#### WOLSTENHOLME:

cr. 10 Jan. 1664/5; ex. May 1762.

I. 1665. "SIR JOHN WOLSTENHOLME, of London, Knt., one of the farmers of His Majesty's Customs," 1st s. and h. of Sir John Wolstenholme, of Nostell Priory, co. York, and of Stammore, co. Midx., also a farmer of the said Customs (d. 25 Nov. 1639, aged 77), hy his 2d wife, Catharine, "cousen and heire of Richard Wanton, of London, Esq.," (b) da. of (—), was b. about 1596; was admitted to Gray's Inn (together with his father), 13 Aug. 1611; was a partner with his father in farming the Customs; M.P. for West Looe, 1625 and 1626; for Newport, 1628 till void 14 April 1628, and for Queenboro', April to May 1640; was Knighted v.p. at Whitehall, 8 May 1633; was of Nostell, co. York, 1640, but was heavily fined and his estates sequestrated in Sep. 1643, (many being sold during the Civil Wars,) suffering a loss of above £100,000; was restored to his office at the Restoration, and made Collector "outward" of the port of London, and was cr. u Baronet, as above, 10 Jan. 1664/5. He m., in or

<sup>(</sup>a) The date of 1 Jan. 1664/5 has been arbitrarily selected as comprising (notwithstanding the chronological disparity of the division) the approximate half of the number of Baronetcies of the three realms, created between 30 Jan. 1648/9 (the death of Charles I.), and 1 May 1707, the date of the Union with Scotland, after which last named epoch the creation of Scotch Baronetcies ceased. The previous portion (30 Jan. 1648/9 to 31 Dec. 1664) of that period is contained in vol. iii.

- II. 1670. SIR THOMAS WOLSTENHOLME, Baronet [1665], of Minchinden, in Edmonton, Midx., 2d but 1st surv. s. and h., b. probably about 1622(b); suc. to the Baronetcy, 4 July 1670. He m. (Lic. Lond., 31 Jan. 1645/6, he of the Middle Temple, London, about 24, bachelor, she about 17, spinster) Elizabeth, da. of Phineas Andrews, of St Olave's, Hart street, London, and of Denton Conrt, co. Kent, by Mildred, sister of Thomas Fanshawe, of Ashford, co. Kent. He was bur. 16 Nov. 1691, at St. Margaret's, Westm. Admon. 5 June 1716 to Sir Nicholas Wolstenholme, Baronet. His widow was bur. there 20 Jan. 1696/7.
- III. 1691. SIR JOHN WOLSTENHOLME, Baronet [1665], 1st s. and h., b. ahout 1650; suc. to the Baronetcy in Nov. 1691. Was M.P. for Middlesex (four Parls.), 1695—1700 and 1705 till death in 1709. He m. firstly, 27 May 1675, at Enfield, Midx. (Lic. Vic. Gen., 19 March 1674/5, he of Edmonton, Midx., about 25, bachelor, and she about 14, spinster) Mary, da. and h. of Nicholas Raynton, of Forty Hall in Enfield aforesaid, by Mary, da. of Michael Harver, of London. She, by whom he had eight children, was bur. at Enfield, 2 April 1691. He m. secondly, 7 Feb. 1699 (both being then of St. Anne's, Westm.), Temperance, widow of Sir Rowland Alston, 2d Baronet [1642], 2d da. and coheir of Thomas (Crewe), 2d Baron Crewe of Stene, by his 1st wife, Mary, da. of Sir Roger Townshend, 1st Baronet [1617]. He was bur. 12 Feb. 1708/9, at Enfield. Will pr. Feb. 1709. His widow, by whom he had no issue, d. 18 Oct. 1728, and was bur. with her 1st husband, at Odell, Beds. Will pr. 1728.
- IV. 1709. SIR NICHOLAS WOLSTENHOLME, Baronet [1665], of Forty Hall aforesaid, 1st s. and h., bap. 6 March 1675/6, at Enfield; suc. to the Baronetcy in Feb. 1708/9. He m. (Lic. Fac., 1 Nov. 1698, he about 22 and she about 17) Grace, da. and coheir of Sir Edward Waldo, of Pinner, Midx., Merchant of London, by his 3d wife, Elizabeth, da. of Sir Richard Shuckburgh. He d. s.p., 19 and was bur. 20 Feb. 1716/7, at Enfield. Will pr. Feb. 1717. His widow m. 11 Jan. 1717/8, at St. James', Westm., William Ferdinand (Carey), 8th Baron Hunsdon (who d. s.p. 12 Jnne 1765, in his 81st year) and d. 9 May 1729, in her 46th year, being bur. at Hutton Rudby, co. York. Will pr. 1729.
- V. 1717. SIR WILLIAM WOLSTENHOLME, Baronet [1665], of Forty Hall aforesaid, next surv. br. and h., being 4th s. of the 3d Baronet, was bap. 12 Dec. 1689, at Enfield; suc. to the Baronetcy, 19 Feb. 1716/7. He m., about 1718, Elizabeth, da. of Benjamin WHEELER. He d. s.p.m.s.(c), 31 Jan., and was bur. 7 Feb. 1723/4, at Enfield. Admon. 1 April 1724. His widow d. 10 May 1739, and was bur. there, aged 40. Admon. 2 June 1739.

Dorothy Vere, but d. s.p. and v.p., 12 and was bur. at Great Stammore, 21 Sep. 1669. M.I. VI. 1724. SIR THOMAS WOLSTENHOLME, Baronet [1665], of Hurley, Berks, uncle and h. male, being 2d s. of the 2d Baronet, was b. probably about 1660; suc. to the Baronetcy, 31 Jan. 1723/4. He m. Mary, da. of (--) Hutten, an officer of the Revenue in Ireland. She d. before him, and is possibly the "Lady Wolsthom" who is bur., 2 March 1724/5, at St. Margaret's, Westm. He d. Sep. 1738, and was bur. at Hurley. Admon. 7 Nov. 1738.

VII. 1738, SIR FRANCIS WOLSTENHOLME, Baronet [1665], of to Hurley aforesaid, 3d but only surv. s. and h.; suc. to the 1762. Baronetcy in Sep. 1738. He d. unm. and was bur. 6 May 1762 at Hurley, when the Baronetcy became extinct.

cr. 11 Jan. 1664/5;

but assumed till 1804 or later.

I. 1665. "SIR JOHN JACOB, of Bromley [by Bow], co. Midx. [and of Woodbury, in Gamlingay, ce. Cambridge], Knt., another of the Farmers of His Majesties Customs," 2d but 1st surv. s. and h. of Abraham Jacob, of Gamlingay and Bromley aforesaid (d. 6 May 1629, aged 56), by Mary (mar. lic. 27 Jan. 1591/2), da. of Francis Rogers, of Dartford, co. Kent, was b. about 1598 at Gamlingay; matric, at Oxford (Merton Coll.) 17 Jan. 1616/7, aged 19; B.A. 1616/7; was one of the Farmers of the Customs of London to Charles I, by whom he was Knighted at Whitehall, 8 May 1633, being then of Stanstead, co. Essex; had an estate of £3,000 a year; was M.P. for Harwich, April to May 1640; for Rye 1640, till expelled 21 Jan. 1641; was a zealous adherent of Charles I, suffering great loss on his behalf, his lands being sequestered, etc., was restored to his office at the Restoration; made a Commissioner of the Customs, and was cr. a Baronet, as above, I1 Jan. 1664/3. He m. firstly, Elizabeth (aged 3 in 1611) only da. of John Hallyday, or Holliday, by Alice, da. of William Ferrers, of London, Mercer. By her he had three children. He m. secondly, I4 June 1632, at Stepney, Midx., Alice, widow of John Eaglesfield, of London, merchant, da. of Thomas Clowes, of the same. He m. thirdly Elizabeth, 1st da. and coheir of Sir John Ashburnham. He was bur. 13 March 1665/6, at Bromley aforesaid, aged about 68. Will pr. 1666. His widow m. (Lic. Fac. 30 June 1688) William Wogan (then aged 30 and unm.), Serjeant at Law, and d. April 1697.

II. 1666. SIR JOHN JACOB, Baronet [1665], of Bromley and Woodbury aforesaid, 3d but 1st surv. s. and h., being 1st s. by the 2d wife; b. at Bromley aforesaid probably about 1633; matric. at Oxford (Mag. Hall.), 24 June 1653; admitted to Middle Temple 1654; suc. to the Baronetcy in March 1665/6. He m. 26 May 1664, at St. James', Clerkenwell, Catharine, da. of William (Alington), 1st Baron Alington of Killard [I.], by Elizabeth, da. of Sir Lionel Tollemache, 2d Baronet [1611]. He d. 1674, and was bur. at St. Mary's, Savoy, Midx. Admon. as of St. Martin's in the Fields, 2 June 1674. His widow d. in St. Giles' in the Fields, and was carried thence for burial 11 May 1675. Admon. 12 June 1675.

III. 1674. SIR JOHN JACOB, Baronet [1665], of West Wratting, co. Cambridge, only surv. s. and h., b. probably about 1665; suc. to the Baronetcy in 1674; was an officer in the Army, serving under William III, in whose cause he was wounded at the battle of Killiecrankie in July 1689, being,

in 1694, Col. of a Reg. of Foot. He is said to bave suffered great loss by the seizure of his estates for Crown debts incurred by his grandfather for raising money in the cause of Charles I. He m. in or before 1692(a) Dorothy, da. of Richard (BARRY), 3d EARL OF BARRYMORE [I.], by his 3d wife, Dorothy, da. and h. of John Ferrer, of Dromore. He d. 31 March 1740. Will dat. 12 Feb. 1738, pr. 19 April 1740. His widow d. 27 Jan. 1748/9, aged 86, and was bur. at Wratting.

SIR HILDEBRAND JACOB, Baronet [1665], of Overswell, TV1740.co. Glouc., grandson and beir, being only s. and h. of Hildebrand JACOB, by Meriel (m. 1717), da. of Sir John Bland, 4th Baronet 1790.[1642], which Hildebrand was only surv. s. and h. ap. of the late Baronet, but d. v.p. in Clarges street, Midx., 3 and was bur. 5 June 1739, at St. Anne's, Soho, aged 46. He was b. ahout 1718; matric. at Oxford (Univ. Coll.), 25 May 1736, aged 18; suc. to the Baronetcy, 31 March 1740; was a Hebrew scholar of some note, and was cr. D.C.L. by the Univ. of Oxford, 8 July 1756. He d. unm., at Malvern Wells, co. Worcester, 4 and was bur. 21 Nov. 1790, at St. Anne's, Soho, aged 72, when the Baronetcy became extinct.(b) Will dat. 5 Dec. 1788, pr. 4 Dec. 1790.

SIR CLEMENT BRYDGES JACOB, Baronet(d) [1665], ν. 1790.4th cousin and presumably heir male, being 1st s. and h. of the Rev. Alexander Jacob, Chaplain to the King, by Mary (m. 1756), da. of Robert Clement, of Bletchingley, co. Surrey, which Alexander, who was author of Jacob's Peeroge (b. 26 Dec. 1731, d. 9 and bur. 18 April 1785, in the Chandos vault at Whitchurch, Midx.), was only s. and h. of Lieut.-Col. Alexander JACOB (d. 13 April 1746, aged 54), who was 1st s. and h. of Alexander Jacob, of London, Turkey Merchant [hy Elizabeth (m. 26 Dec. 1691) sister of James, 1st Duke of Chandos, da. of James (BRYDGES), 8th BARON CHANDOS OF SUDELEY], which Alexander was s. of Robert Jacob, yr. br. of the 1st Baronet. He was b. 1 Nov. 1758, and, on the death, 4 Nov. 1790, of his distant cousin, the 4th Baronet, assumed the Baronetcy, on the ground, apparently, of being heir male collateral of the grantee. He, who was nnm. in 1802, d. s.p.m. 30 March 1804, in his 46th year.

SIR CHARLES JACOB, Baronet(d) [1665], only br. II. 1804, and h., b. 26 April 1761; suc. to the Baronetcy(d), 30 March to1804. He was unm. in 1802, and d. presumably s.p.m., 1820? when the assumption of the Boronetcy ceased.

cr. 12 Jan. 1664/5;ex. 19 Feb. 1788.

