

REPRINT OF THE FIRST DUNDEE REGISTER FOR 1783.

We have before us a reprint in *facsimile* of the first number of the "Dundee Register" or Directory, which was published in the year 1782. We believe there is only one copy of the original known to exist, and it is from this unique volume that the present reprint has been prepared. The quality and kind of paper and style of type of the original have all as far as possible been rigidly adhered to. The edition has been limited to 100 copies, and, as showing the interest taken in the quaint reprint, nearly all that number have been already subscribed for. The few remaining copies will doubtless be eagerly sought after by local antiquarians and others interested in the history and progress of the town. Mr A. C. Lamb, who owns the rare original, has made its republication a labour of love, and has bestowed an amount of attention in securing an exact *fac-*

simile from which the *facsimile* is the staple, of which there have been above four millions of yards annually stamped of late. Threads have been long famous in Dundee, and are now manufactured to a large amount, employing about 3000 people. The inhabitants are reckoned to be about 16,000."

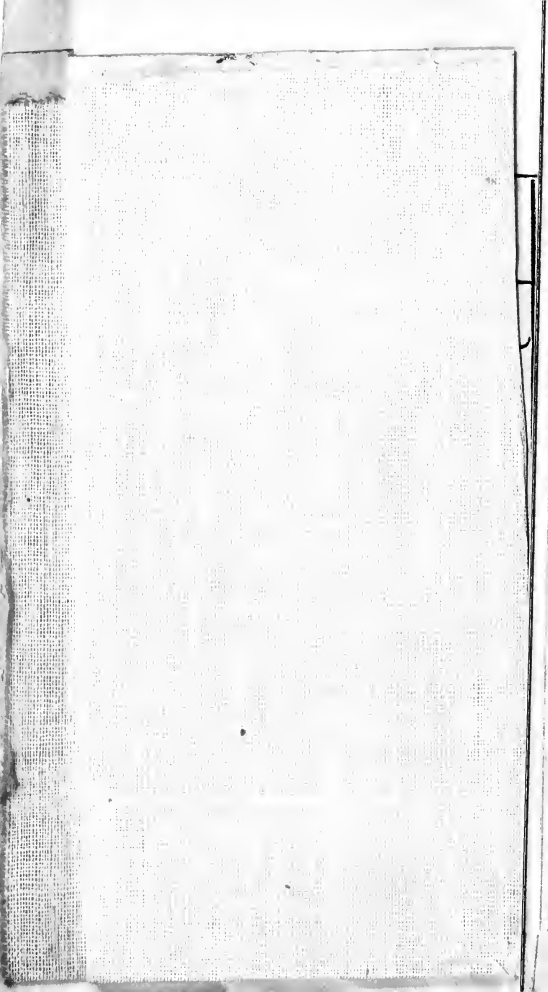

An Account of the Town of DUNDEE, &c.

DUNDEE, the *Alcedum* or *Taodunum* of the antients, is a well built flourishing town, in the shire of Angus, or Forfar, and ranks as third of the royal boroughs.

It is seated on the north side of the river Tay, about eight miles from its mouth, in W. L. 2. 48. N. L. 56. 26. It is very advantageously situated for commerce. Trading vessels of a large burden can get into its harbour. There are convenient and handsome warehouses built in 1756; and also a good area for ship building, which has been carried on to a good extent. The houses are built of stone.

The High street is a very spacious oblong square, in the centre of the town:—from it branch out the four principal streets, viz. the Nethergate, Overgate, Seagate, and

Murraygate, which, with several lesser ones, have all been lately paved. On the south side of the High street stands the Town-house. It is a noble structure of architecture, and was finished in 1734. It contains two elegant rooms, one of which is used occasionally as a mason lodge and assembly room; the Baillies Court-Room, Post-office, Bank-office, and vaulted repository for the records. At the east end of the street is a Trades-hall, lately erected: It contains a very large and well finished room, and nine lesser ones, for the use of the nine incorporations. Three established churches, besides several chapels and meeting houses, having been found insufficient for the increasing number of inhabitants, a handsome new church has been lately built in the Cowgate, on the north part of the town.

There is also a magnificent square Gothic tower or steeple: it is now separated from the other buildings; but was formerly a part of a venerable and superb building of churches in the form of a cross, erected by David Earl of Huntindon, brother to William I. of Scotland, and was dedicated to the Virgin Mary. This he did on his third crusade (in which, with 500 of his countrymen, he had accompanied Richard I. of England, *anno* 1189), in gratitude for his deliverance from several imminent dangers, and particularly from shipwreck, by which he had nearly perished when in view of the place.

