

REMARKS.

Library of Governor Samuel W. Pennypacker, will mark an epoch in the history of American book sales. There has never been such a collection offered at either public or private sale in the world. It embraces nearly three times as many titles as were contained in the great Stevens Collection, purchased by the Library of Congress for thirty-five thousand dollars, and it is larger by far than any collection in either private or public hands. Governor Pennypacker has spent upwards of forty years of untiring research, to make this collection a representative one, and this catalogue will attest the great success which has crowned his efforts.

The collection of Almanacs is unusually large, and contains quite a number that are unique. The Franklin Session Laws of Pennsylvania, and the Votes of the House of Representatives, are almost complete and in magnificent condition. Of the miscellaneous books issued from the Franklin Press, we might mention Cicero's Cato Major (No. 55); Essay on the West India Dry-Gripes, 1745 (No. 57); the finest set of the Seven Moravian Conference Pamphlets in existence; Vorspiel der Neuen-welt, 1732 (No. 4); All Slave Keepers that keep the Innocents in Bondage, 1737 (No. 9); Dewsbury's Sermon, 1740 (No. 16); My Dear Fellow-Traveller, 1742 (No. 201/2); Anno Regni, Georgii II., 1749 (No. 69); Arndt's Der Hocherteuchteter Theologi, 1751 (No. 84); A Poem on Visiting the Academy of Philadelphia, 1753 (No. 87); Narrative of the Late Massacres in Lancaster County, 1764 (No. 109); Poor Richard Almanacks (Lots 112 to 162); Pocket Almanacks (Nos. 163 to 169); Moore's American Country Almanacs (Nos. 170 to 173); Jerman's American Almanacs (Nos. 174 to 177); Pennsylvania Gazettes (Nos. 266 to 276), and numerous works of equal rarity and importance.

One of the most important features of the sale is the collection of Autograph Letters, signed, from Benjamin Franklin, and his son, William Franklin, Colonial Governor of New Jersey.

These embrace a series of twenty-one letters, all addressed to William Strahan, the publisher and friend of Franklin. They throw much light on Franklin's life, and on the history of the American Revolution; in one of them Franklin gives a full report of the speech of William Pitt on the Stamp Act, which he heard (No. 284).

In the books from Franklin's library, is a collection of pamphlets, by various authors, on electricity. These the Doctor had bound together for his personal use, and are doubly interesting from that fact; in one of the pamphlets the author calls Franklin "The father of electricity" (No. 286).

On the cover of the Catalogue is given a reproduction of a bas-relief portrait of Franklin, in Wedgwood, from the wax model of Patience Wright, and executed by the famous Josiah Wedgwood. This is very rare, and is one of the most truthful portraits of the great philosopher and philanthropist. There is also the original portrait of Franklin drawn by Benjamin West, a reproduction of which faces the title page of the Catalogue. Of course this is of superlative value, as it was evidently drawn from the life. And a portrait in bas-relief, in papier maché, made in Paris about 1785, and which evidently belonged to Franklin, as it comes from his family.

Of the books written by and relating to Franklin, there is a great number, which include many works of great historical importance, embracing the various editions of his life works, an uncut copy of his "Historical Review of Pennsylvania," 1759; Franklin's "Political Miscellanies," 1779; "Experiments and Observations on Electricity," 1769; "On Smoky Chimneys," 1793; Keimer's "Brand Pluck'd from the Burning," 1718; and there is also a large collection of Pennsylvania Colonial and Continental paper money, which was printed by Franklin and his immediate successors, Hall & Sellers.

It is unnecessary for me to say more about this truly remarkable collection, as the Catalogue has been faithfully compiled, and interspersed with notes which cannot fail to be of interest. Such an opportunity will probably never occur again. Consequently it will be well for librarians and collectors to give this their careful attention.

Of the balance of Governor Pennypacker's library, catalogues are in course of preparation, and will include the largest collection of "Personal Books" (books from the libraries of

great men) in this country. Of course these embrace quite a number of Manuscript Journals, etc., of great importance. Of books relating to the history of Pennsylvania, the library is replete, and probably not equalled by any private collection. The issues of the Ephrata Press and Sower's Germantown Press, are as complete as is possible to make them, as well as those from the press of Robert Bell. Of early Philadelphia and Pennsylvania imprints, there is also an unusually fine collection, embracing the first American editions of the great English authors.

There are also a very important gathering of works relating to general American history. One feature of the Governor's library, which he prided himself on, is the collection of early American Magazines, which is conceded to be the finest in the country. Then there are a great number of books on Genealogy, Bibliography, and Miscellaneous Literature, Confederate Imprints, an interesting collection of Children's Books, and a large number of books relating to General Washington.

This book, though having the imprint of Samuel Keimer, came partly from the office of Franklin, and was the first bookwork done there. Franklin printed the title-page, Dedication, pages 457 to 694, and the Index. He says, in his autobiography, "Breintnal particularly procured for us from the Quakers the printing 40 sheets of their history the rest being done by Keimer, and upon these we worked exceeding hard for the price was low. It was a folio pro patria size in pica with long primer notes. I composed a sheet a day and Meredith worked it off at press, it was often eleven at night and sometimes later before I had finished my distribution for the next days work, for the little Jobbs sent in by our other friends now and then put us back. But so determined I was to continue doing a sheet a day of this folio that one night when having imposed my forms I thought my days work over, one of them by accident was broken, and two pages rendered to pi, I immediately distributed it over again before I went to bed, and this industry visible to our neighbours began to give us character and credit."

A comparison of type and paper shows that they are identical with those used by Franklin. If Crellius had a printing office, it is remarkable that no book or pamphlet printed by him is known. Hildeburn had never seen a copy.—Gov. Pennypacker.

"In a former Letter I promis'd to write you largely about your Affair with Mr Read, and the Measures taken to recover your Money. Before I receiv'd your Power of Attorney and Acct. there was a Misunderstanding between us, occasioned by his endeavouring to get a small Office from me (Clerk to the Assembly) which I took the more amiss as we had always been good Friends and the Office could not have been of much Service to him the Salary being small; but valuable to me; as a Means of Securing the Publick Business to our Printing House. So as we were not on Speaking Terms when your Acct. came to hand and the influence I had over him as Friend become little or nothing it was some Time before I mentioned it to him. But at length the Ice was broke in the following Manner. I have a Friend in the Country that assisted me when I first set up, whose Affairs have lately been in some Disorder (occasion'd chiefly by his too great good Nature) his Creditors coming in the same time in a Crowd upon Him. I had made up with several of them for him, but Mr Read being employ'd in one small Case (a Debt of 12£ only) early on (by some Contrivance in the Law which I dont understand) a private Action against him, by summoning him in this County when he lives in another, and obtain'd a Judgment against him without his or my knowing anything of the matter; and then came to me, knowing I had a great Affection for Mr Grace, and in a very insulting Manner ask'd, "What shall I do with your Friend Grace? I have got Judgment against him, and must take out Execution if the Debt is not immediately satisfy'd &c." Upon inquiring into the Matter, and understanding how it had been carry'd on I grew a little warm, blam'd his Practice as irregular and unfair, and his Conduct towards Mr Grace, to whom his Father and Family had been much oblig'd, as ungrateful; and find that since he look'd on me as Mr Grace's Friend, he should have told me of the Action before he commenc'd it, that I might have prevented it, and sav'd the Charges arising on it; and his not doing so could be only from a View to the small Fees it procur'd him, in carrying it thro' all the Courts, &c -He justify'd his Practice, and said it was legal & frequent; deny'd that his Father or Family were under any Obligations to Mr Grace; Alleg'd that Grace had us'd him ill in employing another Lawyer as some of his own Actions, when at the same Time he owed him near Five Pounds; and added haughtily that he was determin'd to sue Grace on his own Acct. if not speedily paid; and so saying left me very abruptly.--I thought this a good