- I. 1665. "John Yeomans [or Yeamans], of the city of Bristol, co. Somerset, Esq.," supposed(a) to have been 1st s. and h. of Robert Yeamans, Alderman, and sometime, 1642, Sheriff of Bristol (who was executed there, 30 May 1643, by the then Governor, for having planned the delivery of that city to the King's army), by Anne (afterwards, before 1646, wife of Robert Speed, Quaker), was, probably in reward for that alderman's loyalty, cr. a Baronet, as above, 12 Jan. 1664/5. He afterwards settled in Barhadoes, and finally in South Carolina, where he was Gov. till 1680, having received a grant of four Baronies (48,000 acres), being at the same time created a Landgrave of that province, 5 April 1671, by John Berkeley, the "Palatinns Carolinae." He m. firstly, in Barbadoes, (—), da. of (—) Limp. He m. secondly there, Margaret, da. of the Rev. John Foster, of Barbadoes. He d. between 1680 and 1686.
- II. 1680? SIR WILLIAM YEAMANS, Baronet [1665], of Barbadoes aforesaid, 1st s. and h., being only s. by the 1st wife; suc. to the Baronetcy on the death of his father. He m., in Barbadoes, Willoughby, da. of Sir James Browne. She was living 1676-80.
- III. 1685? SIR JOHN YEAMANS, Baronet [1665], of Barbadoes aforesaid, s. and h., suc. to the Baronetcy on the death of his father. He m. Margaret, 3d da. of Philip Gibbes, of St. James', Barbadoes (d. July 1697), by (—), his 1st wife. He d. apparently (b) before 1691. His widow m. William Foster and, subsequently, Major John Butler, who was living as her widower in Dec. 1691.
- IV. 1690? SIR JOHN YEAMANS, Baronet [1665], of Barbadoes aforesaid, s. and h., b. about 1689, being aged 26 in 1715; suc. to the Baronetcy on the death of his father; was, possibly, the "John Yeamans, Gent.," admitted to Lincoln's Inn, 29 May 1713. He m. in Barbadoes, in or before 1715, Anne, apparently,(b) widow of Col. Thomas Helms, da. of (--) Scantlebury, of Barbadoes. He d. before 1740.
- V. 1730? SIR JOHN YEAMANS, Baronet [1665], of Barbadoes aforesaid, only s. and h., b. there about 1720; matric. at Oxford (Queen's Coll.), 15 July 1738, aged 18; suc. to the Baronetcy on the death of his father. He m. in or before 1742, (—). He was living in Barbadoes, 1771.
- VI. 1780? SIR ROBERT YEAMANS, Baronet [1665], s. and h., b. to about 1742; matric at Oxford (Merton Coll.), 17 Jan. 1759, aged 1788. 17; B.A., 1763; was in Holy Orders; Vicar of Fittleworth and Incumbent of Cold Waltham, Sussex, 1776-88. He d. s.p., presumably, nnm., 19 Feb. 1788, aged about 46, when the Baronetcy became extinct.

<sup>(</sup>e) In Le Neve's Baronetage this is put hypothetically, but in V. L. Oliver's Antigua as a certainty. There was, however, a John Yeamans, of St. Mary's Redcliffe, Bristol, Brewer (whose will was dat. 1645) and who not improbably was a brother or near relation of the alderman, and who certainly had three children, all bap. at St. Mary's aforesaid, viz., (1) John, bap. 28 Feb. 1611, possibly the Baronet of the creation of 1666, who in his will, dated 1686, mentions the children of his brother John and of his brother Joseph; and (3) Joseph, bap. 27 Sep. 1617, who had three children, John, Robert and George.

I. 1665. "John Pye, of Hone [in Marston on Dove], co. Derby, Esq.," 2d s. of Sir Robert Pye, of Faringdon, Berks,(") Anditor of the Exchequer, a zealous Royalist (d. 1662), by Mary, da. and coheir of John Croker, of Battisford, co. Glone., was b. about 1626, and was cr. a Baronet, as above, 13 Jan. 1664/5; el. Sheriff of Derbyshire, 1678, but did not act. He m. 27 Feb. 1648/9, at St. Mary's Aldermanbury, London (Lic. Fac. 24, he of Westminster, aged 23, and unm., and she aged 17, spinster), Rebecca, da. of Nicholas Raynton, of Enfield, Midx., by Rebecca, da. of John Moulson, of Nantwich, co. Chester, which Nicholas was nephew of Sir Nicholas Raynton, Lord Mayor of London, 1622-23. He d. about 1697. His widow d. Sep. 1707. Will pr. Oct. 1707.

II. 1697? SIR CHARLES PYE, Baronet [1665], of Hone aforesaid, only s. and h., b. about 1661, at Mortlake, Snrrey; matric. at Oxford (Wadham Coll.) 26 May 1669, aged 18; suc. to the Baronetcy about 1697; was M.P. for Derby, 1700-01; purchased the estates of Clifton Camvile and Houghton, co. Stafford. He m. firstly (Lic. Fac. 28 April 1680, he of Turnham Green, Chiswick, aged 28, unm., and she aged 19), Philippa, 1st da. of Sir John Hobart, 3d Baronet [1611], by his 1st wife Mary, da. of John Hampden. She, who was living 23 April 1683, d. s.p.s. He m. secondly (Lic. Fac. 23 Feb. 1684/5; Anne (then 22, spinster) da. of Richard Stevens, of Eastington, co. Glouc., by Anne, da. of Sir Hugh Cholmley, 1st Baronet [1641], of Whitby. He d. at Clifton Camville 12 Feb. 1720/1. Admon. 5 April 1721, and 7 May 1729. His widow d. 12 July 1722.

III. 1721. SIR RICHARD PYE, Baronet [1655], of Hone and Clifton Camvile aforesaid, 1st s. and h., by 2d wife, b. probably about 1690; suc. to the Baronetcy, 12 Feb. 1720/1. He d. unm. 22 Nov. 1724, at Derby. Admon. 1 July 1725.

SIR ROBERT PYE, Baronet [1665], of Hone and Clifton

to Camvile aforesaid, hr. and h., b. about 1696; matric at Oxford 1734. (Wadham Coll.), 16 Feb. 1713/4, aged 18; B.A. 1717; M.A. 1720; in Holy Orders; suc. to the Baronetcy, 22 Nov. 1724; was F.R.S. He d. unm. 23 May 1734, when the Baronetcy became extinct. Will pr. June 1734.(b)

#### TAYLOR:

cr. 18 Jan. 1664/5;
ex. Jan. 1719/20.

I. 1665. "Thomas Taylor, of the Parke house in the parish of Maidstone, co. Kent, Esq.," as also of Shadockhurst in that county, only s. and h. of Thomas Taylor, of Shadockhurst aforesaid, and of Newhall in Linstead, in that county, by his 2d wife, Anne, da. of Sir Thomas Hendley, of Corshorne, co. Kent, was b. in 1630, a year before his father's death, was admitted to Gray's Inn, 5 Nov. 1643, and was cr. a Baronet, as above, 18 Jan. 1664/5. He m. in or before 1657, Elizabeth, da. and h. of George Hall, of Maidstone. He is said to have d. in or soon after 1665; admon. not

SIR THOMAS TAYLOR, Baronet [1665], of Park house, ctc., aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 19 Aug. 1657; matric at Oxford (St. John's Coll.), 2 July 1675, aged 16; suc. to the Baronetcy on the death of his father; was M.P. for Maidstone (three Parls.), 1689 till death, in 1696. He m. in or before 1693, Alice, widow of Herbert Stapley, sister and, in 1723, h. of Sir Thomas Colepeper, 3d Baronet [1627], only da. of Sir Thomas Colepeper, 2d Baronet [1627], of Preston Hall, co. Suffolk, by Alice, da. of [-] BOURNE, of Norwich, was nephew and principal testamentary heir of Sir John LEMAN, sometime (1616-17) Lord Mayor of London (who d. unm. 26 March 1632), from whom he inherited in 1632 the estate of Warboys, co. Huntingdon, in which year also he purchased the abovenamed estate at Northaw; was Sheriff of Herts, 1635-36, and of Hunts, 1640-41; M.P. for Hertford, Sep. 1645 to 1653, and 1659-60, taking the Covenant 29 Oct. 1645, serving on several Committees and being a member of the Council of State, Feb. to Nov. 1651. [1.] for Carlow, 1660, and for co. Carlow, 1661-63; settled at East Sheen, near Richmond, in 1663, in which year he went on an unsuccessful mission to the Prince Bishop of Munster; was made Envoy to Brussels in 1665, and cr. a Baronet, as above, 31 Jan. 1665/6. The triple alliance between England, Holland and Sweden was effected mainly by him, and he was soon afterwards, 1668, made Ambassador to the Hague, but was recalled in 1670, though again sent there in 1674, when he brought about the marriage, in 1677, of William of Orange with Mary, afterwards [1689], King and Queen of England. He was M.P. for Northampton, Oct. till void in Nov. 1678; and for Cambridge Univ., 1679-81. He took part in, but disapproved of the treaty of Nimeguen in 1679, in which year he returned to England. "IGNATIUS VITUS, alias WHITE,(a) [COUNT D'ALBI in Ι. 1677, the Holy Roman Empire], 2d s.(b) of Sir Dominick White, of to Limerick, in Ireland," sometime (1636), Mayor of that city, BARON(c) AND COUNT D'ALBI as aforesaid (having been cr. a 1691.Count, Aug. 1658, by the Emperor Leopold), by his 1st wife Christina, da. of Thomas Bourke, of Limerick, of the family of the Barons Castle Connell [1.], was b. about 1626; was many years Envoy of Charles II. to Brussels, and subsequently to Madrid; was Col. of a Reg. of Horse in Flanders, and was, in or before 1674, cr. BARON DE VICKE in Holland; was, as "Ignatius Vitus, Baron of Vicque," cr. D.C.L. of Oxford, 27 June 1674, and was cr. a Baronet, as ahove, 29 June 1677, with a spec. rem. "for want of issue male, to his nephew,(4) Ignatius Maximilian Virus and to the heirs male of his body." He was P.C. and Sec. of State [I.], and was cr. 20 Aug. 1677, by the Emperor Leopold, MARQUIS D'ALBEVILLE in the Holy Roman Empire, a creation which, under the Earl Marshal's warrant, 30 Oct. 1686, was registered in the College of Arms, London; together with a recital that Charles II had, by royal signet, 7 April 1679, allowed together with a recital that Charles 11 had, by royal signet, 7 April 1679, allowed "the Rt. Hon. Sir Ignatius White alias D'Alby, Knight Baronet of the Kingdom of England and Baron de Vigue [i.e., Baron de Vicke in Holland], now Marquis D'Albyville, and Knight, Baron, Count and Marquis of the [Holy Roman] Empire, to receive honours from any King at amity with His Majesty." He was appointed,(\*) 1686, Ambassador to the Hague, where he had a medal struck on the birth, 10 June 1688, of the heir apparent to the Crown. He accompanied James II into France, after the battle of the Boyne; was attainted in 1691; and proclaimed an outlaw at Dublin, 11 May in that year, whereby the Baronetcy became forfeited. He was, till his death in 1694, Secretary to the exiled King at St. Germain's. He m. firstly, in or before 1664, Mary, da. of Patrick (FITZMAURICE), BARON KERRY AND LIXNAW [1.], hy Honora, da. of Edmond FITZGERALD. He, who bad wasted all his property, d. s.p.m.,(c) in great obscurity, heing presumably the "William RAYMOND, Gentleman, so called, otherwise called by the name of Hugh Middleton, d. 10 March 1702" (who resided at Kemberton, Salop), whose burial is thus entered in the parish register of Shiffnal, in that county. (in the Tory interest) for Bury St. Edmunds (six Parls.), 1689-1701, and Nov. 1703 to 1705; for Suffolk (six Parls.), 1705, till his death in 1722. He m., 2 Feb. 1681/2, at Rushbrook, Suffolk, Mary, 1st da. and coheir [1703] of Thomas (JERMYN), 2d BARON JERMYN OF ST. EDMUNDSBURY, by Mary, da. of Henry MERRY, 1st s. of Sir Henry Merry, of Derbyshire. By this marriage he acquired in 1703 one-fifth of the Rushbrook estate, of which he purchased the other parts from his wife's sisters. He sold the estate of Rougham between 1705 and 1710 to his son in law, Clement Corrance. He d. 1 and was bur. 7 Oct. 1722, at Rushbrook, aged 69. Will, in which he directs his Barbadoes estate to be sold, dat. 14 March 1714, pr. 13 Dec. 1722. Ch.), 14 March 1703/4, aged 17; was M.P. for Bury St. Edmunds, 1722-27, and for Suffolk (three Parls.), 1727, till death in 1743; suc. to the Baronetcy, 20 May 1723. By the death, 12 Oct. 1726, of Judith, widow of his great uncle, Henry (Jermyn), 3d Baron Jermyn of St. Edmundsbury and 1st Baron Dover, he inherited considerable estates, of which he sold that of Cheveley, in Cambridgeshire, in 1732. He m. 21 Oct. 1729 [Qy. 1728], at Rushbrook, Margaretta, 1st da. and coheir of the Rev. Edward Green, Rector of Drinkstone, Suffolk [1692-1740], and Margaret, his wife. He d. 20 and was bur. 27 Feb. 1742/3, at Rushbrook. Will dat. 20 Aug. 1740 to 4 Feb. 1742/3, pr. 31 Oct. 1743. His widow d. at Angel Hill, Bury St. Edmunds, 5 Feb. 1780, aged 85. Will dat. 16 and 17 Aug. 1771, directing her burial to be with her parents at Drinkstone, pr. 17 April 1780 at the Archdeacon's Court at Sudbury.

