



INTRODUCTION.

THE first work of the Canterbury and York Society very appropriately has been that of printing what, perhaps, is the earliest known episcopal record, the rolls of Bishop Hugh of Lincoln, which date from the time of King John. No other diocese is known to possess any earlier continuous series of Bishops' registers, unless it may be those of the Archiepiscopal See of York, which, it is said, commence in the year 1214. In considering these ancient records, we are compelled to ask how it is that we have none of an earlier period than the thirteenth century. Records of the twelfth century belonging to the King's Courts still exist, and many of them have been printed, but any continuous record of the business of the various dioceses for this early period appears to be absolutely wanting. It seems impossible to come to any other conclusion than that it was not customary to keep any continuous official record of the episcopal business of the sees. Had the contrary been the case, it is in the highest degree improbable that, in some one diocese or another, some fragments of earlier records would not have remained to us to contradict the assumption that the Bishops kept no journal of their official acts. The neglect to preserve written evidence of the Bishops' doings must at times have led to serious inconvenience, and even, it may be, to fraud. If ordinations took place without any list of the names of the candidates being kept, it is easy to realize that there would be no efficient check upon the assumption of clerical privileges by persons wholly unqualified. Disputes must have arisen as to right of patronage. So it must have been with the pensions and other deductions which at this period were so often paid out of the benefices, and, again, as to the relative rights of rectors and vicars. Many indications of these uncertainties will be found in the rolls of Bishop Hugh de Welles; and the uncertainty there must have been as to the vicarial rights is evidenced by the book of Ordinations of Vicarages, generally known as the *Liber Antiquus*, of Bishop Hugh, which was printed a few years ago. The conclusion, then, which is forced upon us is that no continuous episcopal registers were kept until the time of Bishop Hugh the Second, and that previously it was needful, for

evidence of fact, to rely upon oral testimony and upon such documentary evidence as the parties interested happened to retain in their possession, just as was the case with baptisms and marriages, until the institution of parish registers at the much later date of 1538. That the important reform of instituting a register of the Episcopal Acts at Lincoln was due to the energetic administration of Bishop Hugh, the second of that name, seems most probable. As evidence in favour of that view we may note that the commencement of the extant rolls is subsequent to the date when he entered upon full control of his diocese; the compilation of the *Liber Antiquus*, dealing with vicarages, which placed on record the actual state of appropriated benefices, was undertaken by this Bishop; also the internal evidence of the rolls themselves seems to show that the Bishop's Clerk or Registrar, while giving an accurate record of each transaction, failed at first to realize the necessity of dating his record, and by his failure to recognize that with so extensive a diocese some local subdivision of the records was imperative.

The earlier membranes of what is doubtless the earliest of the Lincoln rolls differ in handwriting, in arrangement, and also in size of parchment, and it must be regarded as uncertain whether they are in their correct sequence. With the exception of those on membrane 2 (vol. i, p. 2), all the entries are written presumably in their chronological order without any indication of the districts, whether county or archdeaconry, to which the entries belong, a deficiency which at times in the case of commoner names, such as Stoke, Weston, and the like, has rendered identification not always an easy task. Moreover the earlier entries are undated. On membrane 2, which contains twenty-two institutions, all the entries, also presumably in chronological order, have the county prefixed to each, a circumstance which seems to suggest that this particular membrane, also of a different width, may belong to Roll 12, a dated roll, in which also the counties are similarly indicated. As this roll bears the definite date "annus decimus", *i.e.*, 1219, it seems probable that by then experience had taught the Registrar the advantage of marking his entries in the margin with the name of the counties to which they belonged. On the conclusion of the roll of that year a further improvement evidently suggested itself to the Registrar, for henceforward we have separate rolls for each archdeaconry, and they are dated regularly by the year of Bishop Hugh's consecration. The advantage of more exact dating was not yet realized. There is no

further clue to the age of the undated rolls, save that allusion to a pension arising out of All Saints' Church, Oxford, proves, on reference to a clerical grant preserved in the *Liber Antiquus*, that it is not earlier than the Bishop's sixth year, viz., 1215. And this agrees with what we might conclude, from comparing the number of entries on the undated membranes with those of the tenth year.

It is certain that there has been a considerable loss of Bishop's records, for there are many references to the charter rolls of the various Archdeaconries, but of these only the roll for Northampton is extant. This loss is the more to be regretted as it is evident that the charter rolls must have been of far greater interest than the rolls of institutions. Amongst the records of Bishop Hugh is the small quarto volume, known as the *Liber Antiquus*, evidently prepared from the rolls in that form, as being more convenient for reference. Its contents deal with the ordination of vicarages, a subject which forms a marked feature of Bishop Hugh's episcopate. Doubtless these ordinations at first were inscribed on rolls of which only the Lincoln Roll remains.

The records of Bishop Hugh of Lincoln, which have come down to our day, and are deposited in the muniment room in a detached tower within the precincts of the Bishop's Palace, on the south side of Lincoln Cathedral, may be placed in three classes : Institutions of the Clergy to their benefices, Appointments of Vicarages, and, thirdly, the Charter Rolls. With the exception of the small quarto parchment volume, in a comparatively modern binding, the *Liber Antiquus* mentioned above, all these records are in the form of continuous rolls of parchment, with the exception of No. II, which consists of five rotulets,¹ and such as have survived are mostly in excellent condition, as a rule quite legible, though written usually in a somewhat minute handwriting with the words, as was common at that period, much abbreviated. Ten of these rolls deal chiefly with the clerical institutions, though it will be seen that some few other transactions occasionally appear upon the dorso. The Quinque Rotuli contain particulars of vicarages created in the Archdeaconries of Oxford, Bedford, Huntingdon, Buckingham, Stowe, and Northampton, while the *Liber Antiquus* is a record of similar character put together in the form of a bound volume. Probably the Quinque Rotuli are somewhat earlier in date than the *Liber Antiquus*.

The Charter Roll of Northampton Archdeaconry, 1220 to 1235,

is perhaps the most interesting of all these records, since there is in it a greater variety of subject matter than is the case with the rolls of institutions or the ordinations of vicarages. It is evident from the occasional references to charter rolls amongst the institutions that the other Archdeaconries also possessed similar records, which have long since perished.

At some recent period these various rolls have been collected together and arbitrarily numbered without regard either to sequence or date. In the present printed volumes these numbers have been retained for reasons of convenience of reference.

Re-arranged they may be placed in the following sequence :—

10. All the archdeaconries of a date before the tenth year of Bishop Hugh's Episcopate, which began 1209.
12. All the archdeaconries of the tenth year, about 1219.
 - 1a. Lincoln, 1220-34.