Opportunity of introducing your Affair, imagining that a Consciousness of his ill Behaviour toward my Friend would pique him to make immediate Payment. Accordingly I wrote him a Letter the next Day, of which I send you the rough Draft enclos'd, together with his Answer; since which several other Letters pass'd on the same Subject, of which I have no Copies. All I insisted on, since he declar'd his Inability to pay at present, was, that he should give you his Bond, so that in Case of his Death you might come in for Payment prior to common Creditors, and that he should allow you Interest from the Time the Money became due in the common Court of Payments. He agreed to give his Bond, but it has been delay'd from time to time till this Day, when on my writing to him again, to know what Amount I should send you, I receiv'd from him the enclos'd Billet, in which he refuses to allow Interest for the Time past, As he cannot be compelled to pay Interest on a Book Acci. I desired him then to fill up and execute a Bond to you for the Principal & he might settle the Affair of the Interest with you hereafter. Accordingly he has just now done it, so that Interest will arise for the time to come :-But as he threatens to pay very speedily, and I am persuaded may easily do it by the help of his Relations, who are wealthy, I hope you will not have much Interest to receive. -He has a great many good qualities for which I love him; but I believe hes is, as you say, sometimes a little crazy.——If the Debt were to me, I could not sue him; so I believe you will not desire me to do it for you; but he shall not want Pressing (tho' I scarcely ever dun for myself) because I think his Relations may and will help him if properly apply'd to; and Mr Hall thinks with me, that nrging him frequently may make him more considerate, and induce him to abridge some of his unnecessary Expenses. The Bond is made payable in a Month from the Day; and, for your Encouragement I may add that notwithstanding what he affects to pay of the Badness of his Circumstances, I look on the Debt to be far from desperate.

Dear Sir

I receiv'd your favour of April 25, with the Maps &c .- I am glad the Polybius did not come, and hope you will not have sent it when this reaches your Hands; it was intended for my Son, who was then in the Army, and seemed bent on a military Life; but as Peace cuts off his Prospect of Advancem^t, in that Way, he will apply himself to other Business. Enclos'd I send you his Certificate from the Governor of New York, by which he is entitled to £98.16.4 Sterling, being his pay; with a Letter of Attorney impowering you to receive it; I know not what the Deduction will be at the Pay Office; but desire you will give my Acc! Credit for the net Proceeds. I am in daily Expectation of a Bill from Virginia of 50 £ which I shall remit you towards the Ballance, & Mr Hall will acc! with you for those Things you have sent me, that are put in his Invoice. Our Accts agree, except that I have charg'd you £1.9.7. for the Ainsworth & James Read, the 6/7 being the Proportion of Charges on that Book. and the Bill on Geo Rigge my Acct called £15.7.11. yours £15.7.1; which is but a small Variation; & I know not but yours may be right.

I have lately sent a Printing house to Antigua, by a very sober, honest & diligent young Man, who has already (as I am informed by divers Hands,) gain'd the Friendship of the principal People, and is like get into good Business. This will open another Market for your Books if you think fit to use it: for I am persuaded, that if you shall send him a Parcel with any Quantity of Stationary he may write to you for, he will make you good and punctual Returns. His name is

Thomas Smith; he is the only Printer on that Island:—had worked with me here and at my Printing-house in N York, 3 or 4 Years, and always behaved extremely well.

Mr Tho' Osborne Bookseller of London, is endeavouring to open a Correspondence in the Plantations for the Sale of his Books: He has accordingly sent several Parcels, 1 to Mr Parker of N. York, 1 to Mr Read here, & one to Mr Parks in Virginia. I have seen the Invoices to Parker & Read; and observe the Books to be very high charged, so that I believe they will not sell. I recommended Parker to you for Books, but he tells me has wrote you several Letters, & in two of them sent a Guinea to purchase some small Things, but never receiv'd, any Answer. Perhaps the Guineas made the Letters miscarry. I now enclose you a Bill for 20£ Sterling, drawn by Mr Stevens on Alexr Grant Mercht London; and what Ballance may remain unpaid, I will send as soon as I can know it.

I am glad you have sent again the Things that were ship't in Davis. As to that Loss, give your self no Concern about it. It is mine, and but a Trifle. I do not know or regard what the Custom of Merchants may be in such Cases; but when I reflect how much Trouble I have given you from time to time in my little Affairs, that you never charged me Commissions and have frequently been in Advance for me; were the Loss much greater, to be sure I should not suffer it to fall on you

Benja Mecom writes me that he has remitted you Thirty Pounds Sterlg. which I am pleas'd to hear. And am glad you have not sent him the great Parcel of Books, &c. which you mention he has wrote for. He is a young Lad, quite unacquainted with the World, and I fear would be much embarrass'd if he went Suddenly into Dealings too deep for his Stock. The People of those Islands might buy his Books, but I know they are very dull Pay, and he would find it impracticable to collect the money when it ought to be sent you. Pray keep him within Bounds, let him have good salable Sortments, but small, and not Suffer him to be more than Fifty Pounds in your Debt, if so much. It is best for him to proceed gradually, and deal more as his Stock and Experience increases. I am thankful to you for prudently delaying to Send what he so indiscretely wrote for, till you had advis'd me of it. Our Compliments to Mrs. Strahan and your Children.

I shall probably make but this one Vibration and Settle here for ever.—Nothing will prevent it, if I can, as I hope I can, prevail with M^{rs} F. to accompany me; especially if we have a Peace. I will not tell you, that to be near & with you and yours, is any part of my Inducement: It would look like a Complement extorted from me by your pretences to Insignificancy. --- Nor will I own that your Persuasions & Arguments have wrought this change in my former Resolutions: tho' it is true that they have frequently intruded themselves, into my Consideration whether I would or not—I trust, however, that we shall once more see each other and be happy again together; Which God &c.

