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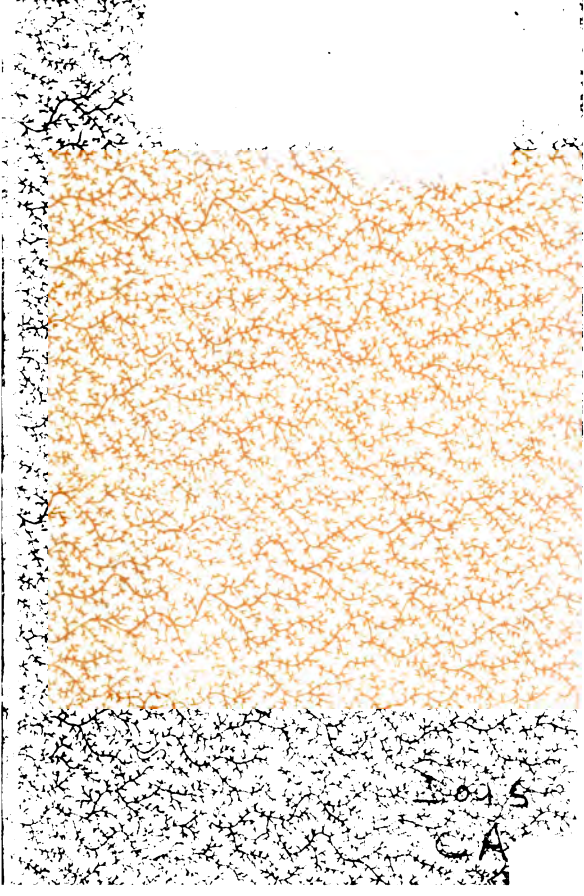
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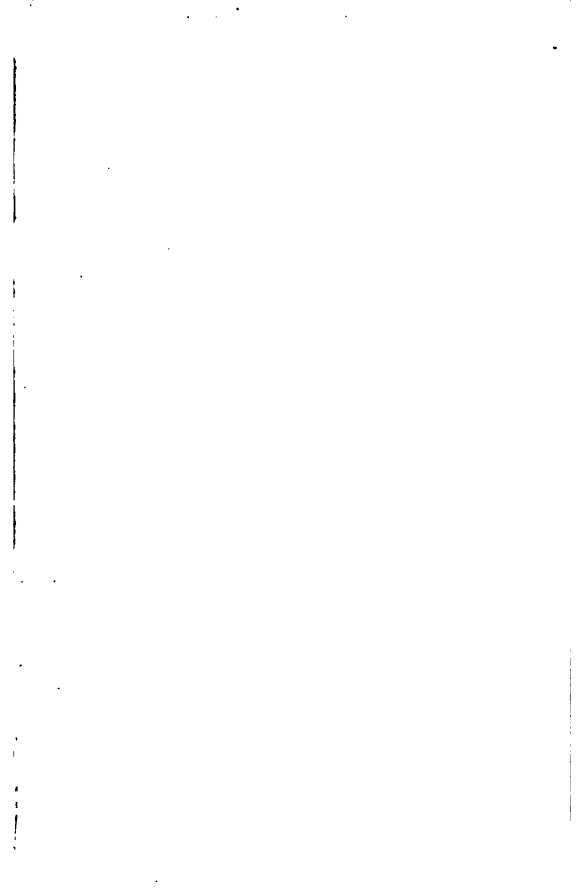
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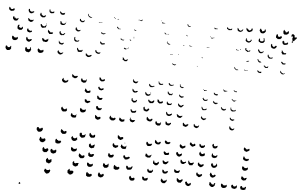

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P R E F A C E.

SINCE this Annual was first undertaken, fifteen years have passed away, six successive administrations have been summoned to the councils of the Sovereign, five parliaments have been elected, and four have been dissolved. Within this period imitators and plagiarists without number have too often sought to intercept the just rewards of an original design, and to sustain a precarious existence by borrowing almost every feature of typography, language, and decoration. But the turn of mind which dictated spoliation was naturally incapable of impartiality; and those who appropriated without hesitation the outward features of a successful plan contributed at least one item to their compilations—the taint of political bias. It is not surprising therefore that this volume, which, during every ministerial vicissitude from the passing of the Reform Bill to the enactment of free trade, has aimed at avoiding party tendencies, should have succeeded in acquiring public support; and that it should once more appeal to a just and generous body of readers with the confidence of an enlarged experience and the sanguine energy of a renewed life.

To describe in any preface or introduction the kind of information which may be found in these pages is now fortunately a needless task; every reader who is not already well acquainted with its purposes and characteristics may be safely referred to the Table of Contents for the shortest exposition of its objects and the strongest evidence of its utility.

B. 1811, m. d. of 6th Duke of Bedford. 2nd tit. Visct. Hamilton. Appointed Groom of the Stole to Prince Albert, 1846. Is patron of 2 livings. *Dudley-house, Park-lane; Carlton; Dudingtons-house, co. Edinburgh; Barons' Court, co. Tyrone; Bentley Priory, Middlesex.*

* **ABERCROMBY** (2nd Bar.), George Ralph Abercromby; cr. 1801.

B. 1800, m. d. of Lord Medwyn. (h. c. 1841, as Mr. Abercromby.) Is a Col. in the Army, and Lord-Lieut. of Clackmannanshire. This Peerage was originally conferred on the widow of the celebrated Sir Ralph Abercromby, with remainder to his son. *Tullibody, Clackmannan.*

† **ABERDEEN** (4th Earl of), George Hamilton Gordon, K.T., P.C., F.R.S.; cr. 1682.

B. 1784, m. first, d. of 1st Marq. of Abercorn; 2dly, d. of the Hon. John Douglas. Sits as Visct. Gordon. 2nd tit. Lord Haddo. (1st Peer a judge.) Was Secretary of State, first for Foreign Affairs, in the Wellington

Ministry, and for the Colonies in 1834-5. Again appointed Foreign Secretary in Sept. 1841; resigned, July, 1846. Is President of the British Institution. Is Chancellor of King's College, Aberdeen, Ranger of Greenwich Park, and Lord-Lieut. of Aberdeenshire. 7, *Argyll-st.*; *Carlton*; *Ranger's House, Blackheath*; *Haddo House, Aberdeensh.*

†**ABERGAVENNY** (4th Earl of), Rev. William Nevill; cr. 1784.

B. 1792, m. d. of the late Ralph Lecke, esq., of Longford Hall, Salop. 2nd tit. Visct. Nevill. Is Rector of Birling, Kent, and Vicar of Prant, Sussex; patron of 19 livings. 58, *Portland-pl.*; *Bridge Castle, Kent*; *Abergavenny Castle, Monmouthsh.*

†**ABINGDON** (5th Earl of), Montagu Bertie, D.C.L.; cr. 1682.

B. 1784, m. first, d. of the Hon. Gen. Gage; 2ndly, d. of Lord Mark Kerr. 2nd tit. Lord Norreys. Lord-Lieut. and Custos Rot. of Berks; High Steward of Abingdon. Is patron of 4 livings. *Carlton*; *Wytham Abbey, Berks.*

†**ABINGER** (2nd Bar.), Robt. Campbell Scarlett; cr. 1835.

B. 1794, m. d. of Geo. Smith, esq., late Chief Justice at the Mauritius. (1st Peer a Judge.) Is a barrister (h. c. 1844, as Mr. Scarlett). 4, *New Street, Spring Gardens*; *Carlton*; *Abinger Hall, Surrey.*

***ACHESON** (1st Bar.), Archibald Acheson; cr. 1847.

Eld. s. of the 2nd Earl of Gosford, and therefore styled by courtesy Visct. Acheson. B. 1806; m. d. of 10th Earl of Meath. Deputy-lieut. of Armagh, Col. of Armagh militia (h. c. 1847 as Visct. Acheson). 59, *Lower Grosvenor-st.*; *Reform Club*; *Gosford Castle, co. Armagh.*

†**AILESBUURY** (1st Marq. of), Charles Bruce Brudenell-Bruce, K.T.; cr. 1821.

B. 1778, m. first, d. of Lord Berwick; 2dly, d. of the Hon. Chas. Tolle-mache. 2nd tit. Earl Bruce. Ranger of Savernake Forest. Is patron of 9 livings. 41, *Grosvenor-sq.*; *Carlton*; *Tottenham Park, Wilts*; *Tanfold Hall, Yorksh.*; *East Sheen, Surrey.*

†**AILSA** (2nd Marq. of), Archibald Kennedy; cr. 1831.

B. 1816, m. d. of the late Sir Richard M. Jephson. Was formerly lieut. 17th dragoons. 2nd tit. Earl of Casillis. 57, *St. James's-st.*; *the Castle of Casillis and Culzean Castle, Ayrsh.*; *Dun-House, Forfarsh.*; *St. Margaret's, Middlesex.*

†**AIRLIE AND LINTRATHEN** (6th Earl of, Sco. Rep.), David Ogilvy; cr. 1639.

B. 1785, m. first d. of Gavin Drummond, esq., 2ndly d. of William

Bruce, esq. (dead). 2nd tit. Lord Ogilvy. Lord-Lieut. of Forfarsh. Restored in 1826 to the above honours, which had been forfeited by his ancestors. *Carlton; Airlie Castle, Forfarsh.*

*ALBEMARLE (4th Earl of), William Charles Keppel, P.C., G.C.H.; cr. 1696.

B. 1772, m. first, d. of 17th Lord de Clifford; 2dly, d. of Sir H. Hume, bt. 2nd tit. Visct. Bury. (1st Peer a distinguished adherent of William III.) Has been Master of the Horse to the Queen. Is patron of 9 livings. 12, *Berkeley-sq.; Quidenham Hall, Norfolk.*

†ALVANLEY (2nd Bar.), William Arden; cr. 1801.

B. 1789, unmarried. Has been a Lieut.-Col. in the Army, but retired. Is patron of 2 livings. (1st Peer a judge.) 57, *St. James'-st.; Tarporey, Chesh.; Hampstead, Middlesex.*

†AMHERST (1st Earl), William Pitt Amherst, P.C., G.C.H., D.C.L.; cr. 1826.

B. 1773, m. first, d. of Lord Archer, and relict of 5th Earl of Plymouth; 2ndly, d. of 2nd Duke of Dorset, and relict of 6th Earl of Plymouth. 2nd tit. Visct. Holmesdale. (1st Peer a distinguished military commander.) Has been one of the Canada Commissioners. Has been a Lord of the King's Bedchamber and Ambassador to China, also Governor-General of India. 66, *Grosvenor-st.; Montreal, Kent.*

*ANGLESEY (1st Marq. of), Henry William Paget, K.G., G.C.B., G.C.H., P.C.; cr. 1815.

B. 1768, m. first d. of the 4th Earl of Jersey, divorced, who has since been married to the 6th Duke of Argyll; 2dly, d. of the 1st Earl of Cadogan, whose previous marriage with Lord Cowley had been dissolved; 2nd tit. Earl of Uxbridge. A distinguished military commander, has been twice Lord-Lieut. of Ireland, is Lord-Lieut. and Custos Rot. of Anglesey, Constable of Carnarvon Castle, and Capt. of Cowes Castle, Col. of Horse Guards, Blue, a Field Marshal in the Army. Appointed Master-General of the Ordnance, July, 1846. Ranger of Snowdon Forest. Is patron of 6 livings. 1, *Old Burlington-st.; Plasnewydd, Anglesey; Beaudesert, Staffordsh.*

†ARGYLL (8th Duke of), George John Douglas Campbell; cr. 1701.

B. 1823, m. d. of 2nd Duke of Sutherland. Sits as Baron Sundridge and Hamilton. 2nd tit. Marq. of Lorn. Heritable Master of the Household in Scotland, Hereditary Sheriff of Argyllsh. 8, *Connaught-pl. West; Inverary, Argyllsh.; Rosneath, Dumbartonsh.*

- ***ARUNDELL OF WARDOUR** (11th Bar.), Henry Benedict Arundell; cr. 1605.

M. first, d. of H. P. Smythe, esq.; 2ndly, d. of Sir H. Tichborne, Bart.; 3rdly, d. of 17th Lord Stourton. (1st Peer a distinguished military commander.) Is patron of 1 living. *Wardour Castle, Wilts; Irnham Hall, Lincolnsh.*

- †**ASHBURNHAM** (4th Earl of), Bertram Ashburnham; cr. 1730.

B. 1797, m. d. of George Baillie, esq. 2nd tit. Vict. St. Asaph. Is patron of 12 livings. 80, *Upper Grosvenor-st.; Carlton; Ashburnham Place, Sussex.*

- †**ASHBURTON** (1st Bar.), Alexander Baring, P.C., D.C.L.; cr. 1835.

B. 1774. M. d. of the late Wm. Bingham, Esq., of Philadelphia; has been President of the Board of Trade, and Ambassador to America. (h. c. 1835, as Mr. A. Baring.) Is patron of 7 livings. 82, *Piccadilly; Carlton; the Grange, Hants; Shoreham, Kent.*

- †**ATHOLL** (6th Duke of), George Augustus Frederic John Murray; cr. 1703.

B. 1814. M. d. of George Home Drummond, esq. Has been a Lord in Waiting to the Queen. Sits as Earl Strange. 2nd tit. Marq. of Tallibardine. Hereditary Sheriff of Perthsh. *Atholl House, Perthsh.*

- ***AUCKLAND** (1st Earl of), George Eden, P.C., G.C.B. cr. 1839.

B. 1784. (Peerage conferred for official services.) Has been President of the Board of Trade, Master of the Mint, First Lord of the Admiralty, and Gov.-Gen. of India. Re-appointed First Lord of the Admiralty, July, 1846. *Admiralty; Eden Lodge, Kensington; Eden Farm, Kent.*

- †**AUDLEY** (20th Bar.), George-Edward Thicknesse-Touchet; cr. 1297.

B. 1817. *Sandridge Park, Wiltsh.*

- †**AYLESFORD** (5th Earl of), Heneage Finch, F.S.A.; cr. 1714.

B. 1786, m. d. of 2nd Earl of Warwick (dead). 2nd tit. Lord Guernsey. (1st Peer a judge.) Has been Capt. of the Yeomen of the Guard, and Lord Steward of the Household. Is patron of 8 livings. *Packington Hall, Warwicksh.; Aylesford, Kent.*

- †**BAGOT** (2nd Bar.), Wm. Bagot, F.S.A., F.L.S., F.H.S.; cr. 1780.

B. 1773, m. first, d. of 1st Lord Southampton; 2dly, d. of the 3rd Earl

of Dartmouth, dead. Is patron of 8 livings. *Carlton; Blithfield House, Staffordsh.; Pool Park, Denbighsh.*

†BALCARRES (7th Earl of), James Lindsay; cr. 1650.

B. 1783, m. d. of 2nd Lord Muncaster. Sits as Baron Wigan. 2nd tit. Lord Lindsay. 21, *Berkeley-sq.; Carlton; Haigh Hall, Lancash.*

†BANDON (2nd Earl of, Ir. Rep.), J. Bernard, D.C.L.; cr. 1793.

B. 1785, m. d. of the Archbp. (Brodrick) of Cashel. 2nd. tit., Visct. Bernard. Lord-Lieut. of the co. of Cork. 8, *Hyde-park Terrace; Carlton; Castle-Bernard, co. Cork.*

†BANGOR (Bp. of), Christopher Bethell, D.D.

2nd s. of Rev. R. Bethell; unmarried; consecrated Bp. of Gloucester 1824; translated 1880. Formerly Fellow of King's College, Cambridge. Is patron of 94 livings. Annual value of see, £4000. *Warren's Hotel, Regent-st.; Bangor Palace, Carnarvonsh.*

BATEMAN (2nd Bar.), William Bateman Bateman-Hanbury; cr. 1837.

B. 1826; graduated at Trinity College, Cambridge. The family is descended from the Hanburys of Kelmarsh, a younger branch of the Hanburys of Worcestersh. *Shobden Court, Herefordsh.; Kelmarsh, Northamptonsh.*

†BATH AND WELLS (Bp. of), Hon. Richard Bagot, D.D.

S. of 1st Lord Bagot, b. 1782; m. d. of 4th Earl of Jersey. Consecrated Bp. of Oxford, 1829; translated 1845. Visitor of Wadham College, Oxford. Formerly Fell. of All Souls' College. Is patron of 80 livings. Annual value of see, £5000. *Palace, Wells.*

†BATHURST (4th Earl), Henry George Bathurst, D.C.L.; cr. 1772.

B. 1790. 2nd tit. Lord Apsley. Is patron of 2 livings. (h. c. 1834 as Lord Apsley.) Has been a member of the Board of Control. 4, *Wilton Crescent; Carlton; Oakley Grove, Gloucestersh.; Langwith Lodge, Notts.*

†BAYNING (3rd Bar.), Rev. Hen. Wm. Powlett; cr. 1797.

B. 1797, m. d. of the late Wm. Henry Fellowes, esq. Assumed the name Powlett in place of the family name of Townshend. Is Rector of Broome, and Rural Dean of Norwich. *University; Carlton; Brome Rectory, Eps, Suffolk.*

†BEAUCHAMP (3rd Earl), John Reginald Pyndar; cr. 1815.

M. d. of the 1st Earl of Clonmel. 2d tit. Visct. Elmley. Lygon has been the family name, but the present Earl assumes the surname of Pyn

only. Is patron of 4 livings. 37, *Portman-sq.*; *Carlton*; *Madresfield Court, Worcestersh.*

†**BEAUFORT** (7th Duke of), Henry Somerset, K.G.; cr. 1682.

B. 1792, m. first, d. of the Hon. Henry Fitzroy, 2dly, d. of Chs. C. Smith, esq. 2nd tit. Marq. of Worcester. (h. c. 1835 as Marq. of Worcester.) The celebrated Marquess of Worcester, an ancestor of the duke, was empowered by Charles II. to create peerages himself; but on the demand of the House of Lords, surrendered the patent. Is patron of 29 livings. 22, *Arlington-st.*; *Carlton*; *Badminton and Stoke Gifford, Gloucestershire*; *Troy House, Monmouthsh.*

***BEAUMONT** (8th Bar.), Miles Thos. Stapleton, cr. 1307.

B. 1808. m. d. of 3rd Baron Kilmaine. This peerage was called out of abeyance in 1840. 18, *Curzon-st.*; *Carleton-hall, Yorkshire*.

***BEAUVALE** (1st Bar.), Fred. James Lamb, P.C., G.C.B.; cr. 1839.

3rd s. of the 1st Visct. Melbourne; b. 1782; m. d. of the Count de Maltzahn. Has been Ambassador at Vienna. 12, *Hyde Park Terrace*; *Beauvale, Notts.*

***BEDFORD** (7th Duke of), Francis Russell, P.C., K.G.; cr. 1694.

B. 1788, m. d. of 3rd Earl of Harrington. (h. c. 1832, as Marq. of Tavistock.) The Duchess was a lady of the Bedchamber to the Queen. 2nd tit. Marq. of Tavistock. Is patron of 27 livings. 6, *Belgrave-sq.*; *Reform Club*; *Woburn Abbey, Oakley, Bedfordsh.*; *Endsleigh, Devon*.

***BELHAVEN AND STENTON** (8th Bar.), Robert Montgomery Hamilton; cr. 1647.

B. 1793, m. d. of Walter Campbell, esq. Is High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Sits as Baron Hamilton. Is Vice-Lieut. of Lanark. 30, *Albemarle-st.*; *Wishaw, Lanarksh.*

†**BERESFORD** (1st Visct.), Wm. Carr Beresford, G. C. B., D.C.L., P.C.; cr. 1823.

B. 1770, m. d. of 1st Lord Decies. (Peerage conferred for military services.) A Gen. in the Army, Col. of 16th Foot, Governor of Jersey, a Field Marshal in the Portuguese Army. Has been Master-Gen. of the Ordnance. Enjoys a pension of £2000 a year. 16, *Cavendish-sq.*; *Carlton*; *Beresford Hall, Stafford*; *Bedgebury Park, Kent*.

***BERNERS** (5th Bar.), Rev. Henry Wilson; cr. 1455.

B. 1762, m. d. of Thos. Sumpter, esq. Is rector of Alexton, Leicestershire. In May, 1832, this title was called out of abeyance. *Alexton*

Rectory, Rockingham, Leicestershire; Diddlington, Kirby lane, and Ashwellthorpe, Norfolk.

BERWICK (4th Bar.), Rev. Richard Noel-Hill; cr. 1784.

M. d. of Wm. M. Owen, esq. (she died 1840.) Is rector of Thornton, Cheshire, and Berrington, Salop, and patron of 4 livings. *Attingham House, Salop.*

***BESSBOROUGH (5th Earl of),** John George Brabazon Ponsonby; cr. 1739.

B. 1809, m. eld. d. of 1st Earl of Durham (dead). Sits as Baron Ponsonby. 2nd tit. Visct. Duncannon. Is Lord Lieut. of the county of Carlw. (h. c. 1847, as Lord Duncannon.) Peerage conferred for official services. 8, *Cavendish-sq.; Brookes's; White's; Travellers'; Bessborough House, Kilkenny; Sysenby, Leicestersh.; Rochester, Surrey.*

†**BEVERLEY (2nd Earl of),** George Percy; cr. 1790.

B. 1778, m. d. of the Hon. J. A. Stuart-Wortley. 2nd tit. Lord Louvaine. Has been Capt. of the Yeomen of the Guard. 8, *Portman-sq.; Carlton.*

†**BEXLEY (1st Bar.),** Nicholas Vansittart, D.C.L., F.R.S., P.C.; cr. 1823.

B. 1766, m. d. of 1st Lord Auckland, dead. (Peerage conferred for official services.) Is a Commissioner of the Duchy of Cornwall, and a Bencher of Lincoln's Inn; has been Chief Secretary for Ireland; Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster; Secretary to the Treasury, and during eleven years filled the office of Chancellor of the Exchequer. (h. c. 1828, as Mr. Vansittart.) 81, *Great George-st.; Carlton; Foot's Cray Place, Kent.*

†**BLAYNEY (12th Bar. Ir. Rep.),** Cadwallader Davis Blayney, cr. 1621.

B. 1808 (h. c. 1834 as Mr. Blayney), First Peer a Military Commander. 76, *Jermyn-st.; Carlton; Blayney Castle, Monaghan.*

***BOLINGBROKE (4th Visct.),** Henry St. John; cr. 1712.

B. 1786, m. d. of the late Sir Henry Mildmay, bt.; dead. (1st Peer the celebrated Lord Bolingbroke.) Is patron of 1 living. *Lydiard Park, Wills.*

†**BOLTON (2nd Bar.),** William Powlett-Powlett; cr. 1797.

B. 1782, m. d. of 1st Lord Dorchester. Is patron of 6 livings. *Hackwood House, Hants; Bolton Hall, Yorksh.*

†**BOSTON (3rd Bar.),** George Irby, D.C.L.; cr. 1761.

B. 1777, m. d. of William Drake, esq. dead. Is patron of 8 livings. *Hedsor Lodge, Bucks.*

†**BRADFORD** (2nd Earl of), George Augustus Frederick Henry Bridgeman; cr. 1815.

B. 1789, m. d. of Sir T. Moncrieffe, bt., dead. 2nd tit. Visct. Newport. Pres. of the Nor. and Shropsh. Association. Is patron of 10 livings. 48, *Belgrave-sq.*; *Carlton*; *Weston Hall, Staffordsh.*; *Castle Bromwich, Warwicksh.*

†**BRAYBROOKE** (3rd Bar.), Richard Griffin, LL.D.; cr. 1788.

B. 1783, m. d. of 2nd Marq. Cornwallis. High Steward of Wokingham. Visitor of Magdalene College, Cambridge. Is patron of 5 livings. 10, *New Burlington-st.*; *Audley End, Essex*; *Billingbear, Berks.*

***BREADALBANE** (2nd Marq. of), John Campbell, K.T.; cr. 1831.

B. 1796, m. d. of George Baillie, esq. 2nd tit. Earl of Ormelie. (h. c. as Visct. Glenorchy, and as Earl of Ormelie, 1834.) Lord-Lieut. of Argyllshire. Was Rector of the University of Glasgow, 1841. 21, *Park-l.*; *Kilchurn Castle, Argyllsh.*; *Taymouth Castle, Perthsh.*; *Langton House, Berwicksh.*

†**BRISTOL** (1st Marq. of), Frederic William Hervey, F.R.S.; cr. 1826.

B. 1769, m. d. of Lord Templetown (dead). 2nd tit. Earl Jermyn. Hereditary Steward of Bury St. Edmund's. Is patron of 20 livings. 6, *St. James'-sq.*; *Ichworth Park, Suffolk*; *Putney Heath, Surrey.*

***BROUGHAM AND VAUX** (1st Bar.), Henry Brougham, P.C.; cr. 1830.

B. 1779, m. d. of T. Eden, esq. President of University Coll., London. Has been Lord Chancellor; enjoys a pension of 5000*l.* a year. (h. c. 1830, as Mr. Brougham.) 4, *Grafton-st.*, *Bond-st.*; *Brougham Hall, Westmoreland.*

†**BROWNLOW** (1st Earl), John Cust, D.C.L., F.R.S.; cr. 1815.

B. 1779, m. first, d. of Sir A. Hume, bt.; 2dly, d. of G. Fludyer, esq.; 3dly, d. of the Earl of Mount-Edgumbe. 2nd tit. Visct. Alford. (Peerage conferred for official services.) Lord Lieut. Custos Rot. and Vice-Admiral of Lincolnsh., Col. of the South Lincoln militia, and Recorder of Boston. Is patron of 11 livings. The Countess is lady of the bed-chamber to the Queen Dowager. 12, *Belgrave-sq.*; *Carlton*; *Belton House, Lincolnsh.*

***BRUCE** (Bar.) George Wm. Fred. Brudenell-Bruce; cr. 1746.

Eld. s. of the Marq. of Ailesbury, and therefore by courtesy Earl

Bruce. B. 1804, m. d. of the 11th Earl of Pembroke. Is a Dep. Lieut. of Wilts. When this Peer was called to the Upper House in 1838, no new Peerage was created, and he takes precedence as of the year 1746, the date of his father's barony. (h. c. 1838, as Lord Bruce.) 78, *Pall Mall*; *Savernake Lodge, Wilts.*

†BUCCLEUCH AND QUEENSBERRY (5th Duke of), Walter Francis Montagu Douglas Scott, K.G., K.T.; cr. 1663.

B. 1806, m. d. of 2nd Marq. of Bath. Sits as Earl of Doncaster. 2nd tit. Earl of Dalkeith. Has been Lord President of the Council, and Lord Privy Seal. Lord-Lieut. of Edinburgh, and of Roxburghshire; Capt. Gen. of the Queen's body guard in Scotland, and Col. of Edinburgh Militia. Is patron of 11 livings. 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PART II.

EXPLANATION OF PARLIAMENTARY TERMS AND PROCEEDINGS.

ADJOURNMENT.—See Interruption of the Sittings of Parliament.

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**AMENDMENT.**—See Order.

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AVOIDANCE OF A DECISION.—When a motion has been made upon which the House happens to be unwilling to come to a vote, there are formal modes of avoiding a decision, amongst which are passing “to the other orders,” or moving “the previous question.” The former means, that the House should—casting aside and taking no further notice of the matter then before it—proceed to the other business appointed for that day; the latter, that a vote be previously taken as to the expediency of coming to any decision on the question raised. If “the previous question” be carried, the motion on which it bears is only gotten rid of for the time, whereas a direct negative to the motion itself would be a proscription of it for the remainder of the Session, as well as a denial of its principle. With respect to a Bill, moving that it “be read this day six months,” or this day three months, is a mode of throwing it out without coming to an express declaration against the principle of the measure.

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**BILLS (PRIVATE).**—These are chiefly introduced to enable private individuals, associated together, to undertake works of public utility at their own risk, and, in a degree, for their own benefit; but there are other private bills, as those of naturalization, change of name, divorce, or for perfecting titles to estates, &c. Generally speaking, expenses, including the fees, attendant upon a private bill amount to 500*l.*, and frequently to a much larger sum. The fees on a bill for the naturalization of a foreigner are limited to 100*l.* The class of professional gentlemen who act as solicitors in promoting private bills are called Parliamentary Agents.

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BILLS (PUBLIC).—A bill is the draft or skeleton of a statute. Any bill which the Lords can originate may be introduced and laid on the table by

any individual peer without the previous permission of the House; but in the Commons no bill can be brought in unless a motion for leave be previously agreed to. Permission having been granted, three or four members are appointed to prepare the bill. It is then brought in and read a first time, and a day appointed for the second reading, previously to which it is printed and a copy furnished to every member. The bill, after the second reading, is referred to a Committee of the whole House, when its details are considered, as its principles were upon each of its several readings. It is, however, very unusual to debate or divide upon the first reading of a bill; for if leave to introduce it be given, or if it should proceed from the other House, permission to read the bill once and have it printed, is rarely refused. But Members are at liberty to discuss its principle on any of its stages out of Committee; still no one is considered to have declared decisively in favour of its principle unless he support by his vote its second reading. In Committee the bill is debated clause by clause, the blanks left for names, dates, nature and amount of penalties, &c. are filled up, and sometimes the bill entirely new-modelled. The next proceeding is, that the Chairman of the Committee should make a report to the House of the changes that the bill has undergone, which he does by presenting a copy of it to the Speaker in its altered form. The House then re-considers the whole measure. Motions may be made and questions put upon every clause or amendment, and the bill may be even recommitted. After the report of the Committee has been agreed to, the bill is ordered to be "engrossed or written in a strong gross hand on one or more long rolls (or presses) of parchment sewed together." This being done, the bill is read a third time, and further amendments may then be made. If a new clause be added, it is called a rider. The last question but one is, that the "bill do pass;" after this nothing remains except to determine its title, which used to be a general one for all the acts passed in the Session, but in modern times distinct titles are used for each statute. During the progress of a bill the House *may* divide on the following questions: 1st, leave to bring it in; 2nd, when brought in whether it shall then be read a first time, and if not, when; 3rd, on the first reading; 4th, on the second reading; 5th, that it be committed; 6th, on the question that the Speaker do leave the chair, in order that the House should resolve itself into such committee; 7th, that the report of the committee be received; 8th, or that the bill be re-committed; 9th, that it be engrossed; 10th, that it be read a third time; 11th, that it do pass; 12th, the title of the bill. These are quite exclusive of any divisions concerning the particular days to be appointed for proceeding with any stage of the measure, or of any proceedings in committee, or any amendments, or of any clauses added to or expunged from the measure in or out of the Committee. Alterations are not usually proposed in a bill until after its principle has been disposed of on the second reading.

Immediately after the passing of a bill, the permanent Chairman of Committees in the case of bills introduced by the Government, or the mover of the bill in other cases, takes it and proceeds, accompanied by a few supporters of the measure, to convey it to the bar of their Lordships' House, desiring their concurrence. If it there passes through the same forms, except that of engrossing, which has been already done. If the bill be rejected, no further proceedings ensue. When the Lords agree with the Commons in the principle of the measure, but differ on matters of detail, a conference usually follows between members deputed from each House, who generally succeed in adjusting the difference; but if both Houses remain inflexible, the bill is dropped. The same proceedings are adopted *mutatis mutandis* when the bill originates in the Upper House. Acts of amnesty are read once only in each House. The bill having thus passed both Houses, remains with the Lords, except in the case of a bill of supply, which is sent back to the Commons, to be by them presented at the bar of the Lords to the Sovereign or the royal Commissioners. The assent of the Crown is the final proceeding which converts a bill into an Act of Parliament. No Act of Parliament can be altered, amended, or repealed during the Session in which it was passed, unless it contain a clause authorising a departure from the general rule. (See "Royal Assent.")

BUDGET (THE).—The Chancellor of the Exchequer makes one general statement every year to the House of Commons, which is intended to present a comprehensive view of the financial condition of the country. Sometimes there are preliminary, or supplemental, or occasional speeches; but the great general statement of the year has, for a long time past, been quaintly called "*the Budget*," from the French *bougette*, by a common figure of speech, putting the name of that which incloses, to signify the thing contained. The annual speech known by that appellation embraces a review of the income and expenditure of the last year, as compared with those of preceding years; remarks upon the financial prospects of the country; an exposition of the intended repeal, modifications or imposition of taxes during the session; and a detail of the public expenditure during the current period, with its grounds of justification.

CABINET.—The government of a state or community is understood to signify the exercise of supreme authority, and includes the executive, the legislative, and the judicial powers; but in popular acceptation it means only the first of these, the higher and more immediate functions of which are exercised by the Cabinet, a select body in whom, for the time being, the whole of the royal authority is vested. Its members all belong to the Privy Council, but do not include a tithe of that body. The Cabinet is composed of the more eminent portion of the Administration, but it does

not constitute more than a fourth part of those whom a change of ministry deprives of office, the persons included in that council being rarely less than ten or more than fifteen. The cabinet being more immediately responsible for the conduct of public affairs, their deliberations are always considered confidential, and kept secret even from their colleagues, who are less exalted in office. The distinguished individual who fills the situation of First Lord of the Treasury, and combined with it sometimes that of Chancellor of the Exchequer, is the chief of the ministry, and therefore of the cabinet: he is usually styled, the "Premier," or "Prime Minister," but more properly designated as "the head of her Majesty's government." It is at his immediate recommendation that his colleagues are appointed; and, with hardly an exception, he dispenses the patronage of the crown. Every cabinet includes the following high officers:—The First Lord of the Treasury, the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and the three Secretaries of State. Several other ministerial functionaries, however, have seats in the cabinet; never less than three, and rarely so many as eight or nine of this latter class, are called to that station. Their offices are as follow:—Chief Commissioner of Woods and Forests, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, First Lord of the Admiralty, President of the Board of Controul, President of the Board of Trade, Secretary at War, Paymaster-General of the Forces, Master of the Mint, Judge Advocate-General, Postmaster-General, Master-General of the Ordnance, Chief Secretary for Ireland, Chief Justice of the Queen's Bench.* The selection usually falls upon those amongst the latter mentioned functionaries, whose rank, talents, reputation, and political weight, render them the most useful auxiliaries, or whose services, while in opposition, may have created the strongest claims to the honours of the cabinet. It has occasionally happened that a peer possessing high character and influence accepts a seat in the cabinet without undertaking the labours and responsibility of any particular office. (See Crown, Executive.)

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**CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEES OF THE WHOLE HOUSE.**—In the Commons this officer—always a member—is elected by the House on the assembling of every new Parliament. When the House is in committee on bills introduced by the government, or in committee of ways and means, or supply (see Committee of Supply), or in committee to consider preliminary resolutions, it is his duty to preside; but he sits, not in the Speaker's chair, but at the table in the seat of the Clerk of the House. In the Lords, the Chairman of Committees of the whole House is elected by the House

every Session, and he is usually selected from amongst those peers who enjoy the rank of earl.

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CHILTERN HUNDREDS.—An acceptance of "the Chiltern Hundreds" is a form which has now no other meaning than that the Member accepting resigns his seat. No office, having emolument attached, can be conferred by the Crown on a Member of the House of Commons without his thereby vacating his seat, and it is only by obtaining office that a Member can rid himself of the duties which any body of constituents may impose even without his consent; the Crown, therefore, for the convenience of the House at large, is always ready to confer on any Member "the Stewardship of her Majesty's Chiltern Hundreds, the Stewardship of the Manor of Poynings, or the Escheatorship of Munster;" sinecures which he continues to hold till some other Member solicits a similar accommodation.

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**CLERK OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.**—"The Clerk of the Commons' House of Parliament" holds an office of great trust and importance. He, with two assistants, sits at the upper end of the table. The Crown appoints him by letters patent, and, when necessary, he can appoint a deputy. The appointment of the other clerks in the service of the House is vested in him. It is his duty to make minutes, not of the arguments held in the House, but of the decisions at which it arrives—in other words, to record its votes, resolutions, addresses, orders, reports, divisions, and all other proceedings in which it may be engaged; to see that they are correctly printed and distributed to the members, to read aloud all such documents as the House may order to be read, to perform the duty (without taking the chair) of president or moderator during the choice of a Speaker, putting a question and directing a division in the same manner as a chairman would.

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COMMITTALS.—In common with courts of law and equity, the Houses of Parliament can punish all contempts of their authority or disobedience of their mandates. Each House is armed with power to repress any aggression committed upon their rights, or any interference with their privileges: but in the case of the Commons the operation of this power is limited to the session of Parliament, committals by that House being invalidated by a prorogation. Either House can delegate to a Committee the power of sending for papers and records, and of enforcing the attendance of necessary witnesses.

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**COMMITTEES.**—Are, first, those of the whole House, which may be to consider of certain Resolutions, as to the nature of which considerable latitude prevails; or the House resolves itself into such Committee to con

sider the details of a Bill, the principle of which may be discussed at any or all of its other stages; or there may be Committees for financial purposes as those of "Supply," or "Ways and Means" (which see). Secondly, There are Select Committees chosen by ballot or otherwise for some specific purpose—the numbers composing such bodies seldom exceed twenty or thirty members; occasionally these are declared Committees of Secrecy. Thirdly, Election Committees, which are judicial tribunals, appointed to try the merits of controverted elections—these are always chosen by ballot. Fourthly, Committees on private Bills (which see). When the whole House is in Committee, the Speaker vacates the Chair, the Mace is placed under the table; and some other Member is called on to preside, who sits in the seat of the senior Clerk. For Committees of Supply, and Ways and Means, and Bills introduced by Ministers, there is a Chairman, who receives a salary. (See Chairman of Committees.)