The Bishop seems to have had a general record compiled of the churches in his diocese in the eleventh year of his episcopate, i.e., in 1220, but only the roll of the Archdeaconry of Lincoln is now extant. This roll commences with the five Churches and the Chapel of St. Sepulchre of the City of Leicester, as in early times it was sometimes called, possibly a faint tradition of the Roman occupation, while the remainder are divided amongst the deaneries of Guthlaxton, Sparkinhoe, Akeley, Goscote, and Gartree.

The entry of each church usually gives the name of the patron, the rector, and any vicar, and by what Bishop or Archdeacon they were instituted, what chapels are attached, and by whom they were served, and what outgoings there were to the regular clergy and others. Most of the clergy had been instituted by Bishop Hugh, or his predecessor, St. Hugh, who ruled the see from 1186 to 1203, some few by William de Blo, who was Bishop for two or three years only, and some by the Archdeacons in the three years'

vacancy of the see which preceded Bishop Hugh's appointment in 1209. Only one or two of the clergy whose livings became vacant in 1220 had held them in the time of Walter de Constance, who ceased to be Bishop some thirty-four years earlier, though obviously it may be that we shall find in the rolls of the next Episcopate that some few survived to the days of Grosseteste, his successor.

As regards the manner in which the records are now presented to the reader it may be noted that the contractions of the original have throughout been extended instead of using "record" type, a decision which most readers will doubtless appreciate; *c*, *u*, and *i* have been rendered as *t*, *v*, and *j*, where modern usage requires it; and capitals have been used throughout for proper names. Short headnotes have been given as a ready guide to the contents of the record, though they do not supersede the necessity of consulting the latin text. In the headnotes the names of places have been rendered by their modern equivalents, and the counties added, but it was thought advisable to leave the surnames as they appear in the record itself.

All the records of Bishop Hugh have now been printed by the Canterbury and York Society, save the *Liber Antiquus*, which was edited by the late Mr. A. Gibbons, in 1888.

BISHOP HUGH DE WELLES.

Bishop Hugh, called also "Secundus", to distinguish him from his predecessor, Saint Hugh of Lincoln, who was Bishop of the diocese from 1186 to 1203, succeeded William de Blo, who held the see for the short period of two years from 1204 to 1206. It is said that he was brother of Joscelin Trotman, who was elected Bishop of Bath and Wells in 1206, and that himself had held the office of Treasurer of Wells, from which circumstance he was known as Hugh de Welles. His patronymic is well known in Gloucestershire, and most, if not all, of those who bear it descend from the family of Trotman long settled at Cam in that county, whose pedigree has been traced back by John Smith of Nibley, the seventeenth century historian of that part of Gloucestershire, to the reign of Edward II; but what evidence there may be for the assertion that the patronymic of the Bishop's family was Trotman does not occur in these Rolls. Bishop Hugh died 7 Feb. 1234-5.

THE DIOCESE OF LINCOLN.

At this period, and, indeed, for long after, the diocese of Lincoln was of enormous extent, being the largest diocese in the

kingdom, and reaching from the Humber to the Thames, and including the whole of Lincolnshire, Leicestershire, Rutland, Northamptonshire, Huntingdonshire, Bedfordshire, Buckinghamshire, and Oxfordshire, with part of Hertfordshire. It was divided into eight Archdeaconries : Lincoln, Stow, Leicester, Northampton (which included Rutland), Bedford, Buckingham, Oxford, and Huntingdon, to which last appertained a few parishes in Hertfordshire.

HISTORICAL ALLUSIONS.

The references to current events are not very numerous in these rolls, but a few may be noted. The Bishop's attendance at the Lateran Council, in 1215, and his return therefrom, is referred to in a letter from the official of the diocese, in membrane 12, showing the date of these first membranes must be between that year and 1218, which last date is indicated in the reference to an entry about a pension issuing out of All Saints, Oxford, which is recorded on membrane 2, printed on page 5. The *Liber Antiquus* contains a composition relating to certain churches in the Archdeaconry of Stowe, made in the fifth year of the episcopate, *i.e.*, 1214, but it seems probable that the actual date of the membranes commences with the return of the Bishop, *viz.*, in 1215.

There are several allusions to the struggle between King John and the Barons. William de Malebise, the patron of Enderby, was suspected of having been with the Barons, and the Bishop declined to institute his nominee until he was satisfied as to his loyalty. Evidence was given that as he had been wholly paralyzed for two years he could not have aided the Barons, and so the Bishop was satisfied.

The "general sentence" of excommunication is mentioned on membrane 6 (I, 37), and we are told expressly that the patron of Kegworth was involved in it, because he stood with the Barons against the King. At Glooston, the presentation to the chapel was rendered null because the patron, H. de Harington, had been captured at Lincoln, and was involved in the general sentence of excommunication against the Barons, but it evidently was regarded as a technical difficulty only, for the Bishop collated the patron's nominee as soon as the living had been vacant six months.

Several cases are recorded in which the institution of the nominee was delayed for political reasons. The institution of Elias de Sutton to the church of Claxby, in Lincolnshire, was postponed

until it should appear "an presentator ejus fuerit cum baronibus contra Regem" (p. 18).

The patrons of Shipton on Cherwell and North Luffenham were also excommunicated. Brand, one of the Canons of St. Paul's, was patron of a mediety of Coddington, Bedfordshire, but excommunicated for siding with the Barons, so the Papal Legate exercised the rights of presentation, and nominated a nephew of the late Abbot of Beaulieu.

So Sir G. de Hole, patron of Claypole and Hole, was excommunicated, but though the Bishop presented, the patron's rights were expressly reserved.

John de Beauchamp, rector of a mediety of Houghton Conquest, was excommunicated by the Pope for "manifold contumacy" and deprived of all preferment.

At Ruskington, the clerk, Manasser, who was presented, had done "many evil deeds in the time of the war", and was directed to clear himself before the Archdeacon.

At Claxby, full institution to the benefice was refused until enquiry was made whether the patron had sided with the Barons.

REFERENCES TO KING JOHN.

On the same membrane as that which proves that Bishop Hugh attended the Lateran Council is a reference to a gift by John, *late* King of England. He is first referred to in membrane 2 as "King of England", though not by name. Yet, in membrane 6 (I, 32), we find "Dominus Johannes rex", presenting to the church of Stoke, in Oxfordshire. On membrane 8 we have "Johannes, quondam Rex Anglie"; yet in membrane 12 "Johannes Rex Anglorum" is recorded as presenting the Treasurer of Poitou to Finedon in Northamptonshire. These discrepancies lead to the conclusion that the various membranes are no longer in their correct order, although we may feel sure that no portion of the roll is earlier than 1215, or possibly 1214.

