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
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

#### HISTORICAL.

#### THE SOCIETY OF COLONIAL WARS

in the United States originated in the City of New York during the summer of 1892. Several preliminary meetings were held in that city during the months of June and July to discuss the proposed Society, and the names of the gentlemen who attended those meetings and to whom the Society owes its existence are as follows:

The immediate outcome of these various meetings was the institution of the

## SOCIETY OF COLONIAL WARS IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK,

which was organized August 19th, 1892, and which has always been the largest and one of the most active Societies in the country.

Its first General Court was held December 19th, 1892, and Mr. Frederick J. de Peyster was elected its Governor. Upon the organization of the General Society, Mr. de Peyster was elected Governor General, and it is a note-

worthy fact that he has continuously filled the important position of Governor of the New York Society and Governor General of the General Society at all times since they were respectively organized.

Prior to the institution of the General Society, charters were granted by the New York Society to Societies in Pennsylvania, Maryland, Massachusetts, Connecticut and the District of Columbia.

#### The Pennsylvania Society

was organized in Philadelphia, January 23rd, 1893. Its headquarters are in the "Old Congress Hall," the building in which the first Congress of the United States held its sessions from 1790 to 1800. Christ Church in Philadelphia was officially selected as the chapel of the Society, and it holds an annual religious service in that church.

#### The Maryland Society

was organized on "Colonial Day," March 25th, 1893, being the 259th anniversary of the landing of the first Maryland Colonists under Leonard Calvert.

#### The Massachusetts Society

was organized April 5th, 1893, and has been uniformly active in the general work of the Society. It has awarded prizes to students of the public schools for essays upon subjects pertaining to Colonial History, and its pilgrimages to the different battle fields and places of historical interest within the limits of the State have been unusually interesting and profitable. It numbers in its membership some of the best known writers on New England History and its various publications contain much of special interest and of original research.

#### The Connecticut Society

was organized April 26th, 1893. Its General Courts are held alternately at Hartford and New Haven on the first Wednesday of May, in commemoration of the first General Court of the Colony of Connecticut, which was held at Hartford, May 1st, 1687. In 1896 this Society erected a beautiful tablet at the "Judge's Cave."

The Society in the District of Columbia was organized May 20th, 1893, and its General Court is held December 19th, the anniversary of the "Great Swamp Fight."

# THE GENERAL SOCIETY OF COLONIAL WARS was instituted May 9th and 10th, 1893, in the Governor's room, City Hall, New York, by delegates from the six Societies above named. It consists of the Societies now existing and such other State Societies as it may charter

from time to time.

It has sole power to act in National affairs as distinct from those pertaining to the affairs of the State Societies. It has jurisdiction to pass upon all questions of eligibility referred to it by the Registrar General, but does not otherwise interfere in the regulation or government of any State Society. It issues insignias and diplomas of membership, and publishes the Annual Register with the cooperation of the several State Societies.

The regular meetings of the General Society are termed "General Assemblies," and are held once in three years, at such time and place as may be fixed by the preceding General Assembly. The first General Assembly was held in the Governor's room, City Hall, New York, May 9th,

1893, the second in Carpenter's Hall, Philadelphia, Pa., May 7th and 8th, 1893, and the third in Baltimore, Maryland, May 9th and 10th, 1899.

The General Council is composed of the officers of the General Society and exercises all of its powers between the meetings of the General Assembly, to which body it regularly reports all of its transactions. The General Council meets semi-annually in the months of November and May, on such days as may be fixed by the Governor General.

The flag of the General Society consists of the Red Cross of St. George on a white field, bearing in the center the Escutcheon of the Society surmounted by a crown and surrounded by nine stars.

Since the organization of the General Society it has granted Charters to Societies in the following States, viz:

New Jersey, Virginia, New Hampshire, Vermont, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, Nebraska, Minnesota, Kentucky, California, Colorado, Iowa, Georgia, Michigan, Wisconsin, Delaware, Rhode Island, Washington and Maine.

owes its existence very largely to the efforts of Messrs. Rukard Hurd, Charles Henry Whipple and Charles Phelps Noyes. All of these gentlemen were members of the Society in other states, and as the result of their joint efforts a petition for the organization of the Society in Minnesota was signed on the 1st day of October, 1895, by Messrs. Rukard Hurd, Charles Phelps Noyes, Clinton Brooks Sears, Fayette Washington Roe, George Henry

Daggett, Charles Henry Whipple, Fielder Bowie Chew, Edward Payson Ingersoll, Philip Reade, Stephen Jewett, Henry Benjamin Hill and Harry Edward Whitney, who thereby became the charter members of the Society.

The charter was issued by the General Society December 19th, 1895, and the first meeting of the charter members was held January 15th, 1896, at which the officers for the ensuing year were elected.

The first General Court of the Society was held at the Aberdeen, Feb. 10th, 1896, and a Constitution and By-Laws were adopted, and the usual banquet was served.

The Society includes in its membership a large number of gentlemen who are active and enthusiastic in its affairs, but it is not too much to say that its early history was largely determined by the three gentlemen above named to whom it owes its existence and whose efforts in its behalf, to a great extent, shaped its future course and made possible its later success.

Major Whipple was the first Secretary of the Society and continued to act in that capacity until January 6th, 1898, when he resigned on account of his removal from the state. On that date the society numbered one hundred and three members, and in recognition of the services rendered by Major Whipple the Council adopted appropriate resolutions and ordered them to be engrossed upon parchment, and to be framed and sent to him.

When the Society was organized, its Constitution provided that the General Court should be held on February 10th, the anniversary of the Treaty of Paris, but beginning in December, 1897, the General Court has been held on December 19th, the anniversary of the "Great

Swamp Fight." By a recent change in the Constitution the Council is given authority to fix the date of the Annual meeting upon any suitable date in December.

#### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

#### CONSTITUTION.

#### ARTICLE I.

#### NAME OF THE SOCIETY.

This Society shall be known by the name of the "Society of Colonial Wars in the State of Minnesota," and the principal office shall be St. Paul, Minnesota. It recognizes the authority of the "General Society of Colonial Wars," and all its proceedings shall be subject to the Constitution of said General Society.

#### ARTICLE II.

#### OBJECTS OF THE SOCIETY.

The Society of Colonial Wars is instituted to perpetuate the memory of the events of American Colonial History, and of the men who, in military and naval service, and in civil positions of trust and responsibility, by their acts or counsel, assisted in the establishment, defense and preservation of the American Colonies, and were in truth the founders of the Nation. To this end it seeks to collect and preserve manuscripts, rolls, relics and records; to provide suitable commemorations or memorials of events in Colonial History; to inspire in its members the fraternal and patriotic spirit of their forefathers, and in the community respect and reverence for those whose public services made our freedom and unity possible.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

Any man above the age of twenty-one years, of good moral character and reputation shall be eligible to membership in this Society, provided that he is lineally descended in either male or female line from an ancestor;

- (1) Who served as a military, naval or marine officer, or as a soldier, sailor or marine, or as a privateersman, under the authority of the Colonies which afterward formed the United States, or in the forces of Great Britain which participated with those of the said Colonies in any wars in which the said Colonies were engaged, or in which they enrolled men, from the settlement of Jamestown, May 13, 1607, to the battle of Lexington, April 19, 1775; or
- (2) Who held office in any of the Colonies between the dates above mentioned, either as
- (a) President, Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Member of the King's Council and County Lieutenant, or Member of the House of Burgesses in the Colony of Virginia.
- (b) Governor-General, Governor, Lieutenant or Deputy Governor, President, Assistant, Member of the Governor's Council, Deputy or Representative in the General Council, Deputy or Representative in the General Court in any of the New England Colonies; or as President of the Provincial Congress of Massachusetts, or as one of the Commissioners of the United States of New England.
- (c) Director-General, Vice-Director General, Governor or Deputy Governor, Member of the Council or the

Landtag of the Colony of New Netherlands, or of the Dutch Colony on the Delaware.

- (d) Palatine, Lord Proprietor, Governor, Deputy Governor, Lieutenant Governor or President, Member of the Council, Member of the Lower House or of Assembly of the Colonies of Maryland or the Carolinas.
- (e) Governor or Lieutenant Governor, Member of the Council or of the Colonial Assembly in the Colony of New York.
- (f) Lord Proprietor, Governor, Deputy Governor, Member of the King's Council, Deputy to the Provincial Assembly, in the Provinces of East Jersey, West Jersey or New Jersey.
- (g) Lord Proprietor, Governor, Deputy or Lieutenant-Governor, Member of the Provincial Council or Assembly of the Province of Pennsylvania, or Member of the Assembly of the Territories of Delaware.
- (h) Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, President, Vice-President, Member of the Council of the Provincial Assembly of the Colony of Georgia.
- (i) Governor-General, Captain General or Lord Lieutenant of the British Colonies in North America."

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### OFFICERS.

The officers of the Society shall be a Governor, a Deputy Governor, a Lieutenant Governor, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Registrar, a Chancellor, a Historian, a Genealogist, a Chaplain and a Surgeon, all of whom shall be ex-officio members of the Council. They shall hold office for one year or until their successors shall be duly elected and qualified.

#### ARTICLE V.

GENTLEMEN OF THE COUNCIL AND COMMITTEES.

There shall be a Council consisting of the officers and former Governors of the Society and nine members in addition thereto, who shall be called "Gentlemen of the Council." At the first election three Gentlemen of the Council shall be elected for a term of one year, three for a term of two years and three for a term of three years, and thereafter at each election three Gentlemen of the Council shall be elected for a term of three years.

There shall be a Committee on Membership consisting of five members and a Committee on Collection of Historical Documents and Records, likewise consisting of five members and they shall respectively hold office for one year or until their successors shall be duly elected and quantified.

#### ARTICLE VI.

#### ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The officers above named together with the Gentlemen of the Council and members of the Committees shall be elected by plurality ballot vote at the General Court. Not less than thirty days before the General Court the Society shall elect by ballot a Nominating Committee consisting of five members, (none of whom shall be officers of the Society or Gentlemen of the Council) and not less than fifteen days before the General Court this committee shall mail to every member a proposed list of the various Officers, Gentlemen of the Council and members of the Committees to be elected as aforesaid.

#### ARTICLE VII.

#### ADMISSION OF MEMBERS.

Any person desiring to be admitted to membership in this Society shall sign and present to the Council a Preliminary Application therefor which shall state the name of the ancestor from whom eligibility is traced and in general terms the service rendered by such ancestor, together with the names of two members of the Society to whom the applicant refers. This Preliminary Application shall be referred to the Membership Committee who shall make written report thereon to the Council.

If the Preliminary Application is approved by the Council the applicant shall sign and submit an Application for Membership which must contain a statement in detail of the service of the ancestor from whom eligibility is traced, together with a reference to the authorities from which proof of such service may be obtained and which must also be signed by two members of the Society as evidence of their approval thereof. The Application for Membership shall be referred to the Genealogist, who shall carefully investigate the same and make written report thereon to the Council. If the report of the Genealogist is favorable the Council may by ballot vote admit the applicant to membership in the Society, provided, however, that at least four-fifths of the members present and voting must in all cases vote in favor thereof. Payment of the initiation fee and dues shall be a prerequisite of membership.

No person who may be admitted as a member of the Society shall be permitted to remain a member thereof after his supposed proofs of descent or eligibility have been found to be defective. In all such cases the Council shall by vote fix a reasonable time within which such person may sbstantiate his claim by further and sufficient proof and a copy of this vote shall be furnished to him by the Secretary.

In the event of his failure to furnish proper proof to support his claim, the Council shall cause the name of such person to be erased from the membership list and his membership in the Society shall thereby cease and determine.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

#### DECLARATION.

Every member shall declare upon honor that he will use his best efforts to promote the purposes of the Society and will observe the Constitution and By-Laws of the same; and shall sign a declaration that he will support the Constitution of the United States.

#### ARTICLE IX.

#### COMMEMORATION.

The Society shall celebrate yearly some important event in Colonial History, as a festival day, and its members shall dine together at least once in each year when practicable.

#### ARTICLE X.

#### SEAL.

The seal shall be—a title scroll "1607-1775. Society of Colonial Wars in the State of Minnesota," surrounding the emblem of the Seal of the State of Minnesota.

The Secretary shall be the Custodian of the Seal.

#### ARTICLE XI.

#### INSIGNIA, ROSETTE AND DIPLOMA.

The Insignia, Rosette and Diploma shall be the same as those of the General Society.

#### ARTICLE XII.

#### FLAG.

The Flag of this Society shall consist of the Red Cross of Saint George on a white field having in the center an escutcheon bearing the Seal of the Society.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

#### ALTERATION AND AMENDMENT.

This Constitution shall not be amended unless written notice signed by the member proposing the amendment has first been filed with the Secretary. When any amendment is thus proposed the Secretary shall send to every member of the Society a printed copy thereof, and shall also state the date of the Court at which the amendment will be voted upon. No amendment shall be adopted unless two-thirds of the members present vote in favor thereof.

#### BY-LAWS.

#### SECTION I.

#### FEES AND DUES.

The initiation fee shall be Fifteen Dollars. The annual dues shall be Five Dollars payable in advance on January 1st of each year. The payment of Fifty Dollars at one time shall constitute a person a life member and shall be in lieu of an initiation fee and of all annual dues. Members admitted at any time between the date of the Annual Meeting and October 1st of the succeeding calendar year shall pay the annual dues for the current society year, but members admitted between October 1st and the next succeeding Annual Meeting shall pay no annual dues for the year in which they are thus admitted.

Annual dues unpaid on March 1st of each year shall be considered in arrears and the Council shall have the power to drop from the rolls the name of any member of the Society whose annual dues remain in arrears at the date of the next annual meeting, and who shall fail upon proper notice to pay the same within sixty days thereafter. Upon being dropped from the rolls by the Council his membership in the Society shall cease, but the Council may at any time in its discretion reinstate a member thus dropped upon his written application and upon the payment of all annual dues from the date when he was dropped to the date of his reinstatement.

#### SECTION II.

#### RESIGNATION.

No resignation of any member shall become effective unless consented to by the Council.

#### SECTION III.

#### SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION.

For conduct detrimental to the interests of the Society or inconsistent with the character of a gentleman and a man of honor any member may be suspended or expelled. But no member shall be suspended or expelled unless written charges against him have first been presented to the Council.

The Council shall cause a copy of the charges preferred against any member of the Society to be delivered to him, and shall afford him reasonable opportunity to be heard in relation thereto. After hearing the evidence concerning such charges the Council may, in its discretion, recommend to the Society the expulsion or suspension of such member, and the Society shall act thereon at some Court of which due notice has been given to the member against whom the charges have been presented.

The insignia shall be returned to the Treasurer by any member who may withdraw, resign or be expelled, and in such cases the money paid therefor shall be refunded.

#### SECTION IV.

#### VACANCIES AND TERMS OF OFFICE.

Vacancies in any office, or in the Council or in any Committee, whether occasioned by death, resignation or by the failure of the Society to elect, shall be filled by the Council for the balance of the current Society year. If any officer of the Society shall be suspended, or neglect to serve, or be unable to perform his duties by reason of absence, sickness or other cause, the Council shall have power to declare his office vacant or to appoint a member to discharge the duties thereof until the inability of such officer shall cease. If any member of the Council, other than an officer or former Governor, shall be absent from three consecutive Council meetings, without sufficient excuse, his office may be declared vacant by the Council, which may appoint another member for the unexpired term thereof. For good cause shown the Council may suspend any officer of the Society, but in such event its action must be reported to the Society for approval within thirty days.

#### SECTION V.

GOVERNOR, DEPUTY GOVERNOR AND LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

The Governor shall preside at all Courts of the Society and at all meetings of the Council and shall be a member ex-officio of all Committees except the Nominating Committee and the Committee on Membership. He shall have power to convene the Council at his discretion or upon the request of two of its members, and shall have such other powers as may be incident to his office, or which may be conferred upon him by the Constitution and By-Laws.

If the Governor is absent from any Court of the Society or from any meeting of the Council the Deputy Governor shall preside, and he shall have such other

powers as may be conferred upon him by the Constitution and By-Laws.

If the Governor and Deputy Governor are both absent from any Court of the Society or from any meeting of the Council the Lieutenant Governor shall preside and he shall have such other powers as may be conferred upon him by the Constitution and By-Laws.

#### SECTION VI.

#### CHAPLAIN.

The Chaplain shall be an ordained minister of a Christian church and it shall be his duty to officiate when called upon by the proper officers.

#### SECTION VII.

#### CHANCELLOR.

The Chancellor shall be a lawyer duly admitted to the bar, and it shall be his duty to give a legal opinion on any matter affecting the Society when called upon by the proper officers.