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**CONFERENCE.**—This is a species of negotiation between the two Houses of Parliament, conducted by managers appointed on both sides, for the purpose of producing concurrence, in cases where mutual consent is necessary; or for the purpose of reconciling differences which may have arisen. If the conference be upon the subject of a bill depending between the two Houses, it must be demanded by that House which, at the time of asking the conference, is in possession of the bill. It is the sole privilege of the Lords to name the time and place for holding a conference, no matter by which House it may have been demanded. Reasons in writing for the course resolved to be taken, are usually furnished to the managers on both sides, in which case it is simply called "a conference." Should this proceeding fail, a "free conference" must be held, which gives an opportunity for the managers individually, and unrestrained by any precise form of argument, to urge such reasons as in their judgment may best tend to influence the House to which they are addressed. A free conference is usually demanded after two conferences have been holden without effect. After one free conference, none other but free conferences can be held touching the same subject. At all conferences, the managers on the part of the Upper House are seated and wear their hats; those for the Commons stand uncovered. The Speaker quits the chair of the House during the absence of managers attending a conference.

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**CROWN.**—The prerogatives and functions of the Crown may be summed up under the following heads:—To give or refuse to bills the "Royal Assent" (which see); to cause the due administration and execution of the laws; to act on behalf of the whole community in its intercourse with Foreign States, and as a part of that, to declare war or conclude peace; to direct the naval and military force of the country; to administer the public

revenue; to prorogue or dissolve Parliament; to create peers; and to coin money. The monarch is the head of the Church; the source of justice and of mercy, of all offices, honours, emoluments, and chartered rights. But in every case the sovereign acts by ministers who are amenable to Parliament, and the choice of those ministers is the only prerogative, which can be constitutionally exercised without responsible advisers; but even over this, there is much Parliamentary controul, for the royal favour can have no practical effect, unless it rest upon men whose characters and measures prove generally acceptable to both Houses (see Cabinet).

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DISSOLUTION.—See Interruption of the Sittings of Parliament.

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**ESTATE OF PARLIAMENT.**—Strictly speaking, the three “Estates of the Realm” consist of, 1st, the Lords Spiritual; 2nd, the Lords Temporal; 3rd, the Commons. Parliament fully assembled consists of the King, with the two estates of the peerage, sitting in one House, and the Commonalty by their representatives standing below the bar. But instead of the three estates of the realm, we are accustomed to speak of the three branches of the legislature. Neither of the Houses ever deliberates in the presence of the Sovereign, nor will either of them permit any allusion in debate to his sentiments. The King, Lords, and Commons, in their united character, exercise none but the legislative functions. Taken together, they are the Parliament, and there can be no act of Parliament in which they do not concur. (See Royal Assent.) In addition to this legislative character, common to the three, each has separate functions peculiar to itself. In the Sovereign resides the whole executive authority. The House of Lords exercises judicial authority as a court of dernier resort, and as a tribunal to which great officers of state, impeached by the other House, are amenable.

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EXECUTIVE.—The following comprise the principal departments of the executive government:—The Treasury, the Admiralty, the War Office, the Ordnance, the Home Office, the India Board, the Colonial Office, the Board of Trade, the Foreign Office, the Board of Public Works, Woods and Forests, the Mint, the Office of the Privy Seal, the Office of the Duchy of Lancaster, and the Irish Office. Those offices which are principally or exclusively occupied with the collection of the public revenue are the Customs, the Excise, the Stamps, the Post Office, the Office of Assessed Taxes, the Crown Lands, &c. The public functionaries to whom the conduct in chief of these several departments is entrusted, together with the great officers of the royal household, constitute what is termed the Ministry or Administration.* Its members vary according to cir-

* The chief officers of the Customs, Excise, Stamps, and Taxes, are exceptions; they do not go out of office on changes of the Administration.

cumstances, rarely exceeding fifty or sixty persons. They hold their offices, not like the judges, *quandiu bene se gesserint*, but *durante bene placito*—a tenure which was anciently universal, and still prevails in the great majority of offices. The Administration usually resign when they lose the confidence of either House of Parliament; or they may be dismissed by the Sovereign, and it is competent for either House to present an address to the throne, praying their dismissal. The members of a government are understood to concur in principles of legislation and policy, and co-operate in Parliament upon all matters not specifically agreed on as open questions. Their acknowledged chief is the First Lord of the Treasury. When a Commoner, he frequently though not necessarily combines with that office the Chancellorship of the Exchequer.

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#### FINANCE.—See Budget.

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HOUSE OF COMMONS.—This branch of the Legislature no longer sits in St. Stephen's chapel, but in what was formerly the place of assemblage for the Upper House; which, in consequence of the calamitous fire that occurred in the month of October of 1834, has been converted into a temporary place of meeting for the House of Commons. That which is called the strangers' gallery is placed at the lower end, opposite the chair, and commands a full view of the House. Behind the chair is a small gallery appropriated to the Reporters, while the side galleries are exclusively for Members. Persons obtain access to the "strangers' gallery" through the order of a member, given in writing or *visu & voce*. According to ancient practice, the House always adjourns to 10 o'clock in the morning; and should the Speaker take the chair (forty members being present*) at any time between that hour and four in the afternoon, the appointed proceedings may immediately commence; otherwise no business can, on that day, be transacted, and the House will stand adjourned to 10 o'clock on the following morning. Down to 1833, the practice was, that a few minutes before 4 o'clock the Speaker took his seat at the table, the Chaplain read prayers, the strangers' gallery was then opened, the Members present were counted, and, as forty generally attended, business began. The fact important to visitors of the House was this, that any Member might, at any time after 12 o'clock, call upon the door-keeper to open the gallery—a course which Members frequently adopted for the accommodation of their private friends whenever a great debate was expected—hence it became difficult to conjecture how early the gallery might be filled; but generally speaking it was not opened till 4 o'clock. During the Session of 1833, a material change

took place, the House sitting from 12 till 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and resuming at 5. This continued to be the practice in 1834, and was occasionally resorted to in 1835. At first the early sittings were confined to private business and petitions; but, towards the latter end of the Session, public business commenced at noon, and was continued generally till long after midnight, with the exception of the hours from 3 to 5. For three or four years past, however, the old practice of not commencing business till 4 in the afternoon has been generally observed. All Peers, distinguished foreigners, &c. are accommodated below the bar, besides those who are fortunate enough to obtain Orders from the Speaker.

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**HOUSE OF LORDS.**—The strangers' gallery, as in the Commons, is not opened till after prayers, and strangers are excluded during divisions. Their Lordships frequently sit during the day as a Court of Appeal, but do not usually assemble in their legislative capacity until five in the afternoon, unless upon the opening or closing of the session, which generally takes place at two o'clock; or when the royal assent is to be given to Bills by commission, on which occasion their Lordships meet earlier than the customary hour, but for this purpose no precise time has been established by usage. While sitting in their judicial capacity, the House, like other courts of justice, is open to the public.

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INTERRUPTION OF THE SITTINGS OF PARLIAMENT.—The proceedings of the legislature may be interrupted or suspended either by adjournment, prorogation, or dissolution. Adjournment, as the term imports, is a postponement of the sitting or proceedings of either House of Parliament from one time, to another specified for the reassemblage. When the sittings of both Houses are interrupted by royal authority, it is called prorogation. Dissolution puts an end to the representative character of the individuals, who at the time compose the House of Commons, as well as to that of the sixteen Scottish Peers, and Parliament cannot again assemble until after a general election. The power of adjournment is inherent in each House respectively, and no precise restraints upon this power are prescribed by the constitution. Either House may interrupt or postpone any debate, defer the consideration of any measure, or altogether adjourn its sittings. The Lords frequently adjourn "during pleasure," which means that the Lord Chancellor or other Speaker of the House may, in the exercise of his discretion, take his seat on the woolsack, two other Peers being present, and cause business to proceed at any hour within the day on which such adjournment "during pleasure" takes place, otherwise their Lordships' House will stand adjourned to the usual hour on the following day; but usage has fixed five o'clock, P.M., as the time for resuming after an

adjournment "during pleasure." The Commons, on the contrary, always *adjourns* to a time specified. The Speaker of that House may, in conformity with the previously expressed wish of the body over which he presides, leave the chair during any number of hours; but such proceeding is merely regarded as a temporary suspension of business, and not called an adjournment. (See House of Commons.) The adjournment of one House is no adjournment of the other. The Crown may, pending an adjournment, summon by proclamation, either House or both; and may direct either or both Houses to adjourn to any particular day, which direction has always been obeyed to the letter; but some Members, and even some writers of authority, have denied the existence of such a prerogative, yet it has been frequently exercised, and never resisted. It is contrary, however, to modern usage. An individual member may for the time interrupt the progress of business, by successive motions of adjournment, which *may* be repeated indefinitely; but the adoption of this course rarely has the effect of delaying proceedings for more than a single day. In Committee, to move that the Chairman report progress is equivalent to moving that the debate be then adjourned. Adjournment does not close the session; prorogation does not terminate the Parliament; the former is an act of either House; the latter an act of the Crown, the duration of which may be subsequently extended or curtailed, according to the royal pleasure. All unfinished proceedings are quashed by prorogation; but during an adjournment they remain *in statu quo*. Prorogation never extends beyond eighty days (see Privileges of Parliament), but fresh prorogations may take place from time to time by proclamation, and continue to be renewed till it is intended that Parliament should really assemble for the despatch of business. The Crown, by proclamation, may, notwithstanding a prorogation, summon Parliament on giving fourteen days' notice. Dissolution is the civil death of the Parliament, and may be effected by the pleasure of the Crown, by the demise of the Crown, or by length of time. The existence of a Parliament cannot be prolonged, even by the authority of the monarch, for a greater period than seven years; and however recently elected, it must expire in six months at most from the demise of the Crown; but, of course, it may be dissolved by the Sovereign in a less period than six months from the death of his predecessor. If Parliament at the time of the Sovereign's death be separated by adjournment or prorogation, it must assemble immediately. If no Parliament be then in existence, the members of the last must again meet and may serve as a Parliament for six months, unless sooner prorogued; and so much importance appears to be attached to an instant assemblage, that upon the demise of the Crown even the intervention of Sunday is not permitted to delay the meeting of both Houses.

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 LORD HIGH CHANCELLOR.—This distinguished functionary being

keeper of the great seal, is by prescription Speaker of the House of Lords, and is usually a Peer. When royal commissions are issued for opening the Session, for giving the royal assent to bills, or for proroguing Parliament, the Lord Chancellor is always one of the Commissioners, and reads the royal speech upon the occasion. When the Sovereign opens or closes the Session in person, the Lord Chancellor stands on the right of the throne, and hands to the Monarch the speech opening or terminating the annual labours of the Legislature.

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MINISTER (PRIME).—See Cabinet.

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**MINISTRY.—**See Cabinet: also Executive.

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MONEY BILL.—See Supply: also Ways and Means.

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**NEWSPAPER REPORTING.**—A century ago there was no publication which could properly be said to contain a satisfactory account of parliamentary proceedings; and even within the recollection of many persons now alive the debates were but very imperfectly reported. From the commencement of the American war, however, till the year 1814, a *gradual* improvement took place in the publication of debates, until at length the art of the Reporter, and the business of the Publisher, were prosecuted with a degree of success, the effects of which will continue to be felt so long as freedom and civilization exist in England. When the close of the war in 1815 diminished at once the supply and the importance of foreign intelligence; when the public attention became directed with almost exclusive anxiety to domestic affairs, the publication of Parliamentary debates appeared to become an object of national importance, and in the course of a few years assumed its present full, detailed, and accurate character. It is contrary to the standing orders of both Houses that any strangers should be present, and an individual member can demand that the order be enforced; the publication, therefore, of debates is held to be theoretically a breach of privilege; but in modern times, if any member were repeatedly to insist upon the exclusion of "strangers," as all are called who neither are members nor officers of the House, there can be no doubt that this abuse of the privilege must lead to such a modification of the standing order as would deprive individual members of any controul over a matter so interesting to the nation, whose representatives and servants they are, from whose pleasure their Parliamentary existence and authority are derived, and by whom that authority would doubtless be speedily withdrawn, were any attempt made to carry on the business of the public without publicity. Secret deliberations have been so long renounced, that the right of the public to be present through their agents, the Reporters, is as clearly established now as if no theoretical

privacy had ever existed. The process of Parliamentary reporting, and the qualifications of those by whom the task is performed, cannot be adequately described within the narrow limits of this article, but it is hoped that the reader may be enabled to form some idea of both from the following brief outline. Every publication not copying from, or abridging any other, but giving original reports, keeps one of a series of Reporters constantly in the gallery of the Lords and another in the Commons. These, like sentinels, are at stated periods relieved by their colleagues, when they take advantage of the interval to transcribe their notes, in order to be ready again to resume the duty of note taking, and afterwards that of transcription for the press. A succession of Reporters for each establishment is thus maintained, and the process of writing from their notes never interrupted till an account of the whole debates of the evening has been committed to the hands of the printer. There are only seven publications for which a Reporter is constantly in attendance, and these include the London morning newspapers, from which all others that give debates are under the necessity of copying or abridging them. The number of Reporters maintained by each varies from ten or eleven to seventeen or eighteen. They are for the most part gentlemen of liberal education—many having graduated at the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Edinburgh, Glasgow, or Dublin; and they must all possess a competent knowledge of the multifarious subjects which come under the consideration of Parliament. The expedition and ability with which their duties are performed must be admitted by every one who attends a debate and afterwards reads a newspaper, while the correctness and rapidity with which their manuscript is put in type and printed, has long been a subject of surprise and admiration. Mr. Sheil's speech on the Income Tax (March 1st, 1845), contains the following passage:—"What can be more unjust than to impose the same Tax upon a man whose income is derived from his intellectual toil—which may be called the sweat of his mind—and upon the man whose income is as stable as the earth on which we tread; can there be a greater injustice than to tax, in the same proportion, the first Lord of the Treasury and the gentlemen who report his speech on the Income Tax in the gallery of this House? There are men in that gallery of liberal education, and of minds embellished with every literary adornment, who, by great labour, by great wear and tear of body and mind, acquire an income which falls within the range of the tax, although it is far from being commensurate with the ability or the usefulness of a class to which some of the first men in England have belonged."

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OFFICE (ACCEPTANCE OF).—See Chiltern Hundreds.
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**ORDER.—**By this word is meant an obedience to certain regulations

which are intended to facilitate the despatch of business, and preserve decorum in public deliberations. The rules by which the business of the Houses of Parliament is conducted are of two kinds, one class they possess in common with all public assemblies, another is peculiar to themselves (see Speaker, duties of, as also House of Lords, order in). For the proper application of these rules, it has been found necessary that some officer should be appointed, to whose decision deference will be paid. Such an officer is the Chairman or Speaker. In the House of Commons (though the practice in the Lords is otherwise), he takes no part in debate, his duty being to regulate the manner in which business shall be transacted; to confine those who address the House to the real subject under discussion; to pronounce an opinion upon any thing relating to order; to put the matter in dispute into the form of a question, on which the votes of the body at large may be taken; to announce the decision of the majority to declare the proceedings of the assembly closed at the completion of the business of the day, and to see that they are properly recorded. The first act of the Member who presides is to intimate that business should commence, which is done by calling on the individual whose motion stands first on the list of notices, or who is otherwise entitled to precedence. A motion being made, it is necessary that it should be seconded, else it falls to the ground. This done, the terms of the motion are handed in writing to the Chairman, who reads them aloud. Objections may then be taken. Amongst the several modes of opposing a motion, are the following—a direct negative, an amendment, a postponement, proceeding to “the other orders,” moving “the previous question,” or an adjournment. A motion which has been moved, seconded, and read, becomes a sort of property of the whole body, and cannot be withdrawn without leave. If no objector to a motion present himself, neither the mover nor seconder has a right to speak again, except in explanation; but if an objection be started, a right of reply is, according to the courtesy of all assemblies, acquired by the mover of any original motion, but not by the mover of an amendment;—the privilege of explanation, however, is conceded to all. The debate being ended, either by a pause, or at the manifest wish of a large majority, the presiding Member puts the question, calling upon those who are favourable to say “ay,” and those of a contrary opinion to say “no.” He then declares, that in his judgment the “ayes” or the “noes” “have it.” If any Member should question this decision, the House must divide, the Speaker or Chairman appointing tellers; in the House of Lords, the phrase is “content” and “not content,” whilst in most other public assemblies the votes previous to a division are taken by show of hands. When an amendment has been moved, it is usual to take the votes simply for the amendment, and then for the original motion; but in Parliament the practice is that the Speaker or Chairman should read to the

House the original motion, next that he should read the amendment, and then say, "the question which I am to put is, that the words proposed to be left out (by the amendment) stand part of the question." Should the "noes" prevail, the amendment then becomes a substantive motion, upon which other amendments may be moved, and considered in like manner as the first. Thus a number of successive amendments to the original motion may be disposed of, though no amendment can be moved upon an amendment; but all the amendments as well as the motion itself may be negatived. Any Member is at liberty to interrupt another by "rising to order," viz., calling the attention of the chair, or of the assembly at large, to the fact, that a breach of order was then being committed. When two or more Members rise at once to address the House of Commons, the Speaker or Chairman determines who shall have precedence. In Parliament it is contrary to order for those engaged in debate, to mention any Member by name (excepting the Chairman of Committees). It is also out of order to speak in direct terms of any proceedings of the other House, unless they have been formally made known by "message," or recorded in the notices, votes, or orders of the other House. It is also irregular to refer to the opinions of the Sovereign; speeches from the throne and royal messages being treated as the sentiments of the ministry, which the Sovereign utters or communicates on their responsibility.

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ORDER IN THE LORDS.—The rules of order in the House of Lords differ in some particulars from those observed in the Commons. In debate those who speak address the whole house, and not the chairman. The Peer who sits on the woolsack or in the chair of committees has no duties to perform during the deliberations of the House, excepting to "put the question." He is not the judge or guardian of order. If several Peers rise together, the House decides who shall first be heard. The speaker or deputy speaker of the Lords is not disqualified *ex officio* from taking a part in debate.

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**ORIGINATING BILLS.**—With the Crown all bills of amnesty originate;—with the House of Lords all bills relating to a restitution in blood and to restitution of honours;—with the House of Commons all bills relating to the public income and expenditure, and all other measures that can properly come within the class of "money bills." Bills affecting the royal prerogative are not usually introduced into either House without the previous consent of the Crown. It is considered unconstitutional for one House to take the initiative in any measure affecting the privileges of the other. In general it is held that in the Lords should originate bills of "pains and penalties," or other measures founded upon oral testimony, as their Lordships, unlike the Commons, have the power of examining witnesses upon oath.

**OTHER ORDERS (PASSING TO THE).—**See Avoidance of a Decision.

**PARLIAMENT.**—The Commons are not the Parliament, neither are the Lords nor the Crown; but the three united are the "Estates," which in their triple capacity constitute the Parliament, and exercise the legislative functions of the realm. A peer is of course as much a member of Parliament as a commoner, while the Crown is a whole estate of Parliament centred in the person of an individual. The two Houses convened by royal authority, and acting jointly with the Crown, constitute the Legislature or Parliament; and its acts are called indifferently "Statutes" or "Acts of Parliament;" they have the full force and effect of law. (See "Bills," as also "Estate of Parliament.") The power of Parliament is held to be transcendent, and subject to no limitation whatever. An Act of Parliament binds every subject, and even the Sovereign, when specially named therein; and no authority less than that of Parliament can dispense with or abrogate a statute.

**PEERS OF PARLIAMENT.**—The Peerage of Great Britain and Ireland may be described as consisting of the following parts; the reader, however, should bear in mind that every individual peerage has a locality, no matter with what part of the empire the existing possessor may otherwise be connected. There are, in the first place, the Peers of England; 2dly, those of Scotland; 3dly, those of Ireland; 4thly, those of the United Kingdom; and, 5thly, those of the Episcopal Bench; but such distinctions are chiefly confined to Parliament. In the House of Lords, all Peers of England have seats and votes, so have all of the United Kingdom, though the locality may be Irish or Scottish. It frequently happens that Peers of England, or of the United Kingdom, hold an equal or superior rank in the peerage of Scotland or that of Ireland. In which case, though popularly known by the higher dignity, they still have seats and votes in the House as of the inferior rank. Lord Paget (by courtesy Earl of Uxbridge); Lord (by courtesy Earl) Bruce, heirs respectively to the Peerages of Anglesey and Ailesbury, were called to the Upper House during their fathers' lives. The peers of Scotland and Ireland have a place in the House only by their representatives, of which Ireland sends 28, and Scotland 16. By the Act of Union, no Irish Peer enjoying a British dignity can be elected a Representative Peer. But the case of an Irish Representative obtaining an English Peerage after his election was not adverted to: there are consequently at present some Irish Representatives who sit by their Irish dignities, though holding also English baronies. All English and Welsh bishops, with the exception of the Bishop of Sodor and Man, sit as barons, and four of the Irish bishops in annual

rotation. The Scottish peers are chosen with every new Parliament. The twenty-eight Irish temporal peers are elected for life.

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PREVIOUS QUESTION.—See Avoidance of a Decision.

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**PRIVILEGES OF PARLIAMENT.**—These are of three kinds: 1st, the privileges which appertain to members individually; 2nd, those which belong to either House in its collective capacity; 3rd, those of both Houses jointly. From well known precedents it appears that the Lords and Commons, acting concurrently, can assume the supreme power whenever the throne is vacant, or the Sovereign incapable of exercising the royal functions, as happened at the Revolution in 1688; in 1788, when the sovereign authority was offered to the Prince of Wales, though George III. recovered so speedily that a regency became unnecessary; in 1812, when a restricted regency was appointed; and, subsequently, when the restrictions were removed. The separate privileges of either House are extensive, but they are, at the same time, uncertain and indefinite. Amongst those privileges are the power of committing individuals to prison, the power of publishing matters which, if not issuing from such high authority, might become the subject of proceedings in a court of law, the power of directing the Attorney-General to prosecute persons accused of offences against the laws, or affecting the privilege of Parliament, and, finally, a power vested in each House respectively of doing any thing—not directly contravening an *Act* of Parliament—which may be necessary for the vindication or protection of itself in the exercise of its own constitutional functions. In the daily proceedings of Parliament questions of privilege take precedence of all other business. The privileges of individual members of Parliament are freedom of speech and person, including freedom from legal arrests and seizures under process from the courts of law or equity; this, however, does not extend to indictable offences, to actual contempts of the courts of justice, or to proceedings in bankruptcy. Members of Parliament are exempt from serving the office of sheriff, from obeying subpoenas, and serving on juries. Every member can introduce one person to the strangers' gallery. "Privilege of Parliament" continues to Peers at all times, and to Commoners during eighty days after a prorogation, and for a "convenient" time after dissolution. Peers are entitled to be present at the coronation of the Sovereign, but places were never provided for the Commons at that ceremonial until the reign of William IV. Peers cannot be outlawed in any civil action, nor can any attachment lie against their persons; they are exempt from attending courts leet, or the *posse-com-tatus*; when arraigned for any criminal offence, it must be before their peers: who return a verdict, not upon oath, but upon honour; they have th

privilege of sitting covered in courts of justice; they may vote in Parliament by proxy.

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PROROGATION.—See Interruption of the Sittings of Parliament.

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**QUESTION.**—See Order.  
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ROYAL ASSENT.—The act by which the Crown agrees to a bill which has already passed both Houses is called "The Royal Assent," which may be given by the Sovereign in person robed, crowned, and seated on the throne in the House of Lords, the Commons standing at the bar: or the royal assent may be given by commissioners appointed by the Crown for that special purpose and for the single occasion. The forms observed in both cases do not vary, and are as follow:—The Lords being assembled in their own House, the Sovereign or the Commissioners seated, and the Commons at the bar, the titles of the several bills which have passed both Houses are read, and the King or Queen's answer is declared by the clerk of the Parliaments in Norman French. To a bill of supply the assent is given in the following words:—" *Le roy (or, la reine) remercie ses loyals subjects, accepte leur benevolence et ainsi le veut.*" To a private bill it is thus declared:—" *Soit fait comme il est désiré.*" And to public general bills it is given in these terms:—" *Le roy (or, la reine) le veut.*" Should the Sovereign refuse his assent, it is in the gentle language of "*Le roy (or, la reine) s'avisera*.*" As acts of grace and amnesty originate with the Crown, the clerk expressing the gratitude of the subject addresses the throne as follows:—" *Les prélats, seigneurs, et commons, en ce present Parliament assemblés au nom de tout vous autres subjects remercient très humblement votre majesté, et prient à Dieu vous donner en sante bonne vie et longue.*" The moment the royal assent has been given, that which was a bill becomes an Act, and *instantly* has the force and effect of law, unless some time for the commencement of its operation should have been specially appointed.

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**SERJEANT AT ARMS.**—Of officers bearing this title, there are several; some are attached to the Court of Chancery; but there are two appointed by the Crown to attend the Houses of Parliament, and each has a deputy. In the House of Lords, the practical maintenance of decorum below the bar, near the throne, and in the gallery, devolves upon the gentleman and yeoman usher, with their assistants, so that "the Serjeant at Arms attending the House of Lords" has less conspicuous duties to perform than those which

\* Queen Elisabeth at the end of a Session rejected 48 bills agreed to by both Houses. The power of rejection was exercised for the last time in the year 1692, by William III. who at first refused, but in two years afterwards yielded assent to the bill for Triennial Parliaments.



devolve upon "the Serjeant attending the House of Commons;" both, however, execute the commands of the House to which they belong, as regards the apprehension or custody of all persons committed by order of Parliament. In the House of Commons, the Serjeant at Arms is an officer of considerable importance, enjoying large emoluments, assisted by a deputy and several subordinate officers; during the sittings of the House he occupies a chair below the bar, and he directs a large proportion of the arrangements connected with the maintenance of order in the approaches to the House and the offices adjacent. He is at once the executive and the ceremonial officer of the lower House; but his discretionary powers are not extensive, for almost all his more important duties are performed under the immediate direction of the House itself, communicated through the Speaker. The office is usually held by a gentleman of the military profession, seldom under the rank of a field officer.

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SESSION.—The term session, applied to the sittings of any public assembly, would be generally understood to signify the period during which they sat without any intermission or recess; but in Parliamentary language it has a more extensive signification. Unless Parliament be prorogued, the session is not closed. The House of Commons takes care to limit to one year the duration of certain acts of Parliament, such as the Mutiny Act, all statutes authorising the levy of taxes, &c., without which the Government of the country could not be carried on, and the Crown, therefore, is compelled to resort to an annual assemblage of Parliament, which usually takes place in the beginning of February, though special circumstances may sometimes lead to the appointment of an earlier period. Fourteen days at least, but generally thirty or forty days previous to the intended meeting, a proclamation is issued by the Crown, commanding the attendance of the Lords and Commons, usually at Westminster; but it may be at any place within the United Kingdom. The Houses being assembled, the Sovereign meets them in the House of Lords, and delivers a speech. In this manner does a session commence. The circumstance of either or both Houses adjourning their sittings, whether with, or without the recommendation of the Crown, does not terminate the session. To effect that, there must be an actual prorogation under a royal commission, or by the Sovereign in person. The progress which a measure makes in one session, does not influence its position in the next, or in any other; for if not completed previous to the prorogation of Parliament, it must in any following session be commenced *de novo*. The mere assemblage and prorogation are not however sufficient of themselves to constitute a session, unless one bill, at least, have passed both Houses, and received the Royal assent. The business usually transacted on the first day of every session is to take into consideration the speech from the throne; but for "form

sake," one bill always receives a first reading, in order, it is said, to assert a right in the Parliament of not being obliged to give precedence to the subjects contained in the royal speech. In the year 1768, in 1817, and on various other occasions, the consideration of the King's speech has been delayed by discussions on other subjects, but generally the practice is to proceed with it at five o'clock in the afternoon, namely, in about two hours after the speech has been delivered. The usual duration of the session is from February to August; but no number or length of adjournments destroy its continuity. In the year 1621, the House of Commons adjourned its sittings for five months; but yet it was held that the session had not terminated. (See "Interruption of the Sittings of Parliament.")

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**SIX MONTHS (THIS DAY).—**See Avoidance of a Decision.  
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SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS (DUTIES OF).—This great officer must have been anciently as at present the organ or mouthpiece of the Commons, although in modern times he is more occupied in presiding over the deliberations of the House, than in delivering speeches on their behalf. Amongst the duties of the Speaker are the following:—To read to the Sovereign petitions or addresses from the Commons, and to deliver, in the Royal presence, whether at the Palace or in the House of Lords, such speeches as are usually made on behalf of the Commons; to manage in the name of the House, where counsel, witnesses, or prisoners, are at the bar; to reprimand persons who have incurred the displeasure of the House; to issue warrants of committal or release for breaches of privilege; to communicate in writing with any parties, when so instructed by the House; to exercise vigilance in reference to private bills, especially with a view to protect property in general, or the rights of individuals, from undue encroachment or injury; to express the thanks or approbation of the Commons to distinguished personages; to controul and regulate the subordinate officers of the House; to entertain the members at dinner, in due succession, and at stated periods; to adjourn the House at four o'clock, if forty members be not present (see Adjournment); to appoint tellers on divisions. The Speaker must abstain from debating, unless in Committees of the whole House. As Chairman of the House, his duties are the same as those of any other President of a deliberative assembly. (See Order.) When Parliament is about to be prorogued, it is customary for the Speaker to address to the Sovereign, in the House of Lords, a speech, recapitulating the proceedings of the session.

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**SPEAKER—HIS PRIVILEGES, APPOINTMENT, AND RANK.—**He is chosen by the House of Commons from amongst its own members, sub'

to the approval of the Crown, and holds his office till the dissolution of the Parliament in which he was elected. His salary is 6000*l.* a year, exclusive of a furnished residence. At the end of his official labours he is generally rewarded by a peerage, and a pension of 4000*l.* for two lives. He is a member of the Privy Council, and entitled to rank after Barons. When forty members are not present, he may adjourn the House without leave (see Adjournment). Generally speaking, business cannot be transacted in his absence, though to this rule there was an exception in the year 1806, a prisoner being released by order of the House during the illness of a Speaker. Should a member persevere in breaches of order, the Speaker may "name" him, as it is called, a course uniformly followed by the censure of the House. In extreme cases the Speaker may order members or others into custody until the pleasure of the House be signified (see Committals). He has a casting vote on divisions.

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SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF LORDS.—The Lord Chancellor is the keeper of the great seal, and by virtue of that office he becomes on the bare delivery of the seal to him by the Sovereign, speaker of the House of Lords. He is usually, but not necessarily, a peer. There has always been a deputy speaker, and sometimes two. The Chairman of Committees generally fills the latter office (see Chairman of Committees on Commons). In the absence of the Lord Chancellor and of the Deputy Speaker, it is competent to the House to appoint any noble Lord to take the woolsack. The Speaker is the organ or mouthpiece of the House, and it therefore is his duty to represent their Lordships in their collective capacity when holding intercourse with other public bodies or with individuals. He has not a casting vote upon divisions, for should the numbers prove equal, the not contents prevail. (See Speaker of the House of Commons, duties of, privileges of.) The Deputy Speaker of the Lords is appointed by the Crown. (See Order, as also Order in the Lords.)

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**STRANGERS (ADMISSION OF).**—See House of Commons.

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SUPPLY (COMMITTEE OF).—All proceedings which relate to the public income or expenditure, must originate with the House of Commons, and the initiative to the latter consists of resolutions moved in a Committee of Supply, which is always a Committee of the whole House. In the course of the session, estimates are submitted to a Committee of Supply, and resolutions moved therein, granting to the Crown the sums requisite for defraying the expense attendant upon the various branches of the public service. Those resolutions having been considered and disposed of,

such amongst them as may be affirmed, are reported to the House, reconsidered, and adopted or rejected. Under authority of those to which the House agree, the Lords of the Treasury issue the requisite funds for carrying on the service of the country. At the end of the session, the supply resolutions are consolidated in the Appropriation Bill, which is sent up to the Lords, and being there considered and decided on, receives the Royal assent, and becomes law. The Lords may reject this or any other money bill; but it would be considered an invasion of the privileges of the Commons if their Lordships were substantially to modify measures of this class; the Commons, however, do not object to consider any verbal emendations which may be made by the other House. Before any bill can be introduced, authorising expenditure of public money, resolutions must be moved in Committee of Supply, agreed to there, reported, and confirmed by the House.

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**THREE MONTHS (THIS DAY).—**See Avoidance of a Decision.

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VACATING SEATS.—See Chiltern Hundreds.

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**WAYS AND MEANS (COMMITTEE OF).—**As the Committee of Supply (which see) relates to the expenditure of the nation, so the functions and duties of a Committee of Ways and Means, have reference to the funds by which such expenditure is to be sustained. Loans, duties, taxes, tolls, revenue and imposts of every description, are submitted to a Committee of Ways and Means (which is always one of the whole House). The propositions of Government on these subjects are reduced to the form of resolutions, considered, decided on; and such as are agreed to, reported to the House. Those which may be there adopted are embodied into bills, and in due course become law. As in the case of supply, the Lords may reject, but cannot modify; neither can their Lordships insert pecuniary penalties in any bill whatever.

Was first elected for Corfe Castle in 1816, which he continued to represent until the passing of the Reform Act; unsuccessfully contested the University of Cambridge in 1829. First returned for the co. in 1841.—5, *Old Palace Yard*; *Carlton*; *United University*; *Studland, Dorsetsh.*; *East Sheen, Surrey*.

**Barclay, David.** (*Sunderland*)

S. of the late Robert Barclay, esq. of Bury Hill; b. 1784; mar. in 1818, Maria Dorothea, the eldest sister of Sir Hedworth Williamson, bart. (she died 1846.) A merchant. A Liberal. Sat for Penryn in the Parliament of 1826; unsuccessfully contested the borough in 1832, but was returned at the general election in 1834; did not sit in Parliament from 1837 till 1841, but was returned for Sunderland at the latter date.—8, *Belgrave-sq.*; *Eastwich Park, Surrey*.

**Baring, Right Hon. Wm. Bingham.** (*Thetford*)

Eld. s. of Lord Ashburton, and a nephew of Sir Thomas Baring, bt.; b. 1799; m. in 1823, Harriet, d. of the 6th Earl of Sandwich. A merchant. Was Paymaster-general of the Forces from February, 1845, till July, 1846. Has been one of the Secretaries to the Board of Control. A Conservative; voted for the admission of Dissenters to the Universities, as also for free trade; in 1832, displaced Mr. Buller East, a Conservative; sat for Thetford in the Parliament of 1826, for Callington in that of 1830, for Winchester in 1832 and 1835, and for Staffordsh. North from 1837 till 1841, when he was again returned for Thetford, which he has since continued to represent.—12, *Gt. Stanhope-st.*; *Carlton*; *Athe naeum*.

**Baring, Right Hon. Francis Thornhill.** (*Portsmouth*)

Eld. s. of Sir T. Baring, bart.; who is patron of 3 livings; m. 1st, 1825, d. of Sir G. Grey, bt., 2ndly, 1841, d. of 1st Earl of Effingham. Called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn, 1823. Was a Lord of the Treasury from 1830 till June 1834, when he became one of the joint secretaries of the Treasury, which he held till the dissolution of the Whig Ministry in Nov. of that year. Resumed his office in April, 1835; was Chancellor of

the Exchequer from 1839 till 1841. Voted in favour of free trade. Has sat for Portsmouth since 1826.—86, *Eaton-sq.*; *Athenæum and Reform Clubs*; *Manor House, Lee, Kent*.

### Baring, Henry Bingham. (*Marlborough*)

Nephew of Sir Thomas Baring, bt.; m. 1827, Lady Augusta Brudenell, 5th d. of the 6th Earl of Cardigan. An East India proprietor. A Major in the Army. Has been a Lord of the Treasury. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for Callington in the Parliament of 1831. Has sat for Marlborough since 1832.—13, *Eaton-pl.*; *Carlton*; *Athenæum*.

### Baring, Thomas. (*Huntingdon*)

2nd s. of Sir Thomas Baring, bt. and nephew of Lord Ashburton. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Church. First elected for Huntingdon in 1844, on the elevation of Sir Frederick Pollock to the Bench. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Yarmouth in 1838, and for London in 1843. Has sat for Huntingdon since April, 1844.—40, *Charles-st.*, *Berkeley-sq.*

### Barkly, Henry. (*Leominster*)

Only s. of the late Æneas Barkly, esq. (of Monteagle, Ross-shire, N.B.) an eminent West India merchant in London. Is descended from a junior branch of the ancient family of Berkeley of Mathers. B. in London 1815; m. in 1840 Elizabeth Helen, 2nd d. of J. F. Trinnis, esq. of Hiefield House, Herts. A West India proprietor. Of "Liberal-Conservative" principles, and "a supporter of Sir R. Peel's commercial policy." First elected for Leominster in 1845, when he was returned without a contest.—50, *Eaton-pl.*; *Wyndham*; *Carlton*; *Sparrows Herne, Herts*.

### Barnard, Edward Geo. (*Greenwich*)

A ship-builder. Is patron of 1 living. In favour of the ballot, triennial Parliaments, the repeal of the assessed taxes, &c. Has sat for Greenwich since 1832.—*Deptford Green*; *Reform Club*; *Gosfield Hall, Essex*.

