may be read in Hutchins' *Dorset*, Vol. ii., p. 372. See also C. 42a).

FAIRS AND MARKETS.

The Fairs and Markets at Dorchester in 1337 are given in the Inquisition of that date, at page 8, viz.:—Fairs on the festivals of Holy Trinity, Nativity of St. John Baptist, and St. James, and Markets on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays. The following memoranda refer to later regulations.

1631, Nov. 21. Process to be taken against persons who have refused to pay toll, and who have broken the Liberty by arresting townsmen. C. o.

1640, July 15. "Whereas Mr. John Gould, of Vpway, bringing in come into our market which was brought from France, expects to have it Toll Free, It is thought fitt and so

ordered that he shall pay Toll corne for it, being noe way exempt." C. 12.

1640, July 22. "Sheepe Markett. It is agreed at the motion of Mathew Bonger, that the Serieants at Mace shall on St. James' day next proclaime in the faire that yf the Country men will bring in their sheepe and cattle on any market daies, provision shall be made for pyning of the sheep that shall be brought to the market to be sold." C. 12.

1692-3, Jan. 27. "Wee agree that Mr. Wm. Channing shall have and enioy the setting vpp and placeing of hurdles and therewith makeing Pynes for the sale of all sorts of Sheepe and Lambes in all the Faires and Marketts within this Borough from henceforth for the space of seven yeares, he payeing yearely to the Mayor for the tyme being twelve pounds at Mich'as yearely, and he finding and provideing hurddles and not takeing above Twelve pence per score and soe proporcionable. What Pavements be spoiled Mr. Channing is to amend." C. 7.

1700, Oct. 21. Lease from the Corporation to William Channing of Dorchester, maulster, of all that their faires and Marketts of and within the Borough for the selling and exposing to sale of all sorts of sheep and lambes, for 7 years, at £12 rent, he not to exact more than 12d. by the score for penning sheep and lambs, and to repair pavements prejudiced by the said penning. Richard Samwaies, Mayor. B. 45.

1693, Oct. 2. Court of General Ouarter Sessions. "Whereas it is found by experience that diverse persons who bring corne, grain and other vendible comodities to this Towne to make sale thereof, doe often sett in and place such their corne and goods in Innes, Alehouses, Hosteries and other places or the greatest parte thereof, and carry some small parte thereof into the Marketts and faires that happen within this Borough, whereby the price of Corne and other Comodities are much inhaunced, and the poore and other Inhabitants abused thereby. And whereas diverse Millers, Bakers and Drovers take vppon [themselves] to buy great Quantities of Corne in and out of the Marketts in such places, whereby the same are soe placed as aforesaid. For Prevencion thereof for the future, It is ordered by this Court that if any Inkeeper, Tapster, Hostler, Alehouse Keeper, Hostery Keeper, or other person whatsoever, shall at any time receive, take in or harbour any Corne, graine or other vendible Comodities, or if any person or persons, that are the owners thereof or the servants

of such, shall refuse or neglect to carry into the Marketts or Faires within this Borough such Comodities as aforesaid, vnless it be after three of the clock in the afternoone in any Market or Faire day, or if any Miller, Baker or Drover, comeing to or being in the said Markett, shall presume or take vpon them, her or him to contract for or buy any Corne or graine in the Markett before twelve a Clocke in any Markett day, That then, vppon Complaynt to be made to any Justice of the Peece within this Borough, he is desired to bind over any such person as shall offend in any of the particulars before mencioned to the next Sessions, and in the meane time to be of the good behaviour." C. 21.

1708, Oct. 22. "Whereas diverse persons vseing the Marketts within this Borough and who bring potts or panniers with butter and cheese and place them in the Marketts without paying piccage or coverage money pretending they ought not to pay, And whereas Richard Brookes, waggoner, doth interrupt the Lessee of Hermitage Weights graunted by this Corporacion vnder our seale, Wee therefore agree that a prosecucion att Law be made, if occasion requires, against the persons aforesaid vseing the Marketts and against the said Richard Brookes, as Mr. Bond, our Recorder, shall advise." C. 7.

1757, May 16. "At a Meeting this Day of the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses of the said Borough, it is agreed that the Sheep Fairs, lately kept in a Lane called Pease Lane within this Borough, shall for the future be kept in the back West Street of the said Borough, from the West End of the said street as far as the East Corner of a garden now in the possession of Thomas Pook, gardner, and on both sides of the said street, as far as the opposite place to the said corner of the garden, and also all along the walks from the said West Corner, both north and south, as far as there shall be occasion: At the request and on the complaint of several Farmers and Owners of Sheep who come to the said Fairs, on account of the said Lane called Pease Lane being very inconvenient and even dangerous for penning sheep in the said Lane." C. 27.

1770, Oct. 16. The serjeants at Mace to pay the Town Steward £21, for tolls of Fairs and Markets by them usually collected, and to collect the Burgage Rate. C. 27.

1795, Apl. 27. "The Price of all kinds of victualls and Provisions brought to this Market being increased to an exorbitant Degree, and which is in a great measure thus en-

hanced by Hucksters, Higlers and retailers, buying at an early hour of the Market-Day Quantities of such victualls and Provisions in order for selling the same again in the same Market, or elsewhere, before the Inhabitants can be supplied by the Market people with what is necessary for their own Families, And also by Forestalling the Marketts; For the remedying which injurious and unlawfull Practises it is become expedient that the laws be put in Force against such Offenders, And that certain orders and regulations be made respecting the Marketts of this Borough."

Ist. That the Markett days, being on Wednesdays and Saturdays for this Borough, shall begin at seven of the Clock in the Morning, and not earlier, and that no person shall sell any provisions or victualls of any kind whatsoever in the Markett places of this Borough till the Market commences at the Time above appointed, which is to be proclaimed by the ringing of the Town Bell.

2nd. That no Person who buys to sell again shall resort to such Market to buy of the market people there, nor in any manner deal or contract for the purchase of any provisions or victualls before the Hour of Twelve of the Clock in the forenoon of each Market Day, at which Hour the Town bell shall be again rung (except butter, which may be purchased at any time after Ten o'clock in the Morning between the first day of May and the first day of September next ensuing).

3d. That all Provisions and Victualls, brought for sale to this Borough, shall be exposed to sale in the usual Market places where such Articles are usually sold, and not sold privately and at private Houses.

4th. That all Potatoes in the Quantity of a bushell or upwards shall be sold by weight. C. 42a.

1806, April 7. Approved of suggestion made by several of the Principal Farmers, Graziers and Butchers of the County of Dorset, that it will be for the Public advantage and convenience to have fat and lean sheep and cattle sold at the Market for this Borough on Saturday, 19th April instant, and so to continue every Fortnight until the 28th of June next inclusive. C. 42a.

1806, June 30. Resolved that Notice be given to John Chapman to quit the Hurdle House of which he is Tenant at Lady Day next, and which is to be from that time used for depositing the Hurdles and Standings belonging to the Fairs and Markets. Resolved also that the Price of the

Pens for sheep at the Fairs and Markets be raised to one Shilling and six pence for every score of sheep and lambs, on account of the advanced Price of the Hurdles, to commence on next Saint James' Fair, and that Notice thereof be given by advertisement. C. 42a.

1817, Jan. 8. Agreed that no standings be in future allowed on the pavement on the North side of the High West Street, between the Eastern part of the old butter Market and the first column of the Church yard wall from the Guildhall, and that the standings to be removed be placed on Market and Fair days to the said old butter Market. C. 42a.

1827, Dec. 12. Resolved that the Fairs and Markets shall be let by auction for one year, to commence from the 25th day of March next, and that a Salary shall be paid to the Serjeants at Mace as a compensation for the duties of their office, in lieu of the Tolls of the Markets. C. 42a.

1828, Dec. 19. That in pursuance of the Recommendation of the Jury at the late Quarter Sessions for the Borough, no Butcher or Pork Dealer be allowed in future to have standings under the Hall on the west side of the Road, but that it be used by Dealers in Poultry, Butter and Eggs. C. 42a.

1830, Mch. 8. Ordered that the Tolls and Dues of the several Markets and Fairs be advertized in the Dorset County Chronicle to be let by Tender for two years from the 25th Instant with an option for the Taker to give them up at the end of the first year on giving three months Notice to the Town Clerk. C. 42a.

1832, Apl. 17. Agreed to let the Markets and Fairs for three years from 25th March last, to Henry Mack, at yearly rent of £160 payable monthly, option to quit at end of first year on 3 months Notice. C. 42a.

1833, Apl. 1. The requisition lately presented to the Mayor for calling a Meeting to consider the propriety of seeking to obtain powers in the contemplated new Paving Act to alter the day of one of the Summer Fairs and to hold the Sheep Fairs out of the Town was discussed and the object of it approved. C. 42a.

1835, Feb. 11. Ordered that in pursuance of the power for that purpose contained in the new Paving Act, the Fair heretofore held on Trinity Monday be in future held on the 25th day of October yearly, and that Notice thereof be given accordingly as by the said Act is required.

Ordered that the Town Clerk do take the necessary

measures for letting the Tolls of the Fairs and Markets by Tender for one year from the 25th day of March next. C. 42a

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

1793, Oct. 26. It being represented that the Pork Shop, or Weight House, is become very offensive, and a nuisance owing to the Butchers weighing the raw Hides and Tallow there; Agreed that the present scales shall be removed from the Weight House to the Tree opposite Chubb's Almshouse near the Fryery, and a new Pair of Scales, for the Pork and Butchers Meat only, be purchased for the Weight House, in the room of those to be taken away for the weighing of the Hides and Tallow as aforesaid; And that a shed over the scales be erected if found to be necessary. C. 42a.

1825, Feb. 16. Resolved that no steps be at present taken respecting the new Weights and Measures, the time being likely to be extended for bringing them into use. C. 42a.

1834, Dec. 22. Mr. Bennett Harvey, Jun., having offered to supply the Corporation with a compleat copy of the Imperial Standard Weights and Measures, properly passed and authenticated, at the sum of fifty nine Pounds (exclusive of carriage) upon the old weights and measures being given up to him; Resolved, that Mr. Harvey's offer be accepted, and the same provided forthwith, and that such new Weights and Measures be marked with the figure of a small Castle, with the letter D in the centre. C. 42a.

1834, Dec. 20. Mr. Bennett Harvey writes that he has examined the Weights and Measures at the Town Hall, and that there will be required a New Bushell, Half Bushell, Peck, Gallon, Half Gallon, Gill and Half Gill Measures, and an Eight ounce, Four ounce, Two ounce, One ounce, Half ounce, Quarter ounce, Dram and Half Dram Weights, to make the set compleat. A compleat set of new Weights and Measures with Imperial Yard will be £65, exclusive of carriage. The value of the old Weights and Measures, now in the Hall, is about £6 6s. (Letter pinned in C. 42a.)

STREET IMPROVEMENTS AND REGULATIONS.

1631, July 13. No Brewers of the town, after 24th Aug. next, shall carry beer abroad in the town in carts with iron bonds on the wheels, these having injured the pavement. C. 9.

1639-40, Jan. 29. "To have a buy law made and confirmed at next Lawday for paving the streets at every man's charge except xh. out of the Brewhouse to pave publik places." C. 12.

1641, Oct. 27. "It is ordered and agreed that the said vjh. [received for grant of a lease] shall be bestowed in paving the void place unpaved from the Butchers standing northwards sufficiently, and what it costs more Mr. Maior doth vndertake to procure." C. 12.

1693, Jan. 12. Court of General Quarter Sessions. "It is ordered by this Court that every Inhabitant within this Borough in every Street thereof doe weekly on every Saterday well and sufficiently sweepe and cleanse before their seuerall houses, outhouses, gardens and walks, home to the midle of the gutter or kennell, and take and carry away the dust, dirt and filth that shall be there, &c." C. 21.

1769, June 6. "All the Coopers within the Borough were sent for and ordered to remove all nuisances, and not to make their Casks or do their Work in the streets for the future." C. 27.

1783, Sept. 18. "Mr. Robert Stickland having purchased the White Hart Inn in the parish of All Saints within the said Borough by the desire of the Corporation for the sum of £680, the same is approved of, and Resolved that the east part thereof be pulled down as soon as conveniently may be after the purchase is compleated, and that as a considerable sum of money will be wanting to carry the scheme into execution, it is further Resolved that application be made to our present Representatives for the favour of their aid and assistance to enable us to perform the same." C. 27. [This effected an improvement at the eastern entrance of the Town. See ante, on p. 488.]

1812, Nov. 6. A Petition having been presented by the Inhabitants of this Borough addressed to the Mayor and Corporation, requesting their consent, as Proprietors of the Reversion and Inheritance of the Houses in the Occupation of Thomas Standish, James Mills and others, to the pulling down and destroying the same for the Purpose of widening the street near Saint Peter's Church; It was at this Meeting considered that the pulling down such Houses will be of great Advantage to the Public and tend to the Improvement of the Town of Dorchester, and have therefore Resolved and agreed that the Mayor and Corporation do consent to give up and relinquish their Right and Interest in the said Houses, so far

as may be necessary towards accomplishing the above object. C. 42a.

1825, Aug. 29. Resolved that the Public Pump erected by Mr. Bennett Harvey, sen., in consideration of his being allowed to extend his Building on some part of the waste belonging to the Corporation, be repaired by them, and the Town Steward is desired to lower the Bed of the Pump to the same level with the street, and to take out the initials "B.H." C. 42a.

1828, Mch. 3. Ordered that measures be taken under the Paving Act for suppressing all Nuisances and Obstructions on the Foot and Horse Ways within the Borough by Tradesmen putting goods before their Houses and Shops. C. 42a.

1831, Sept. 5. Resolved, that the Town Steward do give out of the Corporation Funds the sum of Ten Pounds towards the Improvement at the entrance of Durngate Street by purchasing and pulling down the projecting part of Mr. Elias Galpin's House. C. 42a.

1833, Apl. I. A Licence granted to "The Dorchester Gas Light and Coke Company" to lay down their works and pipes in the streets, etc. C. 42a.

1833, Oct. 14. Resolved that the Corporation do request the Gas Company to place a Lamp over the Blindhouse Door, and also lay down Pipes and do what may be necessary for lighting both the Rooms at the Town Hall with Gas, and that the Corporation bear the expence of the whole, including the keeping the Lamp over the Blind House regularly lit. C. 42a.

WATCH AND WARD.

1641, Nov. 8. "It is agreed in regard of these dangerous tymes: That there bee window leaves made by the Steward of the Borough for the windowes of the back partes of the shire hall and gable (?) place there and set vp in the Inside speedily, and alsoe for the small window next Mris. Hiatts, or walled vp, and that there shall bee a constant watch till further order within the Towne in euery night of xij, whereof iij shall watch about the Sheerehall and betwene the Shirehall and Mr. Churchilles howse. And that one discreete person shall euery Lord's day during service and sermon watch on the Towre of Peter's and veiw the country round about. And that the Townesmen shall bee moved to provide all their armes in readines for defence of the Towne." C. 9.

1641, Nov. 22. "It is ordered that this number of 12 be reduced to 8, and that two more every night of substantial

men of the towne to be of the number 42 to surrownd and looke to the watch, from tenne at night till 5 in morning, and they to be excused for that from their ordered night watch." C. 9.

1641-2, Jan. 28. "It's this day thought fitt and ordered that there shall be an award set every Saboth and fasting day of eight men, two at the east end of the Towne, one at the galloes, two at the south end of the Towne, one at the west end, two at Glippath, also that one man shall in tyme of divyne prayer and sermon be set to watch in the tower both forenoone and afternoone." C. 12.

1643, June 23. "Ordered that in respect of the danger of the times there be a strict course taken tomorrow at the Fayre for feare of Incomers." C. 12.

1652, Oct. 29. Six blacke bills to be bought by the Town Steward for the Watchmen. C. 12.

1704-5, March 2. "Robt. Phippard is excused by reason of his age, which is seaventy and five, from watching and warding within this Borough." C. 7.

1834, Sept. 19. In pursuance of the new Paving Act, Abraham Scriven, George Hawkins and Richard Pope, the Watchmen of the said Borough, were sworn in as Constables for the said Borough before the Mayor during their continuance in office as Watchmen. C. 42a.

THE TOWN CHEST AND DOCUMENTS.

1656-7, Jan. 2. "The Keyers for this yeare for the Keyes of the Towne Chest are elected and nominated Mr. Major and Mr. Bailiffs: and that the ancient order be continued that the Chest be not opened unlesse their be eight of the Capitall Burgesses present, and new Keyers to be chosen every yeare." C. 15.

1707, May 5. Mr. George Lester, having on the 28th Sept. last, broken open the Corporation's Chest, and abstracted the Common Seal and Book of Entries belonging to the Guardians of the Free School, which had been entrusted by them to this Corporation for 90 years and upwards, and having nailed down the said Chest so that it cannot be opened,—and when summoned to open the said Chest and deliver up the Seal and Book of Entries, having refused and "behaved himselfe very vnmannerly and gave base and vnworthy language," is now removed from being a Capital Burgess. C. 7.

1708-9, Jan. 28. Mr. Thos. Seward, Mayor, to be reimbursed £8. 16. 11, expenses in carrying on a Lawsuit against Mr. George Lester, decd., for breaking open the Chest of the Corporation. C. 7.

1802, Dec. 29. Resolved that a proper Place for depositing the Records, Books and Papers belonging to the Corporation be made under the Directions of the Mayor, the Town Steward, Mr. White, Mr. Nathaniel Stickland and Mr. Manfield. C. 42a.

1832, Feb. 23. In consequence of the Service upon the Mayor of the Speaker's Warrant, requiring the production to certain persons therein named of the public Documents relating to Whetstone's Charity, the same were this day searched for and investigated, and it was ordered that the Documents relating to the said Charity, now left in the hands of the Town Clerk, be produced by him accordingly, but he is directed not to allow the same to go out of his possession, nor to allow any entry or particular relating to another Charity to be seen. C. 42a.

1835, Dec. 21. Ordered that the Mayor, assisted by the Town Clerk, be requested to look through the Muniments and other Documents and Papers, and separate those which belong to the Corporation in their corporate character from those which relate to Trust or Charitable affairs, in order that the former may be ready to be delivered to the new Council. C. 42a.

NEW TOWN SEAL.

1629, Dec. 23. "It is this day agreed vpon that whereas there is a new siluer seale made for this Corporacion, with the armes of this Borough graven upon it, and this inscription about it: SIG. MAIOR. BAL. ALD. ET. BVRG. DE. DORCHESTER. C. DORSET. That this seale shall from this day forward serve for all publique uses, and all the old Towne seales shalbe disanulled." C. 9.

disanulled." C. 9.

1631-2, Jan. 28. A fee of 2s. 6d. to be charged for affixing the Town Seal to any writing except for Town affairs,—to be paid to the Mayor. C. 9.

DORCHESTER FARTHINGS.

1668-9, Feb. 5. "This day ordered and desired that Mr. Jasper Samwayes, one of this Company, doe speedily procuer twenty pounds in Copper Farthings for the benefit off the pore of this Borough, and that the Towne Armes be

ingrauen on one side and HD on the other syde, and on the side where the Townes Armes are, to be ingrauen round the armes of Dorchester, and on the other side where HD a Dorchester Farthing and vnder HD the date of the Lord." C. 15.

(The meaning of this monogram "HD" was solved by Rev. J. H. Ward, in a communication to Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. iii., p. 104, as standing for "Hospital of Dorchester." The order of the letters may be accounted for by supposing they represent the name in a Latin form, as Hospitium Dorcestrense.)

LAWRENCE RIGHTON'S HALFPENCE.

1668-9, Feb. 5. "Mr. Lawrence Righton, haueing a certaine Brasse coine which he passeth for halfe pence, there being noe such Inscription on them, promiseth, in case they be put downe or doe not passe, will retake them att the same rate he now passeth them, being halfe pence. (Signed), LAWRENCE RIGHTTON." C. 15.

THE TOWN CLOCK.

1620, Mch. 31. Thomas Walden agrees to maintain and repair the clock, quarter clock and chimes of the Borough, for 21 years, if he live so long, and inhabit the Borough, at 10s. a year. C. 4.

1639, July 17. "John Roberts, the clockmaker, hath this day agreed with the Company to keep the Towne clock of Peter's parish for xiijs. iiijd. a yeare, to be paid quarterly by the Towne Steward, the said Roberts to amend all defects in the clock except by any accident the clock shall be extraordinarily broken, his terme to begin at Than [the Annunciation] last, and upon a quarter's warning his agreement to be void." C. 9, p. 132.

1650, Dec. 27. "John Roberts and Matthew Bennett have undertaken betwixt them to keepe the Clocke at Peter's church in good order by the consent of this Company. And that Bennett shall ring eight a'Clocke at night and fower in morning." C. 12.

ASSEMBLY OF THE CORPORATION.

1630, Dec. 29. "Agreed on by the Maior and maior part of the Justices and capitall Burgesses of this Borough, That every of the Capitall Burgesses, vnless for sufficient cause to be by them shewed to the contrary, shall be presente

assembled togither in the Towne Hall of this Borough, haueing every of them their gownes on every Wednesdaie by viij of the clocke in the morninge from henceforth followinge, sup p'a [sub pena] for every such default xijd. to the vse of the poore, and shall likewise all of them on every Friday from henceforth assemble togither at the place aforesaid, every Fridaie from henceforth by one of the clocke in the afternoone, supp'a for every such default xijd. to the vse aforesaide." C. 9.

LIVERY GOWNS.

1694, Dec. 21. "Forasmuch as good order and decency have byn heretofore vsually practised within this Borough, and especially amongst the Mayor, Bayliffes, Aldermen and Capitall Burgesses for the time being, and in particular in wearing of their Livery Gownes on Sundayes and other dayes, when the Mayor for the tyme being is attended to and from Church, on Lawdaies, Quarter Sessions, and other Sessions usualy held, and attending on Judges in their Circuits, and other Noble persons comeing into this Borough, which have not byn soe well manadged of late yeares, in respect persons. chosen into this Company, have neglected to buy and weare such Livery Gowns as aforesaid." It is ordered that the lately chosen Capital Burgesses provide and wear a Livery Gown at or before the next Lent Assizes on pain of £5 a piece. The Recorder is also to wear a Gown when he attends the Mayor and Magistrates. C. 7. [Order renewed 3 Dec., 1708.]

CORPORATION PEWS.

Dorchester, 18th October, 1816,

Reverend Sir.

By the direction of the Mayor and Corporation of this Borough I take the liberty of addressing you as the Archdeacon of this County on the following subject.

In the Parish Churches of The Holy Trinity and Saint Peter, at both of which the Corporation attend divine Service, the Duty is performed on Sundays for the mutual accomodation of the Inhabitants of both parishes, at one of them in the Morning and at the other in the Evening, and in each of such Churches three seats in the Square are indispensably necessary for the Members of the Corporation, and which they have usually enjoyed.

One of such seats in the Church of The Holy Trinity was lately locked up by the Churchwardens, which prevented

the use of it by some of the Members of the Corporation, and there was not sufficient Room for them in the two other Seats belonging to the Corporation.

The Corporation, therefore, request that as Archdeacon you will have the goodness to represent this matter to the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, and request his Lordship's Authority for the Corporation having the exclusive enjoyment of the three Seats in the south part of the Square of the Church of the Holy Trinity in this Town.

The Archdeacon begs the Favor of the Town Clerk to acquaint the Mayor and Corporation that It is the Bishop's Pleasure that the Corporation of Dorchester should have the Three Seats in the Church of The Holy Trinity which they require, appropriated solely to their use; And he has signified the same to the Churchwardens of that Parish. C. 42a.

THE HOSPITAL.

A full account of the establishment of this "Hospital," for setting the poorer portion of the inhabitants to work, is given in Hutchins' *Dorset*, and need not here be repeated, but the following extracts from the Minutes of the Corporation are valuable as showing the working of the Institution. The deed of foundation is dated 6th Oct., 15 James I., 1617.

1618, May 25. "It is this day agreed that John Cooke shall dwell in the Hospital or Workehouse for a whole yer from Midsom' next vnto Mydsom' come 12 moneth, 1619. And the said John Cooke is to pay the teacher of Spynners during that tyme." C. 4.

1631-2, Feb. 1. "Received of the right wo'll the Lady

I631-2, Feb. I. "Received of the right wo'll the Lady Jane Browne, of Frampton, the summe of Tenne pounds of current English mony as a guift which shee bestowed on the poore of the Towne of Dorchester to imploy them in worke, and the same Ten pownds shall bee according to her request putt into the hands of the Governor of the Hospitall of the same Towne to sett the poore on worke, and soe remayne in record to posterity amongst many worthy benefactors, wee say received the first of February, 1631, the summe of xh." C. 9.

1632, Oct. 26. Receipt to Gilbert Loder, executor, of

£33. 6. 8, legacy of Johan Gould, decd., to the "Governor of the poore children of the Hospitall of the Maior, Baylyffes, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester," for the use of the Hospital and the children, "to make up a summe of one hundred Markes (one hundred powndes)" which she had given in her lifetime for the erection of the Hospital. C. 9.

1634, Apr. 18. "There shall bee noe more Stewards chosen for the Hospitall of the Bailiffs and Burgesses of this Borough, But that the Governor of the said Hospitall shall have and execute the said office of Steward, and doe and performe such things as to the said Steward shall appertayne." C. q. [This rule was not maintained.]

1634, Apr. 18. John Coker displaced from being Governor of the Hospital, and Mr. Richard Savage, woollen draper, chosen in his stead. C. 9.

1638, June 19. "This day John Tarrenton, now of Forthington, is agreed withall to vndertake charge and to be master of the Hospitall to imploy halfe the children at present at burlinge,* and afterward the others as they are willing and able, To have the howse and Tenne [sic] per An: wages for the presente, and yf all the Children come vnto burlinge, and ther be no need of the women that doe now teach them to spinne, then the Towne to consyder of Tarrington to giue him either part or all, that is ix pownd, the women now hath." C. 12.

1639, Jan. 17. To remember to question him [John Ash] about chatachisinge the children which he hath neglected a greate while. C. 12.

1639-40, Jan. 24. "John Ash, the bonelace teacher, gave in his accompt to Mr. Maior of the bonelace stock, and thereon it appeareth Walter Spicer oweth 211i. 7s. and promised to give his owne security for it to pay xxs. a weeke vntill the debt bee paid, and is now ordered and hath promised to catechist the children of the Hospitall twice a weeke from henceforth, which he was to doe by agreement, but hath for a good tyme neclected it." C. 12.

1640, April 24. "It was agreed one that Thomas Churchill, baker, that is very sick and in bad condition, and now goinge to the Bath, shall have xxs. out of the Hospitall, out of that mony that is sett aparte yerely to cure lame people,

which shall be delivered to his wife to be given them to make provision for his Jorny." C. 12.

1640, July 31. "This day Mr. Bond making a proposal for altering the course of bone lace making and putting the children to spining and burling and thes to be talked of againe the next meeting." C. 12.

1640, Sept. II. "It is agreed that the children that now are in the Hospitall to make boane lace shall have warning to betake them to some other imployment by Chrismas next, and that John Ash shall have warning to leave the imployment in the Hospital at Chrismas next, or as soone as his tyme of warning, which he is to have by agreement, is expired, and that the children which will betake them to spynning or burling shall be imployed in that imployment by the steward of the Hospitall." C. 12.

1640, Sept. 12. John Ash, teacher of the bonelace makers in the Hospital, agrees to give up that imployment at Michaelmas next. C. 12.

1640, Oct. 2. "John Ash, bone lace maker, gave in his accompt of the Hospitall stock in his hands, which was imployed in bone lace, in imploying the poore children in worke.

He charges himselfe with mony in his hands of the

Hospitall stock, for which his bond lies .. 050h. 00 . 0 In satisfaccion whereof he hath brought in his account of threed, lace and debts dew for

lace 050 . 08 . 0

The particulars of which threed and lace he hath delivered in to Mr. Maior and the company in his box which is in the Counsell house sealed vp with Mr. Maior's and John Ashes seales, and it is all offered to John Ash for 47h. to be paid 25 March next, and he craves tyme to give his answeare."

1640, Oct. 5. "John Ash made an absolute bargaine for it for the sume aforesaid, and received the box and lace and threed sealed vp for his owne vse in presence of Mr. Maior Mr. Joliff and Willm. Derby." C. 12.

· · 1640, Dec. 1. "It is ordered that the vh. to be paid to Peter Salanova for cutting of Giles Garretts leg shall be paid out of the xh. yearely paiable out of the Hospitall for pious vses, by order for such vses, and to have the one halfe having cutt of his leg already, and the other halfe when he is thoroughly cured." C. 12.

1640, Dec. 11. "John Torrington, now Mr. of the Hospitall, desiring to have his wages of 12h. and the howse

to be augmented to 201i. yearely, besides the howse, in regard he hath now more children for him to oversee, for that the bonelace making is now discharged in the howse, or els he will leave the place and imployment by Than: of the Virgin Mary next; and Mr. Maior and the company hath answered him they will before that tyme provide a man for that place or sooner yf John Torrington shall leave the imployment." C. 12.

1640-1, Feb. 12. An agreement of this date (C. 9, p. 94) between the Corporation and John Torrington, overseer of the children of the Hospital, is printed in Hutchins' *Dorset*.

1640-1, Feb. 17. "It is this day ordered that Thomas Wier, who hath an infirmity growne vppon him by a carnosyty growne in his and the Capt. Sala Noua promyseth to doe his endeauor to cure him, but demandeth 61i., for present, for his dyet, phisicke and his Paynes; This Company have ordered the stuard of the Hospital to pay three pownd toward the charge vnto Capt: Salanoua." C. 12.

1643, June 23. "It is ordered that the fiftie pounds that Mr. Bushrod hath in his hands of the Hospital stockes shall at Mr. Bushrod's motion be employed in Clothing for the setting the poore aworke in the Hospital house, at the hazard of the Towne, or to the profitt and losse of the Towne."

Directly after this entry is added, "By reason of the Warres this booke was discontinued for fower yeares and another booke was made use of for the Towne busines, &c."

The next entry is dated I Oct., 1647. C. 12.

1646, Dec. II. "This day Mr. Mayor and the Capital Burgesses of this Borough did agree that in respect of the late wars and troubles and losses sustained, as also for that the Hospital hath had no children in it for this three yeares last past, that the rents, due to the Hospital from Mr. Mayor, Mr. James Gould, and Mris. Parkins for fower yeares last past at Midsommer last, should not be required nor exacted in full by the Gouernor of the sayd Hospital, but that the sayd parties should be abated the one halfe of fower yeares rent, as aforesayd, . . . and that the children may be speedily sett aworke and the house brought into order." C. Q.

1649, May 7. "This day Tho: Clench was here, and demanded 10*li*. per ann. more than the stocke of the Hospital which is 150*li*. lent him for the furnishing of the house with worke for spinners, and for the overlooking to the children.

And that if he doth not shortly offer to this Company a fitt man to live in the house in his steede, such a man as wee shall approve of, that then he will resolve to go and live in the house himselfe, and that the Spinners shall have all the yeare $3\frac{1}{2}$ d a ii. for yearne.

This order to be fully agreed upon when the Company is full. And that there be as many children kept aworke as the roomes will hold. This agreement to continue for five yeares from Midsomer next, and Clement Bryne is approved of to live in the house." C. 12.

1649, Dec. 14. "This day it was agreed that xxs. should be lent unto Tho: Saunders by the steward of the Hospital of the Brewhouse monny to buy leather to sett him on work and xxs. to Mathew Bennet vpon the same tearmes." C. 12.

1649-50, Feb. 6. "It is resolved and agreed that on Fryday next, or next meeting, wee shall take into consideracion the setting of the poore on worke in spinning of worsted, and knitting of stockins, and also of setting vp a trade of making sackcloth. And Mr. Savage is desired to send for the sackcloth maker of Great Tollar, to treatt with him about his helpe in the same." C. 12.

1649-50, Feb. 8. Edward Hayne, an Hospital boy, apprenticed to Henry Hillard, the Button maker, for 9 years, premium 41i. in money and 20s. in apparel. C. 12.

1649-50, Feb. 15. "This day it was agreed that Mr. Losse should be payed by the Steward of the Hospital the somme of viijh. for his paynes and fee as Phisitian in taking care of the poore of the Towne for the last yeare ending Michaelmas last, as it hath bin formerly accustomed."

1651, Nov. 19. "Mr. Bushrod, Steward of the Hospital, is ordered and desired to disburse vnto the Widow Foote xs. for the curing of the Widow Huchins' lame leg at present; and xs. more when the cure is finished." C. 12.

1651, Dec. 19. "This day Mr. Mayor and this Company agreed with Robert Guifford's wife to teach such poore children of the Towne as should offer themselves to be taught to reade at the Chamber ouer the Hospital, and for her paynes therein shee is to be payed xh. per ann. in case there be not more than 30 children taught, but if there be more then 30 children, then shee is to be payed xih. per annum." C. 12.

1652, Sept. 24. "It is ordered and desired that Mr. Bushrod, the Steward of the Hospital, do pay vnto Mr. Mullens

the somme of thirty shillings for curing of Hugh Rogers of a dangerous fistula." C. 12.

1652, Oct. 15. "Ordered that the poore children which are learners to reade at the Hospital shall be clad with vpper clothes, suites and lynnen, and that it bee don by the fifth of November, if possible, by the Steward of the Hospital, whose care is desired herein. And it is ordered that the nomber of children to be taught to reade at the Hospital shall from henceforth not exceede the nomber of threescore. And that Mr. Bayliffes for this yeare be desired to take the ouersight of the Schollars, and that none bee hereafter admitted to the Schole but by Mr. Bayliffes' permission." C. 12.

1653, March 25. "There was a tender made to Mr. Mullens, the Chirurgion, the some of xxxs. for curing of Thomas Hobbs, but hee answered hee would consider of it next weeke." [He declined.] C. 12.

1653, May 20. "A List of children at the Hospital which have bin this yeare clothed, but neglect to follow their reading and schole—Edward Allen's 3 children have bin there but one weeke since Ch'tide: Widow Counter's children wanting a moneth at a time: Edw: Millar's 2 children not there since Ch'tide: Peter Trask his 2 children not there since Ch'tide till now lately: — Gray in Alhollowes I child not there since Xtide: Maunders' 2 children not there since Xtide: Widow Lee's boy not there since Xtide: John Bryne his boy Thomas not there since Xtide, his other boy seldome there." C. 12.

1654-5, Jan. 5. £3 more (£3 already paid) be paid to Cassander[ra] Haggard, "for finishing the great cure on John Drayton otherwise Keuse. C. 12.

1654-5, March 23. "Itt is agreed this day betweene Mr. Maior, Bailiffs and Companie and Mr. Thomas Clench,*

* 1662, Aug. 11. Mr. Clench, who owes the town £63. 10. 6, to the Town Steward 23 pieces of cottons: when sold, Mr. Clench is to have the overplus. 1662, Aug. 22. Mr. Clement Bryne is to be asked whether he will take the Cottons and give security for £100.

1663, July 15. "Wm. Wade and Joseph Seward shall adventuer the three and twentie peces off Cottons off Mr. Clenches into Fraunce, and that they shall hold an account off the neate proceeds thereoff vnto this Company."

1665, April 7. "This day ordered that the sixty pounds due to the Lord Hollis from the old magistrates for Barley be tendered John Dammer some tyme the next weeke, and that Wm. Wade and Joseph Seward doe pay the mony out [of] the mony they did adventuer to Fraunce for the vse off Corporation." C. 15.

that Mr. Clench is to bee Maister and overseer of the Hospital and the children thereof, for three yeares from Lady day next. And he is to have yerely for his paines 100l. lent gratis and to hold and enioy the howse and viijl. a yeare more. And the towne to repaire the howse and buildings, and Mr. Clench is to take care of and over the children that shalbe sent thither: and he is to take care to teach and correct them in due and fitt manner and to see that they neglect not the Sabboth," &c. C. 12.

