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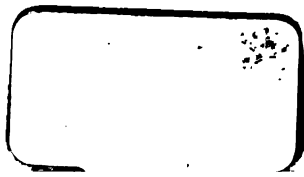
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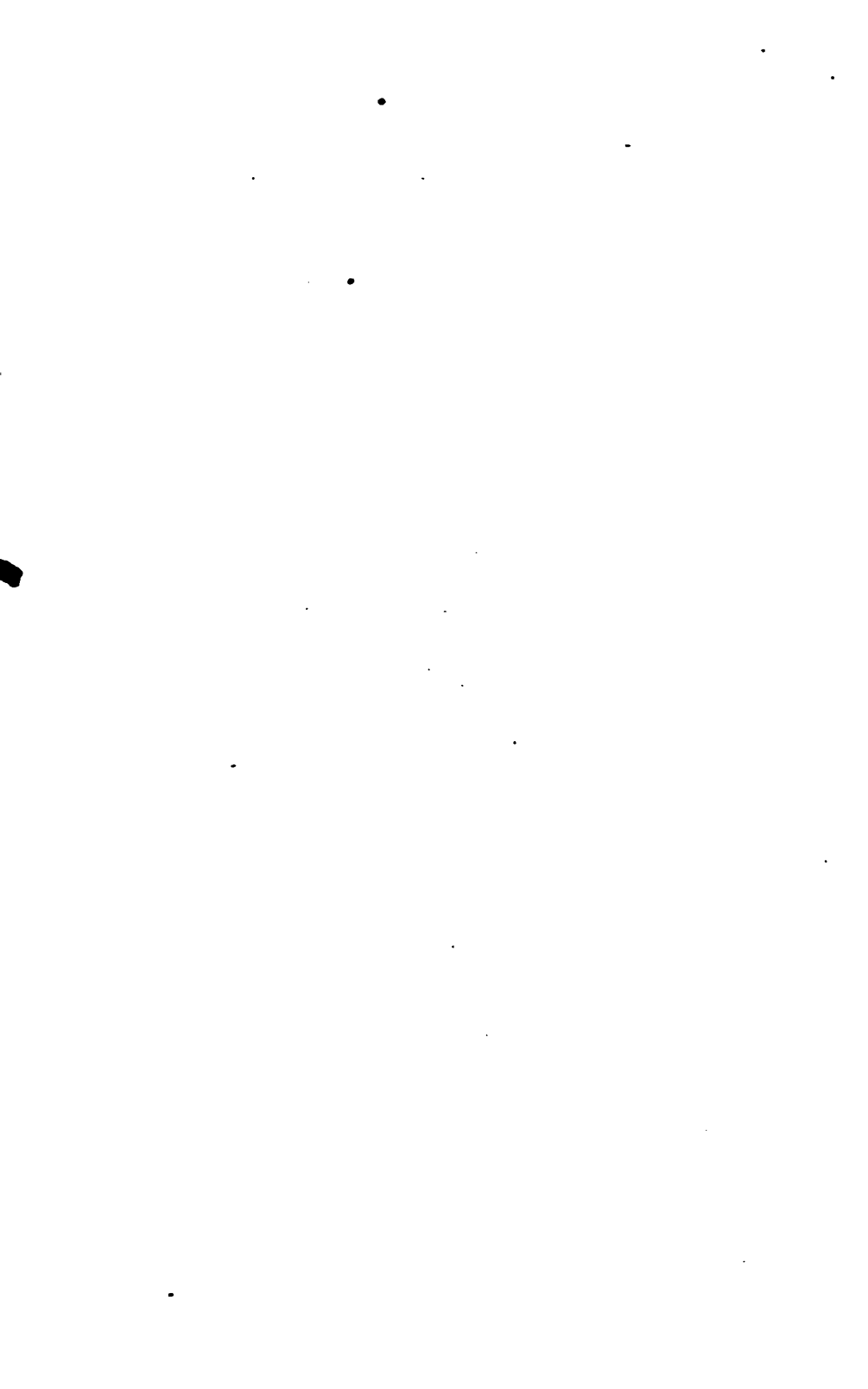
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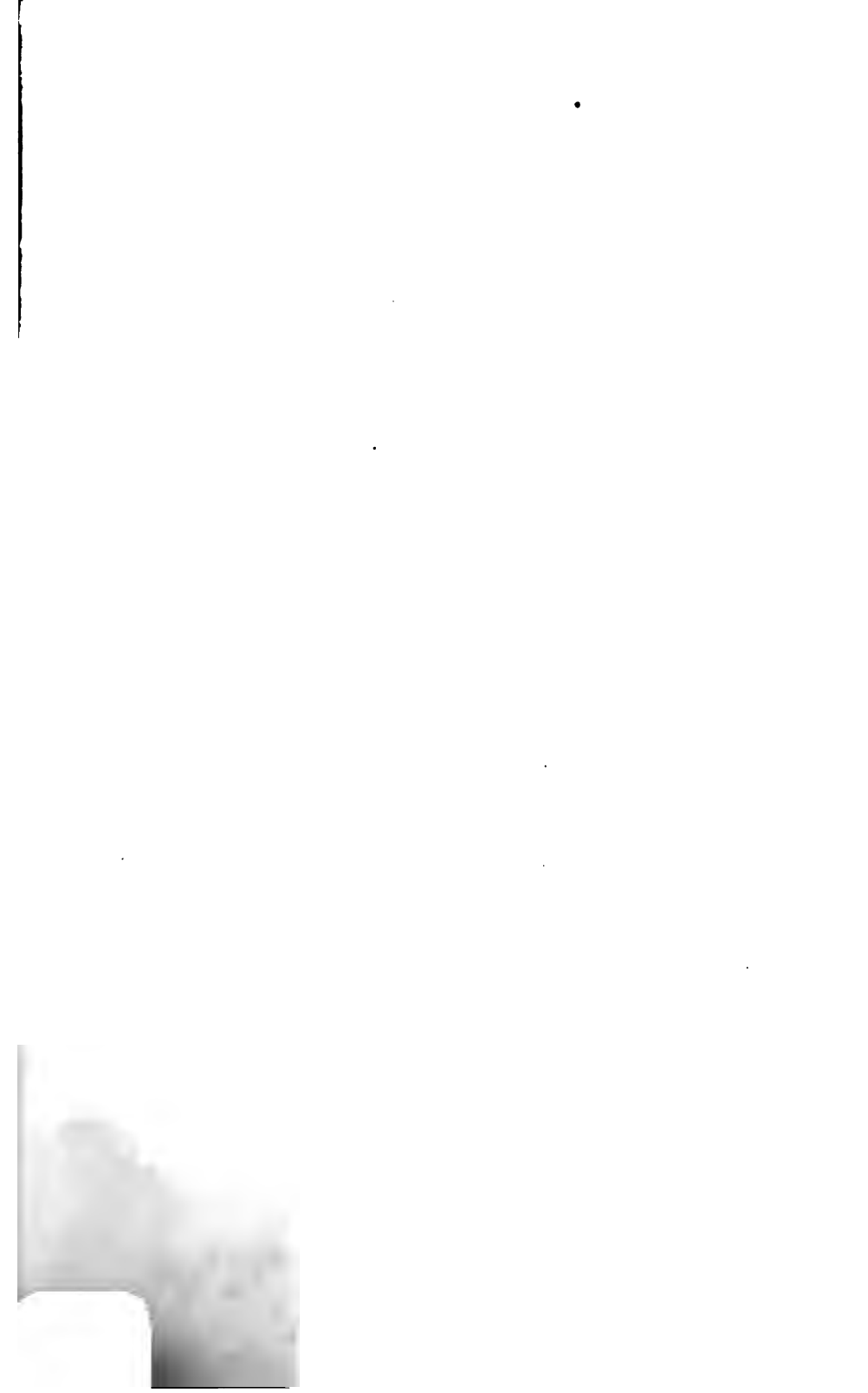

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THE DIFFERENT DEGREES OF NOBILITY IN ENGLAND.

The degrees of nobility in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland are five, viz. *Dukes, Marquesses, Earls, Viscounts, and Barons*; to which may perhaps be properly added a sixth, viz. the *Archbishops and Bishops*, who as spiritual lords are entitled to a seat in the house of peers, and possess for their lives all the faculties and privileges of the peerage.

It is proper to advert to a mode of creation and advancement of peers in use in ancient times, viz. in *full parliament*; on which occasion it does not appear that any writ was used, but that the person advanced or recently created, after undergoing the usual ceremonies of investiture, had his *patent* delivered to him, and did homage to the king.

The following instances, amongst many others, of the above mode of creation, appear in the Rolls of Parliament.

The marquess of Juliers, created *earl of Cambridge*, in full parliament, 14 Edw. III. The lord chancellor notified the king's pleasure to create his son, *Lionel*, then in Ireland, duke of Clarence, to him and his heirs male, his son *John*, duke of Lancaster, and *Edmund*, earl of Cambridge, in fee accordingly. The Commons pray the Lords that the King would create Richard de Bourdeaux, (son of Edward the Black Prince, late Prince of Wales,) Prince of Wales, to which the Lords answer, that he could only be created by the King, 50 Edw. III. *Richard*, prince of Wales, duke

of Cornwall and earl of Chester, opened the parliament by commission, sitting in the King's own place, the Lord Chancellor, in notifying the causes for calling the parliament, said that the King, agreeably to their desire, had created *Richard de Bourdeaux, prince of Wales, &c.* 1376. *Edmund, earl of Cambridge*, advanced to the dignity of *duke of York*, by the king himself in full parliament, by girding him with a sword, putting a crown of gold on his head, and delivering him his patent of creation, 1385. The earl of Buckingham and Essex advanced to the dignity of duke of Gloucester in the like manner. Upon request of the Commons, sir John Holland, the king's brother, created *earl of Huntingdon*, in full parliament, in tail male special. John, duke of Lancaster, created duke of Aquitaine for life, in full parliament, and did homage to the king as king of France. Edward, eldest son of the duke of York, created earl of Rutland, in full parliament, during the LIFE OF HIS FATHER, 1389. Sir Aubrey de Vere created earl of Oxford, to him and his heirs male, in full parliament, and did homage accordingly. 16 Rich. II. John de Beaufort created earl of Somerset, and his heirs male, in full parliament, and did homage, and was placed between the earl marshal and the earl of Warwick. 20 Rich. II. the earl of Derby created duke of Hereford, the earl of Rutland created duke of Albemarle, the earl of Kent created duke of Surrey, the earl of Huntingdon created duke of Exeter, the earl of Nottingham created duke of Norfolk in tail male, Margaret, countess of Norfolk for life, in her absence created duchess of Norfolk, and her patent of creation sent to her, all in full parliament. The earl of Somerset created marquess of Dorset, lord Le Despencer created earl of Gloucester, lord Neville created earl of Westmoreland, Thomas de Percy created earl of Worcester, William Le Scroop earl of Wiltshire, in tail male, and all in full parliament, 21 Rich. II.

Henry, eldest son of the king, created prince of Wales, duke of Cornwall, and earl of Chester, in full parliament, 1 Henry IV.; declaration that the king's eldest son, at the time of his birth, is by placing on his head a circle or coronet, and putting a gold ring on his finger, and placing in his hand a rod of gold, and after kissing his said eldest son, Henry, and giving him a charter, and being so invested was, by his uncle, the duke of York, conducted to his seat in parliament, appointed for the principality. *Cotton's Abr. Records.* 1 Hen. IV. p. 391. Duke of Cornwall, *Lords' Journals*, vol. 6, p. 9, confirmation in full parliament of the grant of the dignity of prince of Wales, and earl of Chester, to the king's eldest son; and also of his right to the title of duke of Cornwall from his birth, pursuant to stat. 11 Edw. III. and livery of the duchy to him accordingly.

DUKE, in Latin *Dux*, à *ducendo*, signifying the leader of an army, noblemen being anciently either generals and commanders of armies in time of war, or wardens of marches, and governors of provinces in peace. This is now the first rank of the nobility; but it was the 18th of Edward III. 1336, before this

dignity was introduced into England, when his eldest son, *Edward*, commonly called the Black Prince, was created duke of Cornwall. The only ceremony at this investiture was girding him with the sword. When *John of Gaunt*, son of king Edward III. was created duke of Lancaster by the same monarch, he had investiture, not only by the king's girding him with a sword, but by putting on him a cap of fur, under a coronet of gold set with precious stones. In the 21st of king Richard II. 1397, the duke of Hereford and several others were created by putting a cap of honour on their heads, and by delivering a rod into their hands; then the surcoat, mantle, hood, and patent were introduced with much ceremony; all of which are at this day omitted. The mantle and surcoat which a duke wears at the coronation of a king or queen is of crimson velvet, lined with white taffeta, and a mantle is doubled from the neck to the elbow with ermine, having four rows of spots on each shoulder; his parliamentary robes are of fine scarlet cloth, lined with taffeta, and doubled with four guards of ermine at equal distances, with gold lace above each guard, and is tied up to the left shoulder by a white riband; his cap is of crimson velvet, lined with ermine, having a gold tassel on the top; and his coronet, which is also of gold, is set round with golden strawberry leaves. He is styled *His Grace*; and by the king or queen in public instruments, *Our right trusty and right entirely beloved Cousin*; and if of the privy council, then with the addition of *Counsellor*. His general style is *the Most Noble*: all his sons are by courtesy styled *Lords*, and his daughters, *Ladies*.

MARQUESS (*Marchio*) was first styled so from the government of marches or frontier provinces; by the Saxons, *Markin Reeve*; and by the Germans, *Markgrave*. This title, which has the next place of honour to that of a duke, was introduced several years subsequent to the establishment of that dignity in England; and the first on whom that honour was conferred was the great favourite of king Richard II. *Robert de Vere, Earl of Oxford*, who was created marquess of Dublin, and by him placed in parliament between the dukes and earls. The creation to this dignity was with nearly the same ceremony as that of a duke; but they are now created by patent under the great seal, without any additional ceremony. His coronation robes are of crimson velvet lined with taffeta, and have four guards of ermine on the right side, and three on the left, set at equal distances, with gold lace above each guard, and tied up to the left shoulder by a white riband; his cap is of crimson velvet, lined with ermine, having a gold tassel at top; his coronet is of gold, and has pearls and golden strawberry leaves mixed alternately round, of nearly equal height. His general style is *Most Honourable*; and he is styled by the king or queen, *Our right trusty and entirely beloved Cousin*. His sons, by courtesy, are styled *Lords*, and his daughters, *Ladies*.

EARL, anciently called *Comes*, being in the habit *comitari regem*, to wait on the king for counsel and advice. The Germans call them

Graves, as *Landgrave*, *Margrave*, *Palgrave*, and *Rheingrave*. This honour, which was derived from the Saxon, was of great dignity and power, and for many ages continued the highest rank in England, till king Edw. III. created dukes and marquesses, both of whom had precedence assigned above earls. They had anciently, for the support of their state, the third penny out the sheriff's court, issuing out of the pleas of the shire from whence they assumed their title; as in ancient times, there was no count or earl but had a county or shire for his earldom; subsequently the number of earls increasing, they have frequently taken their titles from some eminent town or village, or even from their own seat or park, and some from illustrious families, as *Poulet*, *Chalmondeley*, *Ferrers*, *Waldegrave*, *Stanhope*, *Ashburnham*, &c.; nor were titles confined to England alone, as some were taken from the kingdom of France, as *Albemarle* and *Tanker-ville*. Upon the increase of earls their revenues ceased, and their powers were much abridged, and it became the custom of the monarchs of England to assign some stated pension to the person whom he ennobled, for the better support of his dignity, and it was commonly done in the following proportion: *viscounts*, a fee of 20 marks; *earls*, of 20l.; *marquesses*, 40 marks; and *dukes*, of 40l. out of some particular part of the royal revenue. A creation fee to barons was not settled; but Charles I. when he created *Mountjoy Blount*, lord *Mountjoy*, of Thurodston, co. Derby, assigned to him and his issue male a creation fee of 20 marks *per annum*. Anciently an earl was created with nearly the same ceremony as a duke or marquess, but they now receive merely letters patent. His coronation robe is the same as a duke's or marquess's, except that he has only three guards of ermine and gold lace; his cap is the same as theirs. It is uncertain when the coronets of dukes, marquesses, and earls, were settled. Sir Robert Cecil, earl of Salisbury, viscount Cranbourne, was the first of that degree who wore a coronet. An earl's coronet has pearls raised upon points, and strawberry leaves low between them. His style is *Right Honourable*, and he is addressed by the king or queen, *Our right trusty and right well beloved Cousin*. His sons, by courtesy, are styled *Honourable*, and his daughters, *Ladies*.

VISCOUNT (Vicecomes) was anciently the name of him who held the chief office under an earl, who, being oftentimes at court, was his deputy to look after the affairs of the country; but in the reign of Henry VI. 1439, it became a degree of honour, and was made hereditary. The first viscount in England, created by patent, was *John, lord Beaumont*, who was by the above monarch created viscount Beaumont, and he gave him precedence above all barons. His coronation robes are the same as an earl's, with the exception that he has only two rows of plain white fur on his parliamentary robes; his cap is the same, and the golden circle of his coronet is surmounted by fourteen pearls. His style is *Right Honourable*, and he is addressed by the king or queen, *Our right trusty and well beloved Cousin*. His sons and daughters,

by courtesy, are styled *Honourable*.

BISHOPS. The precedence of bishops was settled by stat. 31 Henry VIII. 1539, chap. x. to be next to the viscounts. They have the style of *Lords*, and *Right Reverend Fathers in God*. Previous to the Saxons coming into England, there were in that kindom three archbishoprics, viz. *London*, *York*, and *Cærlæon-upon-Usk*, each of which had many suffragans; but soon after St. Augustine's arrival in England, he, from the great kindness he received from the king of Kent, settled the metropolitan see at *Canterbury*, where it has continued to the present time. *York* continued archiepiscopal, but *London* and *Cærlæon* lost that dignity. The latter was situated too near the Saxons to be much at ease; so that one of its bishops removed the see to St. David's, in South Wales. The archbishop of *Canterbury* is the first peer in Great Britain next to the blood royal; the lord high chancellor is the next; and the archbishop of *York* is the third; they take precedence of all dukes, and have the title of *Your Grace* given them. The archbishop of *Canterbury* styles himself, *By Divine Providence*; but the archbishop of *York*, and the other bishops, *By Divine Permission*. The bishops of *London*, *Durham*, and *Worcester*, have precedence of all the other bishops; the others ranking according to the seniority of their consecration.

BARON. This dignity is either by writ or patent: in the former case descendible to heirs general; in the latter, according to the limitations of the patent. It is extremely ancient; and its original name in England was *Vavasour*, which by the Saxons was changed into *Thane*, and by the Normans into *Baron*. Many of this rank are named in the history of England, and undoubtedly had assisted, or been summoned to parliament; but from the deficiency of public records, it has so happened that the first precept to be found bears no higher date than the 49th Henry III. 1264, which, although it was issued out in the king's name, yet was neither by his authority nor by his direction; for not only the king himself, but his son, prince Edward, and most of the nobility who continued loyal to the monarch, were then prisoners in the hands of the rebellious barons; having been so made in the month of May preceding, at the battle of *Leves*, and so continued until the memorable battle of *Evesham*, which took place in August, in the subsequent year, when by the fortunate escape of prince Edward, he rescued the king and his adherents out of the hands of *Simon Montfort*, earl of *Leicester*. It cannot be doubted but that several parliaments were held by king Henry III. and by king Edward I.; yet no record has been handed down to us by which we are enabled to ascertain this circumstance, (except the 5th Edward I. 1276,) until the 22d year of this last-mentioned sovereign, anno 1293. Some of the barons were summoned but once. When a baron is called up to the house of peers by writ of summons, the writ is in the king's name, and usually runs in these terms: "Whereas, by reason of certain arduous and urgent affairs concerning us, the state and defence of our kingdom of *Great Britain* and the church, we strictly en-

join you, under the faith and allegiance by which you are bound to us, that the weightiness of the said affairs, and eminent perils considered, (waiving all excuses,) you be at the said day and place personally present with us, and with the said prelates, great men, and peers, personally present at our parliament, Westminster, (or elsewhere,) with us, and the prelates, nobles, and peers of our kingdom, to treat of the said affairs, and to give your advice; and this you may in no wise omit, as you tender us and our honour, and the safety and defence of our said kingdom and church, and the despatch of the said affairs." The ceremony of the admission of a baron, as well of all other orders of the temporal peerage, into the house of peers, is thus: He is brought into the house between two peers of his own rank, who conduct him up to the lord chancellor; his patent and writ of summons being carried by Garter king of arms, who presents it to the lord chancellor, who directs the same to be read; which being done, the oaths are administered, and the peer takes his seat, from which he again rises and returns to the chancellor, who congratulates him on becoming a member of the house of peers, or on his elevation, as the case may be. The first who was advanced to the

dignity of baron, by patent, was *John de Beauchamp, of Holt Castle*, created baron of Kidderminster, co. Worcester, to him and the heirs male of his body, by Richard II. 1387. He invested him with a mantle and cap. The robes of a baron have but two guards of white fur, with as many rows of gold lace; in other respects they are the same with those of other peers. King Charles II. granted a coronet to the barons, who till his reign wore only a plain circle of gold; it has now four pearls set at equal distances on the circle. His style is *Right Honourable*, and he is styled by the king or queen, *Right trusty and well beloved*. His sons and daughters, by courtesy, are styled *Honourable*.

SCOTS AND IRISH PEERS,

Scots Peers take precedence of British Peers of the same rank, created since the Union with Scotland; and *Irish Peers* created before the Union with Ireland, in like manner, take place of British Peers created since. Irish Peers of later creation than the Union, rank, according to the dates of their patent, among the Peers of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

THE PRIVILEGES OF THE PEERS OF THE UNITED KINGDOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

The nobility of England enjoy many great privileges, the principal of which are as follow:—

1. That they are free from all arrest for debts, as being the king's hereditary counsellors. Therefore a peer cannot be outlawed in any civil action, and no attachment lies against his person. This privilege extended also to their domestic servants, as well as to those of members of the lower house, till the year 1770, when their lordships joined the house of commons in a bill for abolishing it. For the same reason they are free from attending courts *leet*, or *sheriff's turns*; or, in cases of riot, attending the *posse comitatus*.
2. In criminal causes they are only tried by their peers, who give their verdict, not upon oath as other juries, but only upon their *honour*: and then a court is fitted up for the purpose in the middle of Westminster Hall, at the king's charge.

3. To secure the *honour* of, and prevent the spreading of any *scandal* upon peers, or any great officers of the realm, by reports, there is an express law, called *scandalum magnatum*, by which any man convicted of making a scandalous report against a peer of the realm (though true) is condemned to an *arbitrary fine*, and to remain in custody till the same be paid.

4. Upon any great trial in a court of justice, a peer may come into the court, and sit there uncovered.

No peer can be covered in the royal presence without permission for that purpose, except lord Kingsale. (*See DE COURCY, BARON KINGSALE.*) In case of the *poll-tax*, the peers bear the greater share of the burden, they being taxed every one according to his degree. Each peer can qualify a certain number of chaplains, as under.

By the 23d article of the Union of Scotland, which was confirmed by stat. 5th Anne, cap. 8, all Peers of Scotland shall be Peers of Great Britain, and have rank next after the Peers of the like degree in England at the time of the Union, which commenced the 1st of May 1707, and before all Peers of Great Britain of the same degree created after the Union. By the act for the Union of Ireland, 39 and 40 Geo. III. cap. 67, it is enacted, "The Lords of Parliament on the part of Ireland shall have the same privileges as the Lords on the part of Great Britain; and all the Lords Spiritual of Ireland shall have rank next after the Lords Spiritual of the same rank of Great Britain, and shall enjoy the same privileges, (except those depending upon sitting in the House of Lords;) and the Temporal Peers of Ireland shall have rank next after the Peers of the like rank in Great Britain at the time of the Union; and all Peerages of Ireland

A TABLE,

SHOWING the contemporary Kings of England, Scotland, and France, from the Conquest to the present time, together with the Year of our Lord corresponding with the Year of the Reign of the respective Sovereigns.

N.B.—At the accession of William the Conqueror to the Throne of England, Malcolm Canmore was king of Scotland, and in the 10th Year of his Reign; and Philip I. King of France, in the 7th Year of his Reign. The name of each succeeding sovereign is placed under the last year of the reign of his predecessor, together with the precise day (where that is ascertainable) of his accession. The next figure in the years of reigns is 2, showing that the new sovereign entered the 2d year of his reign on the day of the month in that year corresponding with the day of his accession in the preceding. Thus, William Rufus, 9 Sept. stands under the 22d year of King William the Conqueror, A.D. 1087, showing that he succeeded to the Crown on that day, and the figure 2 under his name, and against A.D. 1088, shows that he completed the 1st and entered the 2d year of his reign on the 9th Sept. in that year.

MARRIAGES AND ISSUE OF THE KINGS OF ENGLAND
FROM THE CONQUEST.

WILLIAM I. "The CONQUEROR," born at Falaise, in Normandy, 1025, crowned 25 Dec. 1066, married Maud, da. of Baldwin, 5th count of Flanders, and by her (who d. 2 Nov. 1083) had issue,

1. ROBERT, who succeeded his father in the duchy of Normandy, and d. 1134.

2. RICHARD, duke of Bernay, d. young.

3. King WILLIAM II.

4. King HENRY I.

5. CECILY, abbess of Caen, in Normandy, d. 1126.

6. CONSTANCE, m. Alan Fergaunt, or the Red, count of Brittany, and earl of Richmond in England, but d. s. p.

7. ADELIZA, d. young.

8. ADELA, or ALICE, m. Stephen, count of Blois, by whom she was mother of king STEPHEN, and other children.

9. GUNDRED, m. William de Warren, earl Warren and Surrey.

10. AGATHA, affianced to Alphonzo, king of Galicia, but d. unm.

King William d. 19 Sept. 1087, and was succeeded by his second surviving son,

WILLIAM II. surnamed "RUFUS," crowned at Westminster 26 Sept. 1087, accidentally slain while hunting in the New Forest, 2 Aug. 1100, unmarried, and was buried at Winchester. He was succeeded by his brother,

HENRY I. surnamed "BEAUCLEERK," born at Selby, in Yorkshire, 1070, crowned at Westminster 6 Aug. 1100, married, 11 Nov. 1100, Maud, da. of Malcolm Canmore, king of Scotland, by Margaret, da. of Edward the Exile, (son of Edmund Ironsides,) and heiress, on the death of her brother, Edgar Atheling, of the Saxon kings of England; by her (who d. 1 May 1118, and was buried at Westminster) he had issue,

1. WILLIAM, duke of Normandy, &c. b. 1102, m. June 1119, Matilda, da. of Fulk, count of Anjou, but was drowned in the great storm, 26 Nov. following, without issue.

2. MAUD, b. 1114, (called by historians the "EMPRESS," from her first marriage with Henry IV. emperor of Germany). After the death of her father, she contested the crown of England with his successor, king Stephen; m. 2dly, Geoffrey Plantagenet, count of Anjou, and had issue by him, (who d. Sept. 1150),

1. King HENRY II.

2. GEOFFREY, earl of Nantes, d. 1157, s. p.

3. WILLIAM, earl of Poitou, d. 1163, s. p. She d. 10 Sept. 1167.

King Henry I. m. 2dly, 2 Feb. 1121, Adeliza, da. of Godfrey, 1st duke of Brabant, by whom (who survived him, and m. 2dly, William de Albini, to whom she took the castle, honour, and earldom of Arundel as her dower) he had no issue. He d. in France 2 Dec. 1135, and was buried in Reading Abbey, Berks. He was succeeded by his nephew.

STEPHEN, son of Adela, countess of Blois, 4th da. of William the Conqueror, crowned 26 Dec. 1135; married Maud, da. of Eustace, count of Boulogne, by whom (who d. 3 May 1151, and was buried at Feversham, co. Kent) he had issue,

1. BALDWIN, d. young.

2. EUSTACE, earl of Boulogne, m. Constance, sister of Louis VII. of France, (who re-m. Raymond, earl of St. Giles,) but d. s. p. 1152, of grief occasioned by the composition made by his father with Henry, son of the empress Maud.