Dear Friend,

I wrote to you some time since to acquaint you with my Arrival, & the kind Reception, I met with from my old and many new Friends, notwithstanding D' Smith's false Reports in London of my Interest as

declining here. I could not wish for a more hearty Welcome, & I never experienc'd greater Cordiality,

We had a long Passage, near ten Weeks from Portsmouth to this Place, but it was a pleasant one; for we had ten Sail in Company and a Man of War to protect us; we had pleasant Weather & fair winds, and frequently visited and dined from Ship to Ship; we call'd too at the delightful Island of Madeira, by way of half-way House, where we replenish'd our Stores, and took in many Refreshments. It was the time of their Vintage, and we hung the Ceiling of the Cabin with Bunches of fine Grapes which serv'd as a Desert at Dinner for some Weeks afterwards. The Reason of our being so long at Sea, was that Sailing with a Convoy, we could none of us go faster than the slowest, being oblig'd every day to shorten Sail, or lay by till they came up; this was the only Inconvenience of our having Company, which was abundantly made up to us by the Sense of greater Safety; the mutual good Offices daily exchanged & the other Pleasures of Society.* It was the Scarboraugh Cap't Stott, who took the greatest care of his little Convoy that can be imagined, & brought us all safely to our several Ports. I wish you would mention this to his Honour in your Paper. I have no Line from you yet, but I hope there is a Letter on its way to me.

My Son is not arrived, & I begin to think he will Spend this Winter with you. Mr Hall I suppose writes by this Ship, I mention'd what you desir'd in your Letter to me at Portsmouth; he informs me he has made some Remittances since I left England, and shall as fast as possible clear the Acc^{t.} He blames himself for ordering so large a Cargo at once, and will keep more within Bounds hereafter.—

M^r Hall sends you I believe, for sale, some Poetic Pieces of our young Geniuses;—it would encourage them greatly if their Performance, could obtain any favourable Reception in England;—I wish therefore you would take the proper steps to get them recommended to the Notice of the Publick as far at least as you may find they deserve, I know that no one can do this better than yourself.

You have doubtless long since-done Rejoining on the Conquest of the Havana. It is indeed a Conquest of great Importance; but it has cost us dear, extremely dear, when we consider the Havock made in our little brave Army by Sickness. I hope it will, in the making of Peace, procure us some Advantages in Commerce or Possesion that may in time countervail this heavy Loss we have sustained in that Enterprise.

I must joyn with David in petitioning that you would write all the Politicks; you have an Opportunity of hearing them all and no one that is not quite in the Secre't of Affairs can judge better of them. I hope the crasy Heads that have been so long raving about Scotchmen & Scotland are by this time either broke or mended.

My dear Love to M^{rs} Strahan, and bid her be well for all our sakes Remember me affectionately to Rachey & my little wife, & to your promising Sons my young Friends Billy, George & Andrew,—God bless you & let me find you well & happy when I come again to England, happy England! My Respects to M^r Johnson; I hope he has got the Amonica in order before this time, & that Rachey plays daily with more & more Boldness & Grace, to the absolute charming of all her Acquaintances.

In two years at farthest I hope to settle all my Affairs in such a manner, as that I may then conveniently remove to England, — provided we can persuade the good Woman to cross the Seas. That will be the great Difficulty: but you can help me a little in removing it.

Dear Straney,

I have before me your Favours of July 16, and Augt 18 which is the latest— It vexes me excessively to see that Parker and Mecom are so much in Arrear with you. What is due from Parker is safe, and will be paid, I think with Interest, for he is a Man as honest as he is industrious & frugal, and has withal some Estate; his Backwardness has been owing to his bad Partners only, of whom he is now nearly quit. But as to Mecom, he seems so dejected & friendless, that I fear little will be got of him. He has dropt his Papers, on which he built his last Hopes. I doubt I shall lose 200£ by him myself, but am taking steps to save what I can for you; of which more fully in my next.

Now I am returned from my long journeys which have consum'd the whole Summer, I shall apply myself to such a Settlement of all my Affairs, as will enable me to do what your Friendship so warmly urges. I have a great Opinion of your Wisdom (Madeira apart) and am apt enough to think that what you seem so clear in, & are so earnest about, must be right. Tho' I own, that I sometimes suspect, my Love to England & my Friends there Seduces me a little, and makes my own middling Reasons for going over, appear very good ones. We shall see in a little Time how Things will turn out.

Blessings on your Heart for the Feast of Politicks you gave me in your last. I could by no other means have obtained so clear a View of the present State of your public affairs as by your Letter. Most of your Observations appear to me extremely Judicious, strickingly clear & true. I only differ from you in some of the melancholly Apprehensions you express concerning Consequences; and to comfort you (at the same time flattering my own Vanity) let me remind you, that I have sometimes been in the right in such Cases, when you happen'd to be in the wrong; as I can prove upon you out of this very Letter of yours. Call to mind your former Fears for the King of Prussia, and remember my telling you that the Man's Abilities were more than equal to all the Force of his Enemies, and that he would finally extricate himself & triumph. This, by the Account you give me from Major Beckwith, is fully verified— You now fear for our virtuous young King, that the factions forming will overpower him, and render

his Reign uncomfortable. On the contrary, I am of Opinion, that his Virtue, and the Consciousness of his sincere Intention to make his People happy, will give him Firmness & Steadiness in his Measures, and in the Support of the honest Friends he has chosen to serve him; and when that Firmness is fully perceiv'd, Faction will dissolve & be dissipated like a Morning Fog before the rising Sun, leaving the rest of the Day clear, with a Sky serene & cloudless. Such after, a few of the first years, will be the future Court of his Majesty's Reign, which I predict will be happy & truly glorious. Your Fears for the Nation too, appear to me as little founded. A new War I cannot yet see Reason to apprehend. The Peace I think will long continue, and your Nation be as happy as they deserve to be, that is, as happy as their moderate Share of Virtue will allow them to be. Happier than that no outward Circumstances can make a Nation any more than a private Man— And as to their Quantity of Virtue I think it bids fair for Increasing; if the old Saying, be true, as it certainly is,

I wrote a few Lines to go to you via Liverpool; but they were too late for the Ship, and now accompany this.——

I gave Mr Parker a Power of Attorney to act for you and myself, with respect to Mecom's Affairs, who has, under Oath, surrended all he possess'd into his Hands, to be divided proportionably between us and his other Creditors, which are chiefly Rivington & Fletcher, and Hamilton, and Balfour. The Effects consist of a Printing Press, some tolerably good Letter, and some Books and Stationary. He has render'd particular and exact Accounts, but his All will fall vastly short of Payment. I suppose it will scarce amount to 4/ in the Pound. Parker thinks him honest, and has let him have a small Printing House at Newhaven in Connecticut, where he is now at work; -but having a Wife & a Number of small Children, I doubt it will be long ere he gets anything beforehand, so as to lessen much of his old Debt. I think it would be well for each of his Creditors to take again what remains unfold of their respective Goods, of which there are separate Accounts. and join in impowering Mr Parker to sell the Remainder, to be divided among us. Tho', on second Thought, perhaps the fairest Way, is to sell and divide the whole You can obtain their Sentiments, and send me your own.—As to what Parker owes you, it is very safe, and you must have Interest.