### Barrington, Visct. (*Berkshire*)

A Peer of Ireland. B. Oct. 1, 1793; m. April 21, 1828, the Hon. Jane Elizabeth Liddell, 4th d. of 1st Lord Ravensworth. A Conservative; gave no pledges; voted for agricultural protection, 1846.—20, *Cavendish square*; *Travellers'*; *Beckett, Berks*.

### Bateson, Thomas. (*Londonderry co.*)

Eld. surviving s. of Sir Robert Bateson, bt., formerly M.P. for Londonderry. B. 1819. Is an officer in the 18th Light Dragoons, and a Dep.-



Lieut. for Londonderry. A Conservative; "holds the same political opinions as his father and late brother;" voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First returned without opposition for the co. of Londonderry in 1844, on the death of his brother Robert.—3 c, *Albany; Carlton; Belvoir-park, co. Down; Magherafelt, co. Derry.*

**Beckett, William. (*Leeds*)**

S. of the late, and bro. of the present Sir John Beckett, bart.; b 1784; m. sister of H. C. M. Ingram, esq. Is a banker; a magistrate of the West Riding; and a Lieut.-Col. of the Yorkshire Hussars. A Conservative; but in favour of free trade; first returned for the borough in 1841.—18, *Upper Brook-street; Carlton; Union; Kirkstall Grange, Yorkshire.*

**Bell, John. (*Thirsk*)**

B. 1809. A Reformer; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; first returned for the borough in 1841.—81, *New Bond-street; Reform; Thirsk.*

**Bell, Matthew. (*Northumberland, South*)**

Eld. s. of Matthew Bell, Esq., of Woolsington, by the d. of C. J. Brandling, Esq., of Gosforth House, Northumberland. B. 1798; m. in 1816, Elizabeth Anne, only dau. of Henry Uttrick Reay, esq. of Killingworth House, Northumberland. Was high sheriff of the co. in 1816. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Is in favour of the total extinction of tithes. Was elected for the county in 1826 and 1830, but lost his seat in 1831. Has sat for it since 1832.—35, *Wimpole-st.; Carlton; Woolstington, Northumberland.*

**Bellew, Richard Montesquieu. (*Louth*)**

Br. of Sir Patrick Bellew; b. 1803; m. 1828, d. of John Lalor, esq. of Crana (dead). Appointed a Lord of the Treasury, Aug. 1847. Dep.-Lieut. for the co. Louth. A Reformer; will vote for the abolition of tithes in every shape, and for the appropriation of a large portion of the Church property to purposes of national utility. Is in favour of shortening the duration of Parliaments, admitting Dissenters to graduate at the Universities, and the vote by ballot. Has sat for the county since 1832.—*Reform; Brookes's; Wyndham; Barmeath, Louth.*

**Benbow, John. (*Dudley*)**

Is solicitor to Lord Ward, by whose influence he was returned for the borough of Dudley in 1844, on the retirement of Mr. Hawkes. A Conservative; but in favour of free trade.—26, *Mecklenburgh-square.*

**Benett, John. (*Wilts, South*)**

Eld. surviving son of Thomas Benett, esq. of Pyt House; b. 1773; m. 1801, Lucy, d. of Edmund Lambert, esq. of Boyton House, co. Wilts,

dead. Is patron of 1 living. Is a tithe owner. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; in favour of an increased property-tax in lieu of the malt-tax. Has sat for the county since 1819.—*Athenæum*; *Norton Bavant and Pyt House, Wilts.*

**Bennet, Philip, jun. (Suffolk, West)**

s. of Philip Bennet, esq. of Rougham-Old-Hall, Suffolk, and Tollesbury, Essex, by the d. and sole heir. of the Rev. R. Kedington (a member of one of the oldest families in Suffolk). B. 1796 at Widcomb, near Bath, which place Mr. Bennet's grandfather represented in Parliament. M. in 1822 d. and co-heir. of Sir Thos. Pilkington, bart. of Chevet, Yorkshire. Was educated at Bury St. Edmund's, and Emmanuel Coll. Cambridge, where in 1818 he took the degree of M.A., having gained the classical prizes of his College two years in succession. Has been for 27 years Capt. of the West Suffolk Yeomanry; is a Magistrate, and Dep.-Lieut. of the co. of Suffolk. Of Conservative principles, "particularly attached to the Church, and in favour of protection to agriculture." Patron of 1 living. Contested Bury St. Edmund's at the general election in 1832, but was defeated by one vote. First returned for West Suffolk in 1845 without opposition.—1, *Chesham-pl.*; *Conservative*; *Rougham Hall, Suffolk.*

**Bentinck, Lord Henry William Scott. (Nottinghamsh. North)**

s. of the 4th Duke of Portland. B. 1804. Graduated at Christ Church, Oxon., was 2nd class in classics in 1826. A Conservative and Protectionist. First elected for North Notts in March, 1846.—19, *Cavendish-sq.*; *Welbeck Abbey, Notts.*

**Bentinck, Lord William George Frederick Scott. (Lynn-Regis)**

Second s. of the Duke of Portland; b. 1802. A Major in the Army. A Conservative, and leader of the Protectionist party. Will support the payment of the Roman Catholic clergy by the landowners in Ireland. Voted in favour of the principle of the Reform Act, but opposed Ministers on several of the details in Committee. Was first elected for the borough in 1828, when he replaced his uncle, Lord Wm. Bentinck, and has sat for it uninterruptedly since.—*Harcourt House, Cavendish-sq.*; *Orange Farm, Norfolk.*

**Beresford, William. (Essex, North)**

Cousin to the Marq. of Waterford; b. 1798; m. in 1834, d. of G. N. Heneage, esq. Is a Major in the army, and served 11 years in the 9th and in the 12th Lancers. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection 1846. Was a second class man at Oxford. Contested Waterford unsuo-

cessfully in 1837; sat for Harwich from 1841 to 1847, when he was returned for Essex, North.—77, *Pall Mall*; *Carlton*; *Travellers'*; *Elstfield, Oxfordsh.*

**Berkeley, Hon. Francis Henry Fitz-Hardinge. (*Bristol*)**

4th son of the 5th Earl Berkeley. Br. of Earl FitzHardinge. B. 7th December, 1794. A Liberal. Has sat for Bristol since 1837.—6, *Spring Gardens*.

**Berkeley, Hon. George Charles Grantley Fitz-Hardinge. (*Gloucestershire, West*)**

A younger son of the late Earl Berkeley, and br. of Earl FitzHardinge. B. 1800; m. in 1824 Caroline, youngest d. of Paul Benfield, esq. A Lieut. in the army. Is author of a novel, called "Berkeley Castle." A Whig; a supporter of the game laws; is in favour of the ballot. Has sat for the county since 1832. Was returned originally through the influence of Earl FitzHardinge, but was elected in 1847 in opposition to the Earl's candidate, Mr. Grenville Berkeley.

**Berkeley, Maurice Frederick Fitz-Hardinge, C.B. (*Gloucester city*)**

Second s. of the 5th Earl Berkeley, and next br. to Earl FitzHardinge; b. 1788; m. in 1823, Lady Charlotte, 6th d. of the 4th Duke of Richmond (dead). A Capt. R.N.; commanded the *Thunderer* at the capture of St. Jean D'Acre. Was a Lord of the Admiralty from April 1833, to Dec. 1834; re-appointed July 1846. A Liberal. Was first elected for the city in 1832, but was defeated at the election which followed his acceptance of office in April 1833; was re-elected in 1835; was an unsuccessful candidate at the election in 1837; was again returned in 1841 and 1847.—15, *Halkin-st. West*; *Reform*.

**Bernal, Ralph. (*Rochester*)**

Father of R. Osborne, esq., M.P. for Middlesex. M. d. of — White, esq. M.D. (a surgeon in the navy,) of Chatham Dock-yard. A Barrister and West India Proprietor. Has written various articles for the *Annals*. Was, during the Grey and Melbourne ministries, Chairman of Committees of the whole House on Government measures. Of Whig principles. Declared himself, in 1837, "a reluctant Convert" to the system of Election by Ballot. Sat for Rochester from 1820 till 1841, before which he sat a short time for Lincoln. Represented Weymouth from 1842 (succeeding on petition) till 1847, when he was again elected for Rochester.—75, *Eaton-sq.*; *Athenæum* and *Reform Clubs*.

**Bernard, Visct. (*Bandon*)**

Eld. s. of the Earl of Bandon. B. 1810; m. in 1832 eld. d. of Thomas Whitmore, esq., of Apley, Shropsh. A Conservative. First returned for

the borough in Feb. 1842.—6, *Hyde Park-terrace*; *Carlton*; *Bernard Castle, co. Cork*.

**Birch, Sir Thomas Bernard, bart. (*Liverpool*)**

Only s. of the late Sir Joseph Birch, bart., of the Hasles, Lancash., (M.P. for Ludgershall, and subsequently for Nottingham,) by the 3rd d. of Benjamin Heywood, esq., of Liverpool. B. 1791. Educated at Rugby, and at Jesus Coll., Cambridge, where he graduated A.M. 1816; called to the Bar, at Lincoln's Inn, 1817; but never practised. Was private secretary to Lord Melbourne, when his lordship was Chief Secretary in Ireland. A Magistrate and Deputy-Lieut. of Lancash., of which co. he was Sheriff in 1841. A Whig; opposed to the taxes on tea, tobacco, windows, &c., and pledged to support a property tax as a substitute. First returned for Liverpool in 1847.—*Brookes's*; *Arthur's*; *University*; *Reform*; *The Hasles, Prescot, Lancash.*

**Blackall, Samuel Wensley. (*Longford*)**

S. of Major Blackall, of the E. I. C.'s Service. B. 1809; m. 1833, Georgiana, d. of the late Henry Rowles, esq., of Stratton-st., Piccadilly. Was educated at Trinity Coll., Dublin. Entered the army as Ensign 85th Foot in 1827, and eventually became a Major. Is author of two pamphlets on Irish affairs. A Liberal; "favourable to the consideration of the repeal question;" in favour of the extension of the franchise and the tenant-right bill. First returned for Longford in 1847.—*Junior United Service Club*; *Sackville-st., Dublin*; *Colamber, Edgeworthstown, Longford*.

**Blackstone, William Seymour. (*Wallingford*)**

Grands. of the great lawyer whose name he bears. B. 1809. His family has the patronage of the living of Wallingford. Dep. Lieut. for Berkshire. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for the borough since 1832.—*Carlton*; *Howbery, Oxfordsh.*; *Castle Priory, Berks.*

**Blake, Martin Joseph. (*Galway bor.*)**

Is head of the house of Ballyglunin, from which also sprang the Blakes, baronets, of Langham, Suffolk. A Repealer; in favour of removing the Bishops from the House of Lords. Was an unsuccessful candidate at the general election in 1832; but on petition superseded Mr. M'Lachlan in 1833.—81, *Jermyn-st.*; *Reform Club*; *Brook Lodge, co. Galway*.

**Blakemore, Richard. (*Wells*)**

Eld. s. of Thomas Blakemore, esq. of Littleton Hall, by the d. of John Partridge, esq. of Ross, Herefordsh. B. 1775. Was High Sheriff of Glamorgansh. in 1826, and of Herefordsh. in 1830. Is a proprietor of tin works in Glamorganshire. A Deputy-Lieut. of Hereford and Monmouth. Is a Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846.

Contested Hereford in 1826, 1832, and 1835. First elected for the Borough at the general election in 1837.—15, *Regent-st.*; *Union*; *Leys, Hertfordsh.*

### Blandford, Marq. of. (*Woodstock*)

Eld. s. of the Duke of Marlborough. B. 1822; m. 1843, Lady Frances Anne Emily, eld. d. of the 8rd Marq. of Londonderry. Graduated at Oriel Coll., Oxford. A Deputy-Lieut. of Oxfordsh.; appointed Lieut. of the 1st Yeomanry Cavalry in that co. 1843. A Conservative; but in favour of free trade. First elected for Woodstock in April, 1844, when Sir F. Thesiger accepted office. Took the Chiltern Hundreds in April, 1845, in consequence of having supported Sir R. Peel's free trade measures without the concurrence of the Duke of Marlborough, whose influence at Woodstock is paramount. Was again returned for that borough, however, without opposition in 1847.—3, *Willon-terr.*; *Carlton*; *Blenheim House, Oxfordsh.*

### Blewitt, Reginald James. (*Monmouth dist.*)

2d s. of Major Edw. Blewitt, of Kensington, Middlesex, and of Llantarnam Abbey, Monmouthshire; b. May 26, 1799. His great-great grandfather was Sir Samuel Blewitt, High Sheriff of London, Master of the Skinners' Company, and s. of a Northamptonsh gentleman. Is descended on the female side from Sir Edward Morgan of Llantarnam Abbey, bt., a lineal descendant of Kidivor Vawr, Lord of Kilsaint, and of the Ancient British blood royal. Was educated at Rugby School. Practised for some years as a Solicitor, but retired in 1827. In 1829 established and edited the *Monmouthshire Merlin*, a liberal paper, which he relinquished in 1832. A Reformer. A Magistrate for the co. of Monmouth, and acts occasionally as Chairman of the Quarter Sessions. First elected for the borough in 1837.—*Llantarnam Abbey, Monmouthsh.*

### Boldero, Capt. Henry George. (*Chippenham*)

S. of the late Rev. J. Boldero, of Ampton, Suffolk, who was of an old family in the county, and had church patronage; m. Mary, d. of the late J. Neeld, Esq., of Gloucester-place, and sister to the Members for Chippenham and Cricklade, of that name. Has been clerk of the Ordnance. Capt. Boldero, during the passing of the Reform Bill, endeavoured to preserve two members for Chippenham; and to commemorate the success of his exertions his constituents presented him with a silver cup. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for the borough in the Parliament of 1831, and since 1835.—*Carlton*; *Hurst Grove, Berks.*

### Bolling, William. (*Bolton-le-Moors*)

Third s. of the late Edward Bolling, esq., of Bolton, who was descended from the Bowlings, of Bowling Hall, Yorksh. B. at Bolton 1785; m.

1824, d. of the late Rev. James Slade, vicar of Winsford, Somerset, and sister to Rev. Canon Slade, vicar of Bolton. Educated at the Bolton Grammar School. Is a merchant and manufacturer. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy. Sat for Bolton from 1832 to 1841, at which last election he was an unsuccessful candidate; again returned in 1847.—*Darcy Lever Hall, near Bolton-le-Moors.*

### Bourke, Richard Southwell. (*Kildare*)

Eld. s. of Robert Bourke, esq., of Hayes, (who is heir presumptive to the Earldom of Mayo,) by the only d. and heir of the late Hon. John Jocelyn (who was uncle to the 3rd Earl of Roden). B. in Dublin, 1822. Educated at the University of Dublin. Is author of "St. Petersburg and Moscow." Was gentleman of the bedchamber to Lord Heytesbury, when Lord Lieut. of Ireland. A Magistrate for Kildare. A Conservative. First returned for Kildare in 1847.—29, *Norfolk-st., Park-lane; Carlton; Palmerston House, Naas, Kildare.*

### Bouverie, Hon. Edward Pleydell. (*Kilmarnock*)

2nd s. of the 3rd Earl of Radnor; b. 1818; m. in 1842, Elizabeth, youngest d. of the late Gen. Balfour, of Balbernie, Fife. Was educated at Harrow, and at Trin. Coll., Cambridge. A Liberal. Is in favour of the Ballot. First returned for Kilmarnock in 1844.—19, *Chester-st., Grosvenor-pl.; Reform and Free Trade Clubs.*

### Bowles, William. (*Launceston*)

A Rear-Admiral and Companion of the Order of the Bath. Commanded the Zebra bomb-ship at the siege of Copenhagen in 1807; has served as Commodore on the South American station, and was for 20 years Comptroller-General of the Coast-Guard Service. Also held the office of naval Aide-de-Camp to her Majesty. Has been a Lord of the Admiralty, and elected M.P. for Launceston, on the appointment of Sir Henry Hardinge as Governor-General of India. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Has sat for Launceston since May 1844.—*Carlton.*

### Bowring, John, LL.D. (*Bolton*)

Eld. s. of Charles Bowring, esq., of Exeter, whose family was for many generations connected with the woollen trade of Devonshire. B. 1792; m. in 1816, Maria, d. of Samuel Lewin, esq., of Hackney. Has honorary diplomas from the Universities of Holland and Italy; is a Fellow of the Linnæan Societies of London and Paris, of the Historical Institute, of the Scandinavian and Icelandic Societies, of the Royal Institute of the Netherlands, of the Royal Societies of Hungary and Copenhagen, of the Frisian, Athenian, and various other Societies; was for many years editor of the Westminster Review; has published a number of works on foreign languages and literature, on politics and political economy, and translations from several languages. Dr. Bowring

employed by Earl Grey's Government, with Sir Henry Parnell, in the investigation of public accounts; and served with Mr. Villiers, as Commercial Commissioner in France, to arrange the bases of a treaty of commerce with that country. Has made several Reports on Free Trade and Public Accountancy. Is a Radical Reformer. Unsuccessfully contested Blackburn in 1832 and 1835, but in the latter year was returned for Kilmarnock; had no seat in Parliament from 1837 till 1841, since which date he has sat for Bolton. — 1, *Queen-sq., Westminster; Reform; Athenæum; Free Trade Club.*

### Boyd, John. (*Coleraine*)

S. of John Boyd, Esq. of Belle Isle, co. Antrim. B. 1789; m. in 1820, Anna Arabella, eld. d. of the Rev. Robt. Hezlet. Is of "high conservative principles," but voted for repeal of the corn laws; is a supporter of the Church of Scotland on the great question now pending relative to that establishment; but would give fair compensation to patrons for loss of patronage — 1, *Pall Mall; Carlton; Dundown House, co. Londonderry.*

### Boyle, Hon. Robert Edward. (*Frome*)

Second surviving s. of the 8th Earl of Cork and Orrery. B. in London, 1809; m. 1844, youngest d. of Abraham Wildey Roberts, esq. Was appointed Lieut. and Capt. in the Coldstream Guards in 1833, and a Major in the army in 1846. Is Secretary to the Order of St. Patrick. Was for some time State Steward to the Lord-Lieut. of Ireland. Appointed Groom in Waiting to the Queen in 1846. A Liberal, and in favour of free trade; opposed to any fresh endowments of any church from the public funds. First elected for Frome in 1847, without opposition. — 8, *Hamilton-pl., Piccadilly; Roehampton; Brookes's; Guards'; Travellers'.*

### Brackley, Visct. (*Staffordsh. North*)

Eld. s. of the Earl of Ellesmere. B. in London 1823; m. 1846, youngest d. of the 1st Earl Cawdor. A Conservative; "will give free trade a fair trial;" opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Staffordsh. North in 1847. — 2, *Hamilton-pl., Hyde Park; Carlton; Conservative; Worsley Hall, Manchester.*

### Bramston, Thomas William. (*Essex, South*)

Eld. s. of the late Thos. Gardiner Bramston, esq., of Skreens, Essex, by the d. of William Blaauw, esq., of Queen Anne-st., London. B. 1796; m. 1830, Eliza, 5th d. and co-heir of Adm. Sir Eliab Harvey, G.C.B., of Rolls Park, Essex, who represented the county for nearly thirty years. A Dep. Lieut. of the county. Ispatron of 2 livings. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Opposed to the appointment of bishops by the crown and to the sale of livings, and in favour of a redeemable rent-charge upon the land in lieu of tithes. — *Carlton; Skreens, Essex.*

**Brand, Thomas. (Hertfordsh.)**

Eld. s. of Lieut.-Gen. the Hon. Henry Otway Trevor, C.B. (who assumed the name of Trevor, and who is heir presumptive to the barony of Dacre,) by the 2nd d. of the late Hon. and Very Rev. Maurice Crosbie, Dean of Limerick. M. 1837, Susan Sophia, eld. d. of the Hon. Charles Compton Cavendish, M.P., a bedchamber woman to the Queen. Graduated at Magdalene Coll., Cambridge, A.B. 1830. Is a Magistrate and Deputy-Lieut. of Herts. A Liberal. Unsuccessfully contested Essex North in 1832, and Lewes in 1837. First returned for Herts in 1847.—*Burlington House, Piccadilly; The Hoo, Welwyn, Herts.*

**Bremridge, Richard. (Barnstaple)**

B. at Barnstaple 1803; educated at Tiverton School. A solicitor in Barnstaple, and for many years agent to the Conservative party there; Coroner for Devonsh. A Conservative and Protectionist; pledged to oppose the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First elected for Barnstaple in 1847.—*Parthenon Club; Castle House, Barnstaple.*

**Bright, John. (Manchester)**

S. of Jacob Bright, Esq. of Greenbank, near Rochdale. B. 1811; m. 1st, in 1839, Elizabeth, eld. d. of Jonathan Priestman, Esq. of Newcastle-on-Tyne (she died 1841); 2ndly, 1847, Margaret Elizabeth, eld. d. of Wm Leatham, esq., of Wakefield, Yorksh. Is a cotton-spinner and manufacturer in Rochdale, being a partner in the firm of John Bright and Brothers, of Rochdale. In favour of free trade; and previous to his election was chiefly known as an active member of the anti-corn-law league. Contested Durham city in April, 1843, when Lord Dungannon was returned by a majority of 101. This election was declared void on petition, in consequence of the payment of head-money by Lord Dungannon. Again stood for Durham in July, 1843, in opposition to Mr. Purvis, and was returned by a majority of 78. The expenses of both contests, and of the petition, were defrayed by a subscription amongst the friends of the anti-corn-law league. First returned for Manchester, 1847.—83, *Lowndes-st.; Free Trade Club; One Ash, Rochdale.*

**Brisco, Musgrave. (Hastings)**

Eld. s. of the late Captain Wastel Brisco, of Coghurst, Sussex. B. 1791; m. in 1828, d. of the late Henry Woodgate, esq., of Spring-grove, Pembury, Kent, and niece of the 6th Viscount Boyne. Is a magistrate and Deputy-Lieut. for the cos. of Sussex and York. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First elected for Hastings in 1844.—38, *Devonshire-place; Coghurst-hall, Hastings.*

**Broadley, Henry. (Yorksh. East)**

S. of the late H. Broadley, esq.; b. 1793. Is a Dep.-Lieut. of Yorkshire. Was Chairman of the Hull and Selby Railway from 1836 to 1843. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First returned



for the county at the general election in 1837.—3, *Charles-st., St. James's; Beverley, Yorksh.*

**Broadwood, Henry. (*Bridgwater*)**

B. Aug. 8, 1796; m. d. of the 2nd Earl of Lonsdale. A Brewer. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Contested the borough unsuccessfully in 1834; was returned, in opposition to Mr. B. Sheridan, on Mr. Leader's vacating his seat to stand for Westminster in 1837. At the general election in the same year was again returned, as also in 1841 and 1847. Was of Emmanuel College, Cambridge—5, *Whitehall-yard; Carlton, Union, Crockford's.*

**Brocklehurst, John, jun. (*Macclesfield*)**

Second s. of John Brocklehurst, esq. of Jordan Gate, Macclesfield; m. in 1812, the 2nd d. of—Coare, esq. of Islington. A silk manufacturer and banker, in partnership with his brothers, at Macclesfield. A Reformer; voted against the corn laws, but is in favour of protection for the silk trade, short Parliaments, the ballot, and admitting the Dissenters to the Universities. First sat for the borough in 1832.—83, *Milk-st.; Reform Club; Hurdsfield House, Chesh.*

**Brockman, Edward Drake. (*Hythe*)**

Fifth s. of the late James Drake-Brockman, esq., of Beachborough, Kent, by the d. of the Rev. William Tatton, D.D., Prebendary of Canterbury. Was called to the Bar at the Inner Temple in 1819. Is Recorder of Folkestone. A Liberal. First returned in 1847 for Hythe, in the neighbourhood of which his family have long been resident.—*The Paddock, Hythe; Beachborough, Kent; Reform Club.*

**Brooke, Lord. (*Warwicksh. South*)**

S. of the Earl of Warwick. B. 1818. A Conservative; is in favour of agricultural protection; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic church. First returned for Warwicksh. South without opposition in 1845.—7, *Carlton Gardens; Travellers'; Carlton, Warwick Castle, Warwicksh.*

**Brooke, Sir Arthur Brinsley, bt. (*Fermanagh*)**

B. 1797; m. 1841, the youngest d. of Sir George Anson, G.C.B. First returned for the county in 1840. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for Fermanagh since 1840.—63, *St. James's-st.; Carlton; Colebrook, co. Fermanagh.*

**Brotherton, Joseph. (*Salford*)**

A retired cotton and silk manufacturer. A Liberal. Has sat for the borough since 1832.—*Reform Club; Salford.*

**Brown, Humphrey. (*Tewkesbury*)**

S. of Humphrey Brown, esq., of Tewkesbury, a merchant and extensive

carrier. B. at Tewkesbury 1808; m. 1834, d. of Charles Edward Chandler, esq., late of Tewkesbury. Was formerly a merchant and carrier at Tewkesbury; was an active promoter of the Birmingham and Gloucester Railway; is well known as a Railway statist and traffic taker. A Liberal, opposed to all religious endowments. First returned for Tewkesbury in 1847, without opposition.—2, *Little Smith-st., Westminster; Free Trade Club; Tewkesbury.*

**Brown, William. (Lancash. South)**

S. of the late Alex. Brown of Baltimore, United States. B. at Ballymena, co. Antrim, 1784; educated at Caterick, Yorksh.; m. 1810, d. of Andrew Gibson, esq., of Ballymena. Patron of 1 living. A Liberal. Is author of Letters advocating Commercial Freedom. Unsuccessfully contested Lancash. in 1844; and was returned without opposition on the elevation of Lord F. Egerton to the Earldom of Ellesmere, 1846.—*Fenton's Hotel, St. James's-st.; Richmond Hill, Lancash.*

**Browne, Robert Dillon. (Mayo)**

Is descended from the Kilmaine family, and is s. of the late Arthur Browne, esq. of Glencorrib, co. Mayo. First elected in 1836, *vice* the Rt. Hon. Dominick Browne, created Lord Oranmore. A Repealer.—*Reform Club; Glencorrib, Ireland.*

**Bruce, Charles Lennox Cumming. (Elginsh. &c.)**

Sec. son of Sir A. P. G. Cumming; b. 1790; m. in 1820 grd. d. of James Bruce, the Abyssinian traveller. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Formerly represented the Inverness Dist. First returned for the co. in 1840.—*Carlton, United Service; Rose-isle, Stirlingsh.; Dunphail, Elginsh.; Kinnaird, Stirlingsh.*

**Bruce, Lord Ernest Aug. Chas. Brudenell. (Marlborough)**

2nd s. of the Marq. of Ailesbury; b. 1811; m. 1834 Hon. Louisa Beresford, 2nd d. of Lord Decies. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Has been Vice Chamberlain to the Queen; resigned July, 1846. A Cornet in the Royal Wilts Yeomanry. Has sat for the borough since 1832.—7, *St. George's Place, Hyde Park Corner; Carlton; Tottenham Park, Wilts.*

**Bruen, Henry. (Carlow co.)**

M. d. of T. Kavanagh, esq., of Borris. Is col. of the Carlow Militia. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for the county in the Parliaments of 1830 and 1831, but lost his seat in 1832. Was petitioned against in Feb. 1835, and election declared void; on the new writ being issued, Messrs. Vigors and Raphael were returned at the head of the poll, but unseated on petition by Col. Bruen and Mr. Kavanagh. In 1840, on the death of Mr. Vigors, was again returned for the county.—8, *Suffolk-st.; Carlton; Oak Park, co. Carlow.*

**Bruges, William Heald Ludlow. (*Devizes*)**

Eld. and only surviving s. of the late Benjamin Pennell Ludlow, esq. of Melksham, Wilts, by the d. of William Bruges, esq. of Semington, Wilts. The family of Ludlow is of long standing in Wilts, and numbered amongst its members the republican general, Edmund Ludlow, whose estates were forfeited at the Restoration. B. at Melksham in 1796; m. 1st in 1827, youngest d. of Samuel Heathcote, esq. of Shaw-hill house, Wilts; 2ndly in 1834, Agnes, 3rd d. of Thomas Penruddock, esq. of Winckton, near Christchurch, Hants. Assumed the additional name of Bruges in 1835, in compliance with the will of Thomas Bruges, esq. of Seend. Was educated at Queen's College, Oxford; called to the Bar in 1820, and practised in Chancery; but retired from the profession in 1826. A magistrate, and Deputy Lieut. for Wilts; Chairman of the Quarter Sessions for the northern division of that county; and many years Recorder of Devizes, which latter office he resigned on becoming a candidate for that borough. A Conservative; not pledged; is "a member of the Established Church, supporting its connexion with the State;" voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Represented Bath from 1837 to 1841; at the general election in Sept. 1841, he was an unsuccessful candidate. First returned for Devizes in 1844, when Mr. Sotherton accepted the Chiltern Hundreds. — *United University; Conservative; Seend, near Melksham, Wilts.*

**Buck, Lewis William. (*Devon, North*)**

Eld. s. of George Stucley Buck, esq. by the d. of the Rev. Richard Keats; m. d. of Thomas Robins, esq. Is a Dep.-Lieutenant of Devonshire. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Represented Exeter from 1826 to 1832. First elected for the co. in 1839, on the elevation of Visct. Ebrington to a peerage.—12, *Norfolk-street, Park-lane; Carlton; Moreton, Devon.*

**Bulkeley, Sir Richard Bulkeley Williams, bt. (*Anglesea*)**

S. of the 9th bart B. 1801; m. 1st, 1828, d. of 1st Lord Dinorben; 2ndly, 1832, d. of Sir T. S. M. Stanley, bart.; assumed the name of Bulkeley in 1827. Is a Dep.-Lieut. of Anglesea, and patron of 4 livings. A Liberal. Sat for Beaumaris from 1830 till 1833, then for Anglesea till 1837, next for Flint dist. from 1841 to 1847, when he was once more elected for Anglesea.—69, *Eaton-sq.; Reform; Baron's Hill, Anglesea.*

**Buller, Right Hon. Charles. (*Liskeard*)**

B. at Calcutta, August, 1806. His father was in the civil service of the East India Company at Bengal. Was educated at Harrow, at the University of Edinburgh, and at Trin. Coll., Cambridge; was called to the Bar in 1831. Appointed Judge Advocate-General, June, 1846; a Queen's Counsel, Nov. 1846. Has been a contributor to several Reviews, and is an East India Proprietor. Has been Secretary to the Board of Con-

troul. A Radical Reformer. Was chief secretary to Lord Durham when in Canada. Sat for West Loo in 1830. Has sat for Liskeard since 1832.—2, *Chester-place, Chester-square; Athenæum.*

**Buller, Sir John Buller Yarde, bart. (Devonsh. South)**

Granda. of Mr. Justice Buller; b. 1799; m. 1823 Elizabeth, d. of Thos. Wilson Patten, esq. Is patron of 1 living. Is Lieut.-Col. of the South Devon Militia. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. He contested the county unsuccessfully in 1832, but was elected in 1835, in conjunction with Lord John Russell, without opposition.—39, *Belgrave-square; Carlton; Lupton, Devon.*

**Bunbury, Edward Herbert. (Bury St. Edmund's)**

Second s. of Sir Henry Bunbury, bart., of Great Barton, Suffolk, by the d. of the Hon. Henry Edward Fox. B. 1811; is unm. Educated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, where he was senior medallist in 1833. Was called to the Bar at the Inner Temple in 1841. A Liberal; though unfavourable to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy, refuses to pledge himself. First returned for Bury St. Edmund's in 1847.—15, *Lincoln's-inn Fields; Athenæum; Oxford and Cambridge Club.*

**Burghley, Lord. (Lincolnsh. South)**

Eld. s. of the Marq. of Exeter. B. 1825. Graduated at St John's Coll. Cambridge. Appointed Lieut.-Col. Northamptonsh. Militia in 1846. A Conservative and Protectionist; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Lincolnsh. in 1847, without opposition.—36, *Grosvenor-sq.; Carlton; Burghley House, Stamford, Lincolnsh.*

**Burke, Sir Thomas John, bart. (Galway co.)**

Eld. s. of Sir John Burke, bart., of Marble Hill, co. Galway, by the d. of the Right Hon. John Calcraft. B. 1813; is unm. Was formerly a Capt. in the 1st Dragoons. A Whig. First returned for the co. of Galway, April, 1847, without opposition; re-elected Aug., 1847.—112, *Jermyn-st.; Arthur's; Junior United Service; Marble Hill, co. Galway.*

**Burrell, Sir Charles Merrik, bart. (Shoreham)**

M. Frances, d. of the 3rd Earl of Egremont. An East India Proprietor. A Conservative. Paired off in favour of the Reform Bill, but opposed several of its details; is in favour of agricultural protection: Was first elected for the borough in the Parliament of 1806.—5, *Richmond ter.; Knepp Castle, Sussex.*

**Burroughes, Henry Negus. (Norfolk, East)**

Eld. s. of the late J. Burkin Burroughes, esq. of Burlingham, the representative of an ancient family in the county, by Christabel, d. and heir

of Henry Negus, esq., of Hoveton Hall. B. Feb. 8, 1791. M. 26th of August, 1818, to Jane Sarah, sister of the late, and aunt to the present, Sir Wm. Hoste, bt. Was High Sheriff of the co. in 1817. Is a Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for Norfolk since 1837.—*Burlingham Hall, Norfolk.*

### Busfeild, William. (*Bradford*)

Eld. s. of the late J. A. Busfeild, esq., of Myrtle Grove, and Ryshworth Hall, a Magistrate and Registrar of the West Riding of Yorkshire. B. at Myrtle Grove 1778; m. 1800, Caroline, eld. d. of Capt. Chas. Wood, R.N., of Bowling Hall, niece to the late Sir Francis Wood, bt. Educated at Queens' Coll., Cambridge. Was for many years a Major in the 1st West York Militia, and is a Deputy-Lieut. for the West Riding of Yorkshire. Has been "for the last forty years a staunch Whig and Reformer." Represented the borough from 1837 to July 1841; was an unsuccessful candidate at the general election in that month, but was returned, on the death of W. C. Lister, esq., in the September following, and was re-elected in 1847.—15, *Bury-st., St. James's; Upwood, Yorksh.*

### Butler, Pierce Somerset. (*Kilkenny co.*)

Eld. s. of Col. the Hon. Pierce Butler, grandson of the late Lord Mount-Garrett, and nephew of the 1st Earl of Kilkenny. B. 1801, m. in 1836, Jessie Anne, relict of the late P. A. Warren, Esq. of Lodge Park, Co. Kilkenny. Was called to the bar; is a Capt. in the Kilkenny militia. Was a candidate for the representation of the city of Kilkenny before the passing of the Reform Act, and petitioned, without success, against the return of Mr. (now Lord Chief Justice) Doherty. Is opposed to the tithe system in Ireland, and supports a repeal of the Union. Was educated at Trin. Coll. Dublin, and obtained the highest classical honours there. Was returned for the co. of Kilkenny, on the death of Major Bryan in 1843, without opposition.—*Lodge Park, co. Kilkenny.*

### Buxton, Sir Edward North, bart. (*Essex, South*)

Eld. s. of the late Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton, bart., by the 5th d. of the late John Gurney, esq., of Earlsam Hall, Norfolk. B. at Earlsam 1812; m. 1836, 2nd d. of Samuel Gurney, esq., of Ham House, Essex. Educated at Cambridge. A Liberal. First returned for Essex South in 1847.—*Leytonstone House, Essex; Bellfield, Dorset.*

### Cabbell, Benjamin Bond. (*Boston*)

Was called to the Bar by the Society of the Middle Temple in 1816. "Is in favour of the repeal or very great alteration of the present Poor Law; opposed the grant to Maynooth, and is anxious to promote the improvement of the social, moral, and mental condition of the industrious classes." Sat for St. Alban's from Aug., 1846, to July, 1847; was an unsuccessful candidate for that city in 1837 and in Feb. 1841; as also, for

Marylebone in Aug., 1841. Has sat for Boston since 1847.—52, *Portland-pl.*; 1, *Brick-st.*, *Temple*.

### Callaghan, Daniel. (*Cork city*)

Son of an eminent provision merchant in Cork: b. 1786. Was a Government contractor, and is a merchant at Cork. Originally he professed himself opposed to a repeal of the Union; but before the election, in 1832, pledged himself to vote for it, as well as for all the other measures usually appended to repeal. First sat for the city in 1829. Was not returned in 1835; but, on petition, succeeded in regaining his seat.—*Reform Club*; *Lotabeg*, *Cork*.

### Campbell, Hon. William Frederick. (*Cambridge bor.*)

Eld. s. of Lord Campbell and Lady Stratheden. B. 1824. Graduated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, A.M. 1846. A Liberal; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Cambridge, 1847.—*South-pl.*, *Knightsbridge*; *Reform*.

### Cardwell, Edward. (*Liverpool*)

S. of John Cardwell, esq. late of Liverpool, merchant; b. 1813; m. in 1838, Anne, youngest child of the late Charles Stuart Parker, esq. of Fairlie, Ayrshire. Is a barrister, and goes the Northern circuit. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Was Secretary to the Treasury from Feb. 1845 to July, 1846. Was not returned at the general election in 1841, but on petition, in 1842, was declared duly elected for Clitheroe, ousting Mr. Wilson. First returned for Liverpool in 1847. Late a fellow of Balliol College, Oxford; was a double first-class man in 1835.—3, *Whitehall Gardens*; *Carlton*; *Oxford and Cambridge Club*.