#### SECTION VIII.

#### SECRETARY.

The Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society, and keep a record thereof. He shall notify all persons elected to membership in the Society, and perform such other duties as the Society or his office may require. He shall have charge of the Seal, Certificates of Incorporation, Constitution, By-Laws, historical and other documents and records of the Society other than those required to be deposited with the Registrar,

and shall affix the seal to all properly authenticated certificates of membership, and transmit the same to members to whom they may be issued. He shall notify the Registrar of all admissions to membership. He shall certify all acts of the Society, and when required authenticate them under seal. He shall have charge of printing and publications issued by the Society. He shall give due notice of the time and place of the holding of all Courts of the Society and of the Council, and shall incorporate in said notice the names of all applicants for membership to be voted on at said Council, and shall be present at the same. He shall keep fair and accurate records of all the proceedings and orders of the Society and of the Council, and shall give notice to each officer who may be affected by them, of all votes, resolutions and proceedings of the Society or the Council and at the General Court, or oftener, shall report the names of those candidates who have been admitted to membership, and shall read the names of those members whose resignations have been accepted or who have been expelled for cause or for failure to substantiate claim of descent. In his absence from any meeting a Secretary pro tem. may be designated therefor.

#### SECTION IX.

#### TREASURER.

The Treasurer shall collect and keep the funds and securities of the Society and deposit and invest them subject to the credit of the Society of Colonial Wars, in the State of Minnesota. Out of these funds he shall pay such sums only as may be ordered by the Society or

Council or his office may require. He shall keep a full account of receipts and payments, and shall render an account of the same to the Society at each annual meeting.

For the faithful performance of his duty he may be required to give such security as the Society may deem proper.

#### SECTION X.

#### HISTORIAN.

The Historian shall keep a detailed record of all historical and commemorative celebrations of the Society, and in conjunction with the Secretary shall edit and prepare for publication such historical addresses, papers, and other documents as the Society or Council may see fit to publish. He shall also prepare a necrological list for each year, with biographies of deceased members, which he may be called upon to read at meetings of the Society.

#### SECTION XI.

#### REGISTRAR.

The Registrar shall receive and file all the proofs upon which membership or supplemental ancestral records have been granted, with a list of all diplomas countersigned by him, and all documents which the Society may obtain; and he, under direction of the Council, shall make copies of such papers as the owners may not be willing to leave in the keeping of the Society.

#### SECTION XII.

#### GENEALOGIST.

The Genealogist shall investigate all applications for membership and also all supplemental applications, and shall make written report thereon to the Council. He shall receive such salary or compensation as the Council may fix and determine. The Genealogist shall be exofficio a member of the Committee on Membership.

#### SECTION XIII.

#### SURGEON.

The Surgeon shall be a practicing physician.

#### SECTION XIV.

#### COUNCIL.

The Council shall meet at the call of the Governor or Secretary, or upon the written request of two of its members. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The council shall have general control and management of all the affairs and funds of the Society and shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed in the Constitution and By-Laws. 'It shall cause a report of the proceedings of the Society to be made at the General Court, and it may, in its discretion, appoint committees to transact any business under its direction and control.

#### SECTION XV.

#### MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE.

The Membership Committee shall be chosen by ballot at the General Court of the Society and shall consist of five members. The proceedings of the Committee shall be secret and confidential, and it shall have the power to make such rules and regulations for the transaction of its business as are not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society.

### SECTION XVI.

#### COURTS.

The Council shall have authority to fix the date of the General Court, provided, however, that it shall in all cases be held during the month of December. Unless otherwise ordered by the Council the General Court shall be held on December nineteenth, the anniversary of the Great Swamp Fight, and if this date falls on Sunday the General Court for that year shall be held on the preceding day. Other Courts shall be held at such times as the Council may fix and determine.

Special Courts may be called by the Governor or upon the written request of ten members, and the Secretary shall mail notice thereof to the members at least ten days prior thereto. Ten members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any Court of the Society.

### SECTION XVII.

#### ALTERATION AND AMENDMENT.

These By-Laws shall not be amended unless written notice signed by the member proposing the amendment has first been filed with the Secretary. When any amendment is thus proposed the Secretary shall send to all the members of the Society a printed copy thereof which shall also state the date of the Court at which the amendment shall be voted upon. No amendment shall be adopted unless two-thirds of the members present vote in favor thereof.

Governor of Virginia 1710-1723; Postmaster General of the Colonies; founded school for Indians; led an expedition across the Blue Ridge Mountains and also founded the order of the Knights of the Golden Horse Shoe; Major General of the expedition against Carthagena and died on the eve of embarkation; served on the staff of the Duke of Marlborough and was wounded at the battle of Blenheim, 1704.

## WILLIAM VASSALL.

William Vassall, of Eastwood, Essex, son of John Vassall and Anne Russell, was born in that place, August 27th, 1592, and died at Barbadoes in 1655. His grandfather, John Vassall, Sr., of Rinart, by Cany, Normandy, on account of disturbances at home, was sent into England, where he died young, leaving a son, John Vassall, of Ratcliffe, Stepney, and Cocksey-hurst, Eastwood, Essex. John Vassall, Jr. equipped and was Captain sucsively of the "Samuel" 140 tons, 70 men, and the "Tobey Ir.," likewise 140 tons, 70 men. He was in command of the last named vessel in the conflict with the Spanish Armada. He was thrice married; first to Anne Hewes, Sept. 25th, 1569; second to Anne Russell of Ratcliffe, Sept. 4th, 1580; she died May 5th, 1593, and he married Judith Borough as his third wife March 27th, 1594. He died of the plague Sept. 13th, 1625, and was buried at Stepney. His wife, Judith, survived him and died in 1638-9, her will being proved on January 29th of that year.

William Vassall was one of the original patentees of New England lands under the charter granted by Charles I. March 4, 1628-9 for the "Colony of the Massachusetts Bay in New England." On May 13, 1629, Mr. Mathew Cradocke was chosen Governor, and William Vassall one of eighteen Assistants. Oct. 20, 1629, Mr. John Winthrop was chosen Governor and William Vassall one of eighteen Assistants. He was present at the last recorded Court of the Assistants in England, held aboard the "Arbella," March 23, 1630, then at anchor off Cowes. He signed an agreement August 26, 1629, at Cambridge, with R. Saltonstall, Thomas Dudley, John Winthrop, Isaac Johnson, Increase Nowell, William Pyncheon and others to sail for New England, "to inhabit and continue" by 1st of March next. He came over with his family in 1630, but returned to England the same year in the ship Lyon, of Bristol, Pierce, master. He again came to New England in 1634 or 1635 as appears by the following entry in Rev. John Eliot's Record of Church Members, Roxbury, "Mrs. Anna Vassaile, the wife of Mr. William Vassaile. Her husband brought 5 children to this land, Judith, Frances, John, Margaret, Mary." He settled in Scituate, Plymouth Colony having made him a grant of 150 acres of land Dec. 3, 1638, provided he take the "oath of fidelitie." Feby. 1, 1638-9, he took the oath. He resided in Scituate until 1646, when he returned to England and in 1648 removed to Barbadoes, where he had extensive estates, and there died in 1655.

Governor Winthrop, writing of him in 1646, says. "One Mr. William Vassall, sometime one of the Assistants of the Massachusetts, but now of Scituate in Plymouth jurisdiction, a man of busy and factious spirit, and always opposite to the civil governments of this country and the way of our churches, had practiced with such as were not members of our churches to take some course, first petitioning the courts of Massachusetts and of Plymouth, and (if that succeeded not) then to the parliament of Eng-

land, that the distinctions which were maintained here both in civil and church estate might be taken away, and that we might be wholly governed by the laws of England; and accordingly a petition was drawn up to the parliament, pretending that they being free born subjects of England were denied the liberty of subjects, both in church and commonwealth, themselves and their children debarred from the seals of the covenant, except they would submit to such a way of entrance and church covenant, as their consciences could not admit, and take such a civil oath as would not stand with their oath of allegiance, or else they must be deprived of all power and interest in civil affairs, and were subjected to an arbitrary government and extrajudicial proceedings, &c."

The petition was not granted by Plymouth or Massachusetts or the Parliament of England as appears by another entry in Winthrop's Journal in 1648. "Here arrived three ships from London in one day. By the passengers we understood, as also by letters from Mr. Winslow &c. how the hopes and endeavors of Dr. Child and other the petitioners &c. had been blasted by the special providence of the Lord, who still wrought for us.

Dr. Child had a brother, a major of a regiment of Kent, who, being set on by his brother and William Vassall, (who went from Scituate to petition against the country &c.) set out a pamphlet, wherein he published their petition, exhibited to our General Court, and other proceedings of the Court. This was answered by Mr. Winslow in a book, entitled the Salamander, (pointing therein at Mr. Vassall, a man never at rest, but when he was in the fire of contention,) wherein he clears the jus-

tice of our proceedings. As for those who went over to procure us trouble, God met with them all. Mr. Vassall finding no entertainment for his petitions, went to Barbadoes." Hubbard in his General History of New England, "Mr. William Vassall one of the patentees, that came over in the year 1630, (when he was chosen an Assistant,) but not complying with the rest of his colleagues, nor yet able to make a party amongst them, returned for England soon after; but not satisfying himself in his return, came back again to New England in the year 1635, and then settled himself at Scituate, in the jurisdiction of New Plymouth; a man of pleasant and facetious wit, and in that respect complacent in company; but for his actings and designs of a busy and a factious spirit, and indeed a meer salamander by his disposition, that could take content in no element but that of the fire; and in his discourse did usually, in all companies, bear the part of Antilegon, as he was called by a friend of his, and was always found opposite to the government of the place where he lived, both ecclesiastical and civil." The History of Scituate in Mass. His. Soc'y Collections 1816, contains the following. "Mr. William Vassall, one of the Assistants and planters of Massachusetts, emigrated thence, it seems, to Scituate in Plymouth Colony as early as February 1, 1638, where he continued on his extensive plantation, which he called the "West Newland," until about 1650, when, having acguired great estates in the West Indies, he went there, and died in Barbadoes, 1655. His place of residence was in St. Michael's parish in that island. As he was of the Church of England, and adhered to its ceremonies, we do

not meet him in civil office; but the immediate government of Plymouth Colony evidently held him in just and deserved estimation, and on emergent occasions his worthy name occurs, as of the Council of War. He was clearly a public-spirited man, liberal in his opinions and views, though somewhat restless, and we should conclude the wealthiest person at that period in Plymouth Colony, even before the acquirement of the West India estates."

The will of William Vassall does not mention his wife, but gives one-third of his estate to his son, John Vassall, who is appointed executor, and two-thirds to his daughters Judith, wife of Resolved White, Frances, wife of James Adams, Anna, wife of Nicholas Ware, and to his daughters Margaret and Mary to be equally divided among them, each one to receive one-fifth thereof.

In the marriage licenses granted by the Bishop of London, Mr. H. F. Waters discovered the following entry.

"June 9 1613. William Vassall of Eastwood, Essex, yoeman, a bachelor aged about 20, son of John Vassall of the same parish, gent, with his said father's consent, and Anne Kinge of Cold Norton, spinster, about 20, daughter of George Kinge of Cold Norton, yoeman. George Kinge appeared and did give express consent; at Cold Norton."

Judith Vassall, daughter of William Vassall and Anne Kinge, married November 5, 1640 Resolved White, son of William White, who came in the Mayflower. Their children were:

William, born April 10, 1642. John, born March 11, 1644. Samuel, born March 13, 1646. Resolved, born Nov. 12, 1647. Anna, born June 4, 1649. Elizabeth, born June 4, 1652. Josiah, born Sept. 29, 1654.

Anna White married June 2, 1671, John Hayward of Concord, Mass., and died May 25, 1714. He died November 22, 1718. See double gravestone at Concord. Elizabeth White married July 17, 1672, Obadiah Wheeler of Concord, Mass.

Frances Vassall, daughter of William, married James Adams July 16, 1646. May 15, 1672, the General Court granted her "150 acres of land in any free place where it may be found." May 7, 1673, a plat of the farm selected was returned into the court, and approved. She was then of Concord, Mass., and "wife to James Addams and daughter to ye late Wm. Vassall."

## GOV. WILLIAM CODDINGTON.

Gov. William Coddington was born in Boston, Lincolnshire, England, in 1601; was made a freeman there Sept. 24, 1625, and about that time married Mary, daughter of Richard Moseley of Ouseden, Suffolk, England.

The Government of the Mass. Bay Colony was organized in England, with John Winthrop as Governor, Thomas Dudley as Deputy Governor and William Coddington as one of the Assistants, and they came to New England together in the ship "Arbella" in 1630 and assumed their duties immediately on their arrival in Boston.

His first wife died soon after reaching New England, and the following spring he went back to England where he married Mary, his second wife, and returned to Boston in 1633. He became a prominent merchant there, built the first brick house in Boston, continued in his office as Assistant, and served as Treasurer of the Colony from 1634 to 1636.

Coddington in 1637 supported Vane, who was of the Antinomian party, for Governor, in opposition to his old friend Winthrop. For this he was dropped from the Government, but the freemen of Boston immediately returned him as their Deputy. He then identified himself with the Antinomians, and in the trials of Rev. John Wheelwright and Mrs. Anne Hutchinson, he alone of the Magistrates was their firm supporter. Ellis, in his life of Mrs. Hutchinson, says that in these trials he urged indulgence and charity and that his firm stand was the more remarkable as he had more to lose than any on account of his popularity, wealth and prominence and that he would without doubt have been Governor of Mass. Bay Colony but for this action.

All who came under condemnation for sympathy with Mrs. Hutchinson were warned to remove from the Colony, and a small company, with Coddington at their head, purchased of Canonicus and Miantonomi, chief Sachems of the Narragansetts, the beautiful and fertile Island of Aquidneck, for "forty fathoms of white peag"; and for the additional gratuity of "ten coats and twenty hoes" the resident Indians agreed to move away. Here at Pocasset (Portsmouth), with Coddington as Judge they began a new settlement, a Christian state where all who

bore that name might worship God according to the dictates of conscience, untrammelled by written articles of faith and unawed by civil power. Their Civil Compact reads as follows:

"The 7th day of the first month 1638(7 Mch.1638). We whose names are underwritten do hereby solemnly in the presence of Jehovah incorporate ourselves into a Bodie Politick, and as he shall help will submit our persons, lives and estate unto Our Lord, Jesus Christ, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, and to all those perfect and most absolute laws of his given us in his holy word of truth to be guided and judged thereby."—Exod. XXIV 3, 4; 2 Chron. XI. 3; 2 Kings, XI. 17."

The following spring some moved to the southwest end of the Island, and began the settlement of Newport. Coddington, (as Judge) and eight others signed the agreement upon which the town was organized, 1639. Both towns were considered as belonging to the same Colony. In imitation, however, of the form of government which existed under the Judges of Israel during the period of the Hebrew Commonwealth, each of the two settlements called their chief magistrate Judge, Wm. Hutchinson being Judge of Portsmouth, and Coddington of Newport. Here he acquired a large property, and is said to have been the first in Newport to engage in commerce, for which that city became famous later.

In 1640 the two towns of Portsmouth and Newport united, and the title of the chief magistrate was changed to Governor. Coddington was elected to that office, and served until 1647.

A free and absolute charter was granted the Colony

by Parliament in 1644, and in May, 1647, the corporators met at Portsmouth and organized the new government under the charter. Coddington was one of the four Assistants chosen. The next year he was elected Chief Magistrate of Rhode Island, the title then being President.

He seems now to have headed the unsuccessful party who sought a union with the United Colonies of New England, and his willingness to make concessions to secure this union made him unpopular with the majority. He went again to England in 1649, and while there obtained from the Council of State, probably with the aid of his friend Sir Henry Vane, a commission dated Apl. 3, 1651, which appointed him Governor of Rhode Island for life, with a Council of six to assist him. This apparently annulled the Charter of 1644, and made him practically Dictator. The Island towns submitted silently, but the mainland towns refused to recognize his authority, met as before in General Assembly, and the feeling of resentment was very strong. It is said of him that "he was decidedly aristocratic in his tendencies and inclined to be autocratic in his dealings with his fellow colonists." "He had in him a little too much of the future for Massachusetts, and a little too much of the past for Rhode Island, as she then was."

The opposition to Coddington's usurpation grew. Roger Williams and John Clark were sent to England and succeeded in getting his commission revoked in 1652, and for a time he retired to private life.

His wife Mary had died in 1647, and during this last visit to England in 1649, he married his third wife, Ann

Brinley. He had joined the Friends and now espoused their cause with great vigor, and became one of their most distinguished champions.