3. WILLIAM, earl of Mortaigne and Boulogne, m. Isabel, da. and h. of William, earl Warren and Surrey, and d. s. p. 1159.

4. MARY, d. young.

5. MARY, countess of Boulogne and Mortaigne, m. Matthew, younger son of Theodore, count of Flanders, and had issue.

King Stephen was compelled by the empress Maud to acknowledge her son as his successor in the crown of England. He d. 25 Oct. 1154, and was buried at Feversham, co. Kent, being succeeded on the throne, pursuant to the treaty, by his cousin,

HENRY II. born 1133, crowned 19 Dec. 1155, married, 1151, Eleanor, eldest da. and co-h. of William, 5th duke of Aquitaine, the divorced wife of Louis VII. of France, by whom (who d. 26 June 1202) he had issue,

1. WILLIAM, d. young.

4. GEOFFREY, earl of Brittany and Richmond, b. 23 Sept. 1158, m. Constance, da. and h. of Conan, (*le petit*), count of Brittany, and was accidentally killed in a tournament at Paris, 19 Aug. 1186, leaving issue by her, (who survived him, and m. 2dly, Ralph Blundeville, earl of Chester; and 3dly, Guy, viscount de Thouars, and d. 1201.)

1. Arthur, b. posthumous, 1186, who

contested the crown of England with his uncle, John, but *d.* in an attempt to escape from the castle of Rouen, *unm.*

2. ELEANOR, who also *d.* *unm.* 1241.

5. KING JOHN.

6. MAUD, *m.* Henry the Lyon, duke of Brunswick, ancestor of the present royal family of England.

7. ELEANOR, *m.* Alphonzo VIII. king of Castile.

8. JOAN, *m.* 1st, William II. king of Sicily; and 2dly, Raymond, count of Thoulouse.

King Henry II. *d.* 7 July 1189, and was buried at Fontevraud, in Anjou; he was succeeded by his eldest surviving son,

RICHARD I. surnamed "CŒUR DE LION," born Sept. 1157, married, 1190, Berengaria, da. of Sancho, 6th king of Navarre, by whom he had no issue; and being slain by an arrow at the siege of Chalus, in Limosin, 6 April 1199, was buried at Fontevraud, and the throne was usurped by his next surviving brother,

JOHN, surnamed "LACKLAND," born 1166, crowned 27 May 1199; contracted, 1173, to Alice, eldest da. and co-h. of Humbert, 3d earl of Mairienne, (now called Savoy, but her death prevented the completion of the marriage; married Isabel, 3d da. and co-h. of William, earl of Gloucester, (with whom he acquired that earldom,) but was afterwards divorced from her on the plea of consanguinity (her grandfather, Robert, consul or earl of Gloucester, having been a natural son of king Henry I.; and she re-m. Geoffrey Mandeville, earl of Essex); and he m. again, 1200, Isabel, da. of Aymer, count of Angoulême, by whom he had issue,

1. King HENRY III.

2. RICHARD, *b.* 1209, created earl of Cornwall, and elected, 1256, king of the Romans; *m.* 1st, 1230, Isabel, 3d da. of William Marshall, earl of Pembroke, and co-h. of her brothers, Walter, William, Richard, and Gilbert, successively earls of Pembroke, by whom he had issue, four sons and one da. who all *d.* young or *unm.* He *m.* 2dly, Sanchia, 3d da. and co-h. of Raymond Berenger, count of Provence, by whom (who *d.* 1261) he had two sons,

1. Edmond, earl of Cornwall, who succeeded his father, *m.* Margaret, da. of Richard de Clare, earl of Gloucester and Hertford, but *d.* without issue.

2. Richard, killed at the siege of Berwick, *unm.* 1296.

He *m.* 3dly, Beatrice, niece of the elector of Cologne, who survived him, but by whom he had no issue. Richard, king of the Romans, *d.* at Berkhamstead, 1271.

3. JOAN, *m.* 25 June 1221, Alexander II. king of Scotland, and *d. s. p.* 4 March 1238.

4. ELEANOR, *m.* 1st, William Marshall, the younger, earl of Pembroke; and 2dly, Simon Montfort, earl of Leicester.

5. ISABEL, *b.* 1214, *m.* 20 July 1235, Frederick II. emperor of Germany, and *d.* 1 Dec. 1241.

King John *d.* 19 Oct. 1216, and was buried in Worcester cathedral; he was succeeded by his son,

HENRY III. born 1 Oct. 1206, crowned 28 Oct. 1216, married, 14 Jan. 1236, Eleanor, 2d da. and co-h. of Raymond Berenger, count of Provence, and by her (who survived him, and *d.* a nun at Ambresbury, co. Wilts, 25 June 1291) had issue,

1. King EDWARD I.

2. EDMOND, (surnamed *Crouchback*, from his having taken the cross,) *b.* 16 Jan. 1243, earl of Lancaster, Leicester, and Derby, lord of Monmouth, and steward of England, *m.* 1st, 1269, Avelina, da. and h. of William de Fortibus, earl of Albemarle, by whom he had no issue; and 2dly, Blanche, da. of Robert, count of Artois, and widow of Henry, of Champagne, king of Navarre, and countess palatine of Champagne and Brie, by whom he had issue,

1. Thomas, who succeeded his father, *m.* Alice, da. and h. of Henry Lacy, earl of Lincoln, with whom he acquired that earldom, but was beheaded, 15 Edw. II. leaving no issue.

2. Henry, succeeded his brother, *m.* Maud, da. and h. of sir Patrick Chaworth, knt. and *d.* 1345, leaving issue, six das. and one son,

1. Blanche, *m.* Thomas, lord Wake, of Lydell, and *d. s. p.*

2. Maud, *m.* 1st, William de Burgh, earl of Ulster (by whom she had an only da. Elizabeth, *m.* Lionel, duke of Clarence, son of king Edward III.); and 2dly, Ralph, lord Stafford.

4. EDWARD, prince of Wales, (the first of the royal house of England who had that title,) afterwards king Edward II.

5. ELEANOR, m. 1294, Henry, earl of Barre, in France.

6. JOAN, (surnamed of *Acres*, from her birth in that city,) b. 1272, m. 1st, 1290, Gilbert de Clare, earl of Gloucester and Hertford; and 2dly, Ralph de Monthermer, and had issue by both.

7. MARGARET, b. 1275, m. 1290, John, 2d duke of Brabant.

8, 9. BEBENGER and ALICE, d. infants.

10. MARY, a nun.

11. ELIZABETH, b. 1284, m. 1st, 1298, John IV. count of Holland, by whom she had no issue; and 2dly, Humphry de Bohun, earl of Hereford and Essex, and constable of England, by whom she had issue.

12, 13. BEATRIX and BLANCH, d. infants. King Edward m. 2dly, 8 Sept. 1299, Margaret, eldest da. of Philip III. (the Bold,) king of France, by whom (who survived him and d. 1317, he had issue,

14. THOMAS, (of *Brotherton*), earl of Norfolk, and Marshal of England, b. 1 June 1300, m. Alice, da. of sir Roger Halye, knt. and d. 1338, having had issue, a son,

Edward, who d. in his father's lifetime without issue; and two das.

1. Margaret, created duchess of Norfolk, m. 1st, John, lord Segrave, by whom she had a da. and h.

Elizabeth, m. John, lord Mowbray, ancestor of the Mowbrays, dukes of Norfolk.

The duchess of Norfolk m. 2dly, sir Walter Manny, and had issue.

2. Alice, m. Edward de Montague, and had issue, an only child, Joan, m. to William de Ufford, earl of Suffolk, but d. s. p.

15. EDMOND, (of *Woodstock*), earl of Kent, b. 5 Aug. 1301, m. Margaret, da. of John, and sister and h. of Thomas, lord Wake. He was beheaded 1329, leaving issue, two sons,

Edmond and John, successively earls of Kent, who both d. without issue; and a da.

Joan, the fair maid of Kent, m. 1st, sir Thomas Holland, K.G. created earl of Kent; 2dly, William Montague, earl of Salisbury, from whom she was divorced; and 3dly, Edward, the Black Prince, by whom she was mother of king Richard II.

16. ELEANOR, d. an infant.

King Edward I. d. 7 July 1307, and was buried at Westminster, being succeeded by his son,

EDWARD II. (surnamed of *Caernarvon*), born 25 April 1284, crowned 28 Feb. 1307-8; married, 28 Jan. 1307-8, Isabel, da. of Philip the IV. (le Bel,) king of France, and had issue by her, (who d. 22 Aug. 1357.)

1. EDWARD, prince of Wales, afterwards king Edward III.

2. JOHN, (of *Eltham*), earl of Cornwall, d. unm. 1334.

3. JOAN, m. 1289, David Bruce, king of Scotland, and d. without issue 1357.

4. ELEANOR, m. 1332, Raynald, 2d earl of Gueldres, and had issue.

King Edward II. being deposed and murdered, 25 Jan. 1326-7, was buried at Gloucester, and succeeded by his son,

EDWARD III. (surnamed of *Windsor*), Founder of the Order of the Garter, born 13 Nov. 1312; crowned 1 Feb. 1327; married, 1327, Philippa, 3d da. of William, count of Hainault, by whom (who d. 15 Aug. 1369) he had issue,

1. EDWARD, prince of Wales, (surnamed the BLACK PRINCE,) b. 15 June 1330, m. 1361, Joan, countess of Kent, only da. of Edmond, of Woodstock, earl of Kent, his great-uncle, and widow of sir Thomas Holland, K.G.; and by this lady (who survived him, and d. 1386) he had two sons,

1. Edward, b. 1365, d. an infant.

2. RICHARD, afterwards king Richard II. Edward, prince of Wales, d. in his father's lifetime, 8 July 1376.

2. WILLIAM, (of *Hatfield*), b. 1336, d. an infant.

3. LIONEL, (of *Antwerp*), duke of Clarence, and earl of Ulster, b. 29 Nov. 1338; m. 1352, Elizabeth, da. and h. of William de Burgh, earl of Ulster, and by her (who d. 1363) he had issue, an only child,

Philippa, b. 13 Aug. 1355; m. 1368, Edmond Mortimer, earl of March, and had issue by him, three sons,

1. Roger, earl of March.

2. Sir Edmond, who settled in Scotland.

3. Sir John, who was hanged s. p. 1424; and two das.

1. Elizabeth, m. Henry, lord Percy, (surnamed *Hotspur*).

2. Philippa, m. 1st, John Hastings, earl of Pembroke; 2dly, Richard Fitz-Alan, earl of Arundel; and 3dly, sir John Poynings, lord St. John, but left no surviving issue by either husband.

Roger Mortimer, earl of March, eldest son of Philippa, m. Eleanor, eldest da. of Thomas Holland, earl of Kent, and was killed in Ireland 1398, leaving by her, (who re-m. Edward Charlton, lord Powis, and d. 1405,) three children, viz.

1. Edmond, earl of March, who, on the death of king Richard II. became, according to the laws of descent, rightful heir of the English crown, and was in consequence kept a close prisoner by king Henry IV. and d. in confinement at Trim Castle, in Ireland, without issue, 1424.

2. Anne, who became heiress of her house, and conveyed its claims on the crown to the house of York, by marriage with Richard, earl of Cambridge, as hereafter stated.

King HENRY IV.; and two daa.

1. Philippa, *m.* 1367, John 1st, king of Portugal, and *d.* 1415.

2. Elizabeth, *m.* 1st, John Holland, duke of Exeter; and 2dly, sir John Cornewall, K.G. created baron Fanhope.

The duke *m.* 2dly, 1372, Constance, eldest da. and co-h. of Peter, (the Cruel,) king of Castile and Leon, (who *d.* 1394,) and thereupon assumed the title of those kingdoms, but resigned his pretensions on the marriage of his only child,

Katherine, with Henry, prince of Asturias, afterwards king of Castile and Leon.

The duke *m.* 2dly, Catherine, da. of sir Payn Roet, knt. and widow of sir Hugh Swynford, knt. By this lady he had, before marriage, three sons and one da. who were afterwards, by act of parliament, 20 Richard II. rendered legitimate, with power to possess all dignities; but a reservation of the royal dignity was afterwards inserted by Henry IV. They were,

1. John, created marquis of Dorset and Somerset, *m.* Margaret, da. of Thomas Holland, earl of Kent, (who *re-m.* Thomas, duke of Clarence,) and had issue.

John, duke of Somerset, whose only da. and h.

Margaret, was mother to
King HENRY VII.

2. Henry, bishop of Winchester, cardinal of St. Eusebius.

3. Thomas, created duke of Exeter, *d.* *s. p.* 1424.

4. Joan, *m.* 1st, Robert Ferrers, son of lord Ferrers, of Wem; and 2dly, Ralph Nevill, 1st earl of Westmoreland.

John of *Genau* *d.* 1399.

5. EDMOND, (of *Langley*), duke of York and earl of Cambridge, *b.* 1341, *m.* 1st, 1372, Isabel, youngest of the two daa. and co-hh. of Peter, (the Cruel,) king of Castile and Leon; and 2dly, Joan, da. of Thomas, and sister and co-h. of Edmond Holland, earl of Kent. By his 2d wife (who survived him, and *m.* three other husbands, *vis.* 2. William, lord Willoughby, of Eresby; 3. Henry, lord Scrope; and 4. Henry Bromfete, lord Vesey) he had no issue; but by his 1st duchess, he had a da.

Constance, *m.* Thomas le Despencer, earl of Gloucester; and two sons,

1. Edward, duke of York and Albemarle, who was slain at the battle of Agincourt, 25 Oct. 1415, without issue.

2. Richard, (of *Coningsburgh*), earl of Cambridge, who *m.* to his 1st wife,

Anne Mortimer, great-grandchild, and eventually h. of the body of his uncle, Lionel, duke of Clarence, through which lady the house of York derived its claim to the crown of England, in preference to that of Lancaster, which, though descended in an unbroken male line from king Edward III. was derived from a younger son. The earl *m.* 2dly, Maud, da. of Thomas, lord Clifford, (who *re-m.* John, lord Latimer,) but by her had no issue; he was beheaded for a plot against the life of king Henry V. 1415, leaving issue by Anne Mortimer, a da.

Isabel, *m.* Henry Bouchier, earl of Essex; and an only son,

Richard, duke of York, sometime regent of France, and protector of England, *m.* Cecily, da. of Ralph Nevill, earl of Westmoreland, (by Joan Beaufort,) and was slain at Wakefield 1460, having had issue,

1. Henry, *d.* an infant.

2. EDWARD, afterwards king Edward IV.

3. Edmond, earl of Rutland, slain at Wakefield, aged only 12 years.

4. 5. William and John, *d.* infants.

6. George, duke of Clarence, murdered by order of his brother, king Edward IV. 1477; *m.* Isabel, da. of Richard Nevill, earl of Warwick, and had issue,

Edward, earl of Warwick and Salisbury, the last male of the house of York, beheaded 1499, *unm.*; and

Margaret, countess of Salisbury, *m.* sir Richard Pole, knt. and was beheaded 1541, leaving issue.

7. Thomas, *d.* an infant.

8. RICHARD, afterwards king Richard III.

9. Anne, *m.* 1st, Henry Holland, duke of Exeter; and 2dly, sir Thomas St. Leger, knt. by whom she left issue.

10. Elizabeth, *m.* John De-la-pole, duke of Suffolk.

11. Margaret, *m.* Charles the Bold, duke of Burgundy.

12. Ursula.

6. WILLIAM, (of *Windsor*), *d.* an infant.

7. THOMAS, (of *Woodstock*), duke of Gloucester, earl of Buckingham, Essex, and Northampton, and constable of England, *b.* 1355, *m.* Eleanor, eldest da. and co-h. of Humphry de Bohun, earl of Hereford, Essex, and Northampton, and constable of England, and was murdered at Calais 8 Sept. 1397, leaving issue by his said wife, who survived him, and *d.* 3 Oct. 1399, one son,

Humphry, *d.* *unm.* 1399; and four daa.

1. Anne, *m.* 1st, Thomas, earl Stafford; 2dly, Edmond, earl Stafford, brother of

Thomas; and 3dly, William Bourchier, earl of Eu, by the last two of whom she had issue.

2. Joan, m. Gilbert, lord Talbot, but d. without surviving issue.

3. Isabel, a nun.

4. Philippa, d. unm.

8. ISABEL, m. 1365, Ingleram de Coucy, created earl of Bedford, and had issue.

9. JOAN, contracted in marriage to Alphonso, king of Castile, but d. of the plague before the solemnization, 1348.

10. BLANCH, d. an infant.

11. MARY, m. John Montfort, (the Valiant,) duke of Brittany, and had issue.

12. MARGARET, m. John Hastings, earl of Pembroke, but d. s. p.

King Edward III. dying 21 June 1377, was buried at Westminster, and succeeded by his grandson,

RICHARD II. (surnamed of BOURDEAUX,) born 1366, crowned 16 July 1377, married 1st, 22 Jan. 1382, Anne, da. of the emperor Charles IV. of Germany. By this queen (who d. 1394) he had no issue. King Richard m. 2dly, 1396, Isabel, eldest da. of Charles VI. king of France, by whom also he had no issue.

King Richard surrendered his crown, 29 Sept. 1399, to his cousin, Henry of Bolingbroke, and is by some said to have been starved to death; by others, to have been basely murdered at Pomfret, 14 Feb. following; he was 1st interred at Langley, in Herts, but afterwards removed to Westminster.

HENRY IV. (surnamed BOLINGBROKE,) born about 1366, crowned 13 Oct. 1399, married, 1st, 1380, Mary, youngest da. and co-h. of Humphry de Bohun, earl of Hereford, Essex, and Northampton, and constable of England, and by her (who d. 1394) had issue,

1. HENRY, prince of Wales, afterwards king Henry V.

2. THOMAS, duke of Clarence, and earl of Albemarle, m. Margaret, 3d da. of Thomas, and sister and co-h. of Edmund Holland, earls of Kent, and widow of John Beaufort, earl of Somerset, but d. without issue, being slain at the battle of Baugy, in France, 1421.

3. JOHN, duke of Bedford, earl of Richmond and Kendal, and constable of England, also regent of France in the reign of his nephew, king Henry VI.; m. 1st, 1423, Anne, da. of John, duke of Burgundy. By this lady, who d. in childbed, 14 Nov. 1432, he had no surviving issue. He m. 2dly, Jaquetta, da. of Peter of Luxemburg, earl of St. Paul, by whom (who survived him, and was re-m. to sir Richard Widville, knt. afterwards earl Rivers, and d. 30 May 1472) he had also no issue. The duke d. at Paris 14 Sept. 1435.

4. HUMPHREY, duke of Gloucester and earl of Pembroke, and during part of the reign of his nephew, king Henry VI. regent of England, as his brother, the duke of Bedford, was of France; m. 1st, Jaqueline, countess of Holland, Zealand, and Hainault, da. and h. of William, duke of Bavaria, but from this lady he was divorced, and m. 2dly, Eleanor,

da. of Reginald, lord Cobham. He had no issue by either wife. The duke d. not without great suspicion of violence or poison, 1446.

5. BLANCH, m. 1st, Lewis Barbatos, duke of Bavaria; 2dly, the duke of Arragon; and 3dly, the duke of Barr.

6. PHILIPPA, m. Eric, king of Denmark, 1405.

King Henry IV. m. 2dly, 1403, Joan, da. of Charles, 2d king of Navarre, and widow of John de Montfort, (the Valiant,) duke of Brittany, but by her (who survived him, and d. 10 July 1427) he had no issue.

King Henry IV. dying 20 March 1412, was interred at Canterbury, and succeeded by his son,

HENRY V. (surnamed of MONMOUTH,) born 1388, crowned 9 April 1413, married, 3 June 1420, Katherine, youngest da. of Charles VI. king of France, by whom (who survived him, and d. 3 Jan. 1437, having re-m. sir Owen ap Meredith ap Tudor, by whom she was mother of Edmund Tudor, earl of Richmond, who, by Margaret, da. and h. of John Beaufort, duke of Somerset, grandson of John of Gaunt, was father of Henry, earl of Richmond, afterwards king Henry VII.) he had an only son,

HENRY, prince of Wales, afterwards king Henry VI.

King Henry V. d. in France, 31 Aug. 1422, and was interred at Westminster, being succeeded by his only son,

HENRY VI. (surnamed of WINDSOR,) born 1421, crowned 6 Nov. 1429, married, 22 April 1445, Margaret, da. of Bayard, duke of Anjou, (titular king of Jerusalem,) by whom (who survived him and d. 1482) he had an only child,

EDWARD, prince of Wales, b. 14 Oct. 1453, m. 1470, Anne Neville, 2d da. and co-h. of Richard, earl of Warwick, but was murdered at Tewkesbury the same year, by Richard, duke of Gloucester.

King Henry VI. was deposed by Edward, duke of York, 1461, and, ten years afterwards, murdered in the Tower, 21 May 1472, and interred in the chapel of Windsor.

EDWARD IV. born 29 April 1441, proclaimed king 3 March, and crowned 28 June 1461, married, 1 May 1464, Elizabeth, da. of sir Richard Widville, earl Rivers, (by Jaquetta, widow of John, duke of Bedford, son of king Henry IV.) and widow of sir John Grey, of Groby; by whom (who survived him and d. in the abbey of Bermondsey, about 1492) he had issue,

1. EDWARD, prince of Wales, afterwards Edward V.

2. RICHARD, duke of York, m. in his infancy, to Anne, h. of the house of Mowbray, only child of John Mowbray, duke of Norfolk, earl marshal of England, but was murdered along with his brother, king Edward V. 1483.

3. GEORGE, duke of Bedford, d. an infant.

4. ELIZABETH, b. 11 Feb. 1466, m. king Henry VII.

5. CICELY, m. 1st, John, viscount Wells, and 2dly, — Kyme, but d. without surviving issue by either.

6. ANNE, m. Thomas Howard, duke of Norfolk, earl marshal of England, but d. without surviving issue.

7. BRIDGET, a nun, d. 1517.

8. MARY, d. unm. 1482.

9. MARGARET, b. and d. 1472.

10. KATHERINE, m. William Courtenay, earl of Devon, and had issue.

King Edward IV. d. 9 April 1483, and was interred in the chapel at Windsor, being succeeded by his son,

EDWARD V. born 4 Nov. 1470, proclaimed king on his father's death in 1483, was never crowned; murdered in the Tower, 22 June in the same year. The exact place of burial of this prince and his brother remained unknown till 1674, when their bones were discovered and deposited in an urn in Westminster Abbey.

RICHARD III. ascended the throne 27 June, and crowned 7 July 1483, married Anne, 2d da. and co-h. of Richard Neville, earl of Warwick, and widow of Edward, prince of Wales, only son of king Henry VI. By this lady (who d. 1485) he had one son,

EDWARD, born 1473, created prince of Wales 24 Aug. 1483, but d. in his father's lifetime, 1484.

King Richard III. was slain at Bosworth, 22 Aug. 1485, and interred at Leicester, being succeeded by

HENRY VII. born 26 July 1455, crowned 30 Oct. 1485, married, 18 Jan. 1486, Elizabeth, eldest da. of king Edward IV. and h. of the house of York, by whom (who was crowned 25 Nov. 1487, and d. 11 Feb. 1502) he had issue,

PRINCE AUGUSTUS-FREDERICK, DUKE of SUSSEX, Earl of Inverness, and Baron Arklow, (so created 7 Nov. 1801,) Knight of the Orders of the Garter, Thistle, and First and Principal Knight Grand Cross of the Bath, and Acting Grand Master of the Order; G.C.H. D.C.L. and Captain General, and Colonel of the Honourable Artillery Company, Ranger of St. James's and Hyde Parks; born 27 Jan. 1773. H.R.H. married, at Rome, 4 April, and a second time at St. George's, Hanover Square, 5 Dec. 1793, lady Augusta Murray, da. of John, 5th earl of Dunmore, by whom he had issue, sir Augustus-Frederick D'Este, K.C.H. col. in the army, b. 13 Jan. 1794, and Augusta, b. 11 Aug. 1801. This marriage was declared null and void, being in violation of stat. 12 Geo. III. c. 11, which enacts that no descendant of the body of king George II. (other than the issue of princesses married into foreign countries) is capable of contracting matrimony without the previous consent of the king signified under the great seal; and any marriage contracted without such consent is void. All persons solemnizing, assisting, or being present at, any such prohibited marriage, incur the penalties of a *præmunire*; and the marriage was accordingly dissolved in August 1794.



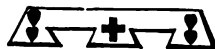

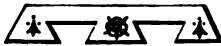

* * The Sovereign's sons, brothers, and uncles, are styled PRINCES OF THE BLOOD ROYAL, and have precedency of all other dukes, with the title of Royal Highness, which title was also, by special warrant, in 1816, conferred on the duke of Gloucester, *deceased*, and, 6 April 1818, on Prince Leopold of Saxe Cobourg (King of the Belgians).

Leicester, in England, Earl of Abercorn, Baron of Paisley, Abercorn, Hamilton, Mountcastle, and Kilpatrick, in Scotland; Viscount Strabane, Baron of Strabane, and Mountcastle, in Ireland; and a Bart. of Ireland; * born 21 Jan. 1811; succeeded his grandfather, John-James, 1st marquess, 27 Jan. 1818; married, 26 Oct. 1832, lady Louisa Russell, 2d da. of John, duke of Bedford, and has issue,—1. HARRIET, b. 6 July 1834;—2. BEATRICE, b. 21 July 1835;—3. a DA. b. 16 Aug. 1836;—4. a SON, viscount Hamilton, b. 24 Aug. 1838;—5. a DA. b. Jan. 1840.

ARMS—Quarterly: 1st and 4th, gules, three cinquefoils ermine, HAMILTON; 2d and 3d, argent, an ancient ship or lymphad, with one mast, the sail furled up and oars out sable, ARRAN. **CREST**—Out of a ducal coronet an oak tree proper, fructed or, and penetrated through the stem transversely by a frame-saw proper, the blade inscribed with the word "Through." **SUPPORTERS**—Two antelopes argent, horned, unguled, ducally gorged, and the chain reflexed over their backs or. **MOTTO**—"Sola nobilitas virtus." Virtue is the only nobility.

THE marquess is the chief representative in the male line of the illustrious house of Hamilton. His ancestors have frequently intermarried into the royal family of Scotland, and have been acknowledged by the parliament of that country as the presumptive heirs to the crown, in the person of James Hamilton, earl of Arran, who was chosen, in 1542, protector to queen Mary, during her minority, and declared second person of the realm; and, in failure of issue in the queen, her successor to the throne of Scotland.

JAMES, 3d lord Hamilton, was created earl of Arran in 1503, whose son, JAMES, 2d earl, presumptive heir to the crown of Scotland, was created duke of Chatelherault in 1549, by Henry II. of France. He left issue, four sons, viz.

1. James, 3d earl, d. s. p.
2. John, ancestor of the dukes of Hamilton (see that title).
3. CLAUDE, ancestor of the present marquess of Abercorn.
4. David, d. young.

* The marquess asserts his right to the French title of duke of Chatelherault, borne by the duke of Hamilton, upon the ground that, on failure of heirs male in the elder branch of the house of Hamilton, by the death of William, 2d duke of Hamilton, at the battle of Worcester, in 1651, the earls of Abercorn became the heirs male and representatives of the family, and that, by the law of France,

titles of honour were strictly descendible to heirs male to the exclusion of females; the claim to this dignity was accordingly brought forward by James, 6th earl, in 1712, at the peace of Utrecht, and it is inscribed on the monument erected in the family burying-ground at the abbey of Paisley, among the honours and titles of James, 8th earl of Abercorn.

LORD CLAUDE HAMILTON, 3d son of James, 2d earl of Arran, and duke of Chateherault, in France, was created baron of Paisley in 1535. He had issue, four sons, of whom, sir Frederick, the youngest, was father of Gustavus Hamilton, created viscount Boyne in 1617; and sir Claude, the 2d, was ancestor of sir John Hamilton, bart.

JAMES, the eldest son, was created baron of Abercorn in 1604, in his father's lifetime, and was advanced to the dignities of earl of Abercorn, baron of Hamilton, Mountcastle, and Kilpatrick, 10 July 1606. He m. Mariana, da. of Thomas, lord Boyd, and had issue,

1. JAMES, 2d earl of Abercorn, in Scotland, who was created a peer of Ireland in 1616, by the title of baron of Strabane, and was father of James, 3d earl of Abercorn.

2. CLAUDE, to whom his eldest brother made over the title of Strabane, with the permission of king Charles I. whose grandson, Claude, 5th baron of Strabane, in Ireland, succeeded as 4th earl of Abercorn, on the death of his cousin, George, 3d earl.