### Carew, William Henry Pole. (*Cornwall, East*)

2nd surviving son of the late Right Hon. Reginald Pole Carew by the d. of the 1st Lord Lyttleton. The name of this family was originally Pole, but the Right Hon. Reginald Pole assumed the name of Carew on succeeding to the estates of Sir Coventry Carew, of East Anthony. M. 2nd d. of John Buller, esq., of Morval, Cornwall. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection 1846. Thinks "a modified income tax the best of all taxes." A Magistrate, and Dep.-Lieut. of Cornwall. First returned for East Cornwall in 1845, without opposition.—18, *King-st.*, *St. James's*; *East Anthony, Cornwall*.

### Carter, John Bonham. (*Winchester*)

S. of the late John Bonham Carter, esq., M.P. for Portsmouth from 1816 till his death in 1838. B. at Portsmouth 1817. Graduated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge. A Magistrate for Hants. A Liberal. First returned for Winchester in 1847.—6, *Whitehall-place*; *Oxford and Cambridge*, *Brookes's*, and *Reform Clubs*; *Petersfeld, Hants*.

Castlereagh, Rt. Hon. Visct. (*Down co.*)

Eld. s. of the Marq. of Londonderry. B. 1805; m. 1846 the Dowager Viscountess Powerscourt, eld. d. of the 3rd Earl of Roden. Is Lord-Lieut. for the co. Was a Lord of the Admiralty in 1828. Was appointed Vice-Chamberlain of the Household Dec. 1834, but resigned in April following. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; has sat for the county since 1826.—127, *Park-st. Grosvenor-sq.*; *Carlton*.

Caulfeild, Hon. Henry. (*Armagh co.*)

Second s. of the 1st Earl of Charlemont, by the d. of Thomas Hickman, esq., of Clare. Is heir presumptive to the Earldom. B. 1779; m. 1819, Elizabeth Margaret, 2nd d. of the late Dodwell Browne, esq., of Ralines, co. Mayo. A Deputy-Lieut. of Armagh. A Whig; when formerly in Parliament he supported the claims of the Roman Catholics, and voted for the impeachment of Lord Melville. First elected for the co. of Armagh in 1802; again returned in 1806, and in subsequent years; was an unsuccessful candidate, however, in 1818, but regained his seat in 1826, and sat till 1830; was once more returned in 1847.—*Hockley, Armagh*.

Cavendish, Hon. Charles Compton. (*Bucks*)

Youngest s. of the late, and uncle of the present Earl of Burlington, and cousin of the Duke of Devonshire; b. 1798; m. in 1814, Catherine, eldest d. of 9th Marq. of Huntly. Of Whig principles; "will give the Government of Lord John Russell his general and strenuous support." Sat for Newton, Hants, in the Parliaments of 1820 and 1826; for Yarmouth in that of 1831; represented East Sussex from 1832 till 1841; for Youghal from 1841 to 1847, when he was first returned for Bucks.—*Burlington House, Piccadilly*; *Compton-pl., Sussex*.

Cavendish, Hon. Geo. Henry. (*Derbysh. North*)

Second s. of the Hon. Wm. Cavendish, and br. of the Earl of Burlington. Was raised to the rank of an Earl's son by letters patent in 1837. B. 1810; m. 1835 Louisa, youngest d. of the 2nd Earl of Harewood. Of Whig principles. Formerly voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws; but in 1846 supported their repeal. Has sat for the county since his brother's accession to the peerage in 1834.—4, *Belgrave-sq.*; *Ashford Hall, Derbysh.*; *Latimers, Bucks*.

Cavendish, William George. (*Peterborough*)

Only s. of the Hon. Chas. Compton Cavendish, M.P. for Bucks, by the eld. d. of the 9th Marq. of Huntly. B. 1815. A Liberal. First returned for Peterborough in 1847.—*Burlington House, Piccadilly*; *Compton-pl., Sussex*.

Cayley, Edward Stillingfleet. (*Yorksh. North*)

B. 1802. M. in 1828 his cousin, Emma, third d. of Sir George Cayley,

bt. late M.P. for Scarborough. Of Whig principles; opposed to the ballot and short Parliaments; voted in favour of agricultural protection 1846, and will support the Navigation Laws; but is willing to give his general approval to the Russell Ministry. Author of a work on commercial economy, and several political tracts. Hassat for the county since 1832.—16, *Bryanstone-st.*; *Wydale House, Yorksh.*

### Chandos, Marquis of. (*Buckingham bor.*)

Eld. s. of the Duke of Buckingham and Chandos. B. 1823. Graduated at Christ Church, Oxon. Is Capt. of the Bucks Yeomanry Cavalry. Appointed Dep.-Lieut. of Bucks and of Northamptonsh. in 1845. A Conservative; and "will advocate that protection to which the agricultural interests have so just a claim; will endeavour to preserve unimpaired the Protestant religion." First returned for Buckingham, Feb. 1846, without a contest.—91, *Pall Mall*.

### Chaplin, William James. (*Salisbury*)

S. of Mr. William Chaplin, of Rochester. B. at Rochester 1787; m. 1816, Elizabeth, d. of William Alston, esq. Educated at Bromley. Is head of the firm of Chaplin and Horne, the well-known carriers and coach-proprietors; Chairman of the South Western Railway; Director of the Paris and Rouen, Rouen and Havre, Southampton and Dorchester, Richmond, Dutch and Rhenish Railways. Was Sheriff of London and Middlesex 1845-6, and has taken an active part in the improvement of prison discipline. A Liberal. Has sat for Salisbury since Jan., 1847.—1, *Adelphi-terr.*; *Ewhurst Park, Basingstoke, Hants.*

### Charteris, Hon. Francis Wemyss. (*Haddingtonsh.*)

Eld. s. of Lord Elcho, by the 4th d. of the 2nd Earl of Lucan; grands. of the 7th Earl of Wemyss. B. 1818; m. 1843, Lady Anne Frederica, 2nd d. of the 1st Earl of Lichfield. Graduated at Christ Church, Oxford. Appointed a Deputy-Lieut. of Haddingtonsh. in 1846. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade; is adverse to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy, but refused to pledge himself against it; will support the immediate reduction of the duties on tea, tobacco, windows, and soap. Was elected for East Gloucestersh. in 1841, and then declared himself in favour of agricultural protection; withdrew from Parliament in Feb., 1846; was returned for Haddingtonsh. in 1847.—27, *Chesham-st.*, *Belgrave-sq.*; *Carlton*; *Amisfield*, and *Goaford House, Haddingtonsh.*

### Chichester, Lord John Ludford. (*Belfast*)

S. of 2nd Marq. of Donegal. B. 1811. Appointed Capt. 87th foot in 1843, but retired from the army in 1844. A Liberal. Will vote "for the repeal of the grant to Maynooth Coll." First returned for Belfast in Aug., 1845, without opposition.—8, *St. George's-pl.*, *Hyde Park Corner*.



**Childers, John Walbanke. (Malton)**

Eld. s. of the late Colonel John Walbanke Childers, of Cantley, Yorksh., by the 3rd d. and co-heir of Sampson, Lord Bardley. B. 1798; m. 1824, Anne, only d. of Sir Francis Lindley Wood, bart. Educated at Christ Church, Oxford. Patron of 1 living. A Magistrate for the West Riding of Yorkshire. A Whig. Sat for Cambridgesh. from 1832 to 1836; was unsuccessful at the general election in that year. First returned for Malton, Feb., 1836; sat till April, 1846, when he accepted the Chiltern Hundreds; was again elected in 1847.—*Reform; Cantley Hall, Doncaster, Yorksh.*

**Cholmeley, Sir Montagu John, bt. (Lincolnsh. North)**

B. 1802; m. in 1829, the 5th d. of the 8th Duke of St. Alban's. Is a Dep.-Lieut. of Lincolnsh. A Liberal, but Protectionist; opposed to any grant to the Roman Catholics. Was educated at Winchester, and graduated at Balliol Coll. Oxon. in 1831. A Protectionist. First returned for Dorsetsh. Feb. 1846.—5, *Old Palace Yard*; *Oxford and Cambridge*; *West Stafford, Dorsetsh.*

**Foley, John Hodgetts Hodgetts.** (*Worcestersh. East*)

Second s. of the late Hon. Edward Foley, (bro. to 2nd Lord Foley,) by the d. and heir of John Hodgetts, esq., of Prestwood. B. at Prestwood, Worcestersh., 1797; m. 1825, Charlotte Margaret, 2nd d. of the late John Gage, esq., of Rogate Lodge, Hants, and cousin to 4th Visct. Gage. Was educated at Christ Church, Oxford. A Magistrate for Worcestersh., and for several years Chairman of the Poor Law Union; is President of the Stourbridge Mechanics' Institution, and many other local associations. A Liberal; a supporter of the Established Church; considers the window tax oppressive and injurious. Represented Droitwich from 1821 till 1834; first returned for Worcestersh. **Forbes, William.** (*Stirlingsh.*)

**Fordyce, Alexander Dingwall.** (*Aberdeen*)

S. of William Dingwall Fordyce, esq., of Techmigny, Aberdeensh., and cadet of the families of Dingwall of Brucklay, and Lindsay of Dowhill. B. at Aberdeen 1800; m. 1835, Barbara, d. of James Thom, esq., of Aberdeen. Was educated at the Aberdeen Grammar School; entered the navy as Midshipman in 1818; became a Lieut. in 1826, and a Commander in 1841; is author of "Outlines of Naval Routine." Of Liberal opinions; is opposed to any farther religious endowments.

Chichester Fortescue, of Dromiskin, co. of Louth, by the d. of Samuel Hobson, esq., of Waterford; is bro. to Thomas Fortescue, esq., of Dromiskin, and Ravensdale Park, co. of Louth, formerly M.P. for that co. B. 1823; is unm. Was educated at Christ Church, Oxford, where he was first class in classics in 1844, and obtained the Chancellor's prize for the English Essay in 1846. A Liberal; is opposed to the repeal of the Union. First returned for Louth in 1847, without opposition.—*Alfred Club; Ravensdale Park, Flurry-Bridge, co. of Louth.*

**Fortescue, Hon. John William. (*Barnstaple*)**

Second s. of 2nd Earl Fortescue, by the eld. d. of 2nd Lord Harrowby. B. 1819. Was formerly in the army. Appointed a Dep.-Lieut. of Devon in 1845, and Major in the Devon Militia in 1846. A Liberal. **Fox, Richard Maxwell. (*Longford*)**

Eld. s. of the late Rev. Francis Fox, and nephew to the 6th Earl of Farnham. B. at Raheny Glebe, co. Dublin, 1816; m. 1835, Susan Amelia, 2nd d. of Admiral Sir Lawrence Halsted, G.C.B., and grand-d. of the celebrated Admiral Visct. Exmouth. Was educated at Winchester, and at University College, Oxford. Was a Government Inspector for the Dungannon Union, co. Tyrone, under the Irish Relief Act. A Magistrate and Deputy-Lieut. of Longford. A Liberal; in favour of the repeal of the Union with Ireland, the extension of the franchise, &c.; but opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. **Box, Sackville Walter Lane. (*Beverley*)**

3rd s. of James Lane Fox, esq., by the only d. of the 1st Lord Rivers; m. in 1826, the Lady Charlotte Mary Anne Georgiana, only d. of the 6th Duke of Leeds (she died 1886). A Dep.-Lieut. of the North Riding of Yorksh. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for Helstone from 1831 to 1835; for Beverley from 1837 to 1841; for Ipswich from 1842 to 1847; and was elected again for Beverley in the latter year.—3, *St. James's-sq.*; *Carlton*; *Oran-house, Yorksh.*

**Fox, William Johnson. (*Oldham*)**

S. of a Suffolk farmer, afterwards a cotton-weaver in Norwich. B. at Uggeshal farm, near Wrentham, Suffolk, 1786; m. 1820, d. of James Florance, esq., of Chichester, barrister. Educated for the Dissenting ministry, at Old College, Homerton, under the Rev. J. Pye Smith, D.D. Author of 3 vols. of "Lectures chiefly addressed to the Working Classes;" "Letters of a Norwich Weaver Boy," in the "League" Newspaper, &c. A Radical Reformer, in favour of a separation of Church and State; opposed to all religious endowments. **Freestun, William Lockyer. (*Weymouth*)**

Second s. of Edward Freestun, esq., of Primrose Hill, co. Waterford. B. at May Park, co. Waterford, 1800; m. 1846, Josefa Benita, relict of Charles Pratt, esq., of Totton House, Hants, and the Belvidere, Weymouth. Entered the Army as Ensign in the 5th Foot in 1812, and served for 23 years; was on the staff of the British Legion under Sir de Lacy Evans in 1835-6-7, in which service he became a Col., and was three times wounded. Has received permission to accept and wear the Order of Charles III. (Knight Commander), as also the first class of the Orders of San Fernando and of Isabella the Catholic. Served in Syria in 1840 and 1841 with the local rank of Major and Assistant-Adjutant General, where he was presented with a gold medal by the Sultan, which he has received royal permission to wear. A Liberal; in favour of progressive free trade, the ballot, and "either the endowment of all religious bodies or of none." **French, Fitzstephen. (*Roscommon co.*)**

**Frewen, Charles Hay.** (*Sussex, East*)

This family having succeeded to the Turner estates in Leicestersh. about the middle of the last century, assumed the name of Turner, but in 1837 they reverted to the use of their patronymic, Frewen only. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846.—16, *Clifford-st.*; *United University, Alfred*; *Rose-hill and Ashdown House, Sussex*.

**Galway, Visct.** (*East Retford*)

An Irish Peer. B. 1805; m. 1838, his cousin Henrietta Elisa, only d. of Robert Pemberton Milnes, esq., of Fryston Hall, Yorksh. Was educated at Harrow, and graduated B.A. at Christ Church, Oxford. A Conservative and Protectionist; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for East Retford in 1847 without opposition.—*Boodle's*; *Travellers*; *Scribby Hall, Notts*.

**Gardner, Richard.** (*Leicester*)

Eld. s. of Robert Gardner, esq., a merchant, and Magistrate of Lancash. B. in London 1813; is unm. Was educated at the Charterhouse, and at Wadham Coll., Oxford, where he graduated A.B. Is author of several political pamphlets and contributions to magazines, newspapers, &c. Of Radical opinions; is in favour of the extension of the franchise, and opposed to the endowment by the State of any religious body. First elected for Leicester in 1847.—130, *Piccadilly*; *Reform and Free Trade Clubs*; *Chaseley Hall, Manchester*.

**Gaskell, James Milnes.** (*Wenlock*)

Only s. of the late member for Maldon of that name; b. 1810; m.

1832, Mary, 2nd d. of the Right Hon. C. W. W. Wynn. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has been a Lord of the Treasury; resigned Feb. 1846. Has sat for the borough since 1832.—72, *Lower Grosvenor-st.; Carlton; Thornes House, Yorksh.*

Gibson, Right Hon. Thomas Milner. (*Manchester*)

Only s. of Major Thomas Milner Gibson, of the 87th regt. B. 1807; m. in 1832, d. of the Rev. Sir Thomas G. Cullum, bart. Appointed Vice President of the Board of Trade, 1846. A Liberal. Sat for Ipswich in the early part of the Parliament of 1837. In 1839, accepted the Chiltern Hundreds, stood a contest, and was not elected; unsuccessfully contested Cambridge in 1839; first returned for Manchester in 1841; was a wrangler at Cambridge.—50, *Wilton Crescent; Oxford and Cambridge University Club; Theberton House, Suffolk.*

Gladstone, Right Hon. William Ewart. (*Oxford University*)

Third s. of the late Sir John Gladstone, bart., a Liverpool merchant, who was descended from the ancient family of Gledstaines, and who obtained a royal licence in 1835 to continue the present spelling of his name. Grands. maternally of Andrew Robertson, esq., Provost of Dingwall. B. at Liverpool 1809; m. 1839, Catherine, eld. d. of the late Sir Stephen Richard Glynne, bart., of Hawarden Castle, Flintsh. Was educated at Eton, and at Christ Church, Oxford, where he obtained a double first class in 1831. Was appointed a Lord of the Treasury in Dec., 1834; but, when Mr. Stuart Wortley failed in obtaining a seat, superseded that gentleman as Under-Secretary for the Colonies; held this office till April, 1835; was Vice-President of the Board of Trade and Master of the Mint from Sept., 1841, to May, 1843, when he became President of that Board, retaining the office of Master of the Mint; resigned both Feb., 1845; was Secretary of State for the Colonies from Dec., 1845, to July, 1846. Is author of "The State in its Relations with the Church," "Church Principles considered in their Results," and other works. "A Liberal Conservative." Fourth s. of the late Sir Richard Carr Glyn, bart., by the only d. of John Plumptre, esq., of Fredville, Kent, formerly member for Nottingham. B. in London 1797; m. 1823, Mary Anne, d. of the late Pascoe Grenfell, esq., M.P., of Taplow House, Bucks. Was educated at Westminster. Is partner in the well-known banking firm, Glyn, Halifax, and Co.; Chairman of the London and North-Western Railway; director of the Chester and Holyhead Railway, of the St. Katherine's Dock Company, and of the Globe Insurance Company. A trustee of the City Club. A commissioner of Lieutenancy for the city of London. A Liberal

B. in London 1819; m. 1847, Charlotte, eld. d. of Ayshford Sanford, esq., of Nyncehead Court, Somerset. Educated at Harrow, and at St. John's College, Cambridge. A Magistrate for Wilts; Capt. in the Wilts Yeomanry Cavalry. A Conservative; "will advocate the repeal of all taxes which burden the land, and will endeavour to restore and preserve adequate protection to British industry;" is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned in 1847 for Cricklade, which his father had represented from 1837 to 1841.—58, *Chester-sq.*; *Boodle's*; *The Lawn, Swindon, Wilts.*

**Godson, Richard.** (*Kidderminster*)

5th s. of the late W. Godson, esq., one of the coroners for Worcestersh. B. 19th June, 1797; m. in 1825 Mary, only d. of the late Henry Hargreaves, esq., of Springfield Hall, near Lancaster. Was a Wrangler at Cambridge. A Queen's Counsel. Is author of a Practical Treatise on the law of Patents for Inventions, and on that of Copyright. Appointed Counsel to the Admiralty in Feb. 1845. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for St. Alban's in 1831; for Kidderminster in 1832; unsuccessfully contested the borough in 1835, and came in for it at the head of the poll, at the general election in 1837. Obtained a commission in the 14th Light Dragoons in 1819, but sold out as Capt. in 1837. A Justice of the Peace and Dep.-Lient. for Suffolk. A Conservative; is pledged to support Protection, and to oppose the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First elected for East Suffolk in Feb., 1846.—32, *St. James's-st.*; *Boodle's*; *Carlton*; *Beacon Hill, Suffolk.*

**Gordon, Hon. William.** (*Aberdeenshire*)

B. 1785. Br. of the Earl of Aberdeen. A Rear-Admiral of the Blue; was a Lord of the Admiralty from Sept. 1841 to Feb. 1846. A Conservative;

voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for the co. since 1820.  
—*Carlton; Haddow House, Aberdeensh.*

**Gore, William Ormsby. (*Salop, North*)**

S. of the late William Gore, esq.; b. 1779; m. 1815 Mary Jane, only d. and heiress of Owen Ormsby, Esq. of Willowbrook, in the co. of Sligo, and Porkington, Salop; upon which occasion he assumed, by sign-manual, the additional surname and arms of Ormsby. Is patron of 1 living. A Director of the Protector Life Association. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for Leitrim in the Parliament of 1806, his ancestors having represented that county for nearly a century; for Carnarvon in that of 1830; unsuccessfully contested that borough in 1831, and Salop in 1832; but in 1835 was returned without opposition.—66, *Portland-pl.*; *Carlton; Porkington, Salop; Glyn, Merionethsh.; Willowbrook, co. Sligo.*

**Gore, William Richard Ormsby. (*Sligo co.*)**

Second s. of the member for Salop, North. Is descended from a common ancestor with the Earls of Arran and Sir R. Gore Booth, bart. His family have long been settled in Sligo, several of his ancestors having at various periods represented that co. in Parliament. B. 1819. Is a Lieut. 18th Light Dragoons. S. of Munbee Goulburn, of Portland Place, esq., and the Hon. Susan Chetwynd, sister of Visct. Chetwynd. B. 1784; m. 1811 Jane, 8d d. of Matthew, 4th Lord Rokeby. A West India proprietor. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Has been Secretary for Ireland, Under-secretary for the Colonial Department, and was Chancellor of the Exchequer from 1828 till 1830. Secretary for the Home Department from Dec. 1834 till April, 1835. Was proposed for the office of Speaker in 1839; had 299 votes. Was Chancellor of the Exchequer from Sept. 1841, till July, 1846. Sat for St. Germain's, West Looe, and other boroughs, till 1826, when he sat for Armagh till 1831; was then elected for the University, which he had unsuccessfully contested in 1826 with Sir John Copley (now Lord Lyndhurst) and Lord Palmerston. In 1831, Lord Palmerston and Lord Cavendish having voted for Reform, he and Mr. Yates Peel succeeded in ousting them. B. at Mantua 1792; m. 1819, Frances Mary, only d. of the late Sir Richard Nagle, bart., of Jamestown, co. Westmeath (she died June, 1826). Was educated at Celbridge and at Maynooth, where he obtained several premiums. A Magistrate for Roscommon, of which co. he was High Sheriff in 1830. Of Whig principles; opposed to the repeal of the Union with Ireland. First returned for Roscommon in 1847.—*Mantua House, Elphin, co. Roscommon.*

Graham, Rt. Hon. Sir Jas. Robt. Geo., bt. (*Ripon*)

Cousin to the Earl of Galloway and to Visct. Garlies; b. 1792; m. 1819 Fanny, youngest d. of Jas. Campbell, Esq. of Ardinglass. Was First Lord of the Admiralty, and a member of the Cabinet, from 1830 till 1834, when he retired on account of the extent to which it was intended to carry the Reform of the Irish Church. Was Secretary of State for the Home Department from Sept., 1841, to July, 1846. Is one of the Council of the Duchy of Lancaster. Is patron of 2 livings. A Conservative; formerly voted in favour of the Corn Laws, but supported their abolition in 1846; sat for Carlisle from 1820 to 1830, for Cumberland East from 1830 to 1837. Elected for Pembroke dist. in 1838, for Dorchester in 1841, and for Ripon in 1847.—31, *Hill-st.; Netherby, Cumberland.*

Granby, Marq. of. (*Stamford*)

Eld. surviving s. of the Duke of Rutland, by the Lady Elizabeth, 5th d. of Frederick, 5th Earl of Carlisle. B. 16 May, 1815. Was a Lord of the Bed-chamber to Prince Albert from Dec. 1843 till Aug. 1845. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First returned for Stamford in 1837.—5, *St. James's pl.; Carlton; Belvoir Castle, Leicestersh.*

Granger, Thomas Colpitts. (*Durham city*)

Was called to the Bar at the Inner Temple in 1830, and goes the Northern Circuit. A Liberal. First returned for the city in 1841, having been an unsuccessful candidate at the elections in 1835 and 1837.—12, *King's Bench walk, Temple.*

Grattan, Henry. (*Meath*)

S. of the celebrated Hen. Grattan. M. d. of Dr. Harvey. Called to the

Irish Bar 1810. A Repealer. Sat for the city of Dublin in 1826, having before unsuccessfully contested it; in 1830 he was thrown out by Mr. Shaw, the Recorder of Dublin. Was unsuccessful for the co. of Meath in 1831. Has sat for it since 1832.—*Reform Club; Motrahy, co. Meath.*

**Greenall, Gilbert.** (*Warrington*)

S. of Edward Greenall, esq., and br. of Peter Greenall, esq., formerly M.P. for Wigan. B. at Wilderspool, Chesh., 1806; m. 1836, d. of David Claughton, esq. Is a glass manufacturer. A magistrate for Chesh. and Lancash., and a dep.-lieut. of Chesh. Chairman of the St. Helen's Railway. A Conservative and Protectionist; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Warrington in 1847.—*National Club; Walton Hall, Warrington, Lancash.*

**Greene, John.** (*Kilkenny co.*)

Was elected for Monmouth in 1831, but on petition lost his seat. **Headlam, Thomas Emerson. (Newcastle-on-Tyne)**

Eld. s. of the Rev. John Headlam, Archdeacon of Richmond, and Rector of Wycliffe, Yorksh. B. at Wycliffe Rectory 1818; is unm. Was educated at Shrewsbury School, and at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, where he was 16th wrangler in 1836, and graduated A.M. in 1839; was called to the Bar at the Inner Temple in 1839, and goes the Northern Circuit; is author of a "Treatise on the Practice of the Court of Chancery." Was called to the Bar at the Inner Temple in 1838. A Liberal; in favour of the ballot, and a moderate extension of the suffrage; the reduction of duties on tea, coffee, and sugar; and is willing to modify the Navigation Laws; considers that the Irish Roman Catholic Clergy should be maintained by taxes on Irish land, and that the Irish Protestant Church requires reform. Was educated at Oakham, Rutlandsh., and at Catherine Hall, Cambridge, of which he is a Fellow; was senior optime in 1823; graduated A.M. 1826; was called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn 1827; is a Queen's Counsel, and goes the Northern Circuit. A Conservative and Protectionist; will support the Navigation Laws, and is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. ### Hill, Lord Arthur Edwin. (*Co. of Down*)

S. of 8rd Marq. of Downshire. B. 1819. Appointed Lieut.-Col. of the South Downshire Militia in Sept. 1845. Was Gentleman of the Bed-chamber to the Lord-Lieut. of Ireland; resigned 1845. A Conservative. "Will support the agricultural interest." First returned for Down in 1845.—21, *Hanover-sq.*; *Hillsborough, co. of Down*.

### Hill, Rt. Hon. Lord Arthur Marcus Cecil. (*Evesham*)

Third s. of the 2nd Marq. of Downshire; b. 1798; m. April 12, 1837, Louisa, youngest d. of J. Blake, esq. related to Adm. Blake. Comptroller of the Household from July 1846 to July 1847, when he became Treasurer. A Liberal. Represented Newry in 1832. Has sat for Evesham since 1837, when he was seated on petition, having been unsuccessful at the poll.—2, *Chesham-street, Belgrave-square*; *Reform Club*.

**Hindley, Charles.** (*Ashton under Lyne*)

M. 1839, d. of R. Fort, esq. Of Whig principles, inclining to Radicalism. Contested the borough unsuccessfully in 1832, in opposition to Col. Williams, a Radical, and Mr. Helps, a Conservative. In 1835, he succeeded against the same opponents, and was at the same time an unsuccessful candidate at Warrington. **Hodges, Thomas Law.** (*Kent, West*)

Eld. s. of the late Thomas Hallett Hodges, esq., of Hemsted, Kent, by the youngest d. of John Cartwright, esq., of Marnham, Notts. Is father of the member for Rochester. B. 1776; m. 1802, Rebecca, only child of Sir Roger Twisden, bart., of Bradbourn Park, Kent. Is a Dep.-Lieut. of Kent; a Magistrate for that co. and for Sussex; formerly Major in the West Kent Militia. A Liberal; in favour of the ballot, the repeal of the malt tax, and short parliaments; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Sat for Kent from 1830 till the dissolution of Parliament in 1841; again elected in 1847.—*Reform; Hemsted, Kent.*

**Hodges, Thomas Twisden.** (*Rochester*)

Only s. of Thomas Law Hodges, esq., of Hemsted, Kent, (M.P. for that co.) by the only d. and heir of Sir Roger Twisden, bart., of Bradbourn Park. M. Mary, d. of Thomas Chandless, esq., of London. A Liberal; in favour of the ballot; voted for the repeal of the malt tax. First elected for Rochester in 1835 by a majority of one over Lord Charles Wellesley, and defended his seat successfully against the petition which followed his return; sat till 1837; was re-elected in 1847; but in the interval was twice an unsuccessful candidate for Canterbury, viz., in Feb. and in July, 1841.—169, *New Bond-st.; Reform; Sandgate, Kent.*

**Hodgson, William Nicholson.** (*Carlisle*)

Eld. s. of the late William Hodgson, esq., of Houghton House, Cumberland, by the d. of Joseph Stordy, esq.; is therefore nephew to William Hodgson, esq., of Houghton House. B. 1801; m. 1831, Mary, d. of Thomas Irwin, esq., of Justus Town, Cumberland. Is a Magistrate for Cumberland. A Conservative and Protectionist, opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy.—*Carlisle.*

**Hogg, Sir James Weir, Bart.** (*Honiton*)

S. of William Hogg, esq. by the d. of James Dickey, esq. of Dunmore, co. Antrim. Is originally of Scottish descent. M. 1822, d. of Samuel Swinton, esq., of Swinton, co. Berwick. A barrister. Shortly after he was called to the bar he proceeded to Calcutta, where he practised with much success, and latterly held the office of Registrar in the Supreme Court. Elected an East India Director in 1834, and Chairman

of the Court in 1846. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for Beverley from 1834 to 1847, when he was returned for Honiton.—*16, Grosvenor-sq.; Carlton.*

### Holland, Robert. (*Hastings*)

4th s. of the late William Holland, esq. of Grosvenor-pl. B. 5th Jan. 1808; m. in 1840, d. of Thos. Teed, esq. Formerly of Corpus Christi Coll., Cambridge, where he graduated A.M. 1831; was called to the bar at Lincoln's-inn, 1834. Is a "Reformer, pledged to support the ballot." Has sat for Hastings since 1837.—63, *Portland-pl.; Reform; Pall Mall; Allegria, Sussex.*

### Hood, Sir Alexander, bart. (*Somersetsh. West*)

Only s. of the late Captain Alexander Hood, R.N. (who was slain on board the *Mars* at the capture of *L'Hercule*, 1798,) by the d. of John Periam, esq., of Butley-Wooton, Somerset. Nephew of the distinguished Admiral Sir Samuel Hood, (whose baronetcy he enjoys,) and cousin to Lord Bridport (whose Peerage is in contingent remainder to this branch of the family). B. at Wooton, Somerset, 1793; m. 1815, Amelia Anne, youngest d. and coheir of Sir Hugh Bateman, bart., of Hartington Hall, co. Derby. Graduated at Exeter College, Oxford. A Magistrate for Somerset. A Conservative and Protectionist; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Somerset West in 1847.—*Wooton, Glastonbury, Somerset.*

### Hope, Alexander James Beresford. (*Maidstone*)

Youngest s. of the late T. Hope, esq. author of "*Anastatius*," by d. of 1st Lord Decies (remarried to Lord Beresford). B. 1820; m. in 1842, the Lady Mildred Cecil, eld. d. of 8th Marq. of Salisbury. A "Tory;" voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Gained a scholarship and several prizes at Harrow; in 1840, the English and Latin declamation prizes at Trin. Coll. Cambridge, and in 1841 the Members' B.A. prize for a Latin Essay. First returned for the borough in 1841.—*Carlton; Arcklow House, Connaught-pl.*

### Hope, Henry Thomas. (*Gloucester city*)

Eld. s. of the late Thomas Hope, esq., of Deepdene, Surrey (the well-known author of "*Anastatius*"), by the youngest d. of Lord Decies, Archbishop of Tuam (she m. 2ndly Visct. Beresford). B. 1808; graduated at Trinity Coll., Camb. A Magistrate for Surrey and Gloucestersh.; a director of the London and Westminster Joint Stock Bank. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade; supported a repeal of the window tax, when a candidate for Marylebone in 1833; voted against a repeal of the malt tax in 1835; opposed the Reform Bill. Sat for East Looe in 1830 and 1831; was an unsuccessful candidate for Gloucester in December, 1832; returned for that city in 1838, and s. at till 1841, when he was defeated; was re-elected, however, in 184

1, *Mansfield st.*; 84, *Piccadilly*; *Carlton*; *Deerpene, Dorking, Surrey*; *Trenant Park, East Loos, Cornwall.*

Hope, Sir John, bart. (*Edinburgh co.*)

S. of Sir Archibald, the 9th bart. B. 1781; m. in 1806 youngest d. of the late Sir John Wedderburn, bart. Is Lieut.-Col.-Commandant of the Midlothian Yeomanry Cavalry; Vice-Lieut. and Convener of that co. A Conservative; in favour of protection to agriculture. First elected for the county of Edinburgh in 1845 without opposition.—14, *St. James's-pl.*; *Carlton*; *Pinkie House, Edinburgh.*

Hornby, John. (*Blackburn*)

Youngest s. of the late John Hornby, of Blackburn, Lancashire, and of Rake's Hall, Blackpool. M. 1844, Margaret, d. of the Rev. C. Bird, of Chollerton, Northumberland. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. First returned for the borough in 1841; was petitioned against in 1842, but the Committee declared him duly elected.—22, *Park-crescent, Portland-pl.*; *University Club.*

Horsman, Edward. (*Cockermouth*)

Nephew to 7th Earl of Stair; m. in 1841, d. of J. C. Ramsden, Esq. Was educated at Rugby. An Advocate at the Scottish Bar. Has been Commissioner of Church Inquiry in Scotland. Was a Lord of the Treasury till Sept. 1841. Is in favour of an efficient Church reform; of the vote by ballot; and of the removal of all taxes on knowledge. Unsuccessfully contested the borough at the general election in 1835, but came in without opposition in Feb. 1836, since which date he has retained his seat.—6, *Upper Brook-st.*; *Reform Club*; *Edinburgh.*

Hotham, Lord. (*Yorksh. East*)

An Irish peer; b. 1794; a Col. in the army. Is patron of 8 livings. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Grand-nephew of the celebrated Admiral Hotham. Sat for Leominster from 1820 till 1841, when he was first elected for the co.—7, *Hill-st.*; *Carlton*; *Athenæum*; *South Dalton, Yorksh.*

Houldsworth, Thomas. (*Nottinghamsh. North*)

A Merchant and a Cotton Spinner, at Manchester, and at Rochester, Staffordsh.; unmarried. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for Pontefract from 1818 to 1830; for Newton, Lancash., from 1830 till 1832; since then for the county.—16, *Suffolk-st.*; *Carlton*; *Sheerwood Hall, Notts.*

Howard, Hon. Chas. Wentworth Geo. (*Cumberland, East*)

S. of 6th Earl of Carlisle; b. 1814; m. 1842, Mary 2nd d. of the Right Hon. Sir Jas. Parke, Baron of the Court of Exchequer. A Reformer; willing to endow the Roman Catholic Church. First elected in 1840



the death of Mr. Aglionby.—56, *Park-st., Grosvenor-sq.; Naworth Castle, Cumberland.*

Howard, Hon. Edward George Granville. (*Morpeth*)

S. of the Earl of Carlisle; b. 1809; a Capt. in the Navy; a Whig. Formerly voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws, but in 1846 supported their repeal. First returned for the borough in 1840.—86, *Eaton-pl.; Castle Howard.*

Howard, Hon. James Kenneth. (*Malmesbury*)

Youngest s. of the Earl of Suffolk and Berks; b. 1814; m. in 1845 Lady Louisa Fitz-Maurice, only d. of 3rd Marq. of Lansdowne. Has been a Groom in waiting to her Majesty. A Liberal. First returned for the borough in 1841.—*Reform, Travellers'; Charlton, Wilts.*

Hudson, George. (*Sunderland*)

B. 1800; m. Elizabeth d. of James Nicholson, esq. Is well known for his success in railway undertakings. Is Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Eastern Counties, the Midland, York and North Midland, Leeds and Bradford, Newcastle and Darlington, Newcastle and Berwick Railways. A Magistrate of the East and North Ridings of Yorksh., and a Magistrate and Dep.-Lieut. of Durham. An Alderman and Magistrate of the city of York, for which he was elected Lord Mayor, Nov., 1837; again Nov., 1838; and a third time Nov., 1846. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Is patron of 2 livings; first returned for Sunderland in Aug., 1845, when he defeated Col. Thompson.—*Albert Gate; Carlton, Conservative; York; Londonborough, East Riding, and Newby Park, North Riding of Yorksh.*

Hughes, William Bulkeley. (*Carnarvon dist.*)

Eld. s. of the late Sir W. B. Hughes, whose ancestor, Hugh Hughes, esq. was Attorney-Gen. to Queen Elizabeth. B. 26th July, 1797; m. 19th April, 1825, Elizabeth, widow of Harry Wormald, esq., of Woodhouse, Leeds, and heiress of J. Nettlehip, esq., of Mattersey Abbey, Notts. Was formerly a barrister on the Oxford and Chester circuits. Came forward in 1834 for Carnarvon, as well as for Beaumaris, but withdrew in both cases without going to a poll. Is friendly to the *principle* of the Poor Law Act; is against the Ballot, Universal Suffrage, and was formerly against the abolition of the Corn Laws; but in 1846 supported the repeal of the latter; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy, and will support the present Navigation Laws.—*Plâscoch, Anglesey.*

Hume, Joseph, F.R.S., F.R.A.S. (*Montrose dist.*)