For seven years he refused to lay down his Royal Commission as Governor, and it was not until 1656 that he finally publicly professed his submission. He was elected Commissioner the same day, and served until 1663, and was one of the patentees named in the "Great Charter" of 1663 incorporating the "Colony of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations" which served for 180 years as the organic law of the State until the Constitution was adopted in 1842. He was Deputy in 1666, Assistant 1666-7, Deputy Gov. 1673-4, and in 1674 at the age of seventy-three he was again elected Governor of the Colony, and re-elected in 1675, his two years of service at this time covering the critical period of the Narragansett war.

The Great Charter expressly provided that no Colony should declare war against the Narragansetts without the knowledge and consent of the Governor of Rhode Island and on this provision Coddington took his stand, and vigorously opposed the action of the United Colonies. While Rhode Island through its Executive protested, there were many volunteers who enlisted with the Colonial troops and took part in the Great Swamp Fight.

In the next general election, May, 1676, the war party were successful and Coddington was defeated. He now retired again from public life, but in Aug., 1678, on the death of Gov. Arnold, he was chosen Governor to fill the vacancy. When the next regular session of the Assembly was held, Oct. 30, 1678, it was announced that Gov. Coddington was on his death bed, and the Assembly adjourned.

He died Nov. 1, 1678, in the seventy-eighth year of his age, "a good man and full of days." Arnold says,—"He was a man of vigorous intellect, of strong passions, earnest in whatever he undertook, and self-reliant in all his actions. Such a man could not fail to occupy a prominent place in any community."

His portrait hangs in the State House at Providence and he is called by several historians the Father and Founder of Rhode Island.

## GOV. THOMAS HINCKLEY.

Thomas Hinckley, the last Governor of Plymouth Colony, was born in Tenterden, Kent County, England, about the year 1618. His parents, Samuel and Sarah Hinckley, with their four children, sailed from Sandwich in the ship Hercules, in the latter part of March, 1635. Arriving in Boston, they went at once to Scituate, where they remained some five years, and then removed to Barnstable.

From this town, Thomas Hinckley was elected Deputy to the General Court in 1645, and was frequently reelected till 1658. From that year until 1681 he was an Assistant, being also Deputy Governor in 1680. In 1681 he succeeded Josiah Winslow as Governor of the Colony, and held that office, except during the administration of Andros, until Plymouth was united with Massachuetts under the charter of 1692, in which he was named as one of the Councillors. He was one of the Council of Sir

Edmund Andros, (1686-9), like many others accepting the position "without any allowance from the public," for the purpose of protecting as far as possible the interests of the people. That his efforts were appreciated is shown by the fact that immediately upon the deposition of Andros, the former Governor was recalled to his office. He was for many years one of the Commissioners of the United Colonies. Meanwhile he was prominent in local affairs; was clerk of the town of Barnstable, judge of probate, and a member of the council of war.

He was a man of strong and upright character, great energy and vigorous intellect. When first elected Assistant he took the place of one who had failed of reelection because of his sympathies with the Quakers. Governor Hinckley seems to have considered the rights of this sect from a legal standpoint, and was an active supporter of strict legislation against them. This was a cause of regret to him in his later years. He is said to have been the best read lawyer in the colony. He argued a case at Plymouth as late as March 27th, 1705, less than a month before his will was presented for probate.

He had the general oversight and inspection of the government of the Indians in the colony; was empowered to hold court among them with jurisdiction in all (except capital) criminal cases and in all civil controversies, and took a deep interest in their spiritual and temporal welfare. In 1672 he was made steward of the income set apart for the maintenance of the first school established by law in Plymouth. During his whole public career he gave his best efforts to the establishment and sup-

port of a system of free schools. He also sought to have suitable provision made for the support of ministers of the gospel.

After the Revolution of 1689 in England, Governor Hinckley took a leading part in the attempt to procure for Plymouth a new and independent charter. John Cotton, urging him to visit London for this object, writes "I believe none amongst us will be free to trust any but yourself." He was unable to go, however, and the charter was never obtained.

He married December 4, 1641, Mary, daughter of Thomas and Welthean Richards of Weymouth, by whom he had eight children. She died June 25, 1659, and he married March 16, 1659/60, for his second wife, Mary, widow of Nathaniel Glover and only child of Quartermaster John Smith and his wife Mary (Ryder) Smith, of Dorchester. By her he had nine children. She was very beautiful, and is said to have been the most accomplished and intelligent woman in the colony. She died July 29, 1703, and verses written upon her death by her husband, then aged 85 years have been preserved. He died in April, 1705, at the age of 87, leaving a large estate, and was buried at Barnstable. In 1829 some of his descendants erected to his memory a stone which incorrectly states the year of his death and his age.

The numerous descendants of Governor Hinckley can read with pride this notice of him by Mr. Freeman: "A gentleman of distinguished reputation and of great energy of character, who, as we have seen, filled a large space in the history of the county of Barnstable, and especially in the affairs of the Plymouth Colony. In truth

it may be said it was his to fill a large space in the world's history. He had stood by the cradle of the colony in its infancy, and 'had been, from first to last, the associate, in weal or woe, of its great and good men, and had lived, himself the chief among the surviving, to see the last chapter written in its immortal annals."

## GOV. THOMAS MAYHEW.

Gov. Thomas Mayhew, of Martha's Vineyard, was a son of "Mathew Maow and Ales Barter" of Tisbury Wiltshire, England, and was baptized there April 1, 1593. He emigrated to New England in 1631 and settled in Watertown, Mass.

He had been a merchant in Southampton, England, and intended to engage in business here, but being disappointed in his plans, bought a farm at Watertown, and during the succeeding years received many important appointments from the General Court. He built the first bridge over the Charles River; was proprietor of the mill, the fishing weirs, and for a time of the Oldham Farm and the Bradstreet Farm in Cambridge. He also served as Deputy for Watertown from 1636 to 1644 except in 1642.

In 1641 the Earl of Stirling granted him a patent of Martha's Vineyard, Nantucket and Elizabeth Islands, in which it is stated that "the government Mayhew shall set up shall be such as is now established in the Massachusetts aforesaid." He started a colony of English fami-

lies in the Islands and sent with them as their pastor his only son Thomas, then but 21 years of age, whose work in civilizing and christianizing the Indians was remarkably successful from the beginning. Gov. Mayhew followed later and settled in Edgartown in 1647 when he became Governor, the "Lordship of the Isles" remaining in the family until 1710.

In 1657 his son, Rev. Thomas Mayhew, embarked for England, where he intended to make a short visit, but was lost at sea. Finding it impossible to procure anyone who understood the language to continue his son's work, Gov. Mayhew, although then 70 years of age, gave himself to the work of minister among the Indians, and continued it with such success until his death, that they refused to join in King Philip's War, but patrolled the shores and protected the islands from the warring tribes.

He died March 25, 1682, in the 90th year of his age, and the good work of "gospelizing the Indians" was successfully carried on by his descendants for several generations.

# MAJOR JOHN MASON.

Major John Mason, born in England in 1600, was one of the early emigrants to New England, who had been bred to arms in the religious and political wars of the Low Countries, in which he had served as Lieutenant, under Sir Thomas Fairfax. The military training there received was the best the age afforded, and men who had

been under its rigid discipline were indeed needed to meet the emergencies of the early settlement of our colonies.

Mason came to New England in 1630 and the first notice of him after his arrival associates him with John Gallup in an expedition sent by the Magistrates of Massachusetts against a company of pirates in 1632. In 1633 he was Captain of Militia at Dorchester, Mass., and in 1634 was appointed by the General Court to plan the fortifiations of Boston Harbor, and later the erection of a battery on Castle Island. He represented Dorchester at the General Court in 1634-1635. In 1635 he made the difficult journey to the banks of the Connecticut River, opening the way for Hooker and his company who followed in 1636. He was one of the pioneers and founders of Windsor, where he lived until 1647 when he removed to Saybrook "to have the oversight of the Fort." The slaughter of a party of white people at Wethersfield called for retaliatory measures, and Mason was commissioned by the General Court in 1637, to command the Connecticut forces in the war with the Pequots which followed. He thus became the leader in the most important single affair in all the early warfare of the Colonists with the Indians.

Soon after the close of the Pequot War, the General Court of Connecticut in 1638 made Mason the Major General of the Connecticut forces and he continued in this office until his death.

In 1658 he moved to Norwich where he lived during the remainder of his life.

He held every post of honor in the gift of the Colony,

save that of Governor. He was Assistant 1642 to 1660; Commissioner for the United Colonies 1647 to 1661; organized the First Connecticut Cavalry 1658; was Deputy Governor 1660 to 1670; Patentee of Connecticut, and Deputy Governor under the Royal Charter of Charles II 1662.

During the two years of Gov. Winthrop's absence in England to secure the charter, Maj. Mason, then Deputy Governor, discharged all the duties of Chief Magistrate.

Mason was the Indian Agent of the Colony to the close of his life. He was frequently sent to arbitrate, to quell rising feuds, to collect tribute and to endeavor to keep peace between the Mohegans and the Narragansetts, who, after the Pequot War, maintained incessant hostilities up to the time of King Philip's War.

At the request of the General Court of Connecticut, he prepared an account of the Pequot War, which was published by Increase Mather in 1677, and re-published 1736. He died in Norwich, Conn., 1672.

## CAPTAIN RICHARD BEERS.

Capt. Richard Beers was born in England in 1612 and came to Watertown, Mass., about 1630. He was admitted a freeman of Watertown in 1637, and was its Deputy to the General Court for thirteen years from 1663 to 1676. He was also selectman for a period of thirty-one years, and filled both these offices at the opening of King Philip's War. He was a soldier in the Pequot War in

1637, participating as he himself says "in two several designs, where the Lord delivered them into our hands."

He was a Sergeant at Watertown in 1642 when the Court ordered him to superintend "the breeding of salt-petre"; Lieutenant from 1665 to 1672, and commander of the Watertown company during the early part of King Philip's War with the rank of Captain.

Capt. Beers took an active part in the early campaigns of King Philip's War, and so much of his service in the cause of the Colonies was rendered at that time that it seems appropriate to refer to it somewhat in detail.

In the latter part of July, 1675, a levy had been made in Essex County, and when the news of the disaster at Brookfield reached the Council on August 4th or 5th, a company under Capt. Lathrop and the Watertown company under Capt. Beers were at once ordered to march to its relief. They arrived at Brookfield on Saturday afternoon, August 7th, and on the following Monday or Tuesday they marched out to "Meminimisset, where Capt. Hutchinson and Capt. Wheeler were assaulted," but finding no sign of Indians, the Watertown company under Capt. Beers returned to Brookfield. On August 15th Capts. Lathrop and Beers with their companies marched to Springfield, and were there joined by the forces under Capt. Watts, and spent several days exploring the country along the Swift and the Connecticut Rivers. On August 23rd, all of these companies were at Hadley, and it was determined to disarm the Hadley Indians who had gathered at their fort on the west side of the river, about half way between Hadley and Northampton. The Indians, however, fled on the 24th, and

on the morning of the 25th of August, Capts. Lathrop and Beers with about 100 men came upon them unexpectedly at a place called Sugar Loaf Hill, about ten miles above Hatfield. The exact spot at which the engagement which ensued took place, is not known, but it continued for about three hours during which the English lost nine men.

The troops marched back to Hatfield, and then to Hadley, which was at this time the headquarters of the English, and in the early part of September, Capts. Lathrop and Beers organized a force to relieve the garrison at Northfield. While this expedition was in preparation, and on September 2nd, when the Northfield people and the garrison soldiers were in the fields at work, a large body of Indians suddenly fell upon that town, killed many of the people, burned all of their exposed houses, and destroyed their cattle and crops.

Although Hadley was only thirty miles from North-field, Capt. Beers was unaware of this assault, and on Friday morning, September 3rd he set forth with thirty-six men and one ox team, on his march to bring off the garrison and its people. The march was slow and toil-some, and darkness came upon them when still three or four miles from Northfield, compelling them to encamp for the night. It is supposed that their camp was near the small stream called "Four-mile brook." Early on the morning of Saturday the 4th, Capt. Beers with most of his force started on foot, and leaving the horses at the camp with a small guard, and taking the team with the stores and ammunition, advanced towards the town, still ignorant of the previous day's assault, and, it seems, en-

tirely unsuspicious of an enemy in the vicinity. He appears to have kept on the high plain till he came in sight of the little brook, now known as "Saw-mill brook." The ravine was now covered with a rank growth of grass and ferns and the leaves were thick on the young trees and it was at this place that the Indians had placed their ambuscade. He advanced across the brook by the accustomed fording place, and just at the passage, and when his company was most exposed, was furiously attacked in front and flank, and all were thrown into great confusion, but soon rallied and fought bravely for their lives, only to be forced back by superior numbers some three-quarters of a mile to a narrow ravine on the south of a hill now known as "Beer's Hill." Here a stand was made, and here the little band fought about their leader, with the courage of desperation, till their ammunition was exhausted and the Captain with nearly every man had fallen; only a few escaped, joined the guard left behind with the horses, and made their way back to Hadley, thirteen in all. An undoubted tradition points out the grave of Capt. Beers in the ravine where he fell.

# MAJOR WILLIAM BRADFORD.

Major William Bradford was born at Plymouth, Mass., June 17th, 1624, and became one of the most prominent and important men of the Colony. He lived at Jones River, now Kingston in the same house in which his father, Governor William Bradford, had lived from 1627

to 1647. A portion of this farm has never been sold but has descended by inheritance or bequest to its present owners. A part including the home lot, was sold in 1822 to Francis Drew, who had married into the Bradford family, and on September 30th, 1897, it passed to the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower descendants as a memorial of Governor William Bradford, and his son Major William Bradford. It is situated on a slight eminence overlooking the Jones River, the monument to Miles Standish being in full view about three miles distant, while Plymouth can also be distinctly seen at a distance of about four miles.

Here Major Bradford reared his large family of fifteen children. He was thrice married; first to Alice Richards, second to Widow Wiswall, and third to Mary Atwood Holmes, the widow of Rev. John Holmes of Duxbury. In 1657 and 1658, Major Bradford was Deputy from Plymouth; in 1658 he became Assistant in which office he served for twenty-four successive years, and for the last ten years of the existence of Plymouth Colony he filled the office of Deputy Governor except for the three years of the tyranny of Andros. He was Commissioner for twelve years; member of the Council of War 1657 and 1667; Treasurer of Plymouth Colony most of the time between 1679 and 1690, and Judge of Probate from 1695 to 1702.

Next to Miles Standish he was the chief military officer of the Colony. He was commissioned Ensign of the Plymouth Military Company in 1648 and was made Captain of a Troop of Horse in 1659; in King Philip's War he was Commander in Chief of the Plymouth forces with the rank of Major. He took part in the Great Swamp Fight, December 19th, 1675, and was severely wounded during the battle.

In 1679 the office of Moderator having been established by the town, he was requested by vote of the inhabitants to preside at all the town meetings, and this vote was confirmed and renewed without any further reference to the office until 1717, when another person was chosen. In 1691 he was a member of the Council of Massachusetts.

Jones River, where Major Bradford lived, takes its name from Capt. Jones of the Mayflower, who was one of the exploring party that went three miles up the river on December 29th, 1620. About 1855, Francis Drew made excavations in the old cellar of the Bradford house, and found numerous bricks and a few household articles. People of middle age well remember several apple trees in the old orchard, which stood in a decaying condition until about 1840. It is believed they were planted in 1669, and one of them was left standing and bore a small quantity of fruit as late as 1876.

Major Bradford died March 1st, 1704, at the age of eighty years. He had requested to be buried beside his father, but at the time of the funeral, the road to Plymouth was impassable from snow. The funeral procession therefore followed the shore of the harbor for about two and one-half miles, so that the dead veteran entered the town of Plymouth, close by the rock on which his father originally landed.

A slab of slate still in good condition stands over his

grave on Burial Hill. The inscription upon this stone is as follows:

He lived long and still was doing good, And in his country's service lost much blood; After a life well spent, he's now at rest, His very name and memory is blest.

## GENERAL ARTEMAS WARD.

General Artemas Ward was born November 27th, 1727, at Shrewsbury, Mass. His father, Col. Nahum Ward, was one of the prominent men of the Colony, and one of the proprietors and first settlers of Shrewsbury. He was for many years Deputy to the General Court, and held the military rank of Colonel.

