



#### HISTORY OF HARMAR SCHOOL

Harmar Street and Harmar School were both named for tieneral Harmar, who had charge of the frontier troops of the United States about 125 years ago. At that time the country surrounding Fort Wayne was a wilderness and not more than four or five people lived outside of Fort Wayne within a radius of 100 miles from this city. Fort Wayne could then only be approached by hoat on the rivers or by Indian trails. A battle was fought by General Harmar with the Indians at the foot of Harmar Street—formerly called Harmar Ford—which crosses the river to Lakeside.

In 1868 the School Trustees, who were at that time Pliny Hoagland, A. P. Edgerton and O. P. Morgan, purchased from Horace and Elizabeth Hanna lots 318, 319 and 320, Hanna's Addition, for \$1,700,00, to be used for school purposes. An old frame building, located where the Old High School now stands, was removed and placed on these lots in 1870.

Only one teacher was employed at that time, but the number of scholars having increased two rooms were added in 1871. For a number of years this answered the purpose, but the city having increased rapidly in this direction it was found necessary to erect a new school.

The Trustees employed as architects Sutermeister and Birkner to make plans for the new eight-room school. The contract for building the same was let to Charles G. French on April 1, 1876, for \$11,487,00. The old building standing on the ground was sold to Frederick J. Hayden for \$125,00, who sold it to W. D. Page. He removed it to Jefferson Street and after remodeling the same lived there until he permanently left the city to reside in California.

The school was opened in the fall of 1876 with an enrollment of 89 girls and 90 boys, with classes in the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Grades. The Principal was Nettie Marks, assisted by Margaret Armstrong, Anna Payne, Mary Abel, Marietta M. Lewis and Clara A. Bowen. The Principal received \$650,00 per year for salary and the teachers received salaries ranging from \$360,00 to \$500,00 each. Susan A. Gavin was jabitress and received \$20,00 per month for her services.

In 1893 it was found necessary to furnish additional room for the increasing number of scholars and Messis, Moritz, Morgan and Hoffman, Trustees, ordered a four-room addition creeted, and awarded the contract to William Moellering for \$4.88.00. This building continued to be used until it was found that the enrollment continued to increase, and that the building was obsolete, and the Trustees decided it was necessary to creet the present building.

The present curollment of pupils—exclusive of the Vocational School—is 507; divided, boys 245, girls 262. The present building is the finest ward school in the city of Fort Wayne and architects from different parts of the country have examined it with the view of utilizing some of the new ideas incorporated in the building. Griffith and Fair were the architects and the building complete will cost about \$150,000,00. The School Trustees are proud of it and I am sure that the citizens of Fort Wayne are also.
