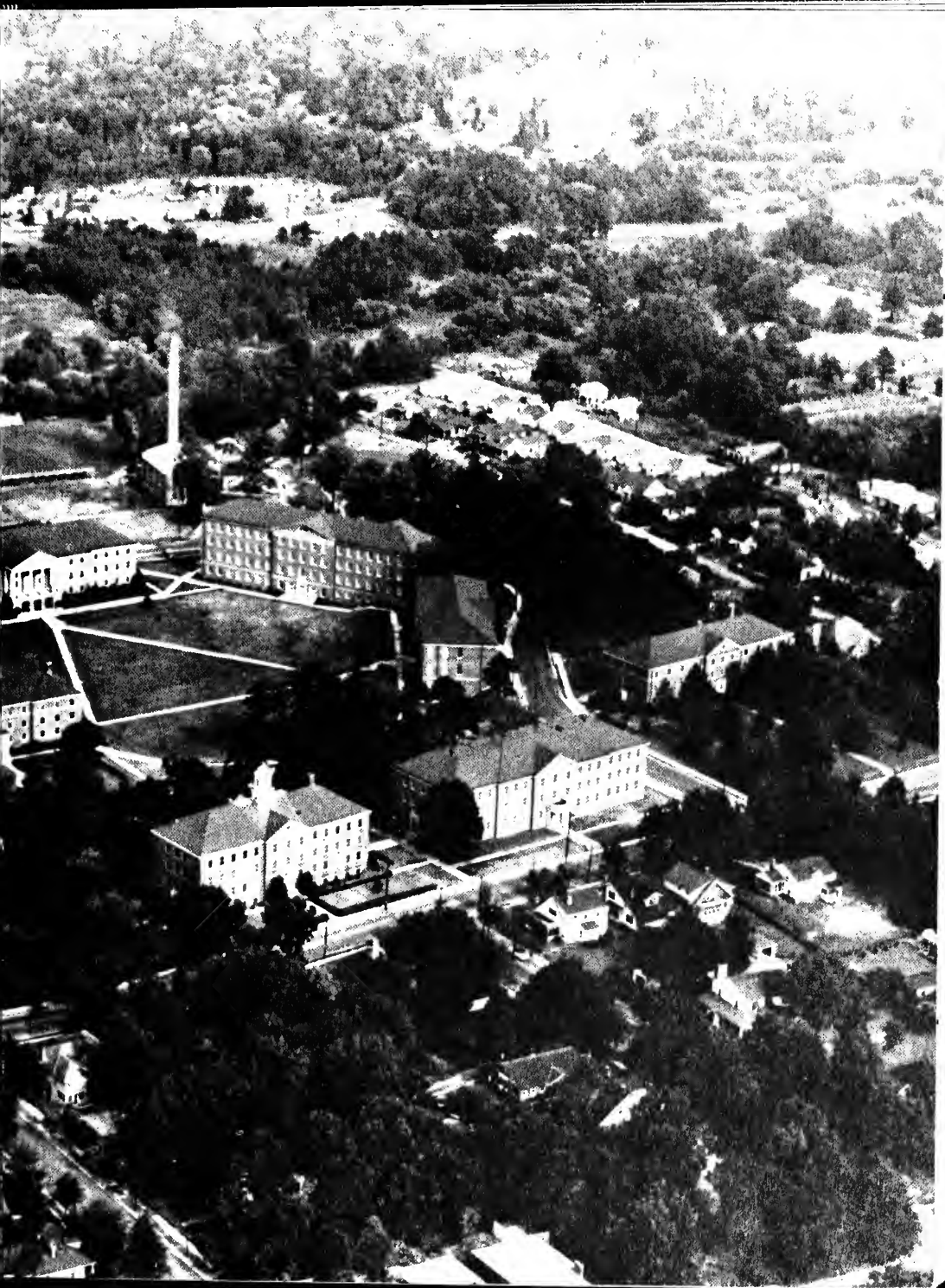

FOREWORD

There are three intrinsic stages in the progress of any educational institution: the past, the present, and the future. The past reflects the dreams and works of the earlier administration, the there and the then, and that which for some strange reason now seems grotesque. The present symbolizes reality, what is here and now, and what seems will forever be. The future represents hopes and ambitions, the "way over yonder" where our bright star is cast, and the "what" seems as though it will never be reached. The three are inextricably bound, for the past was at that time the present, the present was then the future, and the future is now the present; and what is the present if it is not a time to reflect on the past, to live for now, and to plan for the future?

