The various establishments in Dundee, for the behoof and instruction of Poor Children, are,—

1st, Henderson's Mortification, under the patronage of the Magistrates, Ministers, and Town Clerk, from which thirty boys and girls receive Education.

2d, Guthrie's Mortification, under the patronage of the Magistrates and Kirk Session, from which twenty-four boys receive yearly for maintenance and education, £3 6s. 8d. each, and eight boys are educated, but receive nothing for maintenance.

3d, Brown's Mortification, under the patronage of the Magistrates and Kirk Session, from which twenty-seven boys and girls of the name of Brown receive yearly £6 each, for maintenance and education, except in the case of two of the same family being elected, when they receive something less.

4th, Roger's Mortification, under the patronage of the Kirk Session, from which seven boys are educated, and receive yearly £4, two pair of shoes, one pair of stockings, three shirts, one neckcloth, and one suit of clothes each.

5th, Stephen's Mortification, under the patronage of the Provost of Dundee, the Minister of the Murraygate district, and the Lairds of Dunnichen and Blackness; from which seven boys of the name of Stephen receive yearly £8 each.

6th, Ferguson's Mortification, under the patronage of Mr Graham of Fintry, Mr Graham of Balmuir, and the Provost of Dundee, from which two boys receive £8 each.

7th, White's Mortification, under the patronage of Messrs. James Jobson, John Jobson, David Jobson, jun. and Andrew Pitcairn, from which twenty-two boys and girls receive yearly from £4 to £6 each, for maintenance and education.

8th, £100, mortified by Misses Graham, under the patronage of the Kirk Session, the interest of which is applied for the maintenance and education of one poor girl.

9th, £6000, mortified by James Webster, Esq. of London, for the education of boys and girls, from which no less than one hundred are educated.

10th, Clark's Mortification, under the patronage of Mr Clark of Pennycook, from which two boys receive yearly £8.

11th, Bruce's Mortification, under the patronage of the Provost, Dean of Guild, the three first Ministers, and the Rector of the Grammar School, from which one boy receives yearly £8 6s. 8d. for maintenance and education.

12th, Constable's Mortification, under the patronage of the Provost, Dean of Guild, and Minister of the Parish, from which fourteen boys receive £8 yearly for education, for four years.

Besides these, the Kirk Session pay the School Fees of Children of poor parents, for two years: the number of these in general is from 50 to 60; making a total of 287—independent of the Orphan Institution, where nearly twenty children are boarded and educated...

JUSTICE OF PEACE, OR SMALL DEBT COURT, FOR SUMS NOT
EXCEEDING £.5, EXCLUSIVE OF COSTS.

The Dundee District—comprehending the parishes of Dundee, Mains and Strathmartine, Monikie, Monifieth, Murroes, Barry, Panbride, Auchterhouse, Tealing, Liff and Benvie—meet within the Town-Hall of Dundee, every Monday fortnight, at eleven o'clock forenoon. The acting Justices of the Peace are Judges, and any two of them form a quorum.

The parties are heard *viva voce*, either by themselves or any one in the family; but no practitioner of the law is allowed to plead. The Court cannot sustain actions for spiritous liquors; nor any debt for rent upon a tack or lease, or real contract, where the written titles can or may come to be brought in question; nor to any heritable or moveable question where there is a regular deed; nor for gambling debts. Six days after sentence is pronounced, the decret can be put in force by poinding or imprisonment, when parties are present in Court; but in the case of a decree in absence, a charge of six free days must take place before putting the sentence in force. The sentence is not subject to advocacy, suspension, or any other stay of execution, except when the Justices exceed their powers—in which case the cause must be brought in the shape of a reduction before the Supreme Court; and the party bringing it must find sufficient caution for all expences that may be awarded in the event of his reduction being dismissed. Where decree has passed in absence, the defender shall be re-heard on consigning the sums decerned for in the hands of the Clerk of Court, within the days of the charge, and giving intimation thereof to the complainer before the following Court day—And in like manner where absolvitor has passed in absence, the cause to be re-heard on the complainer consigning 2s. 6d. and giving intimation to the defender.—The following are the fees fixed by act 39 and 40, Geo. III. cap. 46; but subject to the modification of

the Justices in very small cases, or where one petition is directed against different defenders.



