



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

## The Mckee Library

THOMAS JEFFERSON McKEE was born in the City of New York, March 9, 1840, the son of Henry and Mary Anderson McKee, both natives of that city. He attended the old Thirteenth Street School until 1853, going from there to the Free Academy (now the College of the City of New York), from which institution he graduated in 1858. Choosing the legal profession as his life-work, he entered the law office of John B. Stevens, and, in a few years, was fairly launched on a In 1863 his services were called for, in promising career. defense of his country, and he left New York for the front, with his regiment, the Twenty-second, N. G., S. N. Y., being away some months, and taking part in the battle of Gettysburg. On his return, with health somewhat impaired, he applied himself assiduously to his law business, and soon attained marked success, particularly in his chosen branch, as a Real Estate and Corporation Lawyer. He was counsel for over 25 years for one of the New York banks, and Trustee and Executor for a number of large estates. In 1896 his health failed, and in a short time he was compelled to give up all active pursuits. He lingered, in patient endurance, nearly four years, and finally entered into rest on July 16, 1899.

The collection of Books, Manuscripts, Autograph Letters, Original Drawings, Engravings, and Play Bills formed by Mr. McKee, and now about to be dispersed, cannot be rightly estimated, except in connection with the personality and aims of the one who gathered it.

His aims were definite, and he did nothing hap-hazard. Every item in his collection was a link in a chain, and possessed to him a distinctive interest.

An early and inherited love for the Drama, together with an insatiable desire for knowledge regarding its history and exponents, led to the formation of doubtless the most complete and comprehensive collection on that subject ever gathered in America. Recognizing the fact that English Literature could only be rightly interpreted when studied "from the foundations up," he began to gather such early specimens as came within his reach and means, in the days when so many others were captivated with showy art works, Dibdiniana, and the like. At that time, and with that object in mind, the initial steps were laid for the formation of his very choice collection of Old English Literature in Prose and Verse which is notable among the fine American collections in that line.

The same reasoning he applied to Early American Literature, and covered the ground in the same thorough way, as evidenced by the contents of this Catalogue.

He collected first editions of English and American Authors, in the early days, because he found an element in their writings presaging immortality. Many were gathered when the authors were unknown, or unappreciated.

His judgment was sound, and he made few mistakes. There is in the collection no representation of that class of authors who are but "a remembrance,"—their works in great demand at one period, and unheard of ever after.

He gathered books omniverously in the earlier years of his collectorship, and the library as it now stands with all its wealth of material, represents but a portion of all that he accumulated. As the years passed, certain lines of literature in which he had formerly been interested lost their hold upon him, and he settled on the final composition of his library. To allow of a greater freedom in purchases, and to make room for later acquisitions, he disposed of two choice and extensive collections of books by public auction sale. Included were his notable gathering of works illustrated by the Cruikshanks, Rowlandson, Leech, "Phiz," and other English illustrators, Sporting Works, First Editions of Dickens and Thackeray, a fine collection of Shakespeariana. sets of the best editions of Standard English Authors, works on the Fine Arts, etc. This enabled him to concentrate his attention on those parts of his collection which were to him of paramount interest.

His marked success in gathering together such a collection cannot be wholly attributed to the qualities generally presumed to be requisite for its accomplishment. He possessed zeal, knowledge, and perseverance, and made abundant use of them, but other, and even more important qualities of mind and disposition supplemented these, and gave him special advantages.

Brimful of good nature and generous to a degree, in thought and deed, he was a true friend to all booksellers, and it was a pleasure for them to approach him with their wares. Meanness was to him an unknown quantity. Mr. McKee was always willing to pay a good price for a good book, and in the lines of his collecting he was for many years one of the recipients of the valuable benefits derived by those who have that reputation.

He possessed, and could depend upon, his intuitions. Some of the choice nuggets in the collection came to him at unexpected times, and in unexpected places, when no sources of information were at hand, and a quick decision was necessary.

He was a reader, as well as a lover of his books, and the information he acquired was freely imparted to others. Probably no private library in New York was so open to those seeking data for literary and dramatic work, as is evidenced by the numerous acknowledgments contained in books and magazines, of help accorded the writers from the use of his material. His friend, Edmund Clarence Stedman has characterized him, "The most obliging of Bibliophilists."

Mr. McKee's interest in American Poetry dated from about the time of the dispersion of the library of Albert G. Greene, in 1869, at which he was a purchaser. Later, at the C. Fiske Harris and Brinley sales, he made notable additions to his collection, and from that time, whenever opportunity presented, he was a ready purchaser of American Poetry.

In the earlier days, there were but few who recognized the peculiarly distinctive qualities of this species of literature,— Evert A. Duyckinck, whose collection is now a part of the New York Public Library (Lenox Branch) was a shining example, and even to-day there are comparatively few who realize the possibilities in it.

Mr. McKee found, on examination, that the real History of America was closely interwoven with its Poetry; that to an exceptional degree the poems were filled with local and personal allusions, and contained valuable biography unobtainable elsewhere; that it was largely a reflex of the manners and customs of the American people,—in fact, among the most interesting of the world's poetry, as a study. Besides this, as an enthusiastic American, he delighted to trace the upward growth of his Country's Literature from the oftentime crude productions of its early writers.

