They are all incorporated by different charters. The Coopers and Dyers sit by sufferance at the Convener's Board. The Trades possess the exclusive privilege of manufacture within the royalty. JUSTICE OF PEACE COURT.—This Court is held every Monday, at eleven o'clock, for decision of claims not exceeding £5; and immediately afterwards the determination of questions under other branches of their jurisdiction, such as violations of the excise, or game laws, &c. The Quarter Sessions are held on the first Tuesdays of March, May, and August, and the last Tuesday of October. *Clerk*, David Shaw; *Depute*, John M'Murtrie; *Procurator-Fiscal*, J. F. COMMISSIONERS OF SUPPLY.—The Commissioners are appointed by Act of Parliament for assessing the Land Tax and County Rates. Their general meeting is always held on the 30th of April, unless when it falls on a Sunday. The qualification necessary for a Commissioner of Supply is £100 Scots of valued rent, either in property, superiority, or life-rent. The Commissioners have the power of dividing or coalescing all lands valued in the valuation-roll of the county. The rogue-money, formerly levied by the freeholders, was transferred into the hands of the Commissioners of Supply by the Scots Reform Act. *Clerk*, D. Shaw.

AYR DISTRICT OF ROADS AND TRUSTEES.—The roads embraced in this district lie in ten parishes of the County—Newton, Monkton, St Quivox, Coylton, Dalrymple, Dalmellington, Ochiltree, Old Cumnock, New Cumnock, and Tarbolton. The turnpike roads are upheld out of the money realised from the let of toll-bars, which, this year, amounted to £3910. The statute or bye-roads on the other hand, are maintained out of the conversion money. The assessment for this purpose, in the parishes stated above, amounts to somewhere between £500 and £600. The conversion money is levied at the rate of 30s. per hundred pounds Scots of valued rent upon tenants of land. Householders are charged 3s., and carters and innkeepers, who let out horses for hire, are assessed in lieu of six days' statute service—1s. per day for their horses, and 6d. for themselves. *Clerk*, J. CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

THE POOR'S HOUSE.—This Institution, for supporting the old, indigent, and helpless, was founded in 1756. The funds for erecting the building were raised by donations and subscriptions. The money necessary for its support is derived from the poor's funds, and from a mortification on the lands of Loans, amounting yearly to 64 bolls of meal and 30 merks of money. The Directors consist of nine members of the Town Council, the Kirk Session, three from the Sailors' Society, three from the Merchants' Company, three from the Writers' Society, eight from the Board of Incorporated Trades, and all heritors whose rent from lands within the parish amount to £50, according to the Town's valuation roll. The management of the charity is confided to a Committee of nine, who are selected annually out of the general body of Directors, in the following way—one from the Magistrates, three from the Kirk Session, and five indiscriminately. Admission is not limited. *Committee of Management*—Bailie Erskine, Rev. A. Cuthill, Rev. Dr Auld, Mr Stephen Rowan, Provost Miller, Messrs P. Stewart, J. D. Boswell, George M'Taggart, Thomas M'Clelland. *Convener*, Provost Miller. *Master and Superintendent*, William Lennox. *Matron*, Mrs Lennox.

SMITH'S INSTITUTION.—This School was established by a legacy from the late Capt. John Smith. The fund, in 1833, amounted to £2122, producing an annual sum of £88, applied in supporting a teacher, and in providing books, &c., for poor scholars. In 1841, a very excellent schoolhouse was erected at the Townhead, where upwards of 200 children are educated. Nearly one-half of these are taught gratuitously. The management is vested in the Provost and Magistrates, and the Ministers of the parish. *Teacher*, James Dobie; *Assistant*, Robert Hunter.

FEVER HOSPITAL.—The alarming extent to which fever frequently prevailed among the lower classes, drew the attention of the benevolent to the necessity of erecting an

hospital for the benefit of the afflicted. In 1842-43, accordingly, a subscription was actively set on foot, which was so successful that in the beginning of 1844, a large and handsome hospital was opened at the head of Mill Street. It is capable of accommodating twenty patients. Originally only fourteen beds were provided; but by the active exertions of the ladies—whose fancy bazaar, held in the Assembly Rooms, produced nearly £400—six additional beds were fitted up. The subscriptions amounted to £2042, 15s. 7d.—the expense of erection and furnishing to £1813, 10s. 9d.; thus leaving a balance of £229, 4s. 10d. The current expense is met, at present, by subscription. During 1844, 100 patients were admitted; of whom 95 recovered, and 5 died. Since its opening, it has been productive of much benefit. The management is vested in a committee. *Patron*, the Most Noble the Marquis of Bute; *President*, Provost Miller; *Committee*, Hugh Cowan, Geo. M'Taggart, Rev. Dr Auld, David Shaw, J. D. Boswell, John Paul, and the Rev. W. Grant; *Treasurer and Secretary*, Wm. Bone; *Surgeon*, J. L. Crawford, M.D.; *Consulting Medical Officers*, Drs Whiteside and Mitchell; *Housekeeper*, Mrs Halbert.