In 1233 Master Ralph, of Norwich, received a dispensation from Pope Honorius III to hold two additional benefices. This was done at the request of King Henry, in recognition of his services in respect of the royal obsequies, presumably those of King John. As he was paid out of the Royal Exchequer an annual payment of £20, it may be suggested that the term obsequies included all subsequent religious offices, and not merely the funeral.

We have also some passing references to the *late* King John,

in the case of Brand, already mentioned, who sided with the Barons, and in consequence became excommunicate. On one of the membranes, I, 140, is indorsed a bond, dated in 1219, by which the Bishop of Lincoln and the Bishop of Bath and Glastonbury undertook to repay, at Paris, a loan of 700 marks which the Cardinal Legate had made to them for the use of their cathedrals. Unless the form of this document was a deliberate concealment of its real nature we have here a transaction directly contrary to what the Legate Gualo's financial relations with England are generally supposed to have been.

KING HENRY.

On membrane 5, I, 28, we have a passing allusion to Henricus Rex, and presumably he and not King John is twice referred to as Dominus Rex, on membranes 10 and 11, I, 83, 89.

THE PAPAL LEGATE GUALO.

The activity of the Papal Legate Gualo is constantly exhibited in these rolls. He gave advice when technical questions arose, as in the case of Oxenden rectory, when it was doubted whether Luke could be instituted because he was already beneficed. Gualo held that he might be, as he had been presented prior to the holding of the Lateran Council, which forbade pluralities. In the case of Ridlington and Preston rectories, he directed some special inquiries to be made in addition to the usual one made by the Archdeacon before institution, but the record gives no hint as to their nature. Peter de Hersefeld was presented to Pitsford by a patron who had obtained a grant of the land belonging to the excommunicated G. Malesoures. Before matters were declared in order for institution, letters were sent to the official by the Legate and King Henry, the former being first mentioned. A similar position arose in the case of Whitchurch, and then the order of the Legate seems to have sufficed. Much the same happened at Layton and North Luffenham. Usually the Bishop collated to any vacant benefice when a patron failed to present; in the case of Hoby the Legate directed the Bishop's official to induct Ralph de Hoby. His certificate of having done so recites Gualo's order. This course was adopted at St. John, Oxford, and at Caddington, the patrons there being excommunicate. At Kegworth the Legate gave dispensation for the induction of a minor, but it may be noted the rectory was evidently a sinecure, for there was a resident vicar. When Gilbert de Innocentibus, the Dean of the City of Lincoln, was presented to the distant rectory of Edlesborough, he gave him

letters of dispensation from the usual formalities. He also gave a dispensation in respect of Sutton in Lincolnshire, and also for Ormesby, Wraysbury, Grainthorpe, Croxby, Steeple Aston, and Aldenham. It was the Legate, not the Bishop, who deprived Alexander de Sutton of Stockton rectory. Robert Passelow was instituted to Swanbourne by dispensation of the Legate. At Fine-don, Geoffrey de Thoars was instituted by order of the Legate. When William de Ponte was deprived of St. Peter ad Pleas the Bishop collated another, but it was by the authority of the Legate. When the Pope deprived John de Beauchamp of Houghton Conquest, the Legate collated his successor. When some question arose about some sextaries of salt at Wainfleet, the Legate addressed a letter to the Bishop. Master Richard de Brackele on being presented to Thimbleby comes under the rule of the Council unless he exhibits letters of dispensation from Gualo, the late Legate.

CRUSADERS.

There are various passing allusions to the Crusaders. We have note of the death of a crusader, Master E. de Melles, who held a rectorial mediety at Welbourn in Lincolnshire.

Philip de Panton, a clerk and a crusader, presented to Roxsley, is enjoined to present himself for ordination as soon as he has fulfilled his vow.

At Wing, in Buckinghamshire, the presentee was an intending crusader, and the Bishop directed that he was to be ordained deacon unless he was obliged to set out on his journey before that could be effected.

In 1221 we have mention of the crusaders' privilege as granted by the General Council in the case of Sir Hugh de Bolonia, his property was taken into the Bishop's keeping for protection.

And two similar cases are recorded in 1227, when the same notification was made with regard to the church and property of the rectors of Draughton and Litchborough, for the space of three years.

FORMULAE.

The formulae followed in these records of institutions varies but little. In the earlier membranes the record is at full length, while later on the Bishop's Registrar ventures upon contracting it, and satisfying himself with the words "et cetera" for phrases in constant use. Usually the record simply states that the patron who is named has presented such and such a person to the living, then comes a recital that the Archdeacon, as the Bishop's official, has

held an enquiry. There follows a declaration that everything is in order, *liquidum, clarum, or in expedito* being the words chiefly used. If there be any adverse claim to the patronage, or any obligation that another is entitled to by virtue of a prior presentation, it is so stated, and particulars are given of any injunction placed upon the presentee by the Bishop. The record finishes with an order to the Archdeacon to put the clerk in possession of the benefice, particulars of which, when a vicarage, are often added together with a note of the liabilities of the vicar.

EXCOMMUNICATION.

Various references to excommunication are to be found. When this happened in respect of a patron, appointments to livings were made subject to his rights on returning to the church. In the case of an unidentified church, Eaton, it is expressly stated that the patron had been absolved from the sentence of excommunication, under which he lay, before his presentation was accepted.

OATHS.

Some few references to the sanction of the oath occur in these rolls. Doubt arose as to whether Elias de Sutton was not a pluralist, and the record tells us that he was *paratus jurare*, that he was not beneficed. Richard de More swore, *juravit*, that he would faithfully administer the living of Morton on behalf of his clerk, Ledger Piparde. The oath of canonical obedience, *juramentum de exhibenda canonica obedientia*, is referred to in one case, because Philip, the new rector of Brigsley, had omitted to swear obedience before the Bishop; *obedientiam non juravit*. The Bishop, who very narrowly criticised the numerous claims to pensions from benefices, often forbade a presentee to pay any such pensions, and enforced his order by administering an oath. Thus Baldwin, who was presented by Bardsey Abbey to Hagworthingham, swore before the Bishop, *tactis sacrosanctis evangeliis*, that he would pay no pension to the monks. In 1230 the Prior of Brooke promised canonical obedience to the Bishop, *inspectis sacrosanctis evangeliis*; and the same phrase is used in a later entry, when the Bishop confirmed the grant of a charity in Polebrook; and other similar examples of the method of administering an oath are to be found in these rolls. It is thus clear from these passages that by ancient usage an oath taken with the Holy Gospels before one was quite valid, and that the adequacy of an oath does not depend upon actual contact with a volume of the gospels, much less that kissing the book, the most emphatic form of reverence, was a

necessity of the ceremony, although the contrary idea obtained such firm hold in modern English judicial practice that it required an Act of Parliament before deponents were allowed to take an oath in any other mode.