1659, April 20. "It was agreed that Mr. Hewett should contract with Margarett Moore, of Wimborne, singlewoman, to take vpon her the teaching to knitt, worsteed and silke, all the pore children of the Towne, or as many of them as shall be sett on worke. To have xijh. per annum wages." C. 15.

1659, Apr. 27. "Margaret Moore came hither, and did promise to be here at Whittsontide, and then to enter vpon the employment." C. 15.

1659, June 3. "There was a promise made to Wm. Demant, that in case Mr. Turbervil shall cure his eies and his wife's of a Cataract growen over them, that this Company will giue three pounds towards the cure, and Mr. Stansby is desired to signifie so much vnto Crewkherne." C. 15.

1659, Sept. 23. Twenty shillings paid to Wm. Demant, "in consideration of the charges hee was at in seeking to cure his wife's eies at Crookherne." C. 15.

1660, Oct. 26. "Phillip Stansby, Bayliff, be desired to write to a friend of his of Crewkarne, that in case Mr. Troubelfeild doe perfectly cure Wm. Deamont of his eye sight, and that this company have sattisffaction it is done; then his frind doe pay Mr. Turbelfeild forty shillings." C. 15. 1661, May 24. "Whereas great complaynt is made

in the Towne that the pore Hospital children and others do frequently go abroad a begging at dores, Adam Hayne was taxed for it, and charged to looke better, or else that himself shall bee putt in blindhouse the next time there is complaynt of any such beggars going abroad a begging." C. 15.

1661-2, Jan. 8. "This day John Debnam had leave granted to him to have the use of the loft over the breaking shop at the Hospital, adjoyning to the reading Schole, to exercise the setting on worke of pore Children about the trade of Cordemaking. And it is promised to him that no body shall putt him out of the sayd roome whiles hee doth so employ the sayd children of the Hospital that come to Schole there, and to pay them for their worke." C. 15.

1662, Sept. I. "This Company do order the Steward of the Hospital to pay vnto Mr. Jasper Colston the somme of twenty pounds towards his bill of fifty-seaven pounds, in charges of Phisick deliuered out to sick people in seueral yeares last past, many particulars whereof this Company think fitt that Mr. Colston should demand of the parties themselves to whome the same was deliuered, and this monny to be payd to him betwixt this and Christmas." C. 15.

1663-4, March 2. "The Steward of the Hospitall is desired to disburse vnto Mr. Cole the Summe of 3h, for the transportacion of John Barber and his family to New England." C. 15.

1664-5, Feb. 3. "Agreed with Mr. Beniamyn Speering that as Master of the Hospitall he shall have that parte of the Hospitall howse which was late in the possession of Thomas Clench, and a chamber which was late in the possession of John Deadman, and eight pownds by the yeare for his sallery, and the howse is to be repaired by the Steward of the Hospitall, by quarterly payments at the Towne Hall, and Mr. Speering is to repaire the glasse windowes, he is to be allowed fifteene turnes for setting the poore that are in the howse or which shall be sent to him to be set on worke there, and shall have new cards of fowerteene pence price by the paire, to be allowed him by the Steward of the Hospitall quarterly, and Mr. Speering doth agree to provide spinning work for such poore persons that shall spin with those turnes as are now there, or shall be hereafter sent thither by the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses, and to pay the poore for their spinning after the vsuall rates for the worke they doe. And this agreement to continue for one whole yeare from Christmas last and from thence forth vntill Mr. Spering shall give notice to this Company that he will leave the place at six moneths end, or the Company give Mr. Speering six moneths notice to leave the same." "It is agreed by the herevnder written. haveing looked into the Foundacion of the Hospitall within this Borough that the intent and meaning and speciall direction of the Founders are for the yearely mayneteyning of fiftie poore children in worke there, which for many yeares past have not byn soe fully ymployed as the same ought to have byn, that from henceforth no Rates or taxes shalbe ymposed or sett vppon the said Hospital or Lands belonging thereto. Royall aide excepted, and that from Easter next the weekely payments to seuerall poore persons, vsually paid by the Steward of the Hospital, shall cease, and that from and after Mich'as next the whole profitts of the Hospitall and Lands shall goe and be ymployed for the setting on worke of fiftie poore children, and other things which may be incident to the manadgment thereof, the Stocke and Utensills of and in the houses and buildings, and the debts contracted for the purchaseing thereof beeing to be then considered and sett apart, being no parte of the Charitable Vse. Andr. Loder " [and ten others]. C. 15.

1674, April 24. "It is ordered that Mr. Beniamen Gould doe pay fowerteen shillings and two pence weekely, and no more, to the poore people of this Borough for three weekes, and in the meane tyme consideracion be taken how to pay the same out of each parish in time to come. And for that purpose it is ordered that all the Company, Governor and the Common Councell, and the old and new Church-Wardens and Overseers of each parish be sommoned to meete here at the hall on Monday next, by five in the afternoone." C. 15.

1674, April 24. "Haveing treated with Mr. Maximilian

Talbot, of Taunton, for his comeing hither to Governe the trade of serge makeing, It's ordered that this busines be further considered of Monday next, and he then to have notice of the Resolucion in this matter." C. 15.

1674, May 8. "It is adjudged that Mr. Maximilian Talbott, in respect of his inabilitie to give security to be answerable for what he might be trusted withall, is not a fitt person for the imployment he was intended, and that notice may be given him of it.

It is agreed that all the Mercers within this Borough be sommoned to attend here Friday next, at tenn of the Clocke in the forenoone, to consider with vs about bringing a person hither to sett vp the trade of a Button Maker, for setting the poore on worke, as likewise about a Sargeman." C. 15.

1674, May 8. "It is ordered that Mr. Beniamen Gould shall continue the weekely payments to the poore people of the parish of All Saints out of the Hospitall only, and no more, and this vntill further order." C. 15.

1676, March 31. Mr. Benjamin Gould appointed Governor of the Hospital. C. 15.

1725. March 5. "Whereas formerly a Charity schoole and workehouse were erected in the High South Streete in this Borough, for supporting the poore people, the educacion of poore children, which Schoole and workehouse for many yeares hath bin disused, and are now very much out of repaire; And whereas the said Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses are now desireous to repaire the said schoole and workehouse. in order that the poore people and children of the said Borough may be sett to labour, and instructed and educated in learning. and taught to worke, the better to gaine their livelyhoods hereafter, It is ordered and agreed that Robert Weare, Gentleman, the present Mayor, and Daniell Arden, Gen', the late Mayor, be joyned with Mr. Walter Crowe, the present Hospital Steward, and that they, or any two of them, doe contract with Carpenters, Masons and all other workemen, for repaireing the said house, and rebuilding a Messuage fitting for a Schoolemaster and his wife to reside in, and also for rebuilding the outhouse belonging to Mr. Purchase his now dwelling house, and that, soe soone as conveniently may be after the repaireing, they produce a just account of the Expence thereof before the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses for the time being, for adjusting the same." C. 7.

1749, July 24. Mr. James Chaffey elected Governor of the Hospital. C. 27.
1767, April 23. "The Mayor and Magistrates of this

1767, April 23. "The Mayor and Magistrates of this Borough, being informed that at a Vestry held for the Parish of St. Peter in this Borough on Monday last (being Easter Monday) four very improper persons were then named to be Overseers of the said Parish... It appearing also that these imprudent measures were taken by a litigious Part of the Inhabitants of the said Parish, in order to create confusion by preventing the Poor being supported in their old and usual manner in the publick Hospital of the said Borough, as they have been for many years last past supported, without any consideration being had by the Inhabitants in general of the said Parish of the Propriety of removing the said Poor from the said Hospital... Resolved that the Mayor for the time being, with the Consent of the major Part of the Corporation, shall nominate two, three or four Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish annually, as they shall think proper," etc. C. 27.

1779, June 28. Mr. John Oldis elected Governor of the Hospital Lands within the Borough, on resignation of Mr. James Chaffey. C. 27.

1793, Feb. 19. On resignation of Mr. John Oldis, Mr. John Garland appointed Governor of the Hospital. C. 42a. 1803. April 18. Mr. John Garland resigns. C. 42a.

1803, May 12. Resolved that the Junior Bailiff for the time being be the Governor and Steward of the Hospital lands. C. 42a.

1827, June. A Deputation of Gentlemen, appointed by and on behalf of the several Parishes within the Borough at a Meeting of the parishioners held on the 16th day of April last, having waited upon the Governor and Steward of the Hospital, and desired that the Statement of the Accounts of the Governor should in future be annually exhibited with the Accounts of the Guardians, to undergo the examination of the Auditors appointed in pursuance of the resolution of the Inhabitants of the Town of the 6th of January, 1743, and the Governor and Steward, Morgan Yeatman, Esqre., having laid the Application before the Meeting, ordered that the Guardians of the Poor be supplied with a Copy of the Account annually settled by the Corporation in future, that a Copy of the last Account be sent to the Guardians by the Town Clerk, and that the Town Clerk do inform the Guardians accordingly. 1831, July 8. Ordered that £12 10s. be allowed out of the proceeds of the Hospital lands to the National School Society, for the necessary repairs of the Central School Room, part of those lands, including the rough-casting and pointing the whole of the West Wall, such work being done under the superintendence of Mr. Stephen Gale. THE TOWN BREWHOUSE.

This experiment in Municipal trading was made in close connection with the Hospital, though its aim was not wholly philanthropic, as may be seen below.

1621-2, March 4. "It is alsoe agreed by them the same tyme that wheras there is a good somme of mony belonging to the Hospitall which now remaynes in seuerall hands, and wheras also it is found by experience that the Brewers of this Borough doe not make good beere wherby there is great complaynt. For remedy wherof and for the ymployment of which mony, It is agreed that there shall be with the said mony a Brewhowse built on the Hospitall grownd betweene this and Michaelmas next, or sooner yf it may bee, and being built to be ymployed and set on worke by the same mony, the profitt arising therby to goe to the benefitt of the hospital." C. 4.

1622-3, Jan. 17. Beniamyn Devenish of Dorchester, tailor, to be Clerk of the Brewhowse and Maulthowse. Wages till Ladyday 3s. a week, thence till Michaelmas 5s. a week, and thence £18 for a year, and afterwards £20 a year. C. 4.

1646, July. "Forasmuch as the Stock of the Hospital Brewhouse of this Town was almost quite lost and destroyed in the late wars by the violence of souldiers* and bad debts, so that the Remayning Stock was not one hundred markes, which small Stock by the diligence and care of this Company being like to encrease: And whereas by the sayd troubles the Hospital children were dissolved and the Charge of the house thereby abated: Vpon the foresayd Consideracions, as also for many other just and reasonable Causes, this Company doth thinke fitt to order, that the Revenues and Proffitts of the Brewhouse shall no longer be confined to the vse and sole benefitt of the Hospital Children, but that whatsoever of the proffitts of the sayd Brewhouse can be spared (the Hospital children being duely provided for as accustomed)

And for the same shall pay 20*li*. per annum ouer and aboue the 200*li*. per ann., which 20*li*. is to be paid every yeare at Christtide." C. 12.

1649, Sept. 17. "The tenants that shall be are to keepe the house and implements of the sayd house in good repayre, and leave both the house and implements in as good condicion at the end of three yeares as they are now in when they enter upon the same.

The time of entrance to the sayd Tenants is Michaelmas next for three yeares. The Tenants of the sayd house vpon

the condicions aforesayd, who are to give security for the Stock and Rent, are Mr. Bayliffe Maber, Mr. Richard Savage, Mr. John Bushrod, Jonas Palfry." C. 12.

That there be lent to the Towne Steward, to pay Mr. Reve for the consideracion of certaine monnyes which he ought to have the benefitt of for 10 years past, the somme of 35h.

There rests 258l. of Mr. Gibs his monny to be disposed of. That 50l. of the sayd monny, or as much as is due, be paid to Mr. Savage himselfe for the Interest of 100li. which was borrowed of him in the yeare 1643, vpon Mortgage of some Towne lands, vpon condicion that Mr. Savage deliuer up the deede of mortgage vpon the Towne Lands, and that an abatement be made by Mr. Savage for the Rents which he received. For the rest of the sayd monny that it be layd aside to be employed in some purchase." C. 12.

1650, Nov. 29. "Whereas Mr. John Bushrod hath bin Steward of the Hospital and Brewhouse for the space of eight yeares past, and hath discharged the place with much faithfulness and care, It is ordered that xijh. 1d., which the sayd Mr. Bushrod oweth for beare and other things to the sayd Brewhouse, shall be remitted to him as a recompence for his labor and paynes in the office aforesayd for so long a time, and to be charged to the accompt accordingly." C. 12.

1651-2, Feb. 13. "It is ordered that the Steward of the Brewhouse shall pay vnto Capt. Nathaniel White the somme of three pounds nine shillings and one penny, the ballance of his father's account, due from the Brewhouse, which he delivered in vnto this Company. And out of our respects to his father and the family It is ordered that he shall haue giuen him out of the Brewhouse, which Jonas [Palfry] is to pay him, the somme of five pounds and more, as a boone at his departure towards Garnesey." 1652, Nov. 10. The renters of the Brewhouse to continue

And yf he shall breake this order, then he and his wagon to be kept out of the towne." C. 9.

1636, Aug. 24. "It is ordered and agreed on by Mr. Maior, &c., that in regard of the presente danger of contagion of the sicknes of the pestilence now increasing in London, and spread abroade in severall partes, there shall bee from henceforth during the continuance of the said present danger a sufficient ward to be kept in this Towne by severall personnes from sun rising to sun setting at severall parts of the Towne, viz., at the east end of the Towne two, at the Gallowes one, at the end of the South Streete one, at the west end of the

towne one, and at Glippath one, and to bee performed from howse to howse through the Towne by every man in person, or by such others for them as shall bee approved and allowed by some one of the Justices of the peace of this Borough. And that the said wardesmen shall not admitt any stranger to come into this Towne, either from London or from any other place suspected for infeccion, or any suspitious person, before he first make it knowne to Mr. Maior of this Borough or some other Justice of peace there, and have allowance or permission for such admittance." C. 9.

1636, Oct 7. "It is ordered by Mr. Maior, &c., and by them made knowne vnto Richard Shank, one of the waggon cariers belonging to this Borough, that in case hee or any other carier shall hence forth goe to London with their horses or wagon, or shall bring to the towne any London wares or goods [as] shall come from any infected place or suspected to bee infected; that such carier or his servants which shall goe or come with the said waggon and his horses and the goodes which shalbe soe brought shall bee kept forth of this Towne, and not be admitted into this Borough without the consent of the Maior, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Capital Burgesses of the said Borough, or the greater parte of them." 1637, July 10. "Whereas John Greene of this Borough, tailer, contrary to the comand of Mr. Maior, &c., hath ben lately at London and is thence retorned, and since his retorne ... had accesse to his howse the backway, but is now abroad againe and kept out of this towne, and his family not suffered to come abroade, for that there is a suspition that the said Greene may bee infected with the plague: It is therefore ordered that the barne of Raph Perryn in Frome Whitefeild bee procured to harbor the said Greene and his family in, or otherwise in the Coller makers howse there, and two wardesmen to bee set to attend them, and the chargs for their diet and phisick to bee borne and paid by the whole Towne out of the mony remayning in the Churchwardens hands given at the last Fast, viz. xviijd. weekely."

Adam Smyth and Thomas Walden, who had also gone to London and returned, to be harboured in one of the same houses which shall not be used for harbouring Greene, and 6d. weekly allowed for their maintenance. C. 9.

1637, July 26. "It is agreed that whereas Greene and his family, Smyth and Walden, haue ben kept out of the towne

vpon triall coming from London by the space of xix daies and contynuing in health, the said Smyth and Walden shall this day be admitted into the Towne, and that the said Greene and his family, and Oaten and Oldish whoe are alsoe kept out for the like cause, shall bee admitted into the towne on Monday next, yf in the meane tyme they continew in health." 1637, Aug. 2. "It is agreed that all the mony for the charge of provision for Greene and his family, and Walden and Smith, kept out of the towne for feare of danger of infection, being 49s. 5d. in the whole, shall be paid by the churchwarden of Peter's parish out of the fast mony." C. 12.

"It is agreed that in regard of the generall visitacion by the pox now being in the towne, that the schoole-masters and publique teachers of children within this Borough shall not admitt into their schooles any children that haue or haue had the pox, or doe or shall diet or lodge in any howse where the pox are or have ben, vntill such children and houses haue ben cleere of the pox by the space of one moneth at the least, and notice heereof to be given to Mr. Reve, Mr. Gould, and the other teachers of the Towne." JOHN CHURCHILL'S GIFT.

THIS INDENTURE TRIPERTITE made the eight and twentithe daie of September in the one and Forteth yere of the Raign of our Soveraign Ladie Elizabeth [1599] by the grace of God of England Fraunce and Ireland Quene defender of the faith, Betwene me, John Churchell of Corton in the Countie of Dorset, gent., of the first part, Sir George Trenchard knight and John Wyllyams Esquier, Brewyn Willyams and Maximilvan Moone gent. of the second part, William Churchill, brother of the said John Churchill, Mathewe Chubbe, Edmond Dashwood, inhabitants of the Borough of Dorchester in the said countie of Dorset of the thirde part. Whereas I, the said John Churchill, have delivered into the handes of the said William Churchill, Mathewe Chubb and Edmunde Dashwood the some of one hundred poundes of lawfull money of England, to be imployed and governed for and towardes the Relief mayntenaunce and setting on worke of the poore Artificers of the said Borough of Dorchester to have contynewannee for ever. Nowe this Indenture witnesseth That I. the said John Churchell, doe by these presents ordeyne lymitt and apoint that the said Will'm Churchell, Mathew Chubbe and Edmunde Dashwood and their successors from hencefourth for ever, shalbe Threasourers of the said some of one hundred poundes to them delivered as aforesaid for the poore Artificers of Dorchester aforesaid, And that the said Sir George Trenchard Knight and John Wyllyams Esquier and their successors, together with the said Brewyn Williams and Maximilvan Moone, and the heires of my two daughters Elizabeth and Anne, wives of the same Brewyn and Maximilian, shalbe Auditors and Visitors of the said Threasourers and poore Artificers. AND I doe farther ordayne that the said Threasources for the time beinge, with the Advice and assent of the said Auditors or some or one of them, shall deliver fourth verelie vnto the poore Artificers of the same Borough of Dorchester such as shall and will put in good suerties for the Repayment therof, to eache of them a severall porcion of the said treasure, for the settinge on worke and maintenannee of them and their familie, to be repaid againe yerely vpon the Feast of Sainte Mychaell tharchangell, and then to be delivered fourth againe, for one yere, ypon like bonde and Suerties. And so verely and successively for ever. And if any poore Artificers of the said Borough shall wante Stocke to sett them selves on worke and be not able to put in such Suerties as aforesaid, That in such case such other Artificers of better abilitie as shall receave any part of the said Treasure in Loane as aforesaid shall yelde some moderate consideracion (not exceedinge Five for the Hundred) for the same, to be distributed vnto the other poorer Artificers aforesaid for their Relief, as to the good discrecion of the said Threasourers with such assent as aforesaid shall seeme most meete and convenient. And if any part of the said Treasure by the decaye or insufficiency of any of the Artificers Suerties or Bondes aboue mencioned shall happen to bee consumed or wasted Then the same to be made vp againe and supplied of such moderate consideracion to be taken as aforesaid. wherby the Stocke of the said Treasure may be continewed for ever. AND I do ordeyne that the said Threasourers and their Successors verelie vpon the Feast daie of Sainct Mychaell Tharchangell or within tenne dayes next after the same Feast shall meete and assemble themselves together before the said Auditors or their Successors or before some or one of them.

and shall deliver vp in writinge in a Register booke to be kept for that purpose a true accompt of the state of the said Treasure, and howe the same is imployed and in whose handes it remayneth, and vpon what securitie, to the ende the same accompts may be subscribed with the handes of the said Auditors or some of them, and their Advice and consent to be geven from tyme to tyme for further imployment direction and safetie of the same stocke. AND if it shall happen any of the said Auditors Visitors or Threasourers being but officers for lief as aforesaid to die or to refuse the execucion thereof. That then and so often the Survivors of them or the most parte of them respectively, shall chuse one other meete and sufficient person to succeede in the roome and office of the person so deceased, and so successively for ever, wherby the number of the officers aforesaid may remayne full and, complete for ever, and the trust and interest of the said Threasources may not at any time be cast vpon executors or administrators. AND I do apoint that one parte of this Tripertite Indenture shall remayne in Custodye of the Bailiffs and Burgesses of Dorchester aforesaid to be safely kept in the Towne Chest there, one other part therof to remayne in the Custodie of the said Sr George Trenchard Knight and his Successors, and the thirde part therof to remayne in the Custodie of me and myne heires for ever. AND YET NEVERTHELESSE for the better preservacion of this myne ordynanice in tyme to come I do ordeyne and apointe that this present deede Indented shalbe acknoledged and inrolled before some of the Justices and Clearke of the Peace of this countie of Dorset to remayne of Recorde in Custodie of the Custos Rotulorum amongest other Records of the same Countie for ever. AND I do request the said Auditors and Visitors that if any negligence or abuse shall happen to be in any of the said Threasourers, wherby the trust in them reposed shall not be performed, that then in such case they will vse their indevors, by the ayde of the Sessions of the peace or the ordinary of the same place, to cause the same to be reformed and redressed, as to ther wisedomes and good discrecions shall seeme meete. And I do earnestly desier my said trustie freinds to voutsafe their charitable aydes to the performannce of this my charitable intent. In witnes where to every parte of the same Indentures all the said parties have putt their handes and Seales. YEAVEN the daye and yere first above written and in the yere or our Lord God one thousand five hundred nynetie and nyne, 1599." B. 14.

Seven signatures, with seals of red wax. John Wyllyams: Seal, a shield quarterly, I and 4, a greyhound courant, between three Cornish choughs; 2 and 3, three bucks' heads couped. John Churchill: Seal, a monogram. Bruen Williams: Seal lost. Max. Moone: Seal a maunch within a bordure charged with crosses, a crescent for difference, helmet, mantling and crest. Will'am Churchell: Seal, T. H. within a diamond. Per me, Mattheu' Chubbe: Seal, a merchant's mark between the letters "M C." Edmunde Dashwoode: Seal, a merchant's mark with "D" at its lower termination.

Endorsed on B. 14a, "John Churchill, of Corton, by Indenture Tripartite, dat' 28° September, 41° Eliz., did constitute divers in trust for the imployment of 100li. for the poore of Dorchester, 1599."

1648, Sept. 18. "Vpon enquiry about the 100h. given by Mr. Churchel to be lent vnto several pore Artificers gratis, etc., we find that there is none of the Feoffees, Visitors nor Tresurers living. That Mr. Edmund Dashwood was the last Tr'er., and by Nathaniel Bower wee are enformed that there is in the hands of

John Churchel, the Taylor o5li. Suretyes, Geo. Lawrence. Sureties, Jasper Colston. George Panchard 05 Suretyes, Tho. Clench. Robt. Gillett 03 Nathaniel Bower ΟI John Meeder 05 Suretyes, Tho. Clench. Beniamen Darby Suretyes, Hen. Hoskins." 10

1650, April 12. Mr. Richard Bury, Mr. John Whiteway and Mr. John Bushrod, Capital Burgesses, appointed treasurers of the £100 given by Mr. John Churchill to be let out to artificers and tradesmen at reasonable rates, in the room of Mr. Wm. Churchill, Mr. Mathew Chubb, and Mr. Edward Dashwood, former treasurers. C. 12.

Dr. James's Good Friday Money.

The distribution of this charity, consisting of £25 per annum, "to be lent out every Good Friday to five tradesmen (gratis) which had families, for a year or two at the most," is frequently mentioned in the account books of the Town, e.g., 12th April, 1650 (C. 12), and 28th March, 1673 (C. 15).

The donor, Francis James, D.C.L., was Chancellor of the Diocese of Bristol, 31st July, 1590 to 1603, and M.P. for Dorchester, 1593 to 1597. He is called "Dr. James Chancellor" in Hutchins Dorset, Vol. ii., p. 404.

"Mr. Samways, There is in your hands some of the good Fryday's money which you carryed away your selfe out of the Hall; you know how that money is to be imployed, therefore pray let it not be said that in the time of your publique office you proued false to your trust in converting that to your owne vse which was designed for the vse of the poore; pray consider of it and take some care to pay it. There is some other money due allsoe from you: pray give some answer to this and sett your hande to the inclosed resignation that some other person may be chosen in your roome, if you doe not take care to pay in the good Fryday's money, it will remaine vpon record to your great disgrace, which wee hope you will take care to prevent; wee are Yor very Lou. freinds, John Cradock, Will. Pitt, Joseph Seward, Hugh Baker, Ben. Gould, James Gould. Aug. 31: 1677."

"Dorsett the Burrough of Dorchesr.

Aug: 31: 1677.

This day I Jasper Samwayes in discharge of my concience and according to my duty doe resigne my place of a Capitall Burgiss into the hands of the Mayor and Company, desireing that some other man may be chosen in my place; Witness my hande the day and yeare aboue written,

Sealed with the Common Towne Seale, 26 July, 18 James, 1620. B. 26.

1648-9, Jan. 18. "Ordered that Mr. John Williams pay in all the money due and in arreare for two Anuyties due and given to the Free Schoole and charitable uses vntill our Lady Day next out of the land at Wotton which was Mr. Richard Bushrod's iiijl. per annum for many yeares past." C. 12.

1649, Dec. 3. "It is agreed and ordered that if Mr. John Williams of Wotton Glandfield, late of Plumber, shall pay vnto this Corporacion the somme of 10½. betwixt this and Christide for the Arreares of the two Annuities of xls. each, due and payable out of the farme of Glandfield Wotton by the guift of Mr. Rich: Bushrod, vidz. xls. for encrease of the Schoolmaster's mayntenance, and xls. to be disposed of vnto charitable vses at the discretion of Feoffes, that then the sayd Mr. John Williams shall be discharged in full for all the arreares of the two foresayd Annuityes vntil Midsommer last." C. 12.

"Dorchester, the 6 off Feb., 1693-4.

Mr. Stephen Abbott, Sr, This is to lett you know that we have (to our great cost) found out how and in what manner the six pounds per annum out of your Estate at Wotton was charged by Mr. Bushrod, the owner thereoff, and itt is payable att our Lady Day and Micelmas vnder a penalty off forty shillings. I intend the next weeke, God willing, to call on you for itt, and if not entierly payd, we shall enter on the land and take the penaltie. You know itt hath bin allways payd without disturbance or demunition [sic] vntill

your late vnreasonable scrupells: and seeing you have putt soe hard vpon vs, I have bin desired [by] our Company to tell you that the Towne will not loose one Jot of itts Rights for the future. But this I shall Indeauour to gett the Commissioners on the next tax to abate to you six pounds per annum, in the valew of your said estate, seeing what you pay vs is wholy to charitable vses. I am, [unsigned]." C. 9.

JOHN HAYMAN'S GIFT.

1658, Sept. 24. "Mr. Bayliffe Cole vndertooke to engage his brother, Mr. Roger Cole, to demand of the Churchwardens of St. Savior, Southwarke, fiftie pounds which were giuen by one John Hayman for the pore of this Towne, payable by the sayd Wardens." C. 15.

1659, June 3. "It is ordered that Mr. John Bushrod do demand and receive that part of the fiftie pounds given by Mr. Hayman to this Towne, payable by the Churchwardens of St. Savior's in Southwarke, which is already raised, which wee vnderstand to bee almost twenty pounds." C. 15.

JULIAN PERKINS' (PARKINS') LEGACY.

1658, Nov. 12. "This day Arthur Gould was here, and did express himselfe willing to lay out the 1001. given by Mris. Parkins to the Towne, upon some Towne land for a Rent Charge or Annuity charged thereon of five pounds a yeare, payable to the overseers of the pore of each parish for the use of the pore every Candlemas day." C. 15.

1658-9, March 4. "That the 100h, given by Mris. Parkins to the pore of the Towne be received, together with twenty pounds more given to some other place, by the Towne Steward for which the George shall be charged with the Annual Rent of six pounds for ever." C. 15.

1660, April 19. "Whereas Mris. Julian Perkins, late of Trinity parish in this town, deceased, did bequeath one hundred pounds to be distributed for the benefit of the three parishes in this town... and whereas the Maior, &c.,... have granted a rent chardg of 6h. a year to Arthur Gold, Susan Grosse, (executors) Josiah Terry, Tho. Simonds and John Foyle, (overseers of her will), and their heirs, to bee issuing out of the Georg in Dorchester: Now wee herby signifye and declare that we have received the sayd hundred

pounds and haue disposed the same into the stock of the Brewhouse, and that it is agreed that the sayd 6li. a year be issuing and payable yearly out of the profits of the sayd Brewhouse, and charged upon the same in all accounts; the sayd Inn being only charged therewith for the security therof, but the Brewhouse for the discharge and payment . . . to be payd in Trinity Church every twenty-fifth day of March." C. 9.

Towards the end of C. 27 is entered a copy of the indenture, dated 19th April, 1660, by which the Corporation covenants with the persons above-named and the Overseers of the three Parishes, to charge the three messuages, called the George, with the payment of £6 yearly.

JOHN CHURCHILL'S LEGACY.

1662, April 26. "Constable William Churchill, being about to go to London, was desired to speak with Mr. Wynston Churchel about the fifty pounds which his father* gaue as a Legacy to the pore of the Towne, and to bring an answere from him concerning it." C. 15.

MISCELLANEOUS CHARITIES.

1620, Aug. 4. A note of certen monyes which are dew to the Towne.

1631, Nov. 21. "That Mr. Derby be prayd to make serch for old Mr. Williams' will concerning a guift of Sir John Williams' auncestors of 40s. per annu' to the old alms house

within this Borough which is deteined." C. 9.

Other Charities are mentioned by Hutchins' Dorset, Vol. ii, p. 404.

THE ALMSHOUSES.

It has already been mentioned on page 510 that an order was made in 1835 for separating the Trust and Charity muniments from those relating to the Corporation of the Borough. Little therefore remains among the latter records bearing upon the three Almshouses situated within the Town.

Whetstone's Almshouse.

The book, C. 7, though subsequently used as a minute book by the Corporation (viz., from 22nd February, 1601. to 30th March, 1733), was intended originally for the purposes of this Almshouse, and contains accounts from 2nd August. 1619, to 29th September, 1651. It begins, "Emanuel: the secondth daye of August, 1619: A Record kept to all posterity that John Whettstone merchaunte, late of Rodden in the parishe of Abbotsburye, . . . gave unto the Towne of Dorchester in the County of Dorset five hundred pounds to the buyldinge of an Almeshouse for poore folk," etc., by will dated 28th January, 1614. It is further stated that £20 was paid to — Rutter for the site in the parish of All Saints, on which the Almshouse was built, and £200 to Mr. Foxall for land in Hermitage and Rodehill, and the total expenditure for land and building, including £8 given to the almspeople, Lady Day to Michaelmas, 1621, was £411. 15. 1.

1634, Dec. 19. An estate in Symondsbury, in possession and reversion, to be bought of one Wade, for £150, for this Almshouse, with the Almshouse money, viz., a capital dwelling house and 4 or 5 acres of ground, worth £6 per ann., a meadow worth £4, a dwelling house and 4 a., worth £4, a dwelling house and 2 a. worth £2, a dwelling house and garden worth £1 (which, except the capital messuage and grounds, are in lease for three lives at 13s. 4d. rent). C. 9.

It was ordered on 28th August, 1826, that the pay of the almspeople be increased from three to four shillings a week, and on 16th April, 1829, by one shilling a week for each couple. C. 42a.

Napper's Almshouse.

1650, April 1.

"To Mr. Napper. Sir, You may please to bee informed, that there is a place void in your Almeshouse, by the death of another of our Townsmen. Wee have underwritten presented you the names of three poore men according to our

former custome, that one of them may bee pitcht on by you to enter in the roome of the former, soe that this new election will make vp but fower of the Towne. Wee shall humbly intreate you as opportunity shall serve, that the number may bee equallized with the County, which your selfe and your worthy predecessors have alwayes don vntill these tymes of trouble; wee shall likewise pray your concurrance in the choice of two new Feoffees for the Parsonage of Froome Whitefeild, namely, Mr. John Whiteway and Mr. Henry Maber, both of this Corporacion, in the place of Mr. Edmund Dashwood and Mr. William Derby, deceased; heerein wee shall have the approbacion of some other gentlemen who are alsoe feoffees with you. Wee beseech you to trouble your selfe soe farre as to lett us know your pleasure heerin by a lyne or two, and by these and your many former favors, you will very much oblige, sir, your worship's most humble and thankefull servants, [unsigned]. The poore men's names, Alexander Biles, William Cooke, William Miller."

"The first of Aprill, 1650." C. 9.

1809, March 13. "At a Meeting held to consider the complaints made respecting Napper's Almshouse, situate within the Borough; It appears that the said Almshouse was endowed in the 13th year of the Reign of his Majesty King James the First, by the name of Napper's Mite, by Sir Robert Napper, with certain Lands Tenements and Here-ditaments, situate lying and being at Little Piddle in the Parish of Piddletown in the said County of Dorset, for the benefit and support of Ten Poor Men to be resident in the said Almshouse;

It further appears that in the year 1670 the said Almshouse was further endowed by Sir Gerrard Napper with the Manor of Stert, lying in the Parish of Babcary in the County of Somerset:

It also appears that only Three Poor Men are now resident in the said Almshouse who receive the Benefit thereof, and that the Rules and Ordinances made and set down for the Government of the said Almshouse and of the said Ten Poor Men are not at present observed;

Resolved, that Humphrey Sturt, Esqr., the Heir of the said Sir Robert Napper and also of the said Sir Gerrard Napper, in whom the said Lands are now vested upon Trust and for the Benefit of the said Ten Poor Men who are to reside in the said Almshouse, be immediately applied to, to give an account

of the Funds arising from the said Lands and Hereditaments situate at Little Piddle in the said County of Dorset, and Stert within the Parish of Babcary in the said County of Somerset, and of the Application thereof, and that the same may in future be applied for the Maintenance and Support of Ten Poor Men to be resident in the said Almshouse agreeable to the Will and Intention of the Founders thereof, and that the Rules and Ordinances for the better Government and Regulation of the said Almshouse may be in future observed;

Resolved that a Copy of the Minutes of this Meeting be transmitted by the Town Clerk to Mr. Sturt." C. 42a.

1809, Sept. 12. Resolved that the necessary Measures be pursued by an application to the Court of Chancery for applying the Rents of the Estates in the Counties of Dorset and Somerset, given and devised for the Benefit of Napper's Almshouse in this Borough, and for enforcing the Rules and Ordinances for the better Government and Regulation of the said Almshouse, and that the Town Clerk do forthwith pursue such Measures accordingly. C. 42a.

Chubb's Almshouse.

"A copy of the 215*li*. paid and disbursed by Mris. Chub towards the 400*li*. which she owes the Towne." (Sheet of foolscap.)

Margaret Chub, of Dorchester, widow, was bound by her indenture of 29 April, 18 James I. [1620], to pay the Bailiffs and Burgesses £400. She has now paid £215, of which £115 have been employed in reedifying the Old Almshouse, and £100 to be employed for the benefit of the children of the workhouse or Hospital of the Borough. 16 April, 19 Jas. I [1621]. C. 5.

