IBBOT, Benjamin, D.D.

A learned divine. Born at Beachamwell, Norfolk, 1680. Educated at Clare Hall and Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. Treasurer of Wells Cathedral, and Rector of St. Vedaft, London, 1708. Some time after appointed Rector of St. Paul's, Shadwell. Prebendary of Westminster 1724. Died 1725. In his Boyle Lectures he ably confutes the objections of Collins.

JUSTINIAN.

The first Roman emperor of his name, and celebrated for his code of laws. Succeeded to the imperial throne 527. Died 565, at the age of eighty-three. He collected the Roman laws into one body, having selected ten of the most able lawyers, who revised the Gregorian, Theodosian, and Hermogenian codes. They were compiled into one body, called The Code. The decisions of the judges and other magistrates, which lay scattered in about 2000 vols., after ten years' labour, chiefly by Tribonian, an eminent lawyer, were reduced to the number of sity, and called Digests or Pandects. For the use of students he ordered four books of Institutes to be drawn up by Tribonian, Dorotheus, and Theophilus; and the laws of modern date were put into one volume, called Novellæ or New Code. The whole are now published under the general title of Corpus Juris Civilis. The editions with Gothofredus's notes are much esteemed.

LE CLERC [CLERICUS], John. A celebrated Protestant writer, and universal scholar. Born at Geneva 1657. Studied divinity under Mestrezat and Turretin. Ordained 1679. Renounced Calvinism, became a zealous Arminian, and was appointed Lecturer in the college belonging to the Remonstrants at Amsterdam. Died 1736. His learning was profound, his reading immense, and his genius sertile. His work on the Holy Scriptures, particularly that part on the Pentateuch, is full of learned and ingenious criticism. He edited Erasmi opera, Cotelerii Patres Apostolici, Grotius de Veritate, Rymeri Fædera, and other works. The reviews of books in his Bibliothèques are, perhaps, more complete, and more accurate, than those in the Nouvelles de la République des Lettres. They are interspersed with essay on different subjects, relating to divinity, facred criticism, history, and moral philosophy. Rites and ceremonies; 7. Government of the Church, in which are included accounts of libraries, schools, power of magistrates, discipline, popes; 8. Schisms; 9. Councils held; 10. Lives of bishops and doctors; 11. Heretics; 12. Martyrs; 13. Miracles and prodigies; 14. The state of the Jews; 15. State of religion without the Church; 16. Political changes in the empire. Mosheim pronounces it "that immortal work, which restored to the light of evidence and truth the facts relating to the rife and progress of the Christian Church, which had been covered with thick darkness and corrupted by innumerable fables." The celebrated Annals of Baronius were undertaken in order to counteract the influence of this history. The work does not reach beyond the thirteenth century. The best edition is the original one of 1559 and following years, in 13 vol., each century making a volume, but generally bound in 8. The reprint in 3 vol. folio, Bafil. 1624, was altered by the editor, Ludovicus Lucius, by various omiffions and interpolations in order to make it more acceptable to the reformed who were not of the school of Luther.

MORLAND, Sir Samuel.

On his return, in 1658, he received public thanks for his services, and published the now rare work noted below. Established by Lady Rebecca Moyer, sister of Sir William Joliffe, Knt., and widow of Sir Samuel Moyer, Bart., a rich Turkey merchant, who was Sheriff of Effex 1698, and died 1716. SANDERSON, Robert, D.D., Bp. of Lincoln.

A learned divine, especially in casuistry. Born at Rotheram, Yorkshire, 1587. Studied at Lincoln College, Oxford, where he obtained a Fellowship 1606. Soon after, elected Reader of Logic. Rector of Boothby Pannel, Lincolnshire, 1619. Prebendary of Lincoln 1629. Rector of Muston 1633. Regius Professor of Divinity, Oxford, and Canon of Christ Church 1642. Ejected from the last two appointments 1643. Restored, and consecrated Bishop of Lincoln, 1660. Died 1662-3. He was a man of great piety, modesty, learning, and abilities. He was originally a strict Calvinist, but from this he afterwards greatly relaxed. "Dr. Sanderson," says Dr. Hammond, "conceives all things deliberately, dwells upon them difcreetly, discerns things that differ exactly, paffeth his judgment rationally, and expresses it aptly, clearly, and honestly." King Charles I. faid, that he "carried his ears to hear other preachers, but his confcience to hear Mr. Sanderfon.'

His father, Marcus Annæus Seneca, was a rhetorician, and his extant works are printed with those of the fon in feveral editions. Lucius Annæus Seneca received his education at Rome, and became fucceffively quæftor, prætor, and, fome fay, conful. He was tutor to Nero, who eventually fent him an order to put himfelf to death, which he did with equanimity. SIBBS, Richard, D.D.