I hope the Bath will fully re-establish good Mrs. Strahan's Health. I enjoy the Pleasure with which you speak of your Children. God has been very good to you, from whence I think you may be assured that he loves you, and that he will take at least as good care of your future Happiness as he has done of your present. What assurance of the Future can be better founded, than that which has been built on Experience of the past?—Thank me for giving you this Hint, by the Help of which you may die as chearfully as you live. If you had Christain Faith, quantum suff. This might not be necessary;—But as Matters are, it may be of Use.—

"Mr Pitt spoke some time before one could divine on which side of the Question relating to America he would be, but beginning first to mention the Stamp Act by the lose Term of that unhappy Act, he went on, and every Time he had Occasion to mention it, it was by a Term still stronger, as unconstitutional unjust oppressive &c. till he finally declar'd in express Terms that the British Parliament had in his Opinion no Right to raise internal Taxes in America, tho' it had to regulate their Commerce & even restrain their Manufactures. He said many Things in favour of America, particularly that they had always readily granted Aids to the Crown in all our Wars, on Requisitions made to their several Assemblies, and particularly in the last War far beyond their Abilities, which the Parlt here considering has made them some Compensation; that the Act was therefore unnecessary; that no Minister before the last, naming all the Ministers in order from the Revolution, & giving their Characters, some of whom were remarkable for their Firmness and Resolution, as well as their Understanding, had ever thought fit or ventur'd to tax the Colonies; that he himself was sometimes represented as rash enough for any thing, & there had not been wanting some during his Admn that urg'd him to it as a thing that would have been acceptable to Gentlemen here, but they could not get him to burn his fingers, with so unnecessary, so unjust, and therefore so odious a Measure; The Arguments of virtual Representation, of the Case of the Colonies being the same with that of Corporations in England or of the Non Electors here, he treated with great Contempt as Trifling insignificant & ridiculous; asserted that Representation in Parlt was originally & properly of Landed Property; that every 40a a Year of landed Property in England still is represented by the Owners having a right to vote in Country Elecd but that tho' a Man in America had 1000 £ a Year in Land, it gave him no right to vote for a single Memof Parliam't. That the Representation of the Commons, was not an original Part of the Constitution;-the Owners of Lands only were call'd to Parliamt & all the Lands in Englan were divided between the King, the Church, & the Barons. The Church, God bless it, had one Third at least. The Commons, were mere Tenants or Copy holders.—But now the Case was greatly alter'd. The Church was stript of most of its Lands, & the Nobles had sold so much of theirs, that what remain'd in their

Hands was but like a Drop of the Bucket compar'd to what was now in the Hands of the Commons. It was therefore on Acct of their Land properly that the Commons were represented in Parliament. As to the Representation of Burroughs, it was wrong to suffer their sitting in Parlim't. It was the rotten Part of our Constitution, & could not stand another Century. How could we with any Face maintain, that a Burrough of half a Dozen Houses ought to have a Representative in in Parlt to take care of its interests; & yet that three Millions of People in America with many Millions of Landed Property should not have a single Vote in the Election of any one Member. Mr. Grenville saying in Defense of the Act that he had before the Measure was entred into, call'd upon the House, & ask'd if there was any one Member that doubted the Right of Parliament to lay an internal Tax on America; & and there was not one, Mr Pitt answered, that, That by no means prov'd the Rectitude of the Measure, for that there had long been in the House a Tenderness of opposing Ministerial Measures, a kind of— what shall I call it— Modesty, that made the Members rather doubt their own judgements. He wished therefore that the young Members would apply themselves more to the Study of Publick Affairs, & qualifie themselves better to judge of them.— That their Silence should be no Proof of the goodness of a ministerial Measure, he reminded the House, that from Year to Year he had in the same Manner call'd upon the House, to know if any one dislik'd our then Continental Connections, and but one ever took the Freedom to speak his Mind on that Head, & he should like him the better for it as long as he liv'd; "for he indeed said frankly "that he did not like what he was pleas'd to call my German War'' But with the rest it went down glibly.—That Oppositions were generally interested; but his Sentiments of this Act had always been the same; & he had ever dislik'd it as destructive to Liberty; a Word often made use of by ambitious Men only as a Horse on which they might mount and ride into Preferment but he had no such Views. --- Mr Conway remark'd on this, that the Preferment he was in was not of his own seeking; and that whenever the honble. Gentleman, for whose Abilities Integrity he had the highest Veneration, should be, as he sincerely hop'd he soon be, appointed to supersede him, he should with great Pleasure mount his Horse & ride out again.

As I hear my good Friend Parson Smith has taken the Liberty (even before he could hear of my Arrival here) to propagate a Report that my Appointment to this Government was disagreeable to the People, I could have wish'd that you had publish'd some of the Addresses to me, & my Speech, &c which were sent over to you. I believe no Governor was ever more affectionately receiv'd by all Ranks of People. Even with those from whom I might have expected opposition I am upon very good Terms. And as a convincing Proof of my Influence, I have carried two Points which the Crown has long had at Heart, & which former Governors have often unsuccessfully attempted. In short, there is no more Foundation for Smith's Report than there is for believing him au honest Man.

I am oblig'd to write this in a great Hurry less I miss the Opportunity; which prevents my adding any Thing of News, or other Affairs. I must therefore refer you to Mr Hall's Papers, & to the Bearer, Mr Reed, a young Gent of this Province who goes over for his Improvement in the Law; and whom I take the liberty of recommending to your Notice as a Friend of mine, & a Person of Merit.

Sir.

The Assembly of this Province have just met upon my Summons, in order to raise some Men to go against the Indians, & and I am this Moment to make my Speech to them, so that this can little more than serve to acknowledge the Receipt of your letter by Tillet, & to desire your Care of the Enclosed, the Postage of which you must charge to me. The Reason of my giving you this Trouble is because I have heard that some of my Letters to the Publick Officers have some how or other miscarried.—Lord Egremont I hear is dead, but the Letter should notwithstanding be left at Whitehall & I should be oblig'd to you to give the Letter for the Board of Trade to Mr. Pownall, & to have Lord Shelburne's Letter lef at his House.

If the several Things which you mention to be of Crimson Damask are not made up before this comes to hand, I should be glad you would prevent it, & let the whole Quantity of Crimson Silk Damask to be given me, be changed for as much Yellow Silk & Worsted Damask as comes to the same Value. As the latter is cheaper than the other I may probably get by the Exchange sufficient for three Window Curtains, to suit some Yellow Damask Chairs & Furniture I have in my Dining Room. The Fringe may likewise be changed for Yellow Fringe or Binding as may be judged most proper for the Curtains by the Upholsterer Mrs. F desires you will employ Mr. Timothy Golding Upholsterer in Brewer Street near Golden Square, as she is acquainted with him, & thinks he will do it in best & most reasonable manner when he knows it is for her.-The Curtains are to be 3 yards & 1/4 long, & 4 Breadths in each Curtain; -to be hung Festoon Fashion He will probably take the Trouble of getting the Damask chang'd-If the Things should however be made up, the Office will I believe allow you for the Value of them in Money as they will do for other Governors; -If they should not produce sufficient for the Curtains, let the Remainder be purchased, & charged to my Account; & when I know the Amount of Golding's Bill I will remit the Money.—The Pictures &c. may be sent as soon as convenient.