3. Sir WILLIAM HAMILTON, knt. d. without issue.

4. Sir GEORGE, ancestor of the marquess of Abercorn.

GEORGE HAMILTON, 4th and youngest son of James, 1st earl of Abercorn, was seated at Donalong, co. Tyrone, in Ireland. During the civil wars he was a captain of horse, colonel of foot, and governor of the castle of Nenah, in Tipperary, and was very active in the service of Charles I. and Charles II. In 1651, he retired to France with the exiled monarch, by whom he was created a bart. of Ireland, after the Restoration. He m. Mary, 3d da. of Thomas, viscount Thurles, son of Walter, 11th earl of Ormond, and sister of James, duke of Ormond, and had issue,

1. JAMES.

2. Sir GEORGE, created count Hamilton in France, and a mareschal du camp; m. Frances, eldest da. and co-h. of Richard Jennings, of Sandridge, co. Herts, esq. sister of Sarah, duchess of Marlborough, and had issue by her, (who m. 2dly, Richard Talbot, duke of Tyrconnel, and d. in Dublin 7th March 1730,)

3. ANTHONY, a lieut.-gen. in the French service.

6. JOHN, a colonel in king James's army, killed at the battle of Aghrim.

7. ELIZABETH, m. Philibert, count de Gramont, younger brother of Anthony, duke de Gramont, peer and mareschal of France.

8. LUCIA, m. sir Donough O'Brien, bart.

9. MARGARET, m. Matthew Ford, esq. of Coolgreeny, in Wexford.

JAMES, the eldest son, d. before his father, sir George; he was groom of the bedchamber to Charles II. and colonel in his army, and m. Elizabeth, eldest da. of John, lord Culpeper, of Throsway, and d. of a wound in 1673, received commanding a regiment of foot, on board the navy, with the duke of York in one of his sea expeditions against the Dutch. He had issue,

1. JAMES.

2. GEORGE, a colonel in the foot-guards, killed at the battle of Steinkirk in 1692.

3. WILLIAM, seated at Chilton Place, Kent, m. Margaret, 2d da. of sir Thomas Culpeper, of Hollingbourne, knt. and was ancestor of sir Charles and sir Edward Hamilton, created baronets 1776 and 1818.

JAMES, the eldest son, succeeded as bart. on the death of his grandfather, sir George, but declined to use the title; at the age of 17 he was groom of the bedchamber to Charles II. and afterwards a privy counsellor and colonel of a regiment of horse to James II.; but perceiving that prince's intention to introduce popery, he fought on the side of king William, and was particularly assisting at the celebrated siege of Londonderry. In 1700, he succeeded to the title of earl of Abercorn, (on the decease of CHARLES, 5th earl of Abercorn, and 6th lord Strabane, who was the grandson and last male descendant of Claude, lord Strabane, 2d son of James, 1st earl of Abercorn,) being the grandson and heir male of sir George Hamilton, bart. 4th son of the 1st earl of Abercorn. His lordship took his seat in the Scots parliament in 1706, as 6th earl of Abercorn, but generally resided in Ireland, of which realm he was a peer, as baron Strabane, and was called into the privy council, and created viscount Strabane and baron of Mountcastle, 2 Dec. 1701. The earl m. 1686, Elizabeth, da. and h. of sir Robert Reading, bart. of Dublin, (by Jane, widow of Charles, earl of Mountrath,) and had issue by her, (who d. 19 March 1754,) nine sons and five das. of whom four sons and one da. d. young; those who survived were,

N.B.—These supporters were granted to the present earl and his successors as viscounts Gordon in 1818. The ancient supporters of the earldom of Aberdeen were, *dexter*, a senator of the College of Justice, and *sinister*, a minister of state, in their robes of office. **MOTTO**—"Fortuna sequatur." Let fortune follow.

THE origin of the illustrious house of Gordon will be found under the title of duke of Gordon; but it may be here observed, that the principal line terminated early in an heiress who *m.* sir Alexander Seton, whose descendants assumed the maternal name; while the family represented by the earl of Aberdeen has continued uninterruptedly in a male line of descent. A current tradition is, that his lordship derives his descent from the Bertram de Gourdon who shot the fatal arrow at king Richard Cœur de Lion, and that the crest of the Aberdeen family, two arms, in the act of letting fly an arrow from a bow, and their motto, "fortuna sequatur," bear allusion to this event. Crawford, on the other hand, in his lives of the officers of state, derives the earl from a sir William Gordon, a younger brother of the principal house living in the reign of

king Edward I. of England. In consequence, however, of the imperfect state of the Scotch records, and the destruction of the family papers during the civil wars, the exact descent of the Aberdeen family cannot be clearly ascertained higher than

PATRICK GORDON, of Methlic, slain at the battle of Arbroath, 1445; eighth in lineal descent from whom was

Sir **WALTER OGILVY**, of Lintrathen, 7th in descent from Gilbert, d. 1440, leaving two sons, sir **JOHN**, ancestor of the earls of Airlie, and sir **Walter**, ancestor of the earls of Findlater and Seafield, and the lords Banff.

Sir **JAMES OGILVY**, son of the above-named sir John, was created, 28 April 1491, lord *Ogilvy*, of Airlie, and from him in a direct line of succession descended

JAMES, 7th lord Ogilvy, created, 2 April, 1639, earl of *Airlie*. JEFFREY, 1st lord Amherst, was commander-in-chief of the British forces in North America, where he distinguished himself by a series of gallant and important services, from 1758 to 1764; and from 1778 to 1795, commander-in-chief of the army, in which he attained the rank of field-marshal, was col. of the 2d regt. of life-guards, col.-in-chief of the 69th foot, and governor of Guernsey. In 1761 he was nominated a K.B. created, 20 May 1776, baron Amherst, of Holmesdale, co. Kent, to him and the heirs male of his body; and, 6 Sept. 1788, baron Amherst, of Montreal, co. Kent, with remainder, on failure of issue male of his body, to his nephew, WIL-

LIAM-PITT, 2d lord. His lordship *m.* 1st, Jane, only da. of Thomas Dalison, of Hampton, co. SIR WILLIAM PAGET, K.G. was summoned to the house of peers by the title of baron Paget, 3 Dec. 1549, 3d of Edward VI.; he *d.* 1563, and was succeeded by his eldest son, HENRY, 2d lord, who, dying *s. p.* 1568, was succeeded by his brother, THOMAS, 3d lord, who was father of WILLIAM, 4th lord, father of

WILLIAM, 5th lord, who *m.* Frances, *da.* of Henry Rich, lord Holland, and had issue, WILLIAM, 6th lord; and Henry, who settled in Ireland, where he *m.* and had issue, an only son, Thomas, whose only *da.* and *h.* Caroline *m.* sir Nicholas Bayly, bart. son and *h.* of sir Edward Bayly, who was created a bart. of Ireland, 4 July 1730; which sir Edward was son of Nicholas Bayly, who was distinguished for his loyalty during the civil wars and usurpation, and grandson of Lewis Bayly, bishop of Bangor, who was descended from an ancient family of that name, seated at Leamington, co. Lanark, in Scotland, came into England with James I. and was chaplain to Henry, prince of Wales, and preceptor to king Charles I.

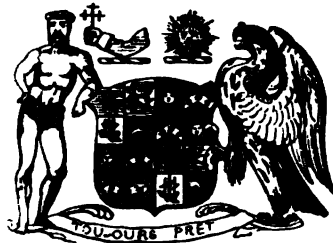

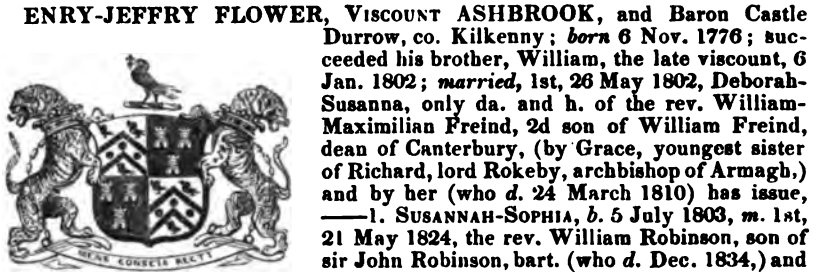

Worcester; succeeded his father, Walter, the late lord, 29 July 1805; *born* 15 Sept. 1769; *married*, 14 June 1802, Elizabeth, da. of Nathan Haines, D.D. by Susannah, his wife, sister of the late sir John Chudleigh, bart. (who d. 24 Aug. 1833, set. 67.)

This family is descended from *Ralph de Aston*, co. Stafford; to whose son, *Robert*, in the time of king *Henry III.* 1260, *Roger de Moreland*, bishop of *Lichfield* and *Coventry*, gave the keeping of the game in *Canckwood*, and a seat in the manor of *Haywood*, both in that county.

To the said *Robert*, whose wife was *Sibyl*, da. of *James de Landa*, succeeded *sir John*, their son, who, in the 7th of *Edward III.* was knight of the shire co. *Stafford*, as, in the 18th and 23d, was *Roger*, his son, who was father of *sir John*, and he of *sir Thomas*, the last of whom often served in parliament for that county, and in the 10th of *Henry IV.* was sheriff thereof; he m. *Elizabeth*, sister and h. to *Reginald de Leigh*, son of *Richard*, son of *Reginald*, lord of *Parkhall*, with whom he had a great estate. *Sir Roger*, their son, in the 12th of *Henry IV.* was one of the principal gentry returned by the commissioners for the county; and he marrying *Joice*, sister and co-heiress to *Baldwin de Freville*, whose ancestors had been barons of parliament, and were heirs general to the noble families of *Marmion* and *Montford* of *Beaudesert*, by her had *Roger*, his heir, who m. *Isabel*, da. of *sir William Brereton*, of the co. *Chester*, had a son, *John*, who, in the time of kings *Edward IV.* and *Richard III.* was sheriff of *Staffordshire*, and he marrying *Elizabeth*, da. of *John Delves*, of *Doddington*, esq. by her was father of *sir John Aston*, who, at the marriage of prince *Arthur*, eldest son of king *Henry VII.* was created *K.B.* In the 4th of *Henry VIII.* he went in the expedition into *Brittany*, and was present at the siege of *Terouaine* and *Tournay*, as also at the battle of *Spurs*, 1513, when, for his conduct and bravery, he was made a knight banneret in the open field; and marrying *Joan*, da. of *sir William Littleton*, by *Helen*, his wife, da. and co-h. to *Robert Welsh*, lord of *Wanlip*, co. *Leicester*, he, by that marriage, became possessed of the said manor of *Wanlip*, and the lordship of *Tixal*, co. *Stafford*, the latter being purchased by the *Littletons*. He had two sons, *sir Edward*, his heir, and *William*.

Sir Edward, who had been several times sheriff for his own county, d. in 1658, left by *Joan*, his wife, da. of *sir Thomas Bowles*, baron of the exchequer, *sir Walter*, his heir, and three das.: *Katharine*, m. 1st, *Stephen Stanley*, esq.; 2dly, *sir William Chetwynd*, of *Ingenetie*, co. *Stafford*; and 3dly, *sir Edward Cope*, of *Canon's Ashby*, co. *Northampton*: *Mary*, m. *Simon Harcourt*, of *Stanton Harcourt*, co. *Oxford*, ancestor to the earls of *Harcourt*; and *Frances*, m. *Robert Needham*, of *Shenton*, co. *Leicester*, ancestor to the earls of *Kilmorey*, in *Ireland*.

Sir Walter, who succeeded his father, d. 1589, left by *Elizabeth*, his wife, da. of *James Leveson*, besides other issue, *sir Edward*, his heir, father of the 1st lord; and *William*, of *Milwich*, co. *Stafford*, ancestor of the present lord.

Sir Edward was sheriff co. *Stafford*, an office which all his ancestors had served from the time of king *Edward III.*; m. 1st, *Mary*, da. of *sir John Spencer*, ancestor of the dukes

of *Marlborough*; 2dly, *Anne*, da. of *sir Thomas Lucy*, knt. by whom he had issue,

Sir Walter, 1st lord, who, at the coronation of king *James I.* of *England*, was made a *K.B.* and, 1611, created a *bart.* In 1622, being then in a public character at the court of *Madrid*, he was commissioned, with *John Digby*, earl of *Bristol*, to conclude a marriage treaty between *Charles*, prince of *Wales*, and the eldest da. of that crown; and though that marriage was defeated, the said *sir Walter*, after his return, was by *Charles I.* for his good services, created lord *Aston*, baron of *Forfar*, with remainder to his heirs male for ever, bearing the name and arms of *Aston*. He m. *Gertrude*, da. of *sir Ralph Sadler*, of *Standon*, co. *Hertford*; he d. 1639, and was succeeded by his eldest son,

Walter, 2d lord, distinguished by his loyalty during the civil war, m. *Mary*, da. of *Richard Weston*, earl of *Portland*, lord treasurer of *England*, by whom he had *Walter*, 3d lord, and several das. whereof *Frances* was 2d wife of *sir Edward Gage*, of *Hengrave*, co. *Suffolk*, *bart.*

Walter, 3d lord, d. Nov. 1714, and left issue by *Eleanor*, his wife, da. of *sir Walter Blount*, of *Soddington*, co. *Worcester*, *bart.* widow of *Robert Knightley*, of *Off-church*, co. *Warwick*, esq.

Walter, 4th lord, who m. *Mary Howard*, the only sister to *Thomas*, duke of *Norfolk*, and by her (who d. in 1723) had several children. His lordship d. 1746, and was succeeded by his son,

James, 5th lord, who m. *Barbara Talbot*, da. of *George*, 14th earl of *Shrewsbury*, and d. Aug. 1751, leaving only two das. *Mary*, m. *sir Walter Blount*; and *Barbara*, m. the hon. *Thomas Clifford*; the baronetcy became extinct, but the barony devolved, agreeably to the patent, upon the descendant of *William Aston*, of *Milwich*, uncle to the 1st lord. The said *William* m. *Elizabeth*, da. of *Waldive Willington*, of *Hurley*, and d. 1628, leaving a son, *Edward*, who, by *Dorothy*, da. of *Richard Eld*, of *Seighford*, had four sons, *Walter*, *William*, *Edward*, *Richard*; *Walter* m. *Mary*, da. of *John Chetwynd*, of *Rudge*, and d. 1691, leaving one da. m. *John Dive*, esq.; *William* and *Richard* d. without issue; *Edward* m. *Prudence King*, and d. 1705, leaving issue two sons, *Walter* and *Edward*. *Walter* m. *Penelope*, da. of *John Whitfield*, esq. and d. 1722, leaving two sons,

Philip and *Walter*, of whom,

GEORGE-GODART-HENRY-DE-REEDE GINKELL, EARL OF ATHLONE, Baron of Aghrim, co. Galway; Baron de Reede and Ginkell, Baron of Amerongen, Middachier, Livédale, Elst Stervelt, and Ronenberg, in the Netherlands; *born* 21 Nov. 1820; succeeded his father, Reinhart-Diederick-Jacob, late earl, 31 Oct. 1823.



Arms—Argent, two bars dancetté sable. *Crest*—A pair of wings expanded argent, each charged as the coat. *Supporters*—Two griffins, wings elevated, or. *Motto*—"Malo mori quam fugari." I had rather die than be disgraced.

The 1st earl of Athlone was **GODART DE GINKELL**, baron de Reede, lieutenant-general of the forces in Ireland under William III. who evinced signal courage and skill in the reduction of that kingdom to his majesty's obedience. He besieged and took Athlone, 30 June 1691, of which the celebrated col. Richard Grace was governor, and had successfully defended against the assault and blockade of the whole army of general Douglas the preceding year. On the 12th of July he also gained the decisive battle of Aghrim, over general St. Ruth. For these brilliant services he was most deservedly rewarded with the earldom of Athlone and barony of Aghrim. He likewise received the thanks of the British house of commons; and, in 1693, had the grant of the forfeited estates of William Dongan, earl of Limerick, amounting to 26,480 acres, confirmed in 1695; and, 1692, was created earl of *Athlone*, and baron of *Aghrim*. The grant of the lands being reversed by parliament, 15 Dec. 1695, and appropriated to the payment of the public debts, the family retired to Holland; and no earl of Athlone sat in the house of peers of Ireland until 10 March 1795. The 1st earl *m.* Ursula Philpota de Raasfeldt, and by her had issue,

Perth, Captain-General and Governor of the Isle of Man; born 26 June 1778; succeeded his father, John, late duke, 29 Sept. 1830.

The family of Murray derives its origin from JOHN DE MORAVIA, who was sheriff of Perthshire 1219, and d. 1225. His grandson, sir WILLIAM DE MORAVIA, was one of the *Magnates Scotiae* summoned to Berwick by king Edward I. 1292; and by marriage with Ada, da. of Malise, seneschal of Strathern, acquired the lands of Tullibardin, of which his descendants were denominated barons.

Sir JOHN MURRAY, of Tullibardin, was created lord Murray, of Tullibardin, 1604, and earl of Tullibardin, 1606. His son WILLIAM having m. Dorothea, da. and h. of John Stewart, earl of Atholl, surrendered the earldom of Tullibardin in favour of his brother Patrick, on the death of whose son James in 1670, it reverted again to the Atholl line.

In 1765, an act of parliament passed for purchasing the Isle of Man, by a contract between the lords of the treasury and the duke and duchess of Atholl, which island had been granted by king Henry IV. in 1406, to sir John de Stanley, knight, whose successors possessed the same till 1736, when it devolved on the duke of Atholl, being heir of the line.

His majesty and the parliament agreed to pay £70,000 for all their graces' interest and privileges in the island, reserving to them the landed property with all their rights in and over the soil, with courts baron, rents, services, and other incidents to such courts belonging, &c. together with the patronage of the bishopric, and other ecclesiastical benefices in the island, on payment of 10l. 15s. 11d. per annum, and rendering two falcons to the kings and queens of England, his majesty's successors, on the days of their respective coronations. The money was directed to be laid out and invested in the purchase of an inheritance in Scotland, and to be unalienably entailed on a certain series of heirs. On the death of the duke of Ancaster, her grace was one of the claimants of the hereditary office of great high chamberlain of England.

The family of Lindsay is of great antiquity in Scotland, where it has spread into numerous branches. The earldom of Crawford, the most ancient on the union roll, was conferred by king Robert III. on sir David Lindsay 21 April 1398.

Of this distinguished house the earl of Balcarres is undoubtedly the chief, being descended, in the male line, from *Walter Lindsay*, 3d son of Alexander, 2d earl of Crawford; and the whole male descendants of the two eldest sons of that earl having failed. *David*, 7th earl of Crawford, having been barbarously treated by his sons, disinherited them, and settled his title and estate on sir *David Lindsay*, of Edzell, great-grandson of *Walter* above mentioned, who consequently became the 8th earl of Crawford; but, notwithstanding he had several sons, and one of them ancestor of the earl of *Balcarres*, the generosity of his disposition induced him to make a settlement of the honours and estate on the rightful heir in blood, *David*, grandson of the 7th earl, reserving to himself, during his life only, the title of earl of Crawford, and a competent provision out of the estate, to support him according to his rank. He expressly conditioned, that, in failure of the heirs male of the body of *David*, above mentioned, who, in virtue of that settlement, became 9th earl of Crawford, the honours and estate should revert to the descendants of his own body, as next heirs male. *Ludovick*, 14th earl of Crawford, having engaged on the side of king Charles I. in the civil wars, was taken prisoner, and condemned to be executed, by the parliament of Scotland: by whom his title and estates were conveyed to John, earl of *Lindsay*, lord high treasurer

of Scotland, a remote branch of the family, which were descended from the principal stock, previous to their creation as earls of Crawford. The earl of Lindsay, being doubtful of the validity of this grant by parliament, entered into a contract with the earl of Crawford, then in prison, under sentence of death, to whom he gave assurances of saving him from the hands of the executioner. By this transaction, Crawford agreed to resign his title in favour of Lindsay, reserving that the resignation should not take effect in the event of his leaving issue male of his own body. On his death, without issue, the earl of Lindsay became, accordingly, 15th earl of Crawford; and thus the succession was conveyed away from the legitimate heirs male. The male line of his body failed in *George*, 20th earl of Crawford, who *d.* without issue in 1808.

Sir DAVID LINDSAY, of Balcarres, (grandson of John Lindsay, 2d son of David, 8th earl of Crawford, above named,) was served heir to John, his father, 19 May 1601: when king Charles I. visited Scotland, he was advanced to the dignity of the peerage by the title of lord *Lindsay*, of Balcarres, 27 June 1633; *m.* Sophia Seton, da. of Alexander, 1st earl of Dunfermline, lord chancellor of Scotland, and had issue,

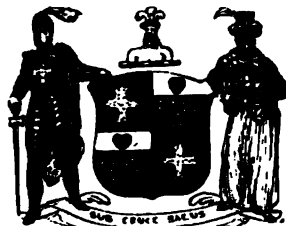

To this fleet, consisting of thirteen ships of the line, and several frigates, admiral Barrington had to oppose only four ships of the line, three of fifty guns, and three frigates, and yet the French commander, after being repulsed in two unsuccessful attacks, did not venture a third. He also distinguished himself at the relief of Gibraltar, being second in command under earl Howe. He *d.* unm. 16 Aug. 1800.

THE origin of this ancient family has been variously stated by different authors, some deriving it from the same stock as the Bassets of Drayton, Sapcote, Weldon, &c. (powerful barons in the midland counties, under the Norman and Angevin kings of England,) while sir William Pole, in his account of Devon, and others, trace its origin to an Osmond Basset, who was seated in Cornwall as early as temp. Henry I. The authority for the account hereafter given, is a MS. pedigree of all the

branches of the Basset family, in the handwriting of the celebrated Vincent; according to that pedigree,

RALPH BASSET, of Drayton, justiciar of England *temp.* Henry I. had four sons, 1. *Thurston*; 2. *Thomas*; 3. *Richard*, ancestor of the Bassets of Weldon and Drayton; and 4. *Nicholas*.

THOMAS BASSET, 2d son of Ralph, lived *temp.* John, m. Alicia, da. of Reginald de Dunstanville, and had issue, GILBERT, whom Vincent calls ancestor of the Bassets of Humbly, or Umberly, co. Devon, but whose descendants he does not trace; and *Thomas*, of Hendenon.

The question, however, is involved in much obscurity; and perhaps all that can be safely asserted is, that the Bassets of Cornwall, about the year 1150, acquired the estate of Tehidy, in that county, (still the residence of the family,) by marriage with an heiress of Dunstanville. By several subsequent marriages they acquired lands co. Devon; and about the year 1556, the family branched off, and the eldest son of JOHN BASSET, of Tehidy, by Jane, da. of Thomas Beaumont, of Devon, seated himself at Umberley and Heanton Court, co. Devon, which property he inherited through the Beaumonts, and in that residence the elder branch now continues. GEORGE, 2d son of John, became possessed of Tehidy, by gift of his nephew, sir Andrew Basset. James, the son of George, m. Jane, one of the das. of sir Francis Godolphin, of Godolphin. In the time of Charles I. there were three brothers, sir Francis, sir Thomas, and sir Arthur. Sir Francis, the eldest, m. Anne, da. of sir J. Trelawny, bart. and was sheriff of Cornwall during the greater part of the rebellion, in which he manifested the utmost zeal and activity in defence of his royal master. Sir Thomas, his brother, was a major-gen. in the king's service, and commanded a division of the royal army, at the battle of Stratton, when, with very superior numbers, the royalists defeated the rebels. Sir Arthur was also a major-gen. in the king's service, and governor of St. Michael's Mount, the property of his brother, Francis, and which was one of the last places that yielded to the parliament. After the battle of Stratton, it is well known that the Cornish royalists, under the command of the gallant sir Bevil Granvil, by repeated victories, supported the royal cause; till, at last, rather exhausted by conquest than beaten by the enemy, they were obliged to submit to the overwhelming torrent which destroyed both church and state. Sir Francis Basset

was with the king, at Lestwithiel, when Essex's army surrendered, after which event he says, in a letter to his wife, "the king told me, in the hearing of thousands, Mr. Sheriff, I now leave the county of Cornwall to your care and protection." Owing to his expenses in support of the royal cause, and his being obliged to compound for his estate with the parliament, he was under the necessity of selling St. Michael's Mount, and much other property. His descendants, therefore, were much distressed for many years after the rebellion. By the marriages, however, of the great-grandfather of the first peer with Miss Lucy Hele, and of his grandfather with Miss Mary Pendarves, both heiresses, a considerable acquisition of property came to the family, which was much improved by the skillful management and well-regulated economy of his father.

JOHN RUSSELL, earl of Bedford, was descended from a family of that name, which had been seated from the time of Henry III. at Kingston Russell, co. Bedford. Having visited, in his youth, most of the courts of Europe, he is said to have returned from his travels one of the most accomplished gentlemen and finest scholars of his time. In 1498, Philip, archduke of Austria, being compelled by stress of weather, when proceeding from the Netherlands to Spain, to take possession of the throne of Castille, to put into Weymouth, was so pleased with Mr. Russell, that he insisted on his accompanying him to Windsor, and introduced him to king Henry VII. into whose service he was soon after admitted, as a gentleman of the privy chamber. By king Henry VIII. he was appointed marshal of the Marshalsea, comptroller of the household, and a privy counsellor; created by patent, 9 March 1539, baron Russell, of Cheney, co. Bucks; appointed warden of the stannaries; K.G. 1540; admiral of England and Ireland; president of the western counties; lord privy seal; and, finally, one of the council to prince Edward, at whose coronation he officiated as lord high steward of England. He obtained also, on the dissolution of the greater monasteries in 1540, a grant to himself and Anne, his wife, and the heirs of their bodies, of the whole site of the rich abbey of Tavistock, and large domains thereunto belonging. On 19 Jan. 1550, 3 Edward VI. he was advanced to the dignity of earl of Bedford; and on the accession of queen Mary he was continued in his office of privy seal, and sent ambassador to Spain, to attend into England king Philip, whose grandfather had first introduced him to the English court. He m. Anne, da. and h. of Guy Sapcote, esq. and widow of sir John Broughton,

knt.; and dying 14 March 1558, was succeeded by his only son.

For these, and other gallant services, he was, 7 May 1697, created baron *Shingey*, co. Cambridge, viscount *Barfleur*, in the duchy of Normandy, and earl of *Orford*, co. Norfolk. His lordship was bred to the profession of arms, in which he has rendered the most signal services to his country. During the Peninsular war, marshal Beresford highly contributed to the brilliant victories obtained by the duke of Wellington, by his eminent conduct, as well in council as in the field. His judgment and unwearied perseverance in rendering the Portuguese troops fit for active service are the theme of every soldier; and the battle of Albuera, in which he had the chief command, and obtained a decisive victory over the enemy, will for ever immortalize

his name in our military annals; in 1810, he was elected knight of the shire for Waterford, which he continued to represent until 1814, when he was advanced to the peerage by the title of baron *Beresford*, of Albuera, in consideration of his eminent services; in the same year, an act of parliament was passed for granting an annuity of 2000*l.* to William, Lord Beresford, and the two next inheritors of the barony.

No writ has been issued to an earl of Berkeley since the death, in 1810, of Frederick-Augustus, 5th earl; the house of peers decided, 1 July 1811, that William-Fitzhardinge Berkeley, esq. who then claimed the title as eldest son and heir of the last earl, had not made good his claim.

THOMAS DE BERKELEY, lord of Berkeley Castle, co. Gloucester, 5th in descent from Harding, a Dane of royal blood, one of the companions of king William the Conqueror,

was summoned to parliament among the barons of the realm, in the reign of Edward I. He d. 1321, and was succeeded by his son, MAURICE, who was father of THOMAS, father of MAURICE, father of THOMAS, 5th lord, who m. Margaret, da. and h. of Warin, lord Lisle, and d. 1416, leaving an only da. and h. Elizabeth, m. to Richard Beauchamp, earl of Warwick; but the castle of Berkeley devolved, pursuant to an especial entail made by Thomas, 3d lord, in 25 Edward III. on his nephew and heir male,

JAMES, 6th lord, who was summoned to parliament 1421, m. Isabella, da. of Thomas Mowbray, duke of Norfolk, and had by her, besides other issue, WILLIAM, who, on the extinction of the male line of the Mowbrays, was created earl of Nottingham, anno 1 Richard III.; earl marshal of England, anno 1 Henry VII.; and anno 4 Henry VII. advanced to the dignity of marquess of Berkeley. He d. without issue 1492, having settled the castle of Berkeley, to the disinheritor of his nephew and heir, on king Henry VII. and his issue male.

