Stores at that place & demand them to place under your charge
& secure all such Convey's & articles belonging to their res-
pective departments as may be found directly within their reach
or power and advance with as further delay to Cincinnati taking
every possible precaution to guard against accident or surprise
for nothing can stand that the enemy were repulsed with loss &
disgrace in their assault upon Fort Recovery they easily may

will send a report upon our escort's &c they will tell you all about
our self their Guard. Should you make any discoveries of a large
body of Indians you will immediately Dispatch an express returning
the news that they are occurring in order that I may reinforce you or
call off the retreat as circumstances may be in the interior I have

Horses and pack horses to be fed and watered on the beatings
of the road and the teams will be truck parted and loaded for which
there will be 30 minutes allotted - when the assembly will beat the
troops will immediately form and the Wagons and pack Horses will
swing out - upon beating a march the whole will advance - should an
accident happen so as to stop any of the Wagons or pack horses the
other pack horses and wagons shall pass them immediately so as not
to break the lines of march nor shall any opening or interval be left
between the wagons & pack horses other than is barely sufficient
to move; these wagons & pack horses to which accidents may occasionally

Provision Returns for the Mounted Voltineteers from West Virginia shall be signed by the Officers Commanding Corps or Detachments who shall note the Name and Number of Rations Drawn by each individual and Return an act of the same to the persons who shall be appointed paymaster to the Corps whose Duty it Shall be to Register Such Returns in such form as may enable him to detect individually the act of the Corps Charging them with the Rations at the price established by the Contractor's at the Posts where the Issues are made The Contractors will issue upon all such Returns keeping an act of the Issues given to the respective Corps or Detachments and Shall Distinguish the same in the General abstract of Issues at each post or placed to the Acting Adjutant General or other officer of the Legion who Shall Furnish all provided in Returns and Certify the abstracts whereof Shall upon such abstract Report to the pay master General of the Legion the true account of issues made to the respective Corps of mounted Voltineteers and Shall file with him the Returns in which such issues are made -

The pay master General of the Legion Shall charge the Department
for the sum of £11 . 10s per month for him & the Pay Master by
Contract & deduct the amount thereof out of the pay that may be due
to each Corp's & the balance that may appear Due he Shall pay into
the hands of Such person as may be appointed pay master to Such Corps
the sum account to the individuals for the Balance of pay Due to

The Board of Officers that was ordered for settling the rank of Officers having thought it too delicate a thing for them to settle their own Rank wish the General Officers to do it. The Brigadier Generals Todd and Darbee will therefore proceed to that business without delay.

A Trumpeter will constantly attend the Officer of the Day who will order Signals for the parades and dismissing the Troops and one other will attend the Adjutant General.

When the Horses are unsaddled three Blasts on the Horn or Trumpet will be a Signal for gathering up and settling three more for Counting and forming and a Single Blast for moving on when on a March two Blasts for a Halt, a Single Blast for moving on. When the Army is halted three Blasts with short interval is a Signal to attend for Orders. When in Camp or on a March three Blasts will be a Signal to prepare for action. When every Officer and Men is instantly to be in his proper place, the Officer of the Day will make report to the General in writing immediately after being relieved. The Spies and Rides will parade on their own Ground when the Army parades for action otherwise and wait for Orders.

The Genl approves the Sentences of the Court Martial whereof Major Whitaker was president, but is extremely distressed to see a Volunteer receive corporal punishment particularly those under good character of which those ordered punishment are. The Genl therefore has been pleased to pardon both Andrew L. Price and J. H. Dream upon a full conviction that it will be a sufficient warning not only to them but to the whole Corps as they may rest assured that no indulgence of this kind need be expected in future.

The Genl positively forbids the Troops swimming in the River or passing it to the Cornfield opposite the Garrison under pain of the sentence of a Court Martial for disobedience of orders.

The Troops will forgoe during there stay at this place on this side of the River in parties not less than ten men with their arms who are forbid burning the Indian nests.

The Court Martial whereof Major Whitaker was president is dissolved. A Genl Court Martial will set this Day for the Trial of Capt William Rogers charged by Major Whitaker for behaving in an ungentlemanly like manner and contrary to orders.

Proceedings of yesterday's Court Martial

At a General Court Martial whereof Major Whitaker is president & under written witness number, The following prisoners were tried on the charges exhibited against them.