In 1752 at the early age of twenty-five years, Artemas Ward was commissioned Justice of the Peace, and in 1755 was commissioned Major of the 3rd Regiment of Militia of the Counties of Worcester and Middlesex, commanded by Col. Abraham Williams. In 1758 he was made Major of the Regiment commanded by Col. William Williams, and which had been raised for the invasion of Canada. This expedition was commanded by Gen. Abercrombie, and Major Ward returned from it with the rank of Lieut. Colonel.

A little later he succeeded Col. Abraham Williams in command of the 3rd Regiment. He took an active part in the controversies that preceded the Revolution, between the Governors of the Colony and the House of

Representatives, and it is said that it was his practice to give political as well as military instruction to the troops under his command, and for this reason his commission as Col. of Militia was revoked by the Governor, a letter to that effect being forwarded by special messenger.

In losing the confidence of the Governor, however, he shared more fully in that of the public. In 1768, the House of Representatives, being disposed to surround the Governor with a Council composed of men approved for their patriotism and ability, elected him as one of the members of that body, but the Governor negatived their choice.

October 27th, 1774, the Provincial Congress then sitting at Cambridge, elected Jedediah Preble, Artemas Ward and Seth Pomroy as General Officers to take rank in the order above stated. On the 19th day of May following, General Ward was appointed Commander in Chief of all the forces in Massachusetts, and on the 17th day of June, 1775, he was chosen by the Continental Congress to be the first Major General of the Continental Army.

His services in the Revolution as a Major General, and as a member of the Continental Congress, are too well known to need special mention. He died October 27th, 1800, at the age of seventy-three, and is buried in the old burying ground at Shrewsbury. He is said to have been fearless in speech and resolute in manner, and he at all times freely denounced such Parliamentary measures as encroached on the rights of the Colonies, and which the Governors if they did not recommend, at least

sought to enforce in forcible language and by arbitrary laws.

The letter revoking his commission as Colonel to which reference has been made, was in the following language:

"Boston, June 30th, 1766.

To Artemas Ward, Esq.,

Sir: I am ordered by the Governor to signify to you that he has thought fit to supersede your commission as Colonel in the Regiment of Militia lying in part in the County of Worcester, and partly in the County of Middlesex, and your said commission is superseded accordingly. I am Sir;

Your most obedient and humble servant,

JOHN COTTON,

Deputy Secretary."

As the messenger who delivered this letter, was in full uniform he attracted the attention of many citizens of Shrewsbury who were present when he delivered it to Col. Ward, and they at once enquired of him if he had important news. Whereupon he read the letter aloud, and then turning to the messenger said, "Give my compliments to the Governor, and say to him that I consider myself twice honored, and more in being superseded, than in having been commissioned, and that I thank him for this letter, since the motive that dictated it is evidence that I am what he is not, a friend to my country."

# GOVERNOR WILLIAM BRADFORD.

Governor William Bradford was born in Austerfield, England, in 1589. At an early age he declared himself a Separatist and joined the band of worshipers which met at Scrooby in the Brownist Church, organized by William Brewster, and which was persecuted by the Church of England.

Persecution followed and James I declared that he would "harry them out of the land or worse." In this emergency they decided to remove to Holland where they could worship God as they wished. When about to start, seven members of the company including Bradford, were seized by the King's forces and cast into prison. Bradford, because of his youth, was released sooner than the others, and joined his friends in Amsterdam where he learned the trade of silk dyeing. At the end of three years, he came into possession of his inheritance, which he converted into money, and established himself in business. In 1609 the colony removed to Leyden where they remained about ten years, during which time Bradford became active in promoting the scheme of emigrating to an English Colony.

A patent was obtained for a tract of land in Virginia, and on the 5th of September, 1620, Bradford embarked at Southampton in the Mayflower with the first hundred passengers that left for America.

By stress of weather they were prevented from landing within the territory of the Virginia Company, and finding themselves in a region beyond the limits of the patent they drew up and signed a "Compact of Government." At this first New England Town Meeting, held in the cabin of the Mayflower in Cape Cod Harbor, November 11th, 1620, John Carver was confirmed in the office of Governor. After many weary exploring tours, the little band of Pilgrims finally landed on Plymouth Rock, December 21st, 1620. Governor Carver died April 21st, 1621, and William Bradford was elected to succeed him. With the exception of one period of two years, and one of three, when he declined to serve, (and during which he was either Deputy Governor or Assistant) he was continued in office each year thereafter until his death in 1657.

This fact sufficiently indicates his paramount influence upon the Colony, an influence due not only to the unselfishness and gentleness of his nature, but also to his great practical abilities as a Governor.

Indeed it was chiefly owing to his energy and forethought that the Colony at the most critical period of its history was not visited by overwhelming disaster.

Among the earliest acts of his administration was to send an embassy to confirm the league entered into with the Indian Sachem, Massasoit, the most influential and powerful of the native chiefs. Bradford's thorough understanding of Indian character, and his prompt action, tact and bravery, saved many lives and won for him the love and respect of his people. In addition to the office of Governor, Deputy Governor, and Assistant, he represented Plymouth at the meeting of the Commissioners of the United Colonies at Boston in 1647, 1648, 1649 and 1656, being President of that Congress from 1648 to

1656. He was a member of the Council of War in 1642, and President of the Council from 1643 to 1653.

Though in his youth Governor Bradford had been given scant opportunity for acquiring knowledge, later in life he studied the languages, and was also a student of History, Philosophy and Theology. His pen was as busy as his brain and though but one of his works, (a diary of occurrences, covering the first year of the Colony) was published during his life, many others have been handed down as valuable, both from an historical and literary point of view.

Five of his manuscripts were published in the Collections of the Massachusetts Historical Society, and four of them appear in Young's Chronicles of the Pilgrim Fathers. The Manuscript of his principal work, "The History of Plymouth Plantation," was lost for many years, but in 1864 was found in the library of the Bishop of London at Fulham. Upon the petition of the United States Ambassador the Consistory Court of the Diocese of London, sitting at St. Paul's March 25th, 1897, ordered the manuscript to be delivered to him for transmission to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and Ambassador Bayard, in whose care it was placed, delivered it to the Governor of Massachusetts, May 26th, 1897.

Governor Bradford last presided in Court, February 13th, 1657.

He died in Plymouth May 9th, 1657.

# SERGEANT BENJAMIN WAIT.

Of the rugged, fearless men who settled the Connecticut Valley and who not only endured with cheerfulness the customary trials and privations of a pioneer life, but who also without flinching faced danger and death in their most awful and hideous forms, and who, in it all, rarely turned their backs either upon an enemy or a duty, Sergt. Benjamin Wait, of Hatfield, may well stand as an example and a type. Of humble origin, never having held civil office and with a military rank at no time higher than that of Sergeant, it is still true that his career possesses more than a local interest, and that his memory deserves to be cherished as truly as that of many a man of more distinguished rank, whom posterity has honored and history made famous.

His life was a fair sample of the men of his time, and was spent in cultivating the soil and in fighting Indians, and as the fearless guide and the leader of many scouting expeditions, he became locally known as the most noted Indian Fighter of the Connecticut Valley.

We know nothing of his birth and parentage, but upon good authority he is believed to have been a brother of William Wait, Sr., of Northampton. We first hear of him at Hadley in 1664, and a little later he settled at Hatfield, where he continued to reside until his death in 1704. He had evidently seen service before he came to Western Massachusetts but from the opening of King Philip's War until his death, he was frequently engaged in expeditions against the Indians, usually in the capacity

of guide or scout, because of his familiarity with Indian ways and methods of warfare.

In the spring of 1676, he acted as one of the guides in the expedition of Capt. William Turner, which terminated so disastrously to the settlers in the so-called "Fall's Fight" of May 19th of that year, and throughout the war which fell with such crushing force upon the settlers in the valley, he was almost constantly in service.

Few portions of New England suffered more from this war than the Connecticut Valley, and few towns sustained a greater loss than Hatfield. During the three years of the War, twenty-seven of its inhabitants were killed, and nineteen made prisoners, a loss that was greater in proportion to its population than any of the towns in the valley.

"From one-third to one-half the houses were burned, and the greater part of their kine, sheep and horses killed, or driven off."

The severest attack upon the town was made more than a year after the war was considered closed. At eleven o'clock in the forenoon of the 19th of September, 1677, while most of the men were dispersed in the meadows, and unsuspicious of danger, a party of Indians suddenly assaulted the few men left at home, and who were then at work on the frame house outside the palisades, killed three of them, and then fell upon the defenseless women and children. Before help could come they had burned seven houses, killed nine more persons, making twelve in all, wounded four, taken seventeen captives and escaped to the cover of the woods. The quickness and suddenness of the movement assured its success, and

the people seemed to have been so paralyzed by the attack that they made no earnest effort at rescue.

The Indians went that day to Deerfield where they killed one man, captured four others, and then halted for the night. They spent the second night at Northfield, West Meadow, and then proceeded further up the river to a point about twenty miles above Northfield where they built a long wigwam and remained about three weeks. About the middle of October the party moved on across the country to Lake Champlain and thence to Canada. With perhaps an individual exception these seventeen from Hatfield, and those taken from Deerfield were the first captives from the valley who had endured the sufferings and peril of a march through the then almost impassable wilderness. The captives taken in the two proceeding years were with two exceptions either burned at the stake or otherwise tortured to death.

At the time of the attack, Sergt. Wait was absent from the town, and upon his return he found that his house had been burned to ashes, and that his family, consisting of his wife, Martha, and three little girls aged, two, four and six respectively, had been carried into captivity. His wife was the daughter of John Leonard of Springfield who was killed by the Indians during the same year. Inured to woodcraft, and familiar with the Indian customs, it was evident to him that any immediate attempt at rescue might result in the death of the captives, but after enduring a month of suspense, Wait and his friend Stephen Jennings, whose family had been captured, determined to ascertain the fate of their friends, and redeem them if found alive. With a commission from the

Governor of Massachusetts, they set out from Hatfield October 24th and went by way of Westfield to Albany then the only traveled road to Canada.

The authorities at Albany who were on friendly terms with the French and their Indian allies, blocked their plans and sent them on a false pretence to New York, and it was the tenth of December before they finally started on their journey. A Frenchman whom they hired to act as guide, was bribed by the Dutch Governor, and betrayed them, and they were forced to engage a Mohawk Indian to take them to Lake George. This savage proved true, and fitted up a canoe, and made a rough drawing upon birch bark of the lakes by which they were to pass. The quaint language of Hubbard's History of New England continues the narrative as follows:

"They were three days passing the first lakes, and then carrying their canoe two miles over a neck of land, they entered the great lake where the second day, they, hoping to trust to the ice, left their canoe, but having traveled one day upon the ice, they were forced to return back to fetch their canoe, and then went by water till they came to the land, being windbound six days in the interim; so as they made it about the first of January, having traveled three days without a bit of bread, or any other relief but some raccoon's flesh which they had killed in a hollow tree. On the 6th day of January they came to Chamblee, a small village of ten houses belonging to the French, only by the way, they met with a bag of biscuit and a bottle of brandy in an empty wigwam, with which they were not a little refreshed, and in traveling towards Sorell, fifteen miles distant from thence they came to a

lodging of Indians among whom they found the wife of Jennings."

They found the remainder of the captives at Sorell, and to his great joy, Wait found that a little daughter had been added to his family. He named her Canada. She afterwards married Joseph Smith of Hatfield, son of the John Smith who was killed in the Hatfield Meadows May 30th, 1676, and from that marriage, the founder of Smith's College, Northampton, was descended.

Unable to secure the captives without the assistance of the French authorities, they went down to Quebec. Here they were well entertained by the Governor, who granted their desire, and assigned them a guard of eleven soldiers for their journey to Albany. They left Quebec on the 19th day of April, and Sorell on the 2nd day of May, having redeemed all the captives who were then living. They reached Albany on their return May 22nd.

From Albany a messenger was sent to Hatfield with letters telling of their success and need of assistance. Let Wait's letter tell its own story.

"Albany, May 23rd, 1678.

To my loving Friends and Kindred at Hatfield:

These few lines are to let you understand that we are arrived at Albany now with the captives, and we now stand in need of assistance, for my charges are very great and heavy; and therefore any that have any love to our condition, let it move them to come to help us in this strait. Three of the captives are murdered, Old Goodman Plymouth, Samuel Foote's daughter, and Samuel Russell. All the rest are alive and well, and now at

Albany, namely: Obadiah Dickinson and his child, Mary Foote and her child, Hannah Jennings and three children, Abigail Allis, Abigail Bartholomew, Goodman Coleman's children; Samuel Kellogg, my wife and four children and Quintin Stockwell. I pray you hasten the matter, for it requireth great haste. Stay not for the Sabbath nor shoeing of horses. We shall endeavor to meet you at Kanterhook; it may be at Housatonock. We must come very softly, because of our wives and children. I pray you hasten, stay not night nor day, for the matter requireth haste. Bring provisions with you for us. Your loving kinsman,

# BENJAMIN WAIT.

P. S. At Albany written from mine own hand. As I have been affected to yourselves all that were fatherless, be affected to me now, and hasten the matter, and stay not and ease me of my charges. You shall not need to be afraid of any enemies."

After stopping at Albany three days they started May 27th, and walked twenty-two miles to Kinderhook, where they met men and horses from Hatfield. They rode through the woods to Westfield, and all reached home safely after an absence of eight months. "The rescue of the captives cost about two hundred pounds, which was gathered by contributions among the English."

Wait rebuilt his burned home, and in it he reared a family of three hardy boys in addition to the girls above mentioned. Although the next few years were, nominally, years of peace, the settlers of the Connecticut Valley were at no time free from danger of Indian attack. King William's War and Queen Anne's War kept them

in a state of constant apprehension, and the peculiar qualities of Sergt. Wait as a brave and fearless guide, well versed in Indian warfare, found frequent opportunity for their exercise. On February 29th, 1704, Deerfield was attacked by Indians and although nearly sixty years of age, he was the first to start to its relief. In the battle that followed, he was killed in the Deerfield Meadows and his body was stripped and mutilated. His remains were buried in the Deerfield cemetery, near the railroad station. A local historian in speaking of the career of Sergt. Wait has made use of the fitting and appropriate words of eulogy with which we close this account:

"We cannot refrain from saying, all honor to the brave scout and Indian fighter; his name is not often mentioned among the heroes of those wars, but among them all, and among those who did most for their country's welfare and stood firmest in the hour of her early peril; who dared and suffered, making no boasts and claiming no official distinction; who offered his life in sacrifice for those he loved; among those whose heroic deeds have made this beautiful valley immortal, no name is brighter, and no man's memory is more worthy to be cherished than that of Benjamin Wait.

Thus did our fathers receive early the baptism of blood, by which they did enter into living covenant with him who was their 'Life and breath and all things'; whose Providence was their strength and defense, and whose grace was their hope. And thus by a 'fiery trial' were they fitted to give vital force to the life, shape to the character and firm foundation to the social and religious institutions, which are our favored heritage today."

## GOVERNOR ROGER LUDLOW.

Our knowledge of the early life of Roger Ludlow is very limited. He was born at Dinton, Wilts County, England, was baptized there on the 7th of March, 1590, and admitted to the Inner Temple in November, 1612. Nothing more seems to be known concerning him until his name appears as one of the Assistants who were sent with Governor John Winthrop and Deputy Governor Thomas Dudley to govern the "Colony of Massachusetts Bay in New England." He sailed from Plymouth, March 20th, 1630, on the "Mary and John" and the ship seems to have outsailed the others of the fleet, and was the first to land at Massachusetts Bay on Sunday, May 30th of the same year. Ludlow and his friends built their rude houses at a place which they named Dorchester.

On the 30th of August, 1630, the first General Court of the "Massachusetts Bay Company in New England" was held at Charlestown, and Roger Ludlow rendered important and valuable services in framing laws for the government of the Colony. One of the Ludlows was a member of the Long Parliament, and the family which, for many generations, had been of great influence, was among the leaders in the struggle for civil and religious liberty, and stoutly withstood the usurpations of the Crown upon the liberties of the people. Our Governor appears to have been, however, a pronounced aristocrat in New England, and he persuaded the freemen to release their right to elect the Governor and Deputy Governor,

and to give this right to the Assistants, and when the freemen repealed this vote, he strongly protested, and was sustained by others of the Assistants. This opposition caused the freemen to adopt the plan of refusing a re-election to a Governor at the expiration of his term, and at a session of the General Court on May 14th, 1634, Thomas Dudley was elected Governor in place of John Winthrop, and Roger Ludlow was promoted to the office of Deputy Governor.

When the Crown became jealous of the independence of the Colonies, the General Court determined to fortify the Harbor, and Ludlow was chosen to oversee the work on "Castle Island," afterwards Fort Independence, near the entrance of Boston Harbor.