My Father desires M^{r.} Chamberlyn would make a good Copy of his Picture which was done for Col. Ludwell. Let it be put in a handsome Gilt Frame, & sent over, as soon as it can be well done, to him.—We are all well & join in Love to you & Mrs. Strahan—I am Dear Sir.

Yours of the 26th of Decn. with a short Postscript of Jany. 30, is come to hand. The above is a Copy of the Letter I sent per Friend which you mention not to have received. I suppose it is now too late to have the Contents comply'd with. Be pleased in that Case, to tell Mr. Golding to make the Curtains notwithstanding, according to the above Directions, & I will remit the Money as soon as I know the Amount. And if the Plate be not sent away before this reaches you, I should be glad to have it commuted for a handsome Silver Waiter, large enough to hold four Cups & Saucers with the Cream Pot;—a Quart Tankard with a Top to it ;—a Pint Cann ;—& a half Pint Cann. The Tankard & Canns to be quite plain.—Mr. Jeffries has done these kind of Things for other Governors, & I doubt not will do the same for me. Should there be a Ballance coming to him let him charge it to me, as I shall have other Dealings with him.—The Bible & three of the Prayer Books may be sent over, & the rest may be disposed of.—I hope you have rec'd the 51 £ from Mess^{rs.} S. & Aufrere, if you have not 'twill be paid on your sending for it.-Next Week I entend going to Philada when I shall purchase a Bill & send you, & write you more particularly than I can at present.—My Reason for not writing you any American Politics was because this Province afforded nothing of any Consequence, & I have been so taken up as not to attend to the Affairs of others. As to what passes in Pensylv. a I suppose my Father & Mr. Hall give you full Accounts. Both that Province & Maryland seem to be in a State of Anarchy, & unless the King takes them under his immediate Government (which all but the Proprietary officers & Dependants are anxious for) the worst of Consequences will probably ensue.—I believe (but you must not mention it) that you will see my Father again in England shortly, as the Inhabitants are very desirous he should take another Voyage there, in order to obtain a Change of Government. He has published two Pamphlets lately, One called a Narrative of the Murder of the Indians at Conestogoe, & another Cool Thoughts, &c. which are not too large for your Chron. & I believe

most of your Readers will be glad to see them there, I suppose Mr. H. sends them. A Period will probably be put to the Indian War this Summer. Sir Wm. Johnson has made Peace with the Senecas. They deliver up the Indians who first fell upon our Frontiers; grant a large Tract round Niagara to the King & his Heirs, with a free Transportation over that Portage to all His Majesty's Subjects, without Fee or Reward. They have given Hostages for the Performance of the Articles; & have joined the rest of the Confederated Nations against our Enemies Sir Wm. expects great Things from all of them: Near 400 are now out against the Enemy Indians—I was much entertained with your Letter to my Father. It made me imagine myself present at the Debates.—Mrs. F. is uneasy at not receiving a Box which Miss Clarke mentions to have been da. to you the 8th. of Jan. ry. — We continue well & happy. Our best Wishes attend you & Mrs. Strahan—I am, Dear Sir,

Dear Sir,

I have by Capt. Friend acknowledged the Receipt of yours by Tillet, together with the Tea & Cheese. Since which I have receiv'd yours of Octr. 8, by Handie, but the 2 Boxes from Mrs. Hughes, & the one containing th Metzotintos, are not yet got to hand, owing to the Ice which has rendered the River impassable for the Stage Boats. This same Ice too has I hear frightened Budden so, that he intends to put off immediately, less he should be shut up for the Winter. As we are not likely to have another Vessel sail from hence till the Spring, I intended to have wrote you a long Letter, but it is now out of my Power, and I question if even these few Lines will be in Time for Budden.

I am much obliged to you for inserting my first Speech, & and I know desire you will insert my Second, together with the Assembly's Address in Answer. They will give you an Idea of our Situation with regard to the Indians. You will find them both in Mr. Hall's Papers sent by this Opportunity. The Title of the Governor, if put at length to the Speech, should be the same as that to the Address, the first being wrong printed And in the last Part of the Paragraph relative to the Militia Law,

instead of the Words [to you as absolutely necessary] insert [so your Consideration]. — I have still a perfect Harmony with every Body in the Province, & shall not fail to follow the good Advice you give me for that Purpose. My hearty Thanks are due to you on that as well

as many other Occasions.

I wish the King & Queen's Pictures were finished, as there is no Picture of either of them (except the Prints) yet sent to N. America Please to tell Mr. Myers if it is possible that he has not yet finish'd the Miniatures) that Mrs. Franklin would be glad to have them made a little fatter, as I have increas'd considerably in Flesh since I left London; But Care must be taken not to alter the Likeness. She would likewise be glad to have my Father's Picture from Mr. Chamberlyne's (which I wrote for in my Last) & mine from Mr. Wilson's, as our Dining Room remains unfurnised for Want of them.-Please to ask Mr. Wilson if he receiv'd a Letter I wrote to him soon after my Arrival here?— I refer you to my Letter per Friend, with regard to what I would have done with the Crimson Damask, &c. which you were to receive for me.

I hope you have receiv'd the 51 f. from Messrs. S. & Aufrere. I dont believe I shall have Money enough in your Hands to answer all the Demands that will be made on you for sundry Things I have ordered from England, but I shall soon remit you a Bill. Miss Clark will have I believe upward of 30£ to receive. Miss Smith 5£ besides what I wrote to you to pay Mr. Small, &c.-I should be glad Becket wd send meall the Vols. of Rutthead, Statues now published, & the other Vols. as they come out; Also the Numbers printed of Mills's Husbandry, & those monthly Pieces of some Gent^{n.} of the Society of Arts. These may be directed for me to the Care of Mr. Hall, as I w. have every thing you send for me.

We are greatly rejoic'd to hear Mrs. Strahan is so well recovered. You have both of you our Wishes for a long uninterrupted State of Health & Happiness .-I am, Dear Sir,

Dear Sir.

I perceive by the Chronicle that my Letter to you of Sept. r. 21 (which enclosed you a second Bill for 30£ Sterling) has got safe to hand, as you have therein published an Extract of it, for which I am much obliged to you. But wether you receiv'd mine of May 1, 1764, containing the first Bill for 30£, I have not heard. last Letter I have receiv'd from you is dated Mar. 23, 1764. But as I have since receiv'd some Tea and Shoes which you were so good as to forward for me to Mr. Hall, I doubt not but you have also wrote, tho' I have not had the Pleasure of receiving your Letter. I have a great Suspicion that some of the Proprietary Politicians in Pennsylvania have been mean enough to intercept many of my Letters from England, in hopes of finding something of which they may take advantage; for I have of late receiv'd several Things from different Persons in England without any Letter accompaning them. For the future, be pleased to send your Letters to me under Cover to Messrs. Baynton and Warton Merchants in Philadelphia.-