B. at Montrose, 1777. Educated for the medical profession, but on proceeding to India was, in a few years, employed in the various offices of surgeon, Persian interpreter to the army during the Mahratta war, from 1802 to 1807, Paymaster, Postmaster, &c., discharging

the duties attached to them in a way to call for the public thanks of Lord Lake and other high functionaries. Having realized a competence, he returned to his native country in 1808. The year 1810, and part of 1811, he spent travelling in Spain, Egypt, Turkey, Greece, &c. Is Member of the College of Surgeons in Edinburgh and London; Vice-President of the Society of Arts; Deputy Lieut. of the co. of Middlesex; a magistrate in Westminster, the counties of Middlesex and Norfolk, &c. &c. An East India Proprietor. A Radical Reformer. Was returned for Weymouth in 1811; in 1818 was elected for Montrose District, for which he continued to sit till 1830, when he succeeded Mr. Whitbread in Middlesex, and represented that county till the general election in 1837, when he was returned for Kilkenny; was an unsuccessful candidate for Leeds in 1841; but was again returned for Montrose on a vacancy occurring in 1842.—6, *Bryanston-sq.*; *Reform Club*; *Bromley Hall, Norfolk*

### Humphery, John. (*Southwark*)

M. in 1836, 2nd dau. of the late James Dyson, Esq. of Bedford. Was Lord Mayor of the city of London in 1842-3; a wharfinger and merchant in the Borough. A Radical Reformer; in favour of the ballot, triennial Parliaments, free-trade, the repeal of the window tax, the repeal of the taxes on knowledge and industry, the abolition of all monopolies, and such a reform in the Church as will abolish tithes, appropriate Church lands to the purposes for which they were originally intended, do away with pluralities, deprive the Bishops of all share in the temporal government of the country, and place the election of the clergy in the hands of the parishioners, paying them according to their duties and merits. ### Hutt, William. (*Gateshead*)

B. 1803; m. in 1831, Mary, Countess of Strathmore, widow of the 10th Earl. A Liberal. Has taken an active part in questions of Commercial Reform, more especially with regard to the exaction of the Sound dues, and the dues collected by the Crown of Hanover at Stade, for which he received the thanks of the General Shipowners' Society. ### Ingestre, Visct. C.B. (*Staffordsh. South*)

Eld. surviving s. of the Earl Talbot, and br.-in-law of the Marq. of Lothian. B. Nov. 8, 1803; m. Nov. 8, 1828, Lady Sarah Elizabeth, d. of the 2d Marq. of Waterford. A Capt. in the Navy; Lieut.-Col. of the Queen's own Regt. of Staffordsh. Militia. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Was elected for Hertford in 1830 and 1832, but unseated on petition in the latter year; was defeated in that borough

1831 and in 1835; returned for Armagh in 1831; resigned that seat in August, and was elected for Dublin (city). Unsuccessfully contested Staffordshire (South) in 1838, but has sat for that co. since 1837.—19, *Grosvenor-st.*; *Carlton*; *Ingestre-Hall, Staffordsh.*

**Inglis, Sir Robt. Harry, bt. D.C.L. (Oxford University)**

B. 1786; m. 1807 Mary, eld. d. of Joseph Seymour Briscoe, of Penhill, Surrey; a Barrister, a Member of the Council of King's College, and a Director of the University Life Assurance Society. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for Dundalk from 1824 to 1826, and for Ripon from 1826 till 1828. Has sat for the University since 1828, when Sir Robert Peel took the Chiltern Hundreds, in order to give his constituents an opportunity of expressing their sentiments upon his change of conduct with respect to Catholic emancipation.—7, *Bedford-sq.*; *Battersea Rise, Surrey*; *Milton Bryant, Bedfordsh.*

**Ireland, Thomas James. (Bewdley)**

Only s. of Thomas Ireland, esq., by the d. of the Rev. Christopher Hand, B.D., rector of Aller, Somerset. B. 1792; m. 1829, Elizabeth, d. of Sir William Earle Welby, bart., of Denton, Lincolnsh. Was educated at Emmanuel Coll., Cambridge, where he was junior optime in 1814, and gained the declamation prizes of his coll. in two successive years; graduated M.A. in 1817; a Magistrate for Suffolk. Patron of 1 living. A Conservative; "a staunch supporter of the connexion between Church and State, and as staunch an opponent of the endowment of the Romish Priesthood from any public sources;" will support "any modification of the Poor Laws which may conduce to their humanity and justice." First elected for Bewdley in 1847.—*Union Club*; *Owsden Hall, Newmarket.*

**Jackson, William. (Newcastle-under-Lyme)**

S. of the late Peter Jackson, esq., of Warrington, Lancash., surgeon. B. at Warrington, 1805; m. 1829, Elizabeth, d. of Lieut. Hughes. Was formerly an African merchant, but retired in 1842. Was an extensive contractor in the improvements effected at Birkenhead and in other local undertakings. Is a director of the Chester and Holyhead, Royston and Hitchin, and Whitehaven Junction Railways. A Magistrate of the co. of Chester. Patron of one living. A Liberal; strongly opposed to any further endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Newcastle under-Lyme in 1847.—*Reform*; *Manor House, Birkenhead*; and *Claughton, Birkenhead.*

**Jermyn, Earl. (Bury St. Edmunds)**

Eld. s. of the Marq. of Bristol. B. 1800; m. in 1830 Catherine, 3d d. of the 5th Duke of Rutland. Is Treasurer of the Household. A Dep.-Lieut. of Suffolk. Appointed Col. of the West Suffolk militia, 1846. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Has sat for the borough since 1880.—47, *Eaton-pl.*; *Carlton*; *Ichworth Pk., Suffolk*; *Putney-heath, Surrey.*

**Jervis, Sir John. (Chester)**

Second s. of Thomas Jervis, Esq. Q.C. late C.J. of Chester, and for many years Counsel to the Admiralty, who was returned to parliament for Yarmouth, through the influence of his second cousin, the late Earl St. Vincent. B. 1802; m. in 1824 Catherine 2d d. of Alexander Mundell, esq. of Great George-st. Has written several law works of repute. Has been Attorney-Gen. since July, 1846. A Radical Reformer; voted for the revision of the pension list, triennial parliaments, and against the 147th clause of the New Poor Law Act. Is opposed to the ballot. Has sat for Chester since 1832.—47, *Eaton-sq.*; *Union and Reform Clubs*; *Beaumaris, co. Anglesey*.

**Jervis, John. (Horsham)**

S. of Sir John Jervis, the Attorney-General. B. in London, 1826. Was educated at Westminster and at Trinity Hall, Cambridge. A Liberal; in favour of free trade. First returned for Horsham in 1847.—47, *Eaton-sq.*; *Reform and Coventry Clubs*; *Fairhill, Tunbridge, Kent*.

**Jocelyn, Visct. (Lynn Regis)**

Eld. s. of the Earl of Roden. B. 1816; m. in 1841 youngest d. of 5th Earl Cowper (she was born in 1820, and is a Lady of the Bedchamber to the Queen). His lordship was military secretary to the Chinese expedition, and is author of "Six Months in China." A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Has been one of the Secretaries to the Board of Controul. Has sat for Lynn Regis since 1842.—35, *Curzon-st.*; *Carlton*.

**Johnstone, Sir John Vanden Bempde, bt. (Scarborough)**

B. 1799; m. in 1825, Louisa Venables Vernon, 2nd d. of the Archbishop of York. Is patron of 2 livings. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Was elected for Yorksh. in the autumn of 1830 on the elevation of Lord Brougham to the peerage; sat for it in 1831; for Scarborough from 1832 till 1837; re-elected in 1841 and 1847.—27, *Grosvenor-sq.*; *Boodle's, Travellers'*; *Hackness Hall, Yorksh.*

**Jolliffe, Sir William Geo. Hylton, bart. (Petersfield)**

S. of the Rev. William Jolliffe. B. 1800; m. in 1825, d. of the Hon. B. Paget. Has represented the borough in former Parliaments. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846.—5, *John-st.*, *Berkeley-sq.*; *Carlton*; *White's*; *Arthur's*; *Merstham House, Surrey*; *Heath House, Petersfield*.

**Jones, Theobald. (Londonderry co.)**

S. of the Rev. James Jones, Rector of Urney, Strabane. B. 1790. A Capt. in the navy. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for the county since 1830.—80, *Charles-st. St. James's*; *Carlton*; *Bovagh, co. Derry*.

**Jones, Sir Willoughby, bart. (*Cheltenham*)**

Second s. of Sir John Thomas Jones, K.C.B., by the d. of Edingham Lawrence, Esq., of New York. B. 1820; is unm. Became Scholar of Trinity College, Cambridge, in 1842; took a Wrangler's degree in 1843; studied for the Bar for two years. Is patron of one living. A Conservative; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Church. First returned for Cheltenham in 1847.—*Alfred Club; Cranmer Hall, Fakenham, Norfolk; Evesham House, Cheltenham.*

**Keating, Robert. (*Waterford co.*)**

A Repealer; a member of the "Old Ireland party." First returned for Waterford in 1847.—*Garranlee, Cashel, co. Tipperary.*

**Keogh, William. (*Athlone*)**

Eld. s. of William Keogh, esq., by Mary, d. of Austin French, esq., of Galway. B. at Galway 1817; m. 1841, Kate, eld. d. of the late Thomas Boney, esq., surgeon. of 9 livings; was at Waterloo, and has served in Spain, France, and Holland. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Is father-in-law of Lord Mahon, and of Lord Henniker. Sat for Northampton in the Parliament of 1818, previously for Shaftesbury, and for Eye since 1824.—18, *Gt. Stanhope-st.; Carlton; Oakley Park and Brome Hall, Suffolk.*

### Kildare, Marquis of. (*Kildare*)

### Knightley, Sir Charles, bt. (*Northamptonsh. South*)

B. 1781; m. in 1818 Selina Mary, d. of Felton Lionel Hervey, esq. a relation of the Marq. of Bristol. Is patron of 8 livings. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Unsuccessfully contested the whole co. in 1831; was first elected for the southern division on the vacancy occasioned by Lord Althorp succeeding to his father's title.—10, *Upper Brook-st.; Carlton; Fawsley, Northamptonsh.*

### Knox, Brownlow William. (*Marlow*)

Third s. of Lieut.-Col. Thomas Knox, of the 1st Foot Guards, by the 3rd d. of Thomas Williams, esq., of Lanidan, Anglesea, who m. 2ndly, Lieut.-Gen. Sir Henry Campbell, K.C.B. Grandnephew of the 1st Visct. Northland. M. d. of — Sutton, esq. Entered the army in 1824, and became Lieut.-Col. in 1839; is Capt. Scots Fusilier Guards. A Conservative and Protectionist. First elected for Marlow in 1841.—28, *Wil-tou-cresc.; Carlton.*

**Labouchere, Rt. Hon. Henry. (Taunton)**

S. of the late P. C. Labouchere, Esq. of Highlands, Essex. B. 1798; m. 1810, d. of Sir Thomas Baring, bart. A Liberal. Formerly voted against an abolition of the Corn Laws, but in 1846 supported their repeal. Lord of the Admiralty from 1832 till Nov. 1834. Vice-President of the Board of Trade, and Master of the Mint, from April, 1835, to March, 1839; then appointed Under-Secretary for the Colonies. President of the Board of Trade from 1839 till Sept. 1841. Chief Secretary for Ireland from July, 1846, till July, 1847, when he was re-appointed President of the Board of Trade. **Lacy, Henry Charles. (Bodmin)**

Has published pamphlets on "Bridge-Building," "A New Kind of Atmospheric Railway for Short Distances," &c. **Lascelles, Right Hon. William Saunders Sebright. (Knaresborough)**

S. of 2nd Earl of Harewood; b. 1798; m. in 1823, eld. d. of 6th Earl of Carlisle. Appointed Comptroller of the Household 1847. Is a Deputy-Lieut. of Yorkshire. Was a Conservative, but is now a Liberal. Sat for Northallerton previous to the passing of the Reform Act. Is Recorder of London. Has been a Commissioner of Bankrupts; is a Bencher of the Inner Temple. Reprinted the speech of his father, the late Lord Chief Justice, against the claims of the Roman Catholics. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. **Lawless, Hon. Cecil John. (*Clonmell*)**

**Lefevre, Right Hon. Charles Shaw. (*Hampshire, North*)**

S. of the late Chas. Shaw Lefevre, Esq., formerly member for Reading. B. 1794, m. in 1817, d. of the late S. Whitbread, esq. Was called to the bar at Lincoln's Inn, 1819. Is Lieut.-Col. of the North Hants Yeomanry, and High Steward of Winchester. Was chosen Speaker of the House in 1839, on the retirement of Mr. Abercromby, and in opposition to Mr. Goulburn; the votes for the latter were 299; for Mr. S. Lefevre, 317. Again chosen Speaker in 1841. Voted for an inquiry into the pension list, and short Parliaments. Has referred to the Corn Laws in his address to his constituents, but avoids giving a decided opinion. Sat for Downton in 1830; for the county since 1831.—71, *Eaton-sq.*; *Athenæum, Reform Club; Heckfield-pl. Hants.*

**Lemon, Sir Charles, bt. (*Cornwall, West*)**

Represented Peern in the Parliament of 1830, and the western division of Cornwall from 1831 to 1841, but was not returned at the general election in the latter year. ### Lennox, Lord Arthur. (*Yarmouth*)

Seventh s. of the 4th Duke of Richmond, by the d. of the 4th Duke of Gordon. B. 1806; m. 1835, Adelaide Constance, d. of the late Col. John Campbell, of Shawfield. Entered the army in 1823; became a Lieut.-Col. in 1842, and is now on the half-pay of the 6th Foot; was a Lord of the Treasury from May, 1844, to Aug., 1845; and Clerk of the Ordnance from Aug., 1845, to July, 1846; was for some years ranked as a moderate Reformer, having supported the Reform Bill and similar measures; subsequently adhered to the Conservatives, dividing against the repeal of the Corn Laws, and joining in the no-confidence vote against the Melbourne Ministry; eventually supported the free trade measures of Sir R. Peel in 1846, and is now classed as a "liberal Conservative." Sat for Chichester from 1831 to 1846, when, differing from his bro., the 5th Duke of Richmond, on the free trade question, he accepted the Chiltern Hundreds, and was succeeded by his nephew, Lord Henry Lennox. George Villiers, sister to the 4th Earl of Clarendon, and relict of Thomas Henry Lister, esq. Was educated at Eton, and at Christ Church, Oxford, where he was first class in classics, and second class in mathematics, 1828; was called to the Bar at the Middle Temple

in 1831; employed in the Commissions of Inquiry into the relief of the poor and the Church in Ireland in 1835; also in the Commission of Inquiry into the affairs of Malta in 1836; appointed a Poor Law Commissioner in Jan., 1839 and held that office till July, 1847; is author of "An Essay on the Use and Abuse of Political Terms," "An Essay on the Origin and Formation of the Romance Languages," "On Local Disturbances in Ireland, and the Irish Church Question," "A Glossary of Provincial Words used in Herefordshire," "Essay on the Government of Dependencies," &c. Lewis, Right Hon. Sir Thomas Frankland, bart. (*Radnor dist.*)

Only s. of the late John Lewis, esq., of Harpton Court, Radnorsh., by his 2nd wife, the 2nd d. of Admiral Sir Thomas Frankland, bart. B. in London 1780; m. 1st, 1805, Harriet, 4th d. of Sir George Cornwall, bart., of Moccas Park, Herefordsh. (she died 1838); 2ndly, 1839, Mary Ann, only surviving d. of the late John Ashton, esq. Educated at Eton, and at Christ Church, Oxford. Was Lieut.-Col. of the Radnorsh. Militia from 1806 till the end of the war. Was a Commissioner of Inquiry into the Irish Revenue in 1821, and into that of Great Britain and Ireland from 1822 to 1827; Secretary to the Treasury in 1827; Vice-President of the Board of Trade, under the Duke of Wellington, in 1828, and sworn in a P.C. in the same year; Treasurer of the Navy in 1830; Chairman of the Poor Law Commission from 1834 till 1839 (when his son was appointed to the same Board); a Commissioner to inquire into the turnpike outrages in Wales in 1843. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade, and will support the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. A Lord of the Treasury from Dec. 1834 till April 1835, and First Commissioner of Woods and Forests from Sept. 1841 to Jan. 1846, when he became Chief Secretary for Ireland; resigned the latter office, July 1846. Is one of the Council of the Duchy of Lancaster. Was M.P. for South Notts from 1832 to 1846; unsuccessfully contested North and South Notts in Feb. and March 1846; was first returned for the Falkirk district in May 1846, on the retirement of Mr. Baird.—*19, Whitehall-pl.; Carlton; Runby Hall, Nottinghamsh.*

**Lindsay, Hon. James. (*Wigan*)**

2nd s. of the 7th Earl of Balcarres. B. at Muncaster Castle, Cumberland, 1815; m. 1845, Lady Sarah Elizabeth Savile, d. of the 3rd Earl of Mexborough. Was educated at Eton. Entered the Grenadier Guards in 1832, attained the rank of Capt. in 1836; and was appointed Adjutant of the 2nd Battalion in 1838. A Conservative; "not pledged to any thing; opposed to a sudden and immediate repeal of protective duties; but considers that they ought to be as low as is consistent with the welfare of *all* classes and the full cultivation of the soil." **Littleton, Hon. Edward Richard. (*Walsall*)**

Eldest s. of Lord Hatherton. B. at Teddesly, Staffordshire, 1815; m. 1841 Lady Margaret, youngest d. of 2nd Earl of Beverley. Was educated at Eton. A Liberal; is in favour of the extension of free trade. First returned for Walsall in 1847.—*Travellers'; Hatherton Hall, Staffordsh.*

**Loch, James, F.G.S., F.S.S., & F.Z.S. (*Wick dist.*)**

Eld. s. of George Loch, esq., of Drylaw, co. of Edinburgh, by Mary, sister of the Rt. Hon. William Adam, Lord Chief Commissioner of the Jury Court in Scotland. B. at Drylaw 1780; m. 1810 Ann, youngest d. of Patrick Orr, esq. of Bridgeton, Kincardinesh. (she died 1842.) A Barrister at the English Bar, and an Advocate at the Scottish; a Dep.-Lieut. for Sutherland. Steward of Morpeth; Auditor to the Duke of Sutherland, the Earl of Carlisle, Lord Francis Egerton, and to the trust estates of the late Earl of Dudley and the late Visct. Keith. A Director of the Liverpool and Manchester railway, and of the Birmingham and Liverpool Junction canal. A member of the Society for the Diffusion of Useful Knowledge, and of the Council of University College, London. Has written an account of Sutherlandsh. A Liberal; opposed to all religious endowments. Voted in favour of the New Poor Law Bill. **Locke, Joseph, F.R.S. (*Honiton*)**

Educated at Edinburgh University; called to the Scottish bar in 1824. A Dep.-Lieut. of Selkirksh. A Conservative; but voted for free trade in 1846. First elected for Selkirksh. Jan. 1846.—*Carlton; Borthwickbras, Selkirksh.; Cleghorn, Lanarksh.*

### Lockhart, William. (*Lanarksh.*)

Is descended from a family long settled in Lanarksh.; b. 1787. Formerly in the E. I. Company's Bengal Army. A Dept.-Lieut. of Lanarkshire, and Capt. of the Douglas troop of Yeomanry Cavalry. "A decided Conservative;" voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Is Patron of 5 livings. A Magistrate of Wilts and Somerset. Dep. Lieut. of Wilts, and Major in the Royal Wilts Yeomanry Cavalry. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Was an unsuccessful candidate for North Hants in 1832; has sat for Wilts since 1835.—29, *Hill-st.; Carlton; Rood Ashton, and South Wrayall, Wilts.*

### Lowther, Henry. (*Cumberland, West*)

Eld. s. of Col. the Hon. Henry Cecil Lowther, by Lady Eleanor, d. of the 5th Earl of Harborough; is therefore nephew to the 2nd Earl of Lonsdale, and to the 6th Earl of Harborough. B. 1818; is unm. Was educated at Westminster, and at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, where he graduated A.M. 1838; entered the army as Cornet and Sub-Lieut. in 1st Life Guards in 1841; became a Lieut. 1843. A Conservative and Protectionist; will support the Navigation Laws, and is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Joseph Gascoyne; 2ndly, Julia, relict of Thomas Teed, esq., of Stanmore Hall, Middlesex. Was formerly chief secretary to the government of Bengal. Is author of "A Remonstrance to the Bishop of London in behalf of the Dissenters." A Radical Reformer, in favour of the ballot, extension of the suffrage, triennial parliaments, and the substitution of a property for the income tax; is opposed to all religious endowments. Pauline Caroline Diana Mary, second d. of Sir James M Stronge, Bart., of Tynan Abbey, co. Armagh. Is a capt. R.N. A Conservative; opposed to Repeal; in favour of civil and religious liberty. First returned for Carlow on the death of his uncle, Thomas Bunbury, esq., July 1846, without opposition.—*Black Hall, co. Louth.*

**Mac Gregor, John.** (*Glasgow*)

Is a Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Was appointed a Lord of the Treasury in April 1845; resigned, Feb. 1846.—*Carlton; Portmore, Peeblessh.*

**Mackinnon, Wm. Alexander.** (*Lymington*)

Head of the Clan Mackinnon. B. 1789; m. 1812 the only d. and heir of the late Jos. Palmer, esq., of Palmerstown, co. Mayo, and Rush House, Dublin. At the death of Mr. B. Palmer, a lunatic, br. of the late Mr. Palmer, the property of the Palmer family will go to Mr. Mackinnon, in right of his wife (dead). Chairman of the United Kingdom Insurance Office, and of the Society against Cruelty; Fellow of the Royal Antiquarian, Asiatic, Geological, and Astronomical Societies, and Colonisation Commissioner for South Australia (to which no remuneration is attached). Kept terms at Lincoln's Inn; but was not called to the bar. Published a work on "Public Opinion;" also, "Thoughts on the Currency Question;" and "The History of Civilization." In 1831 opposed the plan for taking the census of 1821 as the basis of the representation under the Reform Bill, and, on dividing the House, had the largest majority that voted against the bill. In the next Parliament Ministers took the census of 1831 as their guide. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. A major in the militia, and has been High Sheriff of the county. Is descended from the ancient Admirals of Munster, whose office is said to have originated the name "Macnamara," or "Son of the Sea." A Repealer. Has sat for the county since 1830.—*Jun. United Service; Doolen Castle, Clare.*

**Mc Neill, Duncan. (Argyllshire)**

Second s. of John Mc Neill, Esq. of Collonsey, co. Argyll. Was called to the Scottish bar in 1816, and is dean of the faculty of advocates. Was appointed junior counsel for the Crown in 1830; sheriff of Perthsh. from December, 1824, till December, 1834; solicitor-general for Scotland from November, 1834, till April, 1835; re-appointed to that office September, 1841. Was lord advocate from October, 1842, till July, 1846. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Is a Director of the Royal Bank of Scotland, and an Extraordinary Director of the Edinburgh Life Assurance Company, and of the Scottish Amicable Life Assurance Company. **McTavish, Charles Carroll. (Dundalk)**

Nephew of the Duchess of Leeds. Declared that "although he was an American by birth, he was an Irishman by descent and at heart." A Repealer; a member of the "Old Ireland" party. First returned for Dundalk in 1847.

**Magan, William Henry. (Westmeath)**

Eld. s. of the late Wm. Henry Magan, esq., of Clonearl, by the d. of the late Thomas Loftus, esq. of Killyon, co. Meath. B. in Dublin 1820; is unm. Entered the army as Cornet 9th Lancers 1841; exchanged into the 4th light dragoons, and became a Capt. in 1845; retired in June 1846. A Magistrate for Westmeath. A Liberal, and in favour of the repeal of the Union. First returned for Westmeath in 1847, without opposition.—*Army and Navy, United Service, and Reform Clubs; Clonearl, Philipstown, King's co.; Eagle Hill, co. Kildare.*

**Maher, Nicholas. (Tipperary)**

S. of Thomas Maher, esq., a medical practitioner in the city of Cashel,

by his marriage with Margaret, aunt of the late Valentine Maher, esq., formerly M.P. for Tipperary. M. in 1845 Margaret Jane, eld. d. of Walter Otway Herbert, esq. of Pilhouse Carrick-on-Suir, co. Tipperary. A Liberal; in favour of the Repeal of the Union, and declared, "he would struggle for the right of Ireland to a native parliament as long as he had voice, or pen, or pulsation;" is in favour of an absentee tax, and will support the "tenant-right." Was first returned for Tipperary in 1844, on the death of his cousin, Valentine Maher, esq., to whose estates he succeeded.—18, *Fitzroy-st.; Reform; Turtulla, co. Tipperary.*

### Mahon, Lord. (*Hertford bor.*)

Only s. of Earl Stanhope. B. 1805; m. 1834 Emily, 2nd d. of Lieut. Gen. Sir E. Kerrison, bt. M.P. Was Under Secretary of State for the Foreign Department, from Dec. 1834, till April, 1835. Secretary to the Board of Control from July 1845 to July 1846. Is author of a life of Belisarius, a history of the war of the succession in Spain, and a history of England from the Treaty of Utrecht to the Peace of Aix-la-Chapelle. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for Wootton Bassett in 1830 and 1831; was returned for the borough in 1832, but the election was declared void; was again returned in 1835, and has sat for it since that date.—41, *Grosvenor pl.; Carlton, Athenæum; Chesham-st., Kent.*

### Mahon, James Patrick O'Gorman, commonly called "The O'Gorman Mahon." (*Ennis*)

Eld. s. and heir of the late Patrick Mahon, (commonly called "Padraig-ruidh-Mac-Mathghamhna," by Barbara, only d. of the late O'Gorman. B. in the co. of Clare; m. Christina Maria, eld. d. and co-heir of John O'Brien, esq., of FitzWilliam-sq., Dublin. Graduated M.A. at Trinity College, Dublin; was called to the Bar in Ireland, 1834, but has never practised. Was one of the founders of the Roman "Catholic Association," and an active member of that body till its dissolution. Was (in conjunction with Mr. Steel) the immediate cause of the late Mr. O'Connell being returned for Clare, in 1828, against Mr. FitzGerald (afterwards Lord FitzGerald and Vesey). Again proposed Mr. O'Connell, and assisted in his return to parliament after the passing of the Roman Catholic Relief Bill. Is of Liberal opinions, and in favour of a repeal of the Union with Ireland. Was returned for Clare in 1830; unseated on petition in 1831; was again a candidate at the dissolution in that year, but was defeated by the influence of Mr. O'Connell, whom he had previously assisted into parliament. "Is a strong advocate for the most liberal policy towards Ireland." ### Manners, Lord Charles Somerset, K.C.B. (*Leicestersh. North*)

Br. of the Duke of Rutland; b. 1780. A Major-Gen. in the army. Col. of the 11th Dragoons. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for Cambridgeshire in two Parliaments; first elected for Leicestershire in Dec. 1835, on the death of his brother, Lord Robt. Manners.—x 3, *Albany*; *Carlton*; *Belvoir Castle, Rutlandsh.*

### Manners, Lord George John. (*Cambridgesh.*)

Youngest s. of the 5th Duke of Rutland, by the 5th d. of the 5th Earl of Carlisle. B. 1820. Graduated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, M.A. 1841; appointed Capt. Royal Horse Guards 1847. A Conservative and Protectionist; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First elected for Cambridgesh. in 1847, without opposition.—*Carlton*; *Belvoir Castle, Leicestersh.*; *Cheveley Park, Cambridgesh.*

### March, Earl of. (*Sussex, West*)

Eld. s. of the Duke of Richmond; b. 1818; m. in 1843, eld. d. of Algernon Greville, esq. An Officer in the Guards. A Dep.-Lieut. of Banff. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy. First returned for the co. in 1841.—*Goodwood, Sussex*.

### Marshall, James Garth. (*Leeds*)

Third s. of the late John Marshall, esq., of Hedingly, Yorksh., and of Hallsteads, Cumberland, by the 5th d. of William Pollard, esq., of Halifax. Bro. to Wm. Marshall, esq., M.P. for Cumberland East. B. 1802; m. 1841, Hon. Mary Alice Pery, d. of his bro.-in-law Lord

Monteagle, by his lordship's first wife. A Magistrate for Lancash.; Director of the Leeds, Dewsbury, and Manchester Railway. A Liberal. First returned in 1847 for Leeds, which his bro., the late John Marshall, jun., had represented from 1832 to 1835. The linen-yarn factories of this family in Leeds give them influence there.—*Reform Club; Monk-Coniston, Lancash.*

### Marshall, William. (*Cumberland, East*)

Eld. s. of the late John Marshall, esq. of Headingley, in the co. of York, an extensive linen manufacturer at Leeds and Shrewsbury, and in 1826 member for Yorksh. B. 1796; m. 1828, Georgiana Christiana, 7th d. of George Hibbert, esq., of Munden, Hertfordshire. A Radical Reformer; is in favour of triennial parliaments, the ballot, "an extension and equitable division of the suffrage," the removal of all restrictions which fetter trade, and the reform of the Church Establishment. Sat for Petersfield from 1826 to 1830; for Leominster in 1830; for Beverley in 1831; for Carlisle from 1835 to 1847, when he was first returned for Cumberland East.—55, *Lowndes-sq.; Reform Club; Pattendale Hall, Westmoreland.*

### Martin, Charles Wykeham. (*Newport, Isle of Wight*)

S. of Fiennes Wykeham, esq., who assumed for self and issue the name of Martin, on succeeding to the estates of Gen. Martin in 1821. B. 1801; m. 1st, 1828, d. of the Earl of Cornwallis; 2nd, 1838, d. of Sir J. Trollope, bart. Is a Deputy-Lieut. of Hants. Is patron of 1 living; unsuccessfully contested the borough in 1837. A "moderate" Conservative; in favour of free trade. Has sat for Newport since 1841.—*United University, Alfred; Leeds Castle, Kent; Areton Manor, Isle of Wight; Chacombe Priory, Northamptonsh.*

### Martin, John. (*Tewkesbury*)

S. of the late J. Martin, esq., who sat for this bor. from 1812 to 1832. B. Feb. 2, 1805; m. 1847, Maria Henrietta, eld. d. of Evan Hamilton Baillie, esq., of Gloucester-pl., Portman-sq., London. A banker, a director of the Guardian Assurance Company, and an East India Stock proprietor. Is a Liberal. Sat for Tewkesbury from 1832 to 1835, and since 1837.—*Reform Club; 14, Berkeley-sq.; 68, Lombard-street.*

### Martin, Samuel. (*Pontefract*)

Was called to the Bar at the Middle Temple in 1830; is a Queen's Counsel, and goes the Northern Circuit. A Liberal. First returned for Pontefract in 1847.—18, *Wimpole-st.; 1, Essex-court, Temple.*

### Masterman, John. (*London*)

Is a member of the firm of Masterman, Peters, Mildred, and Co., London, bankers. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. "Is prepared to resist any further concessions to Popery," and desirous of amending the

**Poor Law.** Was first elected for the City in 1841.—35, *Nicholas-lane, Lombard-street; Knott's Green, Leyton, Essex.*

**Matheson, Alexander.** (*Inverness dist.*)

Eld. s. of the late John Matheson, esq., of Attadale, Ross-sh., where the family has resided for upwards of six centuries, and nephew maternally of James Matheson, esq., and Lieut.-Col. Thos. Matheson. B. in Ross-sh.; m. 1841, only d. of James Crawford McLeod, esq., of Geanies (since dead). Was educated at the University of Edinburgh. A merchant and senior partner of the firm of Jardine, Matheson, and Co., in China. A Liberal; is opposed to all further religious endowments. First returned for the Inverness dist. of burghs in 1847.—*Oriental and Reform Clubs; Ardross Castle, Ross-sh.; Hedgefield, Inverness.*

**Matheson, James, F.R.S.** (*Ross and Cromarty*)

S. of Donald Matheson, Esq., chief of that name. B. 1796; m. in 1843, Mary Jane, 4th d. of the late Michael Henry Perceval, Esq. Has been a merchant, and was formerly a partner in the house of Jardine, Matheson, and Co. Is a Dep.-Lieut. of Ross and Sutherlandsh. Of liberal politics; will support the repeal of the game laws, and is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy; is author of a pamphlet on the position and prospects of the China trade. Resided many years in India and China; on his return to England received an address from the merchants of Bombay, expressing their high sense of the judgment and firmness displayed by him during the difficulties which arose out of the disputes with China respecting the seizure of opium. On that occasion he was presented with a service of plate value £1500. **Maule, Right Hon. Fox.** (*Perth*)

Eld. s. of Lord Panmure, and cousin-german to the Earl of Dalhousie; b. 1801; m. in 1831 Montague, eld. d. of Lord Abercromby. Was 12 years in the 79th Highlanders. A Liberal. Is Lord Rector of the University of Glasgow. Has been Under-Secretary for the Home Department, and Vice-President of the Board of Trade. Appointed Secretary at War, July, 1846; salary £2530. Was elected for the Elgin

district in March, 1838, on the appointment of Sir A. L. Hay to be Governor of Bermuda. Sat for Perthsh. from 1835 till the dissolution in 1837; was then an unsuccessful candidate, but was returned in March, 1838, for Elgin burghs; has sat for the borough of Perth since 1841.—38, *Grosvenor-st.*; *Dalguise, Perthsh.*

**Maunsell, Col. Thomas Philip. (Northamptonsh. North)**

M. Caroline Elisabeth, d. and co-heiress of the Hon. Wm. Cockayne, br. of Boriase, last Visct. Cullen. This lady was authorized to take rank as a Viscount's d. by royal order, 23d Sept. 1836. Is Col. of the Northampton Militia. Elected on the death of Visct. Milton, in 1835 for Northamptonsh. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. **Maxwell, Hon. James Pierce. (Cavan)**

Was a Lieut. in the 59th Foot, and now holds the rank of Capt. in the army. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First returned for the county in 1843, on the death of Col. **Meagher, Thomas. (Waterford city)**

Eld. s. of the Earl of Minto. B. 1814; m. 1844, Emma Eleanor Elisabeth, only d. and heir of the late General Sir Thomas Hislop, G.C.B. Graduated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, M.A., 1836. A Liberal; in favour of removing the Bishops from the House of Lords. Sat for Hythe from May, 1837, till 1841, when he unsuccessfully contested Rochester. First returned for Greenock in 1847.—*Reform*; *Brookes's*; *Minto Castle, Roxburghsh.*

**Meux, Sir Henry, bart. (Hertfordsh.)**

Eld. s. of the late Sir Henry Meux, bart., the well-known London Brewer, by the d. of Thomas Smith, esq. of Castlebar House, Middlesex, B. 1817; educated at Eton, and at Christchurch, Oxford. Was high sheriff of Herts in 1845. Is a Magistrate for Herts, Essex, and Middlesex. A Conservative, adverse to free trade doctrines, and opposed to further concessions to the Roman Catholic Church. First returned for Herts in 1847.—41, *Upper Brook-st.*; *Carlton*; *Theobald's Park, Cheshunt, Herts.*

**Miles, Philip William Skinner** (*Bristol*)

S. of P. J. Miles, esq., late M.P. for Bristol, and br. of Wm. Miles, esq., M.P. for East Somerset. B. 1846, 5th d. of Maj.-Gen. William F. P. Napier. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for Bristol since 1837.—44, *Belgrave-sq.*; *Leigh Court, Somerset*.

**Miles, William.** (*Somerset, East*)

S. of P. J. Miles, esq., B. 1797; m. d. of John Gordon, esq. of Bristol. A Conservative; well known for his support of agricultural protection. Sat for Chippenham in the Parliament of 1818, for New Romney in 1830 and 1831; unsuccessfully contested the co. in 1832; has sat for it since the death of Mr. Brigstock in 1834.—7, *Hamilton-pl.*; *Carlton, Boodle's, Arthur's, University; Beesthorpe, Kingsweston*.

**Milnes, Richard Monckton.** (*Pontefract*)

S. of R. P. Milnes, esq., M.P. for the borough in many Parliaments. Nephew of Visct. Galway, Lord Gambier, and the Countess Dowager of Cork and Orrery. B. 1809. Is author of *Memorials of a Tour in Greece*. A moderate Conservative; is convinced "that it is the duty of every true Conservative to give a fair and independent support to the government of Lord John Russell." M.A. of Cambridge.—26, *Pall Mall; Athenæum, Boodle's, United University, and Coventry Clubs; Frystone-hall, and Bawtry, Yorksh.*

**Milton, Visct.** (*Wicklow co.*)

Eld. s. of the Earl of Fitzwilliam. B. 1815; m. 1838 eld. d. of the 18th Earl of Morton. Appointed Lieut.-Col. Commandant 1st West York Yeomanry Cavalry, May 1846. A Whig; in favour of free trade. Represented Malton in Parliament from 1837 to 1841, and from April 1846 to July 1847; unsuccessfully contested the West Riding of Yorksh. in 1841. First returned for Wicklow in 1847.—4, *Grosvenor-sq.*

**Mitchell, Thomas Alexander.** (*Bridport*)

One of the committee of management of Lloyd's Shipping Register. A Liberal. First returned for the borough in 1841.—a 6, *Albany; Reform; Bridport*.

**Moffat, George.** (*Dartmouth*)

A partner in the house of Moffat and Co., Tea Agents and Brokers, 28, Fenchurch Street, and 11, Mincing Lane. "An advocate of Free-Trade principles, and opposed to all taxation not strictly applicable to the exigencies of the State; opposed to Church Rates, and in favour of the Ballot." Unsuccessfully contested Ipswich in 1842, but on petition unseated his opponents, without gaining the seat for himself. Unsuccessfully contested Dartmouth in 1844, and failed in the endeavour to unseat Mr. Somes on petition. First elected in July, 1845, on the death of that gentleman.—86, *Eaton Square; Reform, City; Norwood, Surrey*.