In October 1634, when it became necessary to treat with the Pequots, Ludlow was chosen to conduct the negotiations, and he established himself in the eyes of Sas sacus, the chief, by sending back the first embassy sent by him, and refusing to treat with any but ambassadors of high rank. With the Sagamores who then came to his house, he was able to make a successful treaty and to impress favorably the Indians. In Massachusetts and in Connecticut, whenever it was necessary to deal with the savages, he was always energetic and effective.

Ludlow had expected to be elected Governor at the annual election of 1635, but the illustrious John Haynes was chosen, and this seemed to have caused the ambitious Ludlow great disappointment, and to have induced him to break with the Massachusetts Colony. There were two reasons for his failure to be chosen, viz: his aristocratic tendencies, and his liberal church views. The lat-

ter reason should be noted, and also the fact that at this time John Winthrop had been required to give an "account" and that Roger Williams was under a ban and shortly after banished from the Colony. Liberality as to the granting of the franchise to others than church members was the offense. So sensible was the Court of his abilities, however, that he with Winthrop, Dudley and others were appointed a committee of military affairs with extraordinary powers. It seems that Ludlow had determined to leave the Massachusetts Colony (although his action in this regard caused a day of fasting to be called in September, 1634,) and in 1635 he led a small party into Connecticut, which settled on the Connecticut River on land claimed by the Plymouth Colony and also by persons represented by Sir Richard Saltonstall. On the 3rd of March, 1636, he was placed at the head of a commission to govern the people of Connecticut. "His name heads the list of the first nine Courts and he was to all intents and purposes the first Governor of Connecticut,"

In 1636 he instituted trials by jurors and became the teader in Connecticut jurisprudence. He prepared the Constitution of Connecticut, the first example of a writ ten constitution, and distinguished historians have given it the highest praise. Connecticut was governed under this constitution for one hundred and eighty years. In 1649 he prepared "Ludlow's Code," which name is still retained in the laws of Connecticut, although his code has been called the "Blue Laws." On the 11th of April, 1639, the government of Connecticut was organized under the Constitution with John Haynes as Governor, and Roger Ludlow as Deputy Governor

In all the records of those times the ability of this man is shown and particularly his promptness of action in times of danger, and withal a great pride and a haughty temper that would tolerate no opposition. His courage was shown when he took the responsibility of declaring war upon the powerful Pequots, and sending Captain Mason at once into the forest to meet and punish the foe. On the second expedition he personally accompanied the men who went out against the Indians

Later he left the Colony on the Connecticut River and organized a new settlement at Fairfield. His independent actions here brought him into conflict with the government, and he was many times in trouble through his hot temper. He moved his family into Virginia, and finally, in 1654, returned to Dublin, Ireland, where he practised law during the remainder of his life.

#### GOV, THOMAS DUDLEY.

Thomas Dudley, second Governor of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay, was born at Northampton, England, in 1576; was the son of Capt. Roger Dudley, who, serving with the forces sent to aid King Henry of Navarre, was slain at the battle of Ivry. Left an orphan, Thomas Dudley was taken into the family of the Earl of Northampton, where he remained for some years. He became a clerk in the office of Judge Nicholls, a kinsman of his mother,

which gave him an opportunity for study that he faithfully improved.

He inherited a taste for military adventure and when Queen Elizabeth ordered levies for the French service, he secured a commission, was given command of a company, and served at the battle of Amiens under Henry IV.

On his return to England Capt. Dudley married in Northampton "a gentlewoman whose extraction and estate were considerable." This marriage brought him into association with several eminent dissenting clergymen, and he soon became one of the most sincere and inflexible of the persecuted Puritans. Soon after. through the recommendation of Lord Say and Sele and others, he secured the position of steward of the household of the Earl of Lincoln. For ten years he had the management of the young Earl's affairs, and exhibited exceptional ability, improving the estate and increasing the income. He then removed for a time to Boston, Lincolnshire, where he became a parishioner of Rev. John The Earl of Lincoln, however, found he could "be no more without Mr. Dudley than Pharaoh without his Joseph and prevailed with him to resume his former employment."

In 1629 Dudley was one of the five original undertakers of the settlement of Massachusetts Bay Colony, who met in Boston, England, for organization. The following spring (1630) he came to New England in the ship "Arbella" with the charter, and in company with Sir Richard Saltonstall, John Winthrop, Isaac Johnson, William Coddington, Rev. George Phillip, Simon Bradstreet, etc. Winthrop was elected Governor before leaving Eng-

land and soon after embarking Dudley, who was one of the older men of the colony—then 54 years of age—was chosen Deputy Governor.

Upon their arrival they settled at Charlestown, but in the following spring Dudley established his home at Newtown (Cambridge), and was reproved for "bestowing so much cost about wainscoting and adorning his house" on account of the example. He replied that it was for warmth and the charge was little, "being but clapboards nailed to the wall in the form of wainscot."

Dudley was chosen Governor in 1634, succeeding Winthrop, and his influence was felt immediately in improved organization. Instead of the Assistants exercising all the powers of government as before, a representative legislature was formed, consisting of three delegates from each town. The powers of the General Court were defined, trial by jury ordained, future elections provided for, etc. A military commission was formed, Gov. Dudley at the head, with Winthrop, Humphrey, Haynes, Endicott, Coddington, Pynchon, Nowell, Bellingham and Bradstreet as associates.

The following year John Haynes was chosen Governor, but Dudley continued in active service all his life. From this time of his first service as Governor (1634) until his death, he was either Governor or Deputy Governor or Assistant. When in 1650 he was elected Governor for the fourth time he was 74 years of age.

In 1637 Mrs. Anne Hutchinson and her adherents divided the colony into two parties; Vane, then Governor, and Coddington, then Treasurer of the Colony, with Rev. John Cotton, were of the Antinomian party—Dudley.

Winthrop and others, were of the Legalists, so-called, and succeeded in banishing Mrs. Hutchinson and all who supported her heresy.

In 1644 he was given command of all the military forces of the Colony, consisting then of 26 train bands and one troop of horse, with the title of Sergeant Major General.

Shortly after the removal, in 1636, of his friend, Rev. Thomas Hooker, from Newtown to Connecticut Gov. Dudley removed to Ipswich, but did not remain long there as his public duties required his presence in or near Boston. He finally settled in Roxbury and lived there the rest of his life. He died at Roxbury July 31, 1653, in the 77th year of his age. He was a Puritan of the stern, rigid Calvinist type. A man of quick understanding, sound judgment, inflexible integrity, great public spirit and exemplary piety-was a lover of justice, order, the people and of the Christian religion, but intolerant in his zeal against heretics. He was shocked at the heresy of Roger Williams, who dared to preach liberty of conscience, and voted for his banishment. Even more active and zealous was he in procuring the banishment of Wheelwright, Mrs. Hutchinson, his old friend Coddington, and others. His love to his people was, however, shown in the establishment of good laws, seeing that they were enforced, and in serving in a public capacity for so many years at his own cost.

# ELDER WILLIAM BREWSTER.

William Brewster, Ruling Elder and teacher, one of the most prominent of the Pilgrim Fathers, was the son of a country gentleman who, for many years, was Postmaster at Scrooby, England.

After taking his degree at Cambridge, he became Private Secretary to the Puritan, Sir William Davison, Secretary of State to Queen Elizabeth, and accompanied him on his mission to the Netherlands to receive possession of the cautionary towns. The keys to Flushing delivered to Davison were by him entrusted to Brewster, who "kept them under his pillow on which he slept ye first night." After the fall of the Secretary, following the execution of Mary Stuart in 1587, Brewster returned to Scrooby, a little hamlet on the great road from London to Berwick. It contained a decaying manor house, belonging to the Archbishop of York, and was a mail and post station. In time Brewster succeeded his father as postmaster, his royal commissions dating from 1597 to 1609. He was manager of the station and agent of the Archbishop and resided in the ancient manor house

One of the Separatist congregations was at Gainsborough-upon-Trent—not far from Scrooby, and Brewster and young William Bradford, afterwards Governor of Plymouth Colony, were among its members. In 1604 Rev. John Robinson, later the famous minister of the historic church at Leyden, became their pastor. Persecution followed in James II.'s reign, the congregation

was broken up, but a portion consolidated at Scrooby, taking Robinson as their minister and there they met each Lord's Day and were entertained by Brewster in the manor house "with great love, making provision for them, to his great charge." This continued so long as they remained in England.

Still persecuted, they "resolved to go into ve Low Countries." They attempted to leave in 1607, but were arrested and thrown into jail at Boston. "He (Brewster) was ye cheefe of those that were taken at Boston and suffered ye greatest loss, and of ye seven that were kept longst in prison, and after bound over to ye assises." The next year they succeeded in getting away and after spending a short time at Amsterdam, finally settled, about a hundred persons in all, in Leyden. Of this number two only were scholars, Robinson, the minister, and his assistant, Brewster, the Ruling Elder, who supported himself and family by teaching English to the Dutch. He composed a grammar "after ye Latin maner," and later set up a printing press and established a publishing house devoted mainly to the issue of theological controversial works, which were very distasteful to the English.

After eleven or twelve years' residence in Leyden the congregation for "sundrie weightie and solid reasons" resolved in 1620 upon removal to America, "a part to go before and prepare for the rest." Mr. Robinson remained with the major portion and Elder Brewster went as spiritual adviser and leader to establish the colonists in their new place of refuge.

During the passage in the cabin of the Mayflower he

drafted the compact—which is said to have been the first written constitution in the world. This solemn instrument was the foundation of the Puritan Republic.

Upon their arrival at Plymouth and during the earlier years of settlement, public services were conducted by Elder Brewster as the representative of their recognized pastor, Mr. Robinson. Even after Mr. Robinson's death in 1625, Elder Brewster continued to serve until in 1629, when the Rev. Ralph Smith became their settled minister. His friend Bradford says of him, "he taught twise every Saboth and yet both powerfully and profitably to ye great contentment of ye hearers, and their comfortable edification; yea, many were brought to God by his ministrie." He also says, "removeing into this countrie, after leaving Holand, where he had been more at ease, all these things were laid aside againe, and a new course of living must be framed unto; in which he was no way unwilling to take his parte, and to bear his burthen, with ye rest, living many times without bread or corne, many months together having many times nothing but fish and often wanting that also, and drunke nothing but water for many years togeather. yea, till within 5 or 6 years of his death. And yet he lived by ye blessing of God, in health till very old age and besides yt he would labour with his hands in ye fields as long as he was able,"

The record of Capt. Miles Standish's military company gives William Brewster as one of its members, showing that he also rendered military service, assisting in the defense of the colony against the Indians. He died April 16, 1644, having lived more than fourscore years. Bradford, in speaking of his death, says: "their Revrd, Elder, my dear and loving friend had done and suffered much for ye Lord Jesus and ye Gospel's sake, and had bore his parte in well and woe with this poore persecuted church above 36 years in England, Holand, and in this wildernes, and done ye Lord and them faithful service in his place and calling."

# GOV. JOHN LEVERETT.

Among the many passengers of the good ship "Griffen" which dropped anchor in Boston harbor on the 4th day of September, 1633, were such men as John Haynes, Rev. Thomas Hooker, Rev. John Cotton and Elder Thomas Leverett. With the latter was his son John, then a youth of seventeen. The Elder was a gentleman of property and influence at home and contributed to the transportation of his poorer neighbors to the new Colony, and advanced funds for the benefit of the Colony after reaching New England.

On attaining his majority, John Leverett entered into business as a merchant at Boston and for a time diminished his estate by unfortunate ventures. In 1642, at the age of twenty-six, he was sent, with Edward Hutchinson, on an embassy to Miantinomi, the sachem of the Narragansetts, to summon that famous chieftain to appear before the colonists and answer the charge of having entered into a conspiracy with the other Indian

chiefs to cut off the English colonists. In this mission he was successful and from that time his life was given mainly to public service, in the halls of legislation, or upon the field of battle, and his noble bearing, gracious address and great talents gained for him honor upon honor until he had won everything within the gift of the colonists.

In 1644 he returned to England, probably "sent out as a useful man," and was appointed a captain in Rainsborrow's regiment in the service of the Parliament, and his military training was gained on the historic fields of Naseby, Bridgewater and Bristol under Cromwell. After the surrender of Charles I he returned to the colonies with a great reputation, and never by any false step or offensive self-seeking did he lose his hold upon the popular favor. Noble ambition, diplomacy and steadfast courage were remarkably combined in his character. He was a devout churchman, without which it were hopeless to seek advancement in the colonies; a statesman and above all a daring soldier. Among warlike foes he had the magnetism of great intelligence and advantage of great physical courage. Cotton Mather writes of him: "one to whom the affections of the freemen were signalized by his quick advances through the lesser stages of honor and office, unto the highest in the country; and one whose courage has been as much recommended by martial actions abroad in his younger years, as his wisdom and justice were at home in his elder." In the General Court records is found an entry which shows his exceeding popularity. It is the record of a petition of the inhabitants of the south end of Boston that he be confirmed their captain, but the Court, answered: "The Court is very tender of giving any discouragement to the petitioners and having by order confirmed Captain Leverett, to command a troop of horse, a place of greater honor and wherein he may be more serviceable to the country we cannot consent to the petition."

In 1651 he was first chosen Deputy from Boston and during a portion of that year was Speaker of the House, and he was re-elected in 1652 and 1653 and in 1663, 1664 and 1665.

In 1652 Mr. Leverett was one of the commissioners appointed to visit the settlements in Maine and declare them under the jurisdiction of Massachusetts. When, in the following year, the Colonies were greatly disturbed by a rumor of a plot between the Dutch Governor Stuyvesant and the Indians to destroy the English, he was one of the commissioners sent to New York to interview Governor Stuyvesant and was at the same time made commander of any forces that it might be necessary to raise.

In 1654 Captain Leverett went with Major Robert Sedgwick to expel the French from Penobscot and Nova Scotia and they accomplished easily what Miles Standish and others had failed to do. Of this Woodrow Wilson writes: "acting upon secret instructions from the Protector, Oliver Cromwell, Major Robert Sedgwick, of Charlestown, and Captain John Leverett of Boston, led an English force into Acadia, where the French were, upon the Bay of Fundy, and made it by a sudden conquest an English province," and C. C. Smith

adds that Captain Leverett was made temporary Governor of the province.

These acts seem bald as recited in a brief sketch, or as read from the stilted and colorless records of those times, but the incidents of the excursions into trackless forests to treat with the savage, valor upon the great battlefields of the world, and sudden attacks upon hostile foreign colonies, are the materials out of which are woven the thrilling historical novels of the day.

In 1655 in the combined offices of Ambassador and Advocate he was sent to England under the following order: "It is ordered that Captain John Leverett shall be, and he hereby is desired and empowered according to instruction given, to appear for us and act in our behalf in all matters of concernment to us before the Lord Protector and his honorable council in England." He remained in England during the uncertain days before and after the restoration, returning in 1662. In 1664 the Colonies had much of the experience of their decendants in 1776 and at this time Mr. Leverett was one of the four men to whom the colonies in open court had their patent or first charter, committed for safe keeping.

In 1665 he was elected an Assistant, in which office he continued until 1671 when he was elected Deputy Governor. In 1673 he was elected Governor to succeed Mr. Bellingham, and was annually re-elected to succeed himself until his death in 1679.

In 1676 at the time of the controversies with Charles II the Governor refused to take the oath to execute the Royal Acts of Trade and treated Edward Randolph, the King's Commissioner, with great contempt. The

records tell us that this Commissioner from the King brought to the refractory Governor the order of knighthood for valiant service rendered in King Philip's War, but of this Mr. Leverett made no mention during his life. After his death, however, and at his funeral, which the sorrow-stricken colonists conducted with great pomp the title and trappings were made public by the ceremonies connected with the pageant. John Leverett needed no insignia of nobility from any King for it may well have been said of him:

"Who e'er amidst the sons
Of reason, valor, liberty and virtue
Displays distinguished merit, is a noble
Of nature's own creating."

# MAJOR RICHARD WALDRON.

Major Richard Waldron (Walderne), seventh son of William and Catherine (Raven) Walderne, was baptized in Alcester, Warwickshire, England September 2nd, 1615.

In 1635 he came to America, became known at Waldron, N. H., and purchased a large tract of land at Cocheco (Dover). Two years later he returned to England, married, and in 1840 came again to America and settled at Cocheco. Soon afterwards his wife died and he married Ann Scammon of Boston, who became the mother of his large family. He was a man of remarkable enterprise and ability, and by wise investments and

diligent use of his opportunities, acquired a large property. He erected saw-mills, a garrison-house and other buildings, among them a truck-house to accommodate the Indians, with whom he built up an extensive trade which brought him into constant communication with them, and in which he secured their fullest confidence.