A learned and pious divine. Born at Sudbury, Suffolk, 1577. Educated at St. John's College, Cambridge, where he obtained a Fellowship. On being ordained, he was chosen Lecturer of Trinity Church, Cambridge, the living of which he held during the last two years of his life. Preacher of Gray's Inn 1618, where he obtained great reputation as a preacher. Chosen Master of Catharine Hall, Cambridge, 1625. Died 1635. His works are held in much estimation, particularly his Bruised Reed and Soul's Conslict; to the former of which Richard Baxter says, he owed, in a great measure, his conversion. Izaak Walton wrote the following couplet in a copy of The Returning Backslider:—

" Of this blest man, let this just praise be given, Heaven was in him before he was in heaven."

No complete edition of Sibbs's works has been published. The collection printed 1812, in 3 vol. 8°., contains only a small portion. It is incorrectly printed, and omits the prefaces, dedications, and tables.

SOCINUS, Faustus.
From whom the name of the fect of Socinians is derived
Born at Sienna 1539. Supposed to have studied little in his youth. He resided some years at the court of Florence,
where he had a civil employment. Went to Germany
1574, and afterwards to Poland, where the Unitarians

refused to admit him into their communion on account of his doctrine respecting the simple humanity of Christ. Died at Cracow 1604. The most celebrated of the ancient philosophers. Born

in Attica, B.c. 469. His father was a statuary and sculptor, and Socrates carried on the bufiness for some time after his death; but employed his leifure hours in the study of philosophy. Afterwards taught philosophy, and for some time ferved his country in the field. Having been falfely accused as a contemner of the gods, he was put to death by the Athenians, B.c. 396. His opinions are described by Xenophon and Plato.

TALMUD.

The word Talmud, which means study, namely, of subjects appertaining to the religious traditions of the Jews, was given to the vast collections of Jewish patriffic writings which contain the theological and judicial problems and decifions, together with the exegetical discussions, moral maxims and aphorisms, narratives of an historical, mythical, and allegorical character, and the mifcellaneous opinions and fayings of the Rabbins. The Talmud confifts of two parts, - namely, of the body of Rabbinical theology entitled Mifchnah (which fee), and of the Genara (which in

TALMUD (continued).

meaning is fynonymous with the term Talmud). The feveral paragraphs of the Mischnah form texts to which are appended the more lengthy comments of the Gemara. The latter is effentially the exposition and criticism, the amplification or limitation of fuch Mischnaical texts. The Gemara is composed in the Aramaic dialect, and intersperfed with many Hebrew fragments, which in regard to ftyle agree with the language of the Mischnah. There are two distinct Talmuds. The one, which contains the relics of the transactions of Jewish academies in Palestine, is called the Jerusalem Talmud, and was completed in the latter part of the fourth century; the other compilation, called the Babylonian Talmud, is four times larger than the Talmud of Jerusalem. It contains the Gemara, or comments to thirty-fix out of the fixty-three Mischnaical treatifes, and occupies 2947 folio pages in the printed editions, all editions being paged alike to facilitate reference. This Talmud was completed in Sura, after the expiration of the fifth century. The most celebrated commentary on the Babylonian Talmud was written by Rafchi (See Jarchi). There exist many digests of the Talmud; the one best known, and which relates to the practical religious fystem of the Rabbins, was executed by Maimonides in his large work entitled Iad Chazakah. (See Maimonides.) Editions of the Jerusalem Talmud, which now are fcarce and never have been published in a complete form, appeared at Venice (printed by Bomberg), Cracow, Amsterdam, Vienna, &c. Of the Babylonian Talmud have been published numerous editions; the first, by Daniel Bomberg, in Venice, was commenced in 1520. Most editions are in 12 vol. folio; but there are some in convenient 8°., the last of which appeared at Prague, 1839-46, in 24 vol. Small portions of the Talmud have been translated into Latin and various other languages.

TARGUM.

Targum, or interpretation, is the general name of the translations and paraphrases of the Old Testament, written in the Aramaic dialects of Palestine and Babylonia. These versions differ very much in Ryle and in the mode of introducing a variety of Jewish traditions and doctrinal matter. The Targum to the Pentateuch has come down to us in various forms. The most ancient is that attributed to Onkelos (which fee); the other, which ought to be termed Jerusalem Targum, is falsely ascribed to Jonathan Ben Uzziel (which see), for it contains allusions to subjects and events which originated many centuries after the life of that interpreter of the Hebrew Scriptures, who is faid to have been a contemporary of Christ. There are portions apparently of a third version of the Pentateuch, which in the printed copies bear the name Jerusalem Targum. It has, however, been found that this version contains simply emendations and different readings of the one attributed to Jonathan Ben Uzziel. The right defignation of both these versions therefore is Jerusalem Targum. The Targums to nearly all the Scriptures are printed in the Polyglotts and in the Rabbinical Bibles of Buxtorf and others. Two Targums to the Book of Chronicles by different authors were edited with Latin vertions by Beck and Wilkins.
