Biographically, the work contains salient facts furnished by the subjects themselves.





GOLDSBOROUGH, HON. PHILLIPS LEE, Gov. State of Md.; was born in Princes Anne, Somerset Co., Md., Aug., 1865; ed. public schools of native county and Dorchester and the Episcoul High School, Alexandria, Ya.; infer being adm. to bar went to San Francisco as chief clerk for his father. Paymaster W. Worthington Goldsborough, U. S. N.; returned to Cambridge spring of 1800, and entered upon the practice of law; in 1891 nominated by the Republicuus for the office of State's attorney; defeated Jonn R. Pattison, dem.; 1855, candidate tor nomination for Compress in the 1st Dist.; 1893, renominated unanimously for State's atty., and was elected by flattering majority. leading the ticket; 1897, elected State comptroller. At the time Mr. Goo, R. Gaither was nomimated for governor, he was his most formidable opponent, but withdrew in his favor to maintain harmony. In 1911 he was elected Governor of the State of Md.

18 EMINENCE JAMES CARDINAL GIBBONS was born in Baltimore, Md., July 23, 1834. He was baptized at the Cathedral, and was soon taken by his parents to Ireland, where his early education was acquired. From his earliest years he

gave his entire mind to the acquisition of useful knowledge and broadminded study, and soon expressed the earnest desire to devote his life to the service of the church. With this object in view, he returned to Baltimore, and was admitted to St. Charles' College, Maryland, from which he graduated in 1857, and then took up his theological studies at the Seminary of St. Sulpice, St. Mary's University, Baltimore. Archbishop Kendrick ordained him priest June 30, 1861, and he was sent to St. Patrick's Church, Baltimore, as assistant to Rev. James Dolan. The small congregation which was instructed in St. Bridget's Church. Canton, Maryland, was his next charge, and in 1865 he was made private secretary to Archbishop Spalding, who made him chancellor of the archdiocese. He was made assistant chancellor over the Second Plenary Council at Baltimore the following year, and when Pope Pius IX erected the State of North Carolina into a new Vicariate Apostolic. March 3, 1868, he nominated Chancellor Gibbons titular Bishop of Adramyttum, and the first Vicar Apostolic of North Carolina. Archbishop Spalding consecrated him at the Cathedral of Baltimore, August 16, 1868.

On July 30, 1872, Bishop Gibbons was sent to the Diocese of Richmond, Virginia, as successor to the Right Reverend John McGill, who had died the preceding January. Archbishop Bayley installed him as Bishop of Richmond, October 20, 1872, and he immediately took up his new work with undiminished activity.

On July 29, 1877, Bishop Gibbons was made titular Bishop of Jinopolis, with the right of succession to the Primatial See of Baltimore. Upon the death of Archbishop Bayley, October 3, 1877, Bishop Gibbons became Archbishop of Baltimore. On June 7, 1886, Pope Leo XIII created him cardinal, and he selected the twenty-tifth anniversary of his ordination as priest, June 30, 1886, as the date on which to be invested with the insignia of his new rank in the church.





University of Virginia in 1869, after which he entered the Law School of the University of Maryland, and was admitted to practice at the Maryland bar in 1872. He entered upon the legal profession in association with his father, and devoted himself to it until the year 1890, when he withdrew from active practice.

A man of intelligence and culture, possessing artistic, musical and literary tastes, which his wealth and leisure have permitted him to indulge, Mr. Frick has identified himself with the best social and artistic life of his own and foreign countries. He is a member, and was at one time upon the executive committee of the Society of the Cincinnati, that noble organization founded by military heroes, the "officers of the American Army, who associated themselves into one society of friends to endure as long as they shall endure, or any of their eldest male posterity.'' Mr. Frick is a prominent clubman, an enthusiast of outdoor sports, to which he devotes much of his time, and a member of the following organizations: The Maryland Historical Society, the Municipal Art Society, the Maryland Club (of which he was governor 1890-1909), the Baltimore Club, the University Club, the Baltimore Athletic Club, the Baltimore Country Club, the Elkridge Fox Hunting Club. the Automobile Club of Maryland, as well as the Union and Manhattan Clubs of New York, the Automobile Club of America, and the Royal Automobile Club of London, England.