And so it is with North Carolina College at Durham — we have our past, our present, and our future. Our past begins somewhere around 1910 when our founder, Dr. James E. Shepard, saw his faith and hope that were conceived in a dark past come to reality. It was necessary to clear off land used for a city dump and erect a few wooden buildings to accommodate a hand full of students seeking to make their futures bright. Basing their motives on religious training, our first alumni and administration girded around the God of their weary years, locked hand in hand, and walked unstrayingly in their designated path to mold these sloping hills of verdant green on which we now stand at last.

Our present begins somewhere around 1960, fifty years later. Most of us, being the first of the World War II babies and being fresh from the battle fields of the war now being waged to put that salvaged democracy into practice, came here with ideas and motives far removed from those of our ancestors of half a century ago. We, over 2,000 of us, make use of thirty-six brick structured buildings without the slightest notions of how those few wooden ones appeared. Our motives are not now less religious, but more secular; we are not locked hand in hand fighting to throw off a stereotyped image, but seeking individuality. Let it suffice to say that we deem individuality necessary if we are to be catapulted into the main-stream of American life. So we now share in a dream undeferred and in a hope that has lived since birth, and we are assured of this each day we rise and go to classes at the ringing of the ancient bell.

Our future is, as all are, a speculative one; there is for North Carolina College at Durham only one certainty — a four million dollar appropriation to this college by the North Carolina State Legislature. Four new buildings — two dormitories, a student union and a cafeteria — are on the planning board. They are our present needs, as we see them, for being the difference between an existing state affairs and a desirable or inevitable state of affairs. Long range plans are in the making for the thousands of students who will follow us — students, with new and different ideas, different motivations, and different aspirations, who will someday walk among our ruins, and rise and go to classes at the ringing of the ancient bell.

That's how it is now. It is apropos to presently reflect on our past and look to the future; so we drag out the pen, ink, paper, scissors, and other paraphonelia necessary for assembling a yearbook, and put together a pictorial interpretation of NCC's past, present, and future — a lasting memory that in many ways is real and in many others fantasized, yet, one that one day each of us will be able to look back through and say, "Oh! Yes, I remember that. I was there."

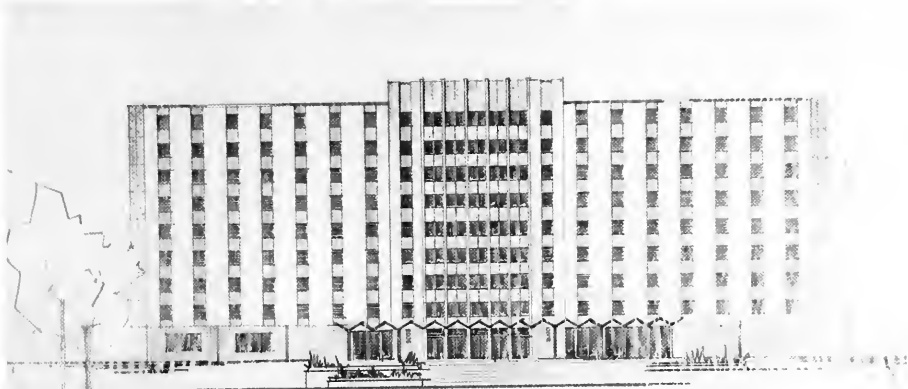

MEMORIAM

Dr. James S. Lee, Chairman of the NCC department of Biology, was known for his lectures that motivated scores of students to pursue advanced work in science. International recognition came to the NCC scholar in 1960 after he announced his discovery of a new, simple, and quick cytochemical reaction for elucidating the structure of the bacterial nucleus. For two years, 1960-1962, Dr. Lee served in the American Institute of Biological Sciences' "Distinguished Visiting Biologists" lecture series.

NCC's retired president, Dr. Alfonso Elder, commented on Dr. Lee's death by saying, "We shall always be indebted to him for the leadership which he provided in the designing and planning of our biology building. His impact upon generations of our students is indelibly written in the substantial and successful accomplishments which these students are exhibiting in their professional pursuits today."

The untimely passing of Daniel Eric Moore came as a shock to family, relatives, friends, and associates throughout the nation.

Mr. Moore was the son of a former North Carolina College dean, the late Reverend John H. Moore.

Dean D. Eric Moore attended North Carolina College for two years and later received his A.B. degree from Johnson C. Smith University.

He first came to North Carolina College as librarian of the Law School in 1940. After a short stay, he left to serve in the U.S. Army.

