At the Autumnal Unitarian Conference held at Worcester, Massachusetts, October, 1842, the following resolution was offered by Rev. Samuel May of Leicester:

~~We do~~ Whereas, There exists in ~~this~~ land, and among professed Christians of all denominations, an institution which systematically defrauds millions of our fellowmen of all their rights as men, dooms them to a life of ignorance and of unrequited toil, and ~~sub~~ demoralises and corrupts all connected with it; and

Whereas, It is now boldly proclaimed, and by an increasing number, that the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ warrants & sanctions ~~that~~ ~~not~~ the existence of that institution among us; therefore

Resolved, That as ministers & disciples of Jesus Christ, we feel bound to declare our solemn opinion that the institution of Slavery is radically and inherently opposite to his religion; - that it ought to be immediately abandoned by all who profess to be Christians; and that we do affectionately admonish and entreat all who hold the like precious faith with us to free themselves from the guilt of sustaining this evil thing.