**Molesworth, Sir William, bart. (*Southwark*)**

S. of the late Sir Arscott Ourry Molesworth, bart. B. 1810; m. 1844 relict of the late Temple West, esq., of Mathon Lodge, Worcesterah. A Radical Reformer. Is a Dep.-Lieut. of Cornwall, and was High Sheriff in 1842. Patron of 4 livings. Represented Cornwall from 1832 to 1837, and Leeds from 1837 to 1841. First returned for Southwark in Sept. 1845.—1, *Lowndes-sq.*; *Pencarrow, Cornwall*.

**Monsell, William. (*Limerick co.*)**

A Dep.-Lieut. of Somerset, and Chairman of the Quarter Sessions. A Protectionist; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. **Moore, George Henry. (*Mayo*)**

S. of the late George Moore, esq., of Moore Hall, co. Mayo, by the d. of the Hon. John Browne, and grandd. of the 1st Earl of Altamont. B. at Moore Hall, 1811; unm. Educated at Oscott, and at Christ's Coll., Cambridge. Of Liberal opinions; considers a repeal of the Union with Ireland a mere question of time; will support "tenant-right." First returned for Mayo in 1847.—*Brookes's and Coventry Clubs*; *Moore Hall, Ballyglass, co. Mayo*.

**Morgan, Chas. Octavius Swinnerton. (*Monmouthsh.*)**

Younger bro. of Sir Chas. Morgan, bt. A Magistrate and Dep.-Lieut. of Monmouthsh. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First returned for the co. in 1840.—70, *Pall Mall*; *Tredegar, Monmouthsh.*

**Morgan, Hamilton Knox Grogan. (*Wexford co.*)**

Assumed the name of Morgan in 1828, in addition to his patronymic, Grogan, on inheriting the estates of his cousin, Mr. Morgan, an alderman of Waterford. B. 1807; m. Sophia, d. of Ralford Roe esq. A

Magistrate and Deputy-Lieut. of Wexford. A moderate Conservative. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Wexford in 1841; first returned in 1847.—*Johnstown Castle, co. Wexford.*

**Morison, William.** (*Clackmannan and Kinross*)

2nd s. of James Morison, esq. of Greenfield, Clackmannan. Is a Maj.-Gen. in India; was appointed a Companion of the Bath in 1831; held several offices of trust in India, including that of commissioner for the government of Mysore; was for some time a member of the supreme council of India, and finally President of that body, and likewise Dep.-Governor of Bengal. A Reformer. First returned for Clackmannan in Feb. 1842.—16, *Saville-row; Oriental, United Service; Greenfield, Clackmannan.*

**Morpeth, Rt. Hon. Visct.** (*Yorksh. West*)

Eld. s. of the Earl of Carlisle. B. 1802. Graduated at Christ Church, Oxon. Is author of the "Last of the Greeks." Was Chief Secretary for Ireland from April 1835 to Sept. 1841; appointed Chief Commissioner of Woods and Forests July 1846. A Dep.-Lieut. of Yorksh. Appointed Lord-Lieut. of East Riding of Yorkshire, July 1847. A Liberal. Represented Morpeth in Parliament from 1826 to 1830; the Western Division of Yorksh. from 1830 to 1841; was again elected for the latter in Feb. 1846, and in 1847.—12, *Grosvenor-pl.; Castle Howard, Yorksh.*

**Morris, David.** (*Carmarthen dist.*)

**Mowatt, Francis.** (*Penryn and Falmouth*)

S. of the late Capt. James Ryder Mowatt, of Eastbourne, Sussex. B. at Eastbourne 1808; m. 1828, d. of Capt. George Barnes, of the E. I. C.'s Marine Service. A Liberal "in the fullest sense of the term;" is strongly opposed to the Game Laws, considering them "most arbitrary and

oppressive;" is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic and all other Clergy; will support the principle that the education of the people should be effected by the State. First returned for Penryn and Falmouth in 1847.—14, *Devonshire-pl.*, *Portland-pl.*; *Athenæum*.

### Mulgrave, Earl. (*Scarborough*)

Only s. of the Marq. of Normanby, by the eld. d. of the 1st Lord Ravensworth. B. 1819; m. 1844, Laura, d. of Capt. Robert Russell, R.N., niece of the Dowager-Duchess of Cleveland. Appointed Ensign and Lieut. Scots Fusilier Guards 1838; Deputy-Lieut. of Yorksh. 1844; Major North York Militia 1846. A Liberal. First returned for Scarborough in 1847, without opposition.—*Reform*; *Mulgrave Castle*, *Whitby*, *Yorkshire*.

### Mundy, Edward Miller. (*Derbysh. South*)

S. of the late Edw. Miller Mundy, esq., whose father represented Derbysh for 40 years. B. 1800. First returned for the co. in 1841. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Has sat for South Derbysh. since 1841.—*Carlton*, *Union*; *Shipley*, *Derbysh*.

### Muntz, George Frederick. (*Birmingham*)

S. of a German merchant, of great respectability, who settled in Birmingham in the year 1783, and married a Miss Purden, of that town. B. 1794, m. in 1818 d. of Rev. John Pryce. Is a merchant, a metal roller, and inventor and manufacturer of patent yellow metal ship sheathing and bolts. Was the first vice-chairman of the Birmingham Political Union, and one of its most strenuous supporters: underwent several prosecutions on account of an alleged riot at a Church-rate meeting, in Birmingham—was convicted upon this charge in 1837, but the proceedings were quashed, the Judge (the late Sir J. A. Park) and the Court of Queen's Bench being of opinion that they were illegal, and that the prosecution should never have been instituted. A Radical Reformer, "wishing to remove all abuses without injury to the just rights of any." Has written several pamphlets on commercial, financial, and politico-economical subjects. Has sat for Birmingham since 1840.—*Reform*; *Britton-ferry House*, *Glamorgansh*.

### Mure, William. (*Renfrewsh.*)

Was educated at Westminster, Edinburgh University, and in Germany. Is author of a "Journal of a Tour in Greece, &c., in 1838," "Dissertation on the Calendar, &c., of Ancient Egypt."



Is Vice-Lieut. of Renfrewsh., and Col. of the Renfrew Militia. A "liberal Conservative," in favour of free trade. Unsuccessfully contested Renfrewsh. in 1841; was first returned without opposition Dec. 1846.—36, *Wilton-crescent*; *United Service*; *Caldwell, Ayrsh.*  
**Neeld, John.** (*Cricklade*)

Younger s. of the late Joseph Neeld, esq., of Gloucester-pl., Portman-sq.; only br. of the member for Chippenham, and br. in law of Capt. Boldero, M.P. for Chippenham. M. in 1845 Harriet Kliza, 2nd d. of Maj.-Gen. Dickson, C.B. of Blenheim House, Berks. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Appointed in 1843 one of the gentlemen of the Privy Chamber. Has sat for Cricklade since 1835.—101, *Gloucester-pl.*; *Carlton, University*; *Avondale-Bashford, Somerset*; *Red Lodge, Wilts.*

**Neeld, Joseph, F.S.A., F.L.S.** (*Chippenham*)

Eld. s. of the late Joseph Neeld, esq. of Gloucester-pl.; br. in law of Capt. Boldero, the other member for the borough; br. of the member for Cricklade, M. 1831 Caroline, eld. d. of the 6th Earl of Shaftesbury. An East India and Bank Proprietor; Dep.-Lieut. of Wilts, and High Steward of Malmesbury; patron of 9 livings. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for the borough since 1830.—6, *Grosvenor-sq.*; *Carlton, Athenæum, Conservative*; *Griffleton-house, Wilts*; *Kelston park, Somerset.*

**Newdegate, Charles Newdigate.** (*Warwicksh. North*)

S. of the late Charles Newdigate Newdegate, Esq. of Harefield Place, Middlesex, who assumed the name of Newdegate in lieu of his patronymic Parker, under the will of a relative in the female line. B. 1816. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for North Warwickshire since 1843.—3, *Arlington-st.*; *Carlton, Travellers', Arthur's, White's*; *Arbury, Warwicksh.*; *Harefield, Middlesex.*

**Newport, Visct.** (*Shropshire, North*)

Eld. s. of the Earl of Bradford. B. 1819. Is a Dep.-Lieut. of Warwicksh. His father is patron of 8 livings. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First returned to Parliament in 1842, when Lord Darlington succeeded to a peerage.—80, *Wilton-crescent*; *Carlton*; *Weston Park, Staffordsh.*; *Castle Bromwich, Warwicksh.*

**Newry and Morne, Visct.** (*Newry*)

Eld. s. of the Earl of Kilmorey; b. 1815; m. in 1839, eld. d. of the Hon. Sir Charles Colville, G.C.B. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. First returned for the borough in 1841.—63, *Eaton-pl.*; *Carlton*; *Shavington Park, Shropshire.*

**Nicholl, Right Hon. John Iltyd, D. C. L.** (*Cardiff dist.*)

S. of the Rt. Hon. Sir John Nicholl. B. 1797; called to the bar at Lincoln's Inn 1824; took the degree of D.C.L. 1826; m. 1821 Jan.

Harriet, 2nd d. of the late T. M. Talbot, esq. of Margam, Glamorgansh. by Mary Lucy, 2nd d. of Henry Thomas, 2nd Earl of Ilchester. Was master of the Faculties, and Judge Advocate Gen. Has sat for the borough since 1832.—10, *Doctors' Commons*; 33, *Belgrave-square*; *Carlton*; *Merthyr-mawr, Glamorgansh.*

Noel, Hon. Gerard James. (*Rutlandsh.*)

Second s. of 1st Earl of Gainsborough, by his 8rd wife, the 2nd d. of the late Sir John Hamlyn-Williams, bart. B. 1823. Entered the army as Cornet in the 11th Hussars in 1842; became a Lieut. in 1843, and is now a Captain. Declared himself "a staunch Protectionist, pledged to support by every means the agriculture of the country;" is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Rutlandsh. in 1847, without opposition.—*Exton Park, Rutlandsh.*

Norreys, Lord. (*Oxfordsh.*)

Eld. s. of the Earl of Abingdon; b. 1808; m. in 1835 Elisabeth Lavinia, only child of George Granville Harcourt, esq. M.P. and grand-d. of the Archbp. of York. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for the county in 1830, but was superseded in 1831 by Mr. Weyland, on account of his opposition to the first Reform Bill. Resumed his seat in 1832.—18, *Grosvenor-st.*; *Carlton*; *Wytham, Berks.*

Norreys, Sir Charles Denham Orlando Jephson, bart. (*Mallow*)

S. of Col. Jephson, formerly M.P. for Mallow. B. 1799; m. in 1821 Catherine Cecilia Jane, d. of William Franks, Esq. of Carrig, co. of Cork. In 1838 assumed the name of Norreys. Is Lord of the Manor of Mallow, by descent from Sir John Jephson, who m., *temp.* James I., the heiress of the Hon. Sir John Norreys, Lord President of Munster. Many members of Sir C. Norreys' family have represented Mallow since 1692. Is patron of 1 living. A Whig. Formerly voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws; but in 1846 supported their repeal. Is in favour of the Ballot. Has sat for the borough since 1826, with the interruption only of the beginning of 1833, Mr. Daunt having been returned in 1832, because Mr. Jephson would not pledge himself to vote for the repeal of the Union; Mr. Daunt was, however, unseated on petition.—*Union Club*; *Mallow Castle, co. An Irish Peer. Uncle to the 2nd Duke of Buckingham. B. 1789; m. 1818, Anne Lucy, 2nd d. of the late Hon. General Vere Poulett. Was

Lord High Commissioner of the United States of the Ionian Islands, from 1832 to 1835. Took an active part in favour of Queen Caroline. Is author of "Lands, Classical and Sacred," and other works. A Liberal Sat for Aylesbury in four parliaments previous to the Reform Act; was an unsuccessful candidate in 1837 and 1839, but succeeded in regaining his seat in 1847.—*Reform; Novar House, and Lillies, Bucks.*

**Nugent, Sir Percy Fitz-Gerald, bart.** (*Westmeath co.*)

Eld. s. of Thomas Fitz-Gerald, esq., Commander R.N., by the d. of Christopher Dardis, esq., of Gigenstown, co. Westmeath. Assumed the name of Nugent in 1831, being grands. of Christina Nugent, the sister and sole heir of Sir Peter Nugent, whose Baronetcy is extinct. B. 1797; m. 1823, only d. of Walter Sweetman, esq., of Dublin. Educated at Old Hall Green, Herts. A Deputy-Lieut. of Westmeath; Director of the Irish Midland Great Western Railway. A Whig; willing to consider in committee a repeal of the Union with Ireland. First returned for Westmeath in 1847, without opposition.—*Donore, Multifarnham, co. Westmeath.*

**O'Brien, John.** (*Limerick city*)

S. of the late Jas. O'Brien, esq. of Limerick. M. d. of the late Jeremiah Murphy, esq., and is therefore br.-in-law to Mr. Serjeant Murphy, formerly member for Cork city. A Liberal. First elected for Limerick in 1841.—22, *Charles-st., St. James's; Reform; Limerick.*

**O'Brien, Sir Lucius. bart.** (*Clare*)

Eld. s. of the late Sir Edward O'Brien, bart., by the eld. d. and co-heir of William Smith, esq., of Cahirmoyle, co. Limerick. B. in the co. of Clare, 1800; m. 1837, Mary, eld. d. of William Fitz-Gerald, esq., of Adelphi, co. Clare. Was educated at Harrow, and at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, where he graduated A.B. 1825, and A.M. 1828; appointed Lord-Lieut. of Clare in May, 1843; is in contingent remainder to the Barony of Inchiquin, next after the issue of the present Marq. of Thomond. A Conservative and Protectionist. Sat for Clare from 1826 to 1830; was a candidate for that co. in 1835, but did not poll any votes; again returned in 1847.—*Dromoland, Newmarket-on-Fergus, co. Clare.*

**O'Brien, Timothy.** (*Cashel*)

An Alderman of Dublin, and President of the Court of Conscience of that city, of which he has been Lord Mayor. A Repealer; in favour of free trade. First returned for Cashel Jan. 1846.—*Merrion-sq., and 99, Lower Baggot-st., Dublin.*

**O'Brien, William Smith.** (*Limerick co.*)

Second s. of the late Sir Edward O'Brien, bart. of Dromoland, co. Clare. B. 1808; m. d. of Jos. Gabbet, esq. A magistrate of the co. A Repealer; in favour of a Poor Law for Ireland, the extinction of tithes, and the ballot. Voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws. Sat for Ennis in 1830, and for Limerick co. since 1835.—*University; Cahirmoyle, co. Limerick.*

**O'Connell, Daniel.** (*Waterford city*)

Fourth s. of the late Daniel O'Connell, esq., by Mary, d. of Edwd. O'Connell, M.D. of Tralee. A Repealer. First returned for Dundalk in 1846, and elected for Waterford in 1847.—*Derrynane Abbey, co. Kerry.*

**O'Connell, John.** (*Kilkenny city, and Limerick city*)

Third s. of the late Daniel O'Connell, Esq.; m. in 1838 d. of Dr. Ryan, of Jubilee Hall, co. Dublin. A Barrister. A Repealer. Is author of "The Life and Speeches of Daniel O'Connell, Esq." Sat for Youghal from 1839 till 1837, when he was returned for Athlone, which place he represented till 1841. First elected for Kilkenny in 1841; again returned in 1847, and chosen at the same time for Limerick city, between which places he will make his election.—*Reform Club.*

**O'Connell, Maurice.** (*Tralee*)

Eld. s. of the late Daniel O'Connell, esq.; m. in 1832 only d. of Bindon Scott, esq., of Cahircorn. A Barrister. A Repealer. Sat for Clare in the Parliament of 1831, and for this borough since 1832, with the exception of a few months in 1838, being reelected on petition.—*Reform Club; Cahircorn House, co. Clare.*

**O'Connell, Morgan John.** (*Kerry*)

Eld. s. of John O'Connell, esq., of Grena, by the d. of Wm. Copinger, esq., of Ballyvolane. Nephew of the late Daniel O'Connell, esq. B. 1811. A Deputy-Lient. of Kerry. A Repealer. Has sat for Kerry since 1835.—*Reform Club; Clarence; Grena, co. Kerry.*

**O'Connor, Feargus.** (*Nottingham*)

S. of the late Roger O'Connor, esq., of Connorville, Bantry Bay, Ireland, and subsequently last tenant of Dangan Castle, co. Meath (the well-known seat of the Wellesley family); nephew of the late Arthur O'Connor, who resided many years in Paris in consequence of the part he bore in the Irish insurrection of 1798. Was called to the Bar in Ireland; has been for many years proprietor and editor of the Northern Star newspaper; is well known as the leading supporter of "The People's Charter." Sat for the co. of Cork from 1832 to 1835; was again returned in 1835, but unseated on petition; was an unsuccessful candidate for Oldham in July, 1835, on the death of Mr. Cobbett; has also been frequently proposed at various elections without going to a poll. **O'Flaherty, Anthony.** (*Galway bor.*)

Was educated at Trinity Coll., Dublin. A Repealer; in favour of the extension of free trade, and every measure for the advancement of civil and religious liberty. Was an unsuccessful

Formerly voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws, but in 1846 supported their repeal; is willing to modify the Navigation Laws. First returned for the co. in 1841.—84, *Eaton-sq.; Travellers'; Oxford and Cambridge; Kirchly Hall, Northumberland.*

**Ord, William.** (*Newcastle upon Tyne*)

Eld. s. of the late William Ord, Esq. of Penham, Durham; b. 1781. M. in 1803 d. of Rev. J. Scott. Is patron of 1 living. A Reformer; will support the ballot if necessary to protect the voter; "has no confidence in a Tory Administration." Sat for Morpeth from 1802 to 1832; unsuccessfully contested Northumberland in 1832; first returned for the borough in 1835.—17, *Berkeley-sq.; Athenæum and Reform Clubs; Whitfield Hall, Northumberland.*

**Osborne, Ralph Bernal.** (*Middlesex*)

Eld. s. of Ralph Bernal, esq., M.P. for Rochester, and formerly chairman of Committees; m. in Aug. 1844, Catherine Isabella, only child and heiress of Sir Thomas Osborne, bart. of Thicknesse, co. Waterford, and Newtown Anner, co. Tipperary, when he assumed the name of Osborne. A Liberal, in favour of the Ballot. Sat for Wycombe from 1841 to 1847, when he was returned for Middlesex.—*United Service; Newtown Anner, co. Tipperary.*

**Ossulston, Lord.** (*Northumberland, North*)

Only s. of the Earl of Tankerville, b. 1810. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Has sat for the county since 1832.—17, *South-st.; Carlton.*

**Oswald, Alexander.** (*Ayrshire*)

S. of the late R. A. Oswald, Esq. and nephew of James Oswald, Esq. member for Glasgow. M. in 1844 the Lady Louisa, relict of Sir Frederick Johnstone, of Westerhall, and only d. of the 1st Earl of Craven. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Has sat for Ayrsh. since 1843.—14, *Arlington-st.; White's, Travellers'; Cavens, Kirkcudbrightsh.; Auchincruive, Ayrsh.*

**Owen, Sir John, bart.** (*Pembroke dist.*)

Eld. s. of Joseph Lord, esq. by Corbetta, d. of Lieut.-Gen. Owen, and grand-d. of Sir Arthur Owen; assumed the surname and arms of Owen upon succeeding by bequest to the estates of Sir Hugh Owen, the sixth

baronet, and was created a baronet in 1818. M. Charlotte, d. of the Rev. John L. Phillips; 2ndly, 1830, Mary Frances, 3d d. of E. Stephenson, esq. of Farley Hill, Berks. Was called to the Bar at the Inner Temple in 1800. Is patron of 6 livings; Lord-Lieut. and Custos Rot. of Pembrokesh., and Governor of Milford Haven. A Conservative. Sat for Pembrokeshire from 1806 till August 1841, when he was returned for the district.—*Orielton, Pembrokesh.*

**Packe, Charles William. (*Leicestersh. South*)**

Nephew of D. S. Dugdale, esq. M.P. b. 1792, m. Kitty Jenkyn, only d. of Thomas Hort, esq., and heiress of Jenkyn Reading, esq., whose nameshe assumed. A Col. of Yeomanry. First elected on the resignation of T. F. Turner, esq. in February, 1836. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846.—7, *Richmond-ter.*; *Carlton*; *Ravenstone Hall, Leicestersh.*

**Paget, Lord Alfred Henry. (*Lichfield*)**

4th s. of the 1st Marq. of Anglesey; b. June 29, 1816; m. 1847, Cecilia, 2nd d. and co-heiress of the late George Thos. Wyndham, esq., of Cromer Hall, Norfolk. A Lieut. in the Royal Horse Guards. Appointed Chief Equerry and Clerk Marshal to the Queen, July, 1846. A Reformer. Has sat for Lichfield since 1837.—1, *Old Burlington-st.*; *Crookford's, White's*; *Beau Desert, Staffordsh.*

**Paget, Lord Clarence Edward. (*Sandwich*)**

**Paget, Lord George Augustus Frederick. (*Beaumaris dist.*)**

Fifth s. of the 1st Marq. of Anglesey, by his 2nd wife, d. of the 1st Earl of Cadogan. B. 1818. Entered the army in 1834; became Lieut.-Col. 4th Dragoons in 1846. A Liberal. First elected in 1847 for Beaumaris dist., which had previously been represented by his cousin, Col. Frederic Paget.—1, *Old Burlington-st.*; *Plâsnewydd, Anglesea.*

**Pakington, Sir John Somerset, Bart. (*Droitwich*)**

S. of Wm. Russell, esq. of Powick-ct. Worcestersh., by the d. of Sir H. Perrot Pakington, bt. of Westwood. B. at Powick-ct. 1799; m. 1st, 1823, only child of M. A. Slaney, esq. of Shiffnal, Salop (she died 1848); 2ndly, in 1844, Augusta Anne, 8rd d. of Bishop Murray, of Rochester. Assumed the name of Pakington on becoming heir to his maternal uncle,

Sir J. Pakington, bart., 1830. Educated at Eton and Oriel Coll. Oxon. Chairman of the Worcestersh. Quarter Sessions since 1834. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for Droitwich since 1837.—41, *Eaton-sq.*; *Westwood-pk.* and *Powick-st., Worcestershire.*

### Palmer, Robert. (*Berks*)

Eld. s. of the late Richard Palmer, esq. and grands. of Mr. Palmer, a solicitor, of Great Russell-st. Bloomsbury-sq.; for many years agent to the Duke of Bedford. B. 1798. Is patron of 1 living. A Conservative; voted for the Reform Act, and against free trade in corn, 1846. Has sat for the county since 1825, with the exception of a part of 1831.—16, *Suffolk-st.*; *Athenæum, Carlton*; *Holme Park, Berks.*

### Palmer, Roundell. (*Plymouth*)

Second s. of the Rev. William Jocelyn Palmer, of Mixbury, Oxfordsh. by the youngest d. of the late Rev. William Roundell, of Gledstone, Yorksh. B. at Mixbury 1812; is unm. Educated at Winchester; was Scholar of Trinity Coll., Oxford, and is now Fellow of Magdalene Coll.; was first class in classics, and obtained the Chancellor's prizes for Latin verse and Latin essay, Newdigate's prize for English verse, Dean Ireland's Scholarship, and the Eldon Law Scholarship. Was called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn in 1837. A "liberal Conservative, favourable to the extension of free trade, but friendly to the principle of the Navigation Laws;" opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy. First returned for Plymouth in 1847.—11, *New-sq., Lincoln's Inn*; *Oxford and Cambridge Club.*

### Palmerston, Right Hon. Visct. G.C.B. (*Tiverton*)

B. 1784; m. in 1839, d. of 1st Visct. Melbourne, and widow of 5th Earl Cowper. An Irish Peer. Lieut.-Col. of the Hampsh. Militia, but with pay suspended. Secretary at War from 1809 to 1828; Sec. of State for Foreign Affairs from Nov. 1830 till the dissolution of Lord Melbourne's administration in Nov. 1834; resumed that office in the April following, and resigned it in Sept. 1841; re-appointed for the third time July 1846. Sat for the University of Cambridge from 1806 till 1831, when, owing to his support of the reform bill, he was not returned, but took his seat for Bletchingly. Sat for South Hants in 1832, for which he was defeated at the general election in Dec. 1834. First elected for Tiverton, in June 1835, in the room of Mr. Kennedy, who accepted the Chiltern Hundreds.—4, *Carlton-Gardens*; *Athenæum and Reform Clubs*; *Broadlands, Southampton.*

### Parker, John. (*Sheffield*)

S. of Hugh Parker, esq., of Tickhill, Doncaster. Was called to the bar at Lincoln's Inn, 1824, and went the northern circuit. Of Whig principles; is in favour of short parliaments. Was a Lord of the

Treasury from Aug. 1836 to June 1841, and Secretary to the Admiralty from June to Sept. 1841. Appointed one of the joint Secretaries to the Treasury, July 1846. Has sat for the borough since 1832.—*Athenæum*, *Brookes's*, and *Reform Clubs*.

**Patten, John Wilson.** (*Lancash. North*)

Eld. s. of the late Thomas Wilson Patten, esq. of Bank Hall, M.P. who assumed the additional surname of Wilson, on succeeding to the estates of the Bishop of Sodor and Man. B. 1802; m. 1828, his cousin, Anna Maria, d. and co-heiress of the late Peter Patten Bold, esq. of Bold, Lancash. (she died, 1846.) A Dep.-Lieut. of Lancash., and Col. of 8rd Lancashire Militia. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Refused, in 1847, to pledge himself against further concessions to the Roman Catholics. Sat for the county in 1830, but lost his election in 1831, and was re-elected in 1832; has retained his seat since the latter date.—24, *Hill-street*; *Athenæum*, *Carlton*; *Bank Hall, Lancash.*; *Light Oaks, Staffordsh.*

**Pattison, James.** (*London*)

S. of the late Nathaniel M. Pattison, Esq. of Congleton, Chesh.; nephew of the late James Pattison, Esq., many years a director of the East India Company; and grand nephew of Gen. James Pattison, who was sixty years in the army. B. 1786; is married; has been governor of the Bank of England, and is a director. A merchant: his father and grandfather were also engaged in commercial pursuits; but the family estate is at Plumstead in Kent, where the Pattisons have been settled for nearly a century. A Reformer; in favour of triennial parliaments, the vote by ballot, and Church reform; opposed to all religious endowments. Represented the City in the Parliaments of 1835 and 1837; was unsuccessful at the general election in 1841, but was elected in October, 1843, filling the vacancy occasioned by the death of Sir Matthew Wood; was re-elected in 1847.—87, *Upper Harley-st.*; *Reform and Free Trade Clubs*; *West House, Cheshire*.

**Pearson, Charles.** (*Lambeth*)

S. of Thomas Pearson, esq., a member of an old-established mercantile firm in London. B. in London 1794; m. 1817, d. of Robert Dutton, esq., of London (this lady is honourably known as a most successful artist and portrait-painter). Was educated at Eastbourne, Sussex. Admitted a Solicitor in 1816; elected, by the Corporation of London, City Solicitor in 1839. Is Solicitor to the Irish Society, and one of the attorneys of the Lord Mayor's Court. A Radical Reformer; in favour of free trade, the repeal of the window tax, and of the fire insurance taxes; also in favour of the reformatory treatment of juvenile offenders; opposed to capital punishment, the rate-paying clauses of the Reform Act, the game laws, the income tax, the creation of new Bishops, and against all religious endowments out of the revenues of the State. First returned for Lambeth in 1847.—7, *Old Jewry*; *Clapham Common, Surrey*.



**Pechell, George Richard.** (*Brighton*)

Youngest s. of the late Major Gen. Sir Thomas Brooke Pechell, bt. Formerly M.P. for Downton; br. of Sir Samuel J. Brooke Pechell, bart. formerly member for Windsor, and a Lord of the Admiralty. B. 1789, m. in 1826 Katherine Annabella, co-heiress of Cecil, Baron de la Zouche, of Haryngworth, who died in 1828, and was succeeded in the barony by his eldest d. Harriet Anne, the present baroness. A Capt. in the Navy, of the year 1822. Patron of one living. Published, in 1822, "*A Visit to the Isle of St. Domingo, on a Mission to President Boyer, in 1820, in H. M. Ship Tamar.*" A moderate Reformer. Unsuccessfully contested the borough in 1832; has sat for it since 1835.—4, *Spring Gardens; Arthur's, Travellers', United Service; Castle Goring, Sussex.*

**Peel, Jonathan.** (*Huntingdon*)

S. of the late and br. of the present Sir Robert Peel. B. 1799; m. in 1824 Alicia Jane, youngest d. of the first Marq. of Ailsa. A Col. in the Army. Has been Surveyor-General of the Ordnance. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for Norwich in the Parliament of 1826; for Huntingdon since 1831.—8, *Park-place, St. James's; Carlton; Twickenham, Midd.; Buckingham House, Suffolk; Accrington House, Lancash.*

**Peel, Right Hon. Sir Robert, bart.** (*Tamworth*)

B. 1788; m. 1820 Julia, youngest d. of the late Gen. Sir J. Floyd, bart. Patron of 2 livings. Having been Under Secretary for the Home Department, and Chief Secretary for Ireland, he succeeded Lord Sidmouth as Secretary of State for the Home Department in 1822, and held that office till 1827, when he resigned, and remained out of place till the formation of the Duke of Wellington's Administration; he then returned to the Home Department, and continued there till the accession of Earl Grey to power, in 1830; was First Lord of the Treasury, and Chancellor of the Exchequer from Dec. 1834 till April 1835, and First Lord of the Treasury alone, from Sept. 1841 to July 1846. Sat for Oxford University from 1818 to 1828, when he was thrown out by Sir Robert Harry Inglis; he then sat for Westbury till 1830, when he was elected for Tamworth, which he has since continued to represent.—4, *Whitehall-Gardens; Carlton; Drayton Manor, Staffordsh.*

**Peel, Right Hon. William Yates.** (*Tamworth*)

Second s. of the late Sir Robert Peel, bart., by his first wife, d. of William Yates, esq., of Bury; is therefore bro. to the present Sir Robert Peel, bart., M.P. B. at Chamber Hall, Bury, Lancash., 1789. m. 1819, Lady Jane Eliza, 2nd d. of the 2nd Earl of Mount-Cashell. Educated at Harrow, and at St. John's Coll., Cambridge. Was called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn, June 1816. Appointed a Commissioner of the Board of Control in 1826, Under-Sec. of State for the Home Department in 1828, a Lord of the Treasury in 1830, and again held that office from 1834 till

April, 1835. Is a Dep. Lieut. of Staffordsh. A Conservative. Was elected for Bossiney in 1817; for Tamworth in 1818, 1820, and 1826; for Yarmouth, Isle of Wight, in 1830; for the University of Cambridge in 1831; again for Tamworth in 1835; and re-elected in 1847 without opposition.—*White's; Boodle's; Carlton; Athenæum; Baginton Hall, Warwicksh.*

**Pendarves, Edward William Wynne. (Cornwall, West)**

Eld. surviving s. of John Stackhouse, esq. Assumed the additional surname of Wynne by sign manual in 1815, and in the same year that of Pendarves, in place of Stackhouse; m. 1804 Tryphena, third d. and sole surviving heiress of the Rev. Browne Trist, of Bowden, Devon. Is patron of 1 living. Of Whig principles; in favour of short Parliaments. Formerly voted against an abolition of the Corn Laws, but in 1846 supported their repeal. Has sat for Cornwall uninterruptedly since 1826.—36, *Eaton-pl.; Athenæum and Reform Clubs; Pendarves, Cornwall.*

**Pennant, Hon. Edward Gordon Douglas. (Carnarvonsh.)**

Bro. of 18th Earl of Morton; b. 1800; m. first, d. of G. H. D. Pennant, esq. whose name he has assumed (she died in 1842); secondly, 1846, Lady Louisa, youngest d. of the 5th Duke of Grafton. A colonel in the army. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. First returned for the co. in 1841.—36, *Belgrave-sq.; Carlton; Penrhyn Castle, Carnarvonsh.*

**Perfect, Robert. (Lewes)**

Only s. of the late William Perfect, Esq., M.D. B. 1799; m. 1825, Eliza Harriet, d. of the late James Strode Butt, Esq. Graduated at Queen's Coll., Oxford, where he was 2nd class in classics 1822. A Deputy-Lieut. and Magistrate for Somerset. A Liberal; "opposed to finality" in legislation; founded the East Somerset Registration Society for increasing liberal votes in that county. First returned for Lewes in the early part of 1847 on the retirement of Sir H. Elphinstone; re-chosen at the general election in July, 1847.—85, *Bryanstone-sq.; Reform; University; Marine Parade, Brighton; Woolston House, Somersetsh.*

**Peto, Samuel Morton. (Norwich)**

S. of the late Henry Peto, esq., of York-road, Lambeth. M. his cousin Mary, eld. d. of Thomas De la Garde Grissell, esq., of Stockwell Common, Surrey (she died May, 1842). A Civil Engineer; member of the firm of Grissell and Peto, cont. actors and builders. Director of the Pontop and South Shields Railway. A Magistrate for Suffolk. Patron of 8 livings. A Liberal; "opposed to any fresh endowment of any religious denomination, and will seek the repeal of every impost which presses on the consciences of the Dissenters, but will not support the separation of the Church of England from the State." First elected for Norwich in

1847.—47, *Russell-sq.*; *York-road, Lambeth*; *Reform*; *Somerleyton Hall, Lowestoft, Suffolk.*

Philips, George Richard. (*Poole*)

Only s. of Sir George Phillips, bart., formerly M.P. for Warwicksh. B. 1789; m. 1819, the Hon. Sarah Georgiana, eld. d. of the late, and sister of the 3rd Lord Waterpark. A Whig. Represented Steyning from 1820 to 1832, Kidderminster from 1835 to 1837, and Poole since the latter date.—12, *Hill-st., Berkeley-sq.*; *Reform*; *Weston House, Oxfordsh.*

Pigot, Sir Robert, bart. (*Bridgenorth*)

Eld. s. of the late Sir G. Pigot, bt.; b. 1801; m. d. of W. Bamford, esq., has sat for the bor. since 1832. Is deputy-lieut. of Staffordshire. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846.—30, *Albemarle-st.*; *Patshull, Staffordsh.*

Pigott, Francis. (*Reading*)

Eld. s. of Payton Pigott Stainsby Conant, esq., of Archer Lodge, Hants, and Banbury, Oxfordsh., who traced his descent from the Knight Pigott, who accompanied William the Conqueror to England. B. at Trunkwell House, Berks, 1809; m. 1833, Frances Phillips, 2nd d. of Lieut.-General Sir Francis John Connor Wilder, of the Manor House, Binfield, Berks, formerly member for Arundel. Educated at Eton, and at Lincoln Coll., Oxford. A Magistrate of Hants, and Lieut. of the North Hants Yeomanry Cavalry. A Liberal; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy; and considers many portions of the present poor law as unnecessarily cruel and oppressive. Unsuccessfully contested Winchester in 1841. First returned for Reading in 1847.—*Hockfield Heath, Hartford-bridge, Hants*; *Reform, Oxford and Cambridge Clubs.*

Pilkington, James. (*Blackburn*)

B. at Blackburn 1804; m. 1831. Is a cotton-spinner and merchant, a Magistrate for Lancash., and Director of the East Lancash. Railway. A Liberal, and opposed to all religious endowments. First returned for Blackburn in 1847.—*Park-pl.*; *Blackburn, Lancash.*

Pinney, William. (*Somersetsh. East*)

Only s. of John Frederick Pinney, esq., of Somerton-Erle, Somersetsh., by the only d. of William Dickinson, esq. The name of Pinney was assumed by his grandfather, in lieu of his patronymic, Pretor, in 1740. B. 1806. Graduated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, M.A. 1833. A Magistrate for Somerset and Dorset, a Deputy-Lieut. of the former co., and Capt. of the West Somerset Yeomanry Cavalry. A Liberal; in favour of free trade, the educational measures of 1847, &c. Sat for Lyme Regis from 1832 to 1842, having been unseated on petition after the general election of 1841. First returned for Somerset East on the death of Col Gore Langton, April, 1847.—30, *Berkeley-sq.*; *Reform*; *Somerton-Erle, Somerset.*

**Plowden, William Henry Chicheley, F.R.S.** (*Newport, Isle of Wight*)

S. of the late Richard Chicheley Plowden, esq., many years an East India Director. B. 1790; m. first, 1818, d. of William Harding, esq., of Baraset, Warwicksh.; 2ndly, 1830, d. of the late Edward Campbell, esq., and niece of Sir Robert Campbell, bart. Was educated at Westminster. Was for many years in the civil service of the E. I. C.; appointed in 1833 second superintendent of British Trade in China. A director of the E. I. C.; a magistrate and deputy-lieut. of Middlesex; a member of the Royal Asiatic Society, and director of the Globe Insurance Office. A Conservative; will oppose any concessions to the Roman Catholic Clergy. Unsuccessfully contested Nottingham in 1837. First elected for Newport in 1847.—8, *Devonsh.-pl., Portland-pl.; Carlton; Travellers'; Union and City of London Clubs.*

**Plumptre, John Pemberton.** (*Kent, East*)

Eld. s. of the late John Plumptre, Esq. of Fredville and of Nottingham, and nephew of Sir Richard Carr Glyn, bart.; b. 1791; m. 1818 Catherine, 4th d. of the late Paul Cobb Methuen, Esq. of Corsham. Is patron of 8 livings. A Deputy Lieut. of Kent; was called to the bar, but practised only for a very short time. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; against the emancipation of the Jews; seconded Mr. Finch's motion of June 1833 against political unions. Has sat for the county since 1832.—8, *Great George-st.; Fredville House, Kent.*