A critical inspection of the books in this portion of the library will show that with a few exceptions, every volume possesses more or less of the qualities indicated. Mr. McKee could not tolerate "glittering generalities" in poetry. There must needs be something definite in it to win his interest. He purchased Eastern, Western, and Southern poetry, that he might study the different types, and obtain a more comprehensive view. But few of his most intimate friends were aware of the wide scope of his knowledge regarding the history, growth, and merit of American Literature. While possessing to an extraordinary degree the so-called collector's instinct, he did not rest content with knowledge of author's names, dates of first editions, and all the minutiæ that pertains to collectorship, in all of which he was thoroughly versed, but he was familiar with the life history of the different authors, the circumstances under which the books were written and brought before the public, their relation to the period in which they were produced, and the critical estimate placed upon them by contemporary and later writers. All this gave zest to his pursuits, and enabled him to derive additional pleasure from his possessions.

Perhaps no better basis for an estimate of the strength of this collection in the earlier printed poetical works can be obtained than by a reference to some others. Bearing in mind the exceptional opportunities possessed by such early collectors of American Poetry as Greene, Brinley, Harris, Duyckinck, and Anthony, it will be conceded that any item they were collectively unable to secure must be very rare, and yet Mr. McKee possessed many such. He secured over thirty items printed before 1800 that are not included in Kettell's remarkable list (1829).

A remark made by Mr. McKee to the writer, years ago, may be quoted as embodying Mr. McKee's ideas on this subject. He said: "American collectors cannot afford to ignore two species of books, American History and American Literature. Those who do are likely to regret it when too late, for not only do they possess the highest interest, but the day is coming when they will be sought for with the same avidity that early English Literature is now." As to the condition of the books forming this collection, it can truthfully be stated that it is much above the average. A very large proportion of the volumes are in condition calculated to please the most fastidious (many of the best known binders being represented), while the bulk of the remainder are good, sound copies.

Mr. McKee was particular as to the condition of the books he purchased, but not finical. He would not pass by a really rare volume because of some *ordinary* defect, but purchased it, and awaited the opportunity of securing another, and a better, copy. The copies which satisfied Heber, Corser, Maidment, Jolley, Mitford, Perkins, Gaisford, Crawford, Brinley, Griswold, and others, were deemed worthy of a place on his shelves.

The intending purchasers at this sale need have no misgivings. The volumes speak for themselves as to condition. An honest and intelligent endeavor has been made to discover and describe every defect, however slight. All important books have been carefully collated.

This Poem first appeared in the columns of RIVINGTON'S "Gazette," and was incorporated in ANDRÉ'S Cow-Chace. NEW YORK: 1780. It was also included in WINTHROP SARGENT'S "Loyalist Poetry of the American Revolution." In these publications, it appeared under the name of "CAMILLO QUERNO." IT IS BELIEVED THAT THE NAME OF THE AUTHOR IS HERE FIRST REVEALED. THE POEM AS PUBLISHED IN THE "Cow-Chace" DIFFERS MATERIALLY FROM THIS MSS. COPY, THE AUTHOR HAVING MADE MANY ALTERA-TIONS. The volume contains a presentation inscription from THATCHER TAYLOR PAVNE, the Poet's younger Brother, in which the facts, as quoted, are detailed. A rare engraved portrait of "MASTER PAYNE," from a miniature by WOOD, is pasted on a fly-leaf, and some poetical clippings accompany the volume. The Author was in charge of a Church in MARYLAND for many years, and his "Causes and Consequences of the American Revolution" is well known. 





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THE Dramatic portion of the McKee Library necessarily extends into three catalogues—with a possible overflow into a fourth. It will be borne in mind that the collection of American Plays has already been dispersed. The succeeding one will contain the remarkably choice lot of Early English Plays, together with the collected editions of the Early Dramatists, including the Shakespeare Folios.

The present Catalogue represents, therefore, but a portion of Mr. McKee's Dramatic Library, and, moreover, contains only such items as pertain strictly to the Drama. The number could have been greatly augmented by the introduction of works usually classed under the heading of Drama, but which relate to its history in only a remote way. As a rule, the Manuscripts, Books of Portraits, Works with Autographic Material, and Playbills, will not be found in this Catalogue—though many notable exceptions have been made. The items will be easily recognized.

Mr. McKee was an enthusiastic student of the Drama, and his knowledge on the subject was all-embracing and exhaustive. Particularly was this true as regards its early history, both in England and America. While most works on the Drama appealed to him as a purchaser, because of his innate desire for knowledge not already possessed, and to extend encouragement to those who were disposed to contribute to its literature, his main endeavor was to secure the "foundation stones," on which the whole dramatic superstructure rests. The measure of success he attained is evidenced by the presence in the collection of such items as Northbrooke, Gosson, Heywood, Green, Downes, etc., in Early English, and the rare works relating to the introduction of the Drama in New York, Philadelphia, Boston, and other American cities. He was constantly in search of material that might throw new light on these particular phases of stage history.

Many interesting and important items which should have been placed in the preceding and present portions of the Catalogue were discovered when too late for insertion with the rest. They will be included in the fifth and final portion.