I have no Copy of the Letter I sent you in June, but I remember it contain'd the first Bill for 30£, and an Acknowledgment of the Receipt of the Trunk containing the Common Prayer Books, Damask, &c. In mine of Nov. 15, 1763. I desired you get the Silk Damask changed for some Silk & Worsted Damask, & to have it made into Curtains for my Dining Room by Mr. Timothy Golding, Upholsterer in Brewer Street near Golden Square, who having formerly work'd for M's. Franklin & her Brother's Family would perhaps make them more reasonably than others. But as that Letter miscarried, & as I thought the Damask would probably be sent over. I desired you in my Letter of May 1, to tell Mr. Golding to make the Curtains notwithstanding, according to these Directions, viz. "Three Curtains of Yellow "Silk and Worsted Damask; Each Curtain to be Three "Yards & a Quarter long.—to contain four Breadths of "the Damask—and to be hung Festoon Fashion." And I likewise desired that if the Chapel Plate was not sent away, that you would have it commuted for a handsome Silver Waiter (large enough to hold four Cups & Saucers with the Cream Pot), A Quart Tankard with a

Top—a Pint Cann,—& a half Pint Cann. The Tankard & Canns to be quite plain.—If you have not receiv'd those Letters, and already sent the Things, I should be glad you would as soon after the Receipt of this as you can conveniently.—The Canns indeed if not sent, may be omitted, as I have been obliged to purchase such here.—M^r, Jefferies, the King's Cutler, has been used to commute Things of this kind for other Governors, & will I doubt not readily do the same for me I should be glad to have your Account as soon suits your Convenience. The Ballance due to you, I desired my Father to pay, which he promised.—I have not receiv'd the Books from Becket which I wrote for, & perhaps he has omitted to send them.

We have not heard anything from my Father since he sail'd, but I hope he has been safely landed in England at least two Months ago. Since he left us, Mr. Allen, one of the principal Propry. Tools in Pensylvania, has employ'd that Miscreant Parson Smith, & two or three other Prostitude Writers to asperse his Character, in which they have been very industrious. However, they have lately receiv'd a terrible Shock from Mr. Hughes, one of my Father's Friends, who being incensed at their base Conduct published an Advertisement sign'd with his Name, in which he promised that if Mr. Allen, or any Gentⁿ of Character, would undertake to justify the Charges brought against Mr. Franklin, he would pay 10 £ to the Hospital for every one they should prove to the Satisfaction of impartial Persons, provided they would pay 5 £ for every Falshood helshould prove they had alledg'd against Mr. Franklin. But this Challenge they were afraid to accept, & therefore still kept their Names concealed; but as they thought that something must be done, they endeavoured to turn Mr Hughes's Challenge into Ridicule, & raise the Laugh against him by an anonymous Answer. He. however, published a Reply, with his Name subscribed, in which he has lash'd them very severely for their Baseness. Not being able to answer this, they employ'd one Dove, a Fellow who has some Talent, for the lowest kind of Scurrility, to publish a Print, with some Verses annex'd, vilifying my Father & some of the most worthy Men of the Province. By way of Revenge some Writer has attack'd them in their own Way, & turn'd all Dove's Verses against Mr. Allen, he being the Head of the Propry, Party. This has enraged him excessively as those Verses & the Print had cost him upwards of 25 £. You will probably have seen,

before this reaches you, the Advertisement, Answer, & Reply, as they were printed in Mr. Hall's Newspaper, & therefore I send you the enclosed Pamphlet, which is likely to put a Stop to that kind of writing here for the future, as was the Intention of the Author.—The Malice of the Prop^{vy} Party against my Father, on Account of his wanting to bring about a Change of Government, is beyond all Bounds. They glory in saying & doing Things to destroy his Character that would make even Devils blush If he does not succeed I know not what will become of the Province as there is such a rooted Hatred among a great Majority of the People against the Prop^{vy}. Family.—Do let me hear what you think of his Undertaking, &c. &c.—

Pray hasten M^{r.} Ramsay with the King & Queen Picture, & send it over with mine at M^{r.} Wilsons.—

Mr. Stockton, the Gentleman who will deliver you this, is a considerable Lawyer of this Province, & a particular Friend of mine. Give me leave to recommend him to your Acquaintance, and to desire that you would treat him with the Sight of St. Johnson, & a few more of your Authors; for we Americans when we go to England, have as much Curiosity to see a live Author as Englishmen have to see a live Ostrich, or Cherokee Sachem.

Dear Sir-

If a due Sense of one's Fault is any Step towards Amendment, I may hope that I shall hereafter become a more regular Correspondent; for never was Man more asham'd of, nor angry with, himself, than I have been on Account of my having so long neglected acknowledging the Receipt of your Favor by Mr. Alexander. I have nothing to plead in Excuse, but that it was constantly in my Intention to write, and that tho' I have somehow or other, from time to time, omitted doing it, yet it was never owing to any Abatement of that Regard and Friendship which I have ever entertain'd for you, from our first Acquaintance. It gives me, indeed, much Concern, that there should be such a Chasm in our Correspondence; But as the Business of my Office occasions me a great deal of Writing, and as my Income (my necessary Expences considered) will not allow me to keep even a private Secretary or Clerk to copy my Dispatches, it is not possible that I should keep up so constant & regular a Correspondence with my Friends as I could wish. I have shewn, and shall continue to shew. Mr. Alex all the Civilities, & render him all the Service in my Power, both on his own Account and your Recommendation. He has been for several Weeks together at my House, and I employ'd him in doing as much Painting as came to ninety Guineas, besides getting him Business in that way from several of my Friends. So that if he don't succeed in recovering his Lands (which, however, I believe he will) he cannot be any great Loser by his Voyage. He was last Year depriv'd of the Use of his Limbs by a fit of Sickness, but is since recovered & got to work again.

This will be delivered to you by a particular Friend of mine, Mr Samuel Wharton Merchant of Philadelphia; who I beg leave to recommend to your Civilities. He is a Gentleman of Character & Abilities, and, from what he has heard me say of you, is very desirous of the pleasure of being of your Acquaintance.—I dare say you will like him, and I am sure he will like you—I long much to have a Chat with you on our American Affairs, which are really become very critical. But I durst not trust my Sentiments on that Subject to a Letter for fear of Accident. Mr. Wharton, however, is capable of giving you very exact Information of the

State of Affairs on this Side the Water. We wait with Impatience to hear the Result of this Session of Parliament with respect to America—Your Letters of political Intelligence, which Mr. Hall generally publishes in his Paper, afford us, from time to time, the best Information we receive of what is doing in Parliament, it containing many interesting Particulars, & little Anecdotes, which we have not thro' any other Channel.

M^{rs.} Franklin & I were much concern'd at the Loss you sustain'd in the Death of your very amiable Daughter Johnston. We hope her Children are well, & afford you & M^{rs.} Strahan a good deal of Comfort. Our best wishes attend you both—Remember me kindly to your Son William, and to my young *Mother*, who, I suppose, is now grown a Woman, and will, ere long add to her & your Happiness, by taking unto herself a Husband. 