MONG the multitudes who venerate the memory of the late Robert Lehr, for nearly half a century the Baltimore representative of the great banking house of Brothers Bonninger, there are, we venture to say, few even of those not person-

ally known to him, who would not feel interested on recalling his life and character, with an emotion elicited, except among his intimates, by one as high in the financial and social world as was this great banker and distinguished citizen.

Robert Lehr was born March 14, 1819, in Coblence on the Rhine, of a family distinguished for many generations in military life. His education was received in Germany, and he early showed a peculiar aptitude for affairs requiring executive and administrative ability. That his talents were accorded speedy recognition was proved in 1850, when, a young man not much past thirty, he was sent to Baltimore to take charge of the famous shipping, banking and general commission house of Brothers Banninger, which had connections in the principal cities of all quarters of the globe. When Mr. Lehr came to America to assume control of this business he brought with him letters to the most prominent people in Baltimore, and was accredited at the Legation at Washington.

Mr. Lehr was largely instrumental in extending the scope of the commerce of the United States in Europe, and for this not our city alone, but the country at large, is indebted to him, although the trade of Baltimore reaped as a matter of course, especial benefits in the extension of her reputation and the establishment of the credit of her merchants abroad. Mr. Lehr was a director in the Merchants' Bank, the Mercantile Trust and Deposit Company, a trustee of the Baltimore Savings Bank and vice-president of the Baltimore Safe Deposit Company. He was extensively interested in the shipping of tobacco to Europe, and was a type of the Baltimore merchant of whom the city is justly proud, whose enterprise and integrity have not only developed widely the commerce of the metropolis, but have given her an enviable reputation for fair dealing and honorable methods.

He was one of the original subscribers and founders of the Maryland Club, which was opened on Fayette street with Jerome Bonaparte first president, and was one of the last of the life governors.

Mr. Lehr died March 10, 1887, at his Baltimore home, leaving the record of a life which was a happy illustration of the honors and rewards of business fidelity and industry combined with high principle and unswerving integrity.

## THE BALTIMORE LAW SCHOOL.

THE Baltimore Law School was incorporated by the Legislature of Maryland in the year 1900, and began its first session in the Fall of that year. During the thirteen years of its existence it has become a decided factor in the field of legal education in Maryland. Its founders realized that the young man of limited means—too limited to permit of his acquiring a college education, deserved the opportunity of obtaining a legal education, if he was possessed of good mental calibre and ambitions. For this reason, no entrance examination was required, but when once enrolled, the applicant was required to demonstate his fitness for the study of the law by rigid examinations. The School has been prosperous, and its student body now numbers two hundred and seventy men. Hon, Alfred S. Niles, former member of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore City, is the Dean, and Edwin T. Diekerson is the Secretary and Treasurer. The Faculty is composed of judges and lawyers in active practice, most of whom are young men.

On February 1, 1911, this School and the Baltimore University School of Law were consolidated under the name of the Baltimore Law School. Plans have recently been perfected for a consolidation of this School with the Law School of the University of Maryland, by which the Baltimore Law School will become an integral part of the former School, and its students will become students of the University of Maryland. The motive for the consolidation is the betterment of legal education in Maryland, and it is confidently expected that the result will be a decided improvement in legal standards and better trained lawyers.


BROMO-SELTZER TOWER. Total height of lower, 357 feet. The Bottle on top, a fac simile of the regular tencent Bromo-Seltzer bottle, but about 10,000,000 times larger, is 54 feet high, 204 feet in diameter, weighs 17 tons, and revolves at the rate of 105 feet per minute. There are 596 electric lights in bottle and crown summonthing it, which can be seen at a distance of 20 miles. The Bromo-Seltzer clock is the largest four dial gravity clock in the world. The dial is 24 feet in diameter. The minute hand is 12 feet 7 unclus long, and weighs 175 nounds. The hour hand is 9 feet 8 helpes long and weighs 155 nounds. The pendulum is 15 feet long and weighs 475 pounds. The clock is automatically wound by an electric motor every six hours.