V. 1743. SIR ROBERT DAVERS, Baronet [1682], of Rushbrook aforesaid, 1st s. and h., b. presumably(a) about 1730 (i.e., after his parents' marriage in Oct. 1729, admitted to Bury Grammar School, July 1742;

1688. "SIR WILLIAM WILLIAMS, of Gray's Inn, co. Midx., T. Knt., Solicitor-General," being also of Glascoed, in Llansilin, co. Denbigh, was 2d s. of Hugh Williams, D.D., Rector of Llantrisant, co. Anglesey, and Canon of Bangor (d. 1670, aged 74), by Emma, da. and h. of John Dolben, of Caeau Gwynion, co. Denbigh, was b. 1634, at Nantanog in Llantrisant aforesaid; matric at Oxford (Jesus Coll.), 7 Nov. 1650, and admitted to Gray's Inn 5 days later; Barrister, 1658, becoming Treasurer in 1681; Recorder of Chester, 1667-84 and 1687-1700, and, being an active politician in the Whig interest, was M.P. for Chester, June 1675 to 1681, for Moutgomery for a few months, till void in June 1685, and for Beaumaris 1689-90 and 1695-98; was Speaker of the House of Commons, Oct. 1680 to March 1680/1, and was fined, in 1686, £10,000 (though payment of £8,000 was accepted) for having, as Speaker, licenced the publication of Dangerfield's libellous Narrative. He was, however, on 13 Dec. 1687, made Solicitor-General (being Knighted 11 Dec. 1687), and, as such, had, on behalf of the Crown, the conduct of the (unsuccessful) prosecution of the seven Bishops(a) in June 1688, being the next week cr. a Baronet, as above, 6 July 1688. Though an active supporter of the Revolution he was not continued in office, but was made King's Counsel in 1689, and continued to practise at the Bar till his death. He was L. Lieut. of Merionethshire Oct. 1689 to March following. As early as 1665 he had purchased the estate of Llanforda, Salop, but apparently resided chiefly at that of Glascoed. Linke Chaloner, D.D., Vice Chancellor of the Univ. of Dublin (d. 27 April 1613), da. of Christopher, Perceval. She d. s.p. 30 Jan. and was bur. 3 Feb. 1658/9, at St. Nicholas', Dublin. Funeral entry. Lord Frederick Henry Howard (yr. s. of Henry, Duke of Norfolk), who d. 16 March 1726/7, aged 42. She d. 22 Jan. 1731/2.

V. 1710, to and h. male, being 2d s. of the 2d Baronet; b. 1664; 1730? entered Trin. Coll., Dublin, 19 Jan. 1678/9, agcd 14; M.A., 1686. Being an adherent of James II, he was attainted 3 April (1694), 6 and 7 William and Mary, and, consequently, when he became heir to the Baronetcy in April 1710, was not legally entitled thereto. He became a monk in the English Monastery at Paris, and was living in France in 1727. On his death the Baronetcy presumably became extinct.

Dublin, 1665; and was in 1687 (21 years after his death) styled, in error, "Baronet" [Qy. I.].(a) He m. prohably about 1640, Margaret, 2d da. of Capt. Erasmus Saunders. She d. 30 April and was bur. 5 May 1662, at St. Werburgh's, Dublin. Funeral entry. He d. 25 Jan. and was bur. there 2 Fcb. 1665/6. Funeral entry. Will dat. 28 Oct. 1665, pr. [I.] 1666.

RICHARD DIXON, subsequently, after 1683/4, SIR RICHARD DIXON, of Colverstown aforesaid, 1st s. and h.; admitted to Lincoln's Inn, 26 Oct. 1659; suc. his father, 25 Feb. 1665/6; was Sheriff of co. Kildare, 1667; Knighted by the Lord Deputy [I.], 24 Feb. 1683/4, and was in 1687 (about three years after his death) styled, in error, "Baronet." (\*) He m. at St. Werburgh's aforesaid, 18 Jan. 1662/3 (Lic. 29 Dec. 1662) Mary, niece of Sir Maurice Eustace, Lord Chancellor [I.], da. of William Eustace, of Blackrath, co. Kildare, by Anne, da. of James Netterille, of Castletown Kilpatrick, co. Meath. She d. 3 Jan. 1678, 9, and was bur. there 22 July 1684. Funeral entry. He d. 19 and was bur. 1684.

ROBERT DIXON, of Colverstown aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 1674, being 10 years old when he suc. his father 19 July 1684, and being in an inquisition at Kilmainham, 13 Oct. 1687, styled, in error, "Baronet." (A) This title, however, he never assumed. He was M.P. [I.] for Randalstown, 1692-93, and for Ilarristown, 1703-13, being Sheriff of co. Kildare 1709. He d. nnm. in Jervis street, Dublin, (b) and was bur. (as "Colonel Dixon") at Kilcullen, 9 March 1725/6. Funeral entry.

[1.] for Coleraine, 1661-66 (being, erroneously, styled "Baronet"); suc. to the Baronetcy, 15 Jan. 1673. He m. (Lic. Vic. Gen., 20 Feb. 1662/3, being then "of Fnlraigne, co. Londonderry, Esq., about 27, bachelor"), Catherine (then about 20) yst. da. of Francis (Annesley), Viscount Valentia [I.] by his 2d wife, Jane, da. of Sir John Stanhofe. He was bur. 19 Oct. 1681, at St. Martin's in the Fields, Midx. Will dat. 4 Oct. 1681, pr. 26 July 1682. His widow d. 3 April 1701, and was bur. at St. Michañ's, Dublin. Her will pr. [I.] 1701.

Cork, by Jane, da. of Anthony Stawell, which Richard (b. in co. Cork 1641, and whose will dat. 6 Feb. 1678/9, was pr. 20 June 1679), d. v.p. in 1679. He was b. 1674, and suc. to the Baronetcy, on the death of his grandfather; was B.A. of Dublin Univ. 1696. He m. firstly (Lic. Lond. 15 Feb. 1696/7, being then about 22, bachelor), Grace, only surv. child of Sir George Norton, of Abbotsleigh, Somerset (d. s.p.s. 26 April 1715, aged 67), by Frances, da. of Ralph Freeke, of Hannington, Wilts. Leicester, by Martha, da. of Thomas Moulsey, of Staffordshire. He d. 1709, aged about 35. Will dat. 3 Aug. 1709, pr. [I.] 1709. His widow, who was b. 1673, m. [—] Boyle.

He d. s.p.m.,'b) at Utrecht in 1729 or 1730, aged about 56, when the Baronetcy became extinct. Admon. [I.] 7 Sep. 1741.

I. 1683. "James Caldwell, Esq., of Wellsburrow [i.e., Wellsburough], co. Fermanagh," 2d s. of John Caldwell, of Enniskillen, merchant (b. at Prestwick, co. Ayr, and d. in Dublin 19 Feb. 1639/40), being 1st s. by 2d wife Mary, da. of Anthony Swettenham, of Shotwick, co. Chester, was b. before 1634, probably about 1630; settled at Rossbeg, afterwards called Castle Caldwell, in Templecarne, co. He m. firstly, Catharine, da. of Sir John Hume, 2d Baronet [S. 1638?] of Castle Hume, co. Fermanagh, by Sidney, da. and coheir of James Hamilton, of Castle Hamilton, co. Leitrim. He m. secondly, shortly after 14 July 1722, "a person of considerably lower position than himself." He d. shortly before 5 Nov. 1726. Will dat. 21 June 1721, not mentioning his own family, but leaving all to Mrs. Ann Hewetson, pr. [I.] 19 Jan. 1726.

III. 1726? SIR JOHN CALDWELL, Baronet [I. 1683], of Castle Caldwell aforesaid, only s. and h.; suc. to the Baronetcy in or shortly before Nov. 1726; was Sheriff of co. Fermanagh, 1730. He m. 11 July 1719, at St. Bridget's, Dublin (settlement same date), Mary, 1st da. of John Trench, D.D., Dean of Raphoe, by Anne, da. of Richard Warburton, of Garryhinch, in Queen's County. He d. between 14 and 18 Feb. 1743/4. Will dat. 5 Jan. 1742/3 to 14 Feb. 1743/4, pr. [I.] 14 or 19 May 1744. His widow d. soon after 7 Nov. 1769.(c)

IV. 1744.SIR JAMES CALDWELL, Baronet [I. 1683], of Castle Caldwell aforesaid, 1st s. and h., b. about 1722; ed. at Dundalk School, 1734; Fellow Commoner of Trin. Coll., Dublin; B.A., 1740; a Freeman of Londonderry, 1741; suc. to the Baronetcy in Fcb. 1743/4, being then in France. Having distinguished himself in the Austrian Service, he was cr. by the Empress Maria Theresa, 15 March 1749, a COUNT OF MILAN IN THE HOLY ROMAN EMPIRE, with rem. to the heirs male of his body. Dep. Gov. of co. Fermanagh, and Col. of a Reg. of Militia, 1752; F.R.S., Feb. 1753; Sheriff of co. Fermanagh, 1756. He raised, 12 Jan. 1760, a Reg. of Light Horse (20th Dragoons) for the defence of Ireland, which was disbanded, 1763; P.C. [I.], 30 Jan. 1762; is said to have declined an Irish Peerage, as also the office of Chamberlain to the Empress of Germany. SIR JOHN CALDWELL, Baronet [I. 1683], of Castle Caldwell aforesaid, a Count of the Holy Roman Empire, 1st s. and h., b. 16 Aug. 1756; entered the Army, 1774; Licut. 1777; Aide de Camp to the Viceroy of Ireland, 1782; suc. to the Baronetcy in Feb. 1784; Gov. of co. Fermanagh, 1793; Lieut. Col. of the Fermanagh Militia, 1794; Sheriff of that county, 1798; Capt. of the Belleek infantry, 1802. He m. 16 May 1789, at Queen's Square chapel, Bath, Harriett, da. and coheir of Godfrey Meynell, of Yeldersley and Bradley, co. Derby, by Frances, da. of [—] Dealter. She d. at Bath, 1795. Admon. Feb. 1818. He d. s.p.m.,(a) 17 June 1830, aged 73, at Ramsgate, co. Kent, when the Countship of the Holy Roman Empire became extinct.

He was bap. 25 Feb. 1775, at Quebec; was made Treasurer Gen. of Canada, about April 1810; suc. to the Baronetcy, 17 June 1830. He m. 21 Aug. 1800, at Quebec, Jane (then aged 18) da. of James Davidson, Surgeon to the 2d Batt. of the Royal Canadian Volunteers. Shc d. at Quebec 1805, and was bur. there. He d. at Fremont House, Boston, United States of America, 26 Oct. 1842, aged 67, and was bur. at Boston. Will pr. Feb. 1844.

VII. 1842, SIR HENRY JOHN CALDWELL, Baronet [I. 1683], of to Belmont, in Canada aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 22 Oct. and bap. 1858. 28 Nov. 1801, at the Protestant Church at Quebec; was a Member of the Canadian Parl. in 1831; suc. to the Baronetcy, 26 Oct. 1842. Meath, 1685; was a Capt. in Luttrell's Dragoons, and was cr. a Baronct [I.], as above, by patent dat. at Dublin 20 May 1686, the Privy Seal being dat. at Whitehall, 18 March previous, with a special remainder, failing heirs male of his body, to his nephew, Edward Tyrrell, and his "heirs male." He was M.P. [I.] for Belturbet, 1689, in the Parl. of James II, and was hy that King (whose cause he adopted), made 7 April 1690, Supervisor of the counties of Cork, Waterford and Kerry. He m. Eleanor, widow of George Colley, of Edenderry, and formerly of Col. William Duckinfield, yr. da. of Sir Dudley Loffus, of Killyan, by Cecilia, da. of Sir James Ware, the elder. He was made prisoner at the surrender of Cork in 1690, and so continued till his death, 7 Feb. 1690/1, "and was never brought to trial or outlawed until 16 April 1691, when he was dead and in his grave." This description of him is, however, a mistake, for (though his father, grandfather and great great grandfather were Knights) he (himself) was neither Knight nor Baronet. He fought as Capt. in "Clare's Dragoons" (the regiment of his said father inlaw), for the cause of James II, at the battle of the Boyne, 1 July 1690, and d. ten days afterwards at his castle of Gort, and was attainted as an "Esquire" (only) in 1697, his estates being granted to Thomas Prendergast, who was cr. a Baronet [I.] by William III.

The mention of his interest in the estate of "the late Earl of Limerick" makes it probable that (like that Earl) he was an adherent of and obtained his title from James II,(b) but it is not improbable that it was given in 1663, and that he is the person indicated, 24 Oct. 1663, in the warrant for creating [—] Chambers, a Baronet. [Calendar of State Papers. Entry Book, 15.]