Sir MAURICE BERKELEY, nephew and heir male of the marquess, was summoned to parliament, 14 Henry VIII. and ranked as junior baron: he d. s. p. 1523. His brother and heir, THOMAS, was summoned in the 21 Henry VIII.; and his nephew, THOMAS, in the 25 Henry VIII.; and the latter sat in the precedence of the ancient barony. On the death of king Edward VI. the issue male of Henry VII. being extinguished, the castle of Berkeley reverted to HENRY BERKELEY, son and heir of the last-named THOMAS, who became of age 1556, and was summoned to parliament the following year. IV. 1472. The family of Vansittart is of considerable antiquity in Germany, and the name, according to tradition, derived from the town of Sittart, in the duchy of Juliers. PETER VANSITTART (son of William-Johnson Vansittart, of Dantzick) settled in England about 1675, and became an eminent Russia merchant, m. Sir COLIN CAMPBELL, 1st of the house of Glenorchy, b. about 1400, was 3d son of Duncan, 1st lord Campbell, of Lochow, by Margery, da. of Robert, duke of Albany,

regent of Scotland; his father settled upon him the estate of Glenorchy, which had been conveyed to the Campbell family, temp. king David II. by the marriage of Margaret Gle-

norchy with John Campbell; he was one of the knights of Rhodes, now styled of Malta, and by his conduct and valour acquired distinguished honour; after the execrable murder of king James I. 1437, he exerted himself in pursuing the regicides, and was so diligent, that he soon apprehended and brought to justice two of the assassins, Chalmers and Colquhoun; in recompense for which service, king James III. afterwards bestowed on him the barony of Lawers; he had the care of the person and estate of his nephew, Colin, 1st earl of Argyll, during his minority, and faithfully discharged the trust reposed in him; concluding a match between the earl and the sister of his own wife, one of the three das. and co-hh. of lord Lorn. He had a charter to himself and Margaret Stirling, his wife, and their issue, of the lands of Acharavach, co. Perth, 27 Oct. 1467; he built the castle of Kilchurn, at the east end of Lochow, in Glenorchy, 1440; and was dead previous to 10 June 1478, on which day the lords auditors gave a decree, in a civil suit, against "Duncan Campbell, son and heir of umquhale sir Colin Campbell, of Glenurquha, knt." By his 3d wife, Margaret, 2d of the three das. and co-hh. of John, lord Lorn, (by whom he got a third of that lordship, which still remains in the family, and from thence quartered the galley of Lorn with his paternal achievement), he had issue, *Duncan*. The earl of Caithness reserved his life-rent of the title, and an annuity for life of 12,000 marks to him and his countess, and the survivor of them. The charter contained also a clause of redemption of the earldom within a limited period, and an obligation on sir John Campbell and his issue, to assume and use the name of Sinclair, and arms of the house of Caithness, when he should be possessed of the earldom irrevocably. George, earl of Caithness, dying at Thurso East, May 1676, sir John Campbell, who was then residing in family with them, being in possession of the earldom, obtained a patent, creating him earl of Caithness, dated at Whitehall 28 June 1677. Sir John Campbell did not, however, long retain the title of earl of Caithness, conferred upon him by the above patent, as the privy council, under the reference of the authority of parliament, found that George Sinclair, of Kess, the heir male of the last earl, had a right to the dignity of earl of Caithness, and he in consequence took place as such in parliament, 15 July 1681.

Sir John Campbell, thus deprived of that title, obtained a patent, 13 Aug. 1681, creating him earl of Breadalbane and Holland, viscount of Tay and Paintland, lord Glenorchy, Benedoraloch, Ormelie, and Weik, with the precedence of the former patent, 22 June 1677, remainder to whichever of his sons, by lady Mary Rich, his wife, he, by writing under his hand, at any time of his life, might think proper to designate, and the heirs male to be procreated of the body so designated; remainder to his issue male, remainder to his nearest legitimate heirs male, remainder to his nearest legitimate heirs whatsoever; m. 1st, 17 Dec. 1657, Mary Rich, 3d da. of Henry, 1st earl of Holland, baron Kensington, executed for his loyalty to

Charles I. 9 March 1649, opposite Westminster Hall, immediately after the duke of Hamilton: and by her had issue,

His lordship's great uncle, sir ALEXANDER HOOD, 1st viscount and baron Bridport, K.B. was younger brother of Samuel, 1st viscount Hood. He was bred from an early age to the naval profession, appointed post capt. 10 June 1756; displayed great courage while he commanded the *Minerva*, of 32 guns; promoted to a flag 1780; served as rear-admiral under lord Howe, at the relief of Gibraltar, 1782; invested with the military order of the bath 1788, advanced to the dignity of baron *Bridport*, of Cricket St. Thomas, in Ireland, 13 Aug. 1794, for his gallantry as second in command on the ever-memorable 1st of June 1794; in 1795 his lordship gained a signal victory over the French fleet. For these gallant services he was created a peer of Great Britain, 13 June 1796, by the title of baron *Bridport*, of Cricket St. Thomas, co. Somerset; and, 10 June 1801, advanced to the further dignity of viscount *Bridport*, being then admiral of the red, vice-admiral of Great Britain, and gen. of royal marines. It appears by Burn's History of Cumberland that the ancestors of lord Brougham and Vaux were seated at Burgham, or Brougham, in the county of Westmoreland, in the time of Edward the Confessor, and continued without interruption lords of the manor of Brougham, until the death of Thomas Brougham, without issue, in 1607. In the 16th century, Peter Brougham, uncle of the last mentioned Thomas, and second son of Thomas Brougham, of Brougham, by Jane, daughter and heir of John Vaux, removed into Cumberland, and settled at Scales Hall, in that county. Henry Brougham, of Scales Hall, great-grandson of Peter, entered his pedigree at the visitation of Westmoreland, by sir William Dugdale, in 1665. John Brougham, of Scales Hall, son of the last mentioned Henry, (by Elizabeth, his second wife, daughter and at length heir of John Lamplugh, of Lamplugh, sq.) came into possession of the ancient fa-

mily demesne of Brougham in the beginning of the last century, and his descendants have ever since resided there. This John, dying without issue in 1742, was succeeded in the family estate by his nephew, Henry-Richmond Brougham, son of his brother Peter, who d. s. p. 1749, when the estate devolved on his cousin, John Brougham, son of Samuel Brougham (son of Henry Brougham and Elizabeth Lamplugh, before mentioned) and Dorothy his wife, da. and h. of John Childe, and dying s. p. m. 1756, was succeeded by his brother,

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The family of Scott traces its descent from Richard le Scott, of Murdieston, co. Lanark, who was one of the Scotch barons that swore fealty to King Edward I. 1296. His descendants afterwards became lords of Brankholm and Buccleuch, but were not ennobled till 1606, when sir WALTER SCOTT was created lord Scott, of Buccleuch; his son Walter was further advanced, 1619, to the dignity of earl of Buccleuch, and dying 1633, was succeeded by his only son,

WALTER, 2d earl, who *d.* 1651, leaving

only two das. 1. MARY, who, on her father's death, became countess of Buccleuch; *m.* Walter Scott, of the house of Scott, of Harden, but *d.* 1661, without issue, whereupon the title devolved on her only sister,

THE north-eastern district of Aberdeenshire, known by the appellation of Buchan, has, for several centuries, given titles to one of the most ancient earldoms in Scotland. The first on record is Fergus, earl of Buchan, *temp.* William the Lion; his da. and h. carried the title into the family of Comyn. It was afterwards granted by king Robert II. to his 4th son, sir Alexander Stewart. Christiana, grandda. and h. of John Stewart, 3d earl of that family, *m.* Robert Douglas; and her grandda. THE name of *Sinclair*, which is originally from the family of Saint Clare, in France, has been very eminent in Scotland. Sir William *Sinclair*, in the reign of Alexander I. obtained several lands from that king, as the barony of Rosslyn, in Mid-Lothian.

William *Sinclair*, of Rosslyn, m. temp. David II. Isabel, da. and co-h. of Malisse, earl of Strathern, Caithness, and Orkney, and their son, Henry *Sinclair*, obtained the earldom of Orkney.

WILLIAM SINCLAIR, 3d earl of Orkney, lord high chancellor of Scotland, obtained from king James II. a grant of the earldom of Caithness, to himself and his heirs, 28 Aug. 1445, in consideration, as the charter states, of a claim of right which he and his heirs had to the lordship of Niddesdale. He was afterwards styled earl of *Orkney* and *Caithness*; but in 1471, having surrendered to James III. the earldom of *Orkney*, he relinquished that title, and was called earl of *Caithness*; he resigned the earldom of Caithness in favour of his son by his 2d wife, *William Sinclair*, passing by another *William Sinclair*, the issue of his first marriage.

WILLIAM, 2d earl of Caithness, in consequence of his father's resignation, obtained James III. a charter of the whole lands

of the earldom of Caithness. He was killed with his royal master, at the battle of Flodden, 9 Sept. 1513; and by Mary, da. of sir William Keith, of Innerugy, had

THE family of which lord Carbery is the head is of Welsh extraction, and was originally seated in Caermarthenshire, in the principality of Wales, from whence a branch of it removed in the reign of James I. to Ireland.

The origin of the name of Dalzell is thus stated by Nisbet, and other Scotch genealogists. A favourite and near kinsman of king Kenneth II. having been taken prisoner by the Picts, was slain, and exposed hanging on a gibbet. The king, exceedingly grieved at this indignity, offered a great reward to any one who would undertake to recover the body; but the danger of the attempt was so imminent, that for some time no one could be found to adventure it, till the ancestor of this family came forward, and said to the king, "*Dall Zell*," which, in the ancient Scottish language, signified, "I dare;" and, having successfully performed his undertaking, took Dalzell for his surname, and a naked body suspended on a gibbet for his armorial ensigns. In his remarks on the Ragman Roll, however, Nisbet says the surname is local, and derived from the lands of Dalzell, co. Lanark.

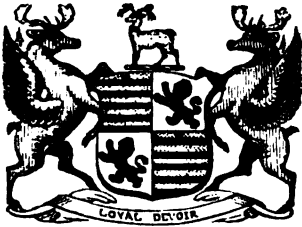

His great-grandfather was knighted at the battle of Blackheath 1497, and *d.* 1511, leaving issue, Anne, who *m.* the protector Somerset; and sir Michael, who was involved in that duke's misfortunes, and beheaded 1551. The family of *Fitzgibbon*, the chief of which was styled the White Knight, otherwise *Clan-gibbon*, is descended from the *Fitzgeralds*, barons *Offaley*, progenitors of the great houses of *Kildars* and *Desmond*; from the same origin are descended the *Knights of Glin*, and the *Valley*, and the *Knights of Kerry*, otherwise the *Black Knights*. These titles were conferred by the earl of *Desmond*, as a count palatine, on junior branches of the house of *Fitzgerald*; in the like manner as *Hugh Lupus*, the earl of *Chester*, created his inferior barons.

The elder branch of the *Fitzgibbons* terminated in an heiress, who carried the estate to the *Kingston* family; as thus described by *Smith*, in his *History of Cork*, vol. i., p. 45; viz. "The White Knight, otherwise styled *Clan-Gibbon*, was descended from *Gialebert*, or *Gilbert*, called by the Irish *Gibbon*, the eldest son, by a 2d wife, of *John Fitz-Gerald*, ancestor of the houses of *Kildare* and *Desmond*: they had large possessions in this territory, a part of which is now the estate of the right hon. the lord baron of *Kingston*, whose grandfather, sir *John King*, was, 4 Sept. 1660, so created by king *Charles II.* The 1st lord m. *Catharine*, da. of sir *William Fenton*, knt., and dame *Margaret Fitz-Gibbon*, his wife, sole heiress to the family of the *White Knights*."

THOMAS FITZGIBBON, of *Ballylander*, co. *Kerry*, esq., ancestor of the earls of *Clare*, representative of the collateral male line of the *White Knights*, assigned his estate to lord *Kingston*, for its better protection from the forfeitures then directed against the families of *Roman Catholics*; but his lordship and *Mr. Fitzgibbon* shortly after died, both leaving infant families; and as no legal re-assignment

of the estate was perfected, it was never recovered. His son, *JOHN Fitzgibbon*, M.D., was father of *THOMAS Fitzgibbon*, of *Ballyseeda*, co. *Limerick*, who left issue, four sons; viz.

one of the 16 Representative Peers for Scotland in the present parliament; succeeded his father, John, the late lord, 8 March 1811; *born* 15 March 1768; *married*, 14 Oct. 1790, Elizabeth, sister of sir Francis Ford, bart. and by her (who *d.* 19 Aug. 1839) had issue, an only da. AMELIA, who *d.* an infant.

The family of *Colville*, in North Britain, sprang from that of the *Colvilles* in England, who had accompanied William the Conqueror from Normandy. *Philip de Colville* settled in Scotland in the 12th century, and flourished in the reigns of Malcolm IV. and William the Lion; was one of the hostages for his sovereign's freedom, by a convention with Henry II. of England; he was ancestor of sir Robert Colville, who was master of the household to James IV. and fell with his royal master at the fatal battle of Floddenfield, anno 1513; he was succeeded by his son, sir James Colville, director of the chancery to James V. and one of the senators of the college of justice on its first institution; his son.

SIR JAMES COLVILLE, of East Wemyss, *m.* Margaret, da. of sir Robert Douglas, of Lochleven, (ancestor of the *earls of Morton*.) and by her had two sons, JAMES, 1st lord Colville, and Alexander, commendator of Culross, ancestor of the present lord.

JAMES, 1st lord, acquired great reputation as a military commander in the wars under Henry IV. of France; on his return, he was in great favour with his sovereign; he was created a baron, by the title of lord Colville, of Culross, 30 Jan. 1609, to him and the heirs male of his body, with remainder to his nearest lawful heirs male, hereditarily, bearing the name and arms of Colville; he *m.* Isabel, da. of Patrick, lord Ruthven, and had issue,

In 1722, however, John Colville, 6th in descent from Alexander, claimed the barony, and was declared, by a resolution of the house of lords, 27 May 1723, to have made good his claim, and his name directed to be added to the roll of peers, according to the date of the patent of 1609. His line of descent we now proceed to trace.

G.T.S. and K.S.F.; late Commander of the Forces in the Leeward Islands, Governor of Sheerness, General in the Army, and Colonel of the 1st Regiment of Life Guards; took the name of Stapleton, in addition to and before Cotton, 21 Nov. 1827; *married*, 1st, 1 Jan. 1801, Anna-Maria Pelham-Clinton, eldest da. of Thomas, 3d duke of Newcastle, and by her (who *d.* 31 May 1807) had issue.—1. ROBERT-HENRY-STAPLE-

TON, *b.* 19 Jan. 1802, *d.* 13 Feb. 1821;—2. and 3. Two sons, who *d.* infants. His lordship represented the borough of Newark in three successive parliaments. His lordship entered the army as a lieut. in the 23d, or Welsh fusiliers, 1791, when he was at Westminster school, and was soon after promoted into the dragoon guards, in which regiment he served in Flanders under the duke of York, 1793 and 1794; in 1794 he obtained the rank of major, and was shortly after appointed lieut.-col. 25th light dragoons (now 22d); he had the command of that regiment at the Cape of Good Hope, 1796, whence he proceeded with it to Madras, and served the whole of the year against Tippoo Saib; he distinguished himself particularly at the battle of Mallavilly, a few days previous to the arrival of the army before Seringapatam. His lordship returned to England, and commanded the 16th dragoons in Ireland three years; was then placed on the staff in England, and remained till Oct. 1808,

when he was sent with a brigade of cavalry to Portugal; was at the battle of Talavera, and in all the subsequent actions, to the end of the Peninsular war; he was commander-in-chief of the cavalry, and second in command to the duke of Wellington, at the battle of Salamanca; and received the order of the Bath for his distinguished services. He received the repeated unanimous thanks of both houses of parliament, in conjunction with the duke of Wellington, &c.; and on his return to England, after the battles of Talavera and Salamanca, was on both occasions thanked in his place in the house of commons. In 1813 he was appointed to the command of the 20th dragoons, and the same year he had the grand cross of the Tower and Sword bestowed upon him by the prince regent of Portugal, and the grand cross of the order of Ferdinand, &c. by the king of Spain. Upon the conclusion of the war, 1814, he was advanced to the dignity of the peerage for his brilliant services. In 1817, he was appointed governor of Barbadoes, and commander of the forces in the West Indies; and in 1825, commander-in-chief of the forces in Bengal, for his services in which command, and particularly the capture of Bhurtpore, he was elevated to the rank of viscount.

RICHARD COTTON, esq. m. 1st, Mary, da. of sir Arthur Mainwaring; 2dly, — Scilliard; and 3dly, the relict of John Dormer, esq. and had a numerous issue, of whom GEORGE COTTON, eldest son, m. Sir THOMAS, 2d bart. m. Philadelphia, da. and sole heiress of sir Thomas Lynch, of Esher, co. Surrey, governor of Jamaica, and left issue, seven sons and six das. of whom Philadelphia, m. Thomas Boycott, esq.; and the other das. *d. unm.*; of the sons, the eldest,

Sir ROBERT-SALISBURY, succeeded to the title, and was 3d bart.; represented the co. Chester in the 1st parliament of Geo. II.; m. Elizabeth Tollemache, eldest da. of Lionel, first earl of Dysart, and, dying without issue, was succeeded by his youngest brother and the 7th son,

Donegal and Londonderry, and a privy counsellor, created baron *Conyngham*, of Mount Charles, 3 Oct. 1753; viscount *Conyngham*, 20 July 1756; and advanced, 14 Jan. 1781, to the dignities of earl and baron *Conyngham*, with remainder of the barony, in default of issue male, to his nephew, Francis-Pierrepoint Burton, eldest son of Mary Conyngham. The earl m. Dec. 1774, Ellen, only da. and h. of Solomon Merrett, esq. and dying without issue, 3 April 1781, the earldom became extinct, but the barony devolved on his nephew, Francis-Pierrepoint Burton, 2d lord Conyngham.

The very ancient family of *Burton* was seated (as by some traditions) for many generations prior to 1460, at Richmond, co. York. Sir Edward Burton, for his services and unshaken loyalty to the house of York, had the honour of knight banneret conferred upon him by Edward IV. after the battle of St. Albans, 1460: he afterwards settled at Longnor, co. Salop; and his son, sir Robert Burton, knt. had the first grant of arms, 22 May 1478; he m. Christa Stapleton, da. of sir John Stapleton, knt. and relict of Robert Cressett, of Upton Cressett, co. Salop: his son, Edward, m. 1st, Joyce, da. of Henry Griffin; and 2dly, Jacosa Coyney, of Weston Coyney, co. Stafford, in 1524; his eldest son, John, m. Elizabeth, da. of Thomas Payne, of Bealow, co. Sussex, esq. d. 1543; his eldest son, Edward, m. Anne, da. and co-h. of Nicholas Maddocks, d. 1550; he narrowly escaped during the persecution of the Protestants, *temp.* queen Mary; dying of excessive joy at the death of the queen, and being refused interment in his parish church of St. Chad, Shrewsbury, was buried in the garden at Longnor, where the tomb still remains; his eldest son, Thomas, m. Catharine, da. and co-h. of William Biest, of Aitcham Grange, co. Salop, d. 1619; his eldest son, Edward, m. Elizabeth Newton, d. 1642. His descendants, in the elder branch, resided at Longnor until 1735, when it was carried into the family of Lingen, by an heir female; but their eldest son, Robert Lingen, took the name of Burton, (by act of parliament 1748,) pursuant to the will of his maternal great-uncle. The above named Thomas and Catharine had a 2d son, William, who by his wife, Susan Lee, was father of William Bur-

ton, author of "Comments on Antoninus," &c.; and the said Thomas and Catharine had also a 4th son, Francis, and a 5th son, Thomas; both of whom went into Ireland 1610; from this last *Thomas Burton*, the present marquess is lineally descended; he m. Anne, da. of Thomas Sheppard, of Balcot, co. Salop, esq. whose son, Samuel, m. Margery, da. of — Harres, esq. (from their 2d son, Benjamin, the Burtons of Dublin and Burton Hall, in Ireland, are descended); his eldest son, Francis, m. Alice, da. of Thomas Tilson, esq.; their son,

ROBERT DE CLIFFORD (son of Roger de Clifford, by Isabel, da. and co-h. of Robert de Vipont, a baron and hereditary sheriff of Westmoreland) was summoned to parliament 1299. His descendant, JOHN, 9th baron, *m.* Margaret, da. and h. of Henry Bromflete, lord Vescy, subsequent to which match, although Henry Bromflete was created baron Vescy, to him and the heirs male of his body, the Cliffords were frequently styled barons Vescy as well as Clifford. HENRY, 11th baron, was created earl of Cumberland 1525, and the barony remained merged in the earldom till 1605, when, on the death of GEORGE, 3d earl, without issue male, it was separated from the earldom of Cumberland, and descended to his da. and h. THIS noble family derives its descent from Pharamond, founder of the French monarchy, being descended from Louis VI. king of France, surnamed Le Gros, and is presumed to be of the blood royal. Reginald de Courtenay, in the reign of Henry II. m. Hawise, da. and sole h. of Robert de Abrincis, baron of Oakhampton, co. Devon. Robert, his son,

baron of Oakhampton, d. 1242; he m. Mary, youngest da. of William de Redvers, earl of Devon; his son, John, the 3d baron, d. 1273, and was succeeded by his son Hugh, 4th baron, who d. 1291, leaving Hugh, who became heir to Isabella de Fortibus, countess of Devon and Albemarle, was admitted earl of Devon, and d. 1349. This potent and illustrious family, of which, during the last century, two branches arrived at dukedoms, is descended, according to Dugdale, from "a younger branch of the Gernons, men of great note divers ages since in the counties of Norfolk and Essex." Roger de Gernon, in the reign of Edward II. having acquired, by marriage with the heiress of John Potton, the lands of Cavendish, in Suffolk, his descendants assumed the name of Cavendish.

Sir JOHN CAVENDISH, son and h. of the above-named Roger, was chief justice of the king's bench, and chancellor of the university of Cambridge, in the reign of Edward III. and Richard II. and murdered by the mob at Bury St. Edmunds 1381. From Roger Cavendish, sir John's next brother, descended a family of that name, seated at Grimston, in Suffolk; of which family was sir Thomas Cavendish, the celebrated navigator, the third person and second Englishman who achieved the circumnavigation of the globe.

Sir WILLIAM CAVENDISH, 5th in lineal descent from the chief justice, was gentleman usher to cardinal Wolsey, and auditor of the court of augmentations; treasurer of the chamber, and privy counsellor to Henry VIII. and Edward VI. He obtained large grants of abbey lands from the latter king, and d. 25 Oct. 1537, leaving issue by his 3d wife, Elizabeth, sister and h. of John Hardwick, of Hardwick, co. GERALD DILLON, of Drumrany, chief of the family of Dillon, towards the end of the 14th century, left two sons, the elder of whom, sir **MAURICE**, was ancestor of the viscounts Dillon, and the younger, sir **JAMES**, of the earls of Roscommon (*see that title*). Sixth in descent from sir Maurice was

Sir **THEOBALD**, of Costello-Gallen, co. There is a tradition in this noble family, present, in 1066, at the battle of Hastings, that sir ROBERT ST. LEGER, kn. who was supported the Conqueror with his hand, when

quitting the ship to land in Sussex. Sir Robert was of an ancient house of Normandy, and settled at Ulcombe, co. Kent, where his descendants were of great eminence, attended Richard I. to the siege of Acre in the Holy Land, (as appears from an inscription on the coffin of Ralph de St. Leger, in the church of Ulcombe,) and intermarried with the royal family in the person of sir Thomas St. Leger, kn. who m. Anne of York, duchess of Exeter, sister of King Edward IV. and eldest da. of Richard Plantagenet, duke of York.

SIR ANTHONY ST. LEGER, of Ulcombe, served under three successive princes as lord-lieutenant of Ireland, and was created by Henry VIII. K.G. for his eminent services during his government in Ireland, where his descendants settled. He left issue,

The family of Sackville derives its origin from Herbrand de Saccheville, who came into England with William the Conqueror, and had its principal seat at Buckhurst, co. Sussex. Sir Richard Sackville, chancellor of the court of augmentations, in the reign of Henry VIII. was father of

THOMAS SACKVILLE, lord Buckhurst, K.G. a celebrated statesman in the reigns of queen Elizabeth and king James. He was one of the commissioners for the trial of Mary, queen of Scots; lord high steward at that of the unfortunate earl of Essex; chancellor of the university of Oxford; and, in 1599, appointed lord high treasurer of England; created, 13 March 1603, earl of Dorset. The earl m. Cecily, da. of sir John Baker, knight, by

whom he had four sons and three da.; and dying 19 April 1608, was succeeded by his eldest son,

SIR PAINE DAWNAY, of Dawnay Castle, in Normandy, from whom this family is descended, came to England with William the Conqueror, and from him descended sir William Dawnay, who was made a general in the 4th year of Richard I. 1192, at Aoon, (now called St. Jean d'Acre,) in Syria, where, having killed a chief prince of the Saracens, and afterwards slaying a lion, he cut off a paw, and presented it to the king; who, as a mark of his approbation, immediately took the ring off his finger, and giving it to sir William, ordered, in *perpetuam rei memoriam*, that his crest should be a demi-Saracen, with a lion's paw in one hand, and a ring in the other, which is the family cognizance to this day; and the ring is still in the possession of viscount Downe. In a direct line from the above, descended sir **NICHOLAS DAWNAY**, who, in the reign of Edward II. obtained the king's charter for a market every week at his manor, and a fair every year at Sheviok, co. Cornwall. In the 1st of Edward III. he had a summons to parliament amongst the barons; and afterwards serving in the wars in the Holy Land, against the infidels, he brought from thence some rich and curious medals.

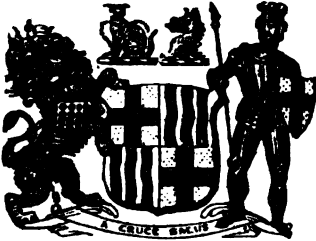

PIERCE, the said 5th lord Dunboyne, was likewise outlawed, and dying 3 May 1694, was succeeded by his only son, **JAMES**, who but for the outlawries would have been the 6th lord Dunboyne; he *d.* in 1701, leaving two sons, **PIERCE** and **EDMOND**, commonly called the 7th and 8th lords Dunboyne; the last-mentioned, **EDMOND**, *d.* in 1732, leaving four sons, *viz.* **JAMES**; **PIERCE**; **JOHN**; and **EDMOND**, who *d.* *s. p.* in 1783; of these **JAMES** succeeded, and was commonly called the 9th lord Dunboyne; and dying *s. p.* in 1768, was succeeded by his brother **PIERCE**, commonly called the 10th lord Dunboyne, who *d.* in 1786, leaving an only son, **PIERCE-EDMOND**, commonly called the 11th lord Dunboyne, who *d.* *unm.* and was succeeded by his uncle, the right rev. **JOHN BUTLER**, D.D. titular bishop of Cork, who was commonly called the 12th lord Dunboyne, and on his death without issue, 7 May 1800, all the male descendants of **JAMES**, the 2d lord Dunboyne, by his before-mentioned 1st wife, became extinct.

Clare, esq. who *d.* in 1784, leaving an only son, **James Butler**, who, on the decease, 7 May 1800, of the before-mentioned rev. **Dr. John Butler**, commonly called the 12th lord Dunboyne, became the eldest male descendant of sir **Edmond Butler**, the 1st lord Dunboyne, and as such petitioned his majesty for permission to prove his descent, that he might be enabled to reverse the outlawries before mentioned, as existing against **James** and **Pierce**, the 4th and 5th lords Dunboyne, which petition his majesty was graciously pleased to refer to the consideration of the law officers of the crown in Ireland; and the attorney-general, before whom the pedigree was investigated and proved, made his report on the said petition to his excellency the lord-lieutenant of Ireland; which, after detailing the evidences produced in support of the petitioner's claim, concludes as follows, "Upon the whole of this case I am humbly of opinion that the petitioner, **James Butler**, has sufficiently proved his right to the title of lord baron of Dunboyne, and that his majesty may, if he shall be graciously pleased so to do, authorize the attorney-general for Ireland to fiat writs of error for the examination of the records and process of the outlawries aforesaid, and to confess the errors therein; and to consent to the reversal thereof." Whereupon his majesty's warrant issued for the reversal of the outlawries, and they were reversed accordingly in due form of law, as before stated.