(Here follows the list of prisoners and numbers of the Court Martial.)

Jacob Allison of Capt Francisco's Company of Kentucky
Volunteers Confined by Capt Bartlett for being asleep whilst on
his post as a sentinel on the night of the 23 July 1794. the
Court judged the prisoner for want Procuration and for his not being
legally confined. Andrew Norrow of Capt Colvins Company confined by
Mjr Genl Scotts order for abusive language to him and being on the
6th of August 1794 - the prisoner pleaded guilty & only offers
in his own defense that Intoxicacion Deprived him so far of his
sense that he did not know Mjr Genl Scott from any other person.

The Court are conscious of the Gravity of Norrows offense and in
well Convinct it Deserves very exemplary Punishment but from the
excellent Character they have Received of him as a peaceable
citizen & good faithful Soldier They only Sentence him to Receive
25 Lashes.

Simon Brown of Capt Henry Bartletts company Confined by Capt
Harron Harrison of sd Co for Refusing to mount Guard on the 9th of
August 1794 when Legitimately warned for that Duty - Srgt Harrison being
Daily sworn declared that the prisoner swore positively he would not
mount Guard on the 9 instant altho he gave him Regular warning of being
his just tour & that he also swore he did not care whether he put
him under guard or no.

The Court find Simon Brown Guilty & Sentence him Receive
twenty five lashes.



The Court Martial of Colt Major Russell not according to Regulations to try Supt Ross and others that may be Brought before them.

Ensign Samuel Shepherd of Capt Lindsey's Company being accused of neglect of duty and conniving at Willcocks in the Country &c and not endeavering to apprehend a Thief when stealing The Contractors Horse he being placed there as an officer for that purpose on the Night of the 7th Inst. - Pleads not Guilty -

The Court are of Opinion that Ensign Shepherd was Guilty of neglect (of duty) on the night of the 7 Inst but as no other post charge Impeached against him and sentence him to receive a flogging from Collydr Genl Todd in front of Capt Lindsey's Company 1000 yards for 10 pounds

Supt. 19: 1794

The Court Martial whereof Mr Russell is President are sitting in Court and proceeded to Business

Adjt Surg Lee of Dr G. Macfie's Company being accused of Negligency in leaving his post on the 20th of August 1794 at the Correspondent of the action that day - Pleads not Guilty -

The Court unanimously find Major Von Guillet of the Company guilty of the charge exhibited against him and sentence him to be dishonored & dismissed from the Service of the United States that His Crime and place of abode, & misbehavior to be published in the Western Chronicle at Cincinnati and Lexington Gazette after which it shall be deemed scandalous for any officer to associate with him. This sentence shall also be read in front of each Battalion by their respective Adjutants.

John Brown private in Capt. Mindsay's Company charged with leaving his guard on the 18th of August 1794 after the battle without permission & not joining it until in the hollow. Major Guillet guilty --

Joseph Dyer private in Capt. Mindsay Company charged with leaving his Company and going to Fort Deposit without leave after the action of the 20 of August 1794 and not joining it till the 22. Major Guillet guilty

The Court finds John Brown guilty of the charge exhibited against him and sentence him to receive five lashes.

The Court also find Joseph Dyer guilty of the charge exhibited against him and sentence him to be reprimanded by the Major of his Battalion on publick parade first time the Company to which he belongs meets.

The Mounted Volunteers under your Command being anxious to return to Kentucky I deem it expedient to comply with their wishes that the Cavalry please to take up your line of march this afternoon or to tomorrow morning for Fort Washington where the Field Corps are to be mustered by Capt Edward Butler who is despatched to be very particular in the case of our forces and not to muster any man who is not present except there an affidavit is made by the officer commanding the Company and a certificate from the Doctor or Surgeon of the Corps to which the recruit belongs that he is left behind at some one of our Garrisons on the west side of the Ohio river or indeed.

Your Command will be allowed Seven days exclusive of this day to march to Fort Washington Three days to muster & three days more to Kentucky say fourteen days in toto this day inclusive at the expiration of which term you will discharge your Corps but it is to be clearly understood that they are to continue under your Command & to receive and obey your orders for and during that period.

Permit me now with great pleasure to return my most cordial thanks to Genl Todd and General Burnside to the Field and other officers

and Privates Enrolled in the Mounted volunteers of Kentucky for their
Good and Soldierly Conduct during the time for which they have been
in Service.