VERIFICATION OF SEALS.

An illustration of the importance of the Seal in early times is shown by an entry in the Northampton charters, which records the institution, in 1228, of Thomas de Longueville as Prior of St. Andrew's, Northampton. Four witnesses were called to prove the authenticity of the seal attached to the letters of presentation; two of them, one the new prior himself, stated that they had seen the seal affixed to the document, and the others spoke generally to their knowledge of it. Finally, the record carefully describes the devices and inscriptions on the seal and the counterseal.

APPEALS TO ROME.

Of these we have an illustration in a matrimonial case in 1223, when the Bishop, to whom the question had been referred by the King, adjudged that Hugh de Chastillun and Gunnora de Bray were lawfully married. Against this sentence Hugh de Chastillun appealed to the Pope. In 1231 the Abbot of Croyland and his fellow judges had confirmed a claim made by the Prior of St. Andrew, Northampton, for an increase of the pension paid him by the rector of St. Mary, Northampton. The Bishop appealed to the Apostolic see on the ground that such pensions ought not to be increased without his assent.

PRESCRIPTION.

Prescriptive rights were admitted in proof of claims to the payment of pensions out of the rectories. These are frequently mentioned, and without the sanction of the Bishop a pension was never allowed unless it was *debita et antiqua*, and it seems to have been regarded as "ancient" when it had been received for a period of forty years. This period is expressly stated as the reason for allowing a pension of ten marks for St. Giles, Northampton, to the Priory of St. Andrew. Similarly, Scotter, in Lincolnshire, had for forty years paid a pension to the Abbot of Peterborough, and in 1220 we are told that Clapton paid, for the like period, 25*s.* 8*d.* to St. Neot's.

EPISCOPAL VISITATION.

In the Buckingham Roll a very detailed account is given of the official visitation of the Bishop to Tichford Priory, where he

was received with a solemn procession, and afterwards preached to the brethren in the chapter house.

CLERICAL LEARNING.

Usually the status of the presentee to each rectory, vicarage, or portion is carefully stated, whether he be "clericus", "capellanus", "acolitus", "diaconus", "decanus", "phisicus", or "medicus", and if, presumably, the presentee were a graduate he is dignified with the title "magister". Among other ranks mentioned in these rolls may be noted subdeacons, monks, deans, and canons. It was by no means a matter of course that the presentee to a living was in holy orders. Great laxity as to this prevailed, and it is not quite easy to determine whether it was due to a scarcity of suitable candidates or to more corrupt reasons.

A remarkable feature of these records is the large number of cases in which it was needful to enjoin upon the presentees that they must attend the schools. This injunction seems to have been given whenever the Bishop suspected that their standard of learning was inadequate for their position as clergymen. Sometimes the Bishop postponed institution until the clerk had proved his competence. Of this the first instance in the Register of such an order is an interesting example. One William Malebise presented his son to the church of Enderby in Lincolnshire, but the Bishop, though he gave him a temporary charge over the church, postponed his institution until the following Easter, when, after attendance at the schools, he was to be examined as to his competence in literature and singing. At Heyford in Oxfordshire, the new rector had licence to attend the schools for three years, studying Holy Scripture and canon law. At Ewelme in the same county, Ralph Bloet, the new rector, was enjoined to learn music. At Caldecote, Hunts, the rector had to attend the school and to learn to chant, and the Archdeacon was directed to see that he did, while the welfare of the parishioners was cared for by the injunction that he should appoint a suitable chaplain. At Diddington in Hunts, again, the rector was enjoined to attend the schools, with the usual penalty of deprivation if he failed to do so. At Bilsby in Lincolnshire, a presentee, a clerk, was rejected because he was nearly illiterate, and no opportunity given him to remedy his ignorance. In the case of Hugh of Scalby, the rector of Cold Hanworth, about whom there are two entries, his institution was postponed to give him the chance of study and to practice chanting. Subsequently, on being examined by the Bishop, he was again found to be

"minus sufficiens" in literature, but was given the charge of the church until the following Easter. At Kislingbury, David of Ermentiers, who had been presented by the Queen, was ordered to attend the schools under pain of losing his benefice. At Chellington, Beds, the new rector was to attend the schools and to seek orders at the next ordination. At Little Loughton, Bucks, Reginald, the clerk, had an indulgence of twelve months for attending the schools. At Great Steeping, Lincolnshire, the rector was "minus litteratus", and was ordered to frequent the schools. So, too, at Lusby and Odell. At Langton by Spilsby, Eustace, described as a clerk, was "minoris etatis", yet he was instituted parson of this place, whilst to one Henry, who was appointed chaplain there for five years, was entrusted the duty of looking after the lad and finding necessaries for him in the schools.

But it is not certain that the descriptions of the clergy can always be relied upon, for in the charter roll of the Northampton archdeaconry many described as simply clerks in the institutions are there noted as of definitely higher rank.

In the archdeaconry of Oxford we find instances where the presentees were directed to attend the schools. At Drayton by Banbury, in the fourteenth year, Sir Thomas de Arderne presented Roger de Arderne, an acolyte. Evidently he failed to attend the schools and suffered deprivation, for in the following year the patron presented another illiterate acolyte. Ensham Abbey presented a subdeacon to Sarsden, who was enjoined to attend the schools. At Kencot and Broughton Pogis presentees, subdeacons, were to attend the schools, and after a year to come up for examination. Subdeacons were presented to Blechingdon and Kiddington, and were placed under the same injunction. In the Oxford archdeaconry we have in the sixteen years of the record one hundred and fifty-six presentations, and of these only thirteen are described as "masters".

Of injunctions to attend the schools there are further instances at Braunston, Aldwincle, Bowden, Wadenhoe, Maidford, Plumpton, and Marston Trussell. At Titchmarsh and Hargrave, in addition to attending the schools, the presentees were to learn to chant. At Roade and Pilton illiterates were rejected by decree. At Thorneby and at Roade the presentees were to attend the schools for a year, and then to appear before the official for examination. Of the Pilton case we learn full particulars in the Northampton Charter Roll. The presentee, evidently a relative of the patron, was enjoined after a prescribed period to

present himself for examination. This he neglected to do, even though specially summoned for the purpose. Ultimately he submitted himself to the Bishop, who, commiserating his poverty, caused him to be examined three times, twice at Leicester and once at Peterborough, with the result that ultimately he was found "omnino insufficiens", and he was rejected. This period of probation lasted over four years.

At Chalfont St. Giles the clerk, nominated by Bradwell Priory, being "minus sufficienter litteratus", was enjoined to frequent the schools, and the Archdeacon was to report to the Bishop if he failed to do so.