THE family of *Quin*, according to the ancient Irish genealogists, derive their surname from *Con Cead Caba*, or *Con* of the hundred battles, monarch of Ireland, in the 2d century; his grandson, *Cormac*, was the 1st who bore the name of *Quin*, i. e. the descendant of *Con*; he is said to have been monarch of Ireland in 254. At the first arrival of the English, temp. Henry II. the family of *Quin* certainly possessed large territories, over which they governed as hereditary chieftains; many places still retain their name, as *Inchiquin*, *Tyquin*, &c. though now conveyed to other proprietors. Camden mentions *O'Quin*, of *Dunderlug*, among the *Ulster* chieftains, temp. queen *Elizabeth*; he was the sister of the famous *O'Neil*.

The immediate descent of the earl is from the ancient branch of *Inchiquin*, co. *Clare*, where his ancestors possessed *Corofin*, *Inchiquin*, and *Glanquin*, with the castles of *Inchiquin*, *Stonehouse*, and *Ballaportrey*, and appear to have had great feudal power, for many centuries. The family documents detail a number of marriages with considerable families during this period, and describe their feuds and final expulsion from *Clare* by the more powerful sect of the *O'Briens*, and bring the pedigree down to

JOHN QUIN, bishop of *Limerick*, 1521, which see he resigned 1551, in consequence of his infirmities; his brother, *JAMES QUIN*, of *Kilmallock*, co. *Limerick*, (in which county their ancestor settled, on being deprived of his ancient patrimony in *Clare*), was father of *DONOUGH QUIN*, who m. *Judith*, da. and sole h. of *O'Riordan*, an Irish chieftain, d. 1671, and was interred in the abbey of *Adare*; he left issue,

The family of Plunkett is supposed (says Lodge) to be of Danish extraction; the time of its first settlement in Ireland cannot be decidedly ascertained, but it was certainly as early as the reign of Henry III. It has extended into many parts of the kingdom, (particularly the cos. of Meath, Dublin, and Louth,) and at this time three distinct peerages are enjoyed by different branches, viz. the earldom of Fingall, and the baronies of Dunsany and Louth.

JOHN PLUNKETT, the earliest of the name on record, appears to have been seated, towards the latter end of the 11th century, at Bewley, or Beaulieu, co. Louth, where he d. 1062. From him descended another

THE SURNAME OF LAMBTON is local, derived from the manor of Lambton, co. Durham, of which his lordship's ancestors have been possessed from time immemorial. Surtees, in his history of that county, says, "No earlier owners of Lambton are on record than the ancient and honourable family which still bears the local name. The regular pedigree can only be traced from the twelfth century, many of the family records having been destroyed in the civil wars; but the previous residence of the family is well proved by attestations of charters and incidental evidence, from a period very nearly approaching the Norman era." JOHN DE LAMBTON was witness to a charter of Uchtrede de Wodeshend, circ. 1180; JOHN DE LAMBTON, to a charter of Alexander, king of Scotland, of lands granted to William de Swynburne in 1260; and RICHARD DE LAMBTON, to charters of Finchale Abbey, circ. 1270.

ROBERT DE LAMBTON was lord of Lambton 1314, and d. 1350. From him lord Durham is 16th in lineal descent. Intermarriages with nearly all the great northern families have long ensured to his ancestors a leading influence in the county and city of Durham, one or other of which they have generally represented, from the earliest period at which the elective franchise was extended to those places.

JOHN SCOTT, 1st earl of Eldon, high steward of the university of Oxford, a governor of the Charter House, and a trustee of the British Museum, P.C. D.C.L. F.R.S. and F.S.A. was b. 4 June 1751, and after a grammatical education, received at Newcastle, was removed to University College, Oxford, of which he became a fellow, and took the degree of M.A.; admitted of the Middle Temple, 1772; called to the bar, 1776; elected M.P. for Weobly, 1783; appointed solicitor-general and knighted, 1788; attorney-general, 1793; lord chief justice of the common pleas, 1799, on which occasion he was elevated to the peerage, by the title of baron Eldon, 18 July 1799. In 1801 his lordship was appointed lord high chancellor of Great Britain, which he resigned 7 Feb. 1806, and, 1 April 1807, was re-appointed to that high office, and continued to hold it during the remainder of the reign of his majesty king George III. On the accession of king George IV. as the rules of proceeding in the case required, he resigned the great seal into the hands of his majesty

in council, and was immediately a third time appointed lord high chancellor of Great Britain, which high office he continued to hold till May 1827, a period longer than any of his predecessors. The 7 July 1821, his majesty was graciously pleased, as a further mark of his royal approbation, to advance his lordship to the dignity of viscount *Encombe*, in the co. of Dorset, and earl of *Eldon*, with the very special and high distinction (at that period) of the expression of his royal pleasure, that in the patent granting those titles, it should be recited, "That his Majesty has been graciously pleased to confer the same in consideration of his profound knowledge of the laws of his country, and the distinguished ability and integrity which he has invariably evinced in administering them in his said office of chancellor, during a period of nineteen years." Kinloss and Torry, P.C. and K.C.; a General in the Army; General of the Queen's Body Guard of Royal Archers, and one of the sixteen Representative Peers for Scotland; succeeded his brother, William-Robert, the late earl, 15 July 1771. The earl was appointed Envoy Extraordinary at Brussels, 18 Aug. 1792; Minister Plenipotentiary to the court of Berlin, 15 Aug. 1795; and, 13 April 1799, Ambassador Extraordinary to the Sublime Ottoman Porte, where he continued till the French were finally driven out of Egypt, and availed himself of the opportunities afforded by his diplomatic character

to make that splendid collection of Grecian Antiquities known by the name of the *Elgin Marbles*, now deposited in the British Museum; *born* 20 July 1766; *married*, 1st, 11 March 1799, Mary, only child of William-Hamilton Nisbet, of Dirleton and Belhaven, co. The earls of Elgin are certainly descended from the royal house of Bruce, although the precise line of that descent cannot now be distinctly traced; their undoubted ancestor, Robert Bruce, of Gersmanoyton, being described as "*dilectus consanguineus*," by king David II. 1359.

EDWARD BRUCE, of Blairhall, 6th in descent from Robert above named, left three sons,

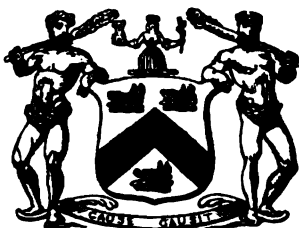

WILLIAM CECIL, the celebrated lord Burghley, treasurer to queen Elizabeth, and her principal minister for forty years, from her accession to his death in 1598, was the son of Robert Cecil, esq. groom of the robes to Henry VIII.; b. 13 Sept. 1521, created lord Burghley 25 Feb. 1571, and lord high treasurer and K.G. in 1572. He accumulated a great fortune by his judicious and provident management of his property, continually aiming to advance the resources of his country by his wise and provident administration. He d. 4 Aug. 1598, and was buried in the family vault, at Stamford Baron. He was

twice married, and left issue by his 1st wife, the da. of sir John Cheke, THOMAS, his successor; and by his 2d, the da. of sir Anthony Cooke, of Giddea Hall, co. Essex, knt. preceptor to king Edward VI. ROBERT, and two das.; these two sons were both created earls in one day, by James I. 4 May 1605: ROBERT, the youngest, being created earl of Salisbury in the morning, and THOMAS, earl of Exeter in the afternoon.

EDWARD PELLEW, 1st viscount Exmouth, entered early into the R.N. and, 1780, was made a lieutenant. In May, in the same year, he received his post-captain's commission; 18 June 1793, being on a cruise in the Nymph frigate of 36 guns, in company with the Venus frigate, admiral Faulkner, he fell in with the French national frigate, La Cleopatra, captain Jean Mullon, of 40 guns and 320 men, three days from St. Maloes, and had made no captures, when, after a severe action, which continued with unabated fury for more than 35 minutes, she surrendered to sir Edward, having lost her captain, three lieutenants, and 60 men killed and wounded. The gallantry displayed by captain Pellew in this action was not unrewarded; on the 29th of the same month, he was introduced to his majesty, and received the honour of knight-hood; 5 March 1796, his majesty was pleased to create him a bart. of Great Britain; and, 1 June 1814, he was advanced to the dignity of the peerage, by the title of baron Exmouth, of Canonteign, co. Devon; and, 10 Dec. 1816, he was, for his distinguished gallantry at the bombardment and total destruction of the fleet and arsenal at Algiers, further advanced to the dignity of viscount Exmouth; he was also G.C.B. and a Grand Cross of the foreign orders of Charles III. 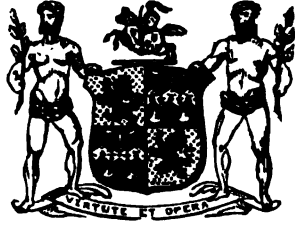

JAMES DUFF, EARL of FIFE, Viscount Macduff, Baron Braco, of Kilbride, co. Cavan, in the Peerage of Ireland, and Baron Fife in that of the United Kingdom; Lord-Lieutenant co. Banff, K.T. G.C.H.; Knight of the Spanish Order of San Fernando; succeeded his father, Alexander, the late earl, in the Irish titles, 17 April 1811; created Baron Fife, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom, 1827; married, 9 Sept. 1799, Mary-Caroline, 2d da. of Louisa, countess of Dysart, and sister to lord Huntingtower, of Buckminster Park, co. Leicester, and by her (who d. 20 Dec. 1805) had no issue. The earl is a Lieut.-col. of the



Inverness-shire Militia, and served as a Major-gen. in the army of the Spanish patriots. His lordship was wounded at the battle of Talavera, 1809, and again, severely, at the storming of Fort Matagorda, near Cadiz, in which he volunteered his services, in 1810.

By virtue and labour. And over the crest—"Deo adjuvante." God aiding.

This noble family is derived from *Fyfe Macduff*, who was a man of considerable wealth and power temp. king Kenneth II. of Scotland, and gave that prince great assistance in his wars with the Picts, about the year 834. On their reduction, 840, king Kenneth gave to this Macduff, in reward of his services, all the lands then called Othelinia, which he himself had conquered from the Picts, and which extended from Fifeness to Clackmannan, from east to west, and from the river Forth on the south, to the rivers Tay and Erne on the north. Of this tract of land, which he called Fife, he was appointed hereditary thane, or baron; and this dignity was enjoyed by his posterity in a direct line to Macduff, the 8th thane, who having contributed to the restoration of king Malcolm Canmore, that king confirmed to him his county of Fife, and created him earl thereof in 1057, or 1061. The title of earl became extinct in 1353, on the death of Duncan, the 13th earl, without issue male. From the same ancestor descended David Duff, ancestor of the present earl, to whom Robert III. 1401, granted considerable lands, and the barony of Muldavit, which continued to be one of the chief titles of the family, until alienated in the beginning of the reign of Charles I.

WILLIAM DUFF, of Dipple and Braco,

1727, represented co. Banff in parliament, and steadily adhered to the interests of his country, but, preferring a private to a public life, declined to be returned to the next parliament. He was created lord Braco, of Kilbride, by the privy seal of queen Caroline, when regent, bearing date at Kensington, 17 June, and by patent at Dublin, 28 July 1735; and was further created viscount Macduff and earl of Fife, 26 April 1759. His lordship, during the rebellion in Scotland, joined the duke of Cumberland at Aberdeen, in March 1745, and made a free offer of his services to the government in any way his majesty should require. That sir William was of the house of Darnley, is clear from the words of the patent, creating his descendant earl of Galloway, wherein his origin, "*ab antiquo domo de Lennox derivata*" is expressly enumerated as one of the reasons of his elevation to the peerage.

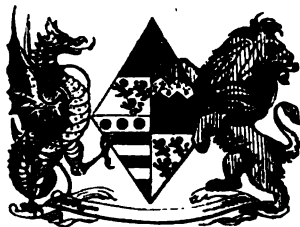

ROGER DE GREY, of Ruthyn, younger son of John, lord Grey, of Wilton, was summoned to parliament among the barons of the realm, 17 Ed. II. His great-great-grandson,

EDMUND, 4th lord, was created, 1465, earl of Kent, and the barony continued merged in the earldom, till the death, without issue, in 1639, of HENRY, 9th earl, when it devolved on his only sister and heiress,

THOMAS HAMILTON, 1st earl, being bred to the law, was by king James VI. made one of the senators in the college of justice, secretary of state, lord advocate and register, and was, in 1613, created baron Binning and Byres, and in 1619 earl of *Melros*, which latter he afterwards changed to the title of *Haddington*; in 1627, he was constituted lord privy seal, which office he held for ten years; m. 1st, a da. of James Borthwick, esq. by whom he had one da.

CHRISTIAN, m. 1st, John, lord Lindsey; and 2dly, Robert, lord Boyd.

His lordship m. 2dly, a da. of sir James Foulis, bart.; and 3dly, a da. of sir — Kerr; by his 2d wife he had three sons and three das. of whom

THOMAS, his eldest son, succeeded his father, as 2d earl, and joined with the covenanters in the beginning of the civil war; was governor of the castle of Dunglas, where he was, 30 Aug. 1640, unfortunately blown up, together with Robert Hamilton, his brother; Patrick, his natural brother; sir John Hamilton, of Red-house, his cousin-german; sir Alexander Hamilton, of Innerwick, and Alexander, his son and h.; sir Alexander Erskine, 4th son of the 7th earl of Mar, brother-in-law to the earl; sir Gideon Baillie, of

Lochend; James Inglis; and John, of Gogar. A report prevailed that Dunglas was treacherously blown up by Edward Paris, an English boy, page to the earl of Haddington, on account of his master jestingly telling him, that his countrymen were a pack of cowards, to suffer themselves to be beaten, and to run away at Newburn; which so much enraged him, that he took a hot iron and thrust it into one of the powder barrels, himself perishing with the rest. THE origin of the illustrious family of Hamilton has been traced by Crawford, Douglas, and other Scotch genealogists, to a *William de Hameldon*, (so surnamed from the place of his birth, the manor of Hameldon, co. Leicester,) whom they assert to have been a younger son of Robert de Bellomont, 3d earl of Leicester, and to have had a son, Gilbert, who, having killed John le Despenser, a favourite officer about the court of king Edward II. fled from the apprehended vengeance of that monarch; and being closely pursued into a wood, he and his servant changed clothes with two woodcutters, and taking their saw, were cutting through an oak-tree when their pursuers passed by. Perceiving his servant take notice of them, he hastily cried out to him, "THROUGH;" which word, with the oak and saw through it, he took for his motto and crest, in memory of his happy deliverance. This detail is, however, liable to several objections. Neither Dugdale, nor any other of the English genealogists, make mention of the descent of the Hamiltons from the earls of Leicester. According to them, Robert, 3d earl, had three sons, Robert, 4th earl, who d. without issue in 1204; Roger, bishop of St. Andrews and chancellor of Scotland, who d. in 1202; and William, a leper, founder of the hospital of St. Leonard,

at Leicester. That this William died before his eldest brother, without issue, is evident, from the circumstance of the great inheritance of the family being divided, on the death of the 4th earl, between his sisters; and it is further proved by a deed of Petronella, widow of the 3d earl, that the surname of her son, William, was not Hamilton, but De Britolio. It is therefore clear, that he was not the progenitor of the family of Hamilton, whose descent, if derived from the earls of Leicester at all, (as indeed the similarity of arms, and the concurring testimony of several authors, seem to render probable,) must have been from one of the younger sons of the first or second earl. We therefore commence our account of the family with

GILBERT DE HAMELDUN, whose name occurs in the Chartulary of Paisley, 1272, and who was the father of

WALTER, who swore fealty to king Edward I. 1292, and had two sons,

1. DAVID, ancestor of the dukes of Hamilton.

2. JOHN, ancestor of the earls of Haddington. Fifth in descent from David was

Sir JAMES, of Cadyow, who was created a lord of parliament 28 June 1445, m. Mary, eldest da. of James II. king of Scotland; and dying 1479, was succeeded by his only son,

JAMES, 2d lord, created, 10 Aug. 1503, earl of Arran, in reward for his services in negotiating the marriage between king James IV. and the princess Margaret, eldest da. of king Henry VII. The earl d. 1530, leaving issue, by his 3d wife, Janet, da. of sir David Beaton, of Creich, a son,

JAMES, 2d earl, who was, in 1543, declared by the estates in parliament second person in the realm, and nearest to succeed to the crown of the same, failing the issue of queen Mary, and by reason thereof, tutor lawful to the queen, and governor of the realm. He was created, by king Henry II. of France, duke of *Chatelherault* in Poitou, and invested with the order of St. Michael 1548. On the marriage of queen Mary with Darnley, the duke was obliged to retire to France, where he remained till 1569, when he returned and headed the partisans of that queen, but was obliged to submit to the regent Moray. His grace m. Mary, da. of William, 1st earl of Denbigh, by Susannah, sister to George Villiers, the celebrated duke of Buckingham, and had issue,

THE lands of Loudoun, in Ayrshire, from which this title is taken, belonged, in the reign of David I. to one Lambinus, whose son, *James de Loudoun*, left an only da. Margaret, who m. sir Reginald Crawford, heritable sheriff of Ayr. Sir Reginald's descendants continued lords of Loudoun for four generations, when their line ended in a female, Susanna, only child and h. of sir Reginald Crawford, who m. sir Duncan Campbell (son of Donald Campbell, 2d son of Colin More Campbell, of Lochow, ancestor of the dukes of Argyll). In the family of Campbell, the lordship of Loudoun descended through ten generations to

Sir HUGH, sheriff of Ayr, and a privy counsellor, created a lord of parliament 30 June 1601, by the title of lord Campbell, of Loudoun, and d. 15 Sept. 1622. By his 1st wife, Margaret, da. of sir John Gordon, of Lochinvar, he had an only son, *George*, master of Loudoun, who d. in his father's lifetime, leaving two das. his co-hh. of whom the youngest, Elizabeth, m. sir Hugh Campbell, of Cessnock, and the eldest,

MARGARET, became baroness of Loudoun; m. 1620, sir JOHN CAMPBELL, of Lawyers (a younger branch of the Campbells of Glenorchy). Sir John was created, 1633, earl of Loudoun, and baron Farrinyeane and Marchline, but joining the opposition against the court, his patent was stopped till 1641, when he was appointed lord high chancellor of Scotland, and his title allowed, with precedence from 1633. He was one of the lords appointed to treat with king Charles I. in the Isle of Wight, 1647: after the battle of Worcester he retired into the Highlands, and, together with his son, was excepted out of Cromwell's act of grace and pardon, 1654. FEW families in North Britain can boast so ancient an origin as that of *Home*, being a branch of the illustrious house of Dunbar and March, and descended from Patrick, 2d son of Cospatrick, earl of Dunbar and March. His grandson, William, assumed the surname of Home, and was ancestor of

ALEXANDER HOME, created lord *Homs*, 2 August 1473, had issue, *Alexander*, who d. in his father's lifetime, leaving issue, two sons, ALEXANDER, 2d lord, and JOHN, of Whiterigs, ancestor of the present earl.

ALEXANDER, 2d lord, left two sons, ALEXANDER, 3d lord, and GEORGE, 4th lord: the latter was father of ALEXANDER, 5th lord, whose only son,

THE surname of *Hope* is of great antiquity in Scotland. John de Hope swore fealty to king Edward I. when he overran Scotland 1296. Another John de Hope had a protection from king Henry IV. of England 1405. John de Hope, the immediate ancestor of this family, is said to have come from France, in the reign of Magdalen, queen of James V. 1537; settling in Scotland, he m. Elizabeth Cumming, by whom he had Edward, who was one of the most considerable inhabitants of Edinburgh in the reign of queen Mary; and, being a great promoter of the Reformation, was chosen one of the commissioners for the metropolis to that parliament 1560; he was father of

HENRY HOPE, a considerable merchant, who, having frequent occasion to visit the continent, m. in one of these excursions, a French lady, Jaqueline de Tott, and by her had two sons,

1. HENRY, ancestor of the great and opulent branch of the *Hopes*, long settled in Amsterdam.

2. THOMAS, entering upon the study of the law, made so rapid a progress in judicial knowledge, that he was, at an early age, called to the bar: his practice was, however, limited till 1606, when he undertook the defence of the six ministers tried for high treason, for denying that the king possessed authority in matters ecclesiastical: he acquitted himself so much to the satisfaction of the Presbyterians at this important trial, that they never afterwards undertook any business of importance without previously consulting him, and he immediately came into the first practice in the kingdom; he was constituted king's advocate, jointly with sir William Oliphant, of Newton, and was created a baronet 11 Feb. 1628. Sir William Oliphant dying 13 April 1628, king Charles I. was pleased not only to appoint sir Thomas Hope his sole advocate, but likewise to grant him several honourable privi-

leges not enjoyed by his predecessors; m. Elizabeth, da. of John Bennet, of Wallyford, co. Haddington, and by her had a numerous issue.

SIR JOHN HOTHAM, descended from an ancient family of that name, seated at Scarborough, co. York, was created a baronet 4 Jan. 1621. He was appointed governor of Hull in 1643; but having been discovered to hold a correspondence with the royal party,

he was tried and convicted by a court-martial for that and other offences against the parliament, and was beheaded on Tower Hill, together with his eldest son, sir John Hotham, knight. "He was master," says lord Clarendon, "of a noble fortune in land, and rich in

THE family of Hastings is descended from Robert de Hastings, who was portreeve of the Cinque Port of that name in the reign of Henry I. An elder branch of it were lords of Abergavenny, and earls of Pembroke, and became extinct in 1390; from a younger brother descended WILLIAM de Hastings, who was summoned to parliament among the barons of the realm, 1461, and afterwards executed by king Richard III. His grandson,

GEORGE, lord Hastings, was created, 1529, earl of *Huntingdon*, and from him the

titles descended, through a series of eight earls, to

FRANCIS, 10th earl, on whose death, without issue, 2 Oct. 1789, the barony devolved on his only sister, Elizabeth, countess of Moira, and on her death descended to her son, the late marquess of Hastings, while the earldom remained dormant, and was even considered as extinct, till, after a lapse of thirty years, it was successfully claimed by the late earl, whose descent we now proceed to state.

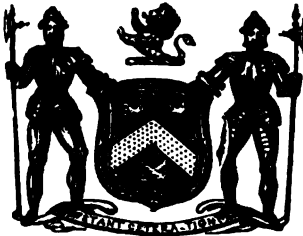

In the reign of Robert I. sir Adam de Gordon obtained a grant of the barony of Strathbogie, co. Atholl; his great-great-grandson, sir Adam Gordon, of Huntley, was killed at Homildon 1402, leaving an only da. and h. m. to Alexander Seton, 2d son of sir William Seton, of Seton. ALEXANDER SETON, lord of Gordon, assumed the surname of Gordon, and was created, 8 Jan. 1449-50, earl of Huntly. SIR STEPHEN FOX, the ancestor of the earls of Ilchester and the barons Holland, was distinguished by his attachment and fidelity to king Charles II.; and though the reigning powers at that time tried their utmost endeavours to make him withdraw his allegiance from his exiled master, they found him incorruptible. When the restoration took place, sir Stephen accompanied his royal master to England, and was immediately rewarded with several places of dignity and trust, which he discharged in the most honourable manner. He was likewise sworn of the privy council; and his majesty granted him, out of the royal arms, an augmentation to his paternal coat, viz. in a canton, a fleur-de-lis or, to him and his heirs for ever. These preferments show how justly he was esteemed by his king and country; but what will endear his memory to the latest posterity is, his being the first projector of the noble design of Chelsea Hospital,

Surrey, esq. by whom he had issue, a da.

SIR VALENTINE BROWNE, of Crofts, co. Lincoln, was treasurer of the town of Berwick,

VI. and queen Mary; he left issue, sir VALENTINE BROWNE, *knt.* a privy counsellor to queen Elizabeth, who purchased large estates in Ireland, *m.* Thomasine, sister of sir Nicholas Bacon, *knt.* lord-keeper of the great seal to queen Elizabeth, and aunt of the celebrated Francis, lord Verulam, viscount St. Albans, lord chancellor of England, from whom descended sir VALENTINE BROWNE, of Castle Rosse, who was created a *bart.* of Ireland 16 Feb. 1621, and *m.* Elizabeth, 5th da. of Gerald, 10th earl of Kildare; he was ancestor of

This noble family is descended from the same common ancestor with the duke of Leinster, the lords Windsor, the Carews, &c. Otho de Windsor, a powerful baron, *temp.* Edward the Confessor. Walter Fitz-Otho, castellan of Windsor 1078, had two sons, William, ancestor of the lords Windsor, and Giraldu. Maurice Fitzgerald, eldest son of Giraldu, was ancestor of the duke of Leinster; William Fitzgerald, 2d son of Giraldu, had also two sons; from Odo, the eldest, the barons Carew derived their descent; and the second, Raymond, (surnamed le Gros,) was father of Maurice, whose son Thomas, was lord of Kerry, and adopted the surname of Fitzmaurice, which was continued by his descendants.

THOMAS FITZMAURICE, 21st baron Kerry, and 14th in descent from Thomas above named, *b.* 1668, was advanced to the dignities of viscount *Clanmaurice* and earl of *Kerry*, 17 Jan. 1722. 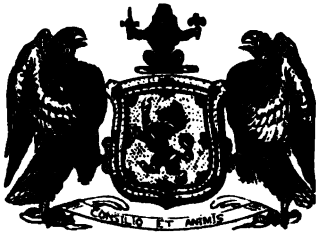

ARMS—Or, a lion rampant gules, couped at all joints of the field, within a double tressure flory counterflory of the second. **CREST**—A lion sejant full faced gules, crowned with an open imperial crown, and holding in the dexter paw a sword

proper, pommel and hilt gold, and in the sinister a fleur-de-lis azure; being, with the difference of the fleur-de-lis, instead of a sceptre in the sinister paw, the royal crest of Scotland, granted by king *Charles II.* to *John*, duke of *Lauderdale*. **SUPPORTERS**—Two eagles, wings inverted, proper. **MOTTO**—"Consilio et animis." By wisdom and courage.

This distinguished family appears to have been seated at *Thirlestane*, in the co. of *Berwick*, at least as early as the 13th century. *Sir Richard Maitland*, of *Leithington* and *Thirlestane*, was one of the extraordinary lords of session and keeper of the privy seal, and retired from public business 1584, having been employed therein more than 70 years, and served four generations of Scottish monarchs. He was father of *William Maitland*, who played a conspicuous part in the troubles that agitated Scotland during the reign of queen *Mary*;

Sir JOHN, who accompanied *James VI.* to *Denmark*, 1589, and on his return was created baron *Thirlestane*, 18 May 1590. He m. *Jean*, only da. and h. of *James*, 4th lord *Fleming*, and d. 3 Oct. 1595, leaving issue, an only son,

THOMAS, lord Le Despencer, grandson of Hugh, styled earl of Gloucester, was created, in 1398, earl of Gloucester; he was beheaded in 1400;—lady Isabella, his only da. and h. m. Richard Beauchamp, earl of Warwick, whose only da. Elizabeth, carried the baronies of *Le Despencer* and *Abergavenny* to

GEORGE ANSON, 1st lord, was a 2d son, and having from his youth devoted himself to the sea service, was, at 25 years of age, 1722, made capt. of the Weasel sloop, and in 1740 he commenced that celebrated voyage, the glories and perils of which, though nearly a century has elapsed, are too well known, and too highly appreciated, to need recapitulation here. His subsequent naval promotions were rear-adm. of the blue 1745, vice-adm. of the blue 1746, and of the red 1748, and (on the death of sir John Norris) vice-adm. of England; adm. of the blue 1748, in which year he conveyed king George II. over to Holland. In 1751 he was appointed 1st lord of the admiralty, and in 1755 adm. and commander-in-chief of the fleet. In 1761 he was appointed commander of the fleet which brought queen Charlotte to England. This was the last of his public services, and while a patent was making out for his elevation to the dignity of a viscount, he d. suddenly, 14 June 1762. He had been created, 13 June 1747, baron Anson, of Soberton, co. Hants, but dying s. p. that title became extinct. He m. Elizabeth Yorke, da. of Philip, 1st earl of Hardwick.