At this period he changed the name of the town from *Alectum* to *Deidonum*; and under this name we find it increasing considerably in the 13th century. The destruction of the churches adjoining to this tower, was the work of Edward I. of England, that barbarous destroyer of monuments and records. He was so enraged that the inhabitants should oppose him, and aid his inveterate foe the famous Wallace, that he set fire to the churches and town, the flames destroying all but a part on the east side, now called the *Old Kirk*. The town suffered very much about the middle of the last century; for just six years after it had been stormed by Montrose, it was besieged in form by General Monk; and although it made a gallant defence under Lumfden, it was at last carried by force on the 1st September 1651, when all that were in arms were put to the sword. There were above sixty vessels in the harbour at that time. In order to enable the inhabitants to recover from these calamities, and to repair their harbour and other public works, Charles II. granted them a excise of one third of an English penny upon every gallon of ale or beer sold in the town for twenty-five years. This act has been continued by five subsequent acts. At present Dundee is in a very flourishing state; manufactures go on briskly, and there are near one hundred sail of shipping belonging to the place. The several

manufactories consist of linnen ; (especially Osnaburghs), sail cloth, cordage, threads, stockings, buckrams, tanned-leathers, shoes, and hats. A sugar-house has been erected some years ago. The Osnaburgh trade is the staple, of which there has been above four millions of yards annually stamped of late. Threads have been long famous in Dundee, and are now manufactured to a large amount, employing about 3000 people. The inhabitants are reckoned to be about 16 000. There has lately been built an excellent new quay for the common passage, and which accommodates travellers, in passing at all times of the tide. And a new street leading to the shore has been lately opened, which promises to be of much service. The town is well and plentifully supplied with water and all sorts of vivres, and has an excellent butchery market-place, lately built.

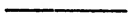

- 85 Julius Agricola, governor of South Britain, to protect the Britons from the incursions of the Caledonians and Picts, built a line of forts between the rivers Forth and Clyde, defeats the Caledonians under Galgacus on the Grampian hills, and first sails round Britain which he discovers to be an island.
- 121 The Caledonians reconquer from the Romans all the southern parts of Scotland, upon which the Emperor Adrian builds a wall between Newcastle and Carlisle; but this proving ineffectual, Pollius Urbicus, the Roman general, about the year 144, repairs Agricola's forts, which he joins by a wall four yards thick.
- 139 Justin writes his first apology for the Christians
- 217 The Septuagint found in a cask.
- 313 The tenth persecution ends by an edict of Constantine, who favours the Christians, and gives full liberty to their religion
- 426 The Romans, reduced to extremities

at home, withdraw their troops from Britain, and never return.

- 446 The Britons, now left to themselves, are greatly harassed by the Scots and Picts.
- 449 Vortigern, king of the Britons, invites the Saxons into Britain against the Scots and Picts.
- 508 Prince Arthur begins his reign over the Britons.
- 685 The Britons, after a brave struggle of 150 years, are totally expelled by the Saxons, and drove into Wales.
- 836 The Flemings trade to Scotland for fish.
- 838 The Scots and Picts have a decisive battle, in which the former prevail, and both kingdoms are united by Kenneth, which begins the second period of the Scots history.
- 1000 Paper made of Cotton rags, that of Linen in 1170.
- 1115 Children forbidden by law to be sold by their parents.
- 1040 The Danes, about this time, driven out of Scotland.

- 1285 Alexander III. dies, and the kingdom of Scotland is disputed by 12 candidates, who submit their claims to the arbitration of Edward king of England, which lays the foundation of a long war between both nations.
- 1298 Wine sold by apothecaries as a cordial.
- 1314 The battle of Bannockburn between Edward II. and Robert Bruce, which establishes the latter on the throne of Scotland.

- 1340 Gunpowder and guns first invented by Swartz, a monk of Cologn.
- 1346 The battle of Durham, in which David king of Scotland is taken prisoner.
- 1354 The money in Scotland till now the same as in England.
- 1388 The battle of Otterburn between Botspur and the Earl of Douglas.
- 1391 Cards invented in France for the king's amusement.
- 1412 The university of St Andrews founded
- 1440 Printing invented by L. Koster at Harlaem in Holland, and brought into England, by W. Caxton in 1471.
- 1446 The sea breaks in at Dort, in Holland, and drowns a hundred thousand people.
- 1454 The university of Glasgow founded.
- 1460 Engraving and etching on copper invented.
- 1477 The university of Aberdeen founded.
- 1843 Richard III. of England is defeated and killed at the battle of Bosworth, by Henry [Tudor] VII. which puts an end to the civil wars between the houses of York and Lancaster, after a contest of 30 years, and the loss of 100,000 men.
- 1513 The battle of Flowden, in which king James IV is killed, with the flower of his nobility.
- 1517 Martin Luther began the reformation.
- 1539 The first translation of the bible au-