He served as Representative to the General Court at Boston 1654 to 1679; Speaker of the House 1666 to 1679; Justice of the Court of Common Pleas 1659 to 1682 and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court 1683. From 1652 he acted as Captain; was commissioned Captain 1672; Major 1674 and Major General 1680; was elected in 1680 one of the first Councillors of the Province of New Hampshire, and again under Gov. Cranfield in 1682. Upon the death of President John Cutts 1691, he was chosen as Deputy President to fill the vacancy. His military command brought him into constant association with the Indians. After King Philip's War the Indians returned toward New Hampshire and the authorities in Massachusetts, fearing for the settlers in that Province, and wishing to capture and punish some of the Indians for murders committed, directed Capt. Joseph Syll to join Capt. Hathorn, and, with their 130 men, to go to Dover, join Major Waldron and arrest all Indians concerned in King Philip's War.

Upon reaching Dover, Sept. 4th, 1676, over 400 armed Indians were found ready to defend those whom it was desired to arrest, and a fight, and possibly a massacre of the whites seemed inevitable. In order to save his friends and their families, Major Waldron determined to try the plan of a sham fight, telling the Indians that,

at the command to fire, all were to fire in the air. At the command the Indians fired, but the soldiers did not. The Indians were then ordered to give up their guns and surrender, and it was recorded as the "stunningest blow of all given to the Indians."

This proceedure on the part of Major Waldron undoubtedly saved the settlers in that locality. Among the courageous men who formed Capt. Syll's company on that day was William Butter, of Woburn, from whom most of that name in this country are descended.

Major Waldron had always been on good terms with the Indians, and after the surrender at Dover made every effort to save the Pennacooks and other innocent Indians. but in spite of his efforts some of them were included in the number that were sent to Boston and subsequently sold as slaves. This excited in the hearts of the Indians a desire for revenge, and on the night of June 27th, 1689, thirteen years after the "Sham Fight" at Dover, they attacked his garrison house in force, and obtained entrance to it by the treachery of some of the inmates. After a hand to hand fight in which Major Waldron killed many of his assailants, he was knocked senseless with a hatchet and disarmed. The Indians then placed him in a chair on a table, called upon him in derision to "Judge Indian" and cruelly tortured him until he died.

For a more full and detailed account of Major Waldron, reference is made to a book soon to be published by George Butters entitled "Arnould Cormerais and Jane Vaughn Rindge, Their Ancestors and Descendants."

# SECRETARY NATHANIEL MORTON.

The first Morton to found a family in America, was George Morton, who was born at Austerfield, Yorkshire, about 1585. Of his early life but little record has been left. We know, however, that he early united himself with the Separatists, and it is probable that he was a member of Brewster's historic church. He joined the Pilgrims at Leyden, and continued one of their company until his death. When the first colonists embarked for America, Mr. Morton remained behind and one writer says that he was "the agent of those of his sect in London," and another that he acted as "the financial agent in London of Plymouth Colony."

The work for which he is most noted, and which will forever link his name with American History, is the publication by him, in London in 1622, of what has since became known as "Mourt's Relation." This has justly been termed the first history of New England, and is composed of letters and journals from the chief colonists at Plymouth, either addressed or entrusted to George Morton. It is full of valuable information, and still continues to be an authority.

Shortly after its publication Mr. Morton sailed with his wife and five children for America in the "Ann," the third and last ship which carried what are distinctively known as the "Forefathers," and reached Plymouth early in June, 1623. He did not long survive, and his early death was a serious loss to the infant settlement. He had married Juliana Carpenter, whose sister, Alice Carpenter,

had married for her first husband Edward Southworth, and who afterwards married as her second husband, Gov. William Bradford. Another sister, Agnes Carpenter, became the second wife of Dr. Samuel Fuller, "one of the most valuable of the pilgrims, and the first physician that came to settle in our country."

Nathaniel Morton was the eldest son of George Morton and Juliana Carpenter, and was born at Leyden in 1613, and accompanied his parents to Plymouth in 1623. After the death of his father he was reared in the family of his uncle, Gov. Bradford, and early became his assistant in the management of public affairs. He was made a freeman in 1635, and in 1645 was chosen Secretary of the Colony, which office he held until his death, in 1685, a longer period than that of any incumbent of a similar office. He was also Secretary of the United Colonies of New England.

An abundant proof of his great industry is found in the fact that nearly all of the records of Plymouth Colony and of the United Colonies are in his handwriting. He is believed to have made manuscript copies of the laws of the Colony for use in the several towns, and one of these copies containing 164 long and closely written pages was produced before the Massachusetts Historical Society in 1870. He was a diligent scholar and an extensive reader, and with infinite pains noted down the incidents of the early days of the Colony. He prepared and published the well known work entitled "New England's Memorial, or a Brief Relation of the Most Memorable and Remarkable passages of the Providence of God, manifested to the Planters of New England."

It was compiled at the request of the Commissioners of the United Colonies and recognized as correct by the most eminent survivors of the early generations.

It served until the recovery of Governor Bradford's manuscript as the basis of all histories of Plymouth Colony. It was published at Cambridge, Mass., about 1669, and was reprinted in England during the same year. Several different editions have been published since that date.

Nathaniel Morton was also the author of numerous verses in memory of the Pilgrims, of which perhaps the best specimens are those on the death of his aunt, Mrs. Bradford.

On the occasion of the first celebration of the "Landing of the Forefathers," which was held at Plymouth, December 22nd, 1769, there were twelve toasts. Ist "To the memory of our brave and pious ancestors, the First Settlers," 2nd "To the memory of John Carver, and the other worthy Governors of the Old Colony," 3rd "To the memory of that pious man and faithful historian, Mr. Secretary Morton."

The placing of Secretary Morton next in honor after the Governors and before Miles Standish and many other noted Pilgrims was a recognition to which he was fully entitled, by virtue of his long and important service, and the position thus assigned him is one that the verdict of history has amply justified.

Mr. Morton married Lydia Cooper n 1635, as his first wife. She died September 23rd, 1673, and on the 29th of April, 1674, he married as his second wife, Hannah, the widow of Richard Templar of Charlestown, and the daughter of Richard Pritchard.

He died June 29th, 1685.

# ROGER WILLIAMS.

In the year 1607 there was born to James Williams, a merchant tailor of the city of London, and to Alice Williams his wife, the subject of this brief memoir.

Little is known of his early life or of his ancestry, save that he was a pensioner at Sutton's Hospital School, called the Charterhouse School, an institution formed at that time in London after some hostile litigation on the part of the testator's nephew who employed for his counsel, Sir Francis Bacon. Sir Edward Coke, afterwards appointed one of the governors of the institution was their successful attorney and it was by his influence that Roger Williams was placed there in 1614. At the age of 14 he was occupied in taking notes of the speeches at the Star Chamber at London and there attracted the attention of his future patron. He probably remained in the school until he was 18 or 19 when he entered Pembroke College, Cambridge, in 1623. In 1626 he took his degree and commenced the study of law under Sir Edward Coke who had evidently been attracted to him by his studious habits and abilities. This occupation semed uncongenial to his tastes and the religious bearings of his earlier years. In his own quaint words "From my childhood, the Father of lights and mercies touched my soul with a love for Himself, to His only begotten, the true Lord Jesus, to his holy scriptures."

The liturgy and ceremonials of the Church of England soon became to him distasteful and he developed into the most radical of the dissenters and embarking Dec. 1, 1630, with his wife Mary, from Bristol in the ship Lyon

he arrived at Nantasket after a stormy voyage of sixty-five days. His arrival is mentioned by Winthrop in his History of New England as that of a "godly minister." It must be remembered that the Massachusetts Colonists, although non-conformists did not, in their early history, consider themselves Separatists from the Church of England. It was their hope to accomplish the reforms they considered so essential, from within rather than from the outside of that body. On the other hand the pilgrims of Plymouth were Separatists and were associated as a distinct church before leaving Holland. They considered that the state should not interfere in ecclesiastical matters—a principle which led to their emigration from England years before. Between the Bay and the Plymouth settlement this radical difference existed.

In August, 1629, a church was organized at Salem with Rev. Mr. Skelton as pastor and Rev. Mr. Higginson as teacher and in June, 1630, one was formed at Charlestown by Gov. Winthrop and others. "We used the imposition of hands," says Winthrop, "but with the protestation by all, that it was only a sign of election and confirmation, not of any intent that Mr. Nelson (the minister) should renounce the ministry he had received from England." The New England Puritan commonwealth partook of an ecclesiastical organization. In the words of Hutchinson "Nobody could be proposed to the church for a member unless the minister allowed it. Nobody could be admitted a Freeman unless he was a member of the church." He must pay taxes but he could not vote unless he was a church member. Thus much seems necessary for a clear understanding of the political and

religious atmosphere into which the subject of this memoir was introduced upon his arrival in America. He was well known and highly esteemed by some of the leading men of the colony and upon his arrival was asked to take the place of John Wilson at Charlestown, who was about visiting England, sailing in the "Lyon,"—the ship that brought Roger Williams over. This invitation he declined on the ground that they were not a separated people from the Church of England. This organization insisted that penalties could be inflicted by the civil authorities for spiritual censures—a position against which Williams' whole life was devoted. The Ten Commandments were the basis of the social and legal fabric of the New England Colony. In theological discussions they were divided into "two" tables—the first four commandments including the "first table" presenting the duties which man owes to God. The "second table," the duties which man owes to man. Williams denied the power of the civil magistracy to prosecute for the violation of the first table. A few weeks after his arrival and soon after his refusal to join with the congregation at Charlestown-or Boston-he was invited to become the assistant to Mr. Skelton, the pastor of the Salem church, in place of Mr. Higginson, who died a few months previously. Presumably this church held more liberal views than that at Boston. He accepted, but the General Court of the Colony at Boston objected. In spite of this Mr. Williams was chosen.

It should be remembered that at this time the theory of religious liberty found no place in the minds of these devoted settlers of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. Strangely enough, as it seems to us now, having fled from persecution, they were intolerant of any religious views differing from their own. Having been disturbed and driven out from England by religious persecution, they looked upon their new heritage as a place where, undisturbed by differing beliefs they could carry out their cherished views of founding a theocracy upon the literal interpretation of the Bible. But here was a man landed upon their shores—devout and scholarly—doubtless a long and deep thinker on divine things who took the startling ground that the state could not interfere with religious opinions.

In April, 1631, he was settled as minister to the church at Salem, the magistrates at Boston protesting, and the meager evidence shows that their protestations had at last the effect of a severance of their relations and the departure of Williams for Plymouth before the end of the summer, when according to Gov. Bradford "he was truly entertained according to our ability, and he exercised his gifts among us; and after some time he was admitted a member of the church and his teaching well approved." He was afterwards appointed assistant to Rev. Ralph Smith—the pastor of the church there.

We may well believe that Roger Williams found himself in a more congenial ecclesiastical atmosphere among the more liberal Pilgrims of Plymouth and for two years he lived among them, supporting himself by his ministry and by fishing and farming. During his residence he became familiar with the tribes of Indians about and with their language, in order to be of benefit to those with whom he always maintained such friendly relations.

In August, 1633, he returned to Salem as assistant to Mr. Skelton once more. Just what steps led to this is not known but it may perhaps be fairly conjectured that the warm friends he had made in Salem and his ability as a preacher led to his return. But he was not allowed to pursue his avocation there in peace. The zealous Puritans soon found what to them seemed sufficient cause for interference. Mr. Willams had, while in Plymouth, written a statement of his views for the Governor and Council there, in which he took the position that the Colonists could not derive title to the land under the Royal Grant, but that the title could only be gained from the rightful owners, the Indians. This paper was never printed and it is fair to believe was not intended as an act of disloyalty to the King. It was simply a private expression of opinion, made doubtless with that wealth of verbiage customary with scholars in those days. His critics, watching keenly for some vulnerable point of attack, used it as a reflection on his loyalty. This phase of the paper seems not to have occurred to him and in answer to a summons to appear before the next General Court for censure he chose to permit the article to be burned publicly or any part of it rather than have any doubts of his loyalty to exist. The magistrates accepted his offer and it was afterwards stated by some that the matter was not found so objectionable as had appeared at first.

In 1634 Mr. Skelton died and Mr. Williams was invited to become his successor. But the Massachusetts Bay authorities objected and sent from Boston a request that he should not be ordained. The Salem church

paid no heed and was quoted as showing a "great contempt of authority." Discussions arose, however, from time to time on what in these times would be considered as trivialities which served to embitter the relations between the other clergy of the Colony and Williams.

The famous act of Endicott in cutting the cross of St. George from the royal banner of England was attributed to his preaching and doubtless he was made the scape-goat for many minor opinions and acts offensive to the zealous Puritans.

At last the crisis came and the church at Salem seemingly unable to breast the storm of criticism, acceded to the decision of the authorities in banishing their leader from the Colonies and the fearless reformer was obliged in the severity of a New England winter to leave the little settlement in Massachusetts Bay and his wife and children, to pursue his lonely journey through the trackless forests of a primeval wilderness. A small sloop was sent to Salem by the authorities to transport him from the Colonies to England but when the officers came to his house they found only his wife and children, he having left three days before. Some twenty personal adherents withdrew from the Salem church with the intention of ultimately following him to his new abode. Gov. Winthrop had in a private letter advised him to leave the Colony and there is every evidence that even those who differed from him on theological grounds had great affection and respect for him as an honest, sincere and kindly man. This prophet of a new era was thus brought face to face with an issue, one of the most momentous ever faced by mortal man. Behind him were the comfortable homes of the early settlers—before an unbroken waste of forest, inhabited by a savage race. For a principle, now considered one of the dearest heritages of a free people-liberty of conscience-he nobly dared to face these dangers trusting to the care of an Almighty protector and friend. In his own words "when I was unkindly and unchristianly, as I believe, drived from my house and land and wife and children in the midst of a New England winter, that ever honored Gov. Winthrop privately wrote me to steer my course to the Narragansett Bay and Indians, for many high and heavenly and public ends encouraging me, from the freeness of the place from any English claims or patents, I took his prudent motion as a hint and voice from God, and, waiving all other thoughts and motions, I steered my course from Salem-though in winter snow which I feel yet, wherein I may say 'Peniel,' that is, I have seen the face of God."

At Seekonk he first settled but upon Gov. Winslow—of Plymouth—advising him that he was within that settlement he moved to the other side of Narragansett Bay. Here the Massachusetts Colony claimed jurisdiction and but for Gov. Bradford he would have been forced to start again on his weary journey for a home free from molestation. His knowledge of the Indian language, gained during his residence at Plymouth, was invaluable to him in his exile. In June, 1623, he made one more move with four companions who had joined him, embarking in his canoe at Seekonk to find a spot beyond the jurisdiction of the Plymouth or Massachusetts Colonies. They paddled down the Seekonk river and as they approached the eastern banks they were greeted by a company of

Indians with the cry of "what cheer, friend." After a short exchange of salutations they embarked again and passing round the headlands of Indian and Fox Points, entered the Mooshausick River and upon climbing the hills commenced the first settlement of Rhode Island, to which "in remembrance of God's manifold mercies" he gave the name of Providence. Negotiations were at once opened with the Sachems for the purchase of necessary land, in accordance with his often declared princi-The owners-his friends Canonicus and his nephew Miantonomo, the chiefs of the Narragansetts ceded to him in March, 1638, lands and meadows lying on the two fresh rivers Mooshausick and Womasquatucket which, as the deed states had been previously purchased by him, "We also (the deed further states) in consideration of the many kindnesses and services, he, Williams hath continually done for us, both with our friends of Massachusetts, as also at Connecticut and Plymouth. do freely give him all that land from those rivers reaching to Pawtucket River." These lands he equally divided among his associates desiring, as he states, that "it might be for a shelter for persons distressed for conscience."

In the summer of 1636 Mrs. Williams, with her two infant children joined him, from Salem and in the course of two years a compact was formed as a basis of government. It was a simple paper, reading as follows: "We, whose names are hereunder written, being desirous to inhabit the town of Providence, do promise to submit ourselves, to all such orders or agreements as shall be made for the public good of this body, in an orderly way, by the major consent of the present inhabitants, masters of

families, incorporated together in a township, and such others whom they shall admit under the same, only in civil things." As he so forcibly states, "The matter with us is not about these children, toys of land, meadows, cattle, government, etc. But here, all over this Colony a great number of weak and distressed souls scattered, are flying hither from Old and New England, the Most High and Only Wise hath, in His infinite wisdom, provided this country and this corner as a shelter for poor and persecuted according to their several persuasions."

