



VISION OF NCCU LIES WITHIN US!







THE HISTORY NORTH CAROLINA CENTRAL UNIVERSITY

North Carolina Central University was established in 1910 by Dr. James L. Shepard as the National Training School and Chatauqua. Unlike many predominately black universities which are now state supported, Dr. Shepards school was not denominationally affiliated. The founder was active in the Chataugna and the International Sunday School Association movement. It was from that ecumenical perspective that he established a school with many purposes, this institution provided secondary education, trade courses, short courses for church workers and baccalaureate programs in the classics and the sciences. The school suffered many financial hardships. In 1915, after bankruptcy proceedings were solved, the institution was recognized as the National Training School with its program primarily that of a secondary academy, although college level degrees were offered. In 1923, Dr. Shepard faced the choice of affiliating with a denomination for support, or seeking state assistance. He chose the second option, and the school became the Durham State Normal School. Two years later it became the North Carolina College for Negroes to receive state support.

In 1939, still under the leadership of Dr. Shepard, the school was authorized to offer graduate and professional programs. The school graduate school was opened that fall, the law school in 1940, and the school of library

sciences in 1941.

By the time of Dr. Shepards death in 1947, the institution had grown to a \$4,000,000,00 enterprise of considerable stature. One year later, it became the North Carolina

College at Durham.

For a brief period, an interim committee directed the school. Dr. Alfonzo Elder became the institutions second president. Under Dr. Elder, the institution continued to grow. Most of the new buildings on the campus date to Dr. Elder's administration. Dr. Elder who retired in 1963, continued his affiliation with the institution as its president emeritus, until his death in 1974.

Dr. Samuel Proctor Massie was president for the period 1963-1966. In 1966, he joined the faculty of the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland, Again in transition, an intern committee assumed the functions of the chief administration officer until Dr. Albert N. Whiting became president in 1967. In 1969, the institution became North Carolina Central University, one of the sixteen tax-supported institutions of higher education which compose the University of North Carolina System.

Dr. Whiting established an Academic Skill Center, a four year nursing program, an elementary education program with emphasis on competency based training, programs in jazz and sacred music, in public administration criminal

justice and in media journalism.

The University offers the bachelors degree in twentyseven areas in the arts and sciences and the master's degree in business, and the juris doctor and bachelor of law degrees, and the master's of library science degree.

Currently, North Carolina Central University enrolls neurly 5,000 students in five schools: The undergraduate and Graduate Schools of Arts and Sciences, The School of Business, The School of Law, and the School of Library


NCCU engages in athletic competition in Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) with teams in basketball, football, tennis, and track. In addition, there are women's teams in softball, basketball, and volleyball. There are also Intramural activities available for both men

The University has a Honors Program, and many aca-

demic and cultural organizations.

Among its alumni are Mayor Jackson, Mayor of Atlanta, Clarence Lightner, former Mayor of Raleigh, North Carolina. Ronald Barbee, judge of N.C. Superior Court; Sam lones, former all pro-basketball; and many other successful individuals in business, education, law and medicine are graduates of North Carolina Central University.



N.C.C.U. helped Jesse "keep hope alive". "It's not your aptitude, but your attitude that determines how high you get in life." If there is anyone who can get a message across it is this man. The Reverend Jesse Louis Jackson. Rec. Jackson touched the hearts of so many as he spoke about the importance of voter registration. Every black person, eligible, should be a card carrying registered voter. "If Mandella can sit in jail for twenty-six years for the right, then no one

can say they have self-respect if they are not a card carrying registered coter," said Jackson. He also reminded us of the four little black girls that died in a church in Alabama and that Rev. Dr. Martin L. King was shot to death for the right to vote.

"If dogs can raise their puppies ... if cats can raise their kittens ... if eagles can take care of their eaglets until they can fly ... and if snakes can watch their little snakes 'til they shed," thundered

Jackson, "surely a young black man can take care of his own." Of course Jesse was not going to touch one subject and leave. Not only did he speak of our responsibilities, but our morals also. "Young women, your place is in the House, the House of Representatives." If there was one day in which we could all look back and smile with pride, it would be the day that the Reverend Jesse L. Jackson came to North Carolina Central University.




Registration Blues "meditation in motion"

THE VISION OF NCCU