In 1949 he returned to NCC as dean of the School of Library Science.

Daniel Eric Moore was active in professional, civic, and church organizations.

A devoted husband and father to all who knew him, "he was a great force for good in the community, and this whole area is diminished by his loss. He was a pioneer in the day that is slowly breaking in the south. We shall miss his counsel and constructive efforts to make our country truly democratic."

AUDIOVISUAL CENTER

The Audiovisual Center is a centralized pool of equipment, materials and services. The Center services all the academic departments of the college and promotes effective utilization of audiovisual materials. The facilities of the Audiovisual Center include a recording studio, a photographic darkroom, a graphic arts room, a maintenance room, and storage space. By the end of the 1963-64 year, the installation of closed-circuit television facilities will be completed.

In addition to providing projection services for the academic departments, the Center films sports events, produces color slides for recruitment purposes and for freshman orientation; it provides projection services for full-length feature films which are sponsored by various student groups. Additionally, the Center sponsors a photography club for students and faculty members. It also arranges photographic exhibits which are aimed at deepening student appreciation of photography, and, at the same time, providing a means for student photographers to gain a sense of personal achievement.

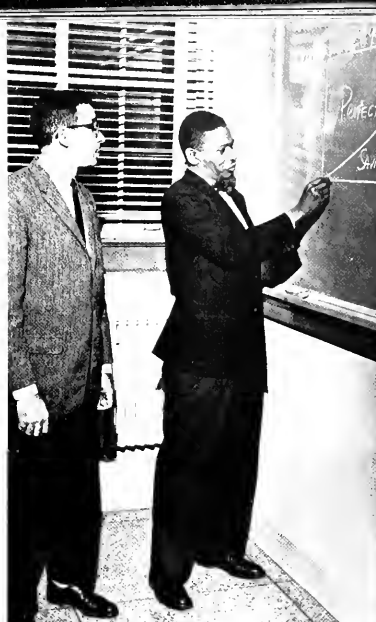

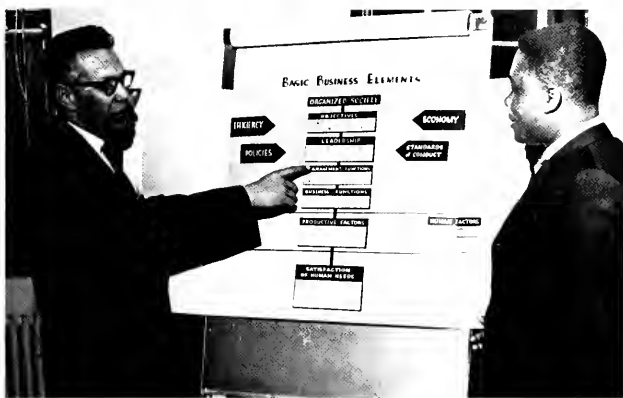

HISTORY OF THE LAW SCHOOL

The Law School is a part of the North Carolina College at Durham which was founded in 1910 by the late President James E. Shepard, as The National Religious Training School and Chautauqua.

In 1925 the North Carolina College for Negroes, which was the name of the college until changed by legislative enactment in 1947, was made the first state-supported liberal arts college in the South for the training of Negro students. In 1939 the North Carolina Legislature amended the charter of the North Carolina College for Negroes to read, in part, as follows: "... Sec. 2¹. The Board of Trustees of the North Carolina College for Negroes is authorized and empowered to establish departments of law, pharmacy, and library science at the above mentioned institution whenever there are applicants desirous of such courses. The Board of Trustees of North Carolina College for Negroes may add other professional courses from time to time as need for the same is found and the funds of the state will justify."

Pursuant to this law amending the charter of North Carolina College for Negroes, the Law School was established in 1939. The first teachers were members of the Law School faculty of the University of North Carolina and Duke University. After several weeks the Law School was closed because of lack of students.

In 1940 the Law School was reopened, and has run continuously since. The faculty for the session 1940-41 was composed wholly of members of the faculty of the Law School of the University of North Carolina working in cooperation with the late Dean M. T. Van Hecks, who was at that time Dean of the University of North Carolina Law School.

In 1941 three full-time resident Negro instructors were added to the faculty in addition to a full-time Law Librarian. The late Dean D. Eric Moore was the first full-time Law Librarian.

In 1942 Dean Van Hecks resigned to become Chairman of the Atlanta, Georgia, Regional Office of the War Labor Board. To succeed him, the present Dean, Albert L. Turner, was appointed.