**Powell, William Edward.** (*Cardigansh.*)

Eld. s. of the late Thomas Powell, esq. of Nanteos; b 1788; m. 1st in 1810 Laura Edwyna, eld. d. of James Sackville Tufton Phelp, esq. of Coston House, Leicestersh. 2ndly in 1841 Harriott Dell, relict of Geo. Ackers, esq. Patron of 1 living. Col. of the Cardigansh. Militia, Lord-Lieut. and Custos Rot. of the county; a Cornet in the Army. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for Cardigansh. since 1816.—7, *Hyde Pk. Ter.; Carlton, Boodle's, the two United Service, the Albion; Nanteos, Cardigansh.*

**Power, Maurice.** (*Cork co.*)

Is descended from the 5th Lord Power, of the co. Waterford, and connected with the McCarthys, O'Sullivans, and O'Donovans. B. at Deelis, West Carbery, co. Cork, 1811; m. 1832, d. of the Hon. Brockholst Livingstone, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of America. Was educated at Stonyhurst Coll., Lancash.; a member of the medical profession, but has never practised; is a Magistrate for the co. of Cork, and a Guardian of the Cork and Bandon Unions; was the first Chairman of the Clonakilty Town Commissioners. A Liberal, and "a moral-force Repealer;" will support free trade measures so long as they

do not interfere with the prosperity of Ireland; is in favour of long leases and the tenant-right bill. First returned for the co. of Cork, July, 1847, on the death of Dan. O'Connell, esq.; was re-elected without opposition at the general election in the same year.—*Ringacottig, Cove, co. Cork.*

**Power, Nicholas Maher.** (*Waterford co.*)

S. of Nicholas Power, esq., of Ballinakill, co. Waterford, by the d. of — Rivers, esq., of Waterford. B. in Waterford 1787; m. 1818, d. of — Mahon, esq., of Dublin. Educated at Oscott and at Ulverston, Lancash. A Magistrate and Dep.-Lieut. for Waterford. A Liberal, and in favour of the repeal of the Union. First returned for the co. of Waterford in 1847, without opposition.—*Faithlegg House, Waterford.*

**Powlett, Lord William John Frederick.** (*St. Ives*)

Second s. of the 1st Duke of Cleveland, by Lady Katherine Powlett, d. and heir of the last Duke of Bolton. Assumed the name of Powlett in lieu of his patronymic, Vane. B. 1792; m. 1815, Lady Caroline, 5th d. of the 1st Earl of Lonsdale. A Dep.-Lieut. of Durham. A Conservative. First returned for St. Ives, July, 1846, without opposition.—19, *Curzon-st.*; *Downham Hall, Brandon, Norfolk.*

**Price, Sir Robert, bart.** (*Hereford city*)

S. of Sir Uvedale Price, the 1st Bart. by the 4th d. of the 1st Earl of Tyrconnel. Is descended from one of the most ancient families in Wales, which is said to derive its origin from Marchweithan, one of the princes. B. 1796; m. in 1823 his first cousin Mary Anne, d. of the Rev Robert Price, D.D. Of Whig principles; "will be the advocate of increased comforts for the humbler classes, and of the advancement of civil and religious liberty." Is patron of 2 livings. Represented the co. of Hereford from 1818 to 1841; first elected for the city of Hereford in 1845 without opposition.—11, *Stratton Street; Foxley, Herefordshire.*

**Prime, Richard.** (*Sussex, West*)

Second s. of the late Samuel Prime, esq., of Upper Brook-st., and of Whitton, Middlesex, by the d. of Richard Holden, esq., of Field House, Yorksh. B. in London 1784; m. 1815, Anne, eld. d. of the late Robert Shuttleworth, esq., of Gawthorpe Hall, Lancash., relict of Richard T. Streatfield, esq., of Sussex. Educated at Eton, and at Trin. Coll., Cambridge, where he was first junior optime in 1806. Was called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn 1810, but did not practise longer than five years, A Deputy-Lieut. and Magistrate of Sussex; was High Sheriff in 1823; Deputy-Chairman of the West Sussex Quarter Sessions; and Chairman of the Central Committee of the Agricultural Protection Society in that county. A Protectionist; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy. First returned for Sussex West in Jan. 1847, when Col. Wyndham retired; re-chosen at the general election without opposition.—*Carlton; Athenæum; Walberton House, Arundel, Sussex.*

**Pryse, Pryse.** (*Cardigan dist.*)

Only s. of the late E. Loveden Loveden, esq., of Buscot Park, Farringdon, formerly M.P. for Bucks. Assumed the name of Pryse in 1798; m. first in 1798, Harriet, d. of William, 2nd Lord Ashbrook, and widow of the Hon. and Rev. John Agar Ellis; 2dly, in 1814, Jane, d. of Peter Cavallier, of Gisborough. Is patron of 2 livings. A Reformer; voted in favour of Queen Caroline, Catholic Emancipation, and both Reform Bills. Has sat for the borough since 1818.—*Limmer's Hotel; Gogerddan, Cardigansh.; Buscot Park, Berks.*

**Pugh, David.** (*Montgomery dist.*)

S. of the late Charles Pugh, esq., of Perry Hill, Kent, by the 3rd d. of William Lloyd, esq., of Montgomery, descended from the Masons of Wrockley, formerly representatives of Montgomery. B. at Perry Hill, 1789; m. 1814, Anne, only child and heir of the late Evan Vaughan, esq., of Beguildy, Radnorsh. Educated at Trinity Coll., Oxford. A Deputy-Lieut. and Magistrate of Montgomerysh.; Recorder of Welshpool; and late a Major in the Montgomerysh. Yeomanry. Was High Sheriff of that county in 1823. A Conservative; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Montgomery in 1832; unseated on petition in 1833. Polled the same number of votes in 1847 as his opponent Mr. Cholmondeley, and a double return ensued; but neither member can vote until after the report of a committee.—*Carlton; Llanerchydol, Welshpool, Montgomerysh.*

**Pusey, Philip.** (*Berksh.*)

Eld. s. of the Hon. Philip Bouverie (half br. of the 1st Earl of Radnor), who assumed the name of Pusey. B. 1799; m. in 1822 Emily Herbert, 3d d. of the 2d Earl of Carnarvon. Is patron of one living. Was a Conservative, and a supporter of the agricultural interest, but in 1846 declared himself a Liberal, and a supporter of Lord John Russell's government. Sat for Chippenham in 1830, Cashel in 1831, and contested the county unsuccessfully in 1832. Has sat for it since 1835.—*85, Grosvenor-sq.; Carlton; Pusey, Berks.*

**Raphael, Alexander.** (*St. Alban's*)

Of liberal opinions. Elected Sheriff of London in 1834. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Pontefract in 1835; was returned for Carlisle in June, 1835, but unseated on petition, when the terms of a pecuniary arrangement between him and Mr. O'Connell for procuring his election there attracted much public attention. **Rendlesham, Lord. (*Suffolk, East*)**

S. of 1st Lord Rendlesham, and br. to the late Lord, who was the 3rd baron. Is an Irish peer. B. 1798, m. in 1838, Eliza, eld. d. of Sir George B. Prescott, Bt. and relict of James Duff, Esq. Was for some years in the army, but has retired. Is patron of 4 livings. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; is opposed to the duties on tea, tobacco, hops, and malt; considers that lunatic asylums, and all county and highway rates, should be paid out of the consolidated fund; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Has sat for Suffolk East since 1843.—*Hereford-st.; White's, Travellers'; Rendlesham, Suffolk.*

**Renton, John Campbell. (*Berwick*)**

B. at Edinburgh 1814. A Conservative and Protectionist. First elected for Berwick in 1847.—*Conservative Club; Mordington House, Berwicksh.*

**Repton, George William John. (*St. Alban's*)**

Only s. of G. S. Repton, esq., and grands. of the 1st Earl of Eldon; b. 1818. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First returned for the borough in 1841.—*Bolton-st., Piccadilly; Carlton, Arthur's.*

**Reynolds, John. (*Dublin*)**

A draper in the city of Dublin. A Repealer. First returned for Dublin in 1847.—*Dublin; Rsker House, Rathmines, co. Wicklow.*

**Ricardo, John Lewis. (*Stoke-on-Trent*)**

B. 1812; m. in 1841, d. of Gen. the Hon. Sir A. Duff. A merchant, largely engaged in railway enterprise; Chairman of the North Staffordshire Railway. A Reformer; in favour of the ballot, free-trade, &c. First elected for the borough in 1841.—*81, Lowndes-sq.; Brookes's; Free Trade.*

**Ricardo, Osman. (*Worcester*)**

Eld. s. of the late David Ricardo, esq. (many years M.P. for Portarlington, and well known as the author of important works on currency and taxation,) by the d. of — Wilkinson, esq. M. Harriet, youngest d. of Robert Harvey Mallory, esq., of Woodcote, Warwicksh. Was educated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, where he graduated A B. 1816. A Liberal; "concurs in the general line of policy of Lord John Russell's Government, and will promote every measure calculated to give increased

energy to trade and commerce." First returned for Worcester in 1847.—*71, Eaton-pl.; Brookes's; Union; Bromesborough-pl., Worcestersh.*

Rice, Edward Royd. (*Dover*)

B. 1790; m. in 1818, Elizabeth, 2d d. of Edward Knight, esq., of Godmersham Park, Kent. Is a banker at Dover, a Deputy-Lieut. for the county of Kent, and a Capt. in the East Kent Yeomanry Cavalry. Was High Sheriff for the county in 1830. A Reformer. Has sat for Dover since 1837; was unsuccessful in 1835.—*United University Club; Dane Court, Kent.*

Rich, Henry. (*Richmond*)

Youngest s. of the late Admiral Sir Thomas Rich. Was educated at Trinity Coll. Cambridge. Has been Groom in Waiting to the Queen. Is a Lord of the Treasury. Is author of "What will the Lords do?" and other political pamphlets. A Reformer; "his efforts will ever be in support of that steady, firm, and progressive Reform which best preserves all our institutions by keeping them in harmony with the advanced education, and morality of our countrymen." Unsuccessfully contested Knaresborough in 1831 and 1834, but was returned in 1837. First elected for Richmond in April, 1846, without a contest.—47, *Mount-st., Grosvenor-sq.; Brookes's, Athenæum.*

Richards, Richard. (*Merionethsh.*)

Eld. s. of the late Lord Chief Baron Richards; b. 1787; m. Harriet, d. of Jonathan Dennett, esq. First elected on the resignation of Sir R. W. Vaughan, bt. in 1836. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846.—21, *Park-cres., Portland-pl.; Carlton; Caernarvon, Merionethsh.*

Robartes, Thomas James Agar. (*Cornwall, East*)

Only s. of the late Hon. Charles Bagenal Agar, by the only d. and heir of Thomas Hunt, esq., of Mollington Hall, Chesh., grandniece and sole heir of Henry Robartes, 3rd Earl of Radnor (extinct). B. in London 1808; m. 1839, Juliana, d. of the late Right Hon. Reginald Pole Carew, of East Antony, Cornwall. Was educated at Harrow, and at Christ Church, Oxford. Assumed the name of Robartes in addition to his patronymic. A Whig; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Church. First returned for Cornwall in 1847, without opposition.—*Athenæum; Lanhydrock, Cornwall.*

Robinson, George Richard. (*Poole*)

A merchant and shipowner, principally engaged in the Newfoundland trade. Succeeded Mr. Alderman Thompson as Chairman of Lloyd's in 1834. An East India Proprietor; Director of the British American Land Company and of the National Bank. A Conservative; formerly voted for free trade, but now in its favour; voted for the Reform Bill;



will support the property tax and all direct taxation; voted for a repeal of the malt tax 1835; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy, and will resist the repeal of the Navigation Laws. Sat for Worcester from 1826 till 1837; was an unsuccessful candidate for the Tower Hamlets in 1841. First elected for Poole in 1847.—27, *Chester-terr.*

### Roche, Edmund Burke. (*Cork co.*)

S. of Edward Roche, esq., of Trabolgan; and connected, through his mother's family, with that of the celebrated Edmund Burke. B. 1815. A Radical Reformer; a Repealer.—*Trabolgan, co. of Cork.*

### Rolleston, Lancelot. (*Nottinghamsh. South*)

S. and heir of Christopher Rolleston, who was highsheriff for the county in 1805. B. 20th July, 1785. M. 17th Nov. 1808, Caroline, d. of the late, and sister of the present, Sir Geo. Chetwynd, bt. (dead.) Is Col. of the Nottinghamsh. Militia. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy. Has sat for Notts since 1837; was an unsuccessful candidate for Nottingham in 1839.—8, *Hertford-st.; Watnall Hall, Nottinghamsh.*

### Romilly, John. (*Devonport*)

S. of the late Sir Samuel Romilly, by the eld. d. of Francis Garbett, esq. Was called to the bar by the Society of Gray's Inn, in 1827. Is a Queen's counsel. A Liberal. First seated for Bridport, on petition, in April 1846; was elected for Devonport in 1847.—32, *Gordon-sq.; 6, Lincoln's Inn New-sq.*

### Rothschild, Baron Lionel Nathan De. (*London*)

Eld. s. of the late Baron Nathan Meyer De Rothschild, (a native of Frankfort-on-the-Maine, who came to England in 1800,) by the 3rd d. of Levi Barnett Cohen, esq., merchant of London; is bro. to the Baron Anthony De Rothschild, of Grosvenor-pl.-houses. B. in London 1808; m. 1836 his cousin Charlotte, d. of the Baron Charles De Rothschild, of Naples. Was educated at Göttingen. Succeeded his father in 1836 as a Baron of the Austrian empire. Is head of the mercantile firm which bears his name, well known for their extensive operations as public loan-contractors and money-brokers. A Liberal; in favour of the extension of the franchise, of direct taxation, the reduction of the duty on tea, &c.; considers that "circumstances may occur which will render necessary further grants for religious endowments." First elected for London in 1847.—148, *Piccadilly; St. Swithin's Lane, City; Brookes's, Reform, and Free Trade Clubs; Gunnersbury Park, Middlessex.*

### Rufford, Francis. (*Worcester city*)

A glass-manufacturer and banker at Stourbridge, and at Bromsgrove, Worcestersh. Is Chairman of the Oxford, Worcester, and Wolverhampton

ton Railway; Director of the Birmingham and Oxford, the Birmingham and Wolverhampton Railways; a Magistrate for Staffordsh. and Worcestersh.; and a Dep.-Lieut. for the latter co. A Conservative and Protectionist; a supporter of the property tax in lieu of taxes on articles of consumption; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy, but in favour of education without regard to religious opinions. First returned for Worcester in 1847.—67, *St. James's-st.*; *Alfred*; *Bell-broughton*, *Stourbridge*, *Worcestersh.*

### Rushout, George. (*Worcestersh. East*)

Only s. of the late Hon. and Rev. George Rushout-Bowles, by the 7th d. of the 7th Earl of Galloway. B. 1811. Graduated M.A. at Christ Church, Oxford; became Capt. 1st Life Guards in 1842; is heir presumptive to the Barony of Northwick; a Magistrate for Worcestersh. A Conservative and Protectionist; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Sat for Evesham from Feb., 1837, till 1841; was unsuccessful at the general election in that year. First returned for Worcestersh. East, Jan., 1847, on the death of Mr. Barneby; was re-chosen at the general election in the same year.—*Carlton*; *Barford*, and *Northwick*, *Worcestersh.*

### Russell, Hon. Edward Southwell. (*Tavistock*)

Eld. s. of the Baroness De Clifford and Capt. John Russell, R.N., cousin of Lord John Russell, M.P. B. 1824. Graduated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge; appointed Cornet Leicestersh. Yeomanry Cavalry 1844. A Liberal. First returned for Tavistock in 1847.—*Reform*; *King's Weston*, *Gloucestersh.*; *Clifford Castle*, *Herefordsh.*

### Russell, Francis Charles Hastings. (*Bedfordsh.*)

Eld. s. of the late Lord George William Russell, by the d. of the late Hon. John Theophilus Rawdon. Nephew to the 7th Duke of Bedford, and to Lord John Russell, M.P. B. in London 1819; m. 1844, Lady Elizabeth, eld. d. of the 5th Earl De-La-Warr. Entered the Scots Fusilier Guards in 1838, but retired from the army July, 1844. A Whig; "will support the well-known principles of his family." First returned for Bedfordsh. in 1847, without opposition.—8, *Eaton-pl. West*; *Brookes's*; *Travellers'*; *Guards.*

### Russell, Rt. Hon. Lord John. (*London*)

Third and youngest s. of the 6th Duke of Bedford, by his first wife Georgiana Elizabeth, 2nd d. of the 4th Visct. Torrington; b. 1792; m. 1st, 1835, Adelaide, eld. d. of Thomas Lister, of Armitage Park, esq., and relict of 2nd Lord Ribblesdale; 2ndly, 1841, Lady Frances Anna Maria, 2nd d. of the 2nd Earl of Minto. Was Paymaster of the Forces from 1830 till Nov. 1834. In April 1835 was appointed Secretary of State for the Home department; and in 1839 Secretary of State for the Colonies; resigned in Sept. 1841. Appointed First Lord of

Treasury, July, 1846. Sat for Devon in 1831, and for Tavistock in the five Parliaments previous, with the exception of that for 1820, when he sat for Huntingdonsh., and 1830, when he sat for Bandon Bridge. On taking office in 1835, he lost his seat for Devon, but was shortly afterwards elected for Stroud, Lieut.-Col. Fox accepting the Chiltern Hundreds in order to create a vacancy. First returned for the City in 1841. Was formerly a conditional supporter of the Ballot.—82, *Chesham place*; *Reform*; *Endsleigh House, Devon*.

### Rutherford, Right Hon. Andrew. (*Leith dist.*)

### Sadlier, John. (*Carlow bor.*)

Third s. of Clement William Sadlier, esq., of Shrone Hill, co. Tipperary. B. at Shrone Hill 1814; is unm. Was educated at Clongowes Coll., Ireland. Admitted a Solicitor in Ireland in 1837, but retired from practice in 1846. A Liberal. First returned for Carlow in 1847.—5, *Great Denmark st., Dublin*; *Grove, Emo, Queen's co.*

### St. George, Christopher. (*Galway co.*)

Eld. s. of the late Arthur St. George, esq., of Tyrone House, co. Galway, by Lady Henrietta, eld. d. of the 2nd Earl of Howth. His grandfather assumed the name of St. George, in lieu of his patronymic, French, to mark his descent from the only d. and heir of the last Lord St. George (extinct). B. at Tyrone, 1812; is unm. Educated at Trinity Coll., Dublin, where he distinguished himself. Is a claimant of the barony of Athenry. A Magistrate for Galway. A Conservative. First returned for Galway co. in 1847, without opposition.—*Union Club*; *Tyrone House, co. Galway*.

### Salwey, Henry. (*Ludlow*)

Third s. of Theophilus Richard Salwey, esq., of the Lodge, Ludlow, (descended from the Salweys of Richard's Castle and Moor Park, Salop,) by the youngest d. and co-heir of Thomas Hill, esq., of Court-of-Hill, Salop. B. at the Lodge, Ludlow, 1794; m. 1828, Eliza Philippa, only d. and heir of John Hooper Holder, esq., of Stanton-Lacey House, Ludlow, great-grandd. of Lord Chancellor Lifford (Ireland). Educated at Eton. Entered the Coldstream Guards 1811, and became a Colonel in the Army 1841; served under Wellington in Spain, France, and Holland, 1813-14-15. A Magistrate for Surrey. A Liberal; in favour of the ballot and triennial parliaments; opposed to all religious endowments; will

support the repeal of the malt tax. Sat for Ludlow from 1837 to 1841, when he was an unsuccessful candidate; was again returned in 1847.—*Reform; Egham Park, Surrey.*

**Sanders, George. (Wakefield)**

S. of the late Samuel Sanders, esq., of Gainsborough, Lincolnsh., descended from the Sanders family, of Ireton, Derbysh. B. at Gainsborough 1805; m. 1829, Mary, d. of George Urden, esq., of Ardwick, Lancash. Was educated at Newark Grammar School. Has been director of several banks and railways. A Conservative; formerly opposed to the repeal of the Corn Laws, but will now support the further extension of free trade, and the policy generally of Sir R. Peel; is opposed, however, to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy, but in favour of the extension of the education scheme to them as well as to others. First returned for Wakefield in 1847.—*Alverthorpe Hall, Wakefield, Yorksh.*

**Scholefield, William. (Birmingham)**

Second s. of the late Joshua Scholefield, esq., many years M.P. for Birmingham, by the 2nd d. of C. Cottrell, esq. B. 1809; m. Jane Matilda, d. of John Miller, esq. (she died 1843.) A merchant in Birmingham. Elected first mayor of Birmingham when that town received its charter of incorporation in 1838. A Magistrate for Warwicksh. Is a director of the Birmingham and Midland Bank. A Radical Reformer; in favour of a wide extension of the suffrage, triennial parliaments, vote by ballot, currency reform, and removal of all disabilities on account of religious opinions; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Unsuccessfully contested Birmingham on the death of his father in 1844; first returned for Birmingham in 1847.—49, *Queen Anne-st. Cavendish-sq.; Reform and Free Trade Clubs; Birmingham.*

**Scott, Hon. Francis. (Berwicksh.)**

S. of 4th Lord Polwarth; b. 1806; m. 1835, d. of Rev. Chas. Boulton. In April 1845 appointed Parliamentary Agent for the district of Port Philip, New South Wales. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for Roxburghsh. from 1841 to 1847, when he was returned for Berwicksh.—*Carlton; Mertoun House, co. Berwick.*

**Scrope, Geo. Poulett, F.R.S., F.G.S. &c. (Stroud)**

Second s. of J. Poulett Thomson, Esq. of Roehampton, Surrey, and Austin Friars; br. of the late Lord Sydenham; b. 1797; m. 1821 Emma, d. and heiress of William Scrope, esq. of Castle Combe, Wilts, and Cockerington, Lincolnsh., whereupon he took the name and arms of Scrope, in addition to those of Poulett. A Dep.-Lieut. of Wilts. Is patron of 1 living. A moderate Reformer; in favour of the establishment of small national bank notes, an enlarged scheme of colonization as a national measure, and free trade generally. Has written pamphlets—

on Banking, the Currency, the Poor Laws, and Political Economy; also "Considerations on Volcanos," the "Geology of Central France," and other geological works. Is also author of a life of Lord Sydenham. Contested the borough unsuccessfully in 1832, but was first elected without opposition on the resignation of Mr. Ricardo in May 1833.—18, *Belgrave-sq.*; *Athenæum and Reform Clubs*; *Castle Combe, co. Wills.*

### Scully, Francis. (*Tipperary*)

S. of the late James Scully, esq., of Kilfane, co. Tipperary, and nephew of the late Denys Scully, an Irish barrister, well known as the author of "A Statement of the Penal Laws affecting the Roman Catholics." B. in Tipperary, 1820; unm. Educated at St. Gregory's Coll., Downside. Called to the Bar at the Middle Temple, 1841, but does not practise. A Repealer; will support "tenant-right." First elected for Tipperary in 1847.—44, *Lincoln's Inn Fields*; *Reform.*

### Seaham, Visct. (*Durham, North*)

S. of the 2nd Marq. of Londonderry, by his 2nd wife, only d. and heir of the late Sir Harry Vane Tempest, bart. Is half-bro. of Visct. Castlereagh, and heir to the Earldom of Vane, which his father enjoys. B. 1821; m. 1846, the only d. of Sir John Edwards, bart. Graduated at Balliol Coll., Oxford; appointed Lieut. 1st Life Guards in 1845; is a Deputy-Lieut. of Durham, and Major of the Durham Militia. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade; will support the Navigation Laws; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First returned for Durham North in 1847.—*Holderness House, Park-lane*; *Carlton*; *Seaham Hall, Sunderland, co. Durham.*

### Seely, Charles. (*Lincoln city*)

S. of the late Mr. Seely, who was engaged in trade at Lincoln. B. at Lincoln, 1808; m. 1831, Mary, d. of Jonathan Hilton, esq., of Newcastle-on-Tyne. Educated at Lincoln. A merchant. A Radical Reformer; is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy; thinks that Dissenters should not be called upon to support the Established Church; and is anxious to reform the Irish Protestant Church, which he considers "a monstrous abuse." Was an unsuccessful candidate for Lincoln in 1841. First elected in 1847.—*Heightington, Lincoln.*

### Seymer, Henry Ker, D.C.L. (*Dorsetsh.*)

S. of H. K. Seymer, by Harriet, d. of Peter Beckford, and sister of the 3rd Lord Rivers. B. at Hanford, Dorsetsh., 1807; m. 1839, Helen, d. of W. Webber, esq., of Binfield Lodge, Berks. Educated at Winchester, and Christ Church, Oxon.; was subsequently Fellow of All Souls' Coll. Is patron of 1 living. A Conservative; in favour of protection to agriculture, and will support the Church. A magistrate and Dep.-Lieut.

for Dorsetsh. First elected for Dorsetsh. in Feb. 1843, without a contest. — *Carlton, Oxford and Cambridge, Travellers', Boedle's, Arthur's; Hanford, Dorsetsh.*

### Seymour, Lord. (*Totness*)

Eld. s. of the Duke of Somerset: b. 1804; m. in 1830 Jane Georgiana, youngest d. of the late Thomas Sheridan, esq. A Liberal; formerly voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws, but in 1846 supported their repeal. A Lord of the Treasury from 1835 to 1839, Secretary to the Board of Control from 1839 to June 1841, when he became Under Secretary of State for the Home Department. Resigned Sept. 1841. Has sat for the borough since 1834. — 18, *Spring-gardens; Reform Club; Berry Pomeroy, Devon.*

### Seymour, Sir Horace Beauchamp, K.C.H. (*Lisburn*)

S. of Lord Hugh Seymour; b. 1791; m. 1st, 1818, d. of Sir L. Palk, bart.; 2ndly, 1835, d. of W. S. Poynts, esq. and relict of 17th Lord Clinton. Was for some years Equerry to King William IV., having previously served in the army, which he entered in 1811. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for Midhurst from 1841 to 1845; for Antrim from 1845 to 1847, when he was elected for Lisburn, which he had previously represented before the passing of the Reform Bill. — 28, *St. James's-pl.; Carlton, White's; Cowdray Lodge, Sussex; Stoke Chichester, Antrim.*

### Shafto, Robert Duncombe. (*Durham, North*)

Eld. s. of Robert Eden Duncombe Shafto, esq., of Whitworth Park, Durham, (formerly M.P. for the city of Durham,) by the 3rd d. of Sir John Eden, bart., of Windlestone. B. in London, 1806; m. 1838, Charlotte Rosa, d. of the late William Baring, esq., and niece of Lord Ashburton. A Magistrate of Durham and of Wilts. A Liberal; will support a modification of the Navigation Laws; and is opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Durham South in 1832. First returned for the Northern division of that co. in 1847. — *Hampworth Lodge, Wilts; Whitworth Park, Bishop-Auckland, Durham.*

### Shaw, Rt. Hon. Frederick. (*Dublin University*)

Second s. of Col. Sir Robert Shaw, bt. of Bushy Park, co. of Dublin, who represented that city in Parliament for 22 years; b. 1799; m. 1819 Thomasine Emily, d. of the Hon. George Jocelyn. Called to the Irish bar in 1823. Is Recorder of Dublin and Dundalk, and a Bencher of King's Inns, Dublin. Obtained some premiums in the University of Dublin, afterwards graduated at Oxford. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for the city of Dublin in the Parliaments of 1830 and 1831. Was first elected for the University in 1832, in opposition to Mr. Orampton. — 59, *St. James's-st.; Carlton; Kimmage-house, co. Dublin.*

Shiel, Rt. Hon. Richard Lalor. (*Dungarvon*)

B. 1794; m. first, niece of Sir Wm. Mc Mahon, bt.; 2ndly, 1830, relict of E. Power, esq., of Long Orchard, co. Tipperary. A Queen's counsel; has been a Commissioner of Greenwich Hospital, Vice-President of the Board of Trade, and Judge Advocate Gen. Appointed Master of the Mint, July, 1846. Has written several Tragedies, and formerly wrote much for different portions of the periodical press. Will vote for the abolition of tithes in every shape, and under every designation; for the appropriation of a large portion of the episcopal estates to purposes of national utility; and the nomination of grand juries by the people. Sat for Milbourne Port in 1880, and (having unsuccessfully contested it in 1880) for Louth in 1881; for Tipperary from 1889 till 1841, when he was first elected for Dungarvon.—73, *Eccleston-sq.; Athenæum and Reform Clubs; Long Orchard, co. Tipperary.*

Shelburne, Earl of. (*Calne*)

Eld. surviving s. of the Marq. of Lansdowne; b. Jan. 5, 1816; m. 5th d. of 11th Earl of Pembroke (dead). Graduated at Trinity Coll., Cambridge. Of Whig opinions. Has sat for Calne since 1887.—*Lansdowne-house, Berkeley-sq.; Bowood, Wilts.*

Sheridan, Richard Brinsley. (*Shaftesbury*)

Granda. of the celebrated man, whose name he bears. A Liberal; thinks "the present Poor Laws require much alteration, but would not support their entire repeal." Voted for agricultural protection, 1846. A Magistrate, and Dep.-Lieut. of Dorsetshire. First returned for Shaftesbury in 1845, without opposition.—18, *Spring-gardens; Frampton, Dorsetshire.*

B. 1788; m. Eliza, d. of Arthur Stanhope, esq., cousin of the Earl of Chesterfield. Elected on the death of E. Sheldon, esq. in 1836. Is a Trustee of Rugby School. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. Sat for Monaghan in 1826 and 1830; first returned for Warwicksh. in 1837.—20, *Belgrave-sq.; Easington-hall, Warwicksh.*

Sibthorp, Col. Charles Delaet Waldo. (*Lincoln*)

M. d. and co-heir of Ponsonby Tottenham, esq. Is patron of 2 livings; Lieut.-Col. of the South Lincoln Militia; a Magistrate and Dep.-Lieut. of Lincolnsh. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Represented the city previous to 1832, then lost his seat, but recovered it in 1835, and has since retained it.—27, *Chester-st., Grosvenor-pl.; Carlton; Canwick Hall, Lincolnsh.*

Sidney, Thomas. (*Stafford*)

S. of Mr. William Sidney, woollen-draper at Stafford. B. at Stafford, 1805; m. 1831, eld. d. of William Hall, esq., of Ranton, Staffordsh. Edu-

cated at Stafford. Is a tea-dealer and importer. An Alderman of London ; was Sheriff of London and Middlesex in 1844. A "Liberal Conservative," in favour of free trade ; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy. First returned for Stafford in 1847.—8, *Ludgate-hill ; Leyton House, Essex.*

### Simeon, John. (*Isle of Wight*)

Eld. s. of Sir Richard Godin Simeon, bart. (who represented the Isle of Wight from 1833 till 1837), by the eld. d. of the late Sir Fitzwilliam Barrington, bart. B. 1815 ; m. 1840, only d. of the late Sir Frederick Francis Baker, bart. Was educated at Christ Church, Oxford, where he graduated M.A. A Liberal, and a supporter generally of Lord John Russell's policy. First elected for the Isle of Wight in 1847.—*Alfred Club ; Swainston, Isle of Wight.*

### Slaney, Robert Aglionby. (*Shrewsbury*)

Eld. s. of the late Robert Slaney, esq., of Hatton Grange, Salop, by the d. of Thomas Mason, esq., of Shrewsbury. B. 1791 ; m. 1812, Elizabeth, only child of the late William Hawkins Mucclleston, esq., M.D. Was called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn 1817, and practised for seven years. A Magistrate for Salop ; author of "An Essay on the Employment of the Poor ;" "An Essay on the Beneficial Direction of Rural Expenditure ;" "An Outline of the Smaller British Birds," &c. A Liberal ; will support the abolition of all religious disabilities. When formerly in Parliament, he obtained committees on the Poor Laws, on the restrictions on malting, on the fluctuations of manufacturing employment, and on public walks in populous cities. Formerly voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws, but in 1846 supported their repeal. Sat for Midhurst in 1830 ; for Chichester since 1831.—47, *Belgrave-sq. ; Dale Park, Sussex.*

### Smith, John Benjamin. (*Stirling dist.*)

A retired merchant. Was President of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce in 1839, 1840, and 1841 ; was the first Chairman of the Anti-Corn Law League. Published, in 1840, "A Reply to the Letter of



Samuel Jones Lloyd, esq., on the Effects of the Administration of the Bank of England." A Liberal, and "opposed to all State grants for religious purposes." Was an unsuccessful candidate for Blackburn in 1837, and for Walsall and Dundee in 1841; first elected for Stirling dist. in 1847.—*Reform; Free Trade Club; Vicar's Field, Eccles. Lancash.*

### Smith, Martin Tucker. (*Wycombe*)

Second s. of the late John Smith, esq., of Blendon Hall, Kent, M.P., a banker in London, by his 2nd wife, d. of Lieut.-Col. Tucker. Is younger bro. of John Abel Smith, esq., M.P. for Chichester. B. 1808; m. 1831, Louisa, 3rd d. of the late Sir Matthew White Ridley, bart. Is an East India Director, and a Commissioner of the Lieutenancy for London. A Liberal. Sat for Midhurst in 1831. First returned for Wycombe in 1847.—18, *Belgrave-st. Upper; Reform.*

### Smith, Right Hon. Robert Vernon. (*Northampton*)

S. of Robert Smith, esq. and nephew of the Rev. Sydney Smith, canon of St. Paul's. M. d. and co-heir of the late Earl of Upper Ossory. Graduated at Christ Church, Oxford, where he was second class in classics 1822. A Liberal. A Lord of the Treasury from Nov. 1830 to Nov. 1834; Secretary of the Board of Control from April 1835 to 1839; Under Secretary for the Colonies from 1839 to 1841. Sat for Tralee from 1829 till the election in 1831, when he was chosen for Northampton.—20, *Saville-row; Reform Club; Farming Woods, Northamptonsh.*

### Smollett, Alexander. (*Dumbartonsh.*)

Was educated at the University of Edinburgh. Is a Member of the Faculty of Advocates. A Conservative; but in favour of free trade. ### Smyth, John George. (*York city*)

B. 1815; m. 1837, Hon. Diana, 5th d. of the 8rd Lord Macdonald. Was educated at Eton, and at Cambridge, where he was a fellow-commoner of Trinity Coll. Is a magistrate for Yorksh., and a lieut. in the Yorksh. Hussars. A Conservative and Protectionist. **Smyth, Sir George Henry, bt. (Colchester)**

**Smythe, Hon. George Augustus Frederick Percy Sydney. (Canterbury)**

Eld. s. of 6th Visct. Strangford; b. 1818, at Stockholm, during his father's embassy there; educated at Eton and St. John's Col. Cambridge. Was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from Jan. to July 1846. Author of "Historic Fancies," and numerous contributions to "the Annuals." A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. First returned for the borough in 1840.—68, *Harley-st.; Carlton; Westenhanger House, Kent.*

**Somers, John Patrick. (Sligo)**

A Deputy-Lieut. of the co. First elected for the borough at the general election in 1837, in the room of John Martin, esq., who had sat as member since 1832. Is a Liberal.—*Reform Club.*

**Somerset, Right Hon. Lord Granville Charles Henry. (Monmouthsh.)**

Second s. of the late Duke of Beaufort. B. 1792; m. 1822 Hon. Emily, d. of 1st Lord Carrington. Graduated at Christ Church, Oxford, where he was second class in classics 1813. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Was appointed a Lord of the Treasury in 1820, and held that office for some years; was Chairman of the Metropolitan Lunacy Commission. Chief Commissioner of Woods and Forests, from Dec. 1834 till April 1835; and Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster from Sept. 1841 till July 1846. Has sat for the county since 1818.—*Carlton.*

**Somerton, Visct. (Wilton)**

Eld. s. of the Earl of Normanton. B. 1818. Is a Deputy Lieut. of Wilts. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. **Sotheron, Thomas Henry Sutton. (Wiltshire, North)**

S. of the Member for Oxford University. B. 1801; m. d. and heiress of

**Admiral Sotheron.** Assumed the name of Sotheron on the death of his father-in-law in 1839, instead of that of Bucknall Estcourt. Capt. of the Devises troop of Yeomanry. **Spearman, Henry John.** (*Durham, city*)

A Liberal; pledged to support Lord John Russell's ministry, "entertaining perfect confidence in the men and hearty approbation of their measures;" is disposed to favour an extension of the suffrage, and "disclaims the finality" of the Reform Act. First returned for the city of Durham in 1847.—*Newton Hall, Durham*; *Thornely, Durham.*

**Spooner, Richard.** (*Warwicksh. North*)

S. of Isaac Spooner, esq., a banker and merchant in Birmingham B. at Birches Green, near Birmingham, 1783; m. in 1804, d. of the late Rev. Dr. Wetherell, Dean of Hereford, and Master of University College, Oxford. (Sister to Sir Charles Wetherell.) Was educated at Rugby. Is a banker. "Pledged to support Conservative principles, but no particular administration; decidedly against Sir R. Peel's currency views." Voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Will oppose the present Poor Law, and vote for a system of national education on Church of England principles. Is a Magistrate for the counties of Warwick, Worcester, and Stafford. Was elected in 1820 for Boroughbridge, but unseated on petition. Sat for Birmingham from 1844 to 1847; was then defeated at the general election, but returned for Warwicksh. **Stafford, Augustus.** (*Northamptonsh. North*)