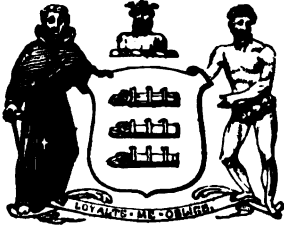

His son, sir Hugh, had licence to make a park in his manor of Lowther, and a grant of free warren there in 1336. His descendant, sir Hugh, was at the battle of Agincourt, 1415. His descendant, sir Hugh, was a K.B. at the marriage of prince Arthur, son of Henry VII. His son, sir Richard, was sheriff of Cumberland, when Mary, queen of Scots, fled to England, in 1568, and had her in his custody; he d. 1607. His son,

sir Christopher, was knighted by king James in 1603, and d. 1607.

The representative of this ancient house, sir JOHN LOWTHER, of Lowther, bart. was created, 1696, by William III. viscount Lonsdale and baron Lowther, which dignities became extinct in 1751, on the death of Henry Lowther, 3d viscount Lonsdale: but the large landed possessions and the baronetage devolved on the next heir male.

Sir JAMES LOWTHER, bart. who, 11 May 1784, was advanced to the dignities of earl of Lonsdale, viscount Lonsdale and Lowther, baron of Lowther and Kendal, co. Westmoreland, and baron Burgh, co. Cumberland, and, 26 Oct. 1797, viscount and baron Lowther,

with remainder to the heirs male of the body of his 3d cousin, the rev. sir William Lowther, of Swillington, bart. The earl m. Mary Stuart, eldest da. of John, 3d earl of Bute, and dying 24 May 1802, without issue by her, (who d. 5 April 1824,) was succeeded in the last-mentioned titles by the present earl.

The rebellion of 1715, changing, however, the state of affairs, Simon, lord Lovat, re-appeared in Scotland, and greatly assisting the government in quelling the insurrection, regained his title and estates; in 1740 he accepted the commission of lieutenant-general and general of the Highlands from Charles Edward, with a patent creating him duke of

Fraser; he himself took no active part in the rebellion, but sent his son and clansmen to join the standard of the prince; being convicted of high treason before the house of lords, 10 March 1747, he was beheaded on Tower Hill, 9 April following, in the 80th year of his age. He left three sons,

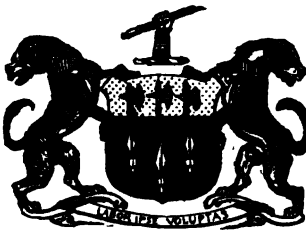

Middlesex, with remainder, in the event of his dying without male issue, to his nephew, David, viscount Stormont. 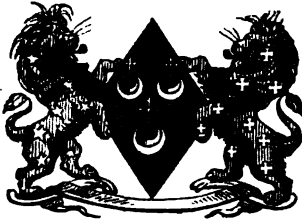

of Caen Wood, co. Middlesex, with remainder to his said nephew, her ladyship's issue by whom will be found under the title of Earl of MANSFIELD. of Blandford, Earl of Sunderland and Marlborough, Baron Spencer, of Wormleighton, Baron Churchill, of Sundridge, and a Prince of the Holy Roman Empire, succeeded his father, George, the late duke, 5 March 1840; *born* 27 Dec. 1793; *married*, 11 Jan. 1819, Jane Stewart, eldest da. of George, 9th earl of Galloway, K.T. and has issue,—1. LOUISA, *b.* 2 Jan. 1821;—2. JOHN-WINSTON, *marquess of Blandford*, *b.* 2 June 1822;—3. ALFRED, *b.* 24 April 1824;—4. ALAN, *b.* 25 July 1825.

Herts.; on 9 April 1689, earl of *Marlborough*; and on 14 Dec. 1702, marquess of *Blandford*, and duke of *Marlborough*. In 1706 (the duke's only son having d. young) an act of parliament passed, extending the limitations of those honours to his da. and their issue male successively. His grace m. Sarah, da. and co-h. of Richard Jennings, esq. and had issue,

The title thus forfeited, remained under attainder till 1824, when his majesty was graciously pleased to command an act to be brought into the house of lords, for its restoration to the great-nephew of the attainted earl, whose descent we now proceed to state.

The family of Methuen or Methven is of very ancient and honourable descent in the kingdom of Scotland, and held offices of the highest importance and greatest trust. In the reign of king James II. of Scotland, A.D. 1440, **JOHN DE METHUEN** was principal secretary of state and lord register, and in 1449, one of the commissioners appointed to treat of a peace with England, when there was a truce concluded for seven years; he sealed with an imperial eagle, charged on the breast with his family coat, which eagle is said to have been given to his ancestors by Albert I. emperor of Germany in 1304. In the reign of king David II. 1363, Paul de Methuen was a commissioner from Scotland for concluding a peace between the two kingdoms; and in 1397, John de Methuen was one of the commissioners from Scotland to treat of a peace with certain commissioners of England.

JOHN DE METHUEN, a zealous promoter of the reformation in Scotland, and thereby rendering himself obnoxious to the government, fled to England and was kindly received by queen Elizabeth, who conferred upon his son, Paul Methuen, several beneficial preferments in the co. of Somerset: this latter gentleman *d.* 1666, leaving a son,

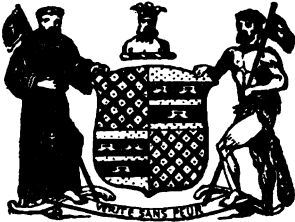

JAMES STEWART, natural son of James V. king of Scotland, and regent of that kingdom during part of the reign of queen Mary, was created earl of Moray 30 Jan. 1562, to him and the heirs male of his body; and he afterwards obtained a charter extending the limitation of the earldom to his next lawful heirs. His history, and death by the hand of Hamilton, of Bothwell-haugh, 21 Jan. 1570, are too well known to need recapitulation. By his wife, Anne, eldest da. of William Keith, 4th earl marischal, he left issue, twodas. 1. ELIZABETH; 2. MARGARET, *m.* Francis, 9th earl of Erroll. 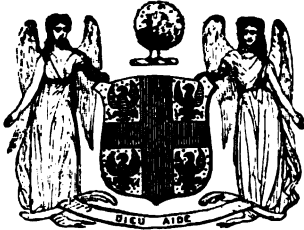

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THIS family derives its origin from GEOFFRY DE MONTMORENCY, a younger son of Hervé de Montmorency, grand butler of France, whose elder son was ancestor of the dukes of Montmorency, of Luxemburg, of Beaumont and Laval. The descendants of Geoffry appear to have had large possessions in England and Ireland, in which latter country they eventually settled, and filled at different times the high offices of chamberlain to king Henry II. chief governor, and constables. In the 15th century they assumed the name of Morres, and continued to be so called until the 3d viscount resumed, by royal licence, that of Montmorency.

In return, the king gave him a curiously wrought glass cup with this blessing to the family, that they should ever prosper, and never want a male heir so long as they should preserve it unbroken, which the superstition of those times imagined to carry good fortune, and called it the *luck of Muncaster*; and of this glass the family are still possessed. This sir John de Pennington commanded the left wing of the English army in an expedition into Scotland; his grandson, sir John de Pennington, had a command at the battle of Flodden Field, 4 Henry VIII.

Arms—Quarterly: 1st and 4th, argent, a saltire engrailed between four roses gules, NAPIER; 2d and 3d, or, within a double tressure flory counterflory azure, a bend of the second charged with a star of six points argent, between two crescents of the field, SCOTT, of Thirlestane. *Crest*—A dexter arm erect couped at the elbow, proper, the hand grasping a crescent, argent. *Supporters*—*Dexter*, an eagle, wings inverted proper. *Sinister*, a man in complete armour, holding in his left hand a tilting spear with a pennon, all proper. These supporters

are said by Scotch heralds to be placed on what they call a compartment, consisting of the battlements of a tower, from which issue six lances, three and three in saltire, being the crest of Scott of Thirlestane. *Motto*—Ready, aye ready; being that of Scott of Thirlestane; and over the crest, "Sans tâche," Without stain.

The origin of the family of Napier is stated in a certificate under the hand and seal of sir Archibald Napier, of Merchistoun, dated 1 June 1625, in the following words: "One of the ancient earls of Lenox, in Scotland, had issue three sonnes; the eldest succeeded him in the earldom of Lenox; the second, whose name was Donald, and the third was named Gillchrist: the then king of Scotts having warres, &c.; among some that were then commanded to serve the king in those warres, was the earle of Lenox, who keeping his eldest sonne at home, sent his second sonne to serve for him; this battell went hard with the Scotts, who were forced to loose grounde, and at last to runne away, which being perceived by Donald, he pulled his father's standard from the bearer thereof, and valiantly encountering the foe, being well followed, repulsed the enemy, and changed the fortune of the day, whereby a greate victory was gott. After the battaile, the king said unto them: *You have all done patiently, but there is one amongst you who hath NA PIER*,—and calling Donald to his presence, in regarde of his worthy service, gave him in augmentation of honour to change his name

from LENOX to NAPIER, and to give him the lands of Gosfoord, &c. and made him his servant, which discourse is confirmed by sundry of my old evidences, wherein we are called LENOX *alias* NAPIER."

John Napier, "to whom," says Mr. Hume, the celebrated historian, "the title of *Great Man* is more justly due than to any other whom his country ever produced," was the inventor of the Logarithms and Robdologie, commonly called "Napier's Bones." He was likewise author of a "Treatise on the Revelation of St. John." These works will remain lasting monuments of his sublime judgment, knowledge, and penetration. Mary, da. of Robert Walpole, of Houghton, esq. sister to sir Robert Walpole, K.G. and K.B. 1st earl of Orford, and to Horatio, 1st lord Walpole, of Wolterton, and father of Horatio, earl of Orford, so created 1 April 1806; her next sister, Dorothy, was the 2d wife of Charles, viscount Townshend, grandfather of the 1st marquess.

HORATIO NELSON, viscount and baron Nelson of the Nile, and of Burnham Thorpe, co. Norfolk, so created by patent 22 May 1801; duke of Bronte, in Sicily, kn. of the most honourable military order of the Bath, senior kn. grand cross of the royal Sicilian order of St. Ferdinand and of Merit, senior kn. of the imperial order of the Turkish Crescent of the first class, kn. grand commander of the most illustrious equestrian, secular, and chaptal order of St. Joachim, LL.D. a vice-admiral of the white, &c. was invested at St. James's with the ensigns of the military order of the Bath 27 Sept. 1797, and installed by proxy 19 May 1803; received his majesty's permission, by sign manual, 7 Jan. 1801, to receive and bear the great cross of the order of St. Ferdinand and of Merit, conferred on his lordship by Ferdinand IV. king of the Two Sicilies; and by another warrant, dated the 9th of the same month, to accept for himself and his heirs the title of duke of Bronte, with the fief of the duchy annexed thereto, conferred also by the said king of the Two Sicilies. His majesty was pleased, 20 March 1802, to grant his royal permission to receive and wear the order of the Crescent, transmitted to him by the grand seignor. The viscount distinguished himself heroically in the bay of Aboukir, adjoining the coast of Egypt, where he attacked the French fleet, moored in a strong line of battle, commanded by admiral Brueys, whose ship was blown up during the engagement; and, after a most gallant action, his lordship obtained a glorious and decisive victory, which occasioned the grand seignor to present him with a chelengk or plume of triumph, of considerable value, which is borne as a crest to his armorial bearings. His lordship was b. 29 Sept. 1758, m. at Nevis, 23 March 1787, Frances-Herbert-Woodward, da. of William Herbert, esq. and relict of Josiah Nesbit, M.D. by whom (who d. 4 May 1831, et. 69) he had no issue. His lordship, after a series of heroic and transcendent services, fell in the moment of victory over the combined fleets of France and Spain, off cape Trafalgar, 21 Oct. 1805, and was honoured with a funeral at the public expense, being buried in the cathedral church of St. Paul, London, 9 Jan. 1806.

His lordship was created baron Nelson of the Nile and of Burnham Thorpe, co. Norfolk, 6 Nov. 1798; viscount, 22 May 1801; and, 18 Aug. 1801, baron Nelson of the Nile, and of Hilborough, co. Edmund Nelson, to his brother WILLIAM, and to his heirs male, and to the heirs male of his sister Susannah, wife of Thomas Bolton, esq. and of Catharine, wife of George Matcham, esq.

WILLIAM NELSON, 1st earl Nelson, D.D. prebendary of Canterbury, b. 20 April 1757; succeeded his brother, Horatio, viscount Nelson, in the barony of Nelson, of Hilborough, 21 Oct. 1805; but the titles of viscount Nelson and baron Nelson, of Burnhamthorpe, became extinct; advanced to the dignities of earl Nelson of Trafalgar, and of Merton, co. Surrey, and viscount Merton of the same, (with remainder, on failure of heirs male of his body, to heirs male of the bodies of his sisters, Susannah Bolton and Catharine Matcham, successively), by patent, dated 20 Nov. 1805, and, 11 Jan. 1806, obtained his majesty's licence and authority to use the honourable augmentations to his armorial ensigns, which had been granted to his late brother, Horatio, viscount and baron Nelson, deceased. In July following, the earl was permitted to bear an augmentation to his arms, viz. a fesse wavy, thereon inscribed the word "TRAFALGAR," (discontinued by Thomas, 2d earl,) and, 21 Oct. 1806, was permitted by his majesty to succeed to the title of duke of Bronte, in the Farther Sicily, granted by his Sicilian majesty to his late brother. This ancient family derives its descent from three of the celebrated chiefs who were heads of the fifteen tribes of North Wales. His grace d. without issue 20 Sept. 1777, when the earldom of Norwich and barony of Howard of Castle Rising became extinct; the baronies of which he was seised in fee fell into abeyance between the hh. of his two nieces, Winifred, lady Stourton, and Anne, lady Petre, before mentioned; and the titles of duke of Norfolk, earl of Arundel, Surrey, and Norfolk; earl marshal and hereditary marshal of England, and baron Fitz-Alan, Clun and Oswaldestre, and Maltravers, devolved on his second cousin,

The family of COMPTON derives its name from the lordship of Compton, co. Warwick. Sir William Dugdale, in his history of this county, derives its descent from TURCHIL, who was one of the first in England, who, in imitation of the Normans, assumed a surname; for it appears, temp. king William Rufus, he wrote himself TURCHUS DE EARDENE, from his residence in Arden (as now written) in the said county, the said king having dispossessed him of his castle of Warwick. By his first wife he had issue, SRWARD DE ARDEN, ancestor to the family of Arden, and by Leverunia, his 2d wife, he had issue, OSBERT, who styled himself of Compton, 1169, and is without doubt the ancestor of this family; which Osbert had issue, three sons, OSBERT, PHILIP, and PETER, the eldest of whom left two da. and co-hh. Philip, 2d son, writing himself Philip de Compton, was a witness, temp. king John, with Walter Poer, to a grant of lands lying in Tirhoe, made by Richard de Beresford, and Cecilia, his wife, to the canons of Kenilworth; to him succeeded THOMAS DE COMPTON, his son and h. who, 1251, was certified to hold a knight's fee, in Compton, of Thomas de Arden, lineal h. to Turchil above mentioned, and he of the earl of Warwick.

Sir HENRY COMPTON, of Compton Wynyate, co. Warwick, knt. was summoned to parliament, among the barons of the realm, by writ, 8 May 1372, 14 Eliz. and d. 1389,

leaving issue by Frances, da. of Francis Hastings, 2d earl of Huntingdon,

WILLIAM, 2d lord Compton, created earl of Northampton 2 Aug. 1618, K.G. lord president of the marches of Wales, m. Elizabeth, da. and sole h. of sir John Spencer, knt. lord mayor of the city of London, 1593, and by her had issue,

(granted as above) a representation of the Trafalgar medal suspended by a gold chain round the neck, and supporting a flag-staff, thereon hoisted the standard of St. George. the horizontal part of the cross inscribed with the words "BRITANNIA VICTRIX." MOTTO—"Tache sans tache." Spot without spot.

HUGH PERCY, DUKE and EARL of NORTHUMBERLAND, Earl and Baron

Percy, and eldest co-heir of the barony of Latimer, Baron Warkworth, of Warkworth, and Baronet, K.G., P.C., F.R. and A.S.; High Steward of the University of Cambridge; Lord-Lieutenant and Vice-Admiral of Northumberland and Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Constable of Launceston Castle, High Steward of Launceston, and the Queen's Trustee of the British Museum; born 20 April 1785, succeeded his father, Hugh, the late duke, 10 July 1817; married, 29 April 1817, Charlotte-Florentina Clive, youngest da. of Edward, 1st earl of Powis, and by her (who

was governess to her Majesty, when Princess Victoria) had a son, still-born, 27 Feb. 1818.

Arms—Quarterly: 1st and 4th, LOVAINE and LUCY quarterly, viz. 1st and 4th, or, a lion rampant azure for Lovaine, and 2d and 3d, gules, three lucies or pikes hauriant, for Lucy; 2d and 3d, azure, five lozenges conjoined in fesse or, PERCY. *Crest*—On a cha-



pean gules, turned up ermine, a lion stantant, tail extended, azure. SUPPORTERS—Dexter, a lion azure. Sinister, a lion guardant or, gorged with a collar compony argent and azure. Motto—"Espérance en Dieu." Hope in God.

THE noble family of Percy is descended from Mainfred, a Danish chieftain, who made irruptions into France in the 9th century, and whose posterity, settling in Normandy, took their name from their domain of Percy in that province.

WILLIAM DE PERCY, with his brother Serlo, came over to England with the Conqueror, and obtained large possessions in York and Lincolnshire.

In the reign of Henry II. AGNES, heiress of the Percy family, m. Joceline de Lovaine, 2d son of Godfrey, duke of Brabant, who thereupon assumed the name of Percy. Their descendants were among the most powerful barons in the north of England; and, 16 July 1377,

HENRY, lord Percy, was created earl of Northumberland. His son, HENRY, better known by the name of *Hotspur*, was slain at the battle of Shrewsbury, 1403, as were his grandson and great-grandson, both named Henry, and successively earls of Northumberland, at those of St. Albans, 1455, and Towton, 1461, fighting for the Lancastrian party. King Edward IV. in 1464, bestowed the earldom of Northumberland on his adherent, John Neville, lord Montacute, (brother of the celebrated earl of Warwick); but that nobleman, on being in 1470 created marquis Montacute, surrendered the said earldom to the king, who restored it to the Percy family, which continued to enjoy it till 1537, when

HENRY, 6th earl, dying without issue, and his nephews being precluded from inheriting by the attainder of their father, who had been executed for Ask's conspiracy, it remained dormant, till king Edward VI. in the 5th year of his reign conferred it on John Dudley, viscount Lisle, and earl of Warwick, who was further advanced to the dignity of duke of Northumberland. The earldom, however, was a second time restored to the Percy family, by queen Mary.

JOCELINE PERCY, 11th and last earl of that family, dying without issue male 1670, the earldom became extinct. The marriage of his only surviving child and h. to Charles, duke of Somerset, and her issue, will be found at large under that title; it need here only be recapitulated, that her son and h.

ALGERNON, duke of Somerset, was, 2 Oct. 1749, created baron Warkworth, and earl of Northumberland, with remainder, in default of issue male of his body, to his son-in-law, sir Hugh Smithson, bart. who succeeded to those titles, pursuant to the said limitation, on the duke's death, 2 Feb. 1750.

Having thus given a succinct account of the descent of the earldom of Northumberland, we proceed to his grace's paternal ancestors.

Sir HUGH SMITHSON, descended from an ancient family of that name, in Yorkshire, was, in reward of his loyalty to king Charles I. created a bart. 1660, and dying 1670, was succeeded by his son and h.

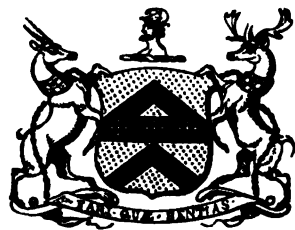

Arms—Quarterly of four: 1st, or, a chief indented azure, BUTLER; 2d, gules, three covered cups, or, BUTLER; 3d, argent, a lion rampant gules, on a chief of the second, a swan close, argent, between two annulets, or, CARRICK; 4th, ermine, a saltire engrailed gules. *Crest*—A demi-falcon, rising from a plume of five ostrich feathers, all argent. *Supporters*—*Dexter*, a falcon, wings inverted, argent, beaked, membered, and belled, or. *Sinister*, a male griffin, argent, armed, ducally gorged, and chained, or. *Motto*—"Comme je trouve." As I find.

The descent of this illustrious family is variously deduced. Sir James Ware and William Roberts, esq. Ulster king of arms in the reign of Charles I. affirm one Herveus, a companion of William the Conqueror, to have been its original ancestor; others derive it from a younger son of the house of Clare, earls of Gloucester and Hertford; and others, again, assert that a Walter Fitz-Gilbert, son of Gilbert Becket, a wealthy citizen of London, and brother of Thomas à Becket, archbishop of Canterbury, was its founder. It is certain, however, that the family name was derived from the office of chief butler of Ireland. We commence our account, therefore, with

THEOBALD LE BOTELER, on whom that office was conferred by king Henry II. 1177, and he and his successors were bound to attend the kings of England at their coronation, and that day present them with the first cup of wine, for which they were to have certain

pieces of the king's plate. Some time after, that king granted him the prisage and butlerage of wines, to enable him and his heirs the better to support the dignity of their office*.

From this Theobald the office descended, through four generations, all of the same Christian name, to

THEOBALD, 5th butler, who d. unm. 1290, and was succeeded by his brother,

EDMOND LE BOTELER, who sat in parliament as a baron 1302, and in 1315 was created earl of Carrick. He d. 1321, leaving, besides other issue, two sons,

1. JAMES, his successor.
2. JOHN, ancestor of the present earl of Carrick. (*See that title.*)

JAMES, 2d earl of Carrick, was created, 2 Nov. 1328, earl of Ormonde; m. Eleanor, da. of Humphry de Bohun, earl of Hereford and Essex, and constable of England, (by the princess Elizabeth, da. of king Edward I.) and dying 1337, was succeeded by his son,

* Under a decree of 12 Feb. 1584, the earl claimed to be entitled to the prisage and butlerage of all wines brought into any of the ports, havens, &c. in Ireland; but this claim having been found troublesome and vexatious to trade, an act passed, 20 June 1810, for the purchase of this right, and the

sum of two hundred and sixteen thousand pounds was accordingly granted for the surrender of this claim, and vesting it in the crown for the public service; and, 31 May 1811, an act received the royal assent for abolishing the duties of the prisage and butlerage of wines in Ireland.

Sir PIERCE BUTLER, great-grandson of Sir Richard, 2d son of the 3d earl; but he was created by king Henry VIII. 1527, earl of Ossory, and the title of Ormonde, by the same king, conferred on his queen's father, Thomas Boleyn, viscount Rochfort, son of Margaret above named. He d. 1539, leaving, besides other issue, two sons,

JAMES, 2d duke and 13th earl, K.G. who, on the removal of the duke of Marlborough from the councils of queen Anne, was appointed commander-in-chief of the forces, warden of the cinque ports, and constable of Dover Castle. On the accession of king George I. he was impeached, and retiring into France, was attainted by acts both of the British and Irish parliaments. He died in exile, and without surviving issue, 1746, and his titles being considered as forfeited under the acts of attainder, remained dormant till they were claimed in 1791 by the father of the present marquess, on the ground that the Irish act of attainder affected the estates only, and not the titles, in which the Irish house of lords concurred. According to this decision, the duke's younger brother, Charles, earl of Arran, became of right 3d duke of Ormonde, and on his death without issue, in 1758, the dukedom and marquessate became extinct, but the earldom devolved on

The family of Maule is said by Douglas, in Peerage of Scotland, to be of French origin, deriving its name from the lordship of

Maule, near Paris. Guarin de Maule, a younger son of Arnold, lord of Maule, was one of the companions of king William the Conqueror, and left a son, Robert, who, accompanying David I. into Scotland, and obtaining from that monarch grants of lands in Lothian, became founder of the Scotch family

of *Maule*. His great-grandson, sir Peter de Maule, *m.* about 1224, Christian, *da.* and heiress of William de Valonijis, lord of Panmure, with whom he got the lordship of Panmure, of which the family was ever after designated.

PATRICK MAULE, of Panmure, 13th in descent from sir Peter, accompanied king James VI. to England, and was created earl of Panmure 3 Aug. 1646; he was a great sufferer for his loyalty to king Charles I. and II. and dying 22 Dec. 1661, was succeeded by his eldest son,

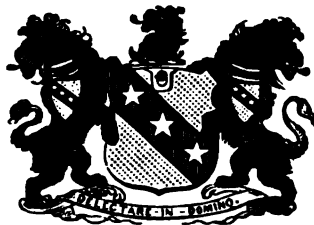

Thomas, his great-grandson, was also a knight of the shire for Hampshire, and obtained the estate of Farley Wallop by marriage with Margaret, da. and co-h. of Nicholas Valaynes, lord of Farley, co. Hants. THIS family was originally French, and in ancient times ranked high among the nobility of that nation. In the list of nobles who accompanied Philip VI. king of France into Flanders, 1328, is FREDERICK DE THELLUSSON, seigneur de Fléschères, also described as baron St. Saphorin, from an estate he possessed adjoining to Fléschères, near Lyons. This Frederick held a high command in the army, and distinguished himself at the siege of Cassel: his descendants continued in possession of these estates until Sunday, 22 Aug. 1572, when they fell victims at the massacre of St. Bartholomew. The only survivor of that dreadful slaughter was THEOPHILUS DE THELLUSSON, who, having m. a sister of the count de Saluce, then governor of Lyons, was concealed by him, and secretly conveyed into Savoy, from whence, seeing no probability of having his estate restored, he retired to Geneva, where his descendants have since filled the first offices in the magistracy of that republic. THEOPHILUS DE THELLUSSON was ancestor of his lordship's great-grandfather.

descendant of his three sons, with benefit of survivorship. This remarkable will was finally established by the house of lords 25 June 1805, but it gave occasion to the passing of the act 39 and 40 Geo. III. cap. 98, restraining the power of devising property for the purpose of accumulation, to 21 years after the death of the testator. The possessions of this noble family upon the borders of the river which gives origin to the title, are by descent of great antiquity, having been acquired about 6 Edward II. 1312, by the marriage of JOHN, son of sir Thomas Lister, with Isabel, da. and h. of John de Bolton, from which John Lister, the present possessor is the 17th in lineal descent. The above Isabel, it is believed, also, was descended through the illustrious families of Clare, Gant, and Roumare, from the old Saxon earls of Mercia; William de Roumare, one of the great Norman barons, having, after the Conquest, *m. Lucy*, sister and h. of Edwin, the last earl, and thereby possessing, as it is quoted by sir William Dugdale, "Cravennam, et Couplandiam, et Allerdale, et Cockeram, jure hereditario." Dug. Monast. vol. i. p. 798.

Of the house of LISTER, whose chief residence has been in the same parish of Gisburne for five hundred years, the limits of our work only allow us to go back to

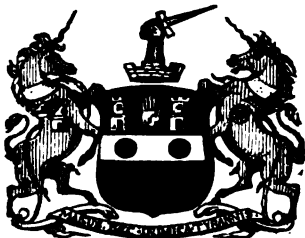

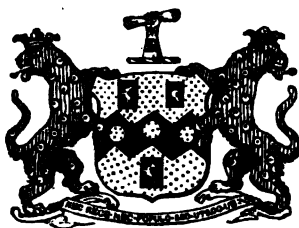

GEORGE ROLLE, a merchant in London, at the time of the Reformation, was a considerable purchaser of abbey lands, and settled at Stevenstone, co. Devon. He d. 1552, leaving six sons, of whom **HENRY**, the 4th, was great-grandfather of Robert Rolle, of Heanton, who m. Arabella, 2d da. and co-h. of Theophilus, earl of Lincoln and baron Clinton, by which match his descendants acquired the barony of Clinton. (*See that title.*)

Perth, in the reign of queen Mary. He was grandfather of James Primrose, who was bred to the law, and filled the office of clerk to the privy council, from 1602 till his death, 1641. He m. Sybilla Miller, and had issue, nineteen children, of whom his second, but eldest surviving son,

Sir ARCHIBALD, succeeded his father in the office of clerk of the privy council; was created a baronet of Nova Scotia 1 Aug. 1651; in 1660, appointed lord registrar of Scotland; and, 1661, a lord of session, by the style of lord Carrington. Lord Rossmore *d.* without issue 6 Aug. 1801, and (Henry-Alexander Jones, *esq.* having *d. unm.* in his lordship's lifetime) was succeeded, pursuant to the limitations of the patent, by the present lord, whose paternal descent we now proceed to trace.