She d. 1676. He m. secondly (Lic. 23 July 1677), Elizabeth, widow of Henry Gref, da. of Major Joseph Deane, of Crumlin, co. Dublin, by his 1st wife, Anne. She d. 16 Jan. and was bur. 18 Feb. 1683/4, at St. Bride's, Dublin. Funeral entry. He d. 17 Nov. 1717, aged 75, and was bur. at Killenasulagh, co. Clare. M.I. Will dat. 18 Nov. 1717, pr. 1 April 1718.

This Sir John (whose will dat. 15 Feb. 1692/3, was pr. [I.] in 1727), he states to have d. soon after the battle (1 July 1690) of the Boyne. There is, however, no trace of his having ever been cr. a Baronet, and, even if he had been, his eldest son Francis Edgworth, of Edgworth's Town, co. Longford (who d. 1722), and his 2d son, Robert Edgworth, of Longwood, co. Meath (who d. 1730), both left male issue, who would be entitled to that dignity in preference to the issue of the 3d son, Henry Edgworth, of Lisard, co. Longford (who d. 1725), of whom the claimant, through a 2d son (the elder son Henry Edgworth, of Pallasmore, co. Longford, 2d son of the said Henry, d. Oct.

His widow d. there 30 Oct. 1794.

IV. 1793. SIR JAMES MALCOLM, Baronet [S. 1665], of Grange, co. Fife, and Balbedie aforesaid, cousin and h. male, being only surv. s. of Robert Malcolm, of Grange, by Isabella, da. of Robert Herries, of Hallykes, co. Dumfries, which Robert Malcolm (who d. abroad, 3 June 1769, aged 87) was 2d s. of the 1st Baronet. He, who was in the army, suc. to the Baronetcy, 5 May 1793, and was Lieut.-Gov. of Sheerness in 1794. He d. s.p., 25 Oct. 1805. Will pr. 1805.

(a) It has been suggested that the Baronetcy was conferred on his father (whose name was also John) and not on himself, but such was not the case. April 1736.

SIR NEIL MENZIES, Baronet [S. 1665], of Castle Menzies aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 16 Aug. 1780; Advocate [S.], 6 March 1802; suc. to the Baronetcy, 8 March 1813; Lient.-Col. of the Royal Highland Perthshire Militia. Ho m. firstly, 6 June 1808, Emilia, da. of Francis Balfour, of Fernie, co. Fife, by (—), da. of (—) Balfour, of Dunbog. She d. s.p.m. 1 Nov. 1810. He m. secondly, 3 Dec. 1816, Grace Charlotte Conyers, sister of Fletcher (Norton), 3d Baron Grantiey, 1st da. of the Hon. Fletcher Norton, by Caroline Elizabeth, da. of James Balmain. He d. 20 Aug. 1844, at Edinburgh, aged 64. It will be noticed that the 6th Baronet, whom he claims as his father, married [as stated in the text] some ten years previously (16 Sep. 1819) Eliza Mary Farquhar, by whom he had a son (born in 1826) who did (de facto) succeed to the Baronetcy in 1836. This difficulty is, however, disposed of by saying that Miss Farquhar's husband, though (hy means of foreclosing the mortgage of £25,000 made by the 5th Baronet to her father, Robert Farquhar) he obtained possession of the Greenock estates, was not, in reality, the son of the 5th Baronet but assumed the Baronetcy, which rightfully belonged to James Gilmour's father, like whom (who, it is stated, was such son), he styled himself "SIR MICHAEL SHAW STEWART, [6th] Baronet," so that from and after 1825 till the death of one of the said parties, there were two contemporary persons thus designated. The marriage with Miss Murdoch is there stated to be mentioned in Lodge's Peerage for 1834, as also in Oliver and Boyd's Almanack for 1837.

Eliza Mary, only child of Robert Farquhar, of Newark, co. Renfrew. He d. 19 Dec. 1836, at the Donglas Hotel, Edinburgh, aged 48. His widow, who was b. 14 Jan. 1799, d. suddenly 25 Jan. 1852, in Belgrave square.

Ch.), 23 May 1872, aged 17; sometime Capt. 4th Batt. Sutherland and Argyll Highlanders; M.P. for East Renfrewshire since 1886. He m. 14 Nov. 1883, at St. Geo. Han. sq., Alice Emma, 1st da. of John Alexander (Thynne), 4th Marquess of Bath, by Frances Isabella Catherine, da. of Thomas (Vesey), 2d Viscount de Vesci [L.]. She was b. 27 Jan. 1864.

His widow was bur. 22 Dec. 1695, at Fulham, co. Midx. Will dat. 15 Deo. 1695, pr. 21 Jan. 1695/6 by her da. Carey, Conntess of Monmouth, the universal legatee.

II. 1681, SIR PETER FRASER, Baronet [S. 1673], of Dores aforeto said, 3rd and yst. s., being only s. by 2d wife, was b. after 1659, 1729. heing under age in 1679; suc. to the Baronetcy on the death of his father, 26 April 1681, under the spee. rem. in the limitation of that dignity in consequence of the Dores estate having heen entailed on him.(c) He was Lord Lieut. of Kincardineshire. He m., probably about 1700, Anne, sister and coheir of Henry Heron, of Cressy Hull, in Surfleet, cc. Lincoln (who d. s.ps. 10 Sep. 1730, aged 56), da. of Sir Edward Heron, K.B., by Dorothy, da. of Sir James Lone, 2d Baronet [1662], of Draycot. He d. s.p. 10 May 1729, when the

(b) He was a great favourite with the King, and was much employed in Court affairs. "Dr. Pierce" told Pepys (Diary 19 Sep. 1664) that Fraser's influence was owing to his being "so great with all the Ladies of the Court in helping them to slip their calves when there is occasion, and with the great men in curing them." In the Dict. Nat. Biogr. this Pierce is spoken of as "a groom of the Privy Chamber, who repeated "backstairs' gossip," it heing there, also, stated that Sir John Denham's "attacks" on Fraser are "founded on personal enmity"

I. 1673. "Robert Cuningham, of Auchenharvie," in the parish of Stewarton, co. Ayr, 2d s. of the Rev. John Cuningham, (c) of Raidland, in Dalry, co. Ayr, Minister of Dalry (1604), by his 2d wife, Jean, da. of Robert Kee, of Treame, co. Ayr, fought on the King's side at the battle of Worcester; was Physician for Scotland to Charles II; had a Crown charter of Auchenharvie, 20 March 1667, ratified 1669, and, having probably been Knighted, was cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, 3 Aug. 1673, the limitation of the dignity being unknown, as no record of such creation exists in the Great Seal Register, nor is it in Milne's List. He, however, registered his arms as a Baronet, 10 Sep. 1673, in the Lyon office. He m. firstly, before 1653, Elizabeth, da. of [—] Dundas, by (—) Bubby, of Addington. He m. secondly, before 1661, Elizabeth, da. of Sir John Henderson, of Fordell, co. Fife, by Margaret Monteith, heiress of Randifoord. He d. late in Feb. and was bur. 4 March 1673/4 in Greyfriars, Edinburgh. (d)

II. 1674, SIR ROBERT CUNINGHAM, Baronet [S. 1673], of Auchenharvie aforesaid, only s. and h. by 2d marriage; bap. 7 Aug. 1662; suc. to the Baronetcy in Feb. 1673/4. He d. s.p. a few mouths later, before 29 Aug. 1674, when the Baronetcy is presumed to have become extinct.(e)

(a) Index to service of heirs. The date is usually given as 23 May. Of his two sisters of the whole blood and coheirs, (1) Carey, maid of honour to the Queen Consort Catharine, m. as his 1st wife, shortly after 1677, the well-known Charles (Mordaunt), Earl of Peterborough and Monmouth, who d. 25 Oct. 1735, aged about 77. I. 1673. "John Kennedy, of Girvanmains," in Girvan, co. Ayr (who appears to have been a grandson of Gilbert Kennedy, of the same, living 1662), reg. arms in the Lyon office, 1672,(a) and was cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, 4 Aug. 1673, with rem. to heirs male of the body; was admitted a Burgess of Ayr, 1674. On 22 Aug. 1678 he was served heir of conquest to his uncle, John Kennedy, in the Barony of Dalwarton, co. Ayr. He, who appears to have been ruined, sold his estates to Sir Thomas Kennedy, of Kirkhill, Provost of Edinburgh, etc., who was thence, sometimes, styled "of Girvanmains." (b)

II. 1700? SIR GILBERT KENNEDY, Baronet [S. 1673], of Girvanto mains aforesaid [Qy. his relationship to the above?]; presumably suc. to the Baronetcy. He was Falconer to the King in Scotland at a salary of £50. He m. Jean, da. of Sir Archibald Kennedy, Ist Baronet [S. 1682], of Culzean, by Elizabeth, da. of David (Leslie), 1st Lord Newark [S.]. He d. June 1740, when the Baronetcy became apparently extinct.

I. 1673. Kenneth(d) Mackenzie, of Coul, in the parish of Contin, co. Ross, 2d s. of Alexander Mackenzie, of Conl aforesaid, being 1st s. by 2d wife(e) Christian (m. in or before 1617), da. of Hector Monro, of Assynt, which Alexander (who d. 1650, at a great age) was illegit. s. of Colin Mackenzie, of Kintail,(f) by Mary (sometimes called his 2d wife), da. of Roderick Mackenzie, of Davochmaluach, was b. probably about 1620; snc. to the estate of Coul on the death of his father, and was cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, 16 Oct. 1673, with rem. to the heirs male of his body, such creation however, not being recorded in the Great Seal Register. He was Sheriff of the united counties of Ross and Inverness. He m. firstly, Jean, 1st da. of Alexander Chisholm, of Comar. He m. secondly (—), da. of Thomas Mackenzie, of Inverlast. He d. in or before 1681.

Baronetcy to which, if the limitation was to heirs male whatsoever, they would have been entitled, though the first one (the harbour builder) is in some notices (though never in any service) styled "Sir Robert." Auchenharvie passed to Anne, sister of the last named Robert, who m. in 1737, John Reid, and bad issue Robert Reid-Cuningham, of Auchinharvie.

(a) These were: "Arg. on a chevron, gu., between 3 cross-crosslets, sz, a boar's head, of the 1st; in middle chief a man's heart, of the 2nd." He was M.P. [S.] for Ross-shire, 1692 till death in 1702. He m. firstly, before 1673, Jean (b. 3 Jan. 1636, in Salisbury), 4th da. of Sir Robert Gordon, 1st Baronet [S. 1625], of Gordonstoun, by Louisa, da. and h. of John Gordon, of Glenluce, Dean of Salisbury. He m. secondly, Janet Johnstone, of Warriston. He d. 1702.

III. 1702, Sir John Mackenzie, Baronet [S. 1673], of Coul aforeto said, 1st s. and h. by 1st wife, b. in or before 1673; suc. to the 1715. Baronetcy in 1702; joined in the rising of 1715, and, not having rendered himself up to justice before 30 June 1716, was attainted, under the Act, 13 Nov, 1715. He m. firstly, Margaret, da. of Hugh Rose, of Kilravock. He m. secondly, in 1703, Helen (b. 27 Feb. 1683), 4th da. of Patrick (Murray), 3d Lord Elibank [S.], by Anne, da. of Alexander Burnet, Archbishop of St. Andrew's. He d. s.p.m. soon after 1715, the Buronetcy, by his abovementioned attainder in that year, having previously become forfeited.(a)

The Baronetcy, notwithstanding the forfeiture, (a) was assumed as below.

IV. 1720? SIR COLIN MACKENZIE, Baronet [S. 1673], (b) of Coul aforesaid, br. of the whole blood and h. male; b. 1674; admitted as Advocate [S.], 8 Feb. 1701; Clerk to the Pipe in the Exchequer [S.] till death; suc. under the entail of 1702 to the family estate on the death of his brother, when he assumed the Baronetcy (h) also. He m., June 1705, Henrietta, widow of Andrew Brown, of Braid, da. of Sir Patrick Houston, 1st Baronet [S. 1668], by Anne, da. of John (Hamilton), 1st Lord Bargeny [S.]. He d. Oct. 1740, in his 67th year.

V. 1740. SIR ALEXANDER MACKENZIE, Baronet [S. 1673],(b) of Coul aforesaid, 1st s. and h.; suc. to the Baronetcy(b) in Oct. 1740, and had a charter under the Great Seal of the whole estate of Coul in 1743, as heir to his grandfather. He m. Janet, da. of Sir James Macdonalo, 6th Baronet [S. 1625], by his 1st wife, Janet, da. of Alexander Macleod, of Grishernish. He d. 1792.

(e) Presuming (though there appears to be no good reason for such presumption) that the forfeiture of 1715 became void after the death s.p.m. of

Ile m. at Leith, 30 April 1778, Katharine, da. of Robert RAMSAY, of Campo. He d. 14 Sep. 1796.

