"It is perhaps not easy now to understand all that was involved in this early adherence to the cause of Anti-Slavery in America. <sup>Ev. Ed. of Standard</sup> Every inducement of a social & worldly nature tended in the strongest manner to dissuade one, in Mrs. Chapman's position, from giving it the least attention. But, in her case, there was neither doubt nor hesitation. She saw the justice, righteousness, & necessity of the movement, and at once became its friend and helper; though she could not fail to know that it had nothing of worldly reward to offer, but, on the contrary, a share in the opprobrium and <sup>even insult</sup> neglect which, to the disgrace of American religion and society, have attended every attempt to enlighten the public mind, and induce public action against the unpeepable crimes and wrong of slavery."
