The Boston Female Anti Slavery Society resolved at a recent meeting - to endeavour to circulate petitions for the abolition of Slavery in the District of Columbia among the women of every town in Massachusetts -

I have sent petitions to nearly all the towns in Franklin County - and as I know of no lady in the town of Leyden - to whom I can send one - I would beg you, sir, to put the enclosed

Letter in I send the letters which you so kindly offered to forward if their several destinations I hope ^{they will excite} you ~~will be~~ ^{no material inconvenience} - if any offered expense is incurred ~~of which you need be~~ ^{averse to let me know that I may know} I hope you will let me know the amount - that I may ~~discharge it~~ ^{repay it} ~~promptly~~ ^{promptly} I as I ~~am~~ shall be glad to render a good account of my labours for the Society in those behalf I act - I ~~shall be~~ ^{shall be} glad to have the Petitions when signed sent to me as they can be ^{forwarded} ~~sent~~ to the Washington as easily from Boston - or from the several towns or from Greenfield. If you ~~have any different books~~ should prefer their being sent from Greenfield I defer of course I have requested the ladies to whom I have written to - send the petitions to Col. Ansel P. Bookstore Greenfield - to your address - & if you trusting to your offered kindness to collect

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send them to 48 Washington Street Boston
directed to Miss Weston - I suppose the best letter
to send is an early letter in the season
I have written to only one lady in each

Town - though you gave me two names
for many towns. I don't know whether
you thought ^{possibly} the location of Vicesyes &