- thorised, and the present translation finished in 1611.
- 1558 Queen Elizabeth begins her reign.
- 1560 The reformation in Scotland completed by John Knox.
- 1572 The massacre of the protestants at Paris.
- 1583 Tobacco first brought into England from Virginia.
- 1587 Mary queen of Scotland is beheaded by order of Elizabeth, after 18 years imprisonment.
- 1588 The Spanish Armada destroyed by Admiral Drake.
- 1603 Queen Elizabeth dies, and nominates James VI. of Scotland her successor, which unites both kingdoms under the name of Great Britain.
- 1605 The gunpowder plot discovered at Westminster, being a project of the Papists to blow up the king and both houses of parliament
- 1610 Henry IV. murdered at Paris by Ravillac, a priest.
- 1614 Napier of Merchiston invents the logarithms.
- 1625 King James dies, and is succeeded by his son Charles I.
- 1635 Regular posts established betwixt London and Scotland
- 1640 King Charles disobliges his Scots subjects, on which their army under general Lesley, enters England and takes Newcastle.

- The massacre in Ireland, when 40,000 English protestants were killed.
- 1643 Excise on beer, ale, &c. first imposed by parliament.
- 1649 Charles I. beheaded by Cromwell, at Whitehall 30th January, aged forty-nine.
- 1654 Cromwell assumes the protectorship.
- 1655 The English, under admiral Penn, take Jamaica from the Spaniards.

- 1666 The great fire in London, in which are destroyed no less than 13,000 houses, and 400 streets.

- 1676 Callicoe printing first set on foot in England
- 1680 A great comet appeared, and, from its nearness to the earth, alarmed the inhabitants. It continued visible from Nov. 3 to March 9.
William Penn, a quaker receives a charter for planting Pennsylvania.
- 1683 Penny-post instituted at London.
- 1685 Charles II. dies, aged 55, and is succeeded by his brother James II.
The Duke of Monmouth, natural son to Charles II. raises a rebellion,

but is defeated and beheaded.

- 1688 The revolution in Great Britain began Nov. 5. King James abdicates, and retires to France, Dec. 3.
King William and Queen Mary, daughter and son in law to James, are proclaimed Feb 16
Viscount Dundee stands out for James in Scotland, but is killed by general Macay at the battle of Killycrankie.
- 1689 The land tax passed in England.
Several bishops are deprived for not taking the oath to K. William
- 1690 The battle of Boyne, gain'd by William against James, in Ireland
- 1691 Sir George M Kenzie, Dundee, writes the antiquities and laws of Scotland.
The war in Ireland finished, by the surrender of Limerick to William.
- 1693 Bayonets at the end of loaded muskets first used by the French against the Confederates in the battle of Turin.
Bank of England established by King William
The first public lottery was drawn this year.
Massacre of Highlanders at Glencoe by King William's army.
- 1694 Queen Mary dies at the age of 33.
- 1699 The Scots settle a colony at the isthmus of Darien, in America, and call it Caledonia.
- 1700 King James dies at St. Germain, aged 68.

- 1701 Prussia erected into a kingdom.
- 1702 King William dies, and is succeeded by Queen Ann.
- 1704 Gibraltar taken from the Spaniards by Admiral Rook.

George Augustus Frederic, prince of Wales born August 12.

1763 The definitive treaty of peace between Great Britain, France, Spain, and Portugal, concluded at Paris, February 10th, which confirms to Great Britain the extensive provinces of Ca-

nada, East and West Florida, and part of Louisiana, in North America; also the islands of Grenada, St Vincent, Dominica, and Tobago, in the West Indies.

Harrison's time-keeper for discovering the longitude invented.

1764 The parliament granted 10,000*l.* to Mr Harrison, for his discovery of the longitude by his time-piece.

1765 His majesty's royal charter passed for incorporating the Society of Artists.

1768 Academy of painting established at London.

The Turks imprison the Russian ambassador, and declare war against the empire.

1770 Canal between Forth and Clyde begun; finished in 1776.

1771 Dr Solander, and Mr Banks, in his majesty's ship the Endeavour, Lieutenant Cooke, return from a voyage round the world, having made several important discoveries in the south seas.

1772 The King of Sweden changes the constitution from aristocracy to a limited monarchy.

The Pretender marries a princess of Germany, grand daughter of Thomas, late Earl of Aylesbury.

The Emperor of Germany, Empress of Russia, and the King of Prussia, strip the king of Poland of great

part of his dominion, which they divide among themselves, in violation of the most solemn treaties.

1773 Captain Philips is sent to explore the North Pole, but having made 81 degrees, is in danger of being locked up by the ice, and his attempt to discover a passage in that quarter proves fruitless.

The Jesuites expelled from the Pope's dominions.

