THE CUSTER FAMILIES

BY MILO CUSTER

ORIGIN AND MEANING OF THE FAMILY NAME,

The family name Custer is of Teutonic origin, and in its various forms of Custer, Kuster, Coster, Köster, Cöster, Küster, etc., is now common to many families in Holland, Germany, and America.

The English meaning of the name is "a sacristan" and the family or individual who first used this surname probably held that office in some Catholic church in western Germany or Holland in mediaeval times.

The first instance of the use of this name in any form, so far as I have been able to learn, was that of Laurens Coster (or Koster), the reputed inventor of printing in Haarlem, Holland. (A. D. 1370?—1440).

In the year 1535 during the Inquisition, PIETER KOSTER, a Menonite preacher who had formerly been sacristan of what was then the Roman Catholic church of Oost Zaandam, Holland, was condemned by the Roman Catholic authorities and executed at Amsterdam because of his religious beliefs.

An early instance of the Hollandish form "De Custer" i. e. "The Sacristan," is that of Hartman De Custer. (1573).

Another early example of the use of this name is that of Samuel Coster, the noted Dutch dramatist and physician of Leyden, Holland. (1579—1662).

PAUL KUSTER.

(ANCESTRY UNKNOWN)

In the year 1684, PAUL KUSTER, (or KÜSTER) a farmer and mason by occupation, his wife Gertrude (Streypers) Kuster, a native of Kaldenkirchen, in the Rheinland; with their children, ARNOLD, HERMANUS, JOHANNES, and ELIZA, emigrated from Crefeld, Germany, along with twenty-eight other emigrant families from Crefeld and other neighboring towns, and settled at Germantown, Pennsylvania.

These families formed the second German colony who settled at Germantown. The first colony of thirteen families landed at Philadelphia, Oct. 6, 1683. They were Mennonites and were under the leadership of Franz Daniel Pastorius, who was both their pastor and school-teacher,

The church organization founded by these pioneer German emigrants is still in existence. Its records contain an entry of the attendance at communion of Arnold and Hermanus Kuster, under date of May 23, 1708.

The first church building in Germantown, a log structure erected about the year 1700, was torn down and replaced with a stone building in 1770. This old stone church is still standing, and is still used as a place of worship by the Mennonites.

The 225th anniversary of the first settlement at Germantown was celebrated October 6, 1908, and a monument erected there bearing the names of the head of families who comprised the first colony.

PAUL KUSTER'S name appears in a list of emigrants who left Crefeld fo America in the year 1684, also in a tax list of heads of families residing in Germantown in 1693. December 2, 1700, he was chosen a committeeman of the corporation of Germantown. December 4, 1704, he purchased fifty acres o land of Henry Buchholtz, and January 5, 1706, he was appointed oversee of fences for Germantown.

Arnold Kuster married Elizabeth ----, and died in the year 1734.

JOHANNES KUSTER (ancestor of the Kester families) married Elizabeth Cassel daughter of Johannes Cassel, September 30, 1692.

PAUL KUSTER died at Germantown, Pa., about Jan. ——, 1708.

Gertrude (Streyper) Kuster died "soon after" the death of her husband.

HERMANUS KUSTER OR CUSTER.


HERMANUS KUSTER (or CUSTER), farmer, son of PAUL and Gertrud (Streypers) Kuster, was born probably about the year 1675. He came t America with his parents' family in the year 1684. He and his brother Johanne purchased 200 acres of land near Skippack, in what is now Montgomery County Pa., upon which they settled about the year 1700. This farm is located about one and one-half miles from Evansburg, Pa.

HERMANUS KUSTER married Isabella Conrad, daughter of Peter Conrad, in the year 1706. Their children were PAUL (2), JOHN (1), PETER (1), GERTRUDI MARGARET, MAGDALENA, and REBECCA.

HERMANUS KUSTER died in Montgomery County, Pa., in the year 1760. He wa probably the first of his family who abandoned the old German spelling of hi family name and adopted the form now used by his descendants.



PAUL CUSTER (2).

PAUL CUSTER (2), farmer, son of Hermanus and Isabella (Conrad) Kuster or Custer, was born in Montgomery County, Pa. about the year 1710. He married Sarah Martha Ball, daughter of John Ball [of Virginia?] about the year 1730. She was, it is said, a sister of Joseph Ball, maternal grandfather of President George Washington. Their children were John Custer, born 1732, died in infancy; JONATHAN CUSTER (1), born 1734; PAUL CUSTER (3) born about 1736, [the writers ancestor?]; WILLIAM CUSTER (1), born about 1740; GEORGE CUSTER (1 G.), born Dec. 3, 1744, and NICHOLAS CUSTER (1), born probably about the year 1746.