1640-I, March 3. The three parishes of the Town have in turn chosen an inmate of the women's Almshouse. It is now the turn of Trinity parish to choose one, but as it refuses to contribute to the rate weekly [two shillings] for the relief of the poor of All Saints', a poor woman of All Saints' parish to be chosen in the place now void. C. 12.

1792, Nov. 13. Mr. Robert Lambert having settled his account as Steward of Chubb's Charity, the balance to be paid to Mr. Richard Cozens the present Steward of the said Charity, Agreed that in future the Accounts of Whetstone's Almshouse and Napper's Charity be annually settled and that

new Stewards be appointed annually, that Mr. Robert Stickland, present Steward of Whetstone's and Mr. Richard Cozens, present Steward of Napper's, are desired to deliver in their accounts forthwith. And that in future the Stewardship of Whetstone's Almshouse to be undertaken by the person who last executed the office of Chubb's Charity, and of Napper's by the person to be the next Mayor at the Michaelmas following. C. 42a.

The allowance to the Poor Women in this Almshouse was ordered, on 6th January, 1808, to be raised from ninepence to one shilling a week, and on 19th February, 1834, to be increased one shilling a week from the following 25th March. C. 42a.

THE FREE SCHOOL.

The charges incurred in the building of the Free or Grammar School during the year 1567 occupy several pages in the Account Book, C. 2, as the Town purchased in detail the various materials required. The following are some of the principal entries, but there are many others.

"Md. that Luke Adyn and William Chirchell made a bargen with John Roye for the makinge of a pynyon with iij chymes, and the poynen tabell and one side wayle with xij lyghts, and a stonen doure in the same walle, beinge the scoule howse, and to have for the worke man shippe viijli. Also to paye hym for makinge of the fore walle to the Stritte xvid. a preche."

"It'm, paide more vnto John Roye in parte of his work the laste of November, 1567, xxs."

John Roye was paid £1 at intervals. Freestones came from Poxwell, and wall stones from Upwey.

"It'm, John Roye mvst have for the makinge of the stone in [stonen] dowre tow the strite, with moulde worke and a tabell of the same dowre vjs. viijd. and also he mvst make viij lyghtes of stone with moulde worke and a tabell for the same wyndowse, and he to have iijs. a lyght. And also tow paye hym for the hweinge of the lodge ment and settinge ijd. a fowte."

"It'm, paide vnto Rollyns and Byshope of Forthinge tund [Fordington] for the caridge of Tow lode of Tymber from Chubbes scoule howse viijd,"

"It'm, paide the Quaryors of Hamdon in parte of payment of x lyghtes at iijs. iiijd. the light, xxs."

"Paide John Roye in the full endinge of his worke beinge xlvij perche at 16d. the perche, fowre score fowtte of loddgge ment and grac tabell at ijd. a fowtte, vj lyghtes at iijs. iiijd. a lyght, and the dowre vjs. viijd., so that the holle symme of this worke is with the hwinge of tow moynell and poyntinge of it, 4s., and the makinge of the Tabell for the King's Armes at ijs. vjd. Sym is vli. ixs. ijd. paide hym in full payment and (also to paide hym xs. to the making of chimne) xxxs."

"It'm, Paide Robartt Amay for fyve wikes brode at ijs. viijd. the wike for cuttinge of the Quynes armes xiijs. iiijd."

The list of Masters given in Hutchins' Dorset, Vol. ii, p. 368, begins with

EDWARD DOUGHTY, M.A., 1580, who is followed by

HENRY HARRIS, a native of Dorset, who matriculated at Oxford, 11th October, 1583, aged 15, from St. Alban Hall; B.A., 1588; M.A., 1590; buried 31st May, 1596. To him succeeded

ROBERT CHEEKE, circa 1595, who was also Rector of All Saints', and died in 1627. (Perhaps M.A., Magdalen Hall, Oxford, 1598, a native of Somerset).

GABRIEL BALL, not mentioned in this list, but elected 1630. He matriculated 13th December, 1622, aged 18, from Brasenose College, son of John Ball of Thurlbare, Somerset, and subscribed the usual declaration, as *literatus*, 22nd September, 1627, previous to his ordination as Deacon by the Bishop of Bristol. (Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. vi, p. 188).

1629-30, Jan. 14. "Gabriell Ball chosen for the Free Shoole, and he is to teach and here the Hospitall children two howers in the weeke: at two seuerall tymes towards night: and for his paynes to have xx nobles: to be paid vnto him quarterly by the Steward of the Hospital, whereof and wherevnto George Gould will allowe vh. which is to be deducted out of George Gould's yerely stipende." C. 9.

1634, April 23. "The Husher, namely Mr. Forward,*

^{*} Perhaps either Samuel Forward, Trinity College, Oxford, B.A., 1629; M.A. (New Inn Hall), 1636; or John Forward, New Inn Hall, B.A., 1632, both sons of Thomas Forward, Rector of Lydlinch.

for supplying the place of an husher in the schoole within this Borough, shall have yearely for his paines there xx markes besids his vailes and gratuityes in the schoole, which xx marks [£13 . 6 . 8] shall thus arise, viz. xx nobles out of Froome, iiijh, the rent of the husher's howse, and 53s. 4d. out of the Brewhowse in lieu of Mr. Bushrod's guift to the schoole till that may bee recovered." C. 9.

GABRIEL, REEVE, circa 1634 or 1635. He was a native of Hants, and matriculated 23rd October, 1612, aged 19, from New College; B.A., 1616, M.A., 1619.

1639-40, Jan. 10. Agreed to have a certificate to the Com'rs for charitable vses that it is the Companie's opinions and have ben that all men of ability shall give xxs. a yeare for every child they shall send to the frescole to be taught, till the Scholemr's mayntenance by foundacion and adicion by the Towne be made vp xli. yearely." C. 12.

1640, May 15. "It is this day agreed one that from hence foorth Thomas Phillips, Scrivener, shall constantly repayre to the Free Schoole within this Borough, to teach such a number of Schollers as ar willinge to learn to write one hour every day in the week, excipt Saturday, and it shall be att such a time as Mr. Gabriell Reeve shall think best and most convenient for ther best advantage to be profited, and it is thought fitt by that Company that he haue from every Scholler that he doth teach 2s. 6d. the quarter." C. 12.

1640, Sept. 12. Mrs. Monke of Exeter, who has a lease for three lives in the school lands in Froome Vawchurch, is content to give up her lease upon assurance of 20*h*. She may be persuaded to 18*h*. yearly during her life. C. 12.

1641, Sept. 22. "It being putt to the Company whether William Munden and William Besse, of thes Borough, are in their iudgemt to be accompted poore men, to have their children taught at the Gramer Schoole for nothing, They resolved that they were men of ability, fitt to pay for teaching their children." C. 12.

1647, Dec. 17. Upon the sum of £53.12.3, which the town had in hand twelve years ago, 5% to be paid for ten

years past, abating two years interest for the wars, in the which time the Schoolmaster was absent*. The sum has now become £80.02.3. Interest on the latter sum at 5% to be allowed, till it becomes £96.10.6, the sum first collected, which will be in 1651. C. 9.

1649, Aug. 31. "This day vpon Mr. Reves demanding of the proffitts of the 53h. 12s. 3d. of the School master's monny now in the Townes hands, wee do find that two yeares agon Mr. Reve was to have payed vnto him by order, for proffitt of the sayd monny, 27h. 10s. And since that time he was, by the same order, to be paid 5 profit the 100h., which now, in Decemb. next, comes vnto 35h. 10s. which is to be paid vnto him."

"This Company doth order that Mr. Nathaniel White shall pay vnto Mr. Reve the quarter's rent for the Vsher which is due at our Lady day last out of the Parsonage, and Mr. White hath promised accordingly at their order." C. 12.

1649-50, Jan. 18. "At a conference with Mr. Reve concerning an Husher to be procured, it was resolved that Mr. Gower should be desired to write vnto Mr. Langley that the Husher which he had prouided for this place should have xxh. a yeare, besides the guifts which he should haue from the schollars. And withal that Mr. Langley be enformed of the low condicion of the Schoole, and how few boyes there be. And it being commended to Mr. Reve's consideracion whether it were not better that he did relinquish his place, having lost his esteeme both in the Towne and country, then any longer to continue Schoolmaster to the prejudice of the Towne and Schoole, the further debate thereof was putt off to be had at Mr. Gower's house on Wednesday, fower of the Clock in afternoone, together with the ministers and this Company." C. 12.

Whereas in the town of Dorchester "there is a convenient dwellinge provided for the Schoolmaster and a small pencion but of twentie pounds per ann. for his maynetenance, in respect whereof the sayd schoole hath been a good space since without a schoolmaster, and whereas Mr. Gabryell Reve, whoe hath heertofore been a schoolemaster there, uppon the intreatie and request of the inhabytants of Dorchester aforesayd, soe that there may be an addiction of fortie pounds per ann. to the sayd schoole, hath ingaged himselfe to undertake the government of the sayd school againe"; it is ordered that £20 per ann. be paid him out of each of the impropriate parsonages of Puddletrenthide and Fordington on condition that he teach, gratis, twelve scholars of Dorchester and twenty of the country. (Minute Books of the Dorset Standing Committee, p. 85).

1649-50, Jan. 28. "This day Mr. Edward Archbold came to Mr. Mayor and this Company, and was told that xxh. per ann. was the stipend which he must expect as Husher, if he would accept of the place, besides the guifts of the schollars, which he did accept of vpon the Condicions mentioned." C. 12.

1650, Aug. 2. "It is ordered and desired that Mr. Mayor and Mr. Loder and Mr. B. Dashwood do acquaint Mr. Reve with the message which Mr. Bond sent downe to this Company the last tearme, viz. that they should remove Mr. Reve from the Schole, or else that he would withdraw the benefitt of the Schole Closes from the School master's mayntenance, and to acquaint him with the general dislike that this Company and the Townes people take at his continuance to their prejudice." C. 12.

1650, Oct. 18. A letter to be sent to Mr. Reeve, signed by all the Company, requesting him to take "a resolutyon of remouall from the scoole." C. 12. This is followed on 1st Nov. by a resolution of the School Feoffees for his removal for "want of care to preserve the repute of the school." C. 9. Mr. Reeve agrees, 31st Jan., 1650-1, to relinquish the School, at our Lady Day next, C. 12, and on 21st March a long reply is sent to his demand for arrears of rent and stipend. C. 9. It seems he did not vacate his office at Lady Day, for an order is sent for his removal by the Feoffees on 4th April, 1651. C. 12. By the 5th Nov. following, he appears to have gone to "Redding."

1651, March 28. "It is agreed that Mr. Archbold, the Husher, shall be warned to be gon from hence as vnfitt to continue here longer by reason of his late offensive carriage." C. 12.

1651, April 12. "This day Mr. Birstall* was sent for into this hall and this Companie declared they were not pleased with his taking of a place in the Towne (as they conceive) in opposition vnto them and the discouraginge of a Scoolemaster to come into this place, and therefore that they cannot approve of his setlement in that place, and that they woold certefie the rest of the Feoffees thereof." C. 12.

Mr. W: Paty, Mr. Stansby, Mr. Seward and Arthur Gould, It was concluded that two able and vnderstanding men of this towne be sent forthwith into Hartfordsheere to enquire whether the good report concerning Mr. Kempe, of Hitchin, be such or no." C. 12.

1651, April 24. "That a letter be sent vnto the Scoole-master of Hychin, Mr. Joseph Kemp, to invite him hither to confer with the Towneship and Feoffees about being Scoole-master; the letter to be sent by the post vnto London, and from thence by an expresse. The letter was this day subscribed by the Companie present and Mr. Jolliffe Mr. Baylif Bushrod is desyred to send this letter to Mr. Nole, and by him to be sent by an expresse vnto Mr. Kemp." C. 12.

1651, April 25. Mr. Joseph Kempe.

"Worthy Sir, Wee hope it was in mercy to this place that, when wee wanted a Schoolemaster, wee weere soe happily enformed by Mr. Mallary of your worth and sufficiency for that necessary employment, which Report concerning you, wee have alsoe received from divers worthy men, which is our encouragement att this tyme to invite you hither, that if you please, wee may have Conference with you, and may treate more largely of those particulars which concerne the Schoole, and the Condition of it. The place is now newly void, soe that wee are free to treate with another man, and although wee have had many earnest suiters for the same, since the Report of its intended Vacancy, and that by persons of vn [? an] eminency, backed with the sollicitacions of powerfull gentlemen, yett wee have hitherto denyed all Suiters, being resolved by God's assistance, not to admitt any man, whose sincerity for Religion did not as well commend him to our choice as his other abillityes. The Revenue belonging to the master is about 50li. per annum, with a faire house and garden, a spacious Schoole, and a publicke Library annexed, all vnder one Roofe: Wee shall desire your speedy answere heerevnto, and daily waite your coming vnto vs, which wee desire may bee with all convenient speed. only wise God direct your way vnto us, and make it prosperous for his glory and the publicke good of this place, which are and shall bee the prayers of, Sir,

1651, May 20. "This day this Company hath elected Mr. Joseph Kempe, of Hitchen, in Hartfordsheere to bee Scholemaster of the Free schoole of this Towne, who was invited hither by a Letter from this Company, and the said Mr. Kempe hath accepted of the said place vpon these condicions following (vidzt) that the Schole bee free for all the Townesmen's sons and of the places adjacent, And that the tyme of Mr. Kempe's entrance vpon the Schole as Master there, doe commence at Midsomer next; and that wee shall endeavour to gett the Feoffees' graunt to confirme this.

"About tenne dayes after the abouesayd Order Mr. Kemp and his wiffe receivinge some discouragements did write seuerall letters to be excused of the intended purpose for theyr removall vnto Dorchester, which occasioned this ensuing letter which is entred on the other syde of this leafe."

"Sir, Vppon Mr. Mallaries report this Towne sylenced theyr thoughts from lookinge out anie man to be a schoole master heer besyds vourselfe, and thought it to be from God that so vnexpectedlie he should name vs a man which we iudged fitt for vs. As soone as were in a capacitie we addressed our selves to you, and you were pleased to comply with our desyres and come vnto vs, and vppon treatie with you we did elect you Schoolemaster of the Free Schoole, vppon the conditions then expressed and agreed on vnder our hands and yours: All scruples were removed, and it seemeth verie strange that vppon such reports as ar not true, you should be so discouraged that nothinge should now satisfie you but the Towne seale. Yf anie man can iustlei charge vs to haue falsiffied our promises which the Corporation hath made to anie publike Person, we then shall submitt to the censure of beinge vnfaithfull to our promises, but we hope none of our Schoolemasters or Mynisters, either now alive or those which have gone before, could iustlie tax vs therin. Although we thought there had been no further need of Capittulations vet for your satisfactyon we shall yeld to what soever is within our power, and fitt for vs to graunt. For the Scoole and Rents they are your owne by deed and act of Parliamt, which is better assurance than anie we can geiue you, and yet you shall have our best assistance for recoveringe of them, yf anie feyler be. We assure you that of all those rents Mr.

Reeue hath not lost five pounds these 20 yeeres, vnles in tyme of the late troubles; from rates, taxes and quarteringe of souldyers you shalbe freed, and yf anie charge be layd vppon you that way, we will beare it; we will remove Mrs. Cheeke, and repayre the Schoole and Schoolehowse to your hands, as we promised, and secure you in possession; we doe not intend that you shall teach English scoolers nor teach to write. For the priueledges and benefitts of your place we refer you to the terms of our agreement; we had taken order for an Instrument from the Feoffees for your setlement before your letters came to our hands. And now having endeuored to the vttermost of our powers to satisfie your demaunds, and the expectation of the Towne and Cuntrie beinge raysed vppon the reports of your coming hither, we cannot see what resons you have in contyente [sic] to refuse comming, havinge so cleer a call, as we well remember you did acknowledge heer in our presence, you had received from vs. It is our vnhappines now at last, as it was yours at first, to be misrepresented; we did soone receiue satisfaction from you of the falshood of those reports, and we hope to fynd the like readynes in you to be ritelie enformed, or els we desyre you to geiue vs leaue to say we shall not receiue such a requitall as our love and singular respects to you have deserued; we perswade ourselves that our future carriage shall confute those calumnies, and therefore pray you to hasten your comming to vs agaynst the tyme appoynted; thus desyring God to setle your minde and perswade you to the pursuance of this your vnquestionable call (as we conceiue), who is onlie able to satisfy all your doubts and our wants, we commend you to his grace and blessinge, and rest

1651, July 4. "It is desyred that Mr. Gower and Mr. Whiteway doe ride vnto Sarum with Mr. Ben, and treat with Mr. Cox in relation to his beinge scoolemaster, and that he pay the charge of their journey." C. 12.

- 1651, Aug. 13. "To enquire after one Mr. Lydol,* of Trinity Colledge, Oxford, a godly man and good Schole master, who is recommended vnto this Companie per Mr. Ric' Sauage." C. 12.
- 1651, Aug. 22. "This day it is agreed that there be a messenger sent vnto Mr. Tutchin at St. Mary Otrey, to enquire from him by a letter which Mr. Mayor is desired to write, what report he can giue vnto this Company concerning one Mr. Thomas Newman, the present or late minister of Farneham, and of his iudgement of his fittness and abilitie to be a Schole-master of this Towne." "That Mr. Ric' Sauage be desyred to pay Mr. Newman's quarters, who came hither Monday night last, to be scoolemaster yf the Towne be so pleased to accept of him, and Mr. Maior is desyred to thanke him for his peynes, and to tell him that at this tyme the Towne is in treatie with Mr. Crumlum, and cannot vntill his answer be received, treat with any other." Glouc., sacr.; matriculated 13th November, 1635, aged 17, from Corpus Christi College, Oxford, B.A., 1639; M.A., 1642; Master of Mercers' Chapel School; Sur-master of St. Paul's School, 1647; Head Master, 1657; died 21st July, 1672.

- 1651, Oct. 10. Mr. Samuel Cromleholme elected Schoolmaster, from Michaelmas last. C. 9.
- 1651, Oct. 20. "It is ordered and desired that Mr. Mayor do pay or cause to be payed to Clement Bryne, for the carridge of Mr. Cromlehome's bookes downe from London this weeke." C. 12.
- 1651, Nov. 21. "This day this Company contracted with Mr. Thomas Polden to be Huisher of the Free Schole of this Towne, and for his paynes to make the Husher's stipend **xx***ii*. per ann., the sayd Mr. Polden to live in the Malter's

Roomes at Brewhouse freely as long as they can be spared, if he please. Hee to enter vppon the place at Christtide next." C. 12.

"It is ordered and agreed that in case Mrs. Lawrence, widow, will remove herselfe and goods out of the Schole-house Roomes, and peaceably deliver up the possession of the same into Mr. Cromleholmes hands, the present Schole Master, that then out of respect to the memory of Mr. Cheeke, her former husband, the sayd Mris. Lawrence shall have paid vnto her by the Steward of the Hospital the somme of fower pounds per annum towards her house rent, to begin from Lady day next, and to be continued as long as shee shall live in Towne. It is to be understood that shee deliver vp the sayd Roomes betwixt this and Lady Day." C. 9.

1657, Oct. 2. "It is agreed that Mr. Cromleholme shall have xxl. given to him in consideracion of his repayring the house and building of the new Washing house, and of the fruit trees, herbs and flowers in the garden, which the Company desire may not be wasted nor defaced by the removal of poles, postes or anything else out of the garden." C. 15.

1657, Oct. 2. "It is ordered and resolved that there be forthwith enquiry made concerning Mr. Everard,* of Christ Church in Oxford, for his sufficiency in learning and pietie to be our Schole Master in the place of Mr. Cromleholme. And that a Messenger shall be sent on Tuesday next to Oxford to that purpose: in order therevnto, yet is desired by this Company that Mr. Benn doe write to Mr. Bull, and Mr. Gower and Mr. Benn to Mr. Russell, and Mr. Jno. Whiteway to Doctor Wilkinson and Mr. Jno. White, for their advice in reference to Mr. Everard's fittnes, and if they give incurragment, the messenger is to deliver a letter from this Company to invite him hither." C. 15.

1657, Oct. 9. "Mr. Cromleholm came to this Company and deliuered up his order of deputacion which hee had received for scholemaster, being chusen Scholemaster of Pawles, and desired this Company to choose another Scholemaster." C. 9.

Anthony Withers, 1657. He matriculated 16th November, 1650, from New College; B.C.L., 1654.

1657, Oct. 18. "This day the Company hath resolved to send vnto Mr. Anthony Withers, who is now come hither

1658, May 14. £5 to be paid to Mr. Anthony Withers, Scholemaster, for his charge in coming down from Oxford. C. 15.

1658, Sept. 3. "Mr. Mayor is desired to write vnto Mr. John Loder,* of London, to entreatte him to vse all possible wayes to prevent Mr. Withers' removal from vs, and to engage his friends also to hinder Mr. Withers being chosen to Wynchester Schole, if possible." C. 15.

1659, July 15. The Company signed a parchment of School orders, containing seven articles, the first being for payment of £50 per ann., without diminution for taxes, to Mr. Wyther.

1661-2, March 21. Mr. Wither to be paid £20 by the Town Steward, in full of all demands of £20 per ann., which was heretofore coming to him from Fordington Parsonage.

JOHN STEVENS came 12th December, 1662 (Hutchins' Dorset). Probably the John Stevens, Priest, who signed the declarations as Master of Bristol Grammar School, 3rd June, 1662 (Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. v, p. 232), and who was master thereof from 8th March, 1657-8, to 9th December, 1662. Perhaps Rector of Wyly, 1664, Preb. of Chute, 1692-8, Preb. of Hurstbourne, 1698, and died 1701.

1664, Apr. 6. "In regard that it is observed that the Schoole is much impayred in reputation and number of schollars to the great sufferance of this town"; It is ordered that rules and orders for the school should be drawn up by Mr. Wm. Pitt, Mr. Joseph Seward, and Mr. Gold, and submitted to the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses, and when approved to be sent up to Mr. Recorder at London, to be drawn by him into form. A copy to be delivered to the present School master, to be observed by him, on pain of dismissal. C. 15.

1664, Oct. 21. "Mr. Terry and Mr. Seward are desired by the Company to repaire to Mr. Hammond† to knowe of him yf he be willing to accept of the Schole Master's place of the towne vppon the subscripcion mencioned in the act of Par-

liament, and yf he will, they will recommend him to the Feoffees."

"Mr. Terry and Mr. Seward delivered the desires of the Company to Mr. Hammond, and he retorned his thankes to the Company, and because the matter is of weight, desires respect to give in his answer till this day seavenight, and Mr. Hammond hath farther returned in answer that he hath heard the Duke* hath some prejudice against him; yf that prejudice cannot be taken of, he will not accepted [accept it] on any termes: neither can he accept it without the Lord Bishopp's approbacion." C. 15.

HENRY DOLLING, 1664. He matriculated at Oxford, 29th October, 1657; B.A., 1661; M.A. 1664.

1666, Nov. 9. Mr. Henry Dolling, the present School-master, to have the Hushier's house, with arrears of rent due to this day, during the pleasure of the Company. C. 15.

1667-8, Jan. 3. The Corporation informs Mr. Hammond that they expect rent for the house he lives in, if he continue it. In reply "he will refer himselfe to this Company concerning the rent of the howse wherein he liveth for the future." C. 15.

1674, April 3. Free School writings put into the boxes in the Towne Hall, (1) Deed, dated 3 Aug., 21 Eliz.; (2) Deed, 2 Jan., 8 James; (3) Deed, 9 Oct., 22 Chas. I.; (4) Deed, 19 Aug., 15 Chas. II.; (5) Deed, 20 Aug., 15 Chas. II.; (6) Paper of articles, orders and constitutions touching the Free School.

"All these writings were returned by John Harden, Esqr., whoe recieued them from the hands of Sir Gerred Napper, Knt., and brought into the hall by Mr. Wm. Pitt." C. 15.

1677, April 10. Mr. Dolling, the School Master, is lent the old deed of Mr. Hardy's to show the Commissioners of Charitable Uses—the Commissioners having summoned in Mr. Chick for seizing and possessing a living at Frome Vauchurch which belonged to the School. C. 15.

1693-4, Jan. 8. "Most honn' Sir. You have bin waited on by some of vs in order to make a new Settlement of the Scoole Lands heare by filling vp the Trust. Your selfe, Mr. Williams, of Heringston, and Mr. James Gould are the Surviving Trustees, a Deed have bin drawen and ingrossed for

you and the others to seale which haue bin refused: The new Feoffees intended in the Deed are as foloweth. Thomas Freeke, Esq., Thomas Trenchard, Esq., Natha: Napier, Esq., Country Gentlemen, Mr. Hugh Baker (Dead), Mr. Allixander Haviland, Mr. Andrew Loder, Mr. John Gollop, off the Town. But if all or either off these be not pleasing to you: please to name seauen others (soe as there bee fower of the Capitall Burgesses of this Borough as have bin euer accustomed). Wee are sure ther is nothing to be gotten by the trust but trouble.

Synce the Foundation of the Scoole, our predissessors haue constantly had the care and ouer-sight of the Scoole, the howses and buildings thereof, and the demeanor of the Scoole master and Vsher for the tyme beeing and the keeping of all the Deeds and Euidences of the lands, till in the late tyme of vsurpation one of the Feoffees, a gentleman then in great power, gott the oridginall Conveyance by which itt is aparent the Scoole hath bin abused. Wee pray your due consideration heare off and speedy direction, in order to the sealing the Deed, which shall be brought to you after your aprobation or nomination, as beefore mentioned, for we desier nothing more than to keep a right vnderstanding and a good corispondancy with persons of your merite, espetially those of your Family who have bin so generous benifactors to our towne: with the tender of our Seruise, crauing a Speedy answer we do remayne [unsigned].

Sir, Last Wensday at the Rising of the house I rec'd your letter of the 8th instant, and had not the opportunity then to deliuer Sir Natha. Napier the incloased, he beeing gon from the house befoare I receaved itt. The next day I did not find him att the house, which occasioned my not giving you an acc: by that day's post; but yesterday, as soone as he came into the house and was seated, I went to him and setting downe by his side, I tould him I had rec'd a letter from you, and a nother encloased for him from our Company, to desier vs, who are the surviving trustees for our Fee scoole [sic] to fill vp the places of those that are dead, that soe the

trust may be the better exicuted. I att the same tyme presented him with that directed to him, which he rece'd of me and op'ned itt, looking on itt the tyme he might be reading itts contents, and then folded itt vp and putt itt into his pockett, telling me that himselfe and Mr. Williams had agreed to have noe others added but each his sonn, to that trust. I then desired him to consider of itt, and that he would be pleased to wright you his Resolution him selfe: he replyed that he had beefore that tyme considred of itt, and thought itt not necessary for him to wright you his answer, but that I might acquaint you (if I pleased) that him selfe and Mr. Williams had resolved to have noe others joyned with them but their two sonns in the trust for the scoole. When I found could obtayne noe other answer from him nor yet a place to argue the matter with him, to shew him the inconveniency of yt and your Resolution, I left him and removed to a nother place, and he soone after went out of the house againe (I supoase to dinner) but I have not seene him synce. For my owne part I shall be ready to doe any resonable act (as I take this desired to be) that shall be offred to me, and will by noe means joyne with them in soe vnresonable an act as excluding the Towne men, whose intrest itt is to advance what they can the incoaridgment and proffitts of the said scoole, and who can best and easiest look after itt, and haueing all the Deeds and Writings concerning the said Scoole in their Custody. may the better be informed what their power and trust is, and soe not soe easily imposed on as Strangers, that understand but litle thereof, may. THE HILL EXHIBITION.

John Hill, by his will dated 7th May, 1657, bequeathed £100, to be invested in the purchase of real property in fee, in the County of Dorset, on trust to apply the rents and profits as a yearly Exhibition for the maintenance of a poor scholar, born of honest parents, inhabitants of Dorchester, and educated at the Free School there, and thence sent and promoted to one of the Universities of this Nation, from his admittance till he shall commence Bachelor of Arts, to be succeeded by a like poor scholar. Should there be a two years' vacancy in filling up this Exhibition, the yearly rent during such vacancy to be for the use of such poor person or persons as from time to time shall be heirs of the testator at common law, to be accounted and paid by the Mayor, Aldermen, etc. C. 9.

1658, Sept. 24. "It was agreed that Mr. Mayor should be desired to write to Mr. Davidge, that this Company have resolved to lay a Rent Charge of five pounds a yeare cleare of all charges vpon the George Inne, which is the Towne land, in consideration of the hundred pounds given to the Towne by Mr. John Hill for five pounds a yeare Exhibition for a pore Schollar of this Towne to be mayntayned in the Universitye." 1658-9, March 4. "Ordered and agreed that the 100h. giuen by Mr. Hill for buying of five pounds a yeare land for mayntenance of a pore scholar in the Vniuersity shall be layed out in a tenement at Chaldon of Mr. Savage his land, for securing the sayd vl. per ann., and that Mr. Davidge have notice giuen to him of it by And: Loder." 1659, July 4. "There was a contract and agreement betwixt the Corporacion and Mr. Christopher Bettscomb, of Symsbury, for the inheritance in fee of the house which lately Mris. A letter was written to Mr. Richard Davidge to this effect, stipulating that the main house and little court should be made over to Mr. Hill's executors by deed from Mr. Bettscomb, and the stable and little garden by another deed to the Corporation, in consideration of their £25. though wee haue heard nothinge from you in answer thereto: significinge in behalfe of the Towne that we had made a purchas of a house in Trinity parrish in Dorchester of one Mr. Betscomb, the inheritance in fee whereof cost 125li., one which wee intend to lay out the 100li. given by my Cozen Mr. John Hill to this Towne for the benifit of poore Schollers in the Vniuersity. and doe intend to have too deeds made from Mr. Bettscomb. namely for the maine dwellinge house which is a new stone built and stone tiled, standinge in the Fore streate; wee intend it shalbe made ouer to you and to Mr. Beale, executors to Mr. Hill, for the sayd 100h. as the will doth direct: And the backe house and the Stable and little garden to be made ouer vnto the Towne in consideration of the 25k. ouerplus, in which deuision wee doe beleive you have the better, for soe wee intended. The house and garden doth now yeeld 9h. per ann', wee to repaier it. Wherefore it is desired that you will provide the 100*li*, and send it downe as soone as may bee: or at least that you will appoint some Atturney to looke into the aforesaid particulers for your further satisfaction therein: and that you will take notice that the Towne is not defective one their part in answeringe the will of their deceased worthy Freind: where vnto wee shall desier your answer as soone as possible for the two yeares is almost expired. Thus after my hearty com' to you and Mr. Beale, I rest,

out of the Quit Rents yearly payable out of the nine Butchers Shops in the Parish of Saint Peter. The Deed indemnifying the Owner of the Exhibition House from payment of the Exhibition Money, and charging other lands with the same, is dated 26th April, 1802. C. 42a.

THE RECTORY OF HOLY TRINITY WITH ST. PETER'S.

John White.*

John White, M.A., and Fellow of New College, Oxford, one of the Assembly of Divines, 1643, the leading spirit in Dorchester in the first half of the seventeenth century (1605—1648), has not left so many traces of his personality in the Town Books as might have been expected. It is clear from them, however, that he was held in high esteem by the municipal authorities of his day, and the draping of the church porch in black, for one month after his decease, as his "month's mind," by order of the Corporation, is an interesting indication of this fact. On the other hand, there are signs of an undercurrent of dissatisfaction at the prevailing Puritan regime. The quotations which follow give examples of both of these currents of opinion.

1630, Sept. 15. "John Role, vpon oath testifieth that Anne Samwayes, vid', did speak vnseemly words of Mr. White, viz., that he did starve the Cuntry, and did ioyne with the divell for mony, and would be a merchant and fearmer for his profitt, and did send provision to New England in a color to convey to Spayne, and many other vnseemly words for a quarter of an howre space." C. 8.

1630, Feb. 8. "The examinacion of Robert Adin,

prisoner, vpon oathe, who saith that Phillip Nychols of this Borough, taylor, coming to the prison yesterday towards the evening, offered speeche to this examinant concerning Mr. John White's preaching the day before, and said that White (for so he called him) had made Crist an inocent and simple man in his sermon, and said that he thought Crist was never so handled in a sermon before, and found himselfe greived that Crist should be said to be simple, and this examinant seemed not to approve the said opinion of Nycols' dislike of saying Crist was a simple man, vnles ther had bene some other addicion thervnto, and because this examinant would not consent vnto him and approve his iudgment in that pointe, he, the said Nychols, rayled at this examinant, calling him 'Old Papist' and doons (?), with other reproachfull speeches, complaying that Mr. White preached not sound doctrine in that point."

Francis Welsted, prisoner, "who sayth that yesterday, in the afternoone, he herd Mr. Robert Adin and Phillip Nychols of this Towne, taylor, in conference about Mr. White's Preaching the day before, and sayth that Phillip Nychols tooke excepcions to some speeches Mr. White then vsed, and shewed himself grevved that he had sayd Crist was a simple man in his sermon. saying to this examinant, 'Sirha, I would thou hadst bene at church yesterday, thou shouldest have herd Crist made a very inocent,' and this examinant asked him 'By whome,' and he awnswered, 'By White' (for so he termed him), and sayd further that God Almighty was neuer so handled before. and this examinant asked him yf Mr. White called him 'foole' or 'begger boy,' and he annswered 'No, but as bad,' and sayd that he had looked in his booke, and found Kelleson had confuted that doctrine." [See Kellison's Survey of Religion in the Dorchester Library.]

Thomas Devenish, Keper of the Gaole, "who saith that meeting Phillip Nychols yesterday in the afternoone, going vp the street this examinant asked him yf he had bene with Mr. Adin againe to make him beleue he would be of theire or that Religion, whoe awnswered he had bene there, and that the Old Semenary and he weare fallen out, and he would come there no more, and shewed this examinant that he had told Mr. Aden what straunge doctrine Mr. White had preached the day before in his opinion, viz., that Crist was made a simple inocent, holding vp his hands and shaking his head, and sayd that the Old Semenary did seeme to approve of what Mr. White had said, which was the cause he would come no more at him."

Phillip Nychols "sayth that he herd Mr. White preach the last Lord's day in the afternoone, and being at the Prison yesterday in the afternoone, told Mr. Adin of some passages of that Sermon, and asked the said Aden yf euer he herd that God was simple, and the said Aden approved that to be true that yt might be so said; and denieth that he vsed any ill Language at all to Mr. Aden, nor vsed him with any disgracefull termes, and denieth also that he vsed any words to that purpose to Mr. Devenish that Mr. Aden and himself were fallen out."

Nychols was committed, and the next day released on his own recognisance (£10) and that of James Gould, clothyer, and John Greene, tayler (£5 each) to appear at the next Sessions,

"to annswer his abuse toward Mr. Jo. White, traducing his doctrine." C. 8.

1636, March 26. Thomasyn, wife of Thomas Powncy "saith that a little before Easter last Roberte Powncy, sonne of Roger Powncy of the Borough aforesaid, being in his father's howse in the same Borough, and there being some speeches vsed that the said Roberte Powncy was to goe to Mr. White, the minister, to be examined before he came to the Sacrament, he, the said Roberte Powncy, said he would not go to the said Mr. White, he would see his on fire in or at the pulpit first." C. 8.

1637, Oct. 6. "John Bonger about the xxth of Sep. last past did in presence of Mr. Edmund Dashwood say that Trinity parish had had a stock of 800k. ere this to mayntaine their poore, but that Mr. Maior and Mr. White did send for it enery Monday morning, after the Sacrament, to the Churchwardens, for the mony given at the bason, and what became of it he knew not, and desired to suffer in the cause. There were also parte, and a witnes Christofer, clockmaker." C. 8.