The English East India Company having, by conquest or treaty, acquired the extensive provinces of Bengal, Orixia, and Banar, containing fifteen millions of inhabitants, great irregularities are committed by their servants abroad, upon which government interferes, and sends out judges, &c. for the better administration of justice. The wars between the Russians and Turks prove disgraceful to the latter, who lose the islands in the Archipelago, and by sea are every where unsuccessful.

1774 Peace is proclaimed between the Russians and Turks.

The British parliament having passed an act, laying a duty of three-pence per pound upon all teas imported into America, the Colonists, considering this as a grievance, deny the right of the British parliament to tax them.

1775 The American Colonies send deputies

to Philadelphia, who assume the title of The Congress of the Thirteen United Provinces, and all the powers of government.

1766 The Congress declare the United States of America independant of the crown and parliament of Great Britain, 4th of July, in Philadelphia.

1777 Lieut. Gen. Burgoyne's convention and surrender of his army at Saratoga, in Canada, to the Provincial army, under the command of Gen. Gates and Arnold, 17th of October.

1778 Toleration of Popery in England, by act of Parliament.

Attempt to introduce the toleration in Scotland.

1780 A free trade granted to Ireland by the British parliament.

American independance first celebrated at Philadelphia, 4th of July.

Charlestown taken from the Americans, 12th May.

A signal victory obtained by Lord Cornwallis over the American army, commanded by General Gates, 16th of August.

Declaration of hostilities against Holland, published 20th December.

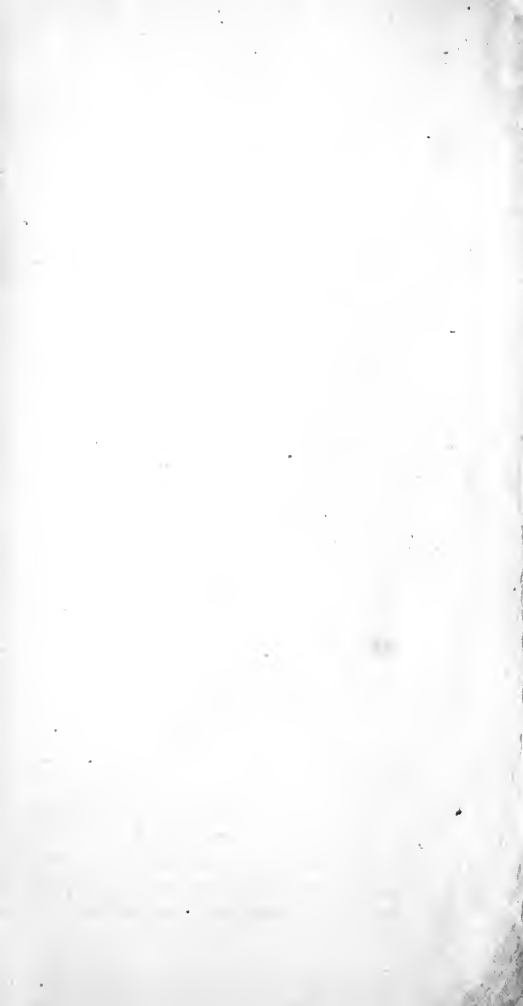

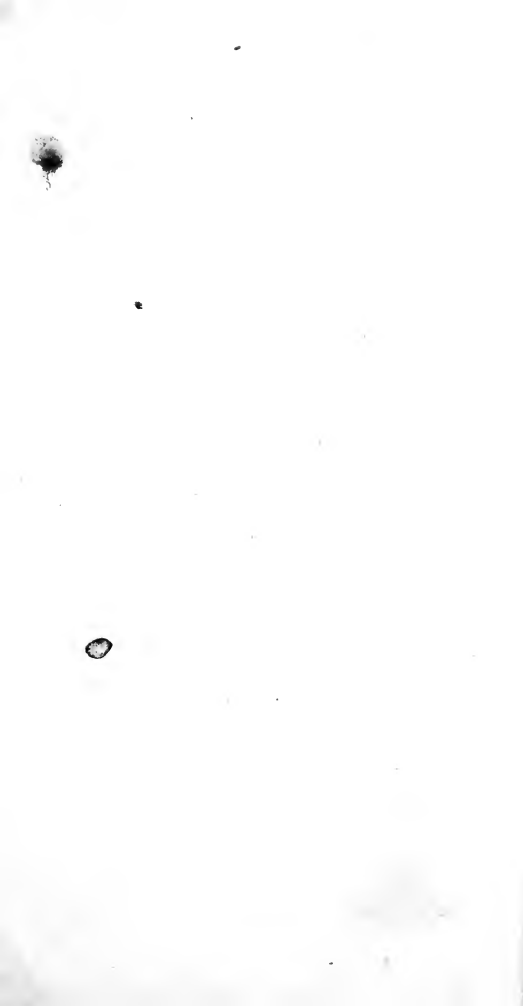