PAUL CUSTER (2) died in Montgomery County, Pa. Nov. 10, 1783. Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer, his wife, died Dec. 10, 1779.

JONATHAN CUSTER (1).

JONATHAN CUSTER (1), farmer, of Montgomery County, Pa. son of Paul (2) and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer, married Hannah (Peters) Kendall, daughter of Henry Peters and widow of Benjamin Kendall about the year 1760. She was born about the year 1735. Their children were Peter Custer (3), born 176-, settled at Redstone, now Browntown, Warren County, Virginia; Benjamin Custer, born 176-, married Margaret Bell; JONATHAN CUSTER (2), born 1767; Hannah (Custer) Pruntzman, born 176-, married Benjamin Pruntzman, and George Custer (2), born about 1770, settled in Ohio. JONATHAN CUSTER (1) died in Berks County, Pa. in the year 1822. Hannah (Peters) Kendall--Custer, his wife, died in the year 1805.

Jonathan Custer (2) and wife are buried in Amityville Cemetery at Amityville Pennsylvania.

PAUL CUSTER (3), son of Paul (2) and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer, settled in Virginia. It is supposed that he is identical with the Paul Custer who was the father of Richard Custer (1), but this is not certain. There is a tradition among some of the descendants of the latter to the effect that their ancestors were German, that they formerly spelled the name with a K, and pronounced the u long. The family of General Custer say that their ancestor Paul with whom this Paul (3) may also have been identical, was German, and that he could not speak good English. The writer would be glad to have more definite information regarding this Paul Custer.

RICHARD CUSTER (1).

Early in the year 1781, as appears from his and his widows applications for pensions, Richard Custer (1) enlisted in the Virginia troops under Col. Nall for service against the British in the War of the American Revolution. He served in this war as a private soldier three months in Captain George Huston's company and three months in the company of Captain Anthony Rader, and participated in the skirmishes at Hot Water Creek and Williamsburg, Va.

He married Jane Humble, daughter of Conrad Humble, March 18 1788. She was born in the year 1771. Their children were all born in Rockingham County, Virginia, and were as follows: RICHARD CUSTER (2), born about the year 1790; SARAH (CUSTER) FULK; GABRIEL CUSTER; JOHANNA (CUSTER) WEVNER; STRAWDER CUSTER, and GEORGE CUSTER (4).

RICHARD CUSTER (1) died in Rockingham County, Virginia, Feb. 14, 1837. Jane (Humble) Custer, his wife, died sometime after the year 1841. They are buried on the old Custer homestead four miles north of Cootes Store, in Rockingham County, Virginia.

RICHARD CUSTER (2).

RICHARD CUSTER (2), farmer and gunsmith, son of Richard (1) and Jane (Humble) Custer, married Elizabeth Trumbo, daughter of Jacob (1) and Hannah (Hess) Trumbo, March 28, 1810. She was born Aug. 21, 1791. Her mother Hannah (Hess) Trumbo, was once taken prisoner by some Indians from Ohio, when she was a girl about ten or twelve years old, and was kept by them several years, until finally released at some exchange of prisoners, probably during the French and Indian war. The children of Richard (2) and Elizabeth (Trumbo) Custer were all born in Rockingham County, Virginia, as follows: SARAH (CUSTER) RIDDLE, born Aug. 21, 1811; GEORGE CUSTER (6), born Sept. 9, 1813; JACOB CUSTER (4), the writers grandfather, born Jan. 25, 1817; DEBORAH CUSTER) WEEN, born Sept. 19 1819; HANNAH (CUSTER) RITCHIE born Feb. 5, 1823; CONRAD CUSTER (1), born Feb. 10, 1825; AMANDA (CUSTER) HESS, born Nov. 20, 1829, and BERRYMAN CUSTER born Feb. 2, 1833,

Richard Custer (2) enlisted in Captain Thomas Hopkins Company, Virginia Militia, War of 1812, Aug. 29, 1814, and served as Ensign until Dec. 8, 1814. RICHARD CUSTER (2) died in Rockingham County, Virginia, June 4, 1856. He was a small, stoutly built man about five feet six inches in height, and weighed about 150 pounds. He was light complexioned, had light hair and blue eyes, and it is said he never wore a beard or mustache.

Elizabeth (Trumbo) Custer, his wife, died also in Rockingham County Virginia in the year 1871. She was a large strongly built woman with dark hair and dark eyes. Their remains are buried on the old Richard Custer homestead four miles north of Cootes Store, Va.

SARAH (CUSTER) RIDDLE.