VII. 1796. SIR GEORGE STEUART MACKENZIE, Baronet [S. 1673], (a) of Coul aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 22 June 1780; suc. to the Baronetcy (a) in 1796; was Eusign General in the Royal Scottish Archers; F.R.S. and Vice-President of the Royal Society of Edinburgh. (b) He m. firstly, 8 June 1802, Mary, 5th da. of Donald Mackeon, of Geanies, co. Ross. She d. 18 Jan. 1835. He m. secondly, 27 Oct. 1836, Catharine, widow of John Street, Capt. R.A., 2d da. of Sir Heury Jardine, of Harwood, aged 68. He d. Oct. 1848. His widow d. 2 Aug. 1857.

VIII. 1848. SIR ALEXANDER MACKENZIE, Baronet [S. 1673],(a) of Coul aforesaid, 1st s. and h. by 1st wife, b. 10 Jan. 1805; entered the East India Company's military service, 1824; Capt. Bengal Native Infantry, 1825; was at the siege and capture of Bhurtpore, 1825-20, and at the battle or Maharajpore (where his horse was killed under him), 29 Dec. 1843; served, as Dep. Judge Gen., with the Army at Gwalior; was in the first campaign (1845-46) on the Sutlej, retiring in 1851. He, who suc. to the Baronetcy(a) in Oct. 1848, obtained in 1855 the local rank of Major in the East Indies. He d. nnm. 3 Jan. 1856, aged nearly 57, at Coul.

IX. 1856. SIR WILLIAM MACKENZIE, Baronet [S. 1673],(a) of Coul aforesaid, br. of the full blood and h., b. 20 May 1806, at Coul; ed. at the High School and Univ. of Edinburgh; entered the Maritime Service of the East India Company in 1826, serving subsequently in the Bombay and China country Service; resided some time in New South Wales; suc. to the Baronetcy(a) 3 Jan. 1856. He m. 16 Aug. 1858, at Dublin, Agnes, 2d da. of Ross Thompson Smyth, of Ardmore, co. Londonderry. He d. s.p. 21 Dec. 1868, at Coul honse, aged 62. His widow m. Sep. 1881, Baron di San Felice, of Naples, and was living at Rome, 1904.

SIR ROBERT RAMSAY MACKENZIE, Baronet [S. 1673],(\*) of Coul aforesaid, br. of the full blood and h.; b. 21 July 1811; was sometime Treasurer and Premier of the Executive Council of the Colony of Queensland; suc. to the Baronetey,(\*) 21 Dec. 1868. He m. 29 Sep. 1846, Louisa Alexandrina, da. of Richard Jones, of New Farm, Brisbanc, Queensland, Member of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales and Treasurer of the Colony of Queensland. He d. 19 Sep. 1873, at 6 Atherstone Terrace, South Kensington, aged 62. His widow living 1904.

XI. 1873. SIR ARTHUR GEORGE RAMSAY MACKENZIE, Baronet [S. 1673],(") of Coul aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 2 May 1865; suc. to the Baronetcy,(") 19 Sep. 1873. He m. 11 May 1901, at St. Paul's, Koightsbridge, Evelyn Mary Montgomery, 4th and yst. da. of Major Gen. Sir Edward Wolstenholm WARD, K.C.M.G., Member of the Leg. Council of New South Wales, by Anne Sophia, da. of Robert Campbell.

(II), William Cochrane, of Ochiltree, who d. 1728, being suc. by his s. (III), Charles Cochrane, of Ochiltree, who d. unm. 19 Scp. 1752, and was suc. by his next surv. br. (IV), Lieut.-Gen. James Cochrane, of Ochiltree, who d. s.p. 29 June 1758, being suc. by his next br. (V), Thomas Cochrane, of Ochiltree, who next month, 9 July 1758, suc. his distant cousin as 8th Earl of Dundonald [S.]. None of these persons, however, appear to have assumed the title of Baronet, and the title, if ever promised, was apparently never confirmed. John Stewart, Commendator of Coldingham (2d s. of Francis, 1st Earl of Bothwell [S.]), suc. his father in 1671, to whom, being then a Knight, hs was served heir special in Northfields and Fewlls, and was cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, between 1672 and 1678, there being, however, no record of such creation in the Great Seal Register, and no date being assigned to it in Milne's List, where, however, it is noted that he "gets his arms as Barronet out of the Lyon office." lle was served, 2 June 1690, heir. gen. of his father, and heir spec. in the Barony of Renton, the office of Forester, etc. He was, however, nearly ruined by his yr. br., Sir Patrick Home, 1st Baronet [S. 1697], of Lumsden, who (wrongfully) held from him the estate of Renton, and whom, in 1685, he accused of forgery. He m. Agnes, or Margaret, da. of Sir William Scor, of Clerkington, from whom he was afterwards separated. He d. 28 May 1698.

II. 1698. SIR ROBERT HOME, or HUME, Baronet [S. 1672-78], s. and h., suc. to the Baronetcy, 28 May 1698, and was, on 14 July following, served heir male and of provision general. He m. Jeau, da. of William Dalmahov, of Ravelrig. He was living 1716, but d. before March 1733.

[S.] for Edinburgh, 1681-82, and Lord Provost of that city, 1682-83. In 1682, he was one of the few who were saved (with the Dnke of York, whom he was accompanying from Lendou) in the wreck of the "Gloucester" frigate (c) Having no surviving male issue, he was again cr. a Baronet [S.], 22 March 1707, with a spec. rem. in favour of the male issue of his only surviving da. He m. Katharine, da. of Sir William Drummond, of Riccaton, hy Magdalen, da. of Thomas Dalyell, of Binns.

II. 1700? SIR THOMAS DALZIELL, or DALYELL, Baronet [S. 1685], of
to Binns aforesaid, only s. and h.; suc. to the Baronetcy on his father's
death. He d. nnm. 4 May 1719 when the Baronetcy, apparently,
became extinct.

SIR JOHN GRAHAM DALYELL, or DALZIELL, Baronet [S. 1685],(a) of Binns aforesaid,(c) br. and b., b. about 1778; was admitted as Advocate 1797; author of several scientific and historical werks; V.P. of the Soc. of Antiquaries [S.], etc.; was Knighted 1836; suc. to the Baronetcy,(d) 1 Feb. 1841. He d. unm. 7 June 1851, at Edinburgh, in his 74th year. Will pr. Nov. 1851.
- VII. SIR WILLIAM CUNNINGHAM DALYELL, or DALZIELL, *1851*. Baronet [S. 1685],(a) of Binns aforesaid,(c) br. and b., being 5th and yst. s. of the 4th Baronet, b. 27 April 1784; was an officer in the Navy, 1792, receiving no less than sixteen wounds in various actions, and being many years a prisoner in France; becoming finally Capt. R.N. and commander of Greenwich Hospital. He suc. to the Baronetcy, (a) 7 June 1851. He m. in 1820, Maria, sister of Anthony Sampayo, French Minister at Hesse, da. of Anthony Teixiera Sampayo, of Peterborough House, Fulham, Midx. He d. 16 Feb. 1865, at his residence in Greenwich Hospital, in his 81st year. His widow d. 20 Oct. 1871 aged 72, at 120 Belgrave road, Pimlico.

He m. secondly in 1703, Margaret (b. 1639), widow of Sir John Young, of Leny (who d. before 15 Aug. 1690), da. of Sir Thomas HOPE, of Kerse. He d. s.p. 15 Jan. 1715, in the 89th year of his age. His widow was bur. 24 Nov. 1723, at Cramond, aged 84.(5)

TT. 1715. SIR THOMAS MONCREIFFE, Baronet [S. 1685], of Moncreiffs aforesaid, nephew and h., being 1st s. and h. of Harry MONCREIFFE, by Barbara, da. of Harry Herbert, of Cardiff, which Harry Moncreiffe was next br. of the full blood to the late Baronet. He suc. to the Baronetcy, as heir male, on the death of his uncle, 15 Jan. 1715. He m. Margaret, da. of David SMYTHE, of Methuen. He d. May 1738, at Glasgow.

- V. 1784. SIR THOMAS MONCREIFFE, Baronet [S. 1685], of Moncreiffe aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 7 June 1758; suc. to the Baronetcy, 28 Sep. 1784. He m. 13 Aug. 1786, at Dalhousie castle, Elizabeth, 2d da. of George (RAMSAY), 8th EARL OF DALHOUSIE [S.], by Elizabeth, da of Andrew Glen. He d. 26 March 1818, aged 59. His widow, who was b. 6 Sep. 1769, d. 3 June 1848 in Chapel street, Belgrave square, from injuries caused by her dress taking lire, aged 78. Will pr. Dec. 1848.
- VI. 1818. SIR DAVID MONCREIFFE, Baronet [S. 1685], of Moncreiffe aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 31 Dec. 1788; suc. to the Baronetcy, 26 March 1818. He m. 12 Jan. 1819, Helen, 2d da. of Æneas Mackay, of Scotstown, co. Peebles. He d. 20 Nov. 1830, at Moncreiffe House, aged 41. His widow m. (as his 2d wife) 30 Oct. 1849, at St. Peter's, Pimlico, George Augustus Frederick Henry (Bridgeman), 6th Earl of Bradford (who d. 22 March 1865, in his 76th year) and d. at Cannes, 22 April 1869.
- VII. 1830. SIR THOMAS MONCREIFFE, Baronet [S. 1685], of Moncreiffe aforesaid, 1st s. and h., b. there 9 Jau. 1822; suc. to the Baronetcy, 20 Nov. 1830; sometime Lieut. 1st Foot Guards, retiring 1848; Lieut.-Col. Perthshire Militia, 1846; Lieut.-Col. Commandant (with rank of Honorary Colonel), 1855. He m. 2 May 1843, at St. Geo. Han. sq., Louisa, 1st da. of Thomas Robert (HAY), 10th Earl of Kinnoull, [S.], by Louisa Burton, da. of Admiral Sir Charles Rowley, G.C.B., 1st Baronet [1836]. He d. 15 Aug. 1879, at Moncreiffe house in his 58th year. His widow, who was b. 5 June 1825, d. 4 Sep. 1898, at Shilston house, near Leamingtou, co. Warwick, and was bur. at Moncreiffe, aged 73.(a)
- VIII. 1879. SIR ROBERT DRUMMOND MONCREIFFE, Baronet [S. 1685], of Moncreiffe aforesaid, 1st s. and h., b. there 3 Nov. 1856; ed. at Harrow; sometime Lieut. Scots Guards, retiring 1881; suc. to the Baronetcy, 15 Aug. 1879; Lieut.-Col. 4th Vol. Batt. Black Watch (Royal Highlanders). He m. 6 April 1880, at St. Paul's, Knightsbridge, Evelyn Elizabeth Vaue, 1st da. of his maternal uncle Col. the Hon. Charles Rowley Hay-Drummond, of Cromlix co. Perth, by Arabella Augusta, da. of Col. William Henry Meyrick. She was b. 27 Oct. 1858.

"John Nicolson, of Tulliecultrie" [i.e. Tillicoultrie] is stated to have been cr. a Baronet [S.], though no date of such creation is given in Milne's List, where it is added "no document, bot is so designed in papers." The date of 1686 is however, frequently assigned, (a) though in all probability, if such creation was ever made, it was in or before 1683, as the person indicated must be Sir John Nicolson, of Tillicoultrie, who d. 1683, and whose s. and h., Thomas, suc., 9 June 1686, to the Baronetcy [S.] conferred 16 Jan. 1636/7 on Thomas Nicolson, of Carnock, co. Stirling. See vol. ii, pp. 424-426, for that Baronetcy, in which this creation, if it ever existed, must be merged.

Haddington, 2d s. of James Broun, of the same (d. 1669), by Anna (m. 1625), da. and h. of Robert Heriot, of Trabroun, was b. probably about 1630; was served heir male, 6 May 1658, to his elder br. George Broun, of Coulston aforesaid (wbo d. s.p.m.(c) 1657), and was cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, 16 Feb. 1685/6, with rem. to heirs male for ever.(d) He m. firstly, Alison, da. of James Sinclair. He m. secondly, Jean, widow of the Rev. Robert Ker, Minister of Haddington, da. of John Ramsay, of Edington. He d. 1688.

He d. s.p. 1718, (a) when the issue male of the grantee became extinct. His wife survived him. (b)

III. 1718 SIR George Broun, Baronet [S. 1686], of Thornydikes, co. Berwick, cousin and, presumably, heir male, (c) being s. of Alexander Broun, of Bassendean, in that county, by his 1st wife Catharine, da. of Sir Alexander Swinton, of Swinton, which Alexander Broun was s. and h. of George Broun, of Thornydikes, yr. br. of James Broun, of Colstoun, father of the 1st Baronet, both being sons of George Broun, of Colstoun. He, on the ground of being heir male, suc. to the Baronetcy(c) in 1718. He m. Janet, da. of Alexander Spottiswoode, of Warristoun, by his 2d wife Helen, da. of John Trotter, of Mortonhall. He d. s.p., 16 Feb. or 15 Ang. 1734.