Among the most distinguished graduates of the Law School are: Dr. J. H. Wheeler, President of the Mechanics and Farmers Band of Durham, North Carolina. Senator Leroy R. Johnson, the first Negro to be elected to the Georgia State Senate in one hundred years, is also a graduate of the Law School. In recent years some of the graduates have become highly successful in the practice of law in North Carolina and others have become prominent in other areas.

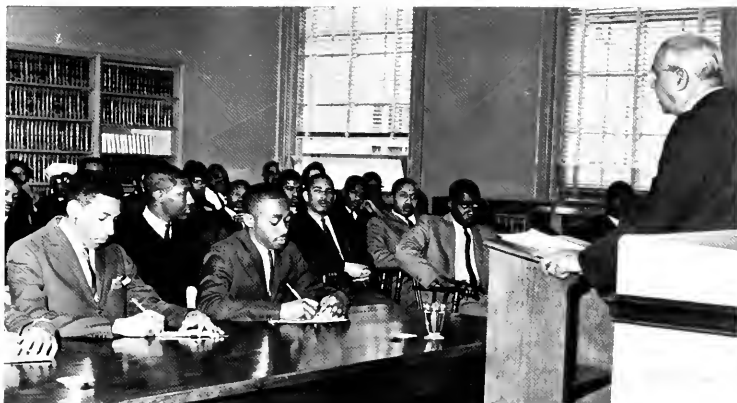

In early October when Herman H. Riddick started his nineteenth season as head coach of the North Carolina College Football Eagles, he had compiled a won-loss record of 100-50-11. At this time, many C.I.A.A. fans thought that Old Hermon would add a few but not many victories to the win side of his record. This feeling was due to the fact that the Eagles were sporting their lightest line in many years.

Nevertheless, when the opening whistle sounded, the Eagles were ready for the occasion and went out and defeated the Morgan State College Bears by a close score of 25-20. In defeating the defending C.I.A.A. football champions, the chargers of "Old Hermon" showed a surprised football circle that they were the team to win in 1963. To prove that they meant business, they persevered and defeated their next five opponents.

Along about this time, opposition was steadily growing, and the battle cry of the C.I.A.A. was "Stop the Eagles!" On November 16, 1963, the ponthers of Virginia Union University stopped the Eagles by a score of 15-14. The stage was now prepared for the Annual Thanksgiving Day Classic game with arch-rival A. & T. College. In the first quarter,

a packed Greensboro Memorial Stadium crowd saw end-quarterback "Pete" Martin hit halfback "Pedro" Currington with a pass that was good for a total of 56 yards. Martin then tried to sneak through the line of the Aggies but got no where. On the next play, "Pete" Martin hit halfback Robert "Crip" Evans with a pass that was good for 29 yards, a touchdown, the only score of the game, and the C.I.A.A. Championship for the Eagles. The rest of the game was merely a formality and a proud Eagles' defense held the Aggies in check for the remaining three quarters of the game.

For the North Carolina College Eagles, the championship was a very proud way of saying "Thank You" to head coach, Herman H. Riddick; line coach, James Stevens; assistant line coach, George Quiett; end coach, James Younge; backfield coach, Floyd Brown; and student assistants, Charlie Cox and Richard Wilkins. To the seniors on the team, Aaron Martin, Larry Newton, James Richardson, Oscar Williams, Aaron Spaulding, Elmer McMillan, William Holmes, Bobby Gardner, James Buie, Donald Thomas, Connie Boykins, Robert Evans, Charles Daye, and Robert Currington, the championship was a way of saying "Thank You" for your field leadership. Surely such a wonderful crop of seniors will be missed in the training camp of the Eagles in 1964.