SARAH (CUSTER) RIDDLE, daughter of Richard (2) and Elizabeth (Trumbo) Custer, married George Riddle in Rockingham County, Virginia, Jan. 1832. Their children all born in Rockingham County, Va. were Jackson Riddle, born Sept. 16, 1832; Stephen Riddle, born Jan. 21, 1834, died 1851, and Clara (Riddle) Turner, wife of Moses Turner of Cootes Store, Va. Lorn Dec. 14, 1838. Sarah (Custer) Riddle died Nov. 3, 1897.

GEORGE CUSTER (6).

GEORGE CUSTER (6) died of injuries received in a fall from horseback in Rockingham County Va. 1855.

RICHARD CUSTER (3).

RICHARD CUSTER (3), son of George (6) and Melvina (Ritchie) Custer, married Sarah E. Huff in Saline County, Mo. July 18 1875. She was born in Missouri April 8, 1855. RICHARD CUSTER (3) died in Saline County Mo. Nov. 30 1901. He was a Confederate soldier in the Civil War.

Oct. 28 1883, accidentally killed on a railroad in Indiana, Jan. 5, 1907, and Everett J. Custer, born also at Decatur, III. March 8, 1889.

EVERETT J. CUSTER, son of Conrad (2) and Sarah C. (Keller) Custer,

married Gertrude Chase, of Rockford, Ill.

SOLOMON CUSTER.



Army, Oct. 19 1864: Brigadier - General of Volunteers U. S. Army, March 13, 1865: Major General U. S. Army April 15, 1865. Participated in the battles of Bull Run (first) Gettysburg, Yellow Tavern, Trevillion Station, Winchester, Fishers Hill Woodstock, Waynesboro, Five Forks and Dinwiddie Court House, Civil War. He was mustered out of the U. S. Volunteer Service in March 1865, was appointed Lieutenant - Colonel of the 7th U. S. Cavalry July 28, 1866. Fought the battle of the Washita, with his command in the campaign against the Cheyenne Indians, Nov. 27, 1877. Aug. 4 1874, they fought the battle of Tongue River (or battle of the Yellowstone) with the Sioux.

GENERAL GEORGE A. CUSTER was killed along with his brothers Captair THOMAS W. CUSTER and BOSTON CUSTER, 202 members of his command and ten civilians in the battle with the confederated Sioux Indian tribes on the Little Big Horn River in Montana, June 25, 1876, Monuments to General Custer have been erected at West Point N. Y. where his remains are buried, and at Monroe Mich. also to him and his men who fell at the Little Eig Horn. (See cuts)

Kline, born June 27, 1862; GEORGE K. KLINE, born Oct. 13, 1863; WILLIAM M. KLINE, born Sept. 12, 1865; HORACE M. KLINE, born May 9, 1867; and Hon. CHARLES H. KLINE, Member State Senate of Pennsylvania, born Dec. 25 1870. ANNA M. (CUSTER) KLINE died at Indiana Pa. June 14, 1902. Wellington B. Kline, her husband, died also at Indiana Pa. March 2, 1904.

EXTRACT

FROM ENCYCLOPAEDIA BRITTANNICA ON LAURENS COSTER.

"KOSTER, or Coster, Laurens (1370?-1440), the first Dutch printer, whose claims to be considered at least one of the inventors of the art (see Printing) have been recognized by many investigators. His real name was Laurens Janssoen, - Koster (i. e. sacristan) being merely the title which he bore as an official of the great parish church of Haarlem. We find him mentioned several times between 1417 and 1434 as a member of the great council, as an assessor (scabinus), and as the city treasurer. He probably perished in the plague that visited Haarlem in 1439-40; his widow is mentioned in the latter year. His descendants through his daughter Lucia can be traced down to 1724.



"In H't Jaer 1535, is 'er geweest een vroom Broeder genaemt Pieter Koster, welke tot Sardam, in Noort Holland, een Koster in de Kerk geweest was, maer alsoo is hy tot de kennis der Waerheyd gekomen is werd hy tot een Leeraer der Gemeente gestelt, en overmits de Verfolging is hy tot Amsterdam gaen woonen alwaer hy van den Schout gevangen wierd, door aenmelding van een vrouw in sijn buert woonende, die door dwasen yver de plaets openbaerde daer hy hem verborgen hadde.

TRANSLATION.

"In the year 1535, a certain pious brother named Pieter Koster, was sacristan of the [Roman Catholic] church at Sardam in North Holland, but when he acquired knowledge of the Truth, he became a preacher of the [Mennonite] organization. Because of the Persecution he went to reside in Amsterdam .

There he was arrested by the bailiff at the instance of a woman residing in his neighborhood, who through foolish zeal revealed the place where he had concealed himself.

As it was in a time when conspiracies and evil revolutions were of universal occurrence, so was this friend of Gods held in suspicion thereof.