All goods having paid shore-dues inwards are exempted from dues when shipped outwards, if they be in the original state.

All goods having paid shore-dues outwards, are exempted from dues when brought inwards, if they be returned goods, to the original shipper, and in the original state.

All returned empty boxes, barrels, bags, sacks, and pack-sheets, are exempted from dues.

All goods not enumerated in the schedule to be charged by the Commissioners in proportion to other goods of similar bulk and value specified in said schedule.

All goods imported or exported by persons who are not Burgesses of Dundee, or who are not free by service in his Majesty's navy or army, and domiciled within the borough of Dundee, to pay one half more than the dues in the said schedule.

All goods, merchandise, wares, or commodities whatsoever, and all beasts, conveyed in licensed passage-boats from any of the ferries of Ferry-Port-on-Craig, Newport,

Woodhaven, or Balmerino, in the county of Fife, to the ferry of Dundee, or from the ferry of Dundee to any of those ferries, are exempted from payment of shore-dues.

Lime and coal landed within the precincts of the harbour, to the eastward of the Rood-Yards and to the westward of the Magdalen Yard, to pay one half of the dues in the said schedule.

Five cubic feet, not exceeding two and a half hundred-weight, to be rated a barrel bulk; but when the weight of five cubic feet is greater than two and a half hundred-weight, then two and a half hundredweight to be rated a barrel bulk.

In weighing and measuring goods, for ascertaining the shore-dues payable, the weight or measurement of the packages is to be included.

Vessels, although registered at the port of Dundee, if navigated by masters who are not burgesses of Dundee, to pay one half more than the dues in the above schedule; but if the masters be domiciled in the borough of Dundee and be free by service in his Majesty's navy or army, the vessels to pay the same dues as if navigated by burgesses of Dundee.

All foreign vessels to pay double the above dues.

All vessels navigated by foreign masters to pay double the above dues.

All vessels leaving the harbour of Dundee, or precincts thereof, having paid tonnage-dues on the voyage inwards, and taking on board goods at any other port or place in the river Tay, and returning to the harbour of Dundee or precincts thereof, to complete their cargoes, shall not be liable in tonnage-dues for such returns.

All vessels launched at the port of Dundee to pay tonnage-dues on the voyage outwards, according to the distance of the port to which such vessels sail, provided they take goods on board; but if they sail in ballast, no dues shall be charged.

All vessels with cargoes to be permitted to enter the harbour of Dundee, for safety or convenience, by payment of one half of the tonnage-dues; but if they shall take goods on board (stores for their own use excepted), or break bulk, they shall be liable in the full tonnage-dues.

All vessels remaining in harbour six months to pay one third more than the above dues, excepting vessels belonging to Dundee employed in the whale-fishery.

All vessels remaining in harbour for one year to pay double the above dues.

All vessels remaining in harbour for a longer period than one year, to pay in proportion to the length of time they shall so remain.

All vessels loading or unloading goods in the precincts of the harbour of Dundee shall be exempted from payment of plank-money.

All steam-vessels employed in the river Tay, in carrying passengers and their luggage exclusively, shall be exempted from payment of shore-dues.

All vessels leaving the harbour for the purpose of taking on board ballast in any part of the river Tay, and returning to the said harbour or precincts thereof with ballast, shall not be liable in shore-dues for such return.

All vessels sailing from the port of Dundee, and put back by stress of weather or any other cause, without having accomplished her voyage, shall not be liable in additional shore-dues for such return.

All vessels from any part of the river Tay with stones, and having no other goods on board, and delivering their cargoes in the precincts of the said harbour, to pay two shillings each voyage, in name of tonnage-dues.

All vessels arriving in ballast for the purpose of being repaired in the graving-dock, and departing in ballast, shall be exempted from shore-dues.