IV. 1734. SIR ALEXANDER BROUN, Baronet [S. 1686], of Bassendean, co. Berwick, br. and h., suc. to the Baronetcy in 1734. He m. Beatrix, da. of Alexander Swinton, of Mersington, a Lord of Session [S.]. He d. 1750.

(a) The estate of Colstoun devolved on his nicce, Jean, 1st da. and heir of line of his brother, Robert Broun, who (with his two sons) was drowned 31 May 1703. She m. Charles Broun, of Cleghornie, and their son George Broun, of Colstoun, was a Lord of Session [S.] nuder the style of "Lord Colstoun," being father of Charles Broun, of Colstonn, whose da. and h., Christian, m. 14 May 1805, George (Ramsay), 9th Earl of Dalhousie [S.], and is ancestress of the present [1904] Earl, the now owner thereof.

(b) She is the heroine of a romantic story, which has been versified under the name of "The charmed Cornac of Colstoun, by Edward Mackenzie Mackenzie, Baronet." The story states that, by recklessly biting (or dreaming that she had eaten) this magic pear (or cornac) which had been some three centuries in the family of her husband, she brought misfortune thereon, he, himself, dying without issue, his only brother (with two sons) having previously died leaving no male issue. [See note "a" above.] This pear is said to have been presented by Hugh Gifford, of Yester (who d. s.p.m. about 1409, being great grandson of another Hugh Gifford, of Yester, the wizard, who d. 1267, by whom perhaps it had been bewitched), to his da. Joan, on her marriage about 1400 to Sir William Hay, with the prophecy that so long as it was preserved unharmed, her race would flourish. It continued in the family of Hay, of Yester, till about 1550, when it formed part of the marriage dower of Jean, da. of John (Hay), 3d Lord Hay of Yester [S.], with George Broun, of Colstonn, whence it acquired the name of the charmed Cornac of Colstoun. Their descendant the 2d Baronet inherited it in 1688 "unharmed" bat at his death in 1718 it passed, with the estate of Colstoun (see p. 338, note "c") to the heir female. In Bronn's Baronetage, 1844, it is thus spoken of—"This pear, now nearly six [sic] centuries old is still [1844] preserved at Colstoun House . . and . . is perhaps the most singular vegetable curiosity in the Kingdom." See N. & Q., 3d S., 111, 466.

(c) In a pedigree drawn up from the MS. notes of Sir Richard Bronn, who d. 1781, by Edward M. Mackenzie (see note "b" above), it is stated that this Sir George had an elder br. Archibald Broun, who, in 1715, raised a troop of Horse for the Chevalier in the Jacobite rising. He, who probably was attainted, is said to have m. a da. of (—) Trotter, and to have left a son [Qy. if legitimate?] who was a Physician in Charlestown, in America, who left a son, Archibald, who d. unm. The first named Archibald may, however, possibly have died before the 2d Baronet, but if he left legitimate male issue, such issue would precede this Sir George in the right to the Baronetcy. Moreover this George is not called a Baronet in the pedigree of Spottiswoode (his wife's family), given in Douglas's

V. 1750, SIR ALEXANDER BROUN, Baronet [S. 1686], of Bridgeto ness, only s. and h.; suc. to the Baronetcy in 1750. He m. in 1755,
Mally, da. of Adam Colquhoun, of Glins, an officer of the Salt
Duty at Borrowstonness. She was living 1766. He d. s.p.m.(\*)
1776, when the Baronetcy hecame dormant and so remained for fifty years(b).

VI. 1776. The Rev. Richard Broun, Minister of the Gospel, at Lochmaben, co. Dumfries, was, according to a service, 12 Jan. 1826 (see below), entitled to the Baronetcy in 1776 as heir male, he being 1st s. of James Broun, tenant of Hume Castle, in the parish of Stichill, co. Berwick, hy Alison, da. of William Brodle, which James was 1st s. of George Broun, (e) 1st s. of George Broun, yr. br. of Alexander Broun (father of the 3d and 4th and grandfather of the 5th Baronet) both being sons of George Broun, of Thornydike. (d) He, who was sometime Minister of Bute, Kingarth, and (finally) of Lochmaben, entered his pedigree at the Lyon office, but never assumed the Baronetcy. He m. in 1765, Robina, da. of Col. Hugh Maceride, of Beadland, co. Ayr. He d. 13 Dec. 1781. His widow d. 5 Feb. 1819.

VII. SIR JAMES BROUN, Baronet [S. 1686],(e) of Mayfield in 1781, or Lochmaben, co. Dumfries (the name of which he changed to 1826. "Coulston Park") 1st s. and h., b. 12 March 1768; was an officer in the 30th Foot, serving ten years in the West Indies, during the Carib insurrection; suc. to the Baronetcy,(e) 13 Dec. 1781, but did not assume the title till 19 March 1826, after having been (in compliance with his claim(f) "served lawful heir male in general to Sir Alexander Broun, Baronet," by a Jury at Lochmaben, 12 Jan. previous. He in 1799 had raised a troop called the Lockerbie Volunteers. He m. firstly, 31 July 1798, Marion, sister of John Irvine HENDERSON, 1st da. of Robert Henderson, of Clengheads and Whitecroft, by Janet, da. and h. of F. CARRUTHERS, of Whitecroft. She d. snddenly, 20 Aug. 1825. He m. secondly, 29 April 1835, Janet, 1st da. of Robert Watson, of Edinburgh. He d. 30 Nov. 1844, at Moffat, co. Dnmfries, aged 76. His widow d. 17 June 1868, at Seafield, near Leith, aged 84.

"Previous to succeeding his father, he demanded inanguration as a Knight, in the capacity of a Baronet's eldest son, but the Lord Chancellor having refused to present him to the Queen for this purpose, he assumed the title of Sir and the addition of Eques auratus in June 1842,"(b) and styled himself (when heir ap. to the Baronetcy of Broun) in the Baronetage (1844), edited by himself, "Sir Richard Broun, Eques auratus, Hon. Sec. to the Committee of the Baronetage for privileges, a Knight Commander of the Sovereign Order of St. John of Jerusalem, and Grand Sec. of the Langue of England." He suc. to the Baronetcy,(a) 30 Nov. 1844, and describes himself in 1856 as "fendal Baron of Colstoun, Haddingtonshire, and chief of his race in North Britain."(c) He was for many years Sec. to the Central Agricultural Society, was a great promoter of extra-mural burial and was, in 1849, the projector of "the London Necropolis" at Woking. He d. unm. 10 Dec. 1858, at Sphinx Lodge, Chelsca, Midx., in his 58th year.

IX. 1858. SIR WILLIAM BROUN, Baronet [S. 1686],(a) of Dumfries, br. of the whole blood, and h., b. July 1804, at Lochmaben; was a Solicitor at Dumfries; suc. to the Baronetcy,(a) 10 Dec. 1858. He m., at Dumfries, 18 July 1843, Elizabeth, 2d da. of John Smith, of Drongan, co. Ayr. He d. 10 June 1882, at 7 Irving street, Dumfries, in his 78th year, and was bur. at Lochmaben. His widow d. 19 Aug. 1899, at "Glenshee," Cambridge Park, Twickenbam, Midx., aged 80, and was bur. at Lochmaben.

X. 1882. SIR WILLIAM BROUN, Baronet [S. 1686],(a) of Somerton, in New South Wales, 2d but 1st surv. s. and h.,(d) b. 18 Dec. 1848, at Dumfries; suc. to the Baronetcy,(a) 10 June 1882. He m. 12 April 1871, at Sydney, in New South Wales, Alice Jane, 2d da. of James Cornelius Peters, of Manley Beach, Sydney, New South Wales, Under Treasurer of that Colony, by Elizabeth, da. of James Chambers, of Edinburgh.

was accompanied by a tabular pedigree beginning with "George, 1st of Thorndike, brother [sic] of Sir Patrick Broun, of Colstoun, Baronet." This George is also stated to have been "brother german of Sir Patrick Broun, of Colstoun, Baronet," in the "genealogical account" of the family by his great grandson Sir Alexander Broun, Baronet, compiled June 1763 at Bridgeness. George, however, appears to have been uncle (not brother) of the 1st Baronet, but the service of 1826 was as heir male to Sir Alexander, the 5th Baronet (who d. in 1776) whose right to the title was not questioned, so that the claimant's relationship to the first Baronet (a collateral relative) was not set forth. He m. Barbara, da. of Sir William RUTHVEN, of Dunglass. He d. Oct. 1696, ar 21 Dec. 1701.(b)

II. 1696?SIR HUGH PATERSON, Baronet [S. 1686], of Bannockburn, b. Jan. 1686, presumably s. and h.; suc. ta the Baronetcy in 1696, or 1701, and, as a Baronet, was, in 1708, midnly elected M.P. for Stirlingshire but unseated in 1709, heing, howto 1716. ever, M.P. thereof (three Parls.) 1710-15; Commissioner of Trade [S.], 1711; joined in the Jacohite rising of 1715 and was attainted, wherehy the Baronetcy became forfeited in 1716. He entertained Prince Charles Edward at Bannockburn house, 14 Sep. 1745, who made it his headquarters in Jan. 1745/6.(°) He m. 2 March 1711/2, at Twickenham, Midx., Jean, only da. of Charles (Erskine), EARL OF MAR [S.], by Mary, da. of George (MAULE), 2d EARL OF PANMURE [S.]. 1730 ? SIR JOHN MYLNE, Baronet [S. 1686], of Barnton afore- $\Pi i$ said, possibly grandson and h., b. about 1701; was Captain of Invalids, and d. 11 May 1791, aged 90. Will pr. June 1791. At his death the Baronetcy is presumed to have become dormant or extinct.(f)

[S.] for Elgin and Forresshire, 1685-86, and was cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, 20 March 1685/6, with rem. to heirs male whatsoever. He having inherited the Towie estate, formerly that of his maternal ancestors, took the name of BARCLAY in lieu of INNES.(c) He apparently d. s.p.m. before 20 Jan. 1736, when Jean BARCLAY was served heir to her father, "SIR ALEXANDER BARCLAY, of Towie, Baronet."(d)

The devolution of the Baronetcy on the heir male seems somewhat uncertain, but apparently was as under:-

He m. his cousin, Isabel, da. and h. of William Dick, of Grange, co. Edinburgh, by Anne, da. of Sir Alexander Setc", 1st Baronet [S. 1683], abovenamed. She d. at Grange House, 7 Nov. 1758. Lanark, Minister of Lamington, by Grizel (relict of John Weir), elder sister to the 1st Baronet, and da. of Robert DENHAM abovenamed. He suc. to the Baronetcy, 1 Jan. 1712, under the entail of that dignity, and was, 3 March 1713, served heir of provision general to his said uncle. He m. Margaret, da. of (—). Pincock, of London, merchant, which Thomas was 3d s. of the 2d Baronet. He was b. about 1750, and suc. to the Baronetcy, 15 Oct. 1799. SIR ROBERT ANSTRUTHER, Baronet [S. 1694], of Balcaskie aforesaid, and of Braemore, co. Caithness, 1st. s. and h.,(b) b. 28 Aug. 1834 at Edinburgh; ed. at Harrow; entered the Grenadier Guards, 1853; Lieut.-Col., 1861; suc. to the Baronetcy, 18 Oct. 1863; M.P. for Fifeshire (four Parls.), 1864-80, and for St. Andrew's burghs, 1885-86; Lieut. of that county, 1864 till death, 1886. He m. 29 July 1859, at Beckenham, co. Kent, Louisa Anne Chowne, 1st da. of the Rev. William Knox Marshall, B.D., Vicar of Wragby, co. Lincoln, and Preb. of Hereford, by Louisa, da. of the Rev. William Marsh, D.D., of Beckenham aforesaid, Rector of Beddington, co. Surrey.(c) He d. 21 July 1886, at Balcaskie, in his 52d year. His widow living 1904.

SIR RALPH WILLIAM ANSTRUTHER, Baronet [S. 1694], of Balcaskie and Braemore aforesaid, 1st s. and h., b. 5 July 1858, and bap. at Beckenham aforesaid; ed. at Eton; sometime (1877-90) in the Royal Engineers, serving in the Egyptian campaign, 1883, and in the Bechuanaland expedition, 1885; suc. to the Baronetcy, 21 July 1886; Lieut.-Col. Com. 6th Fifeshire Vol. Batt. Royal Highlanders. He m. 5 Ang. 1885, at St. Mark's, North Audley street, Mildred Harriet, da. of Edward Hussey, of Scotney Castle, Sussex, and of Lamberhurst, Kent, by Henrietta Sarah, da. of the Hon. His widow d. soon after him, and was bur. with him.

