Dear Friend May-

Your note enclosed to
Miss Esther reached us here on Tuesday
the 26th I am at Mr. Vaughan's (Mr.
Bishop's Father-in-Law) & Miss Esther
lives with the Wighams on the other
side of the town - but I was over
there when the letter's came. Your
letters always meet a hearty wel-
come - I am glad you saw my ar-
ticle in the Eng. & that you ap-
prove of it. It has come back to
me this week in the Liberator.
I have one to appear in the Octo-
ber Advocate & shall connect
with it at least two more if
my stay is long enough. I have
also one which by this time
should be in the hands of the
Editor of the N. S. Bugle. I do not
write much for the American
papers, because to write for
the public, one should bestow
more labor than would be
profitable for me to expend now
when I am compelled to husband

My energies - and besides, the
writing her, private, & for publica-
tion, is enough for me; & is proba-
bly of more importance.

Since my last my time has
been spent ~~mostly~~ in Scotland -
two days or more of it at Prof. F.
Riche's - The meeting of the
W. Association gave me
an opportunity to see a good deal
of eminent men. And the Change
of season from autumn to
winter has had its usual effect
upon me, so that I have only been
fit to observe the labors of others.
Andrew Paton perseveres with his
Sunday Steamer Enterprise. The
results are not yet very ap-
parent - but having many secret
friends, besides a goodly number
of open ones, he will be able to call
on the designs, & it will at last
seem to have been one of the no

ington, & one or two other places.
It is rather forced work, for the