They are, however, nothing more or less than the fruits of nearly a half century of incessant research and toil of a lover of the past; of one delving into the unfrequented paths of antiquity in the search for historical data and information. And this collection is a magnificent monument to the usefulness of the antiquary, in the preservation of documents and tomes which would probably have been destroyed through the carelessness of their owners, had not his forethought seen their use as records of history and mementoes of those who were great, and likely to be forgotten but for these mute witnesses of their one-time existence. Hours, days, weeks, months and years has Governor Pennypacker spent in untiring research. No manuscript was too discolored for him to pass over carelessly, no volume too unpretentious for him to cast aside without first examining its contents, as well as any inscriptions which might appear thereon. Consequently, we have here a really wonderful gathering of Manuscripts, Diaries and Commonplace Books of many of the most important personages of Colonial and Revolutionary times-books from the libraries of Great Generals, Statesmen, Divines, Poets and others, elegantly Illuminated Vellum Missals, Church Chorals, and Antiphonalias. These are so numerous and important that to make intelligent mention of them in these remarks would really necessitate a repetition of their descriptions, so we can only ask that the recipient of the catalogue will read it with especial care, as he cannot help being benefited from the information contained herein.

In closing, I would state that with the personal association books we have included Governor Pennypacker's large collection relating to General Washington, his unique collection of Confederate imprints, and last, and perhaps of most consequence, his magnificent and all-important collection of Original Drawings of Revolutionary Battle Plans and Maps. These latter were drawn and colored by a French Engineer under General Lafayette, and were used by him while campaigning with General Washington, and include the only original contemporary Plan of the Winter Encampment at Valley Forge, Plans of the Battles of Trenton, Princeton, and Siege of Yorktown, in fact no public library can boast of such possessions as these, with them also is the original map of Wolfe's campaign against Quebec, one of the most important events in the world's history, drawn by the British engineer, aided by two engineers from the provincial troops.

Each day of the Calendar has its saint, the interstices between the red-letter days being filled with names specially honored in French dioceses. The Hours differ considerably from those of the Roman rite, and the devotions in honor of St. Sebastian and St. Christopher

at the end of the volume are rarely, if ever, to be met with. The floral borders are of exceeding beauty, golden ivy leaves and berries being a chief feature, largely diversified by the introduction of strawberries, carnations, heartsease, convoluli, cornflowers, etc., while the full borders are further enriched by elegant frond-like scrolls of conventional character, together with foliage of natural tint. The interest of these borders increases with the progress of the book, one in particular (just anterior to the 6th miniature) being finished with surpassing delicacy. These decorations, in themselves a field inexhaustible for study, do but prepare us for a due appreciation of the splender of the pages chosen by the artist for his miniatures. To do justice to these the pen of a Ruskin would be needed. Brocaded tapestries, meadows of emerald green, graceful grasses daintily defined, clustering groves, gold-flecked skies, figures draped in perfection of flowing folds, crimson, blue, white and purple, and crowned with angelic countenancesall the features typical of the 15th Century miniaturist are present in the seven illustrations of this book of private prayer. The set includes-(1) The Annunciation, (2) The Crucifixion, (3) Pentacost, (4) David in Prayer, (5) An Entombment, (6) Madonna and Child, (7) God the Father, with the dead figure of the Son detached from the Cross. Numbers 6 and 7 have each an attendant angel, one playing a harp and the other holding a crown of thorns. Into both of these pictures is introduced a figure in the foreground which, according to the inscription on the fly-leaf, is that of the first ewner of the hook. A seriatim description of the remainder is not possible here. We must be content to say that each one is instinct with devotional fervor, blended with artistic feeling. The levely borders which fence in these miniatures are a worthy framework, firm, crisp, fair and resplendent, in defiance of centuries, a bolder treatment being adopted than in the case of the marginal adornments just alluded to. Lightness of touch, combined with the most accurate decision exemplified in the thread-like use of the white, lends an exquisite charm not only to the strongly drawn lines which define the limits of the picture as distinct from the border, but also to the grand initials below. The early history of this prayer manual is briefly inscribed on the fly-leaf, which tells us that "Ces heures apertiennent à damoisselle Michel le du . les quelles luy sont echeues par la suc-Dere femme de Mr. Loys d'Orleans 1577. Amour et Humilité sont les cession de feu son pere Mr. John Dudere, doux liens de notre mariage."

And again it is touchingly recorded: "Ce prest, liure ma este donné par feu Monsieur Dorleans fils de Mdlle. Dorleans nomée Michelle Dudere lequel estoit. aveugle et qui estoit digne de cette affliction mon cousin germain. G. Dudere, 1050.

In an ancient manuscript note in old French, on the fly-leaf of this volume it says: "The kneeling figures in the pictures in this volume are portraits of the deceased Lady Michelle De Saulai (Duderé) mother of my deceased father."

Dotterer, Dudderer and Dettra are the various forms of the name, as we find it along the Schuylkill, and few Americans can vie with the Pennsylvania Dutch family in the possession of such a beautiful manuscript, and such tangible evidence of their distinguished alliances four centuries ago.

Diaries or journals in the handwriting of General George Washington are of the most extreme rarity, and especially prior to the Revolution, all those known, with this exception, are either in public repositories or in the hands of those who are likely to bequeath them to some institution, and it is possible that this will be the last opportunity to obtain such an interesting memento of the great man. This little book, in which the General has jotted down in his familiar hand the occurrences of the day, contains a complete account, with few exceptions, of the state of the weather from February 1st to September 18th, as well as being replete with notes relative to his farms. A

better picture of the General as a gentleman and farmer could not be had. On his birthday, February 22, 1767, he wrote: "Ground froze,—clear, wind Southward & warm: "13th Vestry meet by 2d appointment';" "16th Vestry meet at Pohick;" Feby "26th Sale of Colo Coloock's Negroes:" April "16 Sowed a little flax at Muddy hole;" April "21 began to Plant Corn in the Neck at the Mill;" July "27 began to Sow wheat at the Mill with the early White Wheat, with grass at Muddy hole." The printed part of the almanac is rather free and coarse, for instance it says, under the heading of September:

"This month some maids makes nine months after sick, When they with men in woods, go nuts to pick; For being round about with woods inclos'd They oftentimes are wantonly dispos'd."

The following plans were drawn and executed in colors by a French officer under General De Lafayette during the War of the Revolution, and are of the utmost historical importance, from the fact that some of them are the only plans we have of certain locations, as, for instance, Washington's camp at Valley Forge. They are also of great historic value from the fact that they were actually used by Lafayette during his campaigning with General Washington, and the other great Generals of the Revolution. REMARKS.

THIS Catalogue embraces a most extensive and rare collection of books relating to the history of Pennsylvania, from its earliest inception to the present time, and includes many that are unique, as well as many so rare as to be almost unique. It is the result of the labors of Governor Pennypacker for the last forty years, and in it will be found the rarest items relating to Pennsylvania which have appeared in the sales of the many great collections that have been dispersed of late years. An unlimited knowledge of the subject has enabled Governor Pennypacker to gather together books printed long ago of which little was known, but containing much vital information in reference to the history of his native State. Consequently we can without uncertainty say that this is the most important collection of its kind ever offered for sale. To such works as we have thought worthy of notices, we have appended bibliographical information that will be of general historical value and give an idea as to their contents and rarity.