II. 1725. SIR ALEXANDER CUMMING, Baronet [S. 1695], possibly of Culter aforesaid, 1st s. and h.,(a) by the 1st wife, b. 1690; entered the Army, 29 May 1703, at the age of 13, becoming, subsequently, a Captain, and serving in the wars in Flanders, and at the battle of Malplaquet (1709), in which his uncle, Col. Swinton, was slain. He was admitted as Advocate 1714, but quitting the legal profession was "taken nnto the secret service of the Crown at a salary of £300 a year," from Christmas 1718 to Christmas 1721.(b) He suc. to the Baronetcy, 7 Feb. 1724/5, and possibly (if, as is not improbable, it had not been previously sold) to the estate of Cutler. In 1729 he sailed for America, and on 3 April 1730, was made Chief of the Cherokee nation, being orowned at Nequisee, he and six Cherokee chiefs doing homage to the King, at Windsor, 22 June following. In 1737 and 1750 (and probably through all that period) he was a Prisoner in the Fleet for debt, but on 30 Dec. 1765, was nominated a Pensioner of the Charter House, London. He m. about 1737, Amy, (not Anne) da. of Lancelot Whitehall, Commissioner of the Customs [S.]. She d. at Chelsea, and was bur. 22 Oct. 1743, at East Barnet, Midx. He d. at the Charter House, 23 and was bur. 28 Aug. 1775, at East Barnet, aged 85. Will pr. Aug. 1775.

III. 1775, SIR ALEXANDER CUMMING, Baronet [S. 1695], only s. to and h., b. about 1737; was a Capt. in the Army, being in 1779 1793? on half pay at the rate of more than £20 a year; suc. to the Baronetcy, 23 Aug. 1775. Was nominated a Pensioner of the Charter Honse 1779 and 1789, but refused each time on ground of his half pay. He, subsequently, became deranged, and d. nnm. in a state of great indigence, near Red Lion street, Whitechapel, when the Baronetcy became dormant or extinct.

I. 1697, RICHARD NEWTON, of that ilk, co. Haddington, s. and h. of Richard Newton, of the same, by Julian, sister of Patrick 1727? (Hume), 1st Earl of Marchmont [S.], da. of Sir Patrick Hume, 1st Baronet [S. 1637], of Polwarth, was cr. a Baronet [S.] 23 April 1697 (the same date that his said maternal uncle was cr. an Earl [S.]) and is styled "Baronet" in several retours and other writs, there being among the family papers a receipt for the fees on such creation, though it is not recorded in the Great Seal Register and is not in Milne's List. He m. before 1702, Helen, da. of John Livingstone, niece and heir of Sir James Livingstone, 1st Baronet [S. 1699], of Westquarter. He, having no near relatives, executed an entail, 18 June 1724, in favour of a distant cousin, Richard Hay (4th s. of Lord William Hay), who, however, had no descent from the family of Newton. He m. firstly, 6 Nov. 1794, Helen, da. of Col. Sir Alexander Penrose Cumming-Gordon, 1st Baronet [1804] of Altyre, by Helen, da. of Sir Ludovic Grant, formerly Colquidoun, 7th Baronet [S. 1625]. SIR GILBERT ELLIOT, afterwards, since 1778, ELLIOT-MURBAY-KYNYNMOUND, Baronet [S. 1700], of Minto aforesaid, 1st s. and h., b. 23 April 1751, at Greyfriars, Edinburgh: ed. at Paris; matric. at Oxford (Ch. Ch.), 9 Nov. 1768, aged 17; cr. M.A. 16 July 1772, and, subsequently, 4 July 1793; cr. D.C.L.; was v.p. He m. firstly, 10 Nov. 1760, at St. James', Westm., Frances, da. and eventually sole heir of Daniel PULTENEY, sometime Envoy to Denmark, by Margaret Deering, da. and coheir of Benjamin TICHBORNE, br. to Henry, Baron Ferrard of Beaulieu [I.]. She, who was b. 21 Oct. and bap. 14 Nov. 1725 at St. James' aforesaid, d. s.p.m.,(d) at Bath House, Piccadilly, and was bur. 8 June 1782, at Westm. Abbey, aged 56. Will dat. 3 Sep. 1773, pr. 18 June 1782. He m. secondly, 3 Jan. 1804 (being then 74 years old), at Dundas Castle, Margaret, widow of Andrew Stewart, of Castlemilk, da. and coheir of Sir William Stirling, of Ardoch, 4th Baronet [S. 1666]. He was b. about 1783; suc. to the Baronetcy, 20 May 1805, succeeding also, at the same time, to the Westerhall estate, the Weymouth estate, and those in America, being served heir male and of provision gen. to his uncle, 10 Oct. 1806, and heir male and of provision gen. in Westerhall, 9 March 1808. He (as did his grandfather) claimed, 17 June 1805, the MARQUESSATE OF ANNANDALE [S. 1700].(a) He was M.P. for Weymouth from May till his death in Dec. 1811. No further light can be thrown on this extraordinary statement, save that the address should, presumably, be "Wynstay Road, Armadale, Melbourne."

He m. in or before 1726, Christian, 2d and yst. da. of Thomas (Hamilton), 8th Earl of Haddington [8.], by Helen, da. of John Hope, of Hopetoun. He d. at New Hailes, 24 Feb. 1751, aged 58. His widow, by whom he had sixteen children, d. there 30 June 1770.

Dec. 1659; was admitted Advocate, 2 Jan. 1673, in which profession he hecame eminently successful, and was cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, 3 Feb. 1701/2, with rem. "to heirs male in perpetuum." (e) He was M.P. [S.] for Lauder, 1702-07. Besides several estates in Ayrshire, he acquired that of Livingstone, co. Linlitigow. He m. firstly, Isabella (b. 30 Jan. 1659), 4th and yst. da. of James (Dalrymple), 1st Viscount Stair [S.], by Margaret, da. of James Ross, of Balniel. He m secondly, 16 March 1698, Elizabeth, da. of Sir Robert Baird, 1st Baronet [S. 1695], of Saughton Hall, by Elizabeth, da. of Michael Fleming. He d. 28 Jan. 1708.

II. 1708.SIR James Cunynghame, Baronet [S. 1702], of Milneraig and Livingstone aforesaid, 1st s. and h., suc. to the Baronetcy, 28 Jan. 1708, and had general service to his father Feb. and April 1708, and subsequently spec. service in the estate of Robertland. He was M.P. for Linlithgowshire, 1715-22. In 1733 he bought the estate of Roodlands, in the parish of Ayr. He d. unm. at Edinburgh, 1 and was bur. 5 Feb. 1747, in Greyfriars churchyard there.

She d. 14 Oct. 1771, at Livingstone. He m. secondly, 27 June 1785, at St. Marylebone, Mary, only da. and h. of Robert UDNEY, of Udney, co. Aberdeen, by Mary, da. and coheir  $^{(n)}$  of Culpeper HOUGHAM. She was living Ang. 1796. He d. 17 Jan. 1828, in Savile Row, Piccadilly, at a great age. Will pr. Feb. 1828.

He m. in 1746, Mary, da. of Paul Stevens, of Jamaica. He d. before her, about 1780. His widow (b. in Jamaica) d. in England 10 and was bur. 18 Oct. 1798 at Worplesdon, Surrey, aged 73.

- IV1802, SIR ALBERT JOSEPH GHISLAIN MURRAY, Baronet. [S. 1704], Count Murray de Melgund in the Holy Roman Empire, only s. and h., by 2d wife, b. 26 Aug. 1774; suc. to the Baronetcy, 8 June 1802; was Field-Marshal, Chamberlain of the Household, etc., in the Austrian service. He m. 6 Sep. 1815, Countess Almeria Frances Ursula Esterhazy Von Galantha. She, who was b. 24 Sep. 1789, d. 25 Jan. 1848. He d. s.p.m.(c) a few days later, 6 Feb. 1848, at Oedenburgh, in Hungary, when the foreign titles became extinct and the Baronetcy became again dormant.



He was made, 7 June 1710, a Lord of Session [S.], under the style of Lord Roystoun, sitting on the Bench for thirty-four years, and being considered one of the most expert judges in criminal cases. He m. about 1707, Elizabeth, widow of Archibald Cockburn. of Langtoun (d. v.p., 22 Aug. 1702, aged 42), da. of Sir George Mackenzie, of Rosehaugh, King's Advocate for Scotland. He d. s.p.m.s. at Edinburgh, 9 and was bur. 15 Nov. 1744, in the Greyfriars churchyard there, aged 73.(b)

II. 1744.SIR GEORGE MACKENZIE, Baronet [S. 1628 and 1704], of Cromarty and Grandvale, nephew and h. male, being s. and h. of the Hon. Sir Kenneth MACKENZIE, 3d Baronet [S. 1628], next elder br. of the late Baronet. He suc. to the Baronetcy [S. 1628], on the death of his father, 13 Sep. 1728, and suc. to the Baronetcy [S. 1704], 9 Nov. 1744, on the death of his nucle abovenamed. He m., 17 April 1775, Anne, yst. da. of Thomas Mylne, of Powderhall. He d. s.p., 17 Oct. 1795, at Silver Knowes, near Cramond, in his 75th year. His widow d. 27 Aug. 1822, at her house in Edinburgh.

V. 1795. SIR John Gordon, Baronet [S. 1706], of "Earlston" in St. Anne's parish, Montego Bay, Jamaica [1811], and afterwards of Earlston, co. Kirkendbright, (d) nephew and h. male, being 1st s. and h. of James Gordon, of Jamaica, by Christiana, da. of James Scarlett, of that island, which James Gordon (who d. 1794) was 9th and yst. s. of the 3d Baronet. Kirkcudhright; suc. to the Baronetcy, 8 Jan. 1843; ed. at Cheltenham College; entered the Army, and was severely wounded before Sebastopol, 1854, and was in the famous charge of the Light Brigade at Balaclava(g); served subsequently in the 1ndian Mutiny, becoming Major in the Army, 1858; Lieut.-Col.

1706. "James Naesmyth [or Nasmyth], of Dawick," co. Peebles, said to be s. of John Nasmyth, by Isabella, da. of Sir I. James Murray, of Philiphaugh, was Advocate 17 March 1684, becoming a very successful lawyer (though at one time disbarred, but in 1696 re-instated), and having acquired in 1691 or 1692 the estate of Dawick from the family of Veitch (of which he had crown charter, 17 Sep. 1703, ratified by Act. of Parl. 1705) was known as the De'il of Daick, and was cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, 31 July 1706, with rem. to heirs male whatsoever. He purchased, in or before 1709, the Barony of Posso, co. Peebles, from his cousin, Dr. Robert Nasmyth. He m. firstly in 1688, Jean, widow of Sir Ludovick Gordon, 2d Baronet [S. 1625], da. of John Stewart, of Ladywell. He m. secondly, Janet, 5th and yst. da. of Sir William MURRAY, 1st Baronet [S. 1664], of Stanhope, by Janet. da. of James (Johnstone) 1st Earl OF HARTFIELD [S.]. He m. thirdly (contract 15 June 1702) BARBARA, 1st da. of Andrew Pringle, of Clifton, co. Roxburgh. He d. 20 July, 1720, having, 19 Nov. 1709, executed an entail of his dignities and lands, including the recently purchased estate of Posso. His widow d. 2 July 1768.

II. 1720. SIR James Naesmyth, or Nasmyth, Baronet [S. 1706], of Dawick and Posso aforesaid, 1st s. and h., by 3d wife, b. about 1704; suc. to the Baronetcy, 20 July 1720, being served heir gen. of his father, 8 July 1721, and to his mother, Barbara, 17 July 1776. He was an eminent Botanist, having studied under Linnaeus, in Sweden. He was M.P. for Peeblesshire (two Parls.) 1732-41; and was F.R.S. 1767. He abaudoned the house at Posso and called that at Dawick by the name of New Posso. He m. Jean, da. of Thomas Keith(a). He d. at New Posso 4, and was bur. 9 Feb. 1779 at Greyfriars, Edinburgh, aged 75.

III. 1779. SIR JAMES NAESMYTH, or NASMYTH, Baronet [S. 1706], of Dawick or New Posso aforesaid, 1st s. and h.; suc. to the Baronetcy, 4 Feb. 1779, and was, 22 April following, served heir male, heir of line, entail and provision to his father in divers lands, many of which, apparently, he subsequently sold. He m. firstly, April 1785, Eleanor, da. of John Murray, of Philiphaugh, co. Selkirk, by (—) da. of (—) Thomson. She by whom he had twelve children, d. after childbirth, 22 Feb. 1807, in York place, Edinburgh. He m. secondly (post nuptial settlement, July 1828), Harriet, da. of John Jones, of Westham, Sussex. He d. 4 Dec. 1829. His widow d. 21 April 1879, at Fern Lodge, Lower Norwood, Surrey, in her 88th year.