But it is apparent from his own writings as also from his confession, that he was innocent in that respect, and diverse credible witnesses were able to testify that he was always heartily opposed to such things,

Nevertheless, because he had received baptism according to Christs command and ordination and thereupon had served in the ministry, he was condemned to death, and executed with the sword at Amsterdam, awaiting with all the

faithful, that Reward which Christ has promised when he said [Matt. 5, 11-12] 'Blessed are ye when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and say all manner of evil against you, falsely for my sake.'

'Rejoice and be exceeding glad, for great is your reward in Heaven."

EXTRACT FROM ENCYCLOPÆDIA BRITTANICA ON DR. SAMUEL COSTER.

"KOSTER, or COSTER, Samuel, (1579-1662), A Dutch dramatist. He was born at Ansterdam, studied at Leyden, and subsequently became physician at the infirmary in his native city. His excellent plays and his establishment of the Nederduitsche Academie (1617), a society which gave great encouragement to the earlier dramatic authors of Holland, earned for him the title "Founder of the theaters of Amsterdam.

Teeuwis de Boer en Mejuffer van Grevelinckhuysen (1615).

His tragedies include Isabella, which was performed at the Castle of Muiden in 1618; Itys (1616), Iphigenia (1617), and Polyxena (1630).

They have been frequently reprinted. Consult the monograph on Koster by Rossing (Leyden, 1875)"

"During the immigration of the year 1684, [we] find also that from Muhlheim came Wigard and Gerhard Levering, Herman Op-de-Trap, Ennecke Klosterman Jan Linderman, Levin Harberdinck, Michael Renberg, Evert In-den-Hoffe, Rennier Hermans, and Klas Jansen; from Crefeld Walter Seimens, J. J. and Mathias Van Bebber, Hans Peter Umstat, Willem Hosters, Kornel Tyson (Thieszen), Herman Dors, Paul, Kuster, Jean De La Plaine, (one of the many Hug-uenots who had immigrated to Crefeld); from Mors, Thomas Rutter, Kornelius Siverts, David Scherkes, H. J. Van Aaken (son-in-law of Jan Streypers); from Neuwied Hubert Brouwer; from Cologne, Jan Neusz (a celebrated silver smith). also from the Rhineland - the particular locality not being ascertained; Gerhard Hendricks Elsen, Hendricks Buchholtz, Arnold Vossen and Philip Hans. Imann.

A DE CUSTER COAT-OF-ARMS.

The Armorial General of the Netherlands by J. B. Rietstap (2nd edition) Vol. I. Gouda Holland, 1884, (copy in Library of Congress) contains the following description of the coat-of-arms of P. de Custer d' Overyssel; viz.

'' Custer. -- P. d' Overyssel. - Rotterdam; De gueules a la croix de deux traverses d' or. tous les bras touchant les bords de l'ecu. Casque Couronne. Cunier. un pelican d'or avec sa piete de gueles''.

The Armories des familles contenues dans 1' Armorial General (copy in Library of Congress); contains a cut of the coat-of-arms of P. de Custer d' Overyssel. (Fascicule 34' plate 164.)

The Algemeen Nederlandsche Familieblad, a Hollandish publication, copies of which are in the Library of Congress, contain references to Hartman de Custer, 1573, (No. 49, P. 1a, and Vol. 16, 1903, P. 316); Michiel Harmus de Custer, 1636, (Vol. 10, 1893, P. 17), and Philips de Custer, 1688, 1695, (No. 3, P. 3a, and No. 134, P. 2a). [Let it be observed here that the Hollandish "de" is the equivalent of the English "the"].

EARLY KÜSTER EMIGRANTS TO PENNSYLVANIA OTHER THAN PAUL KUSTER.

Among the early German emigrants who landed at Philadelphia prior to the year 1775, were the following Kusters; Jacob Kuster, (a passenger on the ship St. Andrew, from Rotterdam, Holland.) who landed Sept. 24, 1737; Johannes Kuster (2), Philip Kuster, Ludwig Kuster, and George Kuster, all of whom landed between the years 1740 and 1757, and Johannes Kuster (3) and George Kuster (2), who landed between the years 1757 and 1775. (Pennsylvania Archives, 2nd Series, Vol. XVII).

Family Name, Kuster. Genitive, Kusters (Heinsberg); Composite form: Kusterman. Without modification of the u, Kuster, Kusterman, Kusterer, (Wurtemburgish). Diminutive form, Kusterle (Gottschee).

Low German, Koster, Coster, Coster, (Jeverland). Genitive, Kosters (Borken).
Composite form, Kosterman. Patronymic, Kostering (Lippe).

With the "n" [presenting] the diminutive forms, Kustner, Kostner.

DEFINITION OF THE FAMILY NAME "DE CUSTER" ETC.