All vessels, and their cargoes of stones, wood, and other materials whatsoever, brought into the harbour or precincts thereof, for the use of the harbour works, ferry harbour-works, or any of the public works of the town of Dundee, shall be exempted from shore-dues, and ferry-boats from tonnage, anchorage, and beacon-dues.



☞ As the weights of Amsterdam, Paris, Bourdeaux, Strasburg, Besancon, and several other places, have

but a minute difference, they are all comprehended under those of Amsterdam—Nuremberg under Frankfurt—and others in the same manner.

EXPLANATION.—By the help of the said table, and the application of the rule of three, any foreign weights may be reduced to their equivalents in English, or English weights to their equivalent quantities abroad. For example: What are 500 lbs. of Lyons equal to in England? By the table, 106 lbs. of Lyons : 100 lbs. of England : : 500 lbs. of Lyons : 471 lbs. 12 oz. nearly.

The foregoing is an average weekly account of the rising and setting of the sun, very ingeniously calculated for any Year, by Mr George Cromwell, Bell Yard, Doctors' Commons, London.

The table contains a weekly list of PARALLEL DAYS, OR CORRESPONDING SEASONS; to shew, if the sun rises and sets at a certain time, on any enumerated day, on what other day in the year it will rise and set at the same time. If, for instance, the sun rises at 46 minutes after 7, and sets at 14 minutes after 4, on the 18th of January, the same will happen on the 22d of November. Again, if it rises at 4, and sets at 8, on the 24th of May, so it will on the 19th of July. The table may also serve as a convenient reference, to find on what day of the week any given date will occur, by reading the following plain rules:

EXPLANATION OF THE USE OF THIS TABLE.

Required to know the day of the week of the 1st September, 1825?

The 1st of January, 1825, in the list of years above, is Saturday, and in the first column of Saturday in a line with September, Thursday is inserted; consequently, the 1st of September, 1825, is shewn to be on a Thursday; if 1825 were a leap year, then, as inserted in the second column of Saturday under letter L, it would fall on a Friday.

When the day of the week of the first of any month is known, it is easy to ascertain the same of any date in that month, so that by the help of this table, the week day of any date may be readily ascertained, and in a great degree, as far as respects time, it will answer the purpose of an almanack.

In general, the nearer the time of the Moon's change, First Quarter, full, and Last Quarter, is to mid-night, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following; and the nearer to mid-day, or noon, these phases of the Moon happen, the more foul or wet the weather may be expected to be during the next seven days.

POLICE.

THE provisions of the Police Act are, for watching, lighting, watering, cleansing, and paving the streets,—erecting and maintaining a police-office and watch-houses,—a bridewell,—prevention, detection, and punishment of crime,—and for other necessary matters.—The expence to be defrayed by an assessment of 1s. per pound on all rents of whatever kinds of property (churches and schools excepted), from £2 to £5, and of 1s. 3d. per pound upon rents of £5, and upwards.—The payment of the assessment is imperative; but those to whom the benefit of the act is not extended, cannot be assessed to support it. Penalties are incurred and summarily recovered for infringements of the provisions of the act. The act is to be carried into execution by two Commissioners elected for each ward, and a body of the Magistrates, including the Sheriff-Depute, and his Substitute for Dundee (if one is appointed); in all thirty-one or thirty-two, as the case may be. The Commissioners are annually appointed, and beside the General there are two Resident Commissioners in each ward, for the management of the more important inferior details within their respective bounds, of which they are chief Constables.

The powers and regulations of this act extend over the royalty of the borough of Dundee, and the whole grounds and houses locally situate and comprehended within the following limits,—viz. within a line commencing on the east at the river Tay, and running northwards in the line of the east march of Mayfield on the lands of Craigie, to the southern extremity of that march; thence along that march to the turnpike-road leading from Dundee to Arbroath; thence eastward along that turnpike-road until its junction with the old Craigie Road; northwards along that road to the Stobsmuir turnpike-road; across that road, and from it along the old road by the head of Robsmuir and Clepington, till it reaches the east road to the