AYR, NEWTON, AND WALLACETOWN DISPENSARY.—This invaluable institution—originated in 1817—is now incorporated with the Fever Hospital, where accommodation is set apart for it. It is open every day for the dispensation of advice and medicine. Subscribers are entitled to have one patient on the books for every donation of 5s. There is no restriction in recommending children for inoculation.

ASSOCIATIONS, INSTITUTIONS & LIBRARIES.

AYRSHIRE AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION.—Modelled after the Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland, this Association was established in November, 1835. The annual meetings are held in October or November, according as it may be answerable. A subscription of five shillings annually, invests the subscriber with all the privileges of a member. Its funds have been increased by occasional donations. The last of the Association's shows was held at Dalry ; and was, at least, equal to any which had taken place before it. An annual Wool Fair, under the Society's superintendence, is held in Ayr on the third Tuesday of July. The Office-bearers are:—*President*, the Right Hon. the Earl of Glasgow ; *Vice-Presidents*, Sir C. D. Fergusson, Sir J. A. Cathcart, Marquis of Bute, James Campbell of Craigie, Alex. Oswald, M.P., and James Ballantine, of Castlehill. There are thirty extraordinary and forty ordinary Directors ; *Treasurer and Secretary*, John M'Murtrie, writer, Ayr.

AYRSHIRE HORTICULTURAL AND AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.—There are about 150 members in this Society. The entry money is 5s., and the annual subscription 3s. Honorary members—which include ladies—subscribe one guinea.

There are three shows during the season—one, for tulips, in the month of May; one, for pinks, in July; and one for dahlias, in September. At this exhibition the competition in agricultural produce takes place. J. O. M'Taggart, Esq. of Seafield, *President*; John Davidson, Culzean, *Vice-President*; Mr D. Hunter, Writer, *Treasurer*; and Mr Charles Imrie, *Secretary*.

ST. QUIVOX CLUB.—This Club was instituted in 1838, by a number of farmers and others interested in agricultural improvement, for the discussion of matters affecting the culture and management of the farm and dairy. The meetings are held generally on the first Tuesday of every month, at 3 o'clock, in the King's Arms Inn, Ayr. LAY ASSOCIATION IN SUPPORT OF THE SCHEMES OF THE CHURCH.—This auxiliary association was established in 1842; and with it was united the "Church Extension Association," which had existed for seven years previously. By the Treasurer's account, read at last meeting, it appears that £201, 11s. 2d. had been received during the past year; one-half of which was applied to Home Missions, and the other to the Education Scheme. *President*, the Right Hon. the Marquis of Bute; *Sec. and Treas.*, Mr C. AYRSHIRE EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION.—This Society was instituted in 1840, for the purpose of establishing schools in destitute localities, and for assisting such as had already been instituted, where the remuneration to the teacher was not competent for his support. An annual subscription of 5s. entitles a person to be ranked as a subscriber. The annual meetings are held in April, and the quarterly meetings in January, April, July, and October. The number of schools at present in connection with the Society amount to thirty, and the scholars to 1500. At last meeting it was resolved to unite the Association to the educational branch of the Ayrshire Lay Association. *President*, the Right Hon. the Marquis of Bute; *Vice-Presidents*, the Earl of Eglinton and Sir C. D. Fergusson; Mr T. M'Clelland, *Treasurer*; the Rev. David Ritchie, and the Rev. R. Inglis, *Secretaries*.

AYRSHIRE ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF FEMALE EDUCATION IN INDIA.—*President*, Lady Jane Hamilton; *Treas.*, C. Cowan, Esq.; *Sec.*, Rev. A. Brown.

AYR SABBATH SCHOOL UNION.—This Society was established in 1821. The union embraces Ayr, Newton, St. Quivox, and Monkton. A subscription of 2s. 6d. per annum, or a donation of 10s., entitles a person to rank as a member. There is a library in connection with the Society.

Connected with the union there were, in April last, 30 schools, 130 teachers, and about 1600 scholars. The income for 1844-5 amounted to £41, 16s. 6d., and the expenditure to £38, 15s. 6½d. *President*, A. Hamilton, Esq. of Rozelle; *Vice-Presidents*, Provost Miller and Mr M'Hutcheon; *Joint-Treasurers*, Mr T. M'Clelland and Mr J. Macneille.