The family of *Westenra* is very ancient in Holland. They bear the augmentation of the sea-horse in their coat armour, in allusion to the gallantry of an ancestor, who, during the duke of Alva's campaigns, was actively employed against the enemy, and undertook to swim across an arm of the sea, with important intelligence to his besieged countrymen.

His lordship's ancestor, WARNER WESTENRA, *esq.* settled in Ireland, *temp.* Charles II. and was made a free denizen, 1662, by act of parliament, together with his brother, Derrick Westenra, *esq.* (who left issue, 1. Peter, of Athurdee, *co.* Louth, elected to parliament for Athboy 1692, *m.* 1682, Sarah, 3d da. of John Bligh, *esq.* grandfather of John, 1st earl of Darnley, and *d.* without issue 1693; 2. Jane, *m.* William Pearse, *esq.*; 3. Isabella, *m.* Roger Warren, *esq.*;) he made his will 23 July 1668, proved at Dublin 1 Feb. 1676, leaving his estate in Ireland, in failure of his own issue, to the eldest son of his brother, Henricus Westenra, on condition of his being sent to Ireland and naturalized; he *m.* Elizabeth Wybrantz, and *d.* 1676, leaving issue, an only son,

HENRY; and a da.

ELIZABETH, *m.* Simon Digby, lord bishop of Elphin, and son of Essex Digby, lord bishop of Dromore, and nephew of Robert, 1st lord Digby, of Geashill, and *d.* 15 April 1720.

HENRY WESTENRA, *esq.* succeeded his father 1676, and also to the estates of his first cousin, Peter Westenra, *esq.* M.P. for Athboy, who *d.* without issue 1693. He was attainted, 1689, by James II. but restored on the accession of William and Mary; *m.* 12 March 1700, Eleanor, 2d da. of sir Joshua Allen, *knt.* and sister of John, 1st viscount Allen, and *d.* 1719, leaving issue,

No Scots surname has been more conspicuous in Europe than that of *Leslie*. There were at one time three general officers of that name in the service of three sovereigns: viz. WALTER, count Leslie, of the emperor of Germany; ALEXANDER, earl of Leven, of the king of England; and DAVID LESLIE, (afterwards baron Newark,) of Gustavus Adolphus, king of Sweden.

Several counts of the name of Leslie settled in Germany, besides many considerable families in France, Russia, and Poland. The family derives its origin from

BARTHOLOMEW, a Flemish chief, who settled with his followers in the district of Garioch, co. Aberdeen, *temp.* king William I. and whose posterity were denominated *de Lesley*, from their place of residence.

Eighth in descent from Bartholomew, was DAVID DE LESLEY, of Lesley, who *d.* without issue male, about 1440, leaving an only da. who inherited the barony of Lesley, which she carried to her husband, a gentleman of the same name, ancestor of the Lesleys, of Lesley; but the other estates went to the heir male,

NORMAN DE LESLEY, of Rothes, (son of sir George Leslie, of the same,) *m.* 1415, Christian, da. of sir John Seton, and had issue,

GEORGE, who, before 20 March 1458, was created earl of *Rothes*; *m.* Christian, da. of Walter, lord Haliburton, and had issue, a son,

ANDREW, master of Rothes, who *d.* in his father's lifetime, having *m.* Marjory, da. of William Sinclair, 3d earl of Orkney, and had issue by her,

In 1663, he obtained a charter, entailing the earldom of Rothes, in case of failure of issue male of his body, on his elder da.; and was created, 29 May 1680, baron Auchmuty and Caskieberry, viscount of Lugtoun, earl of Lesley, marquess of Balenbreich, and duke of Rothes, to him and the heirs male of his body; *m.* Anne, eldest da. of John Lindsay, earl of Crawford, and had issue only two das.

GEORGE, who inherited the barony of Ros, *m.* Ann, da. and sole h. of sir Thomas St. Leger, knt. (by Eleanor, his wife, eldest sister to king Edward IV. widow of Henry Holland, duke of Exeter). He was succeeded by his eldest son,

THOMAS, 2d lord Ros, and 1st earl of Rutland, K.G. who had special livery of the manors, castles, and lands devolved on him from lady Eleanor, his grandmother, sister and co-h. of Edmund, lord Ros, and also from Isabel, the other sister and co-h. of the said Edmund, and was, on the 18th of June 1525, created earl of Rutland, (a title that had never been previously borne but by those of the blood royal,) and had, in consequence of his descent from the sister of king Edward IV. an augmentation to his armorial bearings, viz. Or, two bars azure, and a chief gules, (as they

appear on his father's tomb in St. George's Chapel,) which chief was augmented to quarterly, 1st and 4th, azure, two fleurs-de-lis, or; 2d and 3d, gules, and a lion of England. How and when the barony of Ros became separated from the earldom of Rutland, is shown under the title De Ros (*see that title*): it remains to state that this earl, by Eleanor, da. of sir William Paston, knt. had a numerous family: he *d.* 1543, and was succeeded by his eldest son,

JOHN JERVIS, earl of St. Vincent, was *b.* at Meaford 9 Jan. 1734, entered the navy at the early age of ten years, and obtained the rank of post-captain 13 Oct. 1760. In 1782, on account of the well-known action between his ship and the *Pegase*, French 74, he received the order of the Bath. In 1797, with a fleet of 15 sail of the line only, he engaged and totally defeated the Spanish fleet, consisting of 27 sail, 7 of which carried from 112 to 130 guns each, and was immediately elevated to the peerage, by the titles of baron Jervis of Meaford, and earl of St. Vincent, by patent 23 June 1797, taking this latter title from the cape of that name, near which he had achieved his glorious victory. In 1801, he was appointed 1st lord of the admiralty, and, 27 April in that year, was created viscount St. Vincent, with remainder to his two nephews, William-Henry Ricketts, and Edward-Jervis Ricketts, and the heirs male of their bodies successively, and failing such, to his niece, Mary, countess of Northesk, and the heirs male of her body. His lordship, at the time of his death, was admiral of the fleet, and general of the marines. He *m.* 5 June 1783, Martha, da. of sir Thomas Parker, lord chief baron, but by her (who *d.* 8 Feb. 1816) had no issue. SIR JAMES FIENNES, knt. (grandson and heir of sir William Fiennes, and of Joan, 3d sister and co-h. of William, lord Saye, who *d.* 1369,) was summoned to parliament

by writ, 3 March, 25 Hen. VI. and on the 5th of the same month, in presence of the three estates of parliament, and, with the consent of the lords spiritual and temporal, was cre-

ated a baron of England, by the style, title, and honour of baron *Saye and Sele*. He was murdered by Jack Cade's mob, 4 July 1451, and was succeeded by his son and h.

WILLIAM, 2d lord *Saye and Sele*, who was slain at the battle of *Barnet* 1471; and from his death four generations passed over without any of his descendants claiming the title, or having summons to parliament. On the accession of James I. sir **RICHARD FIENNES**, 5th in descent from, and heir of the body of, the above-named William, obtained a recognition of his right by patent dated 9 Aug. 1603; was summoned to parliament as baron *Saye and Sele*, but sat as junior baron. His son and heir,

WILLIAM, 4th baron, was created, 1624, viscount *Saye and Sele*, and d. 1662, leaving issue,

JAMES, 2d viscount; and three other sons.

GILBERT TALBOT acquired large possessions in and upon the borders of Wales, by marriage with Gwenllian, da. and at length heiress of Rhys ap Gryffith, a prince of South Wales, on which occasion he relinquished his paternal arms, "*bendy of ten argent and gules*," and adopted those of his wife's ancestors, "*gules, a lion rampant, within a bordure engrailed, or*," which have been ever since borne by his posterity. From his father he inherited the titles of duke of Somerset and baron Seymour; from his mother, the barony of Percy; and he was further created, 2 Oct. 1749, baron Warwick and earl of Northumberland, with remainder, in default of issue male, to his son-in-law, sir Hugh Smythson, and the heirs male of his body by the duke's daughter and only surviving child, Elizabeth; and again, 3d of the same month, baron Cockscomb and earl of Egremont, with remainder, on like failure of issue male of his own body, to his nephews, sir Charles Wyndham and Percy O'Brien Wyndham, sons of his sister Catherine, and the heirs male of their bodies successively. His grace m. Frances, eldest da. and co-h. of Henry Thynne, esq. only son of Thomas, viscount Weymouth, and by her had issue, an only son,

GEORGE, who d. on his travels at Bologna 11 Sept. 1744, aged 19; and an only da.

ELIZABETH, m. July 1740, sir Hugh Smythson, of Stanwick, co. York, bart.

The duke d. 7 Feb. 1750, whereupon the earldom of Northumberland, &c. descended to his son-in-law and da.; the earldom of Egremont and barony of Cockscomb devolved on his nephew, sir Charles Wyndham; and the issue male of the 1st duke of Somerset, by his second wife, becoming extinct in him, that title and the barony of Seymour (after a lapse of 214 years) became the inheritance of the elder line, which had been so unprecedently excluded in the original creation, and whose descent we now proceed to trace.

* DESCENT OF THE BARONY OF STAFFORD.

Although the barony of Stafford, to which the present peer has been admitted, was created by the patent of the 12th Sept. 1640, to sir William Howard, and Mary (sister and sole h. of Henry, lord Stafford, who d. in 1637) his wife, yet as his lordship claims the original barony of Stafford, created by the writ of summons to Edmund de Stafford, 6th Feb. 27 Edw. I. 1299, the following account of the descent of that dignity, as well as of the various titles possessed by that illustrious house, of which the baroness Mary above mentioned was the lineal heiress and representative, cannot with propriety be omitted.

From the time of the Conquest to the reign of Edward I. Robert de Stafford and his representatives were barons by tenure; and in the 27th Edward I.

EDMUND, the h. of the said Robert, was, as is stated above, summoned to parliament, when, according to existing principles on the subject, the first inheritable dignity to the heirs of his body was created. His son and h.

RALPH, was in 1351 advanced to the dignity of earl of Stafford, and by his wife, Margaret, da. and sole h. of Hugh de Audley, earl of Gloucester, (by Margaret, da. and co-h. of Gilbert de Clare, earl of Gloucester and Hertford, by Joan Plantagenet, da. of king Edward I.) had issue,

HUGH, 2d earl of Stafford, K.G. from whom the earldom and barony descended in 1403 to his grandson,

HUMPHREY STAFFORD, K.G. 6th earl, son and h. of

EDMUND, 5th earl, by Ann Plantagenet, da. and sole h. of Thomas, of Woodstock, duke of Gloucester, younger son of king Edward III.

The said HUMPHREY was, 14 Sept. 1444, created duke of Buckingham to him and his heirs male; and in the 25th Henry VI. obtained a special grant unto himself and his heirs of precedence above all dukes in England or France, excepting the blood royal; and being slain in 1460, his honours devolved on his grandson and h.

HENRY STAFFORD, K.G. and lord high constable, who was beheaded in 1483, and was succeeded by his son and h.

EDWARD STAFFORD, duke of Buckingham, earl and baron Stafford, lord high constable, and K.G. This distinguished nobleman fell a sacrifice to the tyrannical jealousy of Henry

VIII. having been beheaded and attainted in 1521.

HENRY STAFFORD, his son and h. was, by act of parliament, 1 Edward VI. restored in blood and created lord Stafford, with limitation of the dignity to the heirs male of his body; and a question of precedence having occurred, it was decided in a committee of privileges of the lords, 12 Feb. 4 and 5 Philip and Mary, that he should rank in the precedence of the original barony. By Ursula Pole, his wife, (da. of sir Richard Pole, K.G. by Margaret Plantagenet, countess of Salisbury, da. and sole h. of George, duke of Clarence, brother of Edward IV. and Richard III.) he left issue,

HENRY, his son and h. who succeeded to the dignity, and d. at Thornbury 8 April 1566, s. p. and was succeeded by his brother and h.

EDWARD STAFFORD, who d. in 1603, left issue, (by Mary, da. of Edward, earl of Derby, by Dorothy, da. of the duke of Norfolk,)

EDWARD, his son and h. who succeeded as baron Stafford. On his death, in 1625, the title devolved upon

HENRY STAFFORD, his grandson and h. (son of Edward Stafford, his eldest son, who d. *viâ patris*). Henry, lord Stafford, d. in 1637, without issue, leaving Mary, his sister and h. and who was also h. general of Edward, the last duke of Buckingham; but the barony, created by statute 1 Edward VI. devolved, agreeably to the limitation, upon

ROGER STAFFORD, son and h. of Richard, the youngest son of Henry, the restored lord; and on his demise, about the year 1640, s. p. the heirs male of the body of Henry, lord Stafford, son of Edward, duke of Buckingham, having failed, that barony became extinct.

MARY, sister of Henry, 4th lord Stafford, under that statute, and great-great-grandda. of Henry, lord Stafford, and Ursula Pole, m. sir William Howard, younger son of Thomas, earl of Arundel; and the said sir William, and Mary, his wife, were by patent, dated 12 Sept. 1640, created baron and baroness of Stafford, with remainder to the heirs male of their bodies, failing which, to the heirs of their bodies; and a grant of the same precedence as had been enjoyed by the baroness's brother, Henry, lord Stafford. But this clause having been deemed illegal, the baron was, on 11 Nov. following, apparently with the motive of giving him as high a precedence as belonged to the original barony of 27 Edward I. 1299, (*Fourth Peerage Report*, pp. 50, 51.)

advanced to the dignity of viscount of Stafford, with remainder to his heirs male. The viscount was beheaded in 1678, and being attainted, his honours were not inherited by his issue. His widow was, on the 5th Oct. 1688, created countess of Stafford for life, which title became extinct on her demise in 1693.

In the reign of James II. a bill was introduced to reverse the attainder of William, viscount Stafford, and though it was passed by the lords, and read twice and committed in the commons, yet nothing further was done on the subject. This effort having failed, the king created

HENRY STAFFORD HOWARD, the viscount's son and h. earl of Stafford, with remainder, failing his issue male, to his brothers, John and Francis, and the issue male of their bodies respectively, by patent, 5 Oct. 1688, which dignity descended to

JOHN-PAUL STAFFORD HOWARD, who dying without issue in June 1762, the issue male of the persons mentioned in the patent of 1688 failed, and the earldom consequently became extinct. On this event, the representation of William Howard, viscount and baron Stafford,

and of Mary Stafford, his wife, vested in the heirs of the body of Mary, sister of John-Paul, the last earl, of whom,

GEORGE, present lord Stafford, is the sole representative, and who is consequently heir of the bodies of viscount and viscountess Stafford, as well as of Edward Stafford, the last duke of Buckingham. His lordship is therefore undoubtedly heir in blood to the original barony, created by writ 27 Edw. I. and to the barony created by patent 11 Sept. 1640. The descent of both these dignities was, however, impeded by the attainder of the said duke in 1521, and of the said viscount in 1678; but as the latter was reversed on 17 June 1824, the house of lords resolved, on the 6th July 1825, that "SIR GEORGE JERNINGHAM HAD MADE OUT HIS CLAIM TO THE TITLE, DIGNITY, AND HONOUR OF BARON STAFFORD, UNDER CERTAIN LETTERS PATENT, BEARING DATE THE 12TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, IN THE 16TH YEAR OF THE REIGN OF KING CHARLES THE FIRST." But no decision has as yet been formed upon his claim to the original barony, created by the writ of summons to Edward Stafford in 27 Edward I.

The name of Dalrymple (which is local, and assumed from the barony of Dalrymple, co. Ayr) occurs in Scotch records as early as the 14th century.

WILLIAM DE DALRYMPLE, ancestor of the earl, had a papal dispensation, in 1450, to marry his kinswoman, Agnes Kennedy, with whom he acquired the lands of Stair-Montgomery, co. Ayr: eighth in descent from him was

JAMES DALRYMPLE, of Stair *b.* 1619; a lord of session both during the usurpation and after the restoration of king Charles II.; president of the court of session, 1671; created, 21 April 1690, viscount of Stair, and lord *Glenluce* and *Stranraer*. He *d.* 25 Nov. 1695, leaving five sons, viz.

The earl *m.* Eleanor, 4th da. of James Campbell, earl of Loudoun, and widow of James, viscount Primrose, and having no issue by his lady, (who *d.* Dec. 1750,) he, in 1747, executed a deed, nominating John, son of his 2d brother, George, to succeed to his titles and estates. He *d.* 9 May 1747, when the succession was contested by his two nephews, John, (claiming under the earl's nomination in 1747,) and James, 2d son of the earl's next brother, William. Both the claimants voted, as earl of Stair, at the election of representative peers, 1747, but the house of lords decided, 4 May 1748, "that the nomination, or appointment, dated 31 March 1747, made by John, late earl of Stair, to his honours and dignities, is not valid in law; and that the petitioner, James Dalrymple, has a right and title to the honours and dignities of earl of Stair, viscount Dalrymple, &c."

JAMES, 4th viscount and 3d earl, thus succeeded to the title, *d.* without issue 1760, and was succeeded by his elder brother,

WILLIAM, (earl of Dumfries,) 5th viscount and 4th earl of Stair, who also dying without surviving issue, 1768, the titles at length devolved upon his cousin,

JOHN, 6th viscount and 5th earl, the same who had been nominated heir to them by his uncle, the 2d earl; *m.* the da. of George Middleton, esq. banker in London; he *d.* 13 Oct. 1789, and was succeeded by his only son,

JOHN, 7th viscount and 6th earl, one of the representative peers for Scotland in several parliaments, *d.* 1 June 1821, without issue, and was succeeded by his cousin,

JOHN-WILLIAM-HENRY, 8th viscount and 7th earl, *b.* 16 Nov. 1784, *m.* 28 May 1804, Johanna, eldest da. of Charles Gordon, esq. which marriage was annulled June 1820.

The earl d. at Perth, 22 March 1640, without issue, when the earldom and other titles, created by James 2^d Feb. 1746-7, became extinct but the dignities of VISCOUNT OF STAIR, LORD GREENGLASS and STRANRAER, created 21 April 1749, devolved upon Sir James Hamilton-Dalrymple, bart. 2^d Viscount, whose descent we pursue as usual.

THE house of Grey is amongst the most ancient and most illustrious in the kingdom, tracing an uninterrupted male descent to the Conquest, and ramifying so widely, that in the reign of Henry VII. Thomas, of Groby, marquess of Dorset; George, of Ruthyn, earl of Kent; Reginald, lord Grey, of Wilton; and Henry, lord Grey, of Codnor, the heads of four distinct branches of the family, sat in the same parliament, together with Edward, viscount Lisle, a younger brother of the house of Groby. Of all these, the Groby branch alone survives in the male line, and is now represented by the earl of Stamford.

THOMAS GREY, marquess of Dorset, above named, was grandfather of HENRY, duke of Suffolk, the claim of whose children to the crown of England (derived through their mother, Frances, eldest da. and co-h. of Charles Brandon, duke of Suffolk, by Mary, queen dowager of France, sister of Henry VIII.) was eventually fatal at once to himself and his elder da. the lady Jane Grey. The attainder of the duke extinguished for a time all the honours of the family; but king James I. on his accession created sir HENRY GREY, (son of John Grey, of Pirgo, esq. and only nephew of the attainted duke,) baron Grey, of Groby; and king Charles I. advanced HENRY, 2d lord Grey, grandson and h. of the 1st, to the dignity of earl of Stamford.

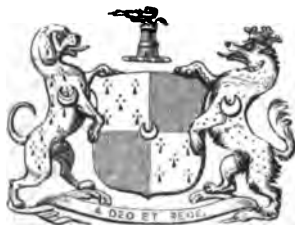

His lordship is descended from an ancient family, which was long seated at Corsham, in Wiltshire, whose arms were, azure, an esccheon argent, surrounded by six lions rampant or, as appeared by a seal then 200 years old, exhibited to the heralds at the visitation of Wilts, 1620, which coat was allowed to the younger branches.

THOMAS SMYTHE, b. circa 1522, the second son of John Smythe, of Corsham, (by Joan Brouncker), became farmer of the customs to queen Mary and queen Elizabeth. He purchased Ostenhanger and other property in Kent, and settled at Ashford. His extensive estates were still further increased by his marriage with Alice, da. and sole h. of sir Andrew Judde, of Ashford, in the same county, (lord mayor of London in 1550,) by Mary, da. and h. of sir Thomas Mirfyn. By this marriage the lords Strangford became the representatives of sir Andrew Judde, the founder of Tonbridge free-school, and eldest co-h. of sir Robert Chicheley, lord mayor of London 1411 and 1421, who was the eldest brother of Henry Chicheley, archbishop of Canterbury, and founder of All Souls' College, Oxon. Thomas Smythe, above mentioned, d. in June 1591, and was buried in his chapel at Ashford, having had issue, seven sons and six daughters. Of the sons, ANDREW, the eldest d. an infant. Sir JOHN, the 2d, was ancestor of the viscounts Strangford. Sir THOMAS, the 3d, was ambassador to Russia in 1604, and d. 1625; he m. Sarah, da. and h. of William Blount, esq. (who m. 2dly, Robert Sydney, 1st earl of Leicester,) by whom he had two sons, sir JOHN, the eldest, m. Isabella Rich, youngest da. of Robert, earl of Warwick, and left issue, Robert Smythe, of Bounds, co. Kent, who m. Dorothy Sydney, eldest da. of Robert, 2d earl of Leicester. This branch terminated in sir Sydney-Stafford Smythe, lord chief baron of the exchequer, who d. 1777. Sir Richard Smythe, of Leeds Castle, co. Kent, (the fifth son of the Customer,) d. in 1628, and on the death of his only son, sir John Smythe, in 1632, s. p. his daughters became his co-heirs.

Sir JOHN SMYTHE (eldest son of Thomas Smythe, the Customer, and Alice Judde, aforesaid) was b. 1556, and was sheriff of Kent, 42 Eliz. He m. in 1578, Elizabeth, sole da. and h. of John Fineux, esq. of Hawhouse in Herne, in that county, (son of sir John Fineux, chief justice of England,) and thereby considerably augmented his estate, obtaining the manors of Whitstable, Bonnington, North Court, and Sturry, together with the representation of the ancient family of Apulderfeld, of which Kilburne, in his Survey of Kent, says, that in his time (1650) "they could be traced for upwards of five hundred years." Sir John Smythe d. 29 Nov. 1608, and was buried with his father in Ashford church, leaving issue, two das. Katherine, m. sir Henry Baker, bart. and Elizabeth, m. sir Henry Neville, of Billingbear, co. Berks; and an only son,

Sir THOMAS SMYTHE, of Ostenhanger, and Ashford, 1st viscount, who was made knight of the Bath in 1625, and was created viscount *Strangford* 17 July 1628. He m. lady Barbara Sydney, 7th da. of Robert, 1st earl of Leicester, K.G. and niece of the memorable sir Philip Sydney, and d. at Hungerford House, in the Strand, on 30 June 1635, and was buried in his chapel at Ashford, where his

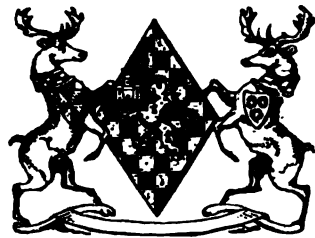

His eldest son, John, took the degree of A.M. at St. Andrews 1687, and gained the highest honours of that university; his grandson, the rev. Dr.

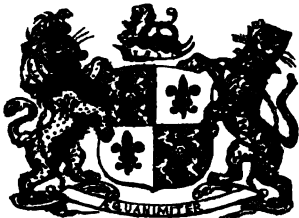

* The title of Earl of Sutherland is the most ancient of any in Great Britain, having continued, without interruption, in the lineal course of descent, for six centuries. While nearly all the other ancient Scotch titles have been changed in their destinations by resignations and new patents, this earldom has remained unaltered, and been transmitted through twenty generations, in regular order of descent, to ELIZABETH, the late countess.

WILLIAM, 1st earl of Sutherland, was great-grandson of Freskin, a Fleming, who settled in Scotland during the reign of David I. His father, Hugh Freskin, had obtained the territory of Sutherland, forfeited by the earl of Caithness, when he rebelled 1197; and he was created an earl by Alexander II. in reward of his assistance in crushing the rebellion of Gillespie, in 1228, and at the same time to balance the power of the earl of Caithness. He d. 1248, and from him the earldom descended, in an unbroken line from father to son, to

WILLIAM, 4th earl, who m. Margaret, eldest da. of king Robert I. and full sister to king David II. who erected the earldom of Sutherland into a regality, by charter, 10 Nov. 1345. From William, the title descended to

JOHN, 9th earl, who d. without issue 1514, when it devolved on his only sister,

ELIZABETH, wife of Adam Gordon, of Aboyne, 2d son of George, 2d earl of Huntly, and she was accordingly enfeoffed in the earldom 30 June 1515. On her death it descended to her grandson and heir,

JOHN, 10th earl, and from him, through a

series of eight generations, to the late countess's grandfather,

WILLIAM, 16th earl, b. 1707, m. 2 April 1734, Elizabeth Wemyss, eldest da. of David, 3d earl of Wemyss and by her (who d. 20 July 1747) had issue,

On the death of the earl without issue male, a competition arose for the title of Earl of Sutherland, between Elizabeth the late countess, sir Robert Gordon, of Gordonstoun, bart. and George Sutherland, of Force, esq.; when upon an appeal to the house of lords, it was unanimously resolved, "That the claimant, Elizabeth Sutherland, has a right to the title, honour, and dignity of the earldom of Sutherland, as heir of the body of William, who was earl of Sutherland 1275;" upon her decease, 29 Jan. 1839, the title devolved upon the duke her son, who is the 19th earl of Sutherland.

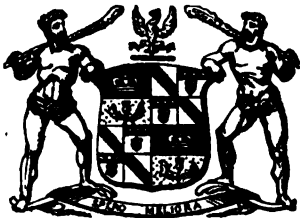

RICHARD COLLEY-WELLESLEY, MARQUESS **WELLESLEY**, of Norragh, Earl of Mornington, Viscount Wellesley, of Dangan Castle, co. Meath, and Baron Mornington, of Mornington, in the same co. in Ireland, and Baron Wellesley, of Wellesley, co. Somerset, in England, K.G. K.C. K.S.L. and D.C.L.; Custos Rotulorum of the county of Meath; born 20 June 1760; succeeded his father, Garrett, 1st earl of Mornington, 22 May 1781; created a Peer of Great Britain, by the title of Baron Wellesley, of Wellesley, co. Somerset, 20 Oct. 1797, and advanced to the dignity of Marquess Wellesley, in the Peerage of Ireland, 2 Dec.

1799. The marquess entered early into public life, was, in 1787, appointed a Lord of the Treasury, and, in 1797, Governor-General of Bengal, which situation he held till 1806. In 1809, he went Ambassador to the Central Junta of Spain, then assembled at Cadiz; and, on his return from that embassy, received the Seals of Chief Secretary of State for the Foreign Department; in 1810, he was elected K.G.; in 1821, appointed Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland; again in 1833, but resigned in 1834. The marquess married, 1st, 29 Nov. 1794, Hyacinthe-Gabrielle,



only da. of Pierre Roland, by whom (who d. 5 Nov. 1816) he had no issue. The marquess m. 2dly, 29 Oct. 1825, Marianne, eldest da. and co-h. of Richard Caton, of Maryland, North America, esq. and widow of Robert Patterson, esq.