Fair Muir, around the march of the Fair Muir, so as to include it, until it joins the Strathmartine turnpike-road; southwards along the Strathmartine turnpike-road until its junction with the road which leads by the back of the Law of Dundee from the Strathmartine turnpike-road to the Cupar and Meikle turnpike-road; along the northern boundary of that road to the Lochee toll-bar, on the turnpike-road from Dundee to Cupar and Meikle; from that toll-bar westwards along the road until it reaches the stone wall which runs on the west side of the houses and garden-ground known by the name of Lark or Lerrick Hall; across from the turnpike road to the march between the estate of Logie and the estate of Balgay; from the turnpike-road southwards along that stone wall to the said march; thence along the march southwards to the extremity of Logie; thence southwards to the Blackness Road, along the dike and hedge which form the present boundary between Blackness and Balgay; thence along the northern boundary of the Blackness Road westwards to the line of the march which is on the south side of that road between Blackness and Balgay; and southwards along that march down to the river Tay. This extent is divided into Wards, as follow:—

Ward I. is bounded on the north by King-street and the turnpike-road leading from Dundee to Aibroath; on the east by the eastern boundary before described of the limits to which this act extends; on the south by the River Tay; on the west by St. Andrew's-street and Trades' Lane; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward II. is bounded on the north by the Cowgate and Murraygate streets, as far west as to include the Trades' Hall; on the west by the High-street and Castle-street, and the West Quay of the Wet Dock; on the south by the River; and on the east by St. Andrew's-street and Trade's Lane; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward III. is bounded on the north by the High-street and the Nethergate-street (exclusive of the English Chapel), as far west as the Lane known by the name of the Slate or Sea-wynd; on the west by the said Slate or

Sea-wynd; on the south by the River; and on the east by Castle-street and the West Quay of the Wet Dock; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward IV. is bounded on the north by the Nethergate-street west from the Slate or Sea-wynd, and by the turnpike-road leading from Dundee to Perth; on the west by the western boundary before described of the limits to which this act extends; on the south by the River; and on the east by the Slate or Sea-wynd; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward V. is bounded on the south by the turnpike-road leading from Dundee to Perth; on the east by Small's-wynd, by a line from the top or north end of Small's-wynd along the Hawkhill-road to the top or south end of the passage known by the name of Anderson's-close, or the Little-close, leading from the Hawkhill-road to the Blackness-road, and by the said passage to the Blackness-road; on the north by the Blackness-road westwards to the boundary before described of the limits to which this act extends; and on the west by the said boundary of the limits to which this act extends; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward VI. is bounded on the east by Barrack-street, Barrack-road, and Constitution Brae, and thence by the road leading along the west side of Stirling's Park and the east side of the Law, until it reaches the north boundary before described of the limits to which this act extends; on the south by the Overgate-street, from Barrack-street westwards by the street or road leading from the west end of the Overgate, along by the West Port and Witchknow to the Blackness-road, and thence by the Blackness-road; and on the north and west by the bounds before described of the limits to which this act extends; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward VII. is bounded on the west by the Barrack-road from the road or street along the north side of the Meadows known by the name of Bell-street, northwards by the Constitution Brae, and thence by the road leading along the west side of Stirling's Park and the east side of the Law, until it reaches the north boundary before described of the limits to which this act extends; on the south and

east by Bell-street, by the close or passage leading from the east end of Bell-street northward, by the west side of the Tannage Yard; from the north end of that passage by the road or passage leading on the south side of the Ladywell to the foot of the Hillton; thence by the Bucklemaker-wynd, the road by the Dens, and the new road to Clepington, and thence by the old road between Easter and Wester Clepington to the northern boundary before described of the limits to which this act extends; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward VIII. is bounded on the west and north by the Wellgate-street, from the top of the Wellgate-street by the Bucklemaker-wynd and Clepington roads to the northern boundary of the limits to which this act extends; on the south by part of the Cowgate-street, from the foot of the Wellgate to King-street, and by King-street and the turnpike-road leading from Dundee to Arbroath; and on the east and north by the boundary before described of the limits to which this act extends; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward IX. is bounded on the west by Barrack-street and the Barrack-road, up to the west end of Bell-street; on the north-east and south by Bell-street, the before-mentioned passage leading from the east end of Bell-street, northward, by the west end of the Tannage Yard; from the north end of that passage by the road or passage leading on the south side of the Ladywell to the top of the Wellgate, and by the Wellgate, Murraygate, High-street, and Overgate, to the foot of Barrack-street; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