John Strickland.*

1631, Dec. 23. "It is agreed by Mr. Maior and the rest of the Capitall Burgesses with the consent and approbacion of Mr. John White, our minister, that Mr. John Strickland shall be chosen an assistant in the ministry vnto Mr. White heere in Dorchester, to receive for the exercise of the ministry amongest vs vnder Mr. White fifty pounds yearely, payable out of the Seaton Parsonage, as long as Mr. White shall approve of him, and the said Mr. Strickland exercise his ministry vnder the said Mr. White in Dorchester aforesaid, which stipend shall be vnto him paid by the Steward for the tyme being of the said Parsonage." C. 9.

1632-3, Jan. 28. Mr. Strickland, minister of God's Word, being called to a parsonage in Somersetshire by Sir John Horner, Knt., the Mayor and Cap. Burgesses relinquish their interest in him, "that hee may with the more quietnes of mynd attend his charge in his Parsonage in Somersetshire." C. 9.

1632-3, Feb. 18. "To Mr. Hill, Minister. Sir, The assurance which wee have by the credible reporte of such as know you well of your abilityes every way for the calling of the ministery makes vs bold, (although vnknowne vnto you), to present you our desire of enjoying your labors amongst vs. Wee have in this Towne vnder Mr. White's charge two congregations, each of them conteyning at least a thousand soules, and two churches each of them capable of the people belonging vnto them, but neither sufficient for both assemblyes, which enforceth both our selves and Mr. White to crave the assistance of an other minister to iovne with him in his ymploymt, and the rather to desire a man of more then ordinery abilityes, because wee find Mr. White, by reason of his yeares, and infirmitves which hathe lately fallen vpon him, not soe well able to continue the paynes which hee hath formerly taken amongst vs, as hearetofore. Wee doe therefore, in the behalfe of the people whome it concernes, and by their desire, earnestly request you to accept of the charge of one of these churches and congregations. Wee doe by these promise you one hundred pounds per annu' for your certen stipend (which wee will bee ready to assure you farther by any other reasonable way, during the tyme of your residence amongst vs) and withall to provide that you may have the due respect amongst vs that becomes your owne worth and

1632-3, March 1. To Mr. Thomas Hill of Cambridge. "Worthy Sir, We have received in your I'res by Mr. Tutchin a negative answeare to our request of vndertaking the charge of a Congregation amongest vs, which bicause we conceive to be grownded on our desire of a present resolution, we are moved to hope that, yf we had graunted you long time of deliberation, we may have received an answeare, corespondent to our hopes. Wherevpon, and withall hoping of noe disaffection of your owne heart to this place and imployment detaines you from vs, and conceiving a greate likelihood of removing that impediment which now witholds you, we are resolved vpon advise with one consent to inlarge the tyme of expecting your finall answeare vnto our motion, vntill you may see farther into the want of your present affaires. We have therefore purposely sent over this bearer to request the motion, which we have made vnto you, once more into your serious consideracion, and that you will be pleased to assure us by your promise to accept our offer, yf you faile in the suite in which you are now ingaged: and lymitt vs the tyme of our expectance till the end of Midsomer term next: wee shall willingly beare the inconvenience of waiting soe long for a person whome we soe much desire. How convenient it may be in it selfe or to your affaires to afford vs your presence in the meane tyme wee know not: but yf your selfe and your freinds should judge it fitt, we should receive it as a speciall token of your love yf you would voutchsaffe to come and visite vs. and abide with vs for what tyme you pleased. We referre it to your wise consideracion, and desire you, as wee endeavor to doe our selves, to recomend this place and the weighty affaire to God in your prayers, to whose gracious blessing we comend you, resting, Your very loving freinds. "It is agreed that whereas Mr. Jonathan Lawrence, minister of God's Word, hath by the space of neere halfe a yeare exercised his ministry amongest vs in assistance of Mr. John White, our Pastor, It is ordered that Mr. Hill, Steward of Seaton Parsonage, out of the profitts of the same parsonage shall pay him tenne pownds for his paines." C. 9.

Stephen Webb.†

1633, July 17. "Sir, it is perhaps not vnknowne vnto you that we have with vs at present the place of an Assistant vnto Mr. White, our minister, voide, and thereby greate want of a minister to supply it,-Mr. White having two churches vnder his charge, either of them capeable of the congregation which belong vnto them, but neither of them able to receive the whole multitude. The report which wee haue heard of your abilities for such a place, and of your leisure at present to vndertake it, haue moved vs soe farre that yf wee had not formerly ben engaged to another man wee had, ere this, manifested vnto them our desires to intreate your helpe and assistance heere, yf God shall soe incline your heart. It hath now pleased God, by disposing otherwise of that person on whome wee depended, to leaue vs at liberty to make our request anew. Wherefore, having found Mr. White's free concurrence with vs in this desire, wee haue sent over vnto you these by the hands of this bearer to request you (yf you stand free from other ingagements), to take the paines to come vnto vs with as much speed as you may, to conferre with vs about this affaire, that (yf God shall soe dispose of our heartes on both sides) wee may agree vpon condicions for your setling in this place, wherein, yf it please you to gratifie vs, wee shall have cause further to engage

To the reuerend our very loving friend Mr. Stephen Webb, preacher of God's word at Basing Stoake. C. 9.

1633, Aug. 14. "Worthy Gentlemen, I have hitherto very palpably found God's good hand in the disposing of me: and what his providence will doe in this particular, I shall be ready to enquire and attend the answeare. On Saturday (God willing) I shall come over, when as by word of mouth I shall thank you for your love and good opynion, soe also give such satisfaction as I may, being subject to bee intreated to doe such work as I am in the Vineyard, and willing that the greate Master should appoynt out the place where by such honest hands that I may in comfortable measure without feare bestow my paines in a profitable and peaceable manner, desiring in the interim that you will humbly seeke God in this behalfe, that, if I come and abide with you by the will of God, it may be with ioy, he giving sentence in mercy which, vf it prove negative, yet it will be noe loss labor to refresh my spirit by seeing reuerend Mr. White, and observing your good order, which the God of truth and peace establish and further by whome he sees good, and, if he will, by him who desires to shew himselfe as faithfull to it. [Circa 12 Nov., 1633.] "Sir, Having vnderstood by the messenger that returned from you your good affection to this place, and your hope to order your affayres in such sort that you might be at libertie to deliberate more freely then you could, when you were with vs, of the propositions wee then made vnto you for the full setling of your resolucion, we thought yt needefull to signifie vnto you once againe by wryting our heartie and earnest desire to enioy you, and the fruits of your Labours of which you have given vs so good a taste already, and that not for a time but for continuance, yf God be pleased to further our desire. Whatsoeuer therefore

we have already offered vnto you wee resolve and promise (God assisting vs) to performe really, viz., to pay in for the present 60li. per annum for your setled maintenance, and that as long as you please, and yf, after tryall, you like so well of the place as to be willing to remaine among vs, we shalbe willing to enlarge yt when your occasions shall require, according to our abillytie. Wee forbeare to capitulate more particulerly at present, because wee thinke yt vnreasonable to desire you to resigne yourself ouer vnto vs wholly till you have knowen vs better. But desire you to beleeue that as wee never yet gave any minister that came vnto vs cause to complaine of our fayling in performance, but have made good our agreements with advantage, so we shalbe much more vnwilling to come short of your expectacion, whom wee so generally and justly approve and reverence for that which wee haue both heard and found by our owne experience. Wee doe therefore intreate you to awnswere our heartie and affectionate desires of enioving your company and labours amongst vs with the same singlenes of heart with which they are tendered, and yf God shall encline your heart towards vs, to signific your resolucion as speedely as you may, that we may take order for all things that concerne your coming vnto vs and continuance amongst us, with all convenient speede. In the meane time we comend you and your resolucions to the wise directing hand of God, and rest, your Loving frends. William Jolyffe, Maior, Edmund Dashwood, Ri: Blachford, Jon. To our worthely reverenced and respected frend, Mr. Hugh Thomson, Mr. of Arts, and fellowe of L. Collidge in Exon " [sic], i.e., Oxon. C. 9.

1633-4, March 14. The Mayor and Burgesses agree to pay Mr. Tompson, minister, £100 per ann. quarterly (viz., £60 out of Seaton Parsonage, £5 out of Mr. Perkins's gift, £20 out of the Brewhouse which was usually paid to the Reader, and £15 more out of the profit of the Brewhouse)—the 1st payment at this rate to begin at Christide next, and in the mean time he is to have but £60 yearly. C. 9. A copy of the agreement, which states that the stipend of £100 a year is to run from the following Michaelmas, is found in C. 9, under date 6th June, 1634.

1647, Oct. 6. "It was this day agreed that there shall be 2001i, per annum allowed out of Fordington parsonage

for the mayntenance of an Assistant minister in the two higher parishes, to ease Mr. White in his weakenes. The first quarter's payment to be made at Lady day next." C. 12.

1647, Nov. 12. "Whereas the Warden of New College* being dead, and a new Warden being to be chosen, there is greate doubt that Mr. Jo: White, our minister, is to bee chosen, and therefore to prevent it, and to farther the busines about Fordington Parsonage, that the towne send Mr. Benne and one of the Company with him, to labor in the busines." C. 12.

1647, Nov. 12. "This day it was agreed that on Monday next, at eight of the clocke in morning, this Company be desired to be all here present, and to make choice of an Assistant Minister to helpe Mr. White in his weaknesse." C. 12.

Simon Ford.†

1647-8, Jan. 7. "This day this Company vpon conference that Mr. White, our minister, having already declared Mr. Ford, minister, now of Pidletowne, to bee his assistant in the ministery in Trinity and Peter's parishes, and to which we do freely consent, we do agree to move the common Counsell and to acquaint them therewith to gett their approbation, And that his allowance shall begin from our Lady day next, by which time wee hope he may be brought hither. C. 12.

1647-8, Jan. 24. "It is agreed that the two vpper parishes be enformed tomorrow at the evening sermon of Mr. White's motion to this Company whether they approve of Mr. Ford, of Pudletowne, to be an Assistant to him in this Towne. And this being don, that a letter be written to Mr. Ford of their choosing of him." C. 12.

1648, March 31. "Mr. John White, our minister, desires a further estate in his barne at Chub's gate." C. 12.

1648, May 12. "It is ordered and agreed that Mr. White and Mr. Ben bee desired to take course that on enery Sabboth day in morning, when Mr. White shall be vnable to preach himselfe, that Mr. Ben may preach at Peter's church, where this Company are for the most part, which wee vnderstand also will give very great satisfaction to the Towne in general." C. 12.

1648, June 23. "Upon the failing of Mr. White's quarterly payments from the parishioners of Trinity and Peter's, the same not making vp the somme of fowerscore pounds per annum, which was the summe designed for his additional mayntenance, wee thinke fitt and haue agreed that there shall be an account given in by the Collectors of the sayd quarterly contribucion, when they have don their vttmost endeuours for gathering vp what is behind of Lady daves quarter and Midsommer quarter, and what wants of fifteene pounds each of those quarters shall be made vp and supplyed by the Steward of Fordington parsonage out of the proffitts of the same, which this Company will allow vpon his account: And that the monnyes quarterly collected shall be by the sayd Collectors payed in vnto the Steward of the parsonage euery quarter, and the sayd Steward to pay vnto Mr. White the fifteene pounds aforesayd, as before expressed, within ten dayes after the quarter, and this to continue for euery quarter for the future, vntil there shall be an assistant minister brought in place." C. 12.

The Interregnum.

John White, the aged Rector of Holy Trinity and St. Peter's, died on 21st July, 1648. In his will, dated 29th May in that year, and proved 14th June, 1649 (105 Fairfax, P.C.C.) by his youngest son, Nathaniel, he mentions his four sons, and his four sisters, Anne Drake, Martha Moore, Elizabeth Allen and Mary White, and Mr. Frederick Losse, physician. The three younger sons were named John, Josias and Samuel.

1648, Apr. 28. "Mr. Samuel White, gold smith, agreed with this Company for 21 yeers in his shop (which he now inioyeth) the yeers to begin after the deth of Mr. Edward Ears, minister, who now liveth in Ireland, the Towne Rent of 30s. still to continue in the 21 yeers. The fine to be paid Midsommer next, viz., xxh." C. 12.

1648, July 24. "It was agreed and thought fitt that the Feoffees of Trinity parsonage be desired to giue power by their warrant to authorize Nathaniel White, his father's executor, to receiue and gather vp all tithes which shall fall due vntil there shall be a minister brought into the place of Mr. White deceased, the said Nathaniel White engaging himself to be responsible to the next Incumbent for all the tithes which he shall receiue after his father's death. He is to be allowed for his paynes, and allowing meanes for a minister

to supply the vacancy. And that Nathaniel White should have the lease for his father's barne enlarged, according to a former promise made to his father." C. 12.

1648, July 24. "It is ordered by Mr. Maior and the Company that Mr. Savage, on the Companies desire to give, in their names, to Mr. White's executor five pounds, to give it to the poore in Mr. White's name."

"And that Mr. Savage doe cause the porch to be hung with black at the funerall and for one moneth after, and yf it be stolen, the Company will satisfie him for it." C. 9.

1648, Aug. 11. "This day, being a day of Humiliacion set apart to seeke vnto God for direction for choise of a minister, in the place of Mr. John Wite, the late deceased minister, there was given and collected 4*h*. 14s." C. 7.

1648, Sept. 22. "It is ordered that Mr. Ben be desired, with the assistance of some one of this Company or some other honest man of the Towne, to ride with him vnto Exeter and to treatte with Mr. Ford,* the minister now dwelling there, about being successor of our deceased minister, Mr. White. And that their charge be borne by the Towne, and that Mr. Ben be desired, in case he think fitt when he comes to Exon, to treate with Mr. Gower as well as with Mr. Ford. That after Mr. Benn's and Mr. Cole's retorne we approve of what they did act and do concerning Mr. Gower."

"Mr. Cole is desyred to ride vnto Exon to accompanie Mr. Ben and to propose vnto the mynister for his encouragment to come vnto Dorchester the Parsonage worth clerly 120½. per ann., and 60½ in lew of the Ester Booke, and to prouide him a convenient howse for the Parsonage howse which is not convenient, or that 4 suffityent men of this Towne shall engage to pay him 40½ euery quarter, cleer of all Taxes, and a convenient howse." C. 12.

1648, Oct. 16 [? 10]. "It is agreed that Mr. Ben be desired to ride vnto the Isle of Weight, accompanyed with [blank], to have conference with Mr. Marshal, Mr. Charell, Mr. Vynes and Mr. Seaman, of the Assembly now at Newport, about the Treatty touching Mr. Gower, and to know their iudgements of his abilityes and fittnes to succeede Mr. White in this Towne, and that they would please to give a full testimony concerning him, and to know of them what likelyhood

there is of getting him removed from the place where he is now in London."

1648-9, Jan. 26. "At the motion of Mr. Samuel White this Company doth iudge fitt that he be payd the fower pounds fourteene shillinges, which he hath layed out for the ministers which haue preached here in Towne since his father's death, and forty shillings more for the entertainment of seueral ministers in his house at several times, and that his brother Nathaniel shall be desired by Mr. Gower to pay him the somme of 61i. 14s. aforesayd." C. 12.

Stanley Gower.

He was born in Dublin, 1603, graduated B.A., at the University there, 1625, was ordained by Archbishop Usher in 1627, and was his chaplain. He served the cure of Sheffield, Yorks, and was a member of the Assembly of Divines, 1643. being then of Brampton Brian, co. Hereford. (See Hutchins' Dorset). "Mr. Gower made report of his part of Luther's last works: he thinks them not fit to be published. Many things will not advantage the work of Reformation; little good in it." (Minutes of Sessions of Assembly of Divines, p. 474.) He was nominated to Holy Trinity, Dorchester, 26th November, 1648 (Lords' Journals, Vol. x, p. 638), and was inducted into the Parsonage 24th January, 1648-9, having been presented by the major portion of the Feoffees, C. 9. and on 8th February £20 were promised him by the Corporation "towards the charge of his coming downe and the fetching downe of his wife and family." C. 12, and on 12th March it was agreed "that xli, be presented to Mris. Gower by Mr. Savage out of the profitts of Fordington parsonage to testifie their respects and to beare her charge down." C. 12. A still further sum of £30 was agreed on, 5th November, to be paid to Mr. Gower from the same source, "to disengage him of such debts as he contracted for his removal." C. 12. He still retained for some months the nominal charge of St. Martin's Sarum, for an augmentation of stipend for half a year to 29th September, 1649, was settled on him from Dean and Chapter lands, William Eyre succeeding to it for the Christmas quarter. (Shaw, Vol. ii, p. 546.) He died between 10th February and 18th July, 1660, but no entry of his burial occurs in the registers of Holy Trinity or St. Peter's. Susan Gower, widow, was buried at St. Peter's, 5th December, There can be little doubt that all the events above mentioned refer to one and the same person.

1648-9, Jan. 24. "This day Mr. Stanley Gower was inducted in the Parsonage of Trinity in the place of Mr. John White, deceased, being chosen by this Company and presented to the same by the major part of the Feoffees of the said Parsonage, to which choice was freely given the full consent and approbacion of the inhabitants of Trinity and Peter's without any contradiction. Gilberte Loder, Maior, [and others]." C. 9.

An Assistant Minister.

1653, May 13. "It is ordered and agreed that the three quarters of a yeare payment out of Fordington parsonage of fowerscore pounds a yeare, issuing thence for the additional mayntenance of a Minister of Peter's parish, which will bee due at Midsommer next, shall be payed vnto Mr. Stanley Gower for this yeare (the some being neere threescore pounds) for his paynes in preaching in both churches, and for to make a supply to the defect of the quarterly contribucions; the other twenty-two pounds having bin granted already to Mr. Ben for his paynes in officiating in Peter's church this yeare. And Mr. Whiteway is ordered to pay the same to Mr. Gower when he shall have so much money in his hands of the parsonage money."

"It is agreed that there bee an assistant minister for Peter's sought out, who shall begin to be payed from Midsommer next, and that Mr. Gower and Mr. Ben bee desired to afford their assistance and helpe in finding out a godly, fitt and able man, such a man as may suite best with the condicion of this Towne and with our present constitution with reference to the Congregacions, and for prevention of disorder." C. 12.

r657, June 26. "Whereas by the Charter or ordinance of Parliament for the Impropriate parsonage of Fordington is provision made of eightie pounds a yeare for the minister of Peter's in Dorchester, Wee, the Mayor, &c., by whose sole procurement the sayd Charter or ordinance was obtayned, do hereby declare that our Intention thereby was not to make Peter's a distinct parish from Trinity, but for the enabling of the Rector of Trinity to keepe and mayntayne an Assistant for the better supply of the two churches of Trinity and Peter's, which time out of mind beyond the memory of man haue alwayes bin held and supplyed by the Rector of Trinity and his Curate or Assistant. And whereas, by reason of some expressions in the sayd charter or ordinance, some question

hath arisen about the manner of bringing in of the sayd Assistant, to cleere vp our meaning and intentions therein wee haue thought fitt to declare, and wee do hereby declare Mr. Stanly Gower minister of Trinity and Peter's, as Mr. White and his predecessors have formerly bin, and that the sayd eightie pounds per annum is vested in him for the benifitt of an assistant, hereby desiring Mr. Gower to assigne the payment thereof to such assistant minister as the sayd Mayor and Corporacion with the advise and consent of him, the sayd Mr. Gower, shall nominate and bring in. And that Mr. Gower will also signifie his consent under his hand, that the arreares of the sayd eightie pounds per annum during the vacancy of an Assistant already due, together with whatsoever proffitts shall arise by reason of any future vacancy, shall be proportioned and disposed of by the sayd Mayor and Corporacion, as they in their iudgements shall iudge most agreeable to the ends for which it was obtayned. In wittness whereof wee haue hereunto sett our hands, Tho. Symonds, Maior" [and others]. .C. g.

Mr. Glover.*

1656, Apr. 18. "It is ordered that there bee a Conference held with Mr. Glover, of Wynford, either by Mr. Savage or Mr. Whiteway or both of them, concerning his coming hither to bee a Lecturer, whether or no hee will be perswaded to remove to this Towne for 80 \dot{n} . per ann. and a house, or 9[0]l. and a house rather than fayle." C. 12.

1656. June 20. "This day the Company having spoken with Mr. Gower to obtayne his concurrence for the bringing in of an Assistant Minister that may enioy the 80½, per annum granted vpon the Charter of Fordington Parsonage Mr. Gower made this proposition in order therevnto, vidz., That if the Company will declare vnder their hands that they repute him minister of Trinity and Peter's in succession of Mr. White, notwithstanding such third minister to bee now brought in, that then hee conceives wee may be free to bring in another minister, and hee will afford vs his helpe therein, And that in the instrument of declaration he would desire that it might be expressed that as Mr. White enioyed both Trinity and Peter's so doth Mr. Gower, and so shall the succeeding minister, so far as lieth in vs." C. 12.

James Speering.

1656, Oct. 17. "It is agreed that Mr. James Speering shalbee sent vnto, by all conventry, (and by his brother if wee can gett him to go), to come to Dorchester to bee a Lecturer at Peter's Church in Dorchester, who, yf he come and accept the place, he shall haue 80*li*. per ann. allowed out of Fordington parsonage." C. 12.

1656, Nov. 3. "It is agreed by this Company that Mr. Bailiff Maber shall goe to London to conferr with Mr. Bonde, Mr. Whiteway, and Mr. Burie, about to settle or agree to settle and procure a third person to preach at Peter's and Trinitie, and to haue the 80½. per ann. for his paines, and Mr. Maber shall haue his charges borne." C. 12.

Richard Russell.*

1657, Sept. 14. "This day it is agreed that there be a letter written vnto Mr. Rich. Russel, at Oxford, to invite him to be our Assistant Minister, and therein to propound to him 100½. per ann. for his salary while hee shall continue in that place, and that Mr. Whiteway be desired to write the said letter, and that Mr. Gower and Mr. Ben be also desired to write vnto Mr. Russel on the same behalfe to encourage his coming hither." C. 15.

1659-60, Feb. 10. "Resolved, that Mr. Ben be desired to preach once every Sabboth day in afternoone at Peter's in the absence of Mr. Russel for the space of 4 or 6 monethes, or vntil wee haue an answere from Mr. Russel." C. 15.

Francis Bampfylde.†

1660, July 18. "It is agreed that Mr. Bayliff Maber, Mr. Savage, Mr. Arthur Gould, and Mr. Haysome be desired to goe to Mr. Bamfeild, to treate with him about his being Minister in the place of Mr. Gower, deceased, and that they goe to him tomorrow." C. 15.

1660, July 27. "The day aboue written this Company doth likewise intreat Mr. Maior and it is agreed vppon that

he doth write a letter to-morow to Mr. Jon. Whiteway, one of the Burgesses for this Boroughe now in Parliament, to treat with Mr. Banfield, minister of Sherborne, now in London, and desier his speedy resolution about his removall from Sherborn to this towne, accordinge to the treaty that was had with him att Sherburne the 19th of this present month, by Mr. Maber, Richard Savage and Mr. Haysom and Arthur Gould; and likewise that Mr. Jon. Bushrod write a letter to Mr. Thomas Banfeild to the same purpose and that they desier a speedy answer to both the letters." C. 15.

George Hammond.

He was born in 1620, and studied at Trinity College, Dublin, but his name does not occur in the printed list of Dublin graduates. He was incorporated at Oxford, 12th October, 1639, and became M.A. from Exeter College, 1641, Rector of Mamhead, 1645, and Vicar of Totnes, Devon. He succeeded Gower at Dorchester, and on his ejection in 1662 continued to reside in the town, where he was licensed as a Presbyterian teacher, 4th April, 1672. In 1677 he removed to Taunton and thence, after Monmouth's rebellion, to London, where he died in October, 1705.

1660, Oct. 16. "This day at a meeting of the Guardians for the parish of Trinity for the choosing of a minister to succeede Mr. Gower, there was chosen by the major part of the Feoffees then present Mr. George Hammond, late of Bigbury in Devon. Richard Sauage, Maior, John Browne, Edw. Dashwood, Josiah Terry, Tho. Symonds. There were present at the same time Thomas Trenchard, Esq., for Mr. Rolls, John Whiteway for Mr. Rolls, Mr. John Daniel refused to vote, Mr. John Bushrod for Mr. Peter Ince.*" C. 15.

1662-3, March 16. "The Intimacion against Mr. Hamond is dated the fowerth day of March present, and was afixed this present sixteenth of March, 1662." C. 15.

1662-3, March 23. "At a full meeting of the Maior and Company this present twenty-third day of March, 1662, vpon information that ther is great hopes that Mr. Georg Hamond will be inabled to take and retayn agayn the Parsonage of the Holy Trinity, out of which he is now remoued, it is agreed by a vnanimous consent that the trustees of the

Dashwood, Maior; Will. Pitt, Robert Napper, Josiah Terry; Richard Churchill and Joseph Seward, Bayliffs; Arthur Gould, Wm. Wade, Alexander Havelland." C. 15.

Samuel Reyner.

1670, Sept. 3. Mr. Samuel Reyner [B.A., Magdalen Hall, Oxford, 1642; Vicar of Sonning, 1658] elected Rector of H. Trinity. C. 15.

Samuel Conant.

1704-5, March 17. Mr. Samuel Conant, M.A., Fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford, elected.

The Feoffees that signed the said presentation were His Grace the Duke of Newcastle (not then present), and J. Williams, John Nelson, John Gollop, George Lester, Thomas Blandford and John Yeat. The following were present but would not sign, viz., Andrew Loder, Thomas Seward, John Oldis, Capt. Robert Coker, Max. Gollop. C. 7. He died of phthisis, 18th May, 1706, aged 29. M.I. in Holy Trinity Church, Cambridge.

Samuel Berdmore.

1706, Sept. 28. Mr. Samuel Berdmore,* of the City of London, elected in the place of Samuel Conant deceased. C. 7. 1726, May 13. £4. 10. 0 ordered to be paid to Mr. Richard Jackson, the present Curate, for his good services in reading Daily Prayers. C. 7.

Holy Trinity Parsonage House.

1652, March 26. "Ordered and agreed that 150½. of the Seaton parsonage monny, now in London in the hands of Mr. Samuel Bury, shall be deliuered to Mr. Gilbert Loder, one of this Company, or his assignes, one hundred pounds whereof, being the fine agreed with Mr. Gardiner for his house vpon the Cornehill which Mr. Loder is desired to pay and gett a discharge for; and the other 50½. Mr. Loder is to repay

vnto whome this Company shall appoint, to be employed and layed out for repayring of the sayd house now in decay, which sayd 150h. is to be made good to the Steward for Seaton parsonage monny, out of the sale of the old Trinity parsonage house, the barne adioyning, and the garden behind the George, with the passage forth into the back lane belonging to the George. This sayd house of Mr. Gardiner's, newly purchased, being intended for a parsonage house for the minister to dwell in, in exchange for the old parsonage house, gardens, barne and passage aforesayd." C. 12.

1652, April 16. "It is agreed by this Company that the back house at the parsonage new house should be forthwith taken downe and sold, vidz., lyrons, rafters and justes, with the munyons of stone and stone heads and dournes, &c." C. 12.

1652, April 23. "It is agreed and ordered that the helliers shall proceed to make an end of covering the late purchased parsonage house, and that no further charge be bestowed vpon the repayring of the sayd house (the healing thereof excepted) vntil the title be cleered. And that the back house at the parsonage house be sold away and taken down. . . ." C. 12.

1652, April 30. "This day at a debate concerning the title of the new purchased house lately Mris. Gardiner's, this Company, doubting whether the mortgage that is vpon it may not prove troublesome in future time, have made this ensuing proposition to Mr. Loder, vidz., That he would with all possible and convenient speede buy the fee of the sayd house of John Gardiner, in whome the fee is, and that he would then tender it to this Company, either to accept or refuse the bargaine at their choice. In consideracion whereof this Company is content to leave vnto the sayd Mr. Loder all the timber of the back Crosse house at the said Mr. Gardiner's house (the boards and staire-case excepted) with the munyons of the windowes and chimney peeces [crossed out]. But in case this Company shall not thinke fitt to accept of the bargaine which Mr. Loder shall make with the sayd John Gardiner, that then Mr. Loder do take the whole house to himselfe, and pay back to the Towne all the monny which they have payed both towards the fine and for reparacions and building." C. 12.

1652, June 11. The house taken over from Mr. Loder. Cost of the fee, £153.

1656, June 27. "The account of the Charges of the new Parsonage house in Peter's parish & s. The lease of 100 years purchased of William Gardiner and William Alford at the fine of ... 100 . 00 The fee thereof purchased of John Gardiner at ... 053 . 00 The charges of Repayring the sayd house came to the somme of 140 . 00

Besides an Annuitie of six pounds per ann., payed to Temperance Gardiner from the time of the purchase, and to bee continued during her life.

Md. That in consideracion of the charge of purchasing this foresayd parsonage house for the Minister of Trinity and Peter's, the old parsonage house in Trinity parish was, by agreement of all parties concerned, yeelded vp to the Towne for the benifitt of the Corporacion." C. 9.

An abstract of the deeds relating to this purchase from William Gardiner has already been printed, ante pp. 380-383.

1675, May 14. "Mr. Samuel Reyner. Dorchester, the 4 May, 1675. Sir, whereas wee are lately informed of your clayme to the old parsonage house and garden behind the George by your forbidding the Tenants to pay there rents to the Corporation, which house is held onely by deed of exchange betwixt your predecessor and ours, as our house is betwixt our predecessor and yours, and synce you have thereby declared your intention to returne to your antient parsonage house, wee conceave the sayd exchange to be voied and doe now therefore, according to the effect of the said Deed, warne you to leave the possession of the house you now dwel in by virtue of the said exchange, and hold by noe other title, which is noe less then the law permitts and the rule of Justice admeasuers betwix us, which is all expected by, Sir, Jasper Samwaies" [and 9 others]. C. 15.

Holy Trinity Church.

1823, July 21. Resolved that one hundred pounds be given out of the public Funds of the Corporation to the Committee of Management for rebuilding the church of the parish of the Holy Trinity, in aid of the additional expence about to be incurred by the estimate now produced by Mr. Thomas Bower, for the express purpose of casing the walls with Portland

stone, according to a Plan as explained in the said estimate marked A.B. [pinned to the page]. C. 42a.

Estimate to case the front, and south east Tower, and the south west Buttress with Portland stone; work and reset the old stone to the whole of the west end, and as far as the window in the east end, for the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds. The Turrets above the moulding marked B. to be finished with Cement, also the pinacles on the south front and west end Pinacles in Portland stone, Two pounds each, extra.

A.B. To case the whole of the South side, West end, and South-east Turret with Portland Stone (except the part of the Turrets above the moulding marked B, which is to be finished as first proposed with Roman Cement) to wash and set the best of the old stone in the North side and East end, as far as the south east Turret, work the mouldings, coverings to the Buttresses and pedestal for pinacles in the North side and East end with Roman Cement, likewise the whole of the Pinacles North and South sides with Roman Cement, for the sum of Two hundred sixty three pounds, ten shillings. Wm. M. July 19. 1823. [Rebuilt, 1875.]

ALL SAINTS' RECTORY.

William Cheeke.

From several entries occurring in the Minute Books it appears that William Cheeke, Rector of All Saints', whose name occurred in the old register, 1611-1617, vacated his living, and subsequently became an inmate of one of the Town Almshouses. Here he died in 1650, having outlived John White, his contemporary, by two years. The Books of Institution in the Public Record Office do not mention the names of either William or Robert Cheeke.

1636, April 29." Whereas Mr. William Cheeke, sometymes Parson of All Saints' in this Borough, and an inhabitant sometimes in Peter's Parish, is for want of meanes of maintenance placed in Sir Roberte Napper's Almeshowse, and he being blind and feeble, the meanes of maintenance allowed vnto him out of the almeshowse incombe will not suffice to relieve him; It is therefore ordered that twelve pence weekely shall be allowed and paid vnto him out of the bason mony, given and to be given in Peter's parish within this Borough, vntill Mr. Maior and the Company shall otherwise

agree, by the Churchwardens of Peter's parish; and shall have two shirtes given him for his presente necessity, to bee paid for by the Steward of the Hospital." C. 9.

1649, Oct. 19. "It is thought fitt that the xijd. a weeke behind and in arreare, paid to Mr. Cheeke in the Almeshouse, shall be paid to him out of the monny which shall be collected the next Thanksgiuing Day." C. 12.

1649, Nov. 16. "It is ordered and desired that Mr. Bushrod should pay out of the Brewhouse monnyes vnto Constable Gould the some of xxs. for Mr. Cheeke's relieffe in the Almeshouse, and who is to be paid xijd. per weeke." C. 12.

1650, March 29. From henceforth Mr. Bushrod to pay vnto Benjamin Gould xiijs. per quarter, for a weekly supply to Mr. Cheeke at xijd. per weeke. C. 12.

1650, July 3. "This day it was ordered that Mr. Bushrod, the Steward of the Hospital, shall deliuer vnto Ben: Gould xxs. to prouide necessaryes for old Mr. Cheeke in the Almeshouse, now in his extremity of weaknes, and that the xxd. per week shall be continued vnto him as formerly." C. 12.

1650, Aug. 23. A place is void in the Almeshouse by the death of Mr. Cheeke. C. 9.

Robert Cheeke.

He is thus spoken of by Sir Francis Ashley in his assignment for his benefit of the lease of the tithes of Walterston in 1617, which will be mentioned presently. "Roberte Cheeke hath taken and continually doth take great paynes and travaile in expounding of the holie Scriptures, catechesing and otherwise discharging the religious dutyes appertayninge to his pastoral cure and charge," though the value of his parsonage is "very smale, and in no reasonable manner sufficinge for a competent exhibition to an industrious and reasonable pastor." He was also master of the Free School and died in 1627.

Samuel Whitefield.

He was son of Samuel Whitefield, of Bucks, clerk, matriculated at Oxford, 15th May, 1618, aged 18, from Queen's College; B.A. from Magdalen Hall, 1621, M.A., 1624 (Foster's Alumni Oxon.); made the necessary declarations on being ordained Priest by the Bishop of Bristol, 24th September,

1625, and at institution to the Rectory of All Saints', 2nd January, 1627-8. (Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. vi, pp. 185, 188.)

1627, Dec. 16. "Mr. James Whitefield was chosen parson of All Saints' in Mr. Cheek's place."—William Whiteway's Diary. (Dorset Field Club's Proceedings, Vol. xiii, p. 69.)

John Ball.

1628, Dec. 30. John Ball, M.A., subscribed the Articles previous to institution to the Rectory of All Saints', and again on 7th May following, on his presentation by Sir Walter Erle to the Rectory of Langton Matravers, so that his connection with Dorchester was of brief duration. (Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. vi, p. 190.)

William Benn.

He was born about November, 1600, a native of Cumberland, and had been a member of Queen's College, Oxford, but did not graduate; incumbent of [Wokingham], Berks; Chaplain to Marchioness of Northampton in Somerset (Wood's Athena Oxon., Vol. iii, col. 1273); was elected Rector of All Saints', 12th July, 1629 (C. 9), and took the oaths of Supremacy and Canonical Obedience and the oath against Simony, 5th August following (Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. vi, p. 143). He was ejected in 1662, but continued to reside in the town till the Five Mile Act, when he retired to Maiden Newton. He was licensed as a Nonconforming teacher at Dorchester, 1st May, 1672, and dying on 22nd March, 1680-1, was buried in All Saints' Churchyard.