Above is shown a picture of the **BALTIMORE CATHEDRAL**, one of the oldest and probably the most leantiful church edifice of its kind in the United States. Imposing and stately from an architectural standpoint as one gazes on this fine building, which is over a hundred years old, he cannot help but be impressed with its appearance. Thousands of visitors and tourists to the Monumental City view it every year, as it is known as one of the principal sights of Baltimore. The Cathedral has a sanctuary which is circular in dimensions, and cannot be compared with by any other sanctuary in this country, heing 70 feet wide and 65 feet deep. Exclusive of the circular projection in the sanctuary, the main building measures 180 feet 6 inches. On two sides of the building are transpits, which project 20 feet beyond the main building, being 35 feet 9 inches wide, making the extreme width of the building 115 feet 10 inches. The seating equacity of the church is 1200. Many persons have tried to describe this beautiful old edifice, but as it is a combination of Roman and Russian architecture, it was found rather hard to give a very good description of it. You would in reality call the style of architecture Russo-Byzantine, as it has the bell-shaped towers of Muscow, which resemble very closely the ones on the Church of the Assumption at Moscow; Roman architecture in the building can be scen very clearly both on the exterior and interior of the church. The columns, entablature and comice of the portico are of sandstone, which carnie form the quarries of Nova Scotia. The main walls of the Cathedral are faced with granite from quarries in the neighborhood of Ellicott City, Vid., the same quarries from which the stone used in a recent addition to the Cathedral by Cardinal Gibbons was obtained. The Cardinal, who is the head of the Architecese of Baltimore, resides in a fine building in the rear of the church. It cannot be seen in the picture, as it faces the east, the Cathedral facing the west, at the northeast corner of Cat






The Orrick family in this country are descendants of the good old Scotch family of the county of Fife, Scotland. The name is said to have had its origin in the rock upon that part of the Fife coast upon which the estate lay. The original Orrick estate in Fife, which was erected into a barony in the seventeenth century, was eventually sold, and the lands in Aberdeenshire acquired, to which the name Orrick was given. These lands are still in the possession of the family. The Orricks who came to this country brought with them their Scotlish traits of thrift and energy, became possessed of large estates in their new home and large number of slaves, and were counted among the wealthiest planters of the country. They intermarried with the Washingtons, Hammonds and other families of settlers, who were also large planters.

ARTHUR W. THOMPSON, third vice-president of the Baltimore and Ohio-Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton System, was born May 8, 1875, at Erie, Pa. He was graduated from Allegheny College, Meadville, Pa., in 1897, and entered railway service in 1898, as a rodman in the engineering department of the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad. His next promotion was to the office of chief engineer of maintenance of way, and continued in such capacity until April, 1910, when he became chief engineer of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. In December, 1910, Mr. Thompson was promoted to general manager, and was promoted to third vice-president of the Baltimore and Ohio-Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton System on April 11, 1912, which office he has held to the present time.



HE magniticent courage, broad vision and sound judgment with which the public-spirited citizens of Baltimore undertook the construction of a railroad from the Patapsco to the Ohio River are reflected in the great Baltimore and Ohio System of railroad lines which now supports the City and Port of Baltimore that gave it birth.

With its 5500 miles of lines, 2500 modern powerful locomotives and 100, 000 freight cars, there is indeed a contrast which the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company of today presents with the little railroad which in 1827 was begun to connect Baltimore with the territory west of the Allegheny Mountains.

