


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Welcome to the next **Level**





Two first-time productions were mounted. The first was the gripping "Break Away" by visiting African American Professor, Leslie Sloan. It is the story of three women in a prison cell and their life stories. Freshman, Mindi Miller said, "I seldom cry during a performance, but 'Break Away' really got to me."

Perhaps the climax of the season was the first production of Marsia Lee Master's poetry in "Over a Glass of Wine". Playwright Rita Kohn and Director Bernard Wurger collaborated and created a beautiful and fragile piece. Ms. Masters, daughter of Edgar Lee Masters, is seen in five eras of her life, each represented by a different actress. Cynthia Fortune (Marcia at 20) commented, "I have really enjoyed working on this piece. It is an exercise in classical verse." Ms. Masters attended the opening night and gave cast and crew words of encouragement.


Saturday concluded Spring Weekend with the Delts hosting their annual all-campus Trik-La Tron events and a showing of the movie "Aladdin" under the tent.

For its members, the marching band provided not only a place to perform, but also an opportunity to develop leadership skills. Being named drum major or section leader gave members the opportunity to strengthen their leadership skills.



The year proved to be another success for the women as members won awards both collectively and individually. A great recognition was the honor of receiving the highest grades for a sorority for both semesters.






An incomplete pass leaves the ball on the loose, while a dedicated B.U. player stretches to reach it before his opponent.






The 1993 MCC Conference Championship Meet was held at La Salle University in Philadelphia at the end of February. It was what the swimmers concentrated on the entire season.



In addition to completing a winning season, several individuals were recognized as well. Junior Donnie Shea was named Most Valuable Player, freshman Frank LaRusso received the Mental Attitude Award, and freshman Craig Kahoun was the recipient of Butlers' Outstanding Freshman Male Athlete of the Year award. The Butler Lacrosse team had an excellent season and they will continue to excel as the years go by.









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