IV. 1829. SIR JOHN MURRAY NAESMYTH, Baronet [S. 1706], of Dawick aforesaid, 1st and only surv. s. and h., by 1st wife, b. there 30 Dec. 1803; entered at Rugby, Jan. 1818; suc. to the Baronetcy, 4 Dec. 1829; rebuilt the house at Dawick in a castellated style; was well known for his taste as a landscape gardener, (b) and was often professionally consulted in laying out

He d. 19 July 1876, in his 73d year, at Dawick aforesaid. His widow, who was b. 27 July 1800, d. 13 March 1880, at Tunbridge Wells, aged 79.

V. 1876. SIR JAMES NAESMYTH, Baronet [S. 1706], of Dawick aforesaid, only surv. s. and h., by 1st wife, b. 9 Feb. 1827; ed. at Haileybury Coll.; served in the Bengal Civil Service, 1847-73, being sometime Deputy Commissioner in the Punjaub; suc. to the Baronetcy, 19 July 1876; was a member of the Royal Scottish Archers. He m. firstly, 19 Nov. 1850, Eliza Gordon Brodie, 1st da. of Francis Whitworth Russell, Bengal Civil Service, by Jane Anne Catherine, da. of James Brodie, of Brodie. She d. 13 June 1887, at Barnes, Surrey. He m. secondly, in 1888, Agnes Carus Wilson, da. of the Rev. David Barclay Bevan, of Courtlands, Tunbridge Wells. He d. s.p.,(a) 10 Oct. 1896, at Dawick aforesaid, aged 69. Personalty, £8,497. His widow m. in 1898, the Rev. Ernest Charles Bevan, and was living 1904.

VI. 1896. SIR MICHAEL GEORGE NAESMYTH, Baronet [S. 1706], uncle of the half blood and h. male, being s. of the 3d Baronet, hy his 2d wife, b. 19 Oct. 1828; was a Civil Engineer; suc. to the Baronetvy, 10 Oct. 1896. He m. 1 Aug. 1860, Mary Anne, da. of John Nicholls, Clerk to the Lord Chancellor's Court, Westm.

Caithness, next br. to Kenneth (Sutherland), 3d Lord Duffus [S.], who was attainted in 1715, both being sons of James, 2d Lord Duffus [S.], by Margaret, da. of Kenneth (Mackenzie), 3d Earl of Seaforth [S.], having m. about 1705, Elizabeth, widow of Sir Robert Gordon, 3d Baronet [S. 1625], of Gordonstoun (who d. Oct. 1704), only child of Sir William Dunbar, 1st Baronet [S. 1700] of Hempriggs aforesaid, by Margaret, da. of Alexander Sinclair, of Latheron, was, in the lifetime of his wife's father, cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, 10 Dec. 1706,(b) with rem. to heirs whatsoever.(c) He was M.P. [S.] for Caithness-shire, 1706-07, and M.P. [G.B.] thereof, 1710-13. He, on the death, s.p.m.s., in 1711, of his wife's father, the abovenamed Sir William Dunbar, 1st Baronet [S. 1700]. succeeded to the estate of Hempriggs. He d. "in the country [Oct.?] 1724." Funeral entry at the Lyon office.

He m. firstly, 6 Jan. 1729, Elizabeth, only child that had issue of Alexanger Dunbar, of Westfield, Sheriff Principal of Moray, by Margaret, da. of Sir James Calder, of Muirtoun. She d. s.p.m., 3 June 1746. He m. secondly, 21 March 1747, Jean, da. of David Sinclair, of Southdun. He m. thirdly, 21 Oct. 1749, Henrietta, da. of Hugh Rose, of Kilravock, by his 2d wife Jane, da. of Hugh Rose, of Broadhy. He d. 12 June 1793. His widow, who was b. Sep. 1725, d. Sep. 1795 and was bur. in the Greyfriars, Edinburgh. M.1.

III. 1793. SIR BENJAMIN DUNBAR, Baronet [8. 1706], of Hempings aforesaid, only surv. s. and h., heing 1st s. by 3d wife, b. 28 April 1761; suc. to the Baronetcy, 12 June 1793. He, on the death, 30 Jan. 1827, of his cousin James (Sutherland) Lord Duffus [S.], who (by act of Parl., 25 May 1826) had been restored to that forfeited peerage, assumed the title of LORD DUFFUS [S.], as heir male of the body of the grantee (to whom, and not to the heir general, he alleged that the title belonged), and claimed to vote at the election of Scotch peers in 1830. In June 1838 he petitioned the House of Lords as to his right, but no decision thereon was made. He m., 10 Dec. 1784, at Bighouse, Janet, 1st da. of George Mackay, of Bighouse aforesaid. He d. at Hempriggs Castle, Feb. 1843, aged 81. His widow d. there 15 March 1857, aged 89.

IV. 1843, SIR GEORGE SUTHERLAND DUNBAR, Baronet [S. 1706], of to Hempriggs aforesaid, sometimes called Lord Duffus [S.], but 1875. who did not assume that title, 2d but only surv. s. and h., b. 6 Jan. 1799; suc. to his father's title, Feb. 1843. He d. unm., 28 Aug. 1875, at Ackergill Tower, near Wick, co. Caithness, when the male issue of the grantee of the peerage, as well as that of the grantee of the Baronetage, hecame extinct, and the Baronetcy remained dormant for above twenty years.

V. 1875. Benjamin Duff, nephew and heir of line, being 1st surv. s. and h. of Garden Duff, of Hatton, by Louisa, eldest sister of the late Baronet. He, who was b. 1808, was sometime Capt. 92d (Gordon Highlanders), suc. to the right to this Baronetcy, 28 Aug. 1875, but did not assume the title. He m. in 1802, Emma, da. of Commissary Gen. Haines, C.B, He d. 7 Dec. 1897.

VI 1897, DUFF-SUTHERLAND-DUNBAR, SIR GEORGE [S. 1706], of Hempriggs and Ackergill aforesaid, grandson and h., 1899. being s. and h. of Garden Duff-Dunbar, formerly Duff, of the same, by Jane Louisa, da. of Lieut.-Col. James DUFF, of Knockleith, which Garden Duff, who was an officer in the 79th (Cameron Highlanders), serving in the Indian Mutiny, having v.p., suc. to the above estates, took the name of Dunbar after that of Duff, and d. v.p. 1 June 1889. He was b. 29 May 1878; ed. at Harrow; Lieut. Col. 2d Battalion Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders; suc. to the Baronetcy, 7 Dec. 1897 to which his right, as heir general, was acknowledged in 1899, at the Lyon Office. He m. 3 July 1903, at Trinity Church, Sloane street, Pimlico, Sibyl Hawtrey, da. of Col. C. W. H. TATE, Army Ordnance Department.

SIR WILLIAM CRAIGIE, Kt., of Gairsay, in the 1707. parish of Rendall in the island of Orkney, s. and h. of Hugh CRAIGIE, of Gairsay aforesaid, (M.P. [S.] for Orkney, etc., 1661, till death, 15 April 1663), by Margaret, da. of Major George CRICHTON, of Arveckie, and Jean, da. of Sir James Stewart, was under age in 1668; registered Arms in the Lyon Office about 1673; was M.P. [S.] for Orkney, etc., 1681-82, 1689 and 1689-1702; was tacksman of the Customs, etc., at Orkney, 1686, but was superseded at the Revolution, 1689, obtaining, however, damages of £25,000 Scots, in 1701, from the Exchequer; was fined for not having signed the assurance in 1693, between which date and 1696 he was Knighted, and is said to have been cr. a Baronet [S.], as above, in 1707.(b) He m. firstly (contract 20 Nov. 1678), Margaret, da. of Andrew HONYMAN, Bishop of Orkney. She d. 3 and was bur. 7 May 1689 at St. Magnus, Kirkwall. He m. secondly, 5 Feb. 1690, at St. Andrew's, Orkney, Anne, widow of John Buchanan, of Sandsyd (d. 12 Sep. 1689), da. of John GRAHAM, of Drechness. She d. 21 and was bur. 26 April 1692 at St. Magnus aforesaid. He m. thirdly, hefore 8 Sep. following, Anne, 2d da. of Sir Robert Hamilton, 1st Baronet [S. 1646?], of Silvertonhill, by Anne, da. of John (Hamilton), 1st Lord Belhaven [S.], but by her had no issue. He d. 9 April 1712, at Edinburgh.

DAVID CRAIGIE, of Gairsay aforesaid, 2d but II. 1712,only surv. s. and h.,(c) was served heir to his father (as also to to his grandfather and great grandfather), 1712, 1718 and 1760?1736, but in none of these documents is he styled "Sir," nor is there any mention of any Baronetcy, as would almost certainly have been the case, if it had had any existence. He m. Marjorie Douglas. In 1760 the estate of Gairsay was, presumably on the failure of his male issue, in the possession of William Honyman, s. of James, s. of William Honyman, of Gairsay, and the name of CRAIGIE was assumed by that family.

He m. 3 March 1786, at Paris, Joanna, da. and h. of William Douglas, of Garvaldfoot, co. Peebles. She d. 4 Nov. 1794, at Prestonfield. He d. at Durham, 19 Nov. 1796, aged 34.

V. 1796. SIR ALEXANDER DICK, Baronet [S. 1707], of Preston-field aforesaid, only s. and h., b. 8 Dec. 1786; suc. to the Baronetcy, He d. nnm. 2 June 1808, in his 22d year.(b)

VI. 1708. SIR JOHN DICK, Baronet [1707], of Prestonfield aforesaid, nucle and h. male, b. 10 June 1767; suc. to the Baronetcy, 2 June 1808. He d. unm., 14 Dec. 1812, aged 45.

VII. 1812. SIR ROBERT KEITH DICK, atterwards, since 1845, DICK CUNYNGHAM, Baronet [S. 1707], of Prestonfield aforesaid, hr. and h., being yst. s. of the 3d Baronet, b. 14 April 1773; sometime in the East India Company (Bengal) Service; suc. to the Baronetcy 14 Dec. 1812. Notwithstanding that Scotland had after 1707 ceased to exist as a separate kingdom, the following anomalous creation was alleged:—

#### BANKS:

#### 1831 to 1854.

THOMAS CHRISTOPHER BANKS, a member of the Inner Temple, London, and a Genealogist of considerable note, having in 1830 assisted Mr. Humphreys, alias Alexander, in his claim to the Earldom of Stirling [S.], received from him (who alleged himself to be such Earl) a grant of a Baronetcy of Nova Scotia, dated 14 July 1831, together with a grant (in anticipation) of 16,000 acres in Canada. As to this creation the grantee remarks, "I consider the same to be perfectly as legal and as efficacions as if it had been conferred on me by the Crown itself." However, notwithstanding this assertion, he appears, in 1837, to have considered that a Baronetcy some 200 years more ancient, whose creation was of the more usual stamp (viz., the Baronetcy of Norton [S.], cr. 18 June 1633) would be preferable. Accordingly, in 1837, he petitioned Queen Victoria (a few months after her accession) for the lands, or for lands of like value, assigned to his "ancestor," viz., "Sir Walter Banks, then hearing the name of Norron," whose heir, he states, he is "by family settlements" [sic], alleging that the Baronetcy conferred on Sir Walter in 1633 was to heirs male and assigns whatsoever. It is not quite clear whether he considered the Norton Baronetcy (though the estates had been lost) to be already vested in him as such heir, but it is presumed that he did. Anyhow, the petition met with no success.

He was 1st s. of Thomas Banks, one of the Gentlemen Pensioners, by (—) da. of (—) Shutter, of Gough square, London; was b. in 1765; served on board H.M.S. the "Renown" (of which his relative Francis Banks, who d. 12 Sep. 1777, was Captain), but soon afterwards studied the law and pursued genealogical studies, practising at Lyon's Inn, 1813-20, and subsequently at the Dormant Peerage Office, in John street, Pall Mall. The last and most valuable of his many works (one which displays considerable research and acumen (and which was published when he was nearly 80 years old), is the Baronia Anglica, or Account of the Baronies in fee, 2 vols., 4to, Ripon (1844). He was also author of a Dormant and Extinct Baronage of England, 4 vols, 4to (1807-09 and 1837), and of many other genealogical works. He m. (—), da. of (—) Weston, of Kensington.

After a long and active life of literary lahour, interspersed with vehement vituperation against his fellow genealogists and complaints against Government, he died in poor circumstances at Greenwich, 30 Sep. 1854, in his 90th year, having previously been an inmate of Tancred's Almshouses in Yorkshire. It is stated that "when the documents on which Humphrys founded his claims [to be Earl of Stirling] were discovered to he forgeries, Banks ceased to make use of his own title, but in his obituary notice he is styled a Baronet of Nova Scotia and Knight of the Holy Order of St. John of Jerusalem."(a) Anyhow, on his death, 30 Sep. 1854, the assumption of this Baronetcy ceased.