Sometimes the injunction to attend the schools was specially emphatic. Thus, Thomas Basset, an acolyte, presented by Leicester Abbey to Clay Coton in 1224, was to attend the schools continuously during the Bishop's pleasure, and if he failed he was to resign all his right in the church. John de [Peter] Burgh, subdeacon, the Abbey nominee to Oundle, was to frequent the schools "et addiscat". So also John de Rowell, acolyte. Hugh de Tichemers, the rector of Titchmarsh, was to attend the schools and to learn to chant. At Roade the presentation of Peter Lupus was cancelled for insufficient learning. But five years later Robert Lupus again presented Peter Lupus to this same advowson, which had been vacated by Robert de Neville. Apparently he could not have employed the long interval very profitably, for he was enjoined to attend the schools and to be examined at the end of a year.

William de Clendone, subdeacon, parson of Rushton St. Peter, was under an oath to attend the schools, and, after a year, to report his progress to the Bishop. Richard Trussel, subdeacon, at Marston Trussell, under like oath, was to attend the schools. At Pilton in Rutland, the patron had presented his brother to the living, and he was rejected by sentence "propter litterature insufficientiam", not being given, apparently, the opportunity of attending the schools. At Wadenhoe, Sir Henry de Ver's presentee, Henry de Lenn', a clerk, was to attend the school "et addiscat". At Maidford, Ralph, a subdeacon, was to attend the schools. Robert de Dagenhale, the new rector of Thornby, was to attend the schools for a year, and then was to present himself for examination before the official. Simon de Northampton, presented to the chapel of Plumpton, is to attend the schools and learn. Henry de Rand, subdeacon, parson of Hargrave, was to attend the schools and to learn especially chanting. Simon de

Dingele, parson of East Farndon, was enjoined to attend the schools, and was sworn to do so. At Edgecote, in 1222, the呈tee was to attend the schools and to be ordained subdeacon, but he was allowed to postpone doing so because he was "juvenis et scolaris". Robert le Mansel, subdeacon, rector of Soulsbury, was to attend the schools and study for a year, and then to be examined; if he failed, he was to appoint a competent vicar. Henry de Becke, instituted to Little Woolston, had an indulgence for a year to attend the schools, and then to be ordained priest. At Braunston, William de Nevill had a general injunction to attend the schools and to be ordained.

At Bletchingdon the new rector, who was a subdeacon, was to attend the schools. At Kiddington, Robert la Warre, subdeacon, was to attend the schools and to study. Wm. de Neville being "minus sufficienter litteratus", undertook to attend the schools, and the Bishop directed the official to report to him if he failed to do so. At Adstock the rector, Robert de Vernun, was under age, and a vicar was appointed, with the proviso that if he died within seven years Robert should appoint another, but if the vicar survived that period it should not be needful for him to appoint another, although he might be still studying in the schools. The little church of Grove was held by Elias, a subdeacon, who was to be ordained deacon at the next ordination, and to frequent the school for three years, appointing a suitable chaplain to officiate. Apparently it was at times needful to take special precaution that the injunction to attend the schools was observed, for as to Shenley a sentence of deprivation was passed in advance on William Mansel in case he failed to do so.

The chaplain appointed to Wrangle had an indulgence to study theology for a year. From the entry of the presentation of a clerk to the rectory of Horsendon, it appears to have been the duty of the Bishop's official to supervise the various parsons and vicars who had been enjoined to attend the schools, and it is clear that these student incumbents were obliged to submit themselves to examiners appointed by the Bishop.

The clerical standard seems to have been highest in Stowe archdeaconry. Out of some eighty-five presentations, forty-five seem to have been chaplains, and only twelve were described as "clerks", while but six are noted as being masters.

A somewhat similar proportion of masters is found in Northampton archdeaconry, there being twenty out of two hundred and fifty-one presentees.

In Buckingham archdeaconry, out of one hundred and thirty-eight, we find only five masters, a smaller proportion than in Oxford.

In Huntingdon, which included part of Hertfordshire, we find ten masters out of some seventy-two presentations.

In Bedford archdeaconry, out of some one hundred and six presentees, only nine are described as masters.

In Lincoln archdeaconry we find about four hundred and ten presentations, and of these thirty-seven were to masters.

CLERICAL PRECEDENCE.

A note contributed by Mr. Salter, and printed on the wrapper of Part VIII, may properly find a permanent position here:—

“The Bishop’s charter rolls, like the King’s, contained lists of witnesses, and perhaps the witnesses on our roll are its most important part. It enables us to make several additions to Le Neve (ed. Hardy, 3 vols.). We can insert a new name in the list of the archdeacons of Bucks; for a William followed William Blesensis (see p. 190). We may add a Matthew, archdeacon of Oxford in 1221, hitherto unknown (see p. 192); and we can date more accurately those whose names were already ascertained. It is also possible to advance some way towards recovering the list of canons in 1220-1235.

“There can be no doubt that the names of the canons are arranged on a definite system of precedence, the same sequence of names being found repeatedly. Part of the system is clear from the list on p. 235, vol. i; those canons who were in priest’s orders form the first class and are described as ‘capellani’; the two other classes were those in deacon’s and sub-deacon’s orders. Even where their orders are not given it is evident that priests are granted precedence. Further, in each class, a person’s precedence depended upon the length of time that he had been a canon. Thus in the list on p. 235 the five sub-deacons rank in this way: Theobald de Boselle and Roger de Bohun were canons before Feb. 1219 (*Liber Antiq.*, p. 92); Amauricus de Buggedene was made a canon between July 11 and Nov. 25, 1222; Richard de Wendoure on some date before Aug. 9, 1229; Richard de Oxonia between Oct. 5 and Dec. 30, 1228. We find the same result if we go through the list of deacons; William de Winchcombe, the last of them, obtained his canonry between Aug. 25, 1225, and May 20, 1226; Radulfus de Waraville, who is next above him, was canon on Mar. 27, 1222, but not on Nov. 22, 1221. When a canon

received higher orders and passed from one class to another he retained his original precedence; thus on April 12, 1221, William de Avalon was either a deacon or sub-deacon (see p. 191); also Mar. 20, 1226; by April 9, 1230, he is a priest, and ranks above Robert de Gravele and Stephen de Cicestria, who were priests on Mar. 20, 1226. Occasionally the scribe makes an error in the order of names, as is only human: thus, p. 213, Amauricus de Buggedene ought to have been nearly last in the list, but he is placed next to William de Lincolnia, probably in order that one word ‘magistris’ may cover both. Again on p. 235, Theobald de Cantia was some stages senior to Richard de Cantia, but the scribe placed them together for the sake of brevity.