The settlement remained several years in this form, and in its freedom it drew to itself many whose zeal for the right of private judgment carried them to such extremes as to endanger its existence as a law abiding community—but the wise administration of Williams in the end prevailed and the body politic was knit more firmly together than ever. Sir Henry Vane, the younger, afterwards his warm friend, settled on the island of Rhode Island. There Mrs. Hutchinson came after her heated discussions and banishment from Boston. Finally the two settlements—Rhode Island and Portsmouth chose Coddington for their magistrate with the title of Judge—this form of government lasting until 1640.

The kindly and forgiving spirit of Williams was frequently shown in his intervention when the warlike Indians vented their blood-thirsty feelings upon the new settlers. To him the Massachusetts Colony always appealed for aid in such emergencies and the confidence the various Indian tribes felt in him, enabled him to act successfully as a mediator.

With the Pequots and Narragansetts his influence was

great and the Colony which drove him from its borders owed an unbounded debt to him for his services. In a letter to Maj. Mason he says "Gov. Winthrop and some others of the Council motioned and it was debated whether or no I had not merited, not only to be re-called from banishment, but also to be honored with some mark of favor."

In the meantime the new colony was growing apace and the jealousy of the Bay Colony led it to pass a law which practically excluded the people of Providence from its limits—a measure which debarred them from the port of Boston and was a serious injury to their mercantile interests. So tenacious were the people of the Colony of the principles held by its founder that in 1641 when the settlement was re-organized a special act was passed, as follows: "It is ordered that the law of the last court made concerning the liberty of conscience in point of doctrine, be perpetuated" thus emphasizing the great principles for which its founder contended.

In 1643 a confederacy was formed. "The United Colonies of New England"—the foreshadowing of the greater union which the Revolution consummated. But Rhode Island and Providence were not permitted to join, so they pursued their way alone—independent, freedomloving and unhampered by many of the dogmas of their neighbors.

Soon it was thought necessary for the growing colony to obtain a charter from the Home Government, separated as they were from the other colonies and in 1643 Williams set sail from New York for England where great political events were succeeding each other so rapid-

ly. The King had fled from London and the Long Parliament had begun its sittings. Amidst the excitement of political events it was difficult to obtain a hearing but in March, 1644, a Charter was granted which gave to the town of Providence, Portsmouth and Newport the name of the "Providence Plantations on the Narragansett Bay" and allowed them "full power to rule themselves as they shall by free consent agree unto." It was a broad and liberal instrument well fitted to confirm and further the great principles of its early founder.

Williams remained in England a little more than a year, occupying himself with literary work in addition to his political duties. Between John Cotton, the religious leader of Massachusetts, and himself, a discussion was carried on, on the part of one urged by all the hot headedness of a narrow religious zealot—on that of the other by all the eloquence and logic of a broad minded manboth evidencing the sincerity and earnestness belonging to devout, conscientous men. Into the theological and political controversies then carried on at a white heat in England he plunged with all the ardor of his impetuous nature and published a pamphlet addressed to Parliament "Questions of Highest Consideration" pleading for the entire separation of church and state. On the 14th of September, 1644, he landed in Boston—the good people of the Massachusetts Bay Colony having been bidden by members of the Parliament to allow his safe passage across their Colony. His return with a charter seemed to render the Colonies still more inimical to Rhode Island but notwithstanding this attitude they were glad to call on him again to act as a pacificator between themselves and the Indians, which he did with usual success, resulting in a treaty which was concluded in Boston in 1644 between the Narragansetts and Mohegans—thus preventing a threatened war by the Narragansetts upon the Colonies, except Providence and Rhode Island. In May, 1647 a form of government was agreed upon under the new charter and Williams being doubtless ready and anxious to retire from the responsibilities of public life. the office of the president of the colony was bestowed upon John Coggshall of Newport. During the years that followed he was occupied in carrying on a trading business with the Narragansetts, his interest in the affairs of the Colony still active. His influence and character seem to carry the Colony through the early years of its existence among many discussions and differences. Coddington, doubtless from what seemed to him patriotic motives. went to England in 1651 and obtained from the Council of State a commission to govern Rhode Island, and Connecticut during his life with a council of six to be named by the people and approved by himself. sensions of the people of these colonies doubtless led him to take this step but his fellow colonists evidently did not participate in his feeling for as soon as this act was known Williams and John Clark were sent to England to represent the cause of the Colony. Williams had never been fully reimbursed for the expenses of his former trip and in order to raise sufficient funds for his expenses, he was obliged to sell his trading house at Narragansett which yielded an income of some £100 per annum.

They sailed for England in 1651 and in October, 1652, an order in Council was issued vacating the Coddington

commission and directing the towns to re-unite under a new charter. Williams remained in England two and a half years attending to the interests of the Colony. It was the fourth year of the Commonwealth and Williams took a prominent part in the discussions of the time, publishing several books relating to the burning questions of the day. Much of his time was spent with his old friend, Sir Henry Vane, now high in the councils of the Commonwealth. He had occasional interviews with Cromwell. He made frequent visits to Milton to whom he taught Dutch—being considered a linguist of much ability. By teaching the sons of members of Parliament he earned money to defray his expenses.

In 1654 he arrived once more in Boston with an order from the Council requiring the Government of Massachusetts to allow him in the future to land and embark from their territory unmolested. On September 12th, after composing many disagreements and differences between the different towns of the new colony he was elected President. One of his first duties was that of peacemaker again, between the Indians and the Colonies when he met with his usual success in such matters. wise hand steered the little ship of state through many shoals and quicksands and in 1655 he was re-elected and again in 1656. It was at this time that the Quakers appeared in New England and the Colony of Rhode Island afforded them an asylum from the persecutions of the other Colonies who made repeated endeavors to coerce the colony to decline to give them refuge. But Williams sturdily held out, in accordance with his principles of religious tolerance and Newport and other towns

of the colony received considerable accessions to their numbers from these persecuted people.

In 1660 Charles II came to London and occupied the throne. A new charter was obtained—still containing the principles of religious freedom which was in force until Rhode Island adopted the constitution of the United States in 1843.

Until 1677 Williams participated largely in the affairs of the Colony, holding various offices. At this time his advanced age prevented further public duty. In one of his last public utterances—a letter to the Town of Providence he says "I have only one motion and petition, which I earnestly pray the town to lay to heart, as ever they look for a blessing from God on the town, on your families, on your corn and cattle, and your children after you; it is this, that after you have got over the black brook of bondage yourselves you tear not down the bridge after you, by leaving no small pittance for disturbed souls that may come after you."

Noble words of a tolerant kindly man! His last public act was in signing a document in 1683 settling a dispute relating to some boundary question.

In 1684 he died. His biography is his own best eulogy. The founder of our religious liberty—the friend and protector of the persecuted and outcast—just and true in his treatment of the Indians—the generous peace-maker for the Colonies which exiled him from their boundaries; his name grows brighter in the light of the new century and among the great men of Colonial times no name stands higher than that of Roger Williams.

## CAPTAIN MILES STANDISH.

Perhaps the most picturesque figure in early Colonial history is the "doughty Captain" Miles Standish, and yet it is his fortune to be better known from the picture of the poet than from the dry pages of the historical record.

"In the Old Colony days, in Plymouth, the land of the Pilgrims, To and fro in a room of his simple and primitive dwelling, Clad in doublet and hose, and boots of Cordovan leather, Strode with martial air, Miles Standish, the Puritan Captain."

Not often does it happen that name and character are so fitly wedded as in his case. His parents gave him the name of Miles—the old Roman name for soldier—and his long life is a vindication of his right to bear it. He seems to have been an anomaly among the Pilgrims and quite out of place in the company of the saintly Brewster, the gentle and tender hearted Robinson and the scholarly Bradford.

Hubbard says "a little chimney is soon fired; so was the Plymouth Captain, a man of small stature, yet of very hot and angry temper" and adds "he had been bred a soldier in the Low Countries and never entered into the school of Christ or of John the Baptist; or if he ever was there, he had forgotten the first lessons."

The relations, however, that existed between him and the Pilgrim company were always of the closest, and he possessed their fullest confidence and respect in spite of the fact that he never joined himself to them in church communion and was only what we may call "a proselyte of the gate." He was a regular worshiper with the congregation, and a participant on all occasions of fasting and thanksgiving, and of "waiting on the Lord" in all

their active enterprises and expeditions, but he never was a man of "professions," or of "confessions," and he was never "scaled" or "covenanted."

He was distinctively one of those men who "trusted in the Lord and kept his powder dry," and the debt of gratitude which Plymouth Colony owes to his personal courage, and his wise management of its military affairs, can hardly be overstated.

He was born in Lancashire, England, probably in 1584, and was descended from a long and illustrious line of ancestors of that name. He was early educated to the military profession and his commission as Lieutenant was signed by Queen Elizabeth about the year 1600. He began his military life on the Continent, and learned his lessons of war under Prince Maurice, and in service against the Duke of Alva and seems to have remained in active service for nearly ten years. It was in the Low Countries that he made his first acquaintance with some of Robinson's Congregation at Leyden, and either at their solicitation, or perhaps of his own prompting he joined them in their enterprise. He came to New England with the Pilgrim Company in the Mayflower, and his military career began even before the landing at Ply. mouth. Nathaniel Morton in his "New England's Memorial" gives a very graphic and interesting account of his first experience in Indian warfare, but the circumstances of this skirmish which has come to be known in history as the "First Encounter" are so familiar that they need not be given here in detail.

Soon after the landing at Plymouth, he was elected as the chief military officer of Plymouth Colony with the title of Captain, a position which he retained until his death thirty-six years later. It may seem strange that he never reached any higher rank, but his title was of little moment, because Plymouth Colony gave him all that it had to give and he was in supreme command of all its military forces during his life.

In his various expeditions against the Indians, he wanted but few men, and the choice of these he always claimed for himself. Upon the occasion of the "First Encounter" as upon all other occasions, his courage was unquestioned, and he was always ready to meet danger in any form. His expedition in 1623 to break up the plot of the Indians which had been formed to destroy the settlement and massacre the inhabitants of Weymouth, is perhaps the most characteristic one of his life, and may serve as a fair criterion of his character. Justin Winsor in his History of Duxbury says that "upon this occasion, he chose but eight men, refusing any more. He arrived at the settlement, and found the people scattered, wholly unconscious of their impending danger. Having quickly assembled them, he informed them of their situation, not however, without exciting the suspicions of the Indians. Soon after an Indian bringing the Captain some furs, he treated him "smoothly" yet the Indian reported that he saw in the Captain's eye that he was angry in his heart. A little later Pecksuot, an Indian warrior of reputed courage, said to Standish, while whetting his knife before his face and boasting of its quality; "Though you are a great Captain, yet you are but a little man, and though I be no sachem, yet I am a man of great strength and courage."

On the following day Pecksnot with a few other Indians, being in a room together with Standish, the signal was given by the Captain, and the door instantly closed and fastened. Then seizing Pecksnot, he snatched his knife from his belt, while his men fell upon the others. A short struggle ensued, which ended in the death of Pecksnot by Standish, and that of the other Indians by the settlers except a youth whom they afterwards hung. Hobomok, the Indian interpreter and friend of Standish, who stood by a silent spectator of all that passed, smilingly exclaimed: "Yesterday Pecksnot bragged of his own strength, and told you that though you were a great Captain, yet you were a little man, but today I see you are big enough to lay him on the ground."

Nothing can better illustrate not only the foresight of Standish but also the quickness and decision of his character. Not in itself a remarkable battle, it still remains true that the life of the infant colony was seriously endangered, and that the quick and determined blow which he struck was its salvation. His action upon this occasion has often been criticised as unnecessarily severe, but to us it seems providential that so brave a man, and so good an officer was in command of the Pilgrim forces at a time when his military qualities were absolutely essential to the very life of the Colony. By education and training he was utterly unable to sympathise with the soft tenderness for human life which characterized the saintly Robinson, who, when he heard of the conflict where Standish had killed Pecksuot, uttered these sorrowful words: "Oh! that you had converted some before you had killed any," and it is fortunate for us who still believe in Plymouth Rock, that one trained soldier who had faced war conducted by the Duke of Alva, came out in the Mayflower. Had the fate of the Pilgrims depended entirely upon such men as Robinson, or Brewster or Bradford it is to be feared that the scalps of the settlers would have adorned the Indian wigwams, and that the Colony would have come to a sad and untimely end.

Near the close of his life, he was made Commander of the expedition against the Dutch, and although far advanced in years, he was still considered the best person upon whom the command could devolve. In his commission of instruction he is spoken of as one "of whose approved fidelitie and abilitie we have had long experience."

The services of Miles Standish were hardly less important in civil than in military affairs. He was either Assistant or Deputy during the whole of his life; Treasurer of the Colony from 1644 to 1649, and was once sent to England as the agent of the Colony.

About 1630 he settled in Duxbury on a tract of land which had been granted to him by the Colony, and which has since been known as Standish's farm. Upon this farm the well-known Captain's Hill is situated. Here he built his home, and gathered about him a devoted company of friends, among whom were Elder Brewster, John Alden, John Howland, George Soule and many of the other early settlers of the town. He died Octobed 3rd, 1656, and in the quaint language of Secretary Morton:

"He growing very ancient, became sick of the Stone or Strangullion, whereof after his suffering of much dolorous pain, he fell asleep in the Lord and was honorably buried at Duxbury."

The inventory of his estate which is recorded with his will, mentions the Commentaries of Caesar, Bariffe's Artillery, three old Bibles, and three muskets with the harness of the time complete. His Bibles were old, but his muskets new and complete; "a wellworn Bible for every musket, and thank God, a musket to defend each Bible." He was a true type of the citizen soldier and exhibited in his own heroic person, the true idea of the army—skilled military force in loyal subordination to the civil authority.

A monument to his memory has been erected on Captain's Hill, and although the exact spot of his burial is not known, it is supposed that this monument marks the spot where lies "all of a hero that could die."

The prominence of Brewster, Bradford, Winslow, Carver and others in the early life of Plymouth Colony has somewhat overshadowed the career of Miles Standish, and yet it seems providential that he was one of that historic pilgrim company. If he had not been a trained soldier, and if he had not learned from his own experience and from the well conned Commentaries of Caesar how powerless are the most vigorous and patriotic people without real discipline, Plymouth Rock might never have interested us, and the early settlement of Massachusetts might have been indefinitely delayed.

As one of his eulogists has so fittingly remarked: "A citizen soldier's education for a citizen soldier's work; the principle of moral truth, manly honesty, prudent energy, fidelity incorruptible, courage undauntable, all the qualities of manhood that compel unflinching execution of the State's behest, are the foundations upon which any

State must rest. These qualities were his and to crown them all, was his reverence to the Supreme Executive of Earth and Heaven, who knows no feebleness of heart or hand, and whose great purpose moved the war-worn Pilgrim's feet to seek his home on this rockbound continent, where the unceasing waves of two unfettered oceans roar the choral hymn of Freedom."

# COLONEL JOHN TALCOTT.

Col. John Talcott, of Hartford, Conn., was one of the most active, competent and trusted public, civil and military officials of his day. From his early manhood, almost until the day of his death, he was constantly employed in the public service in the most responsible stations.

He was the son of John Talcott and Dorothy Mott who was the daughter of Rev. Mark Mott, D. D., and Mercy Tichbourne, people of high consideration and large estates in Essex, England. John Talcott emigrated in 1632 with his family in the "Lion," settled at Cambridge where he was a Deputy until his removal in 1636 with Rev. Thomas Hooker's Company to Hartford. Here he was a Deputy from 1637 to 1652 and thereafter Assistant, Treasurer of the Colony and Commissioner of the New England Colonies until shortly before his death in 1660.

His son, Col. John Talcott was born in Braintree, Essex County, England, in 1620. He accompanied his father from England to Cambridge and thence to Hart-

ford. He was elected a freeman May 20th, 1652; was confirmed Ensign of the "Trained Band" at Hartford, June 26th, 1650, and was first designated Captain in the Colonial records October 4th, 1660.

In 1672 the office of Sergeant Major of the Colonial forces was created and he was the first officer in Connecticut to fill it. On the 26th day of June, 1672, he was appointed the chief military officer of Hartford County and was chosen Major for that county August 7th, 1673.

In anticipation of war with the Dutch of New Amsterdam, the colonies made warlike preparations, and on Nov. 26th, 1673, he was nominated and appointed "Commander in Chief of such forces as shall be raised by the Colony and sent against New York."