1629, July 12. "Md., that on the day and yeare aboue-said with the approbacion of the cheifest of the parishioners of the parish of All Saints, the Bailiffs and maior parte of the Capitall Burgesses of the said Borough did elect and choose Mr. William Benne to bee the next incombent to the Church of All Saints, and made knowne the same their election to the said Mr. Benne, who accepted thereof, and the said Bailiffs and Capitall Burgesses, then presente, informed the said Mr. Benne that the same Parsonage is of the yearely valew of lxxli. per annum, and that they hoped the profitts therof will bee increased, and agreed to make him a Presentacion to the same Parsonage when Mr. Ball, the present incombent, hath resigned the same Parsonage.

The mayntenance of the same Parsonage is conceived will arise in this manner yearely: The Easter booke; out of the rent of the Church land; the tithes of Little Puddle; out of the Brewhouse, which is paid for the profitt of Iooli. which is the mony given in the tyme of the fast and now ymployed in the Brewhowse." C. 9.

1629-30, Jan. 6. "It is agreed that Benjamin Devenish shall pay out to Mr. Ben xvli. in parte of payment of xxxli. yearely, which he is to have out of the Brewhowse as in augmentacion of the profitts of his parsonage, vntill such tyme as the sayd parsonage shalbe endowed with Revenues about 70li. per annum, being so promised by the Company at his Induction." C. 9.

1630, May 5. "William Chub, servant to Edward Ashe, testefieth vpon oathe that haveng some speeche with his sister Em, the wife of John Gawler, concerning Mr. Benne, the preacher, and enquiring yf Mr. Benne was sick or no, because he did not preache, and his sayde sister awnsered 'Mr. Benne was sick, because he had no more offerings at Easter,' which was spoken the week after Easter last."

"Allexander Biles, whoe, being accused that lately he sayd Mr. Ben did rave or rayle at church in his sermon, confesseth that he said Mr. Benne was an angry man, and denieth that he sayd any other words, but Henry Goare is to testifie in this case." C. 8.

1631, May 4. The examinacion of Lawrence Ryton, taken vppon oath before Mr. Mayor, &c., "who sayth that the 21th day of March last past, going to Cerne in the company of Wm. Martin of this Borough, seevier, the said Martin brake into speche of ministers and lawyers, that they had gotten all the riches of the land into ther hands, and were growen so proud that they will not vouchsaf to speke to a pore man; whervpon they fell into question of the voluntary contrybucion for the provision of corn to be made in Dorchester for the pore, which this examinant sayd Mr. Ben did like well, and in further spech the sayd Martin sayd that Mr. Ben had gotten so much means that he was become so proud that he would not speak vnto him, but cast vp a great pair of eyes vpon him, and this examinant replyed that svs [such] lik Mr. Ben was taken vp with other things, and did not take notice of him when he met him, whervoon he sayd he would nyther sp'ke nor put of his hat vnto him any more, and sayd withal in besley and vncivill terms that he cared not a 'savy your r'vence for him, and you tell him so,' and obiected divers passages of Mr. Ben's preching and prayers, that he was so long in preching; and having an answeare made of the reason, he sayd 'then he might say lesse,' and did not speak lowd inugh in deliuering the names of the children at Christnings."

Cristopher Wey, "whoe saith, going on the way to Cerne in the company of Wm. Martin, the said Martin spake of the bounty of Mr. Cheeke in giving at the colleccions in the church, but thought Mr. Ben gave litle or nothing, and said farther that Mr. Ben did not reade the Com[munion] nor Epistles and Ghospells, nor did not reade audibly, and sayd farther that Mr. Benne, yf he mett him or his nyhbors, he did not vse to salut them with his hatt, but look ouer them with a great pair of eyes, and this examinant bid him stop, and charged him that he ranne out to fast against Mr. Benne, and he replyd that he card not a —— for any one that should tell him of yt."

William Hayward, "who saith that going on the way to Cerne with William Martin, the seavier, ther was speech of the colleccion in the church, and Martin spak in commendacion of the bounty of Mr. Cheeke, that he vsed to give mony guifts to encourage others but sayd Mr. Benne did not, and sayd farther that Mr. Benne did not reade the Common Prayer the Com[munion] and Episles and Ghosples, &c., and this examinant wised him to say no mor then he ment to her of, to which he replyed, that when hee vsed to meet with Mr. Benne, he did not speak to him, nor put of his hat, but vsed to cast vp a great pair of eys vpon him, and sayd farther that he sp'k yt, to the end to her of yt again, and cared not a 'Sir reverens' for him that should tell him of yt." C. 8.

1632, Sept. 26. A certificate given to Mr. Robert Tutchyn* that Lowdes field hath alwayes paid tenths and fifteenths with the parish of All Saints (see *Verdict Book*, 1577), and the mansion house of Lowdes field stands in the parish of All Saints. C. 9.

* Robert Tutchin, literatus, subscribed the usual declarations on being ordained Deacon, 24th September, 1625, and Priest, 22nd September, 1627, by the Bishop of Bristol (Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. vi, pp. 185, 187). "Mr. Turchin removed from Fordington to Charminster," 28th July, 1633 (Wm. Whiteway's Diary) He was subsequently Lecturer at Bridport, 13th July, 1642 (Lords' Journals, Vol. ii, 670) and a Trier, and Lecturer at Chideock, 17th May, 1643 (Commons' Journals, Vol. iii, 89). He was confirmed in the Rectory of Bridport, 4th April, 1646.

1648, Sept. 1. "It is ordered and agreed that in respect the publike thanksgiving day falls out to be on Woodbery Faire Eve, at which time most of the Towne will be from home, Mr. Ben be desired to observe the Wednesday following for a day of Thanksgiving." C. 12.

1650, May 27. "It is agreed that there shall be 101. giuen to Mr. Polwheele,* as a testimony of our respects to Mr. Ben whose eldest daughter he hath lately marryed, out of the Parsonage monny; and Mr. Savage is desired to pay the monny accordingly." C. 12.

"Our Cold Hearts."

1658, Sept. 10. "Mr. Gower, Mr. Benn, Mr. Russell be desired, out of the sence of the greate need wee haue of improveinge the meanes and imbraceinge every opportunitie, to the stirringe our cold harts, the more to be quickened in the wayes of pietie. Mayor, Mr. Symonds, Mr. Whitewaye, Mr. Bushrod, Mr. Terry.

Mr. Cole and Mr. Maber did like the worke but would first haue the ministers spoken withall." C. 15.

Richard Wine.

He graduated as B.A. from Brasenose College, 20th January, 1655-6 (Foster's Alumni Oxon.) and signed the declaration against taking up arms, no date specified, and the usual declarations on ordination as Deacon and Priest, by the Bishop of Bristol, 29th March, 1662, and on institution to Rectory of Wraxall, Dorset, 1st April, 1662 (from which he ceded to All Saints', Dorchester, 10th February, 1662-3), and to Rectory of East Stoke, 18th December, 1667 (Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, Vol. vi, pp. 139, 141, 233), which he resigned a few months after. He recanted his error in declaiming against the Authorities, 19th February, 1683-4, being then termed "Curate of All Saints', Dorchester." (Tanner MS. 129, fol. 105.) Apparently instituted to Rectory of Clifton Maybank, 26th April, 1687, and having resigned circa 1691-2, became a nonconformist. He died in London. (Hutchins' Dorset, Vol. iv, p. 431.)

1662-3, Jan. 12. "Deliuered vnto the Parrerter, Giles Williames, the intimation for the parsonage of All Saints the day aboue written: it bares date the 10 day off Septemb., 1662. Mr. Derby had the intimation deliuered vnto him." C. 15.

1662-3, March 13. "Ordered that Mr. Wine's charge for bringing his goods to towne be discharged by the towne, and alsoe his charge for travailing to Bristoll to save the Parsonage of All Saints from the Laps, and alsoe for one load of wood put into his howse against his comeing to towne, and for the beere that was likewise put into the howse against his comeing, and that this be paid by the Towne Stewards amounting in the whole to fower pownds." C. 15.

1664, June 17. "It is agreed that Mr. Pitt, haveing in his hands vijli. xs. od., Seaton parsonage mony, he doe pay vnto Mr. Wine the summe of fower pownds, he being the minister of All Saints, and vnto Mr. Arnold,* the assistant minister of Trinity, the sume of three pownds and ten shillings, residew of the said seaven pownds ten shillings." C. 15.

1665, May 26. "The examinacion of William Lock of this Borough, butcher, taken [on] oath, who sayth that he comeing to John Lillyes howse to speak with him about his willingnes to contribute to the maynetenance of the minister of All Saints', in this Borough, wherein the said Lilly liveth, and of which this examinant was lately Churchwarden, the said Lilly said he would not give mony to maynetayne Wine's wife in a black Bag; this examinant asked him why he did not come to church, the said Lilly replyed he would not heare such babling, and said he would goe to Church once in a moneth. Will. Locke." C. 15.

1667-8, Jan. 13. The Company agrees to pay Mr. Wine, Rector of All Saints', £20 per ann., "vnlesse besides the present maynetenance of the said Rectory a greater increase of maynetenance then the xxh. yearely aboue agreed on shall otherwise accrew to the said Mr. Wyne, as Rector there." C. 15.

In C. 27 are entries of the election to the Rectory by the Corporation of Mr. Seth Bancks, 27 Jan., 1759, Mr. John Randall, 29 May, 1769, and Mr. Thomas Bryer, 3 Sept., 1774, and in C. 42a that of Mr. Evan Davies, 16 Nov., 1818.

Augmentation of the Endowment of the Dorchester Churches.

The poverty of the endowment of the Livings of All Saints' and St. Peter's* attracted the attention of the inhabitants early in the seventeenth century. A statement by William Benn, Rector of All Saints' (1629-1662), puts the value of All Saints' in 1629 at £20 16s. 8d. per annum, raised by "some priny tithes" to £24, and by "the Easter Booke" to £28 per annum. St. Peter's was endowed with £15 per annum, but had no settled minister till 1632.

Tithes of Walterston.

The document, B. 25(I), is a copy of an Indenture dated the last day of December, 1617, 15 James, by which Francis Ashley, of the Middle Temple, London, Esq., the Recorder of Dorchester, grants to Robert Cheeke, Parson of the Parish of Alhallowes in Dorchester, all his tithes of "corne, grayne, hay, woolle, lambes, oad," and all other tithes, predial, personal or mixed, belonging to the free chapel of Pudle Walterston

C 47 is "A bre' [breviate] about Frome Whitefeild."

Raulf Scrope, esqr., in his life tyme did let to John Strongman thelder, gen., and Mr. Churchill the farme of Frome Whitfild and the advowson thereof so oft as it should fall, during the lease.

The advowson and right of patronage was granted to Sir Robert Napper by a deed dated 1st October, 18 Eliz., for old (?) Strangman, William Strangman and Mr. Churchill.

Jer. Will'ms [called Foye Williams, *ibid.*], being presented by Sir Robert Napper to the parsonage, did make a lease dated 20th July, 23 Eliz., to her Majestie for 99 yeers at 31i. 6s. 8d. rent, enrolled 25th February, 29 Eliz.

A Letter of attornie from Jer. Will'ms to Doctor Baylie and John Wolly esqr., to deliver the said lease as his deed to her Majestie and to acknowledge any act or inrolment, 21st July, 23 Eliz. Inrolled 25th February, 29 Eliz.

This lease was confirmed by Sir Robert Napper 1st August, 23 Eliz., and 1st May, 26 Eliz., by Dr. Bridges 25th February, 24 Eliz., and by Adrian Scrope 1st July, 26 Eliz., and assigned by Dr. Baylie to Sir George Trenchard 20th February, 27 Eliz. Sir Robert Napper granted to Sir George Trenchard his right of patronage for the years to come 12th April, 27 Eliz.

Adrian Scrope, Esqr., by indenture of 1st July, 27 Eliz., granted the patronage to Sir George Trenchard, John Williams esqr., Nic. Foxwell, Ma. Chub, Wm. Churchill, John Henynge, Laur. Stratford, John Greene and Henry Whittell.

alias Pudle Waterston, in the parish of Pudleton alias Pydletowne, and all other tithes in Walterston, to hold from the previous Michaelmas for 40 years, if the said Robert Cheeke shall so long continue Incumbent of Alhallowes, and also if Dorothy Ashley,* daughter of the said Francis Ashley, John White and Josias White, two sons of John White, clerk, Rector of Holy Trinity, or either of them, shall so long live—the said Robert Cheeke paying yearly to John Rogers of Cannington, Somerset, Esq., and his heirs, an annual sum of 40s. at Michaelmas, in the porch of the parish church of Pudleton aforesaid.

1632, July 18. "Whereas there are divers yeares rent arrere for the Parsonage of Walterston, It is ordered that the rent which was due before Mr. Benne had the profitts thereof shall be paid out of the rent of Seaton Parsonage, and the residew shall be paid by Mr. Benne himselfe." C. 9.

1634-5, Jan. 30. "It is ordered that Mr. John Hill shall pay unto Mr. William Benne, out of the income of Seaton Parsonage six pounds, for three yeares rent due vnto Sir Francis Rogers out of the Parsonage of Walterston, which was left unpaid during the last yeare of Mr. Cheeke, Mr. Ball and Mr. Whitefield, their time." C. 9.

1648, April. "It is ordered that whereas there is a lease given by Sir Fr. Ashley to the towne for the parson of All Saints', It is ordered that Mr. John Bushrode be desired to make meanes to purchase the fee of the impropriate parsonage of Walterston, and give an answeare as soone as he can haue a price, and move the Lady Ashley to make good Sir Francis Ashley's guift by his will." C. 12.

1649, Sept. 19. "It is desired that Mr. Ben will please to treat with Mr. Rogers of Waterston Parsonage vpon which there is yet two liues, and that he agree a bargaine for it, so as he doth not exceede 100h." C. 12.

1649-50, March 8. "It is desired that in case Mr. Bury and Mr. Loder cannot prevaile with Mr. Hodges of Sherborne to treate with Mr. Rogers of Cannington for the fee of the tithes at Waterston due to the minister of Alhollowes, that then Mr. Sauage and Mr. Bushrod do ride vnto Mr. Rogers, to treatt with him for the fee of the sayd tithes, and to agree a bargaine with him for the same, not exceeding 100h. value." C. 12.

1652, May 7. "It is agreed and consented vnto that Mr. Bushrod do proceede to finish and conclude a bargaine with Mr. Rogers at Cannington, for the inheritance in fee of that portion of tithes at Walterston, now belonging to Mr. Ben, which is held now by two lines, and was the guift of Sir Francis Ashley, Knight; and that hee offer one hundred and fortie pounds, as is demanded, for the fee of the same, and for the arreares of fortie shillings a yeare rent for about x yeares behind, in case they will not take lesse. Provided that there be a good and firme title made to this Corporacion of the sayd tithes, such as shall be approved of by Counsell."

Further agreed that Mr. Francis Hollis be putt in mind of his grand father's Sir Francis Ashleyes purpose and clause in his will, to giue towards the purchasing of the aforesayd parcel of tithes the somme of one hundred markes, and that hee be requested to make good his intention." C. 12.

1652, May 21. Letter received from Mr. Hugh Hodges in Sherborne, about these tithes (acting for Mr. Rogers) which are liable to an entail. A letter to be written to Mr. Bond, "to consider the bargain and signific his judgement." C. 12.

1652, Oct. 15. "Whereas there is due from this Corporacion vnto Mr. Rogers the somme of two and twentie pounds, for eleven yeares rent out of Walterstone tithes which was by former agreement to be payd by Mr. Ben, minister of Alhallowes, this Company hath agreed and do hereby order the Steward of Fordington Parsonage to pay the somme of twenty pounds, in full satisfaction of all arreares of rent due from the sayd Walterston tithes, out of consideracion of Mr. Ben's assisting the minister of Trinity in the vacancy of an assistant, which is one quarter's pay due to the assistant minister of Peter's parish at Michaelmas, by the charter of Fordington parsonage, and to ease Mr. Ben of the charge of these arreares, &c." C. 12.

Seaton and Beer Parsonage.

On 24th Novr., 1630, the Corporation received from John and James Gould, merchants, sons and executors of John Gould, deceased, the sum of £30 bequeathed by him towards "purchasing of some Impropriacion or other Lands to redowne vnto the benefitt and maintenance of the Ministers" of the parishes of Dorchester, and the Corporation undertook to expend it within six months towards the purchase of the

Impropriate Rectory of Seaton and Beer in Devonshire. B. 25(2).

From the documents in the bundle, B. 25, which relate to a suit in Chancery brought by Richard Wine, Rector of All Saints', and the Churchwardens of St. Peter's, Thomas Hall and Thomas Edward, the latter benefice being then vacant, against Sir Walter Younge, (son and heir of Sir John Young, son and heir of Walter Young), James Gould and Richard Savage, to be heard on 24th April, 1665, the accompanying outline of the transactions which followed may be deduced.

John White, Rector of Holy Trinity, was the active mover in raising a sum of about £1,500 to be invested as an endowment for the Minister of All Saints', and the Assistant Minister of St. Peter's. £32 were subscribed by the parishioners of All Saints', "besides which some of the chiefest parishioners had given before." "Mr. White persuaded the parishioners of All Saints' on a Lord's day to give liberally." He himself gave 40s. Mr. White also procured the assistance of one, Mr. Rolf, "who had the disposing of moneys given by well disposed gentlemen."*

£500 was given by the inhabitants of the Borough, £100 by Mr. John Blatchford, a magistrate of the town, and £600 by several persons in and about London. A meeting was held of about 80 contributors "in the parish Church of St. Peter's on the Lord's day in the afternoon, and there it was agreed that the benefitt of the purchase should remaine and redound to the said Ministers and their successors for ever, and to no other use." (Nicholas Stone.)

£200 or £300 were given by the inhabitants of Dorchester, and £200 or £300 were "taken out of the publique stocke which had beene given at publique fasts, which was at the disposal of the Mayor, giuen for publique uses." Mr. White procured £500 or £600 "from some charitable persons about

* In C. 8 is entered a deed poll from the Corporation to the effect that they had received from Sir William Blake, Knt., William Rolfe, Esq., George Lowe, Esq., Richard Gurnard and Henry Jackson, gent., executors of the will of the late Henry Smith of London, Esq., the sum of £200, parcel of a greater sum given by him towards buying Impropriations for the good of the church, and covenanting to apply the same towards purchasing the Impropriate Parsonage of Seaton, or some other Impropriation, for enlarging the maintenence of the ministers of the three Dorchester parishes, 10th June, 1630. This is followed by a similar instrument of the same date, touching £100.

London, for the increase of ministers' maintenance, £45 by Mr. White of Oxfordshire. (John Whiteway.)

Mr. James Gould states that he contributed £10."

The sum of £1,500 having by these means been raised, and placed in the hands of the Mayor and Magistrates, the purchase of the impropriate parsonage of Seaton and Beer, on which White had set his eye, was effected for the pious uses aforesaid. The vendor was William Fry, of Membury, Devon, Esq. (whose wife, Mary, was a daughter of John Young, and sister of Walter Young, Esqrs.), and the transaction was negociated by the aforesaid Walter Young and his son, Sir John, friends of White, and included the advowson as well as the Rectory. The property had formerly belonged to the Youngs, and Fry tells us he had it in marriage with his wife, Walter Young's sister. The purchase money was paid at Walter Young's house at Colliton. The documents relating to the transfer were I, A lease for twenty-one years from William Fry to Richard Blachford, merchant, John Hill, Iremonger, and Richard Savage, Draper, of Dorchester, dated October, 1631; 2, A lease from William Fry, Mary, his wife, and William, their son and heir, to William Jolliffe, Draper, James Gould, Esq., Richard Bury and Henry Maber, Clothier, of Dorchester, for ninety-nine years, if the grantees lived so long, to commence after the expiration of the aforesaid twentyone years; 3, A deed of feoffment or otherwise, in due form of law, by which the said grantees conveyed the fee or inheritance of the premises to Dennis Bond, Esq., and Edward Dashwood, of Dorchester, Mercer, 28 January, 14 Charles (1638-9). In this manner the whole estate became vested in the persons named in the three several deeds.

Mr. Benn in his deposition declares that for thirteen years, and until 1643, he, as Minister of All Saints', and similarly the Assistant Minister of St. Peter's, received payment out of the profits of the Seaton Rectory. Mr. Wine, in his case, states that "the Curate or Minister for the time being of St. Peter's aforesaid, appointed by the Churchwardens of the said parish Church of St. Peter's, had (sic) vsually [been] paid and did receive out of the same [i.e., Seaton] the sum of fowerscore poundes per ann., or thereabouts, and the Rector of All Saints' the sum of threescore pounds per ann., or thereabouts, out of the same." Savage, a defendant, states that Mr. Hill, a Capital Burgess, was employed as receiver of the profits, 1631-42—the yearly value was £100. Mr. Benn,

Rector of All Saints', received £50, though not above £40 promised, and £100 promised to Mr. Tompson, Assistant minister of St. Peter's, by the Mayor and Magistrates.

1630, Oct. 6. "It is this day ordered by Mr. Maior and the Company that Benjamin Devenish shall pay ouer vnto Mr. Wm. Whitewey, the elder, one hundred pounds which was hertofore raised out of the contribucion at the Fast, and is to goe toward the purchasing of the parsonage of Seton and Beere in the Countie of Devon; the same mony is to be paid by the 15th of this instant October." C. 9.

1632, Oct. 12. Benjamin Devenish to pay out of the Brewhouse stock £100 to Mr. Toup, in part of £300 due to him for mony borrowed to help pay for the purchase of Seaton parsonage. The Town Steward is also to pay him £50 more, reducing his debt to £150. The Steward of the Parsonage is to pay consideration for that £50 to Mr. Wm. Whiteway, the elder, who must be answerable to Mris. Margaret Cheeke, widow, for the same, whose mony it is, and was paid for her by him as lent to the Incorporation. C. 9.

The trouble of collecting the tithes is illustrated by the following quotations:—

1639, Dec. 27. "Some of the parishioners of Seaton and Beere refuse to pay tith hay in kind for certen meadowes which they call $unnent^*$ meadow, and say they have a custom to pay 8d. an acre only To have inquiry made of thes custome, and yf it be found that it is an ancient custome, then to accept of 8d. an acre, but yf otherwise, then to proceed against them." C. 12.

1640, Aug. 5. "Seaton and Beere. Walter Teat gave accompt of the Tithes of hay already collected, amounting to 7li. 6s. 8d., besids the hay gathered in, inough to keep a horse all winter, and besids the custom'd meads pretended to be at 8d. an acre."

"It is ordered he shall buy a horse and crookes, and plank the threshing flowre, and shall have vh. delivered him by Mr. Hill." C. 12.

1640, Aug. 12. "Joseph Michell, the Brewhowse maultman, is this day appoynted to goe tomorrow to Seaton and Beere to assist and ioyne with Walter Teat to helpe take in the Parsonage Tithes there for this Company." C. 12.

1640, Aug. 12. Tristram Hackham came to the Company, and desired his bond, which was for 120li, whereon he hath paid in 100li, only, and hath laid out other monies, soe that he hath, as he saith, but 40s. for his and his horses laber in collecting and selling the corne of the Tith, and is put off and willed to come againe when thes Company sends him notice to come. C. 12.

1640, Aug. 14. "Mr. Jon Hill intreated to ride to Seaton on Thursday next, to vew the proceedings ther about the tithe." C. 12.

1640, Aug. 20. "Mr. Hill is desired to convey xh. to Mr. Walter Teat, to help in the harvest at Seaton parsonage." C. 12.

1640, Sept. II. "This day it is agreed that an answeare be given to Walter Fowler's letter that wee will send to Seaton, and vse all faire meanes to receive the mony behind for tithes in 1638, for the benefit of Fowler and his sonne." C. 12.

1641, March 29. "It is ordered that Walter Tet shall forthwith, so soone as may be, cause all the corne remayning of the parsonage at Beere to bee threshed out and sold, and alsoe to sell away the piggs, and to put vp the ymplements, and bring home the horses and saddles and the wimsheets and sacks." C. 12.

1641, June 25. "It was ordered that Seaton Parsonage be let for 3 yeares to the Governor of the Hospitall at 120*li*. rent cleere aboue all charges." C. 12, C. 9.

1641, July 14. "This day Walter Tet complayneth agaynst the people of Seaton that refuseth to pay tyth of Hey; he is this day ordered to ride to Exiter and aduise with Mr. Paynter, to direct him to the ablest Proctor and gett a Cytatyon agaynst Mr. Hodge." C. 12.

1641, Aug. 4. "Thes day it is agreed that Mr. James Gould and Mr. John Seaward shall goe to Seaton and there endevor to compownd for the tithes with severall persons, yf they can, otherwise to leave order with Walter Tet to compownd with the parishioners, and to take in the rest; and they agree to goe the next weeke." C. 12.

1641, Sept. 29. "Walter Teat, whoe was appoynted to take vp the Tithes of Seaton Parsonage, informeth that Richard Starre of Beere, having ij plotts of barley, the one being j acre and the other halfe an acre, there were 7 stookes

dew for tith out of them both, of which he had only ij stookes, and a close of pease of 2 acres, the tithes may be worth 5s., and did vniustly tith his wheat by picking out the little sheaves."

"Walter Teat's accompt of corne sold and of hay 8 . 17 . 2 and chargs in gathering ... 7 . 12 . 3

Concerning Seaton Parsonage, it is consented vnto, that yf Walter Teat will give 100*li*. for it for thes yeare *de claro*, he shall have all the profitts of it." C. 12. [He consents.]

1642, Apr. 15. "Walter Teat hath agreed with Mr. Maior and the Company for a lease of the Parsonage of Beer and Seaton (except the advowson) for 6 yeares, to begin at Midsomer next, for 105h. yearely for the first yeare, and 110h. yearely for the other five yeares; and Walter is to repaire the barne and parsonage howse and chancells sufficiently, and soe leave them at the end of the terme, and to pay all duties to the poore, and all personall services for the parsonage, and not to sell any man his tithes vntill the same be sown, and only for that yeare, and to give his bond for it, and to have 50h. stock with the Parsonage, and to assure his howse in Dorchester for it. The Towne to beare and pay all other taxes. To pay the rent quarterly or within 6 daies after." C. 12.

This state of things continued till 1648, when, the value of the Parsonage having decreased, and the public stock of the town exhausted, and Fordington Parsonage, which belonged to the Church of Sarum, having been obtained from the Long Parliament, for the maintenance of their ministers, the Corporation, it is said by the advice of John White, determined to sell their interest in Seaton and Beer. Mr. Dashwood having already died, the fee was conveyed to Walter and John Young by Dennis Bond, 22nd January, 1648, and the other surviving trustees, except James Gould,* also joined in the sale, the lease for twenty-one years, being assigned, 6th November, 1648, and the lease for ninety-nine years 7th November, by Jolliffe, Bury and Maber.

1647-8, Feb. 12. To Walter Young, Esq., at Culliton, "Sir, Wee haue bin enformed that you desire to know whether the Corporation of this Towne are resolved to sell off the

Impropriate Parsonage of Beere and Seaton, and that you also desire to heare from vs concerning it. In answere wherevnto wee haue thought fitt to acquaint you of oure purpose[s] therein, which, are to take the first good chepman, for experience hath shewed vs that the remote distance of the same from vs hath occasioned much inconvenience, and is the cheife ground of our willingnes to part with it vpon such termes as wee hope you will judge reasonable. Wee desire you to give vs an answere with as much conveniency as you may, for wee are vpon lettinge of it for certaine yeares, and where you shall appoint, some of our Corporation men shall ride to confer with you further about it; which is all that wee haue at present to comend vnto you: and so, after our humble salutations, we reste, Your very loving friends and servants. Rich. Blachford, Mayor, Jno. Whiteway, Rich. Bury, Bailiffe, Rich. Savage.

Dorchester, February the 12th, 1647." C. 9.

After some negotiation the sale was effected on the following terms to Walter Young:—

1649, May 9. It was agreed to lend 400*li*. of the Parsonage money to Mr. Gregory Gibbs and his eldest son [of South Perrott] for three months, on security of 40*li*. per ann., arising from land mortgaged to Mr. Savage. C. 12. See ante, p. 527.

"The grounds and reasons which moved the Towne and the Capital Burgesses thereof to sell away the Impropriate Parsonage of Beere and Seaton in Devon," are set forth in the following terms:—

"When, by almost twenty yeares experience, the Corporation of Dorchester hath found it inconvenient, that the Parsonage of Beere and Seaton was so far off, and that some of the parishioners refused to pay their tithes, and others neglected to sow there grounds out of frowardnes, by which the revenues from thence came short of what was expected, and not sufficient to furnish their ministers with a competent stipend, They purchased the remaynder of Mr. John Foyle's lease in the Impropriate Parsonage of Fordington, of which there was six yeares to come and vnexpired. And having procured this footing in the sayd Parsonage, they made suite to the Parliament of Lords and Commons, in the yeare 1647, for the fee of the same (belonging to the Deanry and Chapter of Sarum lately abolished), which, by the helpe and favor of their Burgesses, then sitting in Parliament, by name Mr. Denzil Hollis and Mr. Denis Bond, was accordingly obtained, the fee of the sayd Parsonage settled vpon certaine Feoffees, vid' [blank], for these vses following, vid., eightie pounds per ann. for the assistant minister in Peter's Parish, threescore pounds per ann. for the minister of Alhollows, fortie pounds per ann, for the Vicar of Fordington, and twentie pounds per ann. additional mayntenance for the Schole Master of the Free Schole in Dorchester; and whatsoever overplus of

2001. per ann. may arise, to be proportionably divided to the several parties before mencioned.

The obtaining whereof was a great charge to the publique Tresurie of the Towne, which was totally lost and exhausted by the late warres, and the Towne brought much in debt, which occasioned their debate of selling the Parsonage of Beere and Seaton; and finding it necessarie for their present support, as also very rational because of a more liberal supply for their ministers from Fordington, they concluded to sell away the sayd Impropriation, but to reserve twentie pounds a yeare, which was accordingly excepted out of the sale, and is by deede of guift from this Corporacion* graunted to the Vicar of Beere and Seaton, vpon condicion that he preach once euery Sabboth day in Seaton Church, which was don as an expression of the Townes acknowledgement and thankfulnes to God for that more liberal provision which hee had made for their ministers' supply and encouradgement." C. 10.

The ultimate effect of this transaction was thus pithily expressed in 1663: "Soe all is gone from the ministers, and not one farthing benefitt accrewes to them."

1663, May, 13. "This day att a full meeting of this Company, it was ordered and aggreed vppon that Mr. Andrew Loder be desiered to inquier and to solicite the busines concerninge the recouering off the twenty pounds per annum which was formerly giuen away by the former Company vnto the Vicar off Seaton, and to recouer it, yff possible, and what elce may be recouered, and that the Towne Steward for the tyme being shall pay the charge that shall be disbursed in prosequting the sute." C. 15.

The plaintiffs in the action which ensued upon the Restoration alleged that a breach of trust had been committed by the trustees in effecting the sale of the Rectory, and that, since the purchaser was aware that the estate was held for pious uses, the sale was void, and prayed that Sir John Young, son of Walter Young, might be called to account for the rents and profits since the property passed into his hands. The Bill was filed in Easter Term, 1663, to which Sir John appeared, but in the August following, and before any answer was put in, he died, and in Michaelmas Term the same was revived against Sir Walter, his son and heir. On the hearing,

24th April, 1665, the Bill was ordered to be amended, as "the plaintiffes had not made proper parties to theire Bill, neither plaintiffes nor defendants." B. 25(6).

On 28th November, 1665, Sir Walter Young made his answer to the Bill, presenting his view of the transactions in question. Thereupon Counsel's opinion was obtained by the Corporation, who were the real promoters of the suit, and paid the expenses of it. The principal question and answer were as follows:—"I, Whether upon view and consideration had of the said former Bill, answeare and proofes, Counsell bee of opinion that the sale of Seaton to the Grand father, Walter Younge, shall bee reputed the act of the grantees by the direction of the Corporation, or whether it shall bee reputed their owne distinct acts, and then, if itt bee the act of the Corporation and the 1150h. paid to their vse, who shall make satisfaction for the pious vse, whether the Corporation, or these single persons out of their estates?"

Answer.—"It is the act of the Corporacion by their vote in Counsell, and yet possibly this will not excuse the Trustees from a breach of Trust, for though they were trusted by the Corporacion, yet they were not trusted for the Corporacion but the Charitable vse. Nevertheless, the Charity will be decreed, but the Trustees and the Corporacion, who received Sir Walter Y. mony, must reimburse him, and the Corporacion must save the Trustees harmless who acted by their order, to help them to mony to purchase Fordington."

Other answers state that "Sir W. Y., if notice be proved, as it seems to bee well enough, will loose the Law, but must be reimbursed as aforesaid."

"The successors must answer for the act of the predicessors, and rayse the mony as they can; the Stock and Lands of the Corporacion may be sequestered, and 'tis not without president that particular members have been imprisond for disobedience of the Corporacion."

To the final question, "What answeare shall the present Corporacion make to the Bill?" the following wise answer is returned: "The best way is to agree with Sir Walter Y. for the repurchase of Seaton, to settle it vpon the Charitable vse, and so prevent a hearing, wherein the honest successors will suffer for their predicessors.

"To the Wor'll the Maior, Bayliffes, Aldermen and Capitall Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester, these."

"Worthy Sirs, The greate desire wee haue of the welfare and happinesse of this Towne, and the perticuler respect wee haue for yourselues, your honour and repute, are the causes that wee make bold to give you the trouble of this paper, to tell you that wee haue seriousely considered the buisenesse of Seaton, the past transactions, the present advice, and seriousely weighed what are like to bee the future consequences of it, and out of the greate respect wee haue for you, finde it necessary to entreate you to take into your Consideracion seriousely these few Ouærves. I. Whether, if the Magistrates and Ministers should both ioyne together and make as effectual an agreement as can possibly bee invented with Sir Walter Younge, whether any such agreement would stand good in Law, and whether, after such agreement made, it will not bee att the pleasure either of your or our successors to commence a new suite, as if there had beene neuer any agreement made? 2, Vppon supposall that there cann bee noe such agreement made (which wee are certainely informed would not bee valid in Law), whither it doth not highly concerne you to bee very wary what answere you putt in, and to bee well advised by Councell learned in the Law, and the rather because wee are informed that the Lord High Chancellor hath taken this cause soe much into consideration, that hee will neuer suffer it to goe off the stage without a Judgement passed vppon it, and whether it is not now to late, the buisenesse beeinge soe farr gone, to think of stifleinge any evidences? 3. Whether it bee not necessary that you should give an answere that it was neuer bought nor yet sold by the Corporation? But in this you must bee advised by Councell, for wee suggest it onely out of our private reason, beeinge fully convinced in our owne private judgements that that is the true state of it. 4, Supposinge the worst (which wee think will neuer happen) that the repayment of Sir Walter Yonge's money should light vppon the present Corporation, whether it bee not more for the good of the Towne, [and] your owne honor, to think of a way how hee may bee reimbursed his money (there beeinge towards the reimbursemt 340h. in an House, some other monyes, and wee are certainely informed you would haue a greate helpe and assistance from particuler persons, if called into your assistance) rather then to lett a purchase of flueteene hundred pounds bee lost for want of eleauen hundred, there beeinge such a considerable parte in hand towards the reimbursement of it? Lastly wee doe assure you, out of the desire wee haue of the good of the Towne, and our particuler respects unto yourselues, that if you will goe on with the Suite, and it should soe happen (which wee hope and thinck will not) that you should be forced to lay out any monyes out of your Towne Stocke towards the reimbursement aforesaid, that wee shall bee willinge to ioyne with you to craue a decree in Chancery, that you shall enjoy soe much of the revenew of Seaton yearely, for the vse of the Towne Stock, as shall bee sutable to that proportion of money you shall soe expend. Wee have noethinge elce to add att this time, but onely to communicate one of our many grounds which wee haue for the Quæryes, and that onely relatinge to the 3d of them, and that is this, That when Sir [blank] Younge purchased Seaton, there are Letters yet of his to shew that hee would not owne the Corporation in it, nor treate with them as a Corporation, nor receive any Conveyance from your Corporation, but dealt with them onely as private persons, as knowinge full well it was neuer vested in the Corporation, though hee had sufficient notice of the Trust. Thus wishinge you all happinesse and prosperity, and desiringe you to take these thinges into seriouse consideracion, wee rest, Sirs, Your humble servaunts, John Knightbridge,* Rec' eccliæ SS. Trin: et S. Pet: Ric: Wine, Rect: Ecclis: Omnium Sanctorum." B. 25(9).