From the inception of this railroad, which at the end of the first year had been extended a distance of 13 miles to Efficient's Mills, Maryland, has grown one of the leading trunk line systems of transportation in the world, reaching practically every industrial center in the Middle Atlantic States between the Atlantic Scaboard at Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York and the Great Lakes and Mississippi River at Chicago and St. Louis, respectively.

The local railroad company also established the commercial supremacy of Baltimore as a trade center, with its vast facilities for handling home commerce as well as export and import trade. One of the most striking examples of this is the fact that last year Baltimore attained the distinction of being the second largest grain port of the nation, there having been 42.330,313 bushels of grain handled at the port of Baltimore during 1912.

A volume devoted to the development of the State of Maryland by its foremost citizens and leading business interests would be incomplete indeed unless reference were made to the Baltimore and Ohio Bailroad Company. No other enterprise has had a more wholesome influence upon the promotion of Maryland's best inferests and the advancement of its economic welfare than has the State's leading railroad and business corporation.

Spanning the cpochs in the development of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company brings the present generation of Marylanders abreast with one of the country's foremost transportation systems. From a few hundred miles of tracks a generation ago, the company has grown until it is classed as one of the leading railroad corporations. The total earnings for the fiscal yeur, which ended 4une 30, 1913, amounted to \$103,329,992, the largest in the hisfory of the company. These enormous earnings are cleared largely through Baltimore banks.

In addition to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company's 4434 miles of line, there has come recently under the same administration and control the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton Railway Company, with 1015 miles of line. The Baltimore and Ohio Company's operations extend into twelve States and run directly from the Atlantic ports of New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore to the great points of interchange with the West and Southwest at Chicago and St. Louis, the intervening main line and branches reaching directly practically all of the great commercial and industrial centers of the East and Central West.

Early realizing the hopes and expectations of the community by placing Balfimore in direct communication with the Ohio River, every extension of the Baltimore and Ohio System has brought into closer touch with Maryland and Baltimore these great industrial centers.

In addition to this general interchange of commerce, the operations of the Company have been most beneficial to the material welfare of the State of Maryland and the City of Baltimore. The Company has its administrative offices in Baltimore, where its policies are fashioned and the results of its operations cleared.

The expansion of the Baltimore and Ohio System has been most beneficial to the material welfare of the State of Maryland. The most extensive terminals of the Company are in Maryland, where millions of dollars are expended aunually for materials and supplies of all kinds and in meeting the pay-rolls of employes. Of the 65,000 employes of the Company, about 20,000 are engaged in service in the State of Maryland. The pay-roll disbursements in Maryland approximate \$1,000,000 monthly.

Ten thousand men are employed in Baltimore and the monthly pay-roll totals about \$600,000.

Modern terminals are operated at Baltimore, Cumberland and Brunswick. The facilities in Baltimore include two commodious passenger stations— Camden and Mount Royal; export and import terminals at Locust Point and Curtis Bay; Mount Clare and Riverside shops, Camden warehouse and freight vards, fruit and produce terminal, etc.

The Locust Point terminals are the largest on the Atlantic Seaboard. At Locust Point millions of tons of freight are imported and exported annually. Thousands of immigrants seeking new homes in America land at Locust Point each year. Locust Point covers a mile of waterfront. The terminals are situated directly behind historic Fort McHenry, on the left side of the harbor entering the port of Baltimore. Locust Point is well appointed, having a system of spacious docks, large freight and coal piers and mammoth grain elevators. There are 11 piers in the terminals, 9 of these being open and 2 covered. Two grain elevators and two coal piers are embraced in the terminals. The floor space in the freight piers at Locust Point aggregates 738, 700 square feet. Pier 8 is the largest in the ferminals, being 1000 feet by 140 feet in dimensions, two stories high and with a floor area of 235,358 square feet. The pier is equipped with the Telpherage system for handling freight on the platforms, the system being a series of overhead tracks on which carriers handle freight about the pier. The system is operated by electricity. Twenty of these carriers are in use, 10 of them being of 4-ton capacity and 10 of 2-ton capacity.