At the out-break of King Philip's War Connecticut raised "a standing Army of 350 men besides friendly Indians" and he was appointed "Commander-in-Chief of this Army" May 11th, 1676. At the head of the largest force heretofore seen in the Colony, consisting of nearly 300 colonists with their silken banners and 250 friendly Indians in their war paint and feathers, he marched one month later to the relief of Hadley, fought a decisive battle there, then led his forces into the Narragansett country and on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd of July encountered a great body of Indians and completely defeated and scattered them, slaying and capturing great numbers. His letter of July 4th to the Governor and Council gives a graphic account of his operations. Thereafter he conducted his troops, who suffered great hardships on the march, through the wilderness to Rhode Island. On the 19th of August, 1676, a day of thanksgiving was ordered by the Council "for preservation of his men in their long and tedious march through the wilderness, and their great success."

He is designated as Lieut. Colonel in the records under date of January 27th, 1687, and also after his death under date of May 14, 1691, and is highly commended by Palfrey, Bodge and other New England historians for his skill, ability and energy as a soldier.

In his civil capacity he was equally active, successful and devoted to the public interests. He was chosen Deputy 1660 and 1665; Magistrate 1661 and 1663; Assistant of the Hartford Colony 1665 and 1687; Treasurer of the Hartford Colony 1661 and 1665 and of the United Colonies thereafter for many years.

He was made one of the custodians of the Colonial charter October 9th, 1662, and elected Commissioner of the United Colonies 1663, 1669, 1673, 1676, 1683 and 1684, and Reserve Commissioner 1680 and 1682.

He was frequently appointed as Commissioner to treat with the Dutch (Oct. 8th, 1663, and later); to unite the Connecticut Colonies (1663-5); to settle boundaries with Massachusetts (1673); to treat with Rhode Island and Long Island (1672-4); to build forts; to hold Court at New London and elsewhere; to allot lands and to arbitrate disputes. He appears to have been especially entrusted for many years with all matters relating to the Indians and their relations to the Colonists.

He served as a member of the Governor's Council from 1663 almost to the year of his death in 1688. In short the records show no man of his day to have been more

active for the public welfare. During his whole career no man was more regular in his attendance as Deputy, Assistant, Magistrate, Commissioner or Member of the Council and none more relied upon or more successful as a soldier.

His son Joseph Talcott was for sixteen successive years Governor of Connecticut.

### COLONEL WILLIAM CLAIBORNE.

Not far from the river Eden, in Westmoreland, England, are the ruins of a manor house, overshadowed by firs and oaks, and within a stone's throw of the ruin is a Norman chapel which was built at least as early as the twelfth century. To this church is attached a rectory where religious services are still held and which is spoken of as "among the antiquities worthy of notice in Westmoreland."

The ruins are those of Cleburne Hall and the house was built in 1567 on the site of a much older one, the castle or "Pele" of Cleburne which had been time out of mind the headquarters of the "Lords of Cleburne, Bampton, Cundale and Kyne." These rural seigneurs of the north marches were hard headed people always at war with their neighbors, the Scots. They lived the turbulent lives of the old feudal barons, made forays across the border, were regularly harried in their turn, and kept their energies from rusting by taking part in all the fighting which came in their direction. Their blue blood

was incontestable. They traced their pedigree in yellow parchments, back to the time of the Conqueror and "Cleburne Manor" had the honor of being recorded in Domesday Book.

These hard fighting Cleburnes had one representative who is of special interest to Americans and who by sheer force of brains and stubborn will linked himself with our history and rose from obscurity to be one of the great figures of his time.

This man who has made the old cradle of his race in Westmoreland so interesting was William Cleburne or Claiborne as the world now calls him, the famous "Rebel." He was regarded by a great many people as the pest of his time. For nearly a generation he kept two provinces of the New World in hot water; was the mainspring of public events, and a very firebrand of dissension; aroused the bitterest enmities; openly defied the English government; succeeded in overthrowing Lord Baltimore backed by all the power of the crown; and was the author of a civil war ending in a sanguinary battle which decided the fate of Maryland.

His political opponents described him as a "villain" and "Judas Iscariot" and most modern historians have adopted the same view of his character. Mr. Burk calls him "an unprincipled incendiary and execrable villain." Mr. Bancroft "the malignant Clayborne"; and even Chief Justice Marshall has his fling at the unlucky rebel as the "Evil Genius of Maryland."

He seems to have been regarded as a low born adventurer but this is very far from being the case. His father Edmund Cleburne, was a member of the English gentry,

and married a daughter of Sir Alan Bellingham who is described as "a woman of the greatest piety, of unconquerable energy and patience, sparing of her words and full of the greatest charity toward the poor." Her son, William the Rebel, certainly inherited her "unconquerable energy" if not her "piety and patience." He was born about 1587 and but little is known of his youth.

When about thirty he went up to London and making the acquaintance of the celebrated Captain John Smith, secured, probably through his influence, the appointment of public Surveyor to the Colony of Virginia. At this point his adventurous life began.

He sailed from London in 1621 with Sir Francis Wyat, the new governor and with them in the "good ship George" went that wonderful document, the old "Ordinance and Constitution" which virtually established republican government in America.

We hear nothing of Surveyor Clayborne in the great Indian massacre of 1622 but during the next few years we can trace him going in and out among the planters, surveying their lands, recording deeds, and gradually becoming a person of importance. In those years his fortune steadily improved and he became a person of importance in the Colony. In 1625 the new Governor Yeardley appointed him "Secretary of the Colony." In 1626 the King made him a member of the Council and "Secretary of State of this Kingdom of Virginia"; and in 1629 he had an opportunity to show that he had the fighting Cleburne blood in him. The Indians were causing much annoyance to the settlements and Clay-

borne assembled a force, attacked their King Candyack, completely defeated him and concluded a treaty by which the Indians bound themselves to create no further disturbance. For this service he was rewarded by a grant of land between the Pamunkey and Mattapony, extending for nearly twenty miles upon which he built his "favorite residence" Romancoke and said to be one of the finest houses in Virginia.

To this point in his career no criticism can be made upon his actions. He was, perhaps, the most prominent man in Virginia but he owed his great landed possessions to his public services and his office of Secretary to the appointment of the King as a recognition of his ability. Wealth and honor had indeed come to him but they had come legitimately and because he had fairly and honestly earned them.

We come now to the story of his career in Maryland. Attracted by the fertility of Maryland and the value of the fur trade with the Indians he had explored that region in 1627 under authority from the Virginia officials, and in 1631 Charles I empowered "our trusty and well beloved William Clayborne, Secretary of State of our Kingdom of Virginia" to make discoveries and trade there. Armed with this authority he established a trading post on Kent Island, nearly opposite the present city of Annapolis, and as this settlement sent a Burgess to Jamestown in 1632 it would seem that Clayborne and his people were fairly entitled to regard themselves as owners of territory which was conceded to belong to Virginia.

Just a year before, George Calvert, Lord Baltimore had

landed at Jamestown whither he had come to secure the free exercise of his religion. He had joined the Romish church and wished to establish a Roman Catholic colony, but he met with scant encouragement from the Church of England Virginians. They would have no Papists in their colony and among all his opponents Secretary Clayborne was the most determined and he joined in a petition which was sent to England praying that "no Papists might be suffered to settle among them." Lord Baltimore was not easily discouraged and sailing up the Chesapeake and finding the country to his liking he returned to England and obtained a grant of it. By its terms he was to settle his Catholic friends on such lands in Virginia as were "uncultivated and inhabited by savages." This grant was confirmed to his son Cecilius Calvert who proceeded in 1634 to establish the Colony of Maryland.

The issue between Clayborne and Lord Baltimore soon resulted in open conflict. Clayborne insisted that his right to Kent Island was paramount by virtue of his grant from the King, while Gov. Calvert claimed it upon the same ground because it was included within the limits of Maryland. Clayborne's trading pinnace, the "Longtail" was seized by Calvert, whereupon Clayborne sent another armed pinnace to attack him. A naval battle followed in which Calvert was completely victorious, and Kent Island was seized and Clayborne tried and found guilty of "piracy and murder," in consequence of which, as we are informed by the historians, Clayborne became a "felon convict."

He succeeded, however, in escaping into Virginia, and

soon after went to England and presented his case to Charles I. With Charles he seems to have had no difficulty, but through the influence of Queen Henrietta Maria the "Lords Commissioners of Plantation," decided in Calvert's favor, and Clayborne, the rebel, was notified that he had no further rights in Maryland. He was driven from Kent Island, and although Charles appointed him "Treasurer of Virginia" for life, that was indeed a poor satisfaction to a man of his high spirit.

Meantime Clayborne returned to Virginia and watched and waited for his opportunity, which was not long delayed.

In 1645 the day of trouble had arrived for both King and Queen. Crown and Parliament were at dagger's draw and Sir William Berkeley, Governor of Virginia, had gone to England to consult with the King. Here was Clayborne's opportunity. Assembling a force of malcontents he invaded Maryland, violently expelled Calvert and was soon in possession of the province, a result so sudden and strange that it seems almost incomprehensible. In reality it is easily explained. Clayborne, the Church of England man and descendant of the Roman Catholic Cleburnes had made himself the leader of the Puritans, and used them to crush the Maryland Catholics. A large number of the Puritans had been driven from Virginia by intolerant legislation, had sought refuge in Maryland and Clayborne took advantage of the religious animosities of the time to achieve his own ends. It seemed that he had struck a mortal blow. Lord Baltimore was overwhelmed in Maryland and Clayborne once more in power might make a royal progress to his beautiful Isle of Kent. But the joy was too great to last. Sir William Berkeley returned; Leonard Calvert made most piteous complaints and supported by that zealous old Cavalier, he invaded Maryland and again overthrew and expelled Clayborne. The Rebel was thus driven from Maryland and as Virginia was now too hot for him he sailed for England, his enemies, no doubt, believing that they had seen the last of him.

But now comes another turn of the wheel of fortune. In the spring of 1652 a Parliament fleet arrived in Virginia and that royalist province was obliged to surrender to the English Commonwealth. Among the commissioners who received its surrender and apparently the chief among them was our rebel William Clayborne and thus the haughty King's Counsellor and "Secretary of State for this our Kingdom of Virginia" had suddenly re-appeared as a Roundhead and a friend of the usurping Cromwell. It was one of the most dramatic contrasts presented during one of the most changeful of human careers. The rebel was once more the master for he came with authority to "reduce the plantations in the Bay of Chesapeake" one of which was incontestably Maryland, and he was for the moment the arbiter of Virginia. Moreover he had in his pocket a paper which had probably induced him to become a Roundhead commissioner, viz., his instructions which declared that Virginia should be left to "enjoy the ancient bounds and limits granted by the Charters of the former Kings." Now these charters of the former kings were those which covered the entire territory of Maryland and in a corner of that territory was a certain Kent Island, formerly belonging to him, the said William Clayborne, who had, no doubt, suggested in London the insertion of that article with reference to Virginia's "ancient boundaries."

Maryland fell without a struggle. The fierce foe of Lord Baltimore had at last triumphed and it seemed that Clayborne had "triumphed over all his enemies." He was the head of the Puritan party who were the complete masters of all Maryland. His life-long conflict with Lord Baltimore had ended in the final overthrow of Baltimore's power and as far as human eye could see the "pirate and felon convict" would continue to rule Maryland as long as Oliver Cromwell ruled over England. It was a marvelous change for the unknown man who had left Cleburne in Westmoreland about thirty years before and had come to Virginia to seek his fortunes. With nothing to aid him but his own brain and will he had made succesful headway against the powerful Lord Baltimore—indeed against the Crown itself; and now in these last days had finally attained all his ends, and was not only Lord of Kent but of all Maryland.

In his later life, however, fate was not kind to this remarkable man and he was to encounter obstacles with which no human power can contend. He was not destined to retain his authority in Maryland.

In the autumn of 1658 the great Protector passed away and two years later Charles II was restored to his throne and Maryland quietly acknowledged him. That was necessarily the end of Clayborne's authority in the province. There was no longer any posibility of even retaining his hold on Kent Island and for the rest of

his life he made no further attempts to gain possession of it. He and his old Puritan followers were under an eclipse.

The famous rebel was now an old man and spent the remainder of his life at his fine house of "Romancoke" and toward the end of the century he died at the age of about ninety.

These old struggles are now long forgotten, but they lie at the foundation of American History and are well worthy of attention. In the history of Virginia in the seventeenth century, two episodes are most prominent—the Great Rebellion led by Bacon against Sir William Berkeley and Charles II, and this civil war in Maryland instituted by Clayborne against Lord Baltimore and Charles I. Bacon's career and character have secured the recognition to which they are entitled, while Clayborne's have been caricatured by political opponents and their modern echoes.

The decision against his claims by the Lords Commissioners made him technically a rebel, but his right was still there, and he was amply justified in defending it. His career can be readily traced from his childhood at Cleburne Hall to his old age at Romancoke and it is not difficult to correctly estimate the character of the man. He was a soldier, a diplomat, a politician and a man of genius. Living in an age which was not scrupulous, he fought his enemies with their own weapons, and the multitudes of honorable persons of his blood in the United States may well feel proud of their descent from him.

## MAJOR SIMON WILLARD.

Among the Puritans whose names we delight to honor, few rendered more distinguished services both military and civil in Mass. Colony than Maj. Simon Willard.

He was born in Horsmonden, Co. Kent, Eng., was a son of Richard Willard, by his second wife, Margery, and was baptized April 7, 1605. While he was brought up in the Established Church of England there is some reason to believe that his father was among those who inclined towards the dissenters. His own attitude also throughout his long life in New England was that of the strictest adherence to Puritanism. He is said to have had a commission as captain in the army before leaving England and in Johnson's "Wonder Working Providence" he is called a "Kentish soldier."

He first married Mary Sharpe, a daughter of Henry Sharpe of Horsmonden and with his wife and young family came to New England in 1634. He was then aged 29. He settled first at Cambridge where he was a merchant and engaged in trading with Indians, purchasing furs for export. In 1635 Rev. Mr. Bulkeley, Simon Willard and twelve others were granted by the court a plantation at Musketaquid, six miles square, which they occupied during the fall of that year and named the place Concord. Immediately upon the organization of the town he was chosen clerk, which office he held for 19 years. He was given command of the train band and soon after, in March, 1637, was commissioned "Lieut. Commander," and from this time on for upwards of 40

years, his military service was continuous, while he served also continuously in civil office for 15 years as Deputy and 22 years as Assistant.

His large acquaintance and dealings with the Indians enabled him to render the Apostle Eliot valuable aid and he was the medium of communication between the government and the sachems.

As surveyor he appears to have been appointed by the General Court to lay out their grants for towns, etc., and also as arbitrator in the many angry disputes which were constantly arising over boundary lines. A tribute to his tact and judgment is found in the grateful acknowledgment of the people in many of the petitions asking for confirmation of his adjustments. A commission of which he was chairman had for 7 years practically the entire authority in all municipal affairs of the neighboring town of Lancaster. They appointed the selectmen, regulated the division of land, and even the affairs of the church were a part of their care. The administration of their affairs resulted in their offering him an exceptional inducement to come to Lancaster. This he accepted, sold his estate in Concord and removed to Lancaster in 1658 or 1659 and thence to Groton in 1671 settling on a large farm he had acquired there.

His wife Mary died, having borne him 9 children and he married as his second wife Elizabeth Dunster who died six months later. He married as his third wife Mary Dunster, by whom he had 8 children born between the years 1649 and 1669.

He had been chosen Sergeant Major, or chief military officer for Middlesex County in 1653 and the next year was commander in chief of the expedition against Ninigret, Sachem of the Nyanticks. His most distinguished service began with the opening of King Philip's war, when, as Sergeant Major, he was in a position of great responsibility, organizing the forces of the Colony, protecting and fortifying outlying settlements, etc. Although an old man 70 years of age he was in the saddle almost constantly for months. He was at the battle at Brookfield and from that time his forces were scouting the country wherever there was alarm. He went to Hadley, Springfield and other threatened villages and returned to his home in Groton when an attack was expected there. This came in March, 1675-6 and the town was then completely destroyed, including his house and his son's house. The people of Groton had all been removed and Maj. Willard had taken his family to Charlestown.

On March 29th he was in his seat at the Court of Assistants; on April 11 he was re-elected and was actively engaged in his public duties until April 18 when he was taken with an "epidemical cold," and on April 24, 1675-6 he "died in his bed in peace, though God had honored him with several signal victories over our enemies in war," as a contemporary historian says.

His funeral was "an occasion for great pomp. Six military companies parading under command of Capt. Henchman; and his death created profound sorrow far and wide." His family were reimbursed in 1677 "for his great expense and services" and in 1681 a grant of 1000 acres of land was set aside for his six youngest children when they should become of age.