"I have acquainted my atturney with the ofertures which you made me from the Mayor and Corperacion of Dorchester, who confermed me in my openion that I canot be secure by a beare desesting or letting fall of the suite, but I must nesesaryly have a decree to establish me in the possession of the parsonage; if therfore they please to consent to such a decree, and can draw Mr. Wine and the other parties to the like consent, or at least can so order itt that such a decree may passe, though Mr. Wine doe not formaly and expresly declare his asent to itt, which perhaps he will not be persuaded to doe, I shall refere all other maters, and particularly that of the cost which I have wrongfully been putt to, to my said

atturney, whose name is Mr. Daniel! Vinnecombe, who will be in person in London towards the end of the terme, and I will giue him such instructions as you shall judg fayre and rasanable, and will bring the buisnesse, if there be the like cander on the other part, to an acapable concluson. In the meane time, whether this proposall take efect or no, it will be requesitt that the seuerall defendants make answer to my bill, acording to which answars ether the decree may be framed in case we agree, or my fuituer prossedings in Law may be reagulated if we happen to deffer. Henry Derby.

1647, May 14. "This day Mr. Henry Derby,* minister, came before this Company, and accepted of the Vicaridge of Seaton, with an addition of xxli. per ann. out of the Parsonage for this yeare to come; and that for his encouradgement the sayd Mr. Derby to have the arreares due from the inhabitants for the parsonage teithes, which is about xli, or as much as may be recovered of the sum." C. 9.

John Derby.

1648, July 7. "This day a minister, one Mr. John Derby,† was heere with Mr. Maior and the Company, about the Vicarage of Seaton in Devon, and would have the Vicarage and an augmentacion. The Companyes answere is to have him preach heere Saboth day come sennight." C. 12.

James Munden.

1648, Apr. 21. "It is ordered that yf Mr. Munden,* now Mynister at Long Burton, bee free, and will accept of the Vickaridge of Ceton, he shall have the vicaridge howse with all the profitts of the sayd viccaridge to teach the people and offitiat the cures of Ceton and Beere for one year, and that Mr. Richard Sauage be desyred to write vnto him for his answere." C. 12.

1648, Apr. 21. "It is ordered that whatsoever shalbe received from the Parsonage of Seton shalbe payd unto any mynister as shalbe provided to offitiat at Fordington, who shall haue the Viccaridge howse and twentie pounds per ann. out of the Impropriat Parsonage of Fordington, and that Mr. Ben be desyred to enquire out an able mynister for the place." C. 12.

Mr. Smyth.

1648, May 29. "This day one Mr. Smyth, a minister commended unto this Company by Mr. Walt. Young for Seaton Vicaridge, had this answere given unto him by this Company, that if he pleased to reside for some time at Seaton, and preach amongst them, so as satisfaction vpon experience may be given to the godly party of the Parish of his fittnes and abilityes; Vpon their certificatt in his behalfe wee will confer the Vicaridge vpon him, and either 10l. per ann. out of Seaton parsonage, or else the whole tithes of Seaton, vpon condicion the 20li. a year be payed vnto vs for the minister of Fordington." C. 12.

Fordington Parsonage.

About the year 1647 the town of Dorchester had purchased the Impropriate Rectory of Fordington, paying about £200 to procure the grant from Parliament, and £400 for buying out the existing lessee. It was a shortsighted speculation. The men of Fordington, after the sequestration of the Vicar, Giles Goldesbury,† refused to pay tithes to the various substitutes appointed by the County Committee,

so that there were three years' arrears due in February, 1648-9 (Minute Books of the Dorset Standing Committee, pp. 337, 449), and though an augmentation had been assigned on 6th January, 1646-7, for the increase of the minister's stipend, which was then but £40 per annum (Ibid., p. 155), and though a voluntary addition of £20 per annum had been made by the town on 1st June, 1649, the inhabitants were not satisfied. On the Restoration the Rectory reverted to the Church of Sarum, and the purchase money was lost. (See also ante, p. 628.)

George Thorne.

1648, June 23. "At the motion of John Segar for a minister for Fordington, and his naming of Mr. Geo. Thorne,* It is agreed that if the parish or the honest people thereof shall vpon tryall approve of the sayd Mr. Thorne, and that Mr. Thorne will vndertake to performe all the offices belonging to a minister, that wee shall consent that he shall be their minister." C. 12.

1648, Aug. 7. "It is agreed that if Mr. Thorne shall not accept of the offer made him to be minister of Fordington, and declare his mind by Wednesday next of refusing it, that then Mr. Bayly Bury is desired to write vnto one Mr. Watts of Hampsheere, to desire his coming ouer hither as soone as may be, that wee may treatt with him to have the sayd place." C. 12.

John Loder.

1649, Jan. 1. "It is agreed that Mr. John Loder,† now preacher at Fordington, shall have paid vnto him, as an augmentacion of his mayntenance, the somme of twentie pounds per annum out of the proffitts of Fordington Parsonage, the first quarter's payment to be made to Mr. John Loder at Midsomer next, vidz., five pounds.

It is further ordered that if Fordington men will make

the Vicarage worth fiftie pounds per ann., that then Mr. Loder shall have an addition of xxxh. per ann. made vnto him with the former xxh. per ann. And this payment to be made only to Mr. John Loder during his continuance there, and no longer. Provided that Mr. John Loder (according to Mr. Mayor's vndertaking) do submitt himselfe to be ordained minister, within three moneths, or as soone as by his age he be capable of ordinacion." C. 12.

1649-50, Jan. 28. "This day the charter for the Parsonage of Fordington was deliuered over to Mr. Gilberte Loder to bee carried to London, to produce it to the Trustees, and to bee at ordinary costs for the making good of the grannt, and to returne it and an accompt of his proceedings heereon to the Towne." C. 12.

1650, Nov. 29. "It is ordered and desired that Mr. Savage, the Steward of Fordington Parsonage, do pay vnto Mr. Richard Bury, Mayor, the somme of eight pounds which he expended for the repayring of the Vicaridge house at Fordington, seing he failes of being payd the same monny by any other hands." C. 12.

1650-I, March 14. "This day Mr. John Whiteway is desyred and ordered to be Steward for and to keep account of the monie received for the sale of the Impropriat Parsonage of Seaton, which was sould by the Cappitall Burgesses of this Burrough at the purchasinge of the lease of Forthington Parsonage, wherein was expended 500h." C. 12.

1652, May 27. Fordington Parsonage and Glebe let for 3 years from Midsummer next, at £250 per ann., the tenants to allow straw and reede to cover the barn, stables and walls, and to discharge Church and Poore. [John Segar the previous tenant.] C. 12.

1653, Apr. 22. "To remember to treatt with Mr. Recorder at our Towne Sessions about the conveying of Fordington Parsonage to new trustees, and to take advice whether it may not bee settled vpon all the Capital Burgesses of this Towne." C. 12.

1653, Oct. 7. Thos. Knapton, son of Regnaldo Knapton, to have a lease of 21 years of the house his father built and dwelt in at Fordington upon the Glebe, to commence on expiration of the lease which the town purchased of Mr. Foyle, which was in April, 1652. C. 12.

1656, April 4. "This day Mr. Loder of Fordington made Mr. Mayor and the Company acquainted that he was,

by the providence of God, likely to remove to London,* in case hee and his wife should like the aire, which yet they are vncertaine of; wherefore hee craves leave of the Company to retaine his propriety in Fordington vntil Michaelmas next, at which time hee will bee willing another should bee chosen in his place, in case hee shall not returne before; And that in the meane time hee will take order for supplying the cure without the charge or care of this Company." C. 12.

1656, April 30. "There was an answere given to Fordington men this day in order to their demands for more mayntenance to their minister, as followeth. That the Ordinance of Parliament hath given them but 40l. per annum, which hath bin duely payed to their minister ever since it became due, and it shall be continued to him hereafter. And that if, when they have another minister, this Company will treatt with him and endevor to give him satisfaction to the uttermost of their power, if hee shall aske more liberal mayntenance." C. 12.

I656, June 13. "There was an order agreed vpon by Mr. Mayor and Company, that there shall bee an augmentacion of twenty pounds per ann., ouer and aboue the forty pounds granted vpon the charter, from henceforward payed vnto such man as shall bee Vicar of Fordington, for his better encouradgement and mayntenance. And that in case the several sommes payable to the minister of Alhallowes and the assistant minister of Peter's or Fordington, shall come short by meanes of this said twenty pounds augmentacion, that then there bee an equal defalcation and abatement made proportionally out of all the several payments issuing

1656, Oct. 17. As Mr. John Bushrode has managed the Parsonage of Fordington for three years without recompense, and has undertaken to pay £240 for the profits of it this year, and to pay all rates and taxes to Church and Poor, and the cost is to be allowed, he is to sow the glebe lands, and reap and take it next season and harvest. C. 12.

Joshua Churchill.

He was paid £20 for officiating at Fordington for the year ending 25th March, 1659, out of Tenths and First Fruits (Shaw's Church under the Commonwealth, Vol. ii, p. 586).

LICENCES TO NONCONFORMING MINISTERS.

1672, May 17. "This day Mr. William Ben produced his Majesties Licence to bee a Teacher of the Congregation allowed by his Majesty in the roome of Mr. Phillip Stansby in Dorchester, dat. 1mo May, 1672, for the vse of such as doe not conforme.

The same day Mr. Beniamine Way produced the like, for the howse of Wm. Heydon in Dorch., for the vse of such as do not conforme.

Mr. George Hamon produced the like for the Presbiterian persuasion in any place, 4 April, 1672.

Mr. George Hamon produceth two other Licences, dated the 8 day of May, 1672, one for the place, vizt., att Mr. John West's howse in Dorch., and John Marsh's howse.

Mr. Joshua Churchill produceth the like for himself, a Congregational Teacher, in his own howse in Dorchester."* C. 15.

* "1664 [December]. The names of the non-conforming ministers now living in Dorchester are Mr. Hammond, Mr. Walters, Mr. Sprint, Mr. Dammer, Mr. Benn, Mr. Tompson, Mr. Way, Mr. Lawrence, Mr. Churchill. I hear of eight more within this month come to inhabite there." (S.P.D., Chas. II, Vol. 107, No. 99). Their previous residences were:—Benjamin Walters (? Address to Charles II.

"To the King's Most Excellent Majestie. The most humble and hearty adresse of your Majesties dutifull, obedient and loyal Subjects, the Major, Recorder, Bayliffs, Aldermen, Capitall Burgesses, Common Councell, Freeholders, Freemen and other the Inhabitants of your Majesties Burrough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset att the Generall Sessions of the peace, held in and for the said Burrough on Wednesday, the last day of August, Anno xxxiijo Caroli iidi. R's, 1681. When wee reflecte vppon the miserable Condicion your Majesties Kingdomes were reduced to by the Insinuacions and Subtle Designes of Jesuits, Popish Preists and other pretending zealotts, theire instruments, and how God Almighty restored your sacred Majestie, and your Majestie our Laws and Libertyes, which ever since wee have so freely and peaceably enjoyed, wee cannot but in a more then ordinary manner. some way suitable to such mighty blessings, returne our thanks to the King of Kings; and being sensible withall that the same designeing persons, or the spawne of them. are still too bussie in prosecuting the like purposes by false suggestions of arbitrary Government, and endeavoureing to alienate the affections of your Majesties Subjects in order to the same anarchicall end, which every good and loyall Subject ought to avoide and hath greate reason to dread and detest;

Wee therefore, your Majesties dutifull and loyal Subjects. att this our first Generall Meeteing since your Majesties yssueing your late most gracious Declaracion, doe render vnto your Majestie our most humble and dutifull thankes for their many solemne and renued assurances (which your Majestie hath beene pleased in greate condiscencion to make, of governing by the knowne Laws of this your Kingdoms both in Church and State, the contrary of which ill men make it theire bussines to suggest), and though wee come late in theis our most humble acknowledgements and thankefullnes. yett none shall bee before vs in loyaltye, being vnanimously resolved to hazard our lives and fortunes for the preservacion of your Majesties sacred person, your heires and lawfull successors, and the true Protestant Religion, as it is now established, against all attempts of any designeing partyes of what principalls soever they are, and wee doe assure your Majestie that whensoever in your princely wisdome you shall please to summon a Parliament, wee will doe our best a deavours to send such Representatives for this Burrough shall bee men of vnsuspected loyalty to your Majestie and sound principles to the Government as it is now establish by law both in Church and State, and shall always pray a your Majesties long Life and happie Raigne over vs, and our prayers ioyne our vtmost endeavours against all wh shall attempt (which God forbid) to shorten the one or mole the other.

Charles II.

1665, Sept. 13. "Whereas vpon the consideracion the King's Majesties comming to this Towne, Mr. Maior a the Company, together with the Common Councell assembl themselves together, to raise a sum of money for the accomm dation of his Majestie, and herein they doe all agree that o hundred pounds may presently be taken up to supply t present occasion, and if there shall be any farther exper that the hundred pounds, and what ever else shall be expend shall be levied and raysed on the free men and inhabitar of this Borrough by an equall rate. Robert Napper, Maior Richard Churchill, Arthur Gould and Wm. Warde, Baileit Thos. Dashwood, Will. Pitt, Jo. Seward, Alexander Hauilar Gilbert Whiffen, Tho: Seward, John Symonds, The mark Gregory Alamott, Hugh Baker." B. 33a and C. 15.

1666, Aug. 3. "This day there was the Towne Sea affixed to a bond of the penall sum of three hundred poundated the xxth of September last, for the payment of 151 15s. 6d. vnto Mr. William Pitt for the mony he disbursed order of this Company vppon the entertaynment of

Majestie, which mony is to be paid the xxj^{th} of September next, whereof 143h. 4s. jd. was the principall mony disbursed, and the residew is for the interest." C. 15.

George III.

1789, June 26. "His Majesty intending to pass through this Town in a day or two in his way to Weymouth, and as in all probability he may during the time he is in this part of the Country frequently come into this Town, it is incumbent on the Mayor and Magistrates of this Boro' (as much as in them lyeth) to be particularly carefull that his Majesty do meet with no obstruction, nuisance, or other disagreeable inconvenience; Have therefore ordered the present Constables of the said Borough to be very vigilant in their duty on this occasion, and to take care that no carriages of any sort be permitted either to stand in the Streets empty, or to be passing through the Town, whilst his Majesty is within the limitts of this Boro', and to take care that all rubbish whatever be removed from the said Streets, and that peace and good order be preserved throughout the whole Town; And as the present Constables may not be able of themselves to perform the above duty, it is thought proper that the following additional persons be sworne Constables to aid and assist them on the above purpose (to wit), Mathew Baker, James Harvey, Mathew Banger, Edward Jones, George Read, William Finder." C. 42a.

1833, Aug. 2. Locket, for ringing on occasion of the Duchess of Kent and the Princess Victoria passing thro' Dorchester (per order of the Mayor), fir. o. o.

Paid Oliver, Churchwarden of the Holy Trinity (per order of the Mayor) expenses incurred on the above occasion, £1.17.0. C.46.

Judges.

1632, Dec. 26. Mr. William Whiteway to be desired to accept £20 for his great trouble and charge in "entertaining the judges for many years together." C. 9.
1639-40, Jan. 15. "Received a message from Mrs.

1639-40, Jan. 15. "Received a message from Mrs. Whiteway, per her sonne, Mr. Jon. Whiteway, who alsoe told it me from himself likewise, that the Judges canot any more be lodged att their house, which the Company was acquaynted with the same day." C. 12.

1640, June 12. "It is agreed that Mr. Whiteway, or any other where the Company shall agree that the Judges shalbe entertained at the Assises in this Towne, shall have 40s. for entertaining the Judges for every Assises." C. 12.

1640, July 31. "The Steward is appropried to pay Mr. Whiteway 4li. for entertayning the Judges this yeare." C. 12.

1650-1, March 5. "It is ordered that the Serjants shall provide halfe a dozen of Capons or a Fatt Lamb to present to the Judges, together with a gallon of sack and two small sugar loaves." C. 12.

1656, July 18. "It was resolved that Mr. Bury and Mr. Bal. Stansby bee desired to ride to Blandford on Wednesday next, to invite General Desbrough to a priuat Lodging at Mr. Stansby's house, and that there bee a gallon of Sacke and a gallon of White and Clarret and a sugar loafe presented to him from the Towne, together with a fatt sheepe."

"That the Judges also be presented with a gallon of wine, two sugar loaves and a fatt sheepe." C. 12.

1656-7, March 6. "It is ordered that the like present which was sent to the Judges the last Assizes be sent to them this Assizes, in case the Lord Cheefe Justice Glyn do come, but if only Judge Warberton come and no other, then to present him with two sugar loaves and a gallon of wyne and nothing else." C. 15.

1657-8, March 12. "Yet is this day ordered that a present be sent to the Judges, a fatt mutton the best to be gott, two loues of Sugar, a pottle of Sacke and a pottle of Claret; that care be taken that the Judges men doe pay for their chambers but 5s. a man, and the towne to pay the rest." C. 15.

1659, July 27. "It is agreed that the Judge be presented with two sugar Loaves, and wyne, and a sheepe." C. 15.

1661-2, Feb. 28. "It is ordered that there shall be a present given to the Judge now at the Assizes, one fatt sheepe, a pottle of sack, a pottle of clarrett, and a sugar loafe." C. 15.

The Bishop.

1637, July 28. "It is agreed that the Bishop be entertained at his Visitacion, and be sent vnto Bristoll and invited before hand as sone as conveniently may bee; and it is resolu'd to move Mr. Dashwood to lodge him, and Mr. Maior at a publike charge to entertayne him, and towards it Mr. Maior, Mr. Bond, Mr. B. Maber, Mr. P[erkins], Mr. G[ould], Mr. D[erby], Mr. S[avage], Mr. B[ury], Mr. A[llambridge], Mr. Edw. D[ashwood] haue agreed to pay 51. 10s., by 10s. a peece."

1637, Aug. 2. "Agreed to send to the Bishop to invite him Monday senight." C. 12.

1673, June 2. "This day the Company met here att the Hall to consider whether itt were conuenient to inuite the Lord Bishop of these Dioces, the said Bishop being come to Stinsford to make his abode ther for some time, and itt was agreed that he should be inuited by the present Mayor, Mr. Benj. Gould, to his one house, and in consideracion wherof this Company haue ordered that the said Mayor shall be allowed fineteene pounds, and one Barrell of the Best beare, and a Barrell of 4d. Beare, and his charges to be paid him by the Towne Steward." C. 15.

Lord Holles.

1661, Oct. 28. "It is ordered that my Lord Holles be presented with a gallon of sack and two gallons of French wine at his coming to Towne, and a sugar loaf." C. 15.

1668, June 19. "The Honourable Lord Holliss being shortly to come to this Towne, this Company orders for a present to his Honnor six quart glass Bottles of Canary, six Bottles of Clarratt and six Bottles of whit whine and six Ranish and two small fine sugar Loafes; that Mr. Hauiland, Towne Steward, pay for the same." C. 15.

Other Festivities.

1673-4, Jan. 9. "That there be allowed for the charge of the Grand Jury and Constables on Friday next thirteen shillings and fower pence; and all the Company doe agree to dine at the George that day at a Twelve-penny Ordinary." C. 15.

1708-9, Feb. 18. "It is this day agreed by the majority of the Mayor, Bayliffes, Aldermen and Burgesses of this Borough, that henceforth noe publicke entertainment att any Inne within this Borough shall be att any Generall or Quarter Sessions for this Corporation, or the Grand Jury and Constables, but what entertainment shall be the Mayor for the time being to be att the expence thereof." C. 7.

1714, Aug. 3. "Att a Meeting of the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen and Burgesses it is ordered that Mr. John Gollop, the Town Steward, do pay vnto Mr. Francis Hamlyn the bill due for wine to him at proclaiming the Peace with France, and that he pay for six bottles of wine to be drunk this day at the proclaiming the King, and for candles to illuminate

the Cupola, for fifty furse faggotts and half hogshead of ale" ["beer" erased]. C. 7.

1716, May 25. "Then ordered that Mr. Josiah Cooper, the Town Steward, do provide half a hogshead of ale and half a hundred of furse faggotts for Monday next, being the Birth Day of our Sovereign Lord King George, and pay 5s. to the Ringers for that day, and 5s. for the next day, being the 29th of May." C. 7.

The Jubilee of George III.

At a meeting held in the Guildhall, 18th October, 1809, under the presidency of the Mayor, it was resolved unanimously That the approaching anniversary of His Majesty's Accession to the Throne (being the fiftieth year of his Reign) be observed in this Town with a becoming expression of joy and gratitude. That the Inhabitants do attend Divine Service, and that a subscription be opened for contributing to the comfort of the Poor of the several parishes in this Town, and enabling them to partake of the general festivity; to be distributed at the discretion of a Committee appointed for that purpose. That there be no public Dinner or Illumination. An address was also presented to the King on the occasion. C 42a.

ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE.

THE BOROUGH COURT OR COURT BARON, AND THE COURT LEET.

The earliest notice in these records of a Borough Court occurs in 1337, when perquisites of Courts are mentioned in the Inquisition taken in that year, p. 8. The next mention is found in the fourth enrolment in the Domesday, when Cristina Dilvertones appeared before the Bailiffs at the Court held on 10th May, 1395, and claimed to have free seisin of her late father's tenement, p. 117. This was the ordinary Court of the Town, and, from the Bye-laws of 1414, appears to have been held on Mondays, at intervals of three weeks.

The Court Leet and View of Frank Pledge was held twice a year, on the Monday next after Michaelmas, when twenty-four lawful men of the Town elected the two Bailiffs, and on the Monday the eighth day after Easter, in Hocktide. See the Bye-laws of 1414, at p. 112.

At a View of Frank Pledge, 2nd October, 1447, the custom as to actions arising in the Town was presented by the twelve jurors, and the Charter of 1485 grants or confirms the privilege

that all personal actions, causes and complaints, not exceeding 40s., should be heard and determined in the Borough Court.

From this time, apart from incidental notices in the Domesday enrolments, a long silence ensues, which is not broken until 2nd October, 1727, when a collection of presentments at the "Court Leet and Law Day and View of Frank Pledge" are found, extending from that date until 5th October, 1789. referring to various defects and nuisances existing in the streets. Thus, 3rd May, 1731, "the Town Well on Bullstake wants cleaning," and the Town Hall is "kept in a slovenly and indecent manner"; 30th September, 1734, "the pavement in the Butter Market and on the Corn Hill is "very defective"; 1st May, 1732, "the street against the burned Gardens" requires amending; 1st April, 1735, "the pitching of the Bulstake is also much decayed which ought to be repaired by the Town Steward"; and "the highway, called South Streete from the end of Mr. Chaldicott's Malt-house and the Town Brewhouse, on both sides of the way to the end of the street leading to Fordington fields," is "very ruinous and in great decay." The jurors also present four persons to serve as Constables for each of the three parishes, and presentments are made by Constables, Assizers of Bread and Beer, Viewers of Flesh and Gashes in Hydes, Searchers and Sealers of Leather. Serjeants at Mace, Beadle and Hayward. C 31 and C 32.

The papers contain numerous lists of Resiants in the three parishes.

Other presentments comprise, 7th May, 1753, "the Corporation well at the corner of the Sheep Lane, which is now covered with rubble"; 29th April, 1754, "the shoots of Trinity church, which annoy the people passing"; 3rd May, 1756, "the Town well (Trinity parish), at the end of Sheep Lane, a bad standard"; "the well on the Bull stake (St. Peter's parish), bad standards"; 30th April, 1759, "Trimble, the Locksmith, for having his forge on a boarded floor"; 30th April, 1770, "we present . . . Neale, for ingrossing of fish within the said Borough."

On 30th September, 1776, twenty-four persons were nominated "to be the Grand Jury for the said Leet and the General Quarter Sessions to be held at the Assize or Shire Hall within the said Borough, Monday the 7th of October, 1776."

Another bundle of Court Leet papers, extending from 1790 to 1818, is numbered C. 43, and contains a collection

of similar presentments. The officers already mentioned continue to be appointed at the Michaelmas Court, with the exception that on 5th October, 1801, no Viewers of Gashes in Hydes are chosen, but the entry is made, "Managed by Inspectors appointed by an Act, Geo. 3rd." On 5th October, 1807, allusion is made to the "Play House," and "the Lane leading from the Guild Hall to the new Play House" in St. Peter's parish. In 1818 the rule is laid down that no horse is to remain in the streets for the purpose of dressing or cleaning. Freeholders who did not answer to their names when the list was called were amerced 1s. each, affered to 6d., and Resiants 6d., affered to 3d each. The Constables, Assizers of Bread and Beer, and Viewers of Flesh were appointed for the last time in 1877. No Court Leet has been held since 17th October, 1881, when a Hayward was appointed for the year ensuing.

The following are taken from some of the Corporation Minute Books:—

1630, Apr. 14. Mr. Richard Savage, draper, Henry Maber, clothier, and Henry Bridges, clothworker, appointed to search and seale all clothes (*i.e.*, woollen cloth) within the Borough. C. 9.

1641, Aug. 11. "This day Mr. Maior did elect Henry Bridges and Edward Brag to be Searchers and Sealers of cloth within this Borough, and did sweare them for the due execucion of their offices in these words: You shall well and truly execute your office of Searcher and Sealer of cloth within this Borough for one yeare now to come, or vntill an other shall be chosen and sworne in your place, according to your best skill and knowledge as neere as God shall giue you grace. Soe help you God." C. 12.

1658, Oct. 29. Edward Jones, Hugh Baker and Lawrence Righton, were sworn Weighers of Bread and Assizers of Beer. William Gillingham and Richard Marsh, Searchers and Sealers of Leather. Henry Daw and Charles Allen, for Gashers of Hides. Will. Locke and Henry Powncy, Viewers of Flesh. C. 15.

THE BOROUGH JUSTICES OF THE PEACE.

Many interesting illustrations of the social life of the Borough may be derived from C. 8, 15th July, 1629, to 16th October, 1637, continued by C. 11 to 22nd November in the latter year. These records, which really form one

volume, treat of offences dealt with by Justices of the Peace, that jurisdiction having been given to the Bailiffs and their immediate predecessors and the Recorder by James I. in 1610, and to the Mayor and others by Charles I. in 1629. See ante, pp. 42, 58. The statute of Elizabeth, requiring attendance at church, was enforced with a strong hand, not only absentees, but those who came late, or departed before the sermon was over, were fined.* Some of the most striking incidents are found in the examinations of travellers who, unfortunately for them, came within the clutches of the Constables. It was of no avail that they alleged that they were graduates of Cambridge, Doctors of Physic, or even sons of Baronets, and if they could not produce a "Pass," which the Mayor and Bailiffs adjudged to be genuine, they were whipped and sent from tithing to tithing to the place of their nativity. A few allusions to the exodus to New England, favoured by Rev. Iohn White, occur, and some cases of witchcraft. But the bulk of C. 8 is occupied by the fining of drunkards and tipplers. profane swearers and absentees from church. Butchers were forbidden to kill, dress or expose for sale flesh during Lent or other fastdays, and the making of malt was strictly regulated. The womenkind also were not neglected, and when exhortations failed, were ordered to be "plounced" in the river Frome. The inhabitants, to judge from this book, found a congenial pursuit in laying informations one against another. No sooner had a remark escaped the lips of a Dorchester man or woman, reflecting on a fellow townsman, than a sworn information was laid before the Mayor, and the offender bound over to answer at the next General Sessions of the Borough. The particulars, now selected, form a mass of examples which speak for themselves. They are all taken from C. 8.

1629, July 29. "Sarah, the daughter of Benjamyn Derby, saith upon oath that on Monday last she heard Anthony Wood call her brother Matthew Swaffeld 'hollow harted,' and that he would see the Towne beaten downe rather then he would live in such a base Towne; he [sic] said also that the said Wood said to her brother that his hart was so hollow that the Divell might dance in it."

^{*} The fines received from offenders, from 1st October, 1632, to 1636, with a few depositions or examinations in September and November, 1637, are entered in C. 24. The Constables' account of "Offenders' money," Michaelmas, 1673, to Michaelmas, 1674, amounting to £2 19s. 6d., is written on a piece of paper, C. 18.

1629, Aug. 3. "Christofer Way on his oath saith that yesterday in the morning about viij of the clock complaynt being made to him, he being a churchwarden, that Leonard Miller's people were at Brewing, this examinant came vp into Constable Maber's barton, and through the grates saw Leonard Miller's men busye about their work in their ordering(?) their wort. Whervpon this examinant asked them what day it was, and whether it were a day fitt to brew on. They answered they had almost done. And whiles this examinant was there the said Leonard Miller came and demanded this examinant what he would do, and this examinant said he must present [the] offence: then the said Miller answered that yf he did, he, the said Miller, knew the worst of it, it was but tenne groats, it was no more than drinking a quart of wyne in an inne or alehowse."

1629, Aug. 3. "Thomas Devenish on oath saith that he hath often forbidden John Gape of this Borough to play at the ball in the prison court; the said Gape came thither again on Winsday last, and the said Tho. Devenish having reproved him and his company and put them out of the prison court, the said Gape and his company by his meanes retorned againe presently and would play there in despight of the said Tho. Devenish, and wished that he had the said Gape out into the streete, and the said Gape since abused this examinant's daughter in words and scoffes."

1629, Aug. 8. "Dorset. Whereas I have lately received a Commission of Rebellion, a Writt of assistance, and another writt upon the Statute of Northampton to disarme diuers persons which are in the said Comission of Rebellion. These are therefore to will and require you whose names are heere vnder writen, and twenty other more sufficient persons. howsholders, inhabitants of the Towne of Dorchester which my vndersheriff shall and doth nomynate, appoynt and warne to come and appeare personally before me att the signe of the Lyon in Shaftbury within this County on Wednesday next, being the twelveth day of this moneth of August, by two of the clock in the afternone the same day at the farthest tyme, and there to bee ready with your necessary and sufficient armes to attend and bee assisting vnto me in all things dilligently as becometh you and every of you according vnto the said writts and my command on that behalfe, whereof faile

you not as you tender his majesty's service, and will answeare the contrary at your vttermost perilles. Given vnder my hand and seale this 8 day of Au: An'o 5 Reg's Caroli, 1629. Thomas Still, Vic: + Reinoldo Knapton, vndershiriff, Richard Blachford, merchant, and Will'm Whiteway, Ju:, merchant, Bailiffs of the towne of Dorchester or one of them to come, + Henry Maber, Clothier, Constable, + Denys Bond, merchant, John Parkins, marchant, + Joseph Paty, Clothier, Will'm Paty, Clothier, &c. More warned by Roberte Warman, the shiriff's Bailiff, by vertue of the said warrant [34 more names follow]. These persons marked with a cross went accordingly."

1629, Aug. 21. John Allombrig, Constable, "sayth that vpon Wensday last in the morning, when the watchmen for the night past came to this examinant to be discharged, whoe were Rychard Smith, John Pollerd, Wm. Sanwey, [John Downton] an apprentice of Hugh Gape's, John White and Marke Hodder, in short time after being discharged and gone one of the same company, viz. Rychard Smith, came back to this examinant and told him that the rest aboue named were gone to Adam Smith's to drinke, and had already drank some 2d. or 3d., and thervpon this examinant went vnto Adam Smith's house, and found them tipling all the same company, but that Raphe Hutton slipt out of the dores. There was found Beere and Tobacco on the Table and they confessed that they had dronke some 4d. in Beere." Will. Sanway, barber, Richard Smyth, John White and John Downton were all "stockt" for tippling on this occasion.

1629, Aug. 28. "John Facy of Dorchester sware by God twice and by God's woundes this day fortnight at Christofer Edmonds' at Dorchester."

1629, Aug. 29. Examination of Richard Wolsey, who alleged he was born at Stafford, co. Stafford, and is Vicar of Walton upon the Hill, Surrey, and last Midsummer went into Ireland to his brother's son, and is now travelling back from Devonshire.

1629, Sept. 23. "Thomas Barnes, a stranger of Cumberland, living masterles about the Towne, is inioyned to get him a master in covenant within fortnight next."

1629, Sept. 30. "The examinacion of Nathaniel Couth, servant to John Couth, taken before Barnard Toup and Will'm Whiteway, the yonger, Bailiffs of the Borough afore-

said, Who being demaunded what words he heard his kinswoman, Mr. Coothe's wife, speake concerning Mr. G. Loder, he saith that he doth remember that she called him Knave: and that the said Coothe's wife, being sent for to come to hale, she sent word by this examinant that she was not fitt to come; and being likewise demaunded where he heard his kinsman Cooth say that he did wish he were hanged rather than he would stand with his hatt of before Mr. Bailiff Whiteway, he answeared that he remembred that his kinsman said he disdayned to shew him any reuerence, save only by the King's authoritye in the Towne, and saith also that he doth not remember that his kinsman said that ther were noe honest men in Towne save Mr. White* and Mr. Gould, and doth not remember that his kinsman called Mr. Bailiff Whitewaye Knave. And farther saith that the said Mr. Coothe's wife said that she would rather beleive any drunkerd in Chard than any puritants of Dorchester, or words to that purpose, and being also demaunded wher he hard Mr. Cooth or his wife say that Mr. Bond was like an old Crowder on her Country this examinant saith he did not."

1629, Oct. 9. "This day yt was testefied by the oathes of Rychard Burie and Raphe Perrin, Constables of the same, before Mr. Maior that Winter Grant, Esquire, was found dronk within this Borough about one of the Clock in the night last past, in the house of Thomas Foxwell at the Crowne, and hath paid by the hands of Thomas Foxwell aforesaid by his appointment, viz. by the appointment of the said Winter Grant, the som of five shillings for the vse of the pore according to the law." &c.

1529, Oct. 9. John Cawpen, of North Litchet, "saith that he came from Ireland about some 20 weekes since, and in all this time hath liuen about Frampton and in this Borough at Clement Bayliff's, and hath taken vppon him to cure divers ruptures in men and children here about, and made trusses for that purpose, and saith he had a passe vnder the handes of Sir George Trenchard and Sir Thomas Freake to travaile into Ireland to some frends there, but canot shew any such passe nor any other for his passing vp and down the contrey, for which, being by the lawes found to be a wandering person, he is sent to the house of correccion, having acknowledged

that he hath not had any certain dwelling or abode this many yeres, but wandered vp and down the countrey."

1629, Oct. 16. "Robert Harris, absent from his parish

1629, Oct. 16. "Robert Harris, absent from his parish church at Trinity Saboth day last at evening service and sermon, confessed and excused it by saying he went to Charmister to fetch work, which excuse was not allowed reasonable, therefor to pay xijd.; promised to pay it forthwith."