ARMS—Quarterly: 1st and 4th, gules, a cross argent between twenty plates, five saltirewise in each quarter, WELLESLEY; 2d and 3d, or, a lion rampant gules, ducally gorged gold. **COWLEY**: over all in the centre an escoccheon of augmentation, (granted to the marquess in 1803, for his services as governor-general of India,) purple, charged with a star or estoile vert, bordered and radiated or, between eight stripes or spots of the royal tiger of Tippoo Sultaun in pairs saltirewise, also vert bordered or. **CRESTS**—1st, WELLESLEY, out of a ducal coronet or, a demi-lion rampant gules, holding a spear erect proper, thereon flowing a pennon argent, charged with the cross of St. George, and below the pennon (for augmentation granted as above) a banner purple, charged as the escoccheon in the arms, representing the banner of Tippoo Sultaun; 2d, COWLEY, a cubit arm erect habited gules, and the arm encircled by a ducal coronet or, the hand holding originally a sword, but now (for augmentation granted as above) instead of a sword a flag-staff in bend, thereon hoisted first, the union flag of Great Britain, under it the standard of Tippoo Sultaun as above described, and under it, again, the tricoloured flag of France, wrapped round the staff and grasped in the hand. **SUPPORTERS**—*Dexter*, a lion gules, ducally gorged and chained or, holding (for augmentation) a broken spear in bend, point downwards, thereon hoisted the tricoloured flag of France, and showing on the white stripe a part of the words "République Francaise," surrounded by a wreath of laurel. *Sinister*, a tiger regardant vert, striped ducally collared and chained or, and having on the forehead a Persian character implying Hydery, or the dominions of Hyder Ali, in gold, holding in the sinister fore-paw a flag-staff inverted, and resting bendwise over the shoulder, and thereon the standard of Tippoo above described. (This tiger is a representation of a piece of mechanism found among the spoils of Tippoo Sultaun in 1799, consisting of a tiger so painted and spotted preying upon a sepoy.) N.B. The original supporters of the earldom of Mornington were two lions gules, ducally gorged and chained or. **MOTTO**—"Porro unum est necessarium." Moreover, one thing is needful. Over the crest of Wellesley, a Persian character. Over the crest of Cowley, "Virtutis fortuna comes."

THE original name of this noble family was Cowley, or Colley, that of Wellesley having been assumed, as will be hereafter noticed, early in the 18th century. Walter Cowley, or Colley, was solicitor-gen. of Ireland in 1537; he was father of sir Henry Colley, of Carberry and Edenderry, who was knighted 1559: and, by Katharine, eldest da. of sir Thomas Cusacke, knt. lord chancellor of Ireland, had issue, sir George Colley, of Edenderry, his eldest son, (whose grandda. and h. Sarah, m. sir George Blundell, knt. ancestor of the viscounts Blundell,) and a second son, sir Henry Colley, of Castle Carberry, co. Kildare, whose son and h. sir Henry Colley, of Castle Carberry, was father of Dudley Colley, of the same place, who, by his second wife, Anne, da. of Henry Warren, of Grangebeg, co. Kildare, had issue, (besides other children,) Henry, his son and h.; and Elizabeth, m. Garrett Wellesley, of Dangan, co. Meath, esq. by whom she was mother of Garrett Wellesley, of Dangan, member in several parliaments for the co. Meath, who d. 23 Sept. 1728, leaving all his estates to his cousin, Richard Colley, second son of Henry, above named, on the condition of his taking the name and arms of WELLESLEY.

RICHARD COLLEY, 2d son of Henry, and grandson of Dudley, on succeeding to the estates of his cousin, Garrett Wellesley, assumed that surname, and was created, 9 July 1746, baron *Mornington*, of Mornington, co. Marquess and Earl of Wellington, Viscount Wellington, of Talavera, and of Wellington, and Baron Douro, of Wellesley, co. Somerset, P.C. Field Marshal in the Army, Constable of the Tower, and of Dover Castle, Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, Lord Lieutenant of Hampshire, Colonel of the Grenadier Guards, Colonel-in-Chief of the Rifle Brigade, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Chancellor of the University of Oxford, Master of the Corporation of the Trinity House, and late Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order

of the Bath, Grand Cross of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Knight of the Order of St. Esprit of France, Prince of Waterloo, (so created by the king and legislative body of the Netherlands, value £2000 per annum; but the gift in other respects is much enhanced, when it is considered that it is bestowed in lands and woods situated in the very theatre of his splendid victory,) Duke of Ciudad Rodrigo, and a Grandee of Spain of the First Class, Duke of Vittoria, Marquess of Torres Vedras, Count of Vimiera in Portugal, Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of the Golden Fleece, of St. Ferdinand and Merit, and of St. Januarius of the two Sicilies, Knight Grand Cross of the Imperial Military Order of Maria Theresa of Austria, Knight Grand Cross of the Imperial Orders of St. George, St. Andrew, and St. Alexander Newski of Russia, Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the Black Eagle of Prussia, Knight Grand Cross of the Portuguese Royal and Military Order of the Tower and Sword, Knight Grand Cross of the Royal and Military Order of the Sword of Sweden, Knight Grand Cross of the Orders of the Elephant of Denmark, of William of the Low Countries, of the Annunciade of Sardinia, of Maximilian Joseph of Bavaria, and of several others, a Field Marshal in the Armies of the Emperors of Austria and Russia, the Kings of Prussia, Portugal, and the Netherlands, and Captain-General of the Armies of the Queen of Spain; *born* 1 May 1769; *married*, 10 April 1806, the hon. Catherine Pakenham, 3d da. of Edward, lord Longford, (who d. before his mother, Elizabeth, in her own right countess of Longford,) and sister of Thomas, earl of Longford, K.P. and by her (who d. 24 April 1831) has issue,—1. ARTHUR, *marquess of Douro*, b. 3 Feb. 1807, lieutenant-colonel in the army, and M.P. for Norwich, m. 18 April 1839, lady Elizabeth Hay, 4th da. of George, marquess of Tweeddale;—2. THIS illustrious nobleman is the 3d surviving son of Garrett Colley-Wellesley, earl of Mornington, in the peerage of Ireland, (by Anne Hill, eldest da. of Arthur, viscount Dunganon,) and brother of Richard, marquess Wellesley, K. G. &c. &c. (See *Marquess WELLESLEY*.)

ARTHUR, duke of Wellington, born at Dangan Castle, the seat of his father, Garrett, earl of Mornington, was educated at Eton College, and having embraced a military life, first entered upon active service in 1794, when, with the rank of lieutenant-col. in the army, he commanded a brigade in the unsuccessful expedition to Holland, under the duke of York. In 1797, he went to India, acted a conspicuous part in the campaign against Tippoo Sultan, in 1799, and subsequently, when major-general, by the battle of Assaye, fought 23 Sept. 1803, established his reputation as a great commander, by utterly defeating Scindiah and the Rajah of Berar, under the most adverse circumstances. The victory of Argaum, and the storming of the almost inaccessible fortress of Gawilghar, which succeeded, produced the entire submission of Scindiah and the Rajah. Both houses of parliament voted general Wellesley their thanks for these splendid services, the king honoured him with the order of the Bath, and the inhabitants of Calcutta presented him a sword of the value of £1000.

In the autumn of 1807, he commanded the reserve of the army under lord Cathcart, against the island of Zealand. His services during this expedition, which terminated in the surrender of Copenhagen and the whole of the Danish fleet, were most conspicuous, and he received, in common with the other general officers employed on that occasion, the unanimous thanks of parliament, which were delivered to him by the speaker, in his place in the house, on his return.

In 1808, he was sent with a considerable force to Portugal, and on 18 and 21 Aug. fought and gained the battles of Rolea and Vimiera, which victories produced the evacuation of Portugal by the enemy, and the services of sir Arthur Wellesley were honoured by the unanimous thanks of both houses of parliament. In 1809 he was appointed commander-in-chief of the British forces in the Peninsula, and shortly afterwards marshal-general of the Portuguese armies. Having, by his brilliant passage of the Douro, freed Portugal a second time from the invasion of the enemy, he marched into Spain, and, on 26 July, at Talavera de la Reyna, repulsed, after a most desperate conflict, all the efforts of the enemy, directed by marshals Jourdan and Victor, and nominally commanded by Joseph Buonaparte; and for the eminent skill and valour which he exhibited in this battle, he was raised to the peerage, by the titles of baron Douro and viscount Wellington. On the meeting of parliament, in February following, the thanks

of both houses were voted to him, together with an annuity of £2000 per annum, during his own life, and the lives of his two next successors in the title. The misconduct of his Spanish associates, and the events of the war in Germany, having compelled him to retire into Portugal, he passed the year 1810 in preparing for, and accomplishing, the defence of that kingdom. It will be for history to dwell upon the proud day of Busaco, and to record the foresight which fortified the lines of Torres Vedras. Marshal Massena having been compelled by his lordship's sagacious plan to march back his exhausted army into Spain, the unanimous thanks of both houses of parliament were voted to lord viscount Wellington for the consummate ability he had displayed in the defence of Portugal. On 10 Feb. 1812, a similar honour was bestowed upon him, for the skill, decision, indefatigable exertion, and consummate judgment which he manifested at the siege of Ciudad Rodrigo, by which that important fortress was wrested from the enemy in the short space of eleven days. On the 18th of the same month (on which day the restrictions on the regency expired) a message from the prince regent was sent down to both houses of parliament, announcing his lordship's elevation to the rank of earl of Wellington, and recommending the grant of £2000 per annum in addition to the annuity formerly settled upon him, and subject to the same limitations; with which recommendation parliament most cordially complied. April 27 following, he again received the unanimous thanks of both houses for the great ability manifested by him at the siege of Badajoz, by which that important fortress was wrested from the hands of the enemy. On 22 July following, he totally defeated marshal Marmont near Salamanca, and, pursuing his success, planted, on 15 August, his victorious banners on the walls of Madrid. On the 18th of that month, he was created marquess of Wellington; received the unanimous thanks of parliament, followed up, four days afterwards, by a resolution of the house of commons, that £100,000 be granted to his majesty, to be vested in trustees, for the purchase of lands and tenements, to be annexed to, and descend with, the title of Wellington. On 21 June 1813, he gained the most complete and glorious victory near Vittoria, over the army of Joseph Buonaparte, directed by marshal Jourdan; for which achievement, which, in fact, decided the fate of Spain, he was raised from the rank of lieutenant-general to the rare and high station of field-marshal, with the universal approbation of the army and the nation, and received a letter from the hands of the prince regent, couched in the strongest language of gratitude and panegyric; and, on 7 July, both houses of parliament voted him their unanimous thanks. From 25 July to 2 Aug. his lordship was engaged in a series of actions with marshal Soult in the passes of the Pyrenees, the result of which was the defeat

of the enemy, and their retreat into France. These operations were followed by the capture of St. Sebastian, by storm, on 31 Aug. and the defeat of the enemy on the same day, on the heights of San Marcial, and the surrender of the important fortress of Pampeluna, by capitulation, 31 Oct. On 8 Nov. he again received the unanimous thanks of both houses of parliament; and having established his army on the French territory, by the successive passages of the Bidassoa, the Nivelle, and the Nive, he concluded, under the walls of Bayonne, a campaign which commenced on the frontiers of Portugal.

In 1814, he attacked marshal Soult's positions near Orthes, on 27 Feb.; and, having forced them at all points, compelled him to abandon the road to Bordeaux, to which important city he immediately pushed forward a detachment, which entered it on 12 March. For these great services, he received, for the 11th time, the unanimous thanks of parliament. On 10 April, being then unapprized of the happy events which had occurred at Paris, he again defeated marshal Soult in front of Toulouse, of which city he obtained possession on the 12th. On 23 April, a convention was concluded with France, in consequence of the restoration of the house of Bourbon; and on 3 May, his lordship received the last honorary reward in the power of a British sovereign to bestow, being on that day created marquis of Douro and duke of Wellington. On the 12th of the same month, the house of commons, in consequence of a message from the prince regent, resolved that the further sum of £400,000 should be granted to field-marshal the duke of Wellington, to be laid out in the purchase of lands and tenements to descend with the title; and in the event of the title becoming extinct, by the failure of heirs male, the estates to descend to the female descendants of his grace. On the 27th, votes of congratulation and thanks to him were unanimously passed by both houses for the 12th time. On the following day his grace was introduced into the house of lords between the dukes of Richmond and Beaufort, and having taken his seat, the resolution of the preceding evening was notified to him in a suitable eulogium by lord (chancellor) Eldon; and having expressed a wish to thank the house of commons in person, his grace was introduced on the 1st July to the representatives of the British nation, who rose to do him honour as soon as he appeared at their bar, and greeted him with the most enthusiastic cheers.

However marvellous this series of eminent services in which Providence had been pleased to crown the grandest efforts of human prudence and courage with the most unvaried success, it was but the prelude to that victory, which raised the character of this hero to a

height never before attained. The allies had no sooner withdrawn those troops, at the head of which they replaced Louis on his throne, than Buonaparte returned from Elba, and the king was once more obliged to seek refuge in the bosom of foreign states. Europe again rose, and Napoleon advanced to meet its legions: it seemed to have been ordained that the conflict which had subsisted for more than 20 years should remain undecided till the two mighty leaders who had so long electrified the world, should, for the first time, meet hand to hand, and on the 18th day of June 1815, this great conflict took place on the plains of Waterloo. To attempt to particularize any of the events of that day, the limits of this work would not allow: suffice it to say, that the duke of Wellington, seizing an opportunity which the delay of a moment might have lost, destroyed that army which had so long been the terror of Europe; clouded for ever the almost romantic fame of its leader, and crumbled his throne into dust.

A due measure of gratitude for such services could not have been rendered, but the nation did its best. On the 23d June, the thanks of both houses of parliament were once more voted to him, "for the consummate ability, (to use the very words of parliament, on the occasion,) unexampled exertion, and irresistible ardour displayed by him on the 18th of June; and on the 11th of the following month, the additional sum of £200,000 was granted to him towards the purchase of lands, and the building on them a suitable mansion; such estates to be holden by him and his heirs, in free and common socage by fealty; and rendering to his majesty, his heirs and successors, on the 18th of June in every year, at his castle of Windsor, one tricoloured flag, for all manner of rents, services, exactions, and demands.

On the death of H. R. H. the duke of York, his grace was made commander-in-chief of the forces, and so continued till 1823, when he was appointed first lord of the treasury, which office he held till 1831: upon the dissolution of the Melbourne administration in 1834, the full energies of the duke were again called into action, and until the return of sir Robert Peel from the continent, he alone exercised the functions of most of the great officers of state: upon sir Robert taking office as prime minister, his grace accepted that of secretary of state for foreign affairs, which he resigned in the following spring.

THAT the ancient and noble family of *Wemyss* is descended from the great *Macduff*, thane of Fife, who was the chief instrument of subduing the tyrant *Macbeth*, is the unanimous opinion of all the Scotch genealogists; for *John*, the younger son of the said thane, being lord of the barony of *Wemyss*, from thence his descendants assumed their surname. In 1290 sir *David Wemyss* and sir *Michael Scot* were sent to Norway by the lords of the regency in Scotland, to bring over their young queen, *Margaret*, who, to the universal misfortune of the nation, d. at the Orkneys, and thereupon happened the competition between *Baliol* and *Bruce*, about the right of succession. Temp. king *Robert I.* the aforesaid sir *David* was one of those great men in the kingdom who wrote a letter to the pope, asserting the independence of their country.

Sir *JOHN WEMYSS*, lord of that ilk, was a man of great integrity and honour, and much esteemed by *Charles I.* who created him a baronet 1625; raised him to the dignity of the peerage, by the title of lord *Wemyss*, of

Elcho, 1 April 1628; and was afterwards pleased further to dignify him with the titles of earl of *Wemyss*, lord *Elcho*, &c. 15 May 1633. Though he was a man of mild and moderate principles, he sided with the parliament in the troublesome reign of *Charles I.* By *Jane*, da. of *Patrick*, 7th lord *Grey*, he had one son and five das.; he d. 22 Nov. 1649, and was succeeded by his said son.

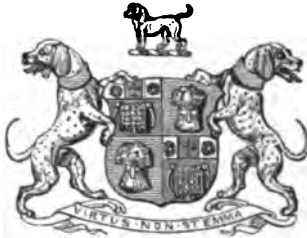

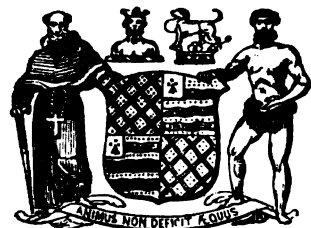

Carnarvon; P.C.; born 19 March 1782; succeeded his father, Peter, 1st lord Gwydir, 29 June 1820, and his mother, Priscilla-Barbara-Elizabeth, in the barony of Willoughby de Eresby, 29 Dec. 1828; took the surname of DRUMMOND in addition to that of BURRELL, by royal sign manual, 5 Nov. 1807, and his issue, the surname and arms of WILLOUGHBY, instead of those of BURRELL, by royal sign manual, 26 June 1829; married, 20

DESCENT OF THE BARONY OF WILLOUGHBY.

ROBERT DE WILLOUGHBY, of Eresby, co. Lincoln, (son of William de Willoughby, knt. by Alice, his wife, da. and co-heiress of John, baron Beke, of Eresby,) was summoned to parliament apparently in the barony of Beke, though by the title of "Willoughby," 7 Edward II. 1313, and the dignity continued in his male descendants till 30 Henry VI. when **ROBERT**, 5th lord, d. leaving an only da. and heiress,

JOAN, who m. **RICHARD**, lord Welles, who was afterwards summoned to parliament, as "Richard Welles de Willoughby." Their only surviving child and heiress, **JOAN**, m. **RICHARD HASTINGS**, who was summoned to parliament as "Richard Hastings de Welles," but, dying without surviving issue, the barony of Willoughby reverted to the male line, and became vested in her cousin,

WILLIAM DE WILLOUGHBY, great-grandson of Thomas, next brother of the 5th lord. He d. 1525, leaving an only da. and h.

CATHERINE, who m. 1st, Charles Brandon, duke of Suffolk, by whom she had two sons, **HENRY** and **CHARLES**, dukes of Suffolk, who both d. minors; and 2dly, Richard Bertie, by whom she had a son and heir,

PEREGRINE, who, on his mother's death, 1580, was summoned to parliament as

baron Willoughby, of Eresby, m. Mary, da. of John, and aunt and heiress of Henry Vere, earls of Oxford, by which match his son acquired the office of hereditary great chamberlain of England. He d. 1601, and was succeeded by his son,

ROBERT, who was created earl of Lindsey, and the barony of Willoughby merged in that earldom, and afterwards in the duchy of Ancaster, to which dignity Robert, 4th earl of Lindsey, was elevated 1715, and so remained till the death of Robert, 4th duke, in 1779, when the barony fell into abeyance between his sisters and co-heiresses, **PRISCILLA**, late baroness, and **GEORGINA**, marchioness of Cholmondeley, which abeyance his majesty was graciously pleased to terminate, 18 March 1780, in favour of

PRISCILLA - BARBARA - ELIZABETH, who was also (with her sister, Georgiana, marchioness Cholmondeley) joint hereditary great chamberlain of England. This high office, originally held by the Veres, earls of Oxford, passed from them to the Bertie family, with Mary, sister of Edward, and aunt of the whole blood, and heiress of Henry Vere, earl of Oxford, who d. 1625. It remained in the Bertie family till the death, in 1779, of Peregrine, 3d duke of Ancaster and Kesteven, when it fell into abeyance between his two das. and co-heiresses, and was executed on

their behalf by lady Willoughby's husband, lord Gwydir, during his life, and subsequently (during her ladyship's life) by her son, the present baron. Her ladyship was b. 16 Feb. 1761; m. 23 Feb. 1779, PETER BURRELL, esq. who was created, 16 June 1796, baron Gwydir, of Gwydir, co. Carnarvon, and had issue by him, (who d. 29 June 1820,) besides other issue, hereafter named,

PETER-ROBERT, present baron Willoughby and Gwydir.

FAMILY OF BURRELL, AND BARONY OF GWYDIR.

This family is said to have been originally of Northumberland; but Randolphus Burrell, having m. 1325, Sermonda, da. and co-heiress of sir Walter Woodland, of Devon, settled in that county. From him descended JOHN BURRELL, of Woodland, who, in 1414, furnished at his own charge, a ship, 20 men-at-arms, and 40 archers, for the war with France; he left issue, several sons, of whom WALTER, the eldest, succeeded to the estate; and Geraldus, the youngest, being bred to the church, became archdeacon and residentiary of Chichester, and vicar of Cuckfield, co. Sussex, where he acquired a considerable estate, which, at his death, 17 April 1506, he left to his nephew,

RALPH BURRELL, of Cuckfield, whose son, THOMAS BURRELL, m. Dorothy Weston, and had issue, NINIAN BURRELL, of Cuckfield, who d. 4 Sept. 1614, leaving issue, by Jane, da. of Henry Smith, of Pepper Harrow, co. Surrey, esq. who m. to Peter Courthope, of Danny, co. Sussex, esq. five sons, of whom WALTER, the eldest, m. Frances, da. of John Hooper, of Stockbury, co. Kent, esq. and had issue, nine sons, of whom TIMOTHY BURRELL, 6th son, left issue, an only child and heiress, ELIZABETH, who m. Thomas, 2d lord Trevor; and

PETER BURRELL, of Beckenham, co. Kent, 9th son of Walter Burrell, of Cuckfield, co. Sussex, by Frances Hooper, settled at Beckenham 1684, m. Isabella, 2d da. of John Merrick, of Stubbers, co. Essex, esq. by whom he had issue,

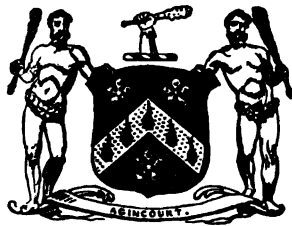

THE family of DUNDAS, in North Britain, is descended from Gospatrick, or Cospatrick, earl of Northumberland, who, 1066, went into Scotland, with king Malcolm Canmore, rather than submit to the Conqueror. King Malcolm gave him the lands of Dunbar, and many other possessions in Scotland. Weldare, his eldest son, gave the lands of Dundas, 1124, to Helias, son of his brother, Hutred, which lands are still possessed by the family, and the original charter is in their possession. Serlo de Dundas succeeded, 1170, and was succeeded by his son, Helias, 1220. Radulphus, his son,

was succeeded by Saer de Dundas, who, 1306, was compelled to swear allegiance to Edward, king of England, for his lands in Mid-Lothian, and for his lands of Fingask, co. Perth. He was succeeded by his son, sir Hugh Dundas, who was companion to sir William Wallace in defence of his country. He d. temp. king Robert de Bruce, and George Dundas, his son, succeeded him, and was killed at the battle of Dupplin; he was succeeded by his son, James de Dundas, who resigned the barony of Fingask to king David, and got a new charter to his son, John de Dundas, 1364, to be

held of the king as honourably as his predecessors did. John, his son, got a charter from king Robert, 1371, of the said barony, which was confirmed by Murdoch, duke of Albany, governor of Scotland, in the absence of king James I. dated 24 May 1430, which is to his heirs male by Christian Stuart, da. to Inermait and Lorn, by Christian, sister to the said duke of Albany; 1431, he was succeeded by his eldest son, James, m. Elizabeth, da. of lord Colvill, of Cleish, by whom he had Archibald, his son and heir, returned to Perth, 8 Feb. 1606, in the barony of Fingaak; he m. Jane, sister to the 1st earl of Southesk, by whom he had sir John Dundas, of Dundas, who had a son, John who succeeded 1670, m. THE DORMANT AND EXTINCT PEERAGES OF IRELAND.

THE early parliaments of Ireland, like those of England, consisted of the greater barons and tenants of the crown in capite; the first enrolment of writs for the holding of a parliament in Ireland is to be found on the close roll of the third year of king Edward II. (1309); the principle, however, upon which the writs issued, and the nature of the dignities which they conferred, are involved in considerable obscurity, and it is extremely difficult to distinguish between barons by tenure and barons by writ in the early periods of Irish history. In the following List, therefore, of the Extinct Irish Peerage, the Editor has thought proper to separate it into two portions, the first part containing the names of all persons said to be summoned by writ, or holding per baroniam between the years 1172 and the 20th year of king Richard II. (1397,) when barons were created by patent. The names of those to whom parliamentary writs are known to have issued are printed in *Italics*, in order to distinguish them from others who were only summoned to attend upon the king with horse and arms. The date has reference to the writ, and the star (*) signifies that such titles are borne by existing peers of Ireland.

The second part comprehends all dukedoms, marquessates, earldoms, and viscounties that have become extinct or forfeited from the period of the earliest creations of the respective dignities, and all baronies that have originated in letters patent.

ORDER OF THE GARTER.



THE MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE GARTER.

INSTITUTED BY EDWARD III. 19 JANUARY 1344.

THE habit and ensigns of the Order are a surcoat, garter, mantle, hood, George, collar, cap, and feathers: the first four were assigned by the founder, Edward III.; the others by Henry VIII. The motto on the garter and star is, *HONI SOIT QUI MAL Y PENSE*—"Dishonoured be he who thinks ill of it." The garter is of blue velvet, bordered with gold. The George is the figure of St. George on horseback, in armour, encountering a dragon with a tilting spear, the whole of gold, enamelled, and may be enriched with jewels, at the pleasure of the possessor; it is worn across the left shoulder, pendent to a dark or garter-blue riband. The collar is of gold, weighing thirty ounces, troy weight, and contains twenty-six garters, enamelled proper, in each a rose gules, and as many knots, enamelled white, to which is pendent the George, as above. Charles I. ordained that the knights should always, in public wear, embroidered on the left side of their coats or cloaks, the cross of St. George, surmounted with the garter, with rays of silver, forming a star of eight points.

At a chapter, held 3 June 1786, a new statute was passed, ordaining, that in future the Order should consist of the sovereign and twenty-five knights, exclusive of the sons of his majesty, or his successors, who have been or shall be elected knights of the same most noble order.

At a chapter, held 17 January 1805, a statute was passed, ordaining, that the Order shall consist of the sovereign and twenty-five knights, together with such lineal descendants of king GEORGE II. as had been, and might be elected; always excepting the PRINCE OF WALES, who is a constituent part of the original institution.

By a statute, dated 23 June 1831, it was declared, that the Order should thenceforth consist of the sovereign, and twenty-five knights companions, and such lineal descendants of king GEORGE I. as had been, and might thereafter be elected into the same.

ORDER OF THE THISTLE.



THE MOST ANCIENT AND MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE THISTLE.

THIS ancient Order is said to have been instituted by king Achaius, and the collar was added by king James V. The institution having however fallen into desuetude, king James II. in May 1687, revived it, and it was finally re-established by queen Anne, 31 Dec. 1703. In Feb. 1714-15, king George I. confirmed the statutes of queen Anne, and added others, particularly that of making rays of glory to surround the figure of St. Andrew, which is suspended to the collar; and his majesty was pleased, in 1717, to order, that, in future, chapters of election should be held in the royal presence; and that the order should consist of the sovereign and twelve knights. By statute 8 May 1827, this number was extended to sixteen.

The star is worn on the left side of the coat or cloak, and consists of a St. Andrew's cross of silver embroidery, with rays going out betwixt the points of the cross; on the middle thereof a thistle of gold and green, upon a field of green, and round the thistle and field a circle of gold, having on it the following motto of the order, in letters of green:—*NEMO ME IMPUNE LACESSIT*—(No man injures me with impunity.) The badge or jewel is worn pendent to a green riband over the left shoulder, and tied under the arm; it consists of the image of St. Andrew, with the cross before, enamelled and chased on rays of gold, the cross and feet resting upon a ground of enamelled green; and on the back, enamelled on a green ground, a thistle, gold and green, the flower reddish, with the before-mentioned motto round. The collar consists of thistles, and sprigs of rue growing betwixt, and at the middle thereof, shall be hung before the image of St. Andrew, as above; the whole of gold enamelled.

N.B. There being no installation of this Order, the Knight wears the collar and star immediately after his investiture.

ORDER OF ST. PATRICK.



THE MOST ILLUSTRIOUS ORDER OF ST. PATRICK.

THE Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick was instituted by king George III. Feb. 5, 1783, during the Vice-Royalty of George-Grenville-Nugent Temple, 1st Marquess of Buckingham, K.G. To consist of the sovereign, a grand master, a prince of the blood royal, and thirteen knights, making in the whole sixteen, and seven officers. The lord-lieutenant for the time being is the grand master; in 1833, by statute, the number of knights was increased to twenty-two.

The star is a cross saltire of red on a field argent, surmounted with a trefoil proper, charged with three imperial crowns of gold, within a circle of gold, with the motto,—*QUIS SEPARABIT*; M.DCC.LXXXIII.—("who shall separate?"); the whole surmounted with eight rays of silver; this is embroidered on the left side of the coat or cloak. The collar is of pure gold, composed of six harps and five roses, alternately joined together by twelve knots. In the centre before is a crown, to which is pendent the badge or jewel of the Order, of gold, enamelled, similar to the star, with the exception of the rays.