AYR, NEWTON, WALLACETOWN, AND ST. QUIVOX TRACT SOCIETY.—This Society, instituted March, 1838, superseded another similar society founded in 1834. It is supported by donation and subscription. AYRSHIRE BIBLE SOCIETY.—The first Society of this kind established in Ayrshire was a branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society; but in 1828 it was formed into a distinct and independent institution, under the designation of "The Ayrshire Bible Society." Its affairs are wholly transacted in Ayr. A sum of five shillings annually endows a person with all the privileges of membership; while a donation of five guineas constitutes a member for life. *President*, The Right Hon. the Earl of Glasgow; *Vice-Presidents*, the Most Noble the Marquis of Bute, the Lord Justice-General, Sir C. INFANT SCHOOL.—In 1843, this excellent institution was opened, having been got up by subscription, under the auspices of Lady Jane Hamilton. The building is a neat and commodious one. It is situated in the Green, at the foot of Charlotte Street. It has been fully attended since its opening. *Trustees*, Archibald Hamilton, Esq. of Rozelle, the Provost of Ayr, the two established clergymen of Ayr, the clergyman of Newton, and the clergyman of Wallace-town; *Teacher*, Miss Jane Thomson; *Assistant*, Miss M'Pherson; *Treasurer*, Hugh Cowan; *Secretary*, J. F. Murdoch.

AYR ACADEMY.—The institution of this Academy is to be ascribed principally to the late Mr Fergusson of Doonholm, who, in the year 1790, bequeathed the sum of £1000, to be applied towards the purposes of education. This sum,

however, was not competent to erect and maintain an Academy such as had been contemplated; and a public subscription was consequently entered into to raise the necessary amount. From a list of subscriptions, published in 1804, we perceive that £7585, 4s. 10d. was realised. The building of the Academy commenced in 1794, and it was opened, under the most encouraging auspices, in August, 1796. The cost of erection amounted to £2837. The remainder of the money subscribed, after defraying what was expended in the purchase of apparatus, &c., was vested in the 3 per cent. consols—out of the interest of which, and Mr Fergusson's donations, together with the sum of £100 annually granted by the Town—the salaries of the teachers are paid. A charter was obtained in 1798, which commits the management of the Academy to—seven Directors, annually chosen from the Magistrates and Council of Ayr—the Sheriff-Depute of the County—the nearest heir-male of the late Mr Fergusson of Doonholm—all persons or incorporations subscribing £50, and their heirs male—and five persons annually chosen from subscribers under £50, and not under £5. *Teachers*—Ancient and Modern Languages, Geography, &c., Wm. Hunter, LL.D.; Mathematics, Arithmetic, Book-keeping, &c., ———; Writing and Drawing, R. Taylor; English Reading, Grammar, and Elocution, A. Lang; French and German, Mr Transki.

AYR READING ROOM.—The Reading Room is an apartment of the Town's Buildings, rented by the Club. The annual meeting and sale of newspapers is held in November. *President*, Hugh Miller, Esq., Provost; *Treasurer*, Mr Kennedy Crawford; *Secretary*, Mr Hugh Reid.

AYR LIBRARY.—This valuable Library, founded in 1762, and incorporated by charter from the Magistrates in 1808, contains about 4000 volumes. There are upwards of a hundred members connected with it. The entry money is £3, and the annual subscription 10s. The Library is in Fort Street, where the Librarian attends to give out books at a certain hour every day. Members are admitted at the annual meeting, which takes place on the last Wednesday of January. *Preses*, C. F. Sloan; *Treasurer*, R. Taylor; *Librarian*, P. Millan.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTION.—The library of this institution was established in 1825, and the museum added a few

years since. It has enjoyed a share of prosperity, but the want of a proper hall has ever militated against it. This has lately been partially overcome, a large flat in the High Street having been rented for its use. The subscription is 1s. 6d. per quarter. To apprentices the subscription is only 9d.—thus wisely conferring a boon upon those to whom such a favour is most valuable. The library contains between three and four thousand volumes. The museum contains a large variety of rare, curious, and valuable articles. The annual meeting is held in the first week of June. *Patron*, A. Hamilton, Esq. of Rozelle; *President*, Hugh Cowan, Esq.; *Vice-President*, George Taylor, Esq.; *Treas.*, Wm. Bone, Esq.; *Secretaries*, Messrs Highet and Gray; *Librarian*, James Goudie.