1629, Nov. 5. Examination of Peter Lamsden, who said that at the age of 15 he was of the University of Cambridge about $7\frac{1}{2}$ years, is now 24 years old, and hath an uncle in co. Glouc. who having two livings desired that this examinant should have one of them, etc.

1629, Nov. 30. "Alice Budden, Alice Glover, Emm. Gardner, Elioner Burd, and Ursula Bull, skolds, being this presente day all questioned before Mr. Bailiff for calling names and misusing one another, ordered when they skold or vse such speech againe either of them to be plownced."

1629, Dec. 15. Towards clothing and providing victuall for the poore against Chrismas:

Offendors' mony 06 . 15 . 3

Profitt of the Fast mony 12 . 15 . 5

Given by Mris. Jone Gould, vid. .. 01 . 10 . 0

Divided among the three parishes, and paid to the Overseers.

r629, Dec. 29. Examination of Thomas Whitle of Dorchester, clothier, "who saith that on the 28th day of December last Stephen Pressly came vnto him into his owne house and questioned this examinant by what authority he did present him, the sayd Presly, to the Court at Blandford for not receiving the Sacrament at Easter, and by what authoritie this examinant would compell him to come to Church and to tarry the service and sermon, and told this examinant that he would not come at all, but yf he did, he sayd he would continue but time of divine service and no more, and bid this examinant looke vpon the Cannons to see what he ought to doe, and said also farther to this examinant that John Dounton [of Fordington] would make as good a sermon as some of them " [or "as Mr. Ben"].

1629-30, Jan. 4. "Mawrice Vile and Katherine his wife (Irish people), taken in this Towne, as Vagarent Rouges, haueing heer received punishment, are sent from tithing to tything."

"Frances Medcoth, taking heer as a Vagrent by wandring

about the Country with George Holcroft, and living incontinently with him, burned in the left shoulder with the letter (R) and sent to Ripping in Yorke' which, as she affirmed, was the last place of her abode."

1629-30, Jan. 12. Anthonie Olevian, Physician, found drunke within the Borough.

1629-30, Jan. 15. "Hugh Baker, Currier, of this Borough, was complayed of to Mr. Maior that he went out of church yesterday at Morning Prayer before prayers were ended, and confesseth the same, and is censured to sit in the stocks two houres for his misdemeanor."

1629-30, Feb. 15. Recognisances entered into by butchers not to "kill or sell or offer to sell by themselves or any other any manner of flesh prohibited by the law during the tyme of Lent."

1629-30, Feb. 22. "Martyn Spring and divers others complayned of for Forestallers of wood and turves."

1630, May 8. "A triall of Leather, made on Satterday, the 8th of May, 1630, by the oathes of Thomas Lacie, jun., Edward Ash, Robert Lawrence, jun., Phillip Lokier, Wm. Facie alias Scholler, Nycholas Baker, jun., who say on theire oathes that one hide of Leather of William Hodges [tanner] of Cearne is vnsufficiently tanned in the whole thereof, and doe value the same hide at viijs."

1630, May 19. "William Lambert, sonne of Roberte Lambert, for almost strangling Richard Lacyes apprentice at Church Saboth day last at sermon, to be questioned at Sessions."

1630, June 3. Malsters are "warned to desist from wetting any barly to convert into mault ten dayes next ensuinge, and afterwards to be ordered by certen lymitacions."

"Md. it was this presente day ordered that the Common Brewers shall sell good beare after the rate of 12s. the hoggshed the best, and 8s. the barrell, and small beer at 4s. 6d. the hoggshed and 3s. the barrell, and soe at the same rates."

1630, June 12. "Hugh French, apprentice to Will'm Parks, for his abuse yesterday, there having ben some difference betwene John Ridwout and his wife, spake concerning a horse for the next neighbour to ride, saying [to] the neighbor 'yow had leaped ouer the ram's head,' which he confessed."

1630, June 12. "Natha: Bower testifieth vpon his oath that Anne Samwayes, widow, being in the market, did call to a man to sell her some wheate, and the man answeared

that it was sold, therevpon this examinant replyed that yf they were served aright they should be served as they were in France to cut holes in their baggs, for that they sold all to the millers."

1630, June 15. "Albion Bull testifieth vpon oath that George Brine (the wachman), being with the Cunstable in giveing his charge to the wach, he said that the Towne should be as well served tomorrow as to day, and that the Towne was served with a company of boyes, and that he did then much disturbe the Cunstable in executing his office about giving charge to the wach."

1630, June 23. "John Graunt vpon oath, yesterday comyng from Waymouth [Robert] George demaunded of Pouncy where he beloed like a calfe; he said he was a man, and George said he was a puppy: then Pouncy alighted from his horse, and after divers speeces George strake Pouncy with a Cudgell," &c.

1630, July 31. "Tobias Hooke, gent., did this present day sweare 7 oathes blasphemously by the name of God within this Borough, and also was the same time dronke," &c.

1630, Aug. 9. "Geo. Sampson, bodymaker, apprentice in London with the Queene's bodymaker, is to bring a testymonyall before fortnight hence, else to be committed."

1630, Oct. 7. "Edward Miller for playing at the Church and disturbing the people in the tyme of divine service, his master, Richard Stevens, is to correct him for it, and Constable Williams must see it well done, and for his next offence to be punished at hall."

1630, Oct. 11. "Richard Hilgrove for default in watching ordered to pay for his default xijd. towards the watch to the Constable."

1630, Oct. 15. "James Orchard, dwelling in Brodewinsor in the countey of Dorset, pettichepman, who hath exercised the same trade about a month, came from home to [blank] on Wensdy last to Sir John Strangways house at Melbery, and thenc the same day to Evershot, and lay there all that night; the Thursday he went to Sir John Strode's and to Sidlin and thenc to Charmister, and lay there all that night, and came this morning to Towne, to bestow some mony with Thomas Lucas, and thence is purposed to travaile toward Corfe Fayre which is on Monday next to sell bone lace and bands and such like commodyties."

"James Orchard, being punished for his offence, is sent by passe to Broadwinser."

1630, Oct. 20. "John Rasker, being heertofore licensed to make three quarters of mault weekely, hath sithence exceeded the quantity, he is now vtterly supprest from making of mault henceforth vntill he shall be farther licensed."

1630, Nov. 23. "The informacion of Mr. Samuel Whetcomb of Taunton, and of Mr. Ralph Bayly of Manchester, who upon oath say that they heard Thomas Jarvis of Lyme say the last night within this Borough that all the Proiectors for New England Busines are rebells, and those that are gon over are Idolaters, captivated and seperatists; and they wishinge him to take heed what he said, yet hee spake it often and said he would mainetaine it before the Councell, if they dare to ride away to morrow morninge, and further he said that the Magistrates of Lyme weare shewmakers, and beinge demaunded by these examinants what he ment by those wordes, he said they weere a Company of Hipocrites and Disemblers."

1630, Nov. 29. "Raph Perrin hath of wheate in his barne 300 bushells, and of barley there in store 640 bushells, hath in his house and family 17 persons certaine, is allowed for his household eighty bushells of wheate, and of barley to spend in his house 100 bushells; he hath sold vnto Mr. Ball. Bond for the pore of the Towne 100 bushells of wheate, and is ordered to bring into the market weekely, or to sell so much to the pore of the Towne and make yt appeare to be so, two bushells of wheate; and of Barley is allowed for sowing of 80 acres 320 bushells of barley, and for his houshold as before 100 bushells; and ther remayneth 220 bushells of barley, and is ordered to bring weekely into the market, or to sell vnto the pore of the Towne, a sack of barley euery fortnight, and the rest he is allowed to make into mault." (This is a specimen of seven orders made by the Court at this date.)

1630-1, Feb. 16. "Thomas Galton's wife was this day charged not to tiple any more within this Borough without licence, and her husband being in prison she is comaunded to acquaint him therewith." [Several other similar orders.]

1630-1, March 14. Examination of Roger Honiborne taken on oath, "whoe sayth that on Friday the xjth of March, 1630, Rob: Hoskins and Thomas Wayte were in Mr. Angell Greyes grownds of Kingston, and fished in his waters and tooke fish there, and this examinant forbid them from Mris. Grey, and willed them to put in the fish againe, but they would not, but contynued fishing there two howers after, and came as far as Mr. Greyes yeate, and much fish being before in Mr. Greyes pond now little is to be found there."

1631, Apr. 9. "Triall of the neck of a hide of Andrew Rose of Shilling Oakeford, Tanner, seised by Edward Ash and Richard Lacy, searchers and sealers of leather." The Jury (six men) found "that the whole neck, &c., is insufficiently tanned."

1631, May 9. "Ed: Hill for going out of his parish Churche one Saboth daye last in the midell of services to maye."

"Mary Tuxbery, for scoulding att the sargences when they did goe about for mersments, is ordered to be plownsed when the wether is warmer."

1631, May 17. Christopher Baker, aged twelve years, a scholar of Trinity College, Oxford, who had wandered about for years getting aid from scholars and ministers, "went to the Schoolmaster of the towne and Usher and so to Mr. White's house for relefe, but had none at all," is sent back to Oxford, his birthplace.

1631, July 13. "Francis Guy testifieth that on the Sunday after Midsomer day last Thomas Sowthy, shoomaker, caried abroad a paire of new boots to sell to Cap. Roberte Brown to Godmaston, and he doth vsually either send or cary abroad boots and shooes on the Saboth daye to be sold, and he made price of them xs."

"Examynacion of Edmund Cage of the City of London, Surgeon, whoe saith that he dwelleth in Seiles' parish by Cripplegate in London, and there exercise his arte of a surgeon, and hath lived there ever since the Isle of Ree expedicion, and the cause of his coming from London is for that he is going towards Plymouth, to seek a place goe to sea, surgeon in some merchant voyage . . . and being examined concerning a misdemeanour of cheating laid to the charge in the City of London, he acknowledgeth that about wo yeares and half since he was accused for such a cryme London . . . but denieth that he was guilty. . ." "Committe to Gaole for want of suerties pro bono gestu."

1631, Aug. 3. "Edmund Cage vpon his second examin cion confesseth that this examinant did vpon examinacion confesse that he was the man that did cheate the men of t mony for which Captayne Clovell was apprehended as accused, and for that he, this examinant, was bownd ov to the Sessions at Middlesex, but that this examinant did n do the fact." Bound in xxli. to appear at the Middles Sessions in Mich. term.

1631, Aug. 29. "Michaell Colliford was absent yesterd in afternoon from the parish Church of All Saints and we a nutting the whole afternoone till 6 of the Clocke."

"Thomasine Blewett, widow, for coming late to Chur yesterday was senight to pay 12d. and for non payment to comitted."

1631, Dec. 12. Monies to bee distributed towards clothic and victualing the poore against Chrismas now coming, viz

- 1631-2, Jan. 23. "Thomas Walden, clockmaker, confesseth his departing out of his parish church at All Saints yesterday, being Sabbath day in the evning prayer time and sermon, but excuseth himself that he was taken with a fit of sicknes, and stayd as long as possible he could without the dore, purposing to come in again but could not, and after went home vnto his house. Alexander Bennet sitteth in the seate with him, whoe knoweth he vseth to keepe the church ordynarily. Excused."
- 1631-2, Feb. 20. "Robert Sansom confesseth that on Munday, being Shrove Munday last, hee did challenge and had of Peter Mounsill, one of the Free Schoole schollers boarded at Mr. Will'm Whiteway the younger his howse, two shillings and seaven farthings, pretending that he had broken his glasse windowes with a gunn which he shott in and a pusland dish, which he afterwards confessed to be vniustly challenged, and confesseth that at the same tyme he did sweare one oath by the name of God."
- 1631-2, Feb. 27. "Roger Rockwell warned not to regrate any more victuall or ingrosse any more."
- 1632, Apr. 13. "An Inquest vpon the death of John Degonia, a Biskiner, prisoner in his Majesties Goale at Dorchester and a condemned man." Died ex visitacione Dei.*
- 1632, Apr. 13. "Margaret Brine on oath sayeth that this present day she heard Jane Bendfeild, widow, call Richard Keate's wife jade, saying, 'You old jade, you will bee in Bridewell before mee."
- 1632, May 14. "Elioner Butler of Hasten in Sussex, coming to this towne with Katheryn Peragus the last night, sayeth on oath that she mett the said Katheryn in the towne

of Hasten about three weekes sithence, in an Alehowse there, kept by one Thomas White, the signe of the Alehows was the Greene Dragon, and further this examinant sayeth that the Maior of Hasten is a tall man, middle aged, and hath a yellow beard, and this examinant sayeth that she verily beleiveth that the said Peragus came to the Porte of Hastens by water, and further this examinant sayeth that the said Katheryne Peragus had the Passe she travaileth by of the Maior of Hasten, whose name shee conceiveth to bee Thomas White, and that John Browne and Hugh —— were the Constables of Hasten, and delivered the Passe to the said Katheryne from the Maior."

1632, June 1. "William Douche, servant to Mathew Bonger of this Borough, Henry Pouncey and William Pouncey, sonnes of Roger and Thomas Pouncey, Nathaniell Read's sonne Nathaniell, Giles Morey yonger, Rychard Stone the glouer's sonne, Edward Meller sonne of Wm. Meller. Wm. Douch confeseth that all these boyes and John Green's sonne met together voon Sabbath day last at Burton in farmer Monday's ground, and played at Nine Holes for money, a farthing a game. Wm. Douch confesseth he lost one farthing and Wm. Perry, Humfrey Perry's sonne, lost a penny in that company. This was doen about 4 of the clock at afternoone. and not one of them were at ther parish church at prayers at afternoone that day, nor at any other church. These all being greate boyes, yt is ordered they shall find good suerties to play no more at vnlawfull games, and shall pay 12d. a peice for absens from church at that time."

1632, June 12. "Breach of the liberties by Giles Foy, &c. Memor', that Joseph Vnderwood was arrested within this Borough by Giles Foy on the xijth of June, 1632, at the suite of Wm. Spering, gent., after such time as Mr. Mayor had denied to giue any leev to the Sheriff's Bayliffs so to do," etc.

1632, June 20. "Adam Smith sayth vpon oath that this 20th day of June, 1632, he was in the house of John Norrington and there was difference betwene John Norington and Roger Turner; he herd Turner say to Norrington that he must go catch more trowtes, and John Norington, being about to dress his cloth with sigg, he calld Turner a dissembleng Puritan Knave, and cast the sigge and filth he had in his hands in Roger Turner's face. And also Adam Smith saith that he heard the same time John Norrington call

Nathaniell Bower, being then present, 'beggerly base knave,' and that he could not live in Dorchester but for his dissembling, and that there were more beggerly knaves lived in Dorchester then in any Towne here about."

1632, June 26. Robert Foot, for being "severall tymes drunke and wishing that fire and brimstone would fall on this towne, it being sufficiently proud," was set close to work in the prison "without liberty of coming into the towne."

1632, Oct. 12. "Thomas Gawlpin, for not opening the doare of his howse to the Constable coming with a huy and cry," etc.

1632, Nov. I. "Katheryne Melmouth (the wife of William Melmouth of this Borough) sayeth that her said husband will not allow her any victualls, and hath stroken his wife and offered her divers grosse abuses."

"William Melmouth sayeth that the difference betwene himselfe and his wife is because hee was promised 40*ii*. in marriage with his wife which hee hath not received."

1632, Nov. 8. "Henry Kippin of Ringwood, colier, coming this day with a cart loade of Coles into this Borough, having his baggs measured they were found to little and deceitfully filled which he confessed vpon examinacion, and had bene warned of the same before, and therfore was ordered to stand in the pillory, and vpon his ernest desire to be spared this time and faythfull promise to bring lawfull measures and good Coles hereafter, his punishment is suspended vppon hope and promise of reformacion at all times hereafter, which yf yt be not performed, when hee shalbe found faulty then to be punished with the pillory."

1632, Dec. 9. "William Hardy, gent., dwelling euerywhere (as he said) charged with swearing eight oaths, and abused the constables saying 'that he durst say they weare all a company of dampned creatures and the divell would haue them all, and called them cods' heads and sheepes' heads.' Fined 8s. for the oaths, and committed to gaol for his abuse; released next day on his "pleanary confession."

1632, Dec. 10. "For clothing and victualing of the

1632, Dec. 10. "For clothing and victualing of the poore against Chrismas now coming," £10 10s. to each of the three parishes.

1632-3, Jan. 5. "Roger Sims sayth that he was at Reynaldo Knapton's house vpon Thursday after Crismas day last past in the after noone of the same day and playd at cards there."

1632-3, Jan. 14. "Whereas the bearer hereof, Robert Smyth, is to make his present repaire into Cornwall vpon his Majesty's espetiall affaires, and to make his speedy retorne to Whitehall, Theise are to will and require you to furnishe him with two able and sufficient post horses for himselfe and his guyde, from stage to stage, at prices reasonable and accustomed, whereof you may not faile as you and enery of you will answere the contrary at your perill, for which thes shalbe your warrant; dated the xijth of January, 1632.

1632-3, March 9. Wm. Pouncy, son of Roger Pouncey, senr., confesseth that he and other young men "in two severall companies thr they plad Five Holes, some other Nine Holes," at the time of Evening Prayers and sermon. Wm. Pouncey committed to the stocks.

1633, June 28. "It is now ordered that Christian Jenkens, Susan Leigh wife of John Leigh, Charytie Robenson, and Thampson Pouncey wife of Thomas Pouncey the elder, shalbe plounced or duckt three severall times vnder the water for common Scolds presented at the last Lawe day, and a warrant granted to the constables to that purpose the same day."

1633, July 8. "Mathew Haggerd, sonne to Mathew Haggerd, Butcher, was charged by Mr. Gold the Scholemaster to abuse his sayd Master and to call him 'base lying Rogue' testefyed against him by 2 or 3 boyes, ordered to be whipt by his father."

1633, Aug. 14. "Thomas Courtney, borne as hee saith at Penzance, who saith that about two yeares and halfe since he went out of Plimouth in a ship callen the *Mary well* in a voyage for Newfoundland, and there took ship, and from thence sailed to Legehorne, and there vnloaded the said ship and took a fraight for England, and coming home in the Straights' mouth was taken by a Turkes man of warre and caried into Tunis, and there he was sold for xiiijh, and there remayned neere two yeares, and vsually went to sea in a man of warre, and at length three Portugall men of warre tooke the ship wherein this examinant was, and caried him and his company into Lisbone, and there they freed this examinant, and from

Lisbone this examinant came for Dover in England in a ship of Dover, and there arrived about two monethes since, and was there remayned about fortnight, and thence came towards London, and was about 5 daies coming thither, and there staied about two monethes, and thence came out on a Wensday about fortnight since, and had the printed passe at my Lo. Maior of London his howse a little before his coming out of London, and his landing breefe he had at Dover under the Maior's hand, and the next day after his landing there. Also he saith that he begged reliefe in this Towne yesterday. Committed to Bridewell for a counterfeite certificat and begging relief heere in the Towne, till he shall be by law delivered."

1633, Nov. 11. "Thomas Pouncey, Ju., in reproachfull maner sayd vnto John Condit this morning, because he came into the prison to arrest him, that for 20d. he would vndoe any man, and when Jo: Condit told him that he was in bond to execute such warrants as came vnto his hands, he scoffingly said his band was as good as his, only his ruffe band was better than his falling band."

1633, Dec. 13. For clothing and victualling, as before, £25 10s.

1633, Dec. 30. Thomas Devenish, keeper of the Gaol, deposeth that Mr. John Gardner of Waymouth spake very disgracefully and disdainefully of the gentlemen of the county of Dorset, but especially of Sir Francis Ashley, Knt., Serjeant at law, and Sir Walter Erle, two of the Justices of the peace for this county.

1633-4, Jan. 27. "Richard Shory of Dorchester, for saying that John Merefeild was a witch, and he having a moate in his hand, and said he had fetched it from the witches house, and he put it into the fire heere in Dorchester, and said he would see if the witch would come, and thervpon went to the window to look for him as this examinant believeth, ex affid. Thomasine vx'is Samuel Cole."

r633-4, Feb. 7. "It is ordered this day vppon complaint made against Margery Goodfellow of the Almes house by Elizabeth Stone . . . for disquieting of the whole house in quarrelling and calling names, and in particular for calling Agnes Ash witch . . . that yf from henceforth she shalbe found againe [offending] . . . that she shalbe plownced and expelled the house."

1634, May 23. "The examincion of Israell Smith, late of Magdalen College in Cambridge, saith that he came from

Cambridge about a yere since without a license from the house, and went to Dover, and ther had a pass to traveyl into Fraunce but of whom he knoweth not, and thence went to Calleis and Deep, and so to Parris, and having spent about a quarter of a yere there departed into Flushing, and there met with a brother of his, and of him rec'd 3h. which he brought with him to defrey his charge, and about a three weeks since landed at Brighthemson, . . . sayth his father was a preacher and dyed som 12 yers since."

On a further examination he said "he was borne at Nosley in Lecester Sheire and was the sonne of one Sir Francis Smith, Barronet, deceased, about 12 yers since, and his fourth sonne, etc." Punished and sent away by passe to Nosley this present day.

1634, June 27. "Jone Jefferies, wife of Nycholas Jeffery of this Borough, confesseth that her husband and her self, Thomas Hooper and John Reynolds, with some others, made a Bonne fyer at Glippath Bridge betweene the dye house and the furse riks nere at 11 of the clock on the 23th day of June at night, but she sayth she is sory for yt, and will avoyd like occasions."

1634, July 28. "Florence Simes, widow, saith that aboue a quarter of a yeare since Elias Fries wife told this examinant that Margery Adyn had given her the said Fries wives daughter a cake, and that her daughter was never well since, and she had a ielosy that the said Margery had bewitched her daughter, and that she had therefore fetched thatch of the said Margeries husband's howse, and was burning of it in Roger Pouncye's howse, and the said Margeries husband came in the whiles and scolded her for it."

1634, Aug. II. Robert Lee and others "have vsed euery of them a crooke to catch out apples out of the pott and have vsed them in markett."

1634, Oct. 24. "Elizabeth Bull, wife of Albion Bull of this Borough, having bene often complained of for her ill cariage toward her husband, is now ordered to continue at home and to intend her husband, to dresse his meate, etc., as a wife ought to doe, and is charged not to accompany her brother so frequently as she hath doen, and if ther shalbe any other just complaint of her fayling in this case herafter, to be sent to the House of Correction, and ther to work hard and to have but the one half of that she earneth, and her husband to have the rest."

1634, Nov. 10. John Colleford, and others, "all these

were found Crookers of Apples in the market some two moneths since, and Robert Cosens' sonne made the crooks."

1634, Dec. 12. For clothing and victualling the poor against Christmas £31.7.11, among the three parishes.

1634-5, Feb. 13. Moses Meller of Padstowe, Cornwall, "sayth that he went voluntary about three yeres since into the Lowe Contreyes to serve the States; he went from London vnder the conduct of Sir Tho: Lucas, an English captaine, and there served vnder him three yeres and somewhat better, served at the Brill in garison all the time and had a discharge from the Prince of Orange about 12 moneths since which is the passe now shewed, and euer since he sayth he continued in that contrey working at his trade of a Barbour. Landed at London some tenne dayes since, and had the passe now shewed from Lord Maior of London to travayle home to Padstow in Cornwall . . . Confesseth that he was burnt in the shoulder in Holland some two yeres since for departing from his Captaine."

"Suffered to passe on because his passe could not be found false or disapproved."

1634-5, Feb. 21. John Stuckey of Yeovell, Somerset, labourer, saith "that he came to this Towne to meete with his Aunt, Jane Hooper, and to entreate her to gett him a place to goe to New England, and being demaunded what monys he had to furnish him in such a voyage for his provision and passag thither, he cannot shew that he hath that abillytic for such an vndertaking, and being demaunded how he came by a new suit of cloathes he sayth he had 20s. of his mother to buy vt, etc."

Stuckey was eventually arrested on suspicion of felony.

1635, Apr. 29. "Richard Clarke sayth that this morning, about eight of the clock, he herd that Thomas Stillard of this Borough was sick in the spleene and sent his litle boy to tell Stillerd or his wife that they should come ouer to this examinant, and when he came, he, this examinant, sent his litle boy to his house for ellecampane which he brought, and he willed Stillerd to slice and take yt," etc.

1635, May 27. "Widow Crowcher [or Coode] who saith that on the Sabbath day last in the time of Evening Prayer at St. Peter's she went as farre as Monkton ditch to bring Colleford's son going towards Melcomb, to the Shippe that was going to New England, out of her care to have him gone, for the boy was her husband's prentice, and she was at charge

of his expense and part of his passage also, and doupting lest he would be careless in going aboard the shippe and so be left behind. She is excused."

1635, May 30. "James Palfry, of Dorchester, Brewer, sworne, saith that Philip Cheuerell of this Borough the 29th of May, 1635, company being talking with him, and telling him that they heard the Spaniard's ships were come at the Isle of Weight, and asking him what he would doe, he said this deponant afterwards heard the said Philip say he would fire the Towne and run away."

1635, July 15. "Sarah Handcock of this Borough having this day been complayned of for her disorderly carriage and scolding in the work house . . . among the spinsters, is now ordered to com no more to the work house to work there, but is to work elswhere and follow her work, or to be further delt withall according to the lawe."

1635, Sept. 17. Inquest on John Crosse, late of Horton, Dorset. The Jury say "that the sixteenth day of this moneth of September the said John Crosse, being in Fordington feild in the late generall muster and of Cap. Coker's band, one of the trained souldiers, by shooting of a peece whiles they were in service, stroke him in the head with some hard thing that was in the musket, but whoe it was is not knowne, by misfortune, which gave him a wound in his head the length of an inch and halfe, whereof he languished vntill about three of the clock in the afternoone this day, and then died of the wound aforesaid."

1636, Oct. 14. "Will: Gosling coming to this Towne with a license vnder the hand of the Master of the Revelles, signed Henry Herbert, and sealed with the seale of the office of Revelles with a Cinquefoyle, authorizing the said Gosling to shew the portraiture of the City of Jerusalem dated 15 June, xij Caroli, and denied to make his shew heere by reason of the dangerous tyme of sicknes."

1636, Oct. 23. Shaston. Collected on the Lord's day in all three churches of this parish towards their relief in thes tyme of their visitacion of the plauge, 45li. 9s. $3\frac{1}{2}d$.:

1636-7, March 9. "John Elwell, the sonne of John Elwell of Marshalshay in the parish of Marshwood in the County of Dorset, saith that he came from his father, Monday last was three weeks, to Captaine Jonas Dennis to Waymouth, to bee by him shipt for St. Christofer's," etc.

1636-7, March 20. "Gulielmo Clarvetto pretending to be a Doctor of Phisick of Trin. College in Cambridge, and heere coming to towne to practise phisick, and can shew noe authority to practise, is required by Mr. Maior at his perill to forbeare to practise heere till he shew authority."

In a subsequent examination he alleges that he was born in Florence, is about 40, lived in University of Padua four years, and there took the degree of M.A., practised surgery in his own country, and then in France, Spain and Germany, and came to England about 18 years since, and has lived mostly in London.

1637, April 17. "The names of such as desire to compound for making mault and brewing according to orders sent downe by the King's Comissioners." [14 maulters, 2 brewers.]

1637, May 13. "Sarah Vren, alias Moore, did danse in the Gaol the Ester morning and had a fidler in the Gaole. Abigal Serrell, the seruant of Mris. Wats, for that she was dansing att the Gaole, is ordered."

1637, May 31. "Robert Powncy maketh oath that Thomas Powncy the younger, this weeke being at bulbayting, did breake the bulkeeper's head with his cudgell."

1637, Oct. 30. "Examinacion of Henry Tipput of St. Kue in Cornwall, aged 32 yeares, who sayth that havinge bin att St. Christofers he landed att the Ile Wight, and thence hee traveiled to St. Kue in Cornwell, since hath bin in Holland, and about Bortholmew tide last was tweluemonth hee re-

turned for England and landed at Hastings in Sussex, since which hee hath traveiled into Scotland and rangled the Cuntry too and froe, and att length comming to Tarring in Sussex hee met with two or three Irish men and women, and lodging in one Barnerd's howse that keepes an Alehouse, the said Barnard made a passe for him dated the eigteenth of October, for the makeinge of which this examinant gaue the said Bernard halfe a duzen of beere.

"Vpon further examinacion confessed afterwards that the passe before mencioned was of his owne making, vpon which passe he received iijs. of the Tresorer of Southampton.

"Whipt and sent away with a passe." C. II.

1637, Nov. 6. "Examinacion of Henry Hutchins, servant of Robert Griffen, of this Burrough, baker, on oath, who sayeth that the 29th of October last past in All Saints' Church on the Lord's day in time of divine servis hee sawe Jno. Hoskins, servant of Jno. Standish of this Burrough, butcher, pull Richard Butler out of his place and strike him a box in the eare." C. II.

1637, Nov. 18. "Examinacion of Constable Bridges, Constable Hewet and Constable Cooke on oath, who say that this day they heard George Browning of Otry, gent., sweare seven oathes by God and by God's Wounds within this Borrough, and since hee came in to Mr. Maior's howse hee swore one oath by the name of God. Paid for his swearinge the same day the somme of viijs., put into purse."

"George Browning this day in presence of Mr. Maior, after there was fine shillings layd downe for his swearing said that yf hee had layd downe fine shillings the Towne should burne for it." C. II.

The selections which follow are culled from later books, but no distinct Offenders' Book is found until 1696:—

1639-40, Jan. 3. "Whereas the beggars doe now begin to goe abroad about the Towne begging, It is ordered that Bower shall carefully looke about the towne and bring such beggars before one of the Justices of this Borough to bee ordered for the same vpon paine of being punished as shalbe fitt." C. 12.

1640, Oct. 2. Thomas Grindham desires to be allowed 6s. 4d. paid the Clerke of the assise for his discharge about imprisoning the fidlers. C. 12.

1648, Oct. 30. "Mr. Gilbert Gray, Phisicion dwelling in this Towne, being drunk in this Towne on Saturday last, which Mr. Maior iustifies, and now laies downe for it vs., and warned him to abuse the Constables no more." C. 12.

1653, June 3. William Ryall to take iiijd. a night for lodging of such prisoners as are committed to his charge, but after a fortnight's commitment ijd. a night. C. 12.

1655-6, March 7. "To remember to debate the matter of Malt drying vpon the Sabboth day." C. 12.

1658, July 16. This day received a petition to this Company from nine distressed prisoners in the Countie Goale, declareinge the sadnes of there condition, and for want of some releife (besids there common allowance) must perrish. In consideration of there condition by reson of the dearnes of wheate and other provision, yet is this day agreed that Mr. Bushrod, Steward of the Hospitall, doe disburse 10s., to be laide out in Flesh for them, 2 dayes in—5s., vntill the some of 10s. be disbursed, and charge it to the Account. C. 15.

1699, Nov. 24. "The informacion of Conyers Place, Schoolemaister of the Free Schoole, who on his oath saith that for seuerall tymes lately severall boyes of this Towne haue disturbed this informant's Schoole by knocking at the Schoole Dore, and throweing in greate stones and some small stones into the passage or entry of the Schoole; the boyes who have byn guilty hereof as this informant is credibly informed are Mr. Derbies two sonnes, Mr. Maber's sonne, Mris. Gigger's sonne, Farmer Light's sonne, and Mr. Wm. Coxe's sonne. He refused to take his oath, but all were sent for, and most appeareing confessed their faults, are very submissive, promised to doe soe no more and are forgiuen." C. 22.

1700, July 1. "Examinacion of William South of Burford in the County of Oxford, labourer, who saith that he went from Burford about seven or eight weekes since towards Portesmouth, where he staid about a week and lodged in a private house; he went from thence by water to Swannidge in this County, staid there three or fouer dayes at the signe of the Castle, thence he went to Corfe, and lay at the George two nights, from Corfe he went to Winfrith and lay at the George, thence he went to Weymouth, where he hath byn vpp and downe for the space of five weekes; in all places hath sold small medecines for cureing colds and other distempers; sayes that he is returning homewards with Elizabeth, his wife." C. 22.

1706, May 17. "The information of John Paddock, the Bedle of this Borough, who upon oath doe say that hee beeing upon the watch Sunday morning last, about 3 a Clock in the morning hee this informant did see four persons, vid: John Morton, Gent., Mr. Henry Churchell, Mr. Wm. Goddard, and one Mr. Ashly, goeing downe (from the Coffee hous of Mr. Bailey, as hee doth suppose) in the forestreet, and as they went along this informant saw them knocking at severall houses as they past, vid., Mr. Bestland's house, from thence to Mr. John Gollop's and Mr. Max: Gollop's, and from thence to allmost every house in the South Street, to the great disturbance of the neighbourhood. John Paddock."

"The information of J. Griffin, one of the watchmen of this Borough, who upon oath doe say that hee saw the aforsaid four persons coming downe the street, hooping and hollowing, and knocking at severall doores; this informant told them they was fit to bee secured, upon which Mr. Moreton laid his hand on his sword; this informant told him, if hee offered to draw, hee would make him eat it.

1716, Apr. 23. Anne Brine, Elizabeth Elsworth, Mary Hobbs and Priscilla Harbin, being idle and disorderly persons, to provide themselves Masters within one month, otherwise to be sent to Bridewell. C. 7.

1756, March 7, Sunday. "The Constables of the said Borough apprehended Joseph Voss, Catherine Newman and Sarah Lester tipling in the house of John Dolling in the time of Divine Service, and the next day Mr. Mayor sent the said Joseph Voss to Weymouth in order to be put on board one of his Majesty's ships of war, convicted the said Catherine Newman of being drunk and ordered her to pay to the Churchwardens, &c., the sum of 5s. in a week's time, and in default of payment to be set in the stocks six hours pursuant to the Statute, and the said Sarah Lester was discharged after a severe reprimand, and on her promise of never offending in like kind again." C. 33.

GENERAL QUARTER SESSIONS.

Besides the summary jurisdiction possessed by the Borough Justices was the Court of Quarter Sessions. The proceedings of this Court are contained in C. 21, 1676 to 1710-11,; C. 25, 1711-12 to 1723-4; C. 29, 1741 to 1745; C. 30, 1746 to 1754,

and C. 34, 1755 to 1817. From 1724 to 1741 no book appears to be extant.

These books contain little of moment, being chiefly occupied by lists of Jurors and Recognizances, with orders for settlement of the poor, and rating appeals. Samuel Hellard was appointed Scavenger, 1st October, 1750, and the appointment renewed the following year and then dropped. Thomas Hardy, the elder, cordwinder, pleaded guilty to the charge of ingrossing and regrating butter, 6th October, 1766. The house called the Quaker Meeting in Holy Trinity parish, in the possession of —— Oxford, then unrated, was ordered to be charged on the assessment, 6th October, 1766. William Winzar, of Fordington, and Robert Masters appeared to answer the complaint of Rev. Thomas Molland, that they had disturbed the congregation where the latter was preaching; they were discharged, there being no prosecution, 5th October, 1778. John Lill, of Wool, yeoman, was indicted for similar offence, but found not guilty, 7th October, 1782.

B. 54 contains various recognizances, 1761-1763, under precept of the Justices to the Serjeants-at-Mace, to make proclamation of the next Quarter Sessions on 3rd October, 1763, and to summon twenty-four jurors, with panels of Grand and Petty Jurors attached, several informations, and presentment of the Grand Jury, 1763. B. 62 is a bundle of some ninety-six documents of a similar character, belonging to the closing years of the eighteenth century.

THE COURT OF RECORD.