Eight lines now make regular sailings from the Locust Point terminals, six to foreign ports and two plying along the coast. The foreign lines are the North German Lloyd to Bremen, Johnson Line to Liverpool, Donaldson Line to Glasgow, Red Star Line to Antwerp, Havre and London; Scandinavian Line to Scandinavian ports and the Holland-American Line to Rotterdam. Two American lines, the Merchants and Miners' Transportation Company and the Baltimore-Texas Line, dock their vessels at Locust Point. Eighteen hundred workmen are employed at Locust Point.

At Curtis Bay the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad operates its largest coal terminal. Export shipments through the port of Baltimore are loaded at Curtis Bay, which is the largest and one of the best equipped terminals on the Atlantic Coast. The world's record for loading a vessel with a cargo of coal is held by the Curtis Bay terminals. Several records were established at Curtis Bay within a year, and November 23, 1912, the collier Newton was loaded in 3 hours and 45 minutes.

The Mount Clare shops of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, at Baltimore, are among the largest in the world. The rebuilding of locomotives and cars and the principal repair work of the railroad's equipment is done at Mount Clare, where 2500 skilled mechanics and other workmen are employed.

The Baltimore and Ohio System operates large terminals at Cumberland, in Western Maryland, and the activities of the railroad in that section of the State have been responsible in large measure for the general development that has been accomplished. Cumberland is the division headquarters of the Cumberland division, and is geographically the "throat" of the Baltimore and Ohio System. The "Queen City" is the point of divergence of the two main lines of the Baltimore and Ohio, one of which proceeds northward towards Pittsburgh and Chicago and the other takes a southwesterly direction towards Cincinnati and St. Louis. These lines pass through the soft coal region and the gas coal region of Southern Pennsylvania and West Virginia, respectively, and the vast tomage from these regions as well as the traffic from manufacturing, industrial and agricultural sections beyond pass through Cumberland. Cumberland is also an interchange point for the Baltimore and Ohio with the Western Maryland and the Cumberland and Pennsylvania railroads. Only recently the Baltimore and Ohio increased its facilities materially at Cumberland by enlarging its freight yards, shops and constructing a modern freight station.

The number of freight cars handled in and out of Cumberland averages 5000 a day. These cars require about 100 trains. In addition, some 40 passenger trains arrive at, and depart from, Cumberland each day.

At Brunswick the Baltimore and Ohio System operates its principal eastern terminal for the classification of carload shipments of freight. The yard at Brunswick is 5 miles long and has a capacity of 7302 cars.

The original line of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad to Wheeling was a single-track road and its construction through the mountainous country presented many engineering problems. The science of engineering was largely in the experimental stage in those early days, so in pushing the construction work across the mountains it became necessary to follow the course of least resistance. The single-track line when built was wholly adequate to handle the business, but the growth of commerce and industrial development of the country taxed the facilities beyond capacity. Betterments were made when finances would permit, tracks were added and larger terminals were provided, until a large percentage of the main line mileage within the State was double track.

Even these facilities became inadequate to handle the traffic and it was urgent that enlargement be made. On January 15, 1940, President Daniel Willard assumed charge of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, and before two weeks had elapsed a committee of West Virginia citizens visited the chief executive of the railroad to urge that additional facilities be provided. Mr. Willard gave the shippers assurance that their request would be complied with. He outlined to them a program of improvements which would increase the hauling capacity of the railroad by 50 per cent., including the construction of a third track on the mountain slopes to prevent congestion and the purchase of new cars and locomotives. The promises of President Willard have been fulfilled and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad is well equipped to handle with dispatch the traffic offered to its rails.

The transformation accomplished on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad in so short a time has been marvelous and has attracted widespread attention of the shipping public and the railroad world. The construction of third and fourth tracks involved the relocation of line, reduction of grades, elimination of tunnels, construction of substantial bridges capable of handling the heaviest of trains, the purchase of locomotives of the most powerful type, freight cars of maximum capacity and modern passenger equipment.