HORTICULTURAL LIBRARY.—This is a valuable auxiliary to the Horticultural Society; and possessing as it does, a choice assortment of the best works in horticulture and floriculture, it has peculiar claims on the attention of those interested in these subjects. The entry money is 6s., and the annual subscription is only 5s. The books are kept in the shop of Mr Imrie, seedsman, High Street.

MEDICO-CHIRURGICAL LIBRARY.—This Library, intended for, and chiefly confined to, members of the medical profession, contains upwards of 100 volumes of the newest and most approved works in medical science. The books are kept by Mr Hodgeon, High Street. The entry money is 10s., and the annual subscription 21s.

CIRCULATING LIBRARIES.—Of these there are three in Ayr—one is kept by Mr Dick, in Sandgate Street; one by Mr D. Logan, High Street; and one by Mr R. Stocks, Old Bridge Street.

SAVINGS' BANK.—This beneficial institution is open every Monday morning, from half-past nine till half-past ten, and sums taken in from 1s. to £10. The amount in the hands of the Treasurer is lodged in the bank of Messrs Hunter & Co. *Governor*, Mr Hugh Cowan; *Deputy-Governor*, Mr A. M'Hutchon; *Treasurer*, Mr A. Hunter; *Secretary*, Mr Wm. Cowan; *Clerk*, Mr Thomas Reid.

BENEFIT SOCIETIES.

MERCHANT COMPANY.—This Company was instituted in 1655; but it was not till 1820 that a benefit society was formed in connexion with it, for granting annuities to decayed members, and to the widows and orphans of members deceased. The rate of entry money varies according to the age of the entrants. The contributions are one guinea yearly. The annuity allowed to widows and decayed members is £10 per annum; and orphans, whatever their number may be, are only entitled collectively to the same amount. The annual meeting is held in the month of June, when applicants are proposed for admission. *Master*, Wm. Pollock; *Treas.*, John Kinloch; *Committee*, David Auld, A. Hunter, Geo. ODD-FELLOWS.—A branch of the Manchester Unity of Odd-Fellows—now so popular throughout the country—was opened in Ayr in the month of May, 1841, under the designation of “The Banks of Ayr Lodge of Odd-Fellows.” The Lodge meets once a fortnight. The entry money, under 30 years of age, is one guinea, and the weekly payments 6d. The alimnt allowed when unfit for employment is 10s. per week; and the funeral expenses £10. None above the age of forty, or below eighteen, are admitted. The meetings are held in the Hall of the Ayr Arms Inn.

SAILORS' SOCIETY.—This Society was instituted so far back as 1581. Its object is to support aged and disabled seamen, and to afford relief to the widows and orphans of deceased mariners. It is upheld by donations from the benevolent. A sum of £5 entitles a person to become a member. At present there are about eighty pensioners on the roll, who receive from 10s. to £3 yearly, according to their necessity. In addition to what has been amassed by donation—amounting to about £1100, out of the interest of which the pensioners are paid—a farther sum is derived from letting the seats in the Sailors' Gallery in the Old Church. *Preses*, Dr Wm. MERCHANT SEAMEN'S SOCIETY.—This Society was commenced in January, 1835. Its affairs are regulated by Act of Parliament. The temporary alimnt ranges from 10s. to 20s. a month, and the permanent from £2 to £8, 10s. per annum. The Trustees for the Harbour of Ayr, and the owners and masters of vessels belonging to the port, meet annually on the 26th of December, and elect fifteen Trustees; and these again elect five of their number as a Committee to assist the Treasurer in the discharge of his duty, and to examine claims for relief. AYR WHIPMEN'S SOCIETY.—This Society was instituted in 1765, and incorporated by charter from the Magistrates of Ayr in 1808. Its object is to afford relief to sick and infirm members, and to grant annuities to aged members and widows. The entry money varies according to age. The subscription is 6s. annually. The alimnt is 4s. weekly. Widows receive £2 yearly, and aged members 1s. 6d. weekly. £2 are also allowed for funeral expenses. *President*, James Hutchison; *Treas.*, William Lawson; *Clerk*, Wm. Hutchison; *Officer*, John Symington.

NEWTON AND WALLACETOWN WHIPMEN'S SOCIETY.—This benefit Society was begun in 1838. There are about forty members on the roll. The entry money is 1s. 2d.; and the weekly subscription 2d. The alimnt is 4s. weekly, and 1s. is levied from each, for funeral expenses, at the death of a member. The whipmen assemble on the second Friday of August, and parade on horseback through Newton and Wallacetown.