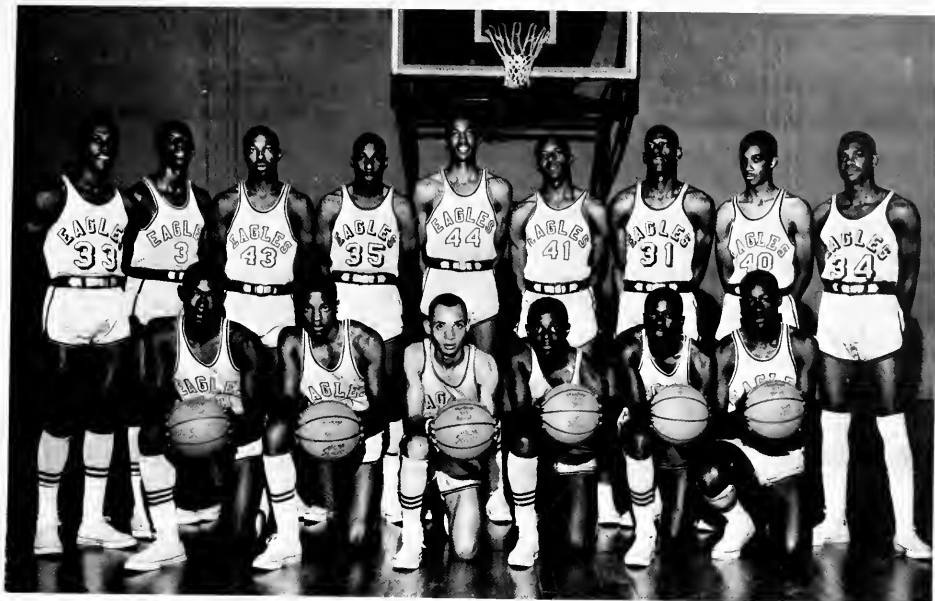

The story of North Carolina College basketball this year is not a story of the usual pattern, so and so teams, nor is it a dismal one either. Instead it is a story of a team that could and should go all the way. As some of the voices around the C.I.A.A. put it "If everyone performs up to expectations, the "Eagles" of N.C.C. should be one of the better teams in the conference this year."

To this pillar, there seems to be a great deal of merit in those words. The team of 1962-63 went into action with a group of talented freshmen plus a few seasoned regulars and went on to the C.I.A.A. tournament where they almost knocked A. & T. College out of the action. 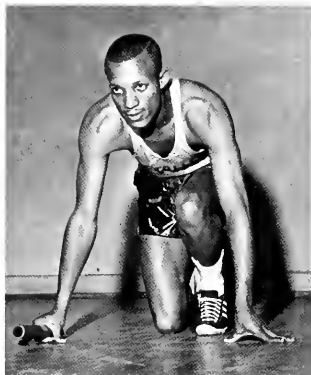

Running a college newspaper, a sometimes regrettable undertaking in most respects, evolves in time to become a gigantic time demanding pursuit, ill received and rarely appreciated. The role of a college editor, a job with unclearly defined responsibilities and unclearly designated tasks, may, by lack of understanding, cause one to become a supposed authority on many conversation items, an untiring public relations man, and a dedicated neutralist. The frequent interruptions which form so large a part of his working hours leave so much to be desired. Everyone wants to know everything, and therefore, he should know so he can tell them. This, however, is the least of his worries. He is confronted everyday of his college life with the tasks of securing and producing material which he hopes will form the nucleus of a good paper. Often he will fail. And the failure is always noticed. Sometimes he will succeed; but success is not a reliable topic for criticism, so his successes are not discussed.

The efforts undertaken by the editor center around many tasks which increase and decrease in importance as time and circumstance will. The current important tasks are that of first being a man, second a citizen, and third a student. The civil rights struggle in which we have played an active part has at times necessitated the neglecting of other duties and the postponement of pressing obligations. But still one cannot shirk from his responsibilities to seek change, nor can one ignore the prevailing conditions which one should seek, at all times, to change.

This, let it suffice to say, was our editorial policy this year and, if the conditions continue to exist, should forever be. And this, finally, has been a part of our duties, but it has not helped to get the paper to press.

Although the previously mentioned factors are a large blemish on our work sheet, they do not cover the whole page. The most constant and hardest situation to remedy is the lack of responsible help. This is the most agonizing when one realizes that the groups which furnish the most criticism also furnish the least amount of aid. It is almost too easy to obtain promises of help and offers are always present in large proportions, but somehow they never materialize. One is almost tempted to think they are insincere. But one would not think to breathe words of incerey where insincerety is not known. No! One must take the liberal and enlightened view that the promises were sincere when given, kept until needed, and broken only by a sincere strain on the heart and conscience of ones would-be helpers. These are the college editor's dilemmas; he must, in time, learn to cope with them if he is to survive. And in the process of overcoming them, he eventually winds up almost a one man staff, and misses those all important deadlines. But for one who lets his academic grades suffer, misses the weekend extra-curriculars, spends hours on hours behind a typewriter, and who has to be all alone with the "rag" from beginning to end, then criticisms become null and void, complaints trivial, Whew!, and really, missing those deadlines no big thing.