“It may be observed that the word ‘magister’, unlike the word ‘dominus’, was not a mere title of respect; certain names always have it, others always lack it. No doubt it describes one who had been through a university. Also the word ‘capellanus’ evidently does not mean ‘chaplain’ in the ordinary sense of the word; it does not denote one who was lower than a rector or vicar, but is used as equivalent to ‘sacerdos’ or ‘presbyter’, and has this significance in all the rolls of Bishop Hugh de Welles.”

THE SCHOOLS.

The frequent reference to “the schools” naturally invites the question as to the locality in which they were situated. Unfortunately the rolls tell us little on this point. Presumably, in many cases they were at Oxford, then within the diocese. But this was not invariably so, for in 1232 John de Dustone, a chaplain, presented by the Priory of St. Andrew to the church of St. Bartholomew, Northampton, was directed to spend a year attending the schools at Northampton, and then to report his progress to the Archdeacon.

In 1228 the witnesses of the institution of the new Prior of St. Andrew’s, Northampton, included twelve “masters”, who are definitely described as “Scolares Oxonienses”. These were:—

Henricus de Welles,	Ricardus le Deveneis,
Helias de Glovernia,	Johannes de Nortone,
Galfridus de Glovernia,	Walter de Prestcote,
Henricus Teissum,	Lucas de Oxonia,
Ralph de Eboraco,	Pascasius de Wintonia,
Willelmus de Eboraco,	Adam de Benintone.

Hugh de Carletone could not be instituted to Barnack because he was studying in the schools at Paris, and the Bishop

required him to produce a certificate of good conduct from the masters there.

Walter, parson of Stoke in Oxfordshire, had a licence to attend the schools "beyond the seas"

We may, perhaps, infer that the fact that the rural dean was to see that Hugh de Scalbey, rector of Cold Hanworth, attended the schools indicated a reference to the existence of the schools which existed at Lincoln, and of which, in 1220, we find definite mention when the vicar of Bardney, although apparently in priest's orders, was directed to attend there for two years and to study theology. During that period, with the Archdeacon's advice, he was to nominate a suitable chaplain to serve in Bardney Church. In 1221, Master John de Berwick was granted a similar indulgence for studying at the Lincoln schools.

CLERICAL CELIBACY.

There are occasionally references to the enforcement upon the clergy of the rule of strict celibacy, and even when a cleric was stated to have contracted a marriage he was directed to put his wife away, and the Archdeacon was directed to report to the Bishop should he fail to do so. It cannot be doubted that other cases, in which there is reference to the concubines of the clergy, indicate clerical marriage and their unwillingness to comply with the celibate rule, rather than mere immorality. In some cases the Bishop contented himself with a simple injunction. At Little Dalby the rector, who had been nominated by the Prioress of Langley, admitted that he had openly kept a concubine, and was directed to put her away before the Bishop would grant him the charge of his church. Further, he was ordered to enter into a bond before the Official that he would do so. A similar order, though in less stringent terms, was made against the rector of Eastwell in Leicestershire. In the case of Alan, the vicar of Ashwell, the name, Annora, of the lady is given, and he is ordered to enter into a bond, with the heavy penalty of thirty marks, to discontinue the acquaintance.

Richard de Newenham, the rector of Sandy, is said to have contracted matrimony and binds himself in a penalty of fifteen marks to put his wife wholly away. The Archdeacon is to see to this, and to report to the Bishop any infringement of the undertaking. A singular point arose in the case of the vicarage of Shillington. Stephen, the rector, presented to the vicarage one Master Stephen de Eketon or Ekintone. Presumably, the

similarity of the name raised local suspicions, as the Bishop did not institute Master Stephen until it was shown that he was born in lawful wedlock and was not the son of the parson. In the case of the chapelry of Well an unusual obstacle to the institution of William de Well occurred, for the official was directed to ascertain how the patron, also named William de Well, was comporting himself towards his wife before he made his enquiries as to the regularity of the nomination.

The living of Woughton was also vacated because Luke de Kamis had married publicly, "publice uxorem duxit," but there is no hint that his marriage was regarded as illegal.

In 1227 Richard, chaplain of Great Kimble, was deprived by decree for the offence of incontinence. An unusual charge was brought against the new rector of Paulerspury in respect of a lady stated to be his aunt, but on enquiry he was able to clear himself from the allegation made.

At Kirtlington, near Oxford, Jordan the vicar was warned that deprivation of his vicarage would follow should he be again reported in respect to a lady living in that village.

A warning to dissociate himself from a woman whose reputation was questioned was given to the rector of St. Michael's, Stamford, in 1220.

FOREIGN PRIESTS.

Of the struggle to exclude foreigners from English benefices there are many traces, and the care the Bishop had for the welfare of the parishes is illustrated in the cases in which foreigners were presented. At Whitchurch, Oxon, a rector was presented whose vicar apparently was an alien, not even a priest, and while he was directed to be ordained and to serve his cure personally, he was to provide himself with an assistant chaplain who could minister to the parishioners in a language known to them. As a further example may be mentioned the presentation of Peter, the nephew of the Cardinal Deacon of St. Angelus at Rome, who received possession of Wardley, Rutland, but as an absentee by his proctor, Vincent de Bec.

In 1226, on the order of the Pope, the Bishop arranged for the retirement of the Precentor of Lincoln from the Church of Morton Pinkny in favour of Master Guy de Aricio, who thereupon farmed the church to the patrons, the Convent of Ashby, for twenty-four marks annually. The chaplain to be appointed by the Convent was to be subject to the Bishop's approval. The covenant by the Convent for the payment of this pension was dated 14 February

1226, and is recorded at length in the charter roll for the Northampton archdeaconry.

Constantly we meet with references in which the Bishop directs that the clerk instituted shall minister personally to the parishioners. There seems to have been a very considerable tendency for each person appointed to perform his duties by deputy. The rector would draw his pension, or simply allow the amount for a vicar fixed by the Bishop's appointment, and the vicar again would have his assistant curate.

PATRONAGE.