Unsuccessfully contested Limerick in 1837. **Stanley, Edward.** (*Cumberland, West*)

A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy; will support the Navigation Laws. Has sat for the county since 1832.—*Carlton; Ponsonby-hall, Cumberland.*

**Stanley, Right Hon. Edward John. (Chesh. North)**

Eld. s. of Lord Stanley of Alderley. B. 1802 (twin with the Hon. William Owen Stanley); m. 1826, Hon. Henrietta Maria, eld. d. of the 18th Visct Dillon. Graduated at Christ Church, Oxford. Is a Deputy-Lieut. of Cheshire; was Under-Secretary of State for the Home Department from July to Nov., 1834; Secretary of the Treasury from April, 1835, to June, 1841; and Paymaster-General of the Forces from June to Sept., 1841. A Liberal; voted in favour of the ballot, but is opposed to the extension of the suffrage; voted against the repeal of the malt tax 1835. Represented Hendon in the parliament of 1831; sat for the northern division of Cheshire from 1832 to 1841; was defeated at the general election in that year, but again returned in 1847 without a contest.—2, *Grosvenor-cresc., Belgrave-sq.; Reform; Alderley Park, Chesh.*

**Stansfield, William Rookes Crompton. (Huddersfield)**

Assumed the name of Stansfield in compliance with the will of his mother, who inherited the property of her maternal uncle, Robt. Stansfield, esq., of Esholt. B. 1790; m. in 1824 d. of the late William Markham, esq., of Bacan, eld. s. of the late Archbishop of York. "A moderate Reformer, a supporter of Government measures in Ireland; favourable to the shortening of the duration of Parliaments, and to the ballot." **Stanton, William Henry. (Stroud)**

S. of the late William Stanton, esq. Woollen Manufacturer at Stroud. B. 1790; m. 1828, eld. d. of the late Roger Smith, esq. of Manor House, Walworth. A Whig. A Magistrate of the county of Gloucester. First elected for the borough in 1841.—4, *Albemarle-street; Reform; The Thrupp, Stroud; Stratford Cottage, Stroud.*

**Staunton, Sir George Thomas, bt., D. C. L., F. R. S. (Portsmouth)**

S. of Sir Geo. L. Staunton, who accompanied Lord Macartney to China. B. May 26, 1781. Was president of the Select Committee at Canton, and one of the royal commissioners of embassy to Peking in 1816. V. P. of Asiatic Society. Formerly thought the Reform Bill too extensive, but subsequently changed his opinion. Formerly voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws, but in 1846 supported their repeal. Moved Resolutions

in the House of Commons on the China trade in 1833. Supported the China war in 1840. Sat for Heytesbury in 1830 and 1831. Was elected for St. Michael's in 1818 and 1820. Sat for Hampsh. in the Parliament of 1832, but was defeated there in 1835. Elected for the borough in March, 1838, on the death of Mr. Bonham Carter, the late member. Translated the penal code of China. Is the author of pamphlets on our relations with China. ### Stephenson, Robert, F.R.S. (*Whitby*)

B. near Newcastle 1803; m. 1829, Frances, d. of John Sanderson, esq., merchant, of London (she died 1842). Was educated at Newcastle, and at the University of Edinburgh. Is well known as a railway engineer and a locomotive-manufacturer; was a leader in the narrow-gauge interest. Is engineer to the Birmingham, Midland, Eastern Counties, and numerous other railways. ### Strickland, Sir George, bart. (*Preston*)

A Reformer; advocate of the ballot, Church reform, of Dissenters being relieved from Church rates, and of shortening the duration of Parliaments; opposed to all monopolies. Sat for Yorksh. ### Strutt, Right Hon. Edward. (*Derby*)

Only s. of the late William Strutt, esq. of St. Helen's House, Derby. B. 1801; m. 1837, Miss Otter, d. of the late Bishop of Chichester. A barrister; a cotton manufacturer. Appointed Chief Commissioner of Railways, Sept. 1846. Is patron of 1 living. A Reformer; in favour of triennial Parliaments, revision of the pension list, the vote by ballot, &c. Has sat for Derby from 1830.—42, *South-st.; Athenæum and Reform Clubs; Kingston Hall, Notts; St. Helen's, Derbysh.*

### Stuart, Lord Dudley Coutts. (*Marylebone*)

S. of the 1st Marq. of Bute, by his 2nd wife, the 2nd d. of the late

Thomas-Coutts, esq. B. 1803; m. 1824, Christine Alexandrine Egypta, d. of Lucien Buonaparte, Prince of Canino (she died May, 1847). Graduated at Christ's Coll., Cambridge, M.A. 1823. A Deputy-Lieut. of Buteah. A Liberal; in favour of "progressive reform;" will "uphold local rights, and oppose every system of centralization;" is adverse to the present Poor Law, to the maintenance of any religious disabilities, and to all religious endowments. Is well known for his exertions on behalf of the exiled Poles. Sat for Arundel from 1830 to 1837, when he was defeated. First returned for Marylebone in 1847.—34, *St. James's-pl.; Reform.*

### Stuart, Henry. (*Bedford*)

Is grands. of the 3rd Earl of Bute, being the second s. of Archbishop (Stuart) of Armagh by Sophia, grandd. of the celebrated Wm. Penn. B. 1804. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. First returned for the borough in 1837, but was unseated on petition; was re-elected in 1841 and 1847.—18, *Hill-st.; Carlton; Tempasford Hall, Huntingdonsh.*

### Stuart, John. (*Newark*)

Is one of the leading counsel in the Court of Chancery; a Queen's counsel, by patent, dated March 1839. ### Sturt, Henry Gerard. (*Dorchester*)

A "moderate Conservative;" opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Church. ### Sutton, John Henry Manners. (*Newark*)

Eld. s. of the late Rev. Frederic Manners-Sutton, of Kelham, Notts, by

### Thompson, George. (*Tower Hamlets*)

Third s. of Thomas Thompson, esq., of Leicester. B. at Liverpool 1804; m. 1831, Anne Erskine, d. of the late Rev. Richard Spry. Entered as a student in Gray's Inn 1843. Is the accredited representative of the Emperor of Delhi; an East India proprietor. Is author of a volume of "Lectures in favour of the Amelioration of the Government of India." A Radical Reformer; in favour of the further extension of free trade, the ballot, short parliaments; and opposed to all endowments for ecclesiastical purposes. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Southampton in 1842. First returned for the Tower Hamlets in 1847.—128, *Sloane-st.*; *Reform and Free Trade Clubs.*

### Thompson, Thomas Perronet, F.R.S. (*Bradford*)

Eld. s. of Thomas Thompson, esq. (a banker at Hull, a local methodist preacher, and many years M.P. for Midhurst,) by the grandd. of the Rev. Vincent Perronet, Vicar of Shoreham, Kent, who eventually joined John Wesley. B. at Hull 1783; m. 1811, Ann Elizabeth, d. of the Rev. Thomas Barker, of York. Was educated at Hull Grammar School, and at Queens' Coll., Cambridge, where he graduated as seventh Wrangler in 1802, and obtained a Fellowship. Was a Midshipman in the Navy from 1803 till 1806, when he entered the Army as Lieut. in the 95th Rifle regiment, and was taken prisoner at Buenos Ayres in 1807; became a Lieut.-Col. in 1829. Was Governor of Sierra Leone from Aug., 1808, till June, 1810; interpreter and negotiator with the Wahabees at the Persian Gulf in 1819 and 1820. Negotiated the first treaty for the abolition of the slave trade in Sierra Leone. Is author of the "True Theory of Rent;" "A Catechism on the Corn Laws;" numerous articles in the Westminster Review from 1826 to 1835 (of which publication he was joint proprietor with Dr. Bowring); and several works on the "Mathematics of Music." A Radical Reformer; in favour of universal suffrage, and pledged to oppose all religious endowments. Represented Hull from 1835 till 1837. Was for some time Chairman of the Committee

**Taylor, Thomas Edward.** (*Dublin co.*)

Eld. s. of the Hon. and Rev. Edward Taylor, br. of the late Marq. of Headfort; b. 1812. A capt. in the Dragoon Guards. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. First returned for the co. in 1841.—*Carlton; Ardgillan Castle, co. Dublin.*

**Tenison, Edward King.** (*Leitrim*)

B. at Braclangwell 1806; is unm. Assumed the name of Verney, in lieu of his patronymic, in 1827, on inheriting the Verney estates. B. 1801; m. 1835, Eliza, d. of Admiral Sir George Hope, K.C.B., and grandd. of the 7th Lord Kinnaird. Has been a Capt. in the Grenadier Guards, and Major in the army. Was Major of the Bucks Militia from 1844 till 1846. Is patron of 3 livings, and a Deputy-Lieut. of Bucks. A Liberal; voted in favour of the ballot. Represented Buckingham from 1832 till 1841. First elected for Bedford in 1847.—*Travellers'; Claydon House, Bucks.*

Vesey, Hon. Thomas. (*Queen's co.*)

Eld. s. of Visct. de Vesci; b. 1808; m. in 1839, d. of 11th Earl of Pembroke. Is a Dep.-Lieut. of the Queen's co. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for the co. from 1835 till 1837; re-elected in 1841. Obtained mathematical honours at Oxford in 1825.—*White's, Travellers', Carlton; Abbey Leix, Queen's co.*

Villiers, Viscount. (*Cirencester*)

Eld. s. of the Earl of Jersey. B. 1808; m. in 1841, eld. d. of the Right Hon. Sir Robert Peel, Bart. (she was born in 1821.) Dep. Lieut. of Oxon. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for Rochester in 1830, for Minehead in 1831, and for Honiton from 1832 to 1835; unsuccessfully contested Weymouth in the latter year; was returned for that borough in 1841, but unseated on petition; first elected for Cirencester in 1844, when Mr. Master accepted the Chiltern Hundreds.—88, *Berkeley-st.*; *Carlton.*

Villiers, Hon. Charles Pelham. (*Lancash. South, also Wolverhampton*)

3rd s. of the late Hon. George Villiers, br. of the Earl of Clarendon. B. 1802. A Barrister; was one of the Commissioners of Inquiry into the operation of the Poor Laws. A Reformer, long known for his annual motions against the Corn Laws; in favour of the Ballot. Sat

**Vivian, John Ennis. (Truro)**

A Conservative; in favour of protection to agriculture. First returned for South Northamptonsh. in Feb. 1846.—*Carlton*; *Stoke, Bucks.*

**Vyvyan, Sir Richard Rawlinson, bart. (Helston)**

B. 1800. High Sheriff of Cornwall 1840-1; is patron of 2 livings; a Dep.-Lieut. of Cornwall. Sat for Bristol from 1825 till 1830, and from 1832 till 1837; for Oakhampton in 1831. First returned for Helston in 1841. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Is author of a pamphlet "On Solitary Confinement."—*St. Dunstan's Villa, Regent's Park*; *Carlton*; *Athenæum*; *Trelowarren, Cornwall.*

**Waddington, David. (Maldon)**

A merchant of Manchester, largely concerned in railway undertakings. Is Deputy Chairman of the Eastern Counties Railway, and formerly held a similar position on the Manchester and Birmingham line. Director of the Mercantile Life Assurance Company. A Conservative and Protectionist, opposed to the endowment of the Roman Catholic clergy. First elected for Maldon in 1847.—*Adelaide House, Enfield, Middlesex.*

**Waddington, Harry Spencer. (Suffolk, West)**

Half br. of Mr. de Horsey, formerly Member for Newcastle-under-Line, and uncle-in-law of Mr. Milnes, M.P. for Pontefract. M. d. of Rich. S. Milnes, esq. Contested this division of the co. in 1833; subsequently declined being put in nomination, but on the death of Mr. Hart Logan, was returned without opposition in 1838. **Wakley, Thomas. (*Finsbury*)**

S. of Henry Wakley, esq. of Membury, Devonshire. B. 1795; m. in 1820 youngest d. of Joseph Goodchild, esq. Is a Surgeon. First became known to the public as Editor of the "Lancet." Is one of the Coroners for the county of Middlesex. Contested the borough unsuccessfully in 1832; also in 1834, on the departure of Sir R. Grant for Bombay; was returned in 1835, and has sat for it since that date. A Radical Reformer.—85, *Bedford-sq*; *Reform Club*.

**Walker, Richard. (*Bury, Lancash.*)**

S. of William Walker, Esq. a merchant at Bury. B. 1784; m. in 1812, Anne, 2nd d. of John Scholes, Esq. Bury. An eminent iron-founder. Of Whig principles; a Radical Reformer. S. of Mr. John Walmsley, marble mason, by Elizabeth, d. of — Perry, Esq. B. at Liverpool, 1794; m. 1815, Adeline, d. of Hugh Mullenoux, Esq., of Liverpool. Educated at Holt Hill, Lancash. Is a corn-merchant at Liverpool, a magistrate for that bor. and for Lancash. Was Mayor of Liverpool in 1839-40. Patron of one living. A Liberal, opposed to all religious endowments. Unsuccessfully contested Liverpool in 1841. First returned for Leicester in 1847.—*Reform and Free Trade Clubs*; *Snibston, Leicestersh.*; *Liverpool.*

**Walpole, Spencer Horatio. (*Midhurst*)**

2nd s. of the late Thomas Walpole, esq., of Stagbury Park, Surrey, and Lady Margaret, youngest d. of the 2nd Earl of Egmont. B. 1806; m. in 1835, Isabella, 4th d. of the late Right Hon. Spencer Perceval. Was educated at Eton, and Trinity Coll., Cambridge, where he obtained the first English declamation prize, and the prize for the best essay on the character and conduct of William III. Was called to the bar by the Society of Lincoln's Inn in 1831. A Conservative; and in favour of protection to agriculture. First elected for Midhurst in 1843.—6, *Serie-st., Lincoln's Inn*; *Ealing, Middlesex.*



Walsh, Sir John Benn, bt. (*Radnorsh.*)

B. Dec. 1798. M. Nov. 9, 1825, the Lady Jane, youngest d. of Geo. Henry, 6th Earl of Stamford and Warrington. Is Lord Lieut. of Radnorsh. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Sat for Sudbury from 1830 to 1834; again elected in March, 1838, on the death of Lt.-Gen. Sir Edward Barnes, G.C.B., the late member; first returned for Radnorsh. in 1840.—28, *Berkeley-sq.*; *Ormathwaite, Cumberland*; *Warfield, Berks.*

Walter, John. (*Nottingham*)

Eld. s. of the late John Walter, esq., of Bearwood, Berks, (M.P. for that co. in two successive parliaments,) by his second wife, d. of Henry Smith, esq., of Eastling, Kent. B. in London 1818; m. 1842, Emily Frances, eld. d. of Major Henry Court, esq., of Castleman, Berks, (a Deputy Lieut. of that co.) Was educated at Eton; took honours at Exeter Coll., Oxford, where he graduated B.A. 1840, M.A. 1843. Was called to the Bar (Lincoln's Inn) 1847. Is patron of 1 living. Declared himself of the same political opinions as the late Mr. Walter, whose sentiments on the New Poor Law are well known; is opposed to the income tax, but not to a property tax levied equitably; is favourable to the financial policy of Sir R. Peel. Contested Nottingham unsuccessfully in 1843; but at the general election in 1847 was returned in his absence without canvass or solicitation, on the day of his father's death.—68, *Russell-sq.*; *Conservative Club*; *Bearwood, Berks.*

Ward, Henry George. (*Sheffield*)

Only s. of Robert Plumer Ward, esq. author of "The History of the Law of Nations," "Tremaine," "De Vere," &c.; who was at various periods a Lord of the Admiralty, Clerk of the Ordnance, and Auditor of the Civil List. M. 1824 Emily, 2nd d. of Sir John Swinburne, bt. Was Minister Plenipotentiary for acknowledging the Mexican Republic. Appointed Secretary to the Admiralty, July 1846. Is proprietor of the "Weekly Chronicle" newspaper, and has taken an active share in railway enterprise. In 1835 he avowed himself in favour of the ballot, triennial Parliaments, and household suffrage. He distinguished himself in 1834, by a motion on the Irish Church, which was the proximate cause of the new organization of the government that ensued. Sat for from 1832 to 1837, since which date he has sat for Sheffield.—*Admiralty*; *St. Alban's Athenæum and Reform Clubs*; *Gilston Park, Herts.*

Watkins, John Lloyd Vaughan. (*Brecknock*)

Eld. surviving s. of the late Rev. Thomas Watkins, of Pennoyre, Brecknocksh., by the only d. of Richard Vaughan, esq., of Shenfield, Essex, and Golden Grove, Carmarthensh. B. at Pennoyre, 1802; m. 1833, Sophia Louisa Henrietta, third d. of the late Sir George Pocock, bart. Educated at Harrow, and at Christ Church Oxford. Appointed

Lord-Lieut. of Brecknocksh. in 1847. Patron of 8 livings. A Liberal; willing to abolish the game laws; in favour of free trade, but, when formerly in parliament, supported a protecting duty on foreign corn, and was pledged to the repeal of the malt tax, vote by ballot, and triennial parliaments. Sat for Brecknock from 1832 to 1835; again returned in 1841.—*Athenæum*; *Pennoyre, Brecknocksh.*

**Wawn, John Twizell. (*South Shields*)**

S. of Christopher Wawn, esq., and grands. of John Twizell, esq., of West Boldon. B. 1801; m. 1st d. of N. Horn, esq.; 2ndly, d. of William Matterson, esq. Is a magistrate of Durham. "A Liberal-Whig." Has sat for South Shields since 1841.—*Boldon, co. Durham.*

**Welby, Glynne Earle. (*Grantham*)**

Eld. s. of Sir W. E. Welby, Bart. of Denton House, Grantham, who is patron of 5 livings; b. 1806; m. 1828 Frances, 2nd d. of the late Sir Montague Cholmeley, Bt. Was educated at Rugby. A Capt. in the Royal South Lincoln militia; a Deputy Lieut. of Lincolnsh. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Has sat for the borough since 1880.—8, *Upper Belgrave-st.; Carlton.*

**Wellesley, Lord Charles. (*Hampshire, South*)**

2nd s. of the Duke of Wellington; b. 1808; m. in 1844 only d. of the Rt. Hon. Henry Manvers Pierrepont. Has been Chief Equerry and Clerk Marshal to the Queen; resigned, July 1846. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. First returned for the county on the retirement of Mr. Fleming in 1842.—*Apsley House; Carlton.*

**West, Frederick Richard. (*Denbigh dist.*)**

Eld. s. of the Hon. Frederick West, of Ruthin Castle, by his 2nd wife, the d. and co heir of Richard Myddleton, esq., of Chirk Castle, Denbighsh. Is grands. of the 2nd Earl De-la-Warr. B. in London, 1799; m. 1st, 1820, Lady Georgiana, 3rd d. of the 5th Earl of Chesterfield; 2ndly, 1827, Theresa, only d. of the late Capt. John Whitby, R.N., of Creswell Hall, Staffordsh. Educated at Eton, and at Christ Church Oxford. A Magistrate for Denbighsh. and a Deputy-Lieut. of Hants, Director of the Shrewsbury and Chester Railway. A "Liberal Conservative," willing to support Lord John Russell's ministry. Elected for Denbigh in 1826; sat for East Grinstead from 1830 till it was disfranchised under the Reform Act; was then out of parliament till 1847, when he was returned for Denbigh dist.—*Boodle's; Carlton; Home-wood House, Lymington, Hants; Ruthin Castle, North Wales.*

**Westenra, Hon. John Craven. (*King's co.*)**

Second surviving s. of 2d Lord Rossmore; b. 1798; m. 1st 1834 Eleanor Mary, widow of Sir Gilbert East, bt., and aunt of Sir William H. Jolliffe, bt. (she died 1838); 2ndly 1842, Ann, d. of the late Lewis Charles Daubuz, esq., of Truro, Cornwall. A Lt.-Col. in the Army, and was Capt.

in the Scots' Fusilier Guards, from which he retired in 1843; steward of the Turf Club in Ireland. A Reformer. Unsuccessfully contested the co. in 1831.—*Reform Club; The Lodge, Berks; Sharavogue Castle, King's co.*

### Westhead, Joshua Proctor. (*Knaresborough*)

Eld. s. of Edward Westhead, Esq., of Manchester, and nephew of the late John Brown, Esq., of Lea Castle, Worcestersh., formerly high sheriff for Worcestersh., whose estates he inherits. B. at Manchester, 1807; m. 1828, Betsy, third d. of G. R. Chappell, Esq., Alderman of Manchester. Was educated at the Manchester and Congleton Grammar Schools. Is a merchant; Dep.-Chairman of the Shropsh. Union Canal and Railway Co.; Director of the London and North-Western, Manchester, Buxton, and Matlock Railways. Published, in 1839, a "Letter to Sir Robert Peel, Bart.," condemnatory of the Corn Laws. A Liberal, opposed to all religious endowments out of the national revenue. First returned for Knaresborough in 1847.—1, *Chester-terr., Regent's-pk.; Lea Castle, Wolverley, Worcestersh.*

### Whitmore, Thomas Charlton. (*Bridgenorth*)

S. of the late member, Mr. Thomas Whitmore; b. 1807; m. 1833, Lady Louisa Anne, eld. d. of the 5th Marq. of Queensberry. Is patron of 6 livings. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Has sat for the borough since 1832.—*Carlton; Apley Park, Salop.*

### Willcox, Brodie Mc Ghie. (*Southampton*)

B. 1785; m. 1812, Sophia, d. of the late Benjamin Vander Gucht, es. of Brook-st. A Ship-owner; a managing Director of the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Comp.; and Director of the Southampton Docks. A Liberal; favourable to the substitution of direct for indirect taxation, and opposed to the application of any part of the public funds to religious endowments. First returned for Southampton in 1847 without opposition.—24, *Dorset-sq.; Reform.*

### Williams, John. (*Macclesfield*)

A member of the Marylebone vestry. Declared himself in favour of universal suffrage and the other "points of the People's Charter." First returned for Macclesfield in 1847.—*Regent's Circus, Oxford-st.*

### Williams, Thomas Peers. (*Marlow, Great*)

Eld. s. of the late Owen Williams, Esq. of Temple House, M.P. for Marlow from 1796 to 1832, by Margaret, sister of the present Lord Dinorben. B. 1795. Is patron of 1 living. A Capt. in the Royal Anglesey infantry militia. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846; voted against the Reform Bill, but was a frequent opponent of the Liverpool and the Wellington Administrations. Has sat for Marlow uninterruptedly since 1820.—41, *Berkeley sq.; Carlton; Temple House, Berks.; Craig y Don, Anglesey.*

**Willoughby, Sir Henry Pollard. (*Evesham*)**

Second s. of the late Sir Christopher Willoughby, bart., by his 2nd wife, d. of the late Maurice Evans, esq. B. 1796. A Deputy-Lieut. of Oxfordsh.; patron of 1 living. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade; when previously in Parliament, voted for the Reform Bill. Sat for Yarmouth, Isle of Wight, on the Reform interest in 1831; represented Newcastle-under-Lyme from 1832 to 1835; was an unsuccessful candidate for Poole on the Conservative interest in 1837, and also contested Northampton without success in 1841. First returned for Evesham in 1847.—*Baldon House, Oxfordsh.; Berwick Lodge, Gloucestersh.*

**Wilson, James. (*Westbury*)**

S. of the late William Wilson, esq., of Hawick House, Roxburghsh., and bro. to Walter Wilson, esq., of Oxehand House, in the same co. B. at Hawick 1805; m. 1832, Elizabeth, d. of Mr. Preston, of Newcastle-on-Tyne. Published in 1839 "Influences of the Corn Laws;" in 1840 "Fluctuations of Currency, Commerce, and Manufactures;" in 1841 "The Revenue; or, What should the Chancellor do?" in 1847 "Capital, Currency, and Banking." Is Editor of the "Economist" newspaper. A Liberal; is adverse to religious endowments. First elected for Westbury in 1847.—15, *Hertford st., Mayfair; Reform, Free Trade, and Coventry Clubs; Fontainville, Westbury, Wilts.*

**Wilson, Matthew, jun. (*Clitheroe*)**

Eld. s. of Matthew Wilson, esq., of Eshton Hall, Yorksh., by his cousin, d. of the late Matthew Wilson, esq., of Eshton Hall. B. at Eshton 1802; m. 1826, Sophia Louisa Emerson, only d. and heir of Sir Wharton Amcotts, bart., of Kettlethorpe, Lincolnsh. (she died 1833.) Educated at Harrow; was a Gentleman-commoner of Brasenose Coll., Oxford. Is a magistrate and Dep.-Lieut. of the West Riding of Yorksh., and a magistrate of Lancash.; Chairman of the Wharfedale Railway Company. A Whig; in favour of household suffrage and vote by ballot. Was elected for Clitheroe in 1841 by a majority of 75, but was unseated on petition by Mr. Cardwell; re-elected in 1847 without opposition.—*Athenæum; Reform; Eshton Hall, Skipton, Yorksh.*

**Wodehouse, Edmond. (*Norfolk, East*)**

A cousin of Lord Wodehouse and Earl Cawdor. M. 1809 his cousin Lucy, d. of the Rev. Philip Wodehouse. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Is Patron of 1 living, and Dep.-Lieut. of the county. Sat for the county from 1817 till 1830, and for the Eastern division since 1835.—*Braydonate Hill, Norwich; Sennowe, Norfolk.*

**Wood, Right Hon. Sir Charles, Bart. (*Halifax*)**

Eld. s. of the late Sir Francis Lindley Wood, bt. B. 1800; m. 1829. Mary, 9th child of 2d Earl Grey. Was private secretary to the Earl, but succeeded Mr. Ellice as Secretary to the Treasury in 1832; and retained that office till Nov. 1834. Secretary to the Admiralty from

April, 1835, to September, 1839. Appointed Chancellor of the Exchequer, July 1846; salary £5000. Formerly voted against the abolition of the Corn Laws, but in 1846 supported their repeal. Is patron of livings. Sat for the semi-disfranchised borough of Great Grimsby from 1826 to 1831, when he was elected for Warcham. Has sat for the borough since 1832.—84, *Eaton sq.*; *Reform Club*; *Hickleton-hall, Yorksh.*

### Wood, William Page. (*Oxford city*)

Second s. of the late Alderman Sir Matthew Wood, bart., by the d. of John Page, esq., of Woodbridge, Suffolk. B. 1801; m. 1830, Charlotte, only d. of Edward Moore, esq., of Great Bealings, Suffolk. Formerly Fellow of Trinity Coll., Cambridge, where he took a Wrangler's degree in 1824. Was called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn in 1827, and is a Queen's Counsel. A Liberal. First returned for Oxford in 1847 without opposition.—12, *Great George-st., Westminster*; 2, *Stone-buildings, Lincoln's Inn.*

### Worcester, Marq. of. (*Gloucestersh. East*)

Eld. s. of the Duke of Beaufort. B. at Paris 1824; m. in 1845, Lady Georgiana Charlotte, d. of 1st Earl Howe. Was educated at Eton. Became Lieut. 1st Life Guards in 1843; appointed Aid-de-camp to the Commander-in-Chief Aug. 1842. A Conservative; "a strong Protectionist." First returned for East Gloucestersh. Feb. 1846, without opposition.—27, *Berkeley-sq.*; *White's, Boodle's.*

### Wortley, Rt. Hon. James Archibald Stuart. (*Butesh.*)

Third s. of 1st Lord Wharnccliffe; b. 1805, m. 1846, only d. of the 1st Baron Wenlock. Graduated at Cambridge; called to the bar by the Inner Temple, 1831, and went the Northern Circuit; became a Queen's Counsel, and was Judge-Advocate-General from Jan. till July 1846. Is a deputy-lieut. of Bute. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for Halifax in the Parliament of 1835; but unsuccessfully contested that bor. in 1832 and 1837. Has sat for Butesh. since 1842.—*Twysden Building, Temple*; 29, *Berkeley-sq.*; *Carlton, Travellers'.*

### Wrightson, William Battie. (*Northallerton*)

Eld. s. of Wm. Wrightson, esq., of Cusworth, (who was formerly member both for Aylesbury and Downton,) and of Henrietta, 2nd d. of Richard Cooper, esq. of Marton, Yorksh., uncle of Bishop Heber. B. 1789; m. in 1821, Georgiana, d. of Inigo Thomas, esq., of Rotton, Sussex. Is patron of livings. Was brought up to the bar; has acted as one of the Commissioners of Inquiry into the State of the Poor of Ireland. Of old Whig principles; is opposed to the extension of household suffrage, triennial Parliaments, the ballot. Was returned for East Retford in 1826; unseated on petition in 1827; sat for Hull in 1830 and 1831; failed at Northallerton in 1832; but was returned without opposition in 1835.—22, *Upper Brook-st.*; *Brookes's, Boodle's*; *Cusworth, Yorksh.*

Wyld, James. (*Bodmin*)

Descended from the Wylds, of Worcestersh. and Notts. B. at the Old Manor House, Surrey, 1812; m. 1838, the only d. and heiress of the late John Hester, esq. Educated on the Continent. Is well known as a mapseller at Charing-cross; Geographer to the Queen, &c. Author of some geographical, astronomical, and statistical works. Director of several mining companies. Has received the gold medal of the Prussian Order for scientific merit. Is "neither Whig, Tory, nor Radical;" is opposed to the Poor Law, to the income tax, and to the endowment of the Roman Catholic Clergy. First elected for Bodmin in 1847.—*Charing-cross East; 8, Park Village West, Regent's Park; Conservative Club.*

Wynn, Rt. Hon. Cha. Watkin Williams, D.C.L., F.S.A. (*Montgomerysh.*)

B. 1776; m. 1806, Mary, eldest d. of Sir Foster Cunliffe, bart. Patron of 2 livings, Steward of Denhigh, a Metropolitan Commissioner of Lunacy, a Commissioner of the Church and Corporation Land Tax, and was President of the Board of Control from 1822 to 1828, when he was replaced by Lord Ellenborough; again came into office under the Grey Administration, as Secretary at War, but objecting to the extent of the Reform Bill, he resigned soon after it was laid before the House, he not having previously been made acquainted with its provisions. Was Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster from Dec. 1834 till April 1835. Has devoted much time to the study of the law of Parliament, the precedents of its proceedings, &c. A Conservative, but in favour of free trade. Sat for Old Sarum in 1796; has sat for the county since 1797.—20, *Grafton-st.; Athenæum; Llangedwin, Salop.*

Wynn, Sir Watkin Williams, bart. (*Denbighsh.*)

B. 1820; is patron of 6 livings; an Officer in the Guards. A Conservative; voted for agricultural protection, 1846. Is Steward of one of Her Majesty's manorial courts in Denbighshire. First returned for the co. in 1841.—*St. James's-sq.; Carlton; Wynnstay, Denbighshire.*

Wyvill, Marmaduke, jun. (*Richmond*)

Eld. s. of Marmaduke Wyvill, esq., of Constable-Burton, Yorksh., by the d. of Richard Slater Milnes, esq., of Fryston, Yorksh. B. 1815; m. 1845, Laura, only d. of the late Sir Charles Ibbetson, bart., of Denton Park, Yorksh. Graduated A.B. at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, in 1839. Appointed a Dep.-Lieut. of Yorksh. in 1845. A Liberal. First returned for Richmond in 1847, without opposition.—*Oxford and Cambridge Club; Constable-Burton, Yorksh.*

Yorke, Hon. Eliot Thomas. (*Cambridgesh.*)

Third s. of the late Adm. Sir Joseph Yorke, and br. to Earl of Hard-

wicke. Was raised to the rank of an Earl's son in 1836. B. 1802. 1838, Emily Anne Millicent, only d. of Emilius Henry Delmé Radc esq., of Belmont, Hants. Graduated at St. John's Coll., Cambridge; called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn 1832. A Conservative; voted agricultural protection, 1846; is in favour of the present Poor Laws; opposed to the removal of Jewish disabilities.—15, *Wilton-pl. Churchyard-st., Temple.*

### Yorke, Henry Galgacas Redhead. (*York city*)

S. of the late Henry Redhead Yorke, esq., a well-known political writer; m. d. of the late Lord Brandon. Is "a moderate Reform when moderation is sufficient; a decided Reformer, when decision better; a radical Reformer, when radicalism is best; but, above things, an uncompromising friend of the people." Has sat for York since 1841.—18, *Eaton-square; Brookes's, Reform, Oxford and Cambridge Clubs; Tulbick-hall, Lincolnshire.*

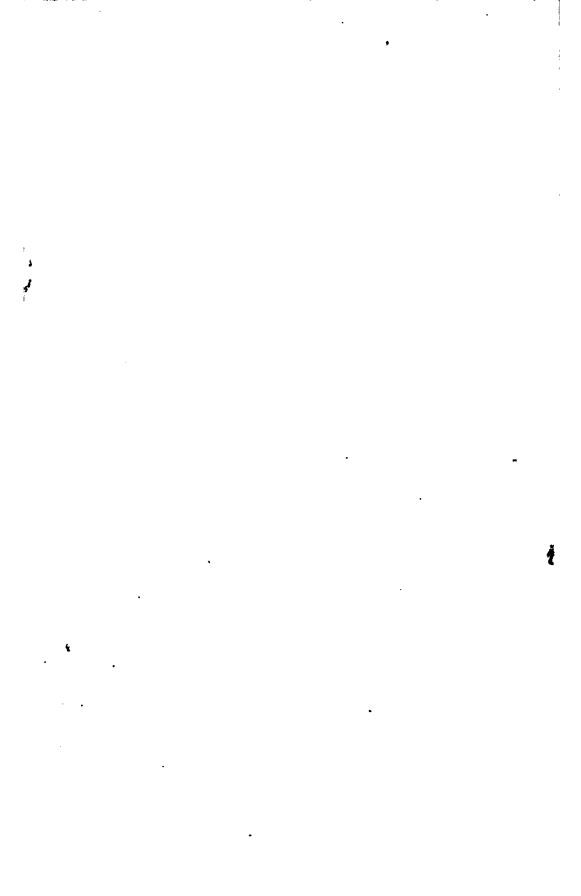
### Young, John. (*Cavan co.*)

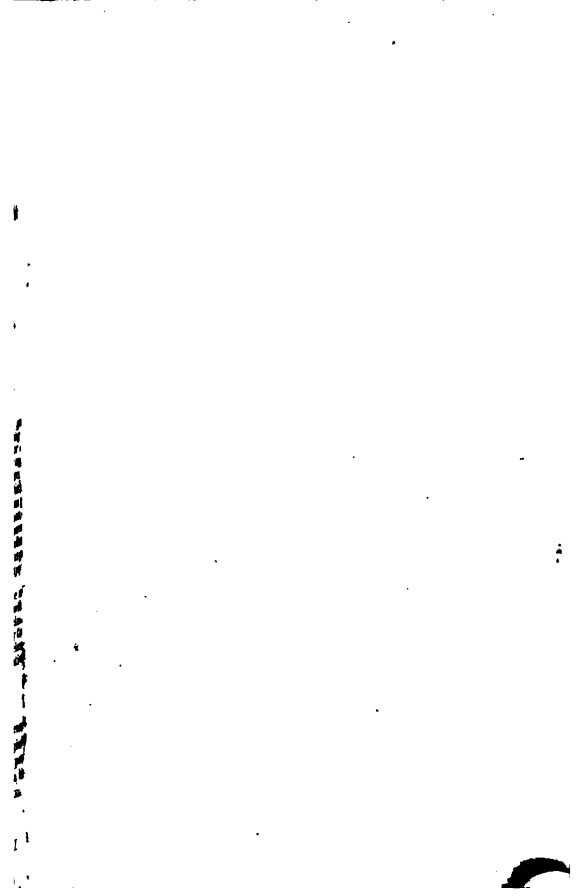

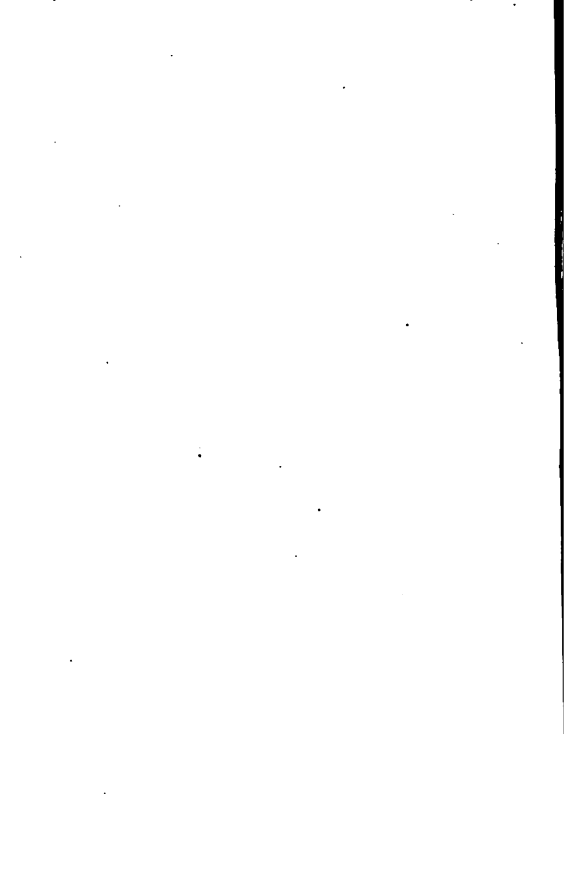