Ward X. is bounded on the west by Small's-wynd and the before-mentioned passage known by the name of Anderson's-close or the Little-close; on the south by the Nethergate-street, from the foot or south end of Small's-wynd to the foot or south end of the Long-wynd; on the east by the Long-wynd; and on the north by the Overgate-street, from the top or north end of the Long-wynd westwards, and by the before-mentioned street or road (part of the boundary of Ward VI.) leading from the west end of the Overgate, along by the Westport and Witchknow, to the Blackness-road, and thence to the northern

extremity of the west boundary by the Blackness-road; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

And Ward XI. is bounded on the west by the Long-wynd; on the north by the Overgate, from the top or north end of the Long-wynd eastwards to the High-street; on the east by the Highstreet; and on the south by the Nethergate, including the English Chapel; and comprehends the whole space within these bounds.

The limits of wards run along the centre of the streets, roads, lanes, and closes, by which they are bounded.

The Judges of Police are the Provost, the four Bailies, and the Dean of Guild, as to all offences, &c. committed within the borough, and the Sheriff and his substitutes beyond the borough. The Court may hear and give judgment, in a summary manner, in all complaints made under the act against persons accused of theft, swindling, unlawful gambling, assault, rioting, breaking the peace, or any such other criminal, riotous, or disorderly conduct, or of offending against any of the provisions of the act, or any of the regulations established by its authority. No complaint can be entertained in the Police Court for offences committed beyond three months from the date of the complaint; and neither the Judges, the Commissioners, the Superintendent, nor any other person can be prosecuted for any thing done under the act, unless wilful corruption, or oppression, or culpable negligence, out of which real injury has arisen, be charged.

The warrants of the Police Court may be executed upon any part of the Firth of Tay within the limits of the port of Dundee,—that is, from the Burn of Invergowrie to the Gaa of Barry.

REFERENCES TO THE VIEWS OF DUNDEE IN 1693.

[These two Views are from those by Slezzer, the celebrated engineer, in 1693, and certainly show our "gude town" in very limited compass; but in his day, and indeed for long after, the two Chapelshades were not built, neither were the Hawkhill, Scouringburn, and Pleasance, to the westward, nor any part of Black's croft on the east—So that the engineer's nut-shell sketch of "Bonny Dundee," is easily accounted for.]

VIEW FROM DUDHOPE.—The most considerable object, of course, is the old steeple in the centre, the cape-house on which wants the roof, and the dial-plate of the clock is on the north side. The building, east of the steeple, with conical-roofed turrets, was the old town-house, which stood on the site of the present one. The hospital, with a small spire, appears to the westward, and below it, in the corner of the fore-ground, part of Dudhope Castle. On the north of the steeple, and obstructing the view of the lower part of it, is the windmill-brae, on the east of which are what were the friars' gardens, (now a tan-yard, the houff, &c.) and beyond these a small part of the rocky ground, east at Morren's north Entry, appears.

VIEW FROM WALLACE-CRAIGIE.—The large house, next the shipping, is what was called 'the Earl's lodging,' the property of the late Provost Guild; and that immediately beside it is the Old Custom-house in the Fishmarket—both still standing. Following the outline of the town, the hospital, with its spire, appears—next the old town-house—then the steeple, with the old and cross churches—and, close upon these, the windmill-brae and friary gardens, as mentioned above. In the distance is Blackness-house—a little below that Dudhope Castle—and, lower still, part of the Hillton. Immediately down from the Hospital is the Castle-hill—and, in the lower line of houses, a little to the right, appears the Cowgate-port (the only remains of our ancient walls; allowed to stand in grateful remembrance of the pious George Wishart, who preached from it during the plague in 1555.