The subject of patronage receives much illustration from these rolls. It was divided mainly into two great classes, those advowsons which were in the hands of the landowners, and those over which the religious houses had gained control. The cases in which the Bishop was the true patron seem to be extremely few, though there are many in which he collated in nominating an incumbent by reason of the patrons being unknown. Indeed, the modern practice of the Bishops holding livings in gross, apart from the property of the see, was apparently unknown in the thirteenth century, and the idea of severance of the advowsons from the ownership of the land, probably arose from the practice of the monastic orders obtaining the patronage of a living whenever opportunity offered. How far, in making these acquisitions, they may have been influenced by mere motives of gain for their houses, or by higher motives of affording to the churches the superior benefits of their regular organisation, it would be difficult to say. However it may have been when the practice of monastic bodies acquiring rights of patronage first arose, it is clear that at the beginning of the thirteenth century the advowsons were regarded by the regular clergy as but a means to enrich their respective orders, and the principal feature of Bishop Hugh's rule over the see of Lincoln was his insistence that adequate maintenance should be secured to the clergy who personally served the churches, and by his steady refusal to permit the payment of pensions unless the same were proved to be "due and ancient", or unless his sanction to the payment had been obtained. Often he found it needful to specially enjoin the incumbent not to pay the pension claimed without the episcopal sanction being first obtained. It is evident that in some cases he feared collusion between the religious houses and their nominees. But one salient feature stands out with regard to the endowment of the rectories. It is certain that they were regarded chiefly as sources of profit to those who owned

these rights of presentation. Pensions might be acquired by the religious houses, the living might be split up into various portions, forming medietyes, and separate rectories and vicarages could be created—often mere sinecures, too often with evident disregard of the necessities of the priest actually officiating. It was to combat this tendency that Bishop Hugh directed his efforts to secure for the parish clergy adequate stipends out of the endowments belonging to the rectories. The results are seen in the *Liber Antiquus*, and the rolls in which are recorded the ordinances of the Bishop, which settled what the vicars were to receive and what were their liabilities. The adequate maintenance of the clergy secured, the patrons appear to have been at liberty to deal with the surplus income of the rectories much as they pleased by the creation of pensions charged thereon. Presumably the tithes and other emoluments increased at a greater ratio than the needs of the clergy, thus creating a surplus income.

The church having no need for this surplus, it was therefore alienated to other objects, though presumably it was open to the Bishop to make fresh ordinances when the vicar's stipend was insufficient. Had the principle underlying the policy of Bishop Hugh been adhered to, in later times we should not have seen the spectacle of lay rectors drawing large incomes, whilst the stipends of the vicars, remaining at some fixed inelastic figure, by lapse of time became utterly inadequate. Obviously under the policy of Bishop Hugh the vicarial stipends would have been revised as necessity required. The policy of the lay rectors was to treat the vicars' stipends as unalterable, whilst they secured the unearned increment.

Primarily, no doubt, all the patronage was in lay hands, or, perhaps, more correctly speaking, was annexed to the ownership of property. The acquisition of the rectories by the monastic societies early altered this, and perhaps largely tended to the severance of the advowsons from the manors. In the presentations recorded in the rolls now printed the patronage was divided :—

The King,	Religious Houses,	Lay Owners,
The Queen,	English,	including ladies,
The Bishop,	Foreign,	Patrons unknown.

The Bishop, as such, seems rarely to have been possessed of patronage, except in the case of his own manors. The modern idea tending to entrust patronage to the Bishops had clearly not then arisen, and most of the examples of the appointment of clergy by the Bishop to benefices occurred in consequence of the lay patrons

failing to present to the benefice. Even then it was not necessarily a foregone conclusion that the Bishop should present, for at Gayton the Earl of Chester presented as chief lord of the fee on an occasion when the actual patron was excommunicate.

DISPUTED PATRONAGE.

It must suffice to give only a few from amongst the very numerous instances of disputed patronage which occur in these rolls.

At Maidwell, in the institution of Hugh de Maidwell, presented by Sir Alan de Maidwell, some question arose as to the patronage of the chapelry of Kelmarsh. It was to remain in the Bishop's hand pending decision of the point. Subsequently, Sir Alan having proved his right in the King's Court, the chapelry was restored to the rector. Nothing appears as to Sir Alan's opponent.

At Abington, on the presentation of Peter de Irencestre, the king's letters were produced showing that as the result of an assize of darrein presentment at Northampton, Nicholas de Bassingborn, the defendant, had granted the presentation to the Lady Isabella de Lusurs.

In 1225 Master Simon de Messindon was collated by the Bishop to Desborough, with a reservation of any patronage rights. Subsequently William Bardene and his wife Agnes produced the king's letter, showing that Godfrey Augwin had quit-claimed to them the advowson, though it does not appear whether it was the result of a hostile suit or merely the levying of an ordinary fine.

At Great Creaton there was a double dispute as to the patronage. Hugh de Whichinton and his wife Sarah brought an assize of darrein presentment against Richard de Yokes, but he granted the presentation to them. The dispute did not then end, for they had to issue a writ of "Quare impedit" against Eve de Creaton, which resulted in a judgment in their favour. This lady was presumably a relative, for the rector, William de Creaton, is expressly stated to be a son of the patron.

In 1227 the Prior of Wurspringe set up a claim to Bulwick Church, but he had to quit-claim it in the King's Court in favour of William de Cantilupe, and Vitalis withdrew the appeal he had entered on behalf of the Prior.

At Great Harrowden, Master Richard de Kent was collated by the Bishop, and subsequently presented by the Abbot of Sulby. The church of Little Harrowden was claimed by Richard de

Loches in an assize of darrein presentment at Northampton, but the Abbot made good his claim to this also, and Richard de Kent obtained this church as well.

In the case of Oxendene, the account of the dispute is somewhat fuller, for we are told that in the proceedings in an assize of darrein presentment, the deforciant, Richard de Clendone, acknowledged that the Abbot of Cirencester had presented the last incumbent.

An assize of darrein presentment between the Prior of Lenton and Amauric de Nowers, respecting the advowson of Irchester, resulted in favour of the Prior.

Richard de Deseburge, as guardian of his late wife's son and heir, recovered Hargrave advowson against the Prior of St. John of Jerusalem in an assize of darrein presentment.

The advowson of East Carlton was in dispute before the justices at Westminster, in an assize of darrein presentment between Ralph the son of Reginald, who made good his claim, and the Abbot of St. James of Northampton, and Hugh de Pateshille. At Church Brampton the same Abbot was again the loser in another assize of darrein presentment, which Peter Pycot had brought.

William de Gimeges, in the King's Court at Westminster, recovered seizin of the church of Bradden from Walter de Bradden.

THE JUDGES.

Although we have so many references to litigation respecting rights of advowson in the King's Court, it is but rarely that the names of the judges are given. In the dispute about Irchester we are told that an assize of darrein presentment was heard before David de Eisseby, Robert de Salceto, Richard Gubiun, and John de Ulecote. A similar dispute about Goxhill came before William de Welle, Simon de Ropp', Roger de St. Martin, and Theobald Haultam', justiciars. This list supplies us with five names of judges not mentioned in Foss's *Judges of England*, viz., David de Eisseby, Richard Gubiun, Simon de Ropp', Roger de St. Martin, and Theobald Haultam'.

LOST CHURCHES.