This Court, to be held every three weeks on Mondays, was granted to the Borough by the Charter of James I. Two books are extant containing the proceedings, viz., C. 26, from 29th October, 1711, to 9th November, 1772, and C. 38, from 30th November, 1772, to 16th April, 1810. Nothing of interest is included in these volumes. The form to be observed at the opening and closing of the Court runs as follows:—" Make three 'O yes's,' and afterwards say, 'All manner of persons that have any thing to do at the Court of Record to be held here this day for this Borough of Dorchester, let them come forth and they shall be heard.'

Make a single 'O yes,' and say, 'If any person will be essoigned or enter any action of debt, trespass or otherwise that this Court will hear, let them come in while this essoign lyeth, and it shall be received.'

Afterwards make another 'O yes,' and say, 'All manner of Persons that have any thing further to do at the Court held here this day may now depart hence, and keep their day here again this day three weeks.'"

ASSIZE OF BREAD.

The price of bread, assessed by three Justices under an Act of 31 George II., is contained in C. 36, commencing in 1758,* and continued until 1801. On 28th October in the former year the Sergeants-at-Mace returned the market price per bushel of best wheat at 5s. 6d., second wheat at 5s., and third wheat at 4s. IId., whereupon the weight of the penny loaf was fixed for the next seven days at 9 oz. I dr. for the best, and 13 oz. I dr. for household bread. The loaves were priced at 1d., 2d., 3d., 6d., 9d. and 12d., and did not vary so long as the price of wheat did not rise or fall 3d. a bushel.

On 9th May, 1774, these qualities were provided for, viz., wheaten penny loaf to weigh 8 oz. 3 dr., standard wheaten, 9 oz. 4 dr., and household 10 oz. 4 dr. An 18d. loaf is first mentioned on 6th September, 1773.

On 30th November, 1778, the system was changed, and the peck loaf weighing 17 lbs. 6 oz. was to be sold for 2s. $3\frac{1}{2}d$. if wheaten, 2s. if standard wheaten, and 1s. $8\frac{1}{2}d$. if household, but on 15th May, 1780, it is added that the penny loaf wheaten must weigh 10 oz. 2 dr.

Between 1758 and 1801 the lowest price for best wheat per bushel was 3s. $6\frac{1}{2}d$., on 7th February, 1762, and the highest 2os., on 2oth December, 1800, and two days after the peck loaf, weighing 17 lbs. 6 oz., was to be sold at 6s. 8d., if standard wheaten, and at 5s. 8d. if household, and the penny loaf wheaten to weigh 3 oz.

CORN RETURNS.

These Returns are entered in a "Register or Account of the Quantities and Prices of Corn and Grain at Dorchester Markets, 1789, Stat. 29 Geo. III.," and extend, with an occasional hiatus, from 7th November, 1789, to 26th April, 1803. Each weekly return is signed by Batt Chaffey, Inspector of Corn Returns. A list is given of "Buyers' Names and Places

of Abode, who have taken the Oath required by the said Act residing in the Neighbourhood of Dorchester." These are forty-eight in number. C. 42.

INNKEEPERS' PRICES.

1657-8, March 12. "The Justices doe assesse the price of oates and haye, for oates to be sold by the Inkeepers and others, 2s. 8d. the bushell; for hay for one day and night at 8d." C. 15.

1692-3, March 3. Hay was priced at 6d., oats remaining the same as before. C. 7. On 16th January, 1734, the prices were unaltered. C. 27.

ISSUE OF LICENCES.

The "Lycence Book" begins 28th October, 1795, and extends to 7th November, 1829, and records the names of persons licensed to sell "Bread and other Victualls, Beer, Ale and other exciseable liquors," and the sums for which they and their sureties were bound. The licensee was bound in £10, and two sureties in £5. On 7th November, 1817, there was one surety in £10, instead of two in £5. From 25th September, 1822, the licensee was bound in £30, and one surety in £20, and so to the end of the entries. C. 44.

1663, Feb. 18. John Coppock, of Dorchester, tapster, and John Cobb, of Dorchester, gent., to the Mayor, etc., in £40.

1664, May 13. Thomas Hollins, of Bridporte, maulster, to the Mayor, etc., in £50.

1664, Sept. 27. John Tewsbury, of Dorchester, victualer, and Julian Hobbs, of Dorchester, carpenter, and George Hillard, of Dorchester, carpenter, to the Mayor, etc., in £39.19.6.

1664, Feb. 6. Robert Bryne and John Bryne, of Fordington, husbandmen, and Michajah Bryne, of Dorchester, husbandman, to the Overseers of the Poor of Allhallows parish, Dorchester, in £40.

1665, June 23. Arthur Moody, of Dorchester, glover, to the Mayor, etc., in £100, that John Evens, of Yeovil, glover, who has lately come to reside in Dorchester as journeyman to Arthur Moody, shall "departe from the said Borough on the morrow after the date hereof, and not retorne thither againe to reside there."

1663, April 17. Edward Chepman releases to the Mayor, etc., all escapes . . . or causes of action for escape of Barnard Blanchard, late a prisoner in the prison of the said Mayor, etc.

1694, May 21. Samuell Crisdy, to Mayor, etc., in £40, to pay £10 to them at Christmas next, if he does not set fowerteene ashen trees in the Schole Close within this Borough the next season. B. 66.

Billets and Musters.

Sir Thomas Frier's Regiment, 1628.

1629, July 27. "To the right honorable his Majesty's Counsell of Warre.

May it please your honors to be advertised that the townesmen of this Borough, having billeted many souldiers by a long space, for which they, having received noe satisfaccion, refused to billet the souldiers of the company of Captayne Stevens at his retorne back from Plymouth with them, and in that respect the said Captayne Stevens, in the name of his Colonell Sir Thomas Frier, did billet 31 souldiers with divers poore men of the said Borough, and vndertooke to pay for their billet, which said souldiers were so billeted from the 23rd day of Aprill, 1628, to the 3rd day of August then following, amounting to 77h 16s., wherof 26h only is paid and 51h. 16s. reste vnpaid, as by the particulers vnder Captayne Stevens' hand appeares, which mony soe vnsatisfied

the poore men, to whome the same is due, doe stand in need of. And in testymony of the trust of this certificat wee the Bailiffs and Burgesses of the said Borough haue heerto caused our Common Seale to bee set the xxvijth day of July, 1629." C. q.

1629, Dec. 23. "This day a Commission was graunted by the Maior and Company unto Mr. William Derby, Mr. John Hill, Mr. John Blachford and Mr. Robert Blake, under the new Towne Seale, for the peticioning of the Privy Counsell about the priviledges of the Towne concerning musters." C. 9.

1629-30, March 10. "Vpon peticioning of the Towne vnto our Lord Lieutenant to haue a Captain of the traine band within our Towne, it was vndertaken by the peticioners to make vp a compleate company, and vpon the said Lord's referrence of the peticion to the Deputy Lieutenants, it was by them questioned whether that Peticion were presented with the Townesmen's consent, wherefore this day, the question being moved amongst the Capitall Burgesses, they consented to the said Peticion. All heere presente declared their consent therevnto." C. 9.

1632-3, Feb. 13. "My Lord Treasorer's letter. After my very harty Comendacions. Whereas I have byn enformed by a Certificate from the Maior, Bayliffes, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Dorchester, in the County of Dorsett, that there is due to the Inhabitants of the said Borough, which they have expended and ben at charge for the passage and billeting of his Majesty's souldiers in the second and third yeere of his Majesty's reigne, the sume of £260 9s. 10d., whereof they have yet received noe manner of satisfacion; and whereas it was heeretofore ordered by the Lords of the Counsell that the Billet monyes, due to his Majesty's Subjects in every County, should bee paid out of the loane mony remayning in the Collectors' hands of each particular County; and for as much as I am informed there remayneth soe much of the said loane in your hands as will satisfy the said Inhabitants: these are therefore to require you forthwith, vpon sight heereof, to make payment vnto the Maior of Dorchester (for the vse of the said Inhabitants) the said sume of £260 gs. 10d., or soe much thereof as you have in your hands of the said remayned, taking his acquittance vnder the Common Seale of the Borough for the same. For the doing whereof this shall bee your sufficient Warrant. Your very Loving freind, R. Weston.

1633, April 12. "It is agreed that Mr. Hill and Mr. Bury shall ride the next weeke to Mr. Bingham, Mr. Still and Mr. Pope, to demaund the mony in their hands, and to deliuer them copies of the letter and to cary with them Mr. Maior's deputacion to receive the monyes." C. 9.

1633, Nov. 12. "Worthy Sir, wee doe with all thankfulnes acknowledge your vndeserved love and favor vnto vs, in procuring the right honourable the Lord Treasorer to write his honourable letters to such gentlemen of our Country as haue the loane mony in their hands, to pay so much mony of it to the Maior of this Borough for the vse of the Inhabitants for the mony by them laid out in billeting and passing of souldiers as is dew vnto them. In prosecucion of which busines wee sent to divers of them and presented the said letters vnto them, but cannot receive one penny of mony, they pleading that they will keepe what monyes they haue for monyes to them due for billet mony, and some others of them, as namely Sir Thomas Freake and Mr. Every, are dead, but not one of them vouchsaffing any answeare in writing although Mr. Still promised to doe it, but never did it, who is conceived to have much monyes in his hands and never yet accompted for the same, wherefore vnlesse you shall bee pleased to thinke on some farther course to bee taken heerein, in such a way as you in your wisedome shall see most convenient, this busnies will fall to the grownd. And thus desiring your farther assistance heerein wee take our leaves, ceasing farther to interrupt your more weighty affaires, remayninge

"Wheras ther was an agreement made last Friday that the three soldiers that were pressed for the King's Service to goe away one Munday last, vntill which time we were content, in regard of ther poverty, they had 8d. per the day, but now seeinge they are com about agayne, they ar to have noe pay att all by the day from the Town, neither if they are required to goe againe shall they cary any of the arms with them which ar the Towne arms and for the safty of the towne." 1640, May 29. "This day vpon report that divers persons are impressed in this Towne by the Constables and by the Muster Master, the Constables, therevpon being sent for, shewed a copy of the warrant vnder Sir Geo. Hastings and Sir Fr. Fulford's hand to the Muster Master to impresse and the Constables, etc., to assist him therein for 20 men in Dorchester Division, and the Constables have thereby impressed 6 in this Borough." C. 12.

1640, June 1. "It is agreed that the three souldiers, whoe now goe in the Towne armes, shall have vs. a peece allowed them by the Towne Steward towards their chargs in travaileinge now at their departure." C. 12.

1641-2, Jan. 24. "It is agreed that a letter be sent to Mr. D. Bond, our Burgesse of the Parliament, to desire him to procure Mr. John Hill, Alderman of our Borough, to be made Captayne of our band of souldiers." C. 12.

Stock of Powder.

1642, July 1. "A noate of the stoare of powder in the magazine in the Shirehall taken by Mr. William Joliff and Mr.

Joseph Paty, 27 Sept. 1639." "The County powder" consisted of thirty-seven barrels, stated to contain 3,918 lbs., but the total, on adding up their contents, amounts to 4,364 lbs. The amount in each barrel varies from 108 lbs., the lowest, to 137 lbs., the highest quantity.

"There are allsoe 3 barrelles of the Towne store, marked B D with Tare and all, I is 102, 2 is 162, 3 is 100."

"It is agreed that the Towne powder in 3 barrelles shall be removed to the Counting house in the Town Brewhouse, and the lead that belongs to the Towne, and the loose parcell of match that belongs also to the Towne." C. 12.

Parliament Orders.

1642, July 19. "The Ordinance of Parliament heerevnder writen was brought to Mr. Maior of this Borough from the Post Master of Shaston.

"It is ordered thes day by the Lords and Commons in Parliament that the Maior, Aldermen and Capitall Burgesses of the Towne of Dorchester, in the County of Dorsett, or any three of them, shall have power to assemble and call togither all and singular the inhabitants of the said Towne and Liberties of the same, or any other that shall offer themselves as Voluntiers, that are meete and fitt for the warres, and them array, weapon, traine, exercise and put in readines, and them to leade, conduct and imploy, soe arrayed and weaponed, for the suppression of all forceable attemptes that shall bee made against the said Towne, and to hinder the surprisall of the Ordnance and Magazine there.

"Mercurij, 3° Aug: 1642.

Whereas the High Sheriff of the Countie of Dorsett hath presumptuously and illegally by his Letter directed to the Maior and Aldermen of Dorchester, required the said Maior and Aldermen to desist and forbeare the trayning and mustering of such well affected persons, as voluntarily offered themselues, to be prepared and exercised in armes for the defence of the Magazine and Amunicion now remayning in the said Towne, and to demollish all such works by him supposed to be Fortificacions, as they had erected for the

better preservacion thereof, whereto they were authorized by Order of the Lords and Commons in Parliament. Nowe therefore it is declared by the said Lords and Commons, that as they shall severely call the said High Sheriff to accompt for such his Affront and Contempt to his Majesty's Authority expressed in the Orders of both Houses of Parliament, soe they approue and commend the endeavors of those Persons aforesaid, which haue contributed their assistance in the lawfull execucion of the same, as Persons well deserving, and desirous to preserve the safty of his Majesty, the Peace of the Kingdome and Prosperitie of true Religion.

And to thend that the said Maior and Aldermen, and other Persons that are or shalbe Volunteers in the Seruice aforesaid, may be encouraged to proceede in soe laudable an vndertaking, it is further ordered and declared by the said Lords and Commons, that they, and enery of them, shalbe protected, kept harmless and indempnified for what they have don or shall doe in lawfull pursuance of the said order; and that all others that shall assest the said Persons in trayning and exercising and defending the said Towne and Magazine, as aforesaid, shalbe held by both Houses of Parliament to doe a seruice acceptable and benificiall to the King and Kingdome, and shall have the Authority of both Houses of Parliament for their indempnity in soe doeing. Jo: Browne, cleric' Parliamentorum."

Endorsed, "A Letter from the Parliament, 1642." B. 28b.

1642, Aug. 13. "That the Ordinance received by Mr. Maior from Parliament be shewed to the Judge at the Assises shortly to be held in the Towne, to shew by what authority the Souldiers doe in their armes watch the magazine and amunition, and that there shall be a strong watch kept in the Towne by night and ward by day, to hinder or stop any insurrection or tumults in the Towne during the tyme of the Assises. It is also agreed that for feare of and [to] prevent any danger of surprize of the Towne now in the tyme of the Assises, that the gates and wards of the Towne shall be made fast every night at eight of the clock during the tyme of the Assises, and that the persons heereafter named be desired to see that the same be performed. Mr. Edward Dashwood for Bankes his doare; Mr. Bushrode for the east end of the Towne, namely the East Gate, and Standishes corner, and Boyes corner; Mr. John Bray for Glippath; Robert Manuel for the west gate; Thomas Poole for the Friery lane." C. 12.

Measures of Defence.

Clarendon relates that "one Mr. Strode, a man much relied on in those parts, and of a good fortune, after he had visited his house, took Dorchester in his way to London, and being desired by the magistrates 'to view their works and fortifications, and to give his judgment of them,' after he had walked about them, he told them, 'that those works might keep out the cavaliers about half an hour.' " (History of the Rebellion, Book 7.)

The following extracts from the Corporation Minute Book, C. 12, will give some indication of the works the inhabitants had in hand:—

1642, Oct. 7. "Henry Bushrode is appoynted to keepe the key, and to see the two east gates and that on Gallowes hill shut at night, and opened in morning, and is to haue for his paines 6s. 8d. a quarter."

Henry Mory is appoynted for the like for the two west gates and at Glippath for the like reward.

Roger Turner is appropried for the like for the three sowth gates at 5s. a quarter. They are to open all the gates at breake of day, and to shut all the back gates at candle-lighting, and the east, west and south mayne gates between 8 and 9 at night." C. 12.

1642, Nov. 8. "It is thought fit that the Constables shall cause to be sett a strong watch and ward in the Towne for the saffety of the Towne and preservacion of the ordinance and amunicion, with pikes and holberds and musketts." C. 12.

1642, Dec. 1. "That every man shall pay his souldiers their full pay for Friday next, being tomorrow, and for the tyme past." C. 12.

1642, Dec. 2. "It is agreed that the pay for the souldiers raised and mayntained by seuerall persons, and now vnder command of Captaine Lewes, shall be collected for all tymes to come, from thes day forward, be collected weekely by three seuerall persons in each parish out, and by them paid over to the Captayne to pay his souldiers, and for presente Mr. Josiah Terry for Trinity parish, Mr. Nath. Bury for Peter's, William Dry for All Saints', are desired to collect the same." C. 12.

1642-3, Jan. II. "It is ordered that the Keyers of the Gates shall wayt at their seueral maine Gards, from the time of the discharging of the Ward vntil the Watch come in place,

and so likewise in morning to stand at the gates betwixt the Watch and the Ward, and not to deliuer the keyes to any, vnles to the Captaine of the Watch, or to the Rounders, or by their appointment." C. 12.

1642-3, Jan. II. "Agreed that there shall be two Companies raised in the Towne contayning in each company 80 men, wherof as many musketeers as may be and none of Cap: Churchilles company to be vnder the command of Capt. Jos Paty, the other under Cap: John Seaward, and euery man to be paid 2s. weekely.

These souldiers to watch every third night and to appeare at their colors to be exercised one afternoone in a weeke, and to be paid 12d. a day, and after that proporcion during such tyme as any such souldier shall doe constant service, and so for every half day. Officers—

1642-3, Jan. 24, "By accompt taken it is found that there are already lasted [listed] for the towne service for 2s. a peece wages weekly—140—who are to watch in their turne every third night, and by accompt it is found that besids these that are in that pay, and those that contribute to their payment, there are found in seuerall howses fitt to watch by 7 in the night at the bow guard, and 9 in the day to ward, 230, which bow guard watch and towne ward are appoynted to bee warned by the Constables, of which 9, 2 to ward at euery towne gate, I at glippath, and I at the gallowes, and one vpon the Tower; and vpon euery Sabath day and fast day 2 on the Tower, and those dayes the ward to consist of x." C. I2.

1642-3, Feb. 3. "For as much as there being a rate made for payment of 160 souldiers of this Townesmen, to beare arms for defence of the towne, and doing their duty

in watch at night and mustering one afternoone in the weeke, for which everie of them were to receive 2s., which having contynued two weeks, many of the Townesmen that were rated have refused, some of them to pay any thing at all, others to pay for more then one weeke; wherevpon it is agreed that that payment shall cease, and that now the Constables shall againe warne both watch and ward, and that from henceforth those souldiers which now before listed bee not disbanded, but bee mustered once a week, Thursday if it may be or els Friday, and shall be paid viijd. a peece, weekely, for their mustering. And that euery of the three Constables doe warne the watch in each parish, viz. 15 in each parish (besids Cap. Lewes his company). C. 12.

1642-3, Feb. 8. "It is agreed that whereas there is xh and vpwards laid out by Thomas Clench, scoutemaster, for one moneth last past for messengers and scoutes, and there being now noe mony to be had of the Comissary for the present, and Mr. Hill having mony in his hands promised to be lent to the Parliament, out of which Mr. Hill is content to pay xh to Thomas Clench, to be repaid him by the Towne vnles the same be allowed out of the mony lent to the Parliament, this Company doth agree to see Mr. Hill repaid, vnles it be allowed as aforesaid." C. 12.

1642-3, Feb. 10. "Whereas 3li. was paid out last weeke to Math. Morton for 3 weeks past, out of monies given by the Townesmen towards the Fortificacions, and now there is 4li. 18s. 8d. left of that mony givin, and yet more mony is to be advanced to pay workmen about the fortificacions this weeke; It is now agreed that the said mony, now to be advanced, shall be paid out of 14li., to be paid in tomorrow towards 24li. to be paid for Peter Standish standing, and all paid out of the Towne mony to be demanded out of the general contribucion mony in the Comisaries hands." [In margin]. "This is altered, and 3li. only is ordered to be paid out of the 14li. for the 3li. paid to Morton, which was paid out of the Townesmen's mony, and so then there will be to pay this week's wages 7li. 18s. 8d." C. 12.

1642-3, Feb. 10. "Nicholas Clark [crossed out and 'Cornew of Taunton' written above], William Hellett, John Vincent, of Chardstock, coming to towne to serve vnder Sir Walter Erle, desire now to be billited till Sir Walter comes; It is agreed they shall [receive] 6s. a weeke for their billet euery of them, and for that they are to doe duty and work at

the Fortificacions, which it is agreed the Borough shall pay, the said Hellet and Vincent to bring their muskets into Towne." C. 12.

1642-3, Feb. 17. "It is agreed that Philip Cornew, coming from Taunton hither vpon the comendacion of Mr. Newton, shall be entertayned as a souldier, being furnished with a musket and sword, and to have 6s, a weeke paid by the Brewhouse." C. 12.

1642-3, Feb. 24. "Mr. Maior, besids the 3h, paid by him on the other side (i.e., the opposite page) hath paid vnto Tho. Clench, out of the xiiijh. of the standing mony, for scout mony vli., and to the three Captaines of the Towne to pay poore souldiers that served the two daies this weeke in muster in the common armes 6li." C. 12.

1642-3, Feb. 27. "Whereas by consent of the Maior and Capital Burgesses the Churchwardens and Overseers of the poore of euery of the three parishes have made a rate for raising of monies weekely for payment of souldiers for defence of the Towne; It is now agreed that one monethes payment shall be paid in hand, besids the weekely rate to provide amunicion." "Robert Burt brought in his noate for worke he did in making chests for muskets for Sir William Waller, wherein, by leaving 3 chests made and vnmade on his hands, he desires to have 10s. allowed him for his losse, which this Company will consider of. It is agreed that the Towne shall take of the chest that is made, and that the Steward shall pay him for it, to Rob. Burt nyne shillings." C. 12

"It is agreed and thought reasonable that the Ouerseers of the pore of Peter's parish shall accept of xxl. of the Tresurer of the County, in full of xxxl. which the Ouerseers of the sayd parish lent him for victualling of the Towne for five yeares agon, in regard that the fish, which was bought with the sayd money, was bestowed amongst the pore of the Towne after the surrender of this Towne to the King's party." C. 12.

- 1648, May 12. "This day, vpon Mr. Maior's mocion, divers of the Townesmen did agree that a generall rate shall bee had and collected, to pay 2 monethes rate towards the payment of the Inkeepers and Alehowsekeepers for quartering the souldiers of Sir Tho: Fairefax." C. 12.
- 1648, Sept. 15. "It is ordered and agreed that the Towne Steward shall pay vnto Constable Pitt and the other Constable the somme of ten pounds, five shillings and six pence, which they have layed out for the charge and quartering of souldiers in the time of the wars, according to a bill deliuered in and putt vpon the file." C. 12.
- 1648, Nov. 1. "This day George Purdew was heere with order for digging and making of powder, and hath an order and liberty from the Parliament to dig and make powder there." C. 12.
- 1650, July 5. "It is agreed that Mr. Bury should be desired to charge his account of Tr'ership with 100li., which the Towne lent the State, Anno 1643, and 20li. which Mr. Savage paid to his Company of Souldiers, as payd to the Towne (although it be not) there having ben an order from the Committee for payment thereof . . . And that 58li., which Colonel Sydenham oweth the Brewhouse for beare while he lived at Weym°, shall be charged as payd also." C. 12.
- 1650, July 19. "It is ordered that Mr. Cole, the Towne Steward, shall pay vnto Henry Hillard the somme of three pounds, fifteene shillings, in full of his demands for worke don in time of the wars at the Avenues of the Towne, being one halfe of his bill. And that he allow all his Arreares due to the Towne, for the wast ground which he holds, of the said 3h. 15s." C. 12.
- I651, Oct. 15. "Received of Maior Ebery, Maior of Maior Generall Desboroughe Regiment of Foote, the day aboue written a purse of mony in which is, as he sayth, 36h. sealed vp, which he deposited with me, to be kept by me vntill I shall haue ordre vnder the Maior Generall's hand, or by word of mouth from him to [pay] it agayn, which I promised to doe. Richard Sauage, Maior. Witnes, Patroclus Cooke, Willm. Riall. Paid the mony agayn the 30 October, 1651, to Captayne Newborough, per the Maior Generall's letter as appears on the File." C. 12.
- 1651, Nov. 7. "For doubling of 158h. which was lent for the Parliament's vse, vidz., 100h. in the yeare 1643, and

58li. in the yeare 1645. Mr. John Bushrod is desired to take vp these monyes following, vidz.:

1653, June 17. The Towne will place forth the second daughter of widow of Wm. Wyer, he having been drowned at Jersey in service under Col. Heanes. C. 12.

1653, Sept. 19. "Rec' from Jersey, from the Governor and souldiers there, the some of fifteene poundes collected there, and desired to bee ymployed to and for the vse and benefitt of the widdow Wyarr, late wife of Wm. Wyarr, drowned att Jersey, and for the benefit of her children." C. 12.

1654, June 2. Robert Cardrow claimed old arrears due to him for quartering of the Ld. of Crawford's men. £3 paid him in full of all such demands. C. 12.

1658, April 4. "William Chase, lately a trooper and farrier, desired leave to dwell in Towne and keepe a victualling house. To whome was answered that hee might come and dwell in Towne freely, but wee should not grant him a license for an Alehouse without the approbacion of Gen. Desborough or Capt. Southwood and Major Dewey." C. 12.

Fortifications of Weymouth.

1658, Sept. 10. Mr. Gilbert Whiffen desires to be paid the money he had expended by order of the Town, "for the charge of Labourers laid upon this town, towards the rayseinge the Fortifications at Waymouth."

1658, Sept. 17. The Town Steward is ordered to pay him £6 for what he paid for the town "in time of the wars at Weymouth." C. 15.

The Recruiting Act of 1756.

The Minute Book, C. 35, contains three written leaves only, recording a meeting of the Corporation 22nd March, 1756, pursuant to a notice from Harry Meggs, Esq., Sheriff of Dorset, when James Chaffey, gent., Mayor, Wm. Bryer, Thomas Cooper, Wm. Templeman and George Arden, gentlemen, Justices of the Peace for the Borough, qualified themselves for putting in execution an Act of 29 George II., "For the speedy and effectual recruiting his Majesty's Land Forces and Marines," by taking the several oaths required. At the same time the Commissioners elected Mr. George Cooper to be their clerk, and instructed the Constables to search for such able-bodied men as were fit to serve and bring them to the Guildhall, on 6th April following, when, if adjudged within the description of the Act, they would be enlisted and delivered into the King's service.

The outcome of these proceedings is distinctly amusing. One man, named Thomas Holme, was apprehended, but on examination was found to be "bursten bellyed," and was discharged, 6th April, 1756. The corpus vile was found in the person of a Devonshire man, who unluckily chanced to be in Dorchester, one Nicholas Smith, of Sydbury, Devon, vellmonger, who was apprehended and "delivered over to Captain Bar. Cope, of Lord Charles Hay's Regiment of Foot [33rd Regiment], for which man the said Captain paid unto the said Constables the sum of 20s., and also 12s. for keeping him and another man (whom the said Captain refused to take, not being within the description of the said Act) twelve days in custody, and to the Commissioners' clerk the sum of 2s. pursuant to the direction of the said Act." 22 Jan., 1757. No more appears to have been done under the Act.

Billetting Dragoon Horses.

Boro' of Dorchester, 15th January, 1795.

Honored Sir,

A Complaint on Oath being made before me by Thomas Wrinch, Quarter Master in his Majesty's First or Royal Dragoons, against Thomas Johnson, an Inn keeper in this Borough, stating that an allowance of eighteen pounds weight of Hay, and six pounds weight of Straw for litter, provided by him, together with the allowance of corn are not sufficient for a Troop Horse; (but there was no complaint of the Hay

not being good and proper, it being water-meadow Hay, the common produce in this neighbourhood). The said Thomas Johnson alleged in his defence that it was regulated by the War Office, and adopted by several towns in this kingdom where Dragoons were quartered, that the stated quantity of eighteen pounds weight of Hay, and six pounds weight of Straw is sufficient for each Dragoon Horse per day. I beg the honor of a line if such stipulations have been made in order to regulate my conduct on this occasion. Cr. Arden, Mayor. The Rt. Honble. Wm. Wyndham, War Office, London. C. 42a.

War Office, 17th January, 1795.

Sir,

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 15th inst., and after returning you the Secretary of War's thanks for the attention which you are therein pleased to shew to His Majesty's service, I have to acquaint you that no line has been drawn under the sanction of Government in regard to the quantity of Hay and Straw to be furnished by the Innholders for the Dragoon Horses billetted upon them.

The Secretary at War very readily admits, and it has in several Instances been said both to the Magistrates and to the Troops, that confining the question merely to the weight of Hay and Straw sufficient for a Horse for 24 Hours, it might fairly be determined by the proportion allowed to the Troops in Barracks; But how to regulate the mode and time of delivery; how to supply the means of which the Non-commissioned officers and Soldiers at every stable must be put in possession of, to ascertain that the fixed quantity is actually delivered to them; and what is still more indispensably necessary, to give them the certain means of keeping that quantity apart,-applicable only to their own Horses, and safe from the depredations of the many persons who have the same access to the stables as the Soldiers, and at all Hours of the day and night while the Soldiers are absent either on duty or at rest. These several circumstances present such difficulties as to render it scarcely possible to adopt the measure proposed without real injury to the King's Service; besides occasioning more frequent disputes than even now arise between the Troops and Innholders, and more frequent trouble to the Magistrates in settling them.

The Legislature seems purposely to have left the quantity unlimited, and has vested the Magistrates with the power of determining on any complaint made before them, whether the quantity supplied was, or was not, good and sufficient: and Mr. Windham conceives the Magistrates are bound to govern themselves by the law as it now stands. M. Lewis. The Mayor of Dorchester. C. 42a.

Danger of Invasion.

The assistance given by the town when the country was alarmed by Napoleon's preparations for the invasion of England is displayed in the following paragraphs:—

1798, Feb. 26. "Unanimously resolved that towards the Defence of our Country against the threatened attacks of our Enemies the sum of Fifty pounds be immediately subscribed, and annually continued during the present War; and that an Entertainment usually given by the Mayor at Michaelmas be discontinued, and the sum allowed for the defraying that Expence be applied for the above purpose.

The Corporation having expended a considerable sum in the Building a new Town Hall prevents them from contributing more largely, and agreeable to their wishes on the present alarming Crisis." C. 42a.

BURGAGE LIST OR RATE, 1737.

The bundle numbered B. 51 contains three rolls, the first of which is here printed, and is dated 1737. The second is entitled "Burgage Rate, 1764," and the third, "A Rental of all the Lands, Burgages, and Tenements of this Borough, renewed at the Feast of Saint Michael old style," 10 George III., 1770. Morgan Yeatman, Mayor.

The payments remain apparently unchanged throughout this period.

Straggling Seamen.

A copy of an Order in Council, 26th Sept., 1787, addressed to Lord Digby, as Custos Rotulorum of the County of Dorset, requiring him to call upon the Justices of the Peace to cause "all straggling Seamen and Seafaring men, who are fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, to be taken up and sent by proper persons from place to place vntil they shall be brought to the Clerk of the Cheque of His Majesty's Yards at Deptford, Woolwich, Chatham, Sheerness, Portsmouth or Plymouth, or to the Naval Officer at Harwich or Deal, . . . so that they may be put on board such of His Hajesty's Ships or vessels as shall be appointed to receive. . . ."

This is accompanied by a letter from Jno. Wallis, Dorchester, 8 Oct., 1787, by Lord Digby's command, to the Mayor of Dorchester, desiring his active assistance on the occasion. (Sheet of foolscap.) B. 59.

Carriage of Goods.

Rates of Carriage of Goods settled at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held at Sherborne in and for the County of Dorset on Tuesday in the first week after the Clause of Easter, to wit the 14th day of April, 1795. For every hundredweight of goods brought from London and Westminster to the Towns of Cranborne, Wimborne Minster, Blandford and Shaston, in the said County of Dorset, the sum of five shillings and sixpence for every hundredweight, and so in proportion for a greater or less quantity than one hundredweight from each of those places to the Cities of London and Westminster.

To Cerne Abbas, Dorchester and Sherborne the sum of six shillings. To Bridport, Broadwinsor and Charmouth the sum of seven shillings.

The above Rate and Assessment transmitted to the Mayor of this Borough by Mr. William Burnet, Clerk of the Peace of the said County of Dorset, 25th May, 1795. C. 42a.

Dorchester Acts of Parliament.

An Act for better cleansing, lighting and watching the streets, lanes and other public passages within the Borough of Dorchester, in the County of Dorset, and in the Tithing of Colliton-Row, in the Town of Dorchester aforesaid; for paving the footways, and repairing certain horseways of such parts thereof as are turnpike; and for paving the footways and repairing the horseways of such parts thereof as are not turnpike; for removing nuisances, annoyances and obstructions therein, and for preventing houses or buildings hereafter to be erected in the said Borough and Tithing, from being thatched. 16 George III., Chap. 27 [1775-6].

An Act for better paving, cleansing, lighting, watching, watering and otherwise improving the streets and other public passages and places within the Borough of Dorchester in the County of Dorset, and the Tithing of Colliton-Row, in the Town of Dorchester aforesaid. 4 William IV., Chap. 16 [1833-4].

Seaton Parsonage.

1630, Dec. 13. "It is agreed on that whereas 100% is borowed of Mr. Bateman towards the buying in of Seaton Parsonage that Mr. Bailiff Bond and Mr. Bailiff Savage shall become bownd for it and that Beniamyn Devenish shall pay it out of the Brewhouse when it shall become payable."

"It is agreed that this yeare there shall be 100*li*. taken out of the profitts of Seaton Parsonage towards the mayntenance of the ministers in Dorchester, viz., to bee this yeare

Trinity Free School.

1637, Aug. 18. Whereas Christopher Gould hath delivered unto Mr. Maior and the Company a noate of the charges in new building a room adjoining to the schoole in the Trinity parish and in repairing the schoole coming to 5*h*. 4s. 11*d*. Now it is agreed that he bestowed a great deale more than he had any order for, this Company will not consent to allow him

the whole charges, but 40s. only, which is ordered to be paid out of the profitts of Mrs. Gould's* money given to the said schoole which is now in the Brewhouse. J. Hill, Maior, H. Maber, W. Whiteway, J. Allenbrig, Will. Derbie, W. Joliff, R. Burie, E. Dashwood. C. 9.

1639-40, Jan. 10. Agreed that the schoole in the Trinity parish be speedily repaired. There is money set apart for it in the Brewhouse account. C. 12.

1639-40, Feb. 21. Trinity Schoole. It is ordered that nine shillings and nine pence be paid to Christopher Gould by the Steward of the Hospitall out of the profitt of Mrs. Gould's guift in the Brewhouse of the last year, for soe much money by him laid out in reparation of the house. C. 12.

1640, Sept. It is agreed that £2 5. o. laid out by Christopher Gould for repairing Trinity Schoole and the stable used therewith shall be repaid to him out of the profitt of Mrs. Gould's money given to that schoole, it being the last year deposited in Benjamin Devenish's hands for that sake. It is now agreed by Mr. Maior and the Company that the agreement made by Mr. Joliff and Mr. Maber shall stand with John Bushrode, and pay him xxs. for the tyme past, to resume the parts of the garden which Christopher Gould lately had, and Christopher Gould to hold and enjoy that parte of the stable and the passage from the garden to the office for ten years at xxs. rent. John Bushrode may have his passage through the churchyard from his house to the garden, and that xxs. be paid quarterly, and that John Bushrode shall pay the town rent for tyme to come, and the rent in arrere being 11. 12s. at midsummer last be paid to the Stewards out of the profit of Mrs. Gould's money in the Brewhouse given to the Trinity School. C. 12.

1648, Oct. 27. Ordered that Christopher Gould be paid ixh. xviis. vid. out of the proffits of Mrs. Gould's money now in Brewhouse. C. 12.