To this has been added his unique and extensive collection of magazines, newspapers and other periodicals published from time to time in Pennsylvania, embracing some of great rarity published in other sections of the United States. Many of these magazines were short lived, and have become so rare that it is almost impossible to obtain even single numbers of them, and Governor Pennypacker has succeeded in collecting full and complete files of each. Quite a number of these are in the German language, published at the small towns in the interior parts of Pennsylvania, and contain much local historical information not otherwise accessible. 





He commences thus: "It is now above Twenty Years, I thank God, that I have not been very Solicitous what the World thought of me." He then proceeds to deny the charges in gross and detail, but soon drops into a Quaker preachment, and seems to have forgotten where he started.

There are two or three allusions to Pennsylvania in the pamphlet, though it can hardly be said to relate to Pennsylvania, as Sabin's Dictionary says. Sabin could never have seen it, as his collation is wrong, and he says it is dated at Paddington, which is another error. Smith's Catalogue of Friends' Books dates the letter at Paddington also, and his collation is one and a half, while it should be two and a half. See facsimile title.



The book was so rare and so little known that it skipped the eye of the gentleman who catalogued that library, as well as the eyes of all the collectors and librarians and dealers who attended the sale. Governor Pennypacker noticed it, knew it, and purchased it, thereby securing the rarest work on early New York and Philadelphia. A translation of the title is:

(Title:) A short and concise plan intended as a mutual

agreement for lessening the labor and difficulty of all kinds of artisans by a common company or colony, (under the protection of their High Mightinesses the States General of the United Netherlands, and especially under the favorable authority of the Worshipful Magistracy of the City of Amsterdam) to be founded on South River in New Netherland; consisting of Husbandmen, Mariners, Workmen of all necessary trades, the masters of necessary arts and sciences. Confiding in the privileges granted by the said Right Worshipful to that end (so as here will be found). Composed by Cornclis Plockhoy of Zierikzee for himself and other lovers of New Netherland.

The advantages were an hundred guilders to every family joining the company of Cornelis Plockhoy. This company was to consist of 24 families only. Each one was to work six hours every day for the Commonwealth. The products of this labor were to be distributed in equal portions to all persons above twenty years—the remainder of their time was left to the private industry of the individuals.—G. M. Asher, Essay on Dutch Books.

Governor Pennypacker says of this very scarce book: "Plockhoy, the author, and his little Mennonite colony lived at Horekill on the Delaware in peace with the Indians for years. In 1664 Sir Robert Carr destroyed the settlement and carried off all of the property (even to a nail). What became of the people is unknown, but thirty years later Plockhoy, old, blind, and poor, wandered with his wife to Germantown. The settlers there gave him a lot, built him a little house, planted a tree in front of it, and made him a garden. There he ended his days. This book being the first concerning a settlement on the Delaware by a man who lived and died here, is the very cornerstone of the history and literature of Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey. Superlatively rare. Only two copies known to Muller of Amsterdam."



REMARKS.

THIS, the fourth part of the Catalogue of the valuable collection of books on Pennsylvania and general American history, gathered by the Hon. Samuel W. Pennypacker, late Governor of Pennsylvania, is replete with items of intense historical interest relating to nearly every State in the Union, as well as the complete history of the American Revolution. By this we mean an exhaustive list of the various pamphlets and books published at the time, from the first commencement of the controversy up to the present; also many items of great rarity relating to the early discoveries and Indian wars of the first settlers, including the French and Indian War.

The Catalogue commences with a collection of American Genealogies, including many that were privately printed and that are almost unattainable to-day. The pre-Revolutionary pamphlets is the most complete set ever offered at public auction, and includes the excessively rare pamphlet, "A Full Vindication of the Measures of Congress," written by Alexander Hamilton at the age of eighteen; together with the various answers, pro and con, written by Samuel Seabury, Isaac Wilkins and others, and published by James Rivington, the celebrated Tory printer of New York.

Of the various controversial pamphlets issued during the Revolutionary War, the collection is very complete, as well as containing all the important histories of the Revolution, including the original Journals of Congress, the original draft used in the convention of the Constitution of the United States, of which probably another copy could not be found.

There is a complete list of the early histories of the States, counties and towns, and of the early travels and explorations. The Indians are represented by a fine copy of Loudon's Indian Wars, published at Carlisle in 1808, and which

to-day is rated as one of the rarest items in Indian history; Ziesberger's Delaware Indian Spelling Book, published at Philadelphia in 1776; Livingston's Review of the Military Operations in North America, published in New York in 1770; original edition of Heckewelder's Narrative; and an extra-illustrated copy of "A Letter to the Right Honorable William Pitt, from an Officer at Fort Frontenac," London, 1759.

Among the books of general interest will be found a fine copy of Morgan Edwards' History of American Baptists, 2 vols.; the most complete collection of the pamphlets written by William Cobbett, including his "Political Censor"; the works of Thomas Paine as first issued; an original autograph orderly book written at Valley Forge by Henry Dearborn in 1778; the suppressed edition of Herndon's Lincoln, in 3 vols.; an early Jansen imprint in 1679, before he came to Philadelphia, giving an account of the hanging of Quakers in Boston; the life of James Aitken, alias John the Painter, who destroyed the naval stores at Portsmouth, England, in 1777—the rare original edition published at London in 1777: the original broadside issued by Secretary Stanton for the apprehension of the assassin of Abraham Lincoln; Stanbury and Odell's Loyal Verses; Major Robert Rogers' Account of North America, London, 1765; Sargent's Loyalists Poetry of the Revolution, etc. This will give a general idea of the worth of the collection, as it would be impossible for us to quote all the important items. The collection merits the attention of all collectors of early Indian history, early State and town history, pre-Revolutionary and Revolutionary history, and early explorations and travels in the United States.

under. The proceedings of the courts martial are peculiarly interesting in detailing the different petty offenses committed by the soldiers, and their punishments, which generally consisted of a generous use of the rod at the head of their regiment, and also of a few cases where capital punishment was necessary. 

De Vries made six voyages, the one to New Netherlands being the most interesting. Of the others, one was to Newfoundland for fish, one to Guiana, and three to the East Indies.

In the introduction to Murphy's translation of these voyages, privately printed by Mr. Lenox, he says of all the numerous Dutch navigators and travelers after Hudson, De Vries was the only one who published a journal or narrative of any voyage to New Netherlands during the period of the possession of the country by the Dutch nation.

In this introduction, Murphy further says: "The book is one of the rarest to be found, no printed copy being known to have been extant in this country, before the one from which the following translation has been made was obtained by James Lenox, Esq.'

Of the eighteen copperplates printed in the text, two represent the author's encounters with the pirates in the Mediterranean, four relate to the East Indies, and twelve to America. The text was first printed and the illustrations afterward printed in the spaces left for them.

In this copy there has been inserted Montana's View of New Amsterdam, and the work also gives an interesting account of the South River or Delaware.


