

Mrs. Skeel believes that an imperfect copy in NYP. having pp. 5-19, (1), may represent her second suggested edition. Her comparison shows differences between it and both issues of the 1805 edition. The Albany Institute Catalogue, 1855, lists "Hymen's Recruiting Sergeant," Nos. I and II, Philadelphia, 1802, but they can not now be located in the portion of the library acquired by NYS.

One of the features distinguishing the second issue of the 1805 edition from the first issue is that in the advertisement on the last page there is no hyphen between the words "Twelve" and "Cents" and no apostrophe after "Cents." For other dif-

Although the text of this anonymous work is quite different from that of the later editions with Weems' name on their titles, Mrs. Skeel shows that these two issues and the German version printed by Bartgis in 1809, see Lebensbeschreibung und merkwürdige Handlungen, above, are practically the same work. The latter has

been attributed to Weems. Quotations from the author's correspondence with Carey, the Philadelphia publisher, are given to show that he had already been working on Washington in 1799.

Correspondence of the author with Carey, the Philadelphia printer and publisher, in April, 1800, shows Weems asking him to print the book, the title being briefly quoted approximately as above. See Skeel, pp. 7–9. This edition quotes the prophecy of Rev. Samuel Davies as to Washington's being preserved to accomplish some service for his country, included in a sermon delivered soon after Braddock's defeat in 1755. See our no. 18763, vol. 5.

This is not true, as the acts of the synod show. It was composed by the deputies and the committee of those two classes, after conference with Weiss and Reiff, and based on their statements. It, therefore, emphasizes the needs of the two congregations for which Weiss and Reiff were appointed to collect, Philadelphia and Shippack, and entirely ignores all the congregations of Bæhm."

According to J. H. Dubbs' "Reformed Church in Pennsylvania," 1902, p. 343, Good, who died in 1924, owned a copy of the pamphlet.

This is undoubtedly the work to which Appleton refers as "An Account and Instruction relating to the Colony and Church of Pennsylvania, made up by the Deputies of the Synod of South Holland, (Amsterdam, 1730)." Appleton states that Weiss also published "a pamphlet concerning his arrangements with the classis of Amsterdam to care for the Germans in Pennsylvania (1731)," but we have found no other reference to such a work.

I., June 6, 1915, laid in the NYP. copy, Harcourt says that the reprint was probably made on the press owned originally by John Carter and that it was undoubtedly printed after May 20, 1809, because it uses the round s and on that

date Carter discontinued the use of the long s.

Miss Catherine C. Quinn of the John Carter Brown Library states that the copy of the reprint in that library has the inscription: "Theodore Foster, presented to him by Gabriel Allen at Providence Monday August 15. 18 (?) at the Post Office." Allen was the son-in-law of West whom he succeeded as postmaster upon West's death in 1813. He himself died in 1824. The only year between 1813 and 1824 in which August 15 fell upon Monday was 1814. This fixes the year of presentation of the Jcb. copy and suggests that the pamphlet may have been issued soon after West's death in August 1813.

WEST-INDISCHE COMPAGNIE.

The Dutch West India Company was chartered under this name in 1621. It was later known as the Generale Geoctroyeerde Nederlandsche West-Indische Companyie. The company was reorganized under a new charter of 1674 and dissolved in 1794.

The following list of printed documents, of publications of the company, and of title entries relating to the company, does not aim to be complete. It is hoped that the most important of the many titles which might be entered here will be included. Our entries should be supplemented by other bibliographical aides. The most important of these is G. M. Asher's "Bibliographical and Historical Essay on the Dutch Books and Pamphlets relating to New-Netherlands and to the Dutch West-India Company," Amsterdam, 1854-1867. The catalogues of Frederik Muller published in Amsterdam, especially those of 1872 and 1875, our no. 51281, vol. 12, P. A. Tiele's "Bibliotheek van Nederlandsche Pamfletten," Amsterdam, 1858-1861, and W. P. C. On the verso is a letter recommending the work to the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, signed by the Lords of Council, and dated "the last day of Iune 1621." The second leaf contains "The names of some, who haue to vndertaken to helpe and advance his Maiesties Plantation in the New-found-land," signed "R. W." This information appears on leaves A-A2 in the 1623 edition. For an impression of the leaves, with signature marks 1-12, see notes on the 1620 edition, above, and Discourse containing a Loving Invitation, below.

This edition includes A Discovrse containing a Loving Invitation, also printed separately, see below. At the end, pp. 15, are a number of letters from Avalon, the unsuccessful colony founded in Newfoundland by Sir George Calvert before under-

Henry N. Stevens suggests that this is the first edition since of the list of twentythree errata at the end of the "Tenent" edition, fourteen are correctly printed in this "Tenet" edition and nine incorrectly. He believes that nine errors are common to both editions and fourteen additional errors were made in the reprinting for the "Tenent" edition. It would also seem that the "Tenet" spelling was corrected to "Tenent" since the latter spelling was used eight years later in "The Bloody Tenent yet More Bloody." A plea for religious toleration in place of tenet, or "tenent," of persecution, also for the separation of church and state. The work includes a reprint of the arguments of a religious prisoner in Newgate (John Murton?) written sur-reptitiously in milk, smuggled out, and printed in "A most Humble Supplication of many of the King's Majesty's Loyal Subjects . . . who are persecuted (only for differing in religion)," signed by "your majesty's loyal subjects not for fear only, but for concience' sake, Unjustly called Ana-baptists," printed in 1620. This had been sent to John Cotton some years before, and his reply to it, now apparently first published, "bloody" in contrast to the milk of the prisoner's writing, precedes Williams' answer to Cotton. The last part is an answer to a work, which Williams attributes in part to Cotton, but which the latter had no part in, see his "Bloudy Tenent Washed," 1647, p. 192.

Reasons are also given for believing that the Request was consistent with Phillips' later life and writings.