These rolls contain references to churches which have long since disappeared. One of these is Creslow, still a parish, though now having but one inhabited dwelling, the Manor House; the fabric of the little church is still to be seen, though long since desecrated and given over to secular uses. Asterley, Estrelega, a

daughter church of Kiddington in Oxfordshire, no longer exists. Of Lashbrook, a chapelry in Shiplake parish, all traces have long since disappeared. It was unendowed at the time the vicarage of Shiplake was constituted, but the Knight of Lashbrook was to be induced, if possible, to provide for the chaplain there. There is a subsequent record that Peter, son of Roger, did make such a provision, but it may be suspected that his endowment was inadequate or else discontinued by his successors. Little Loughton in Bucks is now consolidated with Loughton Magna, and its church destroyed. Ridgemont, Bedfordshire, anciently known as Segenhoe, has also lost its church, while a similar instance is to be found at Dunsthorpe, a lost vill in Haveringham in Lincolnshire.

PRIVATE CHAPELS.

On the charter rolls appear licences to maintain chantries in private houses. As examples of this two instances may be given: permission given to Sir William de Insula to have a chantry in a chapel to be erected within his manor house at Brampton Ash. For this the consent of the Rector and patrons was obtained, and the relations of the chapel to the parish church rigidly defined on the Bishop's charter. Again, at Catesby, permission was given by a charter, of which the terms are preserved to us, to Ralph de Normanville to have a chapel in his court house at Newbold. All rights of the parish church were reserved, and Ralph and his family were to attend the parish church on certain specified feasts, and at the death of his wife the privilege of the private chapel was to cease. So also at Great Addington, Baldwin de Ver built a private chapel within his own precincts, at the same time making liberal gifts of land to the parish church.

BRIDGES.

In the thirteenth century bridges were built and maintained out of the alms given by those who used them, and with the object of encouraging these gifts it was customary for the Bishop to issue letters commanding such works to the faithful, and promising so many days' release, varying in length, from penance enjoined. Such collection of alms was to be made only at the bridge, and the privilege was limited to a fixed term, often three years. Several of these letters are preserved in the Northampton charter rolls, and amongst the bridges thus privileged were Wansford, Rockingham, Thrapstone, Staples, Bretford, Brampton, and Aynho.

For the construction and maintenance of Staples bridge at

Wellingborough in 1227 thirteen days' remission of penance was granted; during a three-year period Rockingham bridge had a similar privilege granted in 1219, though the fact is only known to us by a recital when it was renewed in 1226. It was also renewed in 1229. These grants must have been for short periods, for it was renewed for three years, with a remission of thirteen days, in 1230, with a provision that the collection was limited to the parish of Rockingham.

In 1219 a remission of seven days' penance was allowed to all travellers giving alms for the building and maintenance of Brampton bridge, and this was to last for a year.

So, in 1221, a remission of ten days' penance was granted to all crossing Wansford bridge who gave alms for its reparation, a privilege limited to two years and confined to the town of Wansford. A similar remission of ten days was granted in the case of Thrapstone bridge in 1224. Here the privilege was limited to a year, and there was to be no general collection of alms by any "nuntius" or preacher. A year after the expiry of this licence, in 1226, the privilege was renewed in similar terms, but for the longer period of three years, and here, and also in the case of Aynho bridge, the collections were only to be made at the bridge itself. It was renewed for three years in 1226. In 1226, for Bretford bridge, the remission was limited to seven days, but it was to last for three years, and a similar prohibition for any general collection was here also enjoined.

ECCLESIASTICAL ENDOWMENTS.

The greater part of the endowments of the churches had been in existence long before the date of these records, but what traces of new endowments are found in Bishop Hugh's rolls show that they were voluntary in their origin. We have seen above that the knight of Lashbrooke, in Shiplake parish, was to be persuaded to make provision for the little chapel there. In 1230, the Bishop of Lincoln, who possessed a windmill at Kilsby, granted to the Rector of the parish, by deed, a tithe of it. All Saints' Church, Northampton, in 1232 evidently depended, as churches still do, for its building and repair upon the charitable contributions of the people, only in those days the episcopal exhortations to almsgiving were supplemented by promise of relaxations from any penances imposed. A similar record is given as to Abingdon Church.

Baldwin de Ver, when building his private chapel at Addington, mentioned above, gave six acres of land to the rectory, and in

1230 we have a very interesting account of no less than twenty-three separate gifts of land, by as many various owners, for the maintenance of a chaplain at the altar of St. Mary, at Redmile, in Leicestershire. And the Bishop gave instructions to the Archdeacon to see that these gifts were clearly written both in his own roll and also in the missal of Redmile Church.

What notes have been made in this introduction respecting the contents of these rolls, possibly at too great a length, must not be regarded as exhausting all subjects of interest, but rather as an indication of the information which the student may learn from the careful perusal of these early records. No attempt has been made to illustrate the history of the See or the life of Bishop Hugh by reference to other contemporary authorities.

It is a needful and pleasant duty to acknowledge valuable help rendered in the work of printing these rolls of Bishop Hugh de Welles. At the outset Prebendary Hingeston-Randolph, whose experience as editor of so many volumes of the episcopal records at Exeter rendered his advice of more than ordinary worth, gave invaluable service in perusing the proofs and making suggestive comments thereon.

The Rev. H. E. Salter transcribed and edited the rolls for the Archdeaconry of Oxford, which are printed in Volume ii, pp. 1-47, and also the Northampton charter roll, Volume ii, pp. 183-272. He also collated the greater part of Volume iii.

The Rev. L. P. Fedden transcribed the rolls of the Archdeaconry of Huntingdon, Volume iii, pp. 32-54. The Rev. W. O. Massingbird gave valuable help by checking the identification, not always an easy task, of the place-names in the roll for Stow, i, 211, and in the Lincoln roll, iii, pp. 55-128. Similar help was given by the Rev. R. M. Serjeantson in respect of the rolls for Northampton, Bedford, and Huntingdon, and Mr. A. P. Moore did the same for the Leicester roll. The Rev. Canon Foster undertook the collation of the Leicester Matriculus.

The Rev. F. N. Davis transcribed and edited the roll of Lincoln vicarages, iii, pp. 55-92, the Stow roll, i, pp. 211, and was generally responsible for the editorial work of the latter part of Volume ii, and for the whole of Volume iii.

Miss E. Stokes and Miss M. Cox also rendered valuable professional help in transcribing the rolls printed in Volume i, as

likewise did Mrs. New of Oxford, for pages 97 to 218 in Volume iii.

It may be noted that to facilitate the work of transcription the rolls were temporarily deposited at the Public Record Office by leave of the deputy-keeper, Sir H. Maxwell Lyte, and at the Bodleian Library by permission of Mr. E. W. B. Nicholson, Bodley's Librarian.

Finally, the reader's gratitude is due to the Bishop of Lincoln for his permission to thus render available to the student these records of his remote predecessors, which are of such remarkable interest to the student of the medieval history of the Church of England.
